Manipur on boil again over killing of 2 youths

Imphal, Sept 26: Altogether 45 students, many of them girls, were injured in Manipur's Imphal Valley Tuesday as the police fired tear gas shells and batoncharged protesters demonstrating against the killing of two youths who were allegedly kidnapped in July, officials said.

In view of the prevailing situation, the government re-imposed suspension of internet services for five days and announced that all schools in the state will be closed till Friday.

Twenty-four MLAs of Manipur including 21 of the BJP have urged Union Home Minister Amit Shah for 'urgent necessary action by the CBI against the guilty persons' involved in the killing of two youths.

The students of Imphal-based schools and colleges brought out the protest rallies hours after photos of the bodies of the two youths went viral on social media. They demanded the arrest of those involved in the killing.

The protesters clashed with the police near Sanjenthong in Imphal East district when security forces stopped them from advancing towards the chief minister's secretariat here.

The police used tear gas shells and batons to disperse the

New Delhi, Sept 26: "Today, I am quiet because the attorney general has sought a very short time, next time I will not be quiet. Use your good office to see these issues are resolved," Justice Sanjay Kishan Kaul of the Supreme Court told Attorney General R Venkataramani Tuesday while expressing his dismay over the 'delay' in the appointment of judges with 70 collegium recommendations still stuck with the Centre since last November.

"I thought of saying a lot, but since the attorney general is only seeking seven days time, I'm holding myself," said Justice Kaul, whose bench also comprised Sudhanshu Dhulia, after Venkataramani sought a week's time to come back with instructions on the pending recommendations for judges' appointment to the high court.

Justice Kaul said the judiciary tries to get the best talent but due to the pendency, lawyers whose names were recommended for judgeship have withdrawn their

names. The way good candidates withdraw their consent to be a judge is "really worrisome", he said, adding the apex court will monitor the appointment process at regular intervals.

The appointment of judges through the collegium system has in the past become a major flashpoint between the Supreme Court and the Centre with the mechanism of judges appointing judges drawing criticism from different quarters.

"There were 80 recommendations pending until last week when 10 names were cleared. Now, the figure is 70, of which 26 recommendations are of transfer of judges, seven are reiterations, nine are pending without being returned to the collegium and one case is of appointment

substantial work is done," said Justice Kaul, who is part of the apex court collegium which looks after the appointment of judges in the top court and the high The top court was hear-

ing a petition filed by Advocates Association of Bengaluru seeking contempt action against the Ministry of Law and Justice for not allegedly adhering to the timeline set by the court in a 2021 judgement.

During the hearing, advocate Prashant Bhushan, appearing for another petitioner NGO Common Cause, submitted a chart related to pending recommendations with the government.

He said what is more worrisome is that even after a batch of names is recommended by the collegium at one time, the government segregates it and makes selective appointments.

Justice Kaul, while agreeing with the views of Bhushan, said there are nine such names, where the government has kept the names pending without reverting them back.

I agree that the way good candidates withdraw their consent to be a judge is really worrisome. Bhubaneswar, Sept 26: A day after its introduction, the state Assembly Tuesday passed the Odisha Apartment (Ownership and Management) Bill, 2023 to regulate apartment ownership and management, replacing the Odisha Apartment (Ownership and Management) Ordinance,

The Bill would help regulate the use of common area in an apartment, create a common fund to meet the common expenses of an apartment and create necessary provisions relating to registration of common area in favour of association of allottees in line with the provisions of Real Estate Regulatory Authority (RERA) Act.

Besides, it would clearly spell out the accountability and responsibility of promoters, provide for rights and responsibilities of each apartment owner in relation to the association of apartment owners.

The legislation provides for formation of association of apart-

ment owners and to create provisions for insurance of the apartment and ensure its structural stability.

APARTMENT BILL

According to the new legialation, a builder or promoter will have to handover the ownership certificate of common area to the owners' association within 30 days of giving occupancy certificate to the flat buyer.

If the promoter fails to form the owners' association or sells flats without issuing occupancy certificate, he will be liable to ₹5 lakh as fine.

The Odisha Apartment Ownership Act, 1982 and Odisha Apartment Ownership Rules, 1992 intended to promote apartment and group housing. However, over a period of time it had become essential to provide the individual apartment owners with the rights on common areas and facilities appurtenant to such apartment and the responsibility of its proper maintenance and to make such apartment and interest heritable and transferable.

New Delhi, Sept 26: It all started in 1955 with an errant buffalo and Guru Dutt's car. The animal got in the way and totaled the car, forcing Dutt and his friends to stay on in Hyderabad for a few days. It was then that he spotted a young woman from across the street and made inquiries.

She was, of course, Waheeda Rehman. And the rest, as they say, is cinematic history

Tuesday, Rehman was named recipient of the Dadasaheb Phalke award, occasion for cinephiles to dig into her remarkable filmography.

The Dutt-Rehman story - which starred gems such as "Pyaasa" (1957), "Kaagaz Ke Phool" (1959) and "Sahib Bibi aur Ghulam"

(1962) - was recalled by film writer Abrar Alvi in "Ten Years With Guru Dutt" by Sathya Saran.

'Waheeda has a buffalo to thank for the fact that we signed her on," Alvi recalls in the book, flipping back to the time when Rehman, then a budding dancer, had just started out in the south and Dutt was impatiently looking to add another hit to the list of "Aar Paar" (1954) and "Mr and Mrs '55" (1955).

Looking to remake Tamil hit "Missiamma" (1955) in Hindi, Dutt along with Alvi and their production controller Guruswamy had decided to travel to Hyderabad in a car.

A tired Alvi drove the car into a startled buffalo on the road and the trio had to extend their stay in Hyderabad by a couple of



days due to the smashed up car. On one of those days, sitting at the office of a distributor in Secunderabad, Dutt's attention

was grabbed by a young woman who got down from a car and entered the building opposite. The distributor then informed,

"She is a dancer in a Telugu film 'Rojulu Marayi', which is a super hit thanks to her dance num-

Dutt showed interest in meeting her and Rehman was called into the office, "very plainly dressed, without even lipstick to relieve the monotony of her face" and "spoke softly in near monosyllables in response" to the

Waheeda Rehman had been discovered!

She had appeared in two Telugu films "Rojulu Maraayi" and "Jayasimha" that year. The following year, Dutt introduced her to Hindi audiences through the blockbuster "CID" (1956), produced by him and directed by Raj Khosla. That was also the first time Rehman and Dev Anand appeared together on





Odisha tourism eyes a shining future

Following the devastating Super Cyclone in 1999. tourism sector in Odisha limped back to normalcy in the subsequent years. The sector was again hit in 2020 and 2021 owing to Covid-19 pandemic but it again started recovering in 2022 with a significant rise in footfall of domestic and foreign tourists. A major contributor to the state's revenue, the tourism sector has received an increased outlay of ₹660 crore in the 2023-24 state budget as against ₹590 crore in the previous financial year, exuding renewed hope for a robust sectoral growth. On World Tourism Day 2023, **Orissa POST** takes a sneak peek into the growth and prospects of tourism in the state.

According to educationalist and Odisha tourism enthusiast Jitu Mishra, "Odisha Tourism in recent years has come up with a range of innovative ideas showcasing Odisha's hidden tourism potential. Eco Retreat at several destinations is one such innovative ideas that is gradually changing the perception of tourists about Odisha from bevond the borders. Odisha Walks in the Capital city of Bhubaneswar is yet another such innovative idea that even found place in Time magazine."

Mishra also suggested that both the government, and travel enthusiasts & professionals should work in collaboration to bring hidden gems to limelight and create homestays or other modes of accommodation for travelers. They can also create more local resource persons who can provide more authentic curated experience to travelers, he added.

Srinivas Subudhi, working president of Hotel & Restaurant Association of Odisha (HRAO), said "Attracting more and more foreign tourists is the need of the hour. Although the launch of direct flights connecting Bhubaneswar with Dubai, Bangkok and Singapore will help in attracting more tourists from abroad, infrastructure development like more number of good hotels in the state is highly required. Also, we need good skilled workforce and a good brand ambassador who has the charisma to attract people towards the state like Amitabh

does for Gujarat. Further, hospitality sector needs as much importance as the MSME sector does and this will help in economic development.

As per statistics compiled by the Tourism department, there has been an 875 per cent growth in inflow of foreign and 110 per cent growth in domestic tourists to Odisha in 2022 as compared to 2021. Footfall of domestic tourists increased to 78,67,909 in 2022 from 37,42,221 in 2021. While only 2,269 overseas tourists had visited the state in 2021, their arrival grew to 22,121 in 2022. This put together the total number of tourists visiting the state in 2022 at 78,90,030 as against 37.44,490 in 2021, clocking a growth of 110 per cent. As per statistics, West Bengal, Maharashtra and Madhya Pradesh were the top three states from where

tourists visited the state in 2022. The top three countries from where Odisha gets the maximum number of international tourists are: USA (3,446 tourists), Japan (2,378 tourists) and Germany (1,476 tourists).

The Tourism department attributed the reasons for the growth to multiple factors. Tourism director Sachin Ramchandra Jadhav said that the state government has prepared a robust roadmap to revive the tourism industry post-Covid.

"People wanted to travel after remaining indoors owing to Covid-induced restrictions. There were restrictions on flight movements. The Odisha government made a vibrant marketing and branding initiative to woo the tourists. We launched 'Odisha by road' campaign to explore the state by road," Jadhav said.

With recent launch of direct flights connecting Bhubaneswar to Dubai, Bangkok and Singapore under the 'Viability Gap Funding' scheme, the Odisha government is hopeful of doubling its foreign tourist footfall by 2025 as compared to the pre-pandemic levels, Jadhav said.







Assembly passes six bills

Bhubaneswar, Sep 26: After remaining paralysed since Monday, normalcy returned to the Odisha Assembly Tuesday evening and the House passed six

Opposition BJP members, who had created a ruckus earlier alleging that some of their questions were rejected without showing any reason, later participated in the proceedings while the Congress staged a walkout.

Normalcy returned to the House after Speaker Pramila Mallik in a ruling asked the Assembly secretary to find out the reasons behind not informing the BJP members whose questions were rejected.

Wearing black badges, the saffron party members had staged a protest in the well of the House protesting rejection of their auestions

"The (BJP) members should be given satisfactory reply on the reason for rejecting any question raised by them. The questions were rejected whimsically," said opposition chief whip Mohan Majhi.

In their bid to counter the agitating BJP members, the ruling BJD MLAs wondered why the Centre did not hike the MSP of paddy. Later, the House passed six Bills on Municipal Law Amendment, GST amendment and others.

While the BJP members participated in the discussion during the passage of the Bills, the Congress MLAs led by their leader Narasingha Mishra walked out of the House alleging that they were not allowed to speak on the Bills

Though Speaker Mallik sent Parliamentary Affairs Minister Niranjan Pujari and some other senior leaders to convince the Congress members to join the House, they refused to return. The Bills were passed in the abEarlier on the day, the House

witnessed ruckus for the second consecutive day as opposition and treasury benches shouted slogans against each other. Noisy scenes broke out as soon as the House assembled for the question hour.

The exchange of slogans between the BJD and BJP members forced Speaker Pramila Mallik to adjourn the House first till 12 noon and convene an all-party meeting to restore normalcy.

The meeting was held at the speaker's chamber and the proceedings resumed at 12 noon.

However, the commotion broke out again forcing the speaker to adjourn the House till 4 pm.



As the House remained paralysed, Mallik in a ruling asked the Assembly secretary to inquire into the allegations of the BJP members. BJP MLA Suryabanshi Suraj alleged that the government was avoiding questions in

'It (the government) is filtering questions as per their convenience which is not acceptable. The voice of democracy is being choked in Odisha," he

Government chief whip Prashant Muduli alleged that the BJP members are disrupting the House proceedings without any reason. "It is unfortunate. They too have a moral respon-

Over 28K villages yet to get piped water supply: Amat

Bhubaneswar: Over 28,000 villages in the state are yet to get piped water supply, Drinking Water Minister Pradip Kumar Amat told the Assembly Tuesday.

Replying to a written question by Congress MLA Narasingha Mishra, he said piped water connections have been provided to 19,131 of the total 47,274 villages in the state till September 22.

Amat said work is underway to provide piped water supply to the remaining 28,143 villages, which is around 60 per cent of the total villages in the state.

The Mayurbhanj district, which has a significant tribal population, has the highest number of villages, 2,727, that are yet to get the water connections. Of the 3,720 villages in the district, piped water supply has been provided to 993 villages so far, the minister

Mayurbhanj is followed by Kandhamal, where only 100 out of 2,367 villages have got piped water supply, he said.

The state government has spent a total of Rs 23,286 crore for the project in the last 10 years, 2013-14 to 2022-23, Amat

The government spent Rs 441.73 crore for the project in 2013-14, which went up to Rs 5,913.76 crore in the last financial year, he said.

NIGERIAN DELEGATION TO STUDY RICE FORTIFICATION

Bhubaneswar, Sept 26: A highlevel delegation of the Nigerian government arrived in Odisha Tuesday to learn the state's experience in rice fortification.

The delegation led by John Uruakpa, the director of Nigeria's federal ministry of health, held a meeting with Development Commissioner Anu Garg at the Lok Seva Bhawan.

The Nigerian government is formulating a national strategy to tackle micronutrient deficiencies. The government has identified rice, one of the staples in that country, as a part of the national fortification programme, officials said.

India's rice fortification implementation experience is a valuable example for Nigeria, especially the manner in which the ecosystem has been created around it, they said.

Uruakpa said this visit aims to provide first-hand experience



and knowledge to the stake- ating food security holders, equipping them to efficiently kick-start a rice fortification pilot project in Kebbi state using the school feeding program as a delivery mechanism.

Garg said that Odisha completed the introduction of fortified rice across the state in all food-based schemes a vear ahead of the deadline given by Centre.

Odisha began the first rice fortification programme in the country, in 2012 in the Gajapati district, she said, adding that the state government is open to sharing its experiences and learning, especially towards addressing malnutrition and cre-

The country director of World Food Programme in India Elisabeth Faure said, "The visit aims to learn from India's implementation journey's successes, challenges, and lessons. Also, to identify how these learning can be adapted and implemented in the Nigerian context

The delegation will visit rice fortification sites to understand the process, machinery used, quality control measures, and safety standards, officials said.

They will also meet food regulation officials to discuss regulatory aspects and compliance

In the national government day-schools category, Odisha Adarsh Vidyalaya (OAV), Budhapal, in Deogarh secured the eighth rank while Odisha Adarsh Vidyalaya Sangathan in Baripada got 9th rank.

Similarly, in the co-ed boarding schools category, SAI International Residential School in Cuttack secured the 10th rank nationwide. And in the philanthropy school category, Kalinga Institute of Social Sciences (KISS) here got the 6th rank.

The 17th annual Education World India School Rankings



(EWISR) 2023-24 survey was released in Bengaluru, Tuesday. The survey rates and ranks the country's Top 4,000 schools in four main and 23 sub-categories, namely 'Day: Co-ed, boys and girls, Day-cum-boarding; Boarding: co-ed, Girls and Boys; International: Day, Day-cumboarding and fully Residential. It also rates and ranks the best government day and boarding schools, as well as special needs

and philanthropy schools. 'The EWISR 2023-24 is outcome of an elaborate field survey. Over a period of four months, 127 field researchers conducted interviews in 34 cities across the country. They persuaded fees paying parents, teachers, principals, educationists and senior school students to rate the schools they were aware of on a 100point scale under 14 parameters of education excellence," said Premchand Palety, promotercum-CEO of Centre for Forecasting and Research.

Fire in Metro Tower; 2 minors rescued

Bhubaneswar: Fire broke out in Metro Tower at Vani Vihar Square here late Monday night. Fire services personnel claimed electric short-circuit as the reason behind the blaze. "We received a call regarding fire in the fifth floor of Metro Tower at Vani Vihar Square at around 2am. Two persons identified as Sk Mohamad, 15, and Musfiquer Mohamad, 16, were rescued from the 5th floor that was engulfed by smoke," said a fire service official. "During investigation, we found that the minors were engaged in interior work of a shop at Metro Tower. The spark, caused due to short circuit, came in contact with the waste material kept near an electronic

board in a corner of the shop and caught fire after a few minutes,' said the official. Meanwhile, child rights activist Benudhar Senapati raised serious objections over police action in the issue. He said that they have drawn the attention of OSCPCR, additional CWC and DCPO in the matter of trafficked children who were rescued from Metro Tower. "The children were found to be trafficked from Kolkata to Bhubaneswar for the purpose of work. But Saheed Nagar police handed over the children without even investigation and without producing before CWC. This is clear violation of child trafficking laws, JJ Act and SOP of NHRC," alleged

SC miffed over absence of state counsel POST NEWS NETWORK

New Delhi, Sept 26: The Supreme Court has expressed dissatisfaction over the non-appearance of a standing counsel of the Odisha government in a matter of personal liberty despite the notice being served.

A three-judge bench of Justices BR Gavai, PS Narasimha and PK Mishra, while hearing a petition related to bail, was irked by the non-appearance of a standing counsel of Odisha. The bench observed that it cannot wait endlessly for the state to respond to the notice, at least in the matters concerning personal liberty of citizens. The bench further observed that it was the duty of the state to have represented before this court when the notice was duly served.

"We deprecate the practice of the State of Odisha in not authorising the Standing Counsel to appear in the matter and take notice, particularly in the matters seeking bail," the SC said.

The apex court was hearing a special leave petition filed by Kirti Ranjan Bastia against an order of the Orissa High Court imposing several conditions for bail. The apex court quashed

security. The SC also noted that the petitioner has already been incarcerated for a period of more than seven years. The bench directed to release the petitioner on bail in connection with a FIR registered with Economic Offences Wing, Bhubaneswar on furnishing solvent surety in the sum of Rs 50,000 with one or more sureties in the like amount.

The bench also directed the apex court Registry to forward a copy of this order to the Chief Secretary of Odisha, who shall personally look into the matter and take necessary steps.

Construction of 3 truck terminals in Sambalpur still a distant dream due to lack of funds

Sambalpur, Sept 26: Delay in construction of three truck terminals to ease traffic problems on national and state highways connecting this city to various parts of the state and country, is causing innumerable problems to commuters and vehicles.

Hundreds of heavy vehicles ply daily on the national and state highways as there are a number of industrial units in this town as well as on its outskirts. Illegal parking of vehicles by drivers for hours together leads to traffic snarls and also cause inconvenience to people who use the roads.

To eradicate this problem, it was decided by the administration of Sambalpur district a few years back to construct three truck terminals at strategic locations.

Another, $10 \, \mathrm{acres} \, \mathrm{of} \, \mathrm{land} \, \mathrm{was}$ identified near Jamankira-Rasibeda on National Highway-55 for the second terminal while a third was to come up on 10 acres of land at Patrapali on National Highway-53

After identifying the land, the district administration handed over the plots to the Regional Transport Office and submitted a detailed project report (DPR) for appraisal by the state government. The total budget for the three projects was earmarked at ₹60 crore with each construction needing an investment of ₹20 crore. However, till date not even a single pillar has been built.



He stated that on an average over 4,000 heavy vehicles ply daily on the Biju Expressway. Moreover, thousands of trucks also ply daily on NH-53 connecting Mumbai with Kolkata and NH-55 connecting Sambalpur with Cuttack.

Deben Pati, chairman of Maa Samaleswari Multi-Utility Truck Owners' Association here welcomed the decision to construct the terminals. However, he asserted that work on the project should start immediately.

Pati stated that there have been a number of cases when heavy vehicles parked on the roadside have been stolen. He added that terminals will ensure safety of the vehicles.

Rourkela, Sept 26: The Sushmita Minz death case is gradually snowballing into a major controversy here. Members of the Sundargarh Adivasi Zilla Manch joined the chorus demanding a CBI probe into the death of Sushmita.

Members of the Adivasi Zilla Manch, led by Letha Tirky, a prominent tribal leader, laid siege to the Rourkela ADM's office Tuesday. More than 300 persons took part in the protests. They said they had no faith in the post-mortem report which stated that Sushmita died due to drowning and called the death a 'preplanned murder'.

The members submitted a memorandum at the ADM office here addressed to Odisha Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik. "We demand a CBI probe in the matter of pre-planned murder of Sushmita Minz, assistant collector, ADM office Rourkela, under the supervision of an

SC/HC judge," the memorandum stated. Members of the Adivasi Manch gheraoed the ADM office here for more than three hours. Among other prominent tribal leaders present were Bandana Toppo and Roshan Beck. In the memorandum the

Couple hacked to death over sorcery

Mohana, Sept 26: A couple was allegedly hacked to death at Ghodapanka village under Adaba police limits in Gajapati district late Monday night over black magic and witchcraft. The deceased were identified as Kapilendra Mallick and his wife Sasita Mallick, both residents of the same village.

Sources said that a group of people armed with sharp-edged weapons barged into Kapilendra's house and attacked him. When his wife tried to protect Kapilendra she was also at-

tacked. She tried to run away, but the assailants chased her down and then hacked her to death. Both Kapilendra and Sasita died on the spot.

Police after being informed reached the crime scene to find the two bodies lying in a pool of blood. Police also found the murder weapons, an axe and two knives. Sambalpur, Sept 26: To preserve Western Odisha's rich cultural heritage, the 'Centre of Excellence, Regional Development and Tribal Studies' of Sambalpur University has embarked on a mission to revive two dance forms, the 'Maadli' and 'Dhap'. Both these dance forms are on the verge of extinction. While the 'Maadli' dance, which

belongs to the indigenous communities of Western Odisha, holds a special place in the hearts of people. tribal dance of the region, 'Dhap' is also known for its rhythmic beats and energetic movements.

Nodal officer of the Centre, Arun Kumar Acharya said Tuesday that these dance forms, once vibrant expressions of the region's tribal communities, have faded into obscurity over the years. "However, meticulous efforts have been made to document, record



traditions, the unique dance form 'Maadli' is on the brink of extinction. However, the Centre of Excellence has formed a team of researchers, anthropologists and artists to document the intricate movements, costumes, and cultural significance associated with the dance form.

The process of documentation involved working closely with tribal elders who could remember Maadli's choreography and its connection

oral histories related to the dance and songs. The effort resulted in a comprehensive record that provided a vivid snapshot of the past glory of 'Maadli', Acharya stated.

Only Brave Talk

'hen China's President Xi Jinping told the International Olympic Committee chief Thomas Bach in Hangzhou a day before the opening ceremony of the ongoing Asian Games in Hangzhou, China that he vowed to uphold the principle of "non-politicisation of sports," it was the height of hypocrisy, at least from India's perspective. China, under his leadership, has done just the opposite. It has weaponised the Asian Games to needle and provoke India challenging the latter's territorial sovereignty. His comments came within hours of a diplomatic row breaking out over the inability of three Indian athletes to attend the Games because of visa issues. The three female martial arts athletes are from Arunachal Pradesh which Beijing claims as Zangnan, or South Tibet.

As if taking a cue from the top, a Chinese foreign ministry spokeswoman indulged in diplomatic duplicity and equivocation by asserting that her country welcomed athletes from all countries "with valid legal documents." This means Beijing did not recognise the Indian passports that the three Indian WuShu (a martial art) participants from Arunachal Pradesh possess. The three — Nyeman Wangsu, Onilu Tega and Mepung Lamgu — were given the accreditation needed to travel along with the rest of the Indian team for the Games. But seemingly following a directive issued to the airline by China, the athletes were not allowed to board their flight. China has been continuing with a policy of issuing stapled visas to Indians from Arunachal Pradesh to send the message that it does not recognise the Indian state which it claims to be its own province. Incidentally, only in this July, three WuShu players from Arunachal Pradesh, due to take part in the World University Games in Chengdu, were issued stapled visas. In the present case the decision to debar the three athletes appears even more vindictive since visas are not needed to travel for athletes given digital accreditations

India construed the Chinese decision as a "targeted and pre-meditated" act. This is all the worse since in February last year, Beijing sought to rub India the wrong way by selecting the People's Liberation Army's commander involved in the Galwan Valley clash between Indian and Chinese soldiers, in which 20 Indian soldiers were killed, as one of the torchbearers for the Winter Olympics.

Understandably the organisers of the events - then and now - tried to gloss over China's patently political and uncalled for actions as they appear to be powerless to take on China, given its status as a willing host and strong financial backer of such international sports events.

The acting President of the Olympic Council of Asia, Randhir Singh, who met President Xi in Hangzhou, took a meek stand as he told the media that India's matter was being discussed instead of slamming the denial of entry to the athletes outright. Singh's remark is understandable and he need not be condemned for it. He is not a diplomat and is only the acting or In Charge President of the Olympic Council. Patriotism cannot and must not come into play when the concerned nation is incapable of handling issues through proper official or diplomatic channels. China is constantly in a mood to queer India's pitch at every opportunity in Asia. It has successfully made India look as a helpless nation that can only raise dust internally with the cooperation of the home media but is afraid or incapable to withstand external pressure. A very similar bravado that was sought to be exhibited against Canada now seems to have back fired with the 'Five Eyes' countries coming out and owning up that the Canadian PM's statement was based on intel reports from those allied countries

The Chinese action however is a reflection of the current distrust in bilateral relations as much as the absence of adequate channels of communication to sort out thorny issues, including visas. India's position that restoration of normal relations hinges on completing the disengagement process along the Line of Actual Control may have its justification. But, more than that India needs to show it is serious and resolute while dealing with China.

India's protest in the form of sports minister Anurag Thakur's cancellation of his visit to the Games was too little too late. The decision to send the remaining WuShu squad to take part in the games dilutes the protest and shows India accepts the treatment meted out to the three members of the team caught in the diplomatic cross-fire. Put simply, India could have called off its total participation in the Games and sent a strong message which it did not think fit to do. So the protest will obviously not even be noticed.

India's response appears to be timid in the backdrop of China's continuous attempts for the past few months to disrespect India's territorial integrity. Earlier this year China ratcheted up tension by giving Chinese names to 11 locations in Arunachal Pradesh. Despite India's posturing and denial, China's repeated attempts to nibble into India's territory in Ladakh or Arunachal Pradesh lay bare the nervousness of the current dispensation in Delhi when it comes to take on China head-on. All the brave talk seems to be just internal, nothing external.



The gap between the international community's aspirations for poorer economies and the sad reality of their finances has never been so large, nor so cor-

During the pandemic, many observers foresaw that massive insolvencies loomed on the horizon. While promising proposals were made for wholesale debt relief, world leaders failed to agree on ambitious solutions. Since then, the grinding difficulties of reaching debt deals selectively have demoralised the international community

Much of the opposition to debt relief came from China, the largest bilateral donor. It argues that LMICs' external debts remain relatively low, averaging only 40% of GDP, compared to 100% just before the Highly Indebted Poor Countries (HIPC) Initiative was launched in 1996. China therefore has pushed for debt rescheduling, as happened earlier this year with the long-awaited Zambia deal.

Private lenders have also resisted deep debt relief, even as they remain unwilling to provide liquidity. During the Latin American debt crisis of the 1980s, when liquidity rather than insolvency was seen as the problem, the few banks involved at least could agree on coordinated rescheduling. But now, the wholesale closure of the bond market reflects a collective-action problem that is all too characteristic of fragmented bondholding. While debt reduction is, understandably, a harrowing process, it should be much easier for countries that are only illiquid to build a bridge to a more financially sus tainable future. The good news, here, is that just a handful of countries are currently insolvent. Recent estimates show that 25 LMICs, of which 17 are in Africa, remain below the International Monetary Fund's insolvency threshold, but exceed its liquidity threshold (with debt-servicing costs in the range of 12-15% of revenues).

But the situation will worsen if these countries cannot refinance the principal on their outstanding debt when it reaches maturity. Consider Kenya. It has embarked on an ambitious programme of stabilisation and reforms, backed by a large fiscal stabilisation effort equal to 4% of GDP, and generously supported by the IMF and MDBs. But it has \$2 billion in bonds maturing in 2024. If global capital markets do not allow for refinancing by then, repayment will require an additional fiscal outlay equal to 1.8% of GDP, and that will increase the risk of popular unrest, as happened recently in response to tax hikes and higher costs of living.

The alternative - defaulting is equally unattractive, considering that Kenya's external debt stands at only 38% of gross national income. To overcome this dilemma, the African Union's Nairobi Declaration on Climate Change proposes that countries be allowed to reschedule debts coming due to create fiscal space for new "green growth" policies and reforms, financed by MDBs.

Our own proposal for a "bridging compact" operationalises this idea. Led jointly by the United Nations, the World Bank, and the IMF, it would support not just insolvent countries in need of debt haircuts, but also illiquid countries in need of rescheduling. Countries that have experienced negative net transfers with important creditors could choose to enter an adjustment programme that postpones their debt obligations in exchange for

a commitment to reforms. The goal is to create value through coordination, with the presumption that a country can grow out of debt if it is provided with liquidity, and if it pursues policies to achieve sustainable growth. To be effective, this bridging compact must be anchored in a national renewal program that includes measures to constrain budgets and re forms to move onto a new growth path. That will require more funding from both the IMF and the World Bank, with conditionalities extending beyond the typical three-year IMF programme. Countries that avail themselves of this option should be the first to benefit from a scaling-up of IMF and MDB funding, which in turn would help to prevent a systemic debt crisis that would hurt everyone.

To avoid leakages to other creditors, some debts would have to be rescheduled during the programme period. The interest rate used should be no higher than the growth rate envisioned under the renewal programme so as not to exacerbate the debt situation. The approach should be accepted ex-ante by all creditor groups, but the obligation to reschedule loans that can't be refinanced would have to be enforced by an IMF threat to lend into arrears. Finally, at the end of the programme, if external debt appears unsustainable, a debt reduction programme would need to be devised - as under the HIPC Initiative.

The world desperately needs to make progress toward a more sustainable future. Our proposed approach would help bridge the great divide between our aspirations and our realities, by allowing the world's many illiquid countries to get in shape for the challenges that lie ahead. In the absence of such an initiative, the goal of mobilising trillions of dollars for climatefriendly development will remain a pipe dream.

Remote work is ending for many

EVEN ZOOM, THE COMPANY WHOSE VIDEO COMMUNICATION SOFTWARE MADE IT EASIER FOR PEOPLE TO WORK REMOTELY, **IS ASKING ITS EMPLOYEES TO RETURN TO OFFICE** I knew it wouldn't last."

That's what a lot of office workers around the world are saying, as they say farewell to fulltime remote work, also known as WFH (work from home).

Even Zoom, the company whose video communication software made it easier for people to work remotely, is asking its employees to return to the office a couple of days a week. This is like McDonald's asking its employees to go vegan a couple of days a week.

Here's the message that Zoom employees heard: "Zoom is a great place to work, but if you want to keep working for Zoom. you need to zoom back to the office or your paycheck will zoom to someone else.

Remote work has existed for a long time, but it became prevalent among office workers during the pandemic — a good way to keep COVID from spreading from one worker to another.

T was too good to be true. While some of these workers missed the office environment, the vast majority found remote work to be nothing short of pure heaven. Here, for example, is a diary entry from a remote

> "Dear Diary, I still can't believe it. I am being paid to work from home. I started working this morning without taking a shower, without getting stuck in traffic, and without apologising for being 10 minutes late. I didn't even have to wear a suit. I just changed from my red pajamas to my green pajamas. It is important to maintain certain standards and one of mine is to not wear the same pajamas for sleeping and working. In the afternoon, before the Zoom meeting with my co-workers, I wore a nice shirt over my pajamas and even combed the front portion of my hair. Working remotely saves me more than two hours a day. I don't have to travel to work and I don't have to discuss cricket with my co-work

ers. I am also saving money on petrol, water and deodorant. I am using the extra time to do voga with my wife in the morning and go for walks with her in the afternoon. I have very good work-wife balance."

Remote workers enjoy a number of benefits that allow them to have a good work-life balance. One of the most important benefits is the ability to take care of their children or elderly parents while they work. Another benefit is having a flexible schedule. As long as they remain productive, they can work whenever they want and wherever they want. They may even be able to switch from WFH (work from home) to WFB (work from beach).

But after allowing employees to work remotely since the pandemic, many companies are calling them back to the office, at least for a few days a week. They want workers to interact and collaborate with each other faceto-face. They also want to provide feedback directly to employees and ensure that productivity remains high.

Employers also face pressure from governments and businesses that rely on commuter traffic. It isn't good for them when offices and restaurants are empty, and fewer people are using public transportation.

WFH is good for work-life balance, but it's ending for many workers, much to their chagrin:

"Dear Diary, I still can't believe it. I am being asked to return to the office. My boss says that I will be more productive in my cubicle. He wants to give me feedback directly - without having to call or email me. I asked him if I can be a hybrid worker: four days at the office, the rest of the year at home. He laughed and told me that the pandemic is over. He's right: the pandemic is over. But that doesn't mean we should stop taking precautions. It's much safer to work from home, where there is far less exposure to harmful substances and dreadful bosses.

Chennai, Sept 26: Close on the heels of losing power in Karnataka, the BJP's move to break the jinx and get few seats from Tamil Nadu also seems tapering.

The village was named after the Kiriteshwari temple, one of the 'Shakti peeths'. Legend has it that the upper part of goddess Sati's skull had fallen here.

Several other new temples and ruins of older shrines coexist here. The village, also known as Kiritkona, located around 20 km from district head-quarters Berhampur, is a sleepy hamlet with just a little more than 1,200 voters, whose main oc-

cupation is farming.

The place is a classic example of communal harmony. Here, the temple committee has members from the Muslim community, and they participate actively in various rituals related to the Hindu religion and culture. The Muslims have also given a piece of land to the Hindus since a portion of a temple was there.

"My grandfather wanted to donate a piece of land for the temple and that was given according to his wish. The paperwork was completed around two years ago," said Sirajul Islam, a member of the Kiriteshwari Temple Committee.

A grand feast is organised on the day of Ashtami during the Durga Puja festival every year and 7,000 to 8,000 people including many Muslim families participate in it, said 62-year-old Islam who has been taking part in temple rituals since he was in his early 20s.

According to Dilip Kumar Bhattacharya, a priest of the Kiriteshwari temple, the shrine



was built by Rani Bhavani of Natore, around 300 years ago, and pujas are performed every day. Later, Maharaja of Lalgola, Yogendra Narayan Roy, repaired it around a century back, he said.

"But very little is known about the other temple which is 900-1000 years old. It is now in ruins. We also don't know much about the other ancient temples around the village. Some say those were Shiva temples," Bhattacharya said.

The speciality of the 300-year-

old Kiriteshwari temple lies in its structure as its roof has the influence of Buddhist, Muslim and Hindu architecture, the priest said.

The design of the 'garbha griha' (sanctum sanctorum) where a black stone is worshipped as the goddess, also reflects Hindu, Buddhist and Muslim architecture, he said. After the village got the honour last week, tourists from other areas have started coming.

A tourist from Kolkata, Madan

Mohan Mitra, said, "I have heard about the temple earlier. But the zeal to visit the place increased after it bagged the Centre's award a few days ago. I liked the place."

Villagers Hemanta Mondal, Paban Das and Uttam Das who run small shops selling puja items near the temple feel their lives are about to change in the coming future as the award will bring more tourists.

"We are happy to hear about the award but a lot of infrastructure development is required to boost tourism. We will need lodges, a hospital and a police station," the priest said. The village now has a small lodge that can accommodate only a few pilgrims.

Murshidabad District Magistrate Rajarshi Mitra said that the award has been given considering the immense potential of the place to grow into a tourism hub. "The temple here is very old yet functional. The state government has sanctioned funds for restoration of the ruins," Mitra said.

TN to hold 1,000 medical camps to check dengue

Chennai, Sept 26: The Tamil Nadu health department will hold 1,000 medical camps to screen dengue from October 1, state Health Minister Ma Subramanian announced Tuesday.

In his announcement, the minister said that the camps are being held so that the disease can be diagnosed at the earliest and treated.

He said that a medical team

will visit the fever-affected areas every day and conduct medical camps, adding that a total of 476 mobile medical teams will be pressed into service for creating awareness among the public.

Subramanian said that about 805 Rashtriya Bal Swasthya Karyakram (RBSK) Mobile School Teams will establish fever screening camps in schools to check the students and treat the ones who are unwell.

He said that teachers have also been instructed to provide the details of the students with

fever to medical officers and health personnel.

The minister added that school authorities have been instructed

to spray mosquito repellants to prevent Aedes mosquito breeding in school premises to prevent the spread of dengue fever.

Subramanian appealed to the people to visit fever camps and to consult doctors if they have symptoms of fever and not to treat on their own. Several cities in Tamil Nadu have reported an increase in the number of dengue cases in September as compared to August

50 camera traps installed to monitor poachers in TN

Chennai, Sept 26: In an effort to monitor the movement of poachers, the Tamil Nadu Forest Department has installed 50 camera traps in the Mukurthi, Nilakottai and Thepekkadu forest ranges that come under the Madumalai Tiger Reserve (MTR).

The camera traps are installed to monitor the movement of people within the forest range and to ascertain whether poaching was taking place. The Department has not made public the locations of the camera traps which are camouflaged within the forest ranges.

Sources in the MTR said that the cameras are connected with GPS and the battery life of each camera is only 20 days. After the completion of 20 days, the Department will remove the chips from the traps and hand it over to the Deputy Director's



Office at MTR.

The sources said that the Department has already deputed around 45 anti-poaching wardens and beat forest officers to monitor the areas physically. The development comes following the death of 10 tigers, including cubs, in the Nilgiri forest range in a span of 34 days. Among the dead tigers, a male big cat was poisoned to death by a farmer whose cow was killed by the carnivore.

Kolkata, Sept 26: The West Bengal BJP unit Tuesday staged a protest rally outside the Swasthya Bhawan - the health department office - over the menace of dengue outbreak in the state and alleged that the steps taken by the TMC government are just an "eyewash" to hide its "failures".

The Leader of the Opposition in the West Bengal Assembly, Suvendu Adhikari and 22 BJP MLAs Tuesday afternoon went to Swasthya Bhawan to submit a deputation regarding the dengue outbreak.



But as Adhikari and BJP MLAs were about to enter the state health department office they were stopped by the police, citing security concerns.

A heated argument broke out between the two followed, and BJP MLAs resorted to shouting slogans against the state government over its "failure" to control the dengue outbreak. "We just wanted to submit a deputation. The police are saying they will only allow me into the building. Why are other BJP MLAs not allowed? The state government is busy stopping us but has failed to control the dengue situation," Adhikari said.

Speaking on the steps the state government took to control the

situation, the BJP leader dubbed it "eyewash". "The state government is in denial mode and dubs it an unknown fever. The state government is trying to hide the real situation, and the steps taken are just eyewash," Adhikari said.

Reacting to the allegations, the TMC asked the BJP to refrain from politicising the issue. "The state government is doing everything possible to address the issue. The BJP is just trying to politicise the issue. Public awareness is needed most to combat the situation," TMC leader Kunal Ghosh said.

The West Bengal government Monday directed the districts to immediately clean all dengue hotspots, based on entomological alerts, amid the increase in such cases in the state, officials said.

They said the state also asked the central government offices in West Bengal to ensure cleanliness and adequate preventive measures at under-construction projects, including those of the Kolkata Metro.

TMC to send over 50L letters to PM seeking release of MGNREGA dues

Kolkata, Sept 26: The Trinamool Congress will send more than 50 lakh letters from people denied MGNREGA benefits in West Bengal to Prime Minister Narendra Modi ahead of the party's much-touted protests in New Delhi next month against the alleged withholding of funds by the Centre.

The party has accused the BJP-led NDA government of withholding Rs 15,000 crore of dues to Bengal under the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA) and Gramin Awas Yojana.

The party will also send letters

to Union Panchayati Raj Minister Giriraj Singh."West Bengal stands united against the central government's injustice, determined to claim what's rightfully ours. People's power reigns supreme in democracy," TMC's national general secretary Abhishek Banerjee said on X, formerly Twitter.

"People of Bengal are raising their voice against "injustice", and those adversely impacted have written letters to the PM, seeking their rightful dues", the party said on the microblogging site.

"We have people, who are yet to get their dues even after working under the MGNREGA, to write these letters. Till now, we have collected more than 50 lakh letters. They have all sought the release of dues to Bengal under the rural jobs scheme. We are sending these letters to the offices of Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Union Minister Giriraj Singh," a senior TMC leader said.

Abhishek Banerjee, the party's national general secretary, and TMC MPs, MLAs and leaders from the districts will pay their respects to Mahatma Gandhi at Rajghat in the national capital on October 2 on his birth anniversary

Chief Minister and TMC supremo Mamata Banerjee, who was supposed to attend the programme in New Delhi, might



not go there as she was advised ten days of rest by doctors after she suffered an injury on her left knee during a recent trip to Spain and Dubai. A TMC delegation will meet Singh October 3 and place before him the issue of "non-release of dues" under the MGN-REGA, Bengal minister Chandrima Bhattacharya had said on September 23. The TMC had planned to stage protests in New Delhi for dues under the rural jobs scheme to Bengal.

The ruling party in the state had claimed that despite several requests to the Delhi Police, it was denied permission to hold demonstrations in the national capital. The TMC had, on August 30, said that it was denied permission to hold demonstrations in New Delhi as the BJP-led Union government wanted to "scuttle the voice of Bengal", a charge dubbed as "baseless" by

the saffron camp.
During the TMC's Martyrs'
Day rally on July 21, Abhishek
Banerjee had announced that



New Delhi, Sept 26: India Tuesday called for concerted efforts by like-minded nations to realise the shared vision for a free, open and rules-based Indo-Pacific with Defence Minister Rajnath Singh flagging concerns over the region facing a "complex web" of security challenges, including boundary disputes.

His comments at the opening session of the Indiahosted 13th Indo-Pacific Armies Chiefs' Conference (IPAC) came against the backdrop China's growing military assertiveness in the Indo-Pacific as well as the border row in eastern

In his remarks, Army Chief Gen Manoj Pande said the Indo-Pacific emerged as "pivotal theatre" in contemporary "geostrategic" canvas and that India's outlook for the region emphasises respect for sovereignty and territorial integrity of all states as well as peaceful resolution of disputes

'While efforts by countries are converging towards effecting a free and stable Indo-Pacific, yet we are witnessing manifestations of interstate contestations and competitions," Gen Pande said.

Chief of Staff of the US Army Gen Randy George said the partnership between the US and Indian Army is crucial for stability in the Indo-Pacific, noting the region is facing a challenging strategic environment.

The two-day conference, being attended by delegates from over 30 countries which included chiefs of around 15 armies. The US Army is the co-host of the event.

After Moon mission, ISRO eyes Venus, exo-planets: Somanath

New Delhi, Sept 26: After the success of the Moon mission, ISRO has set sights on unlocking the mysteries of dving stars and exo-planets some of which are known to have atmosphere and are considered habitable, Indian Space Research Organisation Chairman S Somanath said Tuesday.

Delivering a lecture organised by the Indian National Science Academy (INSA), Somanath said the space agency was also planning a mission to study the planet Venus, two satellites to study space climate and its impact on the earth, and conceptualising a project to land a spacecraft on Mars.

He said the XPoSat or the X-Ray Polarimeter Satellite, meant to study bright X-ray pulsars or stars that are in the process of death, was ready for launch in December this year.

"We are also conceiving a satellite called ExoWorlds, a mission for looking at exo-solar planets or planets that are outside our solar system and orbiting other stars," Somanath

said in a statement. He said there were more than 5,000 known exo-planets of which at least 100 were considered to have atmospheres.

The ExoWorlds mission will study the atmosphere of exoplanets and whether they are

Five Bulgarians appear in UK court

London: Five Bulgarians living in the UK who were charged with spying for Russia appeared Tuesday in court for an initial hearing. The three men and two women were accused of "conspiring to collect information intended to be directly or indirectly useful to an enemy," namely Russia, between August 2020 and February this year. The five are alleged to be part of a network conducting surveillance on behalf of Russia. Much of the activity took place abroad, but coordination took place in the UK, prosecutors said.

Islamabad, Sept 26: China has refused to further expand cooperation in the areas of energy, water management, and climate change under the multi-billion dollar China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC), it emerged on Tuesday, signalling a strain in the 'ironclad' friendship between the two all-weather allies.

Cash-strapped Pakistan also gave up its opposition to setting up a new imported coal-fired power plant in Gwadar in Balochistan province and agreed to a number of Chinese demands to address Beijing's concerns, The Express Tribune newspaper reported, citing the signed minutes of the 11th Joint Cooperation Committee (JCC) of the CPEC

The JCC is a strategic decision-making body of the CPEC and its 11th meeting was held virtually on October 27 last year on the insistence of the Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N)-led government that wanted to showcase some progress.

However, the minutes of the meeting were signed almost a year later on July 31 during the visit of Chinese vice premier He Lifeng, highlighting the difference of opinions on both sides that led to such a huge delay in reaching a consensus, the report said. When contacted, the Ministry of Planning stated that it was a global practice for the minutes of meetings between two countries to be signed by both sides only after

Yerevan (Armenia), Sept 26: At least 20 people were killed and nearly 300 others injured by an explosion at a crowded gas station in Nagorno-Karabakh as thousands of people rushed to flee into Armenia, separatist authorities in the region said Tuesday.

More than 13,500 people about 12% of the region's population — have fled across the border since Azerbaijan's swift military operation to fully reclaim the breakaway region after three decades of separatist rule, Armenia's government said Tuesday morning.

The explosion took place as people lined up to fill their cars at a gas station outside the regional capital of Stepanakert late Monday.

The separatist government's health department said that 13 bodies have been found and seven people have died of iniuries from the blast, the cause of which remains unclear.

It added that 290 people have been hospitalised and scores of them remain in grave condition. Armenia's health ministry said a helicopter brought some blast victims to Armenia on Tuesday morning, and more flights were expected. Azerbaijani presidential aide

Hikmet Hajiyev said on X, formerly Twitter, that hospitals in Azerbaijan were ready to treat victims, but not if any had been taken to them. Azerbaijan has sent in burn-

treatment medicine and other humanitarian aid, he said. Gasoline has been in short

supply in Nagorno-Karabakh for months, and the explosion further adds to local residents' anxiety about whether they will be able to drive out. The Armenian border is about 35 km (22 miles) from Stepanakert.

Cars bearing large loads on their roofs crowded the streets of Stepanakert, and residents stood or lay along sidewalks next to heaps of luggage.

The Azerbaijani military routed Armenian forces in a 24-hour blitz last week, forcing the separatist authorities to agree to lay down weapons and start talks on Nagorno-Karabakh's "reintegration" into Azerbaijan.

While Azerbaijan has pledged to respect the rights of ethnic Armenians in the region and restore supplies after a 10-month blockade, many local residents feared reprisals and decided to leave. Azerbaijan's blockade of the only road connecting Nagorno-Karabakh to Armenia caused severe shortages of food,

medicine and fuel in the region. Moscow said that Russian peacekeepers in Nagorno-Karabakh were assisting the

Some 700 people remained in the peacekeepers' camp there by Monday night. Nagorno-Karabakh was an autonomous region within Azerbaijan under the Soviet Union, but separatist sentiment grew in the USSR's dying years and then flared into

Nagorno-Karabakh came under the control of ethnic Armenian forces, backed by the Armenian military, in separatist fighting that ended in 1994. During the war in 2020, Azerbaijan took back parts of Nagorno-Karabakh along with surrounding territory that Armenian forces had claimed

Russian video shows fleet commander alive

Moscow, Sept 26: Admiral Viktor Sokolov, the commander of Russia's Black Sea Fleet, was shown on Russian state television Tuesday attending a defence leaders' meeting remotely, a day after Ukrainian special forces said they had killed him. In video and photographs re-

leased by the defence ministry, Sokolov was shown as one of several fleet commanders on video apparently joining an inperson meeting of Defence Minister Sergei Shoigu and other army chiefs, although not speaking. It was not clear when the video was filmed. Ukraine's special forces said

Monday that Sokolov had been killed along with 33 other officers in a missile attack last week on the headquarters of Russia's Black Sea Fleet in the port of Sevastopol in Crimea, seized from Ukraine in 2014.

In response to the Russian video, the Ukraine special forces said on Telegram: "Since the Russians were urgently forced to publish a response with Sokolov allegedly alive, our units are clarifying the information."

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov had declined to comment on the Ukrainian claim referring reporters to the min-

In the video, Shoigu said more than 17,000 Ukrainian soldiers had been killed in September and that more than 2,700 weapons, including seven American Bradley fighting vehicles, had been destroyed. Reuters could not independently verify battlefield claims.

United Nations, Sept 26: India Tuesday asked the UN member states not to allow "political convenience" to determine responses to terrorism, extremism and violence, in a veiled attack on Canada amidst the diplomatic standoff over the killing of a Khalistani separatist.

SOUTH KOREA HOLDS LARGEST ARMED FORCES DAY

Seoul, Sept 26: South Korea paraded thousands of troops and an array of weapons capable of striking North Korea through its capital as part of its biggest Armed Forces Day ceremony in 10 years Tuesday, as its President vowed to build a stronger military to thwart any provocation by the North.

Concerns are growing that North Korea is seeking Russian help in expanding its nuclear arsenal in return for supplying Moscow with conventional arms exhausted by its war with Ukraine. "After looking at your

imposing march today, I believe our people would trust you and have faith in our national security," President Yoon Suk Yeol told cheering soldiers at the end of the ceremony in a central Seoul plaza. "I'll always support you together with our

Earlier, South Korea rolled tanks, artillery systems, drones and powerful ballistic missiles capable of hitting all of North Korea through the streets of Seoul, amid steady autumn rains. About 4,000 South Korean troops carrying rifles or flags followed them, accompanied by about 300 US soldiers, in



the first such military parade since 2013.

As the soldiers and their

weapons went past, Yoon waved, clapped and flashed a thumbs-up. Since taking office last year, he has been pushing hard to beef up South Korea's defense capability while expanding military drills with the United States in response to North Korea's ad-

vancing nuclear arsenal. But a complication in Seoul and Washington's efforts to curb the North's nuclear ambitions is the latest North Korean push to deepen military cooperation with Russia. Earlier this month, North Korean leader Kim Jong Un travelled to Russia's far eastern region to meet with President Vladimir Putin and visit kev military sites.

North Korea reportedly

wants to receive Russian technologies to help its development of spy satellites, nuclearpropelled submarines and powerful long-range missiles. Such weapons would pose a major security threat to South Korea and the US.

In a formal Armed Forces Day ceremony at a military airport near Seoul earlier Tuesday, Yoon said he'll strive to build "a strong military that instills fear in the enemy". "Based on battleready combat capabilities and a solid readiness posture, our military will immediately retaliate against any North Korean provocation," he said.

India to start carbon trading from 2025 I-T depart notifies

Carbon emission reduction targets will be set for four fossil fuel dependent sectors

New Delhi, Sept 26: India will set carbon emission reduction targets for four fossil fuel dependent sectors, as the country looks to align its industry with the country's greenhouse emissions reduction target, two government officials said.

The country will fix carbon emission intensity benchmarks and reduction targets for three years for companies in petrochemicals, iron and steel, cement and pulp and paper, two government officials, who did not want to be named, told Reuters. The market trading cycle will be annual, they said. The companies in the four

sectors are also likely to be the first ones to trade on the country's carbon trading market from April 2025, the officials added, which will enable them buy and sell carbon credits to met their

Companies which exceed their targets earn carbon credits that can be sold to firms which fall short of their goals.

The mandates will be applicable from 2024-25 and the (carbon) trade will start in 2025-26,'

one top government official said. The targets will be aligned with the country's emission intensity - the total amount of greenhouse gas emissions emit-

ted for every unit increase of gross domestic product (GDP) reduction goals submitted to the United Nations, the officials said.

India has committed to cutting its ratio of greenhouse emissions to gross domestic product by 2030 to 45% of its 2005 level and to net zero by 2070.

The carbon credits will be traded on the proposed carbon market provided under a legislation cleared by the Indian Parliament in December last year. India's ministries of envi-

ronment and power did not respond to a query from Reuters. The proposed Indian carbon market is different from those cre-

ated in developed countries as they set a limit on emissions and then allocate tradable permits, or credits, to emitter industries.

The targets for reducing each sector's emissions are being set by a committee comprising of key ministries such as environment, power and renewable

The rules and targets for the industries are likely to be announced before December, the two officials said.

India already has a market for trading certificates in abovetarget energy savings for entities

Green energy companies formed a group in October to mediate between the government and industry. They included Adani Green, owned by billionaire Gautam Adani, Hero Future Energies, Ayana Renewable Power and global private equity major KKR's Virescent Infra.

New Delhi, Sept 26: The Income Tax Department has notified new angel tax rules that comprise a mechanism to evaluate the shares issued by unlisted startups to investors.

'Angel Tax' rules

While previously the angel tax - a tax levied on capital received on the sale of shares of a startup above the fair market value - applied only to local investors, the Budget for 2023-24 fiscal (April 2023 to March 2024) widened its ambit to include foreign investments. As per the Budget, the excess

premium will be considered as 'income from sources' and taxed at the rate of up to over 30 per cent. However, startups registered by the DPIIT are exempt from the new norms. The Central Board of Direct Taxes (CBDT) in a September 25 notification spelled out the valuation methodology.

As per the changes in Rule 11UA of I-T rules, the Central Board of Direct Taxes (CBDT) provides that the valuation of compulsorily convertible preference shares (CCPS) and equity shares issued by unlisted



startups can be based on the fair market value.

The amended rules also retain the five new valuation methods proposed in the draft rules for consideration received from the non-residents -- (i) Comparable Company Multiple Method, (ii) Probability Weighted Expected Return Method, (iii) Option Pricing Method, (iv) Milestone Analysis Method, and

(v) Replacement Cost Method. Deloitte India Partner Sumit Singhania said from an investors' standpoint, revised rules offer a wider range of valuation methodologies to work with, and that ought to make compliance less onerous henceforth.

"Also, safe harbour permitting 10 per cent deviation from fair value makes room for valuation adjustments when needed. Overall, the trajectory is to align tax valuation methodologies with permissible exchange control norms," Singhania said.

Sluggish demand to hit diamond exports: Icra

New Delhi, Sept 26: India's export of cut and polished diamonds is projected to decline by 22 per cent to USD 17.2 billion in the current fiscal due to weakened demand from the key consuming nations, according to rating agency Icra.

In the first five months of the current fiscal, cut and polished diamond exports witnessed a sharp year-on-year decline of 31 per cent following lower export volumes and higher polished diamond prices, it said. Export of cut and polished diamonds has been on a declining trend since the first half of 2022-23, it added.

The export contraction is primarily being driven by weak underlying demand conditions in key consuming nations like the US and Europe due to the inflationary pressures, leading to a shift in spending away from di-

amonds," Icra Vice President and Sector Head Sakshi Suneja said in a statement. The demand from China, which accounts for 10-15 per cent of the global demand, has also not picked up meaningfully so far, she said.

In addition, competition from lab-grown diamonds, which are priced at a significant discount to natural diamonds, also accentuated the dip in volumes, particularly for the large-sized diamonds in the range of one to three carats. The share of labgrown diamonds within India's total cut and polished diamonds exports continues to rise, she added. Icra said prices of rough diamonds remain elevated in FY2024, with current prices hovering around the 15-year median level, despite some softening seen in recent months. These prices had soared in the last two years, following limited supply from mining companies.

working with Loughborough University in the UK and the German Aerospace Centre Deutsches Zentrum für Luft-und Raumfahrt (DLR), Rolls-Royce has proven a critical engine technology that marks another significant step in the journey to enabling hydrogen as an aviation fuel.

Tests on a full annular combustor of a Pearl 700 engine at DLR in Cologne running on 100 per cent hydrogen have proven

the fuel can be combusted at conditions that represent maximum take-off thrust. Key to that achievement has

been the successful design of advanced fuel spray nozzles to control the combustion process. This involved overcoming significant engineering challenges as hydrogen burns far hotter and more rapidly than kerosene. The new nozzles were able to control the flame position using a new system that progressively mixes air with the hydrogen to manage the fuel's reactivity. Rolls-Royce is pleased to confirm that combustor operability and emissions were both in line with expectations.

The individual nozzles were initially tested at intermediate pressure at Loughborough's recently upgraded test facilities and at DLR Cologne before the final full-pressure combustor tests took place at DLR Cologne.

Last year, easyJet and Rolls-

Royce also set a world first by suc-

cessfully running a modern aero

engine, an AE2100, on green hydrogen at Boscombe Down, UK.

These recent tests mean the combustion element of the hydrogen programme is now well understood, while work continues on systems to deliver the fuel to the engine and integrate those systems with an engine.

Grazia Vittadini, Chief Technology Rolls-Royce, said: "This is an incredible achievement in a short space of time. Controlling the combustion process is one of the key technology challenges the industry faces in making hydrogen a real aviation fuel of the future. We have achieved that, and it makes us eager to keep moving forward. I want to thank easyJet, Loughborough University and DLR for their dedication and support to reach this milestone.'

Johan Lundgren, CEO of easyJet, said: "We believe hydrogen is the future of shorthaul aviation and the success of this test and progress being

made demonstrates that this is becoming ever closer. We remain optimistic that it will play a critical role in helping us achieve the ambitious goals we set out in our net zero roadmap.'



This underlines again DLR's capabilities in complex applied research and the achievement, at such a high pace, was supported by our experience in real-scale testing of ground-based gas turbines.

The technologies tested at Loughborough and DLR will now be incorporated into the learning from the Boscombe Down tests as Rolls-Royce and easyJet prepare for the next stage of testing -- a full gas hydrogen ground test on a Pearl en-

That will in turn lead to a full ground test on a Pearl engine using liquid hydrogen -- both easyJet and Rolls-Royce have ashared ambition to then take the technology to flight.





INDIAN DRESSAGE TEAM CLAIM FIRST ASIAN GAMES YELLOW MET

Horse riders' golden ride

Hangzhou, Sept 26: India's dressage team cantered to their first ever Asian Games gold and only second medal in this discipline in the history of the sport with the quartet of Sudipti Hajela, Divyakriti Singh, Vipul Hriday Chheda and Anush Agarwalla living up to expectations, here Tuesday.

The Indian quartet was performing well in the selection trials as their scores either matched or were better than the Asian Games medal winners from the previous editions.

It was more about the colour of medal they would win and they grabbed the top place on the podium by aggregating 209.205 percentage points, leaving behind China (204.882 %) and Hong Kong (204.852%).

In dressage, the horse and rider are judged on how they perform a series of movements. Each movement is marked out of 10 (from 0 to 10). Each rider gets an overall score and from there, a percentage is worked out. The rider with the highest percentage is the winner of his class. Top three scorers in a team are counted to determine the winner.

It was a long and difficult journey for the Indian team which has an interesting mixture of riders. All of them left home at a voung age and have been training in Europe separately for the last few years away from their family.

They took part in the Asian Games selection trials organised in Europe by the Equestrian Federation of India. Their horses were quarantined in Aachen in Germany for seven days under strict rules before they were brought to China September 21.

The 21-year-old Sudipti, who hails from Indore, is the youngest of the quartet. She currently trains at Pamfou in France. She began horse riding at the age of six as a hobby but later took it seriously as a sport on the insistence of her father. The name of her horse is Chinski.

SWIMMERS SET NEW NR

The Indian men's 4x100m medley relay team obliterated the national record (NR) for the second time in the day but it was not enough to grab a medal as they finished fifth.

The quartet of Srihari Nataraj Likhith Selvaraj, Sajan Prakash and Tanish George Mathew bettered the 3:40.84 timing set earlier in heat 1 in the day, clocking 3:40.20 in the final. China won the gold with an Asian record timing of 3:27.01, while the silver and bronze went to Korea (3:32.05) and Japan (3:32.52) respectively.

In the morning session, the Indians had bettered the national record of 3:44.94 set by Nataraj, Sandeep Sejwal, Prakash, Aaron D'Souza in the last edition of the Games in Jakarta.
