India ride on Virat ton to sweet win over Pak

Dubai, Feb 23: Virat Kohli showcased his penchant to lord over Pakistan in ICC tournaments once more as the batting icon's glittering unbeaten 100 helped India claim an authoritative six-wicket win over their traditional rivals and all but seal a semifinal spot in the Champions Trophy here Sunday.

The victory should be enough for India, who are now on top

of Group A with four points, to make the last four. However, Pakistan are staring at early elimination

from the eight-team event after their second successive loss.

Chasing a tricky 242, India rode on Kohli's 51st ODI ton, Shreyas Iyer's classy 67-ball 56 and Shubman Gill's brilliant start of 46 off 52 balls to overhaul the target with more than seven overs to spare. Kohli rebelled against his

own modest recent form and a dangerous opposition to peel off a memorable knock that took 111 balls and was punctuated with seven fours.

Pakistan, on the other hand, are on their way out of the tournament of which they are the hosts. Once again, they ran into their old nemesis — Kohli. The 36-year-old had several demons of his own to tame — a lean run.

Man shot dead by bro-in-law

Dhenkanal, Feb 23: A man was accidentally shot dead by his brother-in-law while hunting for wildlife in a jungle in Dhenkanal district late Saturday night.

The deceased was identified as Gobind Chandra Nayak, resident of Kalanga Phasigaon village and the owner of a cashew orchard and a farm house at Kalanga Chakundanali, around 5 km away from his residence. The accused was identified as his brother-in-law Ramesh Nayak of Alusingh village under Rasol police limits in the district.

The incident occurred when Gobind and Ramesh were hunting for wild animals in a jungle abutting the farm house. Gobind and Ramesh had taken different paths in search of prev when Ramesh heard a sound. He mistook it for a barking deer and fired from country-made gun without any warning.

Tragically, the bullets struck Gobind, causing fatal injuries on his chest, abdomen, and right arm. Realising his mistake, Ramesh hid the gun and fled the scene

Police arrested the accused, Ramesh Nayak, and produced him in the court, SP Abhinav Sonkar said at a presser Sunday.

Pakistan, Bangladesh resume direct trade

Islamabad, Feb 23: Pakistan and Bangladesh have resumed direct trade for the first time since the 1971 separation, with the first government-approved cargo departing from Port Qasim, according to a media report.

The agreement was finalised in early February when Bangladesh agreed to purchase 50,000 tonnes of Pakistani rice through the Trading Corporation of Pakistan (TCP)

"For the first time, a Pakistan National Shipping Corporation (PNSC) vessel carrying government cargo will dock at a Bangladeshi port, marking a significant milestone in maritime trade relations," The Express Tribune newspaper reported.

Under a deal finalised in early February, Bangladesh is set to import 50,000 tonnes of rice from Pakistan through the Trading Corporation of Pakistan (TCP). The shipment will be completed in two phases, with the remaining 25,000 tonnes to be dispatched in early March.

The development is seen as a positive step in fostering economic cooperation and reopening trade channels that remained dormant for decades. The latest trade deal is expected to strengthen economic ties

between the two nations and facilitate direct shipping routes. After Sheikh Hasina's ouster as the prime minister of Bangladesh last year, the bilateral relations witnessed a thaw with high-level exchanges between

Largest drone attack on eve of anniversary

Kyiv, Feb 23: Russia launched more strike drones into Ukraine overnight Saturday than in any other single attack of the war, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy said Sunday, one day before the threevear anniversary of Moscow's full-scale invasion.

Writing on social media, Zelenskyy said 267 strike drones had been sent in what he called "the largest attack since Iranian drones began hitting Ukrainian cities and villages.

Ukraine's air force said 138 drones had been shot down over 13 Ukrainian regions, with 119 more lost en route to their targets. Three ballistic missiles had also been fired, the air force said. One person was killed in a missile strike on the city of Kryvyi Rih, according to the head of the Kryvyi Rih military administration.

The attack came as leaders in Kyiv and across Europe are seeking to navigate rapid changes in US foreign policy under President Donald Trump,

who in a matter of days has upended years of firm support for Ukraine, leading to fears that he would join with Moscow to force a settlement to the war without involving Ukraine and its European backers

Trump's engagement with Russian officials and his agreement to reopen diplomatic ties and economic cooperation with Moscow marked a dramatic about-face in US policy which had previously sought to isolate Russia and its president, Vladimir Putin, over the war.

Zelenskyy has expressed fears that Trump pushing a quick resolution would result in lost territory for Ukraine and vulnerability to future Russian aggression, though US officials have asserted that the Ukrainian leader would be involved if and when peace talks actually start.

Trump, however, prompted alarm and anger in Ukraine when this week he suggested that Kyiv had started the war, and that Zelenskyy was acting as a "dictator" since the country has not held elections.

7 projects in FY24: Finance Ministry report PRESS TRUST OF INDIA New Delhi, Feb 23: Amid a

raging political controversy over USAID's alleged role in influencing Indian elections the latest annual report of the Finance Ministry has disclosed that the agency funded seven projects worth USD 750 million in 2023-24.

Currently, seven projects worth a total budget of USD 750 million (approx.) are being implemented by USAID in partnership with Government of India, as per the Finance Ministry annual report for 2023-24.

For the financial year 2023-24 an obligation of a total of USD 97 million (about ₹825 crore) has been made by the US Agency for International Development (USAID) under the seven projects, it said.

The Department of Econom ic Affairs under the Finance Ministry which is the nodal de partment for bilateral funding arrangements has also shared the details of projects funded in

2023-24 in the report. During the year, no funding was made for enhancing voter turnout but to projects related to agriculture & food security pro gramme; water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH); Renewable Energy; disaster management and health. Besides, it said, funds were committed for Sustainable Forests and Climate Adaptation Programme and Energy Efficien cy Technology Commercialisa tion and Innovation Project.

The United States of America's bilateral development assistance to India started in 1951 and it is mainly administered through USAID. Since its commencement, USAID has provid ed economic assistance of over USD 17 billion to India in various sectors for over 555 projects

Political controversy erupt ed in the country earlier this month after the Elon Musk-led DOGE (Department of Gov ernment Efficiency) claimed that it had cancelled a USD 21 million grant to India to boost voter turnout.

Record 6.82L Olive Ridleys throng Rushikulya mouth

Berhampur, Feb 23: The mouth of the Rushikulya river in Ganjam district has emerged as a major rookery for the endangered Olive Ridley turtles with over 6.82 lakh such marine species assembling for mass nesting, officials said Sunday.

The mass nesting of the turtles in the Rushikulya river mouth commenced February 16.

"Over 6.82 lakh Olive Ridley turtles have laid eggs on the beach so far, surpassing the previous record of the arrival of 6.37 lakh marine species in 2023," Berhampur Divisional Forest Officer (DFO) Sunny Khokkar said.

A total of 6,37,008 turtles laid eggs in eight days of mass nesting from February 23 to March 2 in 2023, while 5.50 lakh turtles had laid eggs in 2022, sources said.

As the mass nesting of the Olive Ridley turtles is yet to be completed, the number might increase, the DFO said.

Favourable climatic conditions are one of the reasons for a record number of Olive Ridlev turtles visiting the beach for mass nesting, experts said. "The better climatic condition this year has helped more

Govt orders action against 'unruly' KIIT employees

Bhubaneswar, Feb 23: The state government has asked the authorities of Kalinga Institute of Industrial Technology (KIIT) to initiate action against the employees involved in the mistreatment of students following the recent suicide by a Nepalese girl in her hostel room, an official said Sunday.

The state government's directive came a day after Nepal Foreign Minister Arzu Rana Deuba spoke to Chief Minister Mohan Charan Ma-

She insisted that the teachers and staff who misbehaved with Nepalese students should be removed from the college, the official said.

"We have already issued an instruction to KIIT authorities to take prompt action to restore the confidence of Nepalese students who have not returned to the campus so far," a senior official told PTI.

The Nepal government has also expressed concern that their students may be subject ed to reprisal if the "unruly" teachers and staff members

Out of the nearly 1,000 Nepalese students of KIIT, only a few could return to the campus responding to the assurance of the state government and apology by the institute authorities.

"The students, including girls, who have undergone a harrowing experience Monday (February 17) for being forcibly evicted from hostels, dropped at a railway station far away from Bhubaneswar without having tickets to return, are yet to recover from the fear," said one of the Nepalese students.

The police after examining CCTV footage have arrested 10 employees of KIIT, including some director-level officials, secu rity guards and others on charges of assaulting the students.

According to a release issued by KIIT February 18, two security staffers were terminated from service while two senior hostel officials and one senior administrative officer of the International Relations Office (IRO) were suspended pending inquiry.

KIIT authorities have also tendered an apology for some of its staff making some disparaging comments and the distress caused to the students.

Will take steps to stop floodlight gaffe: New OCA president

ed president of OCA, Pankaj Lochan Mohanty, said, "We have submitted our reply to the state government. To ensure that such an incident does not happen again during such important matches, we have decided to deploy two generator sets to supply power to each floodlight.



"The driver was not in the bus and he was called up and asked to remove the vehicle after which the generators could reach the tower and the power was restored,"

Mohanty said that after that ODI, another important match was held till 1.30 am and there was no disturbance. "The BCCI has not sought any report in this matter," the new OCA chief said.






Surge in leprosy cases due to apathy, fund cut

Bhubaneswar, Feb 23: At a time when the Centre has set an ambitious target of eliminating leprosy from India - "Leprosy-Mukt Bharat" - by 2027, the disease is showing no sign of subsiding in Odisha which has recorded 8,396 cases in 2023-24 as compared to 6,148 in 2020-21. Making things worse, funding from the Union government has declined between 2022-23 and 2024-25, thereby making the fight against the chronic bacterial disease weaker.

According to reports, National Leprosy Eradication Programme (NLEP), under the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW), has set an ambitious goal of achieving Leprosy-Mukt Bharat by 2027, However, Odisha has been reporting a prevalence rate (PR) of more than 1 case per 10,000 people for the last five years. In western Odisha, the crisis is even worse, with some districts consistently logging PR of 3 to 5 per 10.000.

Year-wise leprosy cases in Odisha reflect an alarming trend. While in 2020-21, the state reported 6,148 cases, the figures saw a minor dip to 5,729 in 2021-22. But it again surged to 7,197 in 2022-23, and 8,396 in 2023-24. Recorded cases till December 2024 stood at 6,194. Experts, however, are of the view that the entire-year's figures (2024-25) would surpass the records of previous years. Apart from public health con-

her, but this too was short-lived. "One day, they asked me to clean a fish. But the bones got stuck in my hands, and I didn't even feel them because of nerve damage. That's when they realised I had leprosy. Soon after, I was abandoned," she revealed, showing the bruises and burnt wounds, scattered all over her claw hands- an apparent sign of her encounters with hot objects, which she could not feel due to lack of nerve sensation.

She was then moved to a shelter home where she met her husband-another leprosy victim. Later, the couple shifted to Capital City, with fresh hopes for a new beginning.

Her husband Narayan Mohanty then worked as a daily wager near Bhima Tangi area. While normalcy made a comeback in the couple's life, one fine day, Narayan complained of intense chest pain following a strenuous physical activity.

"We had no money for treatment, so we took him to a local community health centre. But within a few days, we ran out of cash. I was forced to beg on the streets to make ends meet for my family. He died a few months later." she said, while controlling her tears, and recalled how she and her children survived on torani (rice water) for several months.

Sajani's daughter, Sanghamitra Mohanty, mother of an eight-yearold, said she dropped out of graduation due to financial constraints. "I have enrolled myself in a distance learning programme, and I hope I will complete my gradua-

tion this time," she added. State apathy & drug crunch

A senior district public health officer, requesting anonymity, said the state administration has turned a blind eye to the rising leprosy cases. "I have raised concerns at several meetings about the acute shortage of Rifampicin, a drug for leprosy, but the health secretary is all words, and no action. Meetings end with assurances only," he said.

As per government norms, a chief district medical officer (CDMO) can issue urgent tenders for immediate procurement of medicines. However, the official claimed, there have been no serious bidders, leaving leprosy patients without access to life-saving drugs.

"If cases don't decline soon, I won't be surprised if the Union Government increases the PR benchmark to 1 case per 20,000 to make the crisis look less severe.' he remarked.

Baripada, Feb 23: Buoyed by factors indicating an increase in the Royal Bengal Tiger (RBT) population in the Similipal Tiger Reserve (STR) in Mayurbhanj district, Forest department officials and experts estimate that big cat count in the reserve would exceed 60 by 2030.

Factors indicating the growing count of tigers in the reserve include the active marking and movement of the cats in the core area, and increase in incidents of them preying on livestocks in the peripheral villages, officials said.

According to a state government survey, Similipal sanctuary currently houses the highest number of RBTs in Odisha. Out of the 30 tigers in the state, 27 are found in Similipal, including 14 females, 13 males

park cover a total of 1,200 square kilometres "Each 100 sa km can accommodate about five tigers. Therefore, we estimate at least 60 tigers can be accommodated within the reserve," he said.

While the increase in tiger population has come as a positive development, it has also led to more instances of human-wildlife conflicts. In 2018, no incidents of cattle predation had been reported. But of late, over hundred of such cases have been reported.

Experts said that the tigers are expanding their territory between the core and buffer zones in search of suitable habitats and prey. Conservation measures such as maintaining a peaceful and undisturbed environment, ensuring sufficient prey availability, and preventing poaching are essential for sustaining this growth, they added.

To curb poaching activities, 150 AI-powered cameras have been installed in the park, and intensive patrolling initiated. Wildlife experts believe cattle predation a sign of a growing tiger population.

Bhanu Mitra Acharya, an independent director at the Odisha State Forest Development Corporation, noted that elderly tigers, unable to hunt efficiently, often target domestic animals. He cautioned against retaliatory poisoning by villagers, which had been a concern in the past.

The increase in Similipal's tiger population is a significant achievement for Odisha. However, ensuring long-term conservation requires continued vigilance, habitat protection, and proactive measures to mitigate human-wildlife conflicts,

894 ineligible old age pensioners found in Jajpur district, following which the

Jajpur, Feb 23: Altogether 894 ineligible people have fraudulently received benefits under an old-age pension scheme in Jajpur district and have been asked to return the money, officials said Sunday. These people have availed of the financial benefit under the old-age pension scheme by allegedly producing fake documents, they said.

The fraud came to the fore at Binjharpur block of Jajpur officials swung into action.

'We inquired about an allegation from the block that ineligible people were receiving old age pensions by producing fake documents. During the probe, we detected 894 fake beneficiaries in at least 29 gram panchayats, who were taking old age pension fraudulently by producing fake documents from September 2023 to September 2024. Hence, we have sent notices to them to refund all old-age pension money they

had received," Binjharpur BDO Hitanshu Samal said.

The BDO said officials visited the residences of the ineligi ble people and served notices to them. If they fail to refund the money that they had taken fraudulently, the administration will take legal action against them, he said.

Last year, the complaint was lodged with former BDO Dib yendu Kumar Das that an irregularity took place as several ineligible beneficiaries took old age pension fraudulently.

Preparation of 'aakhu badi' in final leg ahead of rush

Bhawanipatna, Feb 23: Sundried lentil dumpling, known locally as 'badi', holds a special place in traditional Odia cuisine, especially in western Odisha where it is known for

its unique taste. The region boasts of several varieties of badi, including aakhu (sugarcane) badi, kakharu (pumpkin) badi, bhaja (fried) badi, jhudunga (long beans) badi, phula (flower) badi, lia (fried paddy) badi, muga (green gram) badi, cutting badi, and china badam (groundnut) badi.

Among these, aakhu badi is particularly popular in Kala-



handi. Its preparation begins with cutting sugarcane into pieces, which are then peeled and mixed with fermented black gram dough. Once

shaped, it is left to dry under the sun for several days before it is ready for use. The demand for aakhu badi remains high in the district, where it is an integral part of the diet in almost every household.

Currently, homemakers in the rural as well as urban pockets of Kalahandi district are in the final stages of preparing aakhu badi, typically made between December and February, in anticipation of the usual high demand for the seasonal delicacy during the summer months ahead. Women play a key role in its production.

According to homemakers Gomani Hati and Mamata Tripathy from Dharmagarh and Bhawanipatna respectively, badi is more than just an everyday food item—it carries cultural significance too. Traditionally, badi plays a vital

role in weddings, as brides take packets of it to their in-laws homes as part of their dowry Folklore describes 'white badi' as a symbol of peace and prosperity. Many believe that including badi in the dowry brings harmony to the household and the newly-wed couple.

Furthermore, in Odia culture, a new mother is often given badi curry as her first meal after childbirth. It is believed that since the infant consumes nutrients from the mother's milk, avoiding oil and spices in her diet helps protect the newborn from potential digestive issues.

Badi remains an indispensable element of Odia cuisine, carrying deep-rooted traditions that continue to thrive across generations.

Badi is also a preserved food. In earlier times, dried leafy vegetables were stored for months, and later soaked in water before being cooked again. Similarly, badi can be preserved for years. As a result, it serves as a substitute when vegetables become expensive or scarce.

It is widely believed that households that store badi are blessed with the presence of Goddess Lakshmi, said young researcher Manas Munda. While modern food systems have reduced the demand for badi, its legacy remains intact.

Three Years On

4 February marks the third anniversary of Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine. Kremlin's strategy for a swift victory has faltered badly, leading to a protracted conflict where neither side has achieved significant advances on the battlefield. The initial goals of Russia's invasion were to quickly capture Kyiv and seize control of the eastern half of Ukraine. However, Ukrainian forces successfully halted the Russian advance towards the capital, pushed them out of the north, and later executed effective counter offensives in the east and south. In 2023, Ukraine attempted additional counter offensives, but faced challenges due to equipment shortages and robust Russian defensive positions. By 2024, the conflict had evolved into a war of

Throughout the war, Ukraine has fiercely resisted its larger and more powerful neighbour, but the situation now seems to be deteriorating significantly. Kyiv's relationship with the United States, its primary military supporter since the onset of the war in 2022, has sharply declined in the wake of Donald Trump's return to the White House. At present, the chances of receiving additional US military assistance appear bleak, and the possibility of a disadvantageous peace agreement—one that could compel Ukraine to cede territory to Russia—is becoming more likely.

Tensions escalated recently when US officials resumed discussions with their Russian counterparts, leaving Ukraine out of initial talks aimed at establishing peace. This development further strained the already fraught relationship between Trump and Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy, who last week accused the US president of "living in a Russian disinformation bubble." Hitting back, Trump described the Ukrainian president as a "dictator without elections" and warned him that he'd "better move fast" to negotiate an end to the war or risk not having a nation to lead.

Ukraine faces a potentially bleak outcome in the ongoing war, marked by significant loss of life and extensive damage estimated at up to \$500 billion over three arduous years. With a military force of approximately 900,000 personnel compared to Russia's 1.3 million. Ukraine has encountered challenges related to manpower. Since 2022, Ukraine has remained heavily reliant on Western weapons and munitions. The Trump administration has not pursued additional congressional funding for military support to Kyiv, raising concerns that the flow of US weapons may eventually halt, as occurred when funding expired in late 2023, adversely affecting Ukraine's efforts.

Meanwhile, European governments, concerned about their limited involvement in discussions between high-ranking US and Russian officials, are taking steps to bolster support for Zelenskyy while also working to maintain strong transatlantic relations. On 21 February, European Union Defence Commissioner Andrius Kubilius, the bloc's top defence official, announced that the EU intends to deliver a significant message of support to Ukraine through a new aid package, coinciding with the third anniversary of the war.

Russia seems to be relishing the discord between the US and Ukraine. While it has long portrayed the US as its primary adversary, the Kremlin has notably shifted its rhetoric and public stance towards Washington ever since Trump took office. Trump and his team are cosying up to Russian President Vladimir Putin in a bid to broker a ceasefire in Ukraine. In the process, they are also willing to forego the decades-old transatlantic alliance with Europe. What the Trump administration doesn't realise is that if Russia emerges victorious, whether through military success or a shoddy peace deal with Washington, it will become an even greater threat to Europe and ultimately, most likely, also hurt American interests. Trump, like many Americans, thinks the oceans on both sides protect mainland America. Poor in history, they forget Pearl Harbor.

MELTDOWN IN HIMALAYAS

he United Nations has declared 2025 to be the International Year of Glaciers' Preservation, making it a fitting moment to confront the stark reality that the world's ice sheets are melting. Climate change is accelerating this trend, particularly in the Hindu Kush Himalayas - a region known as the Earth's Third Pole because it contains the largest volume of ice outside of the Arctic and Antarctica. This mountain range, which

stretches across 3,500 kilometers and spans eight countries, from Afghanistan to Myanmar, is warming roughly three times faster than the global average. If temperatures rise by 3° Celsius above pre-industrial levels by the end of this century, up to 75 per cent of the region's glaciers will melt, reducing water availability, undermining food and energy security, and exacerbating biodiversity loss.

Glacial melt thus threatens irreversible damage to nearby communities and local economies. But it would also fuel instability around the globe by increasing migration, disrupting trade, and causing food prices to rise.

The 2021 flood disaster in Nepal's Melamchi River offers a glimpse of what is to come. Unusually heavy monsoon rains, coupled with excessive snowmelt, triggered a debris flow that wiped out thousands of hectares of agricultural land and destroyed critical infrastructure, leaving hundreds of thousands of people without access to water.

As the glaciers retreat, there will be too little water - a problem that is projected to afflict the Hindu Kush Himalayas by 2050. Dwindling river flows would make it more difficult to irrigate crops in an area that produces around one-third of the world's rice and one-quarter of its wheat. Water-supply

and sanitation systems will become difficult to maintain, adding to the one billion people who already lack access to basic sanitation in the region. Food insecurity will almost surely worsen as well, while communities and even entire industries will likely need to migrate in search of fresh water. Asia's poorest and most vulnerable populations will be hit the hardest.

The world must take urgent action to avert the disastrous effects of accelerating glacial melt in this region. That means deepening our knowledge by investing in multi-hazard risk assessment, because the extent of the damage will largely depend on whether global temperatures rise by 1.5° , 1.8° , 2° , or 3° C. We must also strengthen integrated river-basin management by enhancing data collection, facilitating knowledge sharing, optimising water management, and coordinating among people and communities living upstream and downstream.

Ensuring that new and existing infrastructure is climate-resilient is essential for maintaining access to safe drinking water and energy security, as well as sanitation. irrigation, and transport systems. It is equally important to protect ecosystems and promote nature-based solutions such as afforestation, reforestation, wetland preservation, and flood-plain restoration.

Every component of this strategy requires more financing. Development institutions must continue to scale up investment in the Hindu Kush Himalayas, and to work together to recast this glacial region and its river basins as a global public good, especially given their importance for agricultural and industrial activities.

community must advance the equitable use of shared glacial resources through cooperation and diplomacy. This would help defuse potential tensions and promote sustainable development, ensuring that the region's glaciers serve as a force for peace rather than conflict.

The Asian Development Bank (of which I am president) has taken steps to meet some of these goals. Together with the Green Climate Fund and country partners, ADB recently launched the Glaciers to Farms programme, which will mobilise \$3.5 billion to strengthen climate resilience in agriculture in Central and West Asia. Meanwhile, its Building Adaptation and Resilience in the Hindu Kush Himalayas-Bhutan and Nepal initiative is helping plan and design climate-resilient infrastructure and services. And ADB is also piloting new financing instruments, such as eco-compensation mechanisms, carbon markets and water trading, and sustainability-linked bonds.

When UNESCO and the World Meteorological Organization (WMO) launched the International Year of Glaciers' Preservation last month, WMO Secretary-General Celeste Saulo said that it should serve as "a wake-up call to the world." The global community must do everything in its power - from building climate resilience to accelerating the green transition and promoting regional cooperation - to ensure a sustainable future for the billions of people who depend on glaciers and their related ecosystems. Failure to act now would have catastrophic consequences for us all.

Decoupling from superpower economies

ndia must proactively safeguard its interests in the face of potential US tariff actions by pursuing a dual strategy—reducing economic dependence on the US while pushing for its exit from the WTO. This shift could position India as a leader in the Global South's decoupling from superpower economies, requiring a bold new vision and an aggressive expansion of trade networks.

The US is the 2nd largest goods exporter in the world, behind only China. The US goods exports to the world totaled \$2.1 trillion in 2022. up 17.5% (\$307.3 billion) from 2021. It's 8.5% of the world's total exports. It is the world's largest economy by nominal GDP and second largest by purchasing power parity (PPP). The US accounted for 26% of the global economy in 2023 in nominal terms, and about 15.5% in PPP terms.

In this scenario, keeping off the US may not be easy. It is extremely challenging for any developing nation to overlook the US even if President Donald Trump blatantly speaks of imposing of "reciprocal" tariff. It means unilaterally the US would impose high tariff and there is no scope for protest. Diplomatically it may be inter-

preted as intimidation. If Trump has his way, he would bulldoze the domestic economies of many countries for boosting profits of US businesses. There is time till April 1 when Trump's new tax proposal and reciprocity formula would be made public. India as a sovereign nation need not follow every diktat but it also has to mull. It can't take a step that might flare up.

Regarding trade deficits. the US consistently records deficits with several key trading partners. The largest deficit is with China, which was about \$279 billion in 2023. Mexico follows with a deficit of \$152 billion, primarily due to automotive parts and vehicles. Vietnam also emerged as a significant contributor to US trade deficit, with figures around \$104 billion.

In 2024, the US had a trade deficit of \$45.7 billion with India, which was a 5.4% increase from 2023. In 2024, the US exported \$41.8 billion worth of goods to India, which was a 3.4% increase from 2023. The US imported \$87.4 billion

worth of goods from India, which was a 4.5% increase from 2023. From April to December 2024, the US had a merchandise trade deficit of \$210.77 billion. In 2023, the US exported \$36.33 billion in services to India. This was a trade surplus of \$6.47 billion for the US, as India imported \$29.86 billion in services during the same year. In 2024, the US exported an estimated \$32.66 billion worth of services to India in December, and \$251.94 billion in the period from April to November.

The US exports to India include machinery, nuclear reactors, and boilers: \$3.29 billion, aircraft and spacecraft: \$3 billion, electrical and electronic equipment: \$2.21 billion, optical, photo, technical, and medical apparatus: \$1.99 billion.

The US has been pressurising India even during the Joe Biden regime. In November 2024, India's top imports from the US included petroleum, pearls, precious stones, coal, and electric machinery, mostly items that are available closer home at competitive prices. India is made to compromise to enhance US interests.

The US has a surplus of services, meaning it exports more services than it imports globally. The US trade-to-GDP ratio was 27% in 2022, which is lower than the global average of 63%. This means that compared to the average of all countries, the US has a smaller proportion of its economy tied to international trade. A lower trade-to-GDP ratio is interpreted as the US economy is more self-sufficient and relies less on imports and exports for its economic growth compared to other countries on average.

India must recalibrate its approach, positioning itself as an economy grappling with multiple challenges and seeking global support. At the same time, it should push for WTO reforms, particularly revisiting the special and differential treatment clause to ensure fairer global trade. India must reclaim its leadership among developing nations, exposing the widening gap between the global rich and poor. It should also boldly assert that the US, with its trade surpluses, has a greater responsibility to extend concessions rather than demand them.

Muzaffarpur (Bihar), Feb 23: In the heart of rural Bihar, where groundwater depletion, extreme heat and erratic weather have caused havoc for farmers, a quiet transformation is

A group of women, once confined to their homes despite their education, have emerged as agri-entrepreneurs, transforming not only their own lives but also helping their communities adapt to the growing threats of climate change.

Each agri-entrepreneur (AE) works with at least 150-200 small and marginal farmers, who are hit the most by these worsening climate challenges. They provide solutions to farmers on irrigation, provide climate-resilient seeds, help out with crop diversification, and act as a helpdesk for digital work—essentially a one-stop centre for all problems they may encounter.

Their remuneration is proportional to the range of services they provide farmers within a panchayat.

Soni Kumari from Hajipur, for instance, began her journey as an agri-entrepreneur last year by registering a farmer for a farmer card. She then prepared a detailed business proposal based on the farmer's profile-his social indicators, finances and cropping

She then entered the farmer's requirements into a Management Information System, creating a database of her customers to understand demand and create a business plan for

Once a homemaker, Soni who is a science graduate said she never imagined she would one day be at the forefront of promoting sustainable farming HOMEMAKERS TO CHANGEMAKERS



"I opened a shop with a micro-financing loan, where I stock everything from climate-resilient seeds to organic manure and fertilisers. We even have a drone for irrigation,'

The drone technology Soni uses has been a game-changer for her, she added.

It sprays water evenly across fields, ensuring efficient water use and reducing labour costs. "We can irrigate one acre of land in just 5-7 minutes at ₹300-500. Without the drone, this task would take 3-4 hours and labour costs would have been much higher," she said.

But drones are a big investment for the community as the battery lasts only 10-15 minutes per charge and replacing a battery would cost around ₹90,000,

Soni's journey is part of a larger movement supported by JEEVIKA, a state-level women's socioeconomic empowerment programme, that provided her with the initial training. So far, 5,178 AEs are providing services to more than 8 lakh farmers and covering 2,21,000 acres of land, according to official data.

They provide seeds, pesticides, fertilisers, farm equipment and offer services on nursery management, collective marketing and digital banking. The overall profit generated by the AEs to date is ₹1.54 crore, said Abhishek Kumar, Programme Officer for Women's Economic Empowerment at Project Concern International India. Kumar who works closely with them said they serve a key function in spreading awareness about climate-resilient farming tech-

Chanchal Devi from Mushari for instance, encourages farmers to grow water-efficient crops like palak, lal saag and cucum-

niques.

"Given the water shortage, we need crops that thrive with less water. I also teach farmers how to grow multiple crops together, like planting creepers alongside soil-intensive plants to save water and resources," Chanchal said.

Sarita Kumari, a farmer who buys seeds and fertilisers from Chanchal's shop, explained that uncertain weather conditions have made farming a very unpredictable business so the presence of agri-entrepreneurs helps.

"We earlier had to travel to the nearest town to buy seeds and there also we would get traditional seeds, not the climate-resilient ones. So it definitely helps. We have not used the drone irrigation a lot but it is becoming popular here,' the farmer said. Most agri-entrepreneurs source their seeds from Dr Rajendra Prasad Central Agricultural University in Samastipur in Bihar.

By diversifying crops and adopting water-saving techniques, farmers can reduce their vulnerability to climate shocks, said Avantika, a member of Syngenta Foundation India, which works with the women entrepreneurs.

To help farmers cope with the economic impacts of climate change, the women are also promoting the planting of

high-value cash crops, she said. Crops such as capsicum, cauliflower, broccoli, and chillies are grown using high-yielding seeds, enabling farmers to fetch better prices in the market.

The use of polyhouses has also been encouraged, allowing farmers to grow crops in controlled environments and increase yields, she added.

The Social Welfare Depart ment has decided to create a separate cadre under which sub-division, district and state-level protection officers will be appointed.

The decision has been taken in view of the rising number of domestic violence cases in the state. Speaking to PTI, Harjot Kaur Bamhrah, additional chief secretary of the Social Welfare Department and chairman cum MD of Bihar Women and Child Development Corporation, said, "The department has decided to appoint full-time POs to effectively deal with cases of domestic violence.'

"The process will start soon.



ed for the purpose... More than 140 POs will be appointed across the state. Of them, 101 will be appointed at the sub-division level and 38 at the district level. A state-level PO will also be appointed," she added.

The decision has been taken as per the provisions of the Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act, 2005, she said.

"The move aims to provide more effective protection of the rights of women, guaranteed under the Constitution, to victims of violence of any kind occurring within the family and for matters connected therewith or incidental thereto," Bamhrah said. As per the Act, the PO will assist the magistrate in the discharge of his functions and the former will also be responsible to get the aggrieved person medically examined, if she has sustained bodily injuries and forward a copy of the medical report to the police station and the magistrate having jurisdiction in the area where the domestic violence is alleged to

have been taken place, she said. The PO will also ensure that under Section 20 of Domestic Violence Act, 2005 is complied with and executed, in accordance with the procedure prescribed under the existing law, she added.

The state government has already taken several steps to ensure justice for women facing domestic violence through the enactment of the Dowry Prohibition Act, and the Prohibition of Child Marriage Act, 2006 among others, Bamhrah said. adding that different schemes also provide various kinds of services to women who face do mestic violence.

"The Bihar government has also initiated the process of opening 11 additional 'one stop centres (OSCs)' in certain dis tricts to support women affect ed by violence, in private and public spaces, within the family, community and at the workplace more effectively. An approva letter for operationalisation and establishment of 11 additional OSCs in the state was recently received by the WCDC from the Union Ministry of Women and Child Development (Sambal Di-

Tripura's bamboo expansion drive for industrial use

Around 70 per cent of the country's requirement of agarbatti bamboo sticks is supplied by Tripura and the government is keen to bring more such industries in the state

Agartala, Feb 23: The Tripura government has taken up a fiveyear plan to expand the bamboo production area exclusively for industrial use by nearly 100 times to 45,000 hectares of land, a senior official said.

Around 70 per cent of the country's requirement of agarbatti bamboo sticks is supplied by Tripura and the government is keen to bring more such industries in the state, he said.

The northeastern state, which has an abundant bamboo resource, produces 21 species of bamboo.

"As of now, Tripura produces bamboo on 461.32 hectares exclusively for industrial use and we plan to increase that to 45,000 hectares in five years from 2025-26. Nine-thousand hectares will be added in each of these five years," Tripura Bamboo Mission (TBM)'s Additional Mission Director Subhash Chandra Das told PTI.

The TBM has raised high-density bamboo plantation in 461.32 hectares from 2018-19 to 2024-25 exclusively for commercial purposes, he said.

Tripura has 4.20 lakh hectares of bamboo-bearing areas, according to the Forest Survey of India 2023 report.

But, in a major section of those areas, the bamboo cover is either thin or its quality is not good enough to make them useful for industrial purposes, Das said.

The objective of this plan for massive plantation is to supply bamboo smoothly for commercial or industrial purposes, he

The official hoped that if the plan, Tripura Bamboo Plantation Development Scheme, is implemented properly, several challenges in the bamboo production sector, especially trans-



portation, will be removed.

Transportation of bamboo from dense forests or hilly areas has emerged as a major challenge. If bamboo is grown on private land in relatively urban areas, we will not face any problem in bringing bamboo to factories," Das said.

Besides, there will be no need to get permission from the forest department before cutting bamboo produced on private land.

"Thus, this plan will help supply bamboo to the industry in a much easier way," the TBM official said. The ambitious plan will be implemented with convergence of MGNREGA funds by the various government agencies, he said, adding that growers would need to arrange for land only. Several government agencies such as the Tripura Rehabilitation Plantation Corporation, Tribal Welfare Department, Tripura Tribal Areas Autonomous District Council, Forest Department and the TBM will be engaged in the massive bamboo plantation

Each of the agencies will be given an annual target of increasing the production area

for five years, Das said. He said that two big private firms are engaged at Bodhjungnagar bamboo park in West Tripura district, where they produce sticks for incense and

tiles made of bamboo. "Apart from the two, as many as 24 small-scale factories also produce incense sticks which have great demand in Banga lore, Andhra Pradesh, Guwa-

hati and Kolkata," Das said. The current requirement of bamboo in the northeastern state stands at about 2 lakh MT per annum, which is expected to rise to 4 lakh MT annually in the

next two or three years.

Cong slams PM Modi, Preliminary inquiry EAM for govt's silence not mandatory in

New Delhi, Feb 23: Amid the USAID funding row, the Congress Sunday accused the BJP of indulging in "anti-national work" by spreading "fake news from America" and asserted that Prime Minister Narendra Modi and External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar will also have to answer as to why the government is silent when US President Donald Trump and Elon Musk are "insulting" India repeatedly. The BJP has rejected all such

allegations of the Congress and called Rahul Gandhi a "traitor", accusing him of colluding with foreign forces in his bid to weaken India. Congress general secretary in-charge Jairam Ramesh said, "BJP is a procession of liars and illiterates. The news about USD 21 million, on which the BJP and their bootlickers were jumping on, turned out to be fake. The \$21 million in 2022 was not for 'voter turnout' in India, but for Bangladesh.'

"Elon Musk made a fake claim, Trump got confused between Dhaka and Delhi, Amit Malviya spread the lie further, then the rest of BJP's bootlickers seized on it." he charged. Ever since the Trump administration's DOGE said February 16 that USAID has cancelled the \$21 million funding for "voting in India", the BJP has been making fabricated allegations against the Congress, Ramesh said in his post in Hindi on X.

"The first fund USAID gave to CEPPS for Moldova was in 2016 with the ID AID-117LA1600001. But the USAID USD 21 million grant for India marked by DOGE is completely fake. Because it was for Bangladesh, not India," he claimed. And the reality is that of the \$ 21 million earmarked for Bangladesh, \$13.4 million has already been disbursed before the January 2024 elections, Ramesh said.

"Every federal grant specifies the country in which it is to be

spending, there have been no USAID-funded CEPPS projects in India since 2008. The only ongoing \$21 million USAID grant to CEPPS, ID 72038822LA00001, approved in July 2022 for Bangladesh's 'Amar Vote Amar' (My Vote Is Mine), he pointed out.

"In November 2022, the purpose of the grant was changed to 'USAID's Nagorik Programme'. A USAID official in Dhaka also confirmed this on social media during his US visit in December 2024: 'I manage the \$21 million CEPPS/Nagorik project funded by USAID'," Ramesh said.

New Delhi, Feb 23: The Supreme Court has said conducting a preliminary inquiry is not mandatory in every case lodged under the Prevention of Corruption Act and it is not a vested right of the accused.

The court has said while a preliminary inquiry is desirable in certain categories of cases, including those lodged under the Prevention of Corruption (PC) Act, it is not a mandatory pre-requisite for the registration of a criminal case.

A bench of Justices Dipankar Datta and Sandeep Mehta has said the purpose of a preliminary inquiry is not to verify the veracity of the information received, but merely to ascertain whether the said information revealed the commission of a cognisable offence. "The preliminary inquiry is not mandatory in every case under the PC Act," the bench said in its verdict delivered February 17.

"If a superior officer is in seisin of a source information report, which is both detailed and well-reasoned and such



that any reasonable person would be of the view that it prima facie discloses the commission of a cognisable offence, the preliminary inquiry may be avoided," it said.

The top court delivered its verdict on an appeal filed by the Karnataka government, challenging a March 2024 judgment of the state high court. The high court had quashed an FIR lodged by the Karnataka Lokayukta police station against a public servant for alleged offences under the PC Act.

The public servant was accused of acquiring assets that were disproportionate to his known sources of income. The apex court dealt with the issue of whether a preliminary inquiry was mandatory before directing registration of an FIR under the PC Act in the facts of the case or whether the source information report could be treated as a substitute for the preliminary inquiry

Referring to previous apex court judgments, the bench said, "Applying these principles to the case at hand, it is perspicuous that conducting a preliminary inquiry is not sine qua non for registering a case against a public servant who is accused of corruption.'

No place for OPS in **AIADMK**, indicates **Palaniswami**

The former CM also hailed Jayalalithaa for delivering effective governance despite a number of challenges, including the financial one which he said was created by the then Congress-led UPA government at the Centre in which the DMK was an integral part.

Prolonged phone use on toilet causing hemorrhoids: Docs

at a railway station in Patna, Bihar

New Delhi, Feb 23: Prolonged mobile phone use while sitting on the toilet is contributing to a surge in hemorrhoids and anal fistulas, doctors have said.

The habit, coupled with a sedentary lifestyle and poor diet, is putting increased strain on the rectal area, leading to painful conditions that often require medical intervention,

Dr Jignesh Gandhi -- a senior robotic and laparoscopic surgeon at Gleneagles Hospital in Mumbai -- highlighted the concern, linking it to a sedentary lifestyle and excessive phone use in toilets.

He was speaking at the 74th foundation day of ESIC Hospital in Okhla Saturday. Dr Ravi

Ranjan, a surgery specialist at the hospital, said it recorded more than 500 cases of hemorrhoids and fistulas in a year.

He pointed to poor lifestyle habits such as low water intake, excessive consumption of junk food and extended time on the toilet as key contributors. Marengo Asia Hospital surgeon Dr Birbal said, "Chronic constipation from poor diet and prolonged time spent sitting on the toilet create a vicious cycle."

'This puts undue stress on the rectal area, leading to painful inflammation, which can result in hemorrhoids and, in severe cases, anal fistulas, he added. The experts said the rising number of such cases was straining government hospitals.



In January, five Indian fishermen sustained injuries, including two seriously, in an incident of firing by the Sri Lankan Navy in the proximitv of Delft Island, triggering a strong reaction by India.

Nagarkurnool (Telangana), Feb 23: Despite relentless efforts by the Indian Army, NDRF and other agencies, no breakthrough was achieved Sunday in the rescue operations to extricate eight persons who have remained trapped for over 30 hours inside a tunnel after a section of it collapsed in the SLBC project, with prayers on for their well-being.

Telangana Minister J Krishna Rao told reporters that the chances of survival under the circumstances are "not that good." "Muck has piled up too high inside the tunnel, making it impossible to walk through. They (rescuers) are using rub ber tubes and wooden planks to navigate through it," Krishna Rao, who went inside the tunnel, told reporters.

"We can't say. We are hopeful, but the kind of incident that took place was very serious and chances are we can not say. The chances of survival we can not predict. Chancer are not that good," he said when asked about the chances of survival of the trapped persons.

Videos released by the state government showed rescuers navigating through thick muck, tangled iron rods, and cement blocks. Minister Uttam Kumar Reddy said there were about 70 people working in the tunnel Saturday morning when a part of it collapsed. Most of them could escape and return using

The fi nal 200 meters stretch of the col lapsed section of the tunnel has been filled with water and silt, the Minister said, indicating the difficulty that the rescue teams are faced with to reach the spot.

Uttam Kumar Reddy said getting heavy machinery into the tunnel became difficult due to the terrain, but officials are working on alternate methods to remove the debris. The Irrigation Department, Disaster Response Teams, and Defense personnel are coordinating tinuously pumped inside and motors deployed for dewatering, Reddy further said. The teams that managed to

wade up to the 13th kilometer, where the tunnel had collapsed, called out the names of the trapped individuals, but there was no response, sources said. The trapped persons have been identified as Manoj Kumar and Sri Niwas from Uttar Pradesh, Sunny Singh (J&K), Gurpreet Singh (Punjab) and Sandeep Sahu, Jegta Xess, Santosh Sahu and Anuj Sahu, all from Jharkhand.

Nagarkurnool District Collector B Santhosh, who is supervising the rescue operation, said four NDRF teams--one from Hyderabad and three from Vijayawada, comprising 138 members, 24 personnel of the army, personnel of SDRF, besides 23 members from SCCL along with equipment besides members of the infra firm are engaged in the rescue operation. "As of now, we don't have communication with them (those trapped)," the collector said Sunday afternoon.

12 Indians deported by US to Panama, return to India

"This is naturally subject to an unambiguous verification of their nationality. This is not a policy applicable to any specific country, nor indeed one only practised by India. It is a general accepted principle in international relations," he

Health Ministry bars export of unapproved drug combination

New Delhi, Feb 23: The Drugs Controller General of India (DCGI) has prohibited the production and export of all combinations of pain-relief medicines tapentadol and carisoprodol over news reports that unapproved combinations of these drugs were exported to West African countries by a Mumbai-based pharma firm, causing an opioid crisis there.

In a communication, the DCGI has asked the drug control authorities of the states and Union territories to immediately withdraw all export NOCs (no-objection certificates) and manufacturing licences granted for any combination of these two drugs

Tapentadol is an opioid medication used to treat moderate to severe pain. Carisoprodol is a muscle relaxant that works on the centre of the brain and spinal cord to relieve pain. In a statement, the Union health ministry said it has taken immediate and decisive action following news reports highlighting concerns regarding the export of unapproved combination drugs containing tapentadol and carisoprodol by Indian pharmaceutical manufacturer Aveo Pharmaceuticals to certain countries in West Africa.



Jenin (West Bank): Israel's defence minister said Sunday troops will remain "for the coming year" in parts of the occupied West Bank where they have launched an offensive and will prevent tens of thousands of displaced Palestinians from returning, as Israel deepens its crackdown on the Palestinian territory. People are not as naive as the Left considers them, she said. Meloni said that the United States and Europe would remain close under Trump, despite soaring tensions between the allies including over Ukraine.

Ties between Europe and the United States have been strained in the first weeks of Trump's second term after the US leader reached out to Russia and warned of a shift away from Europe, raising fears of Trump's commitment to the

But, "knowing him as a strong and effective leader I bet that those who hope for divisions will be proven wrong,"

Gwadar (Pakistan), Feb 23: With no passengers and no planes, Pakistan's newest and most expensive airport is a bit of a mystery. Entirely financed by China to the tune of \$240 million, it's anyone's guess when New Gwadar International Airport will open for business. Located in the coastal city of Gwadar and completed in October 2024, the airport is a stark

contrast to the impoverished, restive southwestern Balochistan province around it.

For the past decade, China has poured money into Balochistan and Gwadar as part of a multibillion dollar project that connects its western Xinjiang province with the Arabian Sea, called the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor or CPEC. Authorities have hailed it as

transformational but there's scant evidence of change in Gwadar. The city isn't connected to the national grid — electricity comes from neighboring Iran or solar panels — and there isn't enough clean water.

An airport with a 400,000 passenger capacity isn't a priority for the city's 90,000 people.

"This airport is not for Pakistan or Gwadar," said Azeem Khalid, an international relations expert who specializes in



Pakistan-China ties. "It is for China, so they can have secure access for their citizens to Gwadar and Balochistan.

Caught between militants and the military

CPEC has catalysed a decadeslong insurgency in resource-rich and strategically located Balochistan. Separatists, aggrieved by what they say is state exploitation at the

expense of locals, are fighting

for independence — targeting both Pakistani troops and Chinese workers in the province and elsewhere

Members of Pakistan's ethnic Baloch minority say they face discrimination by the government and are denied opportunities available elsewhere in the country, charges the government denies.

Pakistan, keen to protect China's investments, has stepped up its military footprint in Gwadar to combat dissent.

The city is a jumble of checkpoints, barbed wire, troops, barricades, and watchtowers. Roads close at any given time, several days a week, to permit the safe passage of Chinese workers and Pakistani VIPs.

Intelligence officers monitor iournalists visiting Gwadar. The city's fish market is deemed too sensitive for coverage.

Many local residents are frazzled.

"Nobody used to ask where we are going, what we are doing, and what is your name,' said 76-vear-old Gwadar native Khuda Bakhsh Hashim. "We used to enjoy all-night picnics in the mountains or rural areas."

"We are asked to prove our identity, who we are, where we have come from," he added. "We are residents. Those who

ask should identify themselves as to who they are. People in Gwadar see few

benefits from China's presence Gwadar is humble but charming, the food excellent and the locals chatty and welcoming with strangers. It gets busy during public holidays,

especially the beaches. Still, there is a perception that it's dangerous or difficult to visit — only one commercial route operates out of Gwadar's domestic airport, three times a week to Karachi, Pakistan's largest city, located at the other end of Pakistan's Arabian Sea coastline.

There are no direct flights to Balochistan's provincial capital of Quetta, hundreds of miles inland, or the national capital of Islamabad, even further north A scenic coastal highway has few facilities.

Going forward, VK Vijayakumar, Chief Investment Strategist, Geojit Financial Services, believes that revival of FPI investment in India will happen when economic growth and corporate earnings revive. Indications of that are likely to happen in two to three months.

According to the data with the depositories, Foreign Portfolio Investors (FPIs) offloaded shares worth ₹23.710 crore from Indian equities so far this month (till February 21). This came following a net outflow of ₹78,027 crore in January. With these, the total outflow by FPIs has reached ₹1,01,737 crore in 2025 so far, data with the depos-

resulted in the Nifty yielding negative returns of 4 per cent year-to-date.

Market concerns heightened following reports that US President Donald Trump was considering imposing new tariffs on steel and aluminum imports, along with reciprocal tariffs on several countries, Himanshu Srivastava, Associate Director-Manager Research, Morningstar Investment Research India, said.

These developments reignited fears of a potential global

trade war, prompting FPIs to re-evaluate their exposure to emerging markets, including India, he added

On the domestic front, lacklustre corporate earnings and persistent depreciation of the Indian rupee, which breached multi-year lows, further diminished the appeal of Indian assets, Srivastava said.

After Trump's victory in US presidential elections, the US market has been attracting huge capital inflows from the rest of the world. But recently, China has emerged as a major

destination of portfolio flows. Geoiit Financial Services' Vijayakumar said.

The Chinese president's new initiatives with their leading businessmen have kindled hopes of a growth recovery in China.

"Since Chinese stocks continue to be cheap, this 'Sell India, Buy China' trade may continue. But this trade has happened in the past and experience is that it will fizzle out soon since there are structural problems constraining Chinese economic revival," he added.

Additionally, FPIs withdrew money from the debt market. They pulled out ₹7,352 crore from debt general limit and ₹3,822 crore from debt voluntary retention route.

The overall trend indicates a cautious approach by foreign investors, who scaled back in vestments in Indian equities significantly in 2024, with net inflows of just ₹427 crore.

This contrasts sharply with the extraordinary ₹1.71 lakh crore net inflows in 2023, driven by optimism over India's strong economic fundamentals. In comparison, 2022 saw a net outflow of ₹1.21 lakh crore amid aggressive rate hikes by global central banks.

Markets to track news flow on tariffs this week: Analysts

Equity markets would remain closed Wednesday for Mahashivratri'.

"This week, we expect Nifty to remain in consolidation mode; tracking the mixed global market cues, US trade policy announcements and geopolitical developments with regards to the Russia-Ukraine war,' Siddhartha Khemka, Head - Research, Wealth Management, Motilal Oswal Financial Services Ltd. said.

Movement of global oil benchmark Brent crude and the rupee-dollar trend would also dictate market trends this week.

"Investors are keeping a close eye on upcoming pivotal indicators, such as the US Core PCE Price Index and India's GDP growth rate. The market's mood remains cautious,

with pessimistic sentiments likely to linger until there is a marked improvement in corporate earnings and a conducive environment with easy global liquidity and stabilised currency," Vinod Nair, Head of Research, Geojit Financial Services, said.

Last week, the BSE benchmark declined 628.15 points, or 0.82 per cent, and the NSE Nifty went lower by 133.35 points, or 0.58 per cent.

"Reciprocal tariff concerns continued to dominate the global and the Indian equity markets," Shrikant Chouhan, Head-Equity Research, Kotak Securities, said.

Coal India and France's EDF to form renewables JV

New Delhi, Feb 23: India's state-run Coal India will establish a joint venture with an arm of France's EDF to build renewable power plants in South Asian countries, it said Sunday.

The joint venture between Coal India and EDF India, will set up pumped-storage hydropower projects and other renewable energy projects in India and neighbouring countries. Coal India said in a stock exchange announcement.

The two companies have signed a non-binding shareholders agreement to form the joint venture, it said.

EDF also signed a joint venture agreement with state-run Indian power company NTPC to set up hydropower projects and explore opportunities in power distribution, an NTPC statement said. The 50-50 joint venture will set up projects within India and neighbouring countries, the statement said.

This JV company will undertake such projects on its own or may create JV and subsidiaries for undertaking such projects within India and neighbouring countries, the statement said. The JV will also develop hydro projects bundled with other Renewable Energy projects and explore opportunities in the distribution business.

NTPC Ltd is India's largest integrated power utility, contributing one-fourth of India's power requirements and has an installed capacity of over

India, UK to resume talks on proposed FTA from today

New Delhi, Feb 23: After a gap of over eight months, India and the UK will resume negotiations for a proposed free trade agreement (FTA) here from February 24, an official said.

UK's Secretary of State for Business and Trade Jonathan Reynolds will be here for resumption of the talks. He will hold a bilateral meeting with Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal, the official

The India-UK FTA negotiations were launched January

Total 13 rounds of negotiations have been held till December 2023. The 14th round, which began on January 10, 2024, was underway when negotiations were paused by the UK side in May 2024 due to elections in that country.

The talks would resume the discussions from the progress achieved previously and seek to bridge the gaps for expeditiously closing the trade deal, the official added.

The agreement is aimed at boosting bilateral trade and investments.

In such pacts, two countries either eliminate or significantly reduce customs duties on maximum goods traded between them. They also ease norms for promoting trade in services and bilateral invest-

The Indian industry is demanding greater access for its skilled professionals from sectors like IT and healthcare in the UK market, besides market access for several goods at nil customs duty

On the other hand, the UK is seeking a significant cut in import duties on goods such as scotch whiskey, electric vehicles, lamb meat, chocolates and certain confectionary items.

Britain is also looking for more opportunities for UK services in Indian markets in segments like telecommunications, legal and financial services, including banking and insurance.

The talks for the agreement may get an impetus as Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman has proposed to raise the foreign investment limit to 100 per cent in the insurance sector as part of new-generation financial sector reforms.

Presenting Union Budget 2025-26, the Finance Minister had said that foreign direct investment (FDI) limit for the insurance sector will be raised from 74 per cent to 100 per cent.

The two countries are also negotiating a bilateral investment treaty (BIT).

There are 26 chapters in the agreement, which includes goods, services, investments and intellectual property

The bilateral trade between India and the UK increased to USD 21.34 billion in 2023-24 from USD 20.36 billion in 2022-23. The average duty on goods imported from India into the UK is 4.2 per cent.

According to economic think tank GTRL items including tex tiles, apparel (shirts, trousers, women's dresses, bed linen), footwear, carpets, cars, marine products, grapes, and mangoes would be benefitted from the pact as these products face relatively low to moderate tariffs

in the UK. Duties on yarn and fabric are 4 per cent, while tariffs on shirts, trousers, women's dresses, and bed linen range from 10 per cent to 12 per cent Similarly, handbags and trunk cases attract 8 per cent tariffs.

Why's Warren Buffett amassing more cash, selling more stocks?

Omaha, Feb 23: The mystery over Warren Buffett's surprisingly defensive stance deepened over the weekend

The 94-year-old CEO of Berkshire Hathaway sold more stocks in the latest quarter and grew a record cash pile even larger to \$334 billion, but failed to explain in his highly anticipated annual letter why the investor known for his astute equity purchases over time was seemingly battening down the hatches.

Instead Buffett said that this posture in no way represented a move away from his love for stocks.

"Despite what some commentators currently view as an extraordinary cash position at Berkshire, the great majority of your money remains in equities," Buffett wrote in the 2024 annual letter released Saturday. "That preference won't change.

Berkshire's monstrous ownership of cash has raised questions among shareholders and observers especially as interest rates are expected to fall from their multi-year highs. The Berkshire CEO and chairman in recent years has expressed frustration about an expensive market and few buying opportunities. Some investors and analysts have grown impatient with the lack of action and have sought an explanation why.

Despite his repeated selling of stock, Buffett said Berkshire will continue to prefer equities "Berkshire shareholders can

rest assured that we will forever deploy a substantial majority of their money in equities - mostly American equities although many of these will have international operations of significance," Buffett wrote.



"Berkshire will never prefer ownership of cash-equivalent assets over the ownership of good businesses, whether controlled or only partially owned."

Shareholders will have to wait a little longer it seems as the Omaha-based conglomerate net sold equities for a ninth consecutive quarter in the final period of last year, according to the company's annual report, which was also released Sat-

All told, Berkshire sold more than \$134 billion worth of stocks in 2024. This is mainly due to the shrinking of Berkshire's two largest equity holdings — Apple and Bank of America.

Meanwhile, it appears Buffett is not finding his own stock attractive either. Berkshire continued its buyback halt, repurchasing no shares in the fourth quarter or in the first quarter through Feb. 10.

This is despite a massive increase in operating earnings reported by the conglomerate Saturday.

Buffett's sitting on his hands amid a raging bull market that's seen the S&P 500 gain more than 20% for two years in a row and move into the green again so far this year. Some cracks have begun to develop in the past week, however, with some concerns growing about a slowing economy, volatility from rapid policy changes from new President Donald Trump and overall stock valuations.

Berkshire shares were up

25% and 16% respectively the last two years and are up 5% so far this year. Buffett did offer perhaps a

small hint about stock valuations being a concern in the "We are impartial in our

choice of equity vehicles, investing in either variety based upon where we can best deploy your (and my family's) savings," wrote Buffett. "Often, nothing looks compelling; very infrequently we find ourselves knee-deep in opportunities.

In this year's letter, Buffett did endorse designated succes sor Greg Abel in his ability to pick equity opportunities, ever comparing him to the late Char lie Munger.
