DOC DIES IN ROAD MISHAP

Bhubaneswar, Sept 24: A young doctor was killed in a road mishap in Bomikhal area here, a police official said Sunday.

The deceased was identified as Amit Kumar Bisoyi, 28, who hailed from Berhampur in Ganjam district and had been staying in Ravi Talkies area.

Amit had been working at the Emergency and Trauma Care Department of Apollo Hospitals here. "The accident took place at around 1am Sunday when Amit was on his way home in his car after duty. He suddenly lost control over the vehicle at Bomikhal due to unknown reasons and crashed into the road divider. Locals rushed him to Apollo Hospitals where the doctors declared him brought dead," said Laxmisagar inspector in-charge (IIC) P Shyam Sundar Rao.

Amit's body was handed over to family members after postmortem Sunday afternoon.


Narrative being set to 'lynch me': Danish Ali

US gave Canada info: NYT

American officials avoid triggering any diplomatic blowback from India, according to the paper

Washington, Sept 24: The US provided Canada with intelligence after the killing of Sikh separatist Hardeep Singh Nijjar, but communications intercepted by Ottawa were more definitive and led it to accuse India of orchestrating the plot, The New York Times has reported citing

The report came Saturday as the top US diplomat in Canada confirmed that there was 'shared intelligence among Five Eyes partners' that had prompted Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's offensive allegation against India in the killing of a Khalistani extremist on Canadian soil.

The allegations have infuriated India, which rejected them as 'absurd' and 'motivated' and expelled a senior Canadian diplomat in a tit-for-tat move to Ottawa's expulsion of an Indian official over the case. India also accused Canada of being a safe haven for terrorists.

Nijjar, the chief of the banned Khalistan Tiger Force (KTF), was killed in Surrey in British Columbia June 18. India had designated Nijjar as a terrorist

The United States has urged India to cooperate with Canada in its investigations.

"In the aftermath of the killing, US intelligence agencies offered their Canadian counterparts context that helped Canada conclude that India had been involved," the NYT reported, quoting unnamed allied officials as

Yet what appears to be the "smoking gun," intercepted communications of Indian diplomats in Canada indicating involvement in the plot, was gathered by Canadian officials, allied officials said.

David Cohen, US Ambassador to Canada, in an interview with CTV News said that 'shared intelligence among Five Eyes partners' had informed Trudeau of the possible involvement of Indian agents in the murder of a Canadian citizen in June.

"I will say this was a matter of shared intelligence information. There was a lot of communication between Canada and the United States about this, and I think that's as far as I'm comfortable going," Cohen told CTV News.

After Nijjar's death, American officials told their Canadian counterparts that Washington had not had any advance infor-

Crackdown on 19 Khalistani terrorists soon

New Delhi: A day after the National Investigation Agency (NIA) confiscated the properties of Canada-based 'designated individual terrorist' Gurpatwant Singh Pannun, it is learnt that the government has asked the investigative agencies to identify the properties of other terrorists wanted in India sitting abroad. Sources privy to the matter said that the government has asked the agencies to identify the properties of the terrorists settled abroad. The sources also said that the government has asked the agencies to identify Khalistani terrorists settled in countries like US. UK. Canada and Australia and cancel their Overseas Citizenship of India (OCI) so that they don't come to India. The sources said that the step will help the government to choke the finances of these terrorists from India and also not allow them to visit here. The sources said that the government has identified 19 absconding Khalistani terrorists staving in countries like US, UK Canada, UAE, Pakistan and other countries.

But the disclosure of the involvement of US intelligence risks ensnaring Washington in the diplomatic battle between Canada and India at a time when it is keen to develop New Delhi as a closer partner, it said.

When asked about Canada sharing any information in the case with India, the Ministry of External Affairs in New Delhi said: "No specific information has been shared by Canada on this case, either then or before or after. We have, you know, as we have said, or I think we have made very clear, we are willing to look at any specific information.

Bhubaneswar, Sept 24: Prime Minister Narendra Modi Sunday flagged off a Vande Bharat Express on the Puri–Rourkela route through video conferencing from Delhi. This was Odisha's second Vande Bharat Express as the first semi-high-speed train service from Puri to Howrah was inaugurated in May.

Odisha Governor Ganeshi Lal, Union Minister Dharmendra Pradhan and several MLAs graced the occasion at the Bhubaneswar railway station. Railway Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw was also present at

the programme virtually. Speaking on this occasion, Pradhan said, "Today is a historic and proud day for Odisha and also for the country as nine Vande

Bharat Express trains have simultaneously been flagged off." Vaishnaw had, in May, announced that the second Vande Bharat Express in Odisha would

be launched soon. Pradhan requested the PM services from Puri to Raipur. "Many developmental works

in the railway sector have been undertaken by the central government. Fifty-seven railway stations in Odisha are being redeveloped with an estimated cost of Rs 1,400 crore," he said.

The semi-high-speed express train will connect Puri, the abode of Lord Jagannath, with the Steel City Rourkela. The train will also connect Bhubaneswar with industrial areas at Angul and Jharsuguda, and will run six days a week except Saturday, a railway official said. The new Vande Bharat Express will cover a distance of 505 km in 7.45 hours from Puri to Rourkela.

The express train will depart Puri at 5 am and will reach Rourkela at 12:45 pm on the same day. On its return journey, it will leave Rourkela station at 2:10 pm and reach Puri at 9.40 pm.

The train will have stoppages at Khurda Road, Bhubaneswar, Cuttack, Dhenkanal, Talcher Road, Angul, Rairakhol

80 per cent cybercrimes from 10 districts: Study

Noida, Sept 24: Rajasthan's Bharatpur and Uttar Pradesh's Mathura have replaced Jharkhand's Jamtara and Haryana's Nuh as the infamous hotspots of cybercrime in India, according to a new study by an IIT Kanpur-incubated start-up. The study also revealed that just the top 10 districts collectively contribute to 80 per cent of cy bercrimes in the country.

The findings have been mentioned by the Future Crime Research Foundation (FCRF), a non-profit start-up incubated at the IIT-Kanpur, in its latest comprehensive white paper named 'A Deep Dive into Cybercrime Trends Impacting India'.

Bharatpur (18 per cent), Mathura (12 per cent), Nuh (11 per cent), Deoghar (10 per cent), Jamtara (9.6 per cent), Gurugram (8.1 per cent), Alwar (5.1 per cent), Bokaro (2.4 per cent), Karma Tand (2.4 per cent) and Giridih (2.3 per cent) are the top contributors to cybercrime cases in India, collectively accounting for 80 per cent of reported incidence, the FCRF claimed.

"Our analysis focuses on the top 10 districts in India that are most prone to cybercrime. As identified in the white paper, understanding the key factors contributing to cybercrime in these districts is essential for devising effective prevention and mitigation strategies," FCRF co-founder Harshvardhan Singh said. He said the analysis of the top 10 cybercrime hubs in India reveals several common factors contributing to their vulnerability and these include geographical proximity to major urban centres, and limited cyber security infrastructure.

THE ASTEROID BENNU IS EXPECTED TO COME DANGEROUSLY CLOSE TO EARTH IN THE YEAR 2182 -**POSSIBLY CLOSE**

ENOUGH TO HIT

Washington, Sept 24: NASA's first asteroid samples fetched from deep space parachuted into the Utah desert Sunday to cap a seven-year journey.

In a flyby of Earth, the Osiris-Rex spacecraft released the sample capsule from 63,000 miles (100,000 km) out. The small capsule landed four hours later on a remote expanse of military land, as the mothership set off after another asteroid.

Scientists estimate the capsule holds at least a cup of rub-

ble from the carbon-rich asteroid known as Bennu, but won't know for sure until the container is opened. Some spilled and floated away when the spacecraft scooped up too much and rocks jammed the container's lid during collection three years ago. Japan, the only other country to bring back asteroid samples, gathered about a teaspoon

in a pair of asteroid missions. The pebbles and dust delivered Sunday represent the biggest

haul from beyond the moon. Preserved building blocks from the dawn of our solar system 4.5 billion years ago, the samples will help scientists better understand how Earth and life formed. Osiris-Rex, the moth-

billion mission in 2016. It reached Bennu two years later and, using a long stick vacuum, grabbed rubble from the small roundish space rock in 2020. By the time it returned, the spacecraft had logged 4 billion miles (6.2 billion km).

NASA's recovery effort in Utah included helicopters as well as a temporary clean room set up at the Defense Department's Utah Test and Training Range. The samples will be flown Monday morning to a new lab at NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston. The building already houses the hundreds of pounds (kilograms) of moon rocks gathered by the Apollo astronauts more than a half-century ago.

Bennu is expected to come dangerously close to Earth in 2182 — possibly close enough to hit. The data gleaned by Osiris-Rex will help with any asteroiddeflection effort.



Cong slams govt for reducing qualifying percentile to zero

New Delhi, Sept 24: The Congress Sunday termed 'shock ing' the government reducing the qualifying percentile for NEET PG 2023 to zero and asked who benefits from completely doing away with the minimum basic standards.

The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW) Wednesday reduced to zero the qualifying percentile for NEET PG 2023 to be eligible for counselling across all categories.

In a post on X, Congress general secretary Jairam Ramesh said the decision of the Modi government to reduce the cutoff for entry for MD/MS degrees via PG-NEET to the zeroth percentile—making those who score the least in the exam eligible — is "absolutely shocking".

This is a complete U-turn from the stand taken by the government in the Delhi High Court last July, he said and posted a screenshot of a media report on the government telling the HC last year that it cannot lower NEET-PG cut-off so as to the minimum standard of education is maintained.

SC judge bats for simple language in legal profession

New Delhi, Sept 24: Supreme Court judge Justice Sanjiv Khanna Sunday stressed the need for using simple language in the legal profession to enable the citizens to take informed decisions and avoid unintentional

Justice Khanna, speaking at the valedictory session of International Lawyers Conference organised by apex Bar body Bar Council of India said laws were meant to resolve disputes, not become disputed themselves.

He said the question of simplicity of law, i.E., use of language that is understood by common man, required greater attention.

"Is law required to be demystified? Should law be a puzzle that needs to be solved? Laws are meant to resolve disputes, not become disputed themselves. Law should not be mystery to the common man. Law is not written as an edict meant for the legal experts. They apply and govern almost everything in our daily lives and therefore use of simple language is required. This enables the citizens to take informed decisions and avoid unintentional violations. This equally applies to our decisions and judgements," he said.

Inaugurating the International Lawyers' Conference here, Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Saturday said his government is making sincere attempts to draft laws in a simple manner and in Indian languages to the maximum extent, asserting that the language in which laws are written and court proceedings conducted play a key role in ensuring justice.

"The common man should consider the law as his own," he

In his address on Sunday, Justice Khanna noted that commercialisation of litigation and legal professions were of utmost concern

"Escalating cost of litigation exorbitant fees are formidable barrier to access to justice to ensure, and we must ensure that the justice remains accessible

to all," Justice Khanna said. As prime stakeholders of the profession, he said, it was imperative for the lawyers and judges to introspect and address the issue of the declining interest in litigation as a career choice.

Blue light from smartphones linked to early puberty in males

xposure to blue light, like that from smartphones or tablets, may lead to early puberty in males, according to a study in mice.

The research, presented at the ongoing 61st Annual European Society for Paediatric Endocrinology Meeting in The Hague, Netherlands, sheds light on how environmental factors. such as screen time, impact early puberty and testicular tissue, which could eventually lead to future prevention strategies for

Early puberty for most children does not have an obvious cause. Sometimes it is due to genetics, or there is a problem in the brain, such as an injury or tumour, or in the thyroid, adre-

nal or sex glands. In recent years, several stud-

ies have reported increases in early puberty onset for both girls and boys, particularly during the Covid-19 pandemic. One factor may be the increased use of blue light-emitting devices, but this is very difficult to assess in children.

In this study, researchers from the Ankara Bilkent City Hospital and Gazi University in Turkey examined 18 male rats aged 21-days-old, divided into three groups of six and exposed to either a normal light cvcle, to six hours or 12 hours of blue light.

The researchers found that the first signs of puberty occurred significantly earlier in male rats exposed to blue light. Additionally, the longer the rats were exposed to blue light, the earlier their puberty



started, while they also showed suppressed sperm development and damaged testicular



Rare gene variants linked to male hair loss identified

esearchers have identified rare gene variants that cause male pattern hair loss, also termed androgenetic

Male-pattern hair loss is the most common form of hair loss in men, and is largely attributable to hereditary factors. Current treatment options and risk prediction are suboptimal, thus necessitating research into the genetic underpinnings of the condition.

To date, studies worldwide have focused primarily on common genetic variants, and have implicated more than 350 genetic loci, in particular the androgen receptor gene, which is located on the maternally inherited X chromosome.

In contrast, the contribution to this common condition of rare genetic variants has traditionally been assumed to be low. However, systematic analyses of rare variants have been lacking.

"Such analyses are more challenging as they require large cohorts, and the genetic sequences must be captured base by base, e.g., through genome or exome sequencing of affected individuals," explained first author Sabrina Henne, doctoral student at the Institute of Human Genetics at the University Hospital of Bonn (UKB) and the University of Bonn in Germany. The statistical challenge lies



in the fact that these rare genetic variants may be carried by very few, or even single, in-

Among other methods, the Bonn researchers used a type

of sequence kernel association test (SKAT), which is a popular method for detecting associations with rare variants, as well as GenRisk.

The research involved the analysis of genetic sequences from 72,469 male UK Biobank participants.

Within this extensive data set. Bonn geneticists examined rare gene variants that occur in less than one per cent of the population. Using modern bioinformatic and statistical methods. they found associations between male-pattern hair loss and rare genetic variants in the following five genes: EDA2R, WNT10A,

HEPH, CEPT1, and EIF3F. Prior to the analyses, EDA2R and WNT10A were already considered candidate genes, based on previous analyses of common variants.

"Our study provides further evidence that these two genes play a role, and that this occurs through both common and rare variants," explained Dr. Stefanie Heilmann-Heimbach, who is a research group leader at the Institute of Human Genetics.

Similarly, HEPH is located in a genetic region that has already been implicated by common varinamely EDA2R/Androgen receptor, which is a region that has consistently shown the strongest association with male-pattern hair loss in past association studies.

Kendrapara yearns for 'golden fibre' era 'Sagar Kavach' strengthens

Kendrapara, Sept 24: Kendrapara has an agrarian economy. Nowadays, kharif paddy is being cultivated here widely, while in the past, during this time of the year, one could see wide swathes of white jute and tossa jute cultivation. However, jute farming is at an all-time low this year in the coastal district.

The Jute Research Station at Jajanga village under Kendrapara Sadar block has been lying neglected and is virtually nonextant. Jute growers are facing a double whammy as the Agriculture department has been lousy in providing seeds and those available in the open market are too costly, and do not guarantee a good harvest.

Harihar Behera, a farmer from Jajanga village said the golden fibre was once a popular cash crop and the district had earned a name for itself in jute farming. It kept the thriving agro-based economy of the region running. The research station was established in view of the promising prospects and rising popularity of jute cultivation among the farmers. The scientists here had even developed three new varieties of jute seed. Unfortunately now the research station is functioning in just pen and paper,

The lackadaisical attitude of the authorities, lack of a policy and its implementation in favour of jute cultivation and booming polythene and plastic industry are the reason why jute is losing its position among the farmers.

Barring a few farmers, many have withdrawn from jute cultivation as in the absence of government sponsorship they need to spend more to buy seeds from the open market. As a result, jute cultivation in the district has dropped by 90 per cent this year compared to last year, farm-

Farmer leader Bidhu Bhusan Mohapatra said jute cultivation was carried out on 2,152 hectares in 2005. It was extended to 8,000 hectares in 2010 as the climate was conducive for the crop. This prompted the state government to establish a jute research centre on 46 acres at Jajanga on the outskirts of the town. The centre started developing various types of jute seeds following

which jute cultivation was ex-

tended to 14,000 hectares in 2014.

However, the centre has stopped selling jute seeds to farmers for last five-six years. Farmers said the district reguires 30 guintals of seeds for jute cultivation annually but received only two quintals of seeds in 2018. That was the last time the Centre provided seeds to farmers. The sales counter at the research centre has now stopped selling jute seeds. Now, farmers interested in jute cultivation have to buy seeds from open market at exorbitant prices, resulting in a 90 per cent drop in jute cultivation this year, the farmer leader added.

Haladhar Das of Derabish said farmers are turning away from jute cultivation due to lack of government sponsorship. He said the state and Centre have announced they would promote jute sacks instead of plastic sacks to discourage plastic use. However, despite a favourable atmosphere for jute cultivation, farmers have failed to get any support. This has forced them to take up cultivation of other crops, he said.

Niranjan Parida, a farmer from Kansar panchayat who has cultivated jute on 12 acres this year, said the soil in Kendrapara district is ideal for jute cultivation. Earlier, he was earning good amount by transporting his harvest to Kolkata. However, things have changed as he was forced to buy jute seeds from the open market as seeds were not available with the Agriculture department. Saraswati Samal of Paripangara village said a jute-based industry was managed by 60 women self help groups here. Now, they purchase jute from outside due to scant availability of the fibre in the

Paradip/Kolkata, Sept 24: Effectiveness of the coastal security mechanism along the coasts of West Bengal and Odisha was validated through a twoday-long exercise 'Sagar Kavach' held off the coast near Paradip that ended Friday



Impeachments Galore

he US is surfeit with impeachments of its Presidents – past and present. After former President Donald Trump went through the motions of two consecutive impeachments, it now seems to be the turn of President Joe Biden to face the prospect of an impeachment for alleged misdemeanour on his part and corruption by his son Hunter Biden. House Speaker Kevin McCarthy announced a few days back that he was directing the chamber he runs to open an impeachment inquiry into President Biden. He claimed GOP investigations suggest corruption, abuse of power and obstruction of justice

What is astounding is the fact that investigations, so far, have been unable to unearth concrete evidence to prove the charges against President Biden and wrong business dealings of his son. Hence, observers suspect the Republicans' desperation to impeach Biden may boomerang on the party and damage the prospect of its Presidential candidate in

Impeachment by the House of Representatives is the first step in a formal process to remove a president - or other senior executive or judicial official - from office. It requires a simple majority vote in the chamber to trigger a trial in the US Senate, where a two-thirds majority is necessary for conviction and removal. Trump was impeached twice when Democrats controlled the House - over Ukraine in 2019 and the January 6 Capitol riot in 2021 - but was acquitted by the Senate on both occasions. The impeachments met such a fate because the Democrats could not muster the numbers - two-thirds majority-- in the Senate. Similar fate probably awaits the impeachment move this time against Biden since his party – the Democrats – have more numbers than the Republicans in the Senate.

McCarthy claims he found 'credible' allegations against the President and his son. He accused Biden of lying about knowledge of his son's business dealings and said that Biden family members had received millions of dollars in payments from shell companies and that transactions had been flagged as questionable by the US Treasury Department. The Biden administration has been accused of giving the President's family and associates special treatment during its investigations into possible criminal violations. However, Republicans have not found concrete evidence of misconduct by PoTUS till date.

The question is why the Speaker has cleared the first step to impeachment when credible evidence is lacking. One explanation could be the fact that the ultra-right faction in the Republican Party is goading him to provide them with the campaign material against Biden, especially when Trump had faced impeachment proceedings twice. In other words, it is simple political arm twisting. They want to tarnish Biden's image and hope to reap electoral dividends out of it. McCarthy wilted under their pressure since he holds his position by a wafer-thin majority with the help of these very same Republicans.

The Biden team has swung into action to slam McCarthy's impeachment announcement. It has told the national media that House Republicans have been investigating the President for nine months and they have turned up no evidence of wrongdoing. Only three US presidents have been impeached in history - Andrew Johnson in 1868, Bill Clinton in 1998 and Donald Trump twice. None was convicted by the Senate because of the clause of approval by two-thirds members. Democrats currently have a 51-49 majority in the Senate, virtually ensuring that any Biden impeachment referral from the House will meet a similar fate.

It would be naive to think that the Republicans are not aware of the tremendous risk of trying to impeach Biden without tangible evidence. This may even help Biden improve his ratings by creating the impression that his adversaries have stooped too low to hit him below the belt. The latter may also try to impress the electorate that Biden is no angel. After all, elections these days are more about perceptions among the voters than the actual performance or non-performance of a government.

- 1066: English army under King Harold II defeat invading Norwegians led by King Harald Hardrada in the Battle of Stamford Bridge. Harold and his brother Tostig, were both killed. AXIS OF OUTCASTS



Carl Bildt **MAKE NO MISTAKE: REACHING OUT TO A COUNTRY LIKE NORTH KOREA IS A SIGN OF PROFOUND WEAKNESS**

ussian President Vladimir Putin had obvious reasons for hosting North Korean dictator Kim Jong-un at Vostochny, Russia's new spaceport in eastern Siberia, this month. Owing to his illegal war of aggression in Ukraine, Putin is running low on both friends and am-

The Vostochny spaceport has a troubled history. Intended to replace the Baikonur facility in Kazakhstan, its construction was plagued by repeated delays and allegations of corruption and mismanagement. Now, it is rarely used - though it did launch the high-profile Luna-25 mission that crashed into the moon recently.

Russian-North Korean relations have a similar backstory. Once upon a time, the bond between the Kremlin and the Kim regime was tight. After all, communist North Korea was essentially a Soviet creation, and it relied heavily on Soviet support for decades. But following the collapse of the Soviet Union, Russian leaders saw more to gain by developing relations with booming South Korea. The Kremlin effectively switched sides, joining the (unsuccessful) international effort to prevent the Hermit Kingdom from developing nuclear weapons.

Now the situation has changed once again. Putin's attempt to erase Ukraine from the map of Europe has made Russia an international pariah - just like North Korea. Most of the world's developed economies have signed on to comprehensive sanctions against Russia, and the United Nations General Assembly has issued several resolutions condemning Putin's war of aggression. The very few countries that have sided with Russia constitute an international rogues' gallery: Eritrea, Syria, Nicaragua, Belarus, Mali, and - of course – North Korea.

Meanwhile, many countries

that have abstained from these **IIN** votes have increasingly made known their objections to Putin's war. At the recent G20 summit in New Delhi, for example, the final joint declaration included a clear affirmation of the principle of territorial integrity – an obvious reference to Russian aggression and the Kremlin's misbegotten strategic objectives.

Putin expected a quick victory when he launched his war in February 2022, but Russian forces have since lost roughly half of what they captured during the initial invasion. After nearly 600 days, they are bogged down and struggling to defend themselves against an independent, democratic Ukrainian polity that is determined to defend its freedom.

Under these conditions, where Putin needs every friend he can get, North Korea is suddenly

back in the Kremlin's favour. With its thoroughly militarised society and abundant stocks of old Soviet-standard artillery ammunition, Kim's regime looks like a lifeline for Russia's flailing war effort. Putin therefore had little

choice but to roll out the red carpet for the North Korean dictator. Though the details of the Vostochny dealmaking will remain undisclosed, it is safe to assume that Russia will get ammunition in exchange for various essentials that North Korea desperately needs, not least food and energy. Beyond that, there has also been talk of Russia assisting North Korea in developing and deploying satellites, an area where it has been singularly unsuccessful.

Whatever the details, there can be little doubt that the deal violates the UN Security Council's sanctions against North Korea, which were orig inally put in place with Russian support. In claiming that the North Korea sanctions regime is a UN matter, not a Russian one Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov is being dishonest in the extreme.

We are witnessing the emergence of an axis of outcasts: countries united in their willingness to violate international law by starting wars, developing nuclear weapons, and violating sanctions. This list also includes Iran, where Russia has been ac quiring kamikaze drones with which to attack Ukrainian cities and civilians

But make no mistake: reaching out to a country like North Korea is a sign of profound weakness. China and India might not openly condemn Russian aggression, but nor have they endorsed it or done much to help Putin's war effort (other than purchasing Russian hydrocarbons). And whatever support Belarus, Eritrea, Syria, or Mali are capable of offering, it will not help the Kremlin achieve the aims of its "special military operation" in Ukraine.

Nonetheless, these outcasts, driven by desperation, will deepen their cooperation, introducing new risks to regional stability and the global order. For example, if Russia furnishes North Korea with the technologies it needs to advance its missile or nuclear programmes, it is bound to have repercussions for Northeast Asian security.

Russia and North Korea may be failing in their space efforts But their sanctions-busting and rule-breaking here on Earth are sure to have a destabilising effect on the international order.

Salvaging the scavengers

toddler of seven wondered why the thin little woman, who came through the backdoor, was called untouchable. He wondered why his grandmother sprinkled holy Ganga water over the floor where the woman had walked, and was told she had polluted it. So, one day, he dared to touch her saree, to see what would happen to his body. They called in the Pandit; he said Bindeshwar must be banished. His mother intervened to save him from that but the rest of the remedy was almost as terrible. He had to plunge into cold Ganga water and drink a mixture of milk, ghee, curd, cow urine, and cow dung to purify himself. His grandmother mixed it up fiercely and forced it down him. Later, he learned the reason for it. The poor, creeping woman belonged to the Valmiki community, the lowest in the caste hierarchy

In 1950, untouchability was banned in India. Article 17 of the Constitution made "practice in any form forbidden" and "punishable." But it continued because most Indians who had toilets in their homes had pits that needed cleaning. So began

t all began with daredevilry. Bindeshwar's obsession with Bindeshwar Pathak, a tiny sanitation, which soon became a mission. If Indians had proper flush toilets, they could clean themselves. Liberation of scavengers had been Mahatma Gandhi's dream. In 1970, Bindeshwar set up Sulabh Shauchalaya, meaning accessible toilet. The key to everything was his cheap pour-flush toilet, essentially a sieve-like clay-lined pit, flushable with only a litre of water.

A student of Sociology designed it in 1969; in 1973 a local town in Bihar ordered two demonstration models for the municipal compound. They caught on. By 2020, 110 million had been installed across the country. In 1974 Bindeshwar built India's first public lavatory, with 48 seats, urinals, and 20 bathrooms. When it opened in Patna at the height of the JP Movement against corruption, 500 people used it on the first day. Soon almost any bus stand, railway station, or market had its own Sulabh Shauchalaya; around 20 million use them each day. The revenue subsidised smaller community toilets out in the villages and toilets in schools, which encouraged girls to attend.

Shauchalava has born in a struggle. Shortly after university, Bindeshwar spent three months among scavengers in the town of Bettiah, enduring with them the stench, humiliation, and filth that leaked into his hair. His family was appalled by his peculiar, shameful obsession; his father-in-law disowned him. He ran out of funds to build toilets and had to sell his wife's ornaments to keep going; much like Satyajit Ray did to complete his magnum opus "Pather Panchali" depicting the angst of rural life lyrically.

Bindeshwar wrote a wonderful autobiography "Road to Freedom" (2000) based on 20 years of research and fieldwork. It's a seminal piece of work on scavenging, its sources, history, and geographical spread. He resolved to take action not out of sympathy for scavengers but in the firm belief that scavenging is a dehumanising practice that would have a destructive impact on modern Indian society. Despite having a preventive Manual Scavenging Act, 2013 it is indeed sad that this abhorrent practice is still in vogue. As per a reply in Parliament, 43,497 people are still

The success story of Sulabha engaged in manual scavenging, to Scheduled Caste. Although dry pit toilets were banned in India in 1993, two decades later 9.6 million were still hand emptied in India. As per the NFHS V survey findings, a fifth of the population still defecated in the open. Only 52% of rural and urban households in the lowest wealth quintiles have access to toilets. This is in a country that has landed on the Moon and is aiming to go to Mars.

Yet Bindeshwar was always optimistic and confident things would improve. Like Dr Martin Luther King Jr., the visionary, he hoped one day all Indians, united in cleanliness, would worship together, dine together, fetch water from the same well, and bathe in the same pond. Even the likes of his grandmother would sit with the people they had thought filthy, and apply no Ganga water afterwards. Bindeshwar serendipitously died on India's seventy-sixth Independence Day, resolutely fighting to free hapless scavengers from the scourge of humiliation.

Irshalwadi. Sept 24: The nightmare of a landslide that buried an entire village and the dread of watching a mammoth boulder on an unstable slope, fearing every day that it will roll down and kill them all.

That's how it is for thousands of people in Maharashtra's Raigad area, even two months after 84 people were killed when the hillside around Irshalwadi village literally crumbled on the July 19 night of incessant, heavy

The trauma lives on – for those in Irshalwadi who escaped and live in makeshift container homes just down the road and for those in other villages around. Climate change, say experts and long-time residents, has come to their doorstep with extreme weather events that have led to hillsides getting increasingly fragile and maybe dangerous.

According to Prakash Gajbhiye, director, Geological Survey of India (GSI), Pune, rainfall has almost remained the same but the span has reduced and intensity of precipitation increased.

"When there are high (heavy) rains in a shorter span, saturation of soil and rocks leads to sudden landslides. This is exacerbated by manmade activities like deforestation, slope cutting for construction of roads, houses and agricultural fields and changing natural drainage that re-

experts analyse broad trends, the villagers of the hill district of Raigad cope with their uncertain today and unknown tomorrow, wondering off and when they will have to move.

On the face of it, Manisha Yashwant Dore's temporary home in a container close to the Irshadgad fort is better equipped -- there are two fans, decent floor-

ing, cooking gas and tap water. Dore, who lost seven members of her family, including her who had come as a guest that night, her mother-in-law, step mother-in-law, father-in-law, brother-in-law and sister-in-law

The July 19 landslide sealed the fate of the men and women of Irshalwadi. Questions loom large for many thousands living in the tribal area – should they stay on in their villages, home for many generations, or is a move to safer areas inevitable.

There is an increasing feeling that they might just have to leave their homes to move to

On a nearby hill is the tribal hamlet of Changewadi, just below the Sondaigad hill. During the monsoons, the hill is pockmarked with scores of small waterfalls. It makes for great pictures. But villagers fear that the ground beneath a massive boulder, some 25-30 feet in height and 40-50 feet in width, is being eroded. And the boulder might

come crashing down. They have demanded that the boulder be removed.

People in Changewadi are part of the Thakar tribe and work as daily wage labourers at hill station Matheran, or nearby Karjat and Khalapur towns.

Echoing the sentiments of many villagers in the area, 28year-old Khadke said he does not want to leave but wondered if they had any choice in the

The story is repeated in village after village.

In Tadwadi, another tribal hamlet close by land adjoining a hillock has sunk at many places leading to the creation of cracks. In Beedkhurd, villagers last month passed a resolution urging the government to shift them to safer places.

Irsahalwadi is not the only hamlet to be buried. In 2021, Tailye village in Raigad, 87 people were killed in a landslide.

The Geological Survey of India, he said, has suggested that six villages in Raigad be permanently shifted. These are Ambe Shivthar, Wakan Dhamnichiwadi, Kudpan, Chandke, Kamthe and Kamthe Fauzdarwadi.

According to the rainfall data obtained from the state government, July witnessed the heaviest precipitation from 2000 to 2022. In 2017, Raigad recorded 11 heavy rainfall events, followed by 27 in 2019, seven in 2020, 11 in 2021 and 14 in 2022.

The Deccan plateau is made up of basalt rock. Explaining the geological factor behind more landslides in Raigad district, he added that lava flows which resulted in formation of the rocks in Raigad are different and support more weathering and formation of overburden soil which makes it more prone to landslides than other areas.

Why Sunderbans is on the UNESCO list

Kolkata, Sept 24: In 1987, when the Sunderbans National Park in West Bengal received the status of natural UNESCO World Heritage Site, many were unaware of the technical reasons behind this pride of Bengal getting the prestigious accredita-

Experts like Dr Raja Raut explained that one of the reasons for Sunderbans National Park being put on the UNESCO World Heritage Site list was because of its outstanding contribution to ecological and biological processes so necessary for the development of the marine ecosystem, terrestrial habitat and for the survival of different communities of plants and animals

Another reason for the tag was that the Sunderbans National Park meets the criteria under the "in-situ conservation of biological diversity", which in layman's language means the conservation of a species in its natural habitat and the maintenance and recovery of a viable population of species in their original place. This pattern of "in-situ conservation of biological diversity" also includes threatened and endangered species, explained Raut.

In the opinion of experts, meeting these two criteria was the prime reason for Sunderbans . National Park being put on the UNESCO's prestigious list.

They rubbished the argument that lobbying plays an important role in bagging such accreditations

According to them, lobbying might play a minor role on this count, but no amount of influencing can get a region the tag if the site does not fulfill the basic criteria, especially in the

According to experts, Sunderban is unique because not only does it contain the world's largest mangrove forests it also has a range of forests and waterways scattered over the coastal belts of South 24 Parganas and North 24 Parganas.

"While being the largest halophytic mangrove forest in the world is definitely a criteria we also have to keep in mind that it is one of the most productive natural ecosystems. It has a range of forests and waterways that support a huge diversity of fauna that includes threatened and endangered species," an expert pointed out.

In addition to that, the man $grove \, forest \, supports \, the \, largest \,$ population of Royal Bengal tigers unique for its capability of thriving in an amphibious environment and surviving suitably in both land and water, he added.

The Royal Bengal Tigers are unique due to their capabilities of swimming long-distances and survive on a varied diet of fish, water-monitor lizards and even crabs. They have these capabilities as they adapted to their abode in the mangrove forestation," the expert said.

Another point that makes the Sunderban so precious is the fact that this mangrove forestation acts as a shelterbelt for the people of the region and protects them from severe climatic conditions.

Apart from that, the rich natural resources of the Sunderban are the economic backbone of millions of people, whose primary source of livelihood is wood and honey collection, subsistence

fishing and shrimp farming. The park is also immensely important to the local residents, the government, the tourism sector and other stakeholders due to its huge revenue potential.

Mumbai. Sept 24: Exactly 30 years after women's empowerment got a kick-start with 33 per cent reservations in local self-government bodies, which later went upto 50 per cent, the Elected Women Representatives (EWR)s have not only come a long way - but also gone a long way - to consolidate their position as a crucial factor in nation-building from below.

The past three decades have seen the EWRs unshackling themselves from familial and social chains, transforming themselves gradually from being timid, teary-eved, confused or even some 'goongi gudiyas' controlled by the menfolk to now becoming assertive, independent,



tough, capable of taking their own decisions, and if needed, yell at the man to 'go to hell', like veritable Durgas!

Mumbai, Sept 24: Nestled in the narrow lanes of Girgaon in south Mumbai is the city's oldest Ganpati mandal Sarvajanik Ganeshutsav Sanstha, which marks 131 years of celebrating the festival this year.

The Sanstha, established in 1893 under the leadership of Rao Bahadur Limaye and Godse Shastri, has been celebrating the festival at Keshavji Naik Chawl on Khadilkar Road in a traditional manner.

"Lokmanya Bal Gangadhar Tilak's close associates Rao Bahadur Limaye and Godse Shastri started celebrating the festival here after he gave a call for public celebrations of Ganesh Chaturthi for people to come to-



gether against the British," says Kumar Walekar, secretary of the

Sarvajanik Ganeshutsav Sanstha. The 10-day festival is being celebrated with the same devotion since 1893, he says.

Time seems to stand still as one walks into the chawl, where the city's mega festival had its humble beginnings. The one thing that makes the pandal stand out is that traditions have been followed for the last 131 years, says Walekar.

The Sanstha has kept the celebrations simple and traditional since the beginning with a 2 foot idol made of clay. 'Residents celebrate the fes-

tival as one family and all the decorations are designed and made by them. Only the stage and pillars are brought from outside," says Walekar beaming with pride.

'We bring idols of the same size every year. There are children here who observe what is happening, they might not understand it now, but once they grow up, they will know what to do while following all the tradi-

Over 80K idols immersed on fifth day of festivities

ore than 80,000 idols were immersed between Saturday, which was the fifth day of Ganesh festivities, and the early hours of Sunday in Mumbai, a civic official said. As per a release from the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation, 80,969 idols were immersed till 3am Sunday, comprising 1,410 'sarvajanik' or public idols, 71,821 household ones and 7,738 Gauri Ganesh idols. Of these, 32,509 idols were immersed in artificial waterbodies, comprising 581 public idols, 29.620 household ones and 2.308 Gauri Ganesh idols, it said. The immersions took place in Girgaum, Dadar, Juhu, Marve and Aksa beaches and 73 natural spots as well as 191 artificial ponds created by the civic body. In a statement, Mumbai police said 2,094 officials, 11083 constables, 32 platoons of State Reserve Police Force (SRPF), Quick Response Team (QRT), Rapid Action Force and Home Guards have been deployed in the city in view of festivities.

Narrative to get me lynched: Danish Ali PRESS TRUST OF INDIA New Delhi, Sept 24: As more BJP MPs urged Speaker Om Birla to probe BSP MP Danish Ali's

conduct in Lok Sabha, the lawmaker Sunday claimed a narrative was being set for "lynching" him outside the House and termed as baseless the allegation that he had instigated ruling party member Ramesh Bidhuri who made derogatory remarks against him. The opposition parties, which have demanded the strictest ac-

tion including suspension of Bidhuri for his "vile and communal" remarks during a discussion on the success of Chandrayaan-3 in Lok Sabha on Thursday, hit out at the BJP, alleging that it was trying to defend its MP instead of punishing him. Addressing a press conference Sunday, Ali said, "I have seen Nishikant Dubey's letter (to Birla). My verbal lynching was done inside the House and now this is a narrative to get me lynched outside the House." "I would request the Speaker to investigate this baseless allegation. This baseless allegation makes a case for breach of privilege against

Nishikant Dubey," he said. A day after Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla warned Bidhuri of "strict action" if such behaviour is repeated, Dubey on Saturday wrote to the Speaker, saying that while he condemns his party colleague's comments, there should also be a probe into the alleged "unsavoury"

civilised society will not accept it. But at the same time, he claimed that Ali was a repeat offender and all evidence of his "misconduct" in the House will now come into the open He also claimed that Ali was

planning to join the Congress and both were trying to make an issue. It was a "conspiracy" to project that the "minorities are not safe" in the country, the BJP MP alleged. In his letter to the Speaker, Shukla said whatever words Bidhuri used against Ali were "unaccentable in any way" but the circumstances that led to the use of "such objectionable" words by an MP against another member of Parliament in the House "needs to be revisited and examined".

"Twice he had used unparliamentary language against me. On December 9 last year when I was tabling my Private Members Bill namely 'The Population Control Bill. 2019' in the House. Danish Ali tried to interrupt me and made personal remarks against me...,"

the BJP MP charged. Such sort of behaviour is "unacceptable" and needs to be examined by "your esteemed office", he urged the Lok Sabha Speaker."I don't support what Ramesh Bidhuri said. Armies of India, US to kick-start war game in Alaska today

New Delhi, Sept 24: The Indian and US armies will kick-start a twoweek war game in Alaska Monday that will feature a number of complex drills, officials said.

The mega exercise comes amid a renewed push by both New Delhi and Washington to expand the overall scope of the India-US global strategic part-

The Indian Army contingent comprising 350 personnel has already reached Fort Wainwright in Alaska to participate in the 19th edition of exercise Yudh Abhyas, the officials said on Sunday.

It is an annual exercise conducted jointly by the Indian Army and the US Army

The previous edition of the exercise was conducted in Auli, Uttarakhand in November last

The exercise will also involve an exchange of views and best practices in drills on a wide spectrum of military skills, including combat engineering, obstruction clearance, and improvised explosive device warfare.

"The exercise Yudh Abhyas-23 will facilitate both armies to mutually learn from each other and further strengthen the bonds between the two armies." the Indian Army said in a state-

The lead battalion from the Indian side in the exercise is affiliated with the Maratha Light Infantry regiment, it said, adding the 1-24 infantry battalion of the first brigade combat team will participate from the US side.

New Delhi, Sept 24: Exuding confidence about a good showing in the upcoming assembly polls, Congress leader Rahul Gandhi Sunday said that as of now the Congress is certainly winning Madhya Pradesh and Chhattisgarh, probably winning Telangana, and there is a "very close" contest in Rajasthan which the party believes it will emerge victorious in.

Rahul Gandhi also referred to the row over BJP MP Ramesh Bidhuri's derogatory remarks against BSP leader Danish Ali in Lok Sabha, alleging that the BJP indulges in such tactics to distract from the demand for a caste census.

He asserted that the opposition is adapting and working together and the BJP is "in for a surprise in 2024" general elections. Speaking at a conclave organised by the Pratidin Media Network of Assam, Rahul Gandhi also said the idea of 'One Nation, One Election' was aimed at distracting from real issues of the people.

"It's one of the BJP's dis-

traction strategies," he asserted. The main issues in India are concentration of wealth, huge inequality in wealth, massive_ unemployment, huge unfairness towards the lower caste, OBCs, and tribal communities. and price rise, he said.

"Now, the BJP can't contest those. So 'let's have Mr. Bidhuri make a statement. Let's get together and sort of have elections together. Let's change the name of India'. This is all distraction. We know it, we understand it. And we're not going to let them do it," he said.

He asserted that his party not winning any of the states in the upcoming state polls is out of the question.

Asked about the party's chances, Rahul Gandhi said, "I would say, right now, we are probably winning Telangana, we are certainly winning Madhya Pradesh, we are certainly winning Chhattisgarh. Rajasthan, we are very close, and we think we will be able to win. That is what it is looking like, and by the way, that is also what the BJP internally is saying.

INDIA in search of a Dalit leader

NDIA may have cobbled together 28 parties to give the BJP a be-fitting lesson in 2024 Lok Sabha polls. But it is in desperate search of a Dalit leader who is worth a salt. Since BSP's Mayawati has been kept out of INDIA, the alliance is looking for a Dalit leader who can sway those voters in UP and a couple of other states. More than Akhilesh Yadav, it's the Congress which is keen to get those Dalit voters who went away 30 years ago to BSP. There is a move to project Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge as the party's Dalit face and field him for the Lok Sabha seat in UP.

How Kamal Nath put his foot down

NDIA alliance parties were left high and dry and Congress high command ran for cover when Madhya Pradesh Congress president Kamal Nath declined to hold a joint rally of the Opposition parties in Bhopal on October 1. Kamal Nath was upset with the AICC general secretary (organisation) K C Venugopal that he was not even consulted before committing to hold a rally in Bhopal on October 1.He explained to the members of the Gandhi family that the entire state unit is in the midst of a virtual war with the BJP to win the Assembly polls. The high command buckled and the rally was cancelled. The Congress conveyed to the INDIA bloc parties that it would be difficult to spare resources for a joint Opposition rally in the midst of assembly polls in five states. Kamal Nath is at variance with the other parties of the INDIA bloc on the issue of Hindutva and Sanatan Dharma and presence of the DMK would hugely embarrass the Congress. Kamal Nath, on the contrary, is in competition with the BJP to establish himself as a bigger Hindu than the RSS and the BJP leaders. The Congress leadership had proposed to hold the joint Opposition rally at Bhopal at the Coordination committee at the residence of NCP supremo Sharad Pawar on September 13.

Big fight in BJP

ere's more on the Ghosi by-election which was won by the SP candidate who defeated Dara Singh Chauhan of the BJP by a huge margin. The result is being seen in UP's political circles as a victory



for CM Yogi Adityanath as he was not in favour of Chauhan's recent return to the BJP but was overruled by Amit Shah. Though Yogi did campaign for Chauhan in Ghosi, it was acknowledged that his heart was not in it. Well aware of the CM's indifference, Shah gave charge of the election to Arvind Sharma, known as PM Narendra Modi's man. But nothing helped. Besides Chauhan, Yogi has also been smarting over Shah's decision to seal an alliance with Om Prakash Rajbhar of the

Suheldev Bharatiya Samaj Party. Even as the BJP's state unit is still recovering from its defeat in Ghosi, Rajbhar put the proverbial cat among the pigeons by publicly declaring he and Chauhan will soon be inducted in the Yogi Cabinet. The CM is obviously resisting. It is to be seen if Shah will manage to prevail.

Nitish dumps liquor ban policy

Even as Bihar Chief Minister Nitish Kumar is emerging as a front-runner for the Prime ministerial race of INDIA, he has decided to look the other way in terms of his strict prohibition policy. The policy saw thousands going behind bars, millions bottles broken of liquor and families suffering since April 2016. While the success of the initiative remains debatable, the main question is whether Nitish, who is sort of the de facto convener of Opposition unity at the moment, has been maintaining a studied silence on whether he will propose to implement it all over the country. After all, he has spent the last seven years defending the policy despite vehement criticism. Now that the policy failed miserably, Nitish Kumar has issued informal orders to the police in the state not to harass people and arrest. The police should focus on recovery of illicit liquor only. Now Nitish Kumar is fully focused on national issues and ducking state specific

Near Kornidzor, Armenia, **Sept 24:** The 1, 20,000 ethnic Armenians of Nagorno-Karabakh will leave for Armenia as they do not want to live as part of Azerbaijan and fear ethnic cleansing, the leadership of the breakaway said Sunday.

The Armenians of Karabakh - a territory internationally recognised as part of Azerbaijan but previously beyond Baku's control - were forced to declare a ceasefire September 20 after a lightning 24-hour military operation by the much larger Azerbaijani military.

Azerbaijan says it will guarantee their rights and integrate the region, but the Armenians say they fear repression.

"Our people do not want to live as part of Azerbaijan. Ninety-nine point nine percent prefer to leave our historic lands," David Babayan, an adviser to Samvel Shahramanyan, President of the self-styled Republic of Artsakh, told Reuters.

The Armenian leaders of Karabakh said in a statement that all those made homeless by the Azerbaijani military operation and wanting to leave would be escorted to Armenia by Russian peacekeepers.

Reuters reporters near the village of Kornidzor on the Armenian border saw some heavily laden cars pass into Armenia. One of the drivers said they were from Nagorno-Karabakh.

FIRST KARABAKH WAR

Nagorno-Karabakh, known as Artsakh by Armenians, lies in an area that over centuries has come under the sway of Persians, Turks, Russians, Ottomans and Soviets. It was claimed by both

Azerbaijan and Armenia after the fall of the Russian Empire in 1917. In Soviet times it was designated an autonomous region within Azerbaijan.

As the Soviet Union crumbled, the Armenians there threw off nominal Azeri control and captured neighbouring territory in what is now known as the First Karabakh War. From 1988-1994 about 30,000 people were killed and more than a million people, mostly Azeris, displaced.

In 2020, after decades of skirmishes, Azerbaijan, backed by Turkey, won a decisive 44-day Second Karabakh War, recapturing territory in and around Karabakh. That war ended with a Russian-brokered peace deal, which Armenians accuse Moscow of failing to guarantee.

The Armenian authorities in the region said late on Saturday that about 150 tons of humanitarian cargo from Russia and another 65 tons of flour shipped by the International Committee of the Red Cross had arrived in the region. With 2,000 peacekeepers in the region, Russia said that under the terms of the ceasefire six armoured vehicles. more than 800 small arms, antitank weapons and portable air defence systems, as well as 22,000 ammunition rounds, had been handed in by Saturday.

Space for 40,000 people from Karabakh had been prepared in Armenia. Azerbaijan, which is mainly Muslim, has said the Armenians, who are Christian, can leave if they want.

Madrid, Sept 24: Tens of thousands of Spaniards protested in Madrid Sunday against possible plans by acting Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez to grant an amnesty to Catalan separatists to keep himself in office after an election he failed to win.

Waving Spanish flags, supporters of the Opposition conservative People's Party (PP) travelled from across Spain to attend the rally in Madrid. Authorities estimated the size of the crowd at 40,000.

Sanchez, who came second in an election in July, could stay in office if he wins the support of exiled former Catalonia leader Carles Puigdemont, whose Junts per Catalunya party controls seven seats in parliament.

Puigdemont, wanted in Spain for attempting the region's secession, has demanded that legal action be dropped against fellow separatists as a condition for his support.

Alberto Nunez Feijoo, leader of the PP which won the most votes July 23, said he would never concede to demands for an amnesty for organisers of a 2017 independence referendum in

Catalonia, which was held despite courts ruling it was illegal.

Withdrawing criminal cases against the separatists would amount to granting an amnesty to "coup plotters", he told supporters at the Madrid rally.

Gregorio Casteneda, 72, a pensioner, had travelled from Santander on Spain's north coast to show his opposition to any amnesty.

"I am not in favour of the government that we have. To me this is a disaster because it is going to divide Spain totally,' he told Reuters. Sanchez held his own political rally in Gava, near Catalonia's regional capital Barcelona, on Sunday. He did not mention an amnesty but said the Socialists wanted to heal social divisions over the Catalan crisis. In 2021, Sanchez granted pardons to nine separatists jailed over their roles in the independence push.

Feijoo will take the first stab at a vote to become prime minister September 27, but his chances of winning are seen as slim since the PP opposes any concessions to separatists. If Feijoo fails, Sanchez will get a chance to see if he can muster support.

Gunmen battle police in Kosovo monastery siege

North Mitrovica, Kosovo, Sept 24: Gunmen in armoured vehicles stormed a village in Kosovo on Sunday, battling police and barricading themselves in a_ Serbian Orthodox monastery in a resurgence of violence in the restive northern region. Kosovo police said one offi-

cer and three of about 30 attackers were killed in shootouts around the village of Baniska. Monks and pilgrims were

locked in the monastery's temple, the church said, as the siege raged for hours.

Ethnic Albanians form more than 90% of the population in Kosovo, a former province of Serbia, but Serbs are the majority in the north and there were clashes in May that injured dozens of protesters and

NATO alliance peacekeepers.

The Serbs have never accepted Kosovo's 2008 declaration of independence and still see Belgrade as their capital more than two decades after the Kosovo Albanian uprising against repressive Serbian rule. It was unclear who exactly was behind Sunday's violence, but Kosovo's Prime Minister Albin Kurti and Interior Minister Xhelal Svecla blamed "Serbia-sponsored criminals". "They are professionals, with military and police background," said Kurti, urging their surrender.

London, Sept 24: Wildfires fuelled by climate change have ravaged communities from Maui to the Mediterranean this summer, killing many people, exhausting firefighters and fuelling demand for new solutions. Enter artificial intelligence.

Firefighters and startups are using AI-enabled cameras to scan the horizon for signs of smoke. A German company is building a constellation of satellites to detect fires from space. And Microsoft is using AI models to predict where the next blaze could be sparked.

With wildfires becoming larger and more intense as the world

warms, firefighters, utilities and governments are scrambling to get ahead of the flames by tapping into the latest AI technol-— which has stirred both fear and excitement for its potential to transform life. While increasingly stretched first responders hope AI offers them a leg up, humans are still needed to check that the tech is accurate.

California's main firefighting agency this summer started testing an AI system that looks for smoke from more than 1,000 mountaintop camera feeds and is now expanding it statewide.

The system is designed to find "abnormalities" and alert emergency command centers, where staffers will confirm whether



it's indeed smoke or something else in the air.

The cameras, part of a network that workers previously had to watch, provide billions of bytes of data for the AI system to digest. While humans still need to confirm any smoke sightings, the system helps reduce

fatigue among staffers typically monitoring multiple screens and cameras, alerting them to look only when there's possible fire or smoke, SeLegue said.

It's already helped. A battalion chief got a smoke alert in the middle of the night, confirmed it on his cellphone and called a

Ather losses swell

New Delhi: Hero MotoCorpbacked electric vehicle (EV) company Ather Energy's losses surged more than 2.5 times in the financial year 2022-23. The EV startup reported a loss of ₹864.5 crore in FY23, against a loss of ₹344.1 crore in FY22, according to its annual financial statements filed with the Registrar of Companies (RoC). Ather's total expenses more than tripled to ₹2,670.6 crore from ₹757.9 crore in FY22, despite strong sales. The surge in losses reported even after the firm's revenue from operations grew 4.3 times to reach ₹1,784 crore during the fiscal year ending March 2023. The company spent ₹1.5 to earn every ₹1 from operations in FY23, while EBITDA margin improved to -38.3 per cent, according to

Chinese goods under govt lens

New Delhi, Sept 24: The Reserve Bank is likely to maintain status quo on policy rates for the fourth time in a row at its bi-monthly monetary policy review meeting early next month, as retail inflation continues to remain high and the US Federal Reserve has decided to keep a hawkish stance for some more time, according

The Reserve Bank Governorheaded six-member Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) meeting is scheduled for October 4-6. 2023. The last meeting of the MPC, the highest rating-setting panel, was in August.

"We do expect the RBI to hold on to a status quo position this time as inflation is still high and liquidity tight. In fact, going by RBI forecast on inflation, it would be above 5 per cent in Q3 too, which will ensure that the status quo prevails for the calendar year for sure and probably Q4 too," said Madan Sabnavis, Chief Economist, Bank of Baroda.

Sabnavis further said there are uncertainties relating to Kharif crop, especially on pulses, which can increase prices.

"The comfort is that there is less concern on growth which is on target," he added.

Although the Consumer Price Index (CPI)-based retail inflation eased a bit to 6.83 per cent in August from 7.44 per cent in the preceding month in July, it remained above the Reserve Bank's comfort level of 6 per cent. It may be mentioned that the government has mandated the RBI to keep inflation at 4 per cent with 2 per cent margin on either side.

Aditi Nayar, Chief Economist, ICRA Limited said the headline CPI inflation is expected to ease to 5.3-5.5 per cent in September 2023 from 6.8 per cent in August 2023, benefitting from the halving of the average price of tomatoes as well as a favourable base.

... We expect the CPI inflation to ease to 5.6 per cent in Q3 FY2024 and further to 5.1 per cent in Q4 FY2024, amid upside risks to food inflation on account of the impact of uneven and sub-par monsoons and low reser-

voir levels on Kharif yields and Rabi sowing, respectively," she said. Nayar said ICRA expects the MPC to remain on hold in October 2023 policy, while continuing to demonstrate caution amid a cloudy outlook for food inflation and elevated crude oil

The Reserve Bank has proiected CPI inflation at 5.4 per cent for 2023-24, with Q2 at 6.2 per cent, Q3 at 5.7 per cent and Q4 at 5.2 per cent, with risks evenly balanced. CPI inflation for Q1, 2024 25 is projected at 5.2 per cent.

The Reserve Bank mainly factors in the CPI-based inflation while arriving at its bi-monthly monetary policy.

The borrowing cost which started rising in May last year has stabilised with RBI keeping the reporate unchanged at 6.5 per cent since February, when it was raised from 6.25 per cent. Later in the next three bi-monthly policy reviews in April, June and August the benchmark rate was

Apart for the limited period offers, IRCTC Air also offers defence fares and leave travel concession (LTC) tickets for government officials, a statement issued by IRCTC said.

Can't interfere in Akasa dispute: DGCA

New Delhi, Sept 24: India's aviation authorities have ruled out intervening in a dispute between Akasa Air and its pilots after the budget carrier accused the regulator of inaction, a legal fil-

Over 40 of Akasa's 450 pilots quit without serving their notice in recent weeks, and the airline has sued some of them and challenged Indian authorities in court for not acting on its requests to deal with alleged pilot 'misconduct". The airline has also warned of a shut down due to the crisis

India mandates a notice period of 6-12 months for pilots which some pilot organisations are challenging in court. Akasa argues its contractual obligations with pilots remain in force, and is suing the regulator for not intervening in the public interest.

The Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) and the aviation ministry in a September 22 filing at the Delhi High Court said Akasa's plea should be

thrown out as the regulator is unable to interfere in the matter.

The DGCA "does not have any power or delegated authority to interfere in any employment contract," it said.

Akasa has accused the DGCA of being "unwilling to take any action" which resulted in "significant financial and opera-

tional hardship" to the airline. The pilot resignations caused 632 flight cancellations in August, according to Akasa, an estimated 18% of the roughly 3,500 flights the airline usually operates in a month.

The DGCA contested that position in its court filing, saving it "categorically denies" that Akasa "provided any documents or reasons" in respect of cancellation as a result of pilot exits.

Sharing data, it said only 1.17% of Akasa's flights were cancelled in August. The 6,000 member Federation of Indian Pilots have also responded to Akasa's plea, saying flight cancellation numbers were "unsubstantiated" and that the DGCA cannot interfere in the dispute.

"Alleged mass resignation of pilots ... also serves as an indication of employee discontent," the federation said.

With regards to mutual fund unitholders, the regulator in its circular June 15, 2022, made it mandatory for mutual fund subscribers to submit the nomination details or declaration to opt out of the nomination on or after August 1, 2022. Later, the deadline was extended to-October 1, 2022, and again till

New Delhi, Sept 24: French energy giant TotalEnergies SE's \$300 million investment in clean energy projects of Adani Green Energy Ltd has taken the total investments poured in by global investors in India's largest renewable power producer to \$1.63 billion or about ₹14,000 crore, sources close to the company

Last week, Total announced it will hold a 50 per cent stake in the new joint venture firm where Adani Green Energy Ltd (AGEL)

will hold the rest. The joint ven ture will hold a portfolio of 1,050 MW, including 300 MW of already operational capacity, 500 MW under construction and 250 MW under-development assets with a blend of solar and wind

Total already has a 19.7 per cent stake in AGEL. It also has an equal joint venture with AGEL, called AGE23L that holds a portfolio of 2,353 MW.

The \$300 million investment Total is making in the joint venture is the first since the Hindenburg report in January highlighted Adani Group's debt pile and alleged accounting fraud and stock manipulation, which Adani denies.

Sources said AGEL is one company within the Adani Portfolio, which has attracted a range of investors over the past few months including repeat strategic investor Total, one of the largest emerging market funds GQG



Capital Partners and one of the world's largest sovereign funds Qatar Investment Authority.

Together these three investors have invested \$1.63 billion or close to ₹14,000 crore over the past few months, taking advantage of the attractive valuations post the short-seller report, they

GQG Partners has taken a 6.8 per cent stake in AGEL while QIA picked up 2.7 per cent. IHC International Holding Company has another 1.3 per cent stake.

Explaining the rationale of the investments, sources said India is now a leader in the renewable energy space, with dozens of solar and wind projects in the pipeline. Adani being the largest renewable power producer in India, with its strong execution ability and superior track record, is in an extremely sweet spot.

This has made Adani the largest solar power producer in India as well as one of the lowest cost renewable power producers in the world. Average portfolio tariff is as low as ₹3.02 per unit as against average procurement price of the country of

₹3.75 per unit. It already has a portfolio of 20.4 GW across operational, under-construction, awarded and acquired assets.

Sources said the firm has given a capex guidance of ₹14,000 crore for this year for around 3 GW of projects. Next year, it is likely to do at least 5 GW, which would mean another ₹23,000-24,000 crore.

The management attributes its ability to produce lowest cost power to its execution, which includes site identification acquisition, concession and regulatory agreements, investment case development, engineering and design, sourcing and quality checks, equity and debt funding for the project and highly tech-enabled O&M

The company has built most of the portfolio during the post-Covid era and has a track record of delivering each of its projects before time. As against, 18 months period permitted from the effective scheduling of the PPA to commissioning, the company has a track record of executing this in less than a year, sources said.

With its capacity target to reach 45 GW, it has the potential to deliver 6X growth from FY23 and FY30, they said, adding around 40 GW worth resource assessment has already been done - sites, geotechnical studies, sourcing equipment etc. With constantly upgrading technology, there are chances that there could be an upside surprise in terms of output.

It was a complete domination from the Indians who took seven minutes to break the deadlock, but once they did, it was complete mayhem for Uzbekistan. However, the matter for concern is that India could only convert five of the 14 penalty corners they got. India scored 10 field goals while

another one was from a 'stroke'. The Indians got their first chance in the fifth minute but Abhishek's tap from close range was saved by Uzbek goalkeeper Davlat Tolibbaev. Minutes later Sukhjeet earned India's first penalty corner but Sanjay's flick was kept away by Tolibbaev.

However, India broke the deadlock seconds later when Lalit scored from a rebound after Tolibbaev had made a double save. Varun doubled India's lead in the 12th minute by converting India's second penalty corner.
