RBI keeps repo rate unchanged

(RBI) Thursday left its key interest rate unchanged for a second straight policy meeting but signalled that it wants to see inflation moderate more while preserving the growth momentum. The sixmember monetary policy committee (MPC) voted unanimously to keep the benchmark repurchase, or reporate unchanged at 6.50 per cent. RBI Governor Shaktikanta Das said headline inflation is still above the target of 4 per cent which is worrying.

■ Ghost-fearing students not ready to attend classes in school used as makeshift morgue

Balasore, June 8: The building of the Bahanaga Bazar High School in this district which was used as a make-shift morgue after the triple train disaster June 2, may be demolished, Collector Dattatraya Bhausaheb Shinde said Thursday. This is because students of the school are scared to return to their classes apprehending the presence of 'ghosts'. A total of 288 persons were killed in the train crash and many of the bodies were kept in the school.

Such is the reluctance of the young students and their parents to come back to a building associated with tragic mass death that the school management committee (SMC) has pleaded with the Odisha government to demolish the building as it is 65 years old.

Another accident averted at Bhadrak

Bhadrak: Another major train disaster was averted Wednesday night due to an alert Railway staff at Manjuri Road station in this district, sources said Thursday. They said that an employee found a boulder stuck in the middle of the inter-locking track at the Manjuri Road station. He alerted other officials and they removed the boulder at the appropriate time. Sources said that it was big enough to derail a train moving at speed. An investigation is underway by the RPF to determine how the stone was placed on the track.

Girls shine in Plus II Arts, Vocational exams POST NEWS NETWORK was 64.23% and it was

Bhubaneswar, June 8: Girls outshone boys with a better pass percentage in the Class XII state board exams for Arts and Vocational streams, the results of which were declared Thursday by the Council of Higher Secondary Education (CHSE).

Of the 2,30,545 students. 1,81,869 cleared the Plus-II (Arts) examinations, this year, and the overall pass percentage was 78.88%, down from 82.80% last year, School and Mass Education department secretary Aswathy Sinformed. While 70.43 per cent of boys passed the examinations, the percentage of girls, who cleared the tests. was 85.66%, the official said.

Similarly, 67.48 per cent of students cleared the examinations in Vocational stream this year. The pass percentage among boys

71.10% for girls. A total of 3,860 students appeared for the Vocational exams. There were 843 students who got first division, 1,751 got second division while 1,115 cleared the examination in third division.

Balasore district had the highest pass percentage of 84.97% in the Arts stream while Nabarangpur recorded the lowest pass percentage of 70.74%.

Regarding the dip in pass percentage, Aswathy said, "We cannot use this result as a yardstick since the pass percentage is better than that of pre-Covid times.

The exams were conducted from March 2 to April 5. The overall pass percentage in Science and Commerce streams, the results of which were declared May 31, were 84.93% and 81.12% respectively.

Man kills live-in partner; chops, boils body parts

Thane, June 8: In what can be said a replica of the horrific Shraddha Walker murder last year, a 56-year-old man was arrested late Wednesday night after killing his live-in partner and then chopping her body parts in this district of Maharashtra.

The deceased has been identified as Saraswati Vaidya (32) while the accused Manoj Sane (56) has been remanded in police custody till June 16 by a court Thursday, a police official said. The couple resided in a flat on the seventh floor of a building in the Mira-Bhayandar area for the past three years, the official said.

Police were alerted by local residents about a foul smell emanating from the flat, said an official. He informed that a forensic team which visited the spot confirmed that some of the body parts have been boiled in a pressure cooker while some parts were found in three buckets full of blood.






Cuttack, June 8: As the deadline for affixing High Security Registration Plates (HSRPs) on old vehicles registered prior to April 1, 2019, has ended February 28, 2023, and still many vehicles are spotted on roads without the new number plates, the State Transport Authority (STA) has decided to conduct a special drive from June 23, 2023, to detect such vehicles

and impose penalty. In a press note, Thursday, Transport, Road Safety & Enforcement additional commissioner Lalmohan Sethi, said, "As on June 7, a total of 40,93,608 vehicle owners have booked slots, out of which HSRPs have been affixed in 35.87.577 vehicles.

Vehicles owners are advised to affix HSRPs at the earliest to avoid

"In case the vehicle is not affixed with HSRP, an e-challan will be issued against the offending vehicle and attract fine of ₹5.000 or ₹10,000 under Section 192 of MV Act, 1988, as the case may be," the press note added.

Bhubaneswar, June 8: The State Level Single Window Clearance Authority (SLSWCA) led by Chief Secretary Pradeep Kumar Jena has approved 18 industrial projects worth ₹3,457 crore, which will generate employment opportunities for 14.436 persons.

Out of 18 approved proposals, 10 investment intents were received during the Make-in Odisha (MiO) Conclave 2022

The committee has given its goahead to nine projects in the metal sector, five in agro & food processing sector and one project each in textiles, cement, IT & ESDM, and pharmaceutical sectors. The approved projects will be set up in Jaipur, Khurda, Koraput, Cuttack, Sundargarh, Bhadrak, Subarnapur,

Bolangir and Boudh districts. Calderys India Refractories Ltd, an Indian subsidiary of Calderys headquartered in France, intends to set up manufacturing unit for acidic refractory bricks, acidic monolithics, refractory bricks, steel The projects will be set up in Jajpur, Khurda, Koraput, Cuttack, Sundargarh, Bhadrak, Subarnapur, **Bolangir and Boudh districts**

They will generate employment opportunities for 14,436 persons

SLSWCA recommended two proposals of IOCL and Toshali Cement Pvt Ltd to HLCA

casting flux, and precast prefired shaped refractory plant with an investment of ₹500 crore. TYK Corporation has proposed to set up its unit in Jajpur district at a cost

of ₹57 crore. While Caldery and TYK Corporation are setting up their first units in the state, SMS India Private Limited is further expanding to add a fourth unit of 4,000 MT/annum capacity of steel plant equipment. The firm proposed to in-

3 held for GED slum murder case in City

Commissionerate Police has arrested three absconding accused involved in the murder of Sushant Navak alias Kalia at GED slum in Unit IV area under Capital police limits May 24, DCP Prateek Singh claimed Thursday. The arrested were identified as Aiit Kumar Navak of Godipada in Navagarh, Bishal Kumar Nayak and Tikili Kumar Nayak of Nirakarpur in Khurda.

The accused were arrested from a hotel at Daringbadi in Kandhamal. The prime accused, Sujit Navak, a native of Sarankul area in Nayagarh, had surrendered before the SDJM court here May 31.

Recently, a case was lodged April 26 by Sushant's family alleging that a member of the accused familv had misbehaved with a lady of their family. A counter case was also registered by the accused family alleging that one Papuni Nayak, a relative of Sushant, had attacked one of the lady relative of Suit.

"Following the last fight between the families May 8, prime accused Sujit and his associates hatched a plan to eliminate Sushant. They came to know that Sushant was going away from his residence every morning. May 24, when he was returning home, they killed him," said Singh.

AGENCIES Bhubaneswar, June 8: Even after six days of the triple-train accident near Bahanaga Bazar station in Balasore district, some families are yet to receive bodies of their

loved ones. At least 288 passengers have died in the horrific train accident that occurred June 2. While 82 bodies have remained unidentified, other bodies have been handed over to the families of the deceased after verification of related documents, an official said Thursday.

Meanwhile, a lot of people from states like West Bengal, Jharkhand and Bihar are waiting at AIIMS Bhubaneswar for the mortal remains of their family members.

While no one is there to claim some bodies, multiple families claim one body. As the bodies are in very bad condition, the family members are also facing difficulties in identifying them. Now, the claimants are waiting for DNA test reports, which will be available in the next two to three days.

DNA samples of the deceased and claimants have been sent to AIIMS New Delhi for cross verification. Once the report is available, the bodies will be handed over to genuine claimants, the official said.

Meanwhile, a man from West Bengal alleged that his 22-year-old son's body has been handed over to

some other people of Bihar. Sibakanta Roy from Cooch Behar district of West Bengal is in trauma as the body of his son Bipul Roy was

taken by another family from Bihar. "I was in Arunachal Pradesh when I came to know about the shocking train accident of Coromandel Express in which my son was also travelling. I rushed back home and requested our BDO to arrange a vehicle. He arranged

it and I arrived at Balasore," Roy said. After searching here and there, the father found Bipul's picture tagged in a wall among the photographs of the deceased. When a stunned Sibakanta sought his son's body, he came to know that someone from Bihar had taken it.

"After reaching AIIMS Bhubaneswar, I came to know that my son's body was taken by someone else. Now what can I do? The officials also said that they had doubts while handing over the body to the Bihar family on the age of the deceased person they were claiming," he said.

"The identification of the remaining 82 bodies is being carried out. We are coordinating with concerned state government officials for proper verification of the claimants. reenhouse gas (GHG) emissions have been found to be "at an all-time high", with human activity resulting in the equivalent of 54 gigatonnes of carbon dioxide being released into the atmosphere on average every year over the last decade.

A group of 50 leading scientists have said in an analysis that humancaused global warming has continued to increase at an "unprecedented rate" since the last major assessment of the climate system published two years ago.

One of the researchers said the

analysis was a "timely wake-up call" and it comes as climate experts meet in Bonn, Germany, to prepare the ground for the major COP28 climate conference in the UAE in December, which will take stock of progress towards keeping global warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius by 2050.

The researchers wrote in the analysis that human-induced warming, largely caused by fossil fuel burning, reached an average of 1.14 degrees Celsius for the most recent decade (2013 to 2022) above pre-industrial levels, up from 1.07 degrees Celsius between 2010 and 2019.

It is now increasing at a pace of over 0.2 degrees Celsius per decade, they wrote in the journal Earth

System Science Data. In an initiative being led by the University of Leeds, UK, the scientists have developed an open data, open science platform - the Indicators of Global Climate Change. Its website will update information on key climate indicators every year.



Arguing that policymakers, climate negotiators and civil society groups need to have access to the latest and robust scientific evidence for decision-making, the scientists said that these key climate indicators have changed since the publication of the UN's Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change's (IPCC's) Sixth Assessment Working Group 1 report in 2021, which produced the key data that fed into the subsequent

IPCC Sixth Synthesis Report. While there has been a positive move away from burning coal, it has, in fact, added to global warming by reducing particulate pollution in the air, which has a cooling effect, the analysis noted.

Coordinator of the initiative, Piers Forster, Director of the Priestlev Centre for Climate Futures at Leeds, said, "Long-term warming rates are currently at a longterm high, caused by highest-ever levels of greenhouse gas emissions. But there is evidence that the rate of increase in greenhouse gas emissions has slowed.

'We need to be nimble footed in the face of climate change. We need to change policy and approaches in the light of the latest evidence about the state of the climate system. Time is no longer on our side. Access to up-to-date information is vitally important.

Decline in remaining carbon budget, an estimate of how much carbon that can be released into the atmosphere to give a 50 per cent chance of keeping global temperature rise within 1.5 degrees Celsius, another major finding of the analysis, has been attributed to a combination of continued emissions since 2020 and updated estimates

of human-induced warming. The IPCC calculated in 2020 this budget to be around 500 gigatonnes of carbon dioxide

By the start of 2023, the figure was roughly halved to 250 gigatonnes.

'Even though we are not yet at 1.5 degrees Celsius warming, the carbon budget will likely be exhausted in only a few years as we have a triple whammy of heating from very high CO2 emissions, heating from increases in other GHG emissions and heating from reductions in pollution.'

"If we don't want to see the 1.5 degrees Celsius goal disappearing in our rearview mirror, the world must work much harder and urgently at bringing emissions down," said Forster

Maisa Rojas Corradi, Minister of the Environment in Chile, IPCC author and a scientist involved in this study, said, "An annual update of key indicators of global change is critical in helping the international community and countries to keep the urgency of addressing the climate crisis at the top of the agenda and for evidence-based decision-making.'



Geopolitics of Nature

rom Russia's war against Ukraine to America's rivalry with China, tec-**▼** tonic geopolitical shifts have shaken multilateralism in recent years. While many of the consequences - from surging food and energy prices to the rising risks of major conflict - have been discussed at length, more attention must be devoted to the implications of these shifts for efforts to address the multifaceted climate and nature crisis.

The geopolitical change we are now experiencing threatens to split the world order in two. A key sign of this is the decision by much of the Global South to support – or at least refuse to condemn – Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine last year, despite the West's efforts to isolate and punish the

Moreover, the BRICS group of major emerging economies (Brazil, Russia, India, China, and South Africa) – which has always sought to create alternatives to Western-led international institutions – may be set to grow, as 19 countries have expressed interest in joining. There is also discussion of creating a new BRICS currency to challenge the US dollar's global dominance.

In the meantime, China is working hard to expand the international use of its own currency, the renminbi, and is achieving some success. Most recently, Brazilian President Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva has taken steps to facilitate renminbi-denominated trade settle-

ment between China and Brazil Forging the shared sense of purpose and marshaling the coordinated action needed to tackle the climate and nature crisis would be difficult in the best of times. In a world characterised by distrust, competition, fiscal constraints, and divergent political priorities, it appears almost impossible. And yet, far from building bridges, many – particularly in the Global North – are exacerbating divisions.

The European Union's recent legislation banning imports of products linked to deforestation is a case in point. The law – which requires companies selling goods like coffee, beef, and soy in the EU to provide verifiable proof that they were not grown on recently deforested land - has been welcomed by green activists and European politicians. But the measure has also met with considerable criticism - and not only from agri-business interests seeking to avoid incurring costs for environmental destruction. Shortly before it was passed, the Brazilian and Indonesian governments submitted a letter, signed by 14 World Trade Organization member states lamenting that the EU was pursuing "unilateral legislation," rather than "international engagement." By failing to consult with the relevant countries, the EU devised "costly and impractical traceability and geolocalisation requirements" for an "uncertain and discriminatory" list of products.

Voluntary carbon-credit markets and emerging biodiversity-credit markets are similarly

flawed. Rich-country critics complain that these markets have failed to deliver credible "additional" reductions of atmospheric carbon. Scandals arising from widespread flaws in certified nature-based carbon credits are a case in point. Leaders from the Global South, for their part, highlight the inequalities they perpetuate, with carbon credits being bought for as little as \$5-10 in the Global South and then sold for \$100 or more in Europe.

Moreover, developing-economy leaders highlight wealthier countries' reluctance to fund the preservation of existing forests. At the recent One Forest Summit, co-hosted by Gabonese President Ali Bongo Ondimba and French President Emmanuel Macron, Gabon's environment minister, Lee White, noted that, as some of the world's most important carbon sinks, "forests potentially represent 20-30% of the solution to climate change." Carbon credits can help channel financing toward forest preservation, but only if they are purchased at fair and predictable prices.

There are relatively straightforward ways to improve engagement and accelerate progress toward shared climate and nature goals. For example the EU's deforestation law could have a far greater impact – and inspire more effective cooperation – if it included support for measures to advance, rather than override, relevant legislation in affected countries. Moreover, building on the insights shared during the One Forest Summit, rich countries could embrace the idea of delivering ecosystem-service payments to countries that maintain their forests, and establish a price floor for carbon and biodiversity credits.

The G7's recently announced Alliance of Nature Positive Economies conceived as a "forum to share knowledge and create information networks on a voluntary basis in collaboration with the private sector and civil society" - could support the shift toward greater collaboration beyond the G7. Key would be to focus on how to address nature and climate goals without deepening existing technological advantages and erecting more trade barriers, and instead to focus on inclusivity and equity.

Brazil's G20 presidency in 2024, and its role as host of the United Nations Climate Change Conference in 2025 (COP30), also represent important opportunities. As the world's most influential representative of nature-rich developing economies, Brazil could use these platforms to mobilise greater support for the countries that are doing the most to protect the climate and preserve nature, despite having done the least to cause the crises we face. Transforming the global economic and financial architecture to advance sustainability goals will be key.

Nature and climate will be part of the new geopolitics, for better or worse. The alternative to a more inclusive approach is not slower progress, but potentially no progress at all. Just as Russia has redirected its energy exports to countries that have not embraced Western sanctions, food exporters, facing de facto deforestation "sanctions" from the EU, may simply find new buyers for their goods. In such situations, everyone loses,

Without a collaborative approach, nature-rich countries may even decide to create a sovereign sellers' club aimed at improving their terms of trade. like OPEC has long done for oil producers. Already, Brazil, Indonesia, and the Democratic Republic of the Congo - which possess the world's largest tropical forests - have formed an alliance focused essentially on pressuring the rich world to finance forest conservation.

Measures like the EU's deforestation legislation or voluntary carbon markets may look like steps in the right direction. And they may bring shortterm benefits. But by alienating the developing world – at a time of global geopolitical realignment, no less – their long-term costs may be too high.

REPEAL OR RETAIN?

WHAT A **DISGRACE THAT WE ARE RETAINING THIS COLONIAL-ERA** LAW, EVEN **AFTER WE BECAME A DEMOCRATIC-REPUBLIC 73** YEARS AGO!

hen the Supreme Court stayed all proceedings relating to cases of sedition under Section 124-A of the Indian Penal Code on 11 May, 2022 till its further order in SG Vombatkere Vs Union of India case, there was an apprehension that this archaic law of the imperialistic era would encounter its demise at any moment. But it does not seem to be so. The 22nd Law Commission of India (LCI), in its 279th Report (2023) has not only reiterated its justification for retention of this law, but also has recommended for a harsher punishment for this crime.

The Commission, headed by Justice Ritu Raj Awasthi, former Chief Justice of Karnataka High Court, in its latest report cites how some people weaponise the powerful social media to propagate hatred and topple democratically elected governments through violent means, and for that it has recommended to increase the lower limit of punishment from 3 years to 7 years. At present the punishment for sedition is 3 years or life imprisonment

The LCI has been vocal on reform of sedition law since very long. In its 42nd Report (1971) the LCI made three broad suggestions - first, incorporate mens rea or criminal intent in the Section; second, widen scope of the Section by incorporating the Constitution, Legislature and the Judiciary along with the Government; and third, bridge the abnormal gap of fine or 3 years' imprisonment to life imprisonment, by making the maximum imprisonment to 7 years. Regarding abolition of sedition law, however, the LCI also vacillated between yes and no.

The 267th Report (2017) of the LCI makes clear distinction between sedition and "hate speech." The report suggests that only those expressions which threaten the sovereignty, integrity and security of India should attract the provision of sedition. In 2018 the Law Commission was again asked by the Central government to examine various pros and cons of Section 124-A of the IPC and make recommendations for reforming

the law. The Commission put up a Consultation Paper in public domain for a wider discussion over the topic. The present suggestions come through the 279th Report.

This latest proposal of the LCI has once again given life to an animated national-debate over the highly controversial and archaic sedition law. It is to be noted here that the present Central government is in no mood to abolish this law and that has been cleared on the floor of the House by then Minister of State for Home Affairs, Nityanand Rai who clarified: "There is a need to retain this provision to effectively combat antinational, secessionist and terrorist elements.

The present sedition law was enacted by the British government against its colonized subjects to prevent the repetition of the 1857-type mutiny and other such serious uprisings. The original law of sedition was drafted by Thomas Macaulay and it was in-

troduced into the IPC in 1870. The original law mentioned: 'Whoever by words, either spoken or intended to be read or by signs, or by visible representation, or otherwise, excites or attempts to excite, feelings of disaffection to the Government established by law in British India, shall be punished with transportation for life or any term to which fine may be added, or with

imprisonment for a term which may extend to three years, to which fine may be added, or with fine.

The British enacted this draconian law to intimidate and silence the Indian subjects, and punished freedom-fighters like Mahatma Gandhi, Bal Gangadhar Tilak, Maulana Azad, Annie Besant and innumerable others. What a disgrace that we are retaining this oneand-half century-old law, even after we became a democratic-republic 73 years ago! We retain the law word for word, the only changes being the deletion of the word "British", and substitution of the word "transportation" with "imprisonment"!

Our first Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru was a fierce critic of this sedition law, and even in a Parliamentary debate in 1951, he had condemned this law as "highly objectionable and obnoxious." He opined that the sooner the nation got rid of it, the better. But Nehru preferred not to walk his talk on this issue during the next 13 years of his tenure. Even his subsequent governments did nothing to abolish or amend this archaic and ambiguous law.

Should we retain this law or abolish it? Curiously, both supporters and opponents of this law have equally strong arguments in their favours. While the support ers give emphasis on "integrity and security" of the nation, the op-

ponents emphasise on "liberty" of the individual. The former argues that the security, unity and integrity of the nation is the supreme concern and it can't be compromised or sacrificed for the sake of freedom of expression of individual citizens. They also argue that the constitutionally guaranteed right to freedom of expression is not absolute, and according to Article 19(2) it can be reasonably restricted in the interest of sovereignty, integrity and security of the nation.

Their opponents, with equal vigour, argue that freedom of ex pression is the soul of democracy, sine qua non for a moderncivilised society, and indispensable for all intellectual and artistic creations. They consider this law a serious threat to freedom of expression, and allege that this ambiguous and archaic law is more abused than used, mostly to harass and intimidate the political or ideological rivals of the party/people in power. That's why most of the accused of this "crime" are hardly convicted by the courts of law.

The constitutionality and legality of sedition law have been challenged before the Supreme Court several times, but the apex court has declined to scrap this law with the logic that mere abuse of a law is no ground for its abolition. In the landmark Kedar Nath Singh Vs State of Bihar case (1962), the 5-Judge Constitution Bench of the SC upheld the constitutional validity of the sedition law, with the explanation that sedition charge can be made only when there is incitement to violence in speech or writing, or there is intention to

disturb law and order. Justifying its necessity, the SC explains in this judgement that crime of sedition is crime against the State and this law is intended to protect the very existence of the State. This logic seems to be more infallible now in view of the changed circumstances. So we must retain this law, but of course, with proper reforms.

▲ made remarkable strides in food production. As per the NSSO's latest annual Periodical Labour Force Survey for 2021-22, the farm sector's share in India's employed labour force is 45.5%. No wonder, India produces more food than it requires for thriving! The food grain production in India touched a record quantity of 323.55 million tonnes in 2022-23. Yet in the 2022 Global Hunger Index, India fared poorly with a rank of 107th out of 121 countries scoring merely 29.1 on a 100-point scale. India faces a paradoxical challenge of grappling with food insecurity despite its significant over-production. As per the UN Food Waste Index Report, 2021. India wasted 50 kilos of food per person per vear. Before shedding light on the factors contributing to India's food security conundrum, let us have a look at some more statistics. India has one of the highest rates

of malnutrition in the world. As per the last National Family Health Survey (NFHS-5), around 37.9% of children under the age of five in India are stunted (low height for age), 20.8% are wasted (low weight for height), and 35.7% are underweight. The State of Food Security

and Nutrition in the World 2021 housing, transportation network MARKNET to strengthen marcultural heritage, which has report estimated 189.2 million people in India to be undernourished, accounting for 13.4% of the total world population. As per the last available government data on per capita calorie intake presented in the Parliament, people in rural areas consume 2,233 kcal a day, while those in urban take 2.206 kcal, which are lower than the recommended daily dietary allowance of 2,320 kcal.

Despite record-breaking farm output, India continuing to suffer from food insecurity highlights a critical discrepancy between production and access. The wastage of food is rampant from the point of production to the point of distribution. The system of agricultural marketing suffers from several defects. Lack of warehouse is a major infrastructural concern in rural areas, in absence of which farmers are compelled to store products in kutcha storehouses which lead to wastage. considerable Approximately 1.5% of the products get rotten in this process rendering them unfit for human consumption. Due to this reason, supply in rural markets increases substantially and farmers fail to get fair price for their products. Along with post-harvest management and warefood reaches those in need. Many villages in rural India are not yet joined by railways and pucca roads to the mandis and transportation of farm produce on slow moving vehicles is often not feasible to carry them to far-off places. The socio-economic disparities

among the regions also contribute to unequal access to food. If we see the history of India, the green revolution of 1960s which modernised agriculture through technology adoption primarily benefited Punjab, Haryana and UP leaving other parts mostly unaffected. Food insecurity is also not evenly distributed across India where some states like Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, Jharkhand, and Chhattisgarh face higher levels of food insecurity compared to other states. So, poverty continues to affect access of the under-privileged section to food. Apart from the above-mentioned factors, low farmer income, lack of crop diversification, lack of financial support mechanism to safeguard livelihood and land fragmentation also contribute to the misery.

It is not that the government is not making efforts to curb these problems. Starting from AG-

storages at district level and midday meal scheme in schools, successive governments have introduced several policies. However, the effect is not as visible as they should be after 76 years of Independence. The GHI ranking us lower than Sri Lanka, Nepal and Pakistan is embarrassing for us and calls for serious action. It is high time food insecurity in India, particularly malnutrition among children, is addressed properly. As citizens we can also serve the cause and extend help to our citizens by simply not wasting food in our day

India's struggle with food security, despite its impressive agricultural production, calls for a comprehensive approach that addresses systemic challenges. By focusing on improving storage and distribution, reducing inequality, implementing farmer-friendly policies. building resilience to climate change. India can make significant strides towards a future where food security is a reality for all its citizens.

Sir, The recent decision made by the Indian government to reduce subsidies for electric twowheeler manufacturers has raised concerns among proponents of clean fuel and sustainable transportation. The subsidy amount for electric two-wheelers has been decreased from 40% to 15% of the ex-factory price, effective from June 1. This move has left the entire industry in a precarious position and is likely to impede the mass adoption of electric mobility. The current market size of the Indian electric two-wheeler industry stands at \$890 million in 2022 and is projected to reach \$6 billion by 2030. Unfortunately, the sudden and substantial cuts in subsidies are likely to lead to a major decline in sales, which will have a detrimental effect on the entire industry. It also poses long-term challenges for achieving India's clean energy and emission reduction goals through increased EV penetration. India should look to successful models implemented in countries like China, United States and some European nations, which provide more substantial subsidies to promote faster adoption of EVs. The Indian government should reconsider its decision and extend the FAME (Faster Adoption and Manufacturing of Hybrid and Electric Vehicles) subsidy support to ensure sustained growth in the EV industry. Additionally, government must emphasize domestic manufacturing of electric vehicles and their components along with building a robust, localized EV ecosystem. India has the potential to become a global leader in clean and sustainable transportation but this vision can only be achieved by maintaining a favourable policy environment, incentivising domestic manufacturing and providing long-term support to the industry. Thane 'house of horror' reveals secrets

FLAT IN MIRA ROAD (EAST), AND TRIED TO HIDE THE STENCH BY SPRAYING ROOM FRESHENER

Thane, June 8: A Thane court Thursday sent Manoi Sane, who allegedly killed his live-in partner at their rented flat in Mira Road town, to police custody till June 16 even as it emerged that he is reportedly suffering from AIDS, while his "house of horror" revealed more macabre secrets.

Sane, 56, was arrested late Wednesday after he tried to flee from a police team that barged into his flat following complaints from the neighbours of a stench emanating from his home for the past couple of days.

In a new twist, Sane has claimed to the investigators that the victim - his live-in partner, Saraswati Vaidya, 32, had allegedly consumed poison and committed suicide, but the police have rubbished the claims as an attempt to "mislead" the probe into the mind-numbing crime.

Continuing its probe, the police discovered that the flat in which the chilling crime was committed is a veritable "house of horrors" bang in the midst of a quiet and unsuspecting middle-class residential locality.

There were at least three buckets stuffed with body parts of the victim, lots of blood splattered on the floor, walls and the bathroom, an electric saw, sharp knives, a mixer-grinder and a pressure cooker, a nauseating stench emanating from there, which Sane tried to "kill" by spraying lots of air-

'Filed false sexual harassment allegations against WFI chief'

New Delhi, June 8: The father of the minor wrestler told PTI Thursday that they deliberately filed a false police complaint of sexual harassment against WFI chief because they wanted to get back at him for the perceived injustice against the girl.

The startling admission by the father substantially weakens the case against Brij Bhusha Sharan Singh who has relentlessly faced protest for the past six months by wrestlers, who have accused him of sexual harassment. The complaint by the minor wrester has also led to investigation under POCSO Act.

"It's better that truth comes out now instead of court," he told PTI when asked why he is changing his story now. "Now that interactions have

started, the government has promised fair enquiry into my daughter's defeat (in Asian U17 championship trials) last year, so it is also my duty that I rectify my mistake," he said.

He also provided elaborated explanation for the origin of his and his daughter's animosity against Singh, who has vehemently denied the sexual harassment allegations, including against the minor. The origin of the animosity goes back to the 2022 Under 17 Asian Championship trials in Lucknow when the minor lost the final and missed out on selection to the Indian team. They blamed Brij Bhushan Sharan Singh for the referee's decision. "I was filled with rage my child's one-year hard work had gone down the drain because of that referee's decision in final and I decided to take revenge," he said.

Chennai, June 8: India's mission to send a manned submersible vehicle to a depth of 6.000 metres to explore the sea, as part of the Samudrayaan project, is progressing as scheduled and the vehicle will be ready soon, Union Minister for Earth Sciences Kiren Rijiju said Thursday.

The indigenous mission, which the National Institute of Ocean Technology (NIOT) here is working on, will involve three people going to a depth of 6,000 metres under the sea in the submersible vehicle called 'Matsya 6000'. Samudravaan, comprising manned and unmanned exploration, is a very critical effort started by the ministry of earth sciences. The unmanned mission has gone beyond 7.000 metres, while the submersible for the manned mission is under construction," the minister said.

"I will be overseeing the progress of the construction with our scientists and engineers. I hope we will complete it on time." the minister told reporters here after speaking at the World Ocean Day celebrations at NIOT.

He said India will have to play a critical and leadership role in exploration of the ocean and develop resources in a sustainable manner for a balanced ecosystem, "Similar to space exploration, we need to go deeper into the ocean and do research. We must be prepared to go

The rail-cum-road bridge connects Patna district at Parev village and Koilwar of Bhojpur district on the Sone River. The Abdul Bari Pul was constructed in 1862. Generally, the department of railways puts over 100-year-old bridges in the dangerous category

The BESA, which is an association of members of the Bihar Engineering Services as well as other state government undertakings, said the audit will identify cies, if any in the structures of all recently completed and under-construction bridges

The Khagaria side of the bridge collapsed Sunday around 14 months after its Sultanganj side pillar number 5 had fallen on April 30 last year. BESA general secretary Rakesh Kumar said. "We must learn lessons from such incidents. A team of BESA members is collecting all relevant information from the ground. We will soon come out with our own report."

"We, however, demand that the state government orders structural audit of all completed and under-construction bridges in the state," he said. He said the audit will identify the flaws, weaknesses and deficiencies, if any.

The exercise will also safeguard properties and human lives, besides enhancing the longevity of structures, Kumar said. Commenting on the Bihar government's decision to suspend the executive engineer of Khagaria division following the incident, he said, "The BESA is not questioning the government's action... But why no action was taken against the authority engineer of the project? It is the responsibility of the contractor and the authority engineer



J'khand: NIA raids seven locations

New Delhi: The National Investigation Agency (NIA) has conducted searches at seven locations in Jharkhand and Bihar in connection with a brutal murder by cadres of the CPI (Maoist), a banned terrorist organisation, about five years ago, an official said Thursday. The victim, Naresh Singh Bhokta, was abducted and killed on the night of November 2, 2018, after being labelled as a police informer by the top leadership and Naxal cadres of CPI (Maoist) at a so-called 'Jan Adalat' (public hearing) convened by the banned terrorist outfit. His body was found near Badhai Bigha village in Madanpur police station area in Aurangabad district, Bihar.

Not good for bilateral ties: India to Canada

New Delhi, June 8: India Thursday warned Canada against giving space to separatists and extremists elements, saying it was not good for the bilateral ties, days after a video of a float, depicting the assassination of former Prime Minister Indira Gandhi, at a parade in Brampton went viral on social

At a media briefing, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said he has a similar message to the United Kingdom and Australia against allowing pro-Khalistani elements to operate from their ter-

On the issue of around 700 Indian students facing deportation from Canada due to fraudulent admissions, the external affairs minister said that India is in touch with Canada over it.

Asked about the Brampton event, the minister said,"I think there is a bigger issue involved. And the bigger issue involved really is the space that Canada has continuously and frankly, we are at a loss to understand other than the requirements of vote bank politics, why anybody would do this.'

would not like to repeat that history. It is not only one incident, however egregious it may be, Jaishankar said.

"I think there is a larger underlying issue about the space which is given to separatists, to extremists, to people who advocate violence and I think it is not good for relationships and not good for Canada," he added.

A video has emerged on social media that showed a float depicting the assassination of Indira Gandhi, in what appeared to be a glorification of violence by Sikh separatists. It was reportedly part of a parade that was organised by some Khalistani elements in Brampton.

Asked about reports of the Canadian NSA criticising India For commenting on Canada's in-

ternal matter, Jaishankar used a Hindi phrase.

"The phrase that came to mind is actually a Hindi phrase which is 'Ulta Chor Kotwal Ko Date' (the pot calling the kettle black).. If anybody has a complaint, we have a complaint about Canada...I was very perplexed by what I heard "he said. Canadian High Commissioner in India Cameron MacKay tweeted that there is no place in Canada for "hate or for the glorification of vi-

"I am appalled by reports of an event in Canada that celebrated the assassination of late Indian Prime Minister Indira Gandhi. There is no place in Canada for hate or for the glorification of violence. I categorically condemn these activities," he said. On the activities of Khalistani elements, Jaishankar said India has issues in the UK and Australia as well, apart from Canada.

On some Indian students facing deportation from Canada over charges that they did not study in the colleges they applied for, Jaishankar said India has taken up the issue with Canadian authorities. Mohd Aamil Malik, Mohini and Raminder Kaur from the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) and Kamaljeet Sehrawat, Gajender Singh Daral and Pankaj Luthra from the Bharativa Janata Party (BJP) are the six councillors who have been elected to the standing committee of the MCD.

Although the AAP is the ruling party in the MCD, the results of the standing committee election could affect the working of the civic body since all the executive decisions are taken by the committee which now has equal members from both the parties. The high court's May 23 order came on petitions by BJP councillors Kamaljeet Sehrawat and Shikha Roy against the mayor's decision to order repoll to elect the members of the panel, amid the running feud between the saffron party and the AAP.

The petitioners had alleged that the mayor, who belongs to AAP and was the returning officer, wrongly invalidated one of the votes and interdicted the election process upon finding the results "politically unpalatable".

Rujira was stopped at the Kolkata airport Monday when she attempted to board a flight to UAE with her two children. She was then served summons to appear before the agency at 11 am June 8. However, she reached the CGO

Complex around 12.40 pm along with her lawyer. She left the ED office around 4.20 pm following her questioning. Abhishek, the Chief Minister's nephew has alleged the questioning was an attempt at "harassing" his family and was aimed at halting his mass outreach campaign ahead of the panchayat elections in the state.

Meanwhile, the ED oserved a notice to Abhishek, summoning him to appear before its sleuths June 13 in connection with the central agency's probe into the primary school jobs scam.

7 killed in MP road accident

Sidhi, June 8: Seven persons, including a 10-year-old child, were killed and two others injured when a speeding truck hit a jeep and a twowheeler in Madhya Pradesh's Sidhi district Thursday, a police official said.

Covid can cause brain cells to fuse: Study

New Delhi, June 8: Infection with the SARS-CoV-2 virus can cause brain cells to fuse, initiating malfunctions that lead to chronic neurological symptoms, according to

SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes Covid-19, has been detected in the brains of people with "long Covid" months after their initial infec-

The new research, published in the journal Science Advances explored how SARS-CoV-2 alters the

function of the nervous system.

'We discovered Covid-19 causes

neurons to undergo a cell fusion

process, which has not been seen before," said Professor Massimo Hilliard from The University of Queensland, Australia.

"After neuronal infection with SARS-CoV-2, the spike S protein becomes present in neurons, and once neurons fuse, they don't die. They either start firing synchronously, or they stop functioning altogether," Hilliard said.

The researcher likened the role of neurons to that of wires connecting switches to the lights in a kitchen and a bathroom. "Once fusion takes place, each switch either turns on both the kitchen and bathroom lights at the same time, or neither of them," Hilliard said.



"It's bad news for the two independent circuits." he added. The discovery offers a potential explanation for persistent neurological effects after a viral infection, the researchers said.

SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes Covid-19. has been detected in the brains of people with "long Covid" months after their initial infection

"In the current understanding of what happens when a virus enters the brain, there are two outcomes-either cell death or inflammation," said Ramon Martinez-Marmol from The University of Queensland. "But we've shown a third possible outcome, which is neuronal fusion,' Martinez-Marmol said.

The researchers noted that numerous viruses cause cell fusion in other tissues, but also infect the nervous system and could be causing the same problem there. "These viruses include HIV, rabies, Japanese encephalitis, measles, herpes simplex virus and Zika virus," Martinez-Marmol said.

"Our research reveals a new mechanism for the neurological events that happen during a viral infection. This is potentially a major cause of neurological diseases and clinical symptoms that is still unexplored," he added.



Russia shells flooded Ukrainian city

Kherson, June 8: Russian forces Thursday shelled a southern Ukrainian city that was inundated in a catastrophic dam collapse, Ukrainian officials said, forcing a suspension of some rescue work hours after President Volodymyr Zelenskyy travelled to the area to assess the damage.

At least five people have died, many are homeless, and tens of thousands are without drinking water after the Kakhovka dam's destruction. Ukraine accused Russia of blowing of the facility, which Moscow's forces controlled, while Russia said Ukraine bombarded it.

The ensuing flooding has ruined crops, displaced land mines, wrought widespread environmental damage, and set the stage for longterm electricity shortages. Exclusive drone footage captured by The Associated Press showed the ruined dam falling into the flooded river and hundreds of submerged homes. greenhouses and even a church. In Kherson city, the largest mu-

shelling echoed overhead in the early afternoon not far from a square where emergency crews and volunteers were dispensing aid. Some evacuation points in the city were hit, wounding eight people, according to

Zelenskyy travelled to Kherson to see the efforts firsthand. He visited an aid distribution point and a medical facility and ordered Ukrainian officials to provide a "fair valuation" of the devastation to help compensate residents, his office said in an online update.

Bomb blast kills 11

Islamabad: A bomb ripped through a memorial service in Afghanistan's northeastern Badakhshan province Thursday, killing at least 11 people, officials said. A former Taliban police official was among those killed and more than 30 were also wounded in the explosion near Nabawi Mosque, according to Abdul Nafi Takor, the Taliban-appointed spokesman for the interior ministry. There were concerns that the number of casualties could rise further as more information becomes available, Takor added. The bombing apparently targeted the memorial service for Nisar Ahmad Ahmadi, the deputy governor of Badakhshan who was killed in a car bombing on Tuesday. That attack in Faizabad, the capital of Badakhshan, also killed the deputy governor's driver and wounded 10 other people. Moazuddin Ahmadi, the Taliban official in charge of information and culture, confirmed Thursday's explosion and the killing of Safiullah Samim, a former Taliban

Wildfires burn across Canada with little relief in sight

Canada, June 8: Forest fires continued to burn across Canada Thursday as the country endured its worst-ever start to wildfire season, forcing thousands of people from their homes and sending a smoky haze billowing across US About 3.8 million hectares (9.4 million acres) have already burned,

roughly 15 times the 10-year average, according to federal Minister of Emergency Preparedness Bill Blair. Warm, dry conditions were expected to persist in the months ahead.

Although wildfires are common in Canada, it is unusual for blazes to be burning simultaneously in the east and west, stretching firefighting resources and forcing the Canadian government to send in the mili-



tary to help. Hundreds of U.S. firefighters arrived in Canada to help

and more were on their way Prime Minister Justin Trudeau blamed climate change. "These fires are affecting everyday routines, lives and livelihoods, and our air quality" Trudeau said on Twitter Some of the worst fires have sprung up in the eastern province of Quebec, and more than 11,000 people had to evacuate their homes in

Wildfire season started unseasonably early in Alberta last month and burned a record area, and Nova Scotia continues to battle its largest-ever blaze. In parts of the Pacific province of British Columbia, which is facing the second-biggest wildfire on record, temperatures were forecast to hit

33 Celsius (91 Fahrenheit) on Thursday, before thunderstorms and heavy rains arrive on Friday.

Rob Schweitzer, executive director of BC Wildfire, said lightning strikes could spark more blazes in tinder-dry forests and the outcome would depend on how much precipitation comes with the storms. "When you get 150 or 200 strikes in one day from lightning coming through the province, it's impossible to have enough resources to suppress them all," he said.

Wildfires have eased in Alberta, the center of Canada's oil and gas industry, but more than 3,000 people remain under evacuation orders and heat warnings are in effect in the south of the province. Smoke-forecasting website BlueSky Canada showed wildfire smoke spreading across much of the country on Thursday.

Arctic summer could be practically ice-free by the 2030s: Study

New Delhi, June 8: The Arctic could get its first summer free of sea-ice by as early as the 2030s, a new study published in the journal Nature Communications has found.

The study by an international team of researchers, led by Yeon-Hee Kim at Pohang University of Science and Technology in South Korea, predicted that the sea ice-free Arctic could happen 10 years earlier than previously thought, regardless of the greenhouse gases (GHG) emissions scenario.

Arctic sea ice area (SIA) has been declining rapidly throughout the year during recent decades with a steeper decline since 2000, the study said.

In the Arctic Ocean, the sea ice area grows and shrinks over the course of the year. Additional sea ice forms in the winter, increasing sea ice area and usually reaches its maximum extent in March. In contrast, sea ice area reduces to its lowest in September, following melting in summer.

The study attributed GHG increases, increased human influence in the Arctic cryosphere and reduction in aerosol emissions since the 1980s following the El Chichon volcanic eruption to be the drivers



of the Arctic SIA reduction, ob-

served throughout the year. Previous models have underestimated the extent of contribution

of GHG to SIA reduction, the study said. This study compared satellite observations with advanced climate models and conducted an up-

dated detection and attribution analysis of the observed Arctic SIA changes across all months over the 1979 - 2019 period

It also said that this study had a smaller observed uncertainty because it used SIA for analysis. Previous studies were mostly based on sea ice extent, it said. While SIA is defined as the actual area covered with sea ice, sea ice extent is the total area of all grid cells with at least 15 per cent sea ice concentration and hence is strongly grid dependent.

Further, based on the quantified GHG contribution to the observed Arctic SIA reduction, the study has projected the future timing of the ice-free Arctic Ocean under the different Shared Socioeconomic Pathway (SSP)

emission scenarios, which are scenarios of projected socioeconomic global changes up to 2100, used to derive greenhouse gas emissions scenarios with different climate policies.

GHG forcing was found to be the factor dominating, the study said, after it showed that the GHG influence is separable from that of other factors including anthropogenic aerosols, solar and volcanic forcing, as well as natural internal variability.

"Our observationally-constrained projections based on attribution results also suggest that we may experience an unprecedented ice-free Arctic climate in the next decade or two, irrespective of emission scenarios," the study authors wrote.

Mumbai, June 8: After unanimously pausing for the second time in a row, the Reserve Bank Thursday reiterated that leaving the key rates and the stance unchanged "is not a pivot but only a pause" and that future policy actions will purely be data-dependent as a durable fall in inflation is still a long way.

Earlier in the day, the RBI governor-led rate-setting panel MPC unanimously left the reporate unchanged at 6.50 per cent and maintained that they will continue to work towards withdrawing policy accommodation.

The six-member panel also reiterated continuing measures to bring inflation under the target in a durable manner.

While consumer price index based inflation eased in March and April and moved into the tolerance band, headline inflation is still above the mandated target of 4 per cent and is expected to remain so during the rest of the current fiscal, said Governor Shaktikanta Das announcing the monetary policy.

"Therefore, close and continued vigil on the evolving inflation outlook is absolutely necessary, especially as the monsoon outlook and the impact of El Nino remain uncertain. Our goal is to achieve the inflation target of 4 per cent in a durable manner and not just keeping inflation within the comfort band of 2-6 per cent," Das told re-

India Inc wants reversal of rate hike cycle

New Delhi: The status quo adopted by the Reserve Bank in its second bi-monthly monetary policy of the current fiscal will pave way for reversal of rate hike cycle in due course, expects India Inc. This pause will help growth to become strong with the support of enhanced consumption demand in the economy, said Saket Dalmia, President, PHD Chamber of Commerce and Industry. President of industry body Ficci Subhrakant Panda said a status quo in policy rates was largely expected and, by keeping the repo rate unchanged and maintaining the stance of withdrawal of accommodation, RBI is keeping a watchful eye on inflation while supporting growth. "Ficci expects the impact of monetary policy interventions till date to pave the way for reversal of the rate hike cycle in due course," he said. Secretary General of another leading industry body Assocham Policy Committee remains focussed on withdrawal of accommodation to further rein in inflation, "we are confident that the RBI would ensure that adequate liquidity is maintained in the banking system and credit growth remains robust".

Fuel margins turn positive; price cut will have to wait

New Delhi, June 8: Margins on petrol and diesel have turned positive following softening of international oil prices but a revision in retail prices may happen only after state-owned oil firms recoup losses they incurred last year, officials said.

State-owned Indian Oil Corporation (IOC), Bharat Petroleum Corporation Ltd (BPCL) and Hindustan Petroleum Corporation Ltd (HPCL) have temporarily abandoned the daily price revision since last year and have not revised petrol and diesel prices in line with the cost. And the losses they incurred when the oil prices were higher than the retail selling prices are now being recouped with rates dropping.

Officials said the three firms have been making positive margins on petrol since the fourth quarter of the 2022 calendar year but diesel, which accounts for the bulk of the fuel sales, had been in red.

But last month, margins on diesel turned positive with a small 50 paise a litre profit, they said, adding, this, however, was not enough to make up for the past losses.



International oil prices had spiked to \$139 per barrel in March 2022 in the aftermath of the Russia-Ukraine war. They have since cooled

At peak, oil firms lost ₹17.4 per litre on petrol and ₹27.7 a litre on diesel. In the October-December quarter, oil firms earned ₹10 a litre margin on petrol but lost ₹6.5 on diesel. In the following quarter, the margins on petrol moderated to ₹6.8 a litre while diesel earned ₹0.5 per litre.

Officials said besides past losses, oil companies want to see if the drop in oil prices will last.

"I guess they will watch for the prices for one more quarter (April to June) before deciding to restart fuel price revision," an official said.

Holding prices when input cost was higher than retail selling prices led to the three firms posting net earnings loss. They posted a combined net loss of ₹21,201.18 crore dur ing April-September despite accounting for ₹22,000 crore announced but not paid LPG subsidy.

On May 19, the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) announced the withdrawal of ₹2,000 denomination banknotes as part of its currency management and permitted the exchange of such notes (up to ₹20,000 in one go) from May 23 onwards. The exchange or deposit window is available till September 30, 2023.

The governor also urged the public not to panic for exchange or deposit of ₹2,000 notes but should avoid last minute rush

He also made it clear that RBI is not thinking of withdrawing ₹500 notes, or even re-introducing notes in the ₹1,000 denomination, and requested the public not to speculate on this

Euro zone slips into recession

INDIA REACH 151/5 AT STUMPS ON DAY

London, June 8: The failure of India's famed top-order against a high-quality pace attack in a pressure game put Australia in firm control of the World Test Championship final here Thursday.

Ravindra Jadeja (48, 51b, 7x4 1x6) and Ajinkya Rahane (29 batting) offered hope to the partisan Indian supporters at The Oval with a 71run stand off 100 balls before the former fell to Nathan Lyon 20 minutes before close of play. India were reeling at 151/5 at stumps in response to Australia's first innings score of 469, trailing by 318 runs.

While the Indian bowlers failed to use the bouncer effectively on day one, the likes of Shubman Gill (13) and Cheteshwar Pujara (14) committed the cardinal sin of misjudging the line and length on a pitch with variable bounce.

Credit should also go to the relentless Australian pace trio of Mitchell Starc (1/52), Pat Cummins (1/36) and Scott Boland (1/29), who got much more out of The Oval surface than their Indian counterparts.

Australia added 142 runs to their

overnight total for the loss of seven wickets before being bowled out one hour into the afternoon session. Mohammed Siraj (4/108) cleaned up the tail and was the pick of India's bowlers with four wickets.

Leaving the ball is a key element of batting in English conditions and that is where Gill and Pujara were found wanting. The in-form Gill showed promise before he inexplicably decided to leave an incoming ball from Boland, leaving his stumps rattled.

Pujara, who had the advantage of being in England well before his teammates arrived, offered no shot to a length ball from Cameron Green (1/22) that cut in sharply from fourth stump.

The slide began with the fall of skipper Rohit Sharma (15) who missed an angled in ball from Cummins in the sixth over to be trapped lbw. Indian superstar Virat Kohli (14) got a snorter from Starc that he could not do much about, leaving India at 71/4.

Rahane and Jadeja tried to hang in there but the Aussie pacers were constantly asking questions. Rahane also had some luck going his way as

he was adjudged lbw off a Cummins no ball when he was batting on 17.

Resuming the day on 327/3, Travis Head (163, 174b, 25x4, 1x6) and Smith (121, 268b, 19x4) walked into the middle under bright sunshine at The Oval.

Smith, who was on 95 overnight, got two freebies on the pads from Siraj in the first over of the day and he happily put them away for consecutive boundaries to complete his seventh hundred in England and third at the venue.

India were guilty of not using the short ball tactic early enough on the opening day but Siraj went for that from the get Thursday. Mohammed Shami too tried to mix it up with an odd bouncer but was not able to get the same zip from the surface as Siraj.

While Smith was not bothered by India's tactic, Head looked in a bit of discomfort. Siraj banged one short onto his body in the sixth over of the day and Head walked across the stumps to pull it but ended up edging it to wicketkeeper KS Bharat, ending an epic 285-run stand. Green was the next to go as he went for an expansive drive off a full ball from Shami but ended up being caught at second slip by an alert Gill.

The prized wicket of Smith came out of nowhere as he dragged an innocuous ball from Shardul Thakur back on to his stumps. It was Thakur's first ball of the day, highlighting his uncanny ability to provide a breakthrough out of the blue.

A brilliant piece of fielding from substitute Axar Patel got India their fourth wicket of the day as his one-handed direct hit from mid off left Starc well short of his ground.

Eyes on Chhetri as India begin campaign

Bhubaneswar, June 8: In the last leg of his glittering career, Indian talisman Sunil Chhetri will be the cynosure of all eyes as the Blue Tigers look to regain the Intercontinental Cup, which begins here Friday.

While Lebanon and Vanuatu will play in the tournament opener, hosts India will take on Mongolia in the day's second match, kicking off their campaign against the lowest-ranked team (No.183) in the tournament.

The Blue Tigers, ranked 101 in the FIFA rankings, will enter the tournament as the second-highest-ranked team, with Lebanon (99) ahead of them by two places.

With 84 goals to his name from 131 international appearances, the most by an Indian, Chhetri has set numerous records over the last two decades. As far as the tournament is concerned, no player has made an impact like the Indian skipper who has scored 11 of India's

16 goals in the event. Chhetri is the only player to score a hat-trick in the competition. "Sunil has always been a role model and a leader in every sense for the boys and girls. But he's not only talking, he's showing that with his test results once again," Stimac



"In this camp, he was in topfive positions in all the tests we executed. So that's the best way of leading the team and showing them how much it can be done.

Sports Minister Anurag Thakur Thursday said that all national federations are aiming to finalise the squads for the Asian Games, well before the July 15 deadline set by the Olympic Council of Asia (OCA). The Games are set to take place in Hangzhou, China from September 23 to October 8.

The Indian Olympic Association (IOA) had April 27 announced that -a three-member ad-hoc committee. A two-member ad hoc committee of Bhupender Singh Bajwa and Suma Shirur, which is running the day-to-day affairs of the Wrestling Federation of India (WFI) since May 4 will be conducting the selection trials most likely in the last week of June.

However, the wrestlers want some more time to get ready for the trials. "We want to take part in the selection trial but to prepare for it, we need at least a month and a half of training," international wrestler Satyawart Kadian, who is also Sakshi Malik's husband, told PTI Thursday.

Getting back into competition mode will be a tough task for the wrestlers as some haven't competed since the World Championships in September last year while some of others last hit the mat even earlier, during the Commonwealth Games in August, 2022.

Messi stuns football world with MLS move

Miami, June 8: Lionel Messi has pulled off his latest stunning feat: He is headed to Major League Soccer (MLS) and joining Inter Miami.

After months - years, even of speculation, Messi Wednesday finally revealed his decision to join a Miami franchise that has been led by another global football icon, David Beckham, since its inception but has yet to make any real splashes on the field.

That likely will soon change. One of Inter Miami's owners, Jorge Mas, tweeted out a photo of a darkly silhouetted Messi jersey shortly before the Argentinian great revealed his decision in interviews with Spanish news outlets Mundo Deportivo and Sport.

It was widely believed that Messi $\,$

eventually would choose to play for Al-Hilal in Saudi Arabia, following longtime rival Cristiano Ronaldo to a nation where some clubs now are funded by the state's sovereign wealth fund. Going back to Barcelona, a storied franchise where he spent most of his career,

was another possibility. But in the end, he made the call that surprised many. Messi is joining MLS. He said in the interviews Wednesday that some final details still need to be worked out, but that he has made the call to "continue my path" in Miami.

"After winning the World Cup and not being able to return to Barcelona, it was my turn to go to the league of the United States to live football in another way," Messi said. He didn't take the money. He didn't choose the memories. He

picked Miami instead.
