uttack's Baliyatra, the largest fair in Asia held along the banks of Mahanadi, gets bigger and better every year. The oldest cultural and business trade fair in Odisha, which celebrates the state's rich maritime legacy, commemorates the trade ties of the Kalingan Empire (now Odisha) with Bali and other South Asian countries. It attracts a huge footfall not only from the different parts of the state but also from across the world.

Speaking about its significance, the Baliyatra, or voyage to Bali, marked the start of the journey of hundreds of traders or Sadhabas from Odisha to destinations like Bali, Sumatra, Java, and Borneo. It resulted in a cultural connection, too. To commemorate those journeys, a festival is observed each year on the day of Kartika Purnima, the full moon day of the Kartik month in the Hindu calendar.

This year, the festival is scheduled to last for eight days, starting November 27.

With just a day to go before the extravaganza, **Sunday POST** delves into the spectacle and highlights some of the newly incorporated features of the festival.



Cuttack in Cuttack

Like last year, this year also presents the 'Cuttack-in-Cuttack' arrangement at the Baliyatra ground in Cuttack. This setup mirrors various prominent landmarks in Cuttack, featuring miniature replicas of structures such as the Odisha High Court, Dhabaleswar Temple, Qadam-e-Rasool,

Barabati Fort Gate, and others. The display encompasses 70 makeshift stalls, including an ORMAS stall and a tunnel aquarium. The Katak Artist Organisation (KAO) has curated an art exhibition in the pavilion for the amusement of the attendees.

In the current edition, 'Cuttack in Cuttack' will depict life in an Indian village. Spanning a six-acre area on the lower Baliyatra ground, the pavilion will showcase thatched houses, farms, shops, and various elements of a village. Approximately 50 thatched houses with cowsheds have been erected, and the landscape features hills and fountains. A pond has been built for fish farming in collaboration with the Fisheries Department, and a farm for livestock such as cows, goats, pigs, and poultry is in progress in association with the Directorate of Animal Husbandry and Veterinary Services.

Additionally, the pavilion has included a temple, 'Bhagabat Tungi', a school, an Anganwadi centre, and a rural market place. Attendees can explore various vintage household items like 'Palanquin,' 'Dhinki' (a wooden tool for manually husking rice), 'Doli' (a large bamboo container for storing rice), and 'Ghuma' (a clay container for storing rice).

Tunnel Aquarium

This year, a novel addition to the Baliyatra

grounds is the installation of the Underwater Fish Tunnel, offering a distinctive experience alongside the annual trade fair. The tunnel features a



spacious 2000-foot-long and 60-foot-wide aquarium adorned with vibrant and alluring fish species. Approximately Rs 12 lakh worth of exotic, colourful fish will inhabit the aquarium, which is constructed with 16-mm glass. Holding an impressive 50,000 liters of water, the aquarium aims to immerse visitors in the sensation of strolling through the sea surrounded by fish. Admission to the Underwater Fish Tunnel Aquarium is priced at Rs 100 to Rs 150 per ticket.



'Voice artists should undergo theatre training'

For an extended period, voice artists operated in the shadows of recording studios. Only recently, thanks to the rise of social media, have they hogged

the spotlight, says popular voice actor Sanket Mhatre

anket Mhatre stands out in the world of Hindi voiceover. He has breathed life into some of the most popular characters in movies and drama shows.

His body of works includes giving voice to Ben Tennyson in *Ben 10: Alien Force* and Ryan Reynolds in *Deadpool*, playing Sasuke Uchiha in the Hindi-dubbed version of *Naruto*, and dubbing in Hindi for many prominent South Indian actors, including Allu Arjun. He recently made his mark in the Netflix live-action adaptation of *One Piece*, where he skillfully voiced Roronoa Zoro.

Mhatre was in Bhubaneswar to attend an event. On its sidelines, **Sunday POST** caught up with him for a breezy chat.

Here are the excerpts:

How do you prepare to act for multiple characters?

Each character presents a unique challenge. Take *Ben 10*, for instance; it required me to elevate my voice beyond my usual range. Transforming into the aliens forced me to experiment with diverse vocal textures I hadn't explored before. *Deadpool* pushed me out of my comfort zone, compelling me to engage in acting and improvisation in novel ways. When approaching a new character, I maintain an open mindset, often allowing the character to guide me and reveal how its voice should

What motivated you to pursue a career in voice acting?

For the past 18 years, I've immersed myself in the world of Voice Artistry, a journey I stumbled upon by chance, finding myself in the right place at the right time. Despite the accidental entry, this path has proven immensely satisfying, shaping me into a better version of myself each day. Voice

acting, discovered unexpectedly, has become a passion, akin to the thrill of performing on stage. It allows me to inhabit a myriad of characters, offering a unique opportunity to delve into diverse worlds and cultures. What drives me is the daily chance to embody someone new, transcending physical appearances and backgrounds—where the voice becomes the sole instrument of expression and storytelling.

What were the challenges you faced as a voice actor in India?

 For an extended period, voice artists operated in obscurity, hidden in the shadows of recording studios. Only recently, thanks

to the rise of social media, have they stepped into the spotlight. Freelance voice artists in India find themselves multitasking as managers, accountants, and social media handlers. Navigating challenges like negotiating rates and ensuring timely payments is part of the journey. Yet, overcoming these obstacles opens the door to a profoundly fulfilling career. And at AniMetro, an event featuring voice artists as guests, experiencing love and appreciation from fans proves to be an unparalleled reward.

How do you see anime influencing and impacting global pop culture, and what makes it so appealing to a diverse audience?

Anime's profound influence on global pop culture is undeniable. Its universal appeal lies in catering to diverse tastes, offering intricate plots for enthusiasts and lighthearted moments for casual viewers. The lasting impact stems from the ability to create deep connections, as fans follow anime for years, forming an enduring bond. As this art form evolves, consistently aligning with changing preferences, it becomes ingrained in one's identity. Anime isn't just entertainment; it becomes a timeless companion, adapting to individuals as they grow.



How was your experience at the anime event in Bhubaneswar?

I was pleasantly surprised by the warm reception in Bhubaneswar. Having participated in two events prior to the Anime-Fest in Odisha, both in metropolitan cities, I approached with modest expectations, eager to connect with passionate Anime fans. To my delight, there was a substantial crowd of almost 350-400 people! Fans had journeyed from locations 60-70 kilometres away to join the festival. It turned out to be a fantastic event where we interacted with numerous fans, took countless selfies, and thoroughly enjoyed ourselves.

Receiving such love and appreciation for my craft is something every artist cherishes. Additionally, the event was exceptionally well organised, and I am confident that there will be many more such events in Odisha, likely on a much grander scale.

Do you have a favourite anime character that you've voiced? If so, why?

Lately, one of my most fulfilling accomplishments has been providing the voice for 'Roronoa Zoro' in the Netflix adaptation of *One Piece*. Having been a fan of the manga and admiring the character of Zoro for some time, I had envisioned a particular voice quality for him even before delving into the Anime. When auditions for the role came around, I seized the opportunity and was thrilled to discover that my voice had been accepted. Voicing Zoro was a truly enjoyable experience, and I took great pleasure

in bringing the live-action version of this beloved character to Hindi-speaking audiences.

Are there any anime characters you would love to voice in the future?

I aspire to lend my voice to a plethora of Anime characters. Whether it's embodying the intensity of Eren Yeager and Levi Ackerman from *Attack On Titan*, capturing the enigmatic essence of L or Yagami Light in *Death Note*, or delving into characters like Roy Mustang in *FMA: Brotherhood* and Guts from *Berserk*, the list is extensive. The array of Anime roles I aspire to explore is vast and diverse, presenting an exciting

challenge that I eagerly look forward to undertaking.

Did you get a chance to explore Bhubaneswar and experience the local culture?

I extend my gratitude to my gracious hosts, Priyadarshan from DBS Chronicles, Funhub Odisha, and the Odisha Anime Club. Thanks to them, I had the opportunity to explore local attractions and savour the delightful cuisine during my brief visit. I plan on returning with more leisure time to fully immerse myself in the experience. While navigating the city, I was struck by numerous locations adorned with captivating graffiti, leaving a lasting impression. Additionally, the enthusiastic reception and boundless affection from fans were the perfect culmination of this visit, truly adding the finishing touch to the entire experience.

What advice do you have for aspiring voice actors, especially in the anime industry?

I think this is the best time for Anime in India, to enter this field or any field related to Anime would be an excellent choice. I always recommend aspiring voice actors take theatre training to help with character development and emotion building. Theatre also teaches the importance of language and guides you on using your voice with skill. Observing people around you and studying their voice and speaking pattern is also something you can do as an exercise.

Top literary honour for Odisha author in Kolkata

Odia filmmaker Sanjoy Patnaik becomes the first Odia to receive the Chidananda Dasgupta and Supriva Dasgupta Award for Best Writing on Cinema for his book 'Of Reels, Romance, and Retakes'

Bhubaneswar: It's not every day that an Odisha author working in English is awarded with one of West Bengal's highest literary honours in Kolkata. So, when Odia filmmaker Sanjoy Patnaik was presented with the Chidananda Dasgupta and Supriya Dasgupta award-2023 for Best Writing on Cinema last week at GD Birla Sabhaghar in Kolkata, it was a matter of

Instituted by the Chidananda Dasgupta Memorial Trust, the honour is granted to authors every year for their writings that receive global acclaim. Sanjoy is the first Odia to receive the honour for his book Of Reels Romance, and Retakes: Social Narratives of Cinema in Odisha.

great pride for every Odia.

The 200-page book attempts to acquaint the reader, particularly the non-Odia audience to the progressive and original quality of Odia literature and cinema, which has mostly gone unnoticed. It is also a sociological expedition that gives a comparative analysis of Odisha's society, literature, and cinema after independence.

Expressing his gratitude after accepting the award from known writer and former diplomat Shashi Tharoor in the presence of eminent director and actress Aparna Sen, Sanjoy said, "I'm elated to get this honour, and I dedicate it to the people of Odisha and Odia cinema enthusiasts."

Continuing in the same breath, he added: "We need to recognise the films, especially those adapted from Odia classics, made in the first four decades of Indian independence to create a sense of nationalism."

This apart, the book, published by Routledge, an international publishing house, also highlights the works of

the artistes who came from remote areas, belonged to lower middle-class families, and strived hard to put Odia cinema at the top. The notable inclusions are Prashanta Nanda, Uttam Mohanty,

Ajit Das, Mahashweta Roy, Aparajita Mohanty, Jharana Das, Dukhiram Swain, and Hemanta Das, to name a few,

There is also a need to revive the glorious days of Odia cinema, felt the author-filmmaker. Recalling a discussion he had with Sen over the past of Odia cinema, Sanjoy shared, "Aparna Sen told me that Baba (Chidanand Dasgupta) would have been very happy to see your book as he always wanted to write on Odia cinemas of the 60s.

For the uninitiated, Sanjoy Patnaik, a social development professional, worked extensively on forests and environmental issues in India. He studied International Politics at Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi, and also took a course on Film Appreciation in the Film and Television Institute of India, Pune. He scripted and directed the award-winning Odia film Shuka Asuchi (2014), depicting the pangs of displacement and the predicament of the rural youth in rich mining belts of Odisha.
