Online med certificate

Bhubaneswar, Jan 17: The Odisha government has made online medical certificates mandatory for those above 40 years of age applying for Driving Licence (DL) or its renewal from January 26, an official said Tuesday.

As per the provision of the Central Motor Vehicles Rule (CMVR) 1989, a medical certificate (in Form 1A) is mandatory for any applicant over 40 years of age, both for fresh licence and renewal.

"At present, the applicants submit a manual certificate in paper format. In this process, the genuineness of the medical certificate cannot be ascertained as fake certificates are also being used by many," said joint transport commissioner (technical) Dipti Ranjan

In order to make the process transparent and ensure medical certificates are made by genuine doctors, the state transport authority (STA) has developed a new online doctor registration portal where about 167 MBBS doctors

As per provision of the Central Motor Vehicles Rule (CMVR) 1989, a medical certificate (in Form 1A) is mandatory for any applicant over 40 years of age, both for fresh licence and renewal

At present, applicants submit medical certificate manually in hard copy. In the process, the genuineness of the certificate cannot be ascertained as fake ones are also being used by many

(MCI) registration have been enrolled, the official said.

"These doctors will now issue medical certificates to the applicants through the Sarathi portal, and no uploading of form 1A would be required," Patra said, adding that starting January 26, online issuance of medical certificates will be mandatory for DL and LL applicants more than 40 years of age.

The joint commissioner said this initiative will also ensure that no one uploads a fake medical certificate and gets a DL.

Islamabad, Jan 17: Pakistan Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif has sought 'serious' and 'sincere' talks with his Indian counterpart Narendra Modi for the resolution of the 'burning' issues, including on Kashmir, and said the UAE could play an important role in facilitating the resumption of dialogue between the two nucleararmed neighbours.

Sharif made these comments

Monday. Relations between India and Pakistan have been strained over the Kashmir issue and crossborder terrorism emanating from Pakistan. India has previously rejected any third-party mediation on the Kashmir issue. "My message to the Indian leadership and Prime Minister Narendra Modi is that let us sit down on the table and have serious and sincere talks to resolve our burning issues like Kashmir," Sharif said.

He said Pakistan and India neighbours and have to 'live with each other.

"It is up to us to live peacefully, make progress or quarrel with each other, and waste time and resources. We have three wars with India and it only brought more misery, poverty, and unemploy-

ment to the people," he explained. "We have learned our lesson and we want to live in peace provided we are able to resolve our genuine problems. We want to alleviate poverty, achieve pros-

perity, and provide education and health facilities and employment to our people and not waste our resources on bombs and ammunition, that is the message I want to give to Prime

India has maintained that terrorism and talks cannot go together and Islamabad should provide a conducive atmosphere for resumption of dialogue.

Minister Modi," he elaborated.

The ties between the two countries nosedived after India abrogated Article 370 of the Constitution, revoking the special status of Jammu and Kashmir and bifurcating the State into two Union Territories August 5, 2019.

India's decision evoked a strong reaction from Pakistan, which downgraded diplomatic ties and expelled the Indian envoy. Trade ties between Pakistan and India have

essentially been frozen since then. "We are nuclear powers, armed to the teeth and if God forbid a war breaks out, who will live to


most populous country. China's population in 2022 --1.4118 billion -- fell by 850,000 from -2021, the National Bureau of





In 2020, AES sold all its shares to the state-run Odisha Hydro Power Corporation (OHPC) for around Rs 1,000 crore. While the company was running on losses in 2020, it has made a profit this year.

OPGC operates thermal power plants of 1740MW capacity at Banarpal, Jharsuguda. The phase-1 unit (2x210 MW) has been running successfully for the last more than 25 years. The phase-II (2x660MW) was commissioned in 2019.

Phase-I unit has coal linkage from the mines of Mahanadi Coal Field, the phase-II units are sourcing coal from the Manoharpur coal line of Odisha Coal & Power Limited, a subsidiary of OPGC through a dedicated Merry Go Round system.

The corporation is contemplating to expand its present capacity through the implementation of Phase III by installing Unit 5 and 6 having 660 MW capacity each.



"Information disclosed that after giving the benefit of incomes as mentioned in their Income-Tax Returns, the total income of PK Jena and his family members from all known sources was to the tune of Rs 3.25 crore during the check period from April 1, 2005, to March 31. 2020." it alleged.

After calculating his income and expenses incurred during the corresponding period, the CBI alleged that there was no satisfactory explanation for Rs 1.92 crore of assets which it said were 59.09 per cent over his genuine sources of income.

During the interview, Sharif said the United Arab Emirates (UAE) leadership could play an important role in bringing Pakistan and India together.

New Delhi has maintained that Kashmir is a bilateral issue between India and Pakistan and no third country has a role in it.

"The Union Territory of Jammu & Kashmir and the Union Territory of Ladakh are and always will be integral and inalienable parts of India. No other country has a locus standi to comment on the same," the Ministry of External Affairs has said previously. Sharif said the UAE was a second home for millions of Pakistanis, days after he visited the Gulf nation, which was aimed at securing fresh loans, ramping up bilateral cooperation and trade ties.

He also lauded Saudi Arabia for being a "friendly and brotherly country." "Before Pakistan came into being, and was carved out of India, millions of Muslims had brotherly relations with Saudi Arabia and were visiting Makkah and Madina," he added. Last week, Pakistan's Foreign Office said it welcomed third-party mediation in the resolution of all outstanding issues with India, including Kashmir.

'Ensure fair allotment to PMAY beneficiaries'

Bhubaneswar, Jan 17: The state BJP Tuesday approached Governor Ganeshi Lal for transparent and fair allocation of PMAY-G houses to beneficiaries in Odisha.

A delegation of BJP led by party chief whip Mohan Majhi submitted a memorandum to the Governor in this regard.

"The Centre has allotted additional 9.5 lakh houses to Odisha under Pradhan Mantri Aawas Yojna-Gramin (PMAY-G). However, recent unpleasant experiences and incidents of favouritism and rampant corruption in allocation of PMAY-G houses to beneficiaries is derailing the ambitious scheme and is an outright denial of rightful houses to the eligible beneficiary," said the BJP in memorandum.

Rural Development ministry has chalked out detailed procedure and mechanism to ensure strict vigil and public scrutiny to ensure that the validation of beneficiaries is fair and transparent, leaving no room for ineligible households to get listed because of favoritism.

However, the party alleged that the state government has completely offloaded its responsibility for fair and transparent allocation of houses letting the process to be hijacked by local leaders and people with vested interests.

"Identification of ineligible beneficiaries and validation of provisional list has also been wrested from the public without zero systemic check and balances or scope of intervention by district administration, block, gram panchayat level officials," the memorandum said.

The saffron party further said that in most rural areas people have not been able to file complaints as the process requires them to provide personal details and a registered mobile number which may create life-threatening situations for the complainant from people with vested interests.

"In absence of awareness of rejection criteria, it is observed that

provisional lists are getting approved without intervention from public. This jeopardises the whole proposition of public scrutiny," they alleged. The BJP leaders requested the Governor to look into the matter and issue necessary instructions to the state government to ensure systemic checks with provision of adequate intervention by district block administration ensuring ownership and responsibility in transparent and fair selection of beneficiaries under PMAY-G.

Speaking on the issue, BJD leader Dhruba Sahoo said that the allotment of houses will be made as per the procedure. About the leftout eligible beneficiaries, he said, "We also request the Centre to provide additional houses for the leftout house ficionies."

n quiet nights across large swaths of the African bush, you may hear a series of whooping calls in the distance. This unique sound is the long-distance vocalisation used by spotted hyenas (Crocuta crocuta) to com-

municate with each other.
For hyenas, it's advantageous to know who is calling before deciding to respond. They don't treat every member of their group the same – and the caller could even be an intruder in their territory.

In animal societies, identity signals are common. They mediate interactions within groups, and allow individuals to discriminate group-mates from out-group competitors. However, individual recog-

nition becomes increasingly challenging as group size increases and as signals must be transmitted over greater distances.

We hypothesised that for hyenas long-distance calls could be used to determine the individual identity and the group membership of the caller.

Our research sought to deter-

mine what information is in these calls, and how hyenas are able to determine whether they are hearing a group mate or an intruder.

We found these calls were individually distinct. Hyenas from the same clan did not sound similar enough to identify the caller's group membership from voice alone. This means hyenas must be able to re-



member the voices of their group mates, an impressive feat of memorisation. It also has implications for how hyenas maintain contact with each other and coordinate their movements over long distances

Our results suggest that individual identity of the caller is im-

portant enough and that a group signature is not enough information for a listening hyena to decide whether to respond or not. Furthermore, distinctive voices may more easily evolve and identifying the individual is enough for hyenas to remember what

group the caller belongs to.

Hyena social groups
Spotted hyenas can be found in
a range of habitats throughout
sub-Saharan Africa. Their population is estimated to be between 20,000 and 50,000 individuals, with the highest known
concentrations in Tanzania's
Serengeti ecosystem. They live in

social groups, called clans that range in size from only six in harsh semi-desert habitats in Namibia to over 125 individuals in Kenya's Maasai Mara National

Within these social groups, spotted hyenas have a strict dominance hierarchy that determines who gets to feed first at carcasses and kills. When a female hyena has new cubs, they enter the dominance ranking right below their mother, pushing their older siblings lower in the pecking order.

Spotted hyenas share and defend a territory as a group, but those groups can be large and individuals are often spread out across the landscape.

Bitter internecine war plagues BJD in Ganjam

Infighting has sparked concern among hopefuls putting their poll prospects at stake in Aska, Kabisuryanagar and Khallikote Assembly constituencies



Berhampur, Jan 17: Factional feud has gripped the ruling Biju Janata Dal (BJD) with party workers here voicing their opposition in open against three women legislators of the party.

The bitter infighting has sparked concern among the party leaders as they apprehend that it may harm their prospective in the upcoming general elections. Senior party workers alleged that the district authorities of the party are not making any effort to resolve the dispute despite bitter squabbles prevailing in the party. MLA of Aska Assembly segment and her son, a youth BJD leader, were the first to draw the ire of the party workers. The party worker also formed an outfit to oppose these two leaders. This is in sharp contrast to the unfledged loyalty that the party workers used to display to its leaders for the last 25 years.

However, in an aberration, party workers are coming out in open and voicing their opposition

against their leaders. On the other hand, the ruling party has failed to hold its organisation meet for the last 15 months. The extended executive body meeting was held

September 15, 2021. They floated a resolution requesting Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik to contest from the Aska Assembly segment as he had started his political career by getting elected from Aska Lok Sabha segment in 1997. They have sent a resolution passed in their meeting to the party supremo seeking his approval to their proposal. The opposition leaders are waiting with baited breath as to what decision the party supremo is going to take regarding their proposal.

for the last time at Bhanjanagar

In the second phase, the MLA of Kabisuryanagar Assembly segment drew the ire of the party workers. There the dissident party leaders and workers led by the former chairman of Kodala NAC raised the banner of revolt against the local MLA. He convened a meeting at his residence and a large

gathering at Beguniapada and made several complaints against the local MLA. Local voters suspect that the simmering tension might turn into an explosive situation if the party leaders do not act fast. The senior leaders in the party are yet to take any steps to stem the resentment brewing among the workers.

In the third case, a former MLA and party workers conducted large gatherings to voice their opposition against the local MLA of Khallikote Assembly segment. Till now, three women MLAs are at the receiving end of the party workers' anger.

The Gopalpur MLA, after being sacked from the ruling party, is now an independent MLA. His supporters have formed Pradip Sena and going all out against the party leaders in the Assembly segment. Political analysts said that this is indicative of the bitter internecine war plaguing the party. The political secretary of the Chief Minister has been assigned the task to look after the political developments and other issues in the Assembly segment.

Similarly, a senior retired officer is managing the politics and other affairs in Hinjili Assembly segment. A senior party leader alleged that lack of any organisational activities has led to an increase in indiscipline and dissidence among the party leaders and workers.

The district BJD president said that very soon an organisational meet will be organised at Chhatrapur or any other place in

Attendance in all banks, government and private offices was thin as the agitators resorted to picketing and did not allow movement of people during the bandh. Indoor air pollution five times worse than outdoors

New Delhi, Jan 17: As Delhi-NCR reels under massive air pollution after Diwali every year, leaving people with respiratory illnesses gasping for fresh air, experts Tuesday said that as most people spend winter days inside and even though the indoor air quality may appear to be better than outdoor air quality, it can be up

to five times worse. The indoor and outdoor air pollution are often treated as two separate entities but outdoor pollutants, such as vehicle exhaust fumes, pollen and mould spores,

can also enter our indoor spaces According to Dr Vipul Gupta, Chief -Neurointerventional Surgery and Co-Chief Stroke Unit at Artemis Hospital in Gurugram - it is believed that indoor air pollution is worse than outdoor air pollution as it is in a contained area which enables the potential pollutants to harm us even more.

"The harmful dust, dirt and gases present inside buildings are linked to several health concerns like cardiovascular diseases, chronic lung diseases and/or development of several infections," Dr Gupta told IANS.

The main cause behind indoor air pollution is known to be gases or particles released into the air, substances like building materials, tobacco smoke, wood-burning stoves cause indoor pollution. Once inside, they can react with indoor pollutants, creating a complex cocktail of dirty air.

"Likewise, indoor pollutants, such as smoke from burning wood or cooking fumes, can exit buildings through ventilation. For example, air fresheners and deodorants may contain Volatile Organic Compounds (VOCs) and benzene, while cleaning products can contain benzene and household fumes and odours," Ginger Lee, Senior Electronics Engineer, at consumer electronics com-

Furniture and carpets can also emit formaldehyde and flame retardants that accumulate in the air, while emissions from cooking appliances, such as ovens and stoves, may contain a range of substances that deteriorate indoor air quality.

"As modern homes generally have better sealing, these pollutants can become trapped and are unable to escape,' said Lee. According to a report in the Indian Journal of Community Medicine, statistics suggest that in developing countries, health impacts of indoor air pollution far outweigh those of outdoor air pollution.

Around 4.2 million people die prematurely due to indoor air pollution, according to the World Health Organisation (WHO).

Lee said that their purifiers make the invisible visible, helping users to understand the types of pollution they are exposed to on a daily basis and giving peace of mind that these pollutants are being captured and that they are breathing clean air indoors. The HEPA+Carbon filter removes 99.95 per cent of pollutants as small as 0.1 microns such as al lergens, bacteria, pollen and mould spores and harmful gases. Dr Gupta advised people to ensure ventilation as it will freshen the air present inside the room and will help in removing the polluted air.

"Along with ventilation, decluttering or cleaning your rooms/households every now and then is important for never letting dust settle and trap pollutants inside. Indoor plants are also a great way to prevent indoor air pollution as they will purify the air quality present inside," he noted.

Not Religion

The latest Oxfam report has nailed the truth in India where a microscopic rich minority is getting richer and the majority grovelling in poverty. Yet, the main political discourse seems oriented towards religion. The Congress, which is desperately trying to refurbish its image as a party of the masses through its 'Bharat Jodo Yatra' campaign, is getting into the trap. Instead of raising the issue of dire economic plight of the majority, it is now busy identifying which Opposition parties are having tacit understanding with the BJP. The so called sickular crowd seems to have lost

The Oxfam report says that 'economic inequality in India is being added to a society that is already fractured along the lines of religion, caste, region

The stark reality in India is that 73 per cent of the wealth generated in 2017 went to 1 per cent of the rich. The richest have cornered a huge part of the wealth created through crony capitalism and inheritance while the poor are still struggling to earn minimum wages and gain access to quality education and health care for which government investment is minimal.

The focus could have been on the issue that even if India reaches a 5 trillion economy, 4.75 trillions will, most likely, be with the 1 per cent mentioned in the recent Oxfam report. The rest 0.25 trillion may get distributed among the rest of the 1.5 billion people.

It looks as if the Congress is shifting gear towards religion, away from the economic crisis that is harming every single household of this country today. This will only help the BJP gain rich political dividends as religion of the majority is the prime plank for that party. The Congress strategy of dragging in the secular credentials of parties, including Aam Admi Party, Asaduddin Owaisi's AIMIM will divert focus and make it look like the minorities are the only issue for the Congress.

Congress spokesman Jairam Ramesh cast doubts about the sincerity of Arvind Kejriwal-led AAP and Owaisi's AIMIM to fight the BJP. According to the Congress assessment, both the parties are working at the behest of the BJP to blunt the edge of anti-incumbency factor and eat into the Congress votes. As such the two parties are, in the Congress' eye, supposedly agents or 'B' teams of the BJP working to make the Congress irrelevant in the country's politics and help the BJP retain power both at state and national levels.

The Congress cites the outcome of recent Assembly elections in Gujarat and Goa as examples of the two parties' backstabbing it, while maintaining a façade of antipathy towards the BJP. For this reason, it is convinced, the AAP fielded candidates in the Gujarat Assembly election in such a manner that ensured the anti-incumbency factor did not help the Congress swell its vote base. On the contrary, it cut into Congress' votes, thereby helping the BJP increase its vote share. Along with these two outfits, the Congress seems to be also considering Badruddin Ajmal's AIUDF, K Chandrasekhar Rao's TRS (renamed BRS), Naveen Patnaik's BJD, AIADMK, Akali Dal and YSR Congress Party as part of the 'B' Team helping the BJP clandestinely.

The Congress may not be far from the truth. It is true all these political parties and their leaders do not raise issues that might harm the BJP's poll prospects anywhere. The AAP, for instance, was silent on the Bilkis Bano case and the fate of cases of atrocities on the minorities during the Gujarat elec-

Similarly, Owaisi's anti-Hindootva rhetoric is nothing but a ploy to help the BJP's gameplan of consolidating its Hindoo vote base by playing the communal card aggressively. In fact, Owaisi and his party have long become suspect in the eyes of some other Opposition parties as well in Bihar and West Bengal. In the last Assembly elections in both these states his fight against the BJP was considered to be hypocritical despite his anti-Modi posturing. His main agenda, as alleged by the Trinamool Congress in West Bengal and the RJD in Bihar, was to dent the support of the minorities for the two parties to help the BJP surge ahead of its main adversaries taking advantage

It is doubtful if turning the secular-religious debate into the main election plank, as the Congress seems to be doing once again will help the non

The flaw of such a policy is that it weakens Opposition unity so much that the fight against the BJP appears doomed. Opposition alliances in the past were built on a so-called principle of extending issue-based support with economy being the main focus. A common minimum programme aimed at improving the economy that will help the majority of the populace takes care of disparities, mismatch and suspicion of allies so that the bigger goal of ousting the ruling party or alliance out of power could be achieved.

The Congress seems not yet prepared to follow this trajectory at least at the moment. By talking about the secular credentials of some Opposition parties it is only betraying its incapacity for understanding the plight of masses despite its mass-contact campaign.

Unemployment, low wages, crippling of the micro, small and medium enterprises due to demonetization, utter failure of foreign policy resulting in the total isolation of India on the global theatre and lastly the divisions created through language and such issues along with the obviously blatant encouragement given to a few select industrialists who are cornering everything in this country should be issues raised that would make people sit up

Let religion be kept away from the discourse.

arrago, in its more usual sense of a confused mixture, turns up so often arrago, in its more usual sense of a confused mixed of secures and obfuscation, in phrases of condemnation like "a farrago of excuses and obfuscation", "a farrago of deceit and lies", or "a rambling farrago of half-digested knowledge", that it has become one of those all-purpose dismissive words that ought to appear in public only when attached to a health warning. The word has no meaning for most people apart from negative associations in such set phrases. To judge from the company it keeps, it is much favoured by judges and journalists but by hardly anybody else. It's hard to be sure from the evidence, but there are indications that people are sometimes using farrago to mean a lot of noise and argument about nothing very much, or some happening or event which has gone disastrously wrong. The Oxford English Dictionary has on file an example from as long ago as 1989 that looks as though it is going that way - David Kalstone wrote in Becoming A Poet: "Recalling the 'farrago' years later, Bishop said that she never again sent Moore any of her poems for suggestions or approval". It looks very much as though people are confusing it with fiasco or furore, and through that confusion creating a new deprecatory sense for the word. But then, farrago has been a negative word right from its first recorded appearance, in the middle of the seventeenth century in John Row's Historie of the Kirk of Scotland: "A strange miscellanie, farrago, and hotchpotch of Poperie, Arminianisme, and what not". This is only a few years after farrago appeared in the language in its original literal sense.

eports on the sinking town of Joshimath get worse. Water is now said to be gushing out of fields while houses are developing cracks. In fact, parts of the hill town may have sunk by nearly 2.2 feet (70 cm) based on ground investigation of affected areas carried out recently. The gateway to famous pilgrimage sites is indeed facing subsidence and hitting headlines these past few days. Moreover, the latest report is way ahead of ISRO's survey on surface deformation which found 5.4 cm subsidence in just past 12 days. Obviously, the hill town, as also many others, is unable to keep pace with rapid urbanisation and the heavy tourist inflow during summer season. The state authorities have ignored warnings by experts who have repeatedly cautioned about the area's vulnerability.

For the past few decades, the entire region from Chamoli to Joshimath has been familiar with disasters. The glacial avalanche known as the Chamoli disaster led to flash floods in the Rishiganga and Dhauliganga rivers, tributaries of the Ganga, in February 2021. The disaster killed 200-odd people, including workers trapped in the Tapovan Vishnugad hydropower plant's tunnel on Dhauliganga river. Worse, despite the region's geological and environmental sensitivity, numerous hydroelectric projects, including the Vishnugad hydel project have been approved in areas such as Joshimath and Tapovan.

A scientific study 'Joshimath localized subsidence and erosion of the AT Nala' carried out way back in 2006 by the Wadia Institute of Himalayan Geology, revealed that parts of the town were "sliding by one cm every year." But even then, the NTPC was building two tunnels as part of its hydroelectric project, opposed by geologists with some warning if the tunneling work was not shelved, Joshimath, gateway to Badrinath, may sink. Experts expressed urgency on the need to find a passage for the water coming out of the ground. Road and tunnel constructions in a fragile mountain ecosystem are creating havoc and leading to the present-day crisis in Joshimath and this is being done despite objections raised by environmental engineers and seismologists. Executive Director of Disaster Uttarakhand

Management Authority, Piyoosh Routela, had in a scientific journal in May 2010 cautioned that Joshimath has been "showing signs of distress due to burgeoning anthropogenic pressure." He pointed out that the town is covered with a thick layer of overburdened material. Large boulders of gneisses and fragments of basics and schistose rocks are embedded in grey-coloured, siltysandy matrix. This makes the town highly vulnerable to sinking.

Over the years, experts have highlighted the lack of enforcement of building laws leading to unplanned settlement and weak structures, unmindful of the carrying capacity of the town that witnesses high tourist inflows every summer. Moreover, the town does not have proper drainage facilities. According to YP Sundriyal of HNB Garhwal University: "The gradually weathering of fine materials between the rocks of debris, water percolation has decreased the cohesive strength of the rocks over time. This resulted in landslides, triggering cracks in the houses."

Obviously, too much construction has caused several large-scale landslides. Between 2009 and 2012, the CSIR chief scientist DP Kanungo recorded 128 landslides in the Chamoli-Joshimath region. He published his findings in Landslides: Journal of the International Consortium on Landslides, in 2014. In 2018, a report published in Current Science highlighted major landslides in the region, including the massive landslide on May 19, 2017, at Vishnuprayag, the confluence of the Dhauliganga and Alaknanda

rivers, eight km from Joshimath. In 2021, the 13.2 MW Rishiganga Hydropower Project and the 520 MW NTPC Hydropower Project turned a natural disaster into a major human tragedy. The NDMA report on the Chamoli disaster in April 2022 clearly stated that it will be necessary to focus on finding alternative sources of energy, as the area appears to be environmentally sensitive Meanwhile investigations have prompted geologists to attribute the cracks to accelerated sinking in parts of the town triggered by the sudden discharge of the aquifer's water since the night of January 2-3. But this crisis was predicted long ago. Even as recently as August, a team of geologists visited towns around Joshimath and noticed cracks in specific locations named in Sema, Sunil and Ravigram. The team in its report recommended counter measures including steps to enhance the drainage facilities and control erosion along the segments of the Alakananda river, north of the town. Thus, it is believed that a major portion of the damaged houses need to be permanently removed and population shifted to a safer location after implementation of landslide zonation areas. As regards the rehabilitation process, land has already been identified at three locations – Koti Colony, Jati Booti Udyan and

Pipalkoti - which are close to Joshimath. It is understood that Geological Survey of India will conduct a study of these three locations and then the design of houses will be made as per proper specifications by the Central Building Research Institute (CBRI). Meanwhile, state authorities are also considering building vulnerability assessment and repair and retrofitting, where applicable, in the less affected zones.

Keeping the above in mind, it may be stated that there is a need for a scientific study of mountains to investigate the carrying capacity and the structural characteristics. In this connection, it's good to know that Chief Minister Pushkar Singh Dhami has decided to carry out a technical and scientific study of all cities and towns in the hills and that construction will be stopped in places found to have exceeded the carrying capacity. Any future development plan would be done based on its findings, he had announced a few days back.

So far, 782 houses from an earlier estimate of 678 houses have been affected due to ground subsidence and 81 families shifted to safer places. At the same time it has been reported that Karnaprayag, located 82 km south-west of Joshimath, is

too sinking. The fact that Joshimath being a key tourism point, especially pertaining to religious tourism, makes the issue more complicated Strict adherence to experts' views needs to be followed, which are not much different from earlier studies. However, there must be a balance in that tourists should not face much hardship and travel to the religious places may be safe and easy. It cannot be denied that the hills, just like cities, need investment and infrastructure. But that has to be scientifically planned, keeping in mind the geological factors. Faster travel facilities and large-scale construction can wait till scientific scrutiny is conducted. Apart from Joshimath, which has made headlines, it is time to ponder whether construction of a railway line in quake-prone Gangtok would be advisable and pursued without getting the scientific nod. The authorities must remember the idiom: a stitch in time saves nine.

nly 12 men have ever walked for womankind." on the moon, but most people – if they racked their brains hard enough - would be able to name only one of them: Neil Armstrong.

That's because he was the first human to walk on the moon, and if you're the first human to achieve a major feat, you get fame and acclaim. If you're the second human to achieve the same feat, you get a pat on the back, a box of chocolates and, if you're lucky, an autographed photo of the first human to achieve the feat.

This is partly why the Russians didn't try too hard to land on the moon. The Americans had already been there, so why bother? No point in being the second country to land on the moon.

But Russia (or the Soviet Union) missed an opportunity to make history. They could have landed their spaceship on the moon and sent one of their cosmonauts onto the surface to utter these immortal words: "That's one small step for woman, one giant leap

The first woman to walk on the moon would be almost as famous as Neil Armstrong. She would certainly be more famous than the other 11 men who have walked on

The opportunity is still there, of course. No one has been to the moon since December 14, 1972. when the Apollo 17 crew completed their mission

The first 12 people to walk on the moon were all white men. Russia, America or another country could make history by taking a diverse group of astronauts to the moon. They could make history with (1) the first African to walk on the moon; (2) the first Asian to walk on the moon; (3) the first Hindu to walk on the moon; (4) the first Muslim to walk on the moon; and (5) the first gay person to walk on the moon.

Yes, there's still plenty of history to be made in outer space. But you don't have to be an astronaut to make history. There are plenty of opportunities left on earth, particularly for women.

For example, Anoud Al-Asmari recently made history as the first Saudi woman to be officially certified as a FIFA referee. This is a great achievement for Saudi Arabia. It gives me hope that someday, perhaps in the near future, someone will make history as the first Saudi woman to be officially certified as a completely free individual. (Someone who can get married

without her father's permission.) Women are achieving firsts all over the world. In America, Maura Healey recently became the first woman and first LGBTQ person to be elected governor of Massachusetts. Manpreet Monica Singh made history as well, becoming the first female Sikh judge in the US. And perhaps most impressive, Olivia Pichardo, an 18year-old pitcher, made history when she made the cut for Brown University's baseball team, becoming the first woman to play for a Division 1 varsity college baseball team. All her teammates will be men, but none quite as fa-

In India, Sania Mirza made history in tennis, but another Sania Mirza is making history without a racquet. This Sania Mirza hails from Uttar Pradesh's Jasovar village and is undergoing training to be a fighter pilot for the Indian Air Force. Before long, she will become India's first Muslim woman fighter pilot.

The other Sania Mirza made history in 2009 when she won the mixed doubles championship at the Australian Open, becoming the first Indian woman to win a major tennis title.

I don't know how many other Sania Mirzas are going to make history in the coming years, but don't be surprised if you open a newspaper one day and read this: "As election results were announced yesterday, supporters of Sania Mirza, a 35-year-old woman from Agra, celebrated her historic victory with loud music and dancing, as she became the first Sania Mirza to win a seat in the Lok Sabha.'

Reach out to every section of society: PM

Various party members who were part of the audience said the prime minister spoke highly of 'sufism' and also asked them to meet professionals from different walks and visit places like universities and churches to connect with them.

The prime minister said India's best era is coming and the party should dedicate itself to the country's development and turn "amrit kaal", the 25 year period till 2047, into "kartavya kaal" (era of duties). Sources said he also cautioned the party against any sense of "overconfidence" and cited example of the BJP's loss in Madhya



Pradesh in 1998 despite the unpopularity of then Congress government led by Digvijaya Singh. Modi was then a key minder of the BJP's organisational affairs in the state.

Maharashtra Deputy Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis told reporters that Modi, in his address to the BJP national executive meet, emphasised on reaching out to all sections of society."The BJP is no longer merely a political movement but a social movement as well that is working to transform socioeconomic conditions," Modi told the executive, he said.

The prime minister said people in 18-25 age group have not witnessed the political history of India and are not aware of "corruption and wrongdoings" that took place under previous governments."So, they need to be made aware. Let them know about the good governance of the BJP," he said.

LG not my headmaster: Kejriwal

New Delhi, Jan 17: Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal Tuesday used the Hindi proverb "begaani shaadi mein Abdullah deewana" to hit out at LG VK Saxena, questioning his authority with a "he is not my headmaster" jibe.

The chief minister alleged that Saxena had called the 2018 Supreme Court judgement "a mere opinion" after Kejriwal had told him that it said that LG has no independent decision-making authority.

Reiterating those allegations, Keiriwal further claimed the LG told

3 detained following violence in college

New Delhi, Jan 17: Three youths have been detained after two student groups clashed and opened fire in a Meerut college.

The incident took place two days after a former college student was assaulted, allegedly by a current student leader of the institution.

No one suffered injuries in the firing incident but panic gripped the area.

Circle Officer, Civil Lines, Arvind Chaurasia, said: "We have detained three youths, and a search is on to nab others involved in the firing. Two outsiders were cornered by college students and were being thrashed. We took the outsiders into our custody.'

According to reports, two days ago, former Meerut College student Pushpender Singh was allegedly beaten by a current student leader, Vijit Talyan, in Begum Bagh locality.

The clash was in retaliation to the incident. Pushpender Singh has been admitted to a hospital with injuries.

The CO said: "A student, Priyanshu Singh, who was part of Talyan's group was targeted during the attack but he had locked himself in a room. Preliminary investigation revealed that it is a fight between two student groups.

The police have filed an FIR against unnamed accused for rioting and using firearms as the identification process is on. Police are yet to reveal the identity of the three detained youths.

IndiGo passenger opens emergency door

"The passenger immediately apologised for the action. As per SOPs (Standard Operating Procedures), the incident was logged and the aircraft underwent mandatory engineering checks, which led to a delay in the flight's departure," it said.

The airline declined to comment about the identity of the passenger. A senior official at aviation regulator DGCA on Tuesday said the event was duly reported and that no safety was compromised.



New Delhi, Jan 17: Police are on the lookout for a man who stayed at a Delhi 5-star hotel for four months by posing as a senior functionary of the UAE royal family and fled without paying bills worth more than Rs 23 lakh, officials said

The accused, Mahamed Shareef, had checked into the Leela Palace-New Delhi on August 1 last year. He was staying in room number 427 and fled from the hotel on November 20, they said. He, besides cheating the hotel of Rs 23.46 lakh in outstanding bills, also decamped with valuables, including silver bottle holders and a mother of pearl tray, po-

Shareef checked into the hotel by impersonating an important functionary of the UAE government's 'Office of His Highness Sheikh Falah Bin Zayed Al Nahyan' and giving a fake business card, according to police. They said that he also gave a UAE resident card on arrival at the hotel.

"It seems the guest purposely gave these cards to create a false image and garner extra trust with intent to cheat and deceive the hotel at a later stage," the hotel management said in its complaint.

"The guest had also made a few part settlements in the month of 20 lakhs due for November 21, 2022



August and September 2022 worth 11.5 lakhs for room charges, the total outstanding still stands at Rs 23.48.413 against which he had issued a post-dated cheque worth Rs

which was duly submitted to our bank on September 22, 2022, but due to insufficient funds the cheque bounced." it said.

On November 20 last year, around 1 pm, the man fled from the hotel

with valuables, a senior police official said. The complainant said, "This seems to be completely preplanned since we were under the impression that by November 22, 2022, the hotel will get the dues cleared through the cheque he had submitted." Rahul hits out at BJP, RSS Punjab, Haryana battle severe cold conditions

Hoshiarpur (Punjab), Jan 17: Congress leader Rahul Gandhi Tuesday accused the BJP and the RSS of capturing institutions and putting pressure on the EC and the judiciary, and also declared that he will not visit an RSS office even if someone slits his throat.

Answering a question on the possibility of reaching out to his cousin and BJP MP Varun Gandhi, he said their ideologies do not match. "I can never go to an RSS office. You can slit my throat, but I will not go. My family has an ideology, it has a thought system,' he said at a press conference here on the sidelines of his Bharat Jodo Yatra. "I can meet him, hug him. But I cannot accept that ideology, that is impossible," he said. He accused the RSS and the

BJP of controlling institutions.

"This is not a fight between one political party and another political party. It is now a fight between the institutions which were captured by them and the opposition. Out of which one factor is EVM,' he said to a question on Electronic Voting Machines. Normal democratic processes in the country are now "missing", he claimed. He also asserted that it is abundantly clear that economic distress, un employment and price rise will deal a "severe blow" to the BJP.

His remarks on Varun Gandhi come amid speculation that the BJP MP, who often has been critical of his own party, might be joining the Congress

To a question, the Congress leader said Varun is in the BJP and if he walks into the vatra, he will face a problem, implying that the saffron party might object. Gandhi, whose foot march is passing through Punjab, also took a swipe at the ruling AAP government in the state, saying Punjab should be run from Punjab only, not from Delhi

"It is a historical fact. If it is run from Delhi, then people of Punjab

ple, he was a bit overexcited. There is quite a lot of enthusiasm to the Yatra. Many people get overexcited and that was the case where he was a bit extra charged up, so there is no problem in that. It has happened many times before. I wouldn't call that a security lapse," said Gandhi.

The man rushed towards Gandhi to hug him during the yatra but was stopped by Punjab Congress chief Amrinder Singh Raja Warring. Inspector General of Police G S Dhillon said there was no security breach. The march, which started from Kanvakumari in Tamil Nadu September 7, will conclude in Srinagar by January 30, with Gandhi hoisting the national flag in the summer capital of Jammu and Kashmir.

Shahjahanpur bird sanctuary in UP attracts many visitors

Shahjahanpur (UP), Jan 17: A bird sanctuary that houses winged animals, Indian as well as exotic, and built by a Shahjahanpur-based bird lover is drawing a huge crowd.

Pankaj Batham says when he was voung, he saw his grandmother had a special bond with birds, rearing them and sometimes even "talking" to them. "After her death, I took her passion and set up a farm for 28 foreign breeds of birds and hundreds of different varieties of birds of the country," he told PTI.

Batham said some of the foreign breeds of birds at the farmhouse, spread over four acres, include Lady Amaranta (Malaysia), Ringnet (Poland), Yokohama (Vietnam), Silkie (US) and Whitecap (Holland).

Besides, there is Kadaknath breed of cock and Masakali variety of pigeon. From time to time, the birds are given vitamins and antibiotics to keep them healthy, he said.

"Every time before I have my meals, I take a round of the farm to check whether any bird is unwell. Two staff members are deputed for food and water to the birds," he said. Batham said he procures foreign-breed birds online. These birds come to Kerala from foreign countries and then reach Lucknow by

to the farm, he said, adding a foreign-breed bird costs around ₹25,000. Masakali pigeon, seen in Hindi film industry movie "Maine Pvar Kiva", enthralls the visitors to the farm when it meanders and spreads its feathers to shape like an umbrella.

An Australian parrot is also there in the farm. Batham said every day around 9 am hundreds of birds arrive at the farm and he feeds them too.

Professor of Zoology in Swami Sukhdevanand College Dr Ramesh Chandra told PTI that foreign breed birds have different behaviour and they adapt themselves to the new environment easily.

Dawood Ibrahim has remarried: Nephew

Mumbai, Jan 17: Fugitive underworld don Dawood Ibrahim has a second wife who is a Pakistani and he has lied about divorcing his first wife, his nephew has told the National Investigation Agency which is probing a case pertaining to a global terrorist network and a criminal syndicate involved in terrorist and criminal activities in India.

The statement of Alishah Parkar, son of Dawood's sister Haseena Parkar, is part of the charge sheet filed by the NIA in the case in November last year. The case is related to a global terrorist network and a transnational organised criminal syndicate, namely 'D-Company', which it claimed is involved in various terrorist and criminal activities in India.

'Dawood Ibrahim Kaskar wife's name is Maizabin and he is having three daughters Marukh (married to Junaid, son of Javed Miandad), Mehrin (married) and Maziva (unmarried) and one son Mohin Nawaz (married)," Alishah Parkar said in the statement, which was made

"Dawood Ibrahim is having a second wife, she is Pakistani Pathan," he said, adding that Dawood Ibrahim shows that he has divorced his first wife, but the fact is it's wrong.

He further mentioned that Dawood Ibrahim lives in a defence area behind Abdullah Gazi Baba Dargah in Karachi, Pakistan, along with his family. The NIA in its charge sheet alleged that Ibrahim had sent a "huge amount of money" through hawala channels to accused arrested in the case pertaining to aiding terrorist activities of 'D-Company' in India.

4 Kanjhawala accused charged with murder

New Delhi, Jan 17: The Delhi Police has slapped murder charges against four of the accused in the Kanjhawala accident case in which a woman was killed after being dragged by a car, officials said on Tuesday.

Six of the seven accused in the case were initially charged under section 304 (Culpable homicide not amounting to murder), they said. Police said Amit Khanna (25), Krishan (27), Mithun (26), and Manoi Mittal, who were inside the car at the time of the incident have been slapped with murder charge.

Earlier, the police had said murder charges were slapped against six of the seven accused."We have added murder charges against four accused who were present inside the car at the time of the incident," said Deputy Commissioner of Police (Outer) Harendra K Singh. A murder charge may attract death penalty or imprisonment for life and fine. "In the Sultanpuri incident, after collection of physical, oral, forensic and other scientific evidence, the police has added section 302 IPC in place of section 304 IPC," Sagar Preet Hooda, Special Commissioner of Police (Law and order) said.

The move comes a day after the Delhi Police told a sessions court that it will invoke section 302 of the Indian Penal Code in the case. In a statement, Deputy Commissioner of Police (Outer) Harendra K Singh said the police has moved the Motor Accident Claim Tribunal (MACT) for early grant of compensation to victim's family. After examination of facts and circumstances, a case under sections 279 (Rash driving or riding on a public way) and 304A (Causing death by negligence) of the Indian Penal Code was registered, he said. During further investigation, section 304 (Punishment for culpable homicide not amounting to murder), 120B (criminal conspiracy) and 34 (common intention) were also added in the case on the same day on which the incident was reported, he said.

New Delhi, Jan 17: India on Tuesday welcomed the UN Security Council decision to declare Pakistan-based Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) leader Abdul Rehman Makki as a global terrorist and said it would continue to press the international community to take credible, verifiable and irreversible action against the menace.

External Affairs Ministry spokesman Arindam Bagchi said threats from terrorism in the region remain high and sanctions by the UNSC were an effective tool to curb such threats."We welcome the decision of the UN Security Council's ISIL and Al Qaida Sanctions Committee to list Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) terrorist Abdul Rehman Makki, who is also the brother-inlaw of LeT leader Hafiz Saeed. Bagchi said in response to questions.

Makki, the 68-year-old brotherin-law of Jamat-ud Dawa (JuD) chief and Mumbai attack mastermind Hafiz Saeed, was designated

a global terrorist by the UN after China lifted its hold on a joint India-US proposal to blacklist the deputy chief of Pakistan-based terror group LeT.

Bagchi said Makki has occupied various leadership roles in LeT, including raising funds for the organisation. "Threats from terrorist organisations in the region remain high and listings and sanctions by the UNSC, are an effective tool to curb such threats and dismantle terror infrastructure in the region," Bagchi said.

He said India remained committed to pursuing a zero-tolerance approach to terrorism and will continue to press the international community to take credible, verifiable and irreversible action against terrorism. In Beijing, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Wang Wenbin described terrorism as a "common enemy of humanity" and praised Pakistan's efforts in taking action against the scourge

"The relevant people have been



convicted and sentenced by Pakistan. The listing also shows Pakistan's firm combat against terrorism, it is a recognition,' Wang said, without elaborating why China, a close ally of Pakistan, decided to put a technical hold in the first place.

Two terrorists killed

Srinagar, Jan 17: Two Lashkare-Toiba terrorists were killed in a brief encounter with security personnel near the court complex in Jammu and Kashmir's Budgam district on Tuesday, police said.

"On a specific input about the movement of terrorists through Budgam, a joint area domination party of the Army and Police tried to stop one suspected vehicle near the court complex. Terrorists fired upon and in retaliation two terrorists were killed," a police spokesperson said.

Additional Director General of Police, Kashmir, Vijay Kumar said the slain terrorists were affiliated to proscribed outfit Lashkar-e-Toiba and have been identified as Arbaaz Mir and Shahid Sheikh, both from Pulwama district. Kumar

said both the terrorists had escaped from a cordon and search operation last week in the nearby Magam area.

An AK rifle and a pistol were recovered from them, he said. Speaking to reporters on the sidelines of an event, DGP Dilbag Singh said the militants were probably looking for a new hideout after they fled from the previous one last week.

"There was an operation in Redbugh area two days ago in which there was some firefight, but terrorists managed to escape. We were looking for them and check-points had been put up for that. "We had inputs about their movement in a vehicle. When this vehicle was signalled to stop, terrorists came down and started firing. In the retaliatory fire, two terrorists were killed," Singh said.

Joshimath sinking: Anatomy of a Himalayan disaster in the making

Joshimath (Uttarakhand), Jan 17: Joshimath is a town on the edge. It's the very precipice for thousands of people, despairing as the lives they have always known slip away just as their mountain town sinks a little more each day and cracks on their homes get dangerously wider.

Families are segregated, and pets and cattle remain unattended as people move out to safety. Many small businesses have shut shop or are in the process of doing so. The future looms dark and uncertain with residents saying they are not sure how long it will take for the earth to swallow their hometown.



'This is a disaster in the making. Many of its implications will unfold in the days to come. You will soon see an epidemic of mental issues cropping up in the town,' Atul Sati, president of the Joshimath Bachao Sangarsh Samiti

and environmental activist, said. The fear of the unknown tomorrow is constant. Two weeks after she woke up to a loud sound, akin to stones crumbling against each other. Nita Devi is still in a daze. The family has been evacuated to safety and she returns each day to see if her home is still intact.

"I have just one request from the government - provide us with a house. We just need a roof over our heads," she said, her eyes welling up. Next to a red cross, a stark contrast to the blue walls of what was once her home, is an orange sticker saying "unusable". For the 65-year-old, the vivid colours are cruel irony for the gloom edging her life and that of her town.

Where can we go from here? My son had a furniture business here which is now shut. My grandson used to go to school here," she said, pointing to gaping fissures that were not so long ago hairline cracks on the walls of her home."My son told me it is dangerous to live in the house as the land around

the neighbourhood is sinking." Nita Devi and her family are not alone. Joshimath, a town of nearly 23,000 people in Uttarakhand's Chamoli district at a height of over 6,150 feet, is slowly sinking, said experts. Disaster response teams are on standby and officials ready plans to evacuate 40 per cent of the town if the situation worsens. However, fears all of Joshimath town might need to be evacuated as every life matters.

Cracks have developed in nearly 850 buildings, including a temple and the Auli Ropeway, and on pavements and streets. An estimated 165 buildings are in danger zone. Some hotels now lean on each other. Over 600 people from 145 families have so far been shifted from their homes to schools, gurdwaras, hotels and homestays. A walk through the streets in some places tells the story of the slow devastation that the subsidence has caused. A team of experts from seven organisations has been constituted to studyand give recommendations on the situation in Joshimath.

Cairo, Jan 17: Amid Yemen's longest-ever pause in fighting more than nine months — Saudi Arabia and its rival, the Iran-backed Houthi rebels, have revived backchannel talks, according to Yemeni, Saudi and UN Officials. The two sides hope to strengthen the informal cease-fire and lay out a path for a negotiated end to the long civil war.

The quiet is fragile, with no formal cease-fire in place since a UNbrokered truce ended in October. It has been shaken by Houthi attacks on oil facilities and fiery rhetoric from Yemen's internationally recognised government, allied with Saudi Arabia, which complains it has so far been left out of the talks. Lack of progress could lead to a breakdown and a renewal of all-out fighting.

But all sides appear to be looking for a solution after eight years of a war that has killed more than 150,000 people, fragmented Yemen and driven the Arab world's poorest country into collapse and near starvation in one of the world's worst humanitarian crises.

Saudi Arabia restarted indirect

exchanges with the Houthis in September, when it became clear the UN-brokered truce wouldn't be renewed. Oman has been acting as intermediary. "It's an opportunity to end the war," a UN official said, "if they negotiate in good faith and the talks include other Yemeni actors." Like other officials, the UN official spoke on condition of anonymity because of the fragility of the talks.

A Saudi diplomat said his country has asked China and Russia to exert pressure on Iran and the Houthis to avoid escalations. Iran, which has been regularly briefed on the talks by the Houthis and the Omanis, has so far supported the undeclared truce, the diplomat said. The Houthis maintain their grip over the north, Sanaa, and much of the heavily populated west. The government and militias hold the south and east, including the key central areas with most of Yemen's oil reserves. The war has bled beyond Yemen's borders, with the Houthis attacking Saudi Arabia and the UAE with ballistic missiles and explosive-

China's Covid death data underestimate true toll, says report

New Delhi, Jan 17: The nearly 60,000 Covid-related deaths China reported for the first five weeks of its current outbreak, the largest the world has ever seen, may underestimate the true toll by hundreds of thousands of fatalities, experts were quoted as saying in a media report.

China's abrupt pivot from Covid Zero in early December (2022) unleashed a surge of omicron infections and led to 59,938 virus-related deaths in the nation's hospitals through January 12, Bloomberg news agency reported, citing the figures disclosed by the National Health Commission.

While the number swamps the few dozen deaths previously recorded in the official tally - which drew widespread criticism both at home and abroad, including from the World Health Organisation (WHO) - experts say it's still likely to be an underestimate given the enormous scale of the outbreak and the mortality rates seen at the height of omicron waves in other countries that initially pursued a Covid Zero strategy, the news agency reported.

Islamabad, Jan 17: Pakistan has been made to realise its consistent failure in ensuring religious security to minorities with the United Nations (UN) calling for immediately curbing coerced religious conversions, child marriages, kidnapping of teenage girls and their forced conversions and marriage to men twice their age.

In an appeal to Pakistan, the UN has urged the authorities to "stop the alleged abuse and kidnapping of teenagers, who are

trafficked far from their homes

and made to marry men sometimes twice their age'

Rights experts, while reporting to the UN Human Rights Council (UNHRC), presented many reports, giving clear indications of outright involvement of religious authorities and the complicity of security forces and the justice system, in cases of kidnapping, forced conversions and child marriages.

Despite the fact that Pakistan has made efforts to pass legislations prohibiting such illegal practices, rights experts have called on the Pakistan government to take tangible and on ground steps to curb the consistently increasing injustice to minorities.

"We urge the government to take immediate steps to prevent and thoroughly investigate these acts objectively and in line with domestic legislations and international human rights commitments. The perpetrators must be held fully accountable," the experts said.

"Pakistan's courts have enabled the perpetrators by accepting fraudulent evidence from them, regarding the age of the victims and their



willingness to marry and convert to Islam," a group of independent experts and special rapporteurs of the UN emphasised, putting significant focus on upholding the rights of women and children.

Criticising the justice system being manipulatively flawed in such matters, the rights experts said that the Pakistani courts have also "misused interpretations of religious laws to justify victims remaining with their abusers".

"The police had also failed the victims' families by refusing to register abductions, or dismissing them as

Govt allocates 3 more coal blocks

New Delhi: The government Tuesday allocated three more coal mines under commercial mining to the successful bidders. With this, allocation orders have been issued for 48 coal mines so far having a cumulative peak rated capacity 89 million tonnes per annum (MTPA) under commercial mining. Representatives of successful bidder received allocation orders from Additional Secretary (Coal) M Nagaraju who stressed on participation of private sector for contributing towards energy security, the coal ministry said in a statement. The cumulative production capacity of the three blocks mines is 3.7 MTPA and its geological reserves is 156.57 MT. These mines are expected to generate an annual revenue of ₹408 crore and will attract capital investment of ₹550 crore.

'OMCs' profitability to

New Delhi: State-owned Indian Oil Corporation (IOC), Bharat Petroleum Corporation Ltd (BPCL) and Hindustan Petroleum Corporation Ltd (HPCL) are likely to see weak earnings in current fiscal year despite fall in oil prices mainly because of losses they incurred on holding prices in the first half, Moody's Investors Service said Tuesday. "As international oil prices cool on economic slowdown concerns, marketing losses wil ease for the three state-owned refining and marketing companies, IOC, BPCL and HPCL. Still, overall earnings for fiscal 2023 ending on March 31, 2023 will be weak because of marketing losses in the first half, when net realized prices did not increase as much as international prices because of fuel price caps," it said.

Mineral production rises 9.7 pc in Nov

New Delhi: The country's mineral production rose by 9.7 per cent in November as compared to the year-ago period, the mines ministry said Tuesday. The cumulative growth for April-November was 4.7 per cent over the corresponding period of the previous financial year. according to provisional figures of the Indian Bureau of Mines. "The index of mineral production of mining and guarrying sector for the month of November, 2022 at 105.8, is 9.7 per cent higher as compared to the level in the month of November, 2021," the mines ministry said in a statement. The output of important minerals in November included coal (761 lakh tonnes), lignite (32 lakh tonnes), natural gas (utilised) 2,779 million cubic metres, petroleum (crude) 24 lakh tonnes and bauxite at 2,228 thousand tonnes

Mumbai, Jan 17: Rising home prices and rentals in large Indian cities could pose a new challenge to the country's central bank in its fight against inflation, even though headline consumer price rises have likely peaked, analysts warn.

Housing rentals and ancillary costs have a 10.07% weightage in India's consumer price inflation basket and are near three-vear highs, posing a fresh worry for the central bank that had to contend with rising food prices for most of last year.

Housing has turned sticky and is being watched closely for indications of second-order effects, a senior official aware of the Reserve of India's (RBI) thinking said.

Urban housing inflation rose to 4.47% year-on-year in December 2022, versus 3.61% in the same period a year ago and 3.21% in December 2020, data from the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation showed.

to its highest levels since 2019. India's retail inflation fell to 5.72% in December, within the RBI's comfort zone of 2%-6% for a second straight month after staving above the upper end for the first 10 months of last year.

However, core inflation, which typically excludes volatile food and fuel prices, remained close to 6%.

"Core inflation has continued to remain sticky and hence an increase in housing inflation poses a significant risk to the overall inflation outlook," said Aditi Gupta, an economist at Bank of Baroda.

She noted that the non-food basket has shouldered much of the recent inflationary pressure.

In the top seven cities, rentals rose 20%-25% on average in 2022 from pre-pandemic levels, with some of the more popular housing societies recording a jump of more than 30%, real estate consultancy firm Anarock said.

Some trends - like hybrid work culture and the need for bigger homes – are likely to stay despite

the pandemic impact waning and could spill over into core inflation amid 'sticky' rental prices, said Ranjani Sinha, chief economist at rating CareEdge Group.

A housing price index, compiled by the RBI to capture home sales. also shows a steady rise to its high est in over a decade as of the quarter ended September last year.

Average house prices in the top seven cities - National Capital Region, Kolkata, Mumbai Metropolitan Region, Pune. Hyderabad, Chennai and Bangalore - increased 4%-7% between October and December, according to Anarock.

That was mainly due to a rise in both input costs and post-COVID

While housing prices are not part of the consumer price inflation basket, their effect is captured through construction and raw material prices, and analysts do not expect a slowdown any time soon.

In fact, housing prices will rise steadily in the next few years, roughly in line with overall economic growth, a Reuters poll of property experts last month showed Bank of Baroda's Gupta echoed

that prediction. "While global commodity prices

have eased, they still remain elevated. Realtors will continue to push the rise in input prices to consumers. Even on the demand side, it continues to remain strong, which will push prices higher,' she added.

Higher interest rates have not been much of a deterrent so far and are unlikely to affect demand going forward. At least not until rates cross 9%, estimates Dhaval Ajmera, director at realty developer Aimera Realty and Infra India

Analysts said rising house prices would also feed into higher demand for services like electricity and repairs, ultimately working their way into the overall inflation basket.

China's GDP sinks to 3% in 2022, 2nd lowest in 50 yrs

Beijing, Jan 17: Hit hard by the zero-Covid policy and slump in the real estate market, China's economy shrank to three per cent in 2022, registering its second lowest growth rate in 50 years in the world's second-largest economy, according to official data released here Tuesday.

The annual GDP of China totalled 21.02 trillion yuan (USD 17.94 trillion) in 2022, falling below the 5.5 per cent official target, the National Bureau Statistics (NBS) said.

The slow pace was blamed mainly on the strictly implemented zero-Covid policy leading to periodic lockdowns and the ruling Communist Party's crackdown on big industrial firms besides the lingering real estate crisis.

This is the slowest growth of the Chinese economy since the 2.3 per cent registered in GDP in 1974.

Significantly this year, China's GDP in terms of dollars declined from USD 18 trillion in 2021 to USD 17.94 trillion last year mainly due to a sharp rise of the dollar against RMB (the Chinese currency)

In RMB terms, the Chinese economy last year posted 121.02 trillion yuan against the 2021 figure of 114.37 trillion yuan

The GDP growth in the fourth quarter was 2.9 per cent year-onvear, compared with 3.9 per cent in the third quarter as it was hit hard by recurring covid lockdowns of various urban centres, including the top industrial and business hubs like Shanghai.

Industrial output, an important economic indicator, expanded by 3.6 per cent year-on-year in 2022 and 1.3 per cent in December.

China's fixed-asset investment went up 5.1 per cent in 2022.

RBI cautions states against reverting to old pension scheme

Mumbai, Jan 17: The Reserve Bank has sounded a note of caution on reversion to the old pension scheme by some states, saying it poses a major risk on the 'subnational fiscal horizon' and would result in accumulation of unfunded liabilities in the coming years for them.

The observations in the RBI's Report titled 'State Finances: A Study of Budgets of 2022-23' comes in the backdrop of Congress-ruled Himachal Pradesh becoming the latest state announcing reverting to the Dearness Allowance (DA) linked Old Pension Scheme (OPS).

Earlier, governments of Rajasthan, Chhattisgarh, and Jharkhand informed the central government and the Pension Fund Regulatory and Development Authority (PFRDA) about their decision to restart the OPS for their employees. The government of Punjab on November 18, 2022 too had issued a notification regarding implementation of the OPS for the state government employees who are presently being covered under the NPS.

In 2004, the Union government came out with the National Pension System (NPS), a defined contribution pension scheme replacing the old pension scheme.

"A major risk looming large on the subnational fiscal horizon is the likely reversion to the old pension

scheme by some states. The annual saving in fiscal resources that this move entails is short-lived," the RBI report said. By postponing the current expenses to the future, the report said states risk the accumulation of unfunded pension liabilities in the coming years.

Under the old pension scheme, employees get a defined pension. Under this, an employee is entitled for a 50 per cent amount of the last drawn salary as pension.

However, the pension amount is contributory under the National Pension System, which is in effect from 2004. Several economists too have expressed concern over reverting to the OPS saying it would put stress on states' finances.

Former Deputy Chairman of the erstwhile Planning Commission Montek Singh Ahluwalia recently spoke against bringing back the OPS, saying it is one of the biggest 'revadis'.

For 2022-23, the RBI report said states have budgeted an increase in revenue spending, mainly led by non-developmental expenditure pension administrative services.

Budget allocations towards medical and public health and natural calamities have been lowered while housing outlay has been increased. Committed expenditure, comprising interest payments, administrative services and pension, is expected to increase marginally from 2021-22 (RE), the report said.

domestic net interest margin which rose by 121 basis points (bps) to 3.72 per cent year-on-year and by 23 bps sequentially, while global margins improved by 101 bps to 3.28 per cent on-year and by 24 bps sequentially, Managing Director and Chief Executive AK Das told reporters in a conference call. As a result along with higher loan sales saw the bank's net interest income soaring 64 per cent to ₹5,596 crore from the year ago period, he said, adding, however, non-interest income declined to ₹1.432 crore from ₹1.835 crore primarily roiled by treasury losses. He, however, guided for a moderation in the full year margin to around 3.25 per cent as the deposits get repriced. As the bank is yet to fully increase the deposit rates, the reporting quarter saw its yield on advances rising by 65 bps to 7.67 per cent on-year and by 46 bps from the previous quarter.

Bank of Maharashtra Q3 profit more than doubles

Bhubaneswar: State-owned Bank of Maharashtra (BoM) Monday reported more than two-fold jump in its profit at ₹775 crore in the quarter ended December 2022 due to increase in net interest income and improved asset quality. The Pune-headquartered public sector bank, which is eyeing a qualified institutional placement (QIP) of ₹500-1,000 crore in the fourth quarter, reported a net profit of ₹325 crore in



the year-ago period. Gross advances rose by about 22 per cent y-o-y to ₹1,56,962 crore. Within this, corporate advances grew by 25 per cent; retail (23 per cent), MSME (22 per cent) and agriculture (9 per cent). Total deposits increased by about 12 per cent to ₹2,08,436 crore as of December-end 2022. Within total deposits, the proportion on low-cost current account, savings account deposits stood at 52.50 per. Speaking about quarterly number, BoM Managing Director AS Rajeev said the net profit surged by a 138.76 per cent and operating profit has shown a growth of 35.94 per cent to ₹1,580 crore as against ₹1,162 crore in the same quarter a year ago. He said the bank aims to protect the profit growth in the current quarter and also maintain the Net Interest Margin (NIM) at the current level of 3.6 per cent.



Green Hydrogen Mission to help India meet net-zero targets: Experts

New Delhi, Jan 17: The National Green Hydrogen Mission is a 'significant step' towards achieving the country's net-zero targets and will help in reducing input costs of clean energy source, besides generating lakhs of job opportunities in the renewable energy sector, experts say.

The Union Cabinet January 4 approved the National Green Hydrogen Mission, which aims to make India a global manufacturing hub and a clean source of energy.

The objective of the Mission is also development of a production

capacity of at least 5 MMT (Million Metric Tonnes) per annum with an associated renewable energy capacity addition of about 125 GW in the country by 2030.

"I expect that the emphasis on demand creation, incentives and partnerships will kick-start the green hydrogen industry in the country and enable Indian companies to be on a level footing with the global energy suppliers. The industry is ready to support India's clean energy transition," Sumant Sinha, Chairman and CEO, ReNew Power.

Sinha. who is also the president of industry body Assocham, termed the launch of the mission 'a sig-



nificant step' towards helping India achieve net-zero targets. Ishver Dholakiya, MD of Goldi

Solar said the program will facilitate production, utilisation, and export, along with generation of lakhs of job opportunities in the renewable energy sector. The incentives will help bring

down the cost of input materials like electrolysers, which will help local players to become competitive at the global level, he said

Girishkumar Kadam, Senior Vice President & Co-Group Head -Corporate Ratings, ICRA Ltd said the round-the-clock procurement of renewable energy at competitive rates remains extremely critical for an improvement in the utilisation of electrolysers.

The timely implementation of the proposed PLI scheme to incentivise/promote the domestic manufacturing of electrolysers will be critical, he said.

Abhay Kumar Singh, ex-CMD of state-owned NHPC, said the cost of per kg hydrogen comes to around USD 3 at present. With the government's ambitious mission it will be

less than half in the times to come. "In April 2022, when I was CMD NHPC. the company had signed an agreement with the Himachal government to develop a pilot green hydrogen mobility project including hydrogen production," he said.

The mission will give a boost to investment sentiments of moreand more interest players, Singh said.

No.5 Aryna Sabalenka maintained her unbeaten start to the vear with a 6-1, 6-4 win over Tereza Martincova. Sabalenka, who won the Adelaide International title in the first week of the year, hit 29 winners to her opponent's seven as she won her fifth consecutive match. Sabalenka hasn't made it past the fourth round at the Australian Open in five previous visits.

Bamboo sticks to artificial turf: 'Hockey Village' set for transition

Saunamara (Odisha), Jan 17: In the small village that has given India some of its biggest hockey players, it all starts with sticks made from bamboo or kendu tree.

Every evening more than 100 children at Saunamara, a hamlet of little over 2000 tribal inhabitants in Odisha's Sundargarh district, play on a dusty ground, pursuing their dreams of becoming the next Dilip Tirkey, Amit Rohidas or Subhadra Pradhan.

Their fortunes, though, could change soon as an artificial turf will be ready by next month. That means the village, which is located just over 100km from Birsa Munda Stadium. the world's largest all-seater hockeyspecific venue in Rourkela, could churn out more international play-

Saunamara is now known as the 'Hockey Village' of India as it has given the country former men's team captain and Hockey India president Tirkey, current national team player Amit Rohidas, India junior team vice-captain Dipsan Tirkey and ex-India women's skipper Subhadra, among others.

This village is part of the Balisankara block of Sundargarh district, which is now considered the cradle of Indian hockey, having given more than 60 national team players, both male and female.

"There were no proper hockey ground in my village when I grow up. We had to play wherever we get some space. But now my village is going to have an artificial turf," Tirkey one of the finest defenders of his time and most capped player for India with 421 matches, told

"I am very happy for the children of my village and, at the same time, feeling proud of the contribution of my village for Indian hockey,' said the 45-year-old.

He said the artificial surface being laid out at his village is a sand-filled turf, which is most appropriate for schools and is a publicly accessible facility, because of its lower cost and multi-function-

The astro turf used for international matches costs at least Rs 4 crore but the price is lower for sand-filled artificial pitches. The



and some of them are already completed. The laying of the artificial surface at the Saunamara village, with

the accompanying field marking, is completed. Only the goal posts are to be erected. It will also have change rooms and other facilities at the front side which will have a

proper entrance. Construction started in December 2021 and was to be completed in one year. But there has been a slight delay and the facility

"Hockey is our life, it's in our blood and all the children in our village play hockey every evening,' said Aman Tirkey, a student of class seven at the Government UG High School. "When I grow up I want to play for the country like Dilip Tirkey or Amit Rohidas," he said, showing off his dribbling skills. "I am waiting for the new artificial turf to be completed and

then I will play there. The game of stick is not restricted to boys as girls like Sumitra Dhurwa also want to take up the sport as a career option. "I want to be Subhadra Pradhan, she is my idol. Our parents never stop us

from playing hockey. They rather support and tell me to go and play it," Sumitra, a class eight student of the same Government UG High

There is a problem for the children, though. All the children do not have modern hockey sticks and they have had to make their own from bamboo and kendu tree trunk. The base of the bamboo tree will be cut round to be used as

the ball. "We provide these modern hockey sticks to our students during games period. Moreover, we give away the old sticks to the students for free to take home," said Ishwarchandra Naik, head master of the Government UG High School

"But all the children at this village cannot have proper modern sticks. For those children of poorer parents, they have to play with sticks made of bamboo or kendu tree. They will cut the base of the bamboo into a round and hard object and will use it as a ball," he said.

Rather than stopping children from playing hockey, the parents of the village encourage them to take up the sport at an early age.

"Our father Vincent Tirkey was in the CRPF and he was a hockey player. He would take Dilip to all places to play hockey. I am also a hockey player. In the village, parents encourage their children to play hockey," Tirkey's older brother

Francis, said. The same is the case with Rohidas who was initiated to the sport by his father who took him to the village playground from a young age.

Saunamara is a unique village, with hockey being the most attractive thing for the people here. The lone and dusty playground has the paintings of several past and present India hockey players of Sundargarh region – Tirkey, Rohidas, Prabhodh Tirkey, Ignace Tirkey, Deep Grace Ekka and Subhadhra - strewn along with 'Chak de India' and 'My National Game' written on bold.

There is also a painting of a hand holding a hockey stick with the caption 'It's my life', summing up the craze of the national game in this village. Surprisingly, there is also a painting of former India cricket captain MS Dhoni.
