Protesting farmers intensify stir

LEADERS OF 32 FARMERS' UNIONS TO OBSERVE 9-HOUR HUNGER STRIKE TODAY

New Delhi, Dec 13: After 'Bharat Bandh' called earlier this month, the protesting farmers Sunday declared a wider day-long movement, urging its leaders to undertake a hunger strike from wherever they are protesting.

The announcement comes after a meeting of farmers here at Singhu border gave their nod to the decision taken by farmer representatives of 32 different unions Saturday for holding the hunger strike December 14 (Monday) from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Earlier, it was decided that the farmer leaders will hold the hunger strike only on Singhu border at Delhi-Chandigarh route - one of the major protest site where thousands of farmers have been camping under open skies from November 26 seeking rollback of three farm laws enacted by the government in September during Monsoon Session of Parliament.

Addressing a press briefing here at Singhu, Bhartiya Kisan Union's (BKU) Haryana president Gurnam Singh Chathuni said "all the leaders would be carrying out hunger strikes wherever they are leading the protest"

Bharatiya Kisan Union's (BKU) national spokesperson Rakesh Tikait said: 'The hunger strike would be carried out tomorrow till 5 p.m. but the farmers will have to take care that no disturbing element comes in our movement".

Tikait, who represents the farmers from western Uttar Pradesh, advised that

all the younger ones shall learn how agitations are carried out. Opening a way to begin government-farmers talk, the farm leader, meanwhile, said "if the government sends us any proposal, we would carry out discussion and take a decision on the same"

Sarva Hind Rashtriya Kisan Mahasangh's Shivkumar Kakka, however, clarified that that farmers are still adamant on the issue that they will not end the ongoing protest till the government repeal the three laws.

He also accused the government of obstructing the way farmers' coming to Delhi, saying "our trolleys are being stopped at Morena and other cities of Madhva Pradesh".

Stressing that the whole agitation is still being run under 'Sanyukt Kisan Morcha' banner, the leader said all the associations are working here and no one has left. "All the decisions taken here are not by majority but maturity and unanimity.'

Giving detail about one farmer leader Bhanu Pratap, who has approached Supreme Court and is about to end the protest, the farmer leaders here at Singhu said he was not "our part and he has no relation with this movement".

Doab Kisan Samiti leader Jagbir Singh also accused the government of stopping farmers' trolleys coming from Uttarakhand. He said that crowd was swelling up each day at Ghazipur bor-

SC to hear plea seeking removal of farmers

NEW DELHI: The Supreme Court is scheduled to hear December 16 a plea seeking a direction to authorities to immediately remove the farmers who are protesting at several border points of Delhi against three new farm laws, saying commuters are facing hardships due to the road blockades and the gatherings might lead to an increase in the number of Covid-19 cases. According to the apex court website, a bench of Chief Justice SA Bobde and justices AS Bopanna and V Ramasubramanian will hear the plea filed by law student Rishabh Sharma, who has also sought directions to authorities to open the roads at Delhi's borders, shift the protesters to the allotted place and provide guidelines on social distancing and use of masks at the protest site in order to curb the spread of Covid-19.

Bhubaneswar, Dec 13: Two Maoists, including a woman, were killed in an exchange of fire between security personnel and the Red rebels in Malkangiri district Sunday police said. Acting on a tip-off, a team

of Special Operation Group personnel launched a combing operation in Gajalmamudi area of 'Swabhiman Anchal', a remote part of the district, earlier in the day, DGP Abhay told the media here.

As the security personnel cordoned off the area, Maoists opened fire at them. In retaliatory firing, two Maoists were killed on the spot, while the others managed to flee the area. The SOG personnel have recovered two guns and Maoist ar-

ticles from the spot. Later, the security personnel intensified combing operations in the area to flush out Left Wing extremists (LWE) from Swabhiman Anchal, the DGP said.

One of the deceased, a woman in uniform, appeared to be holding an important position in the outlawed organisation, while the other, who has been identified as D Ramesh, was a CPI (Maoist) area commander.

"The state government is committed to free the Swabhiman Anchal from Maoists, and we urge them to surrender," the DGP said.

It is worth mentioning here that, a woman Maoist was killed in a gunfight with security personnel in Kandhamal district, December 11.

■ TRP scam: Republic **TV CEO arrested**



Jammu: Two terrorists were killed and another was captured Sunday in a gunfight with security forces in the higher reaches of Surankote in Jammu and Kashmir's Poonch district, officials said. The terrorists are believed to have infiltrated into this side from across the Line of Control (LoC) about three days back and were heading for south Kashmir's Shopian district when they were intercepted in a snow-bound area along the Mughal Road in the afternoon, the officials said.

Conspiracy to close Pari murder case, alleges suspect

Saroj Sethi, a suspect in the case, told the media that he has been tortured by police officials to 'confess' to the crime, though he is 'innocent'

Navagarh. Dec 13: The murder case of Pari, a minor girl from Nayagarh, is turning murkier with each passing day as a college student Sunday alleged that there is a conspiracy to close the case file, a report said.

The explosive revelation has come from Saroi Sethi, a native of Jadupur village and a student of Plus III first year Arts in a local college. Sethi, who is under the SIT scanner for 'killing' Pari. He alleged that efforts are being made to

frame him as the killer. Talking to the local media, Sethi said pressure is being built on him and this is hampering his studies. He alleged that he has been tortured and beaten by police officials to 'confess' the crime, though he is 'innocent'. According to Sethi, the SIT head has prepared a plan to frame him in the



murder case. The SIT head is allegedly threatening him and has even offered him ₹5 lakh to 'confess' the crime. However, the veracity of the charges against SIT head can only be established after a proper investigation.

Sethi has alleged that he is being unnecessarily harassed for speaking the truth. According to Sethi, a day before Pari's kidnapping on July 13, he had informed her parents that he had seen the little girl collecting house. As a result, he was called to the Nayagarh Sadar police station for interrogation July 25 – the day when Pari's body was recovered.

During interrogations, SIT chief Arun Bothra reportedly informed Sethi that they are in possession of evidence and asked him to admit that he had killed Pari. Bothra allegedly threatened him to confess on committing the murder failing which they will frame him by matching the DNA, finger print and blood samples.

Meanwhile, Pari's parents Soudamini and Ashok Sahu have also alleged that efforts are on to destroy evidence in the murder case. They alleged that the sack from which the body was recovered has been changed. The sack which is in police station has been changed with a new sack as part of a move to destroy the evidences in the case.

New rules for cheque payments from January 1

Mumbai, Dec 13: A few months back the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) made a decision to launch the 'positive pay system' for cheque. The new rule will be effective from January 1, 2021. As per the new rule, it may be necessary to reconfirm the details of the cheque. especially for payments above ₹50,000. In the August MPC, the RBI governor Shaktikanta Das made an announcement in this connection keeping in focus consumer safety and also to reduce fraud cases as well as abuse vis-à-vis cheque payment.

Precisely speaking, the 'Positive Pay' is basically an automated fraud detection tool that corroborates particular information relevant to the cheque that is presented for clearing. Such details include payee name, cheque number, cheque date, account number, amount and other details.

Before the new rule comes into effect, it is important that you are aware of a few important things related to cheque payments from January 1, 2021. ■ The idea of 'Positive Pay' entails

reconfirming important details related to cheques worth ₹50,000

This process makes it mandatory for the issuer of the cheque to electronically submit specific details related to the cheque via Internet banking, SMS, mobile app, ATM and others.

The facility for the Positive Pay will be developed by the National Payments Corporation of India in CTS and it will be made available to the participant banks. On their part, the banks will make it available for their account holders who would be issuing cheques worth ₹50,000 or above.

However, availing the Positive Pay facility will solely be the account holder's discretion. However, banks may also make it mandatory for large value cheques.

Last but not the least important, the CTS grids will accept only cheques that are Positive Pay complaint in case of any dispute. In addition, the banks may also employ similar arrangements for allcheques (cleared/collected) that are even outside CTS.

Angul farmers bid adieu to potato farming

LACK OF GOVERNMENT SUPPORT AND COLD STORAGES HAVE COMPELLED FARMERS TO GIVE UP POTATO FARMING

Angul, Dec 13: Even five years after the launch of 'Potato Mission' in the state, there has not been any headway in increasing the output of this kitchen essential in Angul district, allegedly for lack of government support and cold storages. Consequently, many farmers are gradually giving up potato farming in the region.

According to a report, not a single cold store has been set up in this district, while farmers alleged that when preservation facilities are not at hand, their produce is bound to rot.

The 'Potato Mission' was implemented by the state government in 2015-16 to make the state self-sufficient in tuber production. In fact, the mission was taken up after neighbouring West Bengal stopped supplying potatoes few years back, leading to an acute shortage of the vegetable.

Initially, ₹267.05 was pumped in and it was proposed that the scheme would continue till 2023-24. Over a hundred cold stores were to be set up under the mission to enable farmers to preserve their produce. The government had assured to promote private cold stores with subsidies. After mission was put in fast track, farmers had taken up potato farming in hundreds of acres in the district

However, after harvesting, farmers faced lots of problems in preserving them. A private cold store was set up at Kuo, but it is of no use for farmers as its capacity is too less.

In the absence of preservation facilities, farmers were forced to adopt distress sale of the tubers, thus incurring huge losses. They had to sell their produce to outsiders at low prices, dashing their hopes of earning profits.

Faced with such difficulties, many farmers have now switched



The government had approved setting up of cooling gammers (small cold stores) - three in Angul block, two in Chhendipada and one each in Pallahada, Kaniha and Kishorenagar. These cooling gammers helped farm-

ers to preserve their produce for a week, but they alleged that the government was not giving subsidies on electricity bills.

Soundarya Sahu, a potato farmer from the region, said that the cost of preserving potatoes in the private

ties have compelled us to give up potato farming. It involved high cost. Vegetable farming is more profitable." Meanwhile, Padmalochan Das, deputy director of the Horticulture, Angul, said that cold stores are under the Horticulture de-

tional due to shortage of staff. On the other hand, Satyananda Dalabehara, owner of Durga Cold Store, said that his cold store is running at a loss. "It has been difficult to repay bank loans, electricity bills and salaries of the staff. In the last five years, the cold store has failed to get produce preservation for even one per cent of its capacity. Farmers are

not cooperating," he alleged.



DENSE FOG CONTINUES ACROSS CITY

Bhubaneswar, Dec 13: Continuing with the third day of dense fogging and reduced visibility in the state capital, daily life was thrown out of gear during wee hours of Sunday as heavy mist engulfed much of the city areas.

As per the Regional Meteorological Centre here. Airport observatory reported visibility of 200 metres at 6.00 am Sunday morning. The reduced visibility affected traffic movement in the highways as several interstate and city buses were observed moving with slower pace than usual. However, no casualties were reported.

The Met department had earlier predicted that shallow to moderate fog was likely to occur at a few places in the morning over the districts of Rayagada, Kandhamal, Koraput, Nayagarh, Cuttack, Jagatsinghpur and at one or two places in the morning over the districts of Khurda, Puri, Kendrapara Bhadrak, Kalahandi and Boudh.

The Centre had also predicted that dry weather is expected to prevail over the districts of Odisha till December 16. However, fog condition will continue till Monday. Similarly, yellow warning for dense fog has been issued for seven districts including Nayagarh, Boudh, Cuttack, Jagatsinghpur, Kandhamal, Rayagada and Koraput for Monday.

Puri, Dec 13: The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) Sunday alleged that efforts are on to destroy the evidences with regard to the death of a 32-year-old man at the custody of Baselisahi police here November 18.

Addressing a presser here Sunday, BJP leader and Puri MLA Javanta Sarangi claimed that police are trying to cover up the custodial death



AS FLU-CASES RISE, CITIZENS ARE FRETTIN

Bhubaneswar, Dec 13: With the onset of winter, cases of flu, common cold and respiratory diseases have seen a spike. Wary citizens meanwhile are baffled with the suspicion of COVID 19 and seeking advice from their doctors.

While several are still reluctant to go for the testing for COVID-19 and opt for self medication and over the counter drugs, doctors from the city advise for testing of the suspected patients to avoid allowing the disease to become severe.

'The Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) norms bat for testing for the pandemic whenever a patient feels symptoms of flu like running nose, sneezing and fever. 5 fresh Covid deaths in state

Odisha's coronavirus caseload mounts to 3,23,757 with detection of 393 fresh cases in 24 hours

Bhubaneswar, Dec 13: State's Covid-19 caseload climbed to 3,23,757 Sunday after 393 people tested positive for the virus, while five more fatalities pushed the death toll in Odisha to 1,807, a senior Health and Family Welfare (H&FW) department official said.

Of the fresh cases detected from 27 of the 30 districts, 228 were reported from different quarantine centres and the remaining are local-contact cases.

Angul district recorded the highest of 47 new infections followed by Sundargarh (44) and Khurda (39). Three districts—Gajapati, Koraput and Subarnapur—did not register any coronavirus case during the last 24 hours, said the official.

Taking to Twitter, the H&FW department said, "Regret to inform the demise of five Covid positive patients while under treatment in hospitals."

The deaths were reported from Khurda, Mayurbhanj and Sundargarh districts. A total of 53 other Covid-19 patients have also died due to comorbidities, the official pointed out.

Khurda district, comprising state Capital Bhubaneswar, alone accounted for 310 fatalities followed by Ganjam (245), Sundargarh (155),

Of the total 211 Livestock Aid Centres in Cuttack district, 114 centres do not have attendants. Livestock attendants usually play a crucial role in field survey and other works at the village level, sources added.

Moreover, 36 posts of livestock inspectors out of the total 96 in the district are lying vacant. Similarly, altogether 59 veterinarian posts have been sanctioned for Cuttack. At present, the posts of 15 veterinarians are lying vacant.

"The post of Sub Divisional Veterinary Officer (SDVO) has been lying vacant at Banki for last several months. The vacancy has affected file work with regard to the milk farmers of the locality. The state government is fixing targets for vaccination and other programmes. But, staff crunch has become a hurdle in this regard," said a source.

Some social activists, meanwhile, claimed that staff crunch at Livestock Aid Centres is also af-

Organic farming pays dividends to tribal farmers

Makangiri, Dec 13: Tribal farmers living in some parts of Malkangiri district have resumed organic farming, which is turning out to be profitable for them. Given the growing awareness and demand for organic crops, more and more farmers are keen to adopt organic farming, a report said.

For the last several years, they had been raising cereals and vegetables by using chemical fertilizers. They had given up the traditional system of nurturing plants use of cow dung, alluvial soil of rivers and sedimentary silt of ponds. Crops raised this way were tasty and free from harmful elements.

Reports said as people are keen on buying organic food, many tribal farmers have realised the demand for the crops and started farming in traditional ways at Matapaka. They also sow indigenous seeds

instead of high yielding varieties. Muka Jartami, a young farmer of Matapaka, has led this farming in the area. In his farmland, he has grown over 500 chilli plants

Steadfast China

he tirades launched against China in the past few days by External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar and Chief of Defence Staff, General Bipin Rawat are an admission by the government that Chinese aggressive posturing along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in Ladakh has indeed reached a critical stage. This is contrary to the denial mode the Narendra Modi government has preferred to retain. In fact, the responses by Jaishankar and Rawat come across as pathetic pleas to contain China. It betrayed nervousness when Jaishankar said at a FICCI programme that "the events" along the LAC in eastern Lakadh are "very disturbing" and that what has happened there is not in China's interest. It smacks of puerile foreign policy to decide for China what is "in its interest" or what is not. China knows its own interests better than anyone else and it has been pursuing them along Indian borders with shrewdness mixing aggression with its strategic-economicdiplomatic maneuverings bringing into its orbit Pakistan, Nepal and even Bhutan. India under the BJP-led government has all this while been sleeping, neglecting the neighbours. It has turned the heat exclusively on Pakistan as its main foreign policy plank to tailor it to its domestic-electoral politics of communal divide

Jaishankar complained at the FICCI programme that these events have raised some very "basic concerns" as the "other party" has not abided by agreements on respecting the LAC. Two days back, he had told the Australian think tank, Lowy Institute, during an interview that China had been equivocating on the issue. Immediately thereafter, the Chinese foreign office spokesperson Hua Chunying retorted that it was India which had violated bilateral agreements. Her categorical response was that the merit of the situation at the border area is very clear and the responsibility totally lies with the Indian side. According to her, China has been strictly observing the agreements signed between the two sides and is committed to resolving the border issue through dialogue and safeguarding regional peace.

Jaishankar was candid enough to admit that the real danger is that the goodwill which was so carefully developed will dissipate. But he also said that India is being tested and will meet the national security challenge. India's foreign minister's claim that goodwill had been developed probably refers to events such as Xi Jinping and PM Modi sitting on a swing at Ahmedabad or walking on the beach at Mahabalipuram. These kinds of bonhomie do not hold any meaning in a brutal world of diplomacy. Jaishankar's claim was probably intended to please the powers that be but as a career diplomat, he must be aware that his mouth speaks where his heart does not agree.

In another summit on December 10, Rawat urged like-minded countries to build dissuasive deterrence against China's attempts to establish hegemony in the Indo-Pacific region. The irony is when India is looking for strategic partners to take on China, the latter has gone ahead with mobilising hundreds of thousands of soldiers along the LAC and positioned its other military and non-military wherewithal along Indian borders. Not only military, China's hostile policy towards India is dictated by its ambitious economic agenda of One Belt One Road (OBOR) initiative that links Pakistan and many other countries in India's neighbourhood. China has remained steadfast in its global as well as neighbourhood policies. Its aggressiveness towards India, both militarily as well as economically, has not altered during the past few decades. What has changed is the image India has been demonstrating to the world lately. India, projecting an image of a divided society within and a foreign policy blueprint that only depends on personal rapport and pats on the back of PM Modi, has lost out on all initiatives. Individual to individual relations do not hold any significance in a diplomatic whirl where power struggles between nations, especially after CoVID-19 related economic debacles, are taking huge tolls.

Wassail

n Saxon times you would have used the original form of this word, was hail, to greet or say goodbye to somebody; it literally meant "be in good health." By the twelfth century, it had become the salutation you offered as a toast, to which the standard reply was drinc hail, "drink good health." Hail is an older form of hale, healthy, which is now mainly confined to the set phrase hale and hearty and is also closely connected with hail meaning "to salute, greet, welcome." The toast seems to have come over with the Danes; by the twelfth century the Norman conquerors of Britain regarded was hail as one of the most characteristic savings of the country. Later on, the word came to be used also for the drink in which the toast was offered, especially the spiced ale or mulled wine that was drunk on Christmas Eve or Twelfth Night. In the western counties of Britain, the tradition grew up on Twelfth Night of toasting the good health of the apple trees that would bear the crop from which next year's cider would be made. Pieces of bread soaked in cider might be placed in the crooks of trees, guns were fired to ward off evil spirits, and special songs were sung.

Water war

his is a term devised by environmentalists for a type of conflict (most probably a form of guerrilla warfare) which has not yet occurred, but which they predict will happen through an acute shortage of water for drinking and irrigation. About 40 per cent of the world's populations are already affected to some degree, but population growth, climate change and rises in living standards will worsen the situation: the UN Environment Agency warns that almost 3 billion people will be severely short of water within 50 years. Experts point to the disaster of the Aral Sea, which has already lost three-quarters of its water through diversion for irrigation of the rivers feeding it. Possible flash points have been predicted in the Middle East, parts of Africa and in many of the world's major river basins, including the Danube.

Water poverty

umans can, at a pinch, make do without a lot of things, but they must have water. Some people in developing countries have access only to water that is unfit to drink. In other countries, even some prosperous ones such as the oil-rich nations of the Middle East, there isn't enough water for their populations. The term water poverty for the lack of access to potable water isn't new: it's on record as far back as 1950 in reference to the problems of Texas farmers during a prolonged drought. But it has become widely used only in the past decade. A report from the Joseph Rowntree Foundation used the term to describe the state of four million British lowincome households who struggle to pay their water bills.

WHO WILL SUCCEED MERKEL?

erman Chancellor Merkel's -Christian Democratic Union (CDU) has ruled the 71-year-old Federal Republic for a total of 50 years. When she steps down next fall after 16 years in office, it is safe to assume that another Christian Democrat will succeed her. Who will it be?

Within the next few weeks, the CDU will hold its 33rd party convention, and choose a new leader. Whoever it is will most likely be anointed as the CDU's candidate for chancellor when Merkel steps down, and there is little doubt that the CDU will come out on top in next September's general election whereupon it will take the lead in forming the next government.

The three men vying for the party's top job are not household names abroad. The first (going in alphabetical order) is Armin Laschet, the minister-president of North Rhine-Westphalia and a longtime party workhorse whose charisma does not match his competence.

Next is Friedrich Merz, who led the CDU caucus in the Bundestag two decades ago, until he was driven out by Merkel as she prepared her own run to the top. After slinking off to the private sector and making oodles of money, he is pushing for a comeback.

The third contender is Norbert Röttgen, the chairman of the Bundestag's Foreign Affairs Committee. He served a brief stint as environment minister under Merkel until she fired her thenfair-haired boy.

Laschet is Merkel's unspoken favourite, if only because the other two have accounts to settle with 'Mutti' (mom), whose path to power is strewn with the corpses of notso-steely rivals. Owing to COVID-19, we don't yet know when and how the CDU will choose its next leader. But whether it meets physically or virtually, the party will decide this month on a convention date in mid-January.

There is no real front-runner. Merz commanded 27 per cent support in one recent poll, but he was

trending downward. Röttgen had 16 per cent and is enjoying a slight uptick. Laschet trails both, and the 21 per cent of respondents checking 'None of the Above' have added to the uncertainty.

An obvious question is what each of the candidates stands for. But this is not easy to answer in such a boringly - and perhaps fortunately - centrist political system. The German far left and far right together can claim only around 20 per cent in the polls. Most voters opt for the major parties (above all, the CDU), which operate like supermarkets, offering a little of something for everyone, with no surprises or disruptions.

Throughout the first half of the twentieth century – from Kaiser Wilhelm II to the Führer – Germany was the most 'interesting' country in the world. Internally, it was a political volcano, and a deadly threat to its neighbourhood. Today, as a result of two catastrophic world wars, it is about as aggressive as a sloth, with its politics hovering between stable and staid.

So, the CDU beauty contest is nothing like the rollercoaster of the Democratic Party's presidential primary in the United States this year, where Senators Bernie Sanders of Vermont and Elizabeth Warren of Massachusetts pushed a hard-left course. Nor does Germany have a Donald Trump on

the scene. The country's politics is 'continuity über alles.

And so, Laschet is running on his experience as minister-president of the most populous of Germany's 16 states – an advantage Merz and Röttgen lack. His unspoken message amounts to 'four more years of Merkelism': no sudden lurches in domestic or foreign policy.

Meanwhile, Merz, who began his campaign holding up the right end of the CDU table (more Atlanticism and free-market economics), has been carefully balancing his cadences. He, too, wants "no rupture," but he also believes that Germany has "slowed down too much." So, let's have it both ways.

Röttgen, the youngest of the three, sounds like the boldest. Touting his credentials as a foreignpolicy expert, he wants to be tougher on Russia and China than the other two. But take heart: under his leadership, there would be "neither total continuity, nor a break" with the Merkel era.

Thus, stability will continue to be the name of the German game. There is no right-wing outlier like France's Marine Le Pen or Italy's Matteo Salvini, nor is there any radical leftist like Britain's Jeremy Corbyn, the former leader of the Labour Party. Whereas the US and the UK essentially have two-party governments, Germany, like most of continental Europe, governs

through multiparty coalitions that don't swing radically to and fro with every election.

In any case, whoever wins the CDU race in January and becomes chancellor in September will have to govern in tandem or even in a threesome. Buoyed by the pandemic, which has favoured the powers that be, the CDU and its Bavarian sister party, the Christian Social Union (CSU), will presum ably secure around 35 per cent of the vote. A bit to the left, the Greens may pick up around 20 per cent, making them a natural coalition partner for the CDU/CSU.

This balance-of-power arrange ment promises continuity, which is not particularly exciting. We in the media might soon look back wistfully at Trump, who, for all his grating flaws, was the most entertaining leader of the twentyfirst century. But in these troubled times - with COVID-19 not yet vanquished, and the economy still sinking - sluggish centrism is not the worst outcome for Europe's anchor power.

In addition to the three declared CDU contenders, there are two dark horses who, instead of going the conventional route-first chairman, then candidate chancellor - are playing a waiting game. Maybe the party will get bored with the trio of Laschet, Merz, and Röttgen, and will want somebody who is in the public eye daily. One is Minister of Health Jens Spahn, a hard-working politico who, thanks to COVID-19, is constantly in the news. The other is CSU leader Markus Söder, a man of burning ambition who tirelessly works the interview and talk-show circuit. But none of these five candidates would engineer a revolt against Mutti and her legacy. The next German chancellor, it is safe to predict, will be Merkel without the Angela.

which it would instantly jump the frog is slid gently into a pot of comfortably warm water, and the heat is turned up. By the time the frog realises that the water has gotten too hot, it is too late, and it is boiled alive. Independent journalism may now be confronting a similar scenario.

The water temperature around journalists has been rising for the last 15 years. But the heat has recently been turned up. For example, in 2019 alone, the number of unwarranted detentions of journalists increased by 12 per cent, to a total of 389. Almost half are being held in three countries: China, Egypt, and Saudi Arabia.

Popular protests are particularly risky for journalists. At demonstrations in Algeria, Hong Kong, Thailand, and Venezuela, journalists have been routinely intimidated, harassed, and attacked. In the United States, journalists covering the protests against police brutality and systemic racism, led by the Black Lives Matter movement, have faced indiscriminate attacks at the hands of law enforcement. The US Press Freedom Tracker counted more than 900 press-freedom violations so far this year, including

story too good to fact-check more than 177 physical attacks. Newsrooms have not been spared. democracies - and prosecuting sault. In a recent survey, a shocking 75 per cent of female journalists in Kenya reported such threats. Perpetrators include individual misogynists and networked groups intent on suppressing women's voices, as well as state-linked agents $seeking \,to\,undermine\,press\,freedom$ and censor critical journalism carried out by women.

The COVID-19 crisis has compounded the challenges facing journalists by constraining their ability to do their jobs. Part of the problem is restrictive measures ostensibly aimed at containing the virus Freedom House recently highlighted 91 countries with emergency laws and regulations that hamper independent journalism. These range from relatively mild, such as limiting questions at press conferences, to suspending newspapers' publication and blocking websites.

There is also an economic dimension to the challenge. Traditional news media have been under intensifying pressure for decades, their business models upended by digital technologies. Now, the COVID-19 crisis has decimated economic activity in much of the world, weakening business revenues and forcing layoffs.

the Reuters Institute for the Study of Journalism found that more than 50 per cent expected a drop in revenue of 20 per cent or higher in 2020. One-fifth reported an overall decline in audience reach this year. Those hit hardest are those that are advertising-based, as well as newspapers and local media. Respondents' top reported priority is securing funding to cover operational costs. Local and regional media, especially in emerging economies, have fared the worst. But media in rich economies are hardly exempt. In the Netherlands, for example, total advertising income across all media organisations declined by 22 per cent year on year during the first wave of the pandemic. Hundreds of freelance journalists are now fully dependent on government support.

In this sense, the COVID-19 crisis could deal a fatal blow to independent journalism. But there is still time to make sure that it doesn't.

For starters, governments must immediately end the impunity that perpetuates and possibly even encourages attacks on freedom of expression. Democratic countries must begin treating attacks on journalists as attacks on their very

And all directly into boiling water - from cluding open threats of sexual as how COVID-19 has affected them, governments should be held accountable when pandemic-related restrictions are used as a pretext to silence journalists.

Furthermore, policymakers must take action, both at the national and multilateral level, to ensure independent journalism's economic survival. For example, they can create systems that guarantee public funding for independent media, preferably through dedicated funds financed by a digital tax. The European Union could lead the way here, with an EU-wide fund. Democratic governments more broadly should seize the opportunity afforded by the upcoming World Press Freedom Conference to kick-start progress globally.

Independent journalism is indisputably a public good. By reporting on the events shaping our world and exposing criminal wrongdoing and ethical indiscretions, especially by those in power, journalists enable informed debate strengthen accountability, and protect people's rights and interests. We must not wait until it's too late to recognise the importance of their work

Schools monetise solar power

GOVT SCHOOLS IN DELHI EXPECT TO EARN ₹8.5 CRORE AND SAVE ₹8.8 CRORE ON BILLS

New Delhi, Dec 13: Government schools in Delhi are eyeing substantial income, apart from significant reduction in electricity bills, as they start earning money by selling electricity generated by the rooftop solar systems installed on their buildings.

The projects are being built under the Central government scheme for solarising government buildings, where the Centre pays 25% of the capital cost upfront. Government schools in Delhi are eyeing substantial income, apart from significant reduction in electricity bills, as they start earning money by selling electricity generated by the rooftop solar systems installed on their buildings.

Under the Centre's scheme for government building solarisation, the Delhi government has developed over 21 mega-watt (MW) of solar rooftop plants on 150 government schools. These are expected to save about ₹8.8 crore on their electricity bills cumulatively each year, apart from earning ₹8.5 crore from selling power.

The rooftop plants are being installed under the 'Resco' model, wherein solar projects are built and operated by the developer using its **CENTRAL SUPPORT**

own capital, taking the financing burden off from the schools. The developer will get ₹3.13 for every unit of electricity being generated by the rooftop plants from the schools. The rate is 65% lower than the electricity tariffs paid

by the schools to the power distribution companies (discoms).

For any surplus power generated, the discoms would buy the electricity from the schools at ₹5.65 per unit. As consumers globally are gradually becoming 'prosumers' - those who produce energy, consume a part of it and also give a part to the grid — Delhi schools are taking up this opportunity to generate green energy and improve their finances.

One kilowatt (kW) of rooftop solar installation needs about 10 square metres of shadow-free surface area. Among the Delhi schools, the largest rooftop solar plants have been set up in West Vinod Nagar (195 kW), Rohini (170 kW), Rouse Avenue (150 kW), East Vinod Nagar (146 kW) and Rajokari (127 kW). Incidentally, West Vinod Nagar currently houses the largest solar rooftop plant on a government school in the country.

"Our projects would cumulatively save 63,000 tonne of CO2 over the life of the projects, and contribute significantly to Delhi's and India's rooftop solarisation targets," said Sharavan Sampath, CEO of Oakridge Energy, which is one of the major developers in the government school solarisation tender and has installed solar units in the West Vinod Nagar school.

Out of the total solar capacity of 36,910 MW, only 3,402 MW currently comes from rooftop solar. The government aims to have 40,000 MW of rooftop solar capacity by 2022.

The environment committee had on Wednesday asked the municipal commissioners of East and North Delhi to submit their plans and timelines by this coming week to reduce the height of landfill sites to the ground level. Atishi had "pulled up" the two municipal corporations for having "no plan whatsoever" to deal with landfill site fires and the resulting air pollution in Delhi, the committee had said in a statement.

The commissioners had appeared before the committee addressing the issue of fire incidents at Delhi's Ghazipur (East Delhi) and Bhalsawa (North Delhi landfill sites.



He had authored around 150 books and translated several texts from Sanskrit to Kannada. Some of them are Bana Bhatta's novel 'Bana Bhattana Kadambari', Kalidasa's 'Shakuntala' and Shudraka's 'Mrichakatika.

Govindacharya had also translated several historical novels to Kannada. He also wrote notes on the chapters of Hindu text Upanishad.

He was one of the greatest exponents on Madhva philosophy and was best known for his pravachanas, which are very popular among Tuluvas and Kannadigas across the world.

'The government has failed on all fronts, including handling of the COVID-19 pandemic, helping farmers affected due to cyclone, heavy rains and floods. The farmers' Diwali festival (this year) was in darkness," he alleged.

2 terrorists killed, another held

They said it was a joint group of Lashker-e-Toiba (LeT) and Jaish-e-Mohammad (JeM) terrorists and have been pushed into this side in an apparent attempt to disturb the ongoing district development council (DDC) elections which got a tremendous response from the people, causing frustration to Pakistan. The officials said police, assisted by the Army, launched a joint cordon and search operation in remote Chattapani-Dugran village after getting information about the presence of three suspected terrorists. The terrorists were trapped in a snow-bound area and were asked to surrender but they refused and instead fired indiscriminately on the security forces in an attempt to break the cordon, they said, adding the security forces retaliated and killed two of the militants.

Drastic rise in obesity among kids under 5 yrs in 20 states: Survey

New Delhi, Dec 13: The latest National Family Health Survey (NFHS) has found a drastic rise in obesity among children under five years of age in 20 of the 22 states where the study was conducted, with experts attributing it to lack of physical activity and unhealthy food habits.

According to the NHFS-5, several states and Union Territories, including Maharashtra, Gujarat, Mizoram, Tripura, Lakshadweep, Jammu and Kashmir, and Ladakh, have registered several folds increase in the percentage of obesity among children below five years of age in comparison to NFHS-4 conducted between 2015 and 2016.

Only Goa, Dadra and Nagar Haveli, and Daman and Diu registered a drop in the number of over-



weight children under five years of age, the data showed. About 13.4 per cent children under the age of five were found to be obese in Ladakh which was highest among the 22 states and Union Territories sur-

Not just children, rise in obesity has even been recorded in adults in the latest survey in comparison to NFHS-4. According to the survey data, 16 states and Union Territories registered a rise in obesity among

Healthcare experts have attributed the rise in obesity to unhealthy food choices and lack of physical activities among children and even adults

Nicobar Islands recorded the highest percentage of obesity among women at 38 per cent. Also, the Andaman and Nicobar Islands and Lakshadweep recorded the highest percentage of obesity among kg/m2 while children's obesity was counted in terms of weight-for-

Healthcare experts have attributed the rise in obesity to unhealthy food choices and lack of physical activities among children and even adults. Sheila Vir, a public health nutrition expert and founder director of Public Health Nutrition and Development Centre, said there is also lack of awareness on what are good food habits.

Also, high-fat and high-sugar foods are easily available and so there is higher consumption of it, she said. "We have a double burden of undernutrition, malnutrition and overnutrition occurring together. So, I think what to feed a the rise in obesity. "There might be an increase in obesity among children in view of COVID-19 pandemic as after closure of schools, there was lack of physical activity among children and even in adults in some cases," she said.

Villagers strike gold during temple renovation in TN

Kancheepuram (TN), Dec 13: Villagers stumbled upon 'ancient gold' during the renovation of a temple near here and it was seized by authorities and deposited with the government treasury Sunday despite locals protesting against the action, officials said.

During renovation of the Lord Shiva temple off Uthiramerur taken up by the villagers themselves, 'gold items' said to be weighing over half a kg were found beneath the steps leading to the sanctum sanctorum a few days

On receiving information, officials reached the temple and wanted the gold to be handed over to the government.

While devotees and local people declined to part with it as they wanted to place the gold again at the very same spot after completion of renovation, authorities were firm on taking it, the officials said.

After talks failed, officials deployed adequate number of police personnel at the village and amid people's protests, they seized the find, packed it in a box and sealed it before taking it away. According to the villagers, the temple was many centuries old and believed to belong to the Chola era.

"Placing some gold beneath the temple steps is an auspicious mark and this practice is in vogue since times immemorial," a local said.

Since the gold belonged to the temple, authorities had no right to seize or retain it, they contended and blocked policemen and officials from taking the precious metal.

Asked whether they have verified the find (if it was gold and whether it was centuries old), Revenue Divisional Officer Vidya said 'it looked like gold.'

On aspects like weight and if the gold was in the form of coins or ornaments, she said that a complete assessment could not be carried out in view of protests by the people. Bareilly (Uttar Pradesh), Dec 13: BJP MLA Rajesh Mishra has landed in controversy after he took away a baby from a child shelter without any paperwork or permission, attended his son's wedding and turned the baby back the following day.

The incident took place last week, but came to light on Saturday evening when a child shelter official spoke out. The child, in this case, is the 'miracle baby' who was rescued after being buried alive in an earthen pot in the cremation ground in October last year.

Superintendent, Primrose Edmond, of the Warne Baby Fold, a shelter in Bareilly, said, "Last Sunday, BJP legislator Rajesh Mishra came and took the baby with him without any paperwork or permission. He went to his son's wedding, took photos with her without any Covid-19 precautions and re-

turned her to the centre a day later." Primrose further said, "No one is allowed to take the baby away. Only parents registered with the

Authority can adopt and then take

the child. I was not in a position to say no when he took her because of his political influence.' The MLA said he only meant to take care of the baby. "I have always been concerned about her. She was sick that day. I got a call that she was getting seizures. So, I went to the hospital with 20-25 men straight from my son's wedding. I

got her medicines and then came

back to the wedding.' Mishra had taken photos, holding the baby at the wedding, and neither the child nor he wore a mask His son also posted two photos of the one-year-old in which he was holding her up, and another in which his father is carrying her.

Those at the wedding said he had introduced the baby as his

"adopted daughter." Earlier, the MLA had claimed on social media that he had taken the baby home and was bringing her up as her own. He said that he calls her 'Sita' and he Central Adoption Resource is her 'Janak', in a Hindu mythology reference.

Officials, however, said that the MLA had not legally adopted the baby.

According to chairperson of the **UP State Commission for Protection** of Child Rights, Dr. Vishesh Gupta, "By the law, a baby cannot just be handed over to anyone. The responsibility lies with the care centre. Here, the Warne Baby Fold staff is at fault. They should have informed the district administration or the central working committee members if someone was pressurizing them. The baby was clearly put at risk of infection. I will take appropriate action and write to the NCPCR (National Commission for the Protection of Child Rights) in this regard.'

Sun Hong, the assistant chief of staff of the People's Liberation Army Air Force, said they "will improve actual level of combat training and strengthen cooperation". While the ongoing drills are not the first joint air force exercise between the Chinese and the Pakistanis, the timing, location and size are significant.

The Indian military has been aware of the possibility of a twofront war with China and Pakistan and chief of defence staff, Gen. Bipin Rawat, has stated that the Indian defence forces are prepared to face such a challenge if need be.

Analysts like retired Rear Adm. Sudarshan Shrikhande, India's former chief of naval intelligence, think that the exercise is reflective of China and Pakistan's larger strategic posture toward India.

"The issues of growing coherence and collusion between China and Pakistan have become concerns for India," Shrikhande told Nikkei Asia, Both China and Pakistan have also been jolted by the Basic Exchange and Cooperation Agreement on Geospatial Cooperation signed in October between the US and India which allows New Delhi access to American satellite military intelligence for better weapon accuracy.

According to Nikkei Asia, even as Pakistan's military continues to draw closer to China, it still wants to maintain cordial ties with the US. with which it has often partnered since joining the US-led alliance against the Soviet Union during the Cold War, an arrangement which helped it both gain Washington's favour and provide benefits in re-

AFTER FIRES, AUSTRALIA **GETS READY FOR FLOODS**

Sydney, Dec 13: Just days after bushfires threatened an Australian World Heritage site, thousands were bracing for floods on the subtropical east coast Sunday, with beaches closed and the authorities urging people to sandbag their

With as much as 475 millimetres (18.7 inches) of rain in the previous 24 hours, the Bureau of Meteorology issued a "severe weather warning" for the border area between New South Wales and Queensland states, a heavily populated area that includes the Queensland state capital Brisbane A week earlier, nearby Fraser Island was evacuated due to bushfires, dashing hopes that wetter weather would make seasonal fires less catastrophic than last year. Scientists attribute the erratic weather in the early Australian summer to a La Nina pattern - which typically features strong rain - combined with climate change. Fraser Island, the world's largest sand island, is now under the flood warning, which includes urging drivers to avoid roads

where waters were already rising."These are dynamic weather systems and you should always expect the unexpected," bureau senior flood hydrologist Justin Robinson told a news conference. The warning comes soon after Queensland opened its border to the neighbouring state after months of closure due to COVID-19. The authorities urged people travelling for end-of-year holidays to exercise caution since they may not be familiar with flood-prone areas. "It isn't a time to take a chance and drive through those floodwaters," said New South Wales emergency services com missioner Carlene York. "Be aware of your surroundings and where you might be parking your caravan or you may be driving. Emergency services had rescued four people, including some from cars trapped on flooded roads, and received about 700 calls for help, she said. At the heavily populated Gold Coast, south of Brisbane, the authorities closed beaches due to dangerous surf, while the emergency services set up several locations where people could

The Indian embassy condemned the "mischievous act" by hooligans masquerading as protesters. "The statue of Mahatma Gandhi at the Mahatma Gandhi Memorial Plaza in front of the embassy was defaced by Khalistani elements on 12 December 2020. The Embassy strongly condemns this mischievous act by hooligans masquerading as protesters against the universally respected icon of peace

and justice," it said in a statement. COPA Chairman Tissa Vitharana said that even though the average number of elephant deaths due to the human-elephant conflict in Sri Lanka is 272 per year, 407 elephants had died during the past year.

Deadline near: Is there hope left for Brexit deal?

Brussels, Dec 13: Facing yet another self-imposed Brexit deadline Sunday, the chief negotiators from the European Union and United Kingdom were making lastditch efforts to bridge differences on a trade deal that have proved insurmountable for the best part of the year.

New Delhi, Dec 13: Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman took stock of progress made under various schemes under the three Aatmanirbhar Bharat Packages (ANBP) to help revive economy hit hard by the outbreak of COVID-

Following announcement by the Prime Minister, Sitharaman presented the details of the ₹20.97 lakh crore ANBP 1.0 in a series of press conferences from May 13-17. It was followed by AatmaNirbhar Bharat Package 2.0 on October 12 and the third tranche November 12.

Sitharaman Friday concluded a comprehensive review of ANBP with the Secretaries of various Ministries and Departments concerned over three days, the Finance Ministry statement said on Sunday.

Sharing details of the progress made by various schemes under the ANBP, the statement said, banks have sanctioned loans worth ₹2.05.563 crore to about 81 lakh accounts under the ₹3-lakh crore **Emergency Credit Line Guarantee** Scheme (ECLGS) for the MSME sector that was impacted by disruptions caused due to the coronavirus pandemic.

While 40 lakh MSME accounts have received ₹1,58,626 crore till



December 4, ₹3 lakh crore collateral-free guaranteed loans - budgetary provision of ₹4.000 crore made for the Scheme in First Supplementary Demand for Grants

Announcing Aatmanirbhar Bharat Package 3.0 last month, the Finance Minister had said that ₹2.05 lakh crore sanctioned and ₹1.52 lakh crore disbursed under ECLGS 1.0.

As part of the Aatmanirbhar Bharat Abhiyan 3.0 (announced on November 12), ECLGS Scheme has been extended through ECLGS

The loans provided under ECLGS 2.0 will have a five-year tenor, with a 12-month moratorium on repayment of principal. The entire scheme (ECLGS 1.0 and ECLGS 2.0) valid till March 31, 2021, it said.

Some of the sectors identified by the Kamath Committee for onetime debt restructuring included power, construction, real estate, textiles, pharmaceuticals, logistics, cement, auto components and hotel, restaurants and tourism.

The RBI had in August set up the committee headed by former ICICI Bank chairman K V Kamath for suggesting financial parameters to be factored in the resolution plans under the "Resolution Framework for COVID-19 related Stress" along with sector specific benchmark ranges for such parameters.

Talking about progress of other schemes, the finance ministry said ₹775 crore have been released to Small Industries Development Bank of India (SIDBI) under the ₹1,500 crore 'Interest Subvention for MUDRA-Shishu Loan'.

Govt re-invites bids for four coal blocks

New Delhi, Dec 13: The coal ministry has again invited bids for four coal blocks whose tender process was annulled in the first round of auction for commercial mining, as the number of technically qualified bidder for each mine was just one.

Of the four coal blocks, three are in Odisha and one is in Jharkhand. The nominated authority conducted the first attempt of 11th tranche of auction under CM(SP) Act and 1st tranche of auction under the MIMDR Act of identified coal mines blocks vide tender document dated June 18, 2020, the coal ministry said in a notice inviting tender.

It added that as the number of technically qualified bidders for the tender was less than 2 for Chendipada, Chendipada-II and Kuraloi (A) North coal mines in Odisha and Seregarha block in Jharkhand, the process was annulled.

The blocks, which are fully explored, have an annual peak-rated capacity of 52 million tonnes (MT).

The nominated authority is initiating the second attempt of auction of these coal mines with the same terms and conditions as in the first annulled attempt of auction,

the ministry said.

The auction of blocks for commercial mining has opened India's coal sector to private players.

The first-ever auction of coal mines for commercial mining witnessed fierce competition. Earlier, Coal Minister Pralhad

Joshi said 19 auctioned mines will generate total revenues of around ₹7,000 crore per annum and create more than 69,000 jobs once they are operationalised.

In June, Prime Minister Narendra Modi launched the auction process for 41 coal blocks for commercial mining. Some of the large corporate groups that have hagged blocks include Adani Enterprises, Vedanta, Hindalco Industries and Jindal Power.

EPFO likely to credit 8.5 pc interest for 2019-20



NEW DELHI: Retirement fund body EPFO is likely to credit 8.5 per cent rate of interest for 2019 20 in the employees' provident fund (EPF) accounts of around six crore subscribers in one go by the end of December, Earlier in September this year, the Employees Provident Fund Organisation had decided to split 8.5 per cent interest into two installments of 8.15 per cent and 0.35 per cent in its trustees meet headed by Labour Minister Santosh Gangwar. A highly placed source told PTI that the Labour Ministry has sent a proposal to the Finance Ministry to give concurrence to credit 8.5 per cent rate of interest on EPF for 2019-20 earlier this month.

Thermal coal imports at major ports dip 17 pc

NEW DELHI: Disruptions caused by to impact cargo movement in India, with thermal coal imports at 12 major ports falling by 17,22 per cent year-on-year to 48.16 million tonnes (MT) in April-November. according to the ports' body IPA. Coking coal handling dropped by 14.71 per cent to 31.51 MT during the April-November period of the current fiscal. Coal volumes at the 12 major ports declined for the eighth straight month in November 2020, according to the Indian Ports Association (IPA). These ports had handled 58.17 MT of thermal coal and 36.95 MT of coking coal in April-November period of the previous financial year.



Tata Power to reduce SOUTHCO losses

Ministry will take a call on residual ₹14,500 crore capital infusion in the public sector banks (PSBs) in the fourth quarter of this fiscal, sources said.

Following the financial performance review after the first half, sources said, it was found that Punjab & Sind Bank, out of the 12 PSBs, was in need of ₹5,500 crore to meet the regulatory requirement.

So, the government approved capital infusion through preferential allotment of equity shares in Punjab & Sind Bank last month.

The fund was approved from ₹20,000 crore cleared by Parliament in September for capital infusion of PSBs as part of the first batch of Supplementary Demands for Grants for 2020-21. With ₹5,500 crore going to Punjab & Sind Bank, the government is left with ₹14,500 crore.

When the performance review post third quarter numbers takes place, sources said, by that time banks MINISTRY OF FINANCE

would have clear idea about additional burden on them due to onetime restructuring being undertaken as per the RBI guidelines to help the industry tide over the risk of default due to subdued business environment in the COVID-19 crisis.

Besides, sources said there would be a clarity on NPA recognition as the Supreme Court may decide on interest on interest case by then. NPA recognition process has been halted

New Delhi, Dec 13: The government is likely to launch the third tranche of Bharat Bond ETF, the exchange traded fund that invests in debt of public sector companies, this fiscal, a source said.

Central public sector enterprises (CPSEs) have fund raising plans of about ₹12,000 crore. We are thinking of launching the next tranche of Bharat Bond ETF in a couple of months, the source said.

The second tranche of Bharat Bond ETF, which was launched in July, was oversubscribed more than 3 times, collecting about ₹11,000 crore. It had fetched about ₹12,400 crore in its debut offer in December 2019.

The funds raised through debt ETF help in smoothening borrowing plans of the participating CPSEs or public sector banks. It also helps them in meeting their capital expenditure needs.

Bharat Bond ETF, which is a debt exchange traded fund (ETF), offered maturity options of 5 and 12 years in its second tranche, while in the first tranche, maturity options were for 3 and 10 years.

Bharat Bond ETF will offer two maturities of five years and 11 years maturing in April 2025 and April 2031 respectively. You can choose to invest based on your investment horizon, 2. The ETF will track Nifty BHARAT Bond Index April 2025 or Nifty BHARAT Bond Index - April 2031 depending on the maturity.

hours on average in 2019. This has grown by another 25 per cent to 6.9 hours April onwards (post-COVID), the report titled 'Smartphones and their impact on human relationships 2020', said.

The report noted that since lockdown, Indians have been spending



more time on their smartphone for work from home (75 per cent increase), calling (63 per cent rise), and OTT (over the top services like Netflix, Spotify etc) that has seen 59 per cent growth in time spent on

smartphones. There has also been a 55 per cent increase in time spent on social

media, and 45 per cent rise in time spent gaming on smartphones.

Interestingly, the average duration of clicking pictures and taking selfies has increased from 14 minutes to 18 minutes in a day.

The study comprised 2,000 respondents aged 15-45 years across top eight cities (four metros,

Bengaluru, Hyderabad, Ahmedabad and Pune) with 70 per cent male and 30 per cent female participants.

Speaking to PTI, Vivo India Director Brand Strategy Nipun Marya said the company commissioned a similar study last year as well on smartphones and their impact on human relationships.

We all know smartphones are a great tool, especially in a COVID situation where we would have been rendered almost unproductive with-

out smartphones...However, excessive usage of smartphones or anything else, when not used in moderation, that can lead to adverse effects and this is why we did the study, he explained. Marya noted that there has been an organic growth of smartphones from 2019 to 2020 but COVID has certainly accelerated some of the trends that otherwise would have grown much slowly.

Overall, smartphones are a great tool but what it is leading to is a lot of addiction. For example, 84 per cent people check their phones within the first 15 minutes of waking up, and 46 per cent respondents said they pick up the phone at least five times in an hour-long conversation meeting with friends, he said.

Marya said while consumption may come down from the current levels as the situation eases around the pandemic, some of these changes could be permanent.

However, the main game of the day, the Manchester derby ended in
