n a world where technology promises to connect

us like never before, these same digital advances are making people more vulnerable than ever. They often find their bank accounts drained, identities stolen, and privacy breached in ways

beyond imagination. For many, it's not just about the money or the data; it's the feeling of being completely violated. Victims of cybercrime often describe a deep sense of vulnerability and helplessness, as if their lives were taken over by an unseen force. No longer can we simply enjoy the comfort of knowing our information is safe online. Each time we log in, we wonder, "Am I next?" The sense of safety many once felt is slipping away, replaced by a constant fear of be

replaced by a constant fear of being targeted.

At the same time, fake news is spreading like wildfire, and the emotional toll is just as significant. Fake news doesn't just confuse; it divides us as well. It fuels anger, spreads hate, and even damages relationships. Every time a lie is shared, it's not just an attack on the truth; it's an attack on people's beliefs, their sense of reality, and their emotional well-being.

The emotional impact of these growing threats is real, and people are left to wonder how to protect themselves. As these dangers continue to grow, we must face the uncomfortable truth that if we don't take action, we risk losing not just our security, but the trust that keeps our

world together. While most interusers net feel helpless in addressing such issues. there are people who spearhead relentless campaigns on social media to sensitize potential victims.

A few of these digital war-

riors share their recommendations to overcome these unseen dangers with **Sunday POST.**

'Sensitisation can curb the rate of cybercrimes'

Prashant Sahu, CEO of Suryanandan.net and a renowned cyber expert, emphasizes the importance of awareness

in combating the rapidly evolving landscape of cybercrime. He says.

"The only solution to cybercrime is sensitization. People's awareness can curb the rate of cybercrimes. In a world where the online space and methods of cybercrime are evolving constantly, knowledge is crucial. People lose huge amounts of monev due to these scams. Now. scammers use a new term called 'digital arrest,' but people should

know that no such term exists: no one can arrest you digitally. When receiving a call from an online scammer, people often panic and share their credentials, even when they know they shouldn't. Lurge them not to panic and to use their common sense. For instance, if someone claims to be from TRAI (Telecom Regulatory Authority of India) and threatens SIM blockage, remember that TRAI is only a regulatory body. It does not have the authority to make such calls. Similarly, the CBI (Central Bureau of Investigation) never makes calls and does not have a uniform, so how can someone claiming to be from the CBI be in a police uniform? These are clear red flags people must recognize to avoid falling victim to scams."

To raise awareness, Sahu actively uses social media platforms to educate the public about various online scams.

"Everyone says that you should be aware of cybercrime, but where can you gain awareness? The government should conduct regular campaigns and workshops to educate people. I try to inform people about the ways they can be scammed

mers steal your money by luring you with tempting schemes like lotteries, quick loans, or credit card offers. They are trained in such a way that they repeatedly mention the prize amount, which creates a sense of greed or losing something very precious. They take our money and use it against us in the form of anti-social activities," quips Sahu, urging everyone to remain cautious and informed in the digital space.

"For individuals, WhatsApp two-step verification is very necessary. If using Facebook (Meta), they should hide their friend list. If they have a bank account, they should not keep large amounts of money in a savings account but rather invest in a fixed deposit. People should never share OTPs. Before taking any action, they should think wisely. In my opinion, cybercrime can be eliminated if the government makes KYC mandatory for SIM purchases because everything starts with the illegal .purchase of SIM cards," he suggests.



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'Adopt a culture of cyber hygiene to mitigate risks'

Chandra Sekhar Biswal, Director of Defigo Solutions 4u Pvt Ltd, Bhubaneswar, says, "In this digital era, the rapid growth and dependency of human



beings on computers and technology have brought unparalleled convenience, but on the other hand. this is very alarming due to the rise in cyber-attacks. Attackers 11Se very sophisticated and modern techniques for inditargeting

viduals as well as organizations through social engineering, malware injection, phishing attacks, investment fraud, fake bank account apps, digital arrest, etc.'

Biswal goes on to add, "Cybercriminals primarily target individuals by exploiting two major psychological aspects: fear and greed. Under the guise of fear, they often frighten victims by making fraudulent phone calls impersonating law enforcement authorities such as the police, income tax department, excise department, or immigration officials. These criminals manipulate people by claiming that an immediate relative is in danger or has committed a crime, threatening digital arrest to extort money. In some cases, they resort to 'nude calls,' where they record inappropriate video content and use it for sextortion. On the other hand, through greed, they lure victims by offering attractive schemes such as high-interest rates on investments, fake offers on e-commerce platforms, or lucrative lottery prizes. These scams usually culminate in convincing the victim to install a fake application, granting the attackers access to sensitive information, including banking details and OTPs, leading to financial fraud.'

Asked about the ways to check cyber attacks, Biswal explains, "Cybercriminals exploit weak passwords, insufficient verification mechanisms, and an overall lack of security awareness. As a cybersecurity

professional, I emphasize the adoption of proactive technical measures and a culture of cyber hygiene to mitigate these risks.

Elaborating further, he continues: "For individuals, multi-factor authentication (MFA) is non-negotiable. It adds a critical second layer of defense, ensuring that even if credentials are compromised, unauthorized access is prevented. Password managers should be adopted to create and store complex, unique passwords for each account. Regular software updates and patch management are also essential to address known vulnerabilities that attackers often exploit. Data encryption both at rest and in transit—is vital for protecting sensitive information. Backup systems should follow the 3-2-1 rule: maintain three copies of your data, stored on two different types of media, with one copy stored offsite.

Signing off, he shared his thoughts on how to protect organizations.

"Businesses must also conduct regular penetration testing and vulnerability assessments to identify weaknesses before attackers do. Despite these technical defenses, education remains critical. Phishing simulations and regular training help employees and individuals recognize and respond to suspicious activity," he concluded.

'Stay Informed, stay cautious, and contribute to a safer online community'

Binayak Sahoo, HOD of the CSE department at MITM Bhubaneswar and a research scholar in the CSE department at NIT Jamshedpur, is a cybersecurity expert.

According to him, "In today's world, cyber fraudsters and scammers steal information and money through deceitful means like phishing emails, fake websites, and social engineering. To protect themselves, citizens need to be cautious in terms of source verification before clicking on links, avoid sharing sensitive data. loading and downanything from unverified contacts. Avoid suspicious emails, urgent financial requests, and unbelievable offers. Regu-

larly updating passwords, not sharing PINs, passwords, and OTPs, and staying informed about the latest scams can help prevent cyber fraud. Read the SMS carefully before sharing any OTP and never use your UPI PIN to receive money. Awareness and caution are key—think before you click and always report suspicious activity to authorities. Protection from cybercrime and misinformation requires great care



in this digital era. To safeguard oneself against cybercrime. strong. unique

passwords (don't use common passwords like 123456789, etc.) and two-factor authentication should be activated for secure

account management. Constant software updates and prevention of phishing attempts are important practices through the avoidance of dubious links.

He goes on to add, "To protect against fake news, the source must be authenticated first. Cross-checking with reliable news outlets and websites can help differentiate truth from falsehood. Additionally, critical thinking and educating others about verifying infor-

mation before sharing can collectively enhance our defense against these digital

threats. Stav informed, stay and cautious. contribute to a safer on

line community. Tech-savvy individuals must help other netizens to be aware of the activities of scammers to protect themselves.3

Talking about the ripple effects of digital attacks, he shares, "Cybercrime impacts deeply into our lives on personal, professional, and social levels. This includes possible economic exploitation, theft of identity, and psychological trauma to individuals. For larger structures, businesses suffer major economic loss and confidential data loss, with a loss of consumer confidence. Government systems suffer at the national security level. which can halt some public services as well. This, therefore, sends ripple effects of undermining the digital infrastructure that modern society relies on. This shows an urgent need for robust cybersecurity measures and awareness to fight this ever-evolving threat.'

"Proactive defense strategies and strong cybersecurity awareness are required as cyber threats evolve to mitigate risks in this increasingly digital world," concluded Sahoo.

Tees suggests history is often cyclical'

▶ **DB**: The narrative underscores that time is not uniform—different aspects of life evolve at different rates. Some elements of society, like chaiwalas, remain constant, while others, such as political power dynamics and societal roles, evolve rapidly. This contrast highlights the complexity of time, showing that while some things change dramatically, others remain unchanged,

suggesting that wa progress is not the

linear and that history is often cyclical.

► SB: Ayesha's character (Manisha as Ayesha in the film) is tied to a complex web of personal and familial struggles. Could you explain how her character evolves throughout the film?

DB: Ayesha's character is deeply connected to broader societal issues, especially the ways in which women navigate patriarchal structures while trying to find autonomy within those confines. She represents a generation of women who, despite societal limitations, have created spaces for themselves. Ayesha's evolution throughout the film mirrors how individuals, especially older generations, respond to changing social dynamics in terms of family and identity. The personal struggles of her daughter, dealing with issues like sexuality and identity, contrast with her more traditional worldview. Yet, her acceptance of these struggles-like inviting a Hindu guest for dinner during the migration crisis—symbolizes a quiet resilience and adaptability. Her journey reflects the tension between generational shifts and the complexities of family life.

► SB: The film features a unique blend of reality and virtual spaces, especially in scenes like Anhad Draboo's (played by Shashank Arora) virtual interview and the subway. How do these virtual elements reflect the film's themes of control and escape?

DB: The virtual elements in the film are used to emphasize the divide between reality and the constructed digital spaces that people are forced into. The virtual interview scene was initially meant to be an in-person meeting, but COVID made it a reflection of how human interactions in the future might be mediated by avatars and technology. The subway, initially envisioned for a different purpose, became an escape space in the film, where characters could briefly experience freedom and release within the confined reality of their world. These virtual elements highlight themes of control, as the characters are constrained by the physical and social systems around them, but they also seek moments of personal liberation or expression within those boundaries. The juxtaposition of physical and virtual spaces underscores the tension between individual agency and the overarching forces that shape the characters' lives.



nown for influencing modern Indian cinema with his unique storytelling techniques and groundbreaking movies, filmmaker Dibakar Banerjee needs no introduction. His films often address social and political issues, adding depth to mainstream movies. Banerjee is also known for introducing the concept of anthology films in Indian cinema with *Love Sex Aur Dhokha*.

The *Khosla Ka Ghosla!* helmer was recently in Bhubaneswar to attend the 14th India Film Festival of Bhubaneswar (IFFB), organised by the Film Society of Bhubaneswar (FSB), and present his unreleased film *Tees*.

Talking about the movie, it delves into themes of time, generational change, and social transformation, particularly through the lens of Kashmir. The Manisha Koirala-starrer speaks about the challenges faced by a society caught between tradition and progress, and how the narrative spans three key time periods: 1989, 2019, and 2042.

On the sidelines of the event, Banerjee engaged in a conversation with FSB president **Subrata Beura** following the screening of his new movie.

Excerpts:

▶ SB: Dibakar, could you explain the significance of the 30-year span in the narrative, specifically 1989, 2019, and 2042?

DB: The 30-year span, particularly between 1989 and 2019, reflects a generational shift. While people experience life at different times, they are all connected by the same time continuum. The idea is that adults were once children, and children will one day be adults. This structure plays with the notion of continuity,

creating a parallel universe that explores how time shapes different generations and their understanding of the world.

► SB: Could you elaborate on the setting of Kashmir in 1989 and why it's so significant in the context of the story?

▶ **DB:** Kashmir in 1989 is a critical setting, as it reflects a time of social and economic transformation. During the late 1970s and 1980s, land redistribution policies implemented by Sheikh Abdullah's government helped create a growing middle class. This period marked a transition from a more traditional society to a more modern one, with significant mobility within social classes. However, this economic shift was abruptly interrupted by militancy, which dramatically changed the landscape of Kashmir. The film uses this period to highlight the fragility of social change in the face of political unrest.

► SB: Why did you choose to depict a powerful woman, visibly pregnant, in a leadership role in 2042?

▶ **DB:** The depiction of a powerful woman in a leadership role is a symbolic representation of shifting power dynamics and the breaking of traditional gender norms. The choice to show her visibly pregnant adds another layer of meaning, suggesting that societal progress and personal life can coexist. By placing a woman in a position of power, especially in a society that is undergoing significant change, the film emphasizes a future where gender roles are no longer rigid, and women can lead in ways that were once unimaginable.

SB: How does the narrative address the concept of time and how things evolve?
