Now, WHO says China didn't alert it about corona

Geneva/London, July 4: The World Health Organization has updated its account of the early stages of the Covid-19 crisis to say it was alerted by its own office in China, and not by China itself, to the first pneumonia cases in Wuhan.

The UN health body has been accused by US President Donald Trump of failing to provide the information needed to stem the pandemic and of being complacent towards Beijing, charges it denies. April 9, WHO published an initial timeline of its communications, partly in response to criticism of its early response to the outbreak that has now claimed more than 5,21,000 lives worldwide.

In that chronology, WHO had said only that the Wuhan municipal health commission in the province of Hubei had December 31 reported cases of pneumonia. The UN health agency did not, however, specify who had notified it.

WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus told a news conference April 20 that the first report had come from China, without specifying whether the report had been sent by Chinese authorities or another source. But a new chronology, published this week by the Geneva-based institution, offers a more detailed version of events.

It indicates that it was the WHO office in China that December 31 notified its regional point of contact of a case of "viral pneumonia" after having

The same day, WHO's epidemic information service picked up another news report transmitted by the international epidemiological surveillance network ProMed — based in the United States — about the same group of cases of pneumonia from unknown causes in Wuhan.

After which, WHO asked the Chinese authorities on two occasions, January 1 and January 2, for information about these cases, which they provided January 3.

WHO emergencies director Michael Ryan told a news conference Friday that countries have 24-48 hours to officially verify an event and provide the agency with additional information about the nature or cause of an event.

Ryan added that the Chinese authorities immediately contacted the WHO as soon as the agency asked to verify the report.

Fuel prices remain unchanged for fifth day in a row

New Delhi/Bhubaneswar, July 4: Petrol and diesel prices remained unchanged for the fifth straight day, Saturday, as the state-owned oil companies paused a hike in rates. As the rates remained unchanged, diesel continued to be pricier than petrol in the capital city of Delhi.

June 7, state-run oil marketing companies Indian Oil, Hindustan Petroleum and Bharat Petroleum — which account for the majority of petrol and diesel outlets in the country — restarted the normal system of daily price reviews in line with costs following an 82-day hiatus. Since then, till June 28, prices were hiked for 21 days.

The recent increase in petroleum and diesel prices has left denizens aggrieved. Experts say that this fuel hike may pave the way for an altogether change in the mode of transport but doubt that it would be radical.

Ramesh Sahu, a construction engineer in Bhubaneswar, says, "My job involves travelling places. My company provides me travelling allowance (TA) but with the pandemic affecting my firm's business and petrol prices on the rise, my TA remains stagnant. "I am thinking of replacing my diesel car with an electronic vehicle but those are too expensive. "You can't ride a bicycle in Bhubaneswar Heat, can you," he asked.

Bhubaneswar records two deaths with co-morbid conditions

Bhubaneswar, July 4: Five more Covid-19 deaths were reported in Odisha taking the death toll to 34 in the state, informed the Health department Saturday. The casualties reported Saturday — five — was the highest in a span of 24 hours in the state. The state also reported 495 new corona positive cases in the last 24 hours.

Three fatalities were reported in Ganjam district and two in Khurda district.

A 51-year-old male from Bhubaneswar, who was suffering from Pleural Tuberculosis and a 64-year-old male from the state capital city suffering from diabetes succumbed to the virus, informed the health department.

A 50-year-old male from Ganjam, also suffering from diabetes and hypertension, 27-year-old male and 35-year-old male from the Ganjam too succumbed to the deadly virus.

Out of 495 fresh positive cases, 355 cases have been detected from different quarantine centres and 140 are local cases. Ganjam registered the highest 216 fresh cases. The total positive cases mounted to 8,601 in the state. The active cases stand at 2,624 and recoveries at 5,934.

2 IAS, 6 OAS officers deputed to Ganjam


BHUBANESWAR: The Odisha government Saturday deputed two IAS and six OAS officers to Ganjam district to manage the situation there.

The General Administration & Public Grievance department vide an order issued Saturday appointed Parul Patrawari, deputy Secretary in the Works department as special ADM, Ganjam in-charge of Chhatrapur subdivision for the management of Covid-19.

Similarly, Vishal Singh, PD, DRDA, Puri was appointed as special ADM, Ganjam in-charge of Bhanjanagar subdivision for the management of Covid-19.

"In exercise of the powers conferred under Section 20(2) of the Code of Criminal Procedure 1973 (Act II of 1974), the State Government does hereby appoint Shri Vishal Singh, IAS as the Additional District Magistrate in the district of Ganjam," the notification read.

Silver City shuts down till July 8

CUTTACK: Keeping in mind the surging Covid-19 cases, a complete shutdown has been ordered in Cuttack city. The shutdown will remain in force till July 8 midnight as per a notification issued by Cuttack Municipal Corporation (CMC). Senior CMC Officials informed that all the non-essential shops will remain closed and non-essential travel will be completely prohibited. The order will come into force from Saturday. However, all the essential shops like grocery, vegetable and milk shops will remain open from 5am till 6pm. The essential shops will have to strictly adhere to the Covid-19 guidelines and follow requisite social distancing norms or face the imposition of heavy fines and punishment. **MORE P4**

Bhubaneswar, July 4: The India Meteorological Department (IMD) Saturday predicted very heavy rainfall over several parts of the state over next two days.

Very heavy rainfall is likely to occur at one or two places in Angul, Dhenkanal, Sambalpur, Deogarh, Keonjhar, Cuttack, Jajpur, Kendrapara, Mayurbhanj, Sonepur and Jagatsinghpur, said IMD in a weather bulletin.

Similarly, heavy rainfall is also likely to occur at a few places in Mayurbhanj, Keonjhar, Balasore, Sundargarh, Jharsuguda, Sambalpur and Bargarh, Monday.

In the same time, light to moderate rainfall will continue to occur in many other places, the Met department said. Thunderstorm with lightning is likely to occur at one or two places in north coastal Odisha including in Keonjhar, Mayurbhanj and Khurda.

Uber's Mumbai office shut, Air France may lay off 7.5K

Mumbai, July 4: While Uber is reportedly shutting down its Mumbai office, Air France is laying off more than 6,000 employees as part of cost-cutting measures due to Covid-induced economic crisis.

After laying-off almost one-fourth of its staff in India (600 employees) in May, ride-hailing firm Uber has shut down its Mumbai office, said a person aware of the development asking not to be named. Uber's Mumbai employees will continue to work from home until December, the person said. It is not clear if the employees will be moved to another office in Mumbai next year.

A spokesperson for Uber

declined to comment on the development but added that it will continue to provide "a high level of service to all its riders in Mumbai."

Uber's Mumbai office closure comes almost a month after the ride-hailing firm announced a global downsizing exercise that affected around 6,700 employees worldwide.

Air France-KLM plans to cut more than 7,500 jobs at its French arm as the airline industry reels from the coronavirus crisis.

Europe's second-biggest airline will cut 6,560 staff at Air France, with its regional French carrier, Hop!, losing 1,020 jobs, the company said Friday. In a statement, the firm said: "Recovery looks set to be very slow" due to uncertainties around Covid-19.

Chennai, July 4: Media reports have surfaced which say that the cops who were involved in custodial killings of the father-sun duo — Jayaraj and Benix — are also linked to another case of police brutality in Tuticorin.

A 28-year-old man named Mahendran was forcefully taken

by Sathankulam SI Raghuganesh and his team from the residence of his maternal grandmother in the wee hours of May 23.

Guess, what could have been his mistake? Mahendran's elder brother Durai, 35, was one of the nine suspects in a murder case and was untraceable. Raghu Ganesh and his team took Mahendran into custody to get to Durai.

NO WARRANT Perumal, Mahendran's maternal uncle said, "They had removed the number plate in the front and back of the car they came in, Raghu Ganesh had a gun with him and was in mufti. They released him only the following night. When Mahendran came home he was

ally weak and was not able to move one side was his body." Vadivu, Mahendran's mother, a differently-abled woman, said, "He was not able to move his hand and leg on one side, and I kept asking him what happened to him. He kept asking me to keep quiet."

"I saw that he was very unwell and not even able to drink water, then I took him to the hospital in Tuticorin and there they scanned his head and said there were sudden infractions in the head. I admitted him to the hospital Thursday and Saturday he died."

BRAIN DAMAGE Mahendran was a daily wager

and with the pandemic putting them out of work the family was struggling to make ends meet. After two weeks of suffering at home and three more days in the hospital, the 28-year-old man lost the battle. The MRI report of the youngster showed that he had suffered acute left MCA territory infarct and thrombosis (meaning clotting) in the brain.

COVID EXCUSE The family recalls how the hospital denied performing a post-mortem on Mahendran's body. "We wanted a post-mortem to be done but they said there are coronavirus cases and asked us to take him away," said the family.



Twenty Indian soldiers lost their lives in a violent faceoff in Galwan Valley in eastern Ladakh with the Chinese forces June 15. The Galwan clash occurred at the south bank of the river, which flows in an east-west direction, before its confluence with Shayok river. It was the first casualties faced by the Indian Army in a clash with the Chinese People's Liberation Army since 1975, when an Indian patrol was ambushed by Chinese troops in Arunachal Pradesh.

Bhubaneswar, July 4: Making a mockery of security arrangement by Commissionerate Police on the first day of the weekend shutdown this month, bike-borne miscreants, Saturday, targeted two commuters including a woman government official in Nayapalli area here.

According to sources, Ritarani Patnaik, an employee of Forest department, was on her way to the office at Sahid Nagar for some urgent official work as per the instructions of the District Forest Officer (DFO). The miscreants who were waiting for an opportunity on the flyover followed Patnaik after she passed by them near

The miscreants snatched away the vanity bag of Patnaik after hitting her near Jayadev Vihar Square. However, she managed to keep her balance on the two-wheeler after she was hit by the miscreants.

The bag contained her mobile phone worth over ₹20,000, ₹5,000 in cash and some important official documents. On being informed, the cops on duty at Jaydev Vihar took a scared Patnaik to Nayapalli police station where she lodged a

complaint in this regard.

In another incident, Nayapalli police managed to capture two other snatchers from Salia Sahi under the police station after a long chase. Sources claimed that some alert locals called the police when two bike-borne miscreants were trying to snatch the gold chain of a lady near Hotel Mayfair.

Cops from Nayapalli police station in three PCR vans soon rushed to the spot but they succeeded in giving police a slip. However, the police officials arrested the snatchers after chasing them at Nialchakra Nagar slum in Salia Sahi area.

History-sheeters nabbed
On the other hand, Commissionerate Police, Saturday,

arrested three members of a looters' gang who were involved in several incidents of snatching and burglary at Mancheswar, Laxmisagar and Badagada area in the city.

The accused have also confessed to have committed 11 burglaries that include seven in Mancheswar, two each in Laxmisagar and Badagada areas.

Besides, they were involved in more than 20 cases earlier.

The cops seized a gold bracelet weighing 20.60 gm, six gold chains, 2 pairs of gold earrings, three gold rings, two pair of silver anklets, other valuable ornaments used by Odissi dancers from their possession.

PANDEMIC BLOW

No Bol Bom in state this year

Bhubaneswar, July 4: The state government Saturday decided not to allow 'Bol Bom' devotees, also known as 'Kanwariyas', to offer prayers at Shiva temples across the state, to contain the spread of novel coronavirus.

No 'Bol Bom' devotee will be allowed to congregate, carry water from water bodies and walk on roads to pour water on Shiva lingas

Special Relief Commissioner (SRC) Pradeep Kumar Jena said no 'Bol Bom' devotees or 'Kanwariyas' will be allowed to congregate, carry water from water bodies and walk on public roads to pour water on Shiva lingas.

In the month of Shravan (July/August), people carry water from rivers, walk barefoot for several miles and pour the water on Shiva lingas at several shrines on each Monday of the holy month.

The 'Bol Bom' devotees usually start their journey on Saturday/Sunday/Monday by col-

lecting water from one religious place and walk till next Monday morning and pour the collected water on a Shiva linga, said the SRC.

"We believe that everyone will cooperate with the administration in this regard," Jena added.

Similarly, the district administrations are also required to take concrete steps to enforce the order and ensure that no 'Bol Bam yatra' takes place this time, Jena said.

The government's decision to prohibit the yatra comes as the public health crisis continues to mount alarmingly not only in the state but also across the country.

Odisha has so far reported 8,601 Covid-19 cases and 34 fatalities. As many as 1,536 novel coronavirus cases have been reported in the state since July 1 alone.

Earlier, the Dhenkanal administration had clamped Section 144 at 14 major Shiva temples in the district to prevent congregation of 'Bol Bom' devotees on every Shravan Monday in view of COVID-19 pandemic.

Notably, the state government has ordered that all religious places or places of worship will continue to remain closed for the public and all social, political and religious functions and congregations are prohibited till July 31.

Now, doctorate in pulmonary medicine at SCB

Bhubaneswar, July 4: The Medical Council of India (MCI) has allowed opening of new DM (doctorate) in pulmonary medicine course in SCB Medical College and Hospitals, Cuttack from 2020-21 academic session.

The course will be imparted in super specialty department of pulmonary medicine in the college from the current session. SCB would be the first state-run medical college in eastern India and 10th medical institute in the country to offer the course, Health department sources said here, Saturday.

DM Pulmonary Medicine is the course of topmost level in the field of respiratory medicine. Two seats in the course will be managed by the Centre of Excellence, SCB. This will cater to state-of-the-art healthcare and quality research in the field of respiratory medicine for the people of eastern India, the source said.

High-end sophisticated instruments for diagnosis and treatment of respiratory disease will be available for this course as per the MCI guidelines. In future, paramedical course will also be started under the Centre of Excellence, they stated.

Puri, July 4: This year's Rath Yatra came to an end Saturday with the reinstatement of Lord Jagannath and his siblings Lord Balabhadra and Devi Subhadra at the sanctum sanctorum of Srimandir in the Holy City.

FEST SANS DEVOTEES

Consequently, the annual Car Festival of the deities could not be held for several years

For the first time, Rath Yatra, Bahuda Yatra, Suna Besha and Adharapana rituals were held without the congregation of devotees

However, the annual mega festival, which was organised without the congregation of devotees in the wake of Covid-19 outbreak, has added a new chapter to the Srimandir history, said many researchers and locals.

According to researchers, the presiding deities of Srimandir had been shifted out of the shrine several times in the past due to frequent attack from hostile elements. Consequently, the annual Car Festival of the deities could not be held for several years.

However, the annual mega event was once organised inside Srimandir secretly in the past. "For the first time in the history of Srimandir, the Rath Yatra, Bahuda Yatra, Suna Besha and Adharapana rituals were held on the Grand

road without the congregation of devotees. Devotees as well as the people of Odisha would remember this year's Rath Yatra forever," said a researcher.

Srimandir, the abode of Lord Jagannath, was shut for people towards the end of March this year due to the outbreak of novel coronavirus. The 'Rath Anukula' ritual was performed on Srimandir precincts on the occasion of Akshaya Trutiya April 26. However, the chariot construction work could not be carried out due to the lockdown.

After much hiccups, the chariot construction work started May 5, at least 12 days behind the schedule. The Centre had given conditional approval for chariot construction at Rath Yard. But, it had authorised the state government to take

a call on holding the mega festival by assessing the Covid-19 situation.

The Orissa High Court also put the ball at the state government's court while disposing some petitions seeking cancellation of Rath Yatra.

In the meantime, the Shree Jagannath Temple Managing Committee and many servitors' associations of Srimandir pleaded for the organisation of Rath Yatra without the presence of devotees on the Grand Road.

However, the Supreme Court ordered for the cancellation of Car Festival due to Covid-19 while hearing a petition June 18. The Apex Court's order created a lot of resentment among the devotees and Srimandir servitors.

Gajapati king Dibyasingha Deb,

Puri Shankaracharya Nischalananda Saraswati and many Srimandir servitors demanded organisation of Rath Yatra with Covid-19 restrictions. Several petitions were filed with the Supreme Court seeking modifications to the Apex Court's June 18 order on Rath Yatra.

The state government also filed an affidavit in the SC and supported Rath Yatra with restrictions in place. Finally, a three member bench of the SC at 4 pm June 22 allowed conduct of Car Festival in Puri.

With just a few hours in hand for the mega festival, the state government pulled out all the stops to hold the festival amid the pandemic June 23. At least three ministers, the Chief Secretary and the Director General of Police reached the Holy City to supervise the arrangements.

Senior IPS officer duped of ₹2.10L

Bhubaneswar, July 4: A senior IPS officer on state government's duty in New Delhi has fallen prey to the fraudsters.

A case has been lodged at Chandrasekharpur police station on the basis of a complaint filed by the victim, Ravi Kant.

According to sources, Delhi-based Rajesh Ambwani, the fraudster, came in contact with Kant, who is currently deployed as the resident commissioner at the Chief Resident Commissioner's (CRC) office in New Delhi. Ambwani along with his aides has allegedly duped Kant of

₹2,10,000 on the pretext of providing a flat/plot in Bhubaneswar.

Ambwani, who identified himself as a real estate developer, had told Kant that his firm was undertaking several real estate projects in Bhubaneswar and that many such projects were completed.

Kant had given Ambwani two cheques of ₹1, 18,900 and ₹91,000 October 25, 2017.

The fraudsters withdrew the amount from a New Delhi branch of a nationalised bank February 1 and March 8, 2018 respectively.

However, Ambwani and aides started avoiding Kant after re-

ceiving the amount. They neither availed the flat or land nor responded to Kant's phone calls. They even reportedly threatened Kant of dire consequences if he asks for the refund of the amount.

Kant lodged a complaint with the Chandrasekharpur police June 2, 2020.

When contacted, Kant refused to comment on the issue.

The IIC of Chandrasekharpur police station, Biswaranjan Nayak said, "We have registered a case on the basis of the complaint filed by Ravi Kant. However, both the parties are trying to settle the issue amicably."

"We urge our citizens to please cooperate & support our stand in these difficult times. Let's come together to fight & break the chain of #COVID19. Violation to this will invite stringent lawful action (sic)," the DCP tweeted.

Govt aims to make pension work paperless

Bhubaneswar, July 4: The Department of Social Security and Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (SSEPD), which recently made the pension system online, is planning to ensure minimum human involvement during COVID 19 threat.

It has asked Collectors to make people aware of the facility of online services for pension disbursement. The department has now made its pensions schemes, its applications, tracking and others online to reduce paper work and corruption.

This has been planned to avoid unnecessary visits of people from rural areas to cities. The online system has gained importance in the light of the expanding COVID 19 threat.

In a communication to Collectors,

the department has asked officials to disseminate information about the transition to online system to more people.

"Anyone today can apply for social security pension under the National Social Assistance Programme (NSAP) and Madhu Babu Pension Scheme (MSBY). The

entire process starting from submission of applications by a person to sanction by competent authorities has been made online and the applicant can get updated status of his/her application," the department said.

It also added, "This online system is an essential safety requirement

in view of the current pandemic. Printing of application forms under both NSAP and MBPY will now be unnecessary."

In a letter to the Collectors, the department said, "You were therefore requested to switch to online sanction of pension. You are now requested to take necessary steps for wide publication and awareness generation among the beneficiaries and also for imparting training to officials concerned at all levels.

"Under this system, the application is faster and the applicant can track the development of his plea in real time. Within a month, the fate of the application is decided and uploading of documents is done. The nodal officials are bound to pass the applications in the prescribed timeframe," a senior official from the SSEPD department told this correspondent.

ECoR handles 45.80 MT of freight during lockdown

Bhubaneswar, July 4: The East Coast Railway (ECoR) has carried 45.80 million tonnes of freight in 12,680 trains during the lockdown. The ECoR carried 27.06 million tonnes of coal in 7,100 trains from its jurisdiction between March 22 and June 30.

Out of this, 16.14 million tonnes of indigenous coal from Talcher area in 4,157 trains and 10.92 million tonnes of imported coal from different ports under ECoR jurisdiction were transported to various power houses and industries across the country. During this period, ECoR carried 0.95 million tonnes of food grains, especially rice to different states like Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Bihar and Jharkhand in 333 trains.

Rare gynaecological surgery at Apollo Hospitals

The 30-year old patient came to OPD with continuous vaginal bleeding with severe pain abdomen. After all investigations, USG abdomen and pelvis it was found that the young lady is suffering from Ohvira Syndrome. "Since they have already consulted many surgeons in Odisha, they asked me for diagnostic laparoscopic surgery, but I denied, said Dr Sarojini Joshi, Sr consultant of O&G at Apollo Hospitals.

First operation was done in Apollo Hospitals by excision of the



vaginal septum and drainage of 500 ml of blood with clots. The first USG was normal at eight weeks of gestation. But there was appearance of a fibroid in the

same gravid uterus which was the added challenge. Then all the prenatal assessment was done within 20 weeks and a tumour was found growing. Pregnancy was continuing with close vigilance. The patient was booked for LSCS on 38+ gestations but she was admitted with labor pain and rupture of membrane one day earlier in emergency, said Dr Joshi.

After initial measures, LSCS was done and a term live male baby was born. Myomectomy was not considered in the same sitting, added Dr Joshi.

It is a rare case where a baby with a big uterine fibroid in HHWS (Herlyn Werner Wunderlich Syndrome) was delivered without any complication to both mother and baby in spite of so many challenges. Dr Bikash Agarwal, sr radiologist, Dr Sipra Lenka, sr registrar O&G and Dr Debrat Dash, sr anaesthesiologist of Apollo Hospitals assisted Dr Joshi in this case.

OPPN RAPS GOVT OVER COVID

Bhubaneswar, July 4: The BJP and the Congress Saturday criticized the state government over what they called mismanagement of COVID-19 pandemic in the state and raised questions on the testing strategy as cases continued to rise in the state.

Speaking to reporters here, state BJP general secretary Prithviraj Harichandan said, "The Chief Minister has appealed to people to remain cautious as COVID-19 cases are expected to rise in July. However, it seems that the state government is not taking proactive measures to contain the virus."

Referring to removal of nine

IAS officers from special duties for COVID-19, he said, "Though the ruling party spokesperson had claimed that new officers will be appointed for COVID-19, none has been given charge." Congress MLA Santosh Singh Saluja said the situation in Odisha is getting worse like Mumbai. Raising questions on the testing strategy of the government, he said the actual COVID-19 count would be over 1 lakh in the state.

"The government is testing persons, who have symptoms and other health complications. The state government should immediately ramp up COVID-19 testing to include those in quarantine and temporary medical camps," he demanded.

Bhubaneswar, July 4: With the emergence of COVID 19 outbreak, several companies are now allowing their employees to work from home for hassle free workflow and reduce the chances of infection.

Health professionals claim that in the light of more people working from home than normal, they need to take special care to thwart chances of impact on their overall bone health. Orthopedic doctors claim that long hours of sitting in unsuitable furniture and bad postures can scale up orthopedic patients

among the employees working from home.

"Many people, while working from home, sometimes sit in a position which compels them to bend their neck to see their computer screen due to either small chair or more than longer chain. This puts extra pressure on the neck and can spike neck and back pain," said Dr Satya Ranjan Patra, an orthopedic surgeon from the city.

He said the height of chair and table should be such that the screen should be in front of the face. He also advised people not to use recycling chair when working for long on

Work from home needs special ortho care: Experts

KEEPING FIT

Take breaks in between to avoid strain on muscles and joints

- Don't use recycling chair for long working hours
- Maintain right posture for working on computers
- Straight chairs with arm rests are best for computer works

Take morning sunlight to keep bone health at par

computer. "While working from home, many people tend to use recycling chair for work. The best idea is to use straight chairs so

that the posture of the person remains straight to avoid strain on their backbone. Moreover, chairs with hand rest are preferred for

long hours of work otherwise the hand and shoulder will feel the strain," he added.

Other doctors also advised people to take a break between their moves to relax their body. "Longer sittings at chair for work can add strain to your body and eyes. One should often try to take a break every 1-2 hours. One can walk a little bit and relax themselves and their muscles," said Dr Pooja Sah, another doctor.

Sah also advised people to take morning sunlight to keep their bone healthy and avoid chances of Vitamin D deficiency.

Sambalpur, July 4: Even as Covid infection cases are on the rise in Sambalpur, four more staff of Veer Surendra Sai University of Technology (VSSUT) in Burla in Sambalpur district tested positive for COVID-19.

Given the situation, section 144 has been imposed at three places in Burla town for five days. The district was shut down for Sunday. This was informed by Collector Subham Saxena Saturday.

The four employees of VSSUT are male and asymptomatic. All of them have been shifted to the dedicated COVID facility and further contact tracing is underway, said a senior official.

Earlier, a lady lecturer of VSSUT had tested positive for COVID-19. The concerned lecturer's husband, who was a senior official of NALCO, had died of COVID-19.

The concerned lecturer is now undergoing treatment at COVID hospital in Cuttack. Following the detection of the positive case, a massive contact tracing was undertaken and the varsity was sanitised.

Local infections on rise in Mayurbhanj

BARIPADA: As COVID-19 infections are on the rise in Mayurbhanj, emergence of local cases in some pockets of the district has left people and the administration worried, a report said. 28 new cases of COVID were detected in Mayurbhanj Saturday, taking the tally to 253. Of 28 fresh cases, two are Covid warriors, 14 cases were detected from quarantine centres while 12 were found at the local level. Fresh cases were reported from areas including Badashi, Kaptipada, Gopabandhanagar, Baripada, Shymakhunta, Betanoti, Jashipur, Khunta, Kusuma and Karanjia.

Returnees trigger panic in Nuapada

NUAPADA: Nuapada is known for migration of labourers. Owing to the Covid situation, the district is witnessing a reverse migration of workers from other states since Unlock-1 came into force.

Reports said, 65,344 migrant labourers, who were stranded in other states, have come back to the district till date. The mandatory quarantine period for 63,988 of them has ended. They are supposed to remain in home quarantine for a week, but most of them violate the guideline and are found moving freely in villages, causing panic among people when the Covid infection cases are increasing in the district. The administration should restrict them from venturing out of their houses, or else others will face the consequences, locals observed.

Almost all migrant returnees have no work at hand to lead their lives at this crisis time. When asked about it, some lamented that as they have nothing to eat and drink,



they feel compelled to venture out with hopes of getting work and food. The influx of migrants has thrown a challenge to the administration when it comes to providing livelihood and income-generation activities to daily wagers and returnees. The state government laid stress on creating a scope of income generation for workers.

Now, officials are not checking their health status of migrants at regular interval, it was alleged. Swab tests of 4043 people were conducted while 82 cases come positive. CDMO Kalicharan Behera said the situation is being monitored.


Baripada, July 4: Raruan police recovered a Maoist poster from Baria village under Sukruli block in Mayurbhanj district Friday afternoon. The villagers are in panic as Maoists have demanded Rs 10 lakh from them failing which they have asked all villagers to vacate their houses.

"Moreover, villagers may give us 100 quintals of rice instead by July 2. If they forget to do so, we will create havoc in Baria very soon,"

Reacting to this, Raruan police station IIC Dibyakanti Lakra said, "We have already started investigation into this. Presence of Maoists in Baria village has not yet been ascertained."

8-day shutdown in Buguda from July 7

BUGUDA: With COVID-19 positive cases recording a steady rise in Buguda block of Ganjam district and the fear of community transmission looming large, the district administration has announced an eight-day-long shutdown from Tuesday - July 7.



As of Saturday, there are 24 COVID-19 positive cases in the block including 22 policemen (OSAP) and a couple from Kanasuka village in Goudiaborada panchayat. All the patients have been shifted to COVID-19 hospitals, a district administration official said.

To find a way out to make the fight against the invisible enemy more effective, Buguda block development officer (BDO) convened a meeting at Dak Bungalow Friday. Among others, tehsildar, IIC, NAC executive office, CHC officer, journalists, advocates and members of market associations took part in the meeting. It was decided in the meeting that there would be an eight-day long shutdown starting Tuesday in the Buguda town.

COVID WARRIOR DIES IN DUTY IN GANJAM

GANJAM: A COVID-19 warrior died in line of duty at Buguda in this district Saturday. The deceased has been identified as an Anganwadi worker, posted at Kholakhali Anganwadi centre and was working at a quarantine centre. She had been suffering from cold and cough for a week. Yet, she was coming to the centre and discharging her duty diligently.

Like any other day, she was working at the quarantine centre Saturday when she suddenly fell ill. Other staff at the centre immediately rushed her to Buguda government hospital. But it was too

late. The doctors there declared her brought dead.

Alleging that the administration is not taking steps for the betterment of COVID-19 warriors as it should, family members and local residents staged a road blockade putting the body on Buguda main road. They demanded compensation for the bereaved family. However, they withdrew the blockade after the local administration interfered.

Notably, Ganjam reported 216 new COVID-19 cases and three deaths Saturday. With this, the tally and toll in the district has gone up to 2066 and 20 respectively.

Man hangs self after son dies of Covid

Kabisuryanagar, July 4: A man hanged himself after he heard the news of his only son due to coronavirus Friday evening.

The shocking incident was reported from Kabisuryanagar area in Ganjam district, the worst Covid-hit district in Odisha.

The deceased was identified as 55-year-old Rajkishore Satpathy. He worked as a tax collector at Kabisuryanagar NAC.

According to sources, Seemanchal, 27, was a teacher at Sunarijholia Panchayat School.

After complaining of breathing problems, he was admitted to SUM COVID-19 hospital in Bhubaneswar July 1. His swab samples were collected before he was tested positive for COVID-19 Thursday. He passed away the next day.

Even as the deceased's friends and relatives knew about the incident, but they kept it a secret from Rajkishore and his wife. However, he came to know about the incident Friday afternoon and was deeply shocked. He quietly went out of the house in the evening. Local people spotted his body hanging from a tree in Sapuabasa jungle.

Jajpur, July 4: Tension mounted in Kalinganagar area of Jajpur district Friday after local workers staged a demonstration in front of JUSCO office, citing delay in payment of arrears and lack of jobs for the local people.

Jamshedpur Utility and Services Company (JUSCO), a Tata group

company, has its unit at Kalinganagar area. Local workers alleged that JUSCO authorities are not paying monthly salaries and exploiting them. Hundreds of local workers Friday gathered in front of the company gate and demanded immediate disbursement of their arrears.

"If the demands of the workers are not met immediately, we would take to the streets. We will also take

the matter to the court," said Satyabrata Das - a worker in the company. Several other employees including Hemananda Rout, Trilochan Mohapatra and Purna Chandra Rout said the company owes them more than Rs 25 lakh in outstanding and that JUSCO authorities have been dilly-dallying in making the payment.

On being contacted, JUSCO project head Soumitra Sarkar said, "The allegations made by workers will be investigated. Necessary steps will be taken in this regard after discussing with the company higher-ups".

JUSCO has been associated with several other industrial ventures of Tata group since 2015. This Jamshedpur-based company was later renamed as Tata Steel Utility and Infrastructure Services Limited (TSUIS) in 2019.

Reports from Dhenkanal said, people in Sadangi range were panicked as a herd of elephants has been on a rampage in forested areas like Rupabalia under Joranda section for the last five days.

The animals have damaged crops, leaving the farmers worried. Locals said, in the last five days, elephants have caused loss to crops and vegetables at Mahapada.

Vegetables grown on an acre of



land of Himadri Nath were completely damaged. Meanwhile, forest officials have launched a drive to flush out the animals.

Ranger Goutam Pradhan said if the affected farmers come out with complaints at the forest division office, their loss will be compen-

sated on the basis of the assessment report by the department officials. Similarly, Telkoi areas in Keonjhar district has been witnessing elephant menace over past few days. The animals have damaged houses and destroyed crops.

People in several villages under this tribal-dominated block have been spending sleepless nights as elephants keep frequenting these villages creating a havoc, a local forest official said.

The jumbos have pulled down their mud-made houses and destroyed their recently sowed paddy crops, the official said. They destroyed acres of vegetables and damaged houses in Padanga village.

Lady IIC of Balasore town PS missing

Her disappearance has now been a talk of the town here.

The cop was last seen at the police station from 1 pm to 7 pm Friday. She had disappeared after 7 pm and none of the cops or staff knew anything about her whereabouts. Assuming her disappearance as normal, they did not attach much importance to it.



It was at 8 pm when a vigilance team reached the police station searching for the IIC, the police station staff grew suspicious.

The Balasore vigilance SP said that her mobile phone was switched

off most of the time. At times, though the calls were possible but there was none from the other end to answer them.

The IIC's disappearance has now been the fevered gossip across the town. Notably, vigilance sleuths caught Balasore town police station sub inspector Bimal Kar red handed while accepting Rs 25,000 from a middleman to settle a land dispute July 1. Both were arrested and have been lodged in jail.

A theory is going around that the holed up cop may have a role in the above mentioned case.

DONGRIA KONDHS TAKE TO MASK STITCHING FOR A LIVING

Rayagada, July 4: After the craze for Dongria shawls, the demand for Dongria masks has caught up with people due to its beautiful design patterns and stitching by the women of the primitive Dongria Kondh community, a report said.

This is an effort to supplement their income amid the Covid-19 pandemic when people of all sections in society have been severely hit by the coronavirus induced lockdown. Many people have lost their livelihood and work hard to earn a living. The primitive Dongrias living in the Niyamgiri hills are no less good as they have been equally hit by the Covid-19 induced lockdown.

However, the Dongrias making the most of their skills and with the support of the state government have been able to earn livelihood during these difficult times. The masks

with traditional Dongria Kondh motifs have the scope to be marketed as style statements. Red, yellow, green and brown threads are used to embroider the traditional designs.

The Dongria women were sitting idle when the Dongria Kondh Development Agency (DKDA) came to their rescue and showed them a new road for survival. The DKDA taught them to stitch masks with their traditional designs as the face wear has become a must for every person in view of the rapid spread of the pandemic.

The Dongria women started stitching the masks with assistance from the state government and within a short time their masks became a hit. Stitching of masks has helped them earn a living during this lockdown

Sources said over 40 Dongria women of Khambesi, Khajuri, Kurli and Hundijali villages of Kurli pan-



chayat under Bissam Cuttack block in Rayagada district are engaged in mask stitching and weaving during this lockdown from May 21.

The women, all members of the self-help groups, stitch the masks and earn Rs 7 per piece. Later, the women make embroideries of traditional

designs for which they are paid Rs 50 per mask by the DKDA. The DKDA provides cloth, needles and thread for embroidery works.

A mask is sold at Rs 100 while a sum of Rs 95 is spent on raw materials and wages. The women

The women of the Dongria community were known for their beautiful artworks and traditional pattern of designs on clothes. The shawls made by the Dongria women have high demand in national and international markets. However, their business has come down due to the lockdown.

Sukri Kadra, a Dongria woman, said stitching of masks and weaving designs on the masks has helped them manage their household. This has also made them feel happy as the masks woven by them helps in checking the spread of the pandemic.

When contacted, Sudarshan Padhi, project manager, DKDA said they have plans to market the masks in the national and international markets which has become a source of livelihood for the primitive community.

Woman bludgeons hubby to death

THREE-PRONGED THREAT

For writers it has become difficult to pick which disaster to write about this week. There are so many. An embarrassment of riches, or actually whatever the opposite of it is.

Let us start with health. On Friday, 22,000 Indians tested Covid positive and over 440 died of the plague. We are registering 10 per cent of global cases now and will be third highest in terms of number of cases by Monday. By the end of July we will have 50,000 cases a day, the same number as the United States now does and 1,000 daily deaths. By the end of August, it will be a lakh cases a day. At that point, how many doctors and workers will show up for work and how many will be able to do something to consider.

There is no point in thinking about September and October but consider that the places that are going through the peaks now are Delhi, Mumbai and Chennai which have the best health facilities in India. When the disease spreads rapidly in places without urban health-care, what will come is not difficult to imagine.

Let us turn to the economy. India has a few high frequency indicators that can tell us the current state of the economy and the change. The best such indicator we have is automobile sales because at the beginning of each month manufacturers put out the number of units they have sold to dealers. We can compare the number to the same month last year to see how things are going.

Passenger vehicle sales in January 2020 dropped to 2.6 lakh from 2.8 lakh in January 2019. This is before Covid, and two months before the lockdown. Commercial vehicle sales, meaning truck and other transport and cargo vehicles that industry requires, fell from 87,000 units in January 2019 to 75,000 in January this year.

Two wheeler sales fell from 15 lakh to 13 lakh. Across the middle class, the lower middle class and industry there is decline. In February, commercial vehicle sales fell by 32 per cent, passenger vehicle sales by 7 per cent.

After zero sales in April, we should have had a huge bump in May and June but both months are negative in substantial terms. There is something that is hurting the Indian economy and this pain began before the lockdown. The government has not admitted it, though the data is clear, and therefore the government is not doing anything to correct it. The pain will continue and our economy will continue to suffer.

As if these two problems were not substantial enough we face the gravest strategic threat of the last two decades. China is bullying us and occupying parts of Ladakh that we used to patrol till March. We do not know why China is doing this and we do not know what it wants. This government has a former spy as its national security advisor, a position that is usually taken by scholars. We have a chief of defence staff whose focus has been on counter insurgency in Kashmir and who was confident that the LAC with China was settled. He was wrong. Now we are moving troops to the area from the Pakistan front and rushing to buy new warplanes.

Strategic affairs analyst Pravin Sawhney has reported the reason the talks with China are taking so long and not progressing. It is that the Chinese want India to acknowledge the current positions their army is occupying, meaning a shift in the LAC. Of course this cannot be conceded by us, but it cannot even be discussed properly because the prime minister has said there is no intrusion while the defence minister and the foreign minister have conceded that China has violated the LAC and its army is on our side.

Modi's visit to Ladakh on Friday was to correct that confusion. His warlike speech is to confirm that the threat is real and the Chinese need to go back. He has still refused to name China but perhaps that will come soon as it becomes obvious that we have a long and difficult road ahead to get the Chinese to vacate.

One must say here that we have lost valuable time because of our refusal to accept the reality for whatever reason, whether it is embarrassment or the PM's image. We could have mobilised support around the world if we had said openly and clearly that China was violating the LAC, but there's no point in crying over spilt milk. We still have the opportunity when Modi goes to the G7 in a few months though it is not clear if China will have cemented its intrusion by then.

So we have a full blown epidemic, an economic recession with the highest unemployment in Indian history, and a powerful enemy whose aggressive and offensive actions we did not anticipate.

At the beginning of the year I would have said that the biggest problem in our nation was the fact that the ruling party was trying to divide Indians. For long term that remains our primary self-induced worry. But for now we have to unite to combat the immediate threat to our people and our nation.

Stotting



FOCUS CREDIBILITY

In a very well known social science experiment, a sample of randomly selected people is asked whether they understand how a bicycle worked. As would be expected, an overwhelming majority would say they do! Yet on asking to draw a rough sketch of the bicycle, most would get it remarkably wrong! This phenomenon seems to apply equally well to most subjects and most groups of people irrespective of their background, education, social status, race, gender or nationality.

THE COGNITIVE BIAS IN MOST OF US TO HAVE AN OVERESTIMATION OF OUR ABILITY TO UNDERSTAND ISSUES AND THEREBY UNDERESTIMATE VOICES OF SANITY AND REASON, GOADED BY POPULIST LEADERS, IS TURNING OUT TO BE A DEADLY COCKTAIL

The well-known theory in social psychology known as the Dunning-Kruger effect was first introduced in 1999. It relates to the phenomenon of the human tendency to overestimate our own knowledge or competence. It is known as a cognitive bias which is generally corrected as we learn more about the subject over a period of time. This theory was further generalised into what was later termed as the Illusion of Explanatory Depth or IoED by psychologists Leonid Rozenblit and Frank Keil in 2002. As per this theory, most people feel they understand the world with far greater detail, coherence, and depth than they really do. This to me goes a long way in explaining the predicament we face with the avalanche of information we encounter all the time which makes us feel as if we know a lot of things in great depth contrary to reality.

Such a cognitive bias leads to most of the uninformed, fruitless, and rancorous debates online on most subjects. The sooner more of us realise the truth about the shallowness of our knowledge on most subjects, it would help make us humbler and more open to ideas of others. It would help us better appreciate the opinion of those on subjects they have spent a considerable amount of time and effort in mastering.

One of the fastest-growing challenges today is carrying out a civilized discussion on any topic - particularly on social media without degenerating into partisan

bickering. The world is more divided than ever before with leaders like Trump, Bolsonaro, Duterte, Putin, Johnson, Modi, and the like both helping to create and also taking advantage of those divisions for partisan and populist political interests. Such tendencies are clearly visible most prominently on social media platforms like Twitter and Facebook. What makes it really dangerous is the avalanche of fake information mostly in the guise of legitimate news. Such misinformation can range from innocent pranks to deliberate campaigns that are politically motivated with nefarious ends in mind. The emergence of paid troll armies has made it easy for political parties and other entities to control the narrative however incredible it might be. Unfortunately, the impact of these trends is no longer limited to online conversations only but frequently spills over to real-life with deadly consequences. Whether in the case of recent communal riots in Delhi or the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic, the threat of fake news and misinformation campaigns has proven to be most lethal. Even national elections as important as that for the President of USA have become subject to manipulation by

third party actors with a vested interest. Left unchecked this trend will have catastrophic results for mankind.

In this context, the traditional sources of authentic information have come under deadly fire as they are the biggest threat to those who stand to benefit from the spread of fake news. Ironically, powerful persons like Donald Trump take a lead in destroying the reputation of all mainstream media that are traditionally respected for their long-standing credibility by labelling them as fake news, particularly as they try to hold him accountable for his actions. Such examples can be also found closer home in India where intellectuals and media not towing the official line on any issue and asking uncomfortable questions are labelled anti-national. A recent report suggested that more than 50 journalists have been booked by Indian police on one pretext or the other just in the past few months since the start of the Covid-19 outbreak. Prime Minister Modi has not helped the cause by denigrating institutions and intellectuals of proven caliber and reputation. Allowing the system to prosecute important voices that stand up for human rights, for the environment, for

probity in public life has had a chilling effect on civil society. Numerous non-profits have been harassed to the extent of being forced to close operations often in the name of national interest which often turns out to be corporate interest. The war between truth and falsehood seems to be raging and the outcome will have a decisive impact on our future as a society.

The cognitive bias in most of us to have an overestimation of our ability to understand issues and thereby underestimate voices of sanity and reason, goaded by populist leaders is turning out to be a deadly cocktail. Understanding this conundrum, explaining complex ideas in simple terms without loss of their essence will be a crucial skill in the future in order for the wise to be heard over the cacophony of the ongoing discourse. One of the redeeming features of a genuine expert or an intellectual (as opposed to one who pretends to be one) with a certain depth of expertise in any field is the evident humility. As the Sanskrit saying goes - 'Namranti Falina Vrikhshya', which means 'trees full of fruits tend to bend down'. Such humility comes with the knowledge that 'the more you know, the more you realise how much more there is to know!' It's an easy and almost certain measure of the value of a person's opinion especially in his/her area of expertise.

Long before the ideas of Dunning-Kruger or IoED were introduced, the famed philosopher Bertrand Russell had captured the essence almost perfectly in simple words as follows: "The whole problem with the world is that fools and fanatics are always so certain of themselves, and wiser people so full of doubts."

And there lies the source of most of our current troubles!

Taking climate risk seriously

CLIMATE CHANGE COULD AFFECT THE MOST VULNERABLE POPULATIONS DISPROPORTIONATELY, AND COULD FOSTER INEQUALITY BY SIMULTANEOUSLY BENEFITING SOME REGIONS WHILE HARMING OTHERS

COVID-19 has shown how a long-recognised but under-appreciated global risk can suddenly materialise and wreak social and economic devastation in a matter of weeks. The implication is clear: While the world is focused on battling the pandemic, firms and governments must also recognise and plan for other risks, particularly climate change, which, like a pandemic, could upend the economy if not managed properly.

That is not a conclusion we arrive at lightly. At the McKinsey Global Institute, we spent a year assessing the possible socioeconomic impacts of climate change over the coming three decades. What we found is these effects already exist and are increasing, often in non-linear ways.

As part of our analysis, we conducted nine case studies across regions to gauge potential effects, linking climate models with economic projections in each case. We estimated inherent physical risk, absent climate adaptation and mitigation, to assess the size of the challenge and highlight the case for action.

Climate researchers frequently use Representative Concentration Pathway (RCP) scenarios, ranging from lower (RCP 2.6) to higher (RCP

8.5) atmospheric carbon dioxide concentrations. We adopted the higher-emission RCP 8.5 scenario in order to assess inherent physical risk in absence of further decarbonisation. Our studies produced several key findings. First, the most at-risk societies and systems are already close to physical and biological thresholds. Moreover, increasing climate hazards may make such systems vulnerable when they reach such thresholds, often resulting in non-linear intensification of effects.

For example, increasing heat and humidity in India mean that by 2030, and under an RCP 8.5 scenario, between 160-200 million people could live in regions with a 5 per cent average annual probability of lethal heatwaves. As heat and humidity levels rise, outdoor work could become extremely challenging. We estimate that by 2030, the average number of effective working hours lost in India could place 2.5-4.5 per cent of GDP at risk annually.

Second, economic and financial systems have been designed and optimised for a certain level of risk. For example, many global supply chains and food-production systems prioritise efficiency over resilience, making them vulnerable

to failure if intensifying climate hazards affect critical production hubs.

Furthermore, whereas property insurance is generally repriced annually, homeowners often have longer-term time horizons of 30 years or more on their real-estate investments. This mismatch exposes homeowners to the risk of higher costs, including rising premiums or reduced insurance coverage.

Third, financial markets could pull forward risks in affected regions, potentially triggering capital reallocation and asset repricing, as well as changes to cost and availability of insurance. In Florida, for example, estimates based on past trends suggest increased risk of tidal flooding alone could devalue exposed homes by \$30-80 billion, or 15-35 per cent, by 2050, other things being equal.

Fourth, while the direct impact of climate change is local, it can have knock-on effects across regions and sectors as a result of interconnected socioeconomic and financial systems (as is case with COVID-19). For example, we estimate that the direct damage to infrastructure assets from a 100-year flood in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam could increase from about \$300 million today to as much as \$1 billion by 2050, while knock-on costs to the

economy could rise from \$100-400 million to between \$1.5-8.5 billion.

Finally, climate change could affect the most vulnerable populations disproportionately, and could foster inequality by simultaneously benefiting some regions while harming others. Climate events could double the likelihood of harvest failure in agricultural breadbaskets by 2030. This could lead to higher food prices, hitting the poorest communities the hardest.

To mitigate the risk that ongoing climate change will jeopardise more communities and economies, businesses and governments must adapt to the inevitable global warming that will occur over the next decade as a consequence of past emissions. There is a range of actions to consider. Businesses could weigh climate considerations in their capital allocation, product and service development, and supply-chain management. Cities could put climate risk at the center of their urban-planning decisions, while financial institutions could do the same when managing investment portfolios.

After hullabaloo, Nagaland bans dog meat trade, consumption

Kohima/Aizawl/Agartala, July 4: Taking a cue from Mizoram, the Nagaland government has banned the trade and consumption of dog meat. State Chief Secretary Temjen Toy in a tweet Friday said: "The State Government has decided to ban commercial import and trading of dogs and dog markets and also the sale of dog meat, both cooked and uncooked. Appreciate the wise decision taken by the State's Cabinet (on Thursday)." The Chief Secretary tagged his tweet with former union minister and well known animal rights activist Maneka Gandhi, who is currently a BJP MP. Journalist and former parliamentarian Prithvi Nandy urging his followers to join a movement to ban the sale and consumption of dog meat in Nagaland markets, Wednesday said in a tweet: "This is urgent. You can help make history by sending an email tonight to Nagaland Chief Secretary saying



Around 30 million dogs and 10 million cats are killed across Asia for human consumption annually, with the trade most widespread in China, South Korea, Indonesia, Cambodia, Laos, Vietnam and several parts of northeast India. Animal rights activists said the cruel transport and slaughter of dogs violates several provisions of the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, 1960, the IPC, and Food Safety and Standards Authority of India regulations

also recently taken steps to check the open slaughtering of dogs in the state and in March the Mizoram Assembly unanimously passed the Animal Slaughter Bill 2020. Humane Society International/India (HIS/INDIA) said in a statement that Mizoram is the first state in northeast India that has taken a step towards ending its dog meat

trade, by amending the law to remove dogs from the definition of animals suitable for slaughter. The HIS/INDIA statement, issued in Aizawl recently, said that the consumption of dogs is prohibited under India's food safety regulations. "However, the regulations not enforced properly and thousands of dogs each year are cruelly and illegally captured from the streets or stolen from their homes, packed into plastic and jute bags with their mouth stitched or tied, and transported over many days to Mizoram," HIS/INDIA said. According to the Federation of Indian Animal Protection Organisations, thousands of dogs are smuggled regularly to Nagaland and Mizoram from Assam, West Bengal and other states. A healthy big dog, caught in Assam for ₹50, is sold for ₹1,000 in Nagaland's wholesale market. Dog meat sells for ₹200 per kg in Nagaland, said FIAPPO, which works with over 160 organisations across 70 cities in India.

Amid row over MSME Ordinance, Assam denies selling resources

Guwahati, July 4: Amidst widespread protests against a proposed ordinance to allow conversion of land without multiple clearances from authorities for setting up Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs), the Assam government Friday denied allegations that it was planning to 'sell off' the state's land resources.

Various political parties, tribal and social organisations, and students' bodies, including the influential All Assam Students Union (AASU), launched agitations after the cabinet, chaired by Chief Minister Sarbananda Sonowal, June 29 approved the "MSME Ordinance". The ordinance, when promulgated, would allow investors to set up MSMEs without any hurdle and without multiple clearances of land from different authorities.

Industry and Commerce Minister Chandra Mohan Patowary Friday said that the reactions on the proposed ordinance might be because no one has seen its proposals, which, he sought to clarify, did not touch tribal blocks and areas, reserve forests and eco-sensitive regions. "Hazardous units would not be allowed to be set up. The ordinance was aimed to facilitate generation of jobs to the state's 20 lakh registered unemployed as well as some 3.5 lakh people who have been jobless since returning from other parts of India before and during the Covid-19 lockdown," he clarified.

Patowary said under the proposed MSME Ordinance, maxi-



mum quantum of investment would be ₹50 crore for medium, ₹10 crore for small and ₹one crore for micro industrial units. He said only few states like Gujarat, Rajasthan and Karnataka have brought out such ordinance and acts to facilitate setting up of MSMEs. "This Ordinance will not affect the land rights of indigenous people of Assam as protected by the Assam Agricultural Land (Regulation of Re-classifications and Transfer for Non-Agricultural Purpose) Act 2015," he said.

Noting that due to the pandemic, the state's economy has been adversely affected and business environment depressed, the Minister said that in such situations, the ordinance would create a conducive environment, drive domestic growth, attract investment and accelerate industrial development in the state. The opposition Congress, however, said that they were not convinced by the government clarifications. State Congress President Ripun Bora said the easy transfer

of land for industrial purposes would effortlessly allow major investors. "The ordinance would go against the very interest of the indigenous people," he argued.

The All India United Democratic Front President and Lok Sabha Member Maulana Badruddin Ajmal also criticised the ordinance as a ploy to sell off large areas of Assam's land resources to corporate houses posing as MSME aspirants.

Agitators from the AASU Thursday as part of their state-wide agitations burnt copies of the ordinance, which await Governor Jagdish Mukhi's assent. The AASU protestors called the "MSME Ordinance" as a "betrayal of trust" by the Bharatiya Janata Party-led state government that had come to power in 2016 promising to protect 'jati' (race), 'matil' (land) and 'b'hetil' (hearth).

The Delhi-based Rights and Risks Analysis Group has urged the Governor not to give his assent to the "disastrous MSME Ordinance" in the veil of promoting MSMEs.

Bangalore, July 4: Karnataka High Court Justice Krishna Dixit expunged the controversial remarks he made against a rape victim in an order granting anticipatory bail to the accused, an official said Saturday. "On an application by the state government, the judge expunged the controversial remarks made against the rape victim, while granting anticipatory bail on June 22 to the accused, as they were also objected to by lawyers and civil activists across the country," the state legal department official said here.

In the revised order, the judge said he deemed it appropriate to expunge the last four lines in para



number 3 (c) at page 4 of the June 22 judgement, as sought in the state government application.

Granting anticipatory bail to the accused, an employee in a private firm owned by the victim, Justice

Dixit had made the remarks in the judgement.

"Taking note of the contents of the respondent (state's application)... and no objection by the petitioner-accused, I deem it appro-

priate to expunge the last four lines in the para of the subject judgment dated 22.06.2020, as sought for by government pleader Nageshwarappa," said the revised order.

The judge clarified that his observations shall not influence the investigation in the case and its likely trial.

Voicing concern over the controversial remarks, lawyers and civic groups, advocate Aparna Bhat last week wrote to Supreme Court Chief Justice SA Bobde and Justices R Banumathi, Indu Malhotra and Indira Banerjee of the apex court to issue an advisory to all courts to refrain from commenting on the conduct of victims of sexual offence.

Karna mulls online betting for horse racing

Bangalore, July 4: With the COVID-19 induced lockdown stalling horse races since March 25, the Karnataka government is in favour of allowing punters betting on their favourite stallions online, a top official said Saturday.

"The state government has positively responded to our request to allow betting online, as punters and fans are banned from attending horse races if resumed as per the lockdown guidelines in the race course grounds in the city centre," Bangalore Turf Club (BTC) Chairman D Vinod Shivappa told IANS here.

Admitting that suspension of horse racing over the last three months had badly disrupted the peak turf season for stallions and stakeholders, Shivappa said the state government had agreed in principle to permit racing without the presence of punters and spectators in the stands to prevent the virus spread.



"As we have already lost one racing season during the summer vacation and in the process of losing race events in the monsoon period, with no let-up in the virus spread, legalising online betting will enable us to resume races sans punters and spectators," asserted Shivappa.

"We will soon submit a proposal to the state government on how

betting can be legally conducted as in other countries so that we can soon resume horse racing, with punters and fans participating online to revive the exciting sport and make up for losing crores in rupees due to the ban," said Shivappa.

"With the state government approval, we will develop a smartphone application (app) for downloading it by our members, punters

Eyeing promotion, 55-yr-old cop writes Class-X exam

Bangalore, July 4: A 55-year-old Karnataka police constable is writing the Secondary School Leaving Certificate (SSLC) board exam at Kolar to get promotion before his retirement in 2025.

"Karnataka State Reserve Police (KSRP) constable KR Manjunath is appearing for the SSLC board exams as an external candidate at the Government Girls' Junior College at Kolar, which is an enrollment centre," district nodal officer Nagendra Prasad told IANS.

Kolar is about 100km east of Bangalore. The SSLC board exams are being held across the state since June 25 as per the lockdown guidelines, which makes wearing mask, washing hands with sanitiser and maintaining social distancing mandatory. Manjunath appeared for the 6th and last exam in third language Friday after completing papers in five subjects so far.

"Manjunath is attempting to pass in all 6 subjects for the second time, as he failed in 2 subjects in the first attempt 4 years ago. He will get promotion and become head constable if he passes this time," said Prasad.

Though Manjunath studied up to Class VII in the town over four decades ago, he secured a job in the state police department in D group and was promoted as a constable over a decade ago on service

record. "As Manjunath wants to retire as head constable, he has to pass the Class-X exam, which is a minimum for the promotion. He is confident of passing in all subjects this time as he claims to have done well," said Prasad.

The constable has opted to write the exam in his home town (Kolar) though he is posted in Bangalore. "On learning that a senior policeman was writing the Class-X board exam, state Education Minister S. Suresh Kumar enquired about him during his official visit to Kolar June 29," Prasad recalled.

Political problem in Manipur will settle down soon: CM

Imphal, July 4: On returning from Delhi where he met Union Home Minister Amit Shah and BJP president J P Nadda, Manipur Chief Minister N Biren Singh has said the political crisis which recently engulfed the state will settle down soon.

This was Biren's first visit to the national capital after braving resignations by four ministers from ally National People's Party (NPP) and their subsequent return to the NDA fold following intervention of Shah and Nadda. On arrival from Delhi Friday evening, the chief minister underwent a coronavirus test at Imphal airport itself and left for home only after the sample tested negative for the virus.

"Delhi visit was quite well and central leaders were very happy about the crucial victory in the Rajya Sabha election in Manipur," he told reporters at the airport.

In the June 19 election for the lone Rajya Sabha seat from Manipur that took place in the background of the political crisis triggered by resignations of nine ruling coalition members, BJP's candidate Leishemba Sanajaoba had defeated the Congress rival.

Besides the four NPP ministers, three BJP rebels, the lone All India Trinamool Congress legislator and an Independent MLA had quit the BJP-led coalition in Manipur on

While the four NPP legislators are all set to regain their position in the cabinet, the chief minister has to deal with the heightened aspirations of some BJP legislators to become ministers, besides those of the former Congress legislators who had defected to the saffron party shortly after the last state election in 2017

Out of the seven defecting Congress MLAs whose cases under the anti-defection law were heard by the Manipur High Court and the Speaker's Tribunal, the membership of four has been restored and they even voted in the Rajya Sabha election for the lone Manipur seat

June 17. After deft handling of the situation by BJP's key leader in the Northeast Himanta Biswa Sarma and Meghalaya Chief Minister and NPP national president Conrad Sangma in close cooperation with the central leader-

ship, the four NPP legislators later submitted letter of support in favour of Biren Singh to Governor Najma Heptullah. Responding to queries about the portfolios which are yet to be announced for NPP ministers, Biren said, "Central leadership doesn't interfere much. Ours is a national party. It is my duty to seek the advice and suggestions of the national leaders."

Distribution of portfolios in the cabinet was one of the important reasons cited by the NPP ministers while walking out of the government. "I think, at the earliest, there will be a solution for everything with the blessings of the central leaders for the convenience of all," he said. On being allotted Z security cover, he said he had no knowledge and came to know about it after meeting the Union Home Minister July 1.

"I myself did not have any knowledge of it and I was surprised," he said, adding that it must be based on the inputs of intelligence agencies.

Days after overcoming the political crisis, Biren Singh had gone to Delhi Tuesday to meet NDA's central leadership to discuss allocation of portfolios to his ministers.

After end of the political trouble, Biren Singh is facing another challenge in meeting ministerial aspirations of his own party MLAs and also allies for which he is likely to seek guidance from the central leaders.

Pro-Khalistan SFJ begins voter registration for 'Referendum'

New Delhi, July 4: Banned pro-Khalistan group Sikhs For Justice (SFJ) Saturday launched its much-publicised online voter registration for 'Referendum 2020' for people in Punjab through a Russian portal.

The Ministry of Home Affairs had in July last year banned the SFJ for advocating Referendum 2020, an online campaign to demand Khalistan, which seeks a separate homeland for the Sikhs.

As per the inputs, the SFJ launched the Referendum 2020 voter registration through the Russian website www.punjabfree.ru, appealing to the people in Punjab and aged 18 or above from any religion as well as the Sikhs living anywhere else in India to register their votes for participation in the non-governmental Punjab Independence Referendum.

Detailed information regarding the registration process was put up in English and Punjabi languages on the Russia-based website, which mentions three steps for registration of votes and the sign-up to receive updates about the Referendum 2020.

The SFJ has a ground-level plan to ensure that voter registration form for Referendum 2020 reaches every household in Punjab, despite the Indian government's crackdown on the pro-Khalistan activists.

Detailed information regarding the registration mentions three steps for registration of votes and the sign-up to receive updates about the Referendum 2020

The Ministry of Home Affairs had in July last year banned the SFJ for advocating Referendum 2020, an online campaign to demand Khalistan

Designated US-based terrorist Gurpatwant Singh Pannun made the voter registration announcement through a video, putting Punjab Police as well as Central security agencies in a tizzy.

The Indian government has since been in touch with the authorities concerned as to how the SFJ used Russian cyberspace to launch the voter registration for Referendum 2020.

In the backdrop of July 1 commitment of Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Russian President Vladimir Putin to further strengthen the "special and privileged strategic partnership between the two countries in all spheres", use of a Russian portal by the anti-India

campaign is a matter of concern.

The development has also raised questions on the India-Russian historical ties. As Russia has one of the most stringent legal frameworks for web portals to operate from its soil, the matter has been taken up through diplomatic channels as to how SFJ managed to use the cyberspace of that country to fulfil its agenda against India.

Meanwhile, Punjab Police cordoned off the area around the Golden Temple complex in Amritsar city apart from the deployment of a posse of policemen around the shrine and barricades at vulnerable spots.

The sources said July 4 was cho-

sen by the SFJ for voter registration for Referendum 2020 as the government had "ordered the police to enter the Golden Temple precincts to disperse assembled separatist Sikh volunteers on this day in 1955".

The radical group SFJ is supported by Pakistan-based handlers to provide money and logistical support to radical Sikh elements in Punjab to carry out subversive activities.

The SFJ is headed by Avtar Singh Pannun and Gurpatwant Singh Pannun, who have started advocating Khalistan as well as the on-line secessionist campaign for Referendum 2020.

SFJ's key member Pannun is among nine individuals who were designated terrorists by the Ministry of Home Affairs July 1, 2020, for trying to revive militancy in Punjab through anti-national activities and involvement in the Khalistan movement.

Punjab Police booked Pannun and SFJ in April for seditious automated calls aimed at instigating the people, particularly the youth, against the state government during the COVID-19 curfew.

Cases have been registered against Pannun and US-based SFJ under Section 124A of IPC, and Sections 10 (A) and 13 (1) of the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, 1967, at the State Special Operations Cell in Mohali. The Punjab police has registered 10 cases against the SFJ and its members.

TikTok distances from Beijing after app ban

New Delhi, July 4: Social media app TikTok distanced itself from Beijing after India banned 59 Chinese apps in the country, according to a correspondence seen by this news agency.

In a letter to the Indian government dated June 28th, TikTok Chief Executive Kevin Mayer said the Chinese government has never requested user data, nor would the company turn it over if asked.

TikTok, which is not available in China, is owned by China's ByteDance but has sought to distance itself from its Chinese roots to appeal to a global audience. Along with 58 other Chinese apps, including Tencent Holdings Ltd's WeChat and Alibaba Group Holding Ltd's UC Browser, it was banned in India this week following a border clash with China.

"I can confirm that the Chinese government has never made a request to us for the TikTok data of Indian users," Mayer wrote, adding that data for Indian users is stored in servers in Singapore. "If we do ever receive such a request in the future, we would not comply."

The letter was sent ahead of a likely meeting next week between the company and the government, one source familiar with the matter said. One Indian government source told Reuters this week the ban was unlikely to be revoked soon. Lawyers have said a legal challenge was unlikely to be successful, given India has cited national security con-

cerns for the ban.

The ban, which upset India's growing legion of TikTok stars, has also given a lift to local rivals such as Roposo, which added 22 million new users in the 48 hours after the ban took effect.

TikTok has committed to spend \$1 billion in the region. Since its launch in 2017, it has become one of the fastest-growing social media apps. India is its largest market by user, followed by the United States.

In the letter, Mayer played up the company's investment in the region, highlighting more than 3,500 direct and indirect employees and content available in 14 languages.

"The privacy of our users, and the security and sovereignty of India, is of utmost importance to us," Mayer wrote.

Naxal commander gunned down

Gadchiroli: A Naxal who was gunned down by the police in Maharashtra's Gadchiroli district has been identified as a commander of a unit, who had Rs 8 lakh reward on his head. The personnel from C-60, a specialised combat unit of the district police, were on an operation in a jungle under Hedri police help centre in Mauza Yeldami Friday when an exchange of fire took place with Maoist ultras. The police have identified the deceased as Permil Dalam commander Kote Abhilash alias Chander.

Terrorist hideout busted in J&K

Jammu: A terrorist hideout was busted in a remote village in Rajouri district of Jammu and Kashmir Saturday, leading to the recovery of a huge cache of arms and ammunition, officials said. The hideout was unearthed during the course of a joint search operation by police and the Rashtriya Rifles in Dardasan village of the Thanamandi area, the officials said. They said the recoveries made from the hideout included two Chinese pistols with 920 rounds and a Chinese hand grenade.

Two cousins electrocuted

Raisen: Two cousin sisters, aged 18 and 20 years, died of electrocution after they came in contact with a barbed wire fence at a farm in Raisen district of Madhya Pradesh while working in a paddy field, police said Saturday. The incident occurred in Sultanpur, about 40-kms from the district headquarters, Friday evening, Sultanpur police station in-charge Amrish Bohre said.

Two killed in bomb explosion

Kolkata: Two people were killed and around four injured when the bombs they were allegedly manufacturing went off inside a house in Murshidabad district, a senior police officer said Saturday. Their identities were yet to be established as the condition of those injured and undergoing treatment at a hospital was still "critical", he said. The thatched roof of the house, where they were allegedly making bombs, also blew off in the explosion, which occurred at Suti town in Jangipur.

RS gets ready for Monsoon session

New Delhi, July 4: The Rajya Sabha Secretariat is exploring seating members of the upper house in the House's chamber as well as the galleries in conformity with the norm of physical distancing and to enable virtual participation of other members from either the Central Hall or Balayogi Auditorium in the Parliament premises for the monsoon session.

As the Lok Sabha Secretariat came out with new rules for reconvening parliamentary panel meetings, Rajya Sabha Chairman

Venkaiah Naidu too held detailed discussions on various options for conducting the proceedings of the Upper House during the ensuing Monsoon Session of the Parliament. The Secretary General and other senior officials of the Rajya Sabha Secretariat were present in the hour-long discussions.

However, virtual participation is considered to be limited, in view of the capacity constraints of NIC at present to enable such virtual participation of all MPs. But, Naidu said that there is a need to scale up capacities for larger virtual Parliament in due course.

The chamber and the galleries of the Rajya Sabha can accommodate 127 members while adhering to the physical distancing norms. Sources said that all the galleries, except the media gallery, would be utilised for seating the members.

But given the limited seating capacity in the chamber and the galleries of the House, Naidu asked the officials to draw up appropriate plans for seating based on the strength of various parties in the House or any other effective criteria like preparing a list of the participants in the proceedings of the House for the day who would be accommodated accordingly.

'It takes 18 months to develop a vaccine'

New Delhi, July 4: A good vaccine usually takes at least 18 months, before it could be rolled out for production after fast-tracking all the mandatory regulatory approvals, said NK Ganguly, former director general of Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR).

It is expected that India's first indigenous COVID-19 vaccine, Covaxin may be released August 15 under a fast-track mechanism. According to the government's top medical research body, a dozen institutes have been selected for clinical trials of the indigenous COVID-19 vaccine (BBV152 COVID vaccine). Ganguly said the strain of the virus was given to BBIL in May end, and in July, human trials have been scheduled.

Elaborating on the lengthy process involved in vaccine development, he insisted that after spending many months and infusing a lot of funds, the uncertainty continues to linger. "It may be difficult to say whether the vaccine is successful or not", he added. The ICMR in a letter said, "It is envisaged to launch the vaccine for public health use latest by August 15, after completion of all clinical trials. BBIL (Bharat Biotech International Limited) is working expeditiously to meet the target, however the final outcome will depend on the cooperation of all clinical

trial sites involved in this project."

Before the vaccine is tested on humans, challenge studies are done on mice and monkey, then a toxicology report is prepared, to check if the developed vaccine produces harm to cells, and it takes at least three to four months to finalize this report, said Ganguly. After this phase, the vaccine is tested on two rodents and a large animal and after successful completion of this stage the vaccine is ready for human trials.

"In Phase 1, the age group profiling is done (wherein vaccine study is done on people in different age groups). In Phase 2, nearly 600 to 700 people are vaccinated, and if the vaccine performs successfully in this phase then it progresses into Phase 3, which is called the efficacy study (in this phase, thousands of people are enrolled). Even after fast tracking regulatory ap-

provals, it will take at least 18 months to develop a good vaccine", said Ganguly.

He insisted that the vaccine being developed by Moderna (RNA vaccine is set to begin Phase 3 trials later this month and targets a vaccine by 2021) and BioNTech-Pfizer (Phase 3 trial is expected to begin in July). Gennova biopharmaceutical is also working on a vaccine and it looks positive, Ganguly added.



Chinese hand in ISI's Gilgit-Baltistan move hits separatists

The developments in Pakistan related to Gilgit-Baltistan and diminishing role of terrorist leaders and separatists operating against India is not just accidental

New Delhi, July 4: The controversial proposal to annex Gilgit-Baltistan region of Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK), which is to change the semi-autonomous status of the region, is being pushed by Pakistan to help China secure the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC), security agencies have told the government.

The developments in Pakistan related to Gilgit-Baltistan and diminishing role of terrorist leaders and separatists operating against India is not just accidental. It has massive strategic depth and the security perimeter around it with China playing a major role.

Arguably the most important factor, top security officials said,

is increasing interference of China in Pakistani affairs.

The 3,218-kilometre CPEC, a dream project of Chinese President Xi Jinping, in which China has sunk about \$19 billion, runs along the disputed area.

Last August Prime Minister Narendra Modi scrapped special status of Jammu & Kashmir bringing it under federal control. Statements reiterating India's claim over the Gilgit-Baltistan are believed to have sparked further apprehension about Gilgit-Baltistan. There were three meetings in Islamabad to end the autonomous status of Gilgit-Baltistan. As the meetings were happening in Pakistan, the security agencies underline Chinese started incursions in eastern Ladakh region.




Sources detailing the manoeuvres said that the first meeting was held last year in Islamabad and it was presided over by Pakistan's top army officers. In the meeting,

This irked the Pakistan Army and Inter-Services Intelligence. Subsequently, the third meeting was held in February 2020 and it was presided over by another top Pakistan army officer. The meeting was also attended by Pakistan's law minister, PoK law minister, PoK Prime Minister, Gilgit-Baltistan Chief Minister, both factions of Hurriyat and Jammu Kashmir Liberation Front representatives. In the meeting, a detailed presentation by Pakistan army on the history of Gilgit-Baltistan was made wherein it was stated it was never part of Jammu & Kashmir and was forcibly annexed by Dogra Maharaja and British. The Hurriyat leaders supported the idea. However, JKLF nominee and Kashmir-based SAS Geelani's representative remained quiet.

Explaining the shadowy war, sources said that those militants who had gone to PoK and stayed there since 1990s are not a fighting force anymore. "They are seeking a role in political affairs. Hurriyat leadership is not allowing them, since they have developed vested interests. They are not vacating their positions," said sources adding that Geelani has been backing the former Hizbul cadre, who want a political space within Hurriyat.

"The old hawks occupying the top positions are not allowing the younger lot to join. Also, in PoK, many separatists' leaders are living a luxurious life, which is also being resisted by the younger lot. They had even complained to Geelani against the old Hurriyat leaders based in PoK," sources further added.

Earlier, the India Meteorological Department (IMD) had said the metropolises and surrounding areas could get intermittent moderate to heavy rain with "the possibility of very heavy to extremely heavy rainfall at isolated places" Saturday.

COVID cases hit record high amid monsoon rains

New Delhi, July 4: With 22,771 people testing positive for coronavirus in a single day, the highest so far, India's COVID-19 tally climbed to 6,48,315 Saturday, while the death toll rose to 18,655 with 442 new fatalities, according to the Union Health Ministry data.

With a steady rise, the number of recoveries stands at 3,94,226 and one patient has migrated. There are 2,35,433 active cases of coronavirus presently in the country, the updated data at 8 am showed.

"Thus, around 60.80 per cent of patients have recovered so far," an official said.

The total number of confirmed cases also includes foreigners.

According to ICMR, a cumulative total of 95,40,132 samples have been tested up to July 3 with 2,42,383 samples being tested on Friday.

This is the second consecutive day when coronavirus cases have increased by more than 20,000. There has been a surge of 4,57,780 COVID-19 cases from June 1 till date.

Of the 442 deaths reported in the last 24 hours, 198 are from Maharashtra, 64 from Tamil Nadu, 59 from Delhi, 21 from Karnataka, 18 each from Gujarat and West Bengal, 14 from Uttar Pradesh, 10 from Rajasthan, eight each from Andhra Pradesh and Telangana, five from Punjab, four each from Haryana, Madhya Pradesh and Jammu and Kashmir, three from

Bihar, and two each from Assam and Odisha.

Of the total 18,655 deaths reported so far, Maharashtra accounted for the highest 8,376 fatalities, followed by Delhi with 2,923 deaths, Gujarat with 1,904, Tamil Nadu with 1,385, Uttar Pradesh with 749, West Bengal with 717, Madhya Pradesh with 593, Rajasthan with 440 and Karnataka with 293.

The COVID-19 death toll reached 283 in Telangana, 255 in Haryana, 206 in Andhra Pradesh, 157 in Punjab, 119 in Jammu and Kashmir, 80 in Bihar, 42 in Uttarakhand, 29 in Odisha and 25 in Kerala.

Jharkhand has registered 15 deaths, Chhattisgarh and Assam 14 each, Puducherry 12, Himachal Pradesh 10, Chandigarh six, Goa four and Meghalaya, Tripura, Ladakh and Arunachal Pradesh have reported one fatality each, according to the Health Ministry.

More than 70 per cent deaths took place due to comorbidities, it said.

Maharashtra has reported the highest number of cases at 1,92,990 followed by Tamil Nadu at 1,02,721, Delhi at 94,695, Gujarat at 34,600, Uttar Pradesh at 25,797, West Bengal at 20,488 and Telangana at 20,462, according to the ministry data.

The number of COVID-19 cases has gone up to 19,710 in Karnataka, 19,052 in Rajasthan, 16,994 in Andhra Pradesh, 16,003 in Haryana and 14,297 in Madhya Pradesh.

Tiwari was taken into custody by the Special Task Force (STF), which is presently questioning him. The charge of the police station has since been handed over to Pushpraj Singh.

Tiwari was suspended for alleged laxity in the police raid at the gangster's house in the wee hours of Friday. It was learnt that a case would be registered against Tiwari in case his role in the whole affair is found suspicious.

History-sheeter Vikas Dubey and his gang had fired at a police party that had gone to the village to arrest him. The deceased included Bilhaur Circle Officer Devendra Kumar, who

was leading the team, three sub-inspectors and four constables.

Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath had directed the STF to take over investigations and ensure arrest of the criminals.

Inspector General of Police Aggarwal said that those found complicit in the case would not only be dismissed from service but also arrested and prosecuted.

As for the demolition of the Bikru village house of Vikas Dubey, the police officer said that villagers had told authorities that the gangster had built the house after illegally occupying the piece of land, about which the villagers were angry. Meanwhile, sources said that Station Officer Vinay Tiwari had gone to Vikas Dubey's house Wednesday following a complaint by Rahul Tiwari, who was beaten up by the gangster in the presence of the police officer.

When the SO tried to intervene, Dubey allegedly snatched the mobile phone of Vinay Tiwari and behaved rudely with him.

Lightning kills 15 more in Bihar

Patna, July 4: Fifteen more people lost their lives due to lightning amid heavy rain and thunderstorms in seven districts of Bihar in the last 24 hours.

According to the information received from the districts, 15 persons were killed by lightning during the past 24 hours in the state. Of these, six persons died in Vaishali, two in Lakhisarai, three in Samastipur and one each in Gaya, Banka, Nalanda and Jamui districts.

The meteorological department has issued an alert for thunderstorms in more than a dozen districts, including Patna, Bhojpur, Vaishali and Nalanda in the state.

Chief Minister Nitish Kumar has appealed to the people to be vigilant and follow the guidelines issued by the disaster management department for protection against lightning in the inclement weather. He suggested that people stay at home and be safe.

On Thursday, 26 persons died due to lightning striking different districts. These included six in Patna, four in East Champaran, seven in Samastipur, three in Katihar, two each in Shivhar and Madhepura and one each in Purnia and west Champaran districts.

Last Tuesday, 11 persons died as lightning fell in various districts of Bihar while June 26, 96 persons perished as lightning struck different parts of the state.

Drunk cop runs over elderly woman in Delhi

Geelani quitting politics exposes myth of 'peaceful resistance'

Srinagar, July 4: The resignation of hardline separatist leader, Syed Ali Shah Geelani from the all-party Hurriyat conference has exposed the myth of 'peaceful resistance' against Indian rule in Kashmir.

Geelani's disenchantment with the separatist politics marks a watershed moment which will weigh heavily on all those who chose to fol-

low his footsteps.

Serious allegations have been levelled by Geelani against those he claims to have hijacked the separatist movement against the "Indian rule in Kashmir". In his letter of despair, Geelani has blamed the constituents of the separatist conglomerate to have brazenly used it for accumulating wealth and using their clout for personal aggrandisement.


Despite feeling bad about the al-

legations levelled against them by Geelani, his erstwhile comrades cannot publicly criticise him.

The reason is simple, they have glorified Geelani as the "Amir-e-Karwan", (Leader of the movement) for over 30 years and speaking against him now will only result in deeper chinks in the separatist armour.

"Thou can do no wrong": This is how Geelani was seen in Kashmir's separatist camp and finally discovering that he had feet of clay is definitely going to force a re-thinking on whether the path chosen by the separatist leaders is still the right thing to do, feels many.

The fact that Geelani's supremacy



in all party Hurriyat conference has been challenged by its new convener, Mohammad Hussain Khatib, who belongs to Doda district of J&K and is now based in Muzaffarabad, has sent a clear message to Kashmiri separatist leaders.

Pakistan has decided to give up proxies in Kashmir and handle the separatist politics directly from across the border. The creation of 'The Resistance Front' (TRF) has preceded Geelani's ouster from the Hurriyat. It is believed that while the TRF would coordinate and represent all terror outfits to coordinate attacks against the security forces in Kashmir; the takeover of Hurriyat by Muzaffarabad-based Khatib signals the takeover of separatist politics by Islamabad.

This new development leaves very little to look for in the separatist camp for the so-called moderates or those who claim to be fighting for

an independent Kashmir. Street violence had its heroes like Geelani's man Friday, Masarat Alam who is in detention under the public safety act (PSA).

Despite precious lives lost during those orchestrated violent protests, instead of gaining ground against India, the separatists are faced with abrogation of article 370 and the loss of statehood for J&K.

Geelani's disgruntlement with his cherished idea to give an over-ground political platform to the underground armed separatism has failed.

Those who control the gun will also control the separatist politics.



Qureshi tests Covid positive

Islamabad: Pakistan Foreign Minister Shah Mehmood Qureshi confirmed that he has tested positive for the novel coronavirus, but was feeling "strong and energetic". In a tweet on Friday, Qureshi said that he had a slight fever earlier on Friday and had immediately quarantined himself at home, reports Dawn news. "I have now tested positive for COVID-19... I feel strong and energetic. I will continue to carry on my duties from home..." Several politicians, including members of the ruling Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI), have been diagnosed with the virus over the past few months as it continues to spread in Pakistan.

Many evacuated

Tokyo: Japan asked thousands of people to evacuate their homes on its southern island of Kyushu, media said Saturday, following unprecedented torrential rains in which 15 people are feared dead and nine missing. With the region facing the risk of further floods and landslides, authorities told 92,200 households in the prefectures of Kumamoto and Kagoshima to vacate their homes, the Kyodo news agency said.

Officer killed

Toledo: An officer who was responding to a disturbance call in a store parking lot was shot and killed early Saturday morning by an intoxicated man holding a beer, police said. Toledo Officer Anthony Dia was shot in the chest just after midnight in the parking lot of a Home Depot, and later pronounced dead at a hospital, Police Chief George Kral said at a news conference.

Seven cops hurt

London: Seven police officers were injured in violence at an unlicensed musical event in the British capital as they sought to break up a crowd that posed a risk to public health during the coronavirus pandemic, police said Saturday. Those at Friday's event became violent and threw projectiles at police as they entered an estate at Havelock Close in West London, the police said in a statement.

Trump blasts 'left-wing cultural revolution'



South Dakota, July 4: President Donald Trump on Friday accused "angry mobs" of trying to erase history with efforts to remove or re-think monuments to U.S. historical figures and used a speech at Mount Rushmore to paint himself as a bulwark against left-wing extremism.

The pre-July 4 holiday event drew 7,500 people, packed into an outdoor amphitheater. Many did not wear masks, defying the advice of health officials who have urged Americans to avoid large gatherings to slow the spread of COVID-19. Trump has not worn a mask in public and made only limited reference to the pandemic in his remarks.

Speaking underneath the famed landmark depicting four U.S. presidents, Trump warned that the demonstrations over racial inequality threatened the foundations of the U.S. political system. "Make no mistake, this left wing cultural revolution is designed to overthrow the American revolution," Trump said. "Our children are taught in school to hate their own country."

In the nationwide unrest following the death of George Floyd, a Black man who died in police custody in Minneapolis, protesters in several cities have vandalized

the statues of leaders, including Confederate generals who led a rebellion against the U.S. government during the 1861-65 U.S. civil war.

Protesters in one instance unsuccessfully tried to pull down a statue of U.S. President Andrew Jackson outside the White House. Jackson, known for his populist policies, owned slaves and forced thousands of Native Americans from their homes. "Angry mobs are trying to tear down statues of our founders, deface our most sacred memorials, and unleash a wave of violent crime in our cities," Trump said. Trump, a Republican who has

emphasized a "law and order" approach to the demonstrations, has opposed proposals to rename U.S. military bases that are named after Confederate generals. The program was not an official campaign event, but Trump touched on key themes meant to energize his base ahead of the Nov. 3 election. Many in the crowd wore Trump memorabilia and chanted "Four More Years" before the program began. Trump trails presumptive Democratic presidential nominee Joe Biden in opinion polls in key states and is eager to boost his campaign through a tough response to social unrest.

KHASHOGGI MURDER CASE

Trial told oven was lit after killing

Istanbul, July 4: A Saudi consulate worker in Istanbul told a Turkish court Friday he had been asked to light a tandoor oven less than an hour after Saudi journal-

ist Jamal Khashoggi entered the building where he was killed.

Zeki Demir, a local technician who worked for the consulate, was giving evidence on the first day of the trial in absentia of 20 Saudi officials over Khashoggi's killing, which sparked global outrage and tarnished the image of Saudi Arabia's de facto ruler.

Demir said he had been called to the consul's residence after Khashoggi entered the nearby consulate to seek his papers. "There were five to six people there... They asked me to light up the tandoor (oven). There was panic," he said.

Khashoggi disappeared after going to the consulate to get papers for his marriage in October 2018. Some Western governments, as well as the CIA, said they believed Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman had or-

dered the hit - an accusation Saudi officials denied.

Turkish officials have said one theory police pursued was that Khashoggi's killers may have tried to dispose of his body by burning it after suffocating him and cutting up his corpse. The indictment accuses two top Saudi officials, former deputy head of Saudi Arabia's general intelligence Ahmed al-Asiri and former royal court adviser Saud al-Qahtani, of instigating "premeditated murder with monstrous intent".

It says 18 other defendants were flown to Turkey to kill Khashoggi, a prominent and well-connected journalist who had grown increasingly critical of the crown prince. The defendants are being tried in absentia and are unlikely ever to be handed over by Saudi Arabia, which has accused Turkey of failing to cooperate with a separate, largely secretive, trial in Riyadh last year.

In December a Saudi court sentenced five people to death and three to jail for the killing, but Khashoggi's family later said they forgave his murderers, effectively granting them a formal reprieve under Saudi law. A Saudi prosecutor said at the time there was no evidence connecting Qahtani to the killing and dismissed charges against Asiri.

G4 swine flu virus doesn't infect humans easily: China

Shanghai/Beijing, July 4: China's Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Affairs said Saturday that the so-called "G4" strain of swine flu virus is not new and does not infect or sicken humans and animals easily, rebuffing a study published earlier this week.

That study, by a team of Chinese scientists and published by the U.S. journal Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences (PNAS), warned that a new swine flu virus,

named G4, has become more infectious to humans and could become a potential "pandemic virus".

However, China's agriculture ministry said in a statement that the study has been interpreted by the media "in an exaggerated and non-factual way."

An analysis by the ministry concluded that sampling of the published study is too small to be representative, while the article lacks adequate evidence to show the G4 virus has become the dominant strain among pigs.



Trump Jr's girlfriend tests Covid positive

Washington, July 4: Kim Guilfoyle, the girlfriend of Donald Trump Jr. and a top Trump campaign official, has tested positive for the novel coronavirus, it was reported.

Guilfoyle, who travelled to Mount Rushmore to attend President Donald Trump's July 4 kick-off address on Friday, was not in contact with him and did not travel on Air Force One, Politico news said in a report.

Sergio Gor, chief of staff for the Trump Victory Finance Committee, said in a statement on Friday: "After testing positive, Kimberly was immediately isolated to limit any exposure. She's doing well, and will be retested to ensure the diagnosis is correct since she's asymptomatic, but as a precaution will cancel all upcoming events."

"Donald Trump Jr was tested negative, but as a precaution is also self isolating and is cancelling all public events," Guilfoyle however, did not have coronavirus symptoms prior to the rally, Politico news quoted a New York Times report as saying.

Guilfoyle, a former Fox News personality who now works for the Trump campaign, is the latest person close to the President to test positive for coronavirus. In May, a member of the US military who worked in the White House tested positive for the virus.

Days later, Katie Miller, Vice President Mike Pence's spokeswoman, also tested positive.

Big message to China as US sends carriers

Washington, July 4: Two U.S. aircraft carriers were conducting exercises in the disputed South China Sea Saturday, the U.S. navy said, as China also carried out military drills that have been criticised by the Pentagon and neighbouring states.

China and the United States have accused each other of stoking tension in the strategic waterway at a time of strained relations over everything from the new coronavirus to trade to Hong Kong.

The USS Nimitz and USS Ronald Reagan were carrying out operations and exercises in the South China Sea "to support a free and open Indo-Pacific," the navy said in a statement. It did not say exactly where the exercises were being conducted in the South China Sea, which extends for some 1,500 km (900 miles) and 90% of which is claimed by China despite the protests of its neighbours.

"The purpose is to show an unambiguous signal to our partners and allies that we are committed to regional security and stability," Rear Admiral George M. Wikoff

Wikoff, commander of the strike group led by the Ronald Reagan, said the exercises were not a response to those being conducted by China, which the Pentagon criticised this week as "counter-productive to efforts at easing tensions and maintaining stability".

China dismissed the U.S. criticism of its drills on Friday and suggested the United States was to blame for increasing tensions. U.S. carriers have long carried out exercises in the Western Pacific, including in the South China Sea, according to the U.S. navy. At one point recently, the United States had three carriers in the region.

Indian dozes off at airport, misses flight

Dubai, July 4: An Indian expat worker, who was eagerly waiting to be repatriated after cancelling his visa, missed a jumbo jet flying 427 stranded Indians to Kerala after he fell asleep in the Dubai International Airport, the media reported.

P. Shajahan, 53, who worked as a storekeeper with a company in Musaffah in Abu Dhabi, told Gulf News Friday that he had fallen asleep as he had not slept on Wednesday night waiting for confirmation about the flight and had caught an early morning taxi to reach Dubai.

He was supposed to fly on the Emirates jumbo jet to Thiruvananthapuram in Kerala,

which was chartered by the Kerala Muslim Cultural Centre (KMCC) Dubai. After finishing the check-in procedures and rapid test, he reached the waiting area of the boarding gate at Terminal 3 in the afternoon.

"I sat away from most of the others. But I fell asleep," he said.

S. Nizamudeen Kollam, who coordinated the charter flight, said airline officials could not trace Shajahan when the flight was to take off.

"He woke up and called us after the flight left. It is sad that he missed the flight, which was the first ever jumbo jet chartered for repatriation. We are now trying to send him on another Emirates flight that we are chartering on Saturday," Kollam said.

In March, Gulf News had reported that Arun Singh, another Indian expat, who also had fallen asleep in the same terminal and missed the last flight home before flights were suspended due to the COVID-19 pandemic. He was stranded here for over 50 days before getting repatriated.

US COPS FIRED FOR MOCKING MAN'S DEATH

Washington, July 4: Three police officers in the US state of Colorado have been sacked after they shared photos re-enacting a chokehold used on a black man last year who later died.

Elijah McClain, a 23-year-old African-American in Aurora, Colorado, was killed last August after an encounter with police while walking home. The officers who were fired were identified as Jason Rosenblatt, Erica Marrero and Kyle Dittrich. The fourth, Jaron Jones, has earlier resigned on Tuesday.

Vanessa Wilson, the acting police chief in the Denver suburb of Aurora, where the McClain incident took place, called the images a crime against humanity and decency. "We are ashamed, we are sickened, and we are angry about what I have to share," the BBC quoted Wilson as saying at a news conference on Friday.

"While the allegations of this internal affairs case are not criminal, they are a crime against humanity and decency. To even think about doing such a thing is reprehensible."

One of the pictures shows Dittrich and Jones imitating a neck hold, while Marrero smiles to their left. Rosenblatt was sent the photos by text and responded "ha ha".



June GST adds up to ₹759cr

THIS YEAR'S GST COLLECTION IS ₹45 CR (-) 5.6% LESS THAN THE CORRESPONDING PERIOD LAST YEAR

Bhubaneswar, July 4: With the number of relaxations granted by the GST Council, June witnessed a marked improvement in GST collections in the state. The OGST collection for June 2020 is marked ₹759.17 crore. Commissioner (CT & GST) SK Lohani reviewed the tax collections.

The OGST collected ₹759.17 crore against the collection of ₹804.49 crore during the corresponding period last year which is less by ₹45 crore (-) 5.6%. However, the OGST collection of the 1st quarter of 2020-21 (Apr-June) registered a negative growth of 32.79% as the total collection could be ₹1560.20 crore as against ₹2321.39 crore collected during the same period in the preceding year.

Similarly, the Gross GST Collection (CGST, IGST, SGST & Cess) in the first quarter of 2020-21 (Apr-June) is ₹5192.30 cr as against ₹8019.44 cr during the preceding quarter of 2019-20 registering a negative growth rate of (-) 35.25%. However, the situation has improved in June, 2020 which registered a collection of ₹2693.75 cr as against ₹2923.47 Cr achieved during last June. Thus, the shortfall was



only by (-) 7.86% during June 2020.

Further, imposition of nationwide lockdown to contain COVID-19 adversely affected timely filing of returns for the tax periods of February, March and April 2020 also. Realising the difficulties of the taxpayers, the government waived the late fee for the delay in return filing and also allowed late payment of tax due without interest/reduced interest @ 9%.

Similarly, taxpayers having turnover up to ₹5 crore were required to file returns for March tax period by July 5, 2020 and for April tax period by July 9, 2020 with no interest. Failure to file GSTR 3B by the above mentioned dates will attract interest @ 9% im-

mediately after the due dates. All taxpayers are hereby, advised to file returns by the due date to avoid payment of interest.

In a major relief to GST taxpayers, the government has further decided to cap the maximum late fee for Form GSTR-3B at ₹500 per return for the tax period July 2017 to July 2020. The reduced fee will be levied only if returns are filed before September 30, 2020.

It has also notified that there will be NIL late fees if there is no tax liability. In order to further simplify the process of returns filing, GSTN has already introduced filing of monthly and quarterly sales statements (GSTR 1) and tax return (GSTR 3B) through SMS for those tax payers having NIL liability.

Mumbai monorail: 3 Indian cos interested

Mumbai: As many as three Indian companies have shown interest in manufacturing rakes for the monorail projects, weeks after town planning authority MMRDA scrapped the bids by two Chinese firms. Last month, the Mumbai Metropolitan Region Development Authority (MMRDA) scrapped the ₹500 crore contract for sourcing 10 rakes for the Jacob Circle-Wadala-Chembur monorail project wherein two Chinese firms had




expressed their interest to supply the rakes, stating that the companies were "dictating" terms. "3 Indian firms have shown interest in designing and developing Mono rail rolling stock," the authority tweeted. MMRDA Commissioner RA Rajeev had earlier said that the authority was in talks with BHEL and BEML for the contract. Another private sector player Titagarh has also expressed interest.

But unlike Zoom, it does not impose a 40-minute time limit. Calls can go on as long as 24 hours, and all meetings are encrypted and password-protected, the company said.



State claims to cut interest rate of liquidity infusion

Bhubaneswar, July 4: State MSME and Energy minister Ditya Shankar Mishra has urged the central government to reduce the interest rate of liquidity infusion funding by REC and PFC.

The Energy minister asked for reduction from 9.5% to 6% and to extend the said assistance for the revenue shortfall due to less demand of power in FY'2020-21.

Mishra was speaking at the Power Ministers' conference held Friday via a video conferencing chaired by Union Power Minister RK Singh. The benefit of the reform based distribution scheme applicable for the states having done Purchasing power parity (PPP) in their states for better services to the consumers.

He emphasised that the proposed scheme should be such that the tribal children who have been left neglected for long, get access to education, telemedicine and in-



formation similar to their urban counterpart. Mishra stated that this can be achieved if a stable and quality power is facilitated to them in the far and isolated regions.

The Minister also stated that the consumption/demand from the commercial and industrial consumers continues to be very low and about 25% lower than the expected levels. Therefore, the discoms are unable to schedule the power of central Gencos like NTPC. He requested to provide the rebate of the fixed charges component of unscheduled power for full year 2020-21 as the impact will continue.

XAVI TO REPLACE SETIEN: REPORTS

Barcelona, July 4: Former Barcelona great Xavi has reportedly agreed to replace Quique Setien at the end of this season.

The 61-year-old Setien has endured a tough tenure at the helm of the Catalan giants since replacing Ernesto Valverde in January, and speculation has mounted that the club's board are tempted to wield the axe already.

And according to 'Mundo Deportivo', a 'firm agreement' has been finalised which would see Xavi take up the reins at the end of the season.

It is believed that talisman Lionel Messi - who has reportedly been considering his future at the club - and his teammates are satisfied with what would be a sensational appointment.

Xavi, who current manages Al-Sadd in Qatar, has been touted to earn 5.4million pound per year from his new bumper contract.

He had taken over at Al-Sadd last summer after bringing an end to his trophy-laden time on the field with the same club.

However, Barcelona appear to have come knocking once again



after being rejected originally when searching for Valverde's successor at the beginning of the year. The midfield maestro made 767

first-team appearances for the La Liga giants, and joined the club aged 11 before progressing through their world-renowned La Masia

academy system.

Xavi himself admitted last month that he and his coaching staff are preparing to take charge of Barcelona in the future.

The four-time Champions League winner told a video conference: "The biggest hope I have now is to be Barca coach and get Barca back to winning ways. Not me but these players and Barca triumphing. And as a consequence, our technical staff, who are preparing for it a lot and it makes us really excited."

Despite turning down the role due to his perceived lack of experience coaching at the highest level, Xavi appears to have been tempted to accept the offer this time round.

The 40-year-old is unlikely to have enjoyed watching the top-flight title challengers' struggles to retain their crown this season - with a mixed string of results having handed rivals Real Madrid the advantage.

Setien is now fighting for his future, with many expecting him to be sacked at the end of the campaign. The board harbour concerns over recent performances, and players have also reportedly turned against the tactician due to confusion over his instructions.

Morata double props Atletico

Barcelona, July 4: Alvaro Morata scored twice to lead Atletico Madrid to a 3-0 win over Mallorca and extend its strong finish to the Spanish league.

Diego Simeone's team has long been out of the title race being displaced by leader Real Madrid and second-placed Barcelona, which they trail by eight points.

But Atletico is one of the hottest teams as La Liga ticks down before it shifts focus to the Champions League final eight to be played in Portugal next month.

In March when the league was halted, Atletico was struggling to secure a Champions League berth for next season. It is now well on course to finishing third.

Atletico has remained undefeated in seven matches since the Spanish league resumed following a three-month stoppage for the COVID-19 pandemic.

"We were in a complicated situation before the stoppage, but we have been playing well since we got back to playing and have been playing with a great attitude," Morata said.

Simeone's side dominated the relegation-threatened Mallorca from kickoff. Morata earned a penalty when he was pulled down by Aleksandar Sedlar in the area. Goalkeeper Manuel Reina blocked his strike, but a video review helped the referee order a redo of the spot kick after Sedlar entered the area too early.

Morata stepped back up and on

a second try rifled the ball into the top corner in the 29th minute. "Missing and then getting back up and trying again is part of football," Morata said about the penalty.

The former Chelsea and Real Madrid striker was back on the scoreboard in first-half injury time when Koke stole the ball and played Marcos Llorente clear to reach the end line, where he found Morata at the far post to tap home.

The goals were Morata's 10th and 11th of the season in league play. Mallorca could not muster a comeback and Renan Lodi hit the crossbar for Atletico before Koke scored in the 79th.

His shot deflected off a defender to give Reina no chance to save. Mallorca was left five points from safety with four games left.

'Agents already dreaming about Messi-Ronaldo double at Juve'

London, July 4: Lionel Messi could end up making a sensational move to Juventus to play alongside old rival Cristiano Ronaldo next summer, according to Barcelona icon Rivaldo, amid reports that the Argentine is deeply unhappy at the Nou Camp.

With the Catalan giants in turmoil, Spanish radio station 'Cadena SER' reported that Messi would see out his 500,000 pound-per-week contract at the club before moving on next summer.

Messi is deeply unhappy with the club's current hierarchy, following the sale of Arthur and the club's half-baked attempt to re-sign Neymar from PSG.

And Rivaldo claims a move to Turin is already being dreamed up, creating one of the most star-studded attacks in footballing history.

"With all this speculation, I believe that some agents are already dreaming about a Messi-Ronaldo double at Juventus and how big it will be around the globe," Rivaldo told 'Betfair'.

"If that happened there would be a world 'boom', and I believe Juventus would quickly recover

any investment on the Argentinian thanks to the boost they would get from visibility and marketing.

"It would be historical to see both playing together and I'm sure many Juve sponsors would love to help financially, so, it's also a possibility for Messi.



"If there are rumours about his exit, then of course every club will be thinking about how they can sign him. That said, the two best players in the world for the past 10 years playing at the same club would be massive."

Should Messi decide to leave the Nou Camp, another potential destination would be Etihad - a move that would see Messi reunite with

former boss Pep Guardiola.

"If he is considering leaving the club, then something mustn't be good in the Barcelona dressing room and perhaps he is tired with all the constant problems that have surrounded the club in the last few months," Rivaldo added.

"When Messi's contract ends, he will be 34, but with his class I think he could still easily play in Premier League. It will be sad to see him leaving Barcelona once his contract ends eventually, but I still hope that he can stay for now.

"Despite his connection to the club, he has the right to move if he wants and reuniting with Pep Guardiola at City will be tempting for him, as the two of them formed a great coach and player partnership at Barca."

While Messi is fed up with how the Catalan club is currently run, there are huge doubts that he's already decided what he will do in 12 months' time.

If the club are unable to persuade Messi over their new winning 'project' before his contract is up, then it would signal an end of an era for the Argentine in Catalonia. However, a move away from the Nou Camp is very unlikely.

Martinelli pens long-term deal with Gunners

London, July 4: Arsenal's Brazil U-23 striker Gabriel Martinelli has signed a new long-term contract at the Premier League club. The news comes 48 hours after fellow teenager Bukayo Saka, 18, also agreed a new long-term deal with the Gunners.

The 19-year-old Martinelli - who penned his new contract exactly a year after joining Arsenal - has scored 10 goals in 26 games for the club since moving from Brazilian side Ituano last year.

He has been sidelined for the rest of the season after suffering a knee injury in training which required surgery.

"He is a very talented young player and he has impressed us with his performances, attitude and work-rate. We are looking forward to getting him back to full fitness and to watching his development at our club," manager Mikel Arteta told the club website.

Martinelli is the first teenager to score 10 goals in a season for Arsenal since Nicolas Anelka over 20 years ago.

Bairstow, Moeen ignored for 1st Test

Manchester, July 4: Wicket-keeper Jonny Bairstow and spin bowling all-rounder Moeen Ali were Saturday left out of England's 13-man squad for the first 'bio-secure' Test against West Indies, starting July 8.

Ben Stokes will lead the side as England's regular captain Root will miss the game to be with his wife for the birth of their second child.

The squad features pacers James Anderson, Stuart Broad, Jofra Archer and Mark Wood in addition to all-rounders Stokes and Chris Woakes. In the spin department, England have gone with Dominic Bess. Jack Leach has been left out of the main squad and is among reserves.

The most notable omissions from the 30-man training squad include Bairstow and Moeen. Bairstow's position in the side had first be-



come uncertain in 2019 after a prolonged run of low scores. He was initially left out of England's squad for their tour of New Zealand but was able to find a spot due to injury to Joe Denly.

Bairstow then got a spot on the tour of South Africa but scored only 10 runs in two innings of the one Test he played. That left him with a tally of only 334 runs in 2019 at an average of 18.55.

Moeen took a break from red-



ball cricket after being dropped from England's set up mid-way through the Ashes. He went wicketless in his first bowling innings in the warm-up match and picked up two wickets in the second, but Bess and Leach both got more wickets.

But with time Nasser has realised that the current BCCI President is a lovely person.

Speaking on Star Sports show 'Cricket Connected', Hussain spoke about his Team India counterpart back then. "I have always said, and this is a generalisation, but I have always said about Ganguly, that he made India a tougher side.

"So, before Ganguly, there were very talented side, but you felt they were also a nice side, very down to earth, would meet you with morning greetings, morning Nasser, it was a very pleasant experience. "Playing against a Ganguly side, you knew you were in a battle, you knew that Ganguly understood the passion of Indian cricket fans and it wasn't just a game of cricket. It was more important than a game of cricket.

"He was feisty and he picked feisty cricketers whether it would be Harbhajan or Yuvraj or whoever feisty in your face that when you met him away from the game, were lovely, nice. Sourav's like that.

"When I played against Sourav, I hated him, he used to make me wait for the toss every single time and I'll be like, Ganguly, its 10.30, we have to toss. But now I work with him for the last decade on commentary he's such a nice, calm, he's still late for his commentary stints, but he is a lovely bloke.

"And that's the way cricketers should be. When you play with him or against him, you don't like him and when you meet up with him later in life, they're nice people."

Red Bull loses appeal against Mercedes' DAS

Spielberg (Austria), July 4: Red Bull has lost an appeal it lodged against the dual assistant steering system unveiled by Formula One (F1) rival Mercedes during winter testing in February.

The DAS helps the Mercedes car's cornering and reduces its tire wear. On-board footage from testing in Spain showed Lewis Hamilton pulling the steering wheel back and forth on the front straight, apparently changing the angle of the front tires.

Other teams were caught cold by the innovation, with Red Bull claim-

ing in its protest that the DAS is both an aerodynamic and a suspension device. But stewards said it was part of the steering system alone and cleared Mercedes late Friday night following a hearing.

"DAS is part of the steering system, albeit not a conventional one," the FIA said in a statement. "The key challenges to the legality of the DAS rely on it not being part of the steering system. If this were indeed the case, then it would be breaching (regulations)."

The system will be banned as from 2021 but can be used by Mercedes and other teams this season.

LIN DAN HANGS UP HIS RACQUET

Beijing, July 4: Legendary Chinese shuttler Lin Dan, the first men's singles player to retain the Olympic title, Saturday announced his retirement, bringing down curtains on a two-decade long illustrious career.

Considered as one of the greatest players in history, the two-time Olympic champion, popularly known as 'Super Dan', announced his retirement on China's twitter-like social media 'Weibo'.

"From 2000 to 2020, after 20 years, I have to say goodbye to the national team. It is very difficult to say it out loud," the 36-year-old, who had claimed gold medals at the 2008 and 2012 Olympics, wrote.

"Being a 37-year-old, my physical condition and injuries no longer allow me to fight alongside my teammates. There is gratitude, reluctance and frustration. In the days to come, I hope to spend more time with my family, and I will also look



for a new 'competition,'" he said, according to 'Xinhua'.

He said he dedicated everything to the sport he loved. "After going through four Olympic cycles, I have never thought about leaving, nor

would I want to think about it. 'Persistence' is the word I told myself in every suffering moment in order to keep my career longer.

"Rather than simply pursuing rankings as a young shuttler, I'm

challenging my physical limits as an 'old' athlete under the sports spirit of never giving up."

During his glorious career, Lin Dan has also won five World Championship title and six All England champion crowns. He ended with 666 singles titles, besides numerous medals for his country. "My thanks also go to my excellent 'opponents' who inspired me," he said.

Malaysian legend Lee Chong Wei, who had retired just over a year ago, paid glowing tribute to Lin Dan, against whom he had waged many epic battles with the two dominating the international stage for more than a decade.

"We knew this day would arrive, Heavy moment of our lives; You pulled down the curtain gracefully. You were king where we fought so proudly; Your final wave all four disappear. Within the hush of silent tear. #lindan," Chong Wei wrote on his twitter handle.
