

New Delhi, May 13: Due to an acute shortage of Covid-19 vaccines, India is struggling to contain the second wave of the pandemic. Even though the two main vaccine producers in the country, Serum Institute of India (SII) and Bharat Biotech have assured the government that they are ramping up productions, it seems that the states are not buying this. So far 11 states including Odisha have floated global tenders to procure vaccines from abroad. It just shows that they are not ready to depend on the Centre or the vaccine manufacturing units in India anymore.

Both SII and Bharat Biotech have submitted their production plans to the Centre from June to August as per the declarations made by Union Health Minister Harsh Vardhan. He conducted a meeting Wednesday with seven states/UTs which are lagging behind in terms of vaccinating people against Covid-19. Vardhan informed that India's vaccine production is likely to reach eight crore doses in May and nine crore in June.

As per the plans disclosed, Bharat Biotech is all set to raise the production of Covaxin to 3.32 crore doses in July and 7.82 crore in August. SII on the other hand has targeted production of 10 crore Covishield doses in August.

Meanwhile the Centre said Thursday it has so far procured 35.6 crore vaccine doses for the ongoing drive so far and more than 17 crore persons in India have been vaccinated. It also said that it is on the verge of procuring another 16 crore doses and added that the country will have two billion doses of vaccines between August and December.

Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal

has however, blamed the Centre for the shortage of vaccines. He has also said that the Centre is pitting the states in a vaccine war against one another and it is giving India a 'bad image' in its fight against Covid-19.

NOW VENTILATOR **WOES SURFACE**

NEW DELHI: Only the supply of vaccines to the different states is not bothering the Centre alone. Well it has another problem in hand. The 'Make in India' ventilators are developing glitches in many states thus creating another challenge for the Centre. The Centre has said many hospitals or medical colleges are not following' the user manual properly leading to the technical glitches. On the other hand, a number of states including Punjab have said the ventilators are malfunctioning as proper maintenance is not being done by the manufacturers who are supposed to provide 'after sales

of India. India, as one country, shud procure vaccines on behalf of all Indian states (sic)," the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) supremo said in a tweet.

Many states including Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu and West Bengal have temporarily suspended vaccination of the 18-45 years age group. They have said that unless there is a seamless supply of vaccines, it is impossible to carry out vaccination properly. They have also pointed out that crores in the 45-plus category are yet to get the second dose.

Lockdown may continue in state

Bhubaneswar, May 13: With Odisha registering around 10,000 Covid-19 cases on a daily basis there is a strong possibility that the lockdown may be extended after May 19, experts said Thursday. The total number of active cases in Odisha went past the onelakh mark Thursday morning for a brief while.


Out of 30 districts in Odisha, the test positivity rate (TPR) has remained over 10 per cent in 29 for the last seven days (May 6 to 12).

Kalahandi district has reported the highest TPR at 46 per cent. Other districts that have a TPR of more than 30 per cent are Sambalpur (38.4%), Khurda (36.7%), Angul (34.1%), Bargarh (31.3%), Boudh (31.2%) and Sundergarh (30.8%).

Director of Capital Hospital Laxmidhar Sahu said that if the Covid-19 graph doesn't show a downward trend, the government will be forced to extend lockdown.

Similarly, another senior doctor and former public health director JK Tripathy opined that the government should continue with the lockdown as the infection rate continues to remain high. 'The daily infection rate continues to remain above 10.000. so the government should not relax restrictions. Otherwise the rate will increase," asserted Tripathy.







Bhubaneswar, May 13: The sharp rise in daily Covid-19 cases and deaths in the state continued Thursday even as the number of active cases came closer to the 1-lakh mark for the first time in the coastal state since the beginning of the pandemic last year, a Health department official said.

The Covid-19 caseload in the state mounted to 5,76,297 as 10,649 more people tested positive for the virus while 19 fresh fatalities pushed the death toll to 2,251, he said.

Odisha now has 91,648 active cases, the official said, adding that 4,82,345 patients have so far recovered from the infection.

Khurda district, which com prises the state capital Bhubaneswar, accounted for 14,886 actives cases, followed by Sundargarh (11,466) and Cuttack

Of the fresh cases, 5,965 were reported from quarantine centres and 4,684 detected during contact

According to the official, Khurda also recorded the highest number of new cases at 1,557, followed by Cuttack (930), Sundargarh (774), Angul (557) and Balasore (503).

Taking to Twitter, the Health and Family Welfare department said, "Regret to inform the demise of nineteen Covid positive patients while under treatment in hospitals.

Furthermore, the IMD also warned of rain, thunderstorms with lightning in districts of Odisha over the next two days. Orange warning was issued for districts of Bhadrak, Jajpur, Kendrapara, Cuttack, Jagatsinghpur, Puri, Khurda, Nayagarh, Ganjam, Gajapati, Keonjhar, Mayurbhanj, Dhenkanal, Angul, Kandhamal and Rayagada. Also, heavy rainfalls are very likely to occur at one or two places over Bhadrak, Jajpur, Kendrapara, Jagatsinghpur, Cuttack and Khurda, the IMD stated.

Yellow warning was also issued for 24 hours for the districts of Sundargarh, Jharsuguda, Bargarh, Sambalpur, Deogarh, Sonepur, Boudh, Nuapada, Balangir, Kalahandi, Nawarangpur, Koraput and Malkangiri. The IMD predicted maximum temperature to fall by 3-5 degrees Celsius May 13 and rise May 14 by 2-4 degrees Celsius.

Kendrapara, May 13: Farming will be seriously hit in the district with seven rivers going dry and 1114 lift irrigation (LI) points becoming defunct, a report said. It is apprehended that over 25,718 hectares of land might remain uncultivated due to lack of irrigation facilities

This has happened even as 'Akshaya Trutiya' the festival of agriculture, draws near. However, farm works are yet to pick up in the district with farmers showing no enthusiasm to take up cultivation due to lack of irrigation facilities. Their hopes hinge on rain.

Reports said seven rivers flowing through the district have gone dry from the start of this summer season. As a result, farmers are increasingly facing problems in watering their land. The LI points have also become defunct as there is not enough water in the rivers.

The district has 152,000 hectares of farm land out of which 86132 hectares are irrigated by water from canal, LI points, shallow tube wells and other water sources like



Attabira, May 13: Due to massive irregularities in the rural electrification work under the Deen Dayal Upadhyaya Gram Jyoti Yojana (DDUGJY), a Centre-sponsored scheme, the programme has allegedly flopped in Attabira and Bheden blocks in Bargarh district. Officially, it is claimed that crores of rupees have been spent for electrification of BPL households in two blocks in 2017, but the ground reality tells a different story.

In fact, poor people in hundreds of houses are still living in dark. Electricity is still a dream for them, it was learnt.

Actually, no common man had any idea about how the rural electrification is being carried out. A few days ago, some locals of Bhedan block were dismayed by an information plaque about the DDUGJY put up near Deshparthala livestock inspection centre. Matching the ground realities with the data on the plague, the locals suspected massive irregularities committed in the name of DDUGJY. They alleged that some contractors engaged in the rural electrification drive put up the board without doing the work.

Locals said, "While hurriedly laying the foundation for the DDUGJY information plaque near the livestock centre, the underground water pipe got damaged. Water supply was disrupted to the

livestock centre."

The plaque revealed that the NTPC had been entrusted the electrification in the area under DDUGJY. It was claimed that the work was done three years ago while Rs 167 crore has been spent for the electrification of scores of villages in Bargarh district.

Beware Economists

veoliberalism is dead. Or perhaps it remains very much alive. Pundits have been calling it both ways these days. But either way, it is hard to deny that something new is afoot in the world of economic policy. US President Joe Biden has called for a vast expansion of government spending on social programmes, infrastructure, and the transition to a green economy. He wants to use government procurement to rebuild domestic supply chains and bring manufacturing jobs back to the United States. His Treasury Secretary, Janet Yellen, is pushing for a globally coordinated increase in corporate taxes. Jerome Powell, Chair of the Federal Reserve, traditionally the most hawkish arm of government on price stability, is playing down inflation fears and lending his support to fiscal expansion. All of these policy changes represent a sharp departure from the conventional

wisdom in Washington. Do they also augur a new economic policy paradigm? Economic policies in the US and the West more broadly, have long been

in need of overhaul. The ideas dominant since the 1980s – variously called the Washington Consensus, market fundamentalism, or neoliberalism originally gained traction because of the perceived failures of Keynesianism and excessive government regulation. But they took on a life of their own and produced highly financialised, unequal, and unstable economies that were unequipped to cope with today's most sig-

nificant challenges: climate change, social inclusion, and disruptive new technologies

The needed paradigm change might usefully start with how we teach economics. Economists tend to be enamored of the power of markets to promote overall economic prosperity. Adam Smith's invisible hand – the idea that self-interested individuals seeking only their personal enrichment might produce collective prosperity instead of social chaos – is one of the crown jewels of the economics profession. It also remains deeply counterintuitive, which is perhaps why economists devote an inordinate amount of time proselytizing about the magic of markets.

But economics is not a paean to free markets. In fact, much of economics instruction focuses on how markets may produce too much inequality, and how they fail on their own terms of allocating resources efficiently. Perfectly competitive markets that harmoniously produce stable equilibria are only one possibility among many. The Smithian model is not the only one. Still, the knee-jerk reaction of many economists is to treat wellfunctioning, competitive markets as the relevant benchmark for any proposed departure from laissez-faire.

Fortunately, a new paradigm for teaching economics does exist. The CORE Project is an

online teaching tool and free, open-access textbook. Two leading economists, Samuel Bowles of the Santa Fe Institute and Wendy Carlin of University College London, are the visionaries behind it. But a large group of economists worldwide has collaborated in its development. Already, it is in use in a majority of university economics departments in the United Kingdom.

A key advantage of the CORE approach is that it tackles issues like inequality and climate change head-on. But the pedagogically more interesting move is that it replaces the standard benchmarks of economics with alternative benchmarks that are more realistic and useful. For example, in contrast to conventional economics. CORE assumes that individuals are pro-social and myopic, rather than selfish and far-sighted. Competition is imperfect, with winner-take-all characteristics, rather than perfect. Power is ever-present in the form of principal-agent relationships in labour and credit markets, instead of being treated as either diffuse or exogenous. Economic rents are ubiquitous and often required for well-functioning economies, not rare or the result of policy error.

Such a new paradigm for teaching and doing economics will produce better understanding of social outcomes. But we should recognize that it will not produce a new paradigm for economic policy. And that is as it should be.

All of our previous policy paradigms – whether mercantilist, classical lib eral, Keynesian, social-democratic, ordoliberal, or neoliberal – had important blind spots because they were conceived as universal programmes that could be applied everywhere and at all times. Inevitably, each paradigm's blind spots overshadowed the innovations it brought to how we think about economic governance. The result was overreach and pendular swings between excessive optimism and pessimism about government's role in the economy.

The right answer to any policy question in economics is, "It depends." We need economic analysis and evidence to fill out the details of what the desired outcome depends upon. The keywords of a truly useful economics are contingency, contextuality, and non-universality. Economics teaches us that there is a time for fiscal expansion and a time for fiscal retrenchment. There is a time when government should intervene in supply chains, and a time when it should leave markets to their own devices. Sometimes, taxes should be high; sometimes, they should be low. Trade should be freer in some areas. and regulated in others. Mapping the links between real-world circumstances and the desirability of different types of interventions is what good

Our societies are confronted with vital challenges that require new economic approaches and significant policy experimentation. The Biden administration has launched a bold and long-overdue economic transformation. But those who are seeking a new economic paradigm should be careful what they wish for. Our goal should be not to create the next ossified orthodoxy, but to learn how to adapt our policies and institutions to changing exigencies.

In this context, one of our greatest fears is that after decades of improvement, future generations' prospects have suddenly plummeted. This loss of momentum toward the international community's Sustainable Development Goals for 2030 will have far-reaching costs, most of which will be borne by the most vulnerable. Through extraordinary global scientific cooperation, the international community has created an Access to COVID-19 Tools Accelerator (ACT-A) to facilitate the sharing of technology, and the COVID-19 Vaccine Global Access (COVAX) facility to deliver vaccines equitably and efficiently around the world. But while hundreds of millions of vaccine doses have been administered globally, there are deep disparities. In high-income countries, vaccine supplies are sufficient to provide for around one in four people, on average; in low-income countries, this figure drops to one in 500. At

this point, it should go without saying that no one will be safe until we have made these cuttingedge technologies available to everyone. The longer we delay, the greater the risk that dangerous new variants will emerge

SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, is certainly not the last contagious pathogen that humanity will face. But it could be the last one that inflicts such exorbitant costs. Whether the next pandemic can be prevented is up to us all. Success will depend on commitments from all countries to implement the International Health Regulations, the WHO's legal framework establishing how they should prepare for and respond to the cross-border transmission of pathogens and other

health emergencies. Beyond following through on these existing measures, world leaders should take six additional steps. First, we must dramatically scale up investment in global preparedness, so that we can spot the next potential pandemic as early as possible. There is now ample evidence of what works well, and we have gained hardearned experience in getting the necessary systems to function as they should, everywhere. All countries should commit to sharing relevant information rapidly and ensuring its reliability. Second, we must do more to

prevent pathogens from moving to humans from animals and the environment. That means appreciating the risks of crossover transmission and adopting a "One Health" mindset that reflects awareness of biological interdependencies and our shared obligation to protect fragile ecosystems. Third, we need to ensure that all

countries can respond rapidly when the alarm bells start to ring. There is an urgent demand for more investment in local, national, and regional health systems, particularly those that currently lack the capacity for prompt detection and response.

Fourth, public officials need to demonstrate enlightened leadership by committing to, and engaging in, constructive international cooperation, without which the world will always be at risk. As WHO envoys, we are encouraged by the call from 26 heads of state and government, the president of the European Council, and WHO Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus for an international treaty on pandemic preparedness. This effort can provide a solid foundation for high-level coordination between governments. Ideally, it would result in a new compact designed to complement

the International Health Regulations and drive a simultaneous upgrade in all national systems that need it.

Fifth, we must intensify international cooperation to develop and deliver the vaccines, diagnostics, and treatments that are necessary for achieving universal health coverage. That means building on initiatives like the ACT-A to establish a permanent forward looking mechanism for ensuring equitable access to critical health technologies for all who need them.

Lastly, and above all, there is an urgent need to reset the response to this crisis. Everyone needs to recommit to supporting a singular and cohesive strategy that is built on equity and fairness, driven by a single-minded focus to end the pandemic as quickly as possible, and in keep ing with the WHO's mantra: solidarity, science, and solutions.

As special envoys for COVID-19 we will continue to support countries and communities as they confront this crisis. The task now is to prevent and mitigate as much of the damage as we can, which will require concerted action within and across countries to implement the right public-health policies and build capacity wherever it is falling short. Sustaining these efforts will be critical, because it will be many months - even years - before vaccines against current and future variants of the virus are accessible to everyone.

We urge everyone to do their part to help prevent, prepare for, and manage the next outbreak. Above all, we call on today's leaders to muster the solidarity needed to work together for the common good. What the leaders decide to do now will have implications for everyone living today and tomorrow.

Americans declared withdrawing their remaining troops. The violence by Taliban points to the things that are about to come. The Interior Ministry Monday last said that around 11 people were killed by a bomb that exploded in a bus in southeastern Zabul province. It was in fact followed by the carnage two days before Monday, outside a school in Kabul when a series of bombs went off killing 50 people and wounding over 100, many of them young girls. Taliban is making it loud and clear its attitude about women receiving education

and about non-Sunni population. It may have two motivations in unleashing the violence. One, they are warning the Americans that unless they keep the second deadline

they could engage the Americans too. Second, they would continue to attack until the Americans and NATO forces have withdrawn. Taliban, in fact, is adamant that they will not enter into any more negotiations until all the foreign forces are withdrawn from their soil. Whatever be the drivers for

Talibanic violence, the US withdrawal leaves Afghanistan in the lurch, abandoning the country to bombers of school kids and innocent civilians. The US, the reigning super power with a mighty military does help the helpless countries when their independence and human rights are threatened. But it does not do so pretty strategically. The US often-times creates a monster and then decides to fight it. Be it Saddam Hussein in Iraq. Hosni Mubarak in Egypt, Pol Pot in Cambodia, Marcos in Philippines, authoritarian regime in China and Mujahedinin Afghanistan, who later became Taliban and the military dictatorship in Pakistan.

In relation to Afghanistan, let

us recall that America heavily supported Pakistan to create and nurture Mujahedin to drive out the Soviets. Many of the Mujahedin leaders went on to form Taliban actively supported by the Pakistani army. Although Soviets had withdrawn and subsequently, due to their own disintegration, lost interest and influence over Afghanistan, Pakistan continued to meddle in that country and wanted a puppet government with Taliban helming it.

Americans interest in Afghanistan dwindled and Pakistani-backed Taliban took over the country. Islamabad used most of its military support received from the US in cross-border terrorism against India. Also, it was no accident that in 1999, Pakistani terrorists hijacked an Indian plane, Indian Airlines 814, and took it to Kandahar to negotiate with Indian government for the release of dreaded terrorist Masood Azhar.

Americans stormed back to Afghanistan after the terror attack on the World Trade Centre in New York City. They came to hunt down Bin Laden who was sheltered by the Taliban. It is another matter, after 11 years Osama Bin Laden was

Pakistan. They are now leaving the country without completing the work, vanquishing the enemy – that is Taliban. Will Taliban and other terrorist groups associated with it not bite back? Without putting a viable alternative in place to rein in on Taliban, the exit of Americans defies comprehension. Perhaps, Americans think they can bounce back should such an eventuality arise threatening their

security and interests. Understandably, the opinion on American withdrawal is divided. In the Senate, Mitch McConnell called the plan reckless and a grave mistake. He said: "it is a retreat in the face of an enemy that has not yet been vanquished and abdication of American leadership". Some fear that the US exit will lead to the collapse of the government in Kabul and so will the gains made in social development, health, education, women's rights and so on. Government supporters say they will link with the Kabul government diplomatically and extend necessary political support.

2 BJP MPs who won Assembly polls in Bengal resign

Nishit Pramanik and Iagannath Sarkar were among the five BJP MPs the party fielded for the Assembly polls hoping to form government where they could play key roles. That didn't happen

Kolkata, May 13: In Bengal, the BJP's tally of 77 MLAs in the Assembly is down to 75. Two BJP MPs who contested and won have submitted their resignations to the Speaker Wednesday on instructions of the party high command. The Trinamool has mocked the move as the BJP's bid to play safe in the Lok Sabha. The Trinamool has accused the Centre's decision to give Central security to all BJP MLAs in Bengal as misuse of taxpayers' money.

Nishit Pramanik and Jagannath Sarkar were among the five BJP MPs the party fielded for the Assembly polls hoping to form a gov-

ernment where they could play key roles. That didn't happen. Now the BJP clearly feels they are more useful in Parliament.

"The results in Bengal were not as expected. If the BJP had formed government, we would have a specific role. Now that is not the case so the party has said we should remain MPs and resign as MLAs. That's why we are doing it," said Jagannath Sarkar, BJP MP from Ranaghat. He had won from the Santipur Assembly seat, both in

As MPs, both Pramanik and

Sarkar have central security cover. So does Suvendu Adhikari, BJP's Nandigram MLA and Leader of Opposition in the Assembly. He has Z-Plus security.

The Union Home Ministry has recently said it would provide central security to all BJP MLAs, based on a review of their threat perceptions. The ministry will also foot the bill for it-all of Rs1.5 crore per

"For two years, I worked with the BJP without much or a problem. But ever since 2nd May...the day the election results came out, the situation has changed. We need the security (cover). I feel our life is at risk. We have been elected by the people, but it is the failure of the state government that the Centre has to provide security," BJP MLA Agnimitra Paul of Asansol South said.

Definitely we need security from the Centre because we cannot trust the Bengal government... If the elected MLAs don't feel secure. they can't work," said BJP MLA Subrata Thakur from Gaighata in North 24 Parganas.

The Trinamool has mocked both moves - the resignations and the central security.

They have insulted the people who have voted for them and sent them first to Parliament and then to Assembly. Secondly, the Union government has decided to give all MLAs security cover...which is mis-utilisation of public funds," said senior party leader Sukhendu Shekhar Roy. "It has never happened before," he added.

One BJP MLA has declined central security. Ashok Lahiri, the former economic advisor to the Centre said that he is banking on the state government to do what it takes to keep him and the people safe.

Amid Covid surge, old graves being dug up for new burials

Aligarh (UP), May 13: Despite assurances of all help by UP chief minister Yogi Adityanath to the Aligarh Muslim University (AMU) in dealing with the pandemic, the rising death toll has cast an unnerving shadow on the campus

With at least three dozen serving and retired AMU employees having died in the past few weeks due to Covid, old graves are now being dug up to bury the dead.

The AMU campus has seen more deaths in past few weeks than in the entire year. The alarming death toll has sent shock-waves leading to apprehensions that a deadlier 'AMU strain' of the virus is wreaking havoc.

Vice-Chancellor Tariq Mansoor has written to the Indian Council for Medical Research (ICMR) so that all aspects can be studied through genome sequencing.

AMU Proctor, Professor Mohammad Waseem Ali, said, "In the past 20 days, we have lost almost



16 members of our faculty, eminent teachers, including the chairman of the medicine department, dean of law faculty and many others. As we come to terms with this loss, there is a sense of fear and rest-

A senior faculty member said 'The graveyard is comparatively small and old graves are now being dug up to make way for the new. This is not entirely unforeseen but it also explains the situation. At AMU, we never witnessed so many deaths.

The Jawaharlal Nehru Medical College (JNMC) is one of the biggest hospitals in Aligarh and caters to four neighbouring districts. Doctors at the hospital have been dealing with an unprecedented situation with the rising number of Covid cases.

A high inflow of Covid patients from surrounding areas along with the faculty from within the AMU campus, has strained the facility.

Sources said that 8 to 10 burials are taking place on an average every day. "Even the 'namaaz' is being offered collectively," said a student.

Blow conch shells to keep Covid at bay: Yoga experts

There is no scientific evidence to prove that blowing conch shells helps prevent Covid-19 but they say it definitely helps one in lung exercise

Lucknow, May 13: Yoga experts are now advising people to blow conch shells in order to strengthen the respiratory system.

The age-old practice of blowing conch shells, known as 'shankh after prayers, is said to help in fighting Covid by enhancing the lung power.

Yoga expert, Ratan Sinha of Prayagraj, said, "Blowing a conch shell is a part of Hindu and Buddhist tradition. Our elders blew the 'shankh' regularly and their lungs were strong. They rarely suffered from respiratory

On Sinha's advice, people in three Lucknow neighbourhoods at Stanley Road, Darbhanga and Civil Lines area have started blowing conch shells on a regular basis.

"At 6.a.m every day, we start blowing the 'shankh' in our houses and everyone joins in form the confines of their homes. Since we cannot go out for morning walk, this gives us a sense of unity as well. Even the children are now taking interest and blowing the 'shankh', said GP Singh, an octogenarian who lives on Stanley Road.

He insisted that the blowing of conch shells also dispels all the negative energy in the surroundings.

A Lucknow resident, Sameer Khanna, said, "While performing yoga, each and every group member blows conch shells for at least five minutes every day. As Covid affects the respiratory system, blowing conch shells is a good way to strengthen the lungs and increase their capacity."

"We started practicing blowing conch shells since April and are continuing our exercise to strengthen the lungs. We feel better and more positive," said Khanna.

Group members also train each other on the right method of blowing conch shells and share its benefits.

Interestingly, women are also practicing blowing conch shells at their homes. They say that the sound of 'shankh' purifies the atmosphere at home

Cooch Behar (WB), May 13: Claiming that people, who cast their votes as per their choice, are being subjected to attacks in West Bengal, Governor Jagdeep Dhankhar Thursday said while the country is facing the Covid crisis, the state is grappling with the twin challenges of the pandemic and the post-poll violence.

The Governor said he was shocked by incidents of attack following the West Bengal Assembly elections, and decided to visit various places affected by the post-poll violence in the interest of the people.

"The country is facing the Covid crisis, and West Bengal is facing twin challenges of the pandemic and unprecedented post-poll violence only on the ground that some people decided to vote as per their own choice," he said while embarking on a visit to various places in Cooch Behar district.

He said the Mamata Banerjee government must ensure that everyone who took the law into their hands must be brought to justice.

The opposition BJP has been accusing the Trinamool Congress of indulging in violence against their supporters, a charge which the ruling party has also brought against the saffron camp in the state.

"History will judge Mamata Banerjee, the Chief Minister. History will also judge Jagdeep Dhankhar, the Governor, and it will judge the bureaucracy and the media," he said.

Claiming that he did not get any response from the state government despite efforts being made to get information about the post-poll violence. Dhankhar said the state government must provide him with



the requisite particulars under

Article 167 of the Constitution. "I will perform my constitutional duties unhindered, undeterred by any situation whatsoever," he said.

The Chief Minister and the Governor got involved in a war of words Wednesday after Mamata Banerjee wrote to him claiming that his planned visit to the postpoll violence- affected Cooch Behar district violates norms, while Dhankhar hit back saying he was discharging duties mandated by the Constitution.

"I find from social media that you are unilaterally proceeding to Cooch Behar district May 13, and sadly, I find that to be violative of the longstanding norms as evolved over several decades.'

"I, therefore, would expect you will kindly follow the well-established norms of protocol, and desist from abrupt decisions with regards to field visits," Banerjee said in a letter to the Governor.

Soon after receiving the letter, Dhankhar wrote back saying that he has been following the Constitution since taking oath as



2 Naxals killed in encounter

Mumbai: Two Naxals were killed in an encounter with security forces in Maharashtra's Gadchiroli district Thursday morning, a senior police official said. The gun-battle took place at a forest in Morchul village under Dhanora taluka around 6 am, when a team comprising C-60 commandos, a specialised combat unit of the Gadchiroli police, and other security personnel was patrolling in the area, he said. The police had specific information that a group of more than 25 ultras had gathered in the forest at Morchul, located around 900 km from here, Gadchiroli Superintendent of Police Ankit Goval said.

Show cause notice served to Nirav Modi

Mumbai, May 13: A special court here has issued a public notice to fugitive diamond merchant Nirav Modi, wanted in India for alleged fraud and money laundering in the PNB scam case, asking why his properties should not be confiscated under the Fugitive Economic Offenders (FEO) Act.

Special Judge V C Barde has also asked Modi to appear before the court June 11. The court said if the accused

failed to appear, it will proceed with action against him under the FEO Act.

The special court had in December 2019 declared Nirav Modi a fugitive economic offender, on a plea of the Enforcement Directorate (ED), which is conducting a probe into the case.

"I, V C Barde, Special Judge, PMLA, 2002 and Fugitive Economic Offenders Act, 2018, issue NOTICE to you to show cause as to why the properties mentioned in the application (ED's plea), in which you have pecuniary interest and/or otherwise, should not be confiscated under the said Act," the re-

A similar notice was also issued to Nirav Modi's wife Ami, sister Purvi and brother-in-law Maiank

The notice said the family members have been enumerated as "interested person" in the applica-

The investigating agency has alleged that Nirav Modi and his uncle Mehul Choksi, in connivance with certain bank officials, allegedly cheated the Punjab National Bank (PNB) to the tune of ₹14,000 crore through issuance of fraudulent Letters of Undertaking (LoUs).

The LoUs were allegedly issued n a fraudulent manner by a Mumbai branch of the PNB to a group of companies belonging to Nirav Modi since March 2011, till the case came to light

Gap increased between AMIT SHAH IS doses of Covishield vax MISSING: NSUI

However, the National Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation has suggested no change for the dosage interval for Covaxin

New Delhi, May 13: The Centre Thursday approved extending the gap between the two doses of the Covishield vaccine to 12-16 weeks following a recommendation from a government panel, and said it is a "science-based decision" taken with confidence that there will be no extra risk.

However, the National Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (NTAGI) has suggested no change for the dosage interval for Covaxin. the Union health ministry said.

"Based on the available real-life evidences, particularly from the UK, the COVID-19 Working Group agreed for increasing the dosing interval to 12-16 weeks between two

doses of Covishield vaccine. No change in interval of Covaxin vaccine doses was recommended," the ministry said. The present gap between two doses of Covishield, manufactured by the Serum Institute of India, is 6-8 weeks.

The Hyderabad-based Bharat Biotech's indigenously developed Covaxin and Oxford-AstraZeneca's Covishield, being manufactured by the Pune-based SII, are currently being used in India's inoculation drive against coronavirus.

The Central government's move comes amid reports from several states about shortage of COVID-19 vaccines. Some states and UTs have also reported that they had to suspend its vaccination drive for 18-44 years in view of the scarcity.

Sputnik V to be available in market next week: Govt

NEW DELHI: The Union Health Ministry Thursday announced that Russia's Sputnik V, the vaccine against the Covid-19 pandemic, will be available in markets across the country early next week. The announcement comes 12 days after the first consignment of 150,000 doses of the Sputnik V vaccine landed in Hyderabad from Russia, Sputnik V is developed by Russia's Gamaleva National Center. It will be the third vaccine to be cleared for use in India at a time when the country is in the grip of an intense second wave and demand for vaccines has shot up.

While Maharashtra decided on Wednesday to suspend its drive to vaccinate people in the age group of 18 to 44 years in view of vaccine shortage, Delhi also temporarily shut Covaxin-administering centres for this age group as it has run out

Several states and UTs including Delhi, Maharashtra, Karnataka and Telangana have also decided to opt for global tenders for procurement of anti-coronavirus shots with the domestic supply falling short to meet the rising demand.



New Delhi, May 13: Delhi Police Wednesday visited the National Students' Union of India office on a complaint filed by NSUI national general secretary Nagesh Kariyappa that 'Union Home Minister Amit Shah is missing'. The student leader Wednesday filed the report at Parliament Street police station alleging that the minister has "disappeared amid the pandemic and the citizens are in a crisis"

Kariyappa said that politicians were supposed to serve the nation and not run away from a crisis situation. "When the country is suffering from a deadly pandemic and the citizens are in a crisis, it is the duty of the politicians to be accountable for the whole country, said the complaint. Party's national secretary and in-charge of media and communications Lokesh Chugh said: "Until 2013, politicians were responsible towards the citizens, but things changed com"Now, the second most powerful

and responsible person in command is missing amid the pandemic." Meanwhile, Nagesh Kariyappa, asked: "Amit Shah is the home minister of the country or of only the BJP?" Kariyappa alleged the current government has failed and so, the NSUI filed a 'missing complaint'. "We are waiting for the government to present us with the answers," he said. When asked about the police

team's visit, the NSUI said they came to enquire about Chugh and Kariyappa about the complaint. However, the Delhi Police said the NSUI leaders had themselves called the police. "They had called the Police Control Room that the minister is missing. The police then went to the NSUI office to look into the matter," said a senior police officer. "This is a mischievous act and the police will not act on such a complaint," said another officer.

New Delhi, May 13: The Centre has filed a review petition in the Supreme Court in connection with its judgment conferring the President with the sole power for identification of a community as backward and its eligibility for reservation benefits.

The Centre has challenged the top court's interpretation of 102nd Constitutional Amendment in the Maratha reservation judgment delivered May 5. The Centre's petition has contended that state governments cannot be stripped their powers to identify socially and educationally backward classes (SEBC). The top court had upheld the 102nd Constitutional Amendment while denuding the power of states in this regard. "By introduction of Articles 366 (26C) and 342A through the 102nd Amendment, the President alone is empowered to identify SEBCs and include them in a list to be published under Article 342A (1), which shall be deemed to include SEBCs in relation to each state and union territory for the purposes of the Constitution," the top court had held.

New Delhi, May 13: Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa (BRICS) nations have converged on devising a multilateral framework on the issue of Social Security Agreement (SSA).

Social Security Agreement would help the international workers to port their benefit to their home countries thereby preventing loss of their hard-earned money, said the Ministry of Labour and

Employment. Further they will be exempted from contributing both in home as well as host countries.

The decisions were taken in the first BRICS Employment Working

Group (EWG) meeting in which the member nations resolved to enter into dialogue and discussion with each other and take the issue forward towards signing of the agreements. The two-day virtual meeting concluded Wednesday with India assuming BRICS Presidency this year.

The prime agenda for the discussions were promoting Social Security Agreements amongst BRICS nations, formalisation of labour markets, participation of women in labour force and Gig and platform workers --role in labour market.

The representatives of International Labour Organization (ILO) and International Social



Security Agency (ISSA), who also took part in the meeting, made valuable interventions and suggestions on the agenda issues. They also expressed willingness to provide technical support in facilitating conclusion of such agree-

ments. On the issue of formalisation of labour market, member nations

discussed various initiatives taken by them towards formalisation of jobs and how Covid-19 has enhanced informalisation risk.

On participation of women in the labour force, the member coun-





Lightning kills herd of 18 wild elephants in Assam

Guwahati/ Nagaon, May 13: Eighteen elephants died in lightning strikes at a forest in Nagaon district of Assam, a senior Forest Department official said Thursday. The incident happened Wednesday night at a hill in the Kundoli proposed reserve forest in the Kathiatoli range, Principal Chief Conservator of Forest (Wildlife) Amit Sahay said.

'The area is very remote, near the Nagaon-Karbi Anglong border, and our team could reach there Thursday afternoon. It was found that carcasses were lying in two groups. Fourteen were lying atop the hill and four were found at the bottom of the hill," he said.

The preliminary investigation found that the jumbos were killed due to electrocution caused by lightning, but the exact reason will

be known only after post-mortem, which will be done Friday, Sahay said. "Two Divisional Forest Officers (DFOs) and one Conservator of Forest have conducted the preliminary investigation. On Friday morning, another team with veterinary doctors will reach the spot and conduct the post-mortem," he dded. When asked how could such a huge number of elephants die together, Sahay said usually elephants stay in huddles in case of storms or rain. "Probably, at that very moment, lightning struck and the entire group got killed. I have asked the concerned DFO to provide more information like how many males or females were there. It will take some more time," he said.

Nagaon DFO Binod Dulu Bora said the Forest Department with the help of the Veterinary Department will conduct the post-mortem. "Now, forest officials have started



their departmental investigation of the case at the spot," he added. Villagers living near the hill claimed that the herd of the wild elephants was screaming unnaturally throughout the night and the cries faded gradually as the day broke.

Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma expressed concern over the incident and asked Environment and Forest Minister Parimal Suklabaidva to visit the spot to inSuklabaidya mourned the deaths

and said he would visit the site with Sahay and other officials Friday morning to take stock of the situation. Elephant expert Bibhuti Lahkar termed the incident shocking and said such cases are very rare and unheard of in the Northeast. "In open areas of some places like the African grassland such accidents have taken place, but

rarely in India. If we consider Eastern India, then one such incident took place at Jaldapara in West Bengal around 12-15 years ago, but the number of deaths was not so high," he said. Though officials are attributing the reasons to lightning from preliminary investigation, it is too early to arrive at a conclusion before the postmortem as the number of elephants dying is "simply too high", said Lahkar, the head of elephant conservation at NGO Aaranyak.

"If they really died due to lightning, then these are signals of climate change. Our climate has become erratic, thunderstorm, rain -- everything has become erratic. If we really want to arrest this, we need to save our nature," said the winner of the 'Heritage Heroes Award 2016' of the International Union for Conservation of Nature

Peak will come, virus can again emerge: Govt

New Delhi, May 13: As the country battles the second wave of Covid-19, the government Thursday said the virus may emerge again and so preparations have to be made at the national level in collaboration with states, infrastructure needs to be ramped up while curbs and appropriate behaviour must be followed.

Dismissing allegations that the government was unaware of the intensity of the second wave, NITI Aayog member (health) Dr V K Paul said, "We kept warning again and again from this platform that the second wave of Covid-19 will come." "It was said that the sero-positivity is 20 per cent, 80 per cent of the population is still vulnerable and that virus has not gone anywhere and other countries were also witnessing a resurge." At a press conference, Paul said, "The Prime Minister had conveyed the country about the emerging second wave March 17 without creating panic and had said that we have to fight it.'



"Was such a peak expected," he said, "well, no modelling can predict the size of a peak as the unexpected behaviour virus is well known." "So peak will come, the virus can again emerge, we know. So preparations have to be made at country level in collaboration with states, infrastructure has to be ramped up, containment measures have to be implemented and Covid appropri-

"We had not created panic. Other countries have faced multiple peaks after all it's a pandemic," he said. He said it is the nature of the disease that it will ultimately go to villages. This epidemiology is well known, Paul said as he urged people to follow Covid appropriate behaviour and embrace vaccination.

New Delhi, May 13: India added 3,62,727 new coronavirus infections in a day taking the COVID-19 tally of cases to 2,37,03,665, while the death toll rose to 2,58,317 with 4,120 daily fatalities, according to the Union Health Ministry data updated Thursday.

Across the vast nation, the devastating Covid-19 wave has overwhelmed hospitals with patients and crematoriums with bodies, and many coronavirus deaths are not being properly recorded as such.

"Even three to four times would be an underestimate," Anant Bhan, an independent health policy and bioethics researcher said.

Bodies of suspected Covid-19 victims have also been seen floating down the holy Ganga River.

The discrepancies appear particularly stark in Prime Minister Narendra Modi's home state of Gujarat. In Rajkot in the west of the state, the official death toll between April 1-23 was 154, yet the city's own health officials put it at 723. And in Bharuch, the official count for the same period was just

23 but there were 600 funerals. Gujarat's Chief minister Vijay Rupani insisted that the state was following guidelines from the Indian Council of Medical Research.

Those say only deaths directly caused by Covid-19 can be recorded as such, but not fatalities triggered by co-morbidities -- when a patient had heart problems and dies of cardiac arrest, for instance,

Even before the pandemic, just 22 percent of the nearly 10 million annual deaths in India were medically certified, and experts say the spike in funerals points to the same happening with Covid-19 fa-

'MASSIVE UNDERREPORTING'

The surge has pushed the Aishbagh Burial Ground in Lucknow, capital of Uttar Pradesh state, to the brink. Hafiz Abdul Mateen from the graveyard said it handled four to five burials a day before the pandemic.

"Today, 45 bodies of Covid victims have been buried here," he said in a statement.

"We've increased the number of gravediggers but that's also not enough as these men are getting tired and falling sick." The official figures for deaths in some other states including Uttar Pradesh and Harvana also do not align with the

number of funerals. Media reports have also suggested that the official numbers for the capital New Delhi also fall well short of the reality. Health economist and research Rijo M. John described the situation as a "battle for data, data sharing and transparency".

But a spokesperson for India's ruling Bharatiya Janata Party denied allegations of undercounting or political motivations behind the mismatch in fatality numbers.

Delhi, Haryana and Uttar Pradesh are among 10 states that account for 72.42 per cent of the 3,62,727 new cases in the country in a span of 24 hours, the Union Health Ministry said Thursday.

NHRC issues notices to Centre, UP & Bihar

Patna, May 13: The National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) has issued notices to the Union Jal Shakti Ministry, Uttar Pradesh and Bihar, after receiving complaints about several bodies found floating in the Ganga river in the two states.

"It (NHRC) has issued notices to the chief secretaries of both the states and the secretary, Union Ministry of Jal Shakti, today

calling for action taken report within four weeks, its statement noted.

According to residents in Ballia district of Uttar Pradesh, at least 52 bodies were seen floating at the Ujiyar, Kulhadia and Bharauli ghats in the Narahi area. Similar reports of bodies floating in the

Ganga have come from Bihar. In its statement, the NHRC said that it seems the public authorities have failed to take concentric efforts in educating the masses and checking the immersion of half-burnt or unburnt bodies into the Ganga. After Bihar's Buxar, several decomposed dead bodies were now found floating in the Ganga near Patna's Gulabi Ghat Thursday officials said. According

Vaccination race exposes India's digital divide

New Delhi, May 13: For anyone aged between 18 and 44, getting a slot in the expanded vaccination drive -- already plagued by shortages and political squabbles -- has been like buying tickets for a rock concert where popular bands sell out in minutes.

Maskara, like millions of younger Indians terrified by the current surge in infections, is rushing to get vaccinated against the coronavirus after the country this month opened up its inoculation drive to all adults. But the expansion came with restrictions, including only online registrations for the 18-44-year-olds, locking out up to half of population, particu-



larly in poor and rural areas, who don't have smartphones or internet access. Numerous states are also struggling with vaccine shortages. meaning there are limited slots available for the up to 600 million

people in the 18-44 cohort now eligible for jabs. So far, only three percent of the country's 1.3 billion people -- or 39.5 million -- are fully vaccinated with both doses. An additional 10.6 percent have received just their first shot. HACKATHON

Techies have developed workarounds to help users in some cities where slots have been opening up at random times of day and are filled within one or two minutes.

Berty Thomas, 35, a Chennaibased hobbyist programmer and business analyst, created a tool that alerts users via the Telegram messaging app when slots in their district open. It's already gotten more than 400,000 subscribers.

"My focus right now is to expand these alerts to multiple small towns and villages across the country," Thomas told AFP, adding that some users wanted to book for rel-

atives in regional and rural areas. "(Getting slots) has been an issue, particularly in the villages where internet is scarce. So the only way is... for people who have access to

internet to help those who don't." Local media say some families have even travelled long distances to secure slots for their younger

members NO INTERNET, NO VACCINATION

But for Seema, a house-help working in Lucknow -- which has been ravaged by the virus - getting vaccinated seems unlikely. "I don't have access to the internet. A few boys in my neighbourhood do have smartphones but they don't know how to use it for this (registration)," the 40-year-old said. "(The government) should think about people like us. Every day I run the risk of exposing myself to the disease as I work for three households. I wish I could get myself vaccinated." Experts say that the government should allow walkins at vaccination centres -- a measure already introduced for people above 45 years old. Authorities should also consider "taking vaccines to the people rather than having people coming to the vaccines", Ashoka University physics and biology professor Gautam Menon said. He suggested steps like mobile vaccination clinics in remote areas. "There needs to be a system for door-to-door vaccination. Those who don't have a smartphone -- what will they do?," the-26-vear-old told AFP at a milk store in Delhi where he works.

Gaza City, May 13: Hamas sent a heavy barrage of rockets deep into Israel in a matter of minutes Thursday and Israel pounded Gaza with more airstrikes.

The relentless escalation of hostilities came even as Egyptian negotiators held in-person talks with the two sides, intensifying efforts at mediation

Previous fighting between Israel and Gaza's Hamas rulers, including a devastating 2014 war, was largely confined to the impoverished and blockaded Palestinian territory and Israeli communities on the frontier. But this round seems to be rippling farther and wider than at any time since the 2000 Palestinian intifada, or uprising, and is tearing apart the country at

While some rocket attacks have reached the Tel Aviv area, Arab and Jewish mobs have rampaged through the streets, savagely beating people and torching cars. Flights have been cancelled or diverted away from the country's main air-

Gaza's Health Ministry said the death toll has climbed to 83 Palestinians, including 17 children and seven women, with more than 480 people wounded. Islamic Jihad confirmed the deaths of seven militants, while Hamas has acknowl-



edged 13 of its militants killed, including a senior commander.

Israel says the number of militants dead is much higher.

Seven people have been killed in Israel. Among them were a soldier killed by an anti-tank missile and a 6-year-old child hit in a rocket attack. A visit by Egyptian security officials was a significant development in international mediation efforts, which have been key to ending past rounds of fighting. The officials met first with Hamas leaders in Gaza before holding talks with the Israelis in Tel Aviv, two Egyptian intelligence officials said. They spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorised to talk to the press.

Biden signs order to beef up cyber defences

Washington, May 13: Alarmed at repeated cyber-attacks on the country especially after at a key fuel pipeline last week, US President Joe Biden has signed an executive order, implementing new policies to improve national cyber security.

The private sector must adapt to the continuously changing threat environment, ensure its products are built and operate securely, and partner with the Federal Government to foster a more secure cyberspace," he wrote in the executive order.

The company temporarily halted all pipeline operations after the cyber security attack involving ransomware was detected. It has now partially restored the pipeline.



Virus, Mideast turmoil stifle Eid al-Fitr celebrations

Jakarta, May 13: Muslims celebrated Eid al-Fitr in a subdued mood for a second year Thursday as the Covid-19 pandemic again forced mosque closings and family separations on the holiday mark-

ing the end of Ramadan. In the embattled Gaza Strip, the call to prayer echoed over pulverized buildings and heaps of rubble as Israeli warplanes continued to pound the territory in the worst outbreak of violence since the 2014 war.

Worshippers wearing masks joined communal prayers in the streets of Indonesia's capital, Jakarta. The world's most populous Muslim-majority nation allowed mosque prayers in low-risk areas,

but mosques in areas where there was more risk of the virus spreading closed their doors, including Jakarta's Istiqlal Grand Mosque, the largest in Southeast Asia.

Indonesians and Malaysians were banned for a second year from travelling to visit relatives in the traditional Eid homecoming.

In Bangladesh, however, tens of thousands of people were leaving the capital, Dhaka, to join their families back in their villages for Eid celebrations despite a nationwide lockdown and road checkpoints. Experts fear a surge in cases in a country grappling with a shortage of vaccines and fear of spreading coronavirus.

The Jakarta governor also ordered malls, restaurants and leisure destinations usually packed during



the holiday period to shut. While police set up highway checkpoints and domestic flights and other modes of transportation were suspended, anxiety lingers that people will defy the prohibition. Television reports showed city dwellers hiding on disguised trucks

or fishing boats and officers at roadblocks being overwhelmed by

As per FADA, total vehicle registrations in India fell by 28% to 11,85,374 units in April versus 16,49,678 units in March. Similarly, as per SIAM vehicle wholesales last month have declined by 30% to 12.70.458 units compared to 18.19.682 units in March this year.

Oil prices fall as

Mumbai, May 13: Oil prices fell more than 2% Thursday as India's coronavirus crisis deepened and a key US pipeline resumed operations, halting a rally that had lifted crude to an eight-week high after the IEA and OPEC forecast a rebound in global demand later in the year.

Brent crude was down \$1.75, or 2.5%, at \$67.57 a barrel by 1315 GMT, after rising 1% on Wednesday. West Texas Intermediate (WTI) was down \$1.80, or 2.7%, to \$64.28 a barrel, having risen 1.2% in the previous session.

If those losses are sustained, both contracts would mark their biggest daily drops in percentage terms since early April.

In a bearish signal for oil demand, a variant of the coronavirus has swept through the countryside in India, the world's thirdbiggest importer of crude. read more Medical professionals have not been able to say when new infections will plateau and other countries are alarmed over the transmissibility of the variant that is now spreading worldwide.

"Concerns are growing that the untamed spread of the coronavirus in India and in Southeast Asia will dent oil demand," PVM analysts said in a note.

"Its impact, however, is expected to be relatively brief and the second half of the year will see the healthy revival of oil demand growth.

Meanwhile, fuel shortages worsened in the southeastern United States, six days after the shutdown of the Colonial Pipeline, the largest US fuel pipeline network, following a ransomware attack.

CAIT TARGETS eCOMM COS

'Stop delivery of non-essential items'

New Delhi, May 13: The Confederation of All India Traders (CAIT) in a communication sent to Union Commerce Minister Piyush Goyal has said that going one step further, various e-commerce entities even in the ongoing Covid-19 induced national emergency are delivering non-essential goods in blatant contravention of lockdown guidelines imposed by various state governments.

The CAIT has also sent similar communications to Chief Ministers of all states urging them to take immediate cognisance of this violation by e-commerce portals.

The CAIT said that the sole purpose of the lockdown is to limit human-to-human interaction and reduce exposure of the general population to the Covid-19 virus and thereby break the chain of the spread of Covid-19. Therefore, all non-essential activities, including the sale and delivery of non-essential items, are prohibited during the lockdown by ordering the shops to close in all such states.

It said that as a part of "break the chain", the state governments

'We expect that with a hybrid work model here to stay, these trends will continue. Going forward we remain optimistic that the uptick in demand will continue once the second wave settles down. Diwan said.

Amit Goyal, CEO, India Sotheby's International Realty, said the demand for luxury and spacious homes went up significantly across the country post the first phase of Covid-19.

Goyal said the January-March 2021 quarter at India Sotheby's International Realty, one of the leading brokerage firms in luxury segment, was the strongest both in demand and transaction closures.



"With the current lockdown, ves there's a short pause, but we believe that the buying momentum will

make a big comeback, just as it did last year when the Covid situation normalised," he said.

Atletico move closer to title Gunners breach Chelsea fortress

Madrid, May 13: With the Spanish league title in sight, Atletico Madrid made sure it didn't falter. Gritty and determined, Diego Simeone's team moved closer to ending its title drought in Spain with a 2-1 home win against Real Sociedad Wednesday, taking a major step toward securing their first league trophy since 2014.

Simeone punched the air as he raced from the bench to the tunnel after the final whistle, and some of the hundreds of fans who supported the team from outside the Wanda Metropolitano Stadium set off fireworks to celebrate the cru-

"We could hear them," said Atletico captain Koke Resurrección, who played his 500th match for the club. "There are two games left but that's a lot. Everyone is losing points in this league. We have two finals ahead of us."

Yannick Carrasco and Angel Correa scored a goal each in the first half and Atletico held on after conceding late to open a four-point lead over Barcelona with two rounds to go. The Catalan club had stumbled again Tuesday, being held to a 3-3 draw at Levante to see its title chances dwindle.

Atletico are five points ahead of Real Madrid, who can get back within two points if it wins at Granada Thursday. If Madrid draw or lose, a home victory Sunday against 11th-place Osasuna will be enough to give Atletico the league title after a seven-year wait.

Atletico supporters will have to remain outside the Metropolitano for the possible title-clincher Sunday as only some regions in Spain will be allowed to have limited crowds in stadiums, the government said

Suarez, who has been key for Atletico after being let go by Barcelona last season, set up Correa's 28th-minute goal from inside the area with a nice through ball past defenders.

Sociedad, still fighting for a Europa League spot, pulled closer through Igor Zubeldia from close range after a corner in the 83rd and pressed for an equalizer until the end. The Basque Country club had already hit the post twice.

OTHER RESULTS

Celta Vigo defeated Getafe 1-0 to stay in eighth place and maintain a shot at qualifying for the Europa League next season. Getafe remained in danger of demotion, sitting three points from the relegation zone.

Huesca, meanwhile, moved out of the relegation zone with a 1-0 win over Athletic Bilbao, staying two points clear of danger.

Tuchel made seven changes to keep his players fresh, with Saturday's FA Cup final against Leicester clearly in mind.

Kai Havertz missed a great chance to put Chelsea ahead when he dispossessed Pablo Mari just inside his own half, raced in on goal and came one-on-one with Bernd Leno — only to blaze his effort over the bar.

Shortly afterward, Arsenal were ahead after Jorginho didn't realise that Kepa had moved off to the side and gifted the visitors their only real scoring chance of the game.

Powar back as Indian women's team coach

New Delhi, May 13: Former spinner Ramesh Powar Thursday replaced WV Raman as the Indian women's cricket team's head coach, regaining the position more than two years after he was sacked owing to a bitter fallout with ODI captain Mithali Raj.

The 42-year-old was recommended by the Madan Lal-led Cricket Advisory Committee (CAC) after interviewing eight candidates, including Raman.

"The Board of Control for Cricket n India (BCCI) announces the appointment of Mr Ramesh Powar as the Head Coach of Team India (Senior Women). The BCCI had advertised for the post and received over 35 applications," a BCCI statement read.

The others in fray were former India wicketkeeper Ajay Ratra and four female candidates including former chief selector Hemlata Kala. "Looking forward to take India women's cricket ahead. Thanks a lot CAC & BCCI for this opportunity," Powar tweeted after his appointment.

The CAC chose Powar for his clear vision for the team, said Lal. "He has been coaching for a while. His vision for the team impressed us the most. He has a clear cut plan for the team, what he wants do with it to take it to the next level. He also has full clarity on all aspects of the game. Now he needs to deliver on that," Lal told



It remains to be seen how Powar works alongside Mithali, who had accused him of bias after the Harmanpreet Kaur-led T20 team dropped the veteran batter for the all-important World Cup semifinal against England.

Mithali, in a letter to the $\ensuremath{\mathsf{BCCI}}$ after the event, had alleged that Powar 'was out to destroy and humiliate' her. Powar had hit back asserting that Mithali 'threw a lot of tantrums and created chaos in the team'

After being removed from his position in the women's team, Powar proved himself as a coach and earlier this year, led Mumbai to the Viiav Hazare Trophy after the domestic giants failed miserably in the T20 competition. He has also worked at the National Cricket Academy as a bowling coach.

Asked whether his acrimonious exit from the team and relationship with Mithali was discussed during Powar's interview, Lal said: "We did ask him about it and he said he wasn't at fault. He is okay working with all the players."

PSG reach French Cup final Mbappe scores brace, but Parisians needed penalties to beat Montpellier

Paris, May 13: Paris Saint-Germain led twice through goals by Kylian Mbappe but needed penalty kicks to beat Montpellier and reach the French Cup final. Although PSG's league title de-

fense is hanging by a thread, it remains on course for a record-extending 14th cup win. PSG plays the winner of Thursday's match between high-flying Monaco and fourth-tier Rumilly-Vallieres. Mbappe put PSG ahead in the

10th minute Wednesday, but the visitors were punished for wasting chances when striker Gaetan Laborde equalised on the stroke of halftime with a superb shot into the top right corner.

Five minutes after the break, Mbappe was given far too much space on the left to cut inside for his 39th goal of another prolific season. Poor defending cost PSG again,

just like last Sunday against Rennes,

But fans are still not allowed to attend amid coronavirus restrictions. Monaco last won the cup in 1991 and lost the 2010 final to PSG.

REBIC TREBLE HELPS **MILAN ROUT TORINO**

Milan, May 13: Ante Rebic netted a 12-minute hat-trick in the second half to help AC Milan rout Torino 7-0 in Serie A and strengthen their chances to qualify for the Champions League.

The two are two points above Napoli and three above fifth-place Juventus, which won 3-1 at Sassuolo. There are two rounds remaining in Serie A and the top four qualify for next season's Champions League.

Milan was without star striker Zlatan Ibrahimovic but Hernandez gave it the lead in the 19th minute and Samu Castillejo hit the woodwork before Franck Kessie converted a penalty in the 26th.

Olympic-bound race walker Irfan tests +ve

NEW DELHI: Olympic-bound race walker KT Irfan is among five elite trackand-field athletes who have tested positive for COVID-19 at the Sports Authority of India's (SAI) Centre of Excellence in Bangalore. The tests were conducted last Friday and those who returned positive have been kept under guarantine. A source said another male race walker also tested positive but his name could not be confirmed, "Four male players and one female player and four support staff tested positive for COVID-19," a SAI source stated. It is learnt that none of the female race walkers are among those who returned positive. The 31-year-old Irfan had qualified for the Tokyo Olympics way back in early 2019 after finishing fourth in the 20 km event of the Asian Race Walking Championships in Nomi, Japan. The SAI source said the whole hockey team training at the Centre other than one player has tested negative.

India retain top spot in Test Team rankings

DUBAI: India remained the No.1 Test side after the annual update of the ICC team rankings, released Thursday. India head the table after gaining one rating point for an aggregate of 121, having accumulated 2914 points from 24 matches. They are closely followed by their World Test Championship final opponents, New Zealand (120). The Kiwis have garnered 2166 points from 18 Tests. England (109 rating) have climbed a place to third at the expense of Australia (108 rating), down to fourth now. Pakistan (94) remained at fifth spot, while West Indies (84) have jumped to sixth. South Africa (80) and Sri Lanka (78) have dropped a rung each to seventh and eighth positions respectively, followed by Bangladesh (46) and Zimbabwe (35).

Djokovic cruises into quarters

Rome, May 13: The fans were back at the Foro Italico, the sun was out, and Novak Djokovic's game was clicking. The top-ranked Serb seemed to enjoy every moment of his 6-2, 6-1 win over Spanish qualifier Alejandro Davidovich Fokina that put him in the Italian Open quarterfinals.

After spectators were banned from the opening rounds of the Rome tournament because of the coronavirus pandemic, capacity was at 25 per cent Thursday as part of the Italian government's reopening plan.

"It was not good, it was great," Djokovic said. "I missed the crowd as much as anybody else — one of the biggest reasons why I keep on playing. So it was nice to see them back and hopefully I can stay in this tournament an extra day to expe-



rience the crowd more and more. They definitely gave me great sensations today on the court and I

Djokovic often trains with Davidovich Fokina in Marbella,

Spain. Perhaps that familiarity helped Davidovich Fokina break the top-ranked Djokovic in the opening

But Djokovic broke right back and quickly took control. A five-time champion in Rome — with his last title coming in September when the tournament was moved amid the pandemic - Djokovic is looking to boost his clay-court game before the French Open starts at the end of the month. It's been a rough start to the clay

season for Djokovic with a thirdround loss to Daniel Evans at the Monte Carlo Masters followed by a defeat to Aslan Karatsev in the semifinals of his home tournament, the Belgrade Open.

Djokovic will next face either Monte Carlo champion Stefanos Tsitsipas or Madrid Open finalist Matteo Berrettini — both top 10 players. "It's going to be a battle," Djokovic said. "Both of these guys are in great form.'

Also reaching the quarterfinals was 6-foot-11 (2.11-meter) American Reilly Opelka, who eliminated Karatsev, an Australian Open semifinalist, 7-6(8-6), 6-4. Opelka served 18 aces and won

52 of 69 points on his serve to record his third consecutive straight-set win this week — after entering Rome on a six-match losing streak that included dealing with a bout of COVID-19. In the women's tournament, top-

ranked Ash Barty beat Veronika Kudermetova 6-3, 6-3 and will next face American teenager Coco Gauff, who defeated Aryna Sabalenka 7-Sabalenka, who overcame Barty

in the Madrid Open final Saturday, committed more than twice as many unforced errors as Gauff — 놀 36 to 17. It's the fourth time this season that the 17-year-old Gauff has reached the quarterfinals.

Jessica Pegula, another American, followed up her victory over Naomi Osaka by eliminating (Ekaterina Alexandrova 6-2, 6-4.
