Rain plays spoilsport for farmers

■ Wrecked by frequent unseasonal rain, farmers are now at a loss to maintain their families, let alone repay their debts

Bhubaneswar, Rayagada, Binjharpur, Padampur, Telkoi, Nov 14: Incessant rain for the last three days have almost damaged paddy and non-paddy crops across the state dealing a blow to the farmers, who will now find it difficult to support their families, let alone pay off their loans.

In this crisis, if the state government does not take steps like loan waivers it is apprehended that many farmers may take extreme steps like suicide.

In Rayagada, paddy and cotton crops have been badly affected by the incessant rains with hectares of farmlands still under water. Paddy has been cultivated in 47,000 hectares, while non-paddy crops have been raised on 40,000 hectares

Several famers in Rayagada said that they had hurriedly reaped paddy after learning about the rain



forecast. Much of the paddy has been left to rot in the farmlands. They were preparing to carry the paddy to the stockyards, but the rains proved a spoilsport. In Jajpur, ripe paddy is soaking

in rainwater in several hectares. Earlier paddy in several areas under Binjharpur block had been affected by insufficient rainfall. The famers had cut the crops in

the farmland with a lot of efforts, but the unseasonal rains spoiled their hopes. Many farmers are worried about repaying loans they took for the paddy cultivation this year.

They lamented that all their money and hard labour invested in the paddy farming have been

In Mayurbhanj, unseasonal rain have also played spoilsport with paddy in several hectares in tribaldominated Bangiriposi block.

As harvested paddy is already soaking in rainwater and further rains will only worsen their condition, they said.

The situation in most parts of Keonjhar is similar. Farmers had stocked paddy in their yard after harvesting, but the seeds have germinated following incessant rains.

In many places, farmers are showing their damaged paddy to agriculture officials with the hope of receiving compensation. Agriculture official RK Handa said that paddy farming was good this year, but unseasonal rain have

About 80 per cent people in Naugaon block of Jagatsinghpur district depend on agriculture. They had cultivated paddy in over 7,000 hectares. In September, as they were preparing to harvest their crops, heavy spells of rain left them in a striated condition. Their ready-to-harvest crops were damaged by unseasonal rain.

Farmers' organisations have demanded immediate steps for assessment of the damage and payment of compensation to the affected farmers.

COP26 compromises on coal

Glasgow, Nov 14: Almost 200 na tions accepted a compromise deal Saturday aimed at keeping a key global warming target alive, but it contained a last-minute change that watered down crucial language about coal.

Several countries, including small island states, said they were deeply disappointed by the change promoted by India to "phase down," rather than "phase out" coal power, the single biggest source of greenhouse gas emissions.

"Our fragile planet is hanging by a thread," United Nations Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said in a statement. "We are still knocking on the door of climate catastrophe.

Nation after nation had complained earlier on the final day of two weeks of UN Climate talks in Glasgow, Scotland about how the deal did not go far or fast enough, but they said it was better than

nothing and provided incremental progress, if not success.

In the end, the summit broke ground by singling out coal, however weakly, by setting the rules for international trading of carbon credits, and by telling big polluters to come back next year with improved pledges for cutting emissions.

But domestic priorities both political and economic again kept nations from committing to the fast, big cuts that scientists say are needed to keep warming below dangerous levels that would produce extreme weather and rising seas capable of erasing some island nations.

Ahead of the Glasgow talks, the United Nations had set three criteria for success, and none of them were achieved.

The UN's criteria included pledges to cut carbon dioxide emissions in half by 2030, \$100 billion in financial aid from rich nations

to poor, and ensuring that half of

that money went to helping the

developing world adapt to the worst effects of climate change. "We did not achieve these goals at this conference," Guterres said. "But we have some building blocks

for progress.' Negotiators from Switzerland and Mexico called the coal language change against the rules because it came so late. However, they said they had no choice but to hold

their noses and go along with it. Many other nations and climate campaigners criticized India for making demands that weakened the ndia led demand for last-minute change on coal power

"India's last-minute change to the language to phase down but not phase out coal is quite shocking, said Australian climate scientist Bill Hare, who tracks world emission pledges for the science-based Climate Action Tracker. "India has long been a blocker on climate action, but I have never seen it done so publicly.

Others approached the deal from a more positive perspective. In addition to the revised coal language, the Glasgow Climate Pact included enough financial incentives to almost satisfy poorer nations and solved a long-standing problem to pave the way for carbon trading.

The agreement also says big carbon polluting nations have to come back and submit stronger emission cutting pledges by the end of 2022.

"It's a good deal for the world," US Climate envoy John Kerry said. "It's got a few problems, but it's all in all a very good deal.

5-year extension to CBI, ED chiefs from Nov 16

New Delhi, Nov 14: The Centre has brought in ordinances to extend the tenures of Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) and Enforcement Directorate (ED) chiefs up to five years.

Currently, the tenure of directors of both Central investigation agencies is of two years, and now, as per the ordinances, they can get an extension of maximum three years.

President Ram Nath Kovind has approved the ordinances as Parliament is not in session and he is satisfied that circumstances exist which render it necessary for him to take immediate action.

The CVC (Amendment) Ordinance and the Delhi Special Police Establishment (Amendment) Act Ordinance were issued to allow extension of tenure of the Directors of the CBI and the ED ahead of upcoming winter session of the Parliament.

"Provided that the period for which the Director of Enforcement holds the office on his initial appointment may in public interest. on the recommendation of the Committee under clause (a) and for the reasons to be recorded in writing, be extended up to one year at a time: Provided further that no such extension shall be granted after the completion of a period of five years in total including the period mentioned in the initial appointment," the Central Vigilance Commission (Amendment) Ordinance 2021 said.

The Delhi Special Police Establishment (Amendment) Ordinance, 2021, has the same provisions in respect of the CBI Director, and it comes into force at once.

CBSE board exam in new pattern

New Delhi, Nov 14: The Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) will be conducting the board examinations in a new pattern in which over 20 lakh students are set to appear.

Examination for the first term of Class XII will begin from November 16, while for Class X it will start November 17.

For assessing the students across the country, the examination will be held in two terms. Second term of the examination is expected to be held in March-April next year.

According to the CBSE, this time, the students will be given 20 minute-reading time instead of 15 minutes. The first term will have Multiple Choice Questions and the duration for solving it is 90 minutes.

Every question will have four options, of which the student has to encircle the correct one. As every answer sheet will be scanned, no question can be left unanswered. Even if the students do not want to answer, then too, they will have to

encircle an option provided for it. Renowned educationist PS Kandpal said many examinations have been conducted on similar pattern. According to the CBSE, for Class X students, internal assessment marks have been divided into two parts - ten-ten each. Similarly for Class XII, it has been

divided into 15-15 marks. This time, the students have been given an option to appear in the examination centre of their choice as due to Covid-19, many of them were displaced. Many students arestill at their native places while their schools are at other locations.

Odisha among top 5 states in cyber crimes against minors

New Delhi, Nov 14: More than 400 per cent increase in cyber crime cases committed against children was reported in 2020 in comparison to 2019, with most of them relating to publishing or transmitting of materials depicting children in sexually explicit act, according to the latest NCRB data.

Top five states reporting cyber crimes against children are: Uttar Pradesh (170), Karnataka (144), Maharashtra (137), Kerala (107) and Odisha (71), the National Crimes Record Bureau data stated. Among the 842 cases of online of-

fences, 738 cases were about pub-

lishing or transmitting materials depicting children in sexually explicit act. As the NCRB 2020 data reveals, there is a sharp rise (over 400 per cent) in cyber crimes (registered under the Information Technology Act) committed against children in comparison to the last year.

In 2019, 164 cases of cyber crimes against children were reported while in 2018, 117 cases of cyber crimes were committed against children and 79 such cases were registered in 2017. Even though the number of cyber crime cases committed against children in 2020 remain small, its rise from 2019 is alarming.

Puja Marwaha, CEO, CRY-Child Rights and You, said while spending more time on Internet for accessing education and other communication purposes, children have also become more vulnerable to multiple risks, particularly in the contexts of online sexual abuse, grooming or sexual solicitation,



sexting, exposure to pornography, production and circulation of child sexual abuse material, cyber-bullying, online harassment and cybervictimisation, and many other privacy-related risks

"While there is little evidence to ascertain the scale of the impact of the epidemic containment measures on online abuse and exploitation of children, closure of

schools and children's increased the increased online risks experienced by them," she added.

During the Covid pandemic,

exposure to the online space may have had serious implications on

measures taken to contain the spread of the pandemic have resulted in closure of schools and movement to virtual learning environments. Children also spent poses, whilst not necessarily being aware of any associated risks. According to the UNICEF report (2020), 13 per cent of children and people aged 25 years or less in South



data available in the public domain to ascertain the numbers of children accessing the internet for education and other purposes across India, especially during the pandemic.

The UNICEF (2020) report, however, estimated that during the Covid pandemic around 37.6 million children across 16 states in India continued education through various remote learning initiatives such as online classrooms and radio programmes.







42 kids among 262 fresh Covid cases

Bhubaneswar, Nov 14: At least 42 children were among 262 people who tested positive for Covid-19 in Odisha Sunday, pushing the tally to 10,45,471 while two fresh fatalities pushed the coronavirus death toll to 8,377, a Health department official said.

The rate of infection among children and adolescents in the age group of 0 to 18 years increased to 16.03 per cent from 14.97 per cent the previous day.

Of the state's total 10,45,471 Covid-19 cases reported so far, as many as 90,368 were children and adolescents in the age group of 0 to 18 years, he said.

The second wave of the pandemic has so far claimed the lives of 46 children and adolescents in Odisha. At least 13 of these deaths were reported between August 10 and 31, he said.

The Covid-19 toll in Odisha mounted to 8,377 Sunday with two more deaths due to the infection reported from Dhenkanal and Jagatsinghpur. This apart, 53 other Covid-19 patients have died due to comorbidities, he said.

For the fourth consecutive day Sunday, the state's new Covid-19 cases remained below 300. The state had reported 262 cases Saturday, 263 Friday, 271 Thursday and 387 Wednesday. Khurda district, of which state Capital Bhubaneswar is a part, reported the highest of 132 new cases followed by 21 in Cuttack. Ten other districts did not report any new case in the last 24 hours. The state's daily test positivity rate (TPR) stood at 0.43 per cent as 262 persons tested positive for the infection out of 60,923 samples. The TPR was 0.40 per cent Saturday, 0.39 per cent Friday, 0.43 per cent Thursday and 0.60 per cent Wednesday.

The coastal state currently has 2,741 active Covid-19 cases while 10,34,300 patients have recovered from the highly infectious disease including 309 Saturday.

Andhra eyes more bordering villages

Patrapur, Nov 14: After Kotia, Andhra Pradesh is now eyeing more bordering villages under Patrapur block in Ganjam district.

There are some villages in Buratala, Tumba, Ambapur, Gundra, Khambaringa, Barang, Kesharipada, Binuagaon and Gudipadar panchayats under Patrapur block that share borders with Andhra Pradesh.

Gudikhala of Buratala panchayat is one of villages. The moment you reach here, you cannot but feel the presence of the Andhra Pradesh government. Calendars trumpeting the welfare activities taken up by the AP government can be seen pasted on the walls of several houses. The district administration on the other side of the border has carried out some developmental projects in this village.

An investigation reveals that the villagers, mostly tribals, have State-provided ration cards and Voter Identity cards mentioning them as the residents of Gudikhala village, whereas seven cards have been made available to them by the AP government, claiming them to be the residents of Kurudalu village of Budarasingi panchayat under Mandasa mandal in Srikakulam district. Among those are Voter Identity cards, ration cards, Aadhaar cards, pension cards and health insurance.

Gudikhala is not the only village where the residents have such cards provided by the AP government. There are some tribals residing in Gudikhali village of Gangabada panchayat under Rayagada block in Gajapati district who also have such cards.

It is alleged that despite being in Odisha, the villagers of these two villages of Patrapur and Rayagada blocks in Ganjam and Gajapati districts respectively have been deprived of benefits from the Odisha government. Access to basic amenities like drinking water, electricity and road connectivity had been in the wish list of these villagers.

Cashing in on it, the AP government has won the hearts of the villagers and lured them to its side by providing them electricity, drinking water and education facilities, ration items and ₹2,250 monthly pension to elderly people. In Gudikhala village, some villagers have got housing facility from the Patrapur block administration under Indira Awas Yojana, while some others have houses provided by the AP government. Information leaflets about the AP government facilties are seen hanging on the walls. These information

sheets highlight all the details like the list of welfare schemes and the amount of money being provided to the beneficiaries.

Listing out the benefits from the AP government, the locals said they receive ₹500 as monthly pension (old age pension) from Buratala panchayat whereas ₹2,250 is provided by the Tarisingi panchayat in Andhra Pradesh.

"We are 27 tribal families in the village. We suffered a lot due to absence of proper road communication facility. The block administration continued to ignore our problems. It is the AP government that constructed a road up to Kalinga Dala reservoir," observed some villagers

For medical facilities too, they depend on Siripur health centre in AP instead of a nearby hospital of the Odisha government. In case of medical emergency, they spend around ₹300 if they go to the nearest health centre in Odisha. But they receive free healthcare services at Siripur health centre in the neighbouring state.

The villagers have accused the officials of Odisha government of being apathetic towards their plight. "Officers from Andhra Pradesh visit us to know our difficulties. But we have not seen any Odisha officers in our villages, even once,'



ational Security Adviser Ajit Doval has urged a fresh batch of Indian Police Service (IPS) officers, at a passing out parade November 12, to wage war against and 'subvert' the civil society in the name of defending the rule of law. This call could be taken as a call for subverting democracy itself. This is an ominous and dangerous signal coming on the heels of almost similar exhortations by the Chief of Defence Staff General Bipin Rawat to vigilante groups in Jammu and Kashmir to take law in their hands and finish off alleged terrorists.


When a society and a nation state emerge from the dark days of savagery and desire to create a modern democratic system, the first remarkable difference that can be observed is when law and order are implemented. These two words differentiate a free and modern society from a dark and sayage society. Order is imposed by Police and Law is executed by the Judiciary. The problem in India today is that those in power mistakenly consider 'civil society' as being limited to social activists and NGOs and other types of organised groups. If correctly viewed, civil or civilized society comprises not only the activists and organised groups but also educationists, doctors, engineers, lawyers, business persons and, on a wider perspective, any educated and aware citizen of the nation.

Civil society everywhere in the world acts as a watchdog of democracy, opening the eyes of the people to the gross abuse of the rule of law and acts of omission and commission by a government hurting the interests of the people and the nation. A nation is not merely a piece of land. It is the people living on it who create a society that makes that piece of land unique. To try to force this society into submission and neutralise it is an assault on the very nation theory that the police ought to be taught to protect. The rights of freedom of speech and expression guaranteed by the principles of democracy are significant elements that help cement a civilized society.

Suppressing civilized society under the pretext of enforcing rule of law is being projected as if it is in the greater good of the nation. There seems to be no compunction to change the meaning of civil society, damning it indi-

rectly and telling young police officers that the true danger against the nation lies within that civil society. In fact, heinous attacks on civil society by law enforcers have been glorified as a "fourth frontier war."

Fourth-generation warfare (FGW) means a conflict where the state fights non-state actors such as terror groups and insurgents. In defence parlance, the FGW is the fourth stage of evolution in warfare. The first-generation warfare refers to the formal battle-



The attack on civil society, regarded as the conscience-keeper of a democracy, reeks of intolerance and arrogance of a government. The language used by Doval could surprise citizens of any free country. "It is the civil society," he said, "that can be subverted, divided, manipulated to hurt the interest of a nation." What he means is a prescription for the enforcers to make the independent voice fall in line and browbeat it into surrender. It is based on the assumption that civil society is not acting in the interest of the state. The role of civil society, however, is to uphold the interests of the people when the powers that be seek to undermine them.

Then Doval came up with his personal definition of democracy. What he said is in defence of the elected representatives at the expense of the electorate. The quintessence of democracy, he said, did not lie in the ballot box, but "in the laws made by the people who are elected through those ballot boxes' and in the will of the police to enforce them. This is exactly what India is being told currently that an elected government has the mandate to do whatever it thinks best for the nation. But, what has been forgotten is that the people and their civil society have the right to criticise what an elected government does. The right is secured in the provisions of the Constitution of this democratic nation. In order to change the democratic system, the government seems to be systematically maligning the civil society.

Doval further said that laws are not as good as they are made. They are as good as they are implemented and executed. But, what he did not say is that most of the laws, such as the Sedition rules, that the police are now being called upon to enforce every so often are colonial era laws and were not made through a democratic process. Moreover, many of the laws passed by elected lawmakers are poorly or vaguely drafted, giving room for abuse. Most importantly, all laws and all executive decisions are subject to judicial review. This is a point conveniently forgotten by most people in power. In fact, people's confidence in the system of crime and punishment as implemented by the police and the investigating agencies has been alarmingly eroded because of the way the laws are twisted to suit the interests of the government and those who are powerful. The top cops of India, in other words the IPS, need to be exhorted to learn the latest methods of investigation and detection. They desperately need to be sensitised about being pro victim and not the opposite. Invariably, when discussions are held on Police Reforms, they veer towards obtaining new weapons, modern vehicles and better pay and perks of police personnel. While those undoubtedly are very essential and core issues that need to be addressed immediately, in the same breath it must be added that these top cops should be taught that regaining public confidence is essential for successful policing. Without cooperation of the vast majority of citizens, police will remain isolated. Also vital is physical fitness and appearance of police women and men in India.

The police force in India is still carrying its colonial legacy and character. People feel that for namesake only it is called Indian.

Popinjay

his deeply insulting word for a vain or conceited person, one given to pretentious displays, is now rather outmoded or literary. A good example can be found in Joseph Conrad's short story The End of the Tether of 1902: "When he looked around in the club he saw only a lot of conceited popinjays too selfish to think of making a good woman happy." Dictionaries say a popinjay was also at one time the usual name for a parrot, and in that lies the origin of the derogatory term. What could be more gaudily and squawkingly in your face than a parrot? What more perfect term for an empty chatterer, fop or coxcomb? Who's a pretty boy, then? It's an ancient imprecation, already of some age when Shakespeare used it in Henry IV, but the literal parrot sense goes back even further, to the latter part of the fourteenth century. It was also used for a device on a post to shoot at, the archers' equivalent of the quintain, usually it seems because the mark was a figure of a parrot. That explains references such as this one, in Old Mortality, by Sir Walter Scott: "When the musters had been made, and duly reported, the young men, as was usual, were to mix in various sports, of which the chief was to shoot at the popinjay, an ancient game formerly practised with archery, but at this period with fire-arms." The word travelled with the bird from Africa and can be traced back to the Arabic babbaga, through Spanish papagayo and Old French papeiaye.

INTANGIBLE CAPITALISM

n a 2014 book, the Nobel laureate economist Joseph E. Stiglitz and Bruce C. Greenwald argued that the most important societal endowment is the ability to learn. Today, it is increasingly evident that the 'learning society' has not only been created, but is starting to drive our economies.

From the nineteenth century until about 25 years ago, businesses largely invested in physical infrastructure and machinery, from railroads to vehicles. But in the past quarter-century, investment in so-called intangible assets – such as intellectual prop erty, research, software, and managerial and organisational skills - has soared. Recent McKinsey Global Institute (MGI) research found that, by 2019, intangibles accounted for 40% of all investment in the United States and 10 European economies, up 29% from 1995. And intangibles investment appears to have surged again in 2020 as digitalisation accelerated in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

We believe that this trend strongly hints at the emergence of a new model of capitalism, in which companies' success will be measured more by their people and their capabilities than by their machines, products, or services. Moreover, we think there is no going back. Firms such as Amazon, Apple, Facebook, and Microsoft are clearly scaling up dramatically and achieving hypergrowth.

Intangibles may well be driving this phenomenon. After all, there is certainly a correlation between investment in intangibles and higher productivity and growth. MGI's research found that companies in the top quartile for growth invest 2.6 times more in intangible assets than the bottom 50% of firms. Similarly, economic sectors that have invested more than 12% of their gross value added (GVA) in intangible assets

grew 28% faster than other sectors. Economies in which intangible investment is increasing are

also posting growth in total-factor productivity. Notably, the only companies that were able to maintain 2019 rates of growth after the pandemic hit in early 2020 were those that had invested significantly in the full range of intangibles: innovation, data and analytics, and human and brand capital.

In a dematerialised, digitised, knowledge-driven world, corporate returns, productivity, and economic growth will increasingly be tied to such assets. But unlocking their true value requires not only investing in them, but also developing the skills and managerial know-how, or human capital, needed to make effective use of them. An MGI survey of more than 860 executives indicates that the major difference between fast-growing and slowgrowing firms is that the former not only invest more in intangibles and appreciate their importance for boosting competitive advantage, but also focus on deploying them effectively.

The growing salience of intangibles thus makes the imperative of raising skills and capabilities even more acute. This emerging new form of capitalism is potentially marvelous for qualified people with highly portable skills, but somewhat scarier for the less skilled and less digitally savvy. Companies that lack the resources to make necessary investments in intangibles also could fall further behind. The dematerialised economy, if not managed well, thus risks being a recipe for inequality.

Previous MGI research found that a key distinguishing feature of 'superstar' companies is their investment in intangibles, including large-scale spending to raise the skills and capabilities of their people. Back in 2019, for example, Amazon announced plans to spend \$700 million over six years to retrain 100,000 employees. Other tech giants, including Google and IBM, have developed similar schemes.

But the growing concentration of revenue and profit in a small group of successful firms risks increasing disparities of income and wealth. Intangibles-heavy superstar firms tend to employ fewer, more highly skilled, and better paid people who are generally more productive than employees

in less digitised businesses. If these superstars pull even further ahead, then labour's share of national income - the percentage that goes to worker compensation could decline even more.

This is not to argue that successful intangibles-based firms should be constrained from expanding further or from training their own people. Such firms are important sources of innovation and high-productivity growth, and have formidable incentives to continue investing in intangibles. Rather, companies and governments should do everything they can to spread the skills that will open up opportunities for more individuals and firms in the digital economy.

Huge value is at stake. Given the mounting evidence of the correlation between intangibles investment and GVA growth, executives and policymakers should ask themselves what it will take to realise the opportunities intangibles represent. If an additional 10% of companies were to attain the same share of intangibles investment and GVA growth as top growers, this could produce an additional \$1 trillion in GVA, or a 2.7% increase across sectors in OECD economies.

Governments can play a key role in reskilling and in ensuring that the right knowledge infrastructure is in place. That means focusing on education, internet and other communications technologies, urban planning, and public science spending.

Finance must combat climate change – or else

summer. Intergovernmental Panel were. Avoiding the worst, the report made clear, is still possible, but only if humanity moves to a carbon-neutral economy as quickly as possible. "This report," said United Nations Secretary-General António Guterres, "must sound a death knell for coal and fossil fuels, before they destroy our planet."

And yet, with the planet on fire, institutional finance is fanning the flames. Many of the world's most powerful financial actors continue to invest in the fossil-fuel industry. even as its actions predictably lead to massive economic disruption, ecological catastrophe, and social injustice. Until now, they have gotten away with it. But a new trend in the law is forcing institutional investors to decarbonise their portfolios

- or be held legally accountable. Harvard University is a case in point. For a decade, Harvard's leaders had ignored calls from students, faculty, and alumni to divest the university's \$53 billion endowment from the fossil-fuel industry. But, recognising scientific and financial reality, in September Harvard finally pledged to divest from companies whose business models, by relying on sustained carbon extraction, are incompati-

the ble with a livable future. "Given the need to decarbonise the econon Climate Change released omy and our responsibility as fiits latest report, and the scariest part duciaries to make long-term investment decisions that support our teaching and research mission," wrote university President Larry Bacow, "we do not believe such investments are prudent' (emphasis added).

Prudence, in the statute governing Harvard's endowment and many other institutional funds, is a fundamental legal concept that establishes the care, skill, and caution with which a fund's investments must be administered. Prudence guides how a fund must be managed in order to serve its beneficiaries' interests. and there are significant penalties for violating it. Harvard's statement acknowledges the impossibility of complying with such a duty while investing in fossil fuels.

There are plenty of reasons why this might be the case. For starters, fossil-fuel companies face existential uncertainty. A tide of market shifts, regulations, and litigation poses fundamental risks to the industry's interests, while many of the carbon assets from which it derives its value will be rendered unburnable and stranded to meet international climate goals. In addition, the idea of seeking to profit from businesses whose dependence on carbon dioxide emissions serves to hasten climate change is repugnant to the notions of public purpose and social duty that responsible investors claim to uphold, and would seem reason enough to seek broad decarbonisation.

In other words, the fossil-fuel industry's business model is now so misaligned with scientific and financial reality that betting on these companies is not just misguided. It is negligently wrong as a matter of law. Moreover, the concept of prudence applies in similar form to any investor subject to the fiduciary standard, thus binding essentially every academic endowment, charitable fund, and public and private pension fund. That means trillions of dollars stand to be affected by Harvard's recent divestment precedent.

In fact, Harvard's decision is already having ripple effects. In the weeks since the announcement, a number of other influential investors - ranging from the endowments of Boston University, the University of Minnesota, and the MacArthur Foundation to the ABP public pension fund in the Netherlands (Europe's largest) – have likewise acted to align their money with the demands of prudence and climate action. In doing so, they join investors worth over \$39 trillion - many of whom, evidence from markets suggests, are already reaping financial gains from shedding fossil-fuel stocks.

By basing Harvard's decision on

prudence, Bacow may well have intended to generate the sweeping impact that the university's divestment from fossil fuels predictably will achieve. Or perhaps it was a timely defensive move. When Bacow announced the decision, the Massachusetts attorney general was weighing whether to act on a legal complaint filed by students and other members of the Harvard community, along with the nonprofit Climate Defense Project, asserting that the university's fossilfuel investments represented a breach of its charitable obligations.

Whatever the reason, Harvard has given voice to a doctrine that, befitting the urgency of the climate crisis, should spread swiftly around the world and hasten similar decarbonisation decisions by fiduciaries everywhere. It took a decade of struggle to get Harvard to this point. But now that it is finally taking steps toward living up to its global reputation as a leader, other institutional investors must take notice. In an age of climate crisis, these actors' mandate is to stand with the future, or else risk ending up not just on the wrong side of history, but also on the wrong side of the law.



Mumbai/Gadchiroli, Nov 14: Top CPI-Maoist Central Committee Member Milind Teltumbde was among the 26 Maoists, including 6 women, who were gunned down by security forces in Maharastra's Gadchiroli district, Home Minister Dilip Walse-Patil said Sunday.

Milind Teltumbde, 57, is the brother of human rights activist and scholar Anand Teltumbde. who is the brother-in-law of Vanchit Bahujan Aghadi President Dr Prakash Ambedkar.

Anand Teltumbde is among the group of so-called "Urban Maoists' who were raided in early and mid-2018 in connection with the Koregaon Bhima-Elgar Parishad cases, and is currently lodged in the Taloja Jail, Raigad.

Among those eliminated in Sunday's gunfight include 6 women Maoists, 3 Commanders of various Dalams and 13 carrying huge collective cash rewards of Rs 1.38 crore on their scalps -- making it one of the most successful security operations in recent years,

witnesses want security removed

Lakhimpur Kheri (Uttar Pradesh), Nov 14: In an interesting development, eight of the 90 key witnesses in the Lakhimpur Kheri case in which Ashish Misra. son of Union Minister of State for Home Ajay Misra Teni, is the main accused, want their police security removed.

These witnesses have written to the local administration in this regard. A total of eight people, including four farmers, were killed in the Tikunia area of Lakhimpur Kheri October 3.

Security was provided to each of the 90 key witnesses of the case by the police after recording their statement before a magistrate on the directions of the Supreme Court last month.

Additional Superintendent of

Police (ASP), Arun Kumar Singh, who is also a member of the ninemember special investigation committee probing the incident, said, "Eight key witnesses have submitted applications wanting their security to be withdrawn citing personal reasons. Their applications will be reviewed before removing security."

The local police declined to reveal the identity of the witnesses who want their security removed. It may be recalled that October 3. violence erupted after an SUV mowed down four farmers near the Banbirpur village under Tikunia police circle of Lakhimpur Kheri.

Four other people, including two BJP workers Shubham Mishra and Shyam Sunder, journalist Raman Kashyap and a driver Hari Om Mishra, were also killed.

MP reports highest tiger deaths between 2012 and 2019

Bhopal, Nov 14: Madhya Pradesh has reported the highest number of tiger deaths between 2012 and 2019 and in this year alone, 36 of the big cats lost their lives in the state.

The increasing number of tiger deaths in almost all the reserves in Madhya Pradesh is not only putting a risk on the 'tiger state', which it won against Karnataka in 2018, but it has also raised an alarm for forest departments to take more

protective measures. Madhya Pradesh won the 'tiger state' status in the All India Tiger Estimated Report 2018 by a difference of just two big cats - 526 to Karnataka's 524. But the state has lost over 200 tigers between 2012 and 2019 (36 till November 13, 2021), followed by 141 in Maharashtra and 123 in Karnataka during the same period.

The Kanha Tiger Reserve, which is popularly known as Kanha-Kisli National Park located in peripheries of two districts Mandla and Balaghat, has reported 43 tiger deaths between 2012 and 2019, the highest in the country.

Bandhavgarh National Park, another major tiger reserve located in Umaria district (the border between Madhya Pradesh and Chhattisgarh), has reported 38 tiger deaths in the same period.

Pench National Park or Pench

Wildlife Sanctuary, which is lo-

cated between two Sioni and Chhindwara districts, has lost 17 tigers, while Satpura Tiger Reserve in Hoshangabad district and Sanjay-Dubri in Sidhi district have lost three and four, respectively, according to the National Tiger Conservation Authority's report.

However, the officials in the reserves were of the view that the tiger population has continued to grow and it never decreased

despite the deaths.

These dispersing tigers often ended up falling victim to wire traps, poachers and human-animal conflicts. Surprisingly, in the past fortnight, two tigers were reported dead which were fitted with radio-collared mechanism.

"Security system of tigers at each reserve needs to be strengthened with modern mechanism. Death of two radio-collared tigers has created another challenge because the mechanism was considered to be secured in terms of locating movement and other activities of tigers. Increasing population and territorial fights among them are another big concern which needs more attention," said a senior wildlife official at the Kanha National Park. Meanwhile, wildlife activists said that situation is unlikely to improve until a Special Tiger Protection Force (STPF) is formed and deployed in reserves

In 2000 when the number of tigers were on a decline due to human interferences, increasing incidents of poaching and trafficking, the National Tiger Conservation Authority (NTCA) had recommended states having tiger reserves to set up STPF.

Following the recommendation, Odisha, Karnataka and Maharashtra ormed STPFs.-However, Madhya Pradesh is yet to set-up such a force.

PM transfers housing scheme **Manipur attack: Combing on for militants**

Imphal, Nov 14: A massive manhunt is on in the jungles of Churachandrapur in Manipur near the border with Myanmar to search for militants belonging to two shadowy outfits who have claimed responsibility for a deadly ambush which killed personnel and family members of Assam Rifles. Officials said combing operation conducted jointly by Assam Rifles and state police was on in the jungles surrounding the village of Sekhen where the ambush was laid Saturday.

Manipur CM N Biren Singh Sunday said security along the Myanmar border through which militants are believed to have slipped in and ambushed an Assam Rifles Colonel, his wife, son and four other riflemen, was being beefed up. The chief minister, who laid wreaths on their bodies at Imphal airport also said the home department and para-military forces had been instructed to bring the militants to justice at the earliest. Two militant groups - People's Liberation Army and the Manipur Naga People's Front - had jointly claimed responsibility for the attack. Officials said the two groups one of which had been dormant for several years, while the other is little known of, had chosen their target carefully and were likely trying to make their

Speaking to media-persons after the wreath laying ceremony, Singh said "the government will not tolerate such terrorist activities in the state" and added that security along the border areas of the state would be increased. perpetrators" according to the rule of law. Rfn Das was a resident of Murshidabad in West Bengal and Rfn Swargiary belonged to Baksa in Assam. Rfn Konyak was from Mon in Nagaland, while Rfn Meena was a resident of Dausa.



Manas (Assam), Nov 14: When their husbands decided to forgo their dangerous life as poachers, women living in villages around Manas National Park of Assam had to soup up their traditional culinary skills to earn for their

The journey of these women from the indigenous Bodo community has become an example today for others. Their decision to take up the job of keeping the family pot boiling after their husbands were brought back into the mainstream is now being showcased as a model by other community members.

These women in and around Basbari range used their traditional culinary skills by offering Bodo dishes to tourists coming to the famed Manas National Park, known for one-horned rhino and Roval Bengal Tiger, but the endeavour initially floundered due to absence of entrepreneurial skills.

Mitali G Dutta, a culinary entrepreneur, came to know about their attempts and came forward to help these poor women in association with the World Wildlife Fund (WWF) by skilling them and help-



ing them market.

"I was already working with the WWF in a similar project at Kaziranga National Park when they approached me for Manas. I started working with them in 2017 and began with giving tips on how to present a dish in front of a customer," Dutta told PTI in an interview here.

The Bodo women know their dishes best and no training is given to cook the items, but lessons are imparted on how much should be served, how the plates should be arranged and most importantly on the pricing to make it a sustainable business model, she added.

'The Forest Department helped us by providing us space at the Bansbari Anti-Poaching Camp. There different villagers come and set up small food stalls. Initially in 2018-19, the model failed as there was no financial support and lack of business aptitude among the women," Dutta said.

She said that the women are members of two self-help groups, namely Swankar Mithinga Onsai Afat (SMOA) and Somaina, working in the area of rural culinary tourism. Somaina also organises traditional Bodo dances for visitors.

The women from the two groups came together in 2018 and formed 'Gungzema Kitchen' -- an enterprise to showcase traditional and authentic Bodo food and cultural performances -- during the Manas

Spring Festival. While the Gungzema Kitchen team worked on bettering their skills, Dutta took care of their online promotion to the outer world with the help of her own established brand 'FoodSutra by Mitali'.

Dutta said, "Without proper market linkages and effective promotion, this enterprise will hardly catch the attention of travellers. I try to make the best use of social media to ensure Gungzema Kitchen does not go unnoticed."

Santina Basumatary, a member

of Gungzema Kitchen, appreciates Dutta's efforts to teach them both hard and soft skills. "We never had any idea about

running an enterprise like this. We only knew about household works. But Mitali Baideo (sister) has taught us to better our skills and work hard to be consistent and professional," she added. A traditional Bodo platter served

by Gungzema Kitchen contains about 7-8 items and is priced at Rs 500. Customers have often appreciated and acknowledged the culinary skills of the locals and valued their efforts to upscale their household skills into a growing business

Deba Kumar Dutta from WWF India spoke about the visibly noticeable personality development that has occurred in villagers due to this exercise to make them selfsustaining.

"They are all working hard and are motivated! There is a sense of empowerment within the groups now and this has worked constructively for the preservation of Manas' biodiversity," he added.



New Delhi, Nov 14: Delhi Commission For Women (DCW) chief Swati Maliwal wrote to President Ram Nath Kovind Sunday urging him to withdraw the Padma Shri, India's fourth highest civilian award, bestowed on actor Kangana Ranaut for her remarks allegedly be-

littling the country's Independence. Ranaut Thursday had kicked off a row by saying India attained "real freedom" in 2014, apparently referring to the Narendra Modi-led government assuming power, and describing the country's Independence in 1947 as "bheek" (alms). Maliwal, in her letter, said the actor had "made certain outrageous statements disgracing the great freedom fighters of the country".

The DCW chief also demanded sedition charges against the 'Queen' actor. "These statements reflect her hatred for our great freedom fighters like Mahatma Gandhi Bhagat Singh and countless others who laid down their lives for the nation! We all know that our nation got its Independence from British rule through ultimate sacrifices and martyrdom of our great freedom fighters," she wrote.

Highlighting that Ranaut's statements have hurt the sentiments of millions of Indians and are "seditious" in nature, she urged the President to "kindly take cognizance of the matter and withdraw the Padma Shri honour bestowed upon Ms Ranaut".

"I also request you to kindly ensure that an FIR is registered against her on charges of sedition.

I hope that you will uphold the sentiments of crores of Indians and do the needful in the matter," Maliwal stressed.

The DCW chief said Ranaut, through her insensitive and thoughtless lies", had demeaned and belittled "the sacrifices of millions of Indians who participated" in various movements such as the revolt of 1857, the Champaran Satvagrah the Khilafat Movement the Quit India Movement, the Dandi March and the Non Cooperation Movement among several others.

"How can we forget the thousands who had assembled at the Jallianwala Bagh to protest against British rule and the massacre that followed? Are these chapters in our history a 'bheek'?" Maliwal sought to know. She also pointed out that it was not a stray incident by the actor and that "Ranaut appears to not be of sound mind".

"She habitually spews venom against people of her own country and has repeatedly used vile language to attack those she does not agree with. Her behaviour is in no way befitting of the recipient of the highest award in the country and is also an insult to the stalwarts who received the award with and before her," Maliwal added. New Delhi, Nov 14: The Chief Justice of India N.V. Ramana Sunday said primarily the ability of constitutional courts is to function with absolute independence and necessary boldness in the face of adversity -- which defines institution's character -- and emphasized "the law needs to operate humanely", and the state judiciary has to be sensitive to people's problems and their practical difficulties

The Chief Justice was speaking at the valedictory ceremony of the pan-India legal awareness and outreach campaign organised by National Legal Services Authority (NALSA). He said: "The State judiciary, being closely associated with the people, has to be sensitive and aware about their problems and practical difficulties. In particular, it needs to be cognizant

about both victims and as well as accused and must facilitate their emergency needs"

He added, "After all, the law needs to operate humanely. Remember, it is the trial court which is approached first by a woman in distress, a child in need of care, or an illegal detenue." The Chief Justice emphasized that the court's decisions have a huge social impact, and it should be easily comprehensible and must be writ-

ten in simple and clear language. He said it is, primarily, the ability of constitutional courts to function with absolute independence and necessary boldness in the face of adversity, that defines the character of the institution. "Our ability to uphold the Constitution sustains our impeccable character. There is no other way to live up to the faith of our people. Poverty is a misfortune for which the law cannot take any responsibility at all", he added.

The Chief Justice said the stark divide between haves and have nots is still a reality and no matter how many cherished declarations, "we successfully arrive at it, in the face of poverty, inequity and deprivations, it will all seem pointless".

He said: "Despite our being a part of a welfare state, benefits are not trickling down to the intended beneficiaries at the desired levels. People's aspirations about leading a dignified life are often met with challenges. One of them, primarily, being poverty".

Pegasus probe may go for a toss

n independent expert committee of the Supreme Court set up to investigate use of Pegasus spyware against journalists, opposition politicians and others is moving at a snail's pace though it was given eight weeks to submit its report. The Supreme Court overruled pleas by the government that national

security concerns required a veil of secrecy be retained regarding surveillance while not specifically denying the allegations of Pegasus spyware usage either. The committee has one key member Alok Joshi who is a former RAW & National Technical Research Organisation (NTRO) head and has pushed off to the USA and will be back next week. Interestingly, the spyware was allegedly imported by the NTRO when Alok Joshi headed it until November 2018 after he retired as RAW chief in 2015. But he cannot disclose anything in his personal knowledge to the committee either as it will be a violation of oath of secrecy. Insiders also say Joshi sought informal consent from the government to be part of the Supreme Court committee when he was approached. The committee is looking for an office space in Lutyens' Delhi and is yet to start work. If insiders are to be believed, all these administrative issues alone will consume eight weeks.

The agreement acknowledges that commitments made by countries so far to cut emissions of planet-heating greenhouse gases are nowhere near enough to prevent planetary warming from exceeding 1.5 degrees above pre-industrial temperatures. To attempt to solve this, it asks governments to strengthen those targets by the end of next year, rather than every five years, as previously required.

Failure to set, and meet, tougher emissions-cutting goals would have huge consequences. Scientists say that to go beyond a rise of 1.5C would unleash extreme sea level rise and catastrophes including crippling droughts, monstrous storms and wildfires far worse than those the world is already suffering.

Targeting Fossil Fuels

The pact for the first time includes language that asks countries to reduce their reliance on coal and roll back fossil fuel subsidies, moves that would target the energy sources that scientists say are the primary drivers of manmade climate change. The wording was contentious, though

Paris pact fully functional now

After six years of strenuous negotiations and pending items that prevented the full implementation of the Paris Climate Change Agreement -- a legally binding international treaty that was adopted by 196 nations -- on carbon markets and transparency have finally been approved. The 26th meeting of the Conference of Parties (COP26) to the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) came to an end Saturday night in this Scottish city, a day after their scheduled conclusion. Belgrade, Nov 14: At the main hospital in Romania's capital, the morgue ran out of space for the dead in recent days, and doctors in Bulgaria have suspended routine surgeries so they can tend to a surge in Covid-19 patients.

In the Serbian capital, the graveyard now operates an extra day during the week in order to bury all the bodies arriving.

Queen misses memorial service due to back pain

London, Nov 14: Britain's Queen Elizabeth II was forced to withdraw from the UK's annual memorial service for fallen soldiers on Sunday due to a sprained back. 'Her Majesty is disappointed that she will miss the service," the palace said in a statement.

The ceremony would have been the 95-year-old queen's first in-person public engagement since she was advised to rest following a night in hospital last month.

The news that the queen would not attend the service in central London, an event that she sees as one of the most significant engagements of the year, will increase concerns around her health after she withdrew from public life for the longest time in memory.



A palace source said the queen's back sprain was unrelated to the unspecified ailment that caused her hospital visit and her doctor's advice to rest. The source said it was an incredibly unfortunate coincidence

The world's oldest and longestreigning monarch has missed events such as the COP26 climate conference and a festival to remember the nation's war dead on Saturday evening since she went into hospital for "preliminary investigations". The source said the queen hopes to continue as planned with her schedule of light official duties next week

Thousands of military families struggle with food insecurity



FTAs to provide more mkt access

New Delhi: Talks for the proposed free trade agreements (FTAs) with countries, including Australia, the UK and the UAE, are moving at a fast pace and these pacts, when implemented, would help provide greater market access to domestic goods, Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal said Sunday. Under a free trade agreement, two trading partners reduce or eliminate customs duties on the maximum number of goods traded between them. Besides, they liberalise norms to enhance trade in services and boost investments. Goyal said that talks for such pacts are going on with Australia, UAE, GCC (Gulf Cooperation Council), European Union, Israel and the UK. Member countries of GCC are Bahrain, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, and United Arab Emirates (UAE). When these agreements would be finalised, it would provide "greater access to our manufactured goods as there will be less or zero customs duties," the minister said at Vaishya Samaj Sammelan. He also said that Uttar Pradesh plays a key role in promoting the country's exports.

The two companies' legal dispute, centred around Amazon's deal to invest \$200 million in Future Coupons, has become a high-stakes battle which could determine the dominant player in India's retail market in the years ahead. According to the Sunday filing,

Future's directors told the CCI in a Nov 10 letter that Amazon's intentions were not to invest in Future Coupons because of its "unique

"The CCI has to revoke the approval granted for Amazon's investment," the letter from Future's independent directors stated.

Coal import rises 13% in Apr-Sept

New Delhi: India's coal import rose by 12.6 per cent to 107.34 million tonne in the first six months of 2021-22. The country had imported 95.30 million tonne (MT) of the coal in April-September 2020-21, according to provisional data compiled by mjunction services, based on monitoring of vessels' positions and data received from shipping companies. However, the country's coal import dropped to 14.85 MT in September, against 19.04 MT in the corresponding month of previous fiscal, it said.

Maruti to bring more CNG trims

Udaipur: Maruti Suzuki India (MSI) plans to drive in CNG trims across its product range as it remains bullish over long-term prospects of the segment amid increase in fuel prices and drop in diesel car sales, according to a senior company official. The company, which sold around 1.62 lakh CNG cars last FY, is also counting on the rapid expansion of CNG dispensing outlets across the country to bring in more CNG products.

Solar manufacturing to get more funding

New Delhi, Nov 14: The government will soon enhance the funding under the production linked incentive (PLI) scheme for the domestic solar cells and module manufacturing to ₹24,000 crore from the existing ₹4,500 crore to make India an exporting nation.

"We brought the PLI scheme (for solar cells and modules) worth ₹4.500 crore. We invited bids and we got 54,500 MW manufacturing capacity of solar equipment. We asked the government to sanction ₹19,000 crore more under the PLI, which was approved (in-principle). Now we would have a PLI of ₹24.000 crore. We would be exporting solar equipment," Power and New & Renewable Energy Minister R K Singh told PTI.

The minister also informed that at present solar module manufacturing capacity in the country is 8,800 MW while the solar cell manufacturing capacity is 2,500 MW.

In April this year, the Union Cabinet approved a ₹4,500 crore

production linked incentive (PLI) scheme to boost domestic manufacturing capacity of solar PV

The scheme is aimed at adding 10,000 MW manufacturing capacity of integrated solar PV modules entailing direct investment of ₹17,200 crore at present. With the increase in allocation to ₹24,000 crore, the quantum of investments and domestic manufacturing capacity envisaged under the PLI scheme would further increase.

Under the scheme, solar PV manufacturers will be selected through a transparent competitive bidding process. The PLI will be disbursed for five years post commissioning of solar PV manufacturing plants, on sales of high efficiency solar PV modules.

Manufacturers will be rewarded for higher efficiencies of solar PV modules and also for sourcing their material from the domestic market. The PLI amount will increase with increased module efficiency and increased local value addition.

"The Asian Shooting Confederation received a letter from ISSF confirming that the Olympic Quota Places for Asia is increased from 38 to 48," the sport's continental body (ASC) said in a statement on Twitter and Facebook.
