63% polling in biggest phase

The 2024 general elections, the world's biggest democratic exercise, began Friday with millions voting to elect 102 MPs across 21 states and Union Territories in the first of the seven phases. In the high stakes political battle the ruling BJP is aiming for a hattrick, while the Opposition parties have called it a fight for the very survival of democracy in the country. With nearly 63 per cent polling reported till 9 pm, the fate of eight Union ministers, two former chief ministers, one former governor and several key leaders has been sealed in EVMs amid stray incidents of violence.

New Delhi, April 19: A voter turnout of nearly 63 per cent was recorded in the first phase of Lok Sabha elections covering 102 seats across 21 states and Union Territories amid sporadic incidents of violence at some places and an accidental explosion of a grenade launcher shell in Chhattisgarh that left a CRPF jawan dead.

The Election Commission said polling for the first and biggest phase of the seven-phase elections remained largely peaceful. Voters braved the heat in most parts while at some places, they

Chief Minister Neiphiu Rio Friday affirmed that the state government does not have any problem with the Eastern Nagaland People's Organisation's (ENPO) demand for FNT as it has already recommended autonomous powers for the region. The ENPO is the apex body of seven tribal organisations of the eastern region.

FIRING IN MANIPUR

Imphal: Incidents of intimidation and firing were reported from at least two places in Inner Manipur constituency during voting for the Lok Sabha polls, officials said Friday. At Thamnapokpi under Moirang constituency in Bishnupur district, armed men fired several rounds in the air near a polling booth prompting voters to flee, police said, adding additional security personnel were rushed to the spot to contain the situation. Unidentified armed men also intimidated election agents of a particular political party at different places and asked them to leave the polling stations, they said.

Tamil Nadu, where the BJP is trying to make inroads, was among the seven states and three Union Territories where polling was held for all seats. Assembly elections were also held simultaneously in Arunachal Pradesh and Sikkim. The tentative figure at 9 pm of voter turnout of 62.37 per cent is likely to go upwards when reports from all polling stations are obtained, the EC said, adding voters reaching polling stations till the end of polling hour are allowed to cast their vote.

Violence in Bengal

Kolkata: Sporadic incidents of violence marred the first phase of Lok Sabha polls in Bengal's three parliamentary constituencies, with a 77.57 per cent voter turnout till 9pm and several injuries reported as TMC and BJP workers clashed mostly in the violence-prone Cooch Behar seat. The TMC and BJP lodged around 100 and 50 complaints respectively, which are related to poll violence, voter intimidation, and assaults on poll agents in the initial hours of polling, as claimed by sources from both parties. Most complaints originated from Cooch Behar.

2 killed, 7 missing in Mahanadi boat capsize

Bhubaneswar, April 19: At least two persons were killed and seven others, including four women and three children, were missing as the boat they were travelling in capsized in Mahanadi in Jharsuguda district Friday, police said.

The incident took place when around 50 passengers hailing from Kharsia area in neighbouring Chhattisgarh were returning in the boat after visiting a temple in Patharseni Kuda in Bargarh district.

The boat capsized as it was about to reach Sarada Ghat in Rengali police station in Jharsuguda district, a police officer said.

Local fishermen rescued 35 passengers and brought them

to the riverbank, he said, adding that police and fire services personnel rescued seven more passengers. Seven other passengers are

still missing and a search operation has been launched, the police officer said. "The missing persons com-

prised four women and three children. The search and rescue operation will continue till the last person is located, Northern Range IG Himansu Lal said. The IG said four teams have been formed and at least five scuba divers along with two underwater search cameras have been deployed in the search operation.

Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik has announced an ex-gratia amount of ₹4 lakh for the next of kin of the deceased.

Nearly half of China's major cities are sinking

Singapore, April 19: Nearly half of China's major cities are suffering 'moderate to severe' levels of subsidence, putting millions of people at risk of flooding especially as sea levels rise, according to a study of nationwide satellite data released Friday

The authors of the paper, published by the journal Science, found 45 per cent of China's urban land was sinking faster than 3 mm per year, with 16 per cent at more than 10 mm per year, driven not only by declining water tables but also the sheer weight of the built environment.

With the country's urban population already in excess of 900 million, "even a small portion of subsiding land in China could



stantial threat to urban life,' said the team of researchers led by Ao Zurui of the South China

Normal University Subsidence already costs China more than 7.5 billion yuan (\$1.04 billion) in annual losses, and within the next century, nearly a quarter of coastal land could actually be lower than sea

levels, putting hundreds of millions of people at an even greater risk of inundation.

"It really brings home that this is for China a national problem and not a problem in just one or two places," said Robert Nicholls at the Tyndall Centre for Climate Change Research at the University of East Anglia. "And it is a microcosm of what is happening around the rest of the

The northern city of Tianjin, home to more than 15 million people, was identified as one of the worst-hit. Last year, 3,000 residents were evacuated after a 'sudden geological disaster' that investigators blamed on water depletion as well as the construction of geothermal wells.

Many of China's old coal districts have also suffered as a result of over-mining, with authorities often forced to inject concrete into the crumbling shafts to reinforce land.

The problem is not limited to China. A separate study published in February said around 6.3 million square km of land across the globe was at risk. Among the worst-hit countries is Indonesia, with large parts of the capital Jakarta now below sea level. Nicholls said vulnerable cities could learn lessons from Tokyo, which sank by about 16 feet until it banned groundwater extraction in the 1970s.

"Subsidence mitigation should be looked at very seriously, but you can't stop all of it so you are talking about adaptation and building dykes," he added.

Of the 44 major coastal cities suffering from the problem, 30 were in Asia, according to a 2022 Singapore study. "It is a problem of urbanisation and population growth - larger population density, more water extracted. (and) more subsidence," said Matt Wei, a geophysics expert at the University of Rhode Island.

Infosys founder's 5-month-old grandson to earn ₹4.2cr dividend

₹28 per share. Murthy had gifted 15 lakh shares to Ekagrah valued at a staggering ₹240 crore at that time, making the five-month-old the youngest millionaire shareholder of India's second-largest IT company. Thursday, the Infosys board recommended a final dividend of ₹20 per share and additionally a special dividend of ₹8 per share for financial year 2024.

"With this, the total payout over FY20-FY24 will be 85 per cent of free cash flow, in line with our capital allocation policy announced earlier," Infosys

said in its Q4 earnings release. The record date for the purpose of the annual general meeting and payment of final dividend and special dividend is May 31, 2024. The dividend will be paid July 1, 2024, Infosys informed.

Back-of-the-envelope calculations show that with the dividend at the rate of ₹28 per share, youngest millionaire Ekagrah is set to earn ₹4.2 crore. Ekagrah - the third grandchild of Naravana Murthy - is the sonof Rohan Murty and his wife Aparna Krishnan.

In a petition, the party mentioned that some locals put a poser before Law Minister -Jagannath Saraka over drinking water scarcity during his visit to Bissam Cuttack under the Muniguda area in Rayagada district recently.

"At this time, some people, who were accompanying the minister, attacked the locals. The minister remained a mute spectator. Though five days have passed since the victims filed a complaint, the police have not taken any action yet," the BJP petition alleged.

The saffron party said that police inaction is a clear violation of the model code of conduct.

The party demanded that stringent action be taken against the minister, attackers, and the police at the earliest.

The BJP delegation led by party spokesperson Satyabrata Panda also informed the CEO that some policemen, affiliated to the Havildar Sangha, were seen holding BJD flags and singing the song 'Naveen Babu, Ame Tuma Fan' (Naveen Babu, we are your fan).

'We expect an impartial role of police during the elections," Panda said.

Balasore man held in 3 qtl marijuana haul

Bhubaneswar, April 19: The Commissionerate Police Friday arrested a notorious narcotics smuggler and recovered a whooping three quintals of marijuana (ganja) which he was supposed deliver to receivers in neighbouring Jharkhand.

Interestingly, the police said Rahul Sethi, the alleged smuggler, was intercepted with the narcotics consignment in his car when he was on his way to meet his three associates lodged in the Jharpada jail.

A senior officer at the anti-nar-

cotics cell of the City police, which made the detection, said apart from the narcotics consignment having street value of around Rs 3 lakh, the cops have also seized two cars (used for peddling drugs) Rs 14,000 and three mobile phones of Sethi, a native of Balasore.

Assistant Commissioner of Police (ACP) Sarat Kumar Sahoo said Sethi had been evading arrest since long. During interrogation, the police learnt that he had procured the Marijuana consignment from Chitrakonda area of Malkangiri, and was supposed to deliver it to some peddlers in Jharkhand

Sahoo said the anti-narcotics cell sleuths were tipped off about Sethi's movement early Friday and accordingly laid a trap near Pahala area. Upon spotting his car, the waiting police team stopped the vehicle and swiftly rounded up Sethi. During a search of the vehicle, the contraband was found concealed in hidden chambers below the seats.

During interrogation, Sethi allegedly told the police that he had planned to meet his associates-Rajesh Das, Ravi Shankar Das and Kishore Prasad Das at Jharphada Jail. They are all natives of Jharkhand and presently lodged at the jail in some offence. The cops are still trying to find out why would Sethi take the risk of visiting the prison inmates with a massive consign ment of narcotics in his car.

Meanwhile, Sahoo said Sethi was in touch with narcotics syndicates in big cities such as Delhi, Mumbai, Kolkata and Hyderabad. He would splurge his earnings from the crime on luxury hotels and vacation trips.

The incident occurred at around 12.45 am when Saroj Jena, a sports journalist with the daily, was returning home from office.

Jena said the three men crashed their scooter on him from behind near a SBI ATM kiosk on the Kalpana-Badagada road when he was walking towards his home in Badagada Brit Colony. "I protested and asked them to drive carefully. Hearing this, the trio halted the scooter and drove towards me aggressively. They parked the scooter, and while two of them

held me tightly, the other hit me repeatedly on the head with a brick," Jena said in his complaint to the Badagada police.

The attackers then fled the spot, leaving Jena bleeding profusely. Later, a PCR van took an injured Jena to Capital Hospital.

Jena had suffered seri ous head injuries, apart from injuries to other parts of his body.

Sources in Badagada police station said the three attackers, who were said to be locals, have been identified. And efforts are on to

ompeii is shining a light on mysterious rites of ancient Rome thanks to terracottastyle solar roof tiles installed on one of its most famous villas.

The traditional-looking tiles have solar photovoltaic cells inside, allowing the UNESCO World $\,$ Heritage Site to preserve its aesthetics while generating clean energy to illuminate its frescoes.

And though the project is in its early stages, experts say the tiles could one day help historic city centres across Italy turn green.

The tiles look exactly the same as the ancient (Roman) ones. found in archaeological sites cities across the Mediterranean, Pompeii director Gabriel Zuchtriegel told AFP.

"But while Pompeii is a unique site due to its vast size and complexity ... I hope this will not be a unique project," said Zuchtriegel, who wants the site near Naples to be a real-life lab for sustainability.

The scheme weds emerging technologies with an extraor-

How ancient Roman tiles are helping Pompeii to power a villa dinary mural unearthed in 1909 under deep layers of volcanic ash at the Villa of the Mysteries, which was buried along with the rest of the city when Vesuvius

erupted nearly 2,000 years ago. The mural depicts female devotees of Dionysus -- the god of wine and revelry -- engaged in mysterious rites.

They have intrigued scholars for decades, with some historians suggesting they are evidence that the lady of the villa was a priestess whose slaves took part in cult rituals.

Terracotta varnishes

The fresco, which covers three walls and is one of the best preserved in Pompeii, is illuminated by special LED lights designed to bring the deep red, purple and gold images to life, while not damaging the painted

The lights are powered by electricity generated by the solar panels, which were installed in October: Ahlux, the Italian com-



pany behind the lights, patented the system in 2022 and produces both curved and flat panels varnished in terracotta tones

The solar panels on the villa's roof are flat and lie between traditional ceramic curved tiles.

They cover 70 square metres (750 square feet) of roof, produce a maximum of 13 kilowatt-hours and are linked to an ecologicallyfriendly sodium battery, according to project manager Alberto Bruni. Pompeii, which gets over 15 hours sunlight a day in peak summer, intends to extend their use to other villas in the archaeological site, he said.

Augusto Grillo, the founder of Ahlux, said the tiles are about five percent less efficient than a traditional solar panel.

"This nominal loss is compensated however by the fact that our panels heat up less in summer," while traditional ones

are covered by glass, and can lose efficiency on very hot days, he said. "The performance ends up being very similar," he said.

Red-tiled cities

Various institutions have expressed interest in the tiles, from Rome's MAXXI modern art museum to the 17th century Pinoteca Ambrosiana museum in Milan, Grillo said.

The problem is finding the funds," he said, adding that many of Italy's famous historic buildings are public or owned by Catholic institutions.

The cost is a bit more than the price of a new roof and traditional panels put together -though the solar tiles, which last between 20 to 25 years, serve double duty, because they function as a roof too, Grillo said.

Project manager Bruni said the cost of the panels "is coming down", meaning they may be able to play a part in the wider

ecological transition. Italy is under pressure to make red-roofed cities such as Florence or Bologna greener as part of efforts to combat climate change.

The European Union aims to reduce carbon emissions by 55 percent compared with 1990 levels by 2030, and will have to upgrade existing buildings to do so.

That is a mammoth challenge for Italy, where some 60 percent of buildings are in the worst two energy categories, compared to 17 percent in France and six percent in Germany, according to Italian Constructors Association ANCE

"There needs to be some national and perhaps European co-investment to make sure that the very, very ambitious timelines have a chance of being respected," Angelica Donati, president of the youth constructors' association ANCE Giovani, told AFP.

"We have the most beautiful cities in the world, which means we need much more thoughtfulinterventions, and quickly. There's a lot to be done".

Bhubaneswar, April 19: Boudh in western Odisha recorded the highest temperature in the state at 44.3 degrees Celsius, followed by 44.2 degrees Celsius in Baripada.

The weather office had issued an Orange Warning for 18 districts and Yellow Warning for five other districts.

Ten other stations registered maximum temperature at or above 43 degrees Celsius, including Jharsuguda (43.8), Angul (43.7), Titlagarh (43.5), Bolangir, Bhawanipatna, Malkangiri and Navagarh (43).

As many as 32 places recorded maximum temperature at or above 40 degrees Celsius.

Bhubaneswar recorded the maximum temperature of 41.4 degrees Celsius, while it was 42.6 degrees Celsius in neighbouring Cuttack city.

The IMD has forecast that

heatwave conditions will prevail in Odisha till April 21.

'The maximum temperature is very likely to be 40 degrees Celsius or above at most places and above normal by 3 to 5 degrees Celsius in some districts over the next two days," the IMD said in a bulletin.

The IMD also said the state may expect some relief from the heatwave conditions due to thunderstorms from Saturday.

The IMD predicted that the prevailing heatwave conditions would continue in the state for at least the next four days.

"We expect the peak phase of the heatwave within the next two days, with temperatures reaching 45 degrees Celsius at some places like Angul, Kalahandi, Jharsuguda, Bolangir, Boudh and Navagarh," weather scientist Umashankar Das said.

IF AI STEALS OUR JOBS, WHO'LL BE LEFT TO BUY STUFF?

ech titans Google, Microsoft, IBM, Cisco and SAP employment websites along with professional services major Accenture, among others, formed a consortium to explore the impact of Artificial Intelligence (AI) on IT job roles.

The joint effort will enable workers to find and access relevant training programmes and, according to the companies, is expected to help more than 95 million people around the world

over the next 10 years. The jobs that AI can do are multiplying by the day. While this may be frightening for some workers, economics, which is often called the 'dismal science', does offer a rosy outlook. While advancements in AI potentially herald a future with no limits on production and income, the implications for workers, may not be as scary as initially feared.

(economists call this 'general equilibrium'), all resources of capital and labour combine to produce all goods and services. Technology then boosts productivity, removing the limits set by resource constraints. However, a study of consumer demand (so-called microeconomics) says that consumption depends on an individual's income, and only 'labour' consumes.

The crux is this: Increased productivity is ultimately pointless if there is no market for the goods and services being produced. Author Ruchir Sharma has argued that no country can grow faster than the rate of growth of its population. Since India has a large population where consumers are expected to grow for the next decade or so, the focus of global managers seems justified.

ical Keynesian response. Yet, after the COVID-19 pandemic, global growth, according to the International Monetary Fund, slowed from an estimated 6.1 per cent in 2021 to 3.4 per cent in 2022 and 2.8 per cent in 2023.

So here is the conundrum. In developed countries, technological change, particularly AI, seems to indicate no limits on production. On the other hand, the future seems to lie with countries with large populations but limited purchasing power. Consumption requires not only income, as economist JM Keynes rightly noted, but also another critical element: time. Yet, more than time-saving technology is needed to solve the problem.

There are two potential solutions.


One is to shift consumers to where the income is generated or advanced technology is available by allowing for immigration (a political no-no). The second is to shift the production base to where consumers are in abundance via foreign direct investment which combines production, technology and global sourcing of resources. This is why emerging

market economies matter. Returning to the original question of what workers will do when technological miracles do all the work - Amazon suffered embarrassment in running "just walk out" stores with no employees when it emerged earlier this month that a thousand or so workers sitting in India were remotely doing much of the work ascribed to AI. Amazon may however eventually succeed in running such stores without so many humans being involved.

But what if there is no one to enter such stores and buy from them? The limits to growth in the visible future seem to lie not in capital and technology but in people. So, with big apologies to Marx - people of the world procreate, you have nothing to lose except global stagnation.

The oustees recall the humble yet easy life they were living in their villages. Residents of Banchhorpali, Gadashankar, Dunguripali, Podhamunda, Koindapali and Bijapati under Loisingha block had never known such scarcity of water with Suktel river flowing nearby. They had their own wells and ponds in their backyard and tube wells in their houses.

But today, they are living a miserable life after being displaced. Their new address is

Rehabilitation Colony in Kusmel about 15km from the district headquarters of Bolangir.

For the past nine months, 32 homeless families have been living there in temporary houses with tin roofs. In the absence of any source of drinking water, they have to walk every morning and evening about one-anda-half kilometres to Phatabahal village to collect water. In the scorching summer now, they have to visit Phatabahal at least six times every day.

Women of the houses and some schoolchildren walk the long distance every day to collect water. The tube well in the rehabilitation colony has run dry adding to their woes. Despite repeated demands to supply water through tankers, the administration has remained silent. The displaced have alleged

that they have been cheated. Neither the administration nor the politicians lend an ear to listen to their grief.

With the mercury rocketing, the temporary tin houses are turning unbearably hot with temperatures beyond 44-45 degrees Celsius making life difficult. People are living under the trees all day instead of staying in the temporary houses.

The administration provided assistance of up to ₹5 lakh to the displaced families before they were rendered homeless They were promised homestead land, pucca houses, and guaranteed employment. However it appears, all such hopes of the helpless oustees have fallen victim to the administration's dementia. The children of the displaced have not seen blackboards for the last nine months. There is no school near the colony.

A few days ago, District Collector Gaurav Shivaji Isalwar visited the Lower Suktel Temporary Rehabilitation Colony and promised to solve the basic problems. However, drinking water is yet to reach them. As per sources, rehabilitation colonies in Jhankarpali, Kusmel, Gedabanji and other locations are suffering also from grave drinking water problems.

INTACH initiated a passion project to revive this dying tradition, selecting four villages in Lamtaput block and providing looms and assistance to the villagers.

Bhubaneswar, April 19: INTACH's Odisha chapter has unveiled the Kerang Fabric project with an aim to revive the age-old heritage and ancient tradition of the Gadabas of Koraput.

At an event held in Bhubaneswar to mark World Heritage Day, Thursday, Gadaba tribal women, dressed in Kerang sarees, showcased the revival of this ancient tradition.

The use of handwoven clothes made from Kerang fiber by the Gadaba and Bonda tribes has a long history and holds a significant place in their culture and mythology. Women from these tribes wear clothes crafted from the bark of the Kerang plant, which

grows in the wild. Tribal men and women collect the bark, soak it in water from nearby hill streams, sun-dry it, and extract the fiber. They then use various vegetable dves before weaving them into patterns that have been followed for

Gadaba women typically wear fulllength cloth or sarees adorned with colourful stripes, covering their entire bodies, while Bonda women wear a small piece of cloth called 'Ringa', which wraps around the lower part



of the body in a specific customary

These vibrant fabrics can last for generations, with a usable life span of a century. Weaving the Kerang fabric is a rite of passage for every Gadaba girl; she wears it during her marriage and is also draped in it

when she passes away. However, this ancient tradition was dwindling. In INTACH's 2020 study, it was discovered that hardly any villages had existing looms, and none of the Gadabas were engaged

The project was spearheaded by INTACH's Odisha State Convener, AB Tripathy, a retired IPS officer, who proposed it to INTACH's headquarters in Delhi. After approval, Sanjib Chandra

Hota, a retired IAS officer, led the project along with other INTACH members PC Mahapatra, Convener of the Koraput Chapter, Anil Dhir, and Rajendra Padhee.

The team interacted with Gadaba tribesmen in different villages through workshops and open discussions.

The report was released by Justice Sashikanta Mishra, a judge of the High Court of Orissa, in the presence of Vandana Manchanda, Head of INTACH's Heritage Crafts and Community Division.

Hota, the Project Leader, stated that the Koraput district administration and the Odisha government have agreed to provide proper and adequate support to ensure that this ancient tradition of the Gadabas does not vanish.

Damning Indictment

n a significant development in a more than decade-old Case, the Supreme Court has handed a major victory to the Delhi Metro Rail Corporation (DMRC) by overturning its earlier directive. Previously, the apex court had ordered DMRC to pay an arbitration award of ₹8,000 crore to Anil Ambani's firm, Delhi Airport Metro Express Ltd (DAMEPL).

The court's reversal is a damning indictment of the arbitral process, citing a "huge miscarriage of justice". Consequently, the execution proceedings in the Delhi High Court were halted, and DMRC was absolved of the obligation to make the exorbitant payment. Moreover, the court directed the refund of amounts already deposited by DMRC,

aiming to restore both parties to their pre-verdict positions. The legal dispute originated from a "concession agreement" dating back to 2008, governing the construction, operation and maintenance of the Delhi Airport Metro Express Line. Tensions escalated when DAMEPL terminated the contract in 2012, claiming "unresolved structural defects by DMRC". In the ensuing legal battle, DAMEPL won in 2017, leaving DMRC with an exorbitant liability of ₹8,000 crore-plus to be paid to the Anil Ambani firm. Now, that

But the ruling does underscore one important aspect for us to ponder: the unpredictability and complexity inherent in arbitration disputes involving government entities and private firms. A case that dragged on for 12 years also shows how slow and meandering the judicial processes in India. Even more significantly, it prompts serious reflection on the accountability and transparency of government babus in presenting their case effectively and fairly, especially in matters of public interest and significant financial implications.

Forest officers call for probe into colleague's death

Indian Forest Service (IFoS) officers are deeply troubled by the re-

cent suicide of a colleague in Meghalaya. The Chief Conservator of Forests, N. Luikham, tragically took his own life by hanging in his official residence recently. This unfortunate event has sparked a demand from the central unit of

the IFoS Association for a thorough probe into the circumstances leading to Luikham's death, and for accountability for those who may have contributed to his decision.

Sources informed DKB that the association Secretary General Suneesh Buxy has written to Meghalaya Chief Secretary Donland Phillips Wahlang, claiming that Luikham had been falsely accused by a junior colleague last month of sexually harassing her and was under stress and mental trauma because of these allegations. Buxy, reportedly, attributed these allegations to pressure from a powerful mining lobby against whom Luikham had taken a stand. Despite an inquiry yielding no substantive evidence against the officer, the damage to his reputation had been done.

The ramifications of the officer's death are felt deeply by the entire IFoS community, resonating as a blow to the morale of officers nationwide. The association has called for a CBI investigation into Luikham's suicide. The officer's erstwhile colleagues insist on swift and decisive action to hold accountable any individuals found to have played a role in perpetuating the circumstances that led to the tragedy.

EC puts pressure on Gujarat govt to fill key IPS positions

The Election Commission of India (ECI) has put the spotlight on the Guiarat government. With the nomination for 26 Lok Sabha seats and five Assembly seats underway, the poll panel has directed the state government to swiftly submit a list of IPS officers to fill vacant positions in the state immediately.

This move comes in the wake of the model code of conduct being enforced, which mandates that state governments seek the Election Commission's approval before making any appointments or promotions. Such measures aim to prevent any undue influence on the elec-

The vacancy situation in key posts, including the Surat Police Commissioner and three range Inspector Generals, along with positions like Superintendent of Police of Kheda and Mehsana, has been lingering for more than two months. The delay, observers say, is attributed to various factors, such as four IPS officers proceeding on Central deputation last year and five officers being placed on leave reserve by the Election Commission due to their extended postings in a single Lok Sabha constituency for three years.

Of course, another factor for the delay, which is obviously not mentioned, is that senior Guiarat government appointments are made only after a green signal from the Prime Minister's Office (PMO). But now with the Election Commission at the helm, the appointments will be implemented swiftly.

WORLD BANK'S CHALLENGES

COUNTRIES ARE GENERALLY NOT COMPENSATED FOR THE CARBON STORED IN THEIR FORESTS, AND THUS LACK THE **WILL OR ABILITY TO CONSERVE THEM**

e are two of the 25 members of the World Bank's Board of Executive Directors, which collectively represents 189 member countries with divergent interests. So. in addition to holding management accountable, we perform the difficult balancing act of building global consensus on a day-to-day basis. When members see eye to eye, the World Bank is a global public good (GPG) - one of the few places where all countries can strive to find common ground.

But ever since the Bank launched its recent reform process in late 2022, divisions between the Global North and Global South have threatened to weaken an organization accustomed to decision-making by consensus. The main point of contention is how, given scarce development finance, the World Bank can help countries eradicate poverty, boost shared prosperity, and protect their people and natural assets from transboundary crises such as climate change and pandemics. After all, there cannot be one (poverty eradication and shared prosperity) without the other (protection of the global commons) it must be all or nothing.

Nevertheless, we made important progress: a new vision and mission, a redesigned corporate scorecard, \$50 billion in new lending capacity, innovative new funding instruments for raising additional donor contributions, an expanded crisis, and a new approach to creating and disseminating knowledge.

But a central question remained unanswered: Should the Bank use its core product - financing - to nudge countries toward investments and reforms that supply GPGs? On one hand, underinvestment in GPGs, which tend to be complex and costly to deliver, is widespread. For example, countries are generally not compensated for the carbon stored in their forests, and thus lack the will or ability to conserve them. And yet, encouraging such investment is divisive because it necessarily disincentivizes

other types of spending.

Last week, we answered that question by approving a groundbreaking Framework for Incentives. Financial Recognizing the potential methodological pitfalls, members approached the question with care, especially because this would be the first time that the use of contributions to the Bank's balance sheet would be ring-fenced in this way.

The Framework will allow donors making new voluntary financial contributions to the World Bank to earmark them for projects that generate positive cross-border externalities Crucially, funds will be ringfenced for GPGs only for a defined period, after which the funds will be added to the World Bank's general lending pool.

Coalescing around four principles helped us reach consensus on this new instrument. First, financial incentives are crucial to increasing investment in GPGs. While the poorest countries have access to grants and interest-free loans through the World Bank's **International Development** Association, middle-income countries borrow on non-concessional terms.

In recent years, member countries have used more than a third of their financing from the World

Bank to invest in projects that deliver GPGs. But initiatives that benefit the global community are often passed over in favor of those that meet domestic needs. This must change. If the aim is to promote investments and reforms that have positive cross-border effects, then the global community should bear at least some of the cost.

Second, the Bank's funding model must be updated to encourage voluntary contributions. Whereas fresh contributions to multilateral development hanks (MDBs) such as the World Bank have declined over the past decade, funding for specialized "vertical funds" has surged by 95%. The Bank needs innovative funding instruments that offer donors a clearer line of sight between their contributions and the end results, which is one reason why vertical funds have been so successful at raising money.

At the same time, the Bank must retain its multilateral character and protect client countries' "ownership" of their investments. The trade-off between providing accountability to donors and allowing client countries to set their own strategies provoked the longest debate among the Board

A consensus emerged that donors will contribute to a unified platform for GPGs jointly governed by all shareholders, as opposed to earmarking their contributions for specific projects, which has historically contributed to fragmentation and ineffectiveness. Allocations will then be made according to a transparent framework for defining and measuring cross-border externalities. With this approach, the Bank can help tackle urgent global challenges while retaining its credibility and effectiveness.

Lastly, delivering more GPGs must be integrated with the broader goals of sustainable development and poverty eradication, so that they reinforce each other. After lengthy negotiations, the board members have decided that uncommitted funds and reflows from donor contributions earmarked for the GPG platform will revert to the Bank's general lending pool after the agreed commitment period.

This design provides clients additional financing for domestic development needs and ensures clear accountability for GPG investments during the initial stage. Moreover, such an instrument will not undermine calls for a general capital increase, which is still urgently needed and remains the most financially efficient, inclusive, and sustainable way to recapi talize the World Bank.

In the long run, there is no conflict between financing GPGs and eradicating poverty - on the contrary, if we fail on one, we will fail on the other. As World Bank President Ajay Banga put it, "we cannot endure another period of emission-heavy growth." That is why the Bank, having taken an important step toward making its financial model fit for "eradicating poverty on a livable planet," must continue along the path of reform.

Make foreign policy a poll issue

COMMUNICATION BETWEEN POLITICAL PARTIES - RULING AND THE **OPPOSITION IS ESSENTIAL IN A DEMOCRACY**

rime Minister Narendra Modi said in an interview that elections in India are festivals of our democracy. It is true that across the country, people are in a festive mood and are excited about exercising their fundamental right. An avid political commentator had put it in different, slightly derisive words, "Indian politics is electionised not much democratised". His observation pointed to elections round the year in some part of the country or the other. As India has three-tier governance – Centre, states and local governments, elections for any one of the tiers is happening somewhere in the country throughout the year.

Obviously, several issues and features of Indian politics come up during elections. The issues that matter to voters, and the features, mainly the organising principles, are manifested during elections. But does foreign policy issues figure in the campaigns of political parties, at least the national parties? From the reports in the press, opinion polls, voters' surveys, it is evident that foreign policy is not a priority. This contradicts with India's aspirations of becoming a Vishwa Guru or a Vishwa Bandhu.

Before we scan the issues in the manifestoes of the political parties, we should learn why voters are not interested in foreign policy. Indian voters like those in many developing countries do not have much interest in internationalism for a variety of reasons. I will list only a few. Many Indians, for lack of adequate resources, cannot travel and explore the world. Second, the lack of enough international outlook many people in India do not comprehend that international communities comprising both state and non-state actors influence

each country in multiple ways. The external influence over the countries has intensified under the ongoing process of globalisation. So far, the global outlook has been the prerogative of the big powers - Europeans, Americans and Russians. This is because of their superior economic and military might. Chinese and Indians are new entrants. Ironically, China has the resources but not many likeable ideas that will enable it to play

a credible international role. India has the ideas drawn from its rich civilisation and enduring democracy, but lacks resources. Also, India, a vast country with the biggest population in the world, consisting of 28 states, is like the European Union of 27 countries. Both Union of India and the European Union get too embroiled in their internal matters with little enthusiasm and energy left for internationalism.

Foreign policy making is left to an elite club of bureaucrats and so-called experts. Voters hardly influence the making of foreign policy. New Delhi like Brussels fails to realise that playing an international role will enhance the internal strengths. It is a truism that foreign policy of any country is a function of its domestic strengths which are also called determinants. An improved international engagement, which New Delhi seems to seek, requires the backing of domestic heft. India, therefore, needs to internationally position itself which is commensurate with its national strengths and strategies.

Communication between political parties – Ruling and the

Opposition is essential in a democracy. Respect for dissent in domestic and foreign policy is a hallmark of a robust democracy. That said, there could be divergent opinions and approaches in policies including the foreign policy.

At any rate, it is advisable to make foreign policy an issue in elections. This will enhance the domestic determinants of India's foreign policy. Political parties should be willing to share their foreign policy strategies with their voters. Before they do so, they need to educate themselves on the world affairs.

Let us note that Prime Minister Modi made a reference to Katchatheevu, an islet between India and Sri Lanka. That is the way to mobilise voters on a foreign policy issue regardless of whether it was the right cause to take up. This is an example of how to use foreign policy in a competitive electoral process. And this is the way to become a world power.

WBCHSE notifies semester system in state-run schools

Kolkata, April 19: The West Bengal Council of Higher Secondary Education (WBCHSE) has issued a notice announcing the adoption of a semester system of education for Classes XI and XII in all state-run and state-aided schools.

In the notification dated April 18, addressed to school heads and teachers, WBCHSE president Chiranjib Bhattacharya said the council is introducing the semester system for class 11 starting from the academic session 2024-25, and for Class XI from the 2025-26 session.

Under the new system, the Higher Secondary or 10+2 course now comprises four parts - semester 1, 2, 3, and 4. Class XI has been redesigned as semester 1 and 2, while Class XII has been restructured as semester 3 and 4, the notice said. The notice, in accordance with the state education policy, encourages schools to offer guidance and opportunities for students to undertake challenging coursework, participate in extracurricular activities, and engage in summer projects with higher educational institutions.

It also recommends internship programmes during summer vacations, allowing students to pursue subjects of their choice by collaborating with corporate firms, publishing houses, and media houses. The education policy, formulated by an empowered committee, has agreed to retain the existing 4+4+2+2 structure, where students spend four years in the foundation stage, followed by another four years in upper primary (preparatory stage), and two years (Classes IX and X) in secondary education

BHAVNAGAR LS SEAT HEATS UP BJP, AAP set for electoral showdown

Bhavnagar, April 19: The stage is set for a fierce contest in Bhavnagar's Lok Sabha constituency as the BJP and the AAP gear up for the forthcoming elections.

This seat is important because it is one of the two constituencies in Gujarat where AAP competes with the BJP.

The BJP has named Nimuben Bambhania, a local leader and former Mayor of Bhavnagar Municipal Corporation as its candidate. Bambhania, who also serves as the BJP prabhari for Junagadh city, has a strong following in the region. particularly among the Koli community.

On the Opposition front, the AAP has fielded Umesh Makwana, the current MLA from Botad.

Makwana, known for his philanthropic efforts, including distributing over six lakh food packets during the COVID-19 lockdown, adds a dynamic edge to the race.

During a visit to Gujarat, Makwana's campaign recently received a boost from Punjab Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann.

Bhavnagar is also a constituency where the Kshatriya community showed their resentment against senior BJP leader Parshottam Rupala.

Tensions flared April 17, dur ing a BJP election meeting in Bhavnagar, marked by the dramatic resignation of Ravirajsinh Gohil, Vice President of the BJP's Yuva Morcha for Talaja Taluka. Gohil went up on the stage and tendered his resignation.

Matters escalated as a group of Kshatriyas displayed black

flags and chanted slogans during Union Minister Mandaviya's speech in the city.

This incident makes Bhavnagar the fifth district in Saurashtra to witness disruptions at BJP election gatherings.

The protests stem from anger within the Kshatriya community over alleged derogatory remarks made by the BJP's Rajkot candidate, Parshottam Rupala,

targeting the community. Bhavnagar, a key district in the southeastern Kathiawar and Saurashtra region, has a rich history dating back to its establishment in 1743 by Maharaja Bhavsinhji. Historically, the Bhavnagar seat has seen varied

political winds. Since 1991, the Bhavnagar Lok Sabha seat has remained a stronghold of the BJP. The constituency encompasses seven Assembly segments: Talaja, Palitana, Bhavnagar Rural, Bhavnagar East, Bhavnagar West, the SC-reserved seat of Gadhada, and Botad.

However, the Congress has also shown significant presence, capturing the seat five times since the first election in 1962. In the most recent 2019 elections, Bharatiben Shiyal of the BJP won with a substantial majority.

Bhavnagar has approximately 17.68 lakh eligible voters, with the Koli caste playing a pivotal role in determining the electoral outcomes.

As candidates from both major parties, along with the AAP's entry into the fray, begin their campaigns, the electorate of Bhavnagar is poised for a pivotal decision that could influence the region's political landscape. IIT Roorkee team finds giant ancient snake fossil in Gujarat


Roorkee, April 19: A team of researchers from the Indian Roorkee, Friday announced the discovery of an ancient snake species, believed to be one of the largest ever to have roamed the Earth around 47 million years ago.

The snake fossil, named Vasuki Indicus, after Vasuki, the mythical snake often depicted around the neck of the Hindu god Shiva, inhabited the region of present-day Gujarat during the Middle Eocene period.

The 11 to 15-metre-long snake belonged to the now-extinct Madtsoiidae snake family but represented a unique lineage from India, said the team of researchers led by Sunil Bajpai and postdoctoral fellow Debajit

The researchers said that the shape and size of these verte-





brae suggest that Vasuki Indicus had a broad and cylindrical body, hinting at a robust and powerful build, and was a stealthy predator. "This discovery is significant not only for understanding the ancient ecosystems of India but also for unravelling the evolutionary history of snakes on the Indian subcontinent," said Sunil Baipai Department of Earth Sciences, IIT Roorkee.

The team found the ancient giant's fossils in the Panandhro Lignite Mine in Kutch, Gujarat. Among these fossils, 27 vertebrae were exceptionally well-preserved, with some even found connected or articulated, like jigsaw puzzle pieces.

'Vasuki Indicus isn't just any snake we're talking about; its size rivals that of Titanoboa, a massive snake that once roamed the Earth and holds the title of the longest snake ever known, the team said.

"It underscores the importance of preserving our natural history and highlights the role of research in unveiling the mysteries of our past," Prof

Firing, EVM damage in Manipur

Imphal/Churachandpur.

April 19: Incidents of firing, intimidation, destruction of electronic voting machines (EVMs) at some polling booths and allegations of booth capturing were reported from conflict-hit Manipur that recorded a turnout of over 68 per cent in the first phase of Lok Sabha polls Friday.

Both the BJP and the Congress accused each other of unleashing violence and breaching the election Model Code of Conduct.

The state which has been reel ing under the conflict of ethnic violence since May last year has traditionally seen a very high voter turnout. In 2019 Lok Sabha polls, the state recorded a turnout of 82 per cent.

Voting took place in two constituencies--Inner Manipur (32 Assembly segments) and Outer Manipur (15 Assembly segments) Friday while polling in the remaining 13 Assembly segments in the Outer Manipur constituency will take place April 26 in the second phase.

"A voter turnout of 68.82 per cent has been recorded. While the Inner Manipur constituency has recorded 72.3 per cent turnout, the poll percentage in Outer Manipur stood at 61.98 per cent,' said Pradeep Kumar Jha, Chief Electoral Officer, Manipur.

Keirao constituency in Imphal East district recorded the high-

est turnout among all the 32 constituencies of Inner Manipur with 83.81 per cent.

For Outer, Chandel which has both Naga and Kuki voters recorded the highest turnout with 85.54 per cent turnout. Kukidominated Henglep in the Churachandpur district recorded an 80.70 per cent voter turnout while Saikul recorded the lowest with just 19.46 per cent.

Chief Minister N Biren Singh's

constituency Heingang recorded an 80 per cent turnout followed by BJP candidate Thounaojam Basanta Kumar Singh's Nambol constituency, which recorded

79.88 per cent. According to sources, incidents of EVMs being destroyed were reported from at least four polling booths by unidentified miscreants in Imphal East and Imphal West

constituency in Imphal East district and a 65-year-old man was also shot at by some unidentified gunmen. There has also been vandalism in at least one more polling station, in Uripok in Imphal West," an official source said.

"He was standing near a polling station when some armed assailants opened fire. He has been taken to a hospital in Imphal for treatment," a police official said.

Booth level officer for Moirangkampu Sajeb, Surbala Devi said, "Suddenly two men came and asked for polling agents of the Congress and the BJP. They took the Congress agent outside by holding his hand. Then the two men fired shots at him from inside the car."

In a separate incident, armed men also fired several rounds in the air near a polling booth in Thamnapokpi under the Moirang assembly constituency in Bishnupur district, prompting voters to flee, police said. They said additional security personnel were rushed to the spot to contain the situation.

Police officials also said that some unidentified armed men intimidated election agents of a particular political party at different places, including Uripok and Iroishemba in Imphal West district, and asked them to leave the polling stations.

Star player Tirkey aims at scoring winning goal for BJD

New Delhi, April 19: Hockey India president, former India captain and Rajya Sabha MP till 2018 star player Dilip Tirkey now aims at scoring a winning goal in the electoral field as the Biju Janata Dal's (BJD) Lok Sabha candidate from Sundargarh constituency, where hockey is not just a sport but a way of life.

Tirkey contested the Sundargarh seat in 2014 but lost to BJP's Jual Oram. Ten years later, the star, who helped put the tribal dominated area on the world hockey map, is confident the result will be different this time and voters will back not just him but Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik who has made such a significant contribution to promoting the sport.

"A lot has changed in the last 10 years. A lot of development work has been done in Odisha, be it in education, health or sports," Tirkey, who has played more than 400 international matches for India, told PTI in an exclusive interview.

'The Odisha government has changed the image of the state by making it a sporting hub of the country with high performance centres, state-of-the-art training facilities and hosting big tournaments. The sports loving people of Sundargarh and Odisha will not forget this while voting," the 46-year-old added.

Tirkey the first from Odisha to play for India seniors in 1995, is a household name in hockeyloving Sundargarh. Seeing a boy from Saunamara village in the district play for India and captain the national team was a game changer. He was the first to make it big globally. Since then, Sundargarh district has produced several players such as Lazarus Barla and Birender Lakra who have represented India at the World Cup and

"Odisha has made itself a strong presence in the world sports map in the last decade. The world's largest hockey stadium, Birsa Munda Stadium, has been built in Rourkela and last year the Men's Hockey World Cup matches were also successfully held there," Tirkey said.

He didn't contest in 2019, when Oram returned as MP from Sundargarh, and was a member of the Rajya Sabha from 2012 to 2018.

Hockey, in Tirkey's view, is an emotional pivot in his constituency which goes to the polls May 20.

"There is a lot of enthusiasm among hockey players in Sundargarh. To further promote hockey in remote areas, 17 astro turfs have been installed in 17 blocks of different districts. Apart from this, many centres have also been built for indoor sports," said the ace full back who has played three Olympics and three World Cup tournaments.

Over the years, the Patnaik-led state government and hockey have become intertwined. Besides the many facilities, the Odisha government in 2018 became the main sponsor of the Indian teams, signing a ₹100-crore deal for five years. In 2021, it renewed the contract for 10 years for an undisclosed sum after India won bronze at the Tokyo Olympics. 

Chhagan Bhujbal opts out in Nashik

Mumbai, April 19: Senior NCP leader and Maharashtra minister Chhagan Bhujbal Friday said he has decided not to seek ticket from the Nashik Lok Sabha constituency so as to end the deadlock over the seat also coveted by the ally Shiv Sena.

The sitting MP from the north Maharashtra constituency, Hemant Godse, belongs to the Shiv Sena led by Chief Minister Eknath Shinde. Speaking at a press conference here, Bhujbal said during the seat-sharing talks with the ruling allies Shiv Sena and BJP, NCP chief and Deputy Chief Minister Ajit Pawar staked claim to the Nashik seat, saying that his party had more MLAs in the region.

'When we were asked about the candidate, the name of former MP (Chhagan Bhujbal's nephew) Sameer Bhujbal was proposed. But (BJP leader) Amit Shah said I should contest even though I had not asked for a ticket." he said.

CM Shinde, however, demanded the seat as the incumbent MP is from his party. Bhujbal added. No decision was taken for three weeks while the opposition MVA's candidate had already started campaigning,

"I asked deputy CM Devendra Fadnavis and state BJP president Chandrashekar Bawankule about the announcement of Sameer Bhujbal's candidature, and both said the BJP leadership wanted me to contest," the senior minister said, claiming that "all sections of society expressed support for my candidature for the development of Nashik" but his name was not an-

nounced. 'To end the deadlock, I have decided to withdraw from the race. The Mahayuti alliance should declare the candidate soon, otherwise we may face difficulty winning the seat," Bhujbal added.

Doordarshan changes flagship logo to saffron

New Delhi, April 19: Doordarshan has changed the logo of its news channel DD News from red to saffron. The logo came into effect April 16. In a social media post, DD news said that their values remain the same and are now available in a new avatar. "Get ready for a news journey like never before. Experience the all-new DD News. We have the courage to put: Accuracy over speed, facts over claims, Truth over sensationalism. Because if it is on DD News,

it is the truth," the post added. This development has drawn condemnation, with some questioning the move. Vijay Thottathil, an Indian National Congress (INC) supporter, said that this was an attempt to saffronise India. "Save India from saffronisation, No Vote for BJP,'

Earlier, Doordarshan has been criticised by the BJP for being a pro-government channel that does not give space for the Opposition. During the 2014 Lok Sabha elections, in which the Narendra Modi government came into power, Doordarshan was accused of censorship by the BJP over an edited inter-



view of Prime Minister Narendra Modi. In fact, Modi himself tweeted, "I feel very sad to see our national TV channel struggling to maintain its professional freedom." Manish Tewari, former Minister of Information and Broadcasting, said that DD's autonomy and editorial decisions were guaranteed by the Parliament.

However, the situation changed significantly after the BJP government came into power. In 2015, the assistant director of Doordarshan was transferred from Ahmedabad to Andaman after the Gujarati channel of the national broadcaster aired a news item regarding Jashodaben, PM Narendra Modi's wife.

Doordarshan telecasted a

Union Home Minister Amit Shah unfurled the national flag at the party headquarters in Delhi. According to guidelines, DD and All India Radio are mandated live coverage to only government events, and not political parties. Doordarshan had not given any other political party, including the Congress, this benefit.

Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman in the same year created a furore after Doordarshan cut into an advertisement during Tyagaraja Aradhana – a musical event honouring Telugu saint-composer Tyagaraja. She said, "Yo @DDNational what! You couldn't wait for a few moments more for the Pancharatna Krithi-s to be completed. Advertisement and more. #Aradhana #Tyagaraja. Thoughtless, in-

Congress approached the Election Commission in 2019 claiming that Doordarshan was giving preferential treatment for the ruling party. When the EC sought complete information on coverage of various political parties and prominent leaders, the network defended the move by stating that Prime Minister Narendra Modi had "high news

In 2020, Doordarshan's decision to dedicate a slot for Sanskrit news programme every day was met with resistance, especially in Tamil Nadu. Political leaders criticised the move, including Tamil Nadu CM MK Stalin, over the preferential treatment given to certain languages.

In 2024, the Union government's decision to telecast the film 'The Kerala Story' on Doordarshan April 5 was met with criticism. Kerala Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan said Doordarshan must not degrade into a puppet that dances to the communal agenda of the Sangh Parivar and demanded the Union government not to use the platform to disparage Kerala.

Yes Bank co-founder gets bail

Mumbai, April 19: A special court here Friday granted bail to Yes Bank co-founder Rana Kapoor in the ₹466.51 crore bank fraud case, paving the way for him to walk out of jail after four years.

Enforcement Directorate (ED) arrested Kapoor in March 2020 in a money laundering case, and he has been booked in eight cases related to fraud at the bank. The banker has now secured bail in all the cases.

Kapoor's lawyer Rahul Agarwal said they were trying to complete the bail formalities to facilitate his release as early as possible.

The court has granted bail to Kapoor in the CBI's case against him and Avantha Group promoter Gautam Thapar for allegedly indulging in criminal conspiracy, criminal breach of trust, cheating and forgery for diversion of public money to the tune of ₹466.51 crore.

Kejriwal rejects 'high-sugar food' charge

New Delhi, April 19: Accusing of being "petty" and "politicis-ing" what he ate, Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal Friday asserted before a court that the food he consumed was in conformity with the diet chart prepared by his doctor and sought insulin to be administered to him in jail.

The embattled politician moved a fresh petition before the court for a direction to the jail authorities to allow him access to insulin to keep his 'alarming' sugar levels under control. Senior advocate Abhishek Singhvi, his counsel, said Kejriwal has not been administered insulin to control his sugar levels since his arrest, terming it "shocking" and "alarming".

"The applicant is suffering from diabetes for the last 22 years. From 2012, he has been administered insulin every day.

From February 1, 2024, under careful medical supervision, the applicant was able to start Insulin Reversal Programme (IRP)' and the administration of insulin was discontinued. Due to arrest. the applicant was unable to follow the said IRP, and was required to be administered insulin," Singhvi said.

"He neither has been able to follow IRP nor being administered insulin to control his blood sugar levels, despite repeated request, leading to alarming increase of his blood sugar levels," he added. The ED had Thursday claimed before the court that Kejriwal was eating food high in sugar like mangoes and sweets every day, despite having type 2 diabetes, to create grounds for medical bail.

Kejriwal's counsel launched a spirited assault on the federal anti-money laundering agency over its claim that the AAP national convenor was eating food laden with sugar so he can fall ill and seek bail on medical

"ED claimed that I want to inget bail. Am I going to risk paralysis to get bail? Whatever food I have is as per the diet chart prepared by my doctor prior to arrest," Senior Advocate

Abhishek Singhvi told the court. New Delhi, April 19: The Supreme Court Friday sought replies of the Centre and the Assam government on a plea challenging the Citizenship (Amendment) Rules, 2024, meant to operationalise and regulate the process of grant of Indian citizenship to non-Muslim migrants who came from Pakistan, Bangladesh and Afghanistan before December 31, 2014.

A bench comprising Chief Justice D Y Chandrachud and Justice JB Pardiwala took note of the submissions of a lawyer representing petitioner Hiren Gohain, a Guwahati resident, and issued notices to the state government and the union ministries of Home Affairs and External Affairs

The top court also ordered that the fresh plea be tagged with those pending on the issue. The latest plea on the hugely contentious issue said, "The uncontrolled influx of illegal migrants from Bangladesh to Assam has caused huge demographic changes in Assam. The indigenous people, who were once the majority, have now become a minority in their own land.'

Recently, the bench, while re-

fusing to stay the operation of the CAA Rules, asked the Centre to respond to the applications seeking a stay on their implementation till the apex court has disposed of the pleas challenging the validity of the Citizenship (Amendment) Act, 2019.

Gohain, in his plea, said the CAA Rules, 2024 are "ultra-vires to the Constitution" as they are "palpably discriminatory, manifestly arbitrary, illegal and against the basic structure of the Constitution'

"It is stated that the impugned Citizenship (Amendment) Rules, 2024 violates the petitioners' fundamental rights guaranteed under Articles 14 (right to equality), 15 (right against discrimination on basis of religion, race, caste etc), 19 (freedom of speech and expression), 21 (right to life and personal liberty) etc of the

Constitution," it said. Gohain said he has filed the plea in his personal as well as in representative capacity of a majority of the indigenous people living in Assam and seeks enforcement of their fundamen-

Raising the issue of "uncontrolled" influx of illegal migrants from Bangladesh to Assam, the plea said it was not a communal issue.

Adultery a ground for divorce, not child's custody: HC

Mumbai, April 19: Adultery can be a ground for divorce but not for granting custody of a child, the Bombay High Court said while granting custody of a nine-year-old girl to her mother.

A single bench of Justice Rajesh Patil April 12 dismissed the petition filed by the man, son of a former legislator, challenging an order passed by the family court in February 2023



granting custody of his daugh-

ter to his estranged wife. The couple tied the knot in 2010, and their daughter was born in 2015. In 2019, the woman claimed that she was removed from their home. The petitioner, however, alleged that his wife had left of her own volition.

The petitioner's counsel, Indira Jaising, submitted to the court that the woman had multiple affairs, and hence, it would not be proper to hand over the custody of the child to her. Justice Patil noted that the allegations of adulterous behaviour would have no bearing or doubt while deciding the matter of the child's

"Not being a good wife does not necessarily mean she is not a good mother. Adultery can be a ground for divorce, however, the same cannot be a ground for not granting custody," the court ob-

The man, in his plea, claimed that it was in the child's best interest to live with him and his parents, as she was not happy with her mother and there were some behavioural changes

Jaising told the court that the authorities at the girl's school had written emails to the petitioner's mother, raising concerns about her behaviour.

The High Court, however, refused to accept this and questioned why the school got in touch with the paternal grandmother when the parents were well-educated.

It noted that the petitioner's mother was a former legislator aspiring to contest the Lok Sabha

"According to me, the school authorities have no reason to inform about the issues relating to the girl to the grandmother, who is a politician, when both the parents of the child are available, well-educated, and in fact, the mother of the child is a doctor, the court said

Justice Patil noted that the girl was only nine, which is a pre-puberty age, and in such custody matters, the court must consider the welfare of the child as paramount. The girl was taken care of by her maternal grandmother, and her academic record during her custody with the mother was also good, he said.

'Therefore, according to me, there is no reason to change the custody from the wife to the husband," the court said.

22 killed in Syria

Beirut: An attack on progovernment fighters by suspected members of the Islamic State group in central Syria killed 22 pro-government fighters, an opposition war monitor and pro-government media reported Friday. Gunmen attacked a bus carrying members of the Quds Brigade, a government and Russian-backed faction of mostly Palestinian fighters in Syria, near the town of Sukhna late Thursday night. Sukhna was once an IS stronghold. There was no immediate claim of responsibility but both the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, a UK-based opposition war monitor, and the progovernment radio station Sham FM said IS was behind the attack

Blow to Trump

Iran plays down Israeli attacks

Two Indian students meet watery grave

London, April 19: Two students from India who were studying at a university in the UK have been killed in a tragic drowning incident at a scenic waterfall in Scotland.

Police Scotland are vet to name the men from Andhra Pradesh in their 20s and a post-mortem is due to take place Friday.

The incident took place at the Linn of Tummel near Blair of Atholl in Perthshire Wednesday night when two men from a group of friends on an outing fell into the water and got into difficulty. The Scottish Fire and Rescue

Service sent boat teams and vessels to assist with the rescue efforts after their friends raised the alarm with the emergency services.

"Around 7 pm on Wednesday, April 17, we received a report of two men, aged 22 and 26 years, in the water at the Linn of Tummel waterfall near Blair Atholl," said a Police Scotland spokesperson.

"Emergency services attended and following searches in the area, the bodies of two men were recovered from the water. Enquiries are ongoing to establish the full circumstances however there would not appear to be any suspicious circumstances surrounding these deaths," the spokesperson said.

Indian Commission in London said the two students from Andhra Pradesh had "drowned in an unfortunate incident" and their bodies were found a little downstream.

US vetoes Palestinian call for UN membership



United Nations, April 19: The United States Thursday effectively stopped the United Nations from recognizing a Palestinian state by casting a veto in the Security Council to deny Palestinians full membership of the world body. It vetoed a draft resolution

that recommended to the 193member UN General Assembly that "the State of Palestine be admitted to membership" of the UN Britain and Switzerland abstained, while the remaining 12 council members voted yes. "The United States continues

to strongly support a two-state solution. This vote does not reflect opposition to Palestinian statehood, but instead is an acknowledgment that it will only come from direct negotiations between the parties," Deputy US Ambassador to the UN Robert Wood told the council.

Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas condemned the US veto in a statement as "unfair, unethical, and unjustified."

Palestinian UN Ambassador Riyad Mansour, at times emotional, told the council after the vote: "The fact that this resolution did not pass will not break our will and it will not defeat our determination. We will not stop in our effort.

The Palestinian push for full UN membership came six months into a war between Israel and Palestinian militants Hamas in the Gaza Strip, and as Israel is expanding settlements in the occupied West Bank, which the UN considers to be illegal.

Addressing the 12 council members who voted in favor of the draft resolution. Israel's UN Ambassador Gilad Erdan said: "It's very sad because your vote will only embolden Palestinian rejectionism even more and make peace almost impossible."

Algeria's UN Ambassador Amar Bendjama argued before the vote that admitting Palestinians to the United Nations would strengthen rather than undermine the two-state solution, adding: "Peace will come from Palestine's inclusion, not from its exclusion.'

The Palestinian Authority, headed by Abbas, exercises limited self-rule in the West Bank. Hamas ousted the Palestinian Authority from power in Gaza in 2007.

Hamas condemned the US stance in a statement and called on the international community to "support the struggle of our Palestinian people and their legitimate right to determine their destiny.'

Not sending any election observers to India, says US Washington: The US is not sending any election observers to

India but is eager to continue to deepen and strengthen its cooperation with partners in India, the State Department has said. "I'm not aware of the United States sending any observers. We generally don't, in the case of advanced democracies like in the case of India," Vedant Patel, Deputy Spokesperson of the State Department told reporters at his daily news conference Thursday. "We of course are eager to continue to deepen and strengthen our cooperation with our partners in India. And we're just going to let the election play out," he said. The 2024 Lok Sabha polls kicks off Friday with voting for 102 seats spread across 21 states and Union territories in the first of the seven



phases of the world's largest electoral exercise. Responding to a question, he welcomed the idea of world leaders, including Prime Minister Narendra Modi, playing a role in peace in either the Russia-Ukraine conflict or the war in Gaza. "In the context of Russia, Ukraine, if any country is interested in using its voice to further deter Russian aggression on the people of Ukraine, we certainly would welcome that," he said. "In the current ongoing context in Gaza, any country that believes that they can play a positive role in helping us get to a release of hostages, helping us get additional humanitarian assistance into Gaza, helping to defeat Hamas, they certainly should and are welcome to play that role," Patel said

Brazil's President creates two new indigenous territories



Sao Paulo: President Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva Thursday announced the creation of two new Indigenous territories for Brazil, bringing the total number of new reserves during this term to 10. The Cacique Fontoura reserve will be in Mato Grosso state and the Aldeia Velha territory will be in Bahia state. They will cover a combined total area of almost 132 square miles (342 square kilometers). Speaking at a ceremony in Brasilia, Lula's said Indigenous peoples should be patient as he seeks to fulfill his pledge of creating 14 new territories. Lula's predecessor, Jair Bolsonaro, had encouraged widespread development of the Amazon - both legal and illegal - and made good on his pledge to not demarcate

a single centimeter of additional Indigenous land. Lula took office in 2023 pledging to change that, but Indigenous rights activists hoped he would move faster. Last year, he demarcated six territories in April and two more in September.

Moscow's missiles kill 8 Ukrainians

Kyiv, April 19: Ukraine's air force claimed Friday it shot down a Russian strategic bomber, but Moscow officials said the plane crashed in a sparsely populated area due to a malfunction after a combat mission.

Neither claim could be independently verified. Previous Ukrainian claims of shooting down Russian warplanes during their more than two-year war have met with silence or denials from Moscow.

Meanwhile, Russian missiles struck cities in the central Dnipro region of Ukraine, killing eight people, including a 14-year-old girl and 8-year-old boy, and injuring 28, local officials said.

Ukraine President Volodymyr Zelenskyy repeated Kyiv officials' almost daily appeals for more Western air defense systems, again drawing a parallel with how Israel blunted a recent Iranian attack.

Missile and drone attacks can be thwarted, he wrote on social platform X: "This has been demonstrated in the skies over the Middle East, and it should also work in Europe."



New Delhi, April 19: Retirement fund body EPFO registered over 19 per cent growth year-on-year to 1.65 crore members in 2023-24, as per the latest payroll data, showing improvement in the employment situation in the

"In last 6 and half years alone, more than 6.1 crore members joined the EPFO (Employees' Provident Fund Organisation) fold, indicating formalisation of the job market," a labour ministry official told PTI.

The data shows that the EPFO had added 61.12 lakh net subscribers in 2018-19, which increased to 78.58 lakh in 2019-20. However, it dipped to 77.08 lakh in 2020-21, mainly due to the pandemic effect and improved again to 1.22 crore in 2021-22 and 1.38 crore in 2022-23.

The official informed that the net subscribers addition by the body increased by over 19 per cent to 1.65 crore in 2023-24 com-

pared to 1.38 crore in 2022-23. The net addition in EPFO subscriptions is an indicator of the extent of formalisation of the job market, and the coverage of social security benefits to the organised/semi-organised sector workforce, the official opined. The biggest advantage of EPFO

The data released Friday showed that the foreign currency portion of the reserves fell by as much as \$6.51 billion in the week ended April 12.

However, there was an increase of \$1.24 billion in the value of gold assets held by the RBI which cushioned the fall of the forex kitty.

Central banks have also been buying gold in recent months as an investment in safe-haven assets amid geopolitical uncertainties triggered by the Middle East conflict. India's foreign exchange reserves had gone up by \$2.98 billion during the week ended April 5 to scale a new alltime high of \$648.562 billion.

New Delhi, April 19: InterGlobe Enterprises, the parent company of India's top airline IndiGo, and US-based Archer Aviation will launch an all-electric air taxi service in India in 2026, that will carry passengers from Connaught Place in the national capital to Gurugram in Haryana in just 7 minutes.

The 200 planes, each having 12 rotters, will cost around \$1 billion.

The cost of the seven-minute flight operated with the company's five-seater eVTOL (electric vertical takeoff and landing) aircraft from Connaught Place to Gurugram in Haryana could be around ₹2,000 to 3,000, according to Archer Aviation executives.

Archer Aviation Founder and CEO Adam Goldstein Friday said discussions are going on with the US regulator Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and the certification process for its aircraft is at an advanced stage.

The certification is expected next year and once that is in place, the process will be initiated for the certification by the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA).

In an interview with PTI in the national capital, Goldstein said the company expects to start flights in India in 2026 and aims to have 200 of its Midnight planes for the operations.

Initially, Archer Aviation will be focusing on Delhi, Mumbai and Bengaluru. With its flight,



Late arrival costs Punia, Sujeet dearly

While both Punia and Kalkal eventually managed to reach Bishkek after being stranded at the Dubai international airport due to incessant rain and flooding, they could not report for the mandatory weigh-in on time, according to sources. The sources added that the organisers did not allow late weigh-in despite



request from the Indian coaches. Punia (86kg), who had come

close to winning a medal at the Tokyo Games, and Sujeet (65kg), were on their way to Bishkek to participate in the Asia Olympic qualifiers — the second-last qualifying event for Paris Olympics - when a majority of the flights leaving Dubai got cancelled or delayed because of the flooding of the airport.

The duo, accompanied by Russian coach Kamal Malikov and physio Shubham Gupta, were forced to sleep on the floor and had no access to proper food due to the rain-induced crisis in Dubai.

'They were stuck at the Dubai airport since April 16 and it seems the chance of qualifying for Paris Olympics is slipping out of their hands as they are scheduled to compete tomorrow. They are not getting any flights to Bishkek. I am worried about them, Dayanand Kalakal, Sujeet's father, had told PTI Thursday.

Deepak and Sujeet were training in Dagestan, Russia from April 2 to 15 and decided to fly from Makachkala to Bishkek via Dubai. The last chance to qualify for Paris will be World Qualifiers in Turkey in May.
