

study reveals that last year more than 45 lakh people in Índia succumbed to cardiovascular diseases, commonly referred to as heart attack. But the experts believe that the majority of these deaths could have been prevented, if the victims were aware about their heart health.

Here comes the need for ECG (electrocardiogram) tests. It can evaluate if your heart is healthy or has developed a problem. But this test is commonly done before a major surgery or if a heart problem is suspected. However, many people don't even consider undergoing ECG tests due to their lack of knowledge about the signs and symptoms of heart diseases. Keeping this in mind, young physician Abhijit Upadhyaya has launched a startup Cytopot to get ECG tests done freely, especially for those belonging to poor financial backgrounds and living in rural areas.

From the very first day of joining MBBS course, Abhijit has been trying his best to sensitise rural and tribal population about health issues by conducting health awareness programmes and camps free of cost through his voluntary organisation Being and Becoming'. He had a hypothetical plan in his mind for a startup that would improve the healthcare system by going digital and more easily accessible. For one and half years it remained in the planning stage. But things changed after he tested positive for Covid 19. Suddenly he could see everything with a much greater clarity. He realised the urgency of digitisation of even the healthcare

"I always wanted to launch a startup to provide better healthcare services. When I was down with Covid, I decided to create a digital healthcare ecosystem through which we can better the healthcare system during pandemic. I realised that certain key problems of the healthcare system in the country overburdened and disorganised private clinics and OPDs, overcrowding in the areas for patient waiting and lack of real-time updates about the unanticipated rescheduling of appointments — led to a loss of significant working hours for the patients and fewer patient consultations per day. I created the startup Cytopot to provide ECG services to patients freely as cardiovascular diseases ac-

counted for 28.1 per cent of total deaths in the country in 2020", says Abhijit, the CEO of Cytopot.

Upon being asked to explain the whole process of reaching out to patients, Abhijit says, "Currently we are accepting two types of booking for ECG. Patients can book through our toll free number or can book through our website by submitting their details. Once booking is done, our technician will make a call, confirm about the timing and reach the destination. The technician, following Covid protocols, performs the ECG in less than three minutes and sends

his observations to our cardiologist for interpretation. At present, we have three technicians, two assistants and five cardiologists in our team. In case of female patients, we send a female technician to record the ECG. Since, it is a recently launched concept, we have so far covered only Balasore and Bhubaneswar towns. For our doorstep ECG services, we now get booking of approx 15-20 patients per day. Within a couple of weeks we have done more than 1000 ECGs at doorsteps. Our aim is to cover areas where getting healthcare services is a distant dream and help heart patients with portable ECG machines.

Elaborating more about his startup, Abhijit says, "Cytopot is a digital healthcare system

that facilitates provision of standardized access to healthcare at an economic price but ECG service freely. On an integrated platform, the user and the service provider can have direct communication and an

appointment is scheduled. The system takes into consideration of the appointment with respect to the location of the user, distance between the user and the service provider, tracking the real-time location as the user moves and calculates the time-delay; thereby alerting both the service provider as well as the user.

It operates through a unique algorithm to improve the time-management for the client availing an appointment for a consultation or a diagnostic work-up or other healthcare services. Additionally, if the user continues to move beyond a certain range/distance that cannot be covered in the stipulated time period and if there is no response against the alerts, the server automatically sends messages to the service provider for either rescheduling or cancellation of the appointment, taking into consideration of the travel time and other unforeseen time delays.

The user is able to explore the search based upon several criteria, such as a keyword search related to the service, geographic location of the service area, date and time of the service, the pricing and if a tele-consultation is available."

Rotarian Aayush Jasoria says, "It has been observed that Odisha has inadequate ECG

(electrocardiography) facilities which are leading to deaths in a majority of heart attack cases in urban as well as rural areas. It is indeed a big intervention from doctor Ahbijit Upadhyaya and his team of

Disease prevention and treatment being one of the focus areas of Rotary International, Rotary E Club of District 3262 has joined hands with Cytopot to take this initiative to pan-district and get the heart check-up done for patients in rural areas. This will

further help in creating awareness and Rotarians also can be taught first-aid to handle situations related to heart diseases."

Abhinav Cardea, who works as Managing Director & Chief Executive Officer of Cardea Labs, feels Abhijit and his teammates are

literally saving lives by this service at the bottom of the pyramid. There is a huge gap in the healthcare ecosystem in Southeast Asia where a large number of people miss out on quality diagnostics because of



cost and non-availability of technologies. Our team at Cardea Labs along with doctors at AIIMS, New Delhi have worked dedicatedly for years to develop a robust ECG system which can give a high definition, simultaneous 12 lead signals on any Android phones. The user can then instantly send the PDF report for analysis via services such as WhatsApp/mail. It gives a massive edge over the traditional paper based ECG machines and now the patients won't have to travel to get their ECG tests and its analysis done.'

"My role in the startup is to understand business and operations problems and find



solutions. With my experience in building and scaling startups like Moveinsync, Swiggy and Cardekho, I have developed the right understanding to find practical ways. Abhijit sees this

company as a mission to improve healthcare in tier 2 and tier 3 cities. The zeal and enthusiasm of Abhijit and team has made me join them in their mission", says founding member and executive officer for marketing and growth of Cytopot Udit Varshney.



"As a business woman and a responsible mother, going to hospital for an ECG checkup is not only quite risky but it also takes up a lot of time from my busy



Tales of Twists and Subtlety

o this rather mundane literary avenue of Assamese writers' English writing, a new star is shining with sharp scintillations, delving deep into humane attitude and behavioural subtlety penning his memoirs with compassion and utmost literary ardour. Well, he is Rabin Prasad Kalita, a fully self-made man, the spirit of an ever encompassing zeal spanning the wings with creative passion and restless to plant him in any field that is positive creation. Also, he is an ardent disciple of percussion instruments, looks passionately for new instruments, sometimes getting the same from a far-flung corner of the planet and coughing up a hefty sum at the dearness of some essential family needs. Such persons are a rare mortal particularly in a place like Assam, where 'silent endeavours', 'silent meditations are best neglected than pedantic and pompous small-time celebrities and dumping gibberish. Well, God's Shade & A mélange of true tales is an outcome of

penning his fondly remembered and cherished memories down memory lane. It's his life, pathways with potholes and bumping trajectories traversed by him only. He tried to share his experiences and thus to enrich our common individual heritages that make history. The book is a collection of twenty-three episodes of

myriad memories which he compiled with finer sensitivities with great acumen ship of storytelling. The writer might have been influenced by O Henry and Somerset Maugham as each story makes an O Henrylike twist and subtlety, lucidity,



and mastery of storytelling craftsmanship of Maugham.

Here, the writer has looked back on his past acquaintances and incidents he cherished without romanticising his perseverance, a backdrop where he had to trudge uphill and come out of the penury he suffered. This book can be motivational as well for those who struggle with the odds of destiny.

Assam-born English writers are a thinly populated crowd mostly from "Anglicized middle-class creamy layer" that took education in English medium and made their presence felt in a stark difference with vernacular brought up folk, who are by and large, rather put down for naiveties. Here, the writer is from a rustic and rural background and not from upstart city schooling of English medium. Generally "English" language is a big examination taboo particularly for a boy of such a rural setup. One would get dumbfounded to see the intricate, pulsating descriptions and avid narrations of craftily placed words so hand picked up from a vast vocabulary of hard collection, on each page. Besides captivating narrations and description of each situation in-camera framed visuality what makes one feel his nearby presence as if one is in an "Adda with a great talker having ultimate prudence of storytelling". One can feel the writer's heart, which is full of love and unlimited compassion. That is where the communicative skill of the writer best expressed.

My recommendation to read this book is rather an insipid narration that makes a grotesquely ushered welcome. Kindly collect this book, not for a mere anecdotal reading, but to get bewildered to watch the magical transformation of a self endeavoured hero i.e. our dear writer Rabin Prasad Kalita. I am sure the writer will not disappoint you and truly he deserves back-up from all of us. Reading it will make you believe.

Dating revisits old school trends

A SURVEY REVEALS THAT WOMEN **DATERS CRAVE FOR MORE EMOTIONAL ATTACHMENT IN COMPARISON TO THEIR MALE COUNTERPARTS**

ith changing times, the dating scenario has also witnessed major shifts. According to a recent survey, various old-fashioned trends are making a comeback in the dating community and there are various notable changes in the behaviour and ideology of both men and women

A popular dating platform's survey says that 60 per cent users seek emotional attachment in a relationship while 83 per cent prefer meeting the prospective partners in person rather than dating virtually.

It adds that 58 per cent users consider the meeting to be the decisive element for committing to their partner and the relationship.

Majority of the users (80 per cent) look forward to meeting their partners in-person to develop genuine connections. 72 per cent daters comprising of the users between 21-30 age group prefer the same. On the contrary, 46 per cent of the young generation below 20 years age group, are fine with virtual dating. Seventy-eight per cent men and 60 per cent women users choose meeting in person over virtual dating. Seventy-three per cent users from both metropolitan cities and towns no longer worry about the pandemic and express their desire to meet their date in person and only 27 per cent keep virtual dating as an option

Deleting dating app

Majority of the daters (70 per cent), continue using the app despite finding the partner and want to keep their options open whereas only 30 per cent delete the app. Seventy-three per cent of male users and 54 per cent of female users continue using the dating app. Men daters openly express that it is highly unlikely of them discontinuing the usage of the app. On the other hand, 46 per cent women daters delete the dating app once they have found a partner. Despite possessing modern values, 64 per cent users in metro cities delete the dating once their partner search comes to end whereas 70 per cent of users from small cities continue using the app.

To summarise, the report suggests that the dating ballgame is ever-evolving and is witnessing major changes with many old school trends making a comeback. Physical dates are given preference despite the pandemic situation and are the deciding factor for the daters for committing

to their partners. In the present fast-paced life, users crave emotional attachment while physical intimacy is secondary for
