# Asks nothing, wants long term solutions

### PM MODI ANNOUNCES ₹500 CRORE ASSISTANCE FOR YAAS-HIT ODISHA


Bhubaneswar, May 28: Prime Minister Narendra Modi Friday reviewed the post-cyclone situation in the state at a meeting here where the Odisha government sought no immediate funds to manage the expenditure incurred in disaster management as the Centre is already burdened by the Covid crisis and demanded long term solutions to mitigate problems of repeated cyclones and provision of disaster resilient power systems.

The state stressed on long term solutions to the problem as Odisha is frequently hit by major calamities like cyclones, Special Relief Commissioner (SRC) PK Jena told reporters after the meeting.

Immediately after the review meeting which continued for about an hour, attended by Odisha Governor Ganeshi Lal. Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik. Union Ministers Dharmendra Pradhan and Pratap Sarangi, Chief Secretary SC Mahapatra and other senior officials, the Prime Minister left for aerial survey to the worst cyclone affected areas of Balasore and Bhadrak, on his way to West Bengal.

"Sought assistance for long term measures to make Odisha disaster resilient as we are frequented by such climate hazards every year. Highlighted Odisha's demand for disaster resilient power infrastructure and resilient coastal protection with storm surge resilient embankments," Patnaik said through his Twitter handle.

The Prime Minister was earlier received by Governor Ganeshi Lal, Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik, Union

Ministers Dharmendra Pradhan and Pratap Sarangi at the Biju Patnaik International Airport here.

The Chief Minister sought both a disaster resilient power infrastructure and a permanent solution to protect the coastal region from storm surges which accompany cyclones, the SRC said adding that Odisha has a long coastline of about 480 km of which above 200 km is vulnerable to tidal surge. Though the state has not demanded any immediate financial demand over the loss caused by the cyclone Yaas, the PM has announced an assistance of `500 crore for Odisha.

"As the country is at the peak of the Covid-19 pandemic, we have not sought any immediate financial assistance to burden the Central government and would like to manage it through our own resources to tide over the crisis," the CM had said earlier in the day

However, after returning back to New Delhi, the Prime Minister announced financial assistance of `500 crore to Odisha in the aftermath of cyclone Yaas. Modi said the Centre will deploy

an inter-ministerial team to visit

Odisha and West Bengal to assess the extent of damage, based on which further assistance will be granted. "We have to continue the focus towards more scientific management of disasters. As the frequency and im-

pact of cyclonic systems are increasing in the Arabian Sea and the Bay of Bengal, communication systems, mitigation efforts and preparedness have to undergo a major change "Modi said

The PM appreciated the preparedness and disaster management activ-

ities of the Odisha government which have resulted in minimal loss of lives. He also noted that the state has embarked on long term mitigation efforts for dealing with such natural

Cyclone Yaas, packing winds gusting to 145 kmph whiplashed parts of India's eastern coast Wednesday killing at least three people in Odisha and one in West Bengal and leaving behind a trail of damaged homes and flooded farmland, forcing more than 21 lakh people to be evacuated to safe shelters in the states of West Bengal. Odisha and Jharkhand.

After the havoc caused by the cyclone, heavy post-cyclone rains Thursday have seen river water levels rising above the danger mark, placing four districts of Odisha - Bhadrak, Jajpur, Kendrapara and Keonjhar - on high alert.

### Vaccine tender date extended

BHUBANESWAR: Due to poor response, state-run Odisha State Medical Corporation Ltd (OSMCL) Friday extended the last date for submission of bid documents of the global tender floated for procurement of Covid-19 vaccines. The date has been extended by seven days till June 4. The corporation has also extended the submission of online bid, technical bid opening and price bid for a week. The tender was scheduled to be awarded Friday. In a hurry, the state government extended the dates at the last moment. Health department sources said that the date was extended in view of requests from many prospective vendors, cyclone Yaas and to encourage greater participation. However, it seems that there was poor response to the tender for Covid-19 vaccines. In an aim to attract more manufacturers, the state government first relaxed the terms of the global tender document. Now, with this extension of date, it seems that the government is not able to get proper vaccine suppliers. Following the shortage in supply from Indian vaccine manufacturers, the state had decided to procure the vaccines from the open market through global tender to vaccinate the people of the 18 to 44 age group.

# Flight returns mid-air to Delhi after dead bat found in business class

New Delhi, May 28: An Air India flight to Newark in the US had to return to the Delhi airport on the morning of May 27 as cabin crew saw a bat's carcass inside the business class area of the plane just half an hour after takeoff, sources said

The plane had departed from the Delhi airport at 2.20 am Thursday and no one noticed the bat's carcass before the takeoff, they mentioned.

The cabin crew members saw the carcass in the eighth row, which is in the business class area of the plane, and informed the pilots, the sources said.

# India's Covid surge impacts COVAX supply

THERE WILL BE A SHORTFALL OF 190 MILLION DOSES BY THE END OF JUNE, SAYS A JOINT STATEMENT BY WHO, UNICEF, GAVI & CEPI

United Nations, May 28: The "terrible" surge of the coronavirus cases in India has severely impacted COVAX's vaccine supply in the second quarter of this year to the extent that there will be a shortfall of 190 million doses by the end of June, according to a joint statement by the WHO, UNICEF, GAVI

The joint statement was issued Thursday by Coalition for Epidemic WEATHER Preparedness Innovations (CEPI) CEO Dr Richard Hatchett, Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance CEO Dr Seth Berkley, WHO Director-General Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus and UNICEF Executive Director Henrietta Fore. "Countries that are advanced in their vaccination programmes are seeing cases of COVID-19 decline, hospitalisations decrease



and early signs of some kind of normality resume. However, the global picture is far more concerning," the statement said. Giving a call to action to equip COVAX to deliver 2 billion doses in 2021, the statement said, "We

are seeing the traumatic effects of the terrible surge of COVID-19 in South Asia - a surge which has also severely impacted global vaccine supplies.'

It added that COVAX has proven it works as the global mechanism for eq-

uitable access to COVID-19 vaccines, having delivered over 70 million doses to 126 countries and economies around the world since February. "However, the terrible surge of the virus in India has had a severe impact on COVAX's supply in the second quarter of this year, to the point where, by the end of June we will face a shortfall of 190 million doses," the statement said.

The Serum Institute of India (SII), the world's largest vaccine manufacturer, is key supplier of AstraZeneca doses to COVAX. According to the agreement between GAVI and SII, SII is contracted to provide COVAX with the SII-licensed and manufactured AstraZeneca-Oxford vaccine (known as Covishield) to 64 lower-income economies participating in the Gavi COVAX AMC (including India), alongside its commitments to the Government of India.

# All except Twitter share details under IT rules

New Delhi, May 28: Google, Facebook and WhatsApp have shared details with IT ministry under the digital rules but Twitter is still not following the new norms, government sources said Friday.

The sources said Twitter has not sent details of Chief Compliance Officer to the ministry and only shared details of a lawyer working in a law firm in India as their Nodal Contact Person and Grievance Officer. This has been done when the rules require such desig-

nated officers of the signif-

icant social media platforms to be the employees of the company and resident in

India, they pointed out. Most of the large social media platforms have shared details of Chief Compliance Officer, Nodal Contact Person, Grievance Officer with the IT Ministry as

required under the new rules. The sources said social

media intermediaries, including Google, Facebook, WhatsApp, Koo, Sharechat, Telegram and LinkedIn, have shared details with the ministry as per the requirements of the new rules. Twitter isstill not following the rules, the sources said.



# **Govt asks Collectors to vet Covid deaths**

Bhubaneswar, May 28: With death of Covid positive patients showing no signs of abating, the state government has directed the district Collectors and municipal commissioners to review these fatalities through an expert panel within 48 hours of the occurrence. In a letter to all the Collectors and

municipal commissioners, Health and Family Welfare, Additional Chief Secretary (ACS) PK Mohapatra has asked them to functionalise the district level committees to review Covid-19 deaths. The panels will also audit quality of care being provided in various Covid care facilities under their iurisdictions.

The role of these committees will be to audit the quality of care at Covid care facilities and review the death of Covid positive and suspected patients in government and private hospitals in the districts and corporation areas, Mohapatra said.

Further, the panels will also examine all the medical records of the patients while auditing the quality of care and reviewing deaths with a view to strengthening and improving Covid response system to save lives, he said.

The ACS urged the Collectors and commissioners to direct the officials concerned to convene meetings of district level committees daily or on every alternate day so that each death is reviewed within 48 hours of its occurrence.

In October 2020, during first wave of Covid, the government had issued a similar order asking the authorities to form such panels headed by an officer not below the rank of additional district magistrate (ADM). The other members would be chief district medical officer, an ICU trained doctor and medical officer of concerned treating hospital. However, the order was not followed by many of

# 510 roads cleared of blockages post Yaas

Bhubaneswar, May 28: The state government Friday said that it has been able to clear 510 roads after the devastation caused by cyclone Yaas in north Odisha.

The highest 328 road blockages were reported in Balasore district while the least of eight such blockages were reported from Cuttack.

The government said that a total of 2.074 trees were uprooted during the cyclone, creating the road blocks which have now been cleared by the district administration and other departments.

Balasore reported the highest number of uprooting of trees at 1,701 while the lowest such instances was reported from Cuttack district at 12. All the fallen trees have been removed from roads and other places, the government said.

Data was collected from eight cyclone affected districts of Odisha.

# Uploading of marks for HSC results starts today

Cuttack, May 28: The Board of Secondary Education (BSE), Odisha, will start uploading the marks of previous internal examinations on its website from May 29 to facilitate the process of publication of results for annual high school certificate (HSC) examinations.

The headmasters of mentor schools will upload the marks in the presence of the headmasters of all affiliated schools within 7am and 5pm. The BSE has asked the head-

masters of mentor schools to upload the marks with due care. "The headmasters of mentor schools will press the save button after entering the marks of students. Other teachers will verify the entries and press the update button. The headmasters will press the submission button after verifying the entries with utmost care," said the BSE instruction. The uploading of marks will continue till June 7, BSE sources said.

The board has asked the headmasters to upload the highest mark secured by a student in each subiect from his/her performances in the half-yearly and annual examinations of Class-IX and the second. third and fourth practice tests of Class X. The headmasters have

# SC hearing on CBSE Class XII exams Monday

New Delhi, May 28: The Supreme Court Friday said it would hear May 31 a plea seeking directions to cancel Class XII board examinations of CBSE and ICSE in the wake of surge in Covid-19 cases across the country.

A two-judge bench of the apex court comprising Justices AM Khanwilkar and Dinesh Maheshwari asked the petitioner, Mamta Sharma, to issue a copy of the petition to the counsels of Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) and Indian Certificate of Secondary Education (ICSE) and also to the Attorney General. The bench observed that some resolution may come out by

When the petitioner said she will serve the copy of the petition to the parties, the bench observed, "You do it. We will have it on Monday (May 31)".

The petition has arrayed the Centre, the CBSE and the Council for the Indian School Certificate Examination as respondents in the matter.

During the hearing conducted through videoconferencing, Justice Maheshwari observed that the CBSE is likely to take a call on this issue June 1

"Nothing will happen till Monday," the bench said.

When the petitioner told the bench that the top court can take suo motu cognisance of the issue, the bench said, "Be optimistic. May be by Monday some resolution will be there. Let us have it on Monday.'

The petition has sought directions to the Centre, the CBSE and the ICSE to cancel the Class XII examinations and devise an "objective methodology" to declare the result within a specific timeframe.

The plea has contended that due to the unprecedented health emergency and surge in Covid-19 cases in the country, it is not possible to conduct the examination and any further delay would cause irreparable loss to the future of students.

The petitioner also contended that the CBSE and ICSE authorities cannot remain "mute spectators" to the present scenario by not taking timely decision regarding the exams of around 12 lakh students of Class XII. The CBSE had earlier said it has not taken any decision yet on Class XII board examination even as a section of students and parents have been demanding cancellation of exams in view of the pandemic situation. The board had April 14 announced cancellation of Class X exams and postponement of\_ Class XII exams in view of the surge in coronavirus cases.

Bhubaneswar, May 28: Odisha's Covid-19 tally soared to 7,39,955 Friday as 7,216 more people tested positive for the infection, while 33 fresh fatalities pushed the state's coronavirus death toll to 2,651, a Health department official said.

As many as 4,041 new cases were reported in quarantine centres, while 3,175 infections were detected during contact tracing.

The number of fresh infections dropped below 10,000 for the second consecutive day this month as testing of samples also dipped due to the havoc wreaked by cyclone Yaas in the coastal state.

Cuttack reported the highest number of new cases at 1,091, followed by Khurda (809) and Kendrapara (487).

Angul district recorded the highest number of fresh fatalities at five, followed by four in Sundargarh and three each in Boudh, Kalahandi, Khurda and Keonjhar.

On May 27, the Health and Family Welfare department reported 34 deaths due to Covid-19, while 35 persons succumbed to the infection a day earlier—May 26. The department May 25 said that 33 persons died of Covid, while 32 persons lost their lives to the infection the day before.

The Additional Chief Secretary asked officials concerned to be vigilant during surveillance of families returning from cyclone shelters and people engaged in restoration work.

"Such people (those participating in cyclone management and evacuees) should also be sensitised to monitor their own health. In case of any symptoms, they should be immediately isolated and tested for the virus," Mohapatra pointed out.

In a letter to all university vicechancellors and principals of degree colleges, the department wrote, "The summer vacation as declared by this department will come to an end May 31, 2021. After end of summer vacation, the Higher Education Institutions shall resume functioning as per the earlier guidelines?

On May 4, the HE department had announced summer vacation for all higher educational institutions starting May 5 to May 31 this year. The state government had allowed holding interview of PhD and other research scholars on scheduled dates during the vacation. However, online classes and examinations were not held during the summer vacation period, said a source.

# Centre urged to lend 3.45L Covaxin doses

Bhubaneswar, May 28: In a bid to ensure seamless vaccination of those in the age group of 18-44 in Bhubaneswar, Health Minister Naba Kishore Das Friday urged the Centre to lend it 3.45 lakh doses of Covaxin.

In his letter, Das informed Union Health Minister Harsh Vardhan that the Capital city of Bhubaneswar needs 7,92,730 doses of Covaxin in a bid to ensure both doses to 3.96.365 people, including healthcare and frontline workers as well as the 45-plus age group.

"Odisha has till date received 9,86,780 doses of Covaxin under the Centre's quota and 1,51,500 doses have been allocated for June. The state will be left with 3,45,550 doses of Covaxin even after inoculating 3,96,365 people," Das wrote in his letter.

Under the state procurement, Odisha has been allocated 1,65,940 doses of Covaxin which will be completely utilized by end of May. The allocation of Covaxin for June is 1.64.370 doses which can only be used for second dose vaccination of due beneficiaries and no new beneficiary can be vaccinated in June 2021. Das pointed out, adding that 1,37,426 beneficiaries have been vaccinated in the City so far.

The target beneficiary of Bhubaneswar urban in the 18 to 44 years age group is 5.17 lakh for which 10.34 lakh doses of Covaxin is required, he said.

Stating that 1.65 lakh doses of Covaxin will be completely utilized for first dose vaccination by the end of May, the Health Minister said another 3.52 lakh doses of Covoxin is required to inoculate the remaining beneficiaries in the city "Bhubaneswar is a large urban

centre and presently has a high positivity rate of Covid-19 infection. Further, as a nodal point for air, rail and road communication as well as for commercial activities. Bhubaneswar always remains vulnerable to new waves of infection. It is therefore the priority of the state to saturate Covid-19 vaccination of the population of Bhubaneswar at the earliest," Das said.

He sought the permission to utilize 3.45 lakh dose of Covaxin available in Odisha under government of India supply for vaccination of 18 to 44 years age group in Bhubaneswar which shall be adjusted later on from state allocation.

# 74.9 lakh vaccinated in state

The Health department said that a total of 74,99,728 people have been vaccinated in the state against Covid-19. The department Friday was able to vaccinate 1,21,531 persons in the ongoing drive. A total of 666 active sites were planned for Friday.


Kendrapara, May 28: Though over two decades have passed since the super cyclone-1999 struck the state, the district administration here is yet to learn from its past mistakes and prepare itself for greater challenges, a report said.

The very severe cyclonic storm Yaas, which struck the state Wednesday, has again exposed the loopholes in the style of functioning of the district administration and its lackadaisical attitude in meeting the challenges posed by natural calamities. It is worth mentioning here that Kendrapara district is prone to natural calamities like floods and cyclonic storms.

However, neither the district administration nor the public representatives seems to have learnt a lesson or two from the past calamities in protecting the district and its people. This has laid bared the district administration's hollow claims of ushering in various development projects during the last 20

The district administration's approach towards natural calamities is limited to evacuation and relief distribution work. The issue crops up only when there is an impending cyclone or a flood threat in the district. Everybody forgets the issue once the problem gets over.

Reports said that over 55 villages in the district are marooned whenever there is flooding. However, neither the district administration nor the government is making adequate efforts to repair the existing

to threats of cyclone and tsunami The cyclonic storm Yaas made landfall near Bahanaga coast in Balasore, May 26, However, its impact was felt a day before the landfall. Locals said that the cyclone failed to cause much destruction at the seaside blocks such as Rajnagar and Mahakalapara as the wind speed was within 100 to 120 km per hour. The calamity might have wreaked havoc had the wind speed gone up to 185 km per hour.

Moreover, 1,05, 802 people were evacuated and rehabilitated at 974 multi-purpose cyclone centres. Locals Ganesh Chandra Samal, Radhakant Mohanty, Manoj Kumar Nayak, Chittranjan Sahu and environmentalist Hemant Kumar Rout have questioned the district administration as to what prompted them to shift so many people.

They claimed that this has happened due to lack of effective implementation of Centre and statesponsored housing schemes. There would be no need to shift so many people had people been provided with a house under the Awas Yojanas, they added. The government report published

after the Super Cyclone-1999 claimed that 397 persons died during the calamity. However, in reality the total death toll is more than 1,000. Moreover, every year people are losing their livelihood due to natural calamities but efforts are not being made to provide them with alternative livelihood opportunities. The rural job scheme MGNREGS could have provided jobs to the people during emergencies but it is in limbo due to lack of effective implementation.

When contacted, ADM Basant Kumar Rout said that efforts are being made repair the river embankments and creation of more mangrove forests in Bhitarkanika National Park to protect the coastline.

# What's proper, what's not?

rime Minister Narendra Modi's pep talk to district magistrates on the Covid-19 issue in an online meeting has got some raising the issue of whether it was right for Modi to interact directly with district magistrates and other officials while bypassing their respective ministers. Moreover, the event was telecast live when just a few weeks ago, the Centre had objected sharply to Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal for a live feed during Modi's meeting with Chief Ministers.

While seemingly there is nothing wrong with the Prime Minister addressing government officials whenever he chooses to, but the question is about propriety and federalism. District officials work under elected state governments and Chief Ministers and report to them as well. Bypassing the state governments indicates thumbing one's nose at the federal structure, which is problematic, it is being said.

Interestingly, Modi's interaction follows a similar meeting organized by Union Education Minister Ramesh Pokhriyal who spoke directly with state education secretaries, overlooking the state education ministers. This was one reason why the Tamil Nadu government boycotted the meeting.

### IAS, IPS officers use their medical skills

Taking a cue from Gujarat which took this step during the first wave of Covid last year, the Haryana government is using IAS and IPS officers who have a medical degree in the state's fight against the pandemic.

Sources say that five Haryana cadre IAS officers and three IPS officers who have MBBS degrees have been pulled off their administrative duties and have been directed to assist medical teams running Covid hospitals in the state. They have been deputed to additional Chief Secretary for Health Rajeev Arora for the creation and administration of 500-bed hospitals in Panipat and

Hisar and other related duties. The IAS officers are Dr Chander Shekhar Khare, Dr RS Dhillon, Dr Sangeeta Tetarwal, Dr Manoj Kumar and Dr Vaishali Sharma. The IPS officers are Dr Dheeraj Kumar, Dr Anshu Singla and Dr Arpit Jain. The state government



has also deputed 22 senior IAS officers to oversee Covid preparedness in different districts

No doubt, this is a temporary arrangement to combat the second wave of the pandemic. However, it also coincides with the growing demand by some medical experts and organisations that the government create a special all-India cadre of medical officers along the lines of the IAS and IPS etc. If this stopgap measure is successful, it might prod the Centre to seriously consider the demand for a specialised medical service.

# Two senior cops lock horns in Haryana

An intra-service battle has erupted in Haryana Police. IGP Y Puran Kumar, a 2001-batch IPS officer has filed a petition in the Punjab & Haryana High Court against the state police chief Manoj Yadava for alleged "discriminatory behaviour" towards Kumar.

Sources say that Kumar has accused DGP Yadava of "partial attitude, discriminatory treatment and violation of service rules". He has sought directions from the court to direct the Additional Chief Secretary for Home to take immediate decision on his complaints submitted against Yadava.

The spat does not seem to be new. Kumar has accused Yadava of targeting him since July 2020 "in a vindictive manner" ever since Kumar was posted to Ambala instead of another officer favoured by the DGP. Kumar has also sought directions from the court to restrain Yadava from writing his annual performance appraisal report until the petition is decided.

The feud at the top in the state's police service has happened at a time when the state is struggling with the Covid epidemic and also dealing with the farmers' agitation against Central laws, and which shows no sign of disappearing. And when two senior cops take on each other instead of the issues facing Haryana, it can't bode well for law and order in the state.



# Bustard

here was quite a splash in various British newspapers, lamenting what one described as the "final extinction" of the great bustard, a puzzling statement when reference books say it last bred in England in 1832. The real story was that a Wiltshire conservation trust had been trying for 30 years to reintroduce it, but had finally had to admit defeat. It was a sad announcement. It would be good to have it back in the British list again because it's so impressive: it's Europe's largest land bird, often weighing 25lb (12 kilos), the size of a turkey, with a fine courtship display in spring. Its breeding area is now restricted to Spain, northern Germany and the central European plain and it is only a very occasional visitor to these shores, one that causes great excitement when it occurs. It was once relatively common and was a prized dish, considered excellent eating; stuck with cloves, it was prepared by roasting or baking exactly like a turkey. Even the arrival of the turkey itself in the 1520s didn't change that opinion, it being described as "much prized" in the 1690s. But by the 1750s it was becoming rare and was called "this curious fowl" in a cookery book of that date. It was too easy to hunt for its own survival despite being a shy bird. It needed lots of wide open flat countryside of a kind which vanished the best part of two centuries ago in England. In the late eighteenth century the bustard was hanging on in the open turnip fields of Wiltshire, with reports of flocks of fifty or more. But by the 1790s it was said to be very rare and shortly after it vanished for ever from the English countryside as well as the English dining table.

But, focused as we are on the public-health crisis, we risk overlooking pandemic-related economic problems that could plague developing countries long after the wave has receded. At the global level, the

International Monetary Fund has warned of a "Great Divergence," whereby rich countries recover strongly while others flounder. Recent evidence suggests that several advanced economies, notably the United States, and a few developing countries, like Vietnam, Thailand, and Bangladesh, seem to be pulling out of the crisis and could grow faster than they did before the pandemic. But many emerging economies and low-income countries are likely to languish for a long time.

A Great Divergence is visible even within economies. The pandemic has punished sectors such as hospitality, travel, and tourism, and boosted others like pharmaceuticals, digital platforms, and networking technology. It is therefore not surprising that many rich people, including those who are good at navigating equity markets, have actually emerged from the crisis better off, while the poor have borne the brunt of its impact.

Therein lay the real danger. Unlike a pandemic that puts rich and poor alike at risk, the kind of economic crisis currently simmering in much of the developing world does not affect the rich as much and therefore does not generate headlines and is easy to disregard - that is, until it can no longer be ignored.

Sure enough, evidence of trouble is beginning to mount. Emerging economies everywhere face rising debts, and some, like Zambia and Argentina, have already defaulted. In 2020, Latin America's economy contracted by 7.7%; the Philippines and India took even bigger hits, registering growth rates of -9.5% and -9.6%, respectively. And the World

Bank estimates that the pandemic may have pushed up to 40 million people in Africa into extreme

The current wave of Covid-19 that began in India became discernible only in late March. Although systematic data regarding its economic impact are not yet available, anecdotal evidence paints a gloomy picture. According to the Centre for Monitoring Indian Economy, the seven million jobs lost in April caused the national unemployment rate to jump to 8%, from 6.5% in March. Moreover, youth unemployment in India already reached an all-time high of 23.75% last year.

The regular reports of dead bodies being dumped into the River Ganges and washing up in small Indian towns and cities indicate the tragic severity. But they are also tell-tale signs of a brewing economic crisis. For Hindus. not being able to acquire logs and find space to cremate the dead is

a desperate situation. Only in cases of extreme poverty would they abandon this effort and throw corpses into the river.

Another sobering account comes from the two women who run Nanritam, a remarkable NGO that operates a school and an eve hospital in a remote part of West Bengal. They told me how registration at their school is down to nearly half its normal level. Furthermore, the pandemic has forced thousands of the region's tribal chhau dancers and ihumur singers - whose only regular income is the Rs1,000 (\$14) per month they receive from the state government - to resort to begging. When Nanritam recently announced its usual simple relief dole for the poor living around their campus, the NGO was taken aback by some who walked and cycled for miles to get it.

But, aside from such evidence, official data are also beginning to flash warning signs. Last month, Indian wholesale price inflation

climbed to 10.5%, the highest rate in 11 years. This reflects mismatches in demand and supply, which, if not corrected soon, could become a major crisis, causing macroeconomic imbalances that can affect trade and financial flows. India has a highly capable central bank, but many of the country's current problems will be difficult to rectify through monetary policy alone, because they arise from poor governance.

India therefore urgently needs policy blueprints for dealing with the crisis. Policymakers should recognize that when basic goods such as medical oxygen, vaccines, or food are in short supply, pure financial interventions may not work, because the rich will be prepared to spend whatever it takes to get what they need (and more as a precautionary buffer) Providing the poor with cash support to make sure they can meet their basic survival needs will mean that the price of the good rises until the rich have what they want. The poor will thus be back at square one.

We see this kind of problem at both the micro and the international levels, notably with Covid-19 vaccines. Whereas many rich countries are buying up doses to secure ample stocks that go well beyond their basic needs, poor countries, including large parts of Africa, are left without any access to supplies.

Just as national governments in India and other developing countries have a lot to do, multilateral organizations such as the World Bank, the IMF, and the G20 also must act quickly to build up policy buffers and help coordinate support. Otherwise, today's looming economic threat will be tomorrow's front-page news.

# Break-up social media

tivity in the country be responsible to its people. We cannot forget that the East India Company had entered the country in the name of providing economic benefits from trade and in mere two centuries the share of India in the world income fell from 23 percent to mere 2 percent. The intrusion of Google, Facebook, Twitter and Whatsapp is deeper because a foreign-based company can manipulate the minds, not merely businesses, of our people to promote their commercial interests. For example, these companies are actively spreading the misinformation that India will be deprived of foreign investment if India imposes controls on them. They deliberately hide the fact that China continues to receive huge foreign investment despite having stricter controls than India. As of now, these companies take

controversial decisions. For example, Twitter had blocked the account of President Trump during the recent elections. Similarly, they had blocked certain stories put forth by the BJP saying they were forged. The question is not whether these blockages were right or not The question is whether Twitter

The sovereignty of the peotook these decisions to promote are grossly inadequate because its commercial interests or to protect the truth? Can the decision of "true" and "false" be left to the compulsions of commercial pursuits? Thus, the rules made by the Government of India for the regulation of social media companies are in the right direction. They are required to nominate a complaint officer, a governance officer and a nodal officer for being answerable to the government. The last is similar to the news-

papers in the country being required to nominate a person who would be responsible for the news that is posted. In a parallel move, the government has asked Whatsapp to put in place a system to track the origin of a post. Whatsapp has not complied so far. Its argument is that the messages are encrypted and it does not want to violate the privacy of the members by breaking the encryption. However, it is like the courier company that carries the packet not knowing the contents; but it can still trace the origin of the packet. Prof V Kamakoti of IIT Madras says that such tracking is possible without Twitter having to break the encryption. The rules formulated by the Government of India redressal mechanism which is much short of a pro-active accountability of social media to the people. The rules are like establishment of a police station. They are not like the elections wherein the government itself is made accountable. Yet, these are small steps in the right direction.

However, there is another danger lurking in the dark if the control of social media is wholly handed over to the government. For example, China has blocked all news relating to the possible origins of the Covid virus in a government laboratory in Wuhan. Or, would the Government of India be justified in placing restrictions on Baba Ramdev for him questioning the efficacy of allopathic medicines in the management of Covid? Lukashenko in Belarus and Min Aung Hlaing in Myanmar would like to muzzle the social media to oppress their own people. Therefore, social media has a huge positive  $role\ in\ providing\ information\ to$ the people outside the eyes of the governments.

We face two contrary objectives. On the one hand, social media should be accountable to the peo-

the garb of freedom of speech. On the other hand, social media should be able to bypass and reach the people despite the restrictions imposed by their governments - oppressive or not.

Facebook has constituted an Oversight Board to overcome the accusations of manipulation of content. As of now, the Board has some prominent and respectable persons as its members. They include former editor-in-chief of The Guardian newspaper Alan Rusbridger, Vice Chancellor of the National Law School of India University Sudhir Krishnaswamy, and former Prime Minister of Denmark Helle Thorning-Schmidt. Board began its work in October 2020 and its first four out of the five decisions overturned Facebook's actions. The establishment of the Oversight Board is welcome but that still is not accountable to the people of India. Therefore, it is necessary to establish accountability of social media to the people of India but not necessarily to the Government of India.

# **Delhi unlock process to** begin from May 31: CM

The process of lifting the lockdown will start with resumption of construction activities and reopening of factories for one week from Monday

New Delhi, May 28: Claiming that the deadly second wave of Covid-19 pandemic is under control in the national capital, the Delhi Disaster Management Authority (DDMA) Friday decided to start process of lifting lockdown from Monday. The capital has been under strict lockdown since April 20.

After a meeting with Delhi Lt Governor Anil Baijal, who is also Chairman of DDMA, Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal said the time has come when the process of lifting lockdown needs to be initiated. He asserted that people of Delhi have suffered a lot during this Covid pandemic and due to a month-long lockdown.

He stated those who are working as labourer and daily wage earner have lost their livelihood and it has been decided that these two activities will be opened from Monday (May 31).

"During the meeting, it has decided that the situation of Covid-19 is under control as daily cases and positivity rate have reduced now we have to focus on economic



activities as well. Many poor families have lost their livelihood due to lockdown and therefore, it has been decided that - two activities construction work and factories in Delhi will start functioning from Monday," Kejriwal said.

A senior official told IANS that operations of manufacturing, production units in approved industrial areas, activities where the workers are employed within Delhi would be allowed to function.

Addressing a digital press conference Friday, Kejriwal also said that, taking in consideration the number of Covid cases, the process of unlocking would be increased further.

"Every week, we will continue the process of opening slowly based on the suggestions of the public and on the basis of the views of the experts. If matters start growing again, we have to stop this process. Everyone needs to take precaution. Lockdown is imposed under compulsion... we do not want to impose," he added.

Meanwhile, he also appealed the citizen of Delhi that "not to leave the house unless there is a need. We all have to behave re-

In a second post, he said, "I heartily congratulate the flag bearer of the Indian system of medicine, Ramdev ji. He has started the 'Swasth Bharat, Samarth Bharat Abhiyan' through Ayurveda."

Speaking to reporters, Singh said Ramdev was pursuing 'Sanatana Dharma'

"If I retire from politics, I will take up the responsibility for its promotion," he said, and added that the yoga guru's argument was absolutely correct.

Sunday, Ramdev was forced to withdraw a statement made in the viral video clip in which he was heard questioning some of the medicines being used to treat the coronavirus infection and saying that "lakhs have died from taking allopathic medicines for

The remarks were met with

vociferous protests, following which Union Health Minister Harsh Vardhan asked him to withdraw the "extremely unfortunate"

A day later, the yoga guru posed 25 questions to the IMA in an 'open letter' on his Twitter handle, asking if allopathy offered permanent relief for ailments.

Amid the raging controversy, another video has surfaced on social media in which Ramdev is seen reacting to a demand for his arrest, saying "even their father cannot arrest him".

# **HC seeks Centre,** Delhi's reply on jabbing below 18

New Delhi, May 28: The Delhi High Court Friday sought response from Centre and Delhi government on a plea moved by a 12-year-old seeking for immediate vaccination of children between the ages of 12-17 in the city.

The plea contended that data from across the country, including Delhi, has revealed that between April-May, the number of reported cases of children infected and suffering from Covid-19 "has

risen tremendously' The plea said children have a fundamental right to be a beneficiary of the Covid-19 vaccines which are being promoted as "an easy, low-cost way to avoid the infection which may cause them se-

rious harm or death". A bench comprising Chief Justice D N Patel and Justice Jyoti Singh issued notice to the Centre and

Delhi government on the petition. The plea contended that it is pertinent that the vaccine policy against Covid-19 has failed to factor-in children or parents of children, who are a vulnerable section of society, for vaccination against the deadly virus.

The plea added that the evidence that unvaccinated children are more likely to develop a new, more powerful Covid-19 strain, is reflected in the prevalent 'second wave', which has infected many more children than the 'first wave' last year.

'The Respondents have failed to prepare a National Plan for children in adherence to the guidelines as given under the National Disaster Management Plan 2019, formulated under the Disaster Management Act 2005, which clearly recognize children and their vulnerability during a 'biological health emergency', such as the present Covid pandemic," said the plea.

The plea said there is enough

empirical evidence to show that

Covid-19 virus brings long-term

health complications such as organ

damage, long Covid, or multisystem inflammatory syndrome and death to at least some proportion of children. ognize the vulnerability of children during this pandemic and accordingly take all suitable vaccination measures for them,

# 'PM responsible for 2nd Covid wave' Covid daily count

New Delhi, May 28: Attacking the government for its Covid management, Congress leader Rahul Gandhi Friday held Prime Minister Narendra Modi's "nautanki" (theatrics) responsible for the second coronavirus wave and warned of more waves to come at the current rate of vaccination.

Calling on the government to quickly evolve a vaccine strategy for the entire population, he urged the prime minister to procure vaccines for all Indians and not indulge in a blame-game or find excuses. Addressing an online press conference, he said India is the vaccine capital of the world and it is possible to escalate the inoculation drive as only 3 per cent of the people have received their jabs yet.

Gandhi also termed the prime minister an event manager and said it is time for him to show that he can organise vaccines for everyone. "The PM is responsible for the second wave of virus, it is a result of his 'nautanki' and the lack of his responsibility that the people have entrusted him with." he alleged. "It is time for the prime minister to be a leader and display leadership skills and show courage



and Union minister Prakash Javadekar alleged that his choice of words like "nautanki" for the prime minister when Modi is working to curb Covid is part of the toolkit's script, referring to a controversial document about targeting the government

Javadekar noted that the health ministry had recently given a roadmap about producing 216 crore doses by December and how 108 crore people will be vaccinated, as he rebutted Gandhi's claim that it may take three years to finish the exercise, considered critical to curb the disease. In a tweet, Gandhi said, "Bring the country together. Shut the space for viral spread. Stop the lies. Vaccinate extensively.

During the media interaction, he alleged that the Covid death rate in India is "a lie". The government, he said, is trying to spread lies and suppress information and that is why it is lying about the deaths. He also urged the government to not give the virus time or space and change the strategy. This is not the time for spreading this lies, if we have to fight this war against Covid, the gov-

the truth, he noted. "My understanding and the understanding of experts is the current rate of vaccination of 3 per cent almost guarantees a third wave of virus when the lockdown goes, which is completely unnecessary," he warned. If the vaccination is at 50-60 per cent of the population. India would not have a third wave and certainly not a fourth or a fifth wave, Gandhi said. "The problem is there is no strat-

egy. The prime minister doesn't think strategically. He is an event manager. He thinks one event at a time. You don't need events now as events will kill people, you need a strategy. The aim of the strategy should be to shut the space for corona," he said. Going by the current pace of vaccination, the entire inoculation exercise will take another three years, till May 2024, and the country will witness several Covid waves by then, he claimed. Gandhi said the prime minister created space for Covid to spread through his actions.

According to the Congress leader, the lockdown, masks and social distancing are temporary fixes while vaccination is the permanent solution to COVID-19.

# below 2-lakh mark

New Delhi, May 28: The single day rise in coronavirus cases in India fell below the 2-lakh mark for the second time this month, while the recoveries continue to outnumber daily cases for the 15th consecutive day, according to the Union Health Ministry data updated on

A total of 1,86,364 new coronavirus infections were reported in a day, the lowest in around 44 days, taking the total tally of COVID-19 cases to 2,75,55,457. The death toll climbed to 3,18,895 with 3,660 daily deaths, the data updated at 8 am showed. The daily COVID-19 count in India last fell below the 2-lakh mark May 25.

Also, 20,70,508 tests were conducted on Thursday taking the total cumulative tests conducted so far for detection of COVID-19 in the country to 33,90,39,861. The daily positivity rate has declined to 9 per cent. It has been less than 10 per cent for four consecutive days. the ministry said, adding the weekly positivity rate has further declined to 10.42 per cent.

Recoveries continue to outnumber daily new cases for the 15th consecutive day, it said. The active cases have further reduced to 23,43,152 comprising 8.50 per cent of the total infections with a net decline of 76.755 cases in the active caseload in 24 hours, while the national COVID-19 recovery rate has improved to 90.34 per cent.

The number of people who have recuperated from the disease surged to 2,48,93,410 and the case fatality rate has increased to 1.16 per cent, the data stated. India's COVID-19 tally had crossed

the 20-lakh mark August 7, 30 lakh August 23, 40 lakh September 5 and 50 lakh September 16. It went past 60 lakh September 28, 70 lakh October 11, crossed 80 lakh October 29, 90 lakh November 20 and surpassed the one-crore mark December 19. India crossed the grim milestone of 2 crore May 4.

The 3,660 new fatalities include 884 from Maharashtra, 476 from Karnataka, 474 from Tamil Nadu, 187 from Uttar Pradesh. 181 from Kerala, 177 from Punjab, 148 from West Bengal, 117 from Delhi and 104 from Andhra Pradesh.

# Won't allow any unilateral change at LAC: Naravane

New Delhi, May 28: In a clear and unambiguous message to China, Army Chief Gen MM Naravane Friday said there can be no de-escalation without complete disengagement at all friction points in eastern Ladakh and that the Indian Army is prepared for all contingencies in the region.

In an exclusive interview to PTI, Gen Naravane said India is dealing with China in a "firm" and "non-escalatory" manner to ensure the sanctity of its claims in eastern Ladakh, and that it was even open to initiating confidence-building measures.

since the military standoff between the two sides erupted in eastern Ladakh May 5 during which there were fatalities on both sides for the first time in 45 years. They have made limited progress in achieving disengagement at the Pangong lake area while negotiations for similar steps at other points remained deadlocked.

Gen Naravane asserted that the Indian Army is currently holding onto all important areas in the high-altitude region and it has adequate personnel in the form of "reserves" to react to any contin-

"We are very clear that no de-escalation can take place before disengagement at all friction points. India and China have signed a number of border agreements which have been unilaterally breached by the People's Liberation Army(PLA)," Gen Naravane said. 'Though we want peace and

tranquillity at the Line of Actual Control (LAC) and are open to initiating confidence-building measures, we remain prepared for all contingencies. He also said the situation along

the northern border is under control and that the coming rounds of military talks with China will focus on restoring the status quo ante of April 2020.

"Indian Army is very clear that no loss of territory or unilateral change in status quo will be permitted. We are dealing with the Chinese in a firm and non-escalatory way, ensuring the sanctity of our claims in eastern Ladakh." he said

To a question on when a resolution of the standoff can be expected in areas like Hot Springs, Gogra and Depsang, the Army Chief said it was difficult to predict the timeline

# Efforts on to provide quota to Marathas: Maha govt

Mumbai, May 28: The Maharashtra government had not stopped its efforts to provide quota to the Maratha community, Chief Minister Uddhay Thackeray told MP Sambhaji Chhatrapati Friday.

# MHA invites applications for citizenship to migrants from 3 nations

New Delhi, May 28: The Centre Friday invited non-Muslims like Hindus, Sikhs, Jains and Buddhists belonging to Afghanistan, Bangladesh and Pakistan and residing in 13 districts of Gujarat, Rajasthan, Chhattisgarh, Haryana and Punjab to apply for Indian citizenship.

The Union home ministry issued a notification in this effect for immediate implementation of the order under the Citizenship Act 1955 and Rules framed under the law in 2009 even though the rules under the Citizenship Amendment Act (CAA) enacted in 2019 are yet to be framed by the

government. When the CAA was enacted in 2019, there were widespread protests in different parts of the country and even riots took place in Delhi in early 2020 in the wake of these protests

According to the CAA, Indian citizenship will be given to non-Muslim persecuted minorities from Bangladesh, Pakistan and Afghanistan -- Hindu, Sikh, Jain, Buddhist, Parsi and Christian -who had come to India till December 31, 2014. "In exercise of powers conferred under Section 16 of the Citizenship Act, 1955 (57 of 1955), the central government hereby directs that powers exercisable by it for registration as citizen of India under Section 5, or for grant of



certificate of naturalisation under section 6 of the Citizenship Act 1955 in respect of any person belonging to minority community in Afghanistan, Bangladesh and

Pakistan namely, Hindus, Sikhs, Buddhists, Jains, Parsis and Christians, residing in the districts mentioned and the states mentioned below," the notification said.


People who are eligible to apply for Indian citizenship are those currently living in the districts of Morbi, Rajkot, Patan and Vadodara of Gujarat, Durg and Balodabazar in Chhattisgarh, Jalore, Udaipur, Pali. Barmer and Sirohi in Rajasthan, Faridabad in Haryana and Jalandhar in Punjab.

"The application for registration as citizen of India or grant of certificate of naturalisation as citizen of India under the said rules (Citizenship Rules, 2009) shall be made by the applicant online," the notification said.

The home ministry said the verification of the application is done simultaneously by collector or secretary (Home) of Haryana and Punjab as the case may be, at the district-level and the state-level and the application and the reports thereon shall be made accessible simultaneously to the Centre on online portal.

The collector or the secretary. as the case may be, makes such inquiry as he considers necessary for ascertaining the suitability of the applicant and for that purpose forwards the application online to such agencies for verification and comments as may be required for completing such an inquiry and the instructions issued by the Centre from time-to-time in this regard shall be strictly compliedwith by state or union territory and district concerned, it said.

### Lockdown extended in TN

# Take care of kids orphaned by Covid: SC

New Delhi, May 28: The Supreme Court Friday asked the state governments to identify children who have become orphan due to the Covid-19 pandemic and take steps to provide immediate relief to all such children.

The top court asked state governments to understand the agony of children starving on the streets and directed the district authorities that they be immediately taken care of without waiting for any further orders from the courts.

A vacation bench of Justices L N Rao and Aniruddha Bose directed district administrations to identify the orphans in their areas and upload their data on the National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR) website by Saturday evening. The top court's direction came on an application filed by amicus curiae Gaurav Agrawal in the pending suo motu case seeking identification of or-



phaned children due to Covid-19 or otherwise and providing them immediate relief by the state governments. The bench said state governments must inform it of the position of these children and the steps they have taken to provide them immediate relief. "We have read somewhere that in Maharashtra over 2.900 children have lost their one or both the parents due to Covid-19. We don't have an exact number of such children," the bench said. It told the state government's counsel appearing in the matter, "I hope you understand the agony of the children starvpecially of the girl child.

"We are of the opinion that Centre and State shall get the latest information on the identification of children, who have lost their one or both the parents due to pandemic and the steps taken to attend to their basic needs", it said, and listed the matter on June 1.

Kolkata, May 28: In a surprise development, West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee Friday skipped a review meeting conducted by Prime Minister Narendra Modi at the Kalaikunda Air Force Station near Kharagpur to assess the damages caused by severe cyclonic storm Yaas that hit the state

The review meeting snowballed into a political controversy after Banerjee personally met the Prime Minister before the meeting and submitted a copy of the damages caused by the cyclone to him.

She even left the Air Force Station before the meeting commenced. Sources in the administration confirmed that Banerjee had asked for a separate meeting with Modi ahead of the review meeting convened by the Prime Minister.

Accordingly, a slot of 15 minutes was allotted during which Banerjee submitted a detailed report of the damages caused by the storm, mainly in three districts, to Modi.

Though there has been no official briefing on the meeting between the two leaders so far, sources close to the Chief Minister confirmed that the state government has submitted in the report that Bengal incurred damage to the tune of ₹15,000 crore due to the severe cyclonic storm. According to the state government officials. three districts faced the brunt of the cyclone the most -- South 24 Parganas, North 24 Parganas and East Midnapore. Digha, Shakarpur and Mandarman - the three major tourist hubs of the state -- were the worst affected by the storm.

In the 15-minute meeting, Banerjee briefed the Prime Minister about the damages caused to the agricultural fields, residential buildings, embankments and roads.

The Chief Minister then flew Digha to take stock of the situation. Before her brief meeting with the Prime Minister, Banerjee conducted two administrative meetings -- one at Hingalganj in North 24 Parganas and another at Sagar in South 24 Parganas.

Though the Chief Minister had said Thursday that she would attend the review meeting with the Prime Minister, things started to change news surfaced that BJP leader Suvendu Adhikari will also be present in the meeting.

Adhikari, who was informed by the Prime Minister's Office on Thursday night, reached Kalaikunda at 1 pm in the afternoon and is attending the review meeting. State Minister for Irrigation and Waterways, Somen Mahapatra, is expected to be attending the meeting on behalf of the state government.

# Pithani held, sent to 5 day NCB custody

Mumbai, May 28: Hindi film actor Sushant Singh Rajput's flatmate Siddharth Pithani was arrested from Hyderabad in a drug case related to the actor's death June 14 last year, and has been sent to five days custody of the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB).

NCB Zonal Director Sameer Wankhede said that Pithani was produced before a Mumbai court which sent him to the agency's custody till June 1.

Pithani was asked to join the probe, but he didn't, and following this, NCB officials gathered information on his whereabouts.

Wankhede said that the drug

law enforcement agency found that he was in Hyderabad and accordingly May 25, a team from Mumbai was sent there in search of Pithani, who has been long absconding.

NCB Mumbai team was assisted by NCB, Sub Zonal Unit at

Hyderabad, he said. He said that Pithani was arrested May 26 and his statement recorded. He was later produced before a court in

# Warning labels on junk food must to curb kids' obesity

New Delhi, May 28: Strong regulations to cap salt, sugar and other harmful ingredients and simple to understand front of package labelling (FOPL) on junk food packets can help curb the alarming rise in childhood obesity in India, say public health experts and doctors, in a webinar organised by All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) Rishikesh Friday.

Warning labels are critical to help consumers and parents understand how much empty calories and harmful nutrients are being consumed by children.

"Food labels should provide clear guidance. Simple to understand labels with evidence based nutrition cut-off is a need of the hour



and will go a long way to address the crisis of childhood obesity in the country," said Umesh Kapil, Professor, Clinical Epidemiology, Indian Institute of Biliary Sciences.

The experts also urged that India must rapidly adopt the World Health Organization (WHO) recommended limits and also introduce simple, smart and interpretative FOPL.

### MATTER OF CONCERN

'There is enough scientific evidence and a globally agreed WHO SEARO framework for evidencebased cut-offs for anti-nutrients like sugar, salt and saturated fat pres-

ent in packaged food," Kapil added. WHO has identified FOPL as "one of the policy tools that can support healthy diets, both in stimulating consumers to make informed healthier food choices and in driving manufacturers to reformulate products to avoid making unfavourable nutrient content disclosure.'

With more than 14.4 million obese children, India has the second highest number of children with childhood obesity in the world. By 2025 this number is expected to reach a staggering 17 million. As is the trajectory in other developing nations, the proportion of packaged and ultra-processed foods is on the rise.

There is growing evidence that the Covid-19 pandemic could potentially increase the risk of children becoming obese. School closures and lockdowns have already deprived millions of children of nutritional school meals, sports and adequate physical exercise.

# **SPURIOUS LIQUOR** KILLS 15 IN ALIGARH

Aligarh (UP), May 28: Fifteen people died Friday and at least 16 more were taken ill after allegedly consuming spurious liquor sold by a licensed vendor here, a senior official said.

The authorities have ordered a magisterial probe into the incident and suspend five excise officials while four people, including the liquor vend owner, have been arrested.

The inquiry will be conducted by an additional district magistraterank officer, DM Chandra Bhushan Singh told reporters.

The administration is likely to invoke the stringent National Security Act (NSA) against those found guilty, he said. Additional District Magistrate

(Finance) Vidhan Jaiswal told reporters that the victims are residents of villages under Lodha, Khair and Jawan police stations. 'While 15 people have died, 16 are

being treated in different hospitals," he said.

### **UK okays use** of J&J vaccine

London: Regulators Friday authorised another coronavirus vaccine for use in the UK amid concerns about rising Covid-19 cases as a variant of the virus first identified in India spreads around the country. # uote 77 China blames Britain for EU challenges TikTok over consumer rights India's woes in Kashmir

Beijing, May 28: In an unusual diplomatic move, China Friday lashed out at the British blaming them for India's troubles in Kashmir. In a series of tweets, the Chinese government spokesperson Zhao Lijian attacked the UK and its British imperialistic past, with respect to India and Indian Kashmir.

'If British India was the jewel in the crown of the British Empire, then Kashmir has been the biggest crack in it when the crown finally fell over on that land," he tweeted while quoting an article published in China's biggest and most influential state media, Xinhua news agency.

Xinhua is the official state-run press agency, headed by a member of the Central Committee of the Chinese Communist Party (CCP).

Opinion pieces published by the agency are perceived to be the official line of Beijing even as the CCP never owns it.

Zhao is the deputy director and spokesperson of the Foreign Ministry, Information Department.

An outspoken and fierce diplomat, Zhao is quite active on Twitter, the American micro-blogging site which is banned in China.

On Friday while sharing the article, he tweeted: "The British Empire fell, but the poison of hatred has been injected into the body politic of two peoples for decades to come. The land once as pristine as its famous Kashmir Sapphires was carved by innumerable scars, cracked by the greed of imperialists and soaked

The article had quoted David Cameron, the former UK Prime Minister to point out Britain's admission to the creation of modern geopolitical conflicts.

Cameron, the article mentioned.

in his response to the questions from students in Pakistan in 2011 had said: "As with so many of the problems of the world, we are responsible for their creation in the first place.'

But Cameron's "politics of apology" was trashed by both the Right and the Left within the UK, the article said.

"The imperial past is far from being dead. We should not be surprised when British foreign policy interests and interventions today are perceived by many as 'neo-colonial" in their nature."

The article in Xinhua was based on India's retired justice Markandey Katju's book, "The Nation".

However, the fact that the Chinese state media chose to reproduce the select parts on Kashmir, has political connotations given the fact that China itself has been an aggressor in Jammu and Kashmir.

# over consumer rights breaches claim

Brussels, May 28: The European Commission said on Friday it has given one month to the Chineseowned video app TikTok to answer complaints from an European consumers group over its commercial practices.

The EU's executive arm said it has started discussions involving the platform and the national consumer authorities following an alert launched earlier this year by the European Consumer Organisation (BEUC) about alleged breaches of consumers

The Commission said some contractual terms in TikTok's policies could be considered misleading and confusing for consumers, adding that concerns relating to issues including hidden marketing and advertising strategies tar-



geting children were raised. In February, the BEUC filed a complaint with the European Commission and the network of consumer protection authorities against TikTok. It argued that several terms in TikTok's Terms of Service' are unfair and said the platform, which is particularly popular with youngsters, failed to protect children and teenagers from hidden advertising and po-

tentially harmful content.

# Biden to propose \$6tn US budget for FY 2022



Washington, May 28: US President Joe Biden Friday unveiled a \$6 trillion budget for next year that's piled high with new safety net programs for the poor and middle class, but his generosity depends on taxing corporations and the wealthy to keep the nation's spiking debt from spiralling totally out of control.

Biden has already described, in general terms, major plans on infrastructure and he won a major victory on Covid-19 relief earlier this year. But Friday's rollout tallies up the costs and incorporates them into the government's existing budget framework, including Social Security and Medicare. to provide a fuller view of the administration's fiscal posture.

The whopping deficit projections reflect a government with steadily accumulating debt that has topped \$28 trillion after well over \$5 trillion in already approved Covid-19 relief, which would require the government to borrow roughly 50 cents of every dollar it spends this year and next.

With the government's struc-

Biden would use proposed tax hikes on businesses and high-earning people to power huge new social programmes like universal prekindergarten, large subsidies for child care and guaranteed paid

"The best way to grow our economy is not from the top down, but from the bottom up and the middle out," Biden said in his written budget message. "Our prosperity comes from the people who get up every day, work hard, raise their family, pay their taxes, serve their Nation, and volunteer in their communities.'

The budget incorporates the administration's eight-year, \$2.3 trillion infrastructure proposal and its \$1.8 trillion American Families Plan and adds details on his \$1.5 trillion request for annual operating expenditures for the Pentagon and domestic agencies.

"Together, these ... Will be transformational: Strengthening our economy, boosting American competitiveness, and delivering shared prosperity and economic security," said acting White House budget chief Shalanda Young.

# Lawmaker demands Hindus to be called non-Muslims

Islamabad, May 28: A Pakistani Member of the National Assembly (MNA) has submitted a bill and called on the House seeking to ensure that the country's religious minorities are referred to and identified as non-Muslims.

Keeso Mal Keeal Das, from opposition Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N), also issued a notice to the National Assembly Secretariat for introducing a private member bill under rule 118 of the Rules of Procedure and Conduct of Business in the National Assembly, 2007.

The MNA argued that the Constitution discriminates against Pakistani non-Muslims by referring to them as minorities.

'Inaccurate reference gives the impression of being second-class citizens," he maintained.

Keeal Das has suggested in the proposed bill that the act shall be called the Constitution Amendment Act, 2021, urging for it to be adopted and come into force immediately. "It is against the spirit of the

Constitution 1973, to discriminate against a large number of population by declaring them minority. when the sacrifices of that population are remarkable in every sphere of life of the prosperity, growth and bright future of the country," he said in his arguments and reasoning of the bill.

"The word 'minority' is used for four times (in the Constitution) while the word 'non-Muslims' is used 15 times, which reflects the intent of the makers of the Constitution. Therefore, the anomaly shall be omitted by substituting the word minority' with the word non-Muslims.

# Africa urgently needs 20mn vax doses for 2nd jabs: WHO

Geneva, May 28: Africa urgently needs 20 million doses of the AstraZeneca coronavirus vaccine to make sure everyone who has had a first jab can get a second within the recommended eight to 12-week window, the World Health Organization (WHO) said.

Another 200 million doses of any coronavirus vaccine are needed to get 10 per cent of the continent's population vaccinated by September, a news agency Friday quoted the WHO as saying.



WHO data shows 28 million doses from various manufacturers have reached Africa, which corresponds to fewer than two doses per 100 people. Meanwhile, 1.5 billion coronavirus vaccine doses have been administered globally.

"Africa needs vaccines now. Any

pause in our vaccination campaigns will lead to lost lives and lost hope," Matshidiso Moeti, WHO's Regional Director for Africa said. It is too early to say whether Africa is on the cusp of a third wave, she said.

"However, we know that cases are rising, and the clock is ticking so we urgently appeal to countries that have vaccinated their highrisk groups to speed up the dosesharing to fully protect the most vulnerable people.

France is the first country to provide 31,000 doses to Mauritania, said WHO.

# laws, reduces direct public vote

Hong Kong, May 28: Hong Kong's legislature has passed a bill amending electoral laws that drastically reduces the public's ability to vote\_ and increases the number of pro-Beijing lawmakers making decisions for the city.

The new law empowers the city's national security department to candidates for public office and sets up a new committee to ensure that the candidates are "patriotic".



The number of seats in Hong Kong's legislature will be expanded to 90, with 40 of them elected by a largely pro-Beijing election committee. The number of legislators elected directly by Hong Kong voters will be cut to 20, from the

previous 35 The bill, passed by a 40-2 vote, was met with little opposition, as most of the legislators are largely pro-Beijing. Their pro-democracy colleagues resigned en masse last year in protest over the ousting of four lawmakers deemed to be insufficiently loyal to Beijing.



### Uber to offer financial support

In the wake of the second pandemic wave, around 25 per cent of the business of the retail side across categories has been lost and this is going to impact the mall owners as well, according to Shopping Centres Association of India Chairman Mukesh Kumar.

# **Economy added 16.9L less** jobs in FY21: SBI research

Mumbai, May 28: Net job creation in the economy fell by 16.9 lakh in FY21 over the previous fiscal, shows an SBI Research analysis of EPFO payroll data. However, the FY21 numbers are better than the FY20 net job creation, which had declined by 28.9 lakh, further cementing the view that the economy is not creating new employment opportunities.

The latest EPFO data shows that net new EPF subscribers stood at 94.5 lakh in FY21, and NPS added 5.82 lakh, taking the cumulative net addition to 100.4 lakh, which is marginally down from 102.3 lakh

However, according to Soumya Kanti Ghosh, SBI's group chief economic adviser, "this does not represent the correct picture as the data include the number of exited members who re-ioined and resubscribed, and thus not fresh job

"An estimate of the actual net new payroll (first job) adjusted for re-joined/re-subscribed members and formalization (based on ECR data), shows the actual net new payroll is only 44 lakh is FY21. which is 16.9 lakh less than the net new payroll generated in FY20, when the new payroll declined by almost 28.9 lakh," he said.

Ghosh also said most of the 44 lakh additions are low quality jobs.

The second job (or the exited members who re-joined and resubscribed) rose by 17.9 lakh in

However, the number of new members who joined declined by 6.9 lakh in FY21 compared to an increase of 1.5 lakh in FY20. This indicates that lower number of people exited from job market in search for better/new jobs (which was obviously scarce during the pandemic-hit year).

"A breakup of the 95.4 lakhs job created by the EPFO payrolls, 41.2 lakh were through second jobs, 44 lakh through first jobs and 9.3 lakh were through formalisation," he said.

Ghosh added that the official numbers did not capture the 16.9

lakh decline in first-time jobs in FY21, though the number of second time jobs or those members who reioined the payroll rose by 17.9 lakh.

Even the rate of formalisation declined by 1.2 lakh, reflecting the disruptions in MSME sector

'Cumulatively, total payroll generation of EPFO and NPS was almost 19 lakh less than the previous fiscal," he says, adding in the private sector, most job losses were in smaller companies.

The ratio of women enrolment to total enrolment in the EPFO data was 23 per cent in FY20 and has not changed significantly in

According to him, the problem with the EPFO/NPS data is that it does not exclude the the number of retirees.

The latest World Bank data shows a deep compression in the labour force from 495 million in 2019 to 472 million in 2020, primarily due to the first wave of the pandemic.

# **RBI slaps ₹10 crore** penalty on HDFC Bank

Mumbai, May 28: The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has imposed a penalty of ₹10 crore on ĤDFC Bank Ltd for deficiencies in regulatory compliance. The central bank said that the penalty has been imposed as actions of HDFC Bank were found in contravention of provisions of section 6(2) and section 8 of the Banking Regulation Act, 1949.

This action is based on deficiencies in regulatory compliance and is not intended to pronounce upon the validity of any transaction or agreement entered into by the bank with its customers, the RBI said in a statement.

An examination of documents in the matter of marketing and sale of third-party non-financial products to the bank's customers, arising from a whistle blower complaint to RBI regarding irregularities in the auto loan portfolio of the bank, revealed, inter alia, contravention of the afore-said provisions of the Act and the regulatory directions, it said.

Notice was subsequently issued to the bank advising it to show cause as to why penalty should not be imposed for contravention of the provisions of the Act/direc-

After considering the bank's reply to the show cause notice, oral submissions made during the personal hearing and examination of further clarifications and documents furnished by the bank, the RBI came to the conclusion that the aforesaid charge of contravention of provisions of the Act was substantiated and warranted imposition of monetary penalty, the RBI statement said

# **GST Council** leaves tax rate on vaccines unchanged

New Delhi, May 28: The GST Council Friday left taxes on Covid-19 vaccines and medical supplies unchanged but exempted duty on import of a medicine used for treatment of black fungus. A group of ministers will deliberate on tax structure on the vaccine and medical supplies, Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman told reporters after a meeting of the GST Council.

The GST Council, which is headed by the Union Finance Minister and comprises representatives of all states and union territories, exempted levy of I-GST on import of Amphotericin-B, which is used for the treatment of black fungus. Currently, vaccines attract 5 per cent GST.

Sitharaman said the Council decided to continue a waiver of I-GST on free Covid-19 related supplies imported from abroad.

Also, the panel decided that the Centre will borrow ₹1.58 lakh crore and pass it on to the states to make up for the shortfall in their revenues from the implementation of

A special session of the Council will be held soon to consider extending the five-year GST shortfall compensation period to states beyond 2022. The panel provided relief to small GST taxpayers through an amnesty scheme for late return filers.

State finance minister Niranjan Pujari, Ashok Meena, Principal secretary, finance Department and Sushil Kumar Lohani, Commissioner of CT GST, Odisha had also attended the meeting.

Pujari raised the issue of reduction in tax rates on items re quired for Covid management like vaccines so that the burden on common people and states in procuring these items comes down. He highlighted that chief minister of Odisha has already written to Union Finance Minister earlier this month in this regard requesting GST council to consider the matter on priority in view of urgency

# DoT allocates spectrum for 5G trials to telecom operators



New Delhi, May 28: The Department of Telecom (DoT) has allocated spectrum to telecom operators to start 5G trials in the country, sources said. The trials will be conducted at various locations including Delhi, Mumbai, Kolkata, Bangalore, Gujarat, Hyderabad, among others, according to industry sources.

"Telecom operators have been allocated spectrum in 700 Mhz band, 3.3-3.6 gigahertz (Ghz) band and 24.25-28.5 Ghz band across various locations," a telecom company official said.

On May 4, DoT had approved applications from Reliance Jio, Bharti Airtel, Vodafone Idea and MTNL for conducting 5G trials without using technologies from Chinese companies.

is expected to deliver ten times better download speed than that of 4G and up to three times greater spectrum efficiency. During the trials, application of 5G in Indian settings will get

tested. This includes tele-medicine, tele-education and dronebased agriculture monitoring etc. Telecom operators will be able to test various 5G devices on their network.

The duration of the trials, at present, is for a period of 6 months. This includes a time period of 2 months for procurement and setting up of the equipment.



Furthermore, Tuchel's commitment to solid defensive foundations has seen the Blues also ship just four goals in their 12 Champions League games so far – although Frank Lampard can take some credit for that - and Porto's inconsequential 1-0 win in the quarterfinal second leg is their only defeat in the tournament this season.

With the demons of four consecutive last-16 finishes firmly banished, Chelsea's trigger-happy hierarchy can surely look ahead to a bright future under Tuchel after his overwhelmingly successful time in the dugout, although the story could have panned out a lot differently had the

Blues slipped out of the top four.



# Olympic hopes end Yates wins Stage 19 of Giro d'Italia Amit, Shiva in Asian meet finals for Srikanth, Saina

New Delhi, May 28: Kidambi Srikanth and Saina Nehwal's slim hopes of qualifying for Tokyo Games ended after the game's governing body (BWF) Friday made it clear there will not be any change in the current ranking list and no further tournament will be held inside the qualification period.

Former World No.1 Srikanth and London Games bronze-medallist Saina's hopes were all but dashed when the last of the Olympic qualifiers in Singapore was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The duo had hung on a slim hope when the governing body said it 'will issue a further statement on Tokyo Olympics qualifying at a later date'. "The Badminton World Federation (BWF) can confirm no further tournaments will be played inside the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games qualifying window," the apex body said in a statement Friday.

"As such, while the qualification period officially closes 15 June 2021 as per the Revised Tokyo Qualification System, the current Race To Tokyo rankings list will not change.'

Owing to the health crisis, the world body had earlier revised the qualification period, extending it by nearly two months to June 15

However, with no respite from the pandemic, BWF was forced to cancel or postpone the last three qualifiers-India Open, Malaysia Open and Singapore Open, leaving players, including Srikanth and Saina, with no chance to earn a qualification.

"The Olympic qualification process is in effect closed as there are no additional opportunities for players to earn points," BWF secretary general Thomas Lund said.

"However, we still need to receive confirmations from National Olympic Committees and Member Associations, followed by any possible reallocations, and this will take a

number of weeks to complete." According to the qualification rules, the top 16 players – a maximum of two players each in men's and women's singles from a country -

as June 15 will gain direct entries. The BWF said 'invitations will be sent shortly with final participation lists and seedings to be published at the conclusion of this

Indian shuttlers who have already made the cut for the Olympics include PV Sindhu, B Sai Praneeth and the men's doubles pairing of Chirag Shetty and Satwiksairaj Rankireddy.

It was heartbreak for two-time world youth champion Sakshi Choudhary (54kg) as she lost her final spot after her rival, top-seeded Kazakh Dina Zholaman, successfully challenged the narrow victory that she had clinched in the lastfour stage. Sakshi had prevailed 3-2 in the regulation bout but the decision was challenged by the Kazakh team and eventually overturned.



# WTC final: Joint winners in case of draw/tie

Dubai, May 28: India and New Zealand will be adjudged joint winners of the inaugural World Test Championship (WTC) if their final clash in Southampton ends in a draw or tie, the International Cricket Council (ICC) said Friday.

According to the playing conditions unveiled by the global body, "a draw or a tie will see both teams crowned as joint winners.

The ICC has also allocated a Reserve Day to make up for any lost time during the regular days of the Final, scheduled to be played from 18 to 22 June, with 23 June set aside as the Reserve Day.

SHORT RUNS: The third umpire will automatically review any call of a 'short run' by the on-field umpire and communicate the decision prior to the next ball being bowled

PLAYER REVIEWS: The fielding captain or the dismissed batsman will be able confirm with the umpire whether a genuine attempt has been made to play the ball prior to deciding whether to initiate a review for LBW

DRS REVIEWS: For LBW reviews, the height margin of the wicket zone has been lifted to the top of the stumps to ensure the same 'Umpire's Call' margin around the stumps for both height and width

"Both of these decisions were made in June 2018, prior to the

commencement of the ICC World Test Championship." The Reserve Day has been scheduled to ensure five full days of play, and it will only be used if lost play-

ing time cannot be recovered through

the normal provisions for each day. "There will be no additional day's play if a positive result is not achieved after five full days of play and the match will be declared a draw in such a scenario," the

ICC stated. In the event of time being lost during the match, the ICC match referee will regularly update the teams and media about the way in which the Reserve Day may be used.

The final decision on whether the Reserve Day needs to be used will be announced at the scheduled start of the last hour on the fifth day.

While India play at home with SG Test and New Zealand use Kookaburra at home, the final will be played with Grade 1 Dukes balls.

The final will also feature the implementation of three changes to international playing conditions, which were brought into effect with the ongoing World Cup Super League series between Bangladesh and Sri Lanka:

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
