Govt raises premium for PMJJBY, PMSBY

NEW DELHI: The government Tuesday raised the premium for its flagship insurance schemes -- Pradhan Mantri Jeevan Jyoti Bima Yojana (PMJJBY) and Pradhan Mantri Suraksha Bima Yojana (PMSBY) in order to make them economically viable. The premium rate of PMJJBY has been revised upward to Rs 1.25 per day, translating into an increase from Rs 330 to Rs 436 annually. The annual premium for PMSBY has been hiked from Rs 12 to Rs 20, an official statement said. The new premium rates are effective from June 1, 2022.

AT 4.1%, Q4 GROWTH LOWEST IN FY 2021-22

2021-22 is estimated at 8.7% as against a contraction of 6.6% in 2020-21 fiscal

New Delhi, May 31: India's economy grew by 4.1 per cent in January-March quarter of 2021-22 - the lowest quarterly growth in the last fiscal – as the growth was 20.1 per cent, 8.4 per cent, and 5.4 per cent, in the first, second and third quarters, official data said, Tuesday.

In the previous fiscal 2020-21, the economy had contracted by 6.6 per cent as the Covid-19 pandemic disrupted business activities.

China had registered economic growth of 4.8 per cent in the first three months of 2022.

The 4.1 per cent expansion during the January-March period of 2021-22 is the lowest quarterly growth in the last fiscal. The growth was 20.1 per cent, 8.4 per cent, and 5.4 per cent, in the first, second and third quarters, respectively, as per the data released by the

National Statistical Office (NSO). The GDP had grown by 2.5 per



cent in the January-March quarter

in the previous year. The NSO, in its second advance estimate released in February, had projected the GDP growth during 2021-22 at 8.9 per cent.

The Economic Survey tabled in Parliament in February had estimated the GDP growth for the current fiscal (2022-23) in the range of 8-8.5 per cent. According to the NSO data, India's real GDP grew to (GVA) growth during the fiscal ending March 2022 was at 8.1 per cent as against a contraction 4.8 per

cent in the preceding year. The GVA growth in the manufacturing sector accelerated to 9.9 per cent during the year as against a contraction of 0.6 per cent earlier.

GVA growth in both mining and construction was 11.5 per cent.

These two large segments of the

economy had contracted in the Covid-hit 2020-21. However, agri culture sector growth decelerated

to 3 per cent from 3.3 per cent in FY21. Electricity, gas, water supply and other utility services segment grew by 7.5 per cent during 2021-22. The segment had contracted by

3.6 per cent in the previous fiscal. GVA growth in services sector trade, hotel, transport, communication and services related to broadcasting - was 11.1 per cent during 2021-22 as against a contraction of

20.2 per cent in the previous year. Financial, real estate and professional services grew by 4.2 per cent in the year over 2.2 per cent earlier.

Public administration, defence and other services posted 12.6 per cent growth against (-)5.5 per cent in 2020-21. "The growth in GDP during 2021-22 is estimated at 8.7 percent as compared to a contraction of 6.6 percent in 2020-21," the NSO said.

Brajarajnagar bypoll sees 69% voter turnout

Bhubaneswar, May 31: The bypoll to the Brajarajnagar Assembly constituency in Jharsuguda district went off peacefully Tuesday with a voter turnout of 69 per cent till 5 pm, an official said.

"The election was conducted peacefully. The voting began at 7am and continued till 6pm. The final voters' turnout in the bypoll will be known after polling parties return from the booths," said Chief Electoral Officer (CEO), SK Lohani.

So far, no untoward incident has been reported from any booth in the constituency. However, due to some technical glitches, four EVMs have been replaced, he said.

In a village in Lakhanpur block, the voters have boycotted the election protesting closure of school in the village. Moreover, five pink booths were formed where only women polling agents were appointed, officials said.

To ensure free and fair voting, security arrangements were made in different booths for the poll while 1,228 polling officers have been ap-

pointed in the booths. As many as 1,000 police officials and three companies of Central Armed Police Force were deployed at different booths to maintain law and order. The voting was carried out following



Covid-19 norms with arrangements of sanitisers and thermal scanning at all polling booths.

Moreover, liquor outlets were shut for 48 hours for the election in the district.

The bypoll was necessitated following the untimely demise of BJD's Kishore Mohanty in December last year.

Although 11 candidates were in the fray, the constituency predominantly witnessed a triangular fight among BJD, BJP and Congress nominees.

The BJD fielded Alaka Mohanty as its candidate in Brajranjnagar assembly segment, while the BJP nominated former MLA Radharani Panda. Ex-assembly speaker Kishore Patel is contesting the byelection on a Congress ticket.

The Assembly seat was with CPI and Congress till 2009 and went to BJP in 2014. Ruling BJD grabbed the seat in the last election held in 2019. Now, all eyes are on the by-poll as all three parties have a strong hold in the constituency.

to pay ₹5L to Puri mishap victim

Bhubaneswar, May 31: The Odisha Human Rights Commission (OHRC) has directed an insurance company to give ₹5 lakh compensation to next of the kin of a woman who had died in a stampede-like situation during the Rath Yatra celebrations in 2018.

While hearing a plea filed by Haguri Mallick, husband of the victim Saraswati Mallick, the commission has directed the insurance company to disburse the amount within 30 days.

Sources said Saraswati along with a few others sustained severe injuries in a stampede-like situation during the car festival celebrations in the Holy City in 2018. A critically injured Saraswati was first admitted to Puri district headquarters hospital and later shifted to SCB Medical College and Hospital in Cuttack where she succumbed.

Despite recommendation from the Srimandir administration, the insurance firm declined to pay the amount on the pretext of 'non-performance of autopsy of body'. Later, Haguri approached the OHRC seeking its intervention in this matter.

Odisha to receive above normal rainfall: IMD

New Delhi, May 31: India's rainfed agriculture region is set to receive above normal rainfall this monsoon season, the weather office said Tuesday raising hopes for a bumper farm output and reining in inflation.

"The average rainfall this monsoon season is expected to be 103% of the long period average," India Meteorological Department (IMD) Director General Mrutyunjay Mohapatra told reporters here.

In April, the IMD had said the country would receive normal rainfall -- 99 per cent of the long period average (LPA), which is the mean rainfall received over a 50-year-pe-



riod from 1971-2020. The LPA for

the entire country is 87 cm. The monsoon core zone - states ranging from Gujarat to Odisha that are dependent on rainfall for agriculture - is set to experience above normal rainfall at more than 106 per cent of the long period average, Mohapatra said. He said central India and south peninsula are set to receive above normal rainfall, while north-east and north-west re-

gions are likely to get normal rains. This is the fourth consecutive year that India is likely to experience a normal monsoon, Earlier, India had witnessed normal monsoon from 2005-08 and 2010-13.

Mohapatra said in the near future, India could witness normal monsoons as the decadal epoch of below normal rains was nearing its end

"We are now moving towards a normal monsoon epoch," he said. Asked about the criticism faced by IMD for "hasty" declaration of monsoon onset over Kerala, Mohapatra said the weather office followed a scientific process to announce the onset and progress of monsoon.

Sonepur boils at 44.5° C

BHUBANESWAR: Odisha sweltered in scorching heat and intense humidity Tuesday as the mercury rose by several notches

in the state, the weather office said. At least 18 weather

stations recorded a maximum of over 40 degrees Celsius. The temperature rose by around 1-3 degrees at a few places and it was above normal in several areas, the Bhubaneswar Meteorological Centre said.


Sonepur recorded 44.5 degrees Celsius, the highest in the state. The hot weather baked Bolangir



Tobacco kills 37K in state every year

AROUND 600 MILLION TREES ARE CHOPPED DOWN ACROSS THE GLOBE ANNUALLY TO PRODUCE TOBACCO PRODUCTS, SAID DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC HEALTH NIRANJAN MISHRA

Bhubaneswar, May 31: The Health and Family Welfare department observed the World No Tobacco Day 2022 at Soochana Bhawan here Tuesday. On the occasion, a painting exhibition was also organised. The theme of World No Tobacco

Day 2022 is 'Poisoning our planet'. Around 600 million trees are chopped down across the globe annually to produce tobacco products. More than 70 lakh people in the world die due to tobacco use every year. Out of that, 10 lakh people die in India and the figure is 37,000 in Odisha," said Director of Public Health Niranjan Mishra. As per Global Adult Tobacco

Survey (GATS), smoking has decreased significantly among the adult people from 10.3 per cent in 2009-10 (GATS-1) to 7.0 per cent in 2016-17 (GATS-2). During the same period, overall tobacco use prevalence has declined marginally among the adults in Odisha from 46.7 per cent to 45.6 per cent.

Smokeless tobacco use has decreased marginally from 43.1 per cent to 42.1 per cent in the state. Khaini and tobacco for oral application are the two most commonly used tobacco products. At least 16.9 per cent of adults use Khaini and 14.9 per cent use tobacco for oral application in Odisha.

The mean age of initiation of tobacco use among adults has increased from 16.5 years to 17.4 years in comparison to GATS-1. The quit attempts made by the tobacco users also increased by manifolds in last six years. The prevalence of secondhand smoke exposure has also decreased significantly in our state

comprising Justices BR Gavai and Hima Kohli said that the bench can only take up the matter for hearing after the Chief Justice allots it the case. "Until the Chief Justice allots the

matter to us, we cannot hear it. We cannot assume the jurisdiction of the Chief Justice. Our hands are tied. We are controlled by registry," the bench said after the case was mentioned before it.

Senior advocate Mahalaxmi Pavani mentioned the case and submitted that despite the apex court's direction, the case was not listed for hearing Tuesday. The



senior counsel also contended that the construction work is going on against the judgment of this court.

Significantly, a couple of special leave petitions have been filed in the Supreme Court against the Orissa High Court order of May 9. The High Court had not stayed the construction work going on around the Puri Srimandir in its order passed May 9.



Active Covid caseload dips to 70 in state

Bhubaneswar, May 31: Odisha recorded three new Covid cases Tuesday, taking the tally 12,88,440, the state Health department said in a bulletin.

The toll remained at 9,126 as no new death was recorded in the last 24 hours.

There are 70 active cases in the state at present. Seven more people recovered from the disease, taking the recoveries to 12,79,191, the Health bulletin said.

The daily test positivity rate (TPR) was 0.03 per cent as the new cases were detected after testing 11,510 samples, it added.

The state currently contributes 2.99 percent of infected cases of the National caseload. Likewise, it houses 0.41 per cent of the total active cases in India. The percentage of national recovered cases in Odisha is at 3.01 and the state contributes 1.75 per cent of the total Covid fatalities

ASHAs struggle in shadows outside WHO spotlight


ome rain, sun, hail or indeed a contagion, the band of women who form the bedrock of India's rural healthcare system slog on, anonymous, underpaid and mostly unsung until last week when the WHO honoured them for their efforts in controlling Covid.

For the 10 lakh Accredited Social Health Activists (ASHAs) volunteers who administer medicines, vaccines, first aid, offer health advice and a myriad other services across the length and breadth of India, the WHO recognition is just the global spotlight they need

But their battle against low payments, no facilities and erratic schedules continues. And because they are women, so does the tightrope walk between their homes

'We get ₹10,000 per month at most. How are we expected to support ourselves in that money with prices going up every day? Also, the personal sacrifice we make by keeping our work before our family. Who values that?" Sailendri. an ASHA volunteer for 16 years, said in a phone interview to PTI from her home in Basti, still unaware that ASHAs like her have been honoured at an international platform

Sunita Sinha, an ASHA from Sabour block of Bhagalpur district in Bihar, agreed. Echoing Sailendri's resentment, she said there are days when they even have



is no conveyance and we have to manage everything on our own. Also, we work under so much pressure. There have been days when we spend the whole day walking and don't sit for five minutes. But this is not acknowledged.'

ASHAs are the first and sometimes the only point of contact for millions of villagers and the healthcare system. They earn money through task-based incentives under the National Health Mission (NHM), which is funded in a 60:40 ratio between the Centre and state governments. All the ASHAs PTI spoke to said they don't earn more than ₹10,000 per month.

Poonam Muttreja, executive director, Population Foundation of India, noted that there are major differences between the pay scales of regular frontline workers and those recruited on a contractual basis under the NHM.

During the pandemic, ASHAs continued to work in fragile settings despite receiving resistance from communities. A study conducted by the Population Foundation of India during this period showed that the fear of getting infected by Covid among people kept many away from accessing services at health facilities, she said

She added that the government had introduced a performancebased payment method to support ASHAs. However, ASHA incentives are primarily centred on activities relating to reproductive and child health.

"ASHA incentives get significantly impacted in states with low total fertility rates and higher usage of private health care facilities." she said.

Compensation given to ASHAs differ across states and only a few have introduced fixed monthly remuneration in addition to the in-

centive package, Muttreja added. Stressing that the disbursement of incentives needs to be timely and regular, she said ASHAs have a wide-ranging experience working

with community and health system

is imperative for them.

According to Akhila Sivadas, executive director at the Centre for Advocacy and Research, a nonprofit organisation, the time has come to recognize the indispensability of ASHAs.

"An all-out effort must be made to ensure that every process related to ASHA starting from recruitment, appointment, training, remuneration and the right to appeal and redress must be streamlined to ensure that they feel both respected and given the due that they are entitled to," Sivadas said.

As the struggle for acknowledgment and better pay structures continues, Priyanka Kumari from Lakhisarai in Bihar said the biggest award for her is the satisfaction she sees in the eyes of her patients when they get treated.

"If I wanted to earn money I would have done something else but this is a noble profession for me and I keep that in mind whenever I feel inconvenienced," the 41-yearold told PTI.


A law graduate, Gourav prefers to work in the Indian Foreign Services (IFS) over the Indian Administrative Serivice due to his special interest in international relations.

Man gets life term for human sacrifice

Booker for Shree

t is not often that a novel winning a coveted international prize becomes a binding force seeking to bridge gaps between communities, nations, re-Ligions, genders and even languages. When it does, it sends into raptures lovers of literature as much as political-religious-linguistic activists who are against divisive tendencies. This is the reason why Geetanjali Shree's novel 'Tomb of Sand', originally 'Ret Samadhi' in Hindi, winning the prestigious International Booker Prize has created such a world-wide sensation. It is not only a triumph of literary ventures in an Indian language, but also of South Asian languages as the winner has rightly said to the international audience. The book along with its international acclaim is relevant for the current state of affairs of present day India and the rest of the world torn by divisions of all kinds and forms. The chair of the judging panel, Frank Wynne, rightly explained the implications of the story handled in a spirit of fun and humour when he said the "luminous novel of India and partition" weaves a magic welding together with great compassion youth and age, male and female, family and nation into a kaleidoscopic whole.

Set in northern India, the novel tells the story of an 80-year-old woman protagonist who, to her family's consternation, insists on travelling to Pakistan. She slips into a deep depression when her husband dies, but then she recovers from her depression and gains a new lease of life. The woman travels to Pakistan to confront the unresolved trauma of her teenage experiences of partition and re-evaluates what it means to be a mother, a daughter, a woman and a feminist. The serious tale is told in a light-hearted manner not to make light of it, but to reinforce deeper truths even more effectively. As Geetanjali herself said after receiving the award that when one handles a heavy thing with lightness, one actually increases the poignancy and it puts a different kind of focus on it.

The importance of the book in the contemporary world is immense which is why it has struck such a chord with the readers and the judges. It speaks of the pluralism and polyphony of the world. The present times are witnessing sordid attempts by one dominant group, political party or a ruler to stifle the voice of others and impose a monolithic socio-cultural-political vision and narrative pushing the world to the brink of war and conflict. Mankind is being divided in the name of religion. The journey of the protagonist from India to Pakistan in search of meaning in life and composite culture is not only a commentary on the religious and political tensions prevailing now, but also on the situation facing the international community at large.

As the scope of literature becomes narrow if it is used for advancing any doctrine or creed, the jury refrained from specifying the appeal of the novel to the present day reality in the world. Though the title of the book - Tomb of Sand - sounds sombre, it is playful and funny, light but not slight with a carnival of characters. As the novelist emphasises, "it is an important way to focus attention and also the best way to live. To get some fun in spite of the serious things.'

The serious things in the book are borders and divisions between religions, genders and nations - notably between India and Pakistan, as a result of the partition of India in 1947. Shree was born 10 years after the partition, but savs that even though her generation does not remember the partition, "we very much live with it, particularly the ideology it has unleashed, that supposes that these two major communities in the subcontinent cannot live to-

Shree was born Geetanjali Pandey but changed her surname to her mother's forename. The anecdote that she shared with the media after receiving the award is illustrative of the influences that shaped her into an advocate of women's identity and feminine voice in a male-dominated society. "It was in adolescence, when I got my first bank account, and with a great flourish I signed my full name," she said. But her father, a civil servant, insisted that she just sign her first name, because a woman's name changes after marriage. This made Shree think why her mother's name was nowhere, though it was she who played such a big role in bringing her up. So when she started writing, she decided to take her mother's first name as her second name. Hence, her pen name has no surname.

The bilingual novel - the Hindi original is translated by American painter and prolific translator Daisy Rockwell - is yet another literary and linguistic triumph, especially in the context of India where the present dispensation has been trying to impose Hindi on the entire country. The book would have ignited the passions of zealots who advocate Hindi supplanting all other languages as the national language. But, the author herself snubbed a questioner who asked why she had added the English version to the original tome in Hindi. She said it is not an "either or" situation. When asked if she fears that Hindi may be getting overshadowed by English in some ways in India, the author stressed there is no problem in being bilingual or trilingual or multilingual. She believes humans have the capacity to know more than one language. The country should just have an education system which encourages people to know their mother tongue, or another Indian language and English. "But it gets completely riddled with politics and becomes a kind of unresolvable problem." she lamented.

Truly, literature has the power to rise above politics, race and languages.

■ Target

Everyone has targets — figurative ones, anyway. When targets were tangible things, all you could do was hit them, or — perhaps more often miss them. But when the word moved out of the literal field into the intangible arena of management, new verbs became attached to it. Now we can set targets, or reach them, or meet them, or even exceed them. Some of the targets we set are tough ones, or ambitious ones. On occasion they aren't even single points but target ranges, which have nothing to do with shooting ranges, where one may find the corporeal sort of targets. Historically, a target is a small targe. The latter was an ancient word for the light shield carried by those who needed something easy to lug around. Archers had them, and so did other fighters on foot. Though the word is recorded in Old English as either targe or targa — it was Germanic in origin, from a word that meant a frame - its popularity seems to have been reinforced after the Norman Conquest by the French form targe - French had borrowed the word earlier, most probably from the Franks. Naturally, the English came to say the word the same way the French did, with a soft g, to rhyme with large. Target, a word for a little shield, was created in French, so it, too, had the soft g to start with. It only changed to our modern pronunciation sometime around the fifteenth century. But in all this time, and for three hundred years afterwards, target referred only to a shield. Our modern meaning of a device to aim at only arrived in the eighteenth century, just too late for the good Doctor Johnson to include it in his dictionary. (It's first recorded in 1757, two years after the dictionary was published). What then did archers and their like aim at in all the centuries before then? It turns out that the older term was mark. which is recorded from the beginning of the thirteenth century. This was originally a boundary (a variant is march, as in the Welsh Marches for the border between Wales and England), then it became the word for a boundary marker such as a natural feature (as in landmark) or a stone or post. The idea of a mark as a thing to aim at seems to have developed from this. It was something much more substantial than our modern idea of a mark as some visible indication or sign.

triple crisis of climate, nature, and pollution, with one common cause: the fossil-fuel economy, Oil, gas, and coal are at the root of runaway climate disruption, widespread biodiversity loss, and pervasive plastic pollution. The conclusion is clear and must be paramount when political leaders gather in Stockholm this week to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the first United Nations Conference on the Human Environment. Any effort to address these existential threats to human and ecological health will mean little as long as the fossil-fuel economy remains intact. As UN Secretary-General

ur planet is facing a

António Guterres recently noted, fossil fuels are choking our planet. In the last decade, their combustion accounted for 86 per cent of global carbon dioxide emissions, for which just a few actors bear overwhelming responsibility. In fact, nearly two-thirds of all carbon dioxide emitted since the Industrial Revolution can be traced to just 90 polluters, mostly the largest fossil-fuel producers.

Yet, rather than reining in the polluters, the world's governments are currently planning to allow more than twice as much fossil-fuel production in 2030 than would be consistent with the goal - agreed under the 2015 Paris climate agreement – of limiting global warming to 1.5° Celsius above pre-industrial levels. And when it comes to the damage wrought by fossil fuels, higher global temperatures and intensifying extreme weather events are only the beginning.

Last year, the UN Special Rapporteur on Toxics and Human Rights, Marcos A. Orellana, affirmed what frontline communities have long known: fossil-fuel production generates toxic compounds and pollutes air, water, and soil. Air pollution from burning fossil fuels was responsible for about one in five deaths worldwide in 2018. Moreover, oil and gas are the building blocks of the toxic chemicals. pesticides, and synthetic fertilizers that are pushing ecosystems and species to extinction. These fossil-fuel-based products perpetuate an economic and agro-industrial model that drives deforestation, destroys biodiversity, and threatens human health.

Fossil fuels are also behind the proliferation of plastics, which are accumulating in even the most

remote areas of the planet, from the top of Mount Everest to the bottom of the Mariana Trench, Ninetynine per cent of all plastics are made from chemicals derived from fossil fuels, predominantly oil and gas. The production of petrochemical feedstocks for plastics and the use of fossil fuels throughout the plastics value chain are boosting demand for oil and gas and exposing millions of people to toxic pollution.

As if that were not enough, fossil fuels foment and fund violent conflict around the world. The fossil-fuel economy is enabling Russian President Vladimir Putin's war in Ukraine and the humanitarian crisis it has created. In the seven years after Russia illegally annexed Crimea, eight of the world's biggest fossil-fuel companies enriched Russia's government by an estimated \$95.4 billion. Russia's revenues from energy exports have soared since the invasion of Ukraine in February, which drove up prices. And big Western oil companies, cashing in on the conflict, have raked in record profits.

Instead of facing accountability, the oil and gas industry and its allies are exploiting the Ukraine crisis to push for even more drilling, fracking, and exports of liquefied natural gas (LNG) all around the world. But new fossil-fuel infrastructure, which will take years to bring online, will do nothing to address the current energy crisis. Instead, it will only deepen the world's dependence on fossil fuels, enhance producers' ability to wreak havoc on people and the planet, and push a climate-safe future further out of reach.

As world leaders gather for Stockholm+50, breaking our addiction to fossil fuels should be the top priority. Yet fossil fuels are conspicuously absent from the official concept note and agenda, and they are barely mentioned in the background papers of the three Leadership Dialogues that are supposed to inform the summit's

This omission is no accident. The fossil-fuel lobby has decades of experience sowing doubt about the damage the industry is causing and obscuring the link between fossil fuels and the toxic chemicals used in industrial agriculture and plastic products. When outright denial has not worked. the industry has touted false solutions, including speculative technological fixes, market mechanisms with gigantic loopholes.

and misleading "net-zero" pledges The goal is to divert political attention from the urgent action needed to end reliance on fossil fuels and scale-up proven approaches, like renewable energy, agroecology, and plastic reduction and reuse

Such transformative action is precisely what Stockholm+50 must deliver. Participating governments and decision-makers must acknowledge that fossil fuels are the main driver of the triple crisis we face, and they must set a bold agenda for halting fossil-fuel expansion, ensuring a rapid and equitable decline of oil, gas, and coal, and accelerating a just transition to a fossil-free future.

One possible feature of such an agenda would be a Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty - an initiative that has attracted wide support, including from thousands of civil-society organisations, hundreds of scientists and parliamentarians, more than 100 Nobel laureates, and dozens of municipal governments. To spur progress, a broad range of stakeholders – including representatives of indigenous communities, governments, international institutions, and academia – will gather the day before Stockholm+50 for the Pre-Summit on the Global Just

Transition from Fossil Fuels. In parallel with the Stockholm meeting, an intergovernmental negotiating committee, convened by the UN Environment Programme, is gathering in Dakar to develop a legally binding global plastics treaty. Crucially, the treaty will have to take a comprehensive approach that addresses the full plastic life cycle, beginning with fossil-fuel extraction.

If we have learned one thing in the 50 years since the first Stockholm conference, it is that a future tied to fossil fuels is no future at all. To tackle the converging crises of climate change, biodiversity loss, and petrochemical and plastic pollution, Stockholm+50 has no alternative but to confront oil, gas, and coal head-on.

ing Republicans got together recently in Washington, D.C., to discuss what they called "The Problem of Evildoers in Our Schools." America had suffered yet another mass shooting in a school. It was one of so many school shootings in the last 25 years that even the media had lost count.

The urgent meeting had been organised by Senator Ted Cruz of Texas, who had won wide acclaim among his peers for zeroing in on what he considered the most pertinent fact regarding the latest shooting: the 18-year-old gunman had entered the school in Uvalde, Texas, through an unsecured door.

"America does not have a gun problem," Cruz said. "America has a door problem. We do not need gun control. We need door control. We have too many doors.

Cruz, smiling broadly at the applause that greeted him, suggested that schools should not have a dozen doors to enter and exit, but

group of about 20 high-rank- a single high-security door. He was praised not just for conceiving a brilliant solution to a seemingly unsolvable problem, but for standing up bravely against one of the most powerful lobbying groups in America, the National Door Association (NDA).

> The NDA represents hundreds of door manufacturers, who want to sell as many doors as possible. Indeed, it's largely because of the NDA that American houses are full of doors; front doors, back doors, side doors, bedroom doors, bathroom doors, shower doors, closet doors, pantry doors, garage doors, refrigerator doors. But the NDA knows that doors can cause problems. Not only can doors be inviting to potential burglars, they also attract salespeople and Jehovah's Witnesses. The NDA is aware that some people have eliminated front doors—and are using back doors exclusively-to keep people from selling or witnessing to them.

launched a media campaign with a catchy slogan: "Doors do not open for people. People open for people."

Cruz acknowledged that doors do not usually open themselves, except in places like grocery stores with sensors that open doors automatically. But instead of worrying about whether a door in a school is locked or unlocked, the best solution is to eliminate it, he said.

"If we have a single door for every school, we can monitor it for 24 hours a day," he said. "We can see who's coming and going, and what they're carrying. It would be like airport security, with metal detectors, x-ray machines, and mandatory pat-downs of anyone with an angry face. Some kids may have to take their shoes off too, but this is a small price to pay for living in the freest country in the world.'

While gun control advocates are quick to blame the proliferation of guns in America for mass shootings, Cruz noted that there is only an average of one gun per person in America, but at least three doors per person. And that does not even include doors to sheds, outhouses and vehicles.

"The shooter used a door to get into the school," Cruz said, "but without the door to his pick-up truck, he would have never reached the school."

Senator Lindsey Graham of South Carolina wondered aloud if more doors were needed in schools for emergency exits. "If there's a fire in the school, wouldn't we want more than one door for the kids to escape?" he asked. "Wouldn't we have a stampede otherwise?"

Cruz shook his head. "That's what windows are for.'

Jumping out of windows is more efficient than running toward a door, he said. "Besides, fires are not a problem in schools. We have lots of fire extinguishers in schools and every kid carries a water bottle with them.

Srinagar, May 31: A Hindu woman teacher was shot dead Tuesday by terrorists in Jammu and Kashmir's Kulgam district, following which Kashmiri Pandits, employed under the PM package, threatened to undertake mass migration from the Valley if they were not relocated to safe places within the next 24 hours.

"Those involved in this gruesome terror crime will be soon identified and neutralised," a police spokesperson said. The woman's killing evoked widespread condemnation in the Valley. "Very sad. This is yet another targeted killing in a long list of recent attacks directed at unarmed civilians. Words of condemnation & condolence ring hollow as do the assurances of the government that they will not rest till situation normalises. May the deceased rest in peace," National Conference vice-president Omar Abdullah tweeted.

"Rajni was from Samba District of Jammu province. A government teacher working in Kulgam area of South Kashmir, she lost her life in a despicable targeted attack. My heart goes out to her husband Raj Kumar & the rest of her family. Another home irreparably damaged by violence," he added.

"Despite GOIs fake claims about Kashmir being normal its obvious that targeted civilian killings are on the rise & a deep cause of concern (sic). Condemn this act of cowardice which sadly plays into the vicious anti Muslim narrative spun by BJP," she tweeted. Sajad Lone also condemned the killing, saying cowardice has yet again plummeted to shameless depths.

The killing of Rajni Bala (36), who belonged to Jammu's Samba district but was posted at a government school in Gopalpora, Kulgam, is the second killing of a non-Muslim government employee in May and the seventh targeted killing in Kashmir this month

Officials had said she was a migrant Kashmiri Pandit

PDP president Mehbooba Mufti said despite the Centre's claims of normalcy in Kashmir, targeted killings were on the rise

"A teacher, an innocent woman hailing from Samba, has been shot dead in Kulgam. May her soul rest in peace," he said.

BJP spokesman Altaf Thakur said he strongly condemned the attack. "Yet another dastardly act of terrorism in Kulgam. Attacking unarmed civilians, that too women, is no bravery but an act of frustration,"he added. This is second

killing of a non-Muslim government employee in the month of May. On May 12, Rahul Bhat, a clerk, was shot dead inside the tehsildar's office in Chadoora tehsil of Budgam district.

Of the seven targeted killings that took place in Kashmir this month, three victims were off-duty policemen and four were civilians.

Meanwhile, Kashmiri Pandits, employed under the prime minister's package, have threatened to undertake mass migration from the valley if the government did not relocate them to safe places within the next 24 hours as employees from the community hit the streets at various places to protest against the teacher's killing.

Some Kashmiri Pandit employees assembled at the Ghanta Ghar (Clock tower) at Lal Chowk here to protest against the killing while another group gathered at Batwara in Sonawar area of the city and raised slogans against the Union Territory administration, officials said.

Health Min issues guidelines to states

In the 'Guidelines on Management of Monkeypox Disease' issued to states and union territories, the health ministry stressed on surveillance and rapid identification of new cases as the key public health measures for outbreak containment, mandating the need to reduce the risk of human-to-human transmission.

New Delhi, May 31: Amid increasing cases of monkeypox being reported in non-endemic countries, the government Tuesday issued guidelines directing district surveillance units to consider even one such case as an outbreak and initiating a detailed investigation through the Integrated Disease Surveillance Programme.

It stated that India needs to be prepared in view of the increasing reports of cases in non-endemic countries even as no case of monkeypox virus has been reported in the country till date.

The guidelines proposed a surveillance strategy to rapidly identify cases and clusters of infections and the sources of infections as soon as possible in order to isolate cases to prevent further transmission, provide optimal clinical care, identify and manage con-



tacts and protect frontline health workers and effective control and preventive measures based on the identified routes of transmission.

According to the guidelines, a confirmed case is laboratory confirmed for monkeypox virus by detection of unique sequences of viral DNA either by polymerase chain reaction (PCR) and/or sequencing. All the clinical specimens should be transported to the apex laboratory of ICMR-NIV (Pune) routed through the Integrated Disease Surveillance Programme (IDSP) network of the respective district or state. The guidelines explain the Infection Prevention and Control (IPC) measures, IPC at home, patient isolation and ambulance transfer strategies, additional precautions that needs to be taken care of and duration of isolation procedures.

Raising awareness of risk factors under risk communication and preventive measures, the guidelines further explain in detail about raising awareness and educating people about the measures for monkeypox virus like avoiding contact with any material of the sick person, isolation of infected patient from others, practising good hand hygiene and using appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) when caring for patients.

Satyender Jain sent to ED's custody till June 9

New Delhi, May 31: Delhi's health minister Satyendar Jain was Tuesday sent to Enforcement Directorate's custody till June 9 in a money laundering case by a court here which noted that his interrogation was required to unearth the alleged larger conspiracy.

The ED had Monday arrested the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) leader under the criminal sections of the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA). Special Judge Geetanjli Goel issued the remand order after Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, appearing for the ED, sought Jain's custodial interrogation for 14 days.

He said there was a chequered layer of money and the agency was trying to find out if the accused was laundering somebody else's money and whether there were other potential beneficiaries. "The money hasn't stopped at Rs 4.81 crore. It is beyond. Some facts we don't have, but the accused is aware," the SG said, adding that the likelihood of tampering with evidence could not be ruled out till the agency ascertained the real trail. So far, Jain has been evasive in his replies to the agency, he alleged.

Woman throws six kids into well

Mumbai, May 31: The police Tuesday registered a case of murder against a 30-year-old woman who allegedly killed her six children, aged between 18 months and 10 years, by throwing them into a well at a village in Maharashtra's Raigad district following domestic discord, an official said.

The accused, Runa Chikhuri Sahani, threw her children, including five girls, into a well in Kharavali village in Mahad taluka, around 100km from Mumbai, Monday afternoon, and later attempted suicide but was saved by local residents, he said. The woman was arrested and booked for murder, he said and claimed she has confessed to the crime.

The children, aged between 18 months and 10 years, drowned before villagers could pull them out, the official said. Investigations have revealed the accused committed the crime in a fit of rage following an argument with her husband. The couple often fought over the husband's alcohol addiction, he said. After throwing her children into the well, the accused allegedly tried to jump into the water body, but was saved by villagers.

The woman was brought to the

police station by locals, the official said. Sahani's family originally hails from Uttar Pradesh and had come to Maharashtra in search of work, he said.

First person held in Moosewala killing

Chandigarh, May 31: Manpreet Singh, the first arrest in the killing of famed singer-turned-politician Sidhu Moosewala was produced before a Mansa court in Punjab Tuesday and was sent to police custody for five days.

A team of Punjab Police along with sleuths of the Uttarakhand STF had arrested Manpreet Singh from Dehradun Monday. He was suspected to have provided "key logistical support" in the murder of the Punjabi singer.



Singh, a resident of Faridkot in Punjab, was reportedly trying to hide among pilgrims, who were scheduled to go on a yatra to Hemkund in Chamoli district when the police nabbed him. Famous Punjabi singer and Congress leader Moosewala was shot dead by unidentified assailants Sunday, a day after the state government pruned his security cover

Meanwhile, the cremation of Moosewala was held in his native village Moosa in Mansa district Tuesday After much delay to get the consent of his father, the postmortem of Moosewala was conducted by a five-member forensic team of doctors from Patiala and Faridkot medical colleges at the Civil Hospital in Mansa.

Tens of thousands of Moosewala's fans and followers gathered outside his palatial bungalow to pay tributes and attended his funeral.

Officials told IANS the singerturned-politician's wailing parents gave consent for the postmortem of their only child after Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann announced to set up a judicial commission under a sitting judge of Punjab and Haryana High Court to probe his killing.

Backdoor channels active to revive India-Pakistan ties

RELATIONS BETWEEN THE TWO COUNTRIES HAVE REMAINED STRAINED FOR YEARS NOW AND TOOK A TURN FOR THE WORSE IN AUGUST 2019 WHEN INDIA REVOKED SPECIAL STATUS OF JAMMU AND KASHMIR

New Delhi/Islamabad, May 31: With Pakistan Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif in the ruling and a coalition government set in place, Islamabad and New Delhi have been working towards activating backdoor channels for talks to revive the stalled relationship between the nuclear powered neighbours.

The development is being seen as a major step with an intent to push forward the relationship between India and Pakistan towards normalcy through bilateral engagements, talks and addressing each other concerns to find a mutual ground of understanding.

Relations between the two countries have remained strained for years now and took a turn for the worse in August 2019 when India revoked special status of Jammu and Kashmir.

In responde, Pakistan downgraded diplomatic ties and suspended bilateral trade and insisted that until India reverses its decision, there can be no talks on any issue between the two countries.

New Delhi, May 31: The National Capital witnessed its first severe thunderstorm in four years as squally winds of 100 kmph pummeled the city Monday evening, uprooting trees, damaging property and bringing traffic to a screeching halt.

This is the first storm of "se vere" intensity in Delhi since June 9, 2018, when Palam had logged a wind speed of 104 kmph, a Met department official said. A moderate thunderstorm had hit the city

The thunderstorm led to a drastic fall in the temperature at the Safdarjung Observatory -- from 40 degrees Celsius at 4:20 pm to 25 degrees Celsius at 5:40 pm.

Safdarjung, Lodhi Road and Ridge logged 17.8 mm, 20 mm and 15 mm of rainfall. East and central parts of Delhi bore the maximum brunt of the storm that peppered the roads with broken tree branches.

and 70 delayed at the Delhi airport, while long, serpentine queues of vehicles clogged the arterial roads in the city. Loud thunder, lightning strikes and a short, intense spell of rain accompanied the gusty winds.

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) attributed it to a Western Disturbance-induced cyclonic circulation over northwest Rajasthan and adjoining Pakistan.

The moisture-carrying easterly winds from the Bay of Bengal are feeding the cyclonic circulation. it said. High temperature and high humidity create thunderclouds, which are capable of producing short, intense spells of rain and thunderstorms, an official said.

The Indira Gandhi International Airport reported winds gusting up to 100 kmph. The Palam weather station logged a maximum wind speed of 70 kmph.

A trough extending from northwest Rajasthan to Assam will persist for a few days. Some parts of Delhi are likely to see intermittent thunder activity over the next few days which will keep the mercury in check, said Mahesh Palawat, vice president (climate change and meteorology), Skymet Weather.

'Uprooting of trees due to concretisation, fall in groundwater level'

As a severe thunderstorm up-rooted hundreds of trees in Delhi Monday, experts attributed the extensive damage to increasing concretisation and declining groundwater level. Noted environmentalist Pradeep Krishen said extreme weather conditions have damaged trees in the past too. However, the declining groundwater levels and concretisation around the base of the trees have compounded the impact of such events, he added. The roots of a tree tend to spread as much as the canopy spreads and concretisation around its base does not allow water to reach the side roots, which shrivel and weaken the tree as well, Krishen said. Many of the trees are not able to reach the water table that has gone down over the years. This makes them weak and vulnerable, he said. Environmentalist and founder of New Delhi Nature Society Verhaen Khanna said gulmohar trees attract termites that make them hollow. Such trees become the first casualty of severe weather, he said. Many times, people tie cables and ropes to support structures around the tree trunk, which hampers the growth of that particular part. Strong winds snap such trees from these points, he said.

Moosewala murder: Delhi HC to hear Bishnoi's plea citing 'fake encounter' fear



New Delhi, May 31: The Delhi High Court will Wednesday hear the plea filed by jailed gangster Lawrence Bishnoi, named as a suspect in the sensational murder of famed Punjabi singer Sidhu Moosewala, alleging apprehension of a fake encounter by the Punjab police for 'political mileage'.

Through his counsel Vishal Chopra, Bishnoi approached the high court after a NIA court of Patiala House Court junked his plea Monday. In the plea, he sought a direction to the Delhi Police and the Tihar Jail authorities to ensure all necessary security arrangements for him.

The petitioner sought the court's direction to Central Jail Authorities to give prior intimation to his counsels before his custody is given to any other state police on any production warrant. He should be duly handcuffed, shackled, and video-graphed during the production warrant and on transit remand if any warrant is produced by the Punjab police for the safety of his life, the plea stated.





Jama Masjid Shahi Imam Syed Ahmed Bukhari said that two people were injured by stones which fell from minarets and other parts of the mosque. The Kalas (finial) of the main dome fell off. It needs urgent repair to prevent further damages. Some stones of the mosque structure also loosened and fell off. I will write to the Prime Minister for immediate repair of the mosque roping in Archaeological Survey of India, Bukhari told PTI. Delhi Waqf Board officials said a team was sent to Jama Masiid for inspection and assessment of the damage. The finial weighs around 300 kgs. It's a difficult task to fix it back and undertake the repairs. We will take decision after the damage is fully assessed, said a Waqf Board official. In June last year also, some stone pieces from the southern minaret of Jama Masjid had fallen after a storm. In 2020 too, the mosque had suffered damage due to tremors the city. A few pieces of stones had fallen off from minaret near gate number 3 of the mosque premises, its caretakers said.

Improve greenery on European standard roads in west Delhi: CM

A senior PWD official said that the project entails strengthening of road, enhancing its aesthetics and greenery and introducing user facilities like kiosks, benches, decorative lights, and

His mother was seen trying to console her husband as people from Punjab, Rajasthan and Chandigarh among other places queued up in large numbers to get a last glimpse of the singer.

The singer's favourite tractor, which had figured in many of his music videos, was bedecked with flowers for his last ride to a family-

owned field for the cremation. Notwithstanding the scorching



heat, mourners joined the funeral procession as Moosewala's father and mother stood on the tractor with folded hands, accompanying their son on his final journey.

Some of his fans wore t-shirts with Moosewala's picture printed on them. The singer's father, Balkour Singh, even took off his turban on seeing the sea of mourners.

Punjab Congress chief Amrinder Singh Raja Warring was present during the funeral procession.

A heavy police force was deployed at the slain singer's residence as well as at the cremation site. People heaped praises on Moosewala for his songs and even raised slogans in his favour.

"He was a good-natured man. He would never say no to anybody



amongst us today," said a villager. Some villagers and fans ex-

pressed anger over the Punjab police pruning Moosewala's security cover just a day before he was shot dead and sought the strictest punishment for the killers.

"Those who were behind the killing of Moosewala should be given exemplary punishment," said an elderly man who came from Jalandhar.

were also injured in the attack. The popular Punjabi singer had




fought the recent assembly election in Punjab on a Congress ticket from Mansa and was defeated by the AAP's Vijay Singla.

India may see lower rain in coal-producing areas

New Delhi, May 31: India expects rainfall in the biggest coal-producing areas of its east-central region to be below the long-term average this year, potentially easing utilities' coal shortages as there could be fewer disruptions to mining activity due to flooding.

East-central India includes the states of Odisha, Jharkhand, Chhattisgarh and West Bengal, which together account for nearly half of the country's annual coal output. Coal accounts for nearly 75% of India's power generation.

India expects overall rainfall during the annual monsoon to be 103% of the long-term average. Higher rainfall in other parts of the country could increase hydro power generation and irrigation-driven electricity demand could be lower, easing pressure on thermal power.

India has reversed a policy to cut coal imports to zero, invoked an emergency law to operate imported coal-based utilities and plans to reopen closed mines to address surging power demand, which is seen growing at the fastest pace in at least 38 years.

Domestic coal output typically dips during the annual monsoon period between June and September every year due to mining disruptions, and state-run Indian Railways also faces delays due to waterclogged tracks and route closures.

State-run Coal India (COAL.NS), which produces 80% of India's coal, reported the first fall in production in two decades in 2019/20, due to the heaviest rainfall in 25 years.

Coal accounts for nearly 75% of India's power generation

Department (IMD) expects rainfall in the coal-producing regions of Maharashtra and Madhya Pradesh, which together make up a quarter of India's output, to be above average, it said Tuesday.

The intensity of rainfall would be more critical than overall rainfall during a season. Relentless rains over short periods of time could cause mine flooding, even when overall rainfall during the monsoon is deficient. The southwest monsoon has set in over Kerala on May 29, three days ahead of its usual date of June 1.

Erratic rainfall patterns, which India has attributed to climate change, have impeded output in the recent past.

Sudden floods in 2019 in the Dipka mine, India's third largest, halted operations for days, and it took over a month for resume production at full capacity.

India faced a crippling power crisis in April, when a rapid surge in power demand lead to a scramble for coal, forcing the country to roll back plans to cut thermal coal imports to zero.

An increase in peak power consumption during the night when solar power is not available has made phasing out coal-fired generation a big challenge. The addition of alternative sources such as nuclear and hydro power have also been slow.

India is the world's second largest consumer, producer and importer of coal, and the fuel accounts for nearly 75% of annual electricity

BJP censors Dilip Ghosh, bars him from speaking to media

New Delhi, May 31: India and China Tuesday agreed to hold the next round of the Senior Commanders' meeting at an early date to achieve complete disengagement from all friction points in eastern Ladakh to create conditions for the restoration of normalcy in bilateral ties.

It was the only decision taken at a virtual meeting of the Working Mechanism for Consultation and Coordination (WMCC) on the India-China Border Affairs as there was no concrete forward movement to resolve the over two-year-old standoff in eastern Ladakh.

The Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) said the two sides reviewed the situation along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in the Western Sector of India-China border areas and agreed to hold the next round of the Senior Commanders' meeting "at an early date".

The previous meeting under the framework of the WMCC had taken place in November while the 15th round of military dialogue was held March 11

The meeting on the lingering row Tuesday was the first one after Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi visited India March 24 and 25. "They agreed that as instructed by the two foreign ministers, both sides should continue the discussions through diplomatic and military channels to resolve the remaining issues along the LAC at the earliest so as to create conditions for the restoration of normalcy in

bilateral relations," it said. "In this context, they agreed to hold the next (16th) round of the Senior Commanders meeting at an early date to achieve the objective of complete disengagement from all friction points along the LAC in the Western Sector in accordance with the existing bilateral agreements and protocols," the MEA added. India has been consistently maintaining that peace and tranquillity along the LAC were key for the overall development of the bilateral ties.

Each side currently has around 50.000 to 60.000 troops along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in the sensitive sector.

Ban advt of tobacco products: Health experts to govt

New Delhi, May 31: Health experts and celebrities have urged the government to put an immediate ban on advertisement of tobacco roducts

Noted epidemiologist and public health expert Chandrakant Lahariya pointed out that children and non-tobacco users too visit the point of sale (POS) and are at risk of getting addicted and giving relaxation on POS is like inviting a tobacco pandemic.

He also brought to the notice of the government about the tobacco threat on the people's health in the wake of Covid-19.

He cited various studies showing how tobacco users have become vulnerable to the deadly infection during the pandemic. "Every life is precious and we are losing 1.3 million Indians every year to tobacco-related diseases.

Apart from cancer, tobacco is also a major cause of a wide range of chronic and life-threatening conditions like lung diseases, cardiovascular diseases, and strokes to name a few," he said. The epidemiologist backed the

demand to ban designated smoking areas in the airports, hotels and restaurants, as they were a health risk to non-smokers. "People are aware of the ill effects

of tobacco on health. But that is only one facet. There is a strong need to spread awareness on how tobacco adversely affects the environment. From beginning to end, the tobacco cvcle is an overwhelmingly polluting and damaging process.



China sends 30 jets near Taiwan

Taipei, May 31: US Senator Tammy Duckworth Tuesday reiterated America's support for Taiwan on her second visit in a year to the selfgoverning island claimed by China.

Duckworth, meeting with Taiwan President Tsai Ing-wen, emphasized the close economic, political and security relations between Taipei and Washington. China sent 30 military aircraft toward the island Monday in an ongoing campaign of regular flights. Taiwan's Defence Ministry said it responded by scrambling jets, putting air defense missile systems on alert and issuing radio warnings.

Duckworth said she wanted to "emphasise our support for Taiwan security". The former Army helicopter pilot and lieutenant colonel in the National Guard cited strong bipartisan backing for a bill she has put forward promoting cooperation between Taiwan's armed forces and the National Guard.

"I do want to say that it is more than just about military. It's also about the economy," the Illinois

That is seen as a potential route to blocking access to Taiwan by the US and its allies in the event China makes good on its threat to invade the island

Brussels, May 31: In the most significant effort yet to punish Russia for its war in Ukraine, the European Union agreed to ban the overwhelming majority of Russian oil imports after tense negotiations that exposed the cracks in European unity.

From the moment Russia invaded on Feb. 24, the West has sought to hit Moscow's lucrative energy sector to cut off funding for its war. But any such move is a double-edged sword, especially in Europe, which relies on the country for 25% of its oil and 40% of its natural gas. European countries that are even more heavily dependent on Russia have been especially reluctant to act.

In a move unthinkable just months ago. EU leaders agreed late Monday to cut around 90% of all Russian oil imports over the next six months. In response to the EU's decision, Mikhail Ulyanov,

Russia's permanent representative to international organizations in Vienna, took to Twitter, saying: "Russia will find other importers."

Russia has not shied away from withholding its energy supplies, despite the economic damage it could suffer as a result. And Russian energy giant Gazprom announced it would cut natural gas supplies to Dutch trader GasTerra on Tuesday and it is considering cutting off Denmark. It's already turned the taps off in Bulgaria, Poland and Finland.

Dutch trader GasTerra said the move was announced after it refused Gazprom's "one-sided payment requirements." That's a reference to Russian President Vladimir Putin's demand that European nations pay for gas in rubles — an arrangement many have refused. GasTerra said homes would not be hit as it had bought gas elsewhere in anticipation of a shutoff.

Talks at EU headquarters in Brussels were set Tuesday to focus on ways to end the trading bloc's dependence on Russian energy, by diversifying supplies and speeding up the transition to renewable sources and away, as much as possible given recent price hikes, from fossil fuels.

The oil embargo, tied up in a new package of sanctions that will also target Russia's biggest bank and state media outlets accused of spreading propaganda, covers crude oil and petroleum products but

Islamabad, May 31: Cash-strapped Pakistan may face a supply disruption in its oil sector as the key industry is facing challenges in arranging international finances for import of crude and oil products, according to a media report Tuesday.

The Petroleum Division has informed Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif and Finance Minister Miftah Ismail that arrangements of oil imports are getting tough by the day as foreign banks are not providing financing against letters of credit (LCs) opened by oil marketing companies (OMCs) and refineries with the local banks, the Dawn News reported, citing its sources.

A senior official told the Pakistani daily that except two

large corporations - Pakistan State Oil (PSO) and Pak-Arab Refinery Limited (Parco) - all OMCs and refineries are struggling to arrange imports of petroleum products

and crude.

Shanghai, May 31: Shanghai authorities Tuesday began dismantling fences around housing compounds and ripping police tape off public squares and buildings, to the relief of the city's 25 million residents, before a painful two-month lockdown is lifted at midnight.

On Monday evening, some of the people allowed out of their compounds for brief walks took advantage of suspended traffic to congregate for a beer and icecream on deserted streets, but there was a sense of wariness and anxiety among residents.

Most will be stuck indoors again until midnight, as they have been for the past two months under a ruthlessly enforced lockdown that has caused income losses, stress and despair to millions struggling to access food or get emergency healthcare

The prolonged isolation has fuelled public anger and rare protests inside Shanghai and battered the city's manufacturing and export-heavy economy, disrupting supply chains in China

Rupee plunges to all-time low of 77.71 against dollar

Mumbai, May 31: The rupee declined by 17 paise to close at its alltime low of 77.71 against the US currency Tuesday as surging US bond yields dampened the appeal of riskier assets

Losses in the domestic equities, high crude oil prices and forex outflows also weighed on the rupee.

At the interbank foreign exchange market, the rupee opened lower at 77.65 against the greenback and finally settled at 77.71. down 17 paise over its previous

During the session, the rupee touched an intra-day low of 77.71 and a high of 77.62. On Monday, the rupee settled at 77.54 against the US dollar.

This is the fifth straight monthly decline for the rupee amid weak risk sentiments, foreign fund outflows and concerns over high inflation.

The dollar index, which gauges the greenback's strength against a basket of six currencies, was trading 0.5 per cent higher at 101.92.

Global oil benchmark Brent crude futures advanced 1.77 per cent to USD 123.82 per barrel.

According to Dilip Parmar, Research Analyst, HDFC Securities,



the rupee has become the worst-performing currency among Asian currencies and clocked the fifth monthly decline in a row in May on the back of foreign fund outflows and slower economic growth.

"Risk sentiments remained weak on worries over hawkish central banks following higher inflation and slower growth prospects, Parmar said.

US Treasury yields surged Tuesday following a Federal Reserve Governor's comments that the central bank should be prepared to raise interest rates by 50 basis points at every meeting on until inflation is decisively controlled.

timates (RE) of ₹17.65 lakh crore. The total expenditure too was higher at ₹37.94 lakh crore against the RE of ₹37.7 lakh crore presented to Parliament on February 1, 2021. CGA further said the revenue deficit at the end of the fiscal was 4.37 per cent for fiscal 2021-22.

In another set of data, the CGA said the fiscal deficit during the first month of 2022-23 was 4.5 per cent of the Budget Estimate for the current fiscal. The deficit was 5.2 per cent in the year-ago period. The government expects the fiscal deficit for the current financial year at 6.4 per cent of GDP or ₹16.61 lakh crore. In April 2022, there was a revenue surplus of ₹591 crore. Government

meets its fiscal deficit from market borrowings. Commenting on the data, Vivek Jalan, Partner, Tax Connect Advisory, said the revenue collections were around ₹27 lakh crore, almost ₹5 lakh crore above the budget estimates of around ₹22 lakh crore.

There was a growth of around 35% over the last year's revenue collection, led by growth of around 50 per cent indirect taxes and supported by around 20 per cent growth in indirect taxes, he said.

London, May 31: If you assumed crypto was just a young person's game, think again

More people in the United States than ever before are turning to cryptocurrencies to help fund their retirement, it seems, even as the recent market carnage provides a stark reminder that this wild market is not for the faint-hearted.

Some 27% of Americans aged 18-60 - around 50 million people - have owned or traded crypto in the past six months, a poll published last week by crypto exchange KuCoin found

Yet older folk are more devoted

to the young asset class than the general population, according to the survey carried out at the end of March, with 28% of those aged 50 and above betting on crypto as part of their early retirement plans.

Their most popular for investing in crypto were that they saw it as the future of finance, they didn't want to miss a hot trend, and they saw it as a way to diversify their portfolios.

The market turmoil of recent weeks has hushed talk earlier in 2022 that bitcoin and other crypto would win mainstream acceptance and be ushered into pension plans. "If they (investors) want crypto,

it should be a very small alloca-

tion of their portfolio, and they should be prepared to lose it," said Erik Knutzen, chief investment officer for multi-asset class strategies at Neuberger Berman

everybody."

French Open: Bopanna, Middelkoop sail through

Paris, May 31: India's Rohan Bopanna reached his first Grand he and his Dutch partner Matwe Middelkoop rallied to beat Llovd Glasspool and Henri Heliovaara in the men's doubles quarterfinals of the French Open, here.

The Indo-Dutch pair eked out a 4-6, 6-4, 7-6(10-3) win over the British-Finnish combination in a hardfought contest on Monday night.

Bopanna last reached the semifinals of a tennis Major at the 2015 Wimbledon Championships when he had teamed up with Romania's Florin Mergea and lost in a gruelling five-setter to Jean-Julien Rojer and Horia Tecau.

Bopanna, 42, and Middelkoop, 38, will face 12th seeds Marcelo Arevalo and Jean-Julien Roger Thursday in the last four. Bopanna and Middelkoop lost the opening set but dished out a superb fightback to win the next two to emerge vic-

In the decider, the Indo-Dutch pair showed tremendous mental fortitude to fightback from 3-5 down to take the match to a Super Tie-

They were again 0-3 behind but won 10 straight points to come up trumps. Bopanna and Middelkoop had saved five match points to knock out Mate Pavic and Nikola Mektic, the reigning Wimbledon champions, from the Roland Garros,

SWIATEK LOSES SET, BUT ADVANCES

Paris, May 31: The loss of one set by a player is normally not the stuff of headlines at a Grand Slam tournament. That did constitute news at the French Open, because the player was No.1-ranked Iga Swiatek and it had been more than a month since that happened to her.

The way it came about was noteworthy, too: She led the first set of her fourth-round match against 74th-ranked Zheng Qinwen of China 3-0, then 5-2, and was a point from claiming it on five occasions but could not seal the deal. Swiatek entered the day having won 20 sets in a row, and 48 of her preceding 49.

All that truly mattered, in the end, was that 2020 champion Swiatek would not lose another set on this cloudy evening, getting past the hard-swinging Zheng 6-7(5), 6-0, 6-2 to return to the quarterfinals at Roland Garros and run her winning streak to 32 consecutive matches.

Swiatek regrouped by changing tactics — she sped up her forehand instead of absorbing Zheng's power and in a less conventional way, too. deciding to change her tune. No, really: She switched which song she was singing in her head dur-

ing the match. She has won her past five tournaments, going unbeaten since February for the WTA's longest such stretch since Serena Williams compiled a 34-match run in 2013.



With 23-time Grand Slam champion Williams absent from the tour for nearly a year, and Swiatek's predecessor atop the rankings, twotime major winner Ash Barty, having recently retired, there is no dominant figure in women's tennis to mount a challenge

Next to try to stop Swiatek will be 11th-seeded Jessica Pegula, who advanced to her third major quarterfinal — and first in Paris — with a 4-6, 6-2, 6-3 victory over Irina-Camelia Begu of Romania, who

was fined USD 10,000 last week when she threw her racket and it bounced into the stands, brushing a child in a front-row seat.

Pegula, owner of a 2-3 record at Roland Garros before this year, saw two sides to taking on Swiatek, who beat her on a hard court at the Miami Open in March.

The other women's quarterfinal Wednesday will be between two Russians: No.20 Daria Kasatkina and No.29 Veronika Kudermetova. They were team-

mates on the team that won the Billie Jean King Cup last year -Russia was barred from trying to defend that title because of the country's invasion of Ukraine and have known each other since they were kids, squaring off as juniors as long ago as 2011.

Pegula, whose parents own the NFL's Buffalo Bills and NHL's Buffalo Sabres, joins two other American women in the quarterfinals.

Coco Gauff, an 18-year-old seeded 18th, and Sloane Stephens, the 2017 U.S. Open champion and 2018 French Open runner-up, face each other on Tuesday, when the other women's matchup will be No. 17 Leylah Fernandez, a 19-year-old

from Canada, against 54thranked Martina Trevisan of Italy. matches Men's

Wednesday are No.7 Andrey Rublev against 2014 Open champion Marin Cilic, and Holger Rune, a 19-yearold from Denmark, against No.8 Casper Ruud, a 23-year-old from

Cilic swept past 2021 US Open champion Daniil Medvedev 6-2, 6-3, 6-2 in Monday's last match, adding the departure of the men's No.2 seed to that of No.4 Stefanos

Tsitsipas earlier in the day. With Rune, who eliminated 2021 runner-up Tsitsipas 7-5, 3-6, 6-3, 6-4, and Alcaraz still in the field, it's the first time in 28 years that two teens made the men's quarterfinals at any Grand Slam tournament.

Messi backs Benzema for Ballon d'Or Anand beats Carlsen, finishes 4th

Buenos Aires, May 31: According to Lionel Messi, there is "no doubt" that Real Madrid striker Karim Benzema deserves to win his first Ballon d'Or award this year. Messi has won a record seven

Ballon d'Or awards as the world's best player, but saw his new club Paris Saint-Germain eliminated by Madrid in the round of 16 of the Champions League this year — after Benzema scored a hat trick in the second half of the return leg.

Benzema netted another four goals against Chelsea in the quarterfinals and three against Manchester City in the semifinals — including the decisive penalty in extra time of the second leg - before Madrid defeated Liverpool 1-0 in the final on Saturday. Benzema was also the top scorer in the Spanish league as Madrid won the title in dominant fashion.

'There's no doubt, it's very clear that Benzema had a spectacular year," Messi said in an interview to Argentine TV channel TyC Sports when asked if Benzema should get the prestigious award. "I think there is no doubt this year." In total, Benzema scored 44 goals



in 46 matches with his club this season, and equaled Madrid great Raúl González as the club's second-highest scorer with 323 goals. Cristiano Ronaldo leads that tally

While Madrid knocked out a quartet of European giants on their way to the Champions League title, Messi wasn't overly impressed with the team's style of play. Madrid needed big comebacks against both

PSG and Man City and had

Benzema to thank both times. "Out of the blue they score against you, and the match changes automatically," Messi said about this Madrid team. "Madrid was not the best team in this Champions League, there were better teams."

The 34-year-old Messi is training with Argentina in Bilbao for the "Finalissima" — a friendly between the Copa America winners and European champion Italy

Messi could find himself going up against Benzema again at the World Cup in Qatar this year both Argentina and France are among the main contenders — but insisted that defending champion France should be considered the fa-

"France is an impressive team, (four years) ago we said they could be candidates and they ended as winners. I believe the hit they took at the Euros (being eliminated by Switzerland) made them stronger,' Messi said.

"(Argentina) can fight anyone and will make it hard for any rival. That doesn't mean we are the favorites to be world champions or any of that. It means we will fight against anvone.
