Justice (retd) Ranjit Singh to monitor the probe; says it is not confident about the manner in which the govt-appointed SIT is recording evidence

New Delhi, Nov 8: The Supreme Court Monday suggested that a former judge of a "different high court" should monitor the Uttar Pradesh SIT probe on a day-to-day basis in the Lakhimpur Kheri violence case to infuse 'independence, impartiality and fairness" saying the investigation was not going the way it expected. Red flagging some of the issues

pertaining to the SIT probe conducted so far, the top court said, "prima facie it appears that one particular accused (in the farmers' mowing down case) is sought to be given benefit" by securing or procuring evidence from witnesses in the subsequent case related to the lynching of political activists by the farmers' mob.

It was also very critical of the Special Investigation Team of state

police has seized the mobile of Ashish Mishra and rest of the phones belonged to the witnesses to

the mowing down of the farmers. 'We have seen the status report. There is nothing in the status report except to say that some more witnesses have been examined. We granted 10 days time. Laboratory reports have not come. No, no, no...It is not going the way we expected," said the bench headed by Chief Justice NV Ramana.

Reiterating its earlier observation to rule out a CBI probe into the October 3 incident, the bench said it did not want to add any "political overtones" to the case and an independent retired judge should monitor the probe. It asked senior advocate Harish Salve, appearing for UP, to appraise it of the stand of the state government by November 12 on the suggestion that the SIT judge of a different high court.

Making clear that the probe into two separate FIRs related to the mowing down of the farmers and the subsequent lynching of political activists respectively should be carried out separately, the bench said it seemed that the evidence in the lynching case was being "procured or secured" to save the accused in the earlier case.

"One thing more we have in mind is that to ensure that the evidence in FIR no. 219 (pertaining to mowing down of farmers) is recorded independently and in FIR no. 220 (lynching of political activists) it is also recorded independently and there is no overlapping or inter-mixing in the two sets of evidence, we are inclined to appoint a former judge of a different high court to monitor the probe on day-to-day basis and then see how the separate charge sheets are prepared," the bench said.

"We, somehow or the other, are not confident We propose to appoint a person like say from Punjab and Haryana HC, Justice Ranjit Singh, who has an expertise in criminal law and army background...Let an independent judge like Justice Rakesh Kumar Jain, again from the same HC, monitor everything," it said.

Fresh claims of kickbacks in Rafale deal rattle govt

■ The French journal alleges despite the existence of documentary evidence, the CBI decided not to pursue the matter

New Delhi, Nov 8: French investigative journal Mediapart has made fresh claims that alleged bogus invoices were used that enabled French aircraft maker Dassault Aviation to pay at least 7.5 million euros in secret commissions to a middleman to help it secure the Rafale deal with India.

Mediapart had reported in July that a French judge has been appointed to lead a "highly sensitive" judicial investigation into suspected corruption" and favouritism in the ₹59,000-crore inter-governmental deal with India for the supply of 36 Rafale fighter jets.

There was no reaction yet on the latest report from the defence ministry or Dassault Aviation. "Mediapart is today publishing the alleged false invoices that enabled French aircraft manufacturer Dassault Aviation to pay at least 7.5 million euros in secret commissions to a middleman to help secure the sale of 36 Rafale fighter aircraft to India," the journal said in its new report Sunday.

It alleged that despite the existence of "these documents", the Indian probe agencies decided not to pursue the matter. "It involves offshore companies, dubious con-



tracts and "false" invoices. Mediapart can reveal that detectives from India's federal police force, the Central Bureau of Investigations (CBI), and colleagues from the Enforcement Directorate (ED), which fights money laundering, have had proof since October 2018 that French aviation firm Dassault paid at least 7.5 million euros (equivalent to just under ₹650 million) in secret commissions to middleman Sushen Gupta," Mediapart claimed in the report.

This was in the context of the French firm's long and ultimately successful attempt to secure a 7.8 billion-euro-deal in 2016 to sell 36 of its Rafale fighters to India," it said. Rafale manufacturer Dassault Aviation and India's defence ministry have previously trashed allegations of any corruption in the contract. India's Supreme Court too in 2019 dismissed petitions seeking a probe into the deal say-

ing there was no ground for it. In a statement published in April, reacting to Mediapart's report on the investigation. Dassault Aviation stated that the group, "acts in strict compliance with the OECD Anti-Bribery Convention.

Jawan shoots dead four colleagues as they were sleeping

Sukma, Nov 8: Four CRPF personnel were killed and three others injured after their colleague opened fire at them in a camp of the paramilitary force in Chhattisgarh's ukma district Monday, a police official said.

The incident took place at around 3.15 am in the camp of the Central Reserve Police Force's (CRPF) 50th battalion in . Linganpalli village under Maraiguda police station of the area of the district, located nearly 400 km from the state capital Raipur, Inspector General of Police (Bastar range) Sundarraj P said.

As per preliminary information, constable Reetesh Ranjan fired at his colleagues with his service weapon, an AK-47 rifle, the official said. The seven injured personnel were immediately shifted to a hospital in nearby Bhadrachalam area of neighbouring Telangana, where doctors declared four of them dead on ar-

rival, the official said Those killed were identified as constables Rajmani Kumar Yadav, Rajib Mondal, Dhanji and Dharmendra Kumar, he said. adding that three other injured personnel were being treated at the hospital. "The motive behind the firing is yet to be ascertained and an investigation is on into the incident." the official said. Constable Ranjan was immediately held and his interrogation is underway.

Bhawanipatna, Nov 8: Amid protests by the Opposition, Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik Monday visited Kalahandi district for a government programme and shared dais with Minister of State for Home Dibya Shankar Mishra who has been charged with patronising the prime accused in the kidnap and murder of a woman teacher in the district last month.

Patnaik, who has been maintaining silence over the demand for the sacking of the minister, sent a clear message to opposition parties that he has faith in Mishra.

The Chief Minister launched the distribution of smart cards for the state government's health scheme, the Biju Swasthya Kalyan Yojana (BKSY), at the Agriculture College Ground at Bhawanipatna, besides inaugurating several projects and laying foundation stones for some others.

There was tight police security in several strategic locations in Bhawanipatna to ensure that Patnaik's visit was peaceful.

Mishra who is the MLA of Junagarh in Kalahandi and two other ministers Naba Kisore Das and Tukuni Sahu were at the stage along with the Chief Minister.

In protest against Patnaik's visit, protests were held by opposition parties across the state, in Kalahandi where the BJP's women's members staged a sit-in shouting 'go back' slogans against the CM and Mishra, before being taken to a bus by police. The saffron party workers burnt effigies of Patnaik demanding, besides Mishra's removal as a minister, his arrest and a CBI probe into the case. Protesters scuffled with police at various places while many opposition workers were detained as a preventive measure.

Opposition parties are mounting pressure on Patnaik to sack Mishra alleging that he is close to the prime accused in the murder of Mamita and that was why he was able to escape October 17 night from Titlagarh police barrack in Bolangir district, where he was kept.

Final voter list for GP polls December 14

Bhubaneswar, Nov 8: The final voters' list for Panchayat elections in Odisha will be published December 14, State Election Commissioner SEC) Aditva Prasad Padhi said Monday.

Addressing a press conference here, Padhi said: "The tenure of the three-tier Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRI) in the state will end in March, 2022 and elections to form fresh councils will be conducted before the end of the term.

Therefore, the State Election Commission has started preparing electoral rolls for the upcoming poll. Those who have attained 18 years of age as on November 1, 2021, would be included in voters list. The eligible people can apply for inclusion of their names in the electoral roll through proper forms," he added.

"The Election Commission of India has updated the Assembly constituency voters' list. We will split it ward-wise and the preliminary voters' list will be displayed at the Gram Panchayat headquarters November 16." he further said.

People seeking any changes can submit their applications to Panchayat Extension Officer, incharge electoral registration officer, by November 23. The concerned authorities can make necessary corrections and dispose of the applications in between November 24

Those, who are having disputes with the drafted list at Panchayatlevel, can submit their petition before the Block Development Officer (BDO) on November 29 and 30. The BDO will hear the petitions and dispose of those during December 1 to 2, Padhi said.

The SEC informed that BDOs will prepare the final voters' list on December 4 and send it to the State Election Commission by December 6. The Commission will publish it by December 14.

This will be practiced in 29 out of 30 districts. However, Balasore district has been excluded from this practice for the time being, due to delay in reservation and delimitation process by the state government in view of formation of Remuna NAC, added Padhi.

Pegasus: Israel distances from NSO after US blacklist

■ In a blow to NSO Group, the creator of Pegasus spyware, Israel has distanced itself from the company. This follows blacklisting of the company by the United States

Jerusalem, Nov 8: Israel has distanced itself from the controversy triggered by the NSO Group after the US blacklisted the technology firm, which had developed the Pegasus spyware that was allegedly used to target government officials, activists and journalists globally, saying that it is a private company and it has nothing to do with the policies of the Israeli government.

"NSO is a private company, it is not a governmental project and therefore even if it is designated, it has nothing to do with the policies of the Israeli government," Israel's Foreign Minister, Yair Lapid, said at a joint press conference with Prime Minister Naftali Bennett and Finance Minister Avigdor Lieberman at the Prime Minister's Office Saturday evening.

"I don't think there is another country in the world which has such strict rules according to cyber warfare and that is imposing those



rules more than Israel and we will continue to do so," Lapid stressed. The Israeli Foreign Minister's remarks came after the US on

Wednesday sanctioned the Herzliyabased company over alleged misuse of its phone-hacking spyware in countries across the world, in-

The US Department of Commerce's Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS) on Wednesday added the NSO Group and Candiru to the Entity List for engaging in activities that are contrary to the national security or foreign policy interests of the United States.

It said in a statement that they were added to the Entity List based on evidence that it developed and supplied spyware to foreign governments that used these tools to maliciously target government officials, journalists, businesspeople, activists, academics and embassy workers.

These tools have also enabled foreign governments to conduct transnational repression, which is the practice of authoritarian governments targeting dissidents. journalists and activists outside of their sovereign borders to silence dissent. Such practices threaten the rules-based international order, the US commerce department said.

Lapid's comments are the first public remarks by a senior Israeli minister since the US announced the blacklisting Wednesday. The top three ministers of the Israeli government were addressing the press after the passing of the budget.





7 MEMBERS **OF KBN GANG NABBED: DCP**

Bhubaneswar, Nov 8: The Commissionerate Police has claimed to have arrested seven members, including two Monday, of the KBN gang that has struck fear among the denizens for the past several days through some viral videos on social media platforms. The gang members are seen roaming around the city brandishing sharp weapons and firearms late in the night.

The arrested were identified as Sahil Sagar Sarangi, 19, of Salipur in Cuttack and Kanhu Sahu, 23, of Aska in Ganjam

Sarangi is currently staying at Paika Nagar and Sahu is residing at Delta Square under Navapalli police limits. Earlier, five other members of the gang, known as KBN (Koi Bhai Nahi) or Town Tiger were also arrested in different cases registered at Khandagiri and Nayapalli police stations.

DCP Umashankar Dash Monday informed the media that a case has been registered at Nayapalli police station against 29 persons of the gang in connection with the viral video. "An edited video that went viral on various media and social media platforms after it was uploaded on Instagram has created an atmosphere of fear among the citizens. We have taken the video seriously and identified all the gang members present in it," said Dash

He also said anyone who received any kind of threat or suffered any criminal actions by these gangs should inform the police.

He assured that the names of the informants would be kept secret. The Commissionerate Police also bulldozed the residence of Rajesh Kumar Behera alias Chenga, one of the gang members, during a house search on the suspicion of storing firearms at Pokhariput here Monday. Dash said police have launched a manhunt to nab the

COLLEGES TOLD TO USE SMART **CLASSROOMS**

Education (HE) department Monday instructed colleges of the state to effectively utilise virtual classrooms.

In a letter to the principals of 51 degree colleges, Additional Secretary of the department Raiashree Mohanty instructed the college authorities to utilise the smart classrooms for teaching and learning process.

She also said that colleges had been instructed to maintain a log book indicating the number of classes taken by teachers along with student attendance, and submit the copy of the same to the department. However, due to the pandemic and nationwide lockdowns from March 2020, all physical classes were suspended. So far, no report regarding this has been received by

the department. Now that the pandemic has re ceded considerably and physical classes have resumed, effective utilisation of smart classroom installed in the colleges has become the need of the hour, she said, adding that at least 10-15 classes per week must be taken in the smart classroom to meet the objective of the scheme.

"You are therefore directed to arrange classes in smart classrooms and maintain a register. The use of classrooms will be inspected by the senior officials by way of surprise visit," she wrote in her letter.

Two teams to probe **Brahmagiri bombing**

Puri: Two dedicated teams have been formed to probe the group clash in Brahmagiri area here Sunday that saw bomb hurling in which 10 persons suffered injuries, superintendent of police (SP) Kanwar Vishal Singh said Monday. "Now, the situation is under control. Five platoons of police force have been deployed at the clash site. An additional SP will supervise the probe. The persons involved in the bomb hurling will be taken into custody," Singh added.

State sees 387% jump in student suicides

Bhubaneswar, Nov 8: Students always play a pivotal role in the development of a country and loss of students' lives adversely affects the growth of the country or a state. However, Odisha losing 1,469 precious lives of the youngsters has emerged as a cause for concern.

It's ironical that Odisha has recently witnessed a spurt in student suicide cases amidst the novel coronavirus induced pandemic. With 1,469 student suicide cases, the state recorded 387.59 per cent rise in such cases in 2020 as compared to the previous year. As per the National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB) report on 'Accidental Death and Suicides in India', Odisha holds the second spot in student suicide cases in the country. As many as 379 students of the state ended their lives in 2019.

A perusal of previous year's reports indicated at a mercurial growth in the number of student suicides in Odisha.

It's significant to note here that such cases always remained around 400 during the last 20 years, barring 2018, when the number of suicides committed by students rose to 501



Puri civic body's decision to collect user fee sparks protest

Puri, Nov 8: Social activists Monday staged a demonstration before the District Collector's office and threatened to launch a 'Satvagraha' to protest the decision of the Puri Municipality to collect user fees from the residents.

As many as 21 city-based organisations formed a joint coordination committee led by the president of Puri Bikash Parishad Jagannath Bastia to protest the civic body's decision.

A demonstration was staged in front of the Collector's office. The social activists announced to launch a Satyagrah against the civic body if the administration does not scrap the proposal. The civic body has announced it will collect user fees from residents from November 10.

A charter of demands was handed over to Puri Collector Samarth Verma who is also the administrator of the civic body in the absence of an elected council.

During a discussion with the Collector, activists pointed out that



body, the activists said, is arbitrary as the municipality has not organised ward committee meetings

charging user fees on the pretext that huge amount of money is being spent on the ongoing drive for improving sanitation and on payment to outsourced agencies is not based on facts.

Bastia said residents are paying holding tax at enhanced rates to the municipality for sanitation, solid waste management. He further said it is the primary duty of the civic body to provide basic amenities to residents

This apart, both Union and state governments are releasing huge funds to the civic body as grants for collection of garbage and solid waste disposal work.

The decision of the civic body, the activists said, is arbitrary as the municipality has not organised ward committee meetings to get a public opinion before announcing it.

They described the action of the civic body as beyond the rule of governance, unconstitutional, illegal and against the interests of residents at large and demanded that it should be scrapped forthwith.

The Collector assured the delegation that he would discuss the issue with the civic body and consider the points of the demand letter.

The activists postponed their Satyagrah programme after an assurance from the Collector.

TTV in humans can act as biomarker for Covid

eople infected with SARS-CoV-2 are more likely to have increased load of Torquetenovirus (TTV), an apparently inoffensive virus most frequently found in humans, which can be used as a marker of Covid-19 severity and recovery, according to researchers.

Besides humans, TTV is also common in monkeys and domestic animals. Its presence has not been associated with any known disease, but its excessive replication is a sign that something is wrong with the immune system.

The correlation between high

TTV load and immunosuppression has been used in medicine in certain contexts, such as monitoring transplant patients who take medication to prevent rejection of

the transplanted organ. A study by researchers at the University of Sao Paulo (USP) in Brazil analysed samples from 91 patients diagnosed with SARS-CoV-2 by RT-PCR, and from 126 people with flu symptoms who tested neg■ The results, reported in the journal PLOS ONE, showed that TTV titer is higher in subjects infected by the novel coronavirus

Temporary camps left with night watchers Special from Nov 12

Khurda, Nov 8: As Chilika, Asia's largest brackish water lagoon, witnesses the inflow of migratory birds, the alleged absence of deployed officials in the temporary camps that are set up to watch out for threats has raised eyebrows.

As per Chilika Wildlife Division sources, around 22,000 birds of over 60 species have already landed at the Ramsar site. Foreign birds of more than 20 species have been recorded in Mangalajodi and other nearby areas under Tangi Wildlife range.

To ensure protection of the avian guests, the Forest department has set up 11 temporary camps at Mangalajodi, Bhusandapur, Balipatapur, Deypur, Dholapur, Barunapada, Halisinga, Abhimanpur, Sundarpur, Nairi and Sorana

Each camp is meant to station one forester, one forest guard, and one night watcher. These camps are placed to protect the migratory birds from hunters, who operate along the banks of the lagoon during winter. However, many of these camps are running without foresters and guards. While only night watchers are present in these camps, the rest of the staffers are nowhere nearby

When contacted, Tangi Wildlife official CH Murmu said that forest guards have been deployed in all the temporary camps. They are in contact with the locals under their jurisdictions and are vigilant towards birds' security. Since there

is a crunch of foresters, each guard has been assigned with two

The serenity of Chilika, along with the conglomeration of colourful birds, attracts visitors and birdwatchers. Photographers are particularly interested in birds searching for food or flying over the Nalabana and Rajadala regions. However, inflow of migratory birds has not been spectacular so far at Mangalajodi. The place is primarily observing the movement of indigenous birds, according to some tourists.

ILS scientist bags NASI award

Bhubaneswar: Soma Chattopadhyay, Scientist at the Institute of Life Science (ILS). Bhubaneswar, has been selected for the NASI-Reliance Industries Platinum Jubilee Awards 2021. The award has been conferred on her by the National Academy of Sciences, Allahabad for her application-oriented research in the field of biological science. Chattopadhyay's research group has been working on the Chikungunya virus while focusing on developing key reagents to conduct basic research on the same. She has successfully developed and characterised novel, highly sensitive and specific polyclonal antibodies against the non-structural proteins of CHIKV i.e. nsP1, nsP3 and nsP4, along with a monoclonal antibody against nsP2 of CHIKV. The epitopes were analysed against 37 different CHIKV strains and were found to be effective. These antibodies are now being used worldwide. Earlier, she had also received the Biotech Product, Process Development and Commercialization Award 2019 by the Department of Biotechnology, Government of India. The group played a vital role in Covid-19 research, with isolation and characterisation of SARS-CoV-2 virus cultures from patient samples, and made it available for further anti-viral and vaccine research as well as screening of numerous antiviral compounds against both CHIKV and SARS-CoV-2. The group has played a prominent role in establishing the antiviral screening platform at DBT-ILS.

50% fresh Covid cases reported from Khurda

Gajapati 'most vulnerable' to climate change

The first-of-its-kind report released by the Council on Energy, Environment and Water analysed 640 districts in India and found 463 are vulnerable to extreme floods, droughts and cyclones



Bhubaneswar, Nov 8: The states of Assam, Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra, Karnataka and Bihar are the most vulnerable to extreme climate events such as floods. droughts and cyclones in India, according to a first-of-its-kind Climate Vulnerability Index released recently by the Council on Energy, Environment and Water (CEEW). Overall, 27 Indian states and Union Territories are vulnerable to extreme climate events which often disrupt the local economy and displace weaker communities.

The report 'Mapping India's Climate Vulnerability - A Districtlevel Assessment', which has been supported by the India Climate Collaborative and Edelgive Foundation, has analysed 640 districts in India and found that 463 of these are vulnerable to extreme floods, droughts and cyclones.

More than 80 per cent of **Indians live in districts** vulnerable to climate risks. that is, 17 of 20 people in the country are vulnerable to climate risks

Dhemaji and Nagaon in Assam, Khammam in Telangana, Gajapati in Odisha, Vizianagaram in Andhra Pradesh, Sangli in Maharashtra and Chennai in Tamil Nadu are among India's most climate vulnerable districts, finds the study.

More than 80 per cent of Indians live in districts vulnerable to climate risks, that is, 17 of 20 people in the country are vulnerable to climate risks, out of which every five Indians live in areas that are extremely vulnerable, finds the report. It further says that more than 45 per cent of these districts have undergone

"unsustainable landscape and infrastructure changes".

Further, 183 hotspot districts are highly vulnerable to more than one extreme climate event. The CEEW study also found that more than 60 per cent of Indian districts have medium to low adaptive capacity in handling extreme weather events.

Echoing the findings of the latest IPCC Physical Science report, the CEEW report points out that most districts in India have been made particularly vulnerable due to "landscape disruptions" like the disappearance of forest cover, over-construction, degradation of wetlands and other natural ecosystems.

"The anthropogenic activity in changing the land use and therefore degradation of natural eco-systems - which means that an already vulnerable district becomes even more vulnerable to impacts of natural disasters. For instance, Puri

in Odisha has always been prone to cyclones. But it has over the years experienced 49.78 per cent loss of wetlands and 39 per cent loss in mangroves which would act as a natural barrier, making it more vulnerable," says CEEW Programme Lead and author of the study, Abinash Mohanty.

The study also highlighted that states in India's northeast are more vulnerable to floods, while the ones in the south and central are most vulnerable to extreme droughts. Further, 59 and 41 per cent of the total districts in the eastern and western states, respectively, are highly vulnerable to extreme cyclones

The CEEW study also indicated that only 63 per cent of Indian districts have a District Disaster Management Plan (DDMP). While these plans need to be updated every year, only 32 per cent of them had updated plans until 2019. Highly vulnerable states like Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Odisha, Karnataka and Gujarat have improved their respective DDMPs and climateproofed critical infrastructures in recent vears.

Creating the infrastructure to combat extreme weather events is what has put the states of West Bengal and Kerala at the bottom of the vulnerability pile among the surveyed states. Along with Tripura. West Bengal is the third least vulnerable and Kerala the least vulnerable, despite being coastal states and prone to annual cyclones and flooding. "The difference in ranking between the states is really marginal – as they are all vulnerable. But these states have fared better because they have really stepped up their climate action plans. Kerala, for instance, dealt with the 2018 floods remarkably well," says Mohanty.

After 20 years, Saharpur again a safe haven for bats

Villagers have ensured that the bats feel safe and do not face any danger. Bangali Charan Rout, a resident of Saharpur, said that the bats are staying on trees at the backyard of his house. "They fly about from one tree to another in the day time. At night they venture out in search of food. At dawn, they come back to the trees. In summer, some bats die for want of

'The youths sprinkle water on these trees and keep food in polythene packets in the trees so that they do not face any problem," Bangali said.

Banambar Sahu, an environmentalist of Derabish, said that bats play a key role in maintaining ecological balance, but many people unwittingly hate them. "The bats feed on various insects affecting paddy and other crops," he observed.

eghalaya Governor and BJP leader Satya Pal Malik has done it again. He has gone hammer and tongs against the Centre, questioning the wisdom of some of its crucial decisions, including the three controversial farm laws, policies and even the party's tall claim of stemming the tide of corruption that flourished during the previous UPA-II government. The belligerence this time is even greater than on the recent two occasions. The timing appears to be perfect. For, his outbursts on the occasion of a global Jat conference in Jaipur November 7 coincided with the BJP's first national executive meeting in two years at Delhi. Interestingly, the political resolution adopted at the meeting was silent on the three farm laws. It was only in response to media query on farmers' protests that Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman said the government has time and again expressed its willingness to talk to farmer unions and asked them to list their grievances on the three laws. On the other hand, the resolution highlighted the government's programmes for their welfare, including the release of new varieties of crops, farm credit, PM-KISAN scheme and Kisan Rail among others. But, its studied silence on the farm laws themselves, the issues of the Citizenship Amendment Act (CAA) and the military standoff with China is, indeed, deafening,

What is puzzling the nation is the open revolt by the Meghalaya Governor, who is a BJP nominee, against the Centre. He himself conceded that he had been given the post by 'two to three' leaders in Delhi and no one is left in any doubt about who they are. What he has said this time around may test the patience of the BJP leadership far more than what he had said earlier. It may be interesting to note, as a sideline, that Satyapal Malik's vociferous open opposition of the Modi government might be the key for which his position is safe till now. Any retaliation against him would be construed as punishment for speaking the truth. Although action against him cannot be ruled out, it might be risky for the BJP leadership's image, which is already facing criticism. Malik was sarcastic at his best when he said Central leaders send a condolence message when a dog dies, but there was not a word from the Centre on the death of 600 farmers agitating against the farm laws. In an audacious reference to the assassination of the then Prime Minister Indira Gandhi by her Sikh bodyguards in 1984, he said he had urged PM Narendra Modi not to antagonise Sikhs and Jats who form the bulk of the protesters against the farm laws.

He didn't stop there and went on to say the farmers' agitation is having repercussions on the Army as well as many of the country's soldiers belong to farmers' families. The smouldering rage may lead to any consequences, he warned, which could have been construed as provocation to create disaffection among soldiers against the State, had it come from any other government critic

He further said he had reminded the PM that Indira Gandhi had performed a yajna at her farmhouse because she feared she might have to pay with her life for the Operation Blue Star to neutralise the Khalistanis taking shelter in the Golden Temple complex fighting against the Army. The broad hint is

He revealed he had suggested to the PM to tell the protesting farmers that though he thought they were wrong, yet he would accept their point of view as he could not endure their suffering. This, according to him, would have enhanced the PM's stature in the eyes of the nation. It does sound like a sensible suggestion, even though the Governor seems to have glossed over the corporate interests influencing the decision on the farm laws. He also divulged that some in the government are sympathetic to the farmers' cause.

He repeated his prediction that the BJP will not be able to retain power in UP as it has incurred the wrath of farmers, while the prospect in Goa is equally bad because the BJP Chief Minister there is mired in 'corruption. Earlier, he had accused a key BJP leader, known to be close to the RSS chief, and a corporate house of insisting on his clearance of some files for which a staggering amount of money was offered to him as bribe. He claimed after he informed the PM of this development, the latter told him not to clear the files. That no action has been taken by the Modi government against the accused for alleged corruption at high offices is another matter.

At the same time, he has called into question the Modi government's most ambitious and controversial Vista Redevelopment Project in the Capital and said the huge money being spent on it could have been better utilised by setting up world class academic institutions.

Now, the question is why the BJP central leadership and the RSS are tolerating Malik spilling the beans and damaging the party's poll prospects in UP and Goa, in particular. Two questions survive, Does Malik know too much for which any action before the crucial state Assembly polls would cause incalculable harm to the party? Is trouble brewing in the Sangh Parivar itself and Malik is being used to advance the interests of one group to corner another? The silence and hesitation of the Centre to take action against Malik strengthens suspicion and speculation. The challenge he has thrown at the BJP top leadership by announcing that he won't take minutes to resign if he is removed from his post for his utterances only confirms the huge risks entailed in disciplining him. This is music to the ears of the Opposition. It seems all's not well with the Sangh Parivar however much the party tries to project it is different from the Congress parivar.

■ Polish off

his does indeed often appear in connection with food, the key idea being that of consuming it completely and probably quickly: I could easily polish off a packet of biscuits throughout the afternoon, before my dinner of cheesy pasta with buttered bread (The Sun (London), 15 May 2016). It can be used in a variety of other situations, implying the rapid completion of some activity or the subjugation of some adversary: Freshman Matt McFadden returned the opening kickoff 36 yards and senior Kyle Wigley polished off the drive with a two-vard run into the end zone (Gettysburg Times (Pennsylvania), 14 November 2015). He'll limp to the election; cross the line sadly weakened; and then, in due course, be polished off by another thrusting contender who better understands the political process and can command a majority of the party (The Age (Melbourne), 24 May 2016). The idiom has been around since at least the early nineteenth century. Its initial examples were all in the more general sense, extending to getting rid of something, or even to destroy or kill. The application to food seems to have come along a little later in the century, sometimes being simplified to polish without the off. But in his Classical Dictionary of the Vulgar Tongue of 1785 Francis Grose mentions to polish a bone, meaning to eat a meal, so perhaps the food sense really did come first. The idea here is presumably that of clearing the dish by eating everything on it so thoroughly that it ends up appearing polished. This modern work makes it explicit: He knew that it was polite to leave a little something on your plate when you finished, but this evening he decided to throw etiquette aside and polished his plate to a shine (Adam, by Richard Allen Stotts, 2001). The earliest usages of polish off, however, focus on defeating somebody. Some slang dictionaries expressly say that the first context for the idiom was "pugilistic", that is, linked to bare-knuckle fist fighting: Bob had his coat off at once — he stood up to the Banbury man for three minutes, and polished him off in four rounds easy (Vanity Fair, by William Makepeace Thackeray, 1847).

THE OBJECTIVES **DEMONETISATION WERE NEVER SPELT OUT CLEARLY, AND** THE NARRATIVE **KEPT CHANGING** IN THE COURSE **OF THE FOLLOWING**

YEAR

♥his week marks the fifth anniversary of the day demonetisation was sprung on the nation at merely four hours' notice. The Prime Minister announced at 8pm November 8, 2016, that all ₹1,000 and ₹500 notes would cease to be legal tender from midnight. Effectively 86 per cent of the currency was taken away, and the new replacement notes were not yet ready. For several months Indians did not have access to their own funds. And the small numbers of notes issued initially were all in ₹2000 denomination, which didn't help since nobody had change (of the new ₹500 denomination). There were long lines of people outside bank branches and ATMs desperate to withdraw the small ₹4000 limit allowed in the early days. There were cases of rioting, attacks on bank staff, and people also died, some of them waiting in lines to withdraw money.

Snatching away the belongings of people was a very harsh and cruel public policy measure. After 50 days, in late December the government also passed an ordinance (later made into law) that possession of old notes was illegal (on par with owning drugs). There is telling irony and pathos, that recently, unaware of demonetisation which happened five years ago, a blind person, a destitute, who earned his keep by begging in the Krishnagiri district of Tamil Nadu, asked the collector to exchange his entire life savings of ₹65,000 in old notes. Of course, he was denied. There are probably lakhs of such savers who in the past five years discovered that their savings were equal to mud, and had no recourse. And yet month after month, after that fateful November 8 announcement, public opinion surveys showed strong support for the Prime Minister's intent. People around the country, especially the poor were convinced that some big fish were fried and were caught with their pants down. The PM's message was that hoarding cash was black money, and the sudden almost 'surgical attack' took the big fat black money hoarders by surprise. If this thesis was correct

then a substantial portion of the demonetised money should not have come back into the banking system. But it became clear within first 60 days itself, confirmed by the RBI much later in August 2017, that more than 99 per cent of the cash had been turned in

This return of demonetised currency into the banking system was not surprising at all. That's because the government's own data from several years of income tax raids and action by the Enforcement Directorate, had shown that nearly 93 per cent of illgotten wealth was in the form of benami land, gold, real estate, stocks and foreign accounts. So only 7 per cent of black money sits around as cash. Even then demonetising high value notes is a good idea, mooted by the OECD, the European Central Bank and even the former Chief Economist of the International Monetary Fund, Ken Rogoff, among many others. But their version of discontinuing high value notes was with an advance notice of 12 to 18 months. And to certainly not to introduce even higher value notes!

The highest value note in the United States is \$100 which is 0.16 per cent in value of their per capita income. And most of the \$100 notes are actually circulating outside the US not within. For India, a ₹2000 note represents 1.3 per cent of the country's per capita income. That's more than eight times

the ratio of the US. Since it is eight times higher in relative terms, than that of the US, by American standards our highest denomination should be 1/8th of ₹2000 which is around ₹350. So a maximum ₹500 denomination should suffice. If demonetisation was supposed to make a big dent on black money, it clearly failed.

Incidentally, the cash in circulation prior to November 8, 2016, was ₹18 lakh crore, and five years later it is ₹28.3 lakh crore, a jump of 57.5 per cent -- roughly a 10 per cent per year growth, higher than the real GDP growth. In these times of high inflation, the cash with the public is extraordinarilv high. This is despite a steep rise in electronic payments and the widespread use of the Unified Payment Interface (UPI). The latter is clocking more than 4 billion transactions every month, and annually will clock 25 billion transactions as against 15 billion in China. But it can be argued that India's digital journey did not need a demonetisation 'jhatka'. It would have happened anyway, as the current pace of adoption shows. More importantly the share of payments (by value) which are instant payments of the UPI kind is 15.6 per cent, as per a study by a US company called ACI Worldwide. Even the RBI's annual report shows that retail non-cash, instant payment systems still have a lot of catching up to do. It is undoubted

that the pace of adoption of digital payments is super-fast, but no credit for this should be given to demonetisation.

The objectives of demonetisation were never spelt out clearly, and the narrative kept changing in the course of the following year. First it was an attack on black money, counterfeit currency, terrorist financing. Next it was mopping up extra income tax and bringing more people into the tax net. Next it was to make India move rapidly to cashless transactions. And then again, it was to enable the ecosys tem of fintech companies and innovation in the financial system None of this has borne out However, one can use the 'post hoc, ergo propter hoc' fallacy to justify that demonetisation goals (what ever they were) have been met. Not only does 'correlation does not mean causation', but also, just because X follows Y, it does not mean that Y causes X to happen. All this may sound too nuanced, and it will need this year's economics Nobel winners to tease out the causality between demonetisation and subsequent effects.

Undeniably the following propositions still hold. Firstly, people suffered hardship. Secondly the informal sector economy was badly hit. Thirdly the popularity of the Prime Minister, who took ownership of the decision, remained undiminished. (This could be attributed to his power of projecting a 'reality distortion field' as often referred to by the legendary business leader and innovator Steve Jobs). It is the power of his charisma. Fourth, cash is back in circulation with a vengeance, despite a steep increase in digital payments. Fifth, until the pandemic year GDP growth declined continuously and investment to the GDP ratio stagnated. Lastly, the informal economy as a share of the total economy has shrunk, although the factors are many. The analysis of shrinkage of the informal economy is left for another column

The economy that planetary health needs

sions of how the crisis would reshape the global economy. Many heralded the opportunity to transform our financial systems, supply chains, and ways of working. The overall message was that the postpandemic future would be greener, healthier, and more just.

Now, almost two years after the pandemic started, excitement about creating an economic 'new normal' has mostly dissipated. Apart from occasional lockdowns and mask wearing, the world has largely returned to business as usual. The fight against the pandemic repeatedly has been described as a 'war,' but there have been no radical changes akin to a wartime mobilisation. On the contrary the global pandemic response has operated under pre-pandemic economic norms. Likewise, policymakers continue to act as if, to paraphrase Greta Thunberg, the world is not on fire. UN Secretary-General António Guterres described the latest report from the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change as a 'code red for humanity.' Yet countries' current Nationally Determined Contributions under the framework established by the 2015 Paris climate agreement are inadequate to achieve

t the beginning of COVID-19, the Paris accord's goal of limiting economy imperils future generatential or the restoration of species global warming to 1.5° Celsius, relative to preindustrial levels

> The ongoing COP26 in Glasgow is the most immediate policy lever available. But the international climate regime needs to go beyond voluntary commitments to reduce emissions and make good on rich countries' promise to provide financial assistance to the world's poorest and most vulnerable.

I am not an economist. I am a physician who specialises in the new field of 'planetary health,' which focuses on the links between human and planetary well-being. Its core premise is straightforward: protecting and improving our health requires tackling the underlying causes of human disease and

ecosystem damage simultaneously. The economy we have today is destroying our well-being. It unleashed human ingenuity, created financial wealth, and lifted billions of people from poverty. But it also damaged ecosystems and exacerbated social inequality. During the first year of the COVID-19 crisis, more than 114 million jobs were lost, while the world's wealthiest became \$5 trillion richer than they had been before the pandemic began. And by accelerating climate change and biodiversity loss, our current

As a planetary health physician, I believe that the treatment for this disease is economic – not medical.

During this pandemic, we have witnessed a dramatic surge in the use of PPE that look like astronaut suits. But to truly recover, we also need a different kind of PPE – a people- and planet-centered economy. Because climate change and other forms of ecological damage increase the likelihood of future pandemics, this PPE would not just liberate us from the current crisis. The goal established by the WHO's Independent Panel for Pandemic Preparedness and Response – to make COVID-19 the last pandemic of its kind – depends on it.

A people- and planet-centered economy is one that advances the well-being of the entire Earth. It is an economy that has deep respect for the planet's boundaries, such as the temperature limit enshrined in the Paris agreement. And it ensures that the basic daily needs of all people are met – for example, through universal health-care systems and redistributive social policies. The metrics of success for this PPE are not GDP or per capita income, but the ability of children to grow up to reach their full po-

An example of this PPE has already been proposed by Kate Raworth. Unlike the current economic model, with its limitless supply and demand curves, Raworth's Doughnut Economy visualises a narrow 'safe and just space for humanity' that neither overshoots the planet's boundaries nor falls short in meeting society's basic needs.

Early in the pandemic, the city of Amsterdam committed to adopting the doughnut as its post-pandemic economic model. Since then, the city has implemented projects and policies ranging from the circular use of materials in building construction to reforms in the local fashion industry. The next challenge is to apply this model to lowand middle-income countries to ensure they fulfill their society's needs

without breaching planetary limits. The growing planetary health community has an important role to play in creating an alternative that will help us overcome the pandemic and ultimately meet the goals we have set for ourselves as a civilization.

Row over concrete wall along Baitarani embankment

WATER RESOURCES DEPT SEEKS DETAILED REPORT ON THE EFFECTS OF THE WALL ON ENVIRONMENT

Jaipur: Nov 8: The Water Resources department has sought a detailed report from the chief engineer and basin manager of the R&B department on the ongoing construction of a concrete wall alongside the left embankment of the Baitarani river in Jajpur.

This comes in the wake of a case filed at the National Green Tribunal (NGT) by a local outfit -Bhandaripokhari Banya Biparyasta Surakhya Samiti. In its complaint, the outfit stated that the concrete embankment of the Baitarani river will pose more flood threats to several areas in Bhadrak district.

On the other hand, the concrete embankment will only save some areas of Jajpur from flood fury, the complaint read.

Hearing the case, the NGT has observed that the concrete embankments can be constructed only after getting environmental

Following a directive from the NGT, the Water Resources de-

partment has sought a detailed report from its officials.

October 5, convener of the outfit Akshay Kumar Tripathy and other local people had sent a complaint to the Chief Secretary in this connection. They said that building the concrete embankment will be a risk for people in other districts. Notably, a sum of ₹50 crore has

been sanctioned for construction of 8-km-long concrete embankment. It was alleged that there is a plan to float three tenders for a construction of similar project on the right side of Baitarani river near Akhapada.

The Water Resources department has taken up several others projects in the Baitarani riverbed.

These have resulted in natural flow of floodwater in the river.

During floods, the concrete emhankment will shrink the flow of floodwater, confining it to just 700 to 1,000 metres in width, instead of the normal 5 km width.

It is also apprehended that the concrete embankment will cause the river to change its course dangerously in Bhaandaripohari and Bhadrak blocks although floodwater will not affect most parts of Jajpur.

Another barrage project under construction in Jajpur at a cost of ₹216 crore will also result in floods in Bhadrak, it was stated. People in most parts of Bhandaripokhari, Dhamnagar, Tihidi and Chandbali blocks will face danger of massive floods during the monsoon.

However, R&B executive engineer of Jajpur, Arun Kumar Patnaik said that the concrete wall will in no way harm Bhadrak district. 'Flow of floodwater in Baitarani will be as usual. The next step will be taken only after obtaining en-

Demand to free encroachments from Lord Baladeview's properties

Keonjhar, Nov 8: A vast landed property of Lord Baladeview, the presiding deity of Keonihar district, is under encroachment. What ails the devotees and local people is that the Endowment department is hardly doing anything to remove the squatters from the Lord's lands.

They have demanded the encroached lands be reclaimed and stringent action be taken against the squatters.

The temple was built in 1673. The then king recorded thousands of landed properties in different locations in the Lord's name. However, with the end of royal regime, people slowly started encroaching upon these lands in various areas. As of now, the situation has come to such a pass that many of the temple's properties are hard to be located

Pucca buildings and houses have already come up on the encroached lands. In some places, the encroachers, who managed to get fake land documents showing them as owners of the encroached lands.

Sub-Collector-cum-Executive Officer, Endowment department, Ramchandra Kisku said that out of 281.600 acres in Kabitra mouza under Sadar tehsil, 250 acres have already been demarcated and 39 acres in Siddhamatha area have been reclaimed and fenced with barbed wires. 'Similarly, seven acres in

Satasinga mouza are under encroachment. As many as 114 squatters were served notices to vacate the lands by the Endowment department, but they pooh-poohed them. In this connection, the Endowment department has lodged a case with the Endowment Commission," he added.

VILLAGERS ALLEGE SCAM IN RAD SCHEME, WANT VIG PROBE

Kuchinda, Nov 8: Locals here have Rainfed Area Development (RAD) scheme for the non-irritated region in Kuchinda area of Sambalpur district. The scheme is being executed by the Soil Conservation department. Beneficiaries have alleged that the officials have taken commission from them through middlemen for sanctioning funds.

Some beneficiaries of the scheme in Arjundihi village have alleged that despite the irregularities, no action is being taken to look into the matter.

They have filed a complaint at the Kuchinda police station against the Jamankira Soil Conservation officer and some middlemen.

According to reports, 416 people of five villages, including Phatatangar, Thianala and Kulangjora under Burodihai and



Tainsar panchayats, were enrolled in the scheme in 2020-21. Under the scheme, ₹40,000 was provided to each beneficiary for dairy projects and ₹25,000 for goat rearing.

However, the complaint said that the officials allegedly took ₹6,000 as commission from dairy beneficiaries and ₹10,000 from goat rearing beneficiaries though middlemen after sanctioning the funds.

The irregularities came to the fore September 5 when the beneficiaries of two panchayats submitted a written complaint to the sub-collector.

The sub-collector is leant to have probed the matter. He had enquired the matter with the Soil Conservation officer in-charge of the scheme in the area. After the scam came to the fore, the Kuchinda Soil Conservation officer was transferred, the villagers alleged.

Locals have demanded a Vigilance probe into the irregu-

Jamankira Soil Conservation officer Bisbhuprasad Mishra is now in-charge of the scheme. When contacted, Mishra denied bribery allegations against the officials. He, however, said that he would hand over some documents to police.

On the other hand, the Kunchinda Soil Conservation officer denied commenting on the issue.

Garbage treatment plant on pasture land opposed

Delhi's dangerous air ruins school reopening

New Delhi, Nov 8: Many students in New Delhi staved at home Monday rather than return to reopened schools as a toxic smog shrouded the city.

Although authorities eased restrictions on schools imposed when the Covid-19 pandemic first struck India in March last year, many parents decided against sending their children back


"The pollution in Delhi is hazardous. We as parents are afraid of sending our children to school," parent Kamlesh Sharma wrote on Twitter: For air to be deemed safe, the Air Quality Index (AQI), which has a scale of 500, should be below 50. In New Delhi Monday evening it

was 392, well into hazardous territory. That was a marginal improvement on the 451 registered last week as moderate winds helped disperse some of the pollution.

While some schools had resumed classes for higher grades, pupils aged 14 and below were allowed back for the first time on Monday as part of a staggered re-opening.

But many schools reported attendance below 40 per cent on the first day back due to parents fears over the hazardous air and the coronavirus risks.

"After Covid-19, pollution has emerged a major threat for public health particularly for children and senior citizens," Ashok Agarwal, national president, All India Parents Association, said expressing frustration with the lack of enforcement and political

will to improve Delhi's air.

Many supporters of Bharatiya Janata Party opposed a blanket ban on firecrackers while blaming the Opposition-ruled state governments of Delhi and Punjab for worsening pollution. Environmentalists said both Union and state governments were reluctant to take tough steps because they feared loss of support among their voters.

In a letter to the Centre and state authorities, Central Pollution Control Board Chairman Tanmay

Kumar regretted that they were not 'taking sufficient measures to control pollution' and asked them to curb all air polluting activities.

Delhi govt hikes minimum wages for labourers

New Delhi, Nov 8: Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia Monday announced an increase in the minimum wages of unskilled, semiskilled, and skilled labourers, saying it will help them tide over the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and price rise.

The hike takes the monthly wages of unskilled workers from Rs 15,908 to Rs 16,064 while the monthly wages of semi-skilled workers will increase from Rs 17,537 to Rs 17,693, a Delhi government statement said.

The monthly salary of skilled workers has been increased from Rs 19.291 to Rs 19.473, it said.

'The minimum wage paid to labourers in Delhi is higher than any other state in the country. The working class troubled with Covid and inflation will receive some relief from the increase in minimum wages," Sisodia said.

Sisodia, who is also minister incharge of the labour department of the Delhi government, issued an order to increase dearness allowance of unskilled, semi-skilled and other workers of Delhi, it said.

The monthly salary of matriculated but non-graduate employees has been increased from Rs 19,291 to Rs 19,473 and the monthly salary of labourers with graduate and above educational qualification has been increased from Rs 20,976 to Rs 21,184.

Sisodia said the "big step" of increasing wages was taken keeping the interests of the poor and the working class during the coronavirus epidemic in mind. The clerical and supervisor class employees will also

receive this benefit, he said. According to Sisodia, dearness allowance cannot be withheld for workers in the unorganised sector who normally receive only minimum wages. Therefore, the Delhi government has announced a revised minimum wage by adding dearness allowance.

Although, the government has cut many expenses, it has decided to increase the dearness allowance of labourers keeping their interests in mind. Sisodia said.

Due to inflation and skyrocketing prices of commodities, every section of the society has been affected financially, he added.

Yogi invokes Kairana Hindu 'exodus'

Lucknow, Nov 8: Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath Monday invoked the 'exodus' of Hindus from Kairana a few years back, telling people in the western Uttar Pradesh town that those who shoot at traders now will be dispatched

to the 'next world' Addressing a public meeting in Kairana, he slammed the 'Taliban mentality', saving it will not be accepted in the state. He also attacked the Opposition, saying they did not act when houses of Hindus were being burnt and innocent youths killed in Muzaffarnagar, referring to the communal riots there in 2013.

The alleged exodus from Kairana was a big issue in the 2017 Assembly elections as the BJP claimed then that scores of Hindu families had left the town after receiving threats from criminals. The claim, however, was contested by others.

Ahead of next year's Assembly elections in the state, Adityanath visited the town and promised compensation to some families who were allegedly forced to leave it between 2014 and 2016.

Adityanath said Muzaffarnagar riots and the 'exodus' of people



from Kairana are not election issues for the BJP.

"These are issues of our identity. honour and glory," the CM said.

'The criminals who had forced the traders and residents of Kairana to flee had in the past four-and-ahalf-vears been forced to flee themselves," the CM claimed. "No criminal has the courage to walk with his head held high. And if a criminal dares to shoot a trader or a citizen, then the bullet will hit him and will send him to the next world ('doosre lok')," Adityanath said.

Promising exemplary punishment to criminals, the CM said nobody will be allowed to spread an-

archy, incite riots and play with

the honour of women. "It (Taliban) makes the life of sisters and daughters hellish, violates the fundamental rights of citizens. This will not be accepted at all in UP," the CM said.

The CM also alleged that people who opposed the abrogation of Jammu and Kashmir's special status and the construction of the Ram temple in Ayodhya were 'happy' over riots in Muzaffarnagar and 'exodus' from Kairana.

The then MP Hukum Singh had raised the issue of Kairana, he said, adding that on demands of locals he had got the police outpost strengthened and now laid the foundation of a PAC battallion camp worth Rs 250 crores.

He flayed the BJP government in the state for its failure to distribute laptops, free data and tablets to the students that they had promised in their 'Sankalp Patra' (manifesto) in the run-up to the 2017 Assembly polls. UP's Zika outbreak sees surge of nearly 100 cases

Lucknow, Nov 8: At least 89 people, including 17 children, have tested positive for the Zika virus in a surge of cases in the Uttar Pradesh city of Kanpur, its health department said Monday.

First discovered in 1947, the mosquito-borne virus Zika virus reached epidemic proportions in Brazil in 2015, when thousands of babies were born with microcephaly, a disorder that causes babies to be born with abnormally small heads and underdeveloped brains.

"There has been a surge in cases of the Zika virus and the health department has formed several teams to contain the spread," Dr Nepal Singh, chief medical officer of Kanpur district in India's most populous state, told Reuters.

"There is one woman who is pregnant and we are paying special

Ansal brothers get 7 years in jail Malik to file reply

New Delhi, Nov 8: A Delhi court Monday awarded 7-year jail terms to real estate barons Sushil and Gopal Ansal for tampering with evidence in the 1997 case of Uphaar cinema fire which had claimed 59 lives

Chief Metropolitan Magistrate Pankaj Sharma also imposed a fine of Rs 2.25 crore each on the Ansals. Besides, the court awarded 7-yeariail term each to former court staff Dinesh Chand Sharma and two others - P P Batra and Anoop Singh -- in the case and imposed a fine of Rs 3 lakh each on them.

'After thinking over nights and nights. I have come to the conclusion that they deserve punishment," the judge said. He said the circumstances during which the instant crime was committed showed the deep disrespect which the convicts had for the law and the judicial process and for the victims.

'The foundation of judiciary is premised on the trust and confidence of the people and any action which is aimed to thwart the said foundation cannot be permitted and is required to be dealt with utmost strictness," it said.

ciety. While imposing fine on the convicts, the court noted that the DSLSA (Delhi State Legal Services Authority) had suggested in the Victim Impact Report (VIR) that victims had suffered "incalculable harm" and the quantum of compensation also proposed was "incalculable".

The fine was imposed after analysing the income proofs submitted by the convicts. The court held that the Ansals were better placed in terms of financial capacity than others to provide compensation to the victims.

The court said that the amount

The convicts, out on bail, were taken into the custody after the order was pronounced.

The case is related to tampering with the evidence in the main fire tragedy case in which the Ansals were convicted and sentenced to 2-year jail term by the Supreme Court. The apex court however released them taking into account the prison time they had done on the condition that they pay Rs 30 crore fine each, to be used for building a trauma centre in the national capital.

Starting November 8, the US has lifted all restrictions for fully vaccinated international travellers, including from India, but they will have to show proof of a negative coronavirus test before boarding a flight to the country.

Other destinations where Indian passengers were headed past midnight, included Amsterdam, Chile, Dubai, Moscow and Bhutan. Just a day after Bhaidooj, Rashmi Yadav along with her parents bid a teary goodbye her brother headed for Moscow.

"My brother is going to Moscow for his MBBS third-year course. He will return only after finishing his education. Pandemic already made separation so painful," an emotionally overwhelmed Rashmi said, as her parents consoled her. Ramesh Chandra, the head of the department of chemistry at the Delhi University, also took the flight to Moscow early in the morning.

Japan sees no daily Covid deaths

Tokyo: Japan reported no daily deaths from Covid-19 Sunday for the first time in 15 months, as infections decline rapidly in the country. Health officials on Monday said there were no deaths the previous day, giving Japan a total of 18.310 fatalities since the pandemic began.

S'pore's economy recovering steadily

Singapore: Singapore's economy continues to recover steadily from a sharp contraction in 2020 on the back of effective containment measures, accelerated Covid-19 vaccination rollout, and extended policy support for affected businesses and households, said a report published by the ASEAN+3 Macroeconomic Research Office (AMRO) Monday. The AMRO report said that Singapore's economy is forecast to grow by 6.3 per cent in 2021 and 4 percent in 2022, underpinned by the recovery in domestic economic activities and robust exports, reports Xinhua news

Kuwait govt resigns for 2nd time in a yr

Dubai: Kuwait's government resigned Monday for the second time this year, underscoring the political problems plaguing the small, oil-rich nation. The state-run KUNA news agency said Kuwait's ruler, Sheikh Nawaf Al Ahmad Al Sabah, received the government's resignation notice. However, the report did not say whether Sheikh Nawaf would accept the resignation, tendered by the country's prime minister. Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al Hamad Al Sabah.

Grave concern

Berlin: Germany's coronavirus infection rate climbed to its highest recorded level yet Monday as what officials have called a "pandemic of the unvaccinated" gathers pace. The national disease control centre, the Robert Koch Institute, said the country has seen 201.1 new cases per 100,000 residents over the past seven days. That was above the previous record of 197.6 from Dec. 22 last year. While it's still a lower rate than in several other European countries, it has set alarm bells ringing.

Bus set on fire

London: A bus has been hijacked and set on fire in Northern Ireland, amid discontent over the trade deal struck as part of the UK's departure from the European Union. Four masked men boarded the double decker bus Sunday on the outskirts of Belfast. The group ordered the driver and passengers off the bus before setting it ablaze.


Xi looks to secure 3rd term

Beijing, Nov 8: Hundreds of senior officials of the Communist Party of China (CPC) began a key four-day conclave here Monday to deliberate and pass a rare "historical resolution" of the 100year-old ruling party and pave the way for an unprecedented third term for President Xi Jinping.

The 19th Central Committee of the CPC started its sixth plenary session. About 400 full and alternate members of the CPC Central Committee are taking part in the plenum, state-run Xinhua news agency reported.

Xi, the General-Secretary of the CPC Central Committee, delivered a work report on behalf of the Political Bureau and made explanations on a draft resolution on the major achievements and historical experience of the CPC's 100 years of endeavours, the report said.

Xi, 68, holds China's all three power centres - General-Secretary of the CPC, Chairman of the powerful Central Military Commission (CMC) which is the overall high command of the military, and the



Presidency is set to complete his second five-year tenure next year.

Politically, the meeting is regarded as significant for Xi who -- in the last nine years of his tenure in power -- has emerged as the most powerful leader after party founder Mao Zedong. Xi is widely expected to continue for a third term unlike his predecessor Hu Jintao, who retired after two terms, and perhaps may remain in power for life in view of a key constitutional amendment in 2018 which removed

the two-term limit for the President. He was also made "core leader" of the party in 2016, a status enjoyed by Mao. The plenum is being held ahead of the next year's party Congress which was expected to appoint a new leadership.

"The purpose (of this plenum) seems to be to review the party's governance in history, and to pave the way for the future leadership and their policy direction," said Gu Su, a political scientist with Nanjing University.

The top leaders of China's ruling **Communist Party** Monday started a pivotal meeting expected to further firm President Xi Jinping's grip on power

"It will also need to praise the achievements of the current leader," Gu told the Hong Kong based South China Morning Post. The in-camera meeting is being held in Beijing under tight COVID-19 control measures as the city in the last few weeks has reported several cases of coronavirus, prompting officials to tighten entry and exit controls.

1st Chinese woman walks in space

Beijing, Nov 8: Chinese military pilot Wang Yaping scripted history Monday when she became the country's first woman astronaut to walk in space as she moved out of the under-construction space station and took part in extravehicular activities along with her male colleague, the official media.

This marks the first spacewalk in Chinese space history involving a woman astronaut, the China Manned Space Agency said in a statement.

China had launched the Shenzhou-13 spaceship on October 16, sending three astronauts on a six-month mission to the under-construction space station, which was expected to be ready by next year.

The 41-year-old native of Shandong province and mother of a five-year-old girl, Wang joined the People's Liberation Army Air Force in August 1997 and served as a deputy squadron commander before joining the second group of



astronauts at the PLA Astronaut Division in May 2010.

In March 2012, she was part of the backup crew for the ninth manned Shenzhou mission series in June 2013 and took part in the 10th of Shenzhou series which lasted nearly 15 days. She is the second Chinese woman to have flown in space.

During the Shenzhou 10th flight, Wang gave China's first spacebased lecture inside the Tiangong I experimental module to more than 60 million Chinese students at about 80,000 schools across the country. She was selected for the present manned space mission in December 2019. Wang's achievement has expanded the team of global female astronauts who have conducted spacewalks.

A week in, big issues still unresolved at COP26

Glasgow, Nov 8: After a week of negotiations, numerous of the stickiest issues in climate talks remain unresolved and teams of cabinet ministers from different countries are being sent to move things along.

Briefing the United Nations Conference of Parties, or COP26, on the first week's progress, COP President Alok Sharma had to correct himself, noting that "some" issues had been settled, rather than "many." Numerous developing nations were pessimistic. They called progress "disappointing," saying announcements were high in quantity but worried that they were low in quantity. No deals have been made yet on the three main goals of the UN — pledges to cut emissions in half by 2030 to keep the Paris climate deal's 1.5 degree Celsius temperature rise goal alive; the need for USD 100 billion annually in financial help from rich countries to poor ones; and the idea that half of that money go on adapting to global warming's worst effects. Several other issues, including trading carbon and transparency, also weren't solved yet.

And on the issue of more frequent updates of countries' emission-cutting goals — something poorer nations seek — negotiators listed nine different time options for future negotiators to choose from. Sharma named teams of two min-

"The High Court has just ordered a stay of execution pending the hearing of the appeal to the Court of Appeal against the decision of the High Court,' Nagaenthran's lawyer M Ravi posted on Facebook.

The appeal is scheduled to be heard via videoconference on Tuesday. If the appeal is dismissed,

as scheduled.

Nagaenthran, who was arrested in 2009 at the age of 21 with a bundle of heroin strapped to his left thigh, had sought to challenge his execution, contending that he had the mental age of a person below 18 years of age. During the hearing on Monday, his lawyer argued that the execution of intellectually disabled persons is prohibited under customary international law as this amounted to inhuman punishment. He also claimed the Singapore Prison Service (SPS) has an "internal policy" not to execute convicts who are mentally disabled. But SPS has refuted the claim.

In his oral remarks dismissing the application, Justice See Kee Oon said there was no credible basis for Nagaenthran's assertions as to his mental age. The alleged mental age was based on the opinion of his lawyer Ravi, who has no medical expertise and has met the prisoner only once, on November 2, for 26 minutes, the judge noted. Justice See reiterated that Nagaenthran has been accorded due process in accordance with the law.

As ban lifts, visitors to US await long-delayed hugs, kisses

Charles de Gaulle Airport (France), Nov 8: The US lifted restrictions Monday on travel from a long list of countries including Mexico, Canada and most of Europe, setting the stage for emotional reunions nearly two years in the making and providing a boost for the airline and tourism industries decimated by the pandemic.

Wives will hug husbands for the first time in months. Grandmas will coo over grandsons who have doubled in age since they last saw them. Aunts and uncles and cousins will snuggle babies they haven't

The rules that go into effect Monday allow air travel from a series of countries from which it has

been restricted since the early days of the pandemic — as long as the traveller has proof of vaccination and a negative Covid-19 test. Those $crossing \, land \, borders \, from \, Mexico$ or Canada will require proof of vaccination but no test.

American citizens and permanent residents were always allowed to enter the US, but the travel bans grounded tourists, thwarted business travellers and often separated families.

Airlines are now preparing for a surge in travel after the pandemic and resulting restrictions caused international travel to plunge. Data from travel and analytics firm Cirium showed airlines are increasing flights between the United Kingdom and the US by 21% this month over last month.

Future Retail seeks SC's intervention AGENCIES

RELIANCE DEAL

New Delhi, Nov 8: India's Future Retail has asked the country's top court to stall a Singapore arbitration panel's decision to freeze a \$3.4 billion asset sale after e-commerce giant Amazon had sought to block the deal.

The dispute started when Future Retail, India's second-largest retailer with more than 1,700 stores agreed last year to sell retail and other operations to India's biggest retail group Reliance Industries.

Amazon has argued that its own deal with one of Future Group's businesses contained clauses prohibiting the Indian entity from selling retail assets to anyone on a restricted persons list that included Reliance.

Future Retail, which runs popular Big Bazaar outlets in India, denies having violated any contractual agreements with Amazon.

The long-running dispute has placed two of the world's richest men - Amazon founder Jeff Bezos and Reliance majority owner Mukesh Ambani - at odds and could help to determine whether Amazon can blunt Reliance's dominance of India's huge retail market.

Monday Future Retail urged the Supreme Court to put the Singapore arbitration panel's decision on hold, citing stress on its business unless the sale goes through, according to a filing seen by agencies and which is likely to be heard in the coming days.

Centre amends Packaged Commodities Rules 2011

The decision is based on the best sales practice and will reduce the compliance burden on the part of industry as well as help consumers ascertain the price of the product before making a buying decision

New Delhi, Nov 8: Today, consumers buying 3.5 kg packaged rice flour or 88 grams biscuit packet might well be struggling to make out whether the product is exactly costly or cheap in comparison with other offerings. Come April next year, it will be much easier for the consumers to ascertain the cost in unit terms.

To help consumers make a conscious purchase decisions as well as lessen compliance burden on industry players, the Union consumer affairs ministry has amended the Legal Metrology (Packaged Commodities) Rules, 2011, whereby companies will be required to print 'unit sale price' on the packaged commodities.

"Companies selling packaged commodities with a quantity of more than one kilogram should print 'unit sale price' per kg along with the maximum retail price (MRP)," a senior consumer affairs

Mumbai, Nov 8: India's buy-nowpay-later (BNPL) industry is booming and set to surge over ten-fold within four years as tens of millions of online shoppers get lured by interest-free credit with fewer hassles, market players told agencies.

The research firm also estimates that the number of BNPL users in the country may rise to 80-100 million customers by then, from 10-15 million currently. "However, since the maximum

credit currently being offered on BNPL is 100,000 rupees, much lower than credit card offers, it will take some time before it can disrupt the cards market," said analysts at Macquarie Research. Fintech firm MobiKwik sees BNPL

business nearly doubling for the company in two years, in a country where hundreds of millions of people have little access to formal credit.

MobiKwik, which is among the top BNPL players in India and is backed by the Abu Dhabi Investment Authority, said income from the segment accounted for nearly a fifth of its 3.02 billion ru-

RACE TO \$3 TRILLION

Tech giants now a quarter of S&P 500 combined market cap

IT'S POSSIBLE THAT THE S&P 500 COULD HAVE SIX COMPANIES WORTH AT LEAST \$1 TRILLION AT THE SAME TIME IF META PLATFORMS, THE SOCIAL MEDIA GIANT FORMERLY KNOWN AS FACEBOOK, CONTINUES TO REBOUND

New Delhi, Nov 8: Microsoft is now worth a smidge more than Apple, making the Satya Nadella-led cloud software giant the world's most valuable company. Both companies are worth about \$2.5 trillion, CNN reported.

Google owner Alphabet is worth just a touch less than \$2 trillion, while Amazon is valued at \$1.7 trillion. Tesla, Elon Musk's electric car giant recently passed the \$1 trillion mark and has since surged to a market cap of about \$1.25 trillion.

"These five companies are now collectively worth almost \$10 trillion. That's nearly a quarter of the combined \$41.8 trillion market cap of the entire S&P 500," the report said. It's possible that the S&P 500

could have six companies worth at least \$1 trillion at the same time if Meta Platforms, the social media giant formerly known as Facebook, continues to rebound. Meta now has a market valuation of about \$930 billion.

But given the continued strength in tech, it's altogether possible that all six of these companies could soon each be worth at least \$2 trillion, if not more. After all, Microsoft and Apple are knocking on the door of \$3 trillion.

And other techs, such as chip



leader Nvidia and China's Tencent are moving closer to the trillion dollar market valuation mark, the report added

"It seems almost unfathomable that so many companies could be worth this much. But earnings growth for many of the top techs

continues to be strong, and that is pushing prices higher," the report added. Still, the insatiable investor ap-

petite for trillion-dollar techs reminds some market analysts of the Nasdaq froth of the 1990s and early 2000. It could be a warning sign, it said.

Tesla's rally is reminiscent of Cisco's move in 2000, a move that marked the bubble top in 2000," said Mike O'Rourke, chief market strategist with JonesTrading, in a report this month.

O'Rourke pointed out that Cisco shares soared about 50 per cent in the first three months of 2000 and analysts at Credit Suisse predicted that Cisco would be the world's first trillion-dollar company, the report said.

It didn't happen. Cisco, which was worth about \$550 billion at the height of tech stock mania two decades ago, is now valued at about \$240 billion. Intel, another tech stock leader of the late '90s, has struggled in the past few years and is nowhere close to its 2000 peak valuation.

It's proof that becoming a market leader may be easier than staying a market leader. There is no guarantee that the likes of Microsoft, Apple, Amazon, Alphabetand even Tesla will stay at the top, CNN reported.

Rohit, who is set to take over as India's white-ball captain, got fabulous support from another supremely stylish KL Rahul (54 n o, 36b, 4x4, 2x6) as India chased down the target of 133 in only 15.2 overs. The openers added 86 runs inside 10 overs before Rahul and Suryakumar Yadav (25 n o) finished off the task. It was nothing more than a stroll in the park for the Indians, who basically caught the Namibians by the scruff of their necks with spinners Ravindra Jadeja (3/16) and Ravichandran Ashwin (3/20). Then, Rohit dazzled and Rahul

sizzled with some breathtaking pick-up pull shots while Yadav showed his 360 degree hitting skills to end a rather disappointing tournament on a sweet note.

On the night, India's spinners were just too good for the unheralded Namibia batters as India restricted the minnows to a modest 132/8 in their inconsequential final T20 World Cup match.

Already ousted from the tournament after losing to Pakistan and New Zealand in their first two games, India looked relaxed and the Namibians were all at sea as they are not used to playing world-class slow bowling operators of this calibre.

Australia set to tour Pakistan after 24 yrs

Lahore, Nov 8: Australia have agreed to tour Pakistan for the first time in 24 years for a full series next year, providing a muchneeded shot in the arm for the country's cricket following the recent pullouts by England and New Zealand over security concerns.

Australia, who last toured Pakistan in 1998, will play three Tests in Karachi (March 3-7). Rawalpindi (March 12-16) and Lahore (March 21-25) as part of the World Test Championship.

Lahore will also be the venu for the four white-ball matches to be played from March 29 to April 5, the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) announced on Monday.

In September, New Zealand, who were already in Pakistan, went back home without playing a game due to a security threat and soon after. England too announced they won't be touring the country ahead of the T20 World Cup, dealing a huge setback to the PCB's efforts in bringing high-quality international cricket to the country.

Australia coming to Pakistan is a big win for the recently-appointed PCB chief Ramiz Raja, who did not expect the Aussies to tour after England and New Zealand withdrew. England were criticised heavily for not touring the country.

"It pleases me no end that we'll be engaged in a three-Test match series, connoisseurs delight," Raja said in a statement. "Australia are one of the high-performing sides and them playing in our backyard for the first time after a gap of 24 years will be a special treat for the

"Likewise, it will be a great opportunity for the Australia cricketers to not only play at our iconic venues but also feel and enjoy the respect, love and hospitality that this great country offers, something which most of their previous generation of cricketers missed out by playing offshore," he said.

Cricket Australia chief executive Nick Hockley said they will continue to work with PCB to ensure foolproof security for their team.

CA's delegation will visit Pakistan to meet with PCB officials as well as provincial and federal authorities to discuss and finalise matters relating to "team operations, logistics, security and Covid-19 protocols".

Australia last toured Pakistan in 1998-99 when Mark Taylor led them to a 1-0 series victory – their first in the country since Richie Benaud's side defeated Fazal Mahmood's team by a 2-0 margin in the 1959-60

Soaring West Ham stun Liverpool

Liverpool hadn't only been prevented from going a club-record 26th match unbeaten. Jurgen Klopp's side was also dislodged from third place in the Premier League by West Ham with a 3-2 victory Sunday.

There hasn't been much to celebrate at West Ham, especially in the five years since moving into the stadium at the centerpiece of the 2012 Olympics.

It's still an imperfect venue — reconfigured around a running track but the fan dissent and disorder is fading into the past as David Moyes has the club dreaming of unprecedented highs and its fans

happily singing the club anthem. West Ham, whose highest top-tier league finish was third in 1986, is looking like title contenders two years after Moyes took charge of a team a point above the relegation

Building on a sixth-place finish last season — missing out on the Champions League spots by two points — West Ham have now opened a top-flight season by winning seven of 11 games for only the second time.

Stefano Pioli's Milan remained level on points at the top of the Italian league with Napoli, which drew 1-1 against Hellas Verona earlier. Inter was third, seven points below the top two.

Inter were given a second penalty in the 27th after a mistake from Fode Ballo-Toure saw him bring down Matteo Darmian, Lautaro Martinez stepped up but Ciprian Tataruanu

managed to save his spot-kick. Verona ended the match in Naples with nine men after substitutes Daniel Bessa and Nikola Kalinic were sent off. Giovanni Simeone had scored his seventh goal in four matches to give Verona an early lead but that only lasted five minutes before Giovanni Di Lorenzo's equaliser.

Verstappen extends lead in title chase

Mexico City, Nov 8: Red Bull earned itself one heck of a Formula One fiesta. Max Verstappen won the Mexico City Grand Prix with a dominant race Sunday to stretch his season championship lead over Mercedes driver Lewis Hamilton. Teammate Sergio Perez was the first Mexican driver in race history to not just lead the race, but also to earn a podium when he finished

And the result pulled Red Bull nearly even with Mercedes in a team championship worth millions of dollars at the end of season.

While Verstappen and Perez basked in the chants of "Ole! Ole!" from the massive crowd during the podium ceremony and Perez's father wildly waved the Mexican flag, Hamilton could only watch and listen. He had to know he's running out of time and races to catch Verstappen in pursuit of a record eighth F1 season title.

Verstappen now leads Hamilton in the championship by 19 points with four races left, starting next



week in Sao Paolo, Brazil. Verstappen won in 2019 and likely will be favored to again.

The two have traded the lead several times this season, and even crashed into each other twice, in F1's tightest title chase in years.

Verstappen certainly isn't taking anything for granted. The 24-yearold Dutchman is chasing his first F1 championship and earned his ninth win of the season, his second in a row and third in Mexico City in four years.
