

'NABA JAUBAN DARSHAN' SANS DEVOTEES



Deities worshipped in their youthful appearances after 14-day quarantine

Puri, July 9: The 'Naba Jauban Darshan' of the sibling deities, during which they are worshipped in their youthful appearances after spending 14 days in 'Anasara Ghara' or quarantine, was held at Srimandir in the absence of devotees.

The state government announced the imposition of curfew in Puri town from July 11. The curfew will be imposed at 8 pm July 11, a day before Rath Yatra, and continue till 8 am July 13, as per a notification issued by the Special Relief Commissioner's office.

Rath Yatra will be held July 12. All the entry points to Puri town will be sealed, officials said, adding that the restrictions are being imposed to keep devotees at bay in the wake of the Covid-19 pandemic. The restrictions may be further extended in the town, said Sub-Collector Bhabataran Sahoo.

The weekend shutdown, imposed in 10 coastal districts with high test positivity rates till July 16, will be eased for Puri town, as per the notification.

"Now, in view of imposition of curfew in Puri town from 8 pm of 11.07.2021 to 8 pm of 13.07.2021 by the district administration for Rath Yatra and in the interest of the general public, the said shutdown order is partially modified exempting Puri town from the shutdown on 10.01.2021 (Saturday)," it said.

The Trinity -- Lord Jagannath, Lord Balabhadra and Devi Subhadra -- during the 'Naba Jauban Darshan' reappeared after spending 14 days in the 'Anasara Ghara'. However, devotees missed the rituals as no one was allowed entry into the shrine due to the pandemic. The state government has appealed to the people not to visit Puri during the festival, and instead watch the live broadcast of the Rath Yatra on TV.



India needs uniform civil code, says HC

New Delhi, July 9: The Delhi High Court Friday said there is a need for a uniform civil code in the country.

The court observed that youths of modern India belonging to various communities, tribes, castes or religions who solemnise their marriages ought not to be forced to struggle with issues arising out of conflicts in various personal laws.

The court said that the hope expressed in Article 44 of the Constitution that the state shall secure for its citizens uniform civil code "ought not to remain a mere hope." A single bench of Justice Prathiba M. Singh said the need for a uniform civil code as envisioned under Article 44, has been reiterated from time to time by the Supreme Court. "The

need for such a code - 'common to all', would enable uniform principles being applied in respect of aspects such as marriage, divorce, succession etc., so that settled principles, safeguards and procedures can be laid down and citizens are not made to struggle due to the conflicts and contradictions in various personal laws, the bench added.

She said courts have been repeatedly confronted with the conflicts that arise in personal laws, and persons belonging to various communities, castes and religions, who forge marital bonds, struggle with such conflicts.

The court emphasised that in modern Indian society which is gradually becoming homogenous, the traditional barriers of religion, community and caste are slowly dissipating.

FIRE AT BANGLADESH FOOD FACTORY KILLS 52

DHAKA: At least 52 people were killed and scores wounded as a massive fire overnight engulfed a multistoried food and beverage factory on the outskirts of Bangladesh's capital, officials said Friday. Fire service officials and witnesses said the blaze broke out Thursday evening and tore through the factory at the Rupganj area of Narayanganj. Residents in the neighbourhood said most of the factory workers were teenagers. "Fifty two people have been killed so far but we fear more bodies were inside and a search operation is under way," an official told reporters at the scene, nearly 25 kilometres east of Dhaka. Fire service officials said 49 bodies have been recovered from the building while others succumbed to their wounds on way to or at hospitals, where many were being treated for critical wounds. Television footage showed the fire was still burning at the six-story structure, emitting thick smoke.

New Delhi/Kochi, July 9: The Supreme Court Friday refused to stay proceedings in connection with petitions challenging the constitutional validity of the Centre's new IT rules before various high courts.

The Centre had moved the Supreme Court seeking transfer of all petitions to it, citing multiplicity of proceedings. Several high courts, including Delhi, Bombay, Madras and Kerala High Courts are hearing petitions against the new IT rules

In its plea, the Centre said, the issue of regulating the OTT platform was pending before the top court.

A bench comprising Justices AM Khanwilkar and Sanjiv Khanna tagged the central government petition, seeking transfer of all such cases to the top court, with an appeal filed by Justice for Rights Foundation, which is pending before the court.

The bench also refused to pass a direction for an interim stay on the proceedings before various high courts hearing pleas challenging the Information Technology (Intermediary Guidelines and Digital Media Ethics Code) Rules, 2021. Meanwhile, the Kerala High Court

New IT rules: Setback for

Friday directed the Centre not to take any coercive action against the members of News Broadcasters Association (NBA), which represents several news channels, over non-compliance of the new IT rules.

Justice PB Suresh Kumar also issued notice to the Centre and sought its stand on the plea by the NBA which has contended that the new IT rules give government authorities "excessive powers" to "unreasonably and impermissibly restrict" the freedom of speech and expression of the media.

Senior advocate Maninder Singh, who appeared for the NBA, said that under the new IT rules, a joint secretary would be heading the oversight mechanism which would supervise the self-regulatory body headed by a retired judge.

Under the rules, media companies or their associations have to form self-regulatory bodies which would be headed by a retired judge of the Supreme Court or high courts or an eminent person.

Singh contended that as a result a joint secretary would be supervising orders of a retired judge.

In its petition, filed through advocate Nisha Bhambhani, the NBA has said the Information Technology (Intermediary Guidelines & Digital Media Ethics Code) Rules, 2021, are ultra vires to the Information Technology Act, 2000 apart from being violative of Article 14 (equality before law) and 19(1)(g) (right to freedom to practise any profession, or to carry on any occupation, trade or business) of the Constitution.

It has challenged Part III (Code of Ethics and Procedure and Safeguards in relation to Digital Media) of the IT rules on the ground that they create an "oversight mechanism giving the executive unfettered, unbridled and excessive powers to regulate content of digital news media.

"The grievance redressal mechanism created and the powers delegated have a 'chilling effect' on the content of the media.

The writ (petition) also states that the executive by creating such a structure, has made inroads into judicial power and vested itself with powers reserved exclusively for the judiciarv and such exercise of power is without jurisdiction.

Record 61 Covid deaths in state

Bhubaneswar, July 9: Odisha Friday reported record 61 Covid-19 deaths and 2,806 more cases, a Health Department official said.

The state's Covid-19 toll climbed to 4,476 with the latest deaths, he said. 'This list does not reflect deaths

occurring on a particular day. It gives details of past deaths for which the death audit process has been duly completed and the cause of death has been identified as due to Covid-19." the state Health Department tweeted.

Khurda accounted for 11 of the lat est deaths, followed by Bargarh, Ganjam, Mayurbhanj and Puri districts (six each).

Besides, 53 other Covid-19 patients have succumbed due to comorbidi-

ties, the official said. The state has so far reported 9,35,136 Covid-19 cases.

Of the new infections, 1,613 were detected at quarantine centres while the rest 1,193 were local contact cases. Khurda district reported the highest 590 new cases, followed by Cuttack (441), Jajpur (252), Balasore (153) and

Puri (138). There are 27,429 active

cases in the state at present.

There are 5,001 active cases in Khurda and 4,169 in Cuttack, because of which these two districts are in the 'Red Zone'. In the last 24 hours, 2,896 patients recovered, taking the total number of recoveries to 9,03,178. The new cases were detected after testing 78,560 samples.

With the Taliban having routed much of northern Afghanistan in recent weeks, the government is holding little more than a constellation of provincial capitals that must be largely reinforced and resupplied by air.

Afghan commandos have clashed with the insurgents this week in a provincial capital for the first time, with thousands of people fleeing Qalai-Naw in northwest Badghis province.

President Ashraf Ghani said the government could handle the situation, but admitted difficulties lay ahead. "What we are witnessing is one of the most complicated stages of the transition," he said in a speech in Kabul.



POOR ENROLMENT PROMPTS STATE GOVT TO CLOSE DOWN


1,000 schools either merged or shut

Bhubaneswar, July 9: Even as the Covid-19 pandemic has caused severe damage to the education system in the country, the students in Odisha are facing a challenge of a different kind. The state government has been on a spree to shut schools with poor enrolment.

It started in 2014 when close to 200 schools with low student strength were shut. In 2019, nearly 1,000 schools with less than 10 students were either merged or closed down. In fact, the state government had planned to shut around 14,000 schools in phases, but the number was reduced to half last year after the issue was taken up by the Right to Education (RTE) Forum and opposition parties.

Debendra Mahakud, 9, is a Class IV student of Saharasahi Primary School under Kaptipada block of Mayurbhani, The school is barely 100 metres from his house. Prior to the establishment of this school, the village children had to cross a patch of forest to attend the nearest school in a nearby village. To ward off inconvenience in commuting, the state government had established Saharasahi School a decade back. But now, the primary school faces closure due to poor student strength. The next option for Debendra is an-

Shehnaz, a Class VI student, explained the low enrolment problem. She was studying in Raghunathpur Primary School in Dharamshala block of Jajpur but opted out in 2018. She said the school had only one teacher and they didn't have regular classes. Like her, many other students withdrew their admission and got themselves enrolled in another school

2 km away from their village. In 2019, the school was shut down due to low student strength.

While Shehnaz is among the fortunate ones whose parents have agreed to send their daughter to school despite the distance, other students have not been so lucky. Either the kids are too young to be sent to school alone or the transport cost is higher.

To address the issue of commuting, the government has proposed a 'transportation cost' based on the attendance of the students. but experts say that won't solve the problem.

"The issue here is low enrolment and the reasons behind it. Without addressing this, the government is focusing on transportation. The reality is dearth of teachers and proper classes. So, it is obvious that the students are dropping out. Even if the government bears the transportation cost. it can't ensure that students stay ing in tribal areas will attend classes. In tribal areas, the terrain is not easy, so even if they get money, they can't attend the schools. So, they will drop out," said Anil Pradhan of RTE Forum.

After protests by activists and political parties, the government has 'officially' put the school closure decision on hold. But field workers say on the ground, the implementation is on.

Hyderabad police nabs 5 cyber crooks from Capital city

ILLEGAL SAND MINING IN SUBARNAREKHA

Why not rely on scientific methods in probe: NGT

Bhubaneswar, July 9: The East Zone Bench of the National Green Tribunal (NGT) Friday asked the government agencies in Odisha why they didn't rely on satellite images to buttress their points on a case pertaining to illegal sand mining in Subarnarekha River.

The green body's poser to the state government agencies came in the wake of a report filed by a Joint Committee constituted by it to look into the allegations of sand mining in Subarnarekha River at Benapur Mouza under Basta Tehsil in Balasore district. The joint panel had members from several government agencies including State Pollution Control Board, Balasore district administration, State Environment Impact Assessment Authority (SEIAA) and others.

"A reading of the report shows that all the findings on the issue are based on the observations of the local Tehasildar. However, the



report does not mention anything regarding the use of scientific methods to assess the amount of sand mined from the riverbed and resultant the degradation in the environment," observed the NGT.

In its report, the panel informed the NGT that its members did not find any mining activities as the river was in spate.

The petitioner Saral Kumar Parida had alleged excessive mining from the riverbed with the use of machines. Besides, Parida also alleged several other violations of the environmental norms in the sand mining.

"We find the report of the committee shoddy. It is not mentioned tee did not take the assistance of the satellite images at least six months prior to the onset of the monsoon and up to the date of expiry of the lease i.e. 01.05.2021," the NGT further

The green body also said, "The satellite images could help the committee to determine the depth of the available sand in the riverbed and the actual amount of sand mined by the lease holder. The committee could have used scientific method to find out whether heavy vehicles were used in the sand quarrying in violation of the Sustainable Sand Mining Management Guidelines, 2016 & 2020.

The tribunal criticised the conduct of the Joint Inspection Committee and directed the panel to conduct another spot inspection in a proper scientific manner. The panel was asked to find out details regarding the allegations of excess mining and resultant environmental degradation in the river

"In this context, you are requested to submit the vaccination status report on a weekly basis (every Monday) of such mental health establishments in your district/Municipal Corporation. The authorities are, therefore, requested to personally monitor and ensure the vaccination of mentally retarded persons in such mental health establishments in your districts and municipalities," the let-

OHRC seeks report on **Covid care at Baripada**

Bhubaneswar, July 9: The Odisha Human Rights Commission (OHRC) Friday sought a report from the superintendent of Pandit Raghunath Murmu Medical College & Hospital at Baripada in connection with allegations negligence by hospital staff at the dedicated Covid care hospital.

The commission issued the direction while hearing a petition filed by advocate and Congress leader Nishikanta Mishra.

The petition was filed after some photos and videos of patients lying naked and unattended to at the Covid hospital of Baripada Medical College went viral on social media last month. Mishra had also attached the viral images and videos along with his petition. The hospital management as well as the state government came under severe criticism following the issue.

"Patients are left unattended. Many of them are forced to lie on ground. Some of them are also seen sleeping near the toilet. Bedsheets and pillows are not provided to the patients. Oxygen services seem to be a distant dream here. Nurses and doctors are not attending or treating the patients,' claimed Mishra quoting Bibhudatta Dash, who lost his relative to Covid May 23.

The OHRC has directed the superintendent of the medical college to submit his response by August 23. Notably, the district administration had earlier rubbished the allegations terming them as baseless.

Adopt functional cold storages, govt urged

Out of 144 cold storage enterprises established in the state so far, merely 30 are functional

Bhubaneswar, July 9: The cold storage promoters in the coastal state are now facing difficulties owing to the pandemic, lack of support from the government, consistent losses and other related issues which allegedly have turned several such units into Non-Performing Assets (NPAs).

The Cold Storage Association of Odisha Friday urged the state government to redress the grievances of cold storage units and extend a hand holding support as out of 144 cold storage enterprises established in the state so far, merely 30 are functional.

The association also said that most of them are suffering huge

loses and are unable to repay their

"Considering this situation, we have come up with a request to the state government to adopt the functional cold storages from the owners along with its assets and liabilities, so that they remain alive to serve the state and its peasants. The owners will be bankrupt and will be on road if no step is taken," the association said According to the promoters,

most of the cold storage units have become NPAs in the accounts of banks and financial institutions. Many of them are on the verge of closure owing to negative growth and filing liabilities.

A cold storage promoter requesting anonymity said, "Having no other options left to escape the mounting bank interest, the owners have decided to sell their cold storages. Unfortunately no buyers are coming out to purchase these assets. The financing banks are also trying to sell off the cold storages through auction, but they too are not getting any bidders.'

The promoters, however, said that under such circumstances, the banks could auction the same at throwaway prices and sell off their infrastructure to compensate for their losses.

BMC yet to set up more than 50% micro compost centres

Bhubaneswar, July 9: Aimed to manage large quantities of city's waste, the Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation (BMC)'s proposed project of setting up Micro Composting Centres (MCC) has seen less than half of works completed since more than a year of its inception.

MCCs are facilities that convert wet or bio-degradable waste into compost. The civic authority, earlier in 2019, had floated tenders of establishing about 43 MCCs and 10 Material Recovery Facilities (MRFs) around the city and had planned to complete the project by

However, BMC has been able to erect only 18 of these MCCs and two MRFs up until now. Out of these, two MCCs and one MRF were added, Thursday, at Railway Over Bridge (ROB) near Sundarpada. The new MCC will target 90% of waste treatment at the MCC itself and only 10% will be sent to the landfill site.

"The project has been delayed largely due to Covid. Since much of our focus was to control the pandemic in the city, the establishment of MCCs was given less priority. However, we are expediting the process now and aiming to construct all MCCs and MRFs by the end of this year," said a BMC

In case of an emergent situation due to Covid pandemic leading to the shutdown of the office the test may be cancelled at short notice, he further clarified.

The DL skill test slot booking for other 20 category-A districts was already resumed from June 21 & July 5, this year.

In view of the pandemic, the DL and LL services were suspended from April 20 this year. The government has extended the validity of LL expiring from March 18, 2020 to September 30, 2021, till September end of this year. The applicants, who have already paid the fees for the DL/LL tests will remain valid, sources said.

Couple held for torture of minor

Bhubaneswar: Balipatna police Friday arrested a couple for torturing their 7-years-old minor daughter for the last one year. The Deputy Commissioner of Police, Umashankar Dash, informed media about the arrest of the victim's father and step mother. The incident came to fore when the biological mother of the victim rescued her from the fiendish couple Wednesday. The seriously ill minor was later admitted to capital hospital where she is currently undergoing treatment. The child was brutally beaten by her father and step mother almost every day. She was chained at the verandah day and night. The step mother also used to reportedly put the poor girl's fingers into boiling water, and even kick and stand on her belly. They would give only rice and salt as meal and dinner to the hapless girl. The accused father, Bilal Khan of Barahala village under Balipatna police limits had married the victim's biological mother, Rizwana Parvin of Pipli in 2013.

Later, Parvin went to her maternal parent's home in Pipli after Khan divorced her. Khan had forcefully brought the minor girl from her mother in 2020.

112 missing girls traced in June

Bhubaneswar: The commissionerate police have rescued 112 missing minor girls during last month. Commissioner of Police, Saumendra Priyadarshi Friday revealed that the police had launched a drive to trace the missing minor girls during the last couple of years in the city. The Kidnapping and Man Missing cell at the DCP office managed to find out 49 minors while local cops succeeded in rescuing 63 minor girls last month. Sources claimed that the city police have decided to strengthen the cell with the inclusion of more manpower. As many as 4,438 minors were reported missing at different police stations of the city during the last ten years. Out of that, the cops have managed to rescue only 2,889 children. OSSTET aspirants demand change in eligibility criteria



Red velvet mites on verge of extinction

Jamtikra, July 9: With the vivifying touch of monsoon rain, greenery gets resurrected on the earth as fresh foliage covers the soil. Nature is rapturous. And in this verdant blanket, the Red Velvet Mites emerge from under the soil everywhere starting from the village to farmlands, pastures and even hills and forests. These shy, bright red coloured bugs create the unmatched beauty of a scarlet veil on the green turf.

These little bugs, also fondly called as 'Sadhaba Bohu', are believed to be really beneficial to the environment by many. These insects are seen in various regions at the onset of monsoon.

These were easily visible in



large numbers in the loamy and rocky soils of Jamtikra region under Attabira block limits in Bargarh district. But with the changing climate and the subsequent changes in environment, have become a rarity.

In the bygone days, these bugs used to come out of the soil indicating the arrival of rain to the farmers. They also helped maintain the fertility of the soil to an extent. In some regions the maiden girls are seen worshipping these insects. But after the rampant use of fertilisers and pesticides in the farmlands, these beautiful creatures are not easily visible like before. Environmentalists are of the opinion that if special attention is not given to the safety and preservation of these disappearing shy bugs, they will be reduced and limited to only the illustrations of children's story books in near future.

CRABBERS CROWDING MARINE SANCTUARY

Mahakalapara, July 9: Crabbers are gathering at the Gahirmatha Mahakalapara block in Kendrapara district. They crab and fish illegally by entering the sanctuary. Using this opportunity, they also resort to timber smuggling through boats, according to complaints.

As per reports, crab dealers/businessmen in the marine sanctuary region are employing poor local residents as labourers paying them meagre wages. These labourers catch fish, crabs and hunt deer in protected forest areas of Hukitola, Madali, Lancha Ghola, Shohala Muhana, Hetamundia, lighthouse forest, Kansaradia and Tanda and the rivers flowing through these areas.

While the forest department is busy observing 'Vana Mahotsav', the crabbers return homes with boatfuls of timber. They sell their catch of fishes and crabs to local businessmen. Mud crabs are being sold in this region at a rate of one to three thousand rupees per kilogram.

These dealers pack the crabs in big bamboo containers and smuggle them to hotels in big cities including Kolkata, Raipur and Hyderabad. These mud crabs have a high demand in the national and international markets. Foreigners are served with various dishes made with these crabs.

However, these mud crabs are a primary source of food for giant saltwater crocodiles (Baula Kumbhira) and crabbing is banned

in Rajnagar area. But it has been complained that the forest department is not undertaking concrete measures to check crabbing and smuggling in Gahirmatha marine sanctuary

Also the local populace has expressed concern asking what will feed the saltwater crocodiles once the crabs go extinct. A team of representatives will meet and discuss the matter with the Rajnagar DFO, said the environmentalists.

Mayurbhanj: Sabai craft biz touches ₹300 cr

Baripada, July 9: It's not for nothing that Mayurbhanj district is called the hub of Sabai grass craft. The Sabai grass products have their loyal customers not only in India but also in abroad.

Worth mentioning, Odisha University for Agriculture and Technology has recently submitted an application to Geographical Indications Registry at Chennai seeking a GI tag for Mayurbhanj district's Sabai grass craft.

In the tribal dominated Mayurbhanj district, most people earn their livelihood from selling minor forest produces. Sabai grass craft has also turned out to be a money spinner for many people. The craftsmen earn their livelihood from selling their products the year round. According to sources, the annual business of these beautifully woven products touches something around ₹300 crore per annum.

Sabai grass plants are called 'Money Plants' by the weavers, for it takes care of their financial requirement for the entire year. The grass usually grows better in non-irrigated lands.



While the grass, also known as 'golden grass' due to its colour, is grown in 22,758 hectares of land in the district, Baripada, Morada, Suliapada, Kuliana, Betanati and Kaptipada are the areas known for its cultivation. 20,000 MT grass is har-

vested in the district annually. Once the grass comes up to the required length, farmers harvest them. They then spread the sheaves procured by the self help groups There are a total of 21 SHGs where women manufacture as many as 1,062 products. These women are skilled in making a variety of products including jewellery, furniture, household articles, decorative and gift

items using the grass. These items are

them to own some of them. These articles are available at dedicated selling centres at the

district headquarters. This apart, e-commerce companies like Flipkart, Amazon, Jabong sell these crafts. Because of being eco-friendly, durability and beauty, the demand for these crafts is only increasing Last year, rakhis made of

Sabai grass sold like hot cakes. These rakhis were sold through stalls set up in Baripada. Rairangpur and

Bhubaneswar. Notably, the Krishi Vigyan Kendra Shyamakhunta requested OUAT to apply

for the GI tag for the Sabai grass craft. "Once the tag is accorded, the district's residents, particularly the women weavers will become self-reliant," observed scientist of Krishi Vigyan Kendra (1), Sanghamitra Pattanayak.

ensing the current popular mood against the UP government due to the Covid crisis, the party and the Modi sarkar are keen to ensure the party's success in the upcoming Assembly elections. A lot of that worry has to do with the perceptions about Yogi running the government with handpicked but clearly inadequate babu support.

When the trusted PMO aide Arvind Kumar Sharma was airdropped in Lucknow, he was no regular Gujarat cadre babu or just another BJP vicepresident in Uttar Pradesh (after taking voluntary retirement). He was reportedly sent to rein in Yogi who has caused considerable discontent within the state unit of the party, and he remains the PMO's eyes and ears within

Yogi too has gathered around his own trusted band of babus. It is this team that steered Yogi's Covid management. Hovering over these exercises like Banquo's ghost is a familiar presence, Navneet Sehgal. This consistently powerful 1988-batch IAS officer is once again chief firefighter, in charge of the state Information Department as Additional Chief Secretary and leading the perception battle against Covid failure. His dominant presence in the state government, over the last six months has not enthused too many other babus in UP. Yet, it is this larger cohort of babus who will matter more, going ahead and how they manage their last lap briefs, which will be crucial in

CBDT appointment raises more questions

The spate of appointments in the Central Board of Direct Taxes (CBDT) seems to have raised more questions than answers among babu watchers. After the end of CBDT chairman PC Mody's extended tenure, the Finance Ministry has given additional charge of the post to JB Mohapatra, a 1985-

batch Indian Revenue Service (IRS) officer. With Mohapatra as ad hoc chairman, the CBDT now has three 1985-batch board members, the other two being Anu J Singh and Anuja Sarangi.

Sources say that there is also



much speculation about why Mohapatra was named the interim chairperson of CBDT and why the government chose to ignore the claim of KM Prasad, the senior-most board member. Prasad who has about three months to go before retirement could easily have been given additional charge of interim

Besides his ad hoc position, Mohapatra is the first regular Member for Investigation since 2019. The post of Member Investigations now seems to lead to the top post at CBDT, given that the current CEC Sushil Chandra held the same post before he was elevated to CBDT chairperson.

Interestingly, the CBDT board is likely to see more changes in the days ahead. Of the three new members SK Gupta will complete his tenure in July while Anu Singh will retire in August this year as will K.M. Prasad. Will the government draft new members on the board or give extension to the current ones? Let's wait and watch.

Haryana DGP caught between CM and HM

Walking a tightrope can get tiresome after a while. Haryana's Director General of Police Manoj Yadava has sought repatriation to the Intelligence Bureau (IB) for "personal reasons", in a bid to end the war of words between Chief Minister Manohar Khattar and Home Minister Anil Vij over his tenure ex-

Yadava was sent to Haryana on the recommendation by a UPSC committee for appointment as the state police chief. He had returned to his home state cadre after spending 15 years with the IB. The 1988-batch IPS officers have apparently written to Additional Chief Secretary (Home) Rajeev Arora seeking repatriation to IB and resume his old post of Additional Director While the move took some by surprise, those in the know believe that Yadava's inability to get along with his boss, the state Home Minister Anil Vii, may have been the last straw for the top cop. Earlier this year when Chief Minister Manohar Khattar had given Yadava a year's extension as DGP, the Home Minister had vehemently objected but Khattar stuck to his guns and

It's no secret that Khattar and his Home Minister do not see eye to eye on several issues. Yadava may be about to pay the price of their political rivalry if his request for repatriation is accepted.

Can of worms

o open a metaphorical can of worms is to examine some complicated state of affairs, the investigation of which is likely to cause trouble or scandal and which you would much prefer was left alone. A recent example appeared in the Washington Times: "Uncovering past ownership, however, can open its own legal can of worms in exposing art theft." It has long since become an overused and overrated journalistic cliché, which rather lends itself to mixed metaphors: "Africa is a huge can of worms and we can no longer stick our heads in the sand" (from the Daily Record of Glasgow of 17 March 2006). The earliest example I've found is from a syndicated article in the Ironwood Daily Globe of Michigan in 1951: "The question of command for Middle East defense against Soviet aggression is still regarded as 'a can of worms' at General Eisenhower's SHAPE headquarters here." The evidence suggests that the original cans of worms were real cans with actual worms in them, collected as bait for fishing. Here's one in a largely forgotten work of 1914, Diane of the Green Van. by Leona Dalrymple: "There are times, alas, when even fish are perverse! Thoroughly out of patience, Diane presently unjointed her rod, emptied the can of worms upon the bank, and returned to camp.' Fishermen have told me that the most annoying aspect of opening a can of worms is that, being live bait, they crawl out and are difficult to put back. So there may well be an association with the idea of Pandora's Box, as you suspect. It's easy to see how an angler — more probably a non-fishing friend or relative of an angler - who opened a can containing a wriggling mass of worms would see it as something that was best left closed and

Freedom House reports that less than 20% of the world's population now lives in what it categorises as fully free societies, the lowest share in more than a quarter-century. Many countries are drifting steadily toward authoritarianism.

Freedom is in trouble for wellknown reasons. In many countries, increasing inequality and marginalisation of different groups have fueled an embrace of rightwing (and in some cases Left-wing) authoritarianism. As the world grapples with rapid technological change and economic restructuring, many are far from convinced that democracies have the edge in terms of adaptation and forward-looking policymaking. The pandemic – which many democracies mishandled - deepened these doubts.

These are difficult times for those of us who profoundly believe that the absolute, non-negotiable basis of good government is a free, democratically empowered citizenry protected equally under law. I am president of the largest private philanthropy in this domain. If we are honest with our selves, we know that our traditional models of advancing democratic values and institutions are struggling.

The Open Society Foundations (OSF) was founded in the 1980s on the assumption that there was an urgent global public demand for freedom, and that a growing number of governments around the world were embracing its rules and norms. That allowed us (in partnership with local activists) to use a mixture of shaming and encouragement to persuade governments to adopt and respect human-rights laws and democratic procedures.

Whether our work concerned the Roma in Central and Eastern Europe, LGBTQI communities in Africa, ethnic minorities in South

and East Asia, women's rights in Latin America, or worldwide migrant and refugee protection, it seemed that we were pursuing a historic mission. And one day, that pursuit might lead to all individuals enjoying full and equal rights and opportunities.

Today, however, a rising humanrights tide is not lifting all boats; on the contrary, it seems that all are at risk of sinking. This recent sharp reversal of 20 years of human-rights gains is forcing us to think again.

As a foundation chaired to this day by its founder, George Soros – a survivor of Nazism and a refugee from communism in his native Hungary – we will not move on to less challenging issues. After all, Soros started the foundation when prospects for human-rights advances looked as difficult as they do today.

So, the mission is non-negotiable. But we must revisit our approach. We must ask how to recover public support for democratic and human-rights norms, while also identifying more clearly the enemies of open societies and what will lead them, even grudgingly, to respect their obligations again.

In 1980s Eastern Europe, the problem was sclerotic, aging communist governments that could no longer deliver for their people.

Today's situation is more complicated. True, a bipolar world again threatens freedom. Biden's forthcoming Summit for Democracy is in part an effort to rally like-minded governments but also the wider world against Chinese President Xi Jinping's authoritarianism. That may mean democracies have some uncomfortable bedfellows as pragmatism risks trumping values.

A dense web of trade, investment, education, and technology links mean China is tied to the West, and vice versa, in ways that the Soviet Union never was. A relationship that is more economic than military gives democracies an array of options - from governmental and consumer boycotts to a more coherent international containment and engagement strategy - for pressing Xi's regime to accept norms of good behavior at home and abroad. Leaders on both sides will frame this contest primarily in terms of economics, but human rights can also be a big winner – or a big loser.

Soros has always called OSF's work "political philanthropy. What he means is that we need to engage with the wider dynamics of change and find entry points to champion our issues. Whereas strong states were the sole or leading human-rights violators during the Cold War, today's world is one of multidimensional human-rights menaces. Inequalities exacerbated by unregulated transnational financial and corporate power, together with dramatic shifts in individual states' fortunes, are creating an ever more challenging landscape. The world is becoming more unequal - and angrier.

That anger is amplified (and fueled) by social-media platforms where polarization, abuse, and lies undermine trust in institutions. A technology that many saw just a few years ago as an enabler of citizens' rights has become in many cases a tool for manipulating minds and closing societies.

The insidious copycat behaviour that Donald Trump's presidency allowed and encouraged around the world has accelerated a crisis of respect for the rule of law and human rights. Presidents stole additional terms, official corruption surged, and agreements between states brushed aside people's rights. Nowadays, human-rights defenders and those who support them are not welcome in much of the world.

Yet malign governments and globalisation, with its unintended financial and corporate consequences, are only half the problem. Many view the renewed attention to deep-seated institutional racism in the United States and around the world - and the recog nition that marginalisation based on race, gender, religion, and class is often mutually reinforcing as exposing the limits of a humanrights agenda. Human-rights remedies, victims argue, have scratched the surface, not reached

the roots. Human-rights work needs to become more political: tougher and smarter in its attacks on oppressors, and clearer about being on the side of the oppressed. We need to address the challenges people actually face, looking beyond narrow political rights to address the deeper causes of economic and social exclusion.

Among those coming out in favour of scrapping the Games is one of the event's official partners, the newspaper Asahi Shimbun. Depending on one's reading of the polls, that position is apparently supported by 60-80% of the Japanese population. And various medical groups argue that the Games will put unacceptable pressure on Japan's health system at a time when the pandemic is still raging. As if to confirm this sense of crisis, the Japanese government has now declared that Tokyo will be under a state of emergency throughout the Games.

But this is all rather strange. The cancellation chorus makes it sound like Japan is in the grip of a harrowing wave of Covid-19 cases. But that plainly is not the case. The situation is nothing like that of India or Brazil. On July 7, for example, Japan, with 120 million people, reported just 1,683 confirmed cases and 17 deaths, down from the recent peaks of 6,460 new cases May 14 and 113 deaths May 23.

This is not to suggest that Japan should barrel ahead and host the Olympics come what may Accommodating more than 60,000 athletes and their entourages from overseas plainly creates some risk. Similar risks were present when spectators were allowed to attend the US Masters golf tournament in early April, and when 135,000 spectators watched the Indianapolis 500 motor race May 30. And Japan's own baseball league has been holding games throughout the state of emergency.

Clearly, the alarmist chorus against the Tokyo Games could benefit from a greater sense of proportion. Yes, Tokyo and Okinawa remain in a "state of emergency," but this is a misnomer. Japanese law does not permit the government to assume the sort of emergency powers that have commonly been exercised in Europe. The "emergency" basically means that bars and restaurants cannot stay open very late in the evening and are discouraged (but not barred) from serving alcohol. Beyond that, department stores are a bit constrained, and everyone is advised to be as careful as possible. Pandemic life in Japan is a lot more normal than it is in Europe.

Moreover, given Japan's low infection and death figures, fears that hospitals will suddenly exceed true capacity are misplaced. Japan has more hospital beds per 1,000 people than almost any other country in the world. Japan's health system isn't perfect, of course. Because it is publicly financed but largely privately run, the government cannot force an increase in capacity as easily as Britain's National Health Service can. As a result, there have been some scandalous cases of Covid-19 patients being turned away and then dying at home, owing to hospitals choosing not to make more capacity available. Nonetheless, as the overall mortality numbers indicate, these cases have been exceptions, not the norm. Unlike most other advanced economies, Japan has had fewer deaths during the past 18 months than in normal times, because Japanese have been more careful.

Ultimately, it will not be a Covid-19 crisis in Japan that determines

the fate of the Tokyo Olympics, because there is no such crisis. Vaccinations have been painfully slow to get under way, but 19 million have now been administered, and the total will most likely be considerably higher by when the Games begin, protecting the most vulnerable groups. In fact, Japan is perfectly capable of keeping the visiting athletes and their entourages insulated from the population, particularly now that the authorities may prohibit specta-

tors from all events. Given the realities on the ground, the Japanese government is unlikely to accede to the cancellation chorus. Doing so would mean national humiliation. And because the International Olympic Committee would almost certainly oppose the decision, Japan and the Tokyo Metropolitan Government would be liable for damages.

If the Games were being held in a US or Chinese city, would America or China cancel them at this stage in the pandemic? No.

No amenities at Lower Suktel rehab hub

Bolangir, July 9: It is said that Lower Suktel Major Irrigation Project, once set up, would usher in good time for the farmers of Bolangir district. However, the project has been hanging fire for over two decades now. Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik had laid the foundation stone of the project in 2001. However, 20 years after the foundation ceremony, project-affected Paradihapalli villagers were relocated June 29, 2021.

The residents of this pro-project village had agreed to relocate after they received full compensations and rehabilitation benefits. Out of 289 families of this village, 222 families have already relocated, sources

said. The administration has distributed homestead land to 47 of these families in Lower Suktel rehabilitation colony at Larkipalli.

The project-displaced people have alleged that there is no semblance of basic facilities at the place where they have been asked to relocate. Three to four years before the Paradhiapalli villagers were relocated, some project-displaced people had been relocated here. Plots had been identified for 72 families at a place in front of the CRPF camp site. Twenty families have shifted here on their own and are living by themselves.

Even 20 years after the rehabilitation site had been identified, basic facilities have not been made available to people, indicating crass failLife woes

The District Collector has issued directions to departmental engineer and other senior officials to ensure that project-affected people get all facilities including roads, drains, drinking water, streetlights and all other basic amenities within two and half months.

Proper rehabilitation of the project-affected people at the centre will encourage those waiting to relocate to the rehabilitation centre. This will also quicken the construction work of the Lower Sutkel major irrigation project, the displaced people said.

Kshirod Bai attacked Deepika, killing her on the spot.

Jeypore paper mill to start production in Sept

Jeypore, July 9: The Seba paper mill here will start production in coming September. This was revealed by the plant authorities after a meeting with the workers' union. The paper mill, said to be the main pillar of the local economy fell on bad times over two years back. Its management was transferred from BILT to a Hyderabad-based private company, Mother Earth Resource Pvt Ltd. After the transfer of the ownership, work on the paper mill has started on a war-footing.

As a result of this, the plant will have to pay only for the actual volume of water that it will use. The plant authorities have urged the state government to waive the Rs 1100 crore arrear pending against the plant under water and power dues. This has been under the active consideration of the government, sources said.

It may be mentioned here that the paper mill stopped functioning since April 2019. Kerala on alert following Zika outbreak

The southern state has so far reported 14 cases of Zika virus

Thiruvananthapuram/Delhi. July 9: Kerala was put on alert Friday following the outbreak of Zika virus in the state, while the Centre rushed a team of experts to monitor the situation and aid the state government in management of the cases after 13 new ones were confirmed.

The number of cases due to the mosquito-transmitted disease in the southern state went went up to 14 Friday following confirmation of 13 additional samples by the National Institute of Virology Among the infected is a 24-year-old pregnant woman, who was diagnosed with the mosquito-transmitted disease Thursday, making her the first person to be infected with the virus in the state. Of the 19 samples sent to the Punebased institute, 13 were found to be positive for Zika, the State government said Friday. The symptoms are similar to dengue and they in-

What is Zika Virus?

Zika virus is a mosquito-borne flavivirus that was first identified in Uganda in 1947 in monkeys. In 1952, the Zika Virus Disease (ZVD) was identified in humans in Western Africa. ZVD is caused by a virus transmitted primarily by Aedes mosquitoes (AM), mainly Aedes aegypti, the same mosquito that transmits dengue, chikungunya and yellow fever. In addition, the Zika virus is also transmitted from mother to fetus during pregnancy, through sexual contact, transfusion of blood and blood products, and organ transplantation. The symptoms of ZVD include fever, rash, conjunctivitis, muscle and joint pain, malaise or headache. However, most people with Zika virus infection do not develop any symptoms.

Pregnant women should get themselves tested if they have fever, the Minister said at a meeting of the District Medical Officers

Following the emergence of the Zika virus, the Centre rushed a team of experts to support the government in handling the situation. Joint Secretary in the Union health ministry, Lav Agarwal, told reporters in New Delhi that "there are some Zika cases which have been reported from Kerala."

'To monitor the situation and to support the state government, a six-member team, comprising public health experts, vector-borne disease experts and clinicians from AIIMS has already been issued instructions to reach there and support the state government in terms of management of Zika there." he said in a statement.



Kerala HC issues notice to State govt on dowry

Kochi, July 9: The Kerala High Court Friday issued notice to the State government on a writ petition seeking amendments and strict implementation of the Dowry Prohibition Act, 1961.

A Bench, headed by Chief Justice S Manikumar, asked the government why the Act were not being implemented strictly. The court asked why there was no appointment made to the posts of Dowry Prohibition Officers though dowry deaths were being reported frequently.

The petition, filed by In Rajan, the CEO of the Vikram

Sarabhai Science Foundation, sought a direction to all government servants to furnish a declaration that they have not taken any dowry.

"Dowry is a social stigma causing un-imaginable torture and crime towards women. This evil has taken the lives of numerous innocent women from all strata of society," the petition said.

It said though Parliament has enacted the Dowry Prohibition Act, 1961, it could not serve the intended purpose or eradicate dowry, the petition said. The country has seen 8,391 dowry deaths in 2010 meaning there are 1.4 deaths per 1,00,000 women, it said. Such deaths account for 40 to 50 per cent of all homicides recorded annually in the country.

Market linkage support scheme 'Parvaz' launched

Srinagar, July 9: The Jammu and Kashmir government has accorded sanction to the implementation of 'PARVAZ', a market linkage support scheme for shipment of agriculture and horticulture perishables being harvested in J&K through air cargo, officials said.

As per a government order, a provision of 25 per cent subsidy on perishable fruits harvested in Jammu and Kashmir for shipment through air cargo will be notified separately.

Further, subsidy shall be pro-

vided on air cargo charges inclusive of airport handling charges for shipment through one or more empanelled airlines by the government from time to time, and in the mode

farmers/FPOs/SHGs and registered intermediaries. Subsidy shall also be paid in the reimbursement mode as per the original invoices/bills of the concerned air-



lines in offline mode only till August

31, 2021, the order said. Thereafter, the support shall be paid through online medium in DBT mode by creating a platform involving the Directorate of Horticulture and the concerned Airlines. The order further said that the scheme could be adopted by animal, sheep husbandry and fisheries departments for milkbased perishables and Trout fish, subject to availability of funds.

Kochi, July 9: There has to be some government control over the money being collected via crowdfunding for treatment of rare diseases and every "Tom, Dick and Harry" cannot be permitted to raise funds like this, the Kerala High Court said Friday.

The high court said it was concerned that every "Tom, Dick and Harry" was collecting funds via crowdfunding for treatment of the children suffering from rare diseases and asked the state government whether it has any control over such transactions.

Justice P B Suresh Kumar said the court does not want to interdict the crowdfunding process, but it wants the funds to go to the government instead into the account of some private individuals who may or may not give it to those who

require the money. "I do not want every Tom, Dick and Harry to collect money. Is there any state control over this collection of funds via crowdfunding? We should know where the money is going," the court said and added that if private individuals and entities can collect crores of rupees in a short span of time, why the government cannot? "For providing free vaccines the state government could collect only Rs 68 lakh, while 18 crores was collected in a week (for treatment of a boy suffering from spinal muscular atrophy)," the court said.

The government, in a statement filed in court earlier, had said that neither the Health Department nor the Kerala Social Security Mission (KSSM) was in a position to extend financial support for bearing the huge cost of the treatment/medicine required by Arif's son, who has been admitted in the Kozhikode Medical College Hospital and is on ventilator support.

The government had also said that according to the National Rare Disease Policy,2021 of the Union Health Ministry Ministry, Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA) is categorised in Group 3, for which the cost of treatment is very high, and it recommends a digital crowdfunding platform be leveraged for mobilizing the necessary funds.

market committees (APMCs). APMC markets are set up to provide market linkages and create an ecosystem of post-harvest public infrastructure open to all farmers. The Union Cabinet Thursday approved modification in the central scheme making the APMC mandis eligible to avail financial support from the Rs 1 lakh crore Agriculture Infrastructure Fund to expand the regulated markets' capacity and provide better facilities to farmers.

Union Agriculture Minister Narendra Singh Tomar has asserted that the decision to further strengthen the APMCs allays protesting farmers' fear that these mandis will be scrapped with the implementation of three controversial agriculture laws

However, Friday, the Samyukt Kisan Morcha said, "To begin with, referring to a Rs 1 lakh crore Agriculture Infrastructure Fund is highly misleading because there has been no allocation of even a thousand crore rupees from the government. It has merely created a new head under which loans can be accessed from banks.

The government has presented a "minor and insignificant decision", it said in a statement. "The actual financing is dependent on regular commercial banks, and India's story of banking sector mismanagement and collusion with big capitalists is well-known. The government's role is only to provide an interest subvention of a mere 3 per cent and some credit guarantee coverage," the Samyukt Kisan Morcha said.

Only Rs 208 crore was allocated for Agriculture Infrastructure Fund in the revised budget of 2020-21 and Rs 900 crore in the 2021-22 Budget, the umbrella body of farmers' unions claimed.

Haryana, July 9: With Covid-19 cases on a decline, and several states easing Covid restrictions, schools in Haryana and Gujarat are set to reopen from July 15.

The Gujarat government Friday decided to reopen schools for class 12 students and colleges for undergraduate and postgraduate students from 15 July. Only 50 per cent of students will be allowed to attend

Students can attend physical classes on a voluntary basis. Attendance will not be mandatory, as per guidelines.

As per the guidelines, the schools and colleges will have to follow strict Covid-19 guidelines and follow the standard operating principles including mandatory masks, social distancing, sanitization



Meanwhile. government has decided to reopen schools for students in classes 9 to 12 from July 16 onwards.

The decision has been taken after the number of Covid-19 cases had receded in the state. In the first phase, however, only senior students will be called back on campus. For students in classes 6, 7, and 8 summer breaks will begin from July 23. For students in classes 1 to 5, the government is yet to take the final call.

Attendance will not be mandatory. Standard Covid-19 guidelines including wearing a mask, maintaining social distancing, sanitization will be mandatory, informed Haryana Education Minister Kanwar Pal

35% of tiger ranges are outside protected areas: Report

According to the study, India faces an increasing challenge of human-wildlife conflict, which is driven by development pressures

New Delhi, July 9: Thirty-five per cent of India's tiger ranges are outside protected areas and humananimal conflict affects over 75 per cent of the world's wild cat species, according to a new report.

The study, which has been done by WWF and the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) with contribution from 155 experts from 40 organisations based in 27 countries, also stated that human-wildlife conflict is the greatest threat to animals.

"Currently, 35 per cent of India's tiger range, 40 per cent of the African lion range and 70 per cent of the African and Asian elephant ranges are outside protected areas." said the report -- 'A future for all-The need for human-

wildlife coexistence'. "Marine species, such as turtles and whales, that travel thousands of kilometres annually, are also increasingly interacting with people. With so much overlap, effective HWC (human-wildlife conflict) management becomes increasingly necessary," it said.

The report said that humanwildlife conflict -- when struggles arise from people and animals coming into contact -- often leads to killing of animals in self-defence or as pre-emptive or retaliatory, which can drive species to extinction.

"Marine and terrestrial protected areas cover only 9.67 per cent of the globe, and most of these protected areas are disconnected from each other. Therefore, many species depend on human-domi-



nated spaces for their survival, and shared landscapes where both humans and wildlife exist outside protected areas play an increasingly important role for the survival of key species such as large predators and herbivores,' the report said.

It said that many other terrestrial and marine carnivore species such as polar bears and Mediterranean monk seals and large herbivores such as elephants are also getting affected due to HWC.

'In India, data from the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change indicates that over 500 elephants were killed between 2014-2015 and 2018-2019, most related to human-elephant conflict. During the same period, 2,361 people were killed as a result of conflict with elephants," the report said. "With the world's second-largest human population along with the largest wild populations of tigers, Asian elephants, One-horned rhinos, Asiatic lions, and other globally threatened species, India faces urgent problems of human wildlife conflict that must be addressed to achieve a socially just form of conservation. India's elephants probably embody the problem the best," it said.

Elephants in India are restricted to just three- four per cent of their original habitat, with their remaining range plagued by deforestation, invasive species, and climate change. This is pushing elephants to seekresources outside of forests and protected areas, the report said.

'RISK OF SEVERE ILLNESS,


London, July 9: The risk of severe illness and death from SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes Covid-19, is extremely low in children and teenagers, according to a new comprehensive analyses of public health data released Friday by researchers in the UK.

However, the analyses also found that Covid-19 increases the likelihood of serious illness in the most vulnerable young people, those with pre-existing medical conditions and severe disabilities, although these risks remain low overall. The preliminary findings, published in three new pre-print studies led by University College London (UCL), the University of Bristol, University of York and the University of Liverpool, will be submitted to the UK's Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI), the Department for Health and Social Care (DHSC)and the World Health

Organisation (WHO), to inform vaccine and shielding policy for the under-18s.

These new studies show that the risks of severe illness or death from SARS-CoV-2 are extremely low in children and young people,' said Professor Russell Viner from UCL Great Ormond Street Institute of Child Health and senior author on two of the studies. "Those young people at higher risk are those who are also at higher risk from any winter virus or other illness - that is, young people with multiple health conditions and complex disabilities. COVID-19 does however increase the risks for people in these groups to a higher degree than for illnesses such as influenza (sea-

sonal flu)," he said. "Our new findings are important as they will inform shielding guidance for young people as well as decisions about the vaccination of teenagers and children, not just in the UK but internationally," he added.

African-American spelling bee champ makes history with flair

Lake Buena Vista, July 9: Zaila Avant-garde understood the significance of what she was doing as she stood on the Scripps National Spelling Bee stage, peppering pro-



nouncer Jacques Bailly with questions about Greek and Latin roots. Zaila knew she would be the first African American winner of

the bee. She knew Black kids around the country were watching Thursday night's ESPN2 telecast. waiting to be inspired and hoping to follow in the footsteps of someone who looked like them.

But she never let the moment become too big for her, and when she heard what turned out to be her winning word — "Murraya," a genus of tropical Asiatic and Australian trees — she beamed with confidence. It was over.

Declared the champion, Zaila jumped and twirled with joy, only flinching in surprise when confetti was shot onto the stage. "I was pretty relaxed on the subject of Murraya and pretty much any other word I got," Zaila said.

The only previous Black champion was also the only international winner: Jody-Anne Maxwell of Jamaica in 1998. The bee, however, has still been a showcase for spellers of color over the past two decades, with kids of South Asian descent dominating the competition. Zaila's win breaks a streak of at least one Indian-American champion every year since 2008.

Zaila has other priorities, which perhaps explains how she came to dominate this year's bee. The 14-yearold from Harvey, Louisiana, is a basketball prodigy who owns three Guinness world records for dribbling multiple balls simultaneously and hopes to one day play in the WNBA or even coach in the NBA. She described spelling as a side hobby, even though she routinely practiced for seven hours a day.

Many of top Scripps spellers start competing as young as kindergarten. Zaila only started a few years ago, after her father, Jawara Spacetime, watched the bee on TV

and realized his daughter's affinity for doing complicated math in her head could translate well to spelling. She progressed quickly enough to make it to nationals in 2019 but bowed out in the prelim-

inary rounds. She will take home more than \$50,000 in cash and prizes. The runner-up was Chaitra Thummala, a 12-year-old from Frisco, Texas, and another student of Shafer-Ray. She has two years of eligibility remaining and instantly becomes one of next year's favorites. Bhavana Madini, a 13-year-old from Plainview, New York, finished third and also could be back.

"Zaila deserved it. She's always been better than me," Chaitra said.-"I could review a lot more words. I could get a stronger work ethic."

Geneva: The executive board of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) has approved a proposal for a new general Special Drawing Rights (SDR) allocation of \$650 billion, the largest allocation in the organisation's history, to help recovery from the Covid-19 pandemic, IMF Managing Director Kristalina Georgieva said Friday. "I will now present the new SDR allocation proposal to the IMF's Board of Governors for their consideration and approval. If approved, we expect the SDR allocation to be completed by the end of August," Georgieva said in a statement. "This is a shot in the arm for the world. The SDR allocation will boost the liquidity and reserves of all our member countries, build confidence, and foster the resilience and stability of the global economy," she said.

G20 takes up plan to deter cross-border tax dodging

Washington, July 9: Finance Ministers from the Group of 20 countries will push for agreement on proposals backed by US President Joe Biden to deter tax dodging by multinational companies.

While approval of the sweeping tax package is likely at the G-20 meeting Friday and Saturday in Venice, the proposals still face a key hurdle in the US Congress, where Republicans have vowed to oppose it.

Biden's proposal for a 15 per cent global corporate minimum tax resulted in a breakthrough in stalled international tax talks. An agreement was reached July 1 among 131 countries in negotiations convened by the Paris-based Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development

The deal aims to discourage the use of often-complex accounting schemes to move profits to where the least tax is due

The OECD deal asks countries where companies are headquartered to enact the minimum tax so that their companies would pay tax at home even if they shift profits to subsidiaries in low-rate countries overseas, so-called tax havens. Countries have lowered their tax rates to attract the revenue, moves described by US Treasury Secretary

Zomato invests \$100mn in Grofers

New Delhi, July 9: Food ordering platform Zomato, whose ₹9,375 crore IPO opens July 14, is planning to launch a grocery section on its app soon, a senior company official said. The company recently invested \$100 million (around ₹745 crore) for acquiring a minority stake in grocery delivery platform

CFO Akshant Goyal said.

"We are very soon launching online grocery on the Zomato app and that will go live soon, and with that we will foray into the space,'

Out of the total 67 mines offered by the ministry, 23 are under Coal Mines (Special Provisions) Act and 44 under Mines and Minerals (Development and Regulation) Act.

The blocks on offer are a mix of mines with small and large reserves, coking and non-coking mines and fully and partially explored blocks spread across six states-Chhattisgarh, Jharkhand, Odisha, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra and Andhra Pradesh.

The total number of mines successfully auctioned in the first tranche of auction for commercial mining was 20 out of the total 38 coal mines offered, the coal ministry had earlier said.

New Delhi, July 9: Oil marketing companies kept the retail price of petrol and diesel unchanged Friday to analyse the global oil price movement before making further revisions.

After crossing \$77 a barrel, global crude prices have softened a bit with differences surfacing in oil cartel OPEC over continuation of production cuts.

With price pause Friday, petrol continues to be priced at ₹100.56 a litre and diesel 89.62 a litre in the national capital.

Across the country as well the fuel prices remained unchanged Friday. Fuel prices were revised upwards on previous two days taking the retail price of petrol over the century mark all across the

Starting from a price line of ₹90.40 a litre May 1, petrol is now



priced at ₹100.56 a litre in the national capital, rising by a sharp ₹10.16 per litre in last 69 days. Similarly, diesel price in the capital also rose by ₹8.89 per litre in past two months to reach ₹89.62 a litre

With the price rise over past two months, fuel rates have been revised upwards in 37 out of 70 days between May, June and July upto now to take retail rates touch new highs across the country.

Consumers can now only expect that any further raise in fuel price is checked as OMCs start cutting the retail price of petrol and diesel over next few days to provide relief.

DOES ELON MUSK CONTROL TESLA INC OR DOES TESLA CONTROL ELON MUSK?

Musk trial asks the \$2bln question: Who controls Tesla?

Delaware, July 9: Does Elon Musk control Tesla Inc or does Tesla control Elon Musk?

More than \$2 billion hinges on that question as a trial kicks off Monday. Shareholders allege that Musk used his control of Tesla to force the company in 2016 to rescue SolarCity, saving the solar panel maker - and Musk's investment in the company - from bankruptcy.

The union pension funds and asset managers leading the case want Musk to repay to Tesla the cost of the \$2.6 billion deal and to disgorge the profits on his SolarCity stock. If they win, it would be one of the largest judgments against an

individual. The two-week trial in the Court

of Chancery in Wilmington, Delaware, will boil down to whether Musk, who owned about 22% of Tesla at the time of the deal, is that rare controlling stockholder who does not hold a majority stake.

"I think it's going to be very hard for the court to ignore the reality that Elon Musk is Elon Musk and his relationship with Tesla,' said Ann Lipton, a professor at Tulane University Law School.

She said the case might present an unusual situation given Musk's celebrity status, his personal ties to Tesla board members and those board members' financial ties to SolarCity. "Put it all together and it might be enough to count as a controlling shareholder," she said.

Few executives dominate their company's image as much Musk,

known for taunting regulators, battling naysayers and personally engaging with his 57 million Twitter

followers. "We are highly dependent on the services of Elon Musk. Technoking of Tesla and our Chief Executive Officer," said Tesla's 2020 annual report.

Plaintiffs allege that Musk drove the negotiations and even pushed Tesla's board to raise, not lower, the price for SolarCity.

A higher price benefited Musk, who was the largest shareholder of SolarCity, with a stake of about 22%, as well as four members of Tesla's board, who directly or indirectly owned SolarCity stock, according to court records.

Board members settled allegations against them last year for \$60 million and did not admit to any fault. Plaintiffs also allege the deal benefited two of Musk's cousins who founded SolarCity, saving a company that was rapidly running low on cash. Musk has said he was "fully recused" from board negotiations and that shareholders voted to approve the deal because it was central to his "Master Plan. Part Deux" that aims to integrate sustainable solar energy with electric self-driving cars.

He has said that what plaintiffs see as evidence of control is little more than strong management.

"Taken to its natural conclusion, virtually all 'hands-on' and 'inspirational CEOs with minority stock ownership would be deemed controllers," Musk's lawyers wrote in a court filing.

If Vice Chancellor Joseph Slights determines Musk was a controlling shareholder, it will fall to Musk to prove the SolarCity deal met the high bar of the "entire fairness" standard, which examines process and price, said legal experts.

London: England footballers have said they will donate a major chunk of their prize money from the Euro 2020 championships to the National Health Service (NHS) heroes. The England team are expected to get 9.6 million pounds if they win the final, plus there will be match fees and bonuses for the players. Sources said that the donation will not be less than five million pounds. The donation will be made to NHS charities after the football tournament ends Sunday. The team shared a statement to this effect Friday.

New Delhi: Prime Minister Narendra Modi took stock Friday of India's Olympic preparations and also announced a virtual interaction with the country's Tokyo-bound sportspersons July 13. It will happen three days before the first batch departs for the Japanese capital. "Reviewed preparations for facilitation of India's contingent at @Tokyo2020. "On behalf of 130 crore Indians, I would be interacting with the Olympics bound athletes 13th July to wish them luck. Let us all #Cheer4India," he added.

Kyrgios pulls out

Sydney: Australian tennis player Nick Kyrgios has pulled out of the Tokyo Olympic Games, citing abdominal injury and absence of fans at venues. "It's a decision I didn't take lightly," Kyrgios tweeted. "It has been my dream to represent Australia at the Olympics and I know I may never get that opportunity again. But I also know myself. The thought of playing in front of empty stadiums just doesn't sit right with me. It never has,' he said. Kyrgios confirmed that apart from absence of spectators, the abdominal injury that forced him to retire midway in his third-round match at Wimbledon last week was also a reason for his withdrawal.

Contracts extended

Madrid: Atlético Madrid have extended the contracts of coach Diego Simeone and his staff until the end of the 2024 season, the club said Friday. The extensions come after Atlético won their first Spanish league title since 2014. The contracts had been set to expire next June. "Pride. Responsibility. Challenges. Joy," Simeone said on Twitter. "Happy to continue at Atlético de Madrid," he added. Simeone took over Atlético in December 2011 and is the coach with the most consecutive seasons in charge of a Spanish league club. The Argentine is Atlético's most successful coach with eight titles and 316 victories.

These players initially criticised the South American soccer confederation for shifting the continental tournament to Brazil in emergency mode. Before the final against Messi's Argentina, they've changed their narrative to winning at all costs and also keeping a clean sheet.

"We're going to play a final against our eternal rivals, the lifelong ones, the two most powerful national teams in South America and we hope... it will be a great match," said Argentina coach Lionel Scaloni.

As well as looking to end his career-long trophy drought with Argentina, Messi could make history in another way Saturday. He currently sits on 76 goals for Argentina, one shy of Pele's South American record of 77 national team goals.

The Argentine is technically no longer a Barcelona player after his last contract expired at the end of June. So far, he has not put pen to paper on a new deal and is free to accept offers from elsewhere.

Barca president, Joan Laporta is continuing to negotiate with Messi and his representatives, but the club also have to ensure that the player's wages don't breach the salary cap imposed by La Liga and reaching a compromise with the player has so far proved difficult. When asked about Messi's fu-

ture during a charity golf tournament, the 'Koeman Cup' he is hosting, the manager insisted that he remained optimistic that Messi would be a Barcelona

player for the next season. "It's right to be worried when things are not all going well, but I have confidence in the president to solve this question," commented Koeman. "It is important for the club and La Liga that the best player in the world stays. E

Laporta has told me to remain calm and that they are working on the question and we are confident that he (Messi) will be here for several more years,

Skipper confident of ending India's medal drought

New Delhi, July 9: Indian men's team hockey captain Manpreet Singh understood the meaning of challenges quite early in life as his mother single-handedly struggled to bring him up. Manpreet, now a veteran of two Olympics, gears up for another challenge in life and that is to end India's medal drought in the Olympics. Since 1980 India have gone medal-less in hockey and that is indeed a sorry tale of affairs for the eight-time gold winners.

An Olympic veteran at 29, Manpreet, along with champion boxer MC Mary Kom, will be India's flag-bearer in the Olympics opening ceremony. He is the first hockey player after Pargat Singh (1996) to be given the honour.

"It's a big privilege for me to have been given that honour (flagbearer). I am the sixth hockey player who has got this opportunity. Pargat Singh was the first hockey player from my village (Mithapur in Punjab) to lead the Indian contingent in 1996. I consider myself lucky to have got the chance," Manpreet said.

The ace midfielder knows that it won't be easy to clinch India's ninth Olympic gold and first since the 1980 Moscow Games. But he believes a concerted team effort can achieve even the impossible.

"Our target is to finish on the podium and my target can't be dif-

ferent from the team because hockey is a team game. I can't achieve anything alone," Manpreet asserted. "But to achieve that we have to keep our focus intact. We need to give importance to every team, can't underestimate any,' Manpreet added.

World No 4 India are clubbed in Group A alongside current champions Argentina, mighty Australia, hosts Japan, New Zealand and Spain. Manpreet said a sound league campaign would be key to India's success in Tokyo.

"...Our focus is on every single match. If we perform well, results will definitely come our way. So we need to focus on our basics. League stage will be very important," Manpreet pointed out. "We have worked a lot on our attack, penalty corners because the coach was of the feeling that we create a lot of chances inside the box but don't get the desired outcome. So if we use the chances that come our way, we will definitely be successful," he added.

Manpreet also stated that Covid-19 protocols in Tokyo won't affect the team. "We don't know what sort of protocols and rules will be there in Tokyo. But if we speak about our group, we have been following the same Covid-19 protocols for the last one-and-half vears. So I don't think we will have too many issues in following the rules in Tokyo," he signed off.

However, it looks unlikely this time around as Sindhu in the recent past has not been able to stamp her class in the various tournaments she has played in. However, Sindhu is still optimistic about winning a medal and said Friday that she has got a favourable draw. However, she insisted that she has to be on top of her game since no match will be easy at the Olympic level.

Reigning World Champion and Rio Games silver medallist, Sindhu has been drawn with Hong Kong's Cheung Ngan Yi (ranked 34th) and Israel's Ksenia Polikarpova (ranked 58th) in Group J of the women's singles event.

"It's a good draw in the group stage. The Hong Kong girl plays well and it's going to be a good match," Sindhu, who is currently ranked seventh in the world, said in a release issued by Badminton

Association of India (BAI). "Everybody is going to be in top form, I hope I do well. Every game is important so I will take match by match. This is Olympics and it is not going to be easy, each point is very

important," said the sixth seed. Sindhu has an all-win record against her group stage opponents Ngan Yi and Polikarpova in the five and two encounters she has played against them respectively. In men's singles, World No 15 B Sai Praneeth has been placed in Group D alongside World No 29 Mark Caliouw of the Netherlands and World No 47 Israeli shuttler Misha Zilberman.

"It's a mixed draw, not so tough and not so easy. I have to be 100

per cent to win all matches and hopefully it will be a good outcome for me," World Championships bronze medallist Praneeth said. If Praneeth advances to the quarters he is likely to face top seed

New Delhi, July 9: Rahi Sarnobat's relaxed demeanour and her ability to withstand the most nerve-wracking situations is what sets her apart from many of her compatriots and rival competitors.

The scene is from the 2018 Asian Games in Palembang (Indonesia), where despite the air-conditioners running full blast, spectators at the arena were left sweating by the intensity of the competition. India's young Manu Bhaker had just wilted under pressure in the 25m pistol event finishing sixth, but Rahi, then 27, was smashing one target after another with pin-point accuracy to win her maiden Asian Games gold.

Celebrations over, the Kolhapur



shooter reached out to her German coach of Mongolian origin, Munkhbayer Dorjsuren – a twotime World Champion - and hugged her with glee.

Very few knew the struggle Rahi had to go through before glory. She

was suffering from an injured elbow since 2014. After a long steroid therapy and a laparoscopic surgery in 2016 Rahi returned to the Asian Games in 2018 and achieved glory.

As the 30-year-old Rahi aims at Olympic glory in Tokyo, she is once again hitting top form, having clinched gold in the ISSF World Cup held recently in the Croatian city of Osijek. She is once again motivated and her driving force is the

same German coach, Munkhbayer. Rahi had silently walked out of the 2018 Asian Games shooting arena with her equipment bag and a fat book in hand. If she attains glory in Tokyo, India will have another shooting icon, but Rahi's 'philosophy' will remain the same -a steely resolve and an unflinching temperament.

Covid scare: SL series rescheduled

New Delhi, July 9: India's white ball away series against Sri Lanka has been rescheduled as the hosts have been hit hard by the Covid-19 virus. After batting coach Grant Flower had tested positive Thursday for the virus, it was the turn of analyst GT Niroshan to be infected. Sri Lanka Cricket (SLC) said in a statement that Niroshan has tested positive for Covid-19 and has been put in isolation.

The team led by Shikhar Dhawan was scheduled to open their threegame ODI campaign with the first being played July 13. However, now to enforce protocols in a proper manner, the ODI series will start July 17 with the other two games being played July 19 and 21. Similarly the dates of the T20 series have also been changed. The matches will now be played July 24, 25, 27. All the games will be played at the Sri Lankan capital Colombo. 'Yes, the series will now start

from 17th of July instead of 13th. The decision was taken in consultation with SLC keeping the safety and security of players in mind," a senior BCCI official said, confirming the development.

Earlier in the day SLC confirmed that other than Niroshan all other members of the squad had tested negative. "Niroshan was found to be positive, following a PCR test carried out among the national players, coaches, and support staff yesterday (Thursday).

Djokovic sets

Wimbledon, July 9: TTop seed Novak Djokovic remained on course for yet another Wimbledon triumph with a 7-6 (7-3), 7-5, 7-5 win over Denis Shapovalov here Friday. He will meet No. 7 seeded Matteo Berrettini who overcame No. 14 seed, Hubert Hurkacz 6-3, 6-0, 6-7 (3-7), 6-4 in an earlier semifinal played on the day.

Djokovic played the crucial points well against Shapovalov and it was this ability which helped the Serb win the match in straight sets. Shapovalov had 12 breakpoints in the match against Djokovic, but failed to convert a single one.

Djokovic on the other hand got the crucial break of serve in the 11th game of the third set and then sealed the match in the next game with an ace on his first match point.

Earlier cries of "Vai!" (Go!), "Forza!" (Let's go!) and even "Andiamo, amore mio!" (Let's go, my love!) rang through Centre Court as Berrettini became Italy's first Grand Slam finalist in 45 years. With booming serves delivering 22 aces, and powerful forehands helping compile a total of 60 winners, Berrettini used an 11-game streak in the first and second sets to win the match without any major problem.

"I have no words. Really. Just, 'Thanks'. And I need, I think, a couple of hours to understand what happened," Berrettini told the capacity crowd after the match.
