New Delhi, Nov 15: The Centre Monday allowed conducting postmortem after sunset in hospitals with adequate infrastructure, except in cases of homicide, suicide, rape, decomposed bodies and suspected foul play.

Health Minister Mansukh Mandaviya in a tweet in Hindi said, "An end to the system put in place by the British! Post-mortem can be conducted roundthe-clock. In furtherance of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's idea of good governance, the health ministry has decided that post-mortem can be con-

"In response to the multiple references received by the Union Health Ministry from various sources and in line with the government's commitment to promote ease of living by reducing burden imposed due to

changes have been made in the postmortem protocols to allow for the procedure to be conducted after sunset effective from today," the health ministry said.

"Apart from friends and relatives of the deceased, this new procedure also promotes organ donation and

The multiple representations to the ministry in this regard were examined by a technical committee in the Directorate General of Health Services, Union Ministry of Health & Family Welfare.

Spend limit for candidates up

Bhubaneswar, Nov 15: Accepting the suggestions made by various political parties, the State Election Commission (SEC) has increased the poll expenditure limit for candidates contesting for sarpanch, Panchayat Samiti and Zilla Parishad

As per an order issued by the SEC, the poll expenditure limit for Zilla Parishad members was enhanced up to Rs 5 lakh while for Panchayat Samiti members and Sarpanch candidate, the limit was increased to Rs2 lakh.

Now, candidates contesting for Zilla Parishad members can use up to five jeeps or cars and 10 twowheelers whereas Panchayat Samiti member nominees can use a maximum of two jeeps or cars and five two-wheelers.

Similarly, the candidates contesting for Sarpanch posts can use two jeeps or cars and five motorcycles. Use of auto-rickshaws will

have to submit details of the vehicles they use to the Sub-Collector whereas Panchayat Samiti Member and Sarpanch candidates will submit the details to concerned Block Development Officer (BDO). The candidates will have

prior to the polling. Usually the voting time was from 7 am to 12 pm. This time, the voting times have been enhanced by another hour. The voting will be held from 7 am to 1 pm during the upcoming Panchayat elections.

This time, there will be a central counting at the block-level instead of booth level counting on the same day, the political parties had proposed to the SEC to extend the timing during the recently held meeting.

Many political parties had also proposed to increase the election expenditure of sarpanch and samiti member candidates from Rs 80,000 to Rs 2 lakh and to increase the amount from Rs 2 lakh to Rs 5 lakh for Zilla Parishad candidates.

SC talks tough on pollution in Delhi

New Delhi, Nov 15: The Supreme Court Monday directed the Centre to hold an emergency meeting on the pollution crisis and by Tuesday decide on steps like stopping nonessential construction, transport, power plants and implementing work from home to tackle the situation, saying "the cat is out of the bag" now as the "hue and cry" over stubble burning being a big contributor was without any basis.

Ordering the Centre to hold the meeting with the secretaries concerned of Delhi, Punjab, Haryana and UP, the bench headed by Chief Justice NV Ramana said, "In fact, now the cat is out of the bag, the farmers' stubble burning contributes to 4 percent of the pollution... So, we are targeting something which is to-

tally insignificant". It pulled up the city government for making 'lame excuses' and passing the buck to civic bodies for not taking emergent measures in handling the crisis.

The bench, also comprising Justices DY Chandrachud and Surva Kant, said that construction, industry, transport, power and vehicular traffic are the major culprits in causing pollution and asked the Centre to take steps regarding these factors.

Hirakud dam oustees to 3 front-runners get homestead land: CM

Bhubaneswar, Nov 15: The state government announced Monday that lands for homes would be provided to the families who were displaced for the multi-purpose Hirakud Dam project in Sambalpur district. Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik made the announcement while distributing BSKY smart health cards in virtual mode. The decision would benefit nearly 2,000 families.

"Odisha government will provide homestead land to nearly 2.000 families displaced for the Hirakud Dam project. This decision will resolve the long standing issue of oustees," Patnaik said in his message.

The Chief Minister also launched the distribution of BSKY smart health cards in Jharsuguda district. More than 1.15 lakh people will benefit from the BSKY scheme, a senior official informed.

Patnaik also inaugurated a number of development projects for Jharsuguda district worth ₹144 crore. He laid the foundation stones for various projects in the district to the tune of ₹153 crore. He also inaugurated two water treatment plants (WTPs) for Sadar and Brajarajnagar towns.

Bhubaneswar, Nov 15: With the government allowing incumbent DGP Abhav to retire from services December 31, the race for the next chief of the state police has begun. The government issued a notification November 10 allowing Director General of Police (DGP)

Abhay to retire December 31, 2021. Speculations have started in the power corridor about the possible names for the next DGP of Odisha. Names of some senior most IPS officers including Pradeep Kapur, Santosh Upadhaya and Manoj Chhabra are doing the rounds.

Kapur, Abhay's 1986 batch mate, is serving as the director of the National Technical Research Organisation (NTRO) and has been on a central deputation since 2015.

Chhabra is working as the Special Director General of Police, Special Armed Police-Odisha while Upadhaya is the DG, Prisons and Directorate of Correctional Services. Abhay, the 1986-batch IPS, was appointed as DGP in November 2019 and scheduled to retire from service in June this year. However, the government extended his tenure by another six months as per the directive of the Supreme Court which mandated that the tenure of the state DGP should be at least two years. As Abhay's twoyear tenure ends December 9, 2021, speculations are high that the government will appoint a new DGP on or before this date.

As per process, the state government will send a proposal mentioning names of senior Odisha cadre IPS offices to the Union Public Service Commission (UPSC). The UPSC will then shortlist three officers from the the state government's list and send their names for final selection. The state government then chooses one of the threeshortlisted officers left with at least two years of service.

Washington, Nov 15: US President Joe Biden's ties with Vice President Kamala Harris are in crisis, with the latter's staff furious that she is being 'sidelined', while the President's team is increasingly frustrated by how Harris is playing with the American public, the

Daily Mail reported. Harris's approval rating has plunged even further than Biden's in recent months, with rumours swirling that the US President is considering appointing her to the Supreme Court as a backdoor method of selecting a new Vice President, the report said.

Harris and her top aides are reportedly frustrated with Biden for handing her 'no-win' issues like the border crisis, White House insiders told CNN.

They cited how the President defended 'white man' Pete Buttigieg, the transportation secretary, more vigorously than her. At the same time, Biden's staff are reportedly disappointed with Harris over selfinflicted controversies, like her 'awkward' laughter when asked about visiting the border by NBC's



Lester Holt.

They blame her failure on the border crisis for sliding poll numbers. A new ABC News/Washington Post poll shows Biden at 53 per cent disapproval and 41 per cent ap-









Bhubaneswar, Nov 15: The Capital City, Monday, achieved another milestone by crossing 25 lakh Covid-19 vaccinations mark by registering a total of 26,48,813 doses administered under Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation (BMC) so far.

As per sources, the vaccination drive which covers more than 1,600 people daily will be intensified under the direct supervision of Commissioner Sanjay Kumar Singh.

Till November 14, about 14,00,349 have been given the first dose of the vaccine, while 12,48, 464 have received both shots. Out of it, 8, 26, 631 people between 18 and 44 years have got the first dose while 7, 35, 152 persons in this age group are fully vaccinated with both the doses.

Similarly, 4, 76, 284 beneficiaries of 45 years and above age group have taken the first dose while 4,22,874 were fully vaccinated. Meanwhile, a total of 56,328 frontline workers have been administered the first dose of the vaccine while 50,534 were fully vaccinated.

Moreover, 36, 106 healthcare workers have taken the first dose of the the vaccine while 33, 204 beneficiaries were fully vaccinated.

'Har Ghar Dastak'

The BMC, Monday, stated that it would aggressively push the Union government's "Har Ghar Dastak" campaign to ensure no person is left behind in the vaccination exercise in the state capital.

A special team formed by the civic body visited around 1,075 households across the City till Monday and identified 178 unvaccinated households. Around 2,500 eligible beneficiaries were fully



State to get ₹442cr for energy efficiency prog

New Delhi, Nov 15: Odisha will get a total investment of ₹441.66 crore for demand side management (DSM) programme launched by ISC and EESL in partnership with four discoms (distribution companies) in the state.

Energy Efficiency Services Limited (EESL), a joint venture under the Ministry of Power along with Institute for Sustainable Communities (ISC), with support from P4G launched a utility-based demand side management (DSM) programme for the discoms in Odisha, a statement said.

According to the statement, a total investment of ₹441.66 crore has been planned in the state in a phased manner. EESL will be taking up all the upfront and initial investment for implementation of the project and the same shall be recovered from the participating consumers in a period of 3-5 years.

The utility-based DSM project, when implemented, will generate financial savings of ₹12-13 crore for the discoms of Odisha apart from associated incentives. Further, it will lead to savings of ₹73.57 crore for the consumers of discoms.

"To address the country's acute power deficit, utilities are conThe programme aims to accelerate adoption of energy efficient technologies to reduce energy consumption as well as greenhouse gas emissions

fronted with the task of improving end-use energy efficiency and managing power demands for sustainable growth. This has made the utility-based DSM Programme in Odisha a vital enabler for improving the financial viability of discoms.

'Consumers too will benefit from the programme through lowered energy consumption and reduced energy costs," said Energy department principal secretary Nikunja Bihari Dhal

Through DSM, Odisha will be able to address the rising power supply costs, energy subsidies, climate change, environmental degradation and energy security concerns. The programme will also result in seasonal peak demand reduction, energy savings and reduction in emissions of greenhouse gases.

"With growing energy con-

sumption in Odisha, fueled by urbanisation and the development of industries and infrastructure, the utility-based DSM programme will prove to be a highly effective mechanism to ensure energy efficiency. Demand side management comes with an array of benefits and we want them to reach consumers as well as discoms," said OERC chairman UN Behera.

Odisha was considered the pilot project, based on the interest shown by TP Central Odisha Distribution Limited (TPCODL) and TP Northern Odisha Distribution Limited (TPNODL) during the initial planning stage.

The DSM programme aims to accelerate adoption of energy efficient technologies to reduce energy consumption as well as GHG emissions. This programme is further being planned in Jharkhand and Telangana.

The programme aims to replace around 4.5 lakh old fans with superefficient fans with an investment of ₹86.55 crore. A further replacement of around 45,000 of old ACs with super energy efficient ACs with an investment of ₹223.83 crore and replacement of around 14,370 old motors with IE3 Motors with an investment of ₹131.28 crore will also be undertaken.

Classroom teaching for VI, VII resumes

Bhubaneswar, Nov 15: After a gap of more than one-and-a-half years, physical classes for 6th and 7th standard students resumed in the state Monday. The schools reopened for Classes

VI and VII students with strict adherence to the Covid-19 norms. The classes started at 9:30am and continued till 1pm. Classes will continue on all the days excluding Sundays and public holidays. There will be no recess or lunch hour, officials said.

The classrooms have been sanitised prior to reopening. "After conducting thermal scanning and ensuring wearing of masks, students have been allowed to attend school. After completion of teaching, they were allowed to go home at 1 pm, said Rajeswari Raypritiam, headmistress, Unit VIII Boy's High School.

BJEM School principal Sandhya Jena said, "We've got consent letter for physical classes from more than 50 per cent of the parents of Class VI and VII which is a positive sign.

The students expressed happiness over reopening of the schools. "Physical teaching has no alternative. It's easier to understand a subject while attending physical classes than online. I'm happy to attend the classes physically and to meet friends and teachers," said a girl student of Unit-III Saraswati Shishu Vidya Mandir of Bhubaneswar.

Supporting the stand of Congress, BJP MLA Kusum Tete said her party is also not in favour of allowing the MoS into the Assembly.

"If Mishra, against whom allegations have been levelled in a murder case, enters into the House. the dignity of Assembly will be damaged," she said.

NHRC moved seeking ₹15L aid for rape survivor

Bhubaneswar, Nov 15: A Citybased rights activist Monday filed a petition before the National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) seeking payment of ₹15 lakh as compensation to a gang rape survivor of Nimapara area in Puri district.

The activist urged the commission to instruct the government to pay the compensation amount and send documentary proof in this regard within three weeks.

He also urged the commission to direct the Deputy Superintendent of Police (DSP) of Puri district to take stringent action against the culprits and send Action Taken Repot (ATR), charge sheet and medical examination reports within three weeks.

The lady had reportedly gone to an open field near her village Friday evening to answer the nature's call. The accused persons who were roaming around nearby the place spotted the lady standing alone on the bank of a river running near the village. They forcefully took her to a secluded place nearby and sexually abused her.

Meanwhile, the delay in her return raised suspicion in the mind of her husband who reached the spot searching for her. The accused fled the spot after seeing her husband. The man rescued his wife and filed a complaint at the local police station. Subsequently, police arrested the four individuals.

BMC ban on Bada Osha celebrations

Bhubaneswar: BMC Monday issued an order imposing restrictions on congregation of people at river ghats and other water bodies in the Capital city for Bada Osha and Kartika Purnima celebrations. The civic authority issued the order in view of the novel coronavirus still prevalent in the Capital city. MoEF asked to file affidavit in 3 weeks

New Delhi, Nov 15: The National Green Tribunal (NGT) Monday granted three weeks time to the Union Ministry of Environment and Forests (MoEF) to file its affidavit on an application that challenged environmental clearance (EC) given to a thermal power plant in Jharsuguda.

A bench of Judicial Member B Amit Sthalekar and Expert Member Saibal Dasgupta also asked the Odisha government to file its affidavit within three weeks while posting the matter for hearing to January 3 next year.

Significantly, an application has been filed in the tribunal seeking quashing of the environmental clearance given to thermal power plant at Talabira in Jharsuguda.

The appellant contended that the environmental impact assessment was made but various factors have not been taken into consideration.

The environment watchdog noted that the appellant highlighted the inadequacies in the report of the sub-committee constituted by the Expert Appraisal Committee (EAC) which, according to him, was not considered by the EAC while granting the Environmental

The applicant further alleged that the thermal plant is being set up in a critically polluted area. Moreover, impacts on ambient air quality, water bodies, land health and others have not been studied well in the EIA report, the appli-

Below 200 nCoV cases after 9 days

Bhubaneswar, Nov 15: Odisha's daily Covid-19 infection figure dropped below 200 mark after a gap of nine days as the state logged 185 new cases on Monday taking the tally to 10,45,656 while two fresh fatalities pushed the coronavirus death toll to 8.379, a Health department official said.

The 185 new cases included 35 children and adolescents in the age group of 0 to 18 years. The rate of infection among children and adolescents now stands at 18.91 per cent against the previous day's 16.03 per cent.

The state November 5 had reported 170 new cases. While the number of new cases Sunday was 262, it stood at 247 Saturday, 263 Friday, 271 Thursday and 387



Of the 185 new cases, Khurda district of which the state capital Bhubaneswar is a part reported the highest 76 cases followed by 18 in Sambalpur and 14 in Cuttack. Twelve districts did not report any new cases during last 24 hours.

As 185 people tested positive for infection out of 56,857 samples tested Sunday, the daily test positivity rate (TPR) was 0.32 per cent. The TPR was 0.43 per cent Sunday, 0.40 per cent Saturday, 0.39 per cent Friday, 0.43 per cent Thursday and 0.60 per cent

SC tells DMs to identify Covid orphans for PM-Cares benefits

NEW DELHI: The Supreme Court Monday directed District Magistrates and Collectors in all states including Odisha to identify children eligible for benefits under PM CARES fund and share the details with the Union government. A two-judge bench of the SC comprising Justices L Nageswara Rao and BR Gavai observed that it is the duty of the state governments to identify and approve children eligible for benefits under PM Cares for Children scheme so that the Union government can release financial support for them. The bench also asked the Additional Solicitor General (ASG) Aishwarya Bhati to file a status report giving details of the financial support provided in response to applications received under PM Cares for Children scheme so far. ASG Bhati submitted that 4,848 applications have been received so far and out of that, a total of 1,719 have been approved by the DMs. The ASG further submitted in the court that accounts had been opened for those aged above 18 years, and joint accounts are being opened with DMs for minors.

Stay on CB's Cuttack fake drug case

Cuttack, Nov 15: The Orissa High Court Monday ordered a stay on the proceedings of the sensational spurious anti-Covid drug trade case related to Medilloyd Medicant Private Limited by the Special Judge Court here till further instructions.

Justice Sashikanta Mishra ordered the stay while hearing a plea filed by Medilloyd Medicant Private Limited's managing director Siba Prasanna Jena August 5. The court has scheduled the next hearing for December 13.
In his petition, Jena had in-

formed the HC that the drugs control squad has registered a case related the fake drugs with the SDJM Court here, while another case related the issue has been filed by the Crime Branch (CB) with the Special Judge Court here. "Under provisions of law, trial of an offence cannot be done by separate courts simultaneously," Jena had said, urging the HC to quash the case registered by the CB with the Special Judge Court here.

The drugs control squad had recovered fake medicines, including Favipiravir, worth ₹69 lakh following a raid at Jena's Mediloyd Medicant Private Limited at Kanika Square here June 11 this year. It was alleged that Jena's firm used to procure medicines at much cheaper price from Max Relief Healthcare in Mumbai and sell those at exorbitant prices.

Brown sugar worth ₹25L seized; 1 held

Pupils' mental health paramount post Covid: Study

Bhubaneswar, Nov 15: The prolonged school closure and movement restriction have caused fear, anxiety, stress and social bearings among children. Therefore, with schools reopened for Class VI and VII from November 15 in state. addressing the mental wellbeing of these children will play a crucial role in helping them overcome psychological distress and adjust smoothly in a post-Covid classroom.

This was reported Monday by an online study collaboratively conducted by City based Atmashakti Trust and Odisha Shramajeebee Mancha. The study was conducted on 2,219 school going children of Class 1 to 8 from

84 blocks of 16 rural districts. The report says, "Almost half of children (49.8 per cent) reportedly

could not get required support from their family members in their emotional, social as well as learning needs during the pan-

Most importantly, out of the 2,219 children, 91.5 per cent were from government-run schools, 84.7 per cent were from schools under School and Mass Education (S&ME) department and 6.8 per cent were from schools managed by ST & SC Development, Minorities & Backward Classes Welfare department.

Lack of access to online education also played a major role in children's elevated mental stress. Over 94 per cent children interviewed for the study reported that they did not have access to a smartphone, making their learning difficult and stressful. Online education was attended merely by 10.2 per cent of the sampled children.

Similipal Park closed for tourists

Baripada: Similipal National Park in Mayurbhanj will remain closed for visitors until further orders due to unseasonal rain and dense fog in the region following a low pressure system formed over south Andaman Sea, the park authorities informed Monday. According to the park's deputy director Sai Kiran DN, the restriction has been imposed with immediate effect from November 15. The proactive step was taken as a measure to prevent any untoward incident. Usually, a large number of tourists from the state and outside visit the national park during winter, Sai Kiran clarified. "Most trails in the park have become slushy and a thick blanket of fog engulfs the national park. It could become dangerous for the visitors. Hence, we decided to keep the visitors away from the biosphere reserve," the deputy director said. The park authorities have not specified any date regarding reopening.

₹1.07cr Covid aid not distributed

Balasore: As many as 7,176 construction workers in Balasore district are vet to receive the Covid assistance money allegedly due to the lackadaisical attitude of the block authorities. Hence. assistance money amounting to ₹1.07 crore is lying undistributed. In 2020, each district was provided ₹9,51,45,000 to be distributed among construction workers as Covid assistance money. The BDOs were entrusted with the job of distributing ₹1,500 to each of the 63,430 construction workers who had renewed their registration. It is said that while some of these left out workers have migrated to other states. some others are vet to be traced and many have their names in the list of neighbouring blocks. These factors are being ascribed for the sanction money not being distributed. When contacted, assistant district Labour Officer Saniav Keshari Pradhan said the money is lving undistributed because. except for Bhogarai and Soro. authorities in the remaining 10 blocks have not submitted their reports yet.

JCB driver crushed to death

Nayagarh: In a freak mishap, a JCB driver lost his life Monday after he was crushed to death under a huge stone while working at a quarry in Puania area under Sarankul police limits in Nayagarh district. The deceased has been identified as Sushant Das of Odsinga village under Narsinghpur police limits in Cuttack district. According to sources, the incident occurred while stone mining was being undertaken at a quarry in Puania. Sushant was trying to knock down a big stone that rolled down and fell directly on the JCB, crushing him to death at the spot. However, Sushant's family and locals suspected foul play and are questioning whether the death was caused by a rolling stone or following a blast in the quarry. Furthermore, his family that alleged of illegal stone mining is going on without any check at the quarry. Meanwhile, police have seized the body and sent it for post-mortem. An investigation has been launched to find the reason

Man held for rape on pretext of marriage

Berhampur, Nov 15: A man was arrested in Ganjam district Monday for allegedly raping a 21-year-old woman on the pretext of marrying her and forcibly terminating her pregnancy.

The 22-year-old accused was arrested after the woman filed a complaint with the police Monday, Aska police station inspector PK Sahoo said. The woman in her complaint alleged that the man had raped her several times since 2019 after promising to marry her.

The last time he had allegedly sexually exploited her inside a shrub on the bank of a river was February 30 this year, the woman said.

When she became pregnant, the



person terminated her pregnancy by administering some medicines and threatened to kill her if she reported the matter to the police, the woman said in the complaint.

The woman had come in contact with the man in 2018 and he used to frequently visit her residence as a neighbour, police said.

"We have registered a case based on the complaint and started an investigation," Sahoo said. A medical examination of the accused and the victim has been conducted, he said.

Work & Home

oss' is not a bad word. Sometimes one even endearingly calls one's superior 'boss.' But 'bossism' in the professional world more often than not becomes a dirty word. It implies an exercise of power by an individual authorised to supervise the work of subordinates to the point of bullying. A good boss is supposed to know the art of persuasion and how to get the best out of the staff without imposing authority too obtrusively. The bad boss is, of course, a bully who uses the tool of intimidation, injecting fear into the minds of his subordinates to force them to do a work the way he wants them to do. In that case work becomes a form of torture that often forces the worker to quit at the first opportunity. Bossism has acquired an even sinister connotation in the pandemic-ridden world where 'work from home' (WFH) has become the new normal with the internet playing a key role. Things have become so intolerable that Portugal has introduced, for the first time in the world, a legislation to rein in the boss who tries to regulate the private life of his subordinates by intruding into his or her home through the internet or mobile phones making them virtually bonded labourers.

When the pandemic hit the world nearly two years ago, employees all over the world welcomed work from home as a great relief since they do not have to be physically present in their offices nor commute between home and office, thereby endangering themselves while wasting a lot of time and money on the way, but could, instead, work in the comfort of their homes. They could enjoy the closeness of their family members even while working and have lunch and tea as the working hours became flexible. The employers also saw benefits in the new system as the establishment costs for operating offices teeming with employees got reduced in virtually empty office premises. The need for large real estate physical office space also became redundant.

But, soon the uncomfortable side of the new system began to manifest itself. Work from home is now being seen as a major health issue and source of mental stress. There have been complaints galore from employees that they are too much tied up with their work as their bosses can call them any time of the day, pester them with queries about the progress of their work and bully them for any delay on the plea that they have the luxury of not going to office and as such they need to cooperate with the management being at the beck and call of the boss any time of the day. In other words, what was thought to be a blessing in disguise has eventually turned out contrary, something worse than the pre-pandemic order when one could be answerable to the boss only during specified working hours. Now, for all practical purposes, there is no fixed work schedule.

Portugal is a small country, but it is showing to the world how best to tackle COVID-19 with record coverage of vaccination and also now handling the distress of employees who have been implementing the work from home pandemic time policy. Its parliament approved November 12 new labour laws on working from home providing additional protection for employees who do their job away from company premises. The new rules, as Portugal's socialist government explains, are a response to the trend of more staff working from home during the COVID-19 pandemic. It has conceded there are benefits in working from home, but wanted to adapt labour legislation to it. The regulations bring new penalties for companies that disturb the privacy of staff or their families and compel employers to compensate staff for work-related expenses incurred at home. Under the new legal regime, companies should avoid contacting workers outside office hours, except under exceptional circumstances. Moreover, at least every two months, staff should meet with their superiors to prevent worker isolation. Also, companies should pay workers for additional personal expenses incurred at home, such as electricity or internet bills.

There were some other proposals disproportionately in favour of the workers but those were shot down. For example, a measure was mooted that would have granted workers the right to turn off professional communication systems when off work. Companies not complying with the rules will be liable for fines. Justifying the new legislation, Ana Mendes Godinho, Portugal's Minister of Labour and Social Security, said the pandemic has accelerated the need to regulate "what needs to be regulated." The exercise may have been prompted by an electoral consideration as the legislation has been made by the parliament before it is dissolved ahead of a snap election in January. Workers' rights are likely to be one of the major issues in the battle of ballots. But, it addresses a prickly issue that is fast snowballing into a major socio-economic-family crisis

There is no gainsaying that work-life balance has gone for a toss due to the pandemic as employees have been working non-stop all over the world. Since operations have turned remote, people are confined to their homes all day to complete their work. To add to their misery, many are required to work extra hours. This has caused a lot of inconvenience and distress leading to mental and physical health issues at an alarming rate. As nations think of ways to decrease the extreme work pressure, the step taken by Portugal is a welcome development. It is a laudable attempt to ensure employees do not feel the workload to be too heavy by making it illegal for managers and bosses to contact their employees after working hours. India and other countries should take a cue from it and address the problem before it takes too heavy a toll on the lives of workers and their families.

■ Poppysmic

RICH WORLD'S HYPOCRISY

any people around the world already consider the United Nations Change Conference (COP26) in Glasgow a disappointment. That is a massive understatement. Global leaders especially in the developed world -still fail to grasp the gravity of the climate challenge. Although they acknowledge its severity and urgency in their speeches, they mostly pursue short-term national interests and make conveniently distant 'net-zero' emissions pledges without clear and immediate com-

Making matters worse, many rich-country leaders' statements in Glasgow are at odds with their actual climate strategies, and with what they say in other settings. So, while G7 leaders at the summit were issuing underwhelming green commitments for several decades in the future, they were busy allowing and enabling more fossilfuel investment that will generate additional production and greenhouse-gas emissions over the medium term.

For example, could the real US government please stand up and declare itself? In his recent address in Glasgow, President Joe Biden said that "as we see current volatility in energy prices, rather than cast it as a reason to back off our clean energy goals, we must view it as a call to action. Indeed, "high energy prices only reinforce the urgent need to diversify sources, double down on clean energy deployment, and adapt promising new clean-energy technologies.

But just three days later, the Biden administration claimed that OPEC+ is endangering the global economic recovery by not increasing oil production. It even warned that the United States is prepared to use "all tools" necessary to reduce fuel prices.

This is one of the most blatant recent examples of climate hypocrisy by a developed-country leader, but it is by no means the only one. And the duplicity extends to the proceedings at COP26 itself, where developing-country negotiators are apparently finding that

advanced economies' positions in closed-door meetings are quite different from their public stances.

Rich countries, which are responsible for the dominant share of global carbon-dioxide emissions to date, are dithering on longstanding commitments to provide climate finance to developing countries. They are also resisting a proposed operational definition that would prevent them from fudging what counts as climate finance. And they are still treating adaptation to climate change as a separate stream, and refusing to provide finance to avert, minimise, and address the loss and damage associated with climate change in the worst-affected countries.

The declared COP26 promises also reveal the developed world's double standards. A group of 20 countries, including the US, pledged to end public financing for 'unabated' fossil-fuel projects, including those powered by coal, by the end of 2022. But the prohibition applies only to international projects, not domestic ones Significantly, the US and several other signatories refused to join the 23 countries that separately committed to stop new coal-power projects within their borders and phase

out existing coal infrastructure. But even if the pledges in Glasgow had been more solid, richcountry governments, in particular, face a major credibility problem. They have previously made too many empty climate promises, undermining the interests of developing countries that have contributed little to climate change. Advanced economies have made emissions-reduction commitments that they have not kept, and reneged on their assurances to de-

veloping countries regarding not

only climate finance but also tech-

nology transfer.

ment is now 12 years old. At COP15 in Copenhagen, advanced economies promised to provide \$100 billion per year to the developing world, and the 2015 Paris climate agreement made it clear that all developing countries would be eligible for such financing. This amount is trivial relative to developing countries' need, which is in the trillions of dollars, and also when compared to the vast sums that rich countries have spent on fiscal and monetary support for their economies during the COVID-19 pandemic.

But the developed world has not fulfilled even this relatively modest pledge. In 2019, total climate finance channeled to developing countries was less than \$80 billion: the average amount each year since 2013 was only \$67 billion. And this

figure massively overstated the ac tual flows from developed-country governments, because bilateral public climate finance (which should have been provided to the developing world under the Paris accord) averaged less than \$27 billion per year. The remainder came from multilateral institutions - including development banks - and private finance, which rich-country governments sought to take credit for mobilising. Compared to this paltry sum, global fossilfuel subsidies amounted to an estimated \$555 billion per year from 2017 to 2019. Likewise, the rich world's promises of green technology transfer have become mere lip service. Developed-country governments allowed domestic companies to cling to intellectual property rights that block the spread of critical knowledge for climate mitigation and adaptation When countries like China and India have sought to encourage their own renewable-energy industries, the US, in particular, has

filed complaints with the WTO. This short-sighted strategy ultimately benefits no one, including the firms whose immediate financial interests it serves, because it accelerates the planet's destruction and the revenge of na ture on what now appears to be terminally stupid humanity. The student and activist marches in Glasgow against this myopic ap proach are important, but are nowhere near enough to force gov-

ernments to change course. The problem is that powerful corporate interests are clearly intertwined with political leadership. People around the world, and especially in the Global North must become much more vociferous in insisting on meaningful climate action and a real change in economic strategy that resonates beyond national borders Only that can end the rich world's green hypocrisy and save us all.

∠ V ⊥ low point as a result of communal violence. Riots begin small but explode in no time to take on proportions that can be unimaginable. A citizenry that is otherwise mindful of law-and-order boundaries suddenly crosses all limits and it is not uncommon to see mobs attacking police, burning vehicles and taking to streets on the slightest rumour. That has been the history of many riots. The administrative lesson is simple: do not play with this kind of fire.

It is a sad picture of India of the 21st century that communal fires have erupted in states as far apart as Tripura and Maharashtra, one triggering the other and fed mostly on some half-truths and a lot of hatred that has been suffused into the political system. Tripura's response has been shocking. By booking over 100 journalists and lawyers under the stringent provisions of the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, the BJPruled state is covering its failure to control majoritarian violence with action to control reporting of the violence, as the Editors' Guild of India has correctly pointed out.

In Maharashtra, the situation is different. The communal disturbances in Amravati and some other

any governments in free districts began with protests against -- a good response in these times. insights into what friends-turned-India have reached their reported incidents in Tripura. The violence that followed poses a new challenge to the state government, which has been running an experiment in a unique confluence of non-BJP forces glued together to contain an increasingly successful and arrogant BJP. Reports over the weekend indicated continued tension, protests and stray violence, which is not good news at all in a volatile atmosphere made worse by sectarian forces to foment trouble and present the picture, as the BJP has been trying to, of a coalition that is unable to govern.

Yet, it is the government of the day, led in this case by Uddhav Thackeray, that is in charge. He is responsible for outcomes, irrespective of the political forces ranged against him. It is the duty and responsibility of the government to not take this rioting lightly and to put down disturbances with a single-minded devotion before the fire spreads. Any delay in responding with all the resources at its command will be suicidal as violence can spiral out of control, particularly with the Opposition working overtime to discredit the government. Already, a four-day curfew has been imposed and internet services have been restricted

The state government will do well further to take some lessons from the late former Maharashtra CM AR Antulay, much discredited for alleged scams but a well-informed barrister who knew how to keep his administration in check. He was once at a meeting with the Chief Secretary when news came in of some violence in Bhiwandi. He asked the Chief Secretary to go straight from the meeting to the spot, vesting in him all powers of the CM, and ordering him not to come back till the violence was stopped and the situation normalised. That violence was not heard of beyond that day.

Maharashtra is right now going through some challenging times. A former state home minister is behind bars. A former police commissioner of Mumbai is absconding. All this amid the fact that the alliance that has taken power in the state has put up a stiff political challenge to the BJP. With the threedecade long Shiv Sena-BJP partnership broken, the Shiv Sena has come up as one of the fiercest critics of the BJP. This is a political development of some significance. Two parties which have risen on Hindutva politics are now at loggerheads, presenting interesting

The Maharashtra communal differences have to be seen in the light of this tension. The communal divide has sought to be pushed in the state again and again since the BJP lost out on sitting in government in the financial capital of India. Consider the communal commentary from some sections when two sadhus and their driver were killed in a place called Palghar, when what had happened was a case of mob reaction to saffron-clad travellers who were rumoured to be child lifters. Over 270 were arrested in the case and seven chargesheets were filled eventually. Or consider the divide sought to be created in one of the most harmonious of workplaces the film industry. A communal divide has no place here but there have been attempts to create one. The case of Aryan Khan plays into a game to demonise the industry.

The result on the ground is a tinderbox. More fuel is being added to it, and we know not when it may explode, taking with it dreams of a strong, vibrant, plural India that grows to become a developed nation and makes its mark on global stage.

Hooch kills

Sir, Illicit liquor related deaths are quite common in India. A few are highlighted and the rest go unreported. Last week, nearly 20 people lost their lives in Bihar's Mujaffarpur, Gopalganj and West Champaran districts after consuming spurious liquor. No state is spared of hooch deaths. What is special about the twin hooch tragedies in Bihar is that there is prohibition in the state. According to an estimate, hooch has claimed more than 60 lives in the 'dry' state in 2021. In liquor-related deaths, bootleggers are routinely rounded up, and materials used in preparing hooch seized and destroyed. But before a liquor-related tragedy strikes, authorities are mere onlookers despite being fully aware of the illegal preparation and sale. Those from the lower socioeconomic sections are easy targets for illicit liquor vendors. The spurious hooch dealers lure and con the poor by offering employment opportunities, among others. Dangerous spirits mixed with methanol give rise to morbidity and mortality of a severe nature. Nationalisation of liquor sale to eliminate unlawful operators through a national liquor policy and taking stringent measures to control the easy availability of rectified spirits are some steps that can arrest hooch deaths. There is also an urgent need to scrupulously regulate the manufacture, transport and sale of illicit liquor. Smuggling of rectified spirits across the borders should become a thing of the past because districts that have banned alcohol in all forms may otherwise be hit. The importance of breaking the bootlegger-politician-police-criminal mafia nexus in keeping hooch at bay cannot be stressed more. Ganapathi Bhat, AKOLA



SC orders 'work from home' dead in Arunachal

New Delhi, Nov 15: India's Supreme Court told authorities Monday to shut offices in the capital and nearby cities, allowing millions to work from home as officials seek ways to reduce hazardous air pollution that led to the closure of schools.

Its action came after city authorities in New Delhi, which has been battling a toxic haze since early November, took emergency measures Saturday, ordering the closure of schools and building work for four days

"We direct the centre and states of the national capital region to impose work from home for the meantime," said Chief Justice NV Ramana, head of a panel of three judges considering a petition by a city resident. The court also sought urgent steps to rein in crop waste fires in the neighbouring states of Haryana, Punjab and Uttar Pradesh, set by hundreds of thousands of farmers looking to clear fields for a new sowing season.

"We want action on the issue," said Justice Surva Kant. Although the court did not set a deadline for the action by authorities, it will next take up the pollution issue Wednesday. The Supreme Court also ordered measures to halt vehicle traffic that is not essential, cut industrial pollution and limit dust. Contributors to

Three militants shot

Itanagar, Nov 15: Two days after five Assam Rifles personnel, including a colonel-rank officer, were killed in an ambush in Manipur, soldiers of the paramilitary force along with the local police Monday shot dead three militants of the NSCN(K)'s Yung Aung faction in Arunachal Pradesh's Longding district, senior officials said.

Two locals, who were abducted by the militants, were rescued during the operation, the deputy commissioner of Longding, Bani Lego, told PTI. A group of five to six armed rebels of the banned outfit had on November 14 kidnapped Ranwang Lowang, the chief of Lahu village in Tirap district, along with former anchal samiti member Sunwang Hakun, and sought to extort Rs 7 lakh from locals.

Lego said that the rebels were taking the abductees to Myanmar, bordering the Longding district, when the operation was launched by security forces in Khogla village and the duo rescued. According to Superintendent of Police V H Meena, the Assam Rifles (AR) and the Longding police, on learning about the abductions, launched a joint raid in various places, including Khogla village in Wakka circle of the district, around 8 am, and intercepted members of the insurgent group, asking them to surrender.

2 militants, 1 civilian killed in J&K encounter

Dehradun/New Delhi, Nov 15: Congress leader Salman Khurshid's house in Uttarakhand's Nainital was vandalised Monday amid the row over his recent book in which he draws a comparison between Hindutva and terror outfits like the ISIS.

According to initial reports, some people damaged windowpanes and set fire to a door at the house in Bowali police station area. Nainital (City) Superintendent of Police Jagdish Chandra said. Nobody was hurt in the house where only caretakers stay, the SP said.

Khurshid posted video clips on social media in which some people appear to be burning his effigy and shouting derogatory slogans against him and the Muslim community.

One slogan said "the traitors" should be shot. Another said the country did not belong to the "mulmob was also heard shouting, "Jai Jai Veer Bajrangi Jai, Jai Shri Ram." The attack came days after the

former Union minister launched his new book, "Sunrise over Ajodhya: Nationalism in Our Times", drawing much criticism from the BJP and right-wing organisations. "I hoped to open these doors to my friends who have left this calling card. Am I still wrong to say this cannot be Hinduism." he asked on Facebook while posting pictures of arson at his Nainital home. "So such is debate now. Shame is too ineffective a word. Besides I still hope that we can reason together one day and agree to disagree if not more," he said in another post. Congress leader Shashi Tharoor called the attack "disgraceful".

Apart from the BJP, Khurshid faced criticism from his own party leader and former Leader of Opposition in Rajya Sabha Ghulam Nabi Azad for comparing Hindutva with terror groups.

New Delhi, Nov 15: The number of Indians studying in the United States decreased by nearly 13 per cent in 2020-21 as compared to the previous academic year, according to an annual report re-



leased by the Institute of International Education Monday, with US officials attributing the drop in numbers to the impact of the coronavirus pandemic.

Senior officials of the US Embassy in New Delhi Monday shared some of the details from the report at a press conference held at the Fulbright House here, and also told reporters that "over 62,000 student visas were issued this summer alone, more than in any previous year".

The figures on student visas indicate that the "downturn" in number of Indians studying in the US, was a "Covid blip", and that the "overall trendline has been generally positive", said Anthony Miranda, Counselor for Cultural and Educational Affairs at the US Embassy.

He spoke about the global impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on education and student mobility, and that the US too suffered its impact with a drop in the number of international students studying in the US. The number of Indians studying in the US decreased by about 13 per cent in 2020-21 vis-a-vis the previous academic year, while in reference to the same period, the overall decrease in number of international students in the US was about 15 per cent, Miranda said, citing the report.

He asserted that nothwithstanding the impact of the pandemic, "the US remains a top destination for international students, welcoming over 914,000 international students from over 200 places of origin," citing the report.

Indian students comprised nearly 20 per cent of this number, with 1.67.582 students in the 2020-2021 academic year, according to the 2021 Open Doors Report, the US Embassy

said in a statement. The annual report is published by the Institute of International Education (IIE), in partnership with the US Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs. It is the comprehensive information resource on international students and scholars in the US, and American students abroad.

Minister Counsellor for Consular Affairs at the embassy Donald Heflin said, the pandemic and the ensuing lockdown posed major challenges, and raised safety concerns in the minds of parents whose children were to fly to the US for higher education, but efforts were made on both sides (US and India) to ensure a safe and comfortable transition for students.

"Despite the global pandemic, Indian students were able to apply for visas and travel to the United States. We issued over 62,000 student visas this summer alone, more than in any previous year. This goes to show that the US remains the destination of choice for Indian students looking to study abroad. We look forward to issuing many more visas in the year to come," he said.

Heflin also told reporters that more slots for issuing of visas to students, planning to head to the US for Spring semester, have been kept in December. The US Embassy in its statement said that "the United States remained open and welcoming to international students throughout the global COVID-19 pandemic".

Chennai, Nov 15: The Supreme Court Collegium's proposal transferring Madras High Court Chief Justice Sanjib Banerjee to Meghalaya has snowballed into a controversy with voices for and against the shifting of the senior judge.

The Collegium had earlier recommended for the transfer of Chief Justice Sanjib Banerjee to the Meghalaya High Court.

The Collegium, headed by Chief Justice of India NV Ramana, in its meeting held September 16, had also recommended for the transfer of Justice Munishwar Nath Bhandari of the Allahabad High Court to the Madras High Court.

Two major lawyers' bodies here-- the Madras High Court Advocates Association (MHAA), the largest one with a membership of over 20.000 advocates and the Madras Bar Association, an elite group of advocates - have joined the chorus and

passed resolutions protesting against the proposal to shift the CJ. Over 30 senior advocates of the High Court have also joined those protesting against the transfer.

This follows over 200 advocates writing to the CJI and the Collegium last week, protesting against Chief Justice Sanjib Banerjee's transfer to Meghalaya High Court and seeking to reconsider the proposal.

While so, there were voices in support of the transfer as well. Advocate RC Paul Kanakaraj, for- mer president of the MHAA and the chief of BJP Legal Wing, alleged the issue was being politicised.

He questioned the logic behind protesting against the transfer without ascertaining the reasons behind the same. There might be some strong reasons for the shifting, he claimed. The resolutions cannot be taken as the ones passed with the majority of the advocates, when there were several thousand The transfers might



be with good intentions, which would ultimately pave way for seniority and their elevation to the Supreme Court, he added.

Raising his voice against the resolution against the transfer at the extraordinary emergency meeting of the MBA at its premises on Sunday advocate G Karthikevan. who is also the Assistant Solicitor

General of the Madras High Court, questioned the logic behind protesting against the CJ alone. Many judges including Chief Justices were shifted to other High Courts in the recent past. Why was the resolution singled out in respect of CJ Banerjee alone, he asked.

Another senior most judge TS Sivagnanam was transferred to

the High Court in Kolkata recently. The resolution passed by the MBA included his case too.

president MHAAMohanakrishnan said the association was distressed to note that the present Chief Justice was recommended for transfer from Chennai to Meghalaya. He had assumed office only in January 2021 and was a senior Judge. He has been effectively conducting the judicial administration in Tamil Nadu, he said and fervently requested the CJI and the Supreme Court Collegium judges to consider the views of the legal fraternity and take a good decision in the interest of all the stake-holders.

In its resolution, the MBA stated that a Chief Justice of a large chartered High Court like the one in Chennai, must be given at least two years term to study the situation prevailing in the institution and to take measures to improve the same.

Kashmir reels under sub-zero temperatures

Srinagar, Nov 15: Kashmir continued to reel under sub-zero night temperatures as the mercury settled on the freezing point in Srinagar late Sunday, officials said.

Several areas in Kashmir were engulfed by a layer of fog Monday morning as the mercury went below the freezing point, they added.

Srinagar recorded a low of zero degree Celsius -- up from minus 0.9 degrees Celsius the previous night. The officials said Pahalgam, which serves as the base camp for the annual Amarnath Yatra, recorded a low of minus 4 degrees Celsius, the coldest in Kashmir.

Gulmarg in north Kashmir's Baramulla district recorded a minimum temperature of minus 1.6 degrees Celsius. The mercury at Kupwara in north Kashmir too settled at a low of minus 1.6 degrees Celsius. Qazigund, the gateway town to the valley, recorded a minimum temperature of minus 1.2 degrees Celsius, while Kokernag town in the south recorded a low of 0.4 degrees Celsius.

Delhi records highest dengue $^{-}$ cases since 2015

New Delhi, Nov 15: The number of dengue cases in Delhi this season has crossed 5,270, the highest in the national capital in a year since 2015, according to a civic report released Monday.

Nearly 2,570 fresh cases of the vector-borne disease were logged in the city in the last one week. However, no fresh fatality was reported.

According to the report on vector-borne diseases, a total of 5,277 dengue cases were recorded this vear till November 13.

In the previous years, the total count of dengue cases was -- 4,431 (2016), 4.726 (2017), 2.798 (2018), 2.036 (2019) and 1,072 (2020), according to the report.

In 2015, the city had witnessed a massive outbreak of dengue, during which the number of reported

India allows foreign tourists as Covid cases decline

New Delhi. Nov 15: India Monday decided to reopen the entry of all foreign tourists following a sharp and sustained decline in Covid-19 cases.

According to the officials, now the foreign travellers will be allowed to visit India without a mandatory quarantine. The government's move came 20 months after the pandemic situation improved in the country.

India has now allowed entry to fully inoculated tourists from 99 countries including the UK, USA,

Kuwait, Colombia, Russia and Germany, who have already recognized the Indian vaccination certificates or WHO-recognised vaccinated Indian travelers in their countries.

The government only requires that such tourists monitor their health for 14 days after their arrival in India.

In case of a foreigner who has taken only one shot, will have to go for RT-PCR test at the airports or any entry points in India and will have to go for seven days self home quarantine stay in case of a posi-



tive report and on the 8th day, the RT-PCR test will be done again and then they can walk free in the country. In case a person is found positive in the second RT-PCR test, he will have to stay in home quar-

antine for another eight days.



Quake jolts Iran

Tehran: A massive earthquake measuring 6.4 on the Richter scale followed by an almost as intense aftershock and more than 17 other tremors, jolted Iran, killing at least one person and injuring 47 others, according to official media. The 6.4 quake originated near the small inland town of Fin at 3.37 p.m. on Sunday, Xinhua news agency quoted the Iranian Seismological Centre (ISC) as saying in a monitoring report. Less than two minutes later, there was a 6.3 magnitude aftershock, very close to the same location in the southern province of Hormozgan.

Bill Richardson said Monday. Richardson said in a statement that Fenster had been handed over to him in Myanmar and would return to the U.S. via Qatar over the next day and a half. "This is the day that you hope will come when you do this work," Richardson said in a statement emailed from his office. "We are so grateful that Danny will finally be able to reconnect with his loved ones, who have been advocating for him all this time, against immense odds."

Japan, US launch talks

Tokyo: US and Japanese officials agreed Monday to launch talks aimed at settling a dispute over American tariffs on imports of Japanese steel and aluminum. Beijing, Nov 15: China has confined nearly 1,500 university students to their dormitories and hotels following an outbreak of COVID-19 in the northeastern city of Dalian. The order was issued Sunday

after several dozen cases were reported at Zhuanghe University City and hundreds of students were transferred to hotels for observation. Students were attending class remotely and having their meals delivered to their rooms. The lockdown is the latest ex-

It is now almost certain that Xi, 68, will be handed down an unprecedented third five-year term at the Communist Party of China (CPC) once-in-a-five-year-Congress next year as the key Plenum of the party last week reinforced his power by hailing him as its "helmsman", an honorific title reserved for party founder Mao Zedong.

With the party's leadership mandate behind him, Xi will hold the video summit with Biden to highlight China's redlines on Taiwan, Hong Kong, Xinjiang, Tibet besides the continuing trade war launched by former US President Donald Trump.

While the official media here said Xi will ask Biden not to press ahead with the "Taiwan card" as Beijing kept up the pressure on the estranged self-governing island to integrate with the mainland which has now become the main political plank of the Chinese President.

The Chinese military in the last few weeks flew over 200 planes into Taiwan Air Defence Identification Zone (ADIZ), which were virtually unchallenged, raising concerns that it is only a matter of time China may launch an offensive to capture the island which Beijing



Ahead of the summit, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Zhao Lijian told a media briefing on Monday that China would ask the US to bring the relations on to the right track of stable development.

Xi-Biden will exchange views on strategic issues regarding the future of China-US relations and major issues of common concern. Zhao said. In Washington, White House Press Secretary Jen Psaki said the two leaders will discuss ways to responsibly manage the competition between the United States and China, as well as ways to work together where their interests align.

Throughout, President Biden will make clear US intentions and priorities and be clear and candid about our concerns with China. she said on Friday, apparently referring to Washington's concerns on human rights, trade, technology issues as well as the Chinese military's aggressive behaviour in the Indo-Pacific region.

Considering the Biden administration has not taken any concrete action to correct its wrong words and actions on the Taiwan question, China will continue exerting pressure on the US government, Wu Xinbo, dean of the Institute of International Studies at Fudan University, told state-run Global Times.

"It's hard to say whether China

and the US will reach any consensus on this question, but the US has to make some concrete promises in accordance with the one-China principle and in response to China's concerns, otherwise it would affect the outcome of the meeting between the top leaders as well as the future China-US relationship," Wu said.

UK taxi blast declared a terror incident

London, Nov 15: An explosion outside Liverpool Women's Hospital on Remembrance Sunday has been declared a terror incident by British police Monday. The motive behind the attack,

which ended in one fatality, re-

mains unclear as Britain's Counter Terrorism Police lead an investigation into the case involving a taxi explosion, alongside MI5 intelligence agency. A fourth suspect has been arrested as part of the ongoing investigation as the Head of Counter

Terrorism Policing North West, Russ Jackson, said the taxi passenger appeared to have made an "improvised explosive device" which caused the blast.

'The fare — a man — had asked to be taken to Liverpool Women's Hospital, which was about 10 minutes away," Jackson told reporters."As the taxi approached the drop-off point at the hospital an explosion occurred from within the car. This quickly engulfed it in



flames. Remarkably the taxi driver escaped from the cab," he said.

Earlier, three male suspects aged between 21 and 29 were arrested under the Terrorism Act following the car explosion outside the women's hospital. A male passenger of the car was declared dead at the scene outside the hospital and is yet to be formally identified. The local Merseyside Police said the driver of the taxi was taken to hospital where he was treated for his injuries, which are not seen as life threatening, and has since been discharged.

"Detectives from Counter Terrorism Police North West continue to keep an open mind about the cause of the explosion and are

working closely with colleagues at Merseyside Police as the investigation continues at pace," the force said in a statement.

"So far we understand that the car involved was a taxi which pulled up at the hospital shortly before the explosion occurred," the police statement said. The incident took place around the time the UK fell silent for two minutes to mark Remembrance Sunday - marked annually on the second Sunday of November, to commemorate the contribution of British and Commonwealth military and civilian servicemen and women in the two World Wars and later conflicts.

British Prime Minister Boris Johnson and Home Secretary Priti Patel issued statements on Twitter in the wake of the explosion. "My thoughts are with all those affected by the awful incident in Liverpool today. I want to thank the emergency services for their quick response and professionalism, and the police for their ongoing work on the investigation," Johnson said.

India reconstructs 50.000 houses in Nepal

Austrian unvaccinated lockdown starts amid Covid resurgence

Berlin, Nov 15: Austria took what its leader called the "dramatic" step Monday of implementing a nationwide lockdown for unvaccinated people who haven't recently had COVID-19, perhaps the most drastic of a string of measures being taken by European governments to get a massive regional resurgence of the coronavirus under control.

The move, which took effect at midnight, prohibits people 12 years old and older who haven't been vaccinated or recently recovered from leaving their homes except for basic activities such as working, grocery shopping, going for a walkor getting vaccinated.

The lockdown is initially being imposed until November 24 in the Alpine country of 8.9 million. It doesn't apply to children under 12 because they cannot yet officially get vaccinated — though the capital, Vienna, on Monday opened up vaccinations for under-12s as part of a pilot, and reported high demand

Officials have said that police patrols will be stepped up and unvaccinated people can be fined up to 1,450 euros (\$1,660) if they violate the lockdown."We really didn't take this step lightly and I don't think it should be talked down." Chancellor Alexander Schallenberg told Oe1 radio. "This is a dramatic step—about 2 million people in this country are affected...What we are trying is precisely to reduce contact between the unvaccinated and vaccinated to a minimum, and also contact between the unvaccinated.'

"My aim is very clearly to get the unvaccinated to get themselves vaccinated and not to lock down the vaccinated," Schallenberg added. 'In the long term, the way out of this vicious circle we are in — and it is a vicious circle, we are stumbling from wave to lockdown, and that can't carry on ad infinitum is only vaccination.

About 65% of the population is fully vaccinated, a rate that Schallenberg has described as "shamefully low". Authorities are



concerned about rising infections and increasing pressure on hospitals. Austria on Sunday recorded

849.2 new cases per 100,000 residents over the previous seven days. Its situation is far worse than that of neighbouring Germany, where case rates on Monday hit the latest in a string of records, with 303 new cases per 100,000 residents over seven days.

Berlin Monday became the latest of several German states to limit access to restaurants, cinemas, museums and concerts to people who have been vaccinated or recently recovered - shutting out unvaccinated people who have tested negative. Under-18s are exempted.

On Thursday, the German parliament is due to vote on a new legal framework for coronavirus restrictions drawn up by the parties that are expected to form the country's next government.



Wholesale inflation crosses 12% in Oct

New Delhi, Nov 15: The wholesale price-based inflation spiked to 5month high of 12.54 per cent in October, mainly due to rise in prices of manufactured products and crude petroleum.

WPI inflation has remained in double digit for the seventh consecutive month beginning April. Inflation in September this year was at 10.66 per cent, while in October 2020 it was at 1.31 per cent. The October WPI is the highest in five months since May, when it was at 13.11 per cent.

"The high rate of inflation in October 2021 is primarily due to rise in prices of mineral oils, basic metals, food products, crude petroleum & natural gas, chemicals and chemical products etc as compared to the corresponding month of the previous year," the Commerce and Industry Ministry said in a statement.

Inflation in manufactured items was higher at 12.04 per cent in October, as against 11.41 per cent in the previous month. In the fuel and power basket, the rate of price rise was 37.18 per cent in October, as against 24.81 per cent in Inflation in food articles too

witnessed some uptick on a monthon-month basis at (-) 1.69 per cent in October, against (-) 4.69 per cent in September. Vegetable prices were lower at (-) 18.49 per cent, while in onions it was (-) 25.01 per cent.

Nayar said the core index recorded a month-on-month jump of 1 per cent with a widespread uptick across the sub-groups reflecting the pervasive commodity price "With demand reviving, we ex-

pect producers to start passing through higher input and freight costs, even as the tax cuts on fuels will offer them a breather. Led by the base effect, we expect WPI inflation to moderate in the months ahead, and print at 7.5-8.5 per cent in March 2021," Nayar added.

India Ratings and Research Principal Economist Sunil K Sinha said core and manufacturing inflation surged to a fresh high of 11.8 per cent and 12 per cent respectively in October 2021. This was the fourth successive month in which they have remained in excess of 11 per cent.

"As supply disruption has yet to normalize in many areas and manufacturers are becoming more confident about the demand recovery they are increasingly passing on the higher input costs to their output prices. Since fuel is a major input into trans-_ portation cost, higher fuel prices push up the distribution cost further." he said.

In race for EVs, Toyota chases hydrogen dream

Tokyo, Nov 15: As UN climate conference delegates considered how to save the planet over the weekend in Glasgow, Toyota Motor's chief executive was in Japan racing an experimental hydrogen car - a vehicle he says could preserve millions of auto jobs.

The colourful Toyota Corolla Sport that Akio Toyoda steered around the Okayama International Circuit in western Japan was powered by a converted GR Yaris engine running on hydrogen. Making such a powerplant commercially viable could keep internal combustion engines running in a carbon-free world.

Toyota's latest push into hydrogen tech comes as the world's biggest carmaker joins the rush to win a share of the growing market for battery electric vehicles (BEV) as the world tightens emission regulations to meet carbon-cutting pledges.

Not Only Electric

At the gathering in Glasgow, six major carmakers, including General Motors, Ford Motor, Sweden's Volvo and Daimler AG's Mercedes-Benz signed declaration to phase out fossil-fuel cars by 2040.

Toyota declined to join that group, arguing that much of the world is not ready for a shift to EVs. Another notable absence was Germany's Volkswagen.

'We don't want to be seen as an EV maker, but as a carbon-neutral company," Toyota Vice Chairman Shigeru Hayakawa told Reuters in an interview.

"If the adoption of carbon-free fuels happens quickly, that could bring the first battery EV boom to



an end," said Takeshi Miyao, an analyst at auto industry research company Carnorama.

Challenging Technology One problem is that the engine is not completely carbon-free and



Djokovic starts in style with convincing triumph

Serbian in quest of 6th ATP Finals title

Turin, Nov 15: World No.1 Novak Djokovic began his quest for a sixth ATP Finals title with a 7-6(7-4), 6-2 victory over Casper Rudd in his opening group clash here Monday. With this win, Djokovic has equalled legend Ivan Lendl's record of winning 39 matches at the ATP Finals.

Djokovic has won the ATP Finals title in 2008, 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2015. Besides, he was the runner-up in 2016 (lost to Andy Murray) and 2018 (lost to

Alexander Zverev). If he wins the title this time, he will equal the record of Roger Federer who has won the championship six times.

Earlier strong serving and consistent baseline play propelled US Open champion Daniil Medvedev to a 6-7(5-7), 6-3, 6-4 win over first-time qualifier Hubert Hurkacz in a match played late Sunday evening. In another match played on the day, 2018 champion Alexander Zverev won when local favourite Matteo Berrettini of Italy retired early in the second set with an apparent abdominal injury.

Zverev won the first set 7-6 (9-7) and was leading 1-0 in the second when Berrettini dropped his racket to the ground, covered his face



and bent over in apparent pain. Medvedev, the defending cham-

pion at the year-end tournament for the top eight players, served 15

aces and didn't face a single breakpoint against the seventh-seeded Hurkacz, who beat him in five sets at Wimbledon this year.

Medvedev attributed his strong serving performance to conditions he called the fastest he's ever experienced on tour.

"I don't think it's the surface itself because (the) surface probably is exactly the same as in London," the Russian said, referring to the previous tournament host. "I think it's a combination of air, which is really dry here, and I think the ball goes very fast through the air. So I was barely under pressure on my serve against a great returner,"
