OHRC summons DCP (traffic)

Bhubaneswar: A livid Odisha Human Rights Commission (OHRC) has summoned the Deputy Commissioner of Police (traffic) to depose personally as she failed to annear commission desnite notice. On 29 December, the Commission issued the summons while hearing a plea related to traffic mismanagement in the Bhubaneswar and Cuttack twin cities filed by one Siba Shankar Dash from Cuttack. The commission has asked the DCP (traffic) for the twin city, Soumya Mishra to appear before it January 11, 2021. The DCP was also summoned to help in disposing of the matter December 7.

Bhubaneswar, Dec 31: The state government has decided to invest ₹3,500 crore for the modernisation and makeover of Cuttack-based SCB Medical College and Hospital and develop it into an AIIMS Plus institution. The premier institute will have an integrated ultra-modern health system over the next three years. Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik Thursday reviewed the progress made on the modernisation of the institution and set January 1, 2024 for inauguration of the project.

The decision to invest such a huge amount came a day after the Union Cabinet approved ₹3,000 crore to turn Paradip Port into world class by setting up a dock. According to a press statement issued by the CMO, the project will be undertaken under 5T initiative of the state government and make SCBMCH a world-class institution.

Ticketed as biggest medical institution project in government sector

in the country, the hospital project with 5,000 beds will come up over an area of 175 acres. Initially, the hospital will be converted into a 3,500-bedded healthcare institution and later another 1,500 beds will be added. The government also has plans to construct 1,280 staff quar-

JANUARY 1, 2024 ters for the employees and hostels for more than 2,200 medical students of SCBMCH. In addition, the project will introduce best-in-class technologies in the field of medical education, relenges of future. Besides, the institution will have all modern facilities like playground, parking facility; open landscape space, five entry points, robust circular plan, transport facilities. restaurants and commercial centres.

During the review meeting, Naveen directed the officials to form an independent managing committee for the new SCB Medical College and Hospital. The Chief Minister is himself monitoring the project. He hoped that SCB Medical College and Hospital would among the best three health institutions of the country.

In 1944, the SCB Medical College and Hospital was established in Cuttack and it has been providing healthcare services to patients from different states in the eastern region.

Among others, Chief Secretary Asit Tripathy, Development Commissioner Suresh Chandra Mohapatra, Additional Chief Secretary Pradipta Mohapatra and CM's 5T Secretary VK Pandian were present. Works secretary Kishan Kumar presented the details of the project.

New Delhi, Dec 31: The dates of the CBSE Board examinations for Class X and XII in 2021 have been announced. The examinations will kick off in May this time round. The board examinations will commence from May 4 and end June 10. The results of the Class 10

and 12 Board examinations will be announced by July 15. On Thursday evening, Union

Education Minister Ramesh Pokhriyal Nishank made an official announcement with regard to the dates of the examinations. Both the Union

Ministry of Education and the CBSE have made it clear that the examinations will have to be taken at the examination centre itself in the pen and paper mode, like every year. No option has been provided for online examinations.

Education Minister Nishank said, "No programme relating to the board examinations will be held in January or February this year. Practical board examinations will com-

4 killed as SUV turns turtle

Keonjhar: In a tragic incident, four persons were killed and four others injured after a SUV in which they were travelling overturned at Somagiri under Pandapada police limits in the district late Wednesday night. The SUV carrying 11 persons was coming to Jirang near Harichandanpur and lost control and rammed into a road side tree before skidding 10ft off the road. Of the 11 persons, four died on the spot while four others sustained critical injuries. The identity of the deceased persons is yet to be ascertained.

New Delhi, Dec 31: India is likely to have a Covid-19 vaccine in the New Year, Drug Controller General of India VG Somani hinted Thursday.

Speaking at a webinar, Somani said the most important thing is that the industry and research organisations have stood the test of time. He said vaccine candidates have got the funding and also talked about the efforts made by the Department of Biotechnology. "...and probably we will have a very happy New Year with something in hand. That's what I can hint at," Somnai said. The Serum Institute of India, Bharat Biotech and Pfizer have applied to the DCGI seeking emergency use authorisation for their Covid-19 vaccine candidates and

are awaiting approval. Somani said the approval process was fast-tracked in view of the pandemic by quickly processing all applications, allowing parallel phase 1 and 2 trials without waiting for complete data. "There has been no compromise on the safety or efficacy of the data. The only thing is that the regulator has accepted partial data,' he said.

An expert panel in the Central Drugs Standard Control Organisation (CDSCO) that met Wednesday to consider emergency use authorisation applications by SII for the Oxford Covid-19 vaccine and Bharat Biotech's 'Covaxin' will reconvene January 1 to further deliberate on the matter

Meanwhile, a dry run for Covid vaccine will be held in all states January 2, the government said as authorities hinted that approval for a vaccine could be around the corner. The Union Health Secretary Thursday chaired a high-level meeting with all states and Union Territories. This is the second dry run being conducted in the country -- the first was held December 28 and 29 in four states and had gone off without a hitch, the health ministry said.

The dry run will happen at selective places in each state, sources said. The process, in which participants receive dummy Covid vaccines, is meant to test the mechanisms and reveal possible gaps in the system ahead of the actual vaccination drive.

DEFENCE ANALYST HI SUTTON WRITES IN FORBES THAT THESE UNDERWATER DRONES ARE EMPOWERED WITH LARGE WINGS TO GLIDE FOR LONG PERIODS

New Jersey, Dec 31: If defence analyst HI Sutton is to be believed, China has deployed a fleet of underwater drones called Sea Wing (Haiyi) glider in the Indian Ocean, which can operate for months on end and make observations for naval intelligence purposes.

An article by Sutton in the Forbes magazine says that these sea gliders, which the Chinese are deploying "en masse", are a type of Uncrewed



Underwater Vehicle (UUV) launched in mid-December 2019 and recovered in February after making over 3,400 obser-

vations. These gliders are similar to those deployed by the US Navy, one of which was seized by Beijing in 2016 to ensure

"safe navigation of passing ships", Sutton wrote citing government source.

"Taken at face value, it mav be surprising that China is now deploying these types of UUV en masse in the Indian Ocean. China has also deployed the Sea Wing from an ice breaker in the Arctic," the defence analyst wrote.

Reports from December 2019 hinted that 14 such drone would be employed in the Indian Ocean mission but only 12 were used, Bloomberg quoted Sutton as stating in his report. He said that these gliders are unpowered with large wings to glide that can run for long periods of time, adding that they are not fast or agile. However, they are employed for long-range missions. Furthermore, the defence analyst said these Chinese gliders that are placed in the Indian Ocean were reportedly gathering oceanography data, which "sounds innocuous," however, is commonly gathered for naval intelligence purposes.'

# **City cinemas brace for raising curtains**

THE CITY CINEMA HALL OWNERS STARTED SANITISING THEIR PREMISES FOR WELCOMING THE AUDIENCES

Bhubaneswar, Dec 31: A day after the state government allowed cinema halls to reopen from January 1, owners of cinema halls and theatres Thursday started preparations for raising the curtains with strict adherence to Covid-19 norms.

The cinema hall owners started sanitising their premises for welcoming the audiences. As per the guidelines, cinema halls will reopen with 50 per cent capacity.

The big screens were shut for audiences in March 2020 as part of the lockdown guidelines in the wake of the pandemic.

Orissa POST had earlier highlighted the financial burden on the cinema halls in the Capital city due to the lockdown. Maintenance and equipment costs, salary bills and other expenditures pushed the cinema hall owners into trouble. Big cinema halls in the city have incurred losses of around ₹20-30 lakh each due to the restrictions.

"We welcome the state government's decision of reopening cinema halls with Covid-19 protocols. We have started sanitising the seats and hall premises. We will be ready

for reopening the halls after January 14," said Maharaja Cinema Hall owner Biswajit Mohapatra.

Though many big-budget movies have been released through over-thetop (OTT) platforms during the lockdown, it is expected that some good movies would hit the silver screen ahead of the Republic Day, Mohapatra added.

"With 50 per cent capacity rules in place, it is expected that movies will run for longer periods in cinema halls. We request the government to stop sending power bills to us for now,' Mohapatra added. All Odisha

# **Grade tampering of minerals: IBM points to rev loss for state**

ity iron ores in September, 2020. Thereby, their sales value had decreased.

Taking serious note of the matter, Indian Bureau of Mines (IBM) had issued a letter to the directorate of mines of the state government, asking it to assess the average value of all minerals produced by all mines in September and in-

timate it to the IBM. It is learnt that when lease holders show the extracted minerals as low quality stuff in records, their sales value affects the revenue collection of the state government.

As per the Rule-45(5) B of the MCDR-2017, lease holders usually file returns for the minerals ex-

tracted every month. According to the Rule-42(3) and 43 of the Mineral Concession Rule-

2016, on the basis of their returns, the IBM usually gets to know the monthly average sales value of minerals and publish them. On the other hand, the state government determines the revenue of

extracted minerals on the basis of their monthly sales average value and grades of the minerals. The IBM asserted that as compared to previous months, the sales

value and total sales value of the extracted minerals in September had decreased, leading to a huge loss of revenue for the state government.

A high-level committee of the IBM had held its meeting to assess the average value of the minerals sold in September. Then it came to know that the grades of the minerals at Jajang and Jiling Langalata mines have fallen by 55 per cent in

Indian Bureau of Mines (IBM) has asked the directorate of mines to assess the average value of all minerals produced by all mines in September, 2020

September as compared to previous months.

Similarly, grades of iron ores mined from Bhapali, Jajanga, and Badampahad mines had fallen by 55 and 58 percent respectively in the same month.

As the state government has suffered huge loss in terms of revenues, the IBM, in its letter dated 28.12.2020, has sought GST and invoices of the extracted minerals for the month of September.

On the other hand, grades of minerals are allegedly tampered and shown as low grades before exporting them outside the state. High grade minerals usually generate more revenue than the low grade minerals. It may be noted here that this newspaper had carried a report about mineral grade tempering and tax evasion by some lease holders in the last part of September, this year.

# High drama as orphaned jumbo calf is shifted to Kapilas zoo

# Dongria's Kapdaganda shawls to be available on e-com platforms

Rayagada, Dec 31: Dongria women will soon make use of machines to weave their famous Kapdaganda



shawls instead of following the tedious way of weaving them in hands, a report said. Moreover, proper marketing facility will also be provided to sale these shawls on e-commerce platforms like Amazon and Government e-market (GEM), the report said.

This was stated here at a one-day workshop organised by the ministry of handlooms, textiles and handicrafts at a city hotel here. The Dongria women living in Rayagada district will be provided training to weave their shawls in machines and arrangements will be made to sell their products on these e-commerce platforms. The machines have been made available due to the the efforts of deputy director Kumari Shailaja of the Handloom ministry

Reports said 44 Dongria women artisans of Khajuri and Khambesu villages and 22 Dokra artisans of Gotiguda village were given away with identity cards provided by the Union government for the first time in this programme.

Collector Pramod Kumar Behera gave away 20 sewing machines and other necessary materials to the Dongria women. Other officials exuded hope that this will help in weaving more shawls which will be eventually sold in the market and on e-commerce platforms. Amazon state head Durga Madhab Nahak and GEM representative Sudhansu Pradhan provided necessary tips on the sales of Kapdaganda shawls and Dokra articles on the e-commerce platforms.

In the next phase, 44 more Dongria women will be trained to weave Kapdaganda shawls in machines and their sales on e-commerce platforms. In subsequent phases, at least 500 Dongria artisans will be provided with identity cards and government support.

# Low-hanging fruits

ending apps in the country offering easy loans to people has come up as a challenge for the Reserve Bank of India (RBI). Reports of harass-/ ment of borrowers by recovery agents engaged by these unauthorised app companies have come from many states. Acting on these complaints, the RBI has issued a directive asking people not to fall prey to such easy baits. The ownership pattern of these app-based firms and their modus operandi are not transparent. They offer loans with minimum paperwork, that too at quickest possible time. These loans come with a very high rate of interest and exorbitant processing fees, eventually making borrowers to default on schedule of repayments. These shady entities engage recovery guys, read goons, to extract money from defaulters. Since these apps have access to phonebooks of borrowers, they do not hesitate to call up contacts and relatives of a defaulting individual to mount pressure on him. Such shady business has been there for some time. However, the volume of this business shot up following the outbreak of Covid-19. The pandemic has resulted in millions of people losing jobs and livelihood. Therefore, people in large numbers turned to easy money being given on a platter by these lending apps. More the number of loans, the more the number of defaults and eventually higher number cases of harassment of borrowers. We welcome the RBI's decision cautioning potential borrowers not to share documents with such unauthorised entities. It, however, remains to be seen how effective the RBI's warning is going to be. Public lending in our country is usually done by banks and nonbanking finance companies (NBFCs). There are also laws framed by state governments to regulate money lending business. The RBI has asked digital lending platforms to disclose their bank and NBFC affiliations upfront, but there are many unscrupulous entities who have not listened to RBI's instructions.

The central bank has done well by sounding an alert note against these app-based lenders. But that is not enough. Since the banking regulator cannot enforce its dictate, the government, for good measure, must step in to ensure such entities are weeded out, once for all. Inasmuch as this business model revolves around technology, the government must activate its digital prowess to tackle this menace. It can also crack the whip against IT behemoths like Google and others to not host these apps in their app stores. Last week, the government asked Google to stop hosting these apps. These actions must be backed up by stringent rules. Besides, the government must launch a massive awareness campaign to educate people against going in for such low-hanging fruits. With easy penetration of smartphones, operations by these shady companies and their accessibility to people have become easy. It is also important to bring in new laws and amend, if necessary, existing laws to tackle the menace. The RBI must be more alert and should leave no stones unturned to protect the common man. It must try to understand why at all people fall prey to such easy baits while they know for sure that the outcome will not be desirable. The Central government makes tall claims of having taken several measures to take banking to maximum number of people in the country. Measures like Jan Dhan programme and direct benefit transfers have not achieved their desired purposes yet no matter what the BJP-led government at the Centre may claim. Banks, especially state-owned PSBs have been rather stingy about extending loans to potential borrowers, forcing them to approach such lending apps. In the present situation, a concerted measure must be taken to end the menace. Lack of right laws and their implementation led to mushrooming of money-lending business in the country. People fall victim to coercive methods adopted by these money-lenders. The government and the RBI should keep this fact in mind and ensure people avoid plucking these specious low-hanging fruits.

AGRICULTURE

Even before the pandemic, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the UN (FAO) warned that more than 820 million people did not have enough to eat. With the global population expected to grow by roughly two billion people by 2050, improving access to affordable and healthy food will be critical in reducing malnutrition and the associated health-care costs.

Innovation in farming and food production is as old as agriculture itself, yet it is sorely needed today. Recent research by the McKinsey Global Institute finds that biological innovation in agriculture, aquaculture, and food production could yield economic returns of up to \$1.2 trillion over the next decade or two. To put that into context, the global food and agribusiness industry is worth about \$5 trillion today.

What could deliver this growth? The most promising innovations include alternative proteins, marker-assisted breeding, genetic engineering of plant and animal traits, and microbiome mapping and modification. Consumer interest in alternative protein sources is increasing globally, owing to concerns about health, the environment, and animal welfare.

Plant-based meat substitutes are already widely sold, though the economics of their production needs to be improved. Plantbased milk, for example, accounts for 15% of retail milk sales in the

United States and 8% in Britain. And companies like Clara Foods are using advanced yeast engineering and fermentation technologies to produce animal-free egg-white proteins.

Likewise, cultured meat and seafood – whereby muscle tissue grown from cells in the lab is made to mimic the protein profile of animal meat – is on the horizon. Earlier this month, Singapore became the first government to approve the sale of lab-grown meat (cultured chicken created by the San Francisco-based company Eat Just). Over the next ten years, cultured meat and seafood could become cost competitive with conventional animal proteins.

Selective breeding of plants and animals is not new, but marker-assisted breeding has made the process cheaper and significantly faster, because it enables the selection of desirable traits even if the precise genes that generate them have not yet been identified or understood. The plunging cost of DNA sequencing means that thousands of potential markers can be detected simultaneously. Whereas developing new crop varieties previously could require 25 years, it now can be done in as few as seven. And because marker-assisted selection is not yet as prevalent in developing countries as it is in advanced economies, there are significant opportunities for growth. Since the development of the first genetically engineered plant (tobacco) in the early 1980s, genetic engineering has become well established. But, again, the technology is still improving rapidly. New tools like CRISPR have made gene editing more precise, allowing for crops to be tailored much more effectively to local conditions such as temperature and soil type. CRISPR-edited produce could land on grocery store shelves in the US over the next ten years, starting with sweeter strawberries that have a longer shelf life.

Another promising area of innovation is portable DNA-sequencing devices, which could soon be used by farmers to diagnose plant diseases, possibly improving quality and yield while eliminating or reducing use of pesticides. Genetic editing to improve health and productivity in food animals such as dairy and beef cattle, swine, and poultry is still nascent, but interest in the field has soared since the 2019 outbreak

of African swine fever. Similarly, the mapping of the microbiome – including bacteria, fungi, and viruses – is helping researchers find ways to increase the resilience of crops, animals, and soil to drought and disease. Here, too, advances in computing and sequencing are accelerating the pace of discovery, such that the biotech company Novozymes is already offering genetically engineered microbes to use in place of yieldand quality-boosting chemicals. Many of these biological innovations can help us address not only hunger but also resource depletion and broader climate risks. According to the FAO, raising livestock for meat, eggs, and milk generates 14.5% of global greenhousegas emissions; and one-third of all cropland is used to produce animal feed. Agriculture is also the largest contributor to deforestation, occupying 43% of the world's icefree and desert-free land. The plantbased "Impossible Burger" embodies 89% fewer emissions than a traditional beef burger.

Climate change reinforces the need for biological innovations, such as crops that have been engineered to withstand severe weather, or to grow in new environments, including areas with extreme temperatures, high salinity, or frequent droughts.

Many innovations are already contributing to food security, and the full potential of affordable DNA sequencing and CRISPR technology will continue to be revealed over time. It will take longer for labgrown meat to make inroads, but when it does, the impact is likely to be felt far and wide.

Regulation and public perceptions have long played a role – both positive and negative – in biological innovation. The first wave of commercially available genetically engineered products has not yet reached many countries, and 19 EU member states still support partial or full bans on their sale. In Africa, genetically modified food products are legal in only a tiny handful of countries.

Safety is clearly paramount. But if regulators and consumers' concerns can be addressed, the bio-revolution could take us a long way toward tackling global challenges like food security and climate change.

t has indeed been used in the UK: it still is to some extent. However, it's most definitely North American in its genesis and continues to be used there more than anywhere else. Outside of one's own room there is seldom more for a visitor to do than to arrange the flowers for the hostess, to send her a "bread and butter" letter when one has left her house and a present on Christmas proportionate to the length of the visit. Bread and butter letter figuratively extends the literal meaning of bread and butter to refer to hospitality in general. I suspect that it was originally a flippant reference by some young person, bored with the chore of having to write such a letter to his or her hostess and equating it with work. It echoes the older figurative use of bread and butter to refer to what one does to earn the money to buy the necessities of life: "it's my bread and butter", one might say. We do know from occasional references that the term was "society" slang in the US early on. It moved across the Atlantic with some speed and became established in the UK. In 1910 an enquiry in the British journal Notes and Queries states it is by then the common term for a thank-you letter. The writer of that enquiry was puzzled about an unfamiliar term for the missive, one that has long since died out, but which I might mention as an intriguing linguistic aside: a Collins. It appeared in Chambers's Journal in 1904 but vanished again sometime after 1940. It's a literary joke based on William Collins, an elaborately polite character in Pride and Prejudice by Jane Austen, published in 1813: "The promised letter of thanks from Mr. Collins arrived on Tuesday, addressed to their father, and written with all the solemnity of gratitude which a twelvemonth's abode in the family might have prompted."

O f all theatrical superstitions, this attempt to ward off the forces of darkness by wishing one's fellow performers the opposite of good luck is the one that's perhaps best known outside the profession. It belongs with other superstitions, such as that it's bad luck to whistle in a theatre, that you should never utter the final line of a play at the dress rehearsal, or that you must never say the name of the Scottish Play in the green room. Actors have always been a superstitious bunch, as you might expect from a profession in which employment is sporadic, audiences fickle and reputations fragile. The saying is widely used among actors and musicians in the theatre today, sometimes before every performance, but more often reserved for first night.

Year's resolutions. The most common ones, at least in the United States, are to exercise more, eat healthier, save money lose weight, or reduce stress. Some may resolve to be better to a particular person – not to criticize their partner, to visit their aging grandmother more often, or to be a better friend to someone close to them. Yet few people – just 12%, according to one US study – resolve to become a better person in general, meaning better in a moral sense.

One possible explanation is that most people focus on their own wellbeing, and don't see being morally better as something that is in their own interest. A more charitable explanation is that many people see morality as a matter of conforming to a set of rules establishing the things we should not do.

That is not very surprising in societies built on the Jewish and Christian traditions, in which the Ten Commandments are held up as the core of morality. But, today, traditional moral rules have only limited relevance to ordinary life. Few of us are ever in situations in which killing someone even crosses our mind. Most of us don't need to steal,

For those who take this view of morality, and can make an honest living sufficient to meet their own essential needs, being a good person hardly seems worthy of a special resolution. This is suggested in a survey of US adults that found that only 23% report that they often think about or research the ethical aspect of a choice in their life.

Most people can just live as they have always been living, and as their friends and co-workers live. In the same survey, another 31% reported that they sometimes think about ethical aspects of choices in their lives, suggesting that moral choices arise only in unusual circumstances, and many people thus simply cross those bridges when they come to them. What of the remaining 46%? It seems that they never think about ethics at all!

These findings could be interpreted as indicating that nearly half of Americans don't regard ethics as important. But in the same survey, 87% said that it is important to teach ethics to children, from kindergarten through high school. The correct interpretation, therefore, seems to be that

 think that ethics is important, but they don't believe that it requires much thought or research.

We reject this view. Being a good person today requires thought and work. The moral intuitions that evolved during many millennia of living in small, face-to-face societies are no longer adequate. Our actions now – or our failure to act – affect people all over the world and people who will live on this planet for many centuries to come.

That means we face moral choices all the time. Global problems like climate change, extreme poverty, the cruel confinement of billions of animals in factory farms, overfishing of the oceans, and of course the pandemic raise complex questions about how we should spend our money, how much of it we should give to help others, what we should eat, and how we should use our abilities to influence others and our governments. Moral codes written thousands of years ago are silent about climate change, and usually say nothing, or very little, about protecting the environment, the treatment of animals, and how we should exercise our responsibilities as citizens in a democracy. No short set of rules can possibly deal with the variety of circumstances in which individuals find themselves today. To be a good person today requires time and thought. We need to inform ourselves about problems like those just mentioned, decide on our priorities, and consider where we can make the most difference. That's why this is an appropriate area for the kind of commitment involved in making a resolution.

Setting goals works better, especially if the goals are incremental, steps along a path. So make a moral plan. Think about your values, and choose one or two issues that are important to you. Then you can affirm those values by living in a way that addresses the issues you care about, whether it is by reducing your personal contribution to climate change, or animals' suffering, or finding the most effective organizations helping people in extreme poverty, and supporting them with your time or money.

A total of 2,360 participants have been trained in National Training of Trainers and over 57,000 participants trained in district-level training in 719 districts. States are augmenting the state helpline 104 (which shall be used in addition to 1075) for any vaccine/software-related query.

Meanwhile, four persons who recently came to Delhi from the UK and tested positive for COVID-19, have been found infected with the new strain of coronavirus, Health Minister Satyendar Jain said Thursday.

Lone BJP MLA in Kerala votes against farm laws

Thiruvananthapuram, Dec 31: In an unprecedented move, BJP's lone member in the Kerala Assembly, O Rajagopal, Thursday supported the resolution seeking scrapping of the three contentious farm laws against which farmers have been agitating for over a month in Delhi borders, embarrassing the saffron party.

Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan had moved the resolution at a special session Thursday which was unanimously passed by the House with the ruling LDF, Opposition Congress-led UDF and BJP supporting it. When pointed out again that the resolution was for scrapping the three central farm laws, Rajagopal said he supported it (resolution). "I supported the resolution and the central government should withdraw the three farm laws," the senior BJP leader said, adding he agreed with the general consensus in the House. That is the dem-



ocratic spirit, he said. Speaker P Sreeramakrsihanan said the resolution had been passed by voice vote in the House and no one had objected. When pointed that he was going against his party's stand, Rajagopal said in a democratic system, we need to go as per consensus. However, hours later in a U-turn, Rajagopal said in a statement that he had strongly opposed the resolution in the House. "My stand I had clearly stated inside the House. I had neither opposed the central laws nor gone against the union government. The laws would immensely benefit the farmers," he said.

Haryana Police officials said a group of farmers, mostly youths, broke through the barricades set up by them in a bid to move towards Delhi.

The Haryana Police tried to stop them using a water cannon and tear gas even as their leaders urged them not go towards the national capital, they said.

#### Srinagar/Jammu: Pakistani troops opened fire and shelled mortars in unprovoked violations of a ceasefire agreement along the Line of Control (LoC) in Kupwara and Raiouri districts of Jammu and Kashmir, officials said Thursday. In the Tangdhar sector of Kupwara, Pakistani troops specifically targeted mosques and houses in border villages, an Army official said in Srinagar. "Pakistan initiated an unprovoked ceasefire violation along LoC in Tangdhar Sector, Kupwara by firing mortars and other weapons vesterday evening," the official said. In the Nowshera sector of Rajouri, Pakistan Army personnel engaged in heavy firing and mortar shelling on forward posts. "At about 1515 hours today, Pakistan Army initiated unprovoked ceasefire violation by firing with small arms and intense shelling with mortars along LoC in Nowshera sector in Rajouri district," a defence spokesman said in Jammu. Indian Army personnel guarding the LoC retaliated befittingly to the unprovoked ceasefire violations, officials said. Jammu and Kashmir recorded 5,100 instances of ceasefire violations by Pakistan along the LoC in 2020 -- the highest in the past 18 years -- in which 36 people were killed and over 130 were injured, official sources said.

New Delhi: India has crossed a significant milestone in its fight against coronavirus. with the national COVID-19 recovery rate crossing 96 per cent, one of the highest globally, the Union Health Ministry said today. "The total recovered cases have crossed 98.6 lakhs (98,60,280), the highest globally. The gap between active cases and recoveries is continuously increasing and stands at 96,02,624, the ministry highlighted. Further, the active cases have drastically declined to 2.57 lakh. The total positive cases of the country are 2,57,656 and now comprise merely 2.51 per cent of the total cases. "With a high number of COVID patients recovering every day and the sustained fall in the mortality rate, India's steady trend of registering dipping active cases continues,' the ministry said.

# **30 ARRESTED FOR DAMAGING HINDU TEMPLE IN PAKISTAN**



Peshawar, Dec 31: Over 30 people. mostly members of a radical Islamist party, were arrested after a Hindu temple was vandalised and set on fire by a mob protesting against its expansion work in northwest Pakistan, officials said Thursday.

The attack on the temple in Terri village in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's (KP) Karak district Wednesday drew strong condemnation from human rights activists and Hindu community leaders.

Thursday, the provincial government ordered authorities to reconstruct the damaged temple as it vowed to bring the culprits to justice. The temple was attacked by the mob after members of the Hindu community received permission from local authorities to renovate its decades-old building, according to witnesses.

The mob. led by a local cleric and supporters of Jamiat Ulemae-Islam party (Fazal ur Rehman group), demolished the newly constructed work alongside the old structure, they said.

# **Defusing Indo-China tension**

China and India to hold 9th round of Commander-level meet on Ladakh standoff: Chinese Def Ministry

Beijing, Dec 31: China and India are in consultations to hold the ninth round of Corps Commanderlevel meeting to discuss the disengagement of troops in eastern Ladakh, the Chinese Defence Ministry spokesman Sr. Colonel Tan Kefei said Thursday.

Since the eighth round of Corps Commander-level talks between the armies of China and India, the two sides have maintained consultations on disengagement of frontline troops and strengthened management of border troops, Tan told an online media briefing.

The situation in the border areas is generally stable, he said, according to a transcript posted on the Chinese Defence Ministry website.

China is willing to maintain communication with India through military and diplomatic channels, he said

India is expected to work with China towards the same goal, implement the consensus reached at the Corps Commander-level meetings, and take pragmatic measures to further abate the tension in border areas, Tan said.

India and China have held several rounds of talks at the diplomatic and military-level to resolve



the standoff that erupted in early May. At the latest round of foreign ministry-level talks December 18, the two sides said that they have agreed to continue work towards ensuring complete disengagement of troops in all friction points along the Line of Actual Control (LAC). The meeting also decided to hold the next round of military dialogue at an early date.

In the midst of the eastern Ladakh standoff, Chinese President Xi Jinping December 19 appointed a new General as the Commander of the People's Liberation Army's Western Theatre Command which oversees the China-India border.

Xi, who heads the Central Military Commission (CMC), the overall high-command of the two million-strong People's Liberation Army (PLA), appointed Gen. Zhang Xudong as the Commander of the Western Theatre Command.

Gen. Zhang succeeds 65-year-old Gen. Zhao Zongqi who headed the Western Theatre Command during the 2017 Doklam standoff where the Indian Army stood up against the PLA's plan of laying a road close to the Indian border in an area claimed by Bhutan.

The IUC regime, as per the sector regulator Telecom Regulatory Authority of India (TRAI), comes to an end from January 1, 2021.

Jio, in a statement noted that as per the telecom regulator's directions, 'Bill and Keep regime' is being implemented in the country from January 1, 2021, thereby ending IUC rates for all domestic voice calls.

# Current production inadequate to meet country's demand: Govt

New Delhi. Dec 31: The government Thursday said the current domestic production is unable to meet the country's demand, even though the country is the world's second-largest producer of fossil fuel and the fifth-largest nation in terms of coal deposits.

London, Dec 31: Britain said Thursday its decision to suspend retaliatory tariffs against the United States was already bearing fruit after it was spared in a new round of US tariff increases which hit French and German produce.

Britain said earlier this month it would use its new-found freedom outside the European Union to diverge from common EU trade policy towards the United States, deciding to unilaterally suspend tariffs relating to a 16-year dispute on aircraft subsidies.

The US government Wednesday said it would raise tariffs on certain EU products, including aircraft



components and wines from France and Germany, arguing that the EU had unfairly calculated its own tariffs. "The UK wasn't hit because we suspended tariffs and brought the US to the negotiating table," a British official said. "(This) shows we are making the right strategic decisions.

The United States and EU have already imposed tariffs on billions

of dollars of each others' goods over a row about state subsidies provided to civil aviation firms Boeing and Airbus. Those tariffs remain in place.

British trade minister Liz Truss has repeatedly spoken out against the measures, earlier rounds of which have hit British exports such as Scotch whisky. Germany has also recently called for a quick resolution to the dispute.

The British decision to suspend tariffs on U.S. goods from Jan. 1, once Britain fully leaves the EU, upset European planemaker Airbus and exposed a growing rift between the UK and Europe over aerospace investment, industry sources and analysts said.

# 'Economy may add mere 1% in real terms'

Mumbai, Dec 31: The economy, though projected to grow 9.6% in the next financial year in year-on-year growth term, may grow just 1% in real terms to ₹147.17 lakh crore as against ₹145.66 lakh crore in 2019-20, at the 2011-12 prices, according to a report by India Ratings.

The size of the economy, as per the National Statistical Office's data, had stood at ₹145.66 lakh crore in 2019-20, at the 2011-12 prices.

According to the rating agency, the country's gross domestic product (GDP) is expected to contract 7.8% to ₹134.33 lakh crore in 2020-21, but may grow 9.6% to ₹147.17 lakh crore in 2021-22.

In the first quarter of the current financial year that was impacted by the lockdown, GDP tanked 23.9% year-on-year, while the Index of Industrial Production (IIP) contracted 35.9%. But, in a dramatic recovery, GDP contraction was 7.5%



in the second quarter, while IIP contraction was only 5.9% y-o-y. "These growth numbers suggest

a strong V-shaped recovery, leading to the belief that the economy is out of the woods and on the path of a strong recovery. Even a moderate improvement in 1Q and Q2 of FY22 reflects a decent annualised GDP and IIP growth due to the low base." India Ratings said in the report. It added that due to the low base of 2020-21, the full-year GDP growth of 2021-22 on a y-o-y basis is expected to do fairly well, and our growth projections for 2021-22 is 9.6 per cent.
