

## **NHAI** hikes tolls across NHs by 5%

New Delhi, June 2: Motorists using expressways will have to shell out more from Monday as the National Highways Authority of India (NHAI) has decided to hike tolls across the country by an average of 5 per cent.

The annual revision of highway user fee, which is expected to be in the range of average 5 per cent, was earlier to come into effect April 1. But the hike was deferred due to the Lok Sabha elections. "The new user fee will come

into effect from June 3, 2024," a senior NHAI official said Sunday. The change in toll fee is part

of an annual exercise to revise the rates that are linked to the changes in the wholesale price index (CPI)-based inflation.

There are around 855 user fee plazas on the national highway network on which user fee is levied as per the National Highways Fee (Determination of Rates and Collection) Rules, 2008. Out of these, around 675 are public-funded fee plazas and 180 are operated by con-


# SKM sweeps Sikkim; BJP retains Arunachal

Gangtok/Itanagar, June 2: Both the Himalayan states --Sikkim and Arunachal Pradesh -- which went to Assembly polls April 19, re-elected incumbents to their Houses with landslide wins as votes were counted Sunday.

Led by its president and CM Prem Singh Tamang, the Sikkim Krantikari Morcha (SKM) Sunday returned to power in Sikkim for the second consecutive term by a sweeping victory, winning 31 seats in the 32-member assembly. Tamang won from two seats, and his party bagged 58.38 per cent of the votes polled. The SKM had won 17 seats in the 2019 assembly polls.

The opposition Sikkim Democratic Front (SDF), which ruled the state for 25 years in a row till 2019, could manage to secure only one seat, while its president and former CM Pawan Kumar Chamling, who is Tamang's mentor-turned-adversary, lost in the two seats he contested. The 73-year-old eightterm legislator will not be seen in the assembly for the first time since 1985.



The BJP contested in 31 assembly seats but failed to win even a single one in Sikkim where it had 12 members in the outgoing House. The BJP could secure only 5.18 per cent of the votes in the Himalayan state. Like the BJP, the Congress also failed to open its account and secured a paltry vote share of 0.32 per cent which is even less than that of NOTA (0.99 per cent).

PM Narendra Modi hailed Tamang and the SKM for the victory. "Congratulations to SKM and CM @PSTamangGolay for their victory in the Sikkim Assembly Elections 2024. I look forward to working with the State Government to further the progress of Sikkim in the coming

times," Modi said in a post on X. Responding to the Prime Minister's post, Tamang thanked him. "Your unwavering support has been a driving force for us, and we look forward to your continued guidance and blessings,' Tamang replied on X.

In Arunachal Pradesh, the BJP won for the third time in a row and bettered its tally in the House bagging four more seats compared to 2019 as it secured 46 seats in the 60-member assembly.

In sweeping the assembly elections, the BJP decimated the Opposition parties, especially the Congress which was relegated to the fifth position with only one seat after NPP (5), NCP (3) and PPA (2). Three seats went to Independent candidates.

Chief Minister Pema Khandu asserted that the momentum of what happened in the 'Land of the rising sun', a sobriquet for Arunachal Pradesh, will spread to other parts of the country June 4 when votes for the Lok Sabha elections will be counted.

"This is a historic occasion for the BJP and entire Arunachal Pradesh. The people of Arunachal Pradesh have declared that they want BJP to stay in power for the next five years. This time, the mandate is more than what we got in 2019. In the 2019 Assembly polls, BJP won 41 seats, while we have won 46 seats this time," Khandu told PTI Video.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi congratulated the people of Arunachal Pradesh for the landslide win.

'Thank you Arunachal Pradesh! The people of this wonderful state have given an unequivocal mandate to politics of development. My gratitude to them for reposing their faith in @BJP4Arunachalyet again. Our Party will keep working with even greater vigour for the state's growth," Modi said in a post on X.

New Delhi, June 2: Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal Sunday surrendered at the Tihar jail here after his interim bail granted by the Supreme Court in the excise policy-linked money laundering case ended

He was granted the relief by the top court for campaigning in the Lok Sabha elections.

Before surrendering, Kejriwal paid homage to Mahatma Gandhi at the Raj Ghat, offered prayers at the Hanuman temple in Connaught Place and addressed AAP leaders and workers at the party office.

During his address. Keiriwal said, "I am going back to jail not because I was involved in corruption but because I raised voice against dictatorship."

"I was given a 21-day (relief) by the Supreme Court. These 21 days were unforgettable. I did not waste even a minute. I campaigned for saving the country. The AAP is not important, it is secondary. The country comes first," he said.

Kejriwal also asserted that all exit polls predicting a third term for the BJP-led NDA at the Centre were "fake"

Exit polls Saturday predicted that Prime Minister Narendra Modi will retain power for a third straight term, with the NDA expected to win a big majority in the polls.

"They are not forming gov-

Meanwhile, a court here sent Kejriwal to judicial custody till June 5.

Duty judge Sanjeev Aggarwal passed the order after the chief minister was produced before the court through video conference after surrendering at Tihar jail.

The judge passed the order on an application filed by the Enforcement Directorate, seeking extension of judicial custody by 14 days.

The application was moved by the ED May 20 while Kejriwal was out on interim bail. The court sent Keiriwal to judicial custody till June 5, noting that the judge concerned was scheduled to pass an order on his interim bail plea on health grounds on that day.

## Dragon lands on moon's far side to fly back samples

THE SUCCESSFUL **MISSION IS CHINA'S SECOND ON THE DARK SIDE OF THE MOON, A REGION NO OTHER COUNTRY HAS REACHED**

Beijing, June 2: China landed an uncrewed spacecraft on the far side of the moon Sunday, overcoming a key hurdle in its landmark mission to retrieve the world's first rock and soil samples from the dark lunar hemisphere.

The landing elevates China's space power status in a global rush to the moon, where coun-

tries including the United States are hoping to exploit lunar minerals to sustain long-term astronaut missions and moon bases within the next decade.

The Chang'e-6 craft, equipped with an array of tools and its own launcher, touched down in a gigantic impact crater called the South Pole-Aitken Basin on the moon's space-facing side at 6:23am Beijing time (2223 GMT), the China National Space Administration said.

The mission involves many engineering innovations, high risks and great difficulty, the agency said in a statement on its website. The payloads carried by the Chang'e-6 lander will work as planned and carry out scientific exploration missions.

The successful mission is lenging. China's second on the far side of the moon, a region no other



country has reached. The side of the moon perpetually facing away from the Earth is dotted with deep and dark craters, makthe highest. ing communications and robotic landing operations more chal-

Given these challenges, lunar and space experts involved in

the Chang'e-6 mission described the landing phase as a moment where the chance of failure is

The Chang'e-6 probe launched May 3 on China's Long March 5 rocket from the Wenchang Satellite Launch Center on the southern island of Hainan,

reaching the lunar vicinity roughly a week later before tightening its orbit in preparation for a landing.

Chang'e-6 marks the world's third lunar landing this year. Japan's SLIM lander touched down in January, followed the next month by a lander from US

startup Intuitive Machines. The other countries that have sent spacecraft to Earth's nearest neighbour are the then-Soviet Union and India. The United States is the only country to have landed humans on the moon, starting in 1969.

## **SAMPLING THE MOON**

Using a scoop and drill, the Chang'e-6 lander will aim to collect 2 kg of lunar material over two days and bring it back to Earth.

The samples will be trans-

ferred to a rocket booster atop the lander, which will launch back into space, tag up with another spacecraft in lunar orbit and return, with a landing in China's Inner Mongolia region expected around June 25

If all goes as planned, the mission will provide China with a pristine record of the moon's 4.5 billion-year history and yield new clues on the solar system's formation. It will also allow for an unprecedented comparison between the dark, unexplored region with the moon's better understood Earth-facing side.

China's lunar strategy includes its first astronaut landing around 2030 in a programme that counts Russia as a partner. In 2020 China conducted its first lunar sample return missionwith Chang'e-5, retrieving samples from the moon's nearer side.



## Delhi could become a barren desert, says High Court

New Delhi, June 2: Taking note of the recent temperature spike to 52.3 degrees Celsius in the city, the Delhi High Court has observed that the national capital could become a barren desert if the present generation continues an apathetic view on deforestation.

Delhi's Mungeshpur area Wednesday logged a maximum temperature of 52.3 degrees Celsius, the highest ever recorded in the city.

'Judicial notice is taken of the fact that as recent as May 30, the official temperature recorded in Delhi was 52.3 degrees Celsius. It is not far to see the day when this city may be only a barren desert, in case the present generation continues an apathetic view on deforestation," Justice Tushar Rao Gedela said.

The High Court, which had earlier appointed its former judge Najmi Waziri as the chairperson of an internal departmental committee of city officials dealing with the protection



of forests in Delhi, was informed that Waziri was unable to perform his duties due to a lack of infrastructure.

'This court cannot countenance a situation where the chairperson (Justice Waziri) is unable to discharge the responsibilities on account of lack of an office space or a secretarial and support staff or even transportation. However, rather than directing the department (of Forest and Wildlife) to provide staff in a diverted capacity, it is considered appropriate to direct the department to pursue the matter in all earnest and in no case shall the approval be delayed be-

yond June 15," the court said. As per a report of the chairperson of the committee filed through advocate R Arunadhri Iyer, the Delhi government was informed of the requirement

of infrastructure, along with secretarial support staff and transportation which would be required for the chairperson to efficiently discharge his responsibilities.

The chief conservator of forests submitted that the approval for the requirements has already been put up to the minister concerned and thereafter, it is to be placed before the Cabinet and then to the lieutenant governor for final approval.

The amicus curiae appointed in the case submitted that once a judicial order was passed, the infrastructure and other facilities required for efficient administration and discharge of responsibilities by the chairperson of the committee have to be complied with at the

The High Court said after the approval was granted by the competent authority, the infrastructure development should be completed within the next 15 days.

"Since the next date of hearing is already fixed for July 29, it is expected that all things and requirements of the chairperson and the committee shall be put in place and in full working condition, prior thereto," the court directed.

The court also accepted the suggestion of another amicus curiae to rename the committee and said that now, it should be referred to as the 'Special Empowered Committee' instead of the 'Internal Departmental Committee'

"It is made clear once again that all the concerned officers of the concerned departments are directed to attend all the meetings as and when called for, except in special circumstances in which they are unable to attend so. However, the chairperson be given prior intimation as to their inability to attend the particular meeting," the

The court said the strict measures are only to ensure that the committee completes its responsibilities and references made to it, "keeping in view the worsening situation of cli-

matic conditions in Delhi". On December 21 last year, the HC directed the constitution of the committee consisting of the chief conservator of forests, the conservator of forests, the deputy conservator of forests (protecting and monitoring) and the DCF concerned for the

preservation of deemed forests. It had said that the committee would ensure that concrete steps are taken for the protection, preservation, reclamation and enhancement of forests,

both protected and deemed. It had directed the Delhi government to provide suitable and adequate office accommodation for the committee and to bear all the expenses of its functioning, including suitable re-

## **Decomposed body** found from drain

Bhubaneswar, June 2: A 38year-old man's decomposed body was found inside an under-construction drain near Naka Gate here, Bharatpur police said Sunday. Bharatpur inspector incharge (IIC) Dinakrushna Mishra said the deceased was identified as Tutul Singh, a resident of Khandagiri area here. Singh, who worked as a daily wager, had left home two days ago following an argument with his family members.

His face had several injury marks when the body was recovered. "Preliminary investigations revealed that Singh died 48 hours ago," added.Locals noticed putrid smell emanating from drain in the early hours of Sunday following which they informed the police who reached the spot and recovered the body. Meanwhile, the IIC said the post-mortem report is awaited to ascertain the exact cause of death. The body was handed over to the family members in the  $\leftarrow$ evening after the autopsy was conducted, said Mishra.

# Eight places record day temp at 40°C or above

Titilagarh town recorded the highest maximum temperature at 42.5 degrees Celsius



Bhubaneswar, June 2: At least eight places in the state recorded maximum day temperatures at 40 degrees Celsius or above

Titilagarh town recorded the highest maximum temperature at 42.5 degrees Celsius. It was followed by Bolangir and Sonepur each (42.3), Boudh (42.1) Bhawanipatna and Nuapada each (40.5), Jharsuguda (40.4) and Sambalpur (40.0).

The highest maximum temperature of 46 degrees Celsius was recorded Saturday at Titilagarh. The lowest minimum temperature of 22 degrees Celsius was recorded at Nabarangpur in the plains of Odisha.

Odisha Special Relief Commissioner (SRC) Sunday stated that as many as 42 sunstroke deaths were reported May 30 and six out of them have been confirmed. Another six deaths were not due to sunstroke.

Meanwhile, an official communiqué issued by the SRC Sunday said that 99 alleged sunstroke death cases have been reported by the District Collectors in the last 72 hours. Of these 99 alleged cases, 20 cases have been confirmed by the District Collectors taking into account the post-mortem and joint probe. At the same time, it has been confirmed that two of the alleged reports were not due to sunstroke.

"As cumulative, during this summer a total of 141 alleged sunstroke death cases have been reported by the District Collectors of which it was confirmed that 26 cases were due to sunstroke, while eight deaths were due to other reasons," the release read.

Currently, 107 alleged cases are pending with the District Collectors for inquiry.

## 'Stargazing' at Debrigarh Sanctuary creating buzz

Bhubaneswar, June 2: Recently launched, Stargazing initiative by the Debrigarh Wildlife Sanctuary (DWS) is creating buzz among the Astrophiles and astronomy enthusiasts in and around the state. Community members at the DWS have been trained to identify stars and the constellations visible from the sanctuary, daily between 7pm to 7:30pm sessions for the Ecotourism visitors.

"In some of the places like in Ladakh and Uttarakhand, stargazing for public has already been started. This is for the first time such elaborate and systematic stargazing has been started in the state at Debrigarh Wildlife sanctuary," Anshu Pragyan Das, DFO Hirakud Wildlife Division said.

The visibility list includes Sirius - the brightest star in sky, Dhruv Tara or North Star, 'Saptarshi Mandal' constellation which is placed above Hirakud Reservoir and 'Ursa Major' constellation are some of the clearly visible stars and constellations from DWS. These stars have been photographed and framed with marked directions for easy identification by visitors.

"Since, most part of the sanctuary is covered with dense forest (around 353sqkm of DWS and 700sqkm of Hirakud Wetland) area without any human habitation, a big patch of the dark sky, away from city lights and free from light pollution helps for clear visibility



and easy identification of stars and constellations," Das added.

"Few planets like Jupiter can also be directly seen from the Sanctuary. Milky Way can be seen here during summers but cannot be viewed during winters whereas Mars and Venus can be visible during winters. Comets are seen round the year depending specific timeline. As horizon of sky is clearly visible from Hirakud, sunset and moonrise offer some of the picturesque view," Das said.

Soft lights without any reflection towards sky have been put in the whole campus around Debrigarh Ecotourism for easy sighting of stars. We have made six new stargaz-

ing rooms, with glass roofs for viewing star movements at night in Debrigarh Nature Camp. Booking for same has started from May. Visitors have already started coming in and experiencing the new initiative. The photo frames displayed on the walls inside the rooms and at different places. have been photographed by a few astro-photographers from the state. We have also placed books related to stargazing in our library for generating curiosity among children and adults. A telescope is also placed for use by experts, said Das.

ntidepressants, known as selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors (SSRIs), and popular anti-anxiety medication benzodiazepines can offer a sense of hope to those suffering with debilitating mental

health issues.

They can also help patients to foster a sense of confidence, optimism and belief in their own ability to recover. Some patients feel that the medication functions as a "stepping-stone" to improved health.

Other patients complain that the side effects of the medication, which can include nausea, headaches, drowsiness, dizziness, fatigue, agitation, nervousness and weakness, can be worse than the symptoms of depression and anxiety. Many of these adverse effects are well

documented by the pharmaceutical industry and written in small print in medication guidelines. But they are often not communicated by the doctor prescribing them.

Some of the less common but more extreme - side effects. for example, have attracted controversy and criticism. Patients have reported insomnia, sexual dysfunction, anorexia, hallucinations and suicidal thoughts. Some antidepressant drugs carry a "black box warning" about increased risk of suicide while

using the medication. It's imperative that patients are fully informed of potential risks and side effects and closely monitored for behavioural changes. Research shows that less than one per cent of the patients studied "had been told



anything about withdrawal effects or dependence" by the person prescribing the medication.

In most cases, it's not beneficial for patients to be on antidepressants indefinitely so a plan to manage the body's withdrawal from the drug is essential. Withdrawal side effects from anti depressants can include dizziness, vertigo, flu-like symptoms, lethargy and sleep dis-

Doctors can interpret the ef-

fects of withdrawal from antidepressant medication as returning depression symptoms. and put clients back on medication - and, in some cases, even increase it. The patient, then, can feel caught in a cycle of symptoms, side effects, sickness, and medication adjust-

Joanna Moncrieff, a professor of critical and social psychiatry, argues that depression diagnoses are designed to not only monitor and control behaviour but also legitimise pharmacological treatment.

Consultant psychiatrist Stephen Stahl suggests that it is not possible for some of these drugs to act on particular neurotransmitters, arguing that they "must act everywhere". Stahl suggests that side effects

are the "cost of doing business."

This chemical imbalance theorv of depression was once considered the gold standard reason for why people take antidepressants but is heavily criticised now. For example, there's a renewed interest in research on the use of psilocybin, a naturally occurring compound found in magic mushrooms. A recent study has shown psilocybin to be more effective than anti-depressant medication for major depression with side effects considered minor and transient.

The National Institute for Health and Care Excellence also recommends psychotherapy for the treatment of symptoms of depression and anxiety. Psychotherapy is an evidencedbased listening and talking method of addressing psychological and psychosomatic prob

lems and change.

The clinical reality for many patients is that they are not always consulted about their treatment preference and are not always offered psychotherapy. Fewer psychiatrists are providing psychotherapy in part due to increased financial incentives for providing pharmacotherapy.

Treatment with medication alone is to miss out on vital aspects of considering the person as the locus of control or the agent of change, and fails to emphasise their role in the own re-

The psychotherapist, with the client, can collaboratively distinguish between symptoms of illness and side effects of medication; of what is a 'cure' and what is the 'poison'.

# **Decline in Gharial population at** Satkosia gorge sparks concern

Nayagarh, June 2: Despite the sustained efforts put in by the Forest department, Gharial population in Satkosia gorge of Mahanadi river in the district has failed to witness a rise over the years, a report stated.

As many as 880 gharials have been released into Satkosia gorge in the last 46 years, but only eight of them were found during the 2023 crocodile census. This has sparked concerns among nature lovers and wildlife enthusiasts. Experts are curious if the

dwindling population of the reptiles was due to them being swept away, or migrated to other areas in the river or deaths after failing to get acclimatised to the living conditions in the gorge. They demanded a probe to unravel the actual reason behind the decline in gharial population. Nevertheless, the decline in the reptile population has been a matter of serious concerns for all

Surprisingly, the population of Muggers stands at 39 in the Satkosia gorge as per the 2023 census. It was 50 during 2019 census, and 52 in 2020. At present, Muggers have outnumbered Gharials.

Sources said that the Satkosia Wildlife Sanctuary falls in close vicinity of Angul, Boudh and Nayagarh districts. The state government has formed forest divisions in Angul and Nayagarh districts for protection of tiger and crocodile populations in Angul Boudh and Nayagarh districts.

The Kusang and Chhamundia forest ranges are in Nayagarh under the Mahanadi forest and wildlife divisions.

### Keonjhar village faces acute water crisis

Champua, June 2: Residents of Hudi Sahi village in Rajia panchayat under this block in Keonihar district are facing acute water crisis during the scorching summer heat, sources

Over 300 people live in more than 50 houses in this village. All residents belong to various tribal communities and work as daily wagers. The severe heatwave is exacerbating the water woes in the village, impacting their lives, sources added.

According to reports, the tribal residents have been living in the village for decades. Around 10 years ago, a tube well was installed in the village to alleviate drinking water

However, since the past four months, the tube well has become defunct, cutting the only potable water source for the residents during summer. Some families have to travel half a kilometer distance to collect drinking water and have to wait for hours to get their quota. Additionally, for bathing and other purposes, the residents of the village have to rely on a pond, located 2 kilometres away

Local Sarpanch Santosh Kumar Nayak stated that the matter has been communicated to the authorities. Once the election code of conduct is lifted. a new tube well is expected to



A total of 867 Gharials have been released into Satkosia gorge, which includes 26 in 1977, 56 in 1978, 25 in 1980, 43 in 1982, 32 in 1984, 100 in 1985, 124 in 1986, 126 in 1987, 18 in 1988, 59 in 1989, 78 in 1995, 51 in 1996, 105 in 1998, five in 2004, four in 2015, eight in 2016, five in 2019 and two in 2020. The report on release of rest of the gharials into the Satkosia gorge is yet to be available.

Of these 867 reptiles, 523 were brought from Nandankanan and some of them were released into Satkosia gorge during 1986 and 2014. The rest of the Gharials were released into Tikarpada Crocodile Breeding Centre in Angul. However, seven of the Gharials brought from Nandankanan have died.

Given the situation, the decline in Gharial population has sparked serious concerns. The crocodile census report states that there were 11 Gharials in 1975-76, three in 2002-03, one in 2003-04, three in 2004-05, two in 2005-06, two in 2006-07, three in 2007-08, three in 2008-09, three in 2009-10, three in 2010-11, two in 2011-12, two in 2012-13, two in 2013-14, one in 2014-15, three in

2015-16, nine in 2016-17, seven in

2017-18 and eight in 2018-19. On the other hand, there were three Gharials in 2020 as per reports, and later their number increased to five after two more were released into the gorge. The 2021 report states that there were six Gharials and later 12 more were released into the gorge. The 2023 report states there were eight Gharials and 39 Muggers in the gorge.

Around 25 Gharials laid eggs in 2021. Similarly, 30 eggs were laid in 2022 and 35 in 2023 which later hatched. However, these Gharials are now allegedly missing from the gorge. Recently, 35 hatchlings were born May 25.

When contacted, DFO Falguni Sarathi Mallick said Gharials are docile as compared to Muggers. The attack on Gharials by Muggers is on the increase. He however, admitted that the population of Gharials is fast declining despite frequent release of the reptiles into the Satkosia gorge

## Driver killed as truck falls off Taptapani Ghati

Digapahandi/Patapur, June 2: The driver of a turmeric laden truck died after the vehicle fell off Taptapani Ghati near Jakarapalli village in Ganjam district early Sunday morning.

The deceased was identified as Suresh Guru, a resident of Sarapada village near Itamati in Navagarh district.

According to sources, the truck (OD 02-B-9880) was carrying the consignment of turmeric from Mohana in Gajapati district to Berhampur in Ganjam. The driver lost control over the wheels when the vehicle was crossing the Ghati area. As a result, the truck skidded off the road and

The driver was crushed under the truck and died on the spot. On being informed, a fire brigade unit from Sanakhemundi rushed to the spot and recovered the body from under the mangled vehicle with the help of gas cut-



ters. Later, the truck was lifted onto the road with the help of an

earthmover. According to sources, Patapur police reached the spot, seized the body and sent it to MKCG Medical College and Hospital at Berhampur for post-mortem. Police seized the vehicle and launched an investigation after registering a case.

## Lightning strike claims two lives in Ganjam

Rourkela, June 2: During any high-profile health emergency, the burden always comes to the already overstretched Rourkela Government Hospital (RGH). This pressure will possibly be reduced if all the hospitals under the Urban Health Mission (UHM) share the burden of RGH.

However, this is not happening. There are 10 such hospitals, all strategically located at different parts of the district like Bandhamunda, Panposh, Koel Nagar, Chhend, Basanti Colony, Baughat, Sector-6 and 16, Fertiliser Township and Gopabandhupalli.

The sole purpose of these hospitals is to cater to those staying close to these hospitals or in the periphery. Most of these are well maintained and manned by regular staff. However, the ironv is these are unable to reduce some of the burden of RGH. "It

is a fact that these are not so well-equipped like RGH but have more than the basic facilities. Still, these hospitals have failed to attract patients thereby increasing the burden on us," said a doctor at RGH.

The in-charge of Urban Health Mission Dr Pushpamitra Mishra, who superannuated Friday, said, "Actually we have been able to lessen the dependency on RGH. We may not have indoor facilities here but we have two observation beds which are operational.

Another health expert at RGH said, "People do not prefer these hospitals. In fact, during the diarrhoea outbreak, there was provision of beds at Panposh UHM hospital. But people did not go there. The main problem is lack of adequate number of doctors and other paramedic staff there." Besides, the patients are not ready to consider consulting AYUSH doctors, observed an other doctor.



These hospitals are all neat and clean. Basic facilities like blood tests and dressing of wounds are also available. However, for more specialised treatment one will have to go to RGH. Patients are visiting RGH for minor diseases instead of going to these health centres. 'We receive patients with common fever, cold and cough. They could easily avail the services at the UHM hospitals, but they don't go there," said a doctor

His suggestion was to spread more awareness regarding these hospitals at the local levels through ASHAs and ANM professionals. "They are the people who are always in touch with these people and they believe them. If we are availing the services of the retired doctors at RGH why not hire many such professionals living in the city for these

### **Team of doctors visits RGH to assess situation**

Ateam of doctors deputed by the state government visited Rourkela Government Hospital (RGH) Saturday to take stock of the situation here following the high number of heatwave related deaths. There were four doctors in the team, three from Sundargarh and one from Burla. The team held discussions with RGH Director In-Charge Dr Sudharani Pradhan and other doctors. Round-the-clock vigil is kept on all aspects of sunstroke related cases. The meeting lasted more than two hours. Then the team visited the wards earmarked for treating the patients admitted to RGH. Four wards have been kept aside to admit anyone affected with sunstroke. A central team from Delhi was supposed to arrive Saturday evening.

## Kalimela CHC Doc goes missing

Malkangiri/Kalimela, June 2: A doctor posted at the Kalimela community health centre (CHC) in this district has been allegedly kidnapped by Maoists from his official residence, late Saturday night, sources stated here Sunday. The physician has been identified as Dr Amlan Kumar Bhoi, a native of Kandhamal district. He joined the hospital five months back. The matter came to the fore after the authorities of Kalimela CHC lodged a complaint at the Kalimela police station.

Locals and employees at the health centre informed that they found Maoist posters inside the residence of the doctor. They said that the posters clearly indicate the involvement of the Maoists in the alleged abduction of the doctor.

Officials of the Kalimela police station however, rejected the claims made by the locals. They said they are looking into all possible angles. Police also did not rule out the involvement of a particular family in the incident. They said that the mobile phone of Dr Bhoi was found inside the hospital while, his bike



residence. Sources said that some peo-

ple brought an ailing woman of Kota area in Sukma district of Chhattisgarh to the hospital, Friday night. However, by the time she reached the hospital, she had already breathed her last. The doctor then informed the Kalimela police station. On being informed police reached the health centre and seized the body. This led to a heated argument between the doctor and the family members of the deceased as they wanted the body without delay. Kalimela SDPO Sachin Patel visited the hospital and the doctor's official quarters and has initiated a probe. However, they are yet to find any clue. Malkangiri SP Nitesh Wadhwani also stated that the doctor may have gone somewhere on his own without informing anyone. "At this point, we haven't found any clue regarding the involvement of Maoists," he said.

## Victim Card

rojecting oneself as a political martyr for being dragged into legal cases is a trick that top politicians the world over often play. In some cases, it pays rich dividends while in others it does not. However when former US President Donald Trump plays the victim card, it becomes an entirely different ball game altogether. He has successfully been using legal cases against him only to strengthen his support base further and raise even greater funds for electoral campaigns. The New York jury's unanimous verdicts on 34 counts, according to experts, had similar results wherein Trump not only raised a few million dollars for his campaign but also garnered some support, though the task is much harder this time than before.

To keep the record straight, Trump is not only the first sitting or former US president to be prosecuted in a criminal trial, but the first to be convicted of felony after a New York state jury returned a guilty verdict for all 34 charges in the case relating to hush money he had paid to adult movie actor Stormy Daniels in 2016. Trump was found to have falsified business records to hide \$130,000 of hush money paid to cover up a sex scandal he feared might adversely affect his run in 2016. In the case of anyone else it would have been easily assumed that the verdict would do incalculable harm to the politician's campaign. But, the inescapable truth is Trump is running for the White House as a convicted criminal. This seemingly does not cause any shame to Trump. On the contrary, such a sentence only spurs him on to contest the presidential poll with greater vigour.

It is no wonder that Trump's detractors say no scandal or shame seems to cause any dip in his ratings among his core voters or Republican politicians. The trials and rulings in multiple cases against him inexplicably seem to have reinforced his aura of invulnerability to political con-


This trial too appears to be proving, in some ways providing grist to his mill, raising funds and enthusing his supporters. As part of his strategy to turn such reverses into gains, Trump has once again played the martyr and said: "Our whole country is being rigged right now." He even says he will appeal against his "scam" conviction. He is still facing three more criminal cases - over the alleged mishandling of classified documents and attempts to overturn the 2020 election. These are graver charges by far, but are not expected to be heard before election day. This makes him even bolder to go to town with his plea of innocence. All the same it shows how Trump has turned breaking the law for political advantage into a fine art.

What will happen next is anyone's guess. The former businessman, who sought to bully his judges as soon as the verdict was announced, has long been convincing his fans that he is a victim of a plot to bring him down, hatched by a "deep state" intent on purging him if he returns to power. The Republican Party he represents has long deviated from its core principle of being "the party of law and order." This is clear from the fact that most of his colleagues in the party do not dare condemn him for making a mockery of the rule of law.

Nonetheless, the New York trial is ample testimony to the fact that the US has a justice system that can make every citizen, no matter the standing, accountable. It has the guts to publicly dissect the behaviour of a man who had tried to make disregarding the law a virtue. Herein lies the importance of the verdict. It may not lead to any change in the stand of Trump's hard core supporters, but it may make the floating voters have a rethink about whether the country should have a felon

This is something that most other democracies across the world could learn from the US. The so called System can only be strong if the people behind it are strong, just and righteous.




## THIS DAY IN HISTORY

**WHO CARES ABOUT HUMAN LIVES AND FAMILIES WHEN WAR IS A PROFITABLE BUSINESS?** 

he NATO-led, imperialist-imposed Russia-Ukraine war is not only creating a daily human catastrophe but also reshaping the present and future of Western Europe through American shock therapy. This unjust war has led to deaths, destitution, significant civilian sufferings, with countless lives disrupted, communities devastated, and families ruined. This completely avoidable war is pushing the entire European continent into a state of turmoil. The ripple effects of this war are being felt in countries far removed from the front lines

Who cares about human lives and families when war is a profitable business? The grim reality is that the war economy benefits a select few, with European and America defence contractors, arms manufacturers, and other industries profiting immensely from this war. This profit-driven aspect of war often overshadows the human cost, with policymakers and corporations prioritising financial gains over the well-being of individuals and families caught in the crossfire.

Western European countries have long been characterised by their robust welfare systems, which provide a safety net for all citizens and ensure a higher quality of life. These systems are designed to mitigate the harsher aspects of capitalism, ensuring

The welfare states and policies in Western Europe present significant challenges for American health, pharmaceutical, and insurance corporations seeking to expand their profitable businesses in the region. These robust welfare systems provide comprehensive healthcare, education, and social security benefits, reducing the market potential for private American companies in these sectors. The extensive public provision of services means there is less demand for the private, profitdriven health and educational alternatives that dominate the American market.

Similarly, the availability of relatively cheaper Russian oil and natural gas has been instrumental in maintaining the high quality of life in Western Europe. This affordability in energy costs is a key factor in sustaining the economic stability and prosperity of the region Such a situation creates problems for American oil and gas companies, as it limits their ability to penetrate and profit from European markets. The reliance on Russian energy sources reduces the demand for more expensive American alternatives.The geopolitical and economic dynamics surrounding the war in Ukraine could potentially alter these circumstances.

As Western Europe has reduced its dependence on Russian energy, American oil and gas companies find new opportunities to enter the market and profiting hugely. However, this shift led to rising cost of living due to the cost of higher energy prices and economic strain for European consumers and industries, potentially impacting the overall quality of life. In this way, the Russian war in

Ukraine has transformed the welfare policies and energy dependencies in Western Europe and removed significant barriers for American corporations to expand their market presence in the region with the help of war shock.

American imperialism has effectively employed its doctrine of shock therapy across various regions including postcommunist Eastern Europe, Latin America, the Middle East, Africa, Asia and even within its own borders over its own people, all in the pursuit of corporate profit. Yankee imperialism led by USA, supported by its European allies, continues to fund the Ukrainian war, driven by strategic corporate objectives of making super profits at the cost of their people. Meanwhile, the Russian government persists in its aggressive actions, prolonging a senseless war that brings suffering to countless people.

The challenge facing the European people is clear: to unequivocally oppose warfare both within and beyond Europe's borders, and to dismantle the imperialist and military apparatus known as NATO to cultivate enduring peace and stability in the region. It plays a key role in cycling nutrients necessary for both natural ecosystems and for 95% of our calorie intake. It also stores water, building resilience against droughts.

From bacteria to earthworms, soil teems with diverse life forms. all working together to maintain its structure, fertility, and productivity. This vibrant ecosystem not only nourishes humanity but also acts as a massive carbon sink. Healthy soil, enriched with organic matter, traps carbon in the ground, preventing it from being released into the atmosphere, storing three times more carbon dioxide than all terrestrial vegetation combined.

But soils around the world are being eroded and degraded by human activities like agricultural expansion, deforestation, and urbanisation, undermining the planet's ability to sustain us and regulate the climate. According to the Food and Agriculture Organization of the

By harmonising these measures with their national emissions-reduction goals, targets for land-degradation neutrality, and biodiversity strategies, African countries can ensure that efforts to restore degraded land also bolster climate mitigation and protect biodiversity,

the AU's action plan also requires fostering cross-sector collaboration and stakeholder engagement to ensure coherence and effectiveness. Boosting investments in land restoration across the continent is vital, as research shows that every dollar invested in restoring degraded land can generate up to \$30 in economic benefits. But preventing degradation altogether is far more costeffective. Given that agriculture currently accounts for roughly 23% of Africa's GDP and supports 60% of its population, governments and private investors must consider the economic tradeoffs involved in expanding landconservation efforts on the continent. While such investments can help reverse biodiversity loss by mid-century, land-restoration initiatives must be complemented by measures like sustainable intensification to prevent spikes

Guwahati, June 2: The flood situation in Assam remained unchanged with more than six lakh people in 10 districts reeling under waters, officials said

Heavy rains in different parts of the state led to the swelling of river water level, forcing affected people in many areas to evacuate to safety, they said.

Kopili, Barak and Kushiyara rivers were flowing over the danger level. Altogether 6,01,642 people in Hailakandi Hojai, Morigaon, Karimganj, Nagaon, Cachar, Dibrugarh, Golaghat, Karbi Anglong West and Dima Hasao districts remained affected due to the floods.

The death toll in floods and storm since May 28 is at 15, the officials said.

Nagaon remained the worst hit district with over 2.79 affected population, followed by Hojai (1,26,813 affected popu-

He also drew attention to the campaigning activities that were held in the middle of night, besides roadshows and door-todoor campaigns conducted "without the lurking threat of the Pakistani gun'

Swain, noted a potential shift within the outfit, saying some of its members publicly participated in the recent elections which indicated a possible change in their approach.

## GIBBON WILDLIFE SANCTUARY NFR to set up canopy bridges

Guwahati, June 2: The NFR will set up canopy bridges over railway tracks in Gibbon Wildlife Sanctuary in Assam's Jorhat district to facilitate safe movement of arboreal species in the forest, an official Friday.

The decision was taken in consultation with the state forest department, Wildlife Institute\_ of India and all stakeholders, a railway spokesperson said.

The canopy bridges will be installed at several identified points to facilitate easy access and movement of the endangered Hoolock Gibbon from one part of the railway tracks to the other in the forest, he said.

The state forest department has submitted a design with estimates for the installation of such bridges over the railway tracks, the official said.

The design was prepared by the Wildlife Institute of India in consultation with the Northeast Frontier Railway (NFR). The railway authorities have already deposited the estimated amount in February for the installation of bridges by the forest department of Assam.

## Nine counting centres set up for five LS seats in J&K

Jammu, June 2: With two days left for the declaration of results of the Lok Sabha polls, nine centres have been set up counting of votes in five Lok Sabha constituencies in Jammu and Kashmir, officials said Sunday.

Party, Sajjad Lone of Peoples Conference. Former MLA Engineer Rashid is fighting from Tihar Jail, Officials said all arrangements including security and deployment of staff have been made at all the 10 counting

The Combined Voter Turnout (VTR) at the polling stations for the entire Union territory (five Lok Sabha seats) was 58.46 per cent – the highest poll participation in the last 35 years.

The voter turnout of 50.86 per cent from the three parliamentary constituencies in the Kashmir Valley witnessed a jump of 30 percentage points from the 2019 general elections when it was 19.16 per cent.

Srinagar, Baramulla and Anantnag-Rajouri in the valley recorded VTR of 38.49 per cent, 59.1 per cent and 54.84 percent respectively, which has been highest in the last three decades. More encouraging this year is the fact that with the improved law and order situation and the prevailing peace, foreign tourists have started coming to Kashmir in good numbers.



'We earn foreign exchange once the foreign tourists start coming to Kashmir. In addition to this, most of the foreign tourists are high-end tourists whose average spending during their stay is more than the average domestic tourists. Not that the domestic tourists do not include high-end guests. The few 5-star hotels we have in the Valley are also completely sold out these days and the majority of their guests are domestic spenders. said a member of the Hoteliers

Club of Kashmir. Normally the tourist arrivals start coming down with the beginning of the annual Amarnath Yatra due to the heavy rush of pilgrims who come for 'Darshan' at the cave shrine situated 3888 metres above sea level in Kashmir Himalayas.

This year, Amarnath Yatra starts June 29 and will conclude after 52 days August 19.



Under Article 174 (2) (b) of the Constitution. the governor has accepted the cabinet's advise and signed the order to dissolve the seventh state Assembly with immediate effect, the statement issued by the Raj Bhayan said, Parnaik has also accepted the resignation of Chief Minister Pema Khandu and his council of ministers. He requested Khandu and his ministers to continue until the new government is sworn in.

Mumbai: Bollywood actor Raveena Tandon and her driver were allegedly attacked by a mob in Mumbai amid rash driving claims against the driver, police said Sunday. A viral video shows a group of locals accusing Raveena and her driver of assaulting three women. The incident took place on Carter Road in Bandra Saturday night, police said. While no FIR has been registered, a station diary entry has been made at the Khar police station, the official added.

## BJP worker killed in post-poll violence

Kolkata: A BJP worker was killed by a group of men in West Bengal's Nadia district in post-poll violence, with the saffron party pointing fingers at the ruling Trinamool Congress. The TMC, however, claimed that the killing was a fallout of a family feud. 
Friends,

New Delhi, June 2: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday stressed the need to ensure regular fire and electrical safety audits in hospitals and other public places as he reviewed the heatwave situation in the country amid fire incidents which have claimed many lives.

He chaired a host of meetings, including one on the post-Cyclone Remal situation, especially in the northeast region, and another to review the 100-day agenda of the new government to be sworn in after the Lok Sabha results are announced

Exit polls broadcast Saturday predicted a massive win for the BJP-led National Democratic Alliance (NDA), with Modi set to retain power for a third straight term.

In the meeting to review the heatwave conditions in parts of the country, Modi instructed officials that proper drills for preventing and handling incidents of fire must be undertaken on a regular basis, according to an official statement.

He also said that regular drills for the maintenance of fire lines in forests and productive utilisation of biomass must

be planned. Modi was briefed that as per forecasts, the heatwave is likely to continue in parts of Rajasthan, Gujarat and Madhya Pradesh.



Monsoon this year is likely to be normal and above normal in most parts of the country and below normal in parts of peninsular India, the statement said.

In the meeting to review the post-Cyclone Remal situation, another official statement said. Modi was briefed about its impact in the affected states, including the loss of lives and damage to houses and other properties due to landslides and floods in Mizoram, Assam, Manipur, Meghalaya and Tripura.

National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) teams have carried out evacuation, airlifting and road clearance operations, it said, adding the Union home ministry is in regular touch with state governments.

PM Modi said the Union government will continue to extend full support to the states affected by the cyclone, according to the statement. Top bureaucrats were part of the meetings the prime minister chaired.

He is also chairing a meeting to review the preparations to celebrate the World Environment Day, which falls June 5. Much before the Lok Sabha polling exercise began, Modi had set in motion the exercise for different government ministries to prepare the 100-day agenda for the new government.

He had asked his Council of Ministers to prioritise programmes and initiatives for the first 100 days.

## **Dog undergoes** non-invasive heart surgery at vet hosp

New Delhi, June 2: A dog with a complex heart condition successfully underwent a minimally invasive heart surgery at a hospital here with veterinarians claiming it to be the first such procedure to be carried out by private practitioners in the Indian subcontinent.

Seven-year-old beagle, Juliet, was suffering from Mitral valve disease for the last two years, Dr Bhanu Dev Sharma, an interventional cardiologist for small animals at Max PetZ Hospital in East of Kailash said

The condition is caused by degenerative changes in mitral valve leaflets which result in back flow of blood within the left upper chamber of the heart and subsequent congestive heart failure (fluid build-up in lungs) as the disease progresses.

The surgeons performed a Transcatheter Edge-to-Edge Repair (TEER) procedure using a valve clamp May 30.

"It's called hybrid surgery as it's a combination of a micro surgery and interventional procedure. The best part about this procedure is that its minimally invasive as it's a beating heart procedure and not like an open heart surgery which needs a heart lung bypass machine,' Sharma explained. As per the pet parents, they were giving heart medications to Juliet for the last one year, Sharma said.

They learnt about the procedure from their visit to the US where this surgery was introduced at Colorado state univer sity two years ago, he said

## Hyderabad ceases to be common capital of Telangana, Andhra

Hyderabad, June 2: Hyderabad, one of the bustling metropolitan cities of the country, ceased to be the common capital of Telangana and Andhra Pradesh from Sunday as per the Andhra Pradesh Reorganisation Act, 2014.

Beginning June 2, Hyderabad will be the capital city of Telangana only.

Hyderabad was made the capital city of the two states for 10 years when the bifurcation of undivided Andhra Pradesh was carried out in 2014. Telangana came into existence June 2, 2014. "On and from the appointed day (June 2), Hyderabad in the existing State of Andhra Pradesh, shall be the common capital of the State of Telangana and the State of Andhra Pradesh for such period not exceeding ten said the

Reorganisation Act.

"After expiry of the period referred to in sub-section (1), Hyderabad shall be the capital of the State of Telangana and there shall be a new capital for the State of Andhra Pradesh," it added. The formation of Telangana State was fulfilment of a decades-long demand when the statehood was realized on June 2, 2014 following the passage of AP Reorganisation bill in Parliament in February, 2014.

Telangana Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy had last month told officials to take over, after June 2, buildings like the Lake View government guest house in Hyderabad which were given to Andhra Pradesh for a period of 10 years.

Despite ten long years after separation, several issues such as bifurcation of assets are still unresolved between Andhra Pradesh and Telangana.



"They are not forming a government June 4. These exit polls are mind games to drive you into depression," Kejriwal told AAP workers and leaders. The ruling BJD in Odisha, which is not part of the INDIA bloc and is also predicted to lose ground to the BJP, rejected the exit polls, saying they have proved to be wrong in the 2014 and 2019 elections and the trend would

continue this time as well. Senior BJD leader V K

Pandian said in a post on X, "Everybody has seen how inaccurate exit polls made by some national level organisations in air-conditioned rooms are. The exit polls of 2024 will just be a repeat of the previous exit polls.'

However, Union minister Ramdas Athawale said the ruling National Democratic Alliance (NDA) will get more Lok Sabha seats than predicted by the exit polls. Athawale said the exit polls have predicted the NDA will win 350 to 375 seats, but the BJP-led alliance will get more seats.

"In Maharashtra, the ruling Mahayuti win will 35 to 40 seats (out of 48), and in the country, the NDA will get more than 400 seats," said the Republican Party of India (A) chief, whose party is a constituent of the NDA. Shiv Sena (UBT) MP Sanjay Raut decried the exit polls as a "corporate game and a fraud".

Raut also said they do not require the exit polls as they work on the field and know the "undercurrent". "There is a lot of pressure on these media companies. The exit poll exercise is a corporate game and a fraud. Do these companies conduct exit polls for free?"

## lated to the car crash. The Heatwaves, flash floods: India's weather story so far

New Delhi, Jun 2: Sweltering heatwave in north India that have caused scores of deaths, floods and landslides in the northeast that have affected lakhs of people, a spring season that suggests it could soon "disappear" from the calendar — extreme weather events in the first five months of 2024 have got everyone questioning: where is all this headed?

Despite having made predictions to this effect, climate scientists acknowledge that the temperatures this summer, including the outlier 52.9 degrees Celsius in Delhi, are "alarming, though not surprising".


'This could be the worst summer in the last 120 years, at least for north India. Never have temperatures gone so high — more than 45-47 degrees Celsius — for such a vast region, which is also densely populated. This is a record in itself," Vimal Mishra, Vikram Sarabhai Chair Professor, Civil Engineering and Earth Sciences, IIT Gandhinagar,

The temperatures, "similar to those in Africa's Sahara desert," are "far beyond expectations" by at least three or four degrees, according to Mishra. Earth system scientist

Raghu Murtugudde, professor at IIT-Bombay, told PTI this was due to the combined effect of multiple phenomena - climate change, El Nino and the water vapour released by Tonga's Hunga Tonga volcanic eruption in January 2022.

El Nino causes a warming of the sea surface temperatures, affecting the world's weather.

'The Middle East is getting hotter very fast because the desert traps the heat during global warming - warmer atmosphere is more humid and water vapour is a greenhouse gas," Murtugudde said. This warming is causing winds over



the Arabian Sea to shift northward during summer itself and also during the monsoon. These winds are also warming the Arabian Sea very fast and bringing more humid air to Delhi,

thereby raising the heat index. Studies have linked longer,

intense heatwaves to a rise in hos-

pitalisations, premature births and also adverse outcomes such as miscarriages in pregnant women. Research has also projected a rise in inflation and a decline in Gross Domestic Product (GDP) across the world due to climate change.

The hottest temperatures in

the country for the day, however, registered from Haryana's Rohtak and Uttar Pradesh's Prayagraj - 48.8 degrees Celsius - an all-time high of maximum temperatures in the cities for May. The previous highest maximum temperatures ever for Rohtak and Prayagraj were 47.2 degrees Celsius and 48.4 degrees Celsius, respectively, recorded June 6, 1995, and May 30, 1994, respectively.

Una in Himachal logged a 19-year high of 46 degrees Celsius, breaking its previous record of 45.2 degrees seen in June 2005, May 2013 and June 2019. Maximum temperatures in the state were firmly six to eight degrees above normal, with Shimla also registering its highest this season at 31.7 degrees Celsius May 29.

The week also saw flash floods in Assam and Manipur, and landslides in Mizoram and Meghalaya triggered by Cyclone Remal. At least 6 lakh people have been af-

In many northern regions of the country, the "spring season is disappearing," the researchers

They also showed that increasingly more states, including Rajasthan and Andhra Pradesh, faced the likelihood of experiencing over 40 degrees Celsius temperatures in late March, which used to be about five per cent in the 1970s and in fewer states.

Temperatures continued to rise firmly in April, with abovenormal temperatures being recorded in parts of Jodhpur and Bikaner in Rajasthan at 40-42 degrees Celsius, and in Goa at 33-35 degrees Celsius.

The heatwave, part of a larger one impacting billions across South and Southeast Asia, was made about 45 times more likely and 0.85 degrees Celsius hotter due to climate change, scientistsfrom the World Weather

Attribution group found.

### Haiti gets new PM

Miami: A UN development specialist tasked with restoring order to Haiti arrived Saturday to the Caribbean nation to take up his new post as Prime Minister. A transitional council seeking to pave the way for an election in Haiti named Garry Conille this week. Islamabad: Pakistan has reported the fourth polio case of the year, jolting the country's efforts to eradicate the crippling disease. The case was reported Saturday as the government appointed a new head of the polio eradication programme after his predecessor stepped down during the week. The Dawn newspaper reported having a document showing that the victim was a 30-month-old child hailing from the Lakhi region of the Shikarpur district of the Sindh province. This case was the first to be reported from the Sindh province, as the previous three victims belonged to Balochistan.

Zelenskyy dominates Shangri-La Dialogue forum as China, Taiwan, US exchange heated words

Singapore, June 2: Ukrainian Volodmyr President Zelenskiyy's unscheduled appearance at Asia's biggest security conference dominated proceedings Sunday after China's defence chief slammed "separatists" in Taiwan, drawing a sharp response from the government in Taipei.

Dressed in his trademark olive green T-shirt, Zelenskiyy addressed the last day of the Shangri-La Dialogue forum in Singapore, asking for support and participation at a summit in Switzerland later this month aimed at bringing peace to his war-ravaged nation.

'We are convinced that our world wants to be united and be capable of acting in complete harmony," he said to a ballroom packed full of delegates in formal business wear and military uniforms

Zelenskiyy told a news conference that he was not able to meet the Chinese delegation at the conference and was disappointed that Beijing would not attend the summit.

'China, unfortunately... is working for countries not to come to the peace summit," he

Earlier, China's defence chief, Dong Jun, warned that prospects of a peaceful "reunification" of Taiwan were being eroded, and promised to ensure the island would never gain independence.

China views democratically

governed Taiwan as its own territory, over the strong objections of the government in Taipei, and last month staged war games around the island in anger at the inauguration of President Lai Ching-te, who Beijing calls a "separatist".

"Those separatists recently made fanatical statements that show their betraval of the Chinese nation and their ancestors. They will be nailed to the pillar of shame in history," Dong said.


He added that although China was committed to peaceful reunification with Taiwan, the People's Liberation Army "will remain a strong force for upholding national reunification".

Taiwan's China-policy making Mainland Affairs Council said in response that it deeply regretted the "provocative and irrational" comments, and reiterated that the People's Republic of China has never ruled the island.

China has repeatedly threatened force against Taiwan at international venues, and its threats violate the United Nations charter, the council said in a statement.

## US trying to build Asia-Pacific version of NATO, says China

The US is trying to build an Asia-Pacific version of NATO through its Indo-Pacific strategy to maintain its hegemony in the region, a Chinese defence official has said, stressing that Washington's attempt to serve its "selfish" geopolitical interest is "doomed to fail". The remarks by Lieutenant General Jing Jianfeng, deputy chief of staff of the Joint Staff Department of the Central Military Commission, came in response to US Secretary of Defence Lloyd Austin's speech during the Shangri La Dialogue Saturday in which he spoke about strengthening alliances and partnerships across the region. Lieutenant-General Jing warned that if regional countries were to sign up for the US' Indo-Pacific strategy, they would be bound to the "US war chariot" and be lured into "taking bullets for the US". He termed Austin's remarks as "rhetoric" that "sounds good but does no good one that serves "selfish US geopolitical interests" and which is "doomed to fail". "The real purpose is to merge the small circle into the large circle of the Asia-Pacific version of NATO so as to maintain the hegemony led by the US," Jing, a member of the Chinese delegation, said Saturday.

## Israel accepts Biden's plan: Netanyahu aide

Jerusalem, June 2: An aide to Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu confirmed Sunday that Israel had accepted a framework deal for winding down the Gaza war now being advanced by US President Joe Biden, though he described it as flawed and in need of much more work.

In an interview with Britain's Sunday Times, Ophir Falk, chief foreign policy advisor to Netanyahu, said Biden's proposal was "a deal we agreed to, it's not a good deal but we dearly want the hostages released, all of them"

"There are a lot of details to be worked out," he said, adding that Israeli conditions, including "the release of the hostages and the destruction of Hamas as a genocidal terrorist organization" have not changed.

Biden, whose initial lockstep support for Israel's offensive has given way to open censure of the operation's high civilian death toll, Friday aired what he described as a three-phase plan submitted by the Netanyahu government to end the war.

The first phase entails a truce and the return of some hostages held by Hamas, after which the sides would negotiate on an openended cessation of hostilities for a second phase in which remaining live captives would go free, Biden said.

That sequencing appears to imply that Hamas would con-



tinue to play a role in incremental arrangements mediated by Egypt and Qatar - a potential clash with Israel's determination to resume the campaign to eliminate the Iranian-backed Islamist group.

Biden has hailed several cease fire proposals over the past several months, each with similar frameworks to the one he outlined Friday, all of which collapsed. In February he said Israel had agreed to halt fighting by Ramadan, the Muslim holy month that began March 10. No such truce materialised.

The primary sticking point has been Israel's insistence that it would discuss only temporary pauses to fighting until Hamas is destroyed. Hamas, which shows no sign of stepping aside, says it will free hostages only under a path to a permanent end to the war.

In his speech, Biden said his latest proposal "creates a better 'day after' in Gaza without Hamas in power". He did not elaborate on how this would be achieved, and acknowledged that "there are a number of details to negotiate to move from phase one

## SA coalition talks hit deadlock

SOUTH AFRICA'S ANC SAYS IT WON'T DITCH RAMAPHOSA TO FORM COALITION

Johannesburg, June 2: South Afric's once dominant African National Congress acknowledged that it had been humbled by an election that ended its 30-year majority but vowed not to replace President Cyril Ramaphosa as a condition to forming a new governing coalition.

Official results from Wednesday's vote, due Sunday evening, will confirm the end of the ANC's unchallenged grip on political power and start the clock on a race to strike a deal with one or more opposition parties.

Political parties will then have two weeks to work out a deal before a new parliament sits to choose a president, who would



likely still emerge from the ANC as the biggest party.

Voters, angry at joblessness, inequality and rolling blackouts, slashed support for the legacy party of Nelson Mandela to 40%. down from 57.5% in the 2019 parliamentary vote.

"Did we commit mistakes? Yes, we did. In governance and everywhere else," Fikile Mbalula, the party's secretary general, said Sunday during the first press briefing the ANC has held since the polls, adding the party had "nothing to celebrate." The result means that the ANC

must now share power, likely

with a major political rival, in order to keep it - an unprecedented prospect since the democratic end of white minority\_ rule in 1994. "The ANC is committed to the

formation of a government that reflects the will of the people, that is stable and that is able to govern effectively," Mbalula said.

The party's poor showing has fuelled speculation that Ramaphosa's days might be numbered, either due to the demands of a prospective coalition partner or as a result of an internal leadership challenge.

## South Korea pledges 'unendurable' response to North's trash balloons

Seoul, June 2: South Korea said Sunday it would take "unendurable" measures against North Korea for sending trash balloons over the border, which could include blaring propaganda from loudspeakers back at the North. The announcement from

President Yoon Suk Yeol's office followed a meeting by his National Security Council on a response to what Seoul said were more than 700 balloons carrying trash that Pyongyang sent over the heavily fortified border to rile its rival neighbour.

The council condemned the balloons and GPS jamming as an "irrational act of provocation".

Seoul did not rule out resuming the loudspeaker blasts, which it stopped in 2018 after a rare summit with North Korean leader Kim Jong Un, a senior official at

Yoon's office told reporters. The democratic South and the

communist North remain technically at war since the 1950 1953 Korean War ended in an armistice rather than a peace treaty. Seoul is a firm US ally whose sophisticated military regularly holds drills with the US, while Pyongyang is developing missile and nuclear technology that Seoul and Washington say

violates UN resolutions. North Korea has said its balloons were in retaliation for a propaganda campaign by North Korean defectors and activists in South Korea, who regularly send inflatables containing anti-Pyongyang leaflets, food, medicine, money and USB sticks loaded with K-pop music videos and dramas across the border.

The North Korean balloons carrying garbage such as cigarette butts, cloth, paper waste and plastic were found across the capital Seoul from 8 pm Saturday to 1 pm Sunday, South Korea's Joint Chiefs of Staff said.

## **Iceland elects entrepreneur as new Prez**

Copenhagen: Halla Tomasdottir, an entrepreneur, has won Iceland's presidential election and will take over the mostly ceremonial role from incumbent Gudni Johannesson, broadcaster RUV reported Sunday, Tomasdottir, 55, received 34% of the votes cast in Saturday's election in the North Atlantic nation, to beat former Prime Minister Katrin Jakobsdottir, who stepped down as premier in April to run for president. She garnered 25% of votes, according to RUV. The president, who is elected for a four-year term. carries limited political powers but often acts as a uniting figure in the island nation of almost 400,000 people, which is a NATO nember. Tomasdottir, who will be the seventh President of Iceland

since the foundation of the republic in 1944, also ran for president

### Properties worth ₹1.17L-cr sold

New Delhi: Eighteen major listed real estate developers sold properties worth Rs 1.17 lakh crore during the last fiscal with Godrej Properties becoming the largest player posting Rs 22,527 crore of sales bookings. Except for a few realty players, all major developers have achieved higher sales bookings in 2023-24 compared to the preceding financial year. This was largely driven by strong demand for residential properties, especially luxury homes, across major cities. Many developers clocked record pre-sales in the 2023-24 fiscal, riding on a surge in consumer demand. According to the data compiled from regulatory filings, eighteen major listed realty firms have reported combined sales bookings of about Rs 1,16,635 crore in the 2023-24 fiscal, up 33 per cent from nearly Rs 88,000 crore in the preceding year.

# FDI inflows shrink in FY24

**FOREIGN DIRECT INVESTMENT DIPS** 3.5% IN 2023-24

New Delhi, June 2: India received the highest foreign direct investment (FDI) from Singapore in 2023-24 even as overseas capital inflows into the country contracted by about 3.5 per cent due to global economic uncertainties, according to the latest government data.

Though FDI from Singapore has dipped by 31.55 per cent to \$11.77 billion in 2023-24, India has attracted the maximum inflows from that country, the data

During the last fiscal, FDI equity inflows decreased from major countries, including Mauritius, Singapore, the US, the UK, UAE, Cayman Islands, Germany, and Cyprus.

However, investments increased from the Netherlands and Japan.

Since 2018-19, Singapore has been the largest source of such investments for India. In 2017-18, India attracted the maximum FDI from Mauritius.

According to experts, after the India-Mauritius tax treaty amendment. Singapore has emerged as the preferred jurisdiction for investment in Rumki Majumdar, Economist,

Deloitte India, said that as one of the world's prominent financial hubs, Singapore attracts global investors who want to invest in Asia.

As per the data, Mauritius accounts for 25 per cent of the total FDI which India has received during April 2000 to March 2024 (\$171.84 billion), while Singapore's share is 24 per cent (\$159.94 billion). The US accounted for 10 per cent of total overseas investments with \$65.19 billion during the period.

Foreign investments are crucial for India to overhaul its infrastructure such as ports, airports and highways to push growth.

FDI also helps improve the country's balance of payments situation and strengthen the rupee value against other global currencies, especially the US

## FPIs dump ₹ 25,586cr worth of Indian shares



Foreign investors turn net sellers for second month in a row on poll jitters

New Delhi, June 2: Foreign investors pulled out a massive Rs 25,586 crore from Indian equities in May due to uncertainty surrounding the outcome of general election and outperformance of Chinese markets.

This was way higher than a net outflow of over Rs 8,700 crore in April on concerns over a tweak in India's tax treaty with Mauritius and a sustained rise in US bond yields.

Before that, FPIs made a net investment of Rs 35,098 crore in March and Rs 1.539 crore in February, while they took out Rs 25,743 crore in January, data with the depositories showed.

Going ahead, election results, which will be out June 4, could determine FPIs flows into Indian equities in the near future. In the medium term, US in-

terest rates will exert more influence on FPI flows, Vijayakumar, Chief Investment Strategist, Geojit Financial Services, said.

According to the data, Foreign Portfolio Investors (FPIs) made a net withdrawal of Rs 25,586 crore from equities in May.

"The main trigger for the FPI selling has been the outperformance of the Chinese stocks.

The Hang Seng index boomed 8 per cent in the first half of May, triggering selling in India and buying in Chinese stocks, Vijayakumar said.

Another reason was the spike in US bond yields. Whenever the US 10-year bond yields rose above 4.5 per cent, FPIs sold in emerging markets like India and moved money to bonds. These two factors triggered the selling in equity in India, he added.

Further, robust GDP growth, manageable inflation and political stability can create a positive outlook for the Indian economy, marking a turnaround from their net selling in May.

On the other hand, FPIs invested Rs 8,761 crore in debt and Rs 4,283 crore through debt-VRR (Voluntary Retention Route). Before this, foreign investors put in Rs 13,602 crore in March, Rs 22,419 crore in February, Rs 19,836 crore in January.

This inflow was driven by the upcoming inclusion of Indian government bonds in the JP Morgan Index.


Market experts believe that long-term outlook for FPI flows into Indian debt is positive due to India's inclusion in global bond indices.

However, near-term flows are being impacted by global macroeconomic uncertainty and volatility. Overall, FPIs withdrew a net amount of Rs 23,364 crore from equities in 2024 so far. They however invested Rs 53.669 crore in debt market.

## 15% rise in India's power consumption

New Delhi: India's power consumption rose nearly 15 per cent to 156.31 billion units (BU) in May as compared to the year-ago period, mainly due to scorching heat in the country which forced excessive use of cooling appliances like air conditioners and desert coolers. In May 2023, the power consumption stood at 136.50 BU,



government data showed. The highest supply in a day (peak power demand met) also rose to an all-time high of 250.07 GW in May 2024 against 221.42 GW in the year-ago month. The previous all-time high peak power demand of 243.27 GW was recorded in September 2023. Last month, the power ministry had projected a peak power demand of 235 GW during daytime and 225 GW during evening hours for May and 240 GW during daytime and 235 GW during evening hours for June 2024. The ministry also estimated that peak power demand may hit 260 GW during this summer.

## AC makers clock two-fold jump in sales

New Delhi: A blistering summer has led to an almost two-fold jump in sales of airconditioners in May even as leading manufacturers have been grappling with delays in installation and replenishing inventories of hot-selling energy-efficient models. The mercury is hovering above 45



degrees at several places including the national capital, which has been under the grip of a severe heatwave for the past few days. At the same time, AC makers are navigating exceptional demand, recording their bestever sales in a month so far. Leading brands like Voltas, LG, Daikin, Panasonic, and Blue Star witnessed robust sales in May and the industry expects an overall growth of 30 to 35 per cent in 2024 compared to their

## OPEC+ extends deep oil output cuts

Oil prices trade near \$80 per barrel, below what many OPEC+ members need to balance their budget

Dubai, June 2: OPEC+ agreed Sunday to extend most of its deep oil output cuts well into 2025, exceeding market expectations, as the group seeks to shore up the market amid tepid demand growth, high interest rates and rising rival US pro-

Oil prices trade near \$80 per barrel, below what many OPEC+ members need to balance their budget. Worries over slow demand growth in top oil importer China have weighed on prices alongside rising oil stocks in developed economies.

The Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries and allies led by Russia, together known as OPEC+, have made a series of deep output cuts since

OPEC+ members are currently



cutting output by a total of 5.86 million barrels per day (bpd), or about 5.7% of global demand.

Those include 3.66 million bpd of cuts, which were due to expire at the end of 2024, and voluntary cuts by eight members of 2.2 million bpd, expiring at the end of June 2024.

On Sunday, OPEC+ agreed to extend the cuts of 3.66 million bpd by a year until the end of 2025 and prolong the cuts of 2.2 million bpd by three months until the end of September 2024. OPEC will spend one year on gradually phasing out cuts of 2.2 million bpd starting from October 2024 until the end of September 2025, three OPEC+ sources said.

"Now the market has clarity for almost 1.5 years," an OPEC+ delegate said, declining to be Amrita Sen, co-founder of

Energy Aspects think tank, said: 'The deal should allay market fears of OPEC+ adding back barrels at a time when demand concerns are still rife".

Analysts had expected OPEC to prolong voluntary cuts by a few months due to falling oil prices and sluggish demand

But many analysts had also predicted the group would struggle to set targets for 2025 as it had yet to agree individual capacity targets for each member, an issue that had previously created tensions. The United Arab Emirates,

for instance, has been pushing for a higher production quota arguing its capacity figure had been long under-estimated. But in a surprise development

Sunday, OPEC+ postponed the discussions on capacities until November 2025 from this year.

Instead, the group agreed a new output target for the United Arab Emirates which will be allowed to gradually raise production by 0.3 million bpd, up from the current level of 2.9 million.

## Mcap of 8 of 10 top firms erodes by ₹2.08L-crore

New Delhi, June 2: The combined market valuation of eight of the top-10 most valued firms declined by Rs 2,08,207.93 crore last week, with bellwether Reliance Industries, TCS and Infosys taking the biggest hit.

While these three firms along with ITC, Life Insurance Corporation (LIC), Hindustan Unilever Ltd, Bharti Airtel and ICICI Bank were the laggards, HDFC Bank and State Bank of India (SBI) emerged as gainers.

Last week, the 30-share BSE Sensex tanked 1,449 points or 1.92 per cent. It rose by 75.71 points or 0.10 per cent to settle at 73,961.31 Friday, snapping a five-day losing streak.

The market capitalisation (mcap) of index heavyweight Reliance Industries plunged by Rs 67,792.23 crore to Rs 19,34,717.12 crore, while TCS mcap declined by Rs 65,577.84 crore to Rs 13,27,657.21 crore.

The valuation of Infosys slumped by Rs 24,338.1 crore to Rs 5,83,860.28 crore, and that of ITC went lower by Rs 12,422.29 crore to Rs 5,32,036.41

Mcap of LIC dropped by Rs 10,815.74 crore to Rs 6,40,532.52 crore, while HUL's valuation eroded by Rs 9,680.31 crore to Rs 5,47,149.32 crore.

Bharti Airtel's mcap fell by Rs 9,503.31 crore to Rs 7,78,335.40 crore, and that of ICICI Bank dipped by Rs 8.078.11 crore to Rs 7.87.229.71 crore. However, mcap of HDFC Bank climbed Rs 10,954.49 crore to Rs 11,64,083.85 crore.

SBI added Rs 1,338.7 crore, taking the market valuation to Rs 7,40,832.04 crore.

New Delhi, June 2: Gautam Adani has retaken the tag of richest person in Asia after a surge in stock price of the listed companies in his apples-to-airport conglomerate helped him overtake Reliance Industries

head Mukesh Ambani. Adani with a net worth of \$111 billion is now ranked as the 11th richest in the world, ahead of Ambani whose \$109 billion wealth placed him at No 12, according to the Bloomberg Billionaires Index.

Shares of all Adani Group companies surged Friday by up to 14 per cent after US brokerage

Jefferies put a bullish view on the group that is back to an expansion spree with a planned \$90 billion capital expenditure over the next decade. An addition of Rs 84,064 crore

in market value took the market capitalisation of 10 Adani group listed firms to Rs 17.51 lakh crore at the close of trading Friday. This helped Adani, a first generation entrepreneur and chairman of the namesake conglomerate, overtake Ambani, who is currently on a cruise in Europe for a second, multi-million-dollar pre-wedding celebration of his youngest son Anant.

Adani, 61, had in 2022 become Asia's richest man after his per-



sonal wealth rose even as the global economy suffered a period of slowing growth. But in January 2023, his sprawling \$21 billion conglomerate that owns many of India's airports, the nation's largest private-sector port, the media giant New Delhi Television, largest renewable energy firm, data centres and many other holdings was hit by a damning report by prominent short-seller Hindenburg

Hindenburg alleged Adani's business empire was built through fraud, sending stock prices of his group crashing by \$150 billion at its lowest point and him out of the world's top 20 billionaires. Ambani, who had to give away his Asia's richest tag to Adani in 2022, was again the top billionaire

while Ambani's wealth has increased by \$12.7 billion, according to Bloomberg Billionaires Index.

Adani's wealth ballooned in the last 10 years, rising from roughly \$5 billion in 2014 to a whopping \$121 billion at the end of 2022. He briefly became the world's second-richest person in September 2022.

# Late Real show sinks Dortmund

London, June 1: Jude Bellingham described it as 'the best night in his life' as Real Madrid won their 15th Champions League title at a raucous Wembley Stadium here Saturday. They delivered another late surge to claim a 2-0 victory over a Borussia Dortmund team who had threatened an upset win after dominating the

first hour. With Dortmund having made but spurned, several good chances, Real Madrid took control when Dani Carvajal headed in from a corner after 74 minutes and Vinicius (Jr) fired home the second to break German hearts.

Victory secured the trophy for the sixth time in 11 seasons and it was Real's 11th straight triumph in a European final – their last defeat coming against Aberdeen in the Cup Winners' Cup 41 years ago. They have now won the continent's most prestigious club competition more than twice as often as the next best team.

It was a record-extending fifth success as a coach for Carlo Ancelotti, who also won the trophy twice as a player with AC Milan. that continues," Ancelotti said after the game.

Words bouncing around in post-match interviews Saturday included 'clinical', 'ice-cold', and 'belief', while Carvajal summed up the match perfectly after the latest turnaround as his side completed a LaLiga-Champions

"After the first half we didn't even deserve to go to the changing room," Carvajal said. "But we came out of the first half alive, knowing that we would have our moment... and here it is.'

Dortmund, who had shocked Paris St Germain in the semifinals, had a dream first half in every aspect other than scoring. Their first good chance came after 21 minutes when Karim Adeyemi went too wide when rounding goalkeeper Thibaut Courtois.

Then came a flurry of opportunities as Niclas Fuellkrug hit the post and low shots by Julian Brandt and Marcel Sabitzer were saved by Courtois.

Real were unfazed by what

looked livelier from the start of the second half without really

Courtois saved a diving header from Fuellkrug and Dortmund were soon ruing the misses as 5ft 8 inches full-back Carvajal rose to meet a Toni Kroos corner and steer in a glancing header.

Madrid added their second goal when Dortmund's Ian Maatsen gave the ball away on the edge of his box. La Liga player of the year and former Dortmund midfielder Bellingham fed Vinicius (Jr) in space and the Brazilian fired home unerringly.

### Maradona trophy auction postponed

Paris: The auction of a trophy awarded to the late Diego Maradona which was planned this week here has been postponed. French auction house 'Aguttes' said Sunday amid a judicial investigation looking into the possible resale of stolen goods. Maradona's heirs this week failed to stop the auction of the 'Golden Ball' trophy he received for being the best player at the 1986 World Cup by starting an urgent judicial motion. A French court ruled the auction could go ahead, "Maradona has always aroused passions and so our mission is to organise the auction in the best possible conditions, both for our seller and for the buyers," Maximilien Aguttes said in a statement.

## Boxers Amit, Jaismine seal Paris spot HUGE GAME FOR

Bangkok, June 2: World Championships silver medallist boxer Amit Panghal and national champion Jaismine Lamboria qualified for the Paris Olympics with contrasting quarterfinal wins at the 2nd Qualification Tournament here Sunday. Panghal's comeback to the

Indian team culminated in the fifth Olympic quota in boxing as the multiple-time Asian Championships medallist notched a 5-0 win over China's Chuang Liu for a ticket to his second Olympics.

Jaismine, who dropped down from 60kg, then reclaimed the women's 57kg quota for the country, which India had to be surrender after holder Parveen Hooda was suspended for whereabout failure last month. Jaismine out-punched Marine Camara of Mali in a rather lopsided quarterfinal.

Panghal and Jaismine thus join the quartet of Nishant Dev (71kg), Nikhat Zareen (50kg), Preeti Pawar (54kg) and Lovlina Borgohain (75kg) in booking Olympic berths. Panghal had only one shot at making the Paris Olympics and the 2018 Asian Games champion made

the most of his opportunity. The going has been tough for

Panghal as he lost his place in the national team on the basis of Boxing Federation of India's (BFI) evaluation system to World Championship bronze medallist Deepak Bhoria, who competed at the earlier two qualifying events.

Since the Tokyo Olympics, the only big-ticket event that the Haryana boxer has competed in was the Commonwealth Games in 2022, where he won the gold medal. He also emerged victorious at the prestigious Strandja Memorial tournament earlier

The quarterfinal bout began on

a rather sedate note with both



boxers trying to assess each other. One minute into the bout, Liu went after Panghal. At a height disadvantage, the Indian struggled to find his range, and he did manage to land a couple of scor-

ing shots but didn't engage much. Trailing 1-4, Panghal, a threetime Asian Championship medallist, changed his strategy. He went on the offensive, beginning the second round on a positive note. And it worked for him for

the rest of the match. In the last three minutes, Liu changed his game and moved closer to Panghal. It was an energy sapping affair as both boxers traded punches, going hammer and tongs at each other. In the end, Panghal prevailed.

Kolkata, June 2: Indian football team coach Igor Stimac said Sunday the upcoming FIFA World Cup Qualifier against Kuwait could 'change the careers' of his players and described it as a 'huge game'. The match will be played June 6 at the Salt Lake Stadium here.

Despite their shocking loss to lower-ranked Afghanistan in the home leg match in Guwahati in March, the hosts can still make a maiden entry into the third round of qualifiers for the 2026 World Cup.

"It's a huge game. The careers of the boys can change with this game. I want them to enjoy and do their best in the game," Stimac was quoted as saying by the All India Football Federation (AIFF).

India, who slipped to 121 in FIFA rankings after gaining just a solitary point in their two meetings with Afghanistan, will look to put up a much better display against Kuwait in what will also be talisman Sunil Chhetri's farewell from international football.

"For such an important game, we need to do a few things; in re-

gards to strength conditioning, in regards to understanding what it needs, in regards to how important this game is, and in regards to mental strength and self-confidence. So, we worked on all aspects needed for our boys to be on top of their form in this game," Stimac pointed out.

There are two key points for the preparations for this game. First, winning the game is crucial. And to reach that target, we need to be very clever. We need to understand that in the game, we require patience. We need to be intelligent and play quality football together with pace,"the coach added.

The Blue Tigers are winless in their last six matches and have scored just a goal in these games.

## Babar asks mates to remain calm

New York, June 2: The hype, the expectations and the pressure around India-Pakistan games certainly makes players nervous, according to Pakistan skipper Babar Azam who advised his side to stay calm and stick to basics during the much-awaited T20 World Cup clash, here Sunday. India have lost only once to Pakistan in the T20 World Cup in seven meetings.

"We know Pakistan-India fixture generates more discussion than any other match. 'Obviously, the expectations and the hype around this match cause some nervousness. It all comes down to how you handle it. It's a game of immense pressure, and if you keep your head cool, stay calm and trust your hard work and skills, things will be easier," Babar said in a PCB podcast.

## Batting order not fixed: Rohit

New York, June 2: The Indian team are yet to 'nail' their batting line-up for the T20 World Cup and much shouldn't be read into the think tank's decision to send Rishabh Pant at No. 3 in the warm-match against Bangladesh, skipper Rohit Sharma said after the game Saturday.

"It was just to give him (Pant) an opportunity to bat higher up the order. We have not really nailed down what the batting unit will look like. Even the bowlers did pretty well. All in all happy with how things went," Rohit stated when asked about Pant.

"Pretty much got what we wanted from the game. Like I said at the toss, it was important to get used to the conditions. New venue, new ground, drop-in pitch - important to get used to these factors. We man-



aged pretty well," Rohit added. Rohit also praised pacer Arshdeep Singh. "He has shown us, in whatever games he has played, he has the skills up-front. He has got a very good skill-set (at the death too). We saw it today (Saturday). He bowled pretty well, swung the ball up front, and then bowled one at the backend. We have got 15 good players.

We have to see what the conditions are and then see what combination is best for us," the Indian skipper added.

Head coach Rahul Dravid said the pitch was a bit soft and spongy, while lauding the performance of his players. "It's great to get a good hit-out. Obviously, it looks like a good facility," Dravid stated.
