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

The card has "September 2024. Deepika and Ranveer" written on it. For the caption they chose, two folded hands and evil eye emblems.


Congratulatory messages poured in from celebrities

Srimandir treasury audit panel formed

Bhubaneswar, Feb 29: Stage is set for the reopening of Srimandir Ratna Bhandar (treasury) and inventory of valuables stored in it after a gap of more than 45 years, with Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik Thursday announcing constitution of a 12-member high-level committee, led by former Supreme Court Judge Arijit Pasayat, to supervise the much-awaited procedure at the 12th century shrine in Puri.

Patnaik's announcement came in response to a directive issued by the Orissa High Court to the state government in this regard, September 29, 2023. With noted cardiologist Ramakanta Panda as vice-chairman, the panel also has former Allahabad Bank CMD Bidhubhushan Samal, Chartered Accountant AK Sabat, a representative of Puri's titular king Gajapati Dibyasingha Deb, a representative of Archaeological Survey of India (ASI), servitors Durga Prasad Dasmohapatra, Madhav Chandra Mohapatra, Jagannath Kar and Ganesh Mekap, Puri Collector and Shree Jagannath Temple Administration (SJTA) Chief Administrator as its members.

While disposing of a PIL filed by BJP leader Samir Mohanty, the HC had in September 2023 directed the state government to constitute a high-level panel, if approached by the Shree Jagannath Temple Managing Committee (SJTMC), for supervising the inventory of valuables in the temple treasury. The HC, however, said that it would not interfere with the plan of work regarding inventory and repair works of the interior walls of the Ratna Bhandar as prepared in the SJTMC meeting held August 4, 2023 on advice of the ASI (Puri Circle) superintending archaeologist.

Earlier, SJTMC had submitted the copy of the resolution passed by it August 4, 2023. As per the resolution, repair of the Ratna Bhandar should be taken up at such time so that both the rituals of the deities and darshan by devotees are not obstructed.

As per the Jagannath Temple Act, 1955, Ratna Bhandar should be opened for inventory every three years. However, it was last opened and audited from May 13 to July 23, 1978. The state government had April 4, 2018 made an unsuccessful attempt to re-open the inner chamber of the temple treasury for a physical examination of the structure. The inspection could not be completed as the officials failed to open it after the keys were not found.

Following public outcry, a judicial commission, led by retired Justice Raghuraj Das, was constituted June 6, 2018 to probe the missing keys. Meanwhile, the then Puri Collector June 13, 2018 claimed that an envelope with 'duplicate keys of inner Ratna Bhandar' written on it was found in the record room of his office.

According to an affidavit filed by SJTA in HC last year, the temple treasury has approximately 149.47 kg gold jewellery and 198.79 kg silver jewellery apart from utensils. The Ratna Bhandar, situated near sanctum sanctorum of the temple, has been divided into two parts. While the outer chamber stores ornaments used by the deities on a daily basis, many precious jewellery are kept in the inner chamber.

Pay hike for Anganwadi workers

Bhubaneswar, Feb 29: Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik Thursday announced a hike in remuneration of Anganwadi workers, mini-Anganwadi workers and their assistants.

The monthly remuneration of Anganwadi workers has been increased from ₹7,500 to ₹10,000. While mini-Anganwadi workers will now get ₹7,250 instead of ₹5,375 per month, Anganwadi assistants will receive ₹5,000 as remuneration instead of ₹3,750 monthly. The pay hike will be effective from October 2023 and the arrear amount will be credited in their bank accounts between March 5 and 10.

The state government will spend an additional ₹350 crore annually for it. The decision will benefit 1.48 lakh Anganwadi workers, mini-Anganwadi workers and Anganwadi assistants.

The government also announced that ₹2 lakh will be paid in case of death or complete physical disability and ₹1 lakh for partial disability of Anganwadi workers, mini-Anganwadi workers and Anganwadi assistants. Anganwadi workers exiting jobs will now get ₹1 lakh instead of ₹40,000, mini-Anganwadi workers ₹75,000 instead of ₹30,000 and Anganwadi assistants will get ₹50,000 instead of ₹20,000.

IV insertion hiccups stall serial killer's execution

Kuna (Idaho), Feb 29: Idaho halted the execution of serial killer Thomas Eugene Creech, one of the longest-serving death row inmates in the US, after medical team members failed at least eight times to find a vein where they could establish an intravenous (IV) line to carry out the lethal injection.

Creech, 73, has been in prison half a century, convicted of five murders in three states and suspected of several more. He was already serving a life term when he beat a fellow inmate, 22-year-old David Dale Jensen, to death in 1981 — the crime for which he was to be executed.

Creech was wheeled into the execution chamber at the Idaho Maximum Security Institution on a gurney at 10am Wednesday.

"Three medical team members tried eight times to establish an IV," Department of Correction Director Josh Tewalt said. In some cases, they couldn't access the vein, and in others, they could but had concerns about vein quality. They attempted sites in his arms, legs,

hands and feet. At one point, a medical team member left to gather more supplies. The warden announced he was halting the execution at 10:58am.

The department said death warrant for Creech would expire, and that it was considering next steps. While other medical procedures might allow for the execution, the state is mindful of the 8th Amendment's ban on cruel and unusual punishment, Tewalt said.

Six Idaho officials, including Attorney General Raul Labrador,

and four news media representatives, including an Associated Press reporter, were on hand to witness the attempt — which was to be Idaho's first execution in 12 years.

The execution team was made up entirely of volunteers, the corrections department said. Those tasked with inserting the IVs and administering the lethal drug had medical training, but their identities were kept secret. They wore white balaclava-style face coverings and navy scrub caps to conceal their faces.

7 apparel, garment units to come up in Khurda

Bhubaneswar, Feb 29: The state government Thursday distributed project approval letters to seven apparel and garment manufacturing units which will be set up in Khurda district, entailing an investment of ₹378.98 crore. The firms would generate employment opportunities for 18,620 people, Industries Minister Pratap Keshari Deb said during a special function here where he handed over letters to the company officials. Last week, during the State Level Single Window Clearance Authority (SLSWCA) meeting, these projects received approval, and the issuance of approval letters marked a formal acknowledgment of this decision, a release by the state government said. The companies that received approval letters include Meenu Creation LLP (Rs 57.78 crore), Pooja International (Rs 55 crore), Sonu Exim Pvt Ltd (Rs 55 crore), Rainbow Fabart Pvt Ltd (Rs 52

crore), BL International Pvt Ltd (Rs 51.10 crore), Fine Lines (Rs 58 crore), and Golden Seams Industries Pvt Ltd (Rs 50.1 crore). Following the issuance of letters, Anil Peshawari, CMD of Meenu Creation LLP, representing the group of seven industries, emphasised the cluster's commitment to growth and development. Hemant Sharma, Principal Secretary of Industries department, Odisha, highlighted the strategic importance of fostering industrial growth and collaboration in his keynote speech. A pivotal aspect of the event was the discussion on infrastructure development and expedited facilitation, emphasising the necessity for streamlined processes and robust infrastructure to support the burgeoning industry. The state government release added that investors were showing keenness in Odisha due to the state's conducive business environment, stable governance, efficient approval processes, and seamless land allotment procedures.

FISHING BAN FOR TURTLE CONSERVATION

15,037 families get livelihood support

Bhubaneswar, Feb 29: Agriculture and Fisheries Minister Ranendra Pratap Swain Thursday disbursed financial assistance of more than ₹22 crore to 15,037 households dependent on fishing as livelihood support during the fishing ban on account of Olive Ridley turtle conservation. The assistance to families was provided under the government's 'livelihood support to marine fishermen during fishing ban period for Olive Ridley turtle conservation' scheme. With a total financial assistance of ₹22 crore 55 lakh, each fishing family got ₹15,000 in assistance. Among the 15,037 families, 423 are from Jagtsingpur, 6,773 from Kendrapara, 3,450 from Puri, 3,638



from Ganjam and 753 families from Bhadrak, who are suffering livelihood losses due to the ban imposed on fishing for conservation of Olive Ridley turtles. Addressing the meeting organised at Krushi Bhawan, Swain said that the government has introduced the state plan scheme 'livelihood support to marine fishermen during fishing ban period for Olive Ridley

turtle conservation' with an objective to provide financial assistance to affected families for strengthening their livelihood during the fishing ban period. "Odisha is one of the most important maritime states in the country endowed with a 480km long coastline. About 5.18 lakh of marine fishers belonging to 1.15 lakh families solely depend on fishing for their livelihood," said the minister. The state's coastline is known as a breeding ground for the rare Olive Ridley turtle. Every year they come from thousands of miles to the Odisha coast to lay eggs. "To protect their spawning process, fishing restrictions are imposed from November 1 to May 31 every year near the Rushikulya river mouth of Ganjam, Dhamara river mouth of Bhadrak, Devi river mouth of Puri and Jagatsinghpur and throughout the year in the Gahirmatha Marine Sanctuary of Kendrapara," added the minister. The state government has increased the livelihood assistance from time to time considering the demands made by fishermen through different forums. The amount was increased to ₹7,500 in 2017-18 and again to ₹15,000 in 2023.

Police round up inter-state burglar gang

POLICE CLAIM TO SOLVE SPACETOWN APARTMENT SERIES FLAT LOOT CASE

Bhubaneswar, Feb 29: The Commissionerate Police Thursday claimed to have busted a nine-member gang of inter-state burglars and recovered 1.5 kg silver and gold ornaments, eight mobile phones and four motorcycles from them. The accused, all from Ganjam district, were involved in numerous theft cases in Chhattisgarh, Mumbai, Hyderabad, Surat and Andhra Pradesh, apart from various places here and elsewhere in the state, police said. The miscreants are involved in more than eight burglary cases, including the four apartment thefts in Spacetown Apartment under Mancheswar Police limits, said Panda. Police sources said Girish Naik had been booked in more than 40 cases under Ganjam Police limits in the past. The arrested have been booked under Section 457 and 380 of IPC, and were produced before a local court for remand.

Govt to conduct digital crop survey

Bhubaneswar, Feb 29: The state government has decided to conduct a digital crop survey across the state to ascertain the exact area under cultivation by farmers, a senior official said. The survey was first piloted in four districts - Nuapada, Nayagarh, Deogarh, and Bhadrak - during the 2023-24 kharif crop seasons. The exercise will be expanded to the remaining 26 districts, Agriculture department Principal Secretary Arabinda Kumar Padhee said. "The survey will help us in getting accurate amounts of cul-



tivated land in different parts of the state, and in planning and policy making," he said. The study will be conducted using a mobile application developed jointly by the Centre and the state government. "Geo-referenced cadastral maps with Geographic Information System (GIS) and Global Positioning System (GPS) technologies will be used to ensure the farmland position," officials said. The digital survey will establish a clear picture of crops being sown in the farmlands during different agriculture seasons, they said. It will also provide data on damage from natural calamities, disease attacks and agro-meteorological services across the country, the officials added. In a related development, the state government said it will extend the artificial insemination programme to nine more districts after its successful imple-

mentation in Puri, said Utkarsh Vijay, vice-president at Samagra Governance, the technical partner for the project. The nine districts where the programme will now be rolled out are Balasore, Bargarh, Bhadrak, Cuttack, Ganjam, Jagatsinghpur, Jajpur, Kendrapara and Mayurbhanj. "This is a first-of-its-kind service in India, which is now being expanded to 10 districts including Puri. Initial findings show more than 50 per cent positive pregnancy diagnosis. This initiative will help in increasing productivity and income of farmers," he said.

E-vehicle gifted to Capital Hosp

Bhubaneswar, Feb 29: The Odisha State Warehousing Corporation (OSWC) provided one 10-seater e-vehicle at a cost of ₹11.90 lakh to the Capital Hospital here out of its CSR fund in an event held in the hospital campus, Thursday. Atanu Sabyasachi Nayak, Minister of PS & CW, Cooperation, Higher Education, presented the vehicle to Laxmidhar Sahoo, Director, Capital Hospital. The Capital Hospital is a premier hospital, which was recently granted the status of a Post Graduate Institute, is spread

across 25 acres of land with 750 beds with about 5,500 patients coming for treatment on a daily basis. The electric vehicle will help a lot to the regular patients, PWDs, children and senior citizens for their seamless movement inside the campus, especially among different departments, to avail treatment within a short span of time. The OSWC is providing warehousing and logistic support to the agriculture sector by operating 68 warehouses spread over 30 districts of the state. The Corporation mainly deals in scientific storage of food grains for distribution under PDS and other welfare schemes of the government.

AMA BANK INITIATIVE

CM opens 2K village banking outlets

Bhubaneswar, Feb 29: Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik Thursday inaugurated 2,000 CSP (Customer Service Point) plus outlets under the 'Ama Bank' initiative, aimed at providing banking services in all unbanked gram panchayats of the state.

The 'Ama Bank' programme was launched last year after it was realised that 4,373 out of the state's total 6,789 gram panchayats lacked banking outlets, causing difficulties for people to avail benefits from various schemes.

In November 2023, the state government opened 750 CSP Plus outlets, and now an additional

2,000 outlets have been launched.

Patnaik said financial inclusion is crucial for social and economic progress and empowerment of the people.

He said no country or state can achieve inclusive growth without ensuring financial inclusion for its citizens. Delivering public services to the last mile in a fair and transparent manner has been a top priority of the government, he added.

However, financial inclusion has remained a challenge in Odisha due to the limited geographical penetration of banks, with about 65 per cent of gram panchayats lacking brick-and-mortar bank branches, the CM said, adding that this resulted in

significant challenges in accessing banking services and Direct Benefit Transfers for rural residents.

To address this issue, the state government has collaborated with six public sector banks, including SBI, PNB, UBI, UCO Bank, Bank of India, and Bank of Baroda, to implement the 'Ama Bank' scheme, he added.

The Ama Bank scheme is being implemented in a phased manner to cover all unbanked gram panchayats of the state. The government of Odisha is providing rent-free banking space for 5 years along with electricity and internet connectivity. The state government is also bearing one-time expense for fixed costs and recurring expenses for three years. A provision of ₹500 Crore has been made for this purpose.

In the first phase, 750 CSP plus outlets were opened which are rendering full-fledged banking services like deposits, advances, remittances, loan, Aadhaar-Enabled Payment Systems, credit linkage to SHGs, coverage under social security schemes free of cost.

State Water Informatics Centre soon

Bhubaneswar, Feb 29: The state government Thursday decided to establish a State Water Informatics Centre (SWIC) for the coordination, collection and dissemination of water resources data.

Chief Secretary Pradeep Kumar Jena said this will be done with the support and guidance of the National Water Informatics Centre (NWIC).

This was among the eight proposals that received approval of the state Cabinet, headed by Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik. The SWIC will provide a com-



prehensive repository of hydro-meteorological data for the state. It will act under the purview of the water resources department, Jena told reporters after the Cabinet meeting.

The centre will have a proficient team well-versed in water

resource management, data handling, and information technology, sourced from existing organizations or outsourced as needed, Jena said.

The Cabinet also approved the proposal for the regularisation of 504 contractual super-

visors of the Women and Child Development Department.

Regularization of their services will ensure the uninterrupted delivery of essential services and support to vulnerable children and women covered under the Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) programs in the state, Jena added.

The state will bear an additional burden of ₹18.51 crore per annum for this.

In addition, the Cabinet approved amendments to the service rules for the multipurpose health workers, radiographers, pharmacists and nurses.

Expelled BJD MLA Jagadev joins BJP

Bhubaneswar: Another expelled BJD MLA Prasanta Kumar Jagadev Thursday joined the BJP. He was an MLA from Chilika constituency before expulsion. Jagadev, a two-time MLA, once from Begunia and currently the sitting legislator from Chilika, joined the saffron party in the presence of Odisha co-in-charge Lata Usendi, Bhubaneswar MP Aparajita Sarangi and former state unit president Samir Mohanty. Jagadev is the second expelled BJD leader after Pradeep Panigrahy to join BJP this month.

Judgment Day

Day by day, week by week, courts are increasingly becoming the front line in the struggle to preserve democracy from populists and authoritarians. In the United States, the Supreme Court recently heard oral arguments on a decision by Colorado's highest court that Donald Trump is ineligible to appear on the state's presidential ballot, owing to his role in the January 6, 2021, insurrection at the US Capitol. And an appellate court has ruled against Trump's claim that presidents enjoy immunity for any action taken while in office.

Moreover, a state court in New York has just imposed a \$354 million penalty on Trump for financial fraud. That comes on top of \$83 million awarded by the jury in a case where Trump was accused of defaming a woman who had successfully sued him for sexual assault. In addition to barring him from holding any senior role in a New York-based company for the next three years, these two rulings will likely strip Trump of almost all his available cash holdings.

Meanwhile, across the Atlantic, the United Kingdom's Conservative government has been trying to pass a migrant-relocation bill that is intended to bypass a UK Supreme Court ruling late last year overturning similar legislation. In Israel, the country's highest court recently struck down an amendment to the Basic Law that would have curtailed its own authority. And in Germany, the Constitutional Court recently ruled that public funding can be denied to the far-right, anti-democratic Die Heimat party, leading to speculation that it could consider a similar case involving the increasingly popular Alternative für Deutschland (AfD).

The ballot-eligibility case before the US Supreme Court may turn out to be one of the most important in US history. After the Colorado Supreme Court ruled that Trump's role in the January 6 insurrection bars him from holding high office, it became inevitable that the top court would have to weigh in.

Having accepted the case, the justices must decide whether they will block Trump's return to the presidency, knowing that he has promised to unleash "bedlam" if they rule against him. But even if Trump's followers cause disorder, America's system of democracy - which was designed to deter demagogues - will have held. By contrast, if the justices overturn the Colorado decision, as seems likely, the future of American democracy may well be left to just a sliver of voters in key swing states.

The courts and the law have been interwoven with American political life almost since the founding. In 1835, Alexis de Tocqueville observed that, "Scarcely any political question arises in the United States that is not resolved, sooner or later, into a judicial question." This was no exaggeration. In 1803, the Supreme Court had asserted, in *Marbury v. Madison*, its authority to review and, if necessary, strike down legislation, establishing itself as the final arbiter on the meaning and requirements of the US Constitution.

Although America has long been the world's preeminent democracy, few other countries have adopted its judicial model. Within the US, the sovereignty of the Court is taken almost for granted, with only occasional murmurs of dissent. But many observers elsewhere are troubled by the idea that a few men and women in black robes could decide on, say, the creation of a national bank or the legality of slavery. While almost every democratic country has a constitutional court, few are as politically super-charged as America's. Instead, they are expected to defer to elected officials.

And yet, populist politics has increasingly strained many countries' constitutional orders, leading to more instances of courts asserting themselves in novel ways. A good example is the right-wing Israeli administration's attempt to bar the country's Supreme Court from considering "the reasonableness of a decision of the government, the prime minister, or any other minister."

Last month, Israel's Supreme Court struck down that law. Following in the footsteps of their American counterparts, the justices determined that the Court - not the Knesset, not the government, and not the president - is the highest authority on the meaning and requirements of Israel's Basic Laws.

In the UK, where the courts have long been described as "lions under the throne," last year's ruling striking down the government's migrant-relocation law suggests that the justices will come out of the shadows when necessary. The government's attempt to send asylum seekers to Rwanda, the court ruled, amounted to a violation of both international and domestic law, because - contrary to what the Foreign Office claims - Rwanda does not qualify as a safe country for resettlement.

It is unclear what will happen if Prime Minister Rishi Sunak's government manages to pass a bill declaring Rwanda to be "safe," simply because no British government has ever adopted legislation whose sole purpose is to deny reality. (In fact, Rwandans seeking political asylum in the UK already outnumber those whom the UK is trying to send to Rwanda.)

If the UK's traditional conception of parliamentary sovereignty holds, the Supreme Court will be obliged to accept this Alice in Wonderland outcome. Still, even if the justices prove unwilling to topple the constitutional apple cart in this particular case, the broader shift in judicial power is clear, both in Britain and internationally.

To survive this period of populist assaults on the democratic order, courts will need to embrace their proper role as arbiters of justice. They know that their decisions cannot rest on the emotional whims of a Trump or a Boris Johnson. They must follow reason, precedent, and law.

At a time of mounting populist pressure, the judiciary's apparent democratic unaccountability will likely prove to be one of its fundamental strengths, not a weakness. They may now be the last guarantors of democratic constitutional order.

The manifest concern for preserving democracy in India cannot be better exemplified than in the two recent verdicts of the Supreme Court, both authored by CJI DY Chandrachud. In one, a seemingly minor electoral issue in the election of the Mayor of Chandigarh, provoked the CJI to describe the abuse of authority by the Returning Officer as "a murder of democracy" when he found that the ballot papers were defaced by him so as to invalidate eight otherwise valid votes of the opposing candidate which illegally resulted in declaring the BJP candidate to be elected as Mayor. And in the second verdict, the constitutional bench of the SC headed by the CJI declared the Electoral Bonds Scheme (EBS) to be invalid and unconstitutional, violating the fundamental right of a citizen under Article 19(1)(a) by denying him information fundamental to his right to receive the same in the interest of fair and free elections to Parliament and state legislatures. The underlined theme of both these verdicts is the preservation of democracy, nothing more, and nothing less.

TO PUT IT PLAINLY, THE EBS WAS THE GOVERNMENT'S WAY OF SYSTEMATIZE BRIBERY UNTO ITSELF

In 2017, the Finance Act brought about four significant amendments in laws that governed contributions to political parties by individuals and corporations. The statutes that were amended were the Representation of the People Act, 1951; the Companies Act, 2013; Section 13A of the Income Tax Act, 1961; and Section 31 of the Reserve Bank of India Act, 1931. The purpose in all these alterations was to provide complete secrecy and anonymity to cash contributions to political parties by their donors. Contributions could be made without limit by donors on the assurance that their identities would remain secret as would the identities of political parties to whom such donations or contributions were made. By these amendments, neither the donor nor the receiving parties were required to maintain any accounts

or records to show the extent of contributions made or received.

This was in stark departure from the amended provisions of law which compelled donors to disclose the parties to whom contributions were made and the amounts so contributed. Equally, political parties were bound to disclose amounts received by them in full. The consequences of not maintaining proper accounts, especially by companies, were penal in nature under the amended provisions. Quite obviously, the rationale of these amended provisions was that in the larger public interest, such contributions made to political parties were not meant as quid pro quo for favours to the donor.

These laws ensured probity in public life and contributed to keeping the institution of elections clean, free and fair. Prior to the amendment, the monopoly to issue bearer instruments which have the potential of becoming currency was with the RBI. However, by the amendment, any bank could be notified by the Central government as having the authority to issue electoral bonds. To put it plainly, the EBS was the government's way of institutionalising bribery unto itself. A PIL was filed shortly after the introduction of EBS and the principal challenge was that the secrecy attending EBS was a violation of a citizen's fundamental right under Article 19(1)(a). By well-established judicial prece-

ents, an Indian had the right to information in matters relating to governance by the State. Courts had previously traced a citizen's right to information to the values of good governance, transparency and accountability by which the citizen could hold the State liable for its actions and inactions in matters of governance.

Another facet of Article 19(1)(a) was the evolution of the jurisprudence on the right to information to a citizen. The SC had recognised the importance of information to form views on social, cultural and political issues, and participate in and contribute to discussions. This foundational basis of the challenge to EBS found favour with the SC which eventually upheld the same and declared the EBS to be unconstitutional and invalid. In the process of its judgment, the SC held that secrecy in contributions to undisclosed political parties was an obvious means of obtaining political favours by way of quid pro quo from the government in power. Previously, any contribution made in excess of Rs 20,000 by an individual or a company was bound to be disclosed and accounted for, but now a limitless amount could furtively exchange hands from the donor to the donee through the instrumentality of an electoral bond.

What further irked the SC was that when EBS was being mooted and referred to institutions such as RBI and the

Election Commission for their views, both of them expressed serious misgivings about the scheme, including alerting the government and that the EBS would provide a convenient conduit for money laundering and other pernicious practices that would hurt the democratic fabric of the nation. These concerns and objections were brushed aside contemptuously, as it were, by the government.

The SC impliedly in its reasoning upheld these concerns of RBI and EC. The Union of India in its response to the Petitioner brazenly argued, contrary to judicial precedents, that the citizen's right to information was not absolute. The Union argued that the donor was not bound to disclose his affiliation to a political party nor his contribution made to it as that would be an invasion of the donor's right of privacy. This argument was repelled by SC by holding that right of a citizen to information under Article 19(1)(a) far outweighed in importance as an inalienable democratic value to the donor's right of privacy in this regard.

The SC on a scrutiny of the defaced ballot papers held that it was obvious that the real winner was the AAP candidate and declared him as the Mayor of Chandigarh in the place of the previously "elected" BJP candidate. The SC has now issued a contempt notice to the Returning Officer and proposes to prosecute him for abuse of the electoral process and perjury.

What is of significance and runs parallel in both the above verdicts is the SC's innate concern for upholding democratic values in the Indian polity. Both the above judgments are from the heart and the intellectual flavour is just the vehicle through which the SC has done this country proud.

Income & expenditure

Sir, According to the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation's most recent household consumption expenditure survey, per capita urban household expenditure at current prices has more than doubled, rising from Rs 2,630 in 2011-12 to Rs 6,459 in 2022-23. Similarly, rural areas have seen an increase from Rs 1,430 to Rs 3,773. Parallel to these figures is the claim that poverty has decreased by five per cent. The figure of about 23 crore people coming out of multidimensional poverty was also in the news a few days ago. Amidst all this there is also a fact that there has been no significant increase in per capita income. In rural areas, per capita monthly income is almost the same as per capita monthly expenditure. It has also been discovered that expenditure on non-food products has climbed, whilst expenditure on food grains has fallen in comparison to previous years. Expenditure on fruits, vegetables, milk, seafood, edible oil, and other items has grown. Similarly, spending on education, health, entertainment, clothing, and other vital consumer products has risen. One reason for this is that the average consumption spending in that sector has increased as a result of individuals returning from cities to villages during COVID and becoming employed in the agricultural sector. However, the same argument does not apply when raising urban expenditure. During this period, the government is always attempting to keep inflation under control. However, this does not achieve a balance between per capita income and expenditure. In most homes, there is just one earner, but she/he supports three people on average.

Earlier, on the second day of her four-day visit to the state, Murmu arrived at Raisuan airstrip in Keonjhar in a special aircraft and had an interaction with the Juang tribe men

and women, where she stressed on education, training, employment and health of tribals. She said tribals could be self-reliant if they become economically independent.

Asking the gathering to ensure that tribal children should not leave their studies in the midway, the President said it is the responsibility of the government to identify the dropout tribal children and impart vocational training to them.

After their training, financial assistance should be provided to the tribals so that they can earn their livelihood with dignity, Murmu said asking the District Collectors to handhold the District employed tribal youths.

She urged the tribal gathering to be aware of different government schemes and take benefit from them. She said the tribal people are now entitled to get free-of-cost rice till 2029 and one should not be worried about food for the next five years. Both tribal men and women should stress on education, training and employment.

Murmu informed the gathering that the Central government has prepared a scheme worth ₹24,000 crore for the development of 75 PVTGs in three years.

The government is also prepared to give more assistance if required, she said, adding that this scheme will look after their issues like food, drinking water, houses, roads, schools and health. She also called upon the tribal youths to become assets for their families and not liability for others.

The President during the interaction wanted to know how many Juangs are educated, how many get the PDS rice and other benefits. She was, however, informed that only five Juang families were given housing units under the government scheme while the remaining members of the community were unaware of the scheme. She said all the PVTG families should have ration card, Aadhaar card, houses and other facilities.

She also wanted to know as to how many of Juang tribes were in politics and occupying posts in the three-tier Panchayati Raj system.

Berhampur, Feb 29: Zoological Survey of India (ZSI) scientists have discovered a new species of head-shield sea slug from Bay of Bengal in the Odisha-West Bengal border and named it in the honour of President Droupadi Murmu.

The new species was discovered from Udaipur and Digha coast of Odisha and West Bengal and named as *Melanochlamys Droupadi*, said Dhriti Banerjee, Director, ZSI.

The proposed common name of the new species is Droupadi's head-shield sea slug, said one of the scientists.

The species was confirmed by examination of morphological, anatomical and molecular characteristics. It is a small invertebrate with a maximum length up to 7 mm, brownish black in colour with a ruby red spot in the hind end, shell inside the body, hermaphrodite, normally crawling on the intertidal zone, which left the crawl mark behind them in the sandy beaches.

Their reproduction apparently occurs between November and January, said Prasad Chandra Tudu, Marine Aquarium Regional Centre, ZSI, Digha.

Melanochlamys Droupadi is a unique species with a ruby red spot on the left posterior side unlike the other species reported throughout the world, said Tudu,



who was leading the study along with SK Sajan of ZSI Kolkata, Smrutirekha Acharya and Anil Mohapatra of the ZSI's Estuarine Biology Regional Centre, Gopalpur-on-Sea.

Tudu said the distribution of this species was presently recorded only from a 3-km stretch of the Digha-Udaipur coast. The study has revealed it was the second species discovered in the country, he added.

They have collected around 145 specimens from the stretch from February 2021 to March 2023 for the purposes of the study. "After a thorough study, we confirmed the species was a new one," he added. The research paper was published in the leading molluscan journal, *Mollusca Research* in its online edition.

Tudu said the sea slugs are active marauders and rapid hunters, feeding on small animals like ribbon worms, marine worms and small fishes by sucking the whole prey into their mouths. It plays a secondary consumer role in the ecosystem, he added.

Motorcycles collide head-on; 3 killed

Baripada: Three persons were killed in a head-on collision between two motorcycles in Mayurbhanj district Thursday, police said. The accident happened near Gudialbandh on Baripada-Udala Road in Barasahi police station area, they said. The deceased were identified as Akash Bindhani (29), Laxman Singh (19) and Ranjan Singh (25), police said. The bodies were sent to the PRM Medical College and Hospital for post-mortem examinations, they said. A case has been registered, police said.

3-year jail term for ponzi firm manager

Balasure: Special Judge, OPID Court and Additional Sessions Judge Biswajit Das Thursday convicted a manager of a ponzi firm and sentenced him to three years rigorous imprisonment (RI) along with a penalty of ₹61,000. The court further ordered six more months of jail term in case the convict failed to pay the penalty. Special Public Prosecutor Pranab Panda said the accused Nimai Charan Sahu was tried under different sections of IPC including 420, 406, 120(B) and 4, 5, 6 of the Prize Chit Money Circulation Schemes (Banning) Act after a depositor Rasmita Mishra lodged an FIR with Baripada Town police in 2013. Mishra has alleged that the manager of the multi-level marketing company Utkal Women's Cooperative Society had siphoned money from the depositors giving false assurances of high returns, and loans. The chit fund outlet was closed subsequently, she alleged.

Man gets 5 years RI for killing wife

Balasure: Special Judge OPID court and Additional Sessions Judge Biswajit Das Thursday sentenced a murder accused to five years of rigorous imprisonment (RI) along with a ₹5,000 fine and six months more jail term in default of penalty. The convict Madhi Majhi, a resident of Khantapara, was arrested on the charge of killing his wife Tikili Singh by forcefully drowning her in an inebriated state in February 2022 following a complaint from the father of the deceased. The accused was convicted under section 304(I) of IPC and the court pronounced the verdict after examining 12 witnesses and 18 exhibits, said Special Public Prosecutor Pranab Panda.

Keonjhar, Feb 29: Asserting that the societies of the tribal people are the treasure of traditional knowledge, President Droupadi Murmu Thursday said that their lifestyle is icon of non-violence and symbol of co-existence.

Murmu, India's first tribal President, said this after inaugurating a national seminar on 'Tribes of Keonjhar: People, Culture and Heritage' organised by Dharanidhar University at Gambharia, Keonjhar.

Referring to global warming and climate change, Murmu said that only tribals know the technique of living in harmony with the environment.

They do not cause damage to nature for which there is a balance in the environment, she pointed out adding that there are a lot many things which could be learnt from the tribal society.

She urged students, researchers and others to make efforts to save and spread this wealth of knowledge.

Suggesting that students and researchers spend at least five days and nights in tribal villages to acquire experience of their lifestyle, the President said their knowledge could be utilised for the betterment of the society.

"The old persons in tribal villages know which plant is useful for which disease. Since the people of those generations are depleting, one must acquire their

Rourkela, Feb 29: Vigilance sleuths Thursday trapped and caught red-handed a senior assistant working at the ESI Dispensary at Jail Road here for demanding and accepting a bribe of ₹10,000 from the complainant, an accident victim.

Sources said the accused employee identified as Abhiram Sahu was apprehended by the state Vigilance directorate for allegedly demanding ₹10,000 bribe from an accident victim for clearing his medical reimbursement claim under ESI Scheme.

The complainant, being poor, had been repeatedly requesting Sahu to process his medical claim for a long time. However, Sahu kept dillydallying and insisting on the payment of the said amount to get his work done.

Given his financial status, the complainant was expressing his inability to arrange and pay the bribe amount. Finding no other

option, the complainant informed the Vigilance authorities and narrated the harassment he was facing to get his claim cleared by Sahu.

The Vigilance sleuths soon laid a trap and asked the complainant to work as per their direction. As per the plan, the complainant paid the bribe to the ESI official and accordingly he was caught red-handed Thursday while accepting the said amount. The entire bribe money has been recovered and seized from the possession of accused Sahu.

Following the successful trap, simultaneous searches are underway at two different locations linked to Sahu to unearth disproportionate assets (DA), if any.

In this connection, a case has been registered by Rourkela Vigilance under PS Case No.04 dated 28.02.2024, U/s 7 of the PC (Amendment) Act, 2018. A detailed probe against accused Sahu is underway, Vigilance sources said.

CIL, BHEL to jointly set up ammonium nitrate unit in state

New Delhi, Feb 29: Public sector giants Coal India Limited (CIL) and Bharat Heavy Electricals Limited (BHEL) have signed a joint venture (JV) agreement for setting up an ammonium nitrate plant based on surface coal gasification technology in Odisha.

The Coal Ministry announcement Wednesday said the plant to come up in Lakhnapur area of Mahanadi Coalfields Limited (MCL) will initially produce 2,000 tonnes of ammonium nitrate per day.

The annual production is slated at 6.60 lakh tonnes which requires 1.3 million tonnes (mts) of coal.

The coal will be supplied by CIL. BHEL will bring to the table indigenously developed pressurised fluidised bed gasification (PFBG) technology for this purpose.

The synergy and partnership of the two corporate giants is a big step towards National Coal Gasification Mission which facilitates utilisation of chemical properties of coal, the Coal Ministry said.

Ammonium nitrate is a major ingredient in manufacturing bulk explosives which CIL uses in large quantities in its open-cast mining operations, a major source of its coal production.

The upcoming plant's backward integration would help in securing the raw material, reducing import dependence of ammonium nitrate and promoting Atmanirbhar Bharat Abhiyaan.

Coal Secretary Amrit Lal Meena said that with the commitment of CIL and BHEL, this project will be a role model.

Gasification is the highest priority area for the ministry of coal.

In the next two to three years there will be sufficient coal. All the possible support required from the government is in place including financial support for viable gap funding.

Debasish Nanda, Director (Business Development) CIL and Jai Prakash Srivastava, Director (Engineering, R&D) BHEL signed the joint venture agreement on behalf of respective promoter companies.

CIL will pursue alternative uses of coal for environment friendly ventures like coal gasification in future after fulfilling the requirement of the power sector. SCG is a promising technology that converts coal into valuable Syn gas.

On further processing, this produces synthetic natural gas that can be used as alternative natural gas.

20-yr RI to man for minor's rape

Bhadrak, Feb 29: A special fast track court here convicted a man for rape of a minor and handed him down 20 years of rigorous imprisonment (RI), Thursday.

The convict was identified as Mohan Kumar Kundu, 34, a resident of Bhagibindha village under Dhamnagar police limits in this district.

Judge Minati Panda also slapped a penalty of ₹20,000 on Kundu, apart from the punishment. In default, Kundu has to undergo ad-

ditional six months of imprisonment.

This was stated here by government pleaders Batkrushna Das and Pradip Mohapatra, Thursday. The duo, who pleaded the case on behalf of the state government, said that Kundu lured the survivor with snacks and chocolates to the nearby Reba river bank and raped her over there, January 13, 2022. He had even threatened her of dire consequences if she disclosed the matter before others.

The girl returned home and narrated her ordeal before her mother, who took her to the Dhamnagar police station the next day and lodged a complaint.

Police arrested Kundu January 15 and produced him in the court. Since then he was lodged in jail as an under-trial prisoner.

Flight-test of very short range missile successful

New Delhi/Chandipur, Feb 29: The Defence Research & Development Organisation (DRDO) has conducted two successful flight tests of the Very Short-Range Air Defence System (VSHORADS) missile Wednesday and Thursday.

The tests were conducted from a ground-based portable launcher from the Integrated Test Range (ITR), Chandipur, off the coast of Odisha.

These tests were carried out against high-speed unmanned aerial targets under different interception scenarios. During all the test flights, the targets were intercepted and destroyed by the missiles, meeting the mission objectives.

The Ministry of Defence informed that VSHORADS is a Man-



Portable Air Defence System (MANPAD) designed and developed indigenously by the Research Centre Imarat (RCI) in collaboration with other DRDO laboratories and Indian industry partners.

The VSHORADS missile in-

corporates many novel technologies, including miniaturised Reaction Control System (RCS) and integrated avionics, which have been successfully proven during the tests.

The missile is propelled by a

dual thrust solid motor meant for neutralising low-altitude aerial threats at short ranges. The design of the missile, including the launcher, has been highly optimised to ensure easy portability.

The flight tests were witnessed by officials of the Indian Army, senior scientists from various DRDO laboratories, and industry partners.

Defence Minister Rajnath Singh congratulated the DRDO, Indian Army and the industry involved in the successful development trials, saying that this new missile equipped with modern technologies will give further technological boost to the armed forces.

DRDO Chairman Samir V Kamat also congratulated the entire team involved in the design and development of the missile.

New Delhi, Feb 29: Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal Thursday accused Lieutenant Governor V K Saxena of threatening officers to stall various city government initiatives, including the bus marshal scheme.

There was no immediate reaction from the LG's office to the Chief Minister's claim. Speaking in the Delhi Assembly on the issue of removal of civil defence volunteers deployed as bus marshals in Delhi Transport Corporation (DTC) and cluster buses, Kejriwal said the scheme ran smoothly from 2015 to 2022.



"We formed the government in 2015 with a promise to ensure women's safety. We installed CCTV cameras in five years, street lights

were installed at dark spots and buses were equipped with CCTV cameras, panic buttons and bus marshals were deployed. There are several instances of good work by bus marshals," the Chief Minister said.

The bus marshal scheme worked well for eight years but in 2023, officers started raising objections saying civil defence volunteers could not work as

marshals, he said.

"The Lt Governor threatened officers to stall the bus marshal scheme. The LG questioned the deployment of marshals saying there were CCTV cameras and panic buttons," Kejriwal charged.

He also accused the BJP of shedding "crocodile tears" over the issue and said that he was ready to sign any paper for the reinstatement of bus marshals.

Kejriwal also spoke about Saxena's open letter to him on the one-time settlement scheme for allegedly inflated water bills. "The language of the LG's letter was filthy," he said, adding such language should not be used.

Protection bund for farmers soon

Samba/Jammu, Feb 29: Encouraging border residents to cultivate their land ahead of border fence, a top BSF officer Thursday said the Home Ministry has approved a plan for the construction of a protection bund along the International Border for the safety of farmers and it will be completed within next five years.

Inspector General of Border Security Force (BSF), Jammu frontier, D K Boora was speaking at a function organised at Chamliyal village near the zero line in Samba district to hand over a cheque of Rs 3 lakh to a villager who helped in the recovery of a grounded Pakistani drone in January.

Samba Senior Superintendent of Police Vinay Kumar and other prominent people attended the function. "We want the farmers to tend their land ahead of the border fence as the BSF is there for your protection. We will provide you with all the assistance and if you are concerned that you won't be able to cultivate your produce, we will not allow such a situation to develop in the first place," the BSF officer said.

Boora, however, said in case the farmers on the Indian side are not able to reap their produce, the BSF will not allow the other side to cultivate as well. He said the Home Ministry has already approved a proposal for the construction of a protection bund along the IB for the safety of the farmers working in their fields ahead of the border fence.

"The protection bund will be completed within the next four to five years, depending on the availability of the funds. After the completion of the protection bund, you can carry out your work easily without any threat (from the enemy)," he said.

Boora said there are rules in place while moving ahead of the border fence and "we need to follow those rules. BSF is deployed on the borders in J&K, Punjab, Rajasthan, Gujarat, West Bengal, Assam, Meghalaya, Tripura and Mizoram and all these areas are protected by border fences and the rules are the same everywhere."

Boora said the central government has announced many schemes for the development of border villages and the im-

portance of these schemes will be visible on the ground in the next five years.

Highlighting the importance of border residents in safeguarding the country border security is incomplete without the cooperation of the border population.

"We are proud of our border population in Jammu region who are nationalist by core," he said, adding that in neighbouring Punjab, drug smuggling from across the border is a major challenge.

"The drugs are coming by drones and other means in Punjab because there are some elements who are promoting the business. When our own people are involved in such criminal activities, it becomes difficult (for the law enforcing agencies to tackle the situation)," he said, adding that when the border residents are nationalists, the entire focus of the border guarding forces remains on the front rather than looking behind.

Highlighting the cooperation of the border residents in securing the borders of the country, he said Dass had done a very good job for which he was rewarded.

SSP Sharma said the police headquarters had announced rewards to anyone sharing information regarding anti-national activities and Dass was handed over the cheque of Rs 3 lakh for helping in the recovery of enemy drones in January this year.

He said there is also a reward of Rs 5 lakh for anyone who locates the trans-border tunnel, used by anti-national elements to tranship terrorists, explosives, and contraband consignments into Jammu and Kashmir from across the border. "People have always been supportive in providing information to the forces. The rewards were announced just to glorify, certify and celebrate such people," he said.

Dass thanked the BSF and the police for rewarding him and said it is the duty of every individual to expose the enemy conspiracies and safeguard the country alongside the forces. "I was doing spray in my agriculture land on January 17 when I found a drone lying on the ground. I immediately informed BSF who later gave me Rs 50,000," he said, thanking police for the reward of Rs 3 lakhs.

DELHI BJP STARTS CAMPAIGN FOR MANIFESTO

Homestays to boost border tourism in Samba

THE JAMMU AND KASHMIR ADMINISTRATION HAS RECENTLY GIVEN ITS NOD FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF HOMESTAYS IN THE CLOSE VICINITY OF THE FAMOUS BABA CHAMLIYAL SHRINE IN RAMGARH SECTOR TO BOOST BORDER TOURISM AMID PREVAILING PEACE ON THE BORDERS


Samba (J&K), Feb 29: Former Sarpanch Mohan Singh Bhatti is ready to receive tourists at his homestay near the International Border (IB) in Jammu and Kashmir's Samba district, a visible change in the ground situation after the renewed ceasefire between India and Pakistan came into effect in this month three years ago.

The Jammu and Kashmir administration has recently given its nod for the construction of homestays in the close vicinity of the famous Baba Chamliyal shrine in Ramgarh sector to boost border tourism amid prevailing peace on the borders.

Considered a symbol of Indo-Pakistan bonhomie in the past, the famous shrine of Baba Chamliyal on the zero line attracts thousands of devotees from across the country, especially on the occasion of the annual fair in the middle of the year.

Delegations from Pakistan used to come to pay obeisance at the shrine during the annual fair but the practice was stopped after cross-border firing left four BSF personnel including an Assistant Commandant dead on June 13, 2018.

Last year, a BSF jawan was killed in Pakistan Rangers firing in Ramgarh sector during the in-



tervening night of November 8-9, the first loss of life on this side after the renewed ceasefire was agreed upon by the two countries February 25, 2021.

Bhatti, who has come up with a double-storey homestay at his Dagh Channi village of Fatwal, has also constructed a well-furnished underground bunker with a twin objective to make the visitors feel living on the borders and as a safety measure to prevent any damage in case of shelling from across the border.

"On your visit to the border, you will see everything but not the bunker, which we are using during cross-border shelling. The one who had not seen this bunker (during the border visit) has seen nothing," Bhatti said.

He said they have constructed the underground bunker also to ensure the safety of the visitors in case there is firing or shelling from the other side. "As former Prime Minister A B Vajpayee had said, we cannot change our neighbour but we have to remain prepared to avoid getting caught in unwanted situations."

Samba Deputy Commissioner Abhishek Sharma said there are many locations along the 55-km International Border in the district which have the potential to attract tourists in large numbers like Chamliyal shrine, 300-year-old temple Bamu chak, Baba Bali Karan and Baba Sidh

Goria shrines. "Both the centre and J-K administration are focusing on the promotion of border tourism. Last year, visitors to Chamliyal shrine faced accommodation problems and to bridge this gap, we are promoting homestays," Sharma said.

He said there is an encouraging response from the border residents, especially young entrepreneurs who are ready to convert their homes into homestays. "The district administration, Municipal Committee and Central University have signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to provide a hand-holding to the owners of 40 identified homestay owners, both in online and offline mode, to guide them and promote their business," the deputy commissioner said.

He said the people like to visit international borders and the government has come out with a border tourism promotion strategy to enhance the economy of the local population. "The BSF has a strong coordination and communication with the administration. The BSF is also happy about people visiting border villages as it generates nationalistic fervour among the visitors as well," Sharma said.

The visitors can also witness farming along the zero line, while the administration is plan-

ning to turn community bunkers at Ramgarh and Samba into model bunkers by setting up a gym or a library as part of the campaign to ensure proper usage of the structures.

"We are seeing that the bunkers constructed for the protection of the border residents are not properly used or maintained and utilised for other purposes. We have started a campaign so that the space is properly used," the deputy commissioner said.

Om Prakash, a resident of Chamliyal, welcomed the government scheme and lauded Prime Minister Narendra Modi for ensuring peace on the borders.

"Earlier, cross-border shelling was a routine but now peace is prevailing on the borders and new opportunities are opening for the villagers," he said, adding that the border residents want everlasting peace so that the people, who are mostly farmers, can tend their land on both sides without any fear.

Chairman of Baba Chamliyal shrine, Billu Choudhary also thanked the government for the step and said, "Our village is situated just two kilometres from the IB and we want the people to come in large numbers. A person coming from Delhi or Mumbai has only heard about the borders and on reaching here, he can have a feel of the ground situation."

40% pillion riders did not use helmets: AIIMS data

Most of the road accident victims were in the age group of 20 to 40 years, Dr Farooque said

New Delhi, Feb 29: Forty per cent of pillion riders on two-wheelers in Delhi did not use helmets leading to head injuries, according to data collected in 2022 at the AIIMS Trauma Centre here.

However, the data showed that nearly 85 per cent of the riders of two-wheelers used helmets while the rest did not wear protective gear leading to head injuries, which resulted in mortality or morbidity, said AIIMS Trauma Centre chief Dr Kamran Farooque. He referred to data collected at the centre between January 21 and December 22.

He further informed that according to the data, almost 82 per cent of the patients



who were brought dead to the hospital in 2022 had met with road accidents.

Dr Farooque further stated that the hospital received 53,541 trauma patients in 2022, out of which around 25 per cent were road accident victims.

Most of the road accident victims were in the age group of 20 to 40 years, Dr Farooque said. Since this age group is the most active and productive, their becoming victims of accidents has a major impact not only on their families but also on the country's economy. "So, there should be an organised system in place so that road accident victims get immediate help and treatment," he said.

'Minimal growth' in leopard population

New Delhi, Feb 29: India's estimated leopard population rose marginally from 12,852 in 2018 to 13,874 in 2022, with their numbers likely being impacted by poaching and human-wildlife conflict, according to a new report released by the Union environment ministry Thursday.

The "Status of Leopards in India" report, launched by Union Environment Minister Bhupender Yadav, indicated a slight decline in the number of rosetted felines in the Shivalik hills and the Indo-Gangetic Plains. Madhya Pradesh has the maximum number of leopards in the country at 3,907 (up from 3,421 in 2018). The number of felines grew from 1,690 in 2018 to 1,985 in 2022 in Maharashtra, from 1,783 to 1,879 in Karnataka, and from 868 to 1,070 in Tamil Nadu.

"Central India shows a stable or slightly growing leopard population (8,820 in 2022 against 8,071 in 2018), the Shivalik hills and the Indo-Gangetic Plains experienced a decline (from 1,253 in 2018 to 1,109 in 2022)," the ministry said.

"Under Prime Minister Narendra Modi's guidance, this conservation journey embodies the ethos of one earth, one family, and one future," he said in a statement.

Ex-Intel India head killed in accident

Mumbai: Former Intel India country head Avtar Saini was killed after a speeding cab hit him while he was cycling in Navi Mumbai township of Maharashtra, police said Thursday. The accident took place around 5.50 am Wednesday, when Saini (68) was out on a ride with fellow cyclists on the Palm Beach Road in Nerul area, some 20 km from his residence in Mumbai, an official said.

Driverless train: Rlys removes loco pilot

New Delhi: The Northern Railways has removed from service the loco pilot of a freight train which ran about 70 km on its own from Jammu's Kathua to Punjab's Uchhi Bassi, saying his "negligence" could have resulted in a "major incident" causing loss of lives. A notice to this effect was issued by the senior divisional mechanical engineer (DME), the disciplinary authority in this case.

Two minor girls found hanging

Kanpur (UP): Two girls were found hanging from a tree in a field near the brick kiln they were working in here in a village in the Ghatampur area -- days after they were allegedly raped, police said Thursday. Family members have alleged that the minor girls were raped a few days ago by the contractor of the brick kiln, his son and nephew, Additional CP (law and order) Harish Chandra said.

Slain INLD leader's sons get threat calls

Chandigarh: The two sons of slain INLD leader Nafe Singh Rathee allegedly received threat calls from an unknown number Thursday, asking them not to speak to the media about the murder. A probe has been launched into the matter, police said. Nafe Singh Rathee, the president of Indian National Lok Dal's Haryana unit, was shot dead by unidentified assailants in Hajar's Bahadurgarh Sunday.

Dilli Chalo march: Farmer cremated

Chandigarh: The 21-year-old farmer Shubhakaran Singh, who died during clashes between protesting farmers and Haryana security personnel, was cremated in his native village in Punjab's Bathinda district Thursday.

AUTOMATIC VACATION OF STAY ORDERS

SC OVERRULES 2018 VERDICT

New Delhi, Feb 29: Overturning an apex court judgement of 2018, the Supreme Court Thursday ruled that stay orders passed by a lower court or high court in civil and criminal cases cannot stand vacated automatically after six months, and said such a direction "virtually amounts to judicial legislation".

Setting aside the directions on automatic vacation of stay orders in the 2018 judgement, a five-judge constitution bench headed by Chief Justice D Y Chandrachud also ruled that constitutional courts -- the Supreme Court and high courts -- should ordinarily refrain from fixing a deadline for disposal of cases by courts below.

The bench, which also comprised justices A S Oka, J B Pardiwala, Pankaj Mithal and Manoj Misra, pronounced two separate but concurring judgements in the matter.

Justice Oka wrote a 47-page judgement for himself, the CJ, Justices Pardiwala and Misra, while Justice Mithal penned a 6-page concurring verdict. The bench said it was unable to concur with the directions issued in the 2018 judgement in which a three-judge bench had held that



the interim order of stay granted by courts, including high courts, will stand vacated automatically unless specifically extended.

hold that such blanket directions cannot be issued in the exercise of the jurisdiction under Article 142 of the Constitution of India," it held.

The verdict decided two significant legal questions. The first was whether the top court, in the exercise of its jurisdiction under Article 142 of the Constitution, can order automatic vacation of all interim orders of

the high courts of staying proceedings in civil and criminal cases on the expiry of a certain period.

The second issue was whether the Supreme Court can direct the high courts to decide pending cases wherein interim orders of stay of proceedings have been granted on a day-to-day basis and within a fixed period.

Answering the questions in the 'negative', the Supreme Court said, "The directions of the Court that provide for automatic vacation of the order of stay and the disposal of all cases in which a stay has been granted on a day-to-day basis virtually amount to judicial legislation.

"The jurisdiction of this Court cannot be exercised to make such a judicial legislation. Only the legislature can provide that cases of a particular category should be decided within a specific time. There are many statutes which incorporate such provisions. However, all such provisions are usually held to be directory," Justice Oka said in the verdict.

Article 142 of the Constitution empowers the top court to pass "any decree or order necessary for doing complete justice in any case or matter pending before it" across the country.

HP political crisis over

Shimla, Feb 29: The political turmoil in Himachal Pradesh seems to be over with Congress' central observer DK Shivakumar Thursday announcing that all differences have been ironed out even as the assembly speaker disqualified six rebel Congress legislators over abstaining from voting on the Budget in the House.

Shivakumar also said it has been decided to form a coordination committee to sort out all internal matters and claimed the Congress government would complete its full term in the hill state.

The announcements were made at a joint press conference which was also attended by two other central observers Bhupinder Hooda and Bhupesh Baghel, Chief Minister Sukhvinder Singh Sukhu and Himachal Congress chief Pratibha Singh. Shivakumar

said Sukhu has taken the responsibility of Congress leader Abhishek Manu Singhvi's defeat in the Rajya Sabha polls.

When reporters pressed for a direct answer to the query about Sukhu's continuation as CM, Hooda said, "Why are you asking a hypothetical question when Sukhu is the CM."

Public Works Department Minister Vikramaditya Singh, who offered to resign on Wednesday and later said that he would not press for his resignation, will attend the cabinet meeting later in the evening, the observers said.

Earlier in the day Himachal Pradesh Assembly Speaker Kuldeep Singh Pathania on Thursday disqualified six Congress MLAs, who had crossed-voted in the recent Rajya Sabha polls, for defying a party whip to vote in favour of the government on cut motion and the finance bill (Budget) in the state assembly.

Cabinet okays ₹75K-cr rooftop solar scheme

New Delhi: The government Thursday approved a rooftop solar scheme, PM-Surya Ghar: Mufti Bijli Yojna, with an outlay of ₹75,021 crore, to provide up to ₹78,000 subsidy for the installation of solar plants and 300 units free power for one crore households. Briefing media after the Union Cabinet meeting, Information and Broadcasting Minister Anurag Thakur informed that approval has been given for the scheme for installing rooftop solar and providing free electricity up to 300 units every month for one crore households. "The Union Cabinet, chaired by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, has approved PM-Surya Ghar: Mufti Bijli Yojna with a total outlay of ₹75,021 crore for installing rooftop solar and providing free electricity up to 300 units every month for one crore households," an official statement said.

President approves Kerala Lokayukta Bill

Thiruvananthapuram: President Droupadi Murmu has withheld assent to the three University laws Bills referred to her by Governor Arif Mohammed Khan, but approved the Kerala Lokayukta Bill passed by the state Assembly. The Raj Bhavan in a statement Thursday said that the President has withheld assent to the Kerala University Laws (Amendment No.2) Bill 2022, which aims to replace the Governor from the position of Chancellor of Universities. Besides that, the University Law Amendment Bill, 2022 that aims to increase the members in the Search Committee for the appointment of the Vice Chancellor and the University Law Amendment Bill, 2021 which deals with the Appellate Tribunal issue and other amendments to Technological University, were also denied Presidential assent, it said.

Seven cops booked for beating up lawyers

Lucknow: Police have lodged an FIR against several police personnel, naming seven of them, for allegedly beating up some lawyers and implicating them in a false case here. According to the FIR, the lawyers had gone to have dinner at the Summit Building February 23 where Sub-Inspector Rahul Balyan came upon receiving information regarding a fight between two other people. Lawyers Abhishek Singh Chauhan, Rohit Rawat, Abhishek Pandey and Mukul Singh along with others filed a complaint at the Vibhuti Khand police station Wednesday night alleging that they were brutally beaten and humiliated by several police officers in the Vibhuti Khand area of Gomti Nagar, it said.

14 killed, 20 injured as pick-up vehicle falls into valley in MP

Dindori: At least 14 persons were killed and 20 others injured when a pick-up vehicle overturned and fell into a deep valley in Madhya Pradesh's Dindori district Thursday, a police official said. The accident took place near Badjhar Ghat at around 1.30 am when the vehicle's driver lost control over the wheels while negotiating a blind turn. The vehicle then fell into a 40-50 feet deep valley. Fourteen persons died on the spot while 20 others were injured, the official said. The deceased included seven men, six women and a minor boy, as per the police. President Droupadi Murmu and Prime Minister Narendra Modi expressed grief over the incident.

Leap day babies don b'day hats after four-year wait

New Delhi, Feb 29: Birthdays are special, and what when they come only once in four years? Well, the day then just takes on that extra sparkle. As it has this Thursday, when 'leaplings', the special few born February 29 the world over are celebrating -- and being celebrated -- just that little bit more.

Every four years, the world receives an extra day from the calendar gods. The rarest of the days to be born on has given India its former prime minister Morarji Desai and Bharatanatyam dancer Rukmini Devi. Adding that edge of cool is a bit of fiction too -- Superman, the Man of Steel, was born on this day, according to DC comics.

Jigyasa Pant is no Superman, or Superwoman either, but she has been waiting four years for this day and feels as special as the superheroes. Celebrations, she said, start early for the 'leap day baby'.

Pant, a placement executive at Indraprastha Engineering College in Ghaziabad, usually celebrates her birthday February 28 and/or March 1. But if it's a leap year, it begins

right from January 1. "Each day is kind of a celebration in a leap year. People start texting me from January 1 that this is my birthday year. It is extra special to keep receiving wishes and blessings for two whole months," Pant told PTI. The 32-year-old will be turning eight this year, a few more years before she enters her teenage years at the age of 52!

Supreme Court lawyer Prachiti Behere was born the same day -- and year. Behere said she uses her birthdays to break ice and reach out to new people.

WHAT EXACTLY IS A LEAP YEAR? According to US space agency NASA, it takes approximately 365.25 days for Earth to orbit the Sun -- a solar year. The extra quarter of a day is generally rounded off in a calendar year.

To make up for the missing partial day, one day is added to the calendar approximately every four years. That is a leap year. Without the existence of a leap year, the world could end up witnessing wuthering winters in July or sultry summers in December. The excitement doesn't wane with the passage of time.

SL signs security pact with US

Colombo: Sri Lanka has signed a nuclear security pact with the United States to detect and interdict illicit trafficking in special nuclear material and other radioactive material, as part of the efforts to address the growing global security threats. The Sri Lankan Navy signed the Memorandum of Understanding with the US National Nuclear Security Administration at the Navy headquarters here Wednesday. The MoU was signed in the presence of the US Ambassador to Sri Lanka, Julie Chung and the Commander of the Sri Lanka Navy, Vice Admiral Priyantha Perera, according to media reports Thursday.

Sharif takes oath as ordinary lawmaker

Islamabad: Three-time former Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif Thursday took oath as an ordinary lawmaker in the 16th session of Pakistan's National Assembly, days after giving up his bid to lead the country for a record fourth time. A quirk of fate following the poor show in the electoral battle led Nawaz, 74, the supremo of the PML-N party to abandon his claim to the Prime Minister's position to his younger brother Shehbaz, 72.

Three killed

Copenhagen (Denmark): A freight train hit and killed three people at a railway crossing at a station in central Sweden after they got off another train, police said Thursday. The victims crossed the tracks without seeing the freight train approaching, Felicia Davidsson, a spokesperson for the Swedish Transport Administration, told broadcaster SVT.

Death toll crosses 30K

MORE THAN 100 PEOPLE WERE KILLED THURSDAY

Rafah (Gaza Strip), Feb 29: Israeli troops fired on a crowd of Palestinians waiting for aid in Gaza City Thursday, witnesses said. More than 100 people were killed, bringing the death toll since the start of the Israel-Hamas war to more than 30,000 according to health officials.

Hospital officials initially reported an Israeli strike on the crowd, but witnesses later said Israeli troops opened fire as people pulled flour and canned goods off of trucks. Israeli officials acknowledged that troops opened fire, saying they did so after the crowd approached in a threatening way. The officials insisted on anonymity to give details about what happened, after the military said in a statement that "dozens were killed and injured from pushing, trampling and being run over by the trucks".

Gaza City and the surrounding areas in the enclave's north were the first targets of Israel's air, sea and ground offensive, launched in response to Hamas' October 7 attack. The area has suffered widespread devastation and has been largely isolated during the conflict. Trucks carrying food reached northern Gaza this week, the first major aid delivery to the area in a month, officials said Wednesday.

Aid groups say it has become nearly impossible to deliver humanitarian assistance in most of Gaza because of the difficulty of coordinating with the Israeli military, ongoing hostilities and the breakdown of public order, with crowds of desperate people overwhelming aid convoys. The

UN says a quarter of Gaza's 2.3 million Palestinians face starvation; around 80% have fled their homes. Kamel Abu Nahel, who was being treated for a gunshot wound at Shifa Hospital, said he and others went to the distribution point in the middle of the night because they heard there would be a delivery of food. "We've been eating animal feed for two months," he said.

He said Israeli troops opened fire on the crowd, causing it to scatter, with some people hiding under cars. After the shooting stopped, people went back to

the trucks, and the soldiers opened fire again. He was shot in the leg and fell over, and then a truck ran over his leg as it sped off, he said. Alaa Abu Daiya, another witness, said Israeli troops open fire and also that a tank fired a shell. Medics arriving at the scene Thursday found "dozens or hundreds" lying on the ground, according to Fares Afana, the head of the ambulance service at Kamal Adwan Hospital. He said there were not enough ambulances to collect all the dead and wounded and that some were being brought to hospitals in donkey carts. One man — who gave only his

first name, Ahmad, as he was being treated at a hospital for gunshot wounds to the arm and leg — said he lay down on the ground for two hours before someone with a horse-pulled cart had room to take him to Shifa.

In addition to at least 104 people killed, around 760 were wounded, Health Ministry spokesman Ashraf al-Qidra said. The Health Ministry described it as a "massacre."

Separately, the Health Ministry said the Palestinian death toll from the war has climbed to 30,035, with another 70,457 wounded. It does not differentiate between civilians and combatants in its figures but says women and children make up around two-thirds of those killed.

The ministry, which is part of the Hamas-run government in Gaza, maintains detailed records of casualties. Its counts from previous wars have largely matched those of the UN, independent experts and even Israel's own tallies.

The Hamas attack into southern Israel that ignited the war killed 1,200 people, mostly civilians, and the militants seized around 250 hostages. Hamas and other militants are still holding around 100 hostages and the remains of about 30 more, after releasing most of the other captives during a November ceasefire.

The increasing alarm over hunger across Gaza has fuelled international calls for another cease-fire, and the US, Egypt and Qatar are working to secure a deal between Israel and Hamas for a pause in fighting and the release of some of the hostages.

Putin warns West

Moscow, Feb 29: Russian President Vladimir Putin vowed Thursday to fulfil Moscow's goals in Ukraine and sternly warned the West against deeper involvement in the fighting, saying that such a move is fraught with the risk of a global nuclear conflict.

Putin's warning came in a state-of-the-nation address ahead of next month's election he's all but certain to win, underlining his readiness to protect Russian gains in Ukraine.

In an apparent reference to French President Emmanuel Macron's statement earlier this week that the future deployment of Western ground troops to Ukraine should not be "ruled out", Putin warned that it would lead to "tragic" consequences for the countries who decide to do that.

Putin noted that while accusing Russia of plans to attack NATO allies in Europe, Western allies were "selecting targets for striking our territory and selecting the most efficient as they think striking assets and talking about the possibility of sending a NATO contingent to Ukraine".

"We remember the fate of those who sent their troop contingents to the territory of our

country," the Russian leader said. "Now the consequences for the potential invaders will be far more tragic."

Speaking before an audience of lawmakers and top officials, Putin said the West should keep in mind that "we also have the weapons that can strike targets on their territory, and what they are now suggesting and scaring the world with, all that raises the real threat of a nuclear conflict that will mean the destruction of our civilisation".

"Don't they understand it?" he said, alleging that Western leaders are playing with options of deeper involvement in the conflict, as in a simulation. "Those people haven't been through any tough challenges and they have forgotten what war means."

The strong statement followed earlier warnings from Putin, who has issued frequent reminders of Russia's nuclear might since he sent troops into Ukraine in February 2022 as he sought to discourage the West from expanding its military support for Kyiv. Putin emphasised that Russia's nuclear forces are in "full readiness," saying that the military has deployed potent new weapons, some of them tested on the battlefield in Ukraine.

Pak's new lawmakers sworn in amid protests

Islamabad, Feb 29: Pakistan's newly-elected lawmakers were sworn in Thursday during Parliament's maiden session amid vociferous protests by the supporters of jailed former Prime Minister Imran Khan alleging massive vote rigging during the elections.

The National Assembly was summoned after President Dr Arif Alvi's initial refusal due to differences with the caretaker government over the issue of Khan's party-backed candidates not being allotted the reserved seats. The opening session of the 16th Parliament, headed by the outgoing Speaker of the previous Parliament, Raja Pervaiz Ashraf, began after a delay of more than an hour. The general elections were held February 8 and the National Assembly should meet within 21 days after the day of polling, according to the Constitution.

Ashraf administered the oath to the newly-elected lawmakers amidst unruly scenes as 71-year-old Khan's PTI-backed lawmakers chanted slogans against alleged vote rigging in the February 8 general elections.

According to a notification issued by the National Assembly Secretariat later, the new Parliament would elect the next Prime Minister Sunday. It stated that the candidates for the election of the Prime Minister will have to submit their nomination papers by March 2 and their examination will also take place at three o'clock on the same day.

PML-N has announced the name of Shehbaz Sharif for the post of Prime Minister, who has the support of the Pakistan People's Party (PPP), Muttahida Quami Movement Pakistan (MQM-P) and other parties.

On the other hand, PTI announced the name of Omar Ayub Khan as the candidate to compete against Shehbaz. Earlier, outgoing Speaker Ashraf administered the oath to at least 302 members out of a total strength of 336 because the Election Commission of Pakistan has not yet decided on the allocation of reserved seats to the Sunni Ittehad Council (SIC) which swelled its ranks after PTI-backed independently elected members joined it.

Dubai, Feb 29: Iran holds a parliamentary election Friday seen as a test of the clerical establishment's popularity at a time of growing dissent over an array of political, social and economic crises.

The vote will be the first formal gauge of public opinion after anti-government protests in 2022-23 spiralled into some of the worst political turmoil since the 1979 Islamic Revolution. Critics from inside and outside the ruling elite, including politicians and former lawmakers, say the legitimacy of Iran's theocratic system could be at stake due to economic struggles and a lack of electoral options for a

mostly young population chafing at political and social restrictions.

Iran's top authority, Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, has called voting a religious duty. He accused the country's "enemies" — a term he normally uses for the United States and Israel — of trying to create despair among Iranian voters.

The commander of the country's elite Revolutionary Guards, Hossein Salami, said Wednesday that "each vote is like a missile launched at the enemy's heart". But Iranians still have painful memories of the handling of nationwide unrest sparked by the death in custody of a young Iranian-Kurdish woman in 2022, which was quelled by a violent



state crackdown involving mass detentions and even executions.

Economic hardships pose another challenge. Many analysts say that millions have lost hope that Iran's ruling clerics can resolve an economic crisis fo-

mented by a combination of US sanctions, mismanagement and corruption. While establishment supporters will likely vote for hardline candidates, widespread public anger at worsening living standards and pervasive graft

may keep many Iranians at home. Prices for basic goods like bread, meat, dairy and rice have skyrocketed in past months. The official inflation rate stands at about 40%. Analysts and insiders put it at over 50%. The US 2018 withdrawal from Iran's 2015 nuclear deal with six world powers, and its reimposition of sanctions, have hit Iran's economy hard. Efforts to revive the pact have failed.

Iranian activists and opposition groups are distributing the Twitter hashtags #VOTENoVote widely on social media, arguing that a high turnout will legitimise the Islamic Republic.

With heavyweight moderates and conservatives staying out of Friday's race and reformists

calling it an "unfree and unfair election", the vote will pit hardliners and low-key conservatives against each other, all proclaiming loyalty to Iran's Islamic revolutionary ideals.

The interior ministry said 15,200 candidates will run for the 290-seat parliament, with a vetting body called the Guardian Council approving 75% of initially registered hopefuls. The unelected Guardian Council, made up of six clerics and six legal experts generally within Khamenei's orbit, has the authority to scrutinise laws and election candidates. Ballots will mostly be counted manually, so the final result may not be announced for three days, although partial results may appear sooner.

SoftBank slashes stake in Paytm

Bangalore: Japan's SoftBank Group has further reduced its stake in beleaguered Indian payments firm Paytm to 2.83% from 5.01%, an exchange filing showed Thursday. The conglomerate, which held 17.5% stake in Paytm in September 2022, has trimmed its ownership for more than a year through multiple open market deals, with its most recent cut being in January. While some global investors like Warren Buffett's Berkshire Hathaway and China's Alibaba Group exited the firm in 2023, others, including a Netherlands-based unit of Chinese fintech firm Ant Financial cut their stake. Shares of Paytm were down 3.4% in afternoon trade. The stock has fallen 48.5% and lost around ₹234 billion in value since the Reserve Bank of India January 31 ordered the company to wind down its banking arm citing persistent non-compliance with regulations.

Adani's EBITDA hits ₹79K-cr in 2023

New Delhi: Adani Group Thursday said pre-tax profit or EBITDA of its portfolio companies that span from apples to airports soared 34 per cent to ₹79,000 crore in the 12-month period ended December 2023 - 2.5x of EBITDA in financial year 2021. EBITDA of ₹78,823 crore in 2023 is compared with ₹58,653 crore pre-tax profit in the previous year, it said in a statement. "The growth was powered by the highly stable core infrastructure platform. Growing at 35.5 per cent, it generated ₹66,208 crore (\$8 billion) - 84 per cent of portfolio EBITDA," it said.

GDP grows sharply at 8.4%

India's economy grew by better-than-expected 8.4% in the final three months of 2023 - the fastest pace in one-and-a-half years

New Delhi, Feb 29: India's economic growth accelerated to 8.4 per cent in the October-December quarter of this fiscal, mainly due to double-digit growth in manufacturing and good showing by mining & quarrying and construction sectors.

The GDP (gross domestic product) growth was 4.3 per cent in the October-December 2022 quarter, according to the data released by the National Statistical Office (NSO) Thursday.

The manufacturing sector's output, as per the gross value added in the third quarter of this fiscal, grew by 11.6 per cent compared to a contraction of 4.8 per cent in the year-ago period.

Mining and quarrying grew at 7.5 per cent in the third quarter, up from 1.4 per cent a year ago.

The construction sector kept the growth momentum at 9.5 per cent against the same growth rate in the year-ago period.

However, the output of the farm sector declined by 0.8 per cent during the quarter compared to a growth of 5.2 per cent a year ago.

The national accounts data showed electricity, gas, water supply, and other utility services segment has grown by 9 per cent year-on-year against an 8.7

Key infra sectors' growth slows to 3.6% in January

New Delhi, Feb 29: The growth of eight key infrastructure sectors slowed to a 15-month low of 3.6 per cent in January, on account of poor performance of sectors like refinery products, fertiliser, steel and electricity, according to the official data released Thursday.

The growth of eight core sectors - coal, crude oil, natural gas, refinery products, fertiliser, steel, cement and electricity - was 4.9 per cent in December.

It was 9.7 per cent in January 2023. The previous low level of growth rate was recorded at 0.9 per cent in October 2022.

Cumulatively also, the growth rate in the output of these sectors slowed down to 7.7 per cent as against 8.3 per cent in April-January 2022-23.

The output growth of refinery products and fertiliser was in the negative zone. And the pace of increase in the output of coal, steel, and electricity decelerated during the month under review.

However, crude oil, natural gas, and cement production recorded positive growth in January.

The eight core sectors contribute 40.27 per cent to the country's Index of Industrial Production (IIP).

Fiscal deficit touches 63.6% of revised aim

FOR 2023-24, GOVT'S FISCAL DEFICIT IS ESTIMATED AT ₹17.35L-CR OR 5.8% OF GDP

New Delhi, Feb 29: The government's fiscal deficit at ₹11 lakh crore at January end touched 63.6 per cent of the revised annual target, according to the official data released Thursday.

In the corresponding period last year, the fiscal deficit or gap between the expenditure and revenue was 67.8 per cent of Revised Estimates (RE) of the Union Budget 2022-23.

The government's total receipts stood at ₹22.52 lakh crore (81.7 per cent of corresponding RE 2023-24 of total receipts) as of January 2024, according to the data released by Controller General of Accounts (CGA).

This comprised ₹18.8 lakh crore tax revenue (net), ₹3.38 lakh crore of non-tax revenue and ₹34,219 crore of non-debt capital receipts.

Non-debt capital receipts consist of the recovery of loans and miscellaneous capital receipts.

The total expenditure incurred by the Centre was ₹33.54 lakh crore (74.7 per cent of corresponding RE 2023-24), out of which ₹26.33 lakh crore is on

revenue account and ₹7.2 lakh crore on capital account.

As per the CGA data, ₹8,20,250 crore has been transferred to state governments as devolution of share of taxes by the central government up to this period, which is ₹1,52,480 crore higher than the previous year.

Out of the total revenue expenditure, ₹8,21,731 crore was on account of interest payments and ₹3,15,559 crore on major subsidies.

The Prime Minister Narendra Modi-led government in the interim Budget refrained from announcing populist measures, which is expected to help it trim the fiscal deficit to 5.1 per cent of the GDP next fiscal and 4.5 per cent in FY26.

The nominal GDP growth for the next financial year has been pegged at 10.5 per cent against the 11 per cent estimated earlier.

The nominal GDP as per budget estimate 2024-25 has been projected at ₹3,27,71,808 crore, assuming 10.5 per cent growth over the estimated nominal GDP of ₹2,96,57,745 crore, as per the First Advance Estimates of FY2023-24.

In a bid to be self-reliant in semiconductors, Union Cabinet gives green light to three chip-manufacturing units at an investment of ₹1.26L-cr


New Delhi, Feb 29: The Union Cabinet Thursday approved setting up three semiconductor-making units by firms, including Tata Group and Japan's Renesas, at an investment of ₹1.26 lakh crore as part of an attempt to cut India's dependence on imports to meet requirements of chips.

The units which will make chips for sectors including defence, automobiles and telecommunications, will begin construction within the next 100 days, Telecom Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw told reporters after the cabinet meeting.

The three units will be set up under the 'Development of Semiconductors and Display Manufacturing Ecosystem' programme that provides government support of up to ₹76,000 crore.

Tata Electronics Pvt Ltd will set up a semiconductor fab in partnership with Taiwan's Powerchip Semiconductor Manufacturing Corp at Dholera in Gujarat. The plant will have a capacity to produce 50,000 wafers per month and will involve an investment of ₹91,000 crore.

Tata Semiconductor Assembly and Test Pvt Ltd (TSAT) will set up a semiconductor unit in Morigaon, Assam, at an investment of ₹27,000 crore. CG Power, in partnership with Renesas Electronics Corp and Stars

Tata Semiconductor Assembly and Test will set up a semiconductor unit in Morigaon, Assam, at an investment of ₹27,000 crore

In June last year, the Cabinet approved a proposal of Micron for setting up a semiconductor unit in Sanand, Gujarat.

Vaishnaw said the Tata plant at Dholera will produce high-performance computer chips with 28 nm technology for electric vehicles (EV), telecom, defence, automotive, consumer

electronics, display and power electronics.

The unit in Assam will have a capacity of 48 million per day for automotive, electric vehicles, consumer electronics, telecom, and mobile phones. The CG power semiconductor unit will manufacture 15 million chips for consumer, industrial, automotive and power applications.

"Within a very short time, India's semiconductor mission has achieved four big successes. With these units, the semiconductor ecosystem will get established in India. India already has deep capabilities in chip design. With these units, our country will develop capabilities in

semiconductor ecosystem is emerging near the unit, he said. Tata Electronics' partner PSMC is renowned for its expertise in logic and memory foundry segments. FDI inflows plunge 13% to \$32 billion

FDI inflows stood at \$36.74bn during April-Dec 2023 YoY

New Delhi, Feb 29: Foreign direct investment (FDI) inflows in India declined 13 per cent to \$32.03 billion in April-December 2023, dragged down by lower infusion in computer hardware and software, telecom, auto, and pharma sectors, according to the latest government data.

FDI inflows stood at \$36.74 billion during the corresponding nine months of the preceding fiscal.

Inflows during the October-December quarter of the current fiscal, however, rose by 18 per cent to \$11.6 billion as against \$9.83 billion during the same quarter of 2022-23.

The total FDI - which includes equity inflows, reinvested earn-



ings and other capital - declined by about 7 per cent to \$51.5 billion during the period under review against \$55.27 billion in April-December 2022, the data from the Department for Promotion of Industry and Internal Trade (DPIIT) showed.

During the nine-month period of this fiscal, FDI equity inflows decreased from major countries, including Singapore, the US, the UK, Cyprus and the UAE.

Investments fell significantly from the Cayman Islands and Cyprus to \$215 million and \$796 million, respectively, during April-December 2023 as against the two comparative figures of \$624 million and \$1.15 billion recorded in the year-ago period.

However, inflows increased from Mauritius, the Netherlands, Japan and Germany.

Sectorally, inflows contracted in computer software and hardware, trading, services, telecom-

munication, automobile, pharma and chemicals.

In contrast, construction (infrastructure) activities, development and power sectors registered growth in inflows.

State-wise, Maharashtra received the highest inflow of \$12.1 billion during the period. It was \$10.76 billion in the same period a year ago.

Overseas capital inflows in Karnataka plunged to \$3.6 billion in April-December 2023 from \$8.77 billion in the same period of previous fiscal year.

Other states/Union Territories where FDI dipped during the period under review included Delhi, Tamil Nadu, West Bengal, Rajasthan and Haryana.

The inflow, however, recorded a positive growth in Gujarat, Telangana, and Jharkhand.

An official has earlier stated that hardening interest rates globally and worsening geopolitical situation impacted FDI inflows.

Foreign institutional investors (FIIs) offloaded equities worth ₹1,879.23 crore Wednesday, according to exchange data.

Tirkey lauds outgoing CEO Norman

Rourkela, Feb 29: She might have left under acrimonious circumstances, but Hockey India president Dilip Tirkey Thursday praised outgoing CEO Elena Norman, saying that he appreciates the Australian's contribution towards the growth of the sport.

The former captain, however, rejected Norman's claim of factionalism in HI, saying all is well within the federation. "Since taking over, we have done good work and I appreciate it. We have seen the performance of the teams in the past two years. Our CEO has done commendable work for Indian hockey. We appreciate her efforts and contribution," Tirkey said here in a media interaction.

Tirkey's comments came a day after he and Singh issued a joint statement denying Norman's assertion of a rift between them.

Norman resigned Tuesday and in an interview to PTI she alleged that there was factionalism in the body. The 49-year-old Australian suggested that Tirkey and Singh were at loggerheads and also complained of a difficult work environment.

"There are two factions in Hockey India. There is (President) Dilip Tirkey and I and there is (Secretary) Bholanath Singh, (Executive Director) Cdr. R K Srivastava and (Treasurer) Sekar J Manoharan," she had said.

Norman's resignation came close on the heels of Indian women's hockey team coach Janneke Schopman's decision to quit. She also complained of a difficult work environment.



The Dutch coach had accused HI of giving step-motherly treatment to women's hockey.

But Tirkey lauded Schopman's contribution and vowed to provide all possible help to the women's team to make a fresh start. "The women's team did well in 2023. The girls have done really well. They won the 2023 FIH Nations Cup. Their performance has been good in the Asian Champions Trophy and Asian Games as well."

"They played well in the Olympic Qualifier too but it was purely bad luck. But I have been making a note where we made mistakes, and what demands we couldn't fulfil in time, we are assessing," the former India captain said.

The HI chief said the federation's main focus right now is on preparing the men's team for a



podium finish at the Paris Olympics.

"The men's team has already qualified, and we now are thinking of how they can perform better (in Paris)," Tirkey said. "Side by side, the women's team is also on our mind. We are working on how to make better future plans for them."

New Delhi, Feb 29: Senior India batter KL Rahul will not feature in the fifth and final Test against England in Dharamsala owing to an injury while pace spearhead Jasprit Bumrah will return to the team, the BCCI said Thursday.

Rahul, who continues to feel sore in his right quadriceps, has travelled to London to get an expert opinion on his injury. The wicketkeeper-batter became unavailable after the series-opener in Hyderabad in January and as per the BCCI, he was 90 per cent fit before the third Test in Rajkot earlier this month.

"Mr KL Rahul, whose participation in the final IDFC First Bank Test was subject to fitness, has been ruled out of the fifth and final Test in Dharamsala. The

BCCI Medical Team is closely monitoring him and coordinating with specialists in London for further management of his issue," the Board said in a release.

Meanwhile Bumrah, who was released from the squad for the fourth Test in Ranchi in line with the team's workload management policy, will link up with the squad in Dharamsala for the final Test, beginning March 7. India have already taken an unassailable 3-1 lead, following the victory in the fourth Test in Ranchi.

Rahul's absence from the final Test means Rajat Patidar remained with the squad but the MP batter can't be sure of his place in the playing eleven, having aggregated only 63 runs in six innings. All-rounder Washington Sundar has also

been released from the squad. "He will join Tamil Nadu - his Ranji Trophy side - for their Ranji Trophy Semi-final fixture against Mumbai, starting March 2nd, 2024. He will join the India squad after the completion of the domestic fixture for the fifth Test, if need be," the BCCI said.

Rahul needs to be fully fit before the IPL where he will lead Lucknow Super Giants and is expected to bat in the middle order to bolster his chances of making the India squad for the T20 World Cup in the USA and the Caribbean.

It is the same quadriceps injury that had sidelined Rahul for almost four months last year. Having got injured during the IPL, Rahul returned to action during the Asia Cup in September last and made in-

stant impact. In the Test tour of South Africa last year, Rahul was the only century-maker for India in the drawn series.

The BCCI also said senior pacer Mohammed Shami is recovering well after undergoing a surgery February 26 for his right heel problem. "He is recovering well and will soon head to the National Cricket Academy (NCA) in Bengaluru to commence his rehabilitation process," the Board said of Shami.

Bangalore, Feb 29: Delhi Capitals braved a sensational battering from Smriti Mandhana to hand a fighting Royal Challengers Bangalore a 25-run defeat in their Women's Premier League (WPL) match here Thursday.

Mandhana fused power and grace to score 74 (43b, 10x4, 3x6) but other batters did not quite make it big as RCB, who were without indisposed star all-rounder Elysse Perry, ended up at 169/9. The Capitals made a challenging 194/5 as Shafali Varma mustered a 31-ball 50

(3x4, 4x6) after they were asked to bat first.

But that total was under severe threat when Mandhana tore into the DC attack with panache. They went off the blocks in an energetic fashion as Mandhana took it upon herself the task of leading her side's reply.

Mandhana faced 28 balls in the powerplay segment and hammered 45 runs as the home team reached an impressive 52 for no loss after six overs. Sophie Devine just had to watch all the fun from her end as Mandhana reached her first-ever WPL fifty in just 32 balls. But the Kiwi batter soon fell to pacer Arundhati

Reddy (2/38) as her top-edged pull ended in the hands of Jess Jonassen.

However, Mandhana continued her aggressive ways and smoked Marizanne Kapp (2/35) over mid-wicket for a six. But the veteran South African had the last laugh as she uprooted the off-stump with a slower delivery that beat Mandhana's tentative swish.

Thereafter the task only grew steeper for RCB as left-arm spinner Jess Jonassen (3/21) produced an excellent spell. RCB lost six wickets for 18 runs at that stage.

Earlier, Verma and Alice Capsey (46, 33b, 4x4, 2x6) added 82 runs for the second wicket as the Capitals recovered from the early loss of skipper Meg Lanning. Kapp (32, 16b, 2x4, 3x6) and Jonassen (36 not out, 16b, 4x4, 2x6) also played blunders towards the end to give a fillip to the Capitals as they added 58 runs for the fifth wicket in a little over four overs.

Verma, who was dropped on two by Shreyanka Patil off pacer Renuka Singh, and Capsey went about their task shifting seamlessly through the gears. Verma gave a lot of steam to DC innings. But she fell while pulling Shreyanka straight into the hands of Georgia Wareham at mid-wicket.

Bhubaneswar, Feb 29: Odisha FC registered a 2-1 victory over East Bengal FC to consolidate their position at the top of the Indian Super League (ISL) table here Thursday.

The sailing wasn't as smooth for the home side though, with East Bengal FC winger Vishnu Puthiya making heads turn by notching the fastest goal by any player in the current ISL season to break the deadlock in the 33rd second of the match.

Right after the kick-off, Vishnu went dazzling down the right flank, picking the ball on the edge of the box, cutting into the middle, beating Jerry Lalrinzuala and outmanoeuvring Carlos Delgado before launching an instinctive shot beyond Odisha FC goalkeeper Amrinder Singh to put his side ahead.

East Bengal FC had a fantastic chance to sustain the pressure secured through this early lead. However, their influence in the proceedings began waning as Odisha FC recovered from the early setback by playing to their strengths, with the striking duo of Roy Krishna and Diego Mauricio sustaining pressure upfront and capitalising on their prowess from set pieces.

Mauricio had a shot from outside of the box swirling over the post in the 14th minute, but his tricky footwork came to the rescue, helping him earn a spot-kick as fullback Mohammad Rakip challenged to recover possession from him in the 38th minute.

Mauricio stepped up and drilled the ball powerfully at the



top right corner to equalise scores and bag his seventh goal of the campaign. It was also the third penalty that he converted in ISL 2023-24, demonstrating his proficiency from 12 yards out, and helping him get on the scoresheet especially during a phase of the season when his Fijian counterpart Roy Krishna has outperformed him slightly.

That momentum carried on for Odisha FC in the second essay of the game, and it was Ahmed Jahouh who swung into the thick of things to help his side bag the winner. He has been a stalwart of the ISL, securing success with three different clubs, and on Thursday night he equalled his teammate Krishna to become the player to assist the second most number of goals (24) after Hugo Boumous (32) in the history of the competition.

All of this came, courtesy of a corner kick in the 61st minute, with his delivery landing in the path of former FC Goa star Princeton Rebello, who had started the game for Odisha FC. Rebello reached the delivery and flicked it into the back of the net from a position where Prabsukhan Singh Gill could do nothing to thwart the goal, thus resulting in East Bengal FC facing their seventh loss of the ISL campaign.

Similarly, about the Schopman issue he said, "the women's hockey cannot be allowed to suffer. Under her coaching the team won many championships and qualified for the Pro League for the first time."
