The Russian retreat could prove a decisive turning point

in the 6-month-old war

Kyiv, Sept 11: Ukrainian forces Sunday pushed their counteroffensive in the country's east, exploiting quick gains they made in a week of fighting that has sharply changed the course of the conflict. Ukraine's quick action to re-

claim Russia-occupied areas in the northeastern Kharkiv region forced Moscow to withdraw its troops to prevent them from being surrounded and leave behind significant numbers of weapons and munitions in a hasty retreat as the war marked 200 days Sunday. This could prove a decisive turning point in the 6-month-old war.

The jubilant Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy mocked the Russians in a video address late Saturday, saying that "the Russian army in these days is demonstrating the best that it can do — showing its back.'

The Russians' pullback marked the biggest battlefield success for Ukrainian forces since they thwarted a Russian attempt to seize the capital, Kyiv, at the start

of the the war. The retreat drew angry comments from Russian military bloggers, who bemoaned it as a major defeat and urged the Kremlin to respond by stepping up war efforts. Many scathingly criticised Russian authorities for continuing with fireworks and other lavish festivities in Moscow that



marked a city holiday Saturday de-

Just as the Russian forces were hastily pulling back from Izyum under Ukrainian fire, Russian President Vladimir Putin attended the opening of a huge observation wheel at a Moscow park, a new transport link and a sports arena. The action underlined the Kremlin's effort to continue pretending that the war it calls a "special military operation" was going according to plan without affecting the situation in the country.

New Delhi, Sept 11: International oil prices have hit a seven-month low but there is no fall in retail selling price of petrol and diesel in India to bring relief to consumers and ease inflationary pressures as state-owned fuel retailers recoup losses incurred for holding rates for a record five months despite rising cost.

International benchmark Brent crude fell below USD 90 per barrel last week for the first time since early February as recession fears weigh on demand. It has since recovered and is trading at USD 92.84 per barrel, the lowest in six months.

But this has not led to any revision in retail petrol and diesel prices in India and they continue to be on freeze for a recordsetting 158 days.

Responding to reporters' questions, Oil Minister Hardeep Singh Puri had Friday said: "When (international oil) prices were high, our (petrol and diesel) prices were already low ... Have we recouped all our losses?" He, however, did not elaborate on the losses incurred on keeping rates steady since April 6.

Excise duty on petrol went up by a

2021-22, thus burdening the common man. The government's revenue generation through levy of excise duty saw a growth of 126% between 2014-15 and 2021-22. The income growth was 186% during the same period.

According to official data provided by the Petroleum Ministry's Petroleum Planning and Analysis Cell (PPAC), excise duty on petrol was ₹9.48 per litre and on diesel it was ₹3.56 per litre in 2014-15 when the NDA government came to power.

In 2021-22, excise duty on petrol rose 194% to ₹27.90 per litre and on diesel it rose 512% to stand at ₹21.80 per litre.

Interestingly between 2015-16 and 2021-22, while excise duties on petrol and diesel rose steadily, crude oil prices remained consistently below \$80 per barrel and even slid below the \$50 per barrel mark on three occasions.

While crude oil was at \$84.16 per barrel in 2014-15, it fell sharply to stand at \$46 per barrel and \$47 per barrel in 2015-16 and 2016-17 respectively. Contd...4

Fake currency notes of ₹16 lakh seized

Bhubaneswar: A person from Delhi was arrested in Rourkela district after fake Indian currency notes with a face value of over ₹16 lakh were

recovered from his possession, police said Sunday. Acting on a tip-off, a special task force of the crime branch with help of the district police apprehended the person from Sector-17 area of Rourkela Saturday and seized the fake notes from him, a senior officer said. The accused, who hails from Badarpur area of Delhi, has been residing in a north Odisha city, he said. "Fake Indian currency notes with a face value of ₹16.11 lakh, a laptop, a colour printer and other incriminating articles were recovered from his possession," the officer said. A case has been registered at Sector 15 police station for necessary legal action.

SC to hear over 200 PILs today

New Delhi: The Supreme Court is scheduled to hear over 200 PILs Monday including a batch of petitions challenging the constitutional validity of the contentious Citizenship (Amendment) Act. A bench headed by Chief Justice UU Lalit is scheduled to hear the petitions challenging the validity of the CAA whose enactment had triggered widespread protests across the country. According to the list of businesses uploaded on the apex court's website, a bench comprising the Chief Justice and Justice S Ravindra Bhat has posted 220 petitions for hearing, including the lead plea by the Indian Union of Muslim League against the CAA. Several PILs pending for a couple of years in the top court will also be taken up for hearing.

BMC tax collection up, thanks to online system

Bhubaneswar, Sept 11: The Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation (BMC) has recorded a significant growth in tax collection after it switched to online mode of tax collection, an official said Sunday

According to sources, the civic body had collected ₹4,40,25,000 as trade licence fee and ₹39,62,07,573 as holding tax from areas under its jurisdiction in 2018-19 offline.

In 2019-20, when the civic body allowed partial online collection, it recorded holding tax collection of ₹42,46,41,137 and ₹4,02,62,353 as trade licence fee.

Similarly, in 2020-21 when it went for complete online collection, BMC saw a collection of ₹60,33,12,034 as holding tax and ₹3,86,27,055 as trade licence fee.



In 2021-22. the civic body recorded a collection of ₹4,53,83,423 as trade licence fee and ₹62,82,25,054 as holding tax.

BMC Commissioner Vijay Amruta Kulange said, "Citizens have found it convenient to pay their taxes or apply for trade licenses under one umbrella application of Bhubaneswarme. The online mode, which provides a range of services, has enhanced revenue collection efficiency from source and has also helped main-



tained transparency in terms of assessment and collection of holding tax/trade license.³

As the civic authority has set a target of collecting around ₹120 crore towards holding tax in this financial year, it plans to launch a door-to-door survey and trade licence audit to check tax evasion and bring all residential and commercial stakeholders under the purview of the online tax payment system. Although the BMC has planned reassessment of around 62,000 houses for holding tax under its ju risdiction in 2021-22, sources said that revenue generation could have been better as thousands of households, traders and business establishments are either out of tax bracket or have been paying tax without re-assessment of their structure.

Similarly around 55 per cent of vendors are said not to have renewed their licenses, causing loss to the civic authority.

"We will start tax collection drives in different wards which will also include creating awareness among people for payment of their dues or renewal of license. Emphasis will also be laid on providing Point of Sale devices in the wards to enable the officers for collecting holding tax through online process at the doorsteps," said BMC Mayor Sulochna Das.

Bhubaneswar; Sept 11: Thousands of contractual employees working in different Odisha government departments Sunday staged a massive demonstration here demanding total abolition of the contractual appointment system in the state administration

The members of the Odisha Government Contractual Employees' Association (OGCEA) including teachers, police, assistants and other employees of Class-

He said the government appoints contractual employees after they clear the competitive examinations. They are recruited as contractual government employees for a period of six years drawing a paltry salary despite their high educational qualification, the association said

"It is sheer discrimination by the government. While the regular employees get good salary, we are given a paltry salary. Are the regular employees purchasing petrol at higher price than us or are they paying more while getting their rations," asked Anita Behera, a woman contractual employee.

She alleged that the six years of contractual service is not added to the original service period for which the promotion is delayed by six years. The contractual employees are also not getting DA, HRA and other benefits.

"We have a genuine demand of equal pay for equal work as "We have been taken for granted the contractual employees also perform the same duty as the regular staff," Malla said. Lokayukta solved 3,132 cases in three years

Bhubaneswar; Sept 11: The Odisha Lokayukta has solved 3,132 cases in the last three years, whereas the ombudsman has received a total of 3,331 complaints during that period, as per the information accessed through an RTI plea filed by human rights activist Biswapriva Kanungo.

In 2019, the Lokayukta registered 1,132 cases out of which 714 were disposed of. Similarly, 1,409 and 790 cases were lodged at the Lokayukta during 2020 and 2021 respectively. The anti-corruption ombuds-

man completed trial in 1,537 cases in 2020, while as many as 881 were disposed of in 2021.



In 2019, the Lokayukta had spent ₹4,80,18,263 out of the sanctioned budget of ₹7,91,95,000. Similarly, ₹5, 55,90,347 was spent out of the ₹7,9,38,000 granted by the state government in 2020.

The Lokayukta spent ₹7, 81,11,637 of the budget amount of ₹8,14,90,000 in 2021.

In 2019, the Lokayukta registered 1,132 cases out of which 714 were disposed of

The RTI plea brought to fore the fact that the state had spent ₹67,252 on Lokayukta to solve a case of corruption in 2019.

The cost per case came down to ₹36,000 due to the increase in the number of cases disposed by it in 2020.

However, the cost significantly

rose to ₹88,662 in 2021 for the dis-

posal of less number of cases. Lokayukta was created to ad-

dress the grievances of the public against public representatives and public servants like ministers, legislators, and administrative officials in matters related to misuse of power, failures in administration and corruption.

After the passage of the Lokpal and Lokayukta's Act, 2013 in the Parliament, and it becoming a law from January 16, 2014, under the act each state was required to appoint its Lokayukta within a year.

First formed under the Odisha Lokayukta and Deputy Lokayukta Act, the authority in the state was then approved by the President of India.

Bhubaneswar, Sept 11: On the occasion of National Forest Martyrs' Day, Forest, Environment and Climate Change Minister Pradip Kumar Amat Sunday inaugurated a Forest Martyrs' Memorial Tower at the **Regional Plant Research Centre** in the City here.

'The tower is built in memory of the 21 forest martyrs who laid their lives for the protection of the forest and wildlife in the state,' said Amat. The Forest Minister paid tributes to the martyrs and stressed upon the importance of awareness among people for the safety of the forest and animals dwelling in it. He also said that rules of forest safety must be enforced strictly as protection of forest will help keep the environment and the world safe.

Earlier, a martyrs' tower had come up at Dangamal in Bhitarkanika National Park in memory of forest officials who sacrificed their lives to protect the flora and fauna of the park. Five forest personnel had lost their lives while being on conservation work in Bhitarkanika and Gahirmatha marine sanctuarv as they were killed either bytimber mafia or fishermen or died of crocodile attack.

Bhubaneswar; Sept 11: The state's Covid-19 tally mounted to 13,30,240 Sunday as 245 more people, including 43 children, tested positive for the infection, a health bulletin said.

The toll rose to 9,185 as one more person succumbed to the disease, it said, adding that fifty-three other Covid-19 patients have died due to comorbidities so far.

Odisha had reported 269 infections Saturday.

The state now has 1,756 active cases, while 246 more people recuperated from the disease in the last 24 hours, taking the total number of recoveries to 13,19,246, the bulletin said.

The daily positivity rate was at 1.88 per cent as the new coronavirus infections were detected from 13,050 sample tests, it added.

n the last few days, several inci-dents have come to light where a man suddenly fell due to an attack and died. In an incident from Uttar Pradesh's Bareilly, a 48-year-old man died after he suddenly fell while dancing during a birthday party.

In one such incident, Yogesh Gupta, a resident of Jammu, collapsed and died on stage in the middle of his performance. Many such incidents have been reported in the recent past which has sparked a new debate whether such attacks

are on the rise in the post-Covid era. No, it is not always a heart attack, says Tarun Kumar, Professor of Cardiology, RML Hospital. He said, 'We hear people make these statements often interchangeably when someone has a heart condition. But they are not synonyms.'

"A heart attack is when blood flow to the heart is blocked, while sudden cardiac arrest is when the heart malfunctions and suddenly stops beating unexpectedly. A heart attack is a 'circulation' problem and

sudden cardiac arrest is an 'electrical' problem," explained Kumar. Sudden cardiac arrest can occur

after a heart attack, or during the recovery. Heart attacks increase the risk for sudden cardiac arrest. Most heart attacks do not lead to sudden cardiac arrest. But when sudden cardiac arrest occurs, heart attack is a common cause, he said.

Kumar further said that other heart conditions may also disrupt the heart's rhythm and lead to sudden cardiac arrest. These include a thickened heart muscle (cardiomyopathy), heart failure, ar-

rhythmias, particularly ventricular fibrillation, and long Q-T syndrome. He added that cardiac arrest is

reversible if it is treated within a few minutes. Call for emergency medical services and begin CPR (Cardiopulmonary resuscitation) immediately and continue until professional emergency medical services arrive.

chances of survival rises to double or triple fold and bystander CPR, it can prove lifesaving in out of hospital cardiac arrest, he said.

On the rise of such cases post Covid-era, Kumar said this is mainly due to two reasons. Firstly, reduced physical activity during the Covid era and even after that. Secondly, because of wide availability of smartphones or CCTV footage, such incidents in no time come to



Internet and go viral.

Apart from the heart related ailments, the pandemic has triggered an array of emotional, physical, and economic issues. The post-Covid emerging literature underlines the impact of various traumatic stressors related to Covid-19 which has already led to diverse mental health problems, including anxiety, depression, posttraumatic stress disorder, and other trauma- and stressrelated disorders adversely affecting both the frontline warrior doctors and the patients.

Declining mental health remains a silent epidemic in India and the urban lifestyles are primary drivers. Amid the health workers' emotional toll of caring for the unwell. their own mental health tends to be even more neglected, negatively impacting their physical and emotional health.

Their unpredictable and erratic work schedules with long working hours and exposure to human suffering frequently results in mental blockage and burnout," said Deepak Sharma, Co-Founder and CEO, MedLern.

When healthcare professionals seek treatment for substance abuse or mental health issues, they are frequently regarded as less capable and unpredictable. The emotional, psychological, and social well-being are crucial. The important aspect is how we respond to stress, he said. IANS

Why are some people mosquito magnets and others unbothered?

A medical entomologist Jonathan Day, Emeritus Professor of Medical Entomology, University of Florida points to metabolism, body odour and mindset

including humans, release with each breath and through their skin. Mosquitoes are very sensitive to

CO2 and can sense a CO2 source that is many metres away. Receptor cells on the mosquito's antennae and legs bind CO2 molecules and send an electrical signal to the brain. When more molecules hit their receptors, the higher the CO₂ concentration and the closer they are to the host. However, there are many nonliving carbon dioxide sources such as cars, boats, planes and trains. To separate living from nonliving sources of CO2, mosquitoes rely on the secondary olfactory cues that living animals produce. Metabolic processes like breathing and moving generate these scent cues, including lactic acid, ammonia and fatty acids that act as additional olfactory clues that help female mosquitoes zero in on their next blood meal

the first mark of a mosquito magnet. Because the production of CO2 and secondary attractants is linked to metabolic rate, the higher the metabolic rate, the more attractants are produced. Metabolic rate can be genetically determined, but it also increases as the result of physical activity

The human mosquito magnets you can spot at summer parties may have a genetically high metabolic rate or may be more physically active than other attendees. They may also be undertaking other activities that increase their metabolic rate, such as the consumption of alcohol. Increased metabolic rate is why runners attract more mosquitoes during their cooldown stretching exercises. Pregnant women, perhaps due to their increased metabolic rate, attract a disproportionately large number of mosquitoes as well.

Malkangiri, Sept 11: The district health department has claimed that consumption of excessive country liquor and toxic food has led to the death of villagers at Haladikund village under Mathili block of Malkangiri district as a joint team of public representatives and health officials visited the village Sunday and took stock of the situation.

The team comprising zilla parishad chairperson Shamari Tangul, chief district medical of-

Jajpur, Sept 11: The state government has completed satellite mapping of 29 black stone mines under Dharmasala block of Jajpur district but absence of government officials during the process has sparked doubts over the assessment of losses.

It has been alleged that undue favour has been shown to some influential leaseholders during the satellite mapping of their mines. It is also alleged that some influential leaseholders who are in the ruling party are opposing the satellite mapping as it may expose the irregularities they have carried



out during mining.

People apprehend that this time the lessees might be able to give slip due to lack of coordination among various government agencies. On being directed by the state government, the district administration has hired a private agency 'My World Consultancy Agency' to carry out the satellite mapping

and transported it in fake transit of the mines. Speculations are rife whether forms in alleged connivance of revenue, police, forest, local the satellite mapping will at all be able to crack the large scale irpublic representatives and regularities committed in mining district officials.

Several cases have been filed in Orissa High Court, state Lokayukta and National Green Tribunal but the illegal mining is yet to be stopped.

The impacts of the illegal mining have been severe. The water bodies near the mines have been polluted while people live with constant dust pollution. The affected villagers have lodged several protests with the government agencies but to no avail and police are backing the lessees

Jenapur police have lodged over 70 cases against the protestors but very few cases against the lessees and traders where there over 500 mines including sanctioned and illegal mines.

Over 25 labourers have been crushed to death while working in these mines. However, police have termed these deaths to have occurred because of other reasons.

The state government woke up to the rampant loot of black stones and ordered for satellite mapping of the mines after questions were raised in the state Assembly in its session in the month of March. Meanwhile, four lessees have been asked to pay ₹105.87 crore after satellite mapping but the district administration is yet to collect a pie from them.

Earlier, lessees have been directed to pay penalty but the matters are sub-judice in court. They have been able to give slip to the gov ernment as the district administration failed to produce necessary papers in court in time.

The illegal mining at Barada quarry No-1 is a case in this point. The quarry measuring 2 acre and 50 decimal was given on lease to one Prahallad Lenka in 2017-18. Lenka was given approval for mining of black stone of 1,764 cubic metre from this 2 acre 50 decimal area.

He however, extracted stones from 7 acre of land more than the prescribed limits. He is alleged to have extracted 30 lakh tonne of black stone annually which amounts to 1.50 crore tones total during last five years.

When contacted, Dharmasala tehsildar Swagat Das said currently only border areas are being aligned in satellite mapping. The government will remain present and take note of any irregularities when the actual measurement will be done

he delusion creating statement by India that it has reached an accord with China which will imply withdrawal of combatants of both countries from Patrolling Point 15 in Eastern Ladakh will certainly go down well with the applauding domestic crowd. No one will question whether this was the point where both sides faced each other in 2014. It is to be noted that this point was well within Indian territory previously. Indian Army's withdrawal means vacating territory that always belonged to India. The Army has gradually but persistently been pushed back by the People's Liberation Army (PLA) over the past few years. This withdrawal is an open relinquishment of Indian land. The PLA, on the other hand, would be interested to bring the boiling situation to a lower simmering scenario since it has a much greater threat brewing in the Taiwan Straits.

Domestic politics of bravado and belligerence has convinced the average Indian that the nation and its armed forces are equipped and capable to face and defeat both China and Pakistan together. This dangerous misconception is clearly exposed in a survey conducted for Stimson Center which shows unnatural nationalistic sentiment at a dangerous new high. This survey shows that about 90 percent of Indians feel that their country would defeat Pakistan in the event of a war, while 72 per cent believe that India would defeat China in a war. Admittedly, a nation with a high morale is always better equipped to meet aggression and war. One of the best current examples is Ukraine

which, according to today's reports, has been able to not only slow down but effectively turn the tide of war, no matter how temporary, and is pushing the Russian army back. While Ukraine's patriotism and persistence needs to be admired, it has also to be noted that plenty of arms, ammunition and other help is pouring in for that country from the Western world, especially the US. Modern warfare hinges on tactics but also on firepower. It now has started depending a lot more on electronic



and drone based technology to add an edge that was not required earlier. In India's case, it is not the ability of the armed forces that can be questioned. Their valour and determination have stood the test of extremely difficult times in the past and our combatants have always come out with flying colours. The problem for India that should bother every citizen is centred on equipment, tactical weapons, sufficient ammunition and the logistics required for withstanding the pressures of prolonged warfare. Apart from the need of hardware, the most important aspect of modern warfare is foreign policy. Again, let us take a look at Ukraine whose President Zelenskyy has spent a great deal of time, energy and intellect to reach out to and build bridges with all countries across the globe singlehandedly. Our Prime Minister, in his preliminary 3-4 years had attempted to build personal rapport with world leaders but, unlike Ukraine, India today has no friends who would stand by it in case of a military engagement. This holds true even with every immediate neighbour including Bangladesh. The gross failure of foreign policy is going to be a huge impediment for India. The current arch foe of China is the US. With this fact in the backdrop, it must be noted that America is unlikely to come to India's help after the recent political and strategic missteps taken by New Delhi. The Prime Minister's involvement in the last US election and open support for Donald Trump would be rankling in the minds of the US Democrats. Added to this is the more recent event of India unwilling to condemn Russia for its invasion of Ukraine. Such acts have acutely distanced India from the West

Then comes the issue of 'Make in India' where weapons and ammunition for the armed forces are expected to be domestically produced. Limitations on imports of weaponry and critical parts have already been put in place without considering the unavailability of local production strength. Unfortunately, India does not have a Northrop Grumman, Lockheed Martin, Raytheon or even a Dassault. The government owned arms manufacturing units such as HAL, IOF and all shipyards have been completely neglected and demoralised over the past decade. Huge private companies such as Adani and Tata have studiously kept themselves away from the field of production of military equipment and the reasons for this are not difficult to understand. Yet it is these few massive Indian corporates which have benefitted the most from the tax payers' money. In a critical war situation, India will be incapable of arming and supporting its forces for any extended period. If no external help comes in huge quantities. Indian military could be

Some argue that poor countries should focus on development rather than decarbonisation; others advocate "green development," which would involve leapfrogging fossil fuels altogether. Meanwhile, rich countries, multilateral institutions, and major lenders like China are all phasing out development financing for fossil-fuel projects even as they reopen their own coal-fired power plants. What are developing countries supposed to think? To capitalise on high oil and gas prices, some are auctioning off their peatlands and rainforests for drilling and mining. Not mincing words, the Democratic Republic of the Congo's lead climate representative recently pointed out that his country's priority is to achieve stronger growth, "not to save the planet." This way of framing the matter is understandable, given the rich world's longstanding failure to meet its promises and help finance climate mitigation and adaptation in the Global South. But the supposed tradeoff between economic development and green policies is unconvincing-or at least suffers from a high degree of short-termism. Study after study has shown that the catastrophic effects of unfettered

But this is a bit like concluding at the beginning of the twentieth century that "it is not probable that man will ever be able to get along without the horse," and choosing to specialise in horse-carriage technology. Finally, the tradeoff narrative assumes that highly polluting options are cheaper, whereas green technologies are a luxury that only affluent countries can afford. Yet even if this is true at the moment, the gap is rapidly shrinking; the green option will soon be cheaper, too.

public and private investments such as those in the European Green Deal or the US Inflation Reduction Act - green technologies' descent abating the costs of energy transition worldwide, and making fossil-fueled development relatively more expensive. Some countries in the Global South are already putting these principles into practice. Ethiopia, for example, aims to reach middle-income status by building a green economy, with investments in afforestation, renewables, and improved transportation systems. And Kenya likewise has become a low-carbon trailblazer. As Ricardo Hausmann of Harvard University observes, "green development" is no longer an oxymoron. On the contrary, it is the only realistic option. To achieve sustained growth, each country must determine how it can best contribute to the global green supply chain, based on its comparative advantages. These may lie in extracting the raw materials needed for the green transition, producing and exporting renewable electricity and hydrogen, or manufacturing advanced green products at home. Either way, growth in the coming decades will be green. Countries that don't get on board now risk being left behind.

Bodger

his term was once common around the furniture-making town of High This term was once common around the furner of the back words on t were skilled itinerant wood-turners, who worked in the beech woods on the chalk hills of the Chilterns. They cut timber and converted it into chair legs by turning it on a pole lathe, an ancient and very simple tool that uses the spring of a bent sapling to help run it. Their equipment was so easy to move and set up that it was easier to go to the timber and work it there than to transport it to a workshop. The completed chair legs were sold to furniture factories to be married with other chair parts made in the workshop. The word only appears at the end of the nineteenth century. There may be a link - through the idea of a itinerant person - with a much older sense of the word, for a travelling merchant or chapman. The Oxford English Dictionary finds examples of this meaning from the eighteenth century, but there's a much earlier one from Holinshed's Chronicles of 1577 (a major source for Shakespeare) in which William Harrison rails against bodgers who bought up supplies of wheat to sell abroad, leaving nothing for local people to make their bread with. But that leaves us with another sense, the more common one (at least in Britain and Australia) of an incompetent mender of things, which Americans and some British people may prefer to see spelled botcher. In both spellings this comes from the Middle English bocchen, which had a sense of repairing or patching. It could be significant that in medieval times it was a neutral term that had no associations with doing a job badly. It's possible that this old sense of the word survived in dialect or local usage, and evolved into the furniture bodger, while its meaning in the standard language changed. Yet another sense of bodger is hinted at by a line in the Flanders and Swann song that mentioned the rhinoceros having a "bodger on his bonce". Many people have written to say that they know a bodger as a pointed instrument for various purposes. For example Doug Dew wrote: "From my childhood in Surrey, I have a vague memory of the use of the word bodger to mean a blunt stick or tool used to make holes in the ground for seeds". Alan Harrison added: "Bodge is certainly in use in Black Country dialect for poking or making a hole. I have heard my father use bodger of an instrument used to make holes, as for example when making an extra hole in a belt when the wearer has gained or lost weight". Tony Chadwick, Professor of French at the Memorial University of Newfoundland, remembers the late Dr George Storey, co-editor of the Dictionary of Newfoundland English, applying bodger to one of those pointed sticks for picking up litter. Others have mentioned that it is the usual name for the tool used by scaffolders. which has a spanner/wrench at one end and a point at the other.

the Global South will use fossil fuels to escape destitution and invest in decarbonisation only later. Following the same path that rich countries took will lead to climate havoc. Like everyone else, poor countries need to contribute as much as possible to the global decarbonisation effort not to "save the planet" but to save themselves from even more severe droughts, floods, famines, and instability.

Moreover, the idea that highly polluting economic growth should be prioritised over green investments rests on the premise that there will be a market for highly polluting goods in the future. But looking beyond the short term, it is already clear that a combination of changing consumer preferences, carbon border taxes, sustainability provisions in trade treaties, and various regulatory requirements and labeling standards in rich countries will render pollution-intensive options a bad investment.

In this likely future, developing countries could end up locked into products and technologies that the rest of the world regards as antiquated or inferior – be it internal combustion engine components, "fast fashion" garments, unrecyclable plastics, or fossil fuels.

This is already true of solar and wind energy in many parts of the world, and EVs, meat alternatives, and other products are sure to follow the same path. Owing to large

Sir, New research by The Lancet points out that an alarming 47% of antibiotics consumed by patients undergoing treatment in the private sector in 2019 were formulations that did not have the nod of the drug regulator. Given that the private sector contributes to over 85% of the total consumption of antibiotics, this practice assumes alarming proportions and raises safety and efficacy concerns. There are no proper surveillance systems for monitoring antibiotic usage in our country and irrational antibiotic consumption is rampant. The problem is compounded due to the free availability of antibiotics at chemist shops without a doctor's prescription. Its irrational usage by quacks and even many qualified doctors is resulting in antibiotic resistance. The slow progress in healing this critical component of healthcare highlights the fact that the authorities' attempts to find a way out of the complex web of causative factors have been ineffective. Poverty is at the root of this rampant illegality, for a majority of the patients can't afford proper treatment and the near absence of medical insurance drives them to quacks or pharmacies that blatantly sell drugs without prescriptions. Such patients, thus, fall into a vicious trap as over-the-counter antibiotics and their illmatched combinations often lead to resistance to drugs. The drug regulators need to devise a stricter system of controls and checks as the spurious production and sale of unapproved pills and potions undermine India's reputation as the leading producer of Abhijit Roy, JAMSHEDPUR generic drugs.

them saying they follow dynastic (Parivarvaad) politics and are corrupt. But now it wants alliance with TDP's Chandrababu Naidu in Andhra. The Prime Minister had a brief 'bump in' meeting with Naidu which followed a meeting of his son Nara Lokesh with Home Minister Amit Shah to discuss the contours of alliance. The TDP had supported the NDA candidate in Presidential polls. The BJP was keen for an alliance with the ruling YSRCP. But the latter was reluctant due to its own political compulsions. In Haryana, it is working hard to bring various factions of the Devi Lal's family. Two factions; Dushyant Chautala-led JJP and Ranjit Singh are already part of the NDA. But the BJP wants the Abhay Chautala- led INLD to be part of a greater alliance to give Bhupinder Singh Hooda-led Congress a united fight. It is also trying for a patch up between the two factions of LJP; one led by Union Minister,

Pashupati Paran and the other led by Chirag Paswan, Lok Sabha MP and son of late Ram Vilas Paswan. In Tamil Nadu, it is working hard to bring the EPS and OPS factions together though the EPS faction won a legal battle. The BJP has altered its strategy in crucial states of Andhra Pradesh, Bihar, Tamil Nadu and Haryana as the leadership has sensed the danger emerging.

Why Lalpura inducted

he inclusion of Iqbal Singh Lalpura, chairman of national minority commission, is the first Sikh to be inducted into the BJP's Central Parliamentary Board. This may have caused a surprise in the political circles in Punjab and outside. But this is part of a larger scheme of things by the BJP. It could have made Lok Sabha MP SS Ahluwalia a parliamentary board's member who is senior-most Sikh in the

BJP. But he continues to remain on the sidelines in the party. It did not induct another Sikh and Petroleum and Housing & Urban Development minister Hardeep Singh Puri either. Lalpura's induction shows that the party wanted to promote a completely new face and is in line with the party's attempts to build its own base in Punjab after its longstanding ally, the Shiromani Akali Dal, snapped ties with it.

Hit hard by staff crunch

he Prime Minister's Office, President House, Cabinet Secretariat and other ministries and departments of the Central government are facing acute manpower shortage. If the PMO is facing 30% manpower shortage, the President's House has 24% less work force. The DOPT which is directly under the PMO faces a 22% staff shortage. It's the same story in the Cabinet Secretariat and other ministries. The

UPSC, the Centre's key recruiting body, has 35% less manpower. The department of Science and Technology is facing its worst with a 70% shortage in vacancies. It has 3,899 staff though sanctioned strength is 12,442.

Harivansh to remain **RS Deputy Chairman**

Rajya Sabha Deputy Chairman Harivansh was in a dilemma about his continuation as his party, Janata Dal (U), had severed ties with the BJP. Being a JD (U) Rajya Sabha MP, he was expected to quit the post. When he did not attend the meeting of all party MPs and MLAs in Patna last month, it was seen as an act of defiance. But Nitish Kumar is reported to have conveyed to him that he may continue to hold the post as he was elected unanimously by the entire House in August 2018 and it is a non-partisan post.







India-Myanmar border: Narco corridor to hotspot for smugglers of exotic animals

Guwahati/Aizawl, Sept 11: The 1,643-km long India-Myanmar unfenced borders, which have already turned into a hotspot of illegal trade in various highly addictive drugs, gold, arms and ammunition and other contra band, have also become an easy route for smuggling of endangered and exotic animals from Myanmar.

According to the central paramilitary officials, the exotic animals are illegally traded and transported to India's northeast region mainly on two routes. One is east ern Mizoram's Champhai district bordering Myanmar and the other is from Moreh in Chandel district in southern Manipur.

Moreh, along the India-Myanmar border, is 110 km south of Manipur capital Imphal and just four km west of Myanmar's biggest border town Tamu (in Sagaing Region). It has been a famous cross border trading centre for decades

Those arrested in Assam Mizoram and Manipur with the smuggled animals confessed that they were paid to deliver their consignments to West Bengal, specifically the Alipurduar-Cooch Behar-Jalpaiguri-Siliguri belt.

Forest officials said Myanmar, now under military rule, has been the hub of most exotic and rare animals smuggled into the northeastern states, specially Mizoram and Manipur, and then to northern West Bengal and other places in the country. The Assam Police, in one of the biggest seizures of smuggled animals, September 8 seized 40 rare and exotic animals, including 19 primates and two baby wal-

northeastern states, bordering Myanmar, have become an active route for smuggling exotic animals and various drugs from South East Asian countries to mainland India. According to the officials, these

animals are smuggled from countries such as Thailand. Indonesia and Myanmar where there are exotic animal breeding farms.

There were instances that exotic animals seized in West Bengal and Andhra Pradesh were smuggled from Myanmar and ferried through Mizoram to these states

Forest and wildlife officials in North Bengal found four smuggled kangaroos in the Gajoldoba area of Jalpaiguri in April. Two more kangaroos - one dead, the other injured - were found in the Dabgram forest range.

The West Bengal Forest officials also rescued four monkeys smuggled from Indonesia from a Siliguri bound bus earlier this year.

According to the CEO of Aaranyak Dr Bibhab Kumar Talukdar of the Assam-based green group Aaranvak, there seems to be a trend of keeping exotic animals as pets leading to the rising trafficking in animals Pointing out the links between wildlife crimes, narco-terrorism and arms smuggling, Talukdar said, "Synergy among various enforcement agencies including forest, police, central forces and judiciary is the need of the hour in combating the global menace of wildlife crimes.

WB, UNICEF rope in SHGs to check child marriage, pregnancy

Kolkata, Sept 11: The West Bengal government in collaboration with UNICEF will form child-friendly 'sanghas' (clusters), comprising members of self-help groups, to curb child marriage and teenage pregnancy in the state, which is the highest in the country.

To stop these twin menaces, the state government and UNICEF have planned, as a pilot project, to form 110 child-friendly 'sanghas' in the next six months in 87 blocks in all 23 districts of the state, a UNICEF release said here.

This initiative is aimed at addressing the issues that affect the lives of SHG members and their family members, Vibhu Goel, State Mission Director and CEO of West Bengal State Rural Livelihood Mission (SRLM), said at the end of a validation workshop held here Friday.

West Bengal is at the top in cases of child marriage and teenage pregnancy, according to a National Family Health Survey report.

As per the data available, after the National Family Health Survey 5 was conducted in 2019-20, a total 41.6 per cent of women aged between 20 and 24 years were married off while they were teenagers, and 16.4 per cent of girls in their teens became mothers, the report said.

In the first phase of the programme, the members of the 'sanghas' would pledge not to get their children married off under age Goel said.

The project will also look into improving the health of children and mothers as 70.8 per cent of adolescent girls are anaemic in the state. UNICEF will provide technical support through training and development of tools and SRLM will mobilise the members.

Thermocol ban just ahead of Manipuri woman weaves success with lotus silk Durga puja puts artists in a fix THE YOUNG ENTREPRENEUR, WHO LIVES CLOSE TO LOTUS-FILLED LOKTAK LAKE, HAS **EMPLOYED 30 WOMEN AND SEEKS TO EMPLOY MORE LOCALS IN HER UNIQUE VENTURE**

Kolkata, Sept 11: The Centre's ban on thermocol (polystyrene) just three months ahead of the Durga Puja festival has put artisans of West Bengal in a fix as they use that product for long to decorate pandals and embellish ornaments of the idols

The artists feel that it would have been better had the government launched an awareness campaign among them about the item's bad effect on the environment and given time to them to find out an alternative product.

Internationally known artist Sanatan Dinda welcomed the move but said artisans should have been given some time for the transformation.

"Most people go for thermocol based decorations. They should have been trained first and then the ban should have been imposed," he said.

"I used thermocol in the past but shunned it a long time ago. In this year's puja, I am using iron, paper, different kinds of clay and fibreglass for my work," said Dinda who is bringing alive the concept of a couple of Durga pujas in Kolkata.



Artist Pradip Das also supported the government's decision. "The government also must ensure that thermocol is not manufactured. People cannot use it if it is not available in the market," Das said, adding that he is using pieces of cloth to give shape to the theme for another puja organiser in the city.

Every year, many puja organisers choose a theme, mainly social issues, and use their pandals, idols and lighting arrangements to depict it. Chairman of West Bengal Pollution Control Board Kalvan Rudra said everyone has to comply

with the rules laid down by the Government of India.

Ranjit Sarkar, an artisan who creates various items with thermocol as a base besides making embellishments for ornaments for idols, said nothing much can be done this year as most of the items have already been prepared.

'We will have to think of other materials instead of thermocol now. The government should have thought about it a long time ago. Many people will be affected due to the ban and shifting to other materials will take time," he said.

This is a great move, yet a campaign should have been organised before the ban, feels artist

Bhabotosh Sutar. Besides environmental pollution, scattered pieces of thermocol also cause visual pollution, especially after the pujas, he said.

According to him, a substitute for thermocol is required now. "It can be Shola, which is a natural product. It is harvested from shola plant that grows in marshy land," Sutar said. Shola (Aeschynomene aspera) is available in various places in West Bengal and many people are engaged in creating art works made of it.

to lotus-filled Loktak lake, has employed 30 women who work from homes, and plans to engage more locals in her start-up in the days to come.

"Earlier, I simply enjoyed collecting different varieties of lotus that I could find to plant them in the lake. The idea to extract fibres from lotus stems came to me in 2014, following which I researched and trained myself in the art by reading multiple journals and watching videos," Bijiyashanti, the eldest of three siblings, said.

She launched her company 'Sanajing Sana Thambal' in 2018, opening new avenues in the field of textiles and creating job opportunities for local women.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi

had appreciated her innovative efforts in his 'Mann ki Baat' programme two years ago. Manipur Chief Minister N Biren Singh has also lauded her endeavour.

"First, I taught some local women for at least two weeks the technique involved in extracting the fibre and spinning the thread. Next, based on their skills, I gave them work, which they undertake from their homes," the entrepreneur explained.

A botany graduate from GP Women's College, Imphal, Bijiyashanti took pride in the fact that the pandemic, too, did not

come in the way of her business. "As everyone associated with the initiative worked from the safe confines of their homes, there was

no problem as such. We did not have to put work on hold," she said.

Every morning, particularly from May to December when lotus plants are found in abundance, Bijiyashanti along with some women visit the lake to collect stems, which are then washed, snapped, and split open for filament extraction.

Filaments from the stem are gently rolled with hands on a table to produce the thread which is then dried under the sun. Next, the threads are used to make fab ric, either on a spinning wheel or loom, Bijiyashanti said.

The 29-year-old hopes to expand her venture in the days to come, employing more locals.

The aquatic plant has many uses. she noted. Lotus has medicinal value; the roots and leaves can be used to make tea, too, she said.

"Marketing of lotus silk products, however, continues to be a challenge," Bijiyashanti pointed out.

Unlike regular silk, lotus silk products are yet to reach a major cross section of people. It is expected that the demand for lotus silk will grow as the eco-friendliness and sustainability of the fibre have appealed to most customers thus far. she added.

FLOODS Temple provides food, shelter to people: Report

Perched on high ground, the Baba Madhodas Mandir in Jalal Khan village in the Kachhi district has remained relatively safe from the floodwaters and serves as a sanctuary to the flood-affected people in their bleakest hours

Quetta, Sept 11:Tucked in the Kachhi district of Balochistan, the tiny village of Jalal Khan is still reeling from the flooding that destroyed houses and left mass destruction in its wake, Dawn reported. The village was cut off from the

rest of the province due to inundation in the Nari, Bolan, and Lehri rivers, leaving the residents of the remote area to fend for themselves. During these testing times, the local Hindu community opened the doors of the Baba Madhodas Mandir to the flood-hit people and their livestock, Dawn reported. According to locals, Baba Madhodas was a pre-partition Hindu dervish (saint) equally cherished by Muslims and Hindus of the area. "He used to travel on camel," says Iltaf Buzdar, a frequent visitor to

the village from Bhag Nari tehsil. Buzdar says as per the stories narrated by his parents, the saint transcended religious boundaries. "He would think of people through the prism of humanity instead of their



caste and creed," he quotes his parents, Dawn reported. The worship place -- frequented by Hindu worshippers from across Balochistan -- is made of concrete and covers

a large area. Since it is located on high ground, it remained relatively safe from the floodwaters and could serve as a sanctuary to the floodhit people in their bleakest hour.

Most members of the Hindu community in Jalal Khan have migrated to other cities of Kachhi for employment and other opportunities, but a couple of families remain on the temple premises to look after it.

Rattan Kumar, 55, a shopkeeper in the Bhag Nari tehsil, is in-charge of the temple at present. "There are over one hundred rooms in the temple as a large number of people from all over Balochistan and Sindh come here for pilgrimage every year," he tells Dawn.

Sawan Kumar, Rattan's son, told Dawn a few rooms were damaged, but overall the structure remained safe. At least 200-300 people, mostly Muslims. and their livestock were given refuge on the premises and looked after by the Hindu families, Dawn reported.

SL Prez under fire Colombo: Sri Lankan President

Ranil Wickremesinghe has come under fire from the Opposition over his government expansion with 37 state ministers and with moves underway to appoint at least 12 more Cabinet ministers soon at a time when the island nation is facing bankruptcy. London/Beijing, Sept 11: Xi Jinping will leave China for the first time in more than two years for a trip this week to Central Asia where he will meet Russia's Vladimir Putin, just a month before he is set to cement his place as the most powerful Chinese leader since Mao Zedong.

Against a backdrop of Russia's confrontation with the West over Ukraine, the crisis over Taiwan and a stuttering global economy, Xi is due on a state visit to Kazakhstan Wednesday.

China's president will then meet Putin at the Shanghai Cooperation Organization's summit in the ancient Silk Road city of Samarkand in Uzbekistan, Kazakhstan and the Kremlin said. Putin's foreign policy aide, Yuri Ushakov, told reporters last week that the Russian president was expected to meet Xi at the summit. The Kremlin declined to give

Edinburgh, Scotland, Sept 11: Queen Elizabeth's coffin arrived in Edinburgh Sunday after a six-hour journey from her summer home in the Scottish Highlands, past tens of thousands of mourners lining the route, many in sombre silence, some applaud-

ing and others in tears. Shortly after 10 a.m. (0900 GMT), a hearse carrying Elizabeth's oak coffin emerged from the gates of Balmoral Castle, where she died Thursday aged 96, at the start of a slow drive to the Scottish capital.

The coffin was draped in the Roval Standard of Scotland with a wreath on top made of flowers taken from the Balmoral estate including sweet peas, one of Elizabeth's favourites.

Crowds, fifteen deep in places, massed in the centre of Edinburgh to greet the cortege, which included the queen's daughter, Princess Anne, as it made it way to the Palace of Holyroodhouse where it was met by a military guard of honour. Soldiers from the Royal Regiment of Scotland then carried the coffin to the throne room of the palace where it will remain overnight.

'There was no way I could miss this. I would regret it for the rest of my life,"said Eilidh Mackintosh, 62, who left her home at 6 a.m. to

Her death has drawn tears, sadness and warm tributes, not just

from the queen's own close family and many in Britain, but also from around the globe - reflecting her presence on the world stage for seven decades. Wherever the cortege went as it wound its way through picturesque countryside, villages. small towns and cities, people lined the road or stopped their cars to get out and watch. At one point, it passed a guard of honour formed by dozens of tractors lined up in adjacent fields by farmers. Many watched silently in bright sunshine. Some threw flowers into the road. For others, the emotion of the moment moved them to tears. "It's just very, very sad. I'm happy I was here to say our goodbyes," said

Elizabeth Alexander, 69, who was born on the day the queen was crowned in 1953.

Many thousands are continuing to gather at other royal palaces across Britain, and large piles of flowers are massing as people visit to pay their respects.

Charles became king immediately after his mother's death and was officially proclaimed the new monarch at a ceremony on Saturday, full of pageantry and centuriesold traditions.

9/11 attacks still reverberate as US marks 21st anniversary

New York, Sept 11: Americans remembered 9/11 Sunday with readings of victims' names, volunteer work and other tributes 21 years after the deadliest terror attack on US soil.

A tolling bell and a moment of silence began the commemoration at ground zero in New York, where the World Trade Center's twin towers were destroyed by the hijackedplane attacks of September 11, 2001. Firefighter Jimmy Riches' namesake nephew wasn't born yet when his uncle died, but the boy took the podium to pay tribute to him. Victims' relatives and dignitaries also convened at the two other attack sites, the Pentagon

The Ivorian immigrant wrestled with how to comprehend such horror in a country where he'd come looking for a better life. He found it difficult to form the type of close, family-like friendships he and his Windows on the World co-workers had shared. It was too painful, he had learned, to become attached to people when "you have no control over what's going to happen to them next."

On Sunday, President Joe Biden plans to speak and lay a wreath at the Pentagon, while first lady Jill Biden is scheduled to speak in Shanksville, Pennsylvania, where one of the hijacked planes went down after passengers and crew members tried to storm the cockpit as the hijackers headed for Washington. EPIC's calculations were based on a previous study showing that sustained exposure to an additional 10 micrograms per cubic metre of PM2.5 would reduce life expectancy by nearly a year.

Not a single country managed to meet the WHO's 5-microgram standard in 2021, according to a survey of pollution data published earlier this year.

An interesting step in that direction is a vertical forest being planted in Nanjing, eastern China, designed to absorb 25 tonnes of carbon dioxide a year and produce about 60 kg of oxygen per day.

Another intervention in the form of an experimental over-100-metres-high 'smog tower' in northern China has brought noticeable improvement in air quality, according to researchers from the Chinese Academy of Sciences, who monitored the project.

Bhavik Bakshi, Professor at The Ohio State University in the US, pointed out several interventions by other countries to mitigate pollution which India can experiment with.

"These include regulations that limit the amount of pollution that point sources such as industries can emit, and requirement of technology in non-point sources like catalytic converters in cars," Bakshi said.

Point sources are single-source pollutants, such as factories and refineries, while nonpoint sources are harder to identify and address such as construction sites, and forest lands.

"In addition, pollution trading schemes have also been implemented where polluters need to buy permits to pollute. If they clean up their process, they can have extra permits that can be sold to entities who wish to pollute," he said. China was home to some of the world's most polluted cities, but many states in the Communist country have taken control of the situation over the years. In 1998, air pollution in Beijing was dominated by coal-combustion and motor vehicles. Over the next 15 years Beijing implemented a series of measures focused on energy infrastructure optimisation, coal-fired pollution control, and emission controls. By 2013, levels of air pollutants fell and some pollutants, like carbon monoxide and sulphur dioxides, met the national standard, according to a UN Environment Programme report.

While China's successful efforts to combat air pollution are a result of a sustained and longterm effort, many other cities around the world have experimented effectively with short-term measures to battle air pollution.

Paris, for example, bans cars in many his-

toric central districts on weekends, and similar to Delhi imposes odd-even bans on vehicles, makes public transport free during polluting events and encourages car-bike-sharing programmes.

Petrol and diesel-fuelled cars and motorcycles will be banned from the city of Amsterdam from 2030. Copenhagen prioritises bikes over cars and now has more cycles than people.

The Danish capital plans to become carbon neutral by 2025. According to UN Environment, Jambi City in Indonesia has approved an emissions mitigation plan that includes reducing and capturing methane from waste, and local regulations that ban waste burning and promote planting trees.

Zurich has capped the number of parking spaces in the city, only allows a certain number of cars to ply at any point of time, and is building more car-free areas and tram lines.

Chennai, Sept 11: Flat or decreasing exports, increasing imports due to pent up demand in the domestic market, depreciating rupee, hike in commodity prices including oil, geopolitical situations, restrictions on exports are the major reasons cited by experts for India's increasing trade deficit.

Simply put, trade deficit is a situation in which the value of goods a country imports is greater than the value of goods it exports -- excluding software, remittances and others.

"Exports are slowing down while imports are increasing. This has led to widening trade deficit. The trade deficit was \$190 billion last year and around \$125 billion for the period from April-August 2022,' Madan Sabnavis, Chief Economist, Bank of Baroda, told IANS.

'Exports are slowing down due to the global economy moving to recession. Imports are rising as demand is going up as our economy grows - both oil and non-oil imports," he added

New Delhi, Sept 11: While the fisheries growth rate in the last two years showed a growth of 14.3 per cent from 2019-20 to 2021-22, fish production reached an all-time high of 141.64 lakh tonne during 2019-20 to 161.87 lakh tonne during 2021-22.

Similarly in exports, the all-time high exports of 13.64 lakh tonne valuing ₹57,587 crore (\$7.76 billion) dominated by exports of shrimps has been achieved.

For development of Inland fisheries, 20 integrated reservoir development projects have been undertaken by installing 20,622 cages. For development of Marine fisheries, 276 deep sea fishing vessels have been approved and initiated for procurement. Also, 10 marine hatcheries for providing quality seed to the farmers have been approved. Nearly 1,556 cages are going to be installed in sea have been sanctioned already, said the Union Ministry of Fisheries. To strengthen the fisheries infrastructure and augment fish production, as of date, a total of 19 fishing harbours and fish landing centres proposals have been approved to the tune of ₹912.03 crore.

New Delhi, Sept 11: The overall revenue of Indian Railways at the end of August 2022 was ₹95,486.58 crore, showing an increase of ₹26,271.29 crore or 38 per cent over the corresponding period of last year, an official statement said Sunday.

The revenue from passenger traffic was ₹25,276.54 crore, an increase of ₹13,574.44 crore (116 per cent) year-on-year. Passenger traffic also increased compared to last year in both the segments -- reserved and unreserved. The growth from the long distance reserved mail express trains has been sharper than the same in passenger and suburban trains, the Railways said.

The other coaching revenue stood at ₹2,437.42 crore, higher by ₹811.82 crore (50 per cent) over the corresponding period of last year. This is being fuelled by robust growth in the parcel segment of Indian Railways,

the statement added. Goods revenue climbed by ₹10,780.03 crore (or 20 per cent) to ₹65,505.02 crore till August-end this year.

This has been achieved through incremental loading of more than 58 MT and 18 per cent growth in the net tonne-kilometers. Insurance penetration in India

increased from 3.76 per cent in 2019-20 to 4.20 per cent in 2020-21, registering a growth of 11.70 per cent. Insurance penetration measured as the percentage of insurance premium to GDP witnessed handsome growth during the year, mainly due to the outbreak of Covid-19.

The ministry is doing a comprehensive review of the Insurance Act, 1938 and also looking at making relevant changes to help push growth of the sector, sources said, adding the process is at a preliminary stage.

One of the provisions being considered is lowering the minimum capital requirement of ₹100 crore for setting up an insurance business, the sources said.

With the ease of entry capital norms, sources said, there could be entry of companies focussed on micro insurance, agriculture insurance or insurance firms with regional approach.



So for them, the solvency margin requirement would also be different but without compromising on policyholders' interest, the sources said

Entry of more players would not only push penetration but result in greater job creation in the country.

Presently, there are 24 life insurance companies and 31 non-life or general insurance firms, including specialised players like the Agriculture Insurance Company of India Ltd and ECGC Limited.

According to a study, India is likely to become the sixth largest insurance market in the world in the next 10 years, supported by regulatory push and rapid economic expansion.

London, Sept 11: Queen Elizabeth II has been depicted on British banknotes and coins for decades. Her portrait also has been featured on currencies in dozens of other places around the world, in a reminder of the British empire's colonial reach.

So what happens next after her death this week? It will take time for the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, New Zealand and other countries to swap out the monarchs on their money.

Here's a look at what is next for the paper cash featuring the late queen:

SWITCHING MONARCHS

The queen's portrait on British notes and coins is expected to be replaced by a likeness of the new King Charles III, but it won't be immediate

"Current banknotes featuring the image of Her Majesty The Queen will continue to be legal tender," the Bank of England said.

An announcement on existing paper money issued by the UK's central bank will be made after the official 10-day mourning period has ended, it said.

The Royal Mint, which is the official maker of British coins, said all coins with her portrait "remain legal tender and in circulation," with more information to come later. "As we respect this period of re-

spectful mourning, we continue to strike coins as usual," the Royal Mint said on its website. "Rather than all of the current coins and notes being handed in, the process will be a gradual one

and many of the coins featuring portraits of Queen Elizabeth II will remain in circulation for many years to come," according to Coin Expert, a British coin research website.

After Charles takes the crown at his coronation, a new portrait will need to be taken to use on redesigned notes and coins, the website said.

Coins featuring him will show him facing to the left, replacing the queen's rightward gaze in line



with tradition dating to the 17th century. It dictates monarchs be shown in profile and in opposite direction to their predecessors.

WHAT ABOUT OTHER COUNTRIES?

Other nations' currencies that feature the queen — from Australian, Canadian and Belizean

dollars - also will be updated with the new monarch, but the process could take longer, because "it is much easier to enforce a new design in the country where it originates, rather than in other countries where different jurisdiction may take place," the Coin Expert website said.

The Bank of Canada said its current \$20 banknote, made of synthetic polymer, is designed "to circulate for years to come.³

The Reserve Bank of New Zealand said it will issue all of its stock of coins depicting the queen before new ones go out with Charles' image. The queen also is featured on the \$20 bill, which is made "infrequently" and there is no "plan to destroy stock or shorten the life of existing banknotes just because they show the Queen," the bank said.

THE QUEEN'S CURRENCY

She first appeared on money when she was still a princess. That was in 1935, when Canada's \$20 bill featured 8-year-old Princess Elizabeth, whose grandfather King George V was then the monarch, as part of a new series of notes.

Canadian \$20 bills were updated with a new portrait of the queen in 1954, a year after her coronation, and her portrait also started appearing on other currencies around the world, mainly British colonies and Commonwealth countries.

British bills didn't get her image 🛁 until 1960 — seven years after her coronation. That's when the Bank of England was granted permission to use her likeness on paper money, starting with the 1-pound note, though the formal and regal imagewas criticized for being too severe and unrealistic.

Lewandowski scored his ninth goal in five games to double Barcelona's lead after Frenkie de Jong's 55th-minute opener. Lewandowski has only failed to score in one game — his debut since joining Barcelona from Bayern this summer.

Following the halt in play for an ill fan. Lewandowski assisted Ansu Fati before Ousmane Dembélé struck from long range to make it a rout.

A fourth win in a row in the league lifted Barcelona to the top of the standings, one point ahead of Real Madrid before the defending champions host Mallorca.

Madrid, Sept 11: Vinicius Junior and Rodrygo came through in the absence of Karim Benzema to keep Real Madrid perfect this season. Vinicius and Rodrygo scored second-half goals as Madrid came from behind to defeat Mallorca 4-1 for their fifth straight win in the Spanish league Sunday.

Real were without the injured Benzema and other regular starters as coach Carlo Ancelotti rotated

his squad ahead of the team's Champions League match against Leipzig Wednesday.

Mallorca got on the board first at the Santiago Bernabéu Stadium with a header by Vedat Muriqi off an assist by Lee Kang-in during a set piece in the 35th minute. Real got the equaliser three minutes into first-half stoppage time with a well-placed shot by Federico Valverde into the top corner.

Vinicius put Real ahead from inside the area after a nice pass

by Rodrygo in the 72nd, then Rodrygo found the net himself in the 89th after a couple of nifty moves to get past three Mallorca defenders inside the area.

Defender Antonio Rudiger closed the scoring in stoppage time with a shot from close range after a set piece taken by Toni Kroos.

Real are the only team in the top five European leagues with five straight victories. They hadn't won five in a row to start their season since 2009-10.

It was the seventh straight victory for Real in all competitions. They also defeated Eintracht Frankfurt in the final of the UEFA Super Cup and Celtic in its group opener in the Champions League.

Benzema, the team's best player last season, couldn't play against Mallorca after injuring a tendon in the team's match against Celtic in the Champions League Tuesday. The injury was not serious but there was no official timetable for his return. Luka Modric and Eduardo Camavinga were among the regulars who started on the bench.

The victory left Madrid two points ahead of Barcelona, who beat Cadiz 4-0 in their away fixture. Atlético Madrid won 4-1 against Celta Vigo at home for their third league win.

Max wins Italian GP title ahead of Leclerc, Russell

Monza, Sept 11: Formula One championship leader Max Verstappen again made light work of starting down the grid as he won the Italian Grand Prix Sunday to leave him within touching distance of a second successive title.

Verstappen now has a 116-point lead over Charles Leclerc, who finished second after another questionable strategy decision from Ferrari on its home track. With just six races remaining, the Dutch driver could mathematically clinch the title in Singapore next month. Verstappen started seventh after

he was among a number of drivers hit by grid penalties here but made his way up to third by the first corner of the second lap. The Red Bull driver then picked off George Russell in a Mercedes at the start of Lap 5 setting up the hunt for polesitter Leclerc in his Ferrari.

The Virtual Safety Car came out on Lap 12 after Sebastian Vettel's final race here came to an ignominious end, with the four-time World Champion pulling up at the side of the track after complaining about a power issue. The safety car came out again shortly after last vear's winner, Daniel Ricciardo, pulled up on Lap 47 prompting most drivers to pit for soft tires.

Russell was third, ahead of Carlos Sainz Jr. and Lewis Hamilton, who had both fought through the field after starting at the back of the grid following penalties.

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
