

## AIADMK, BJP join hands for TN polls

**Chennai, April 11:** The BJP and AIADMK Friday sealed a poll alliance, with Union Minister Amit Shah declaring that the 2026 Tamil Nadu Assembly election will be fought under the leadership of AIADMK chief Edappadi K Palaniswami.

With the parties rekindling their alliance nearly two years after they parted ways, Shah said it will be Prime Minister Narendra Modi's leadership at the Centre and Palaniswami at the state level.

"AIADMK and BJP have decided to fight next (year's) polls...from 1998, AIADMK has been part of BJP alliance (at different points of time). PM Modi and late Chief Minister J Jayalalithaa had worked together in national politics," Shah told a press conference, flanked by Palaniswami and outgoing BJP TN chief K Annamalai, here.

"We will form a government together led by Edappadi Palaniswami," he said, indicating it would be a coalition government should the NDA win.

He exuded confidence that

the NDA will get a solid mandate and form a government.

On AIADMK's divergent stand on certain issues, Shah said they will sit and discuss. There will be a Common Minimum Programme if required.

He also slammed the ruling DMK in the state, alleging it was raking up issues like Sanatan Dharma, 3-language policy and delimitation with the sole intention to take attention away from key issues.

People were demanding answers from the ruling dispensation over a number of 'scams,' and they would vote on genuine

issues, Shah said.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi Friday hailed the AIADMK's decision to join the BJP-led National Democratic Alliance (NDA) and asserted that it is important that the 'corrupt and divisive' DMK is uprooted at the earliest in Tamil Nadu.

"Stronger together, united towards Tamil Nadu's progress! Glad that AIADMK joins the NDA family. Together, with our other NDA partners, we will take Tamil Nadu to new heights of progress and serve the state diligently. We will ensure a government that ful-

fills the vision of the great MGR and Jayalalithaa Ji," Modi said in a post on X.

He said for the sake of Tamil Nadu's progress and to preserve the uniqueness of Tamil culture, it is important that the 'corrupt and divisive; DMK is uprooted at the earliest, which the alliance will ensure.

Palaniswami, also known as EPS, said the AIADMK was honoured to be welcomed into a partnership with NDA. "An alliance founded on a shared vision for Tamil Nadu's progress and prosperity," he said in a social media update.

## 2% DA hike for govt employees, pensioners

**Bhubaneswar, April 11:** Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi Friday announced a two per cent hike in the dearness allowance (DA) for state government employees and pensioners.

With this hike, the ratio of DA for government employees and TI (temporary increase) for pensioners will rise from 53 per cent to 55 per cent, an official release issued by the CMO said.

It said the hike will be imple-

mented retrospectively from January 1, 2025. Employees will receive the increased DA as cash benefit along with their April salary. This decision will benefit around 8.5 lakh state government employees and pensioners, the release added.

Earlier, the state government had announced a 3 per cent hike in DA (from 50 per cent to 53 per cent) for its employees in October last year retrospectively. The pensioners also got a 3 per cent hike in dearness relief.

## Terrorist killed in encounter in J&K

**Jammu, April 11:** One terrorist was killed in an encounter with security forces in Jammu and Kashmir's Kishtwar district Friday while a separate operation to track down a group of three terrorists is underway in Udhampur district, Army officials said.

The security agencies have expanded the scope of surveillance to the Bhaderwah area of Doda district to track the terrorists potentially moving between different locations in the hilly districts of the Jammu region. Deputy Inspector General (DIG), Kishtwar-Doda-Ramban Range, Shridhar Patil said the operations in the region have been going on for the past three days.

"One terrorist was eliminated this morning," he told reporters in Kishtwar. Other terrorists in the region are trapped and the opera-

tion will continue until they are all eliminated, he added.

According to the officials, the encounter in Kishtwar broke out during an intelligence-based search-and-destroy operation launched jointly by Army and Jammu and Kashmir Police in the Chatru forest area of the district. During the operation, the forces established contact with the terrorists.

"The terrorists were effectively engaged, and a fire-fight ensued. One terrorist has been neutralised so far," the Army's White Knight Corps or 16 Corps, said in a post on X. "Despite hostile terrain and adverse weather, our brave soldiers continue relentless operations," it said. Special forces braved high-snow areas and treacherous terrains to track down one terrorist, while a few others are still on the move under significant pressure from the security forces.

## Man killed, another hurt for opposing liquor trade

**Loisingha, April 11:** A violent outburst stemming from a longstanding family feud over illegal liquor trade has left one man dead and another critically injured in Sargada village under Loisingha block and Sadar police limits of Bolangir district. The incident unfolded Thursday night and has left the villagers shocked.

The deceased has been identified as Arun Sae Patel, a resident of the village, while the injured, Jogeswar Saraf, is currently undergoing treatment after suffering serious head injuries. Police and a forensic team arrived at the scene and launched an investigation Friday morning. The body was sent to Bhima Bhoi Medical College and Hospital in Bolangir for post-mortem.

According to sources, Arun Sae Patel, son of Bijay Sae Patel of Sargada village, had a protracted dispute with one Prasada Nayak and his son Uma over some local illicit liquor trade, which had created deep-seated conflicts between the families. A quarrel reportedly broke out Thursday afternoon between Prasada, Arun and Jogeswar.

Following the altercation, Jogeswar returned home and told his wife that Prasada assaulted him without provocation. Later, Jogeswar and his wife went to Prasada's

house to discuss the matter. However, in a fit of rage, Prasada and his son allegedly attacked Jogeswar with wooden planks in front of his wife, leaving him severely injured. He received eight stitches on his head.

Jogeswar alleged that Arun too was attacked later, which resulted in his death.

In his statement to police, Bijay Sae Patel said that earlier in the day, Uma had visited their home and warned them to keep Arun under control. He said similar warnings had been issued before. In the fateful evening, Bijay and his wife had gone to nearby Bhadra village to attend a religious gathering. However, due to a thunderstorm, they were unable to return that night. Upon returning to the village at around 5 am Friday, they were informed about the death of Arun.

Meanwhile, Bijay demanded a fair investigation and strict action against the accused. The incident has sent shockwaves through the village. Local residents have demanded the district and police administrations to take strong steps to end illegal liquor trade in the area.

It is worth noting that Arun had unsuccessfully contested the 2022 panchayat elections for a Samiti member position.

Police have detained the father-son duo for questioning in connection with the incident.




## ZACHARY LEVI, MAGGIE KEATING WELCOME THEIR FIRST CHILD

## AYUSHMAN BHARAT YOJANA LAUNCHED IN STATE

### Historic day for Odisha: Nadda

Cuttack, April 11: Union Health Minister J P Nadda Friday launched the Ayushman Bharat Yojana in Odisha, and expressed hope that the central health insurance scheme will soon be implemented in neighbouring West Bengal - the only state where it is still not in force.

Billed as the world's largest government healthcare programme, the scheme aims to provide a coverage of ₹5 lakh per family annually.

Calling it a 'historic day' for Odisha, Nadda said as many as 3.51 crore people of 1.03 lakh families of the state will get the benefit from the schemes like Ayushman Bharat, Ayushman Vaya-Vandana Yojana, and the state-run Gopabandhu Jan Arogya Yojana. The Union minister said each member of a family will get separate cards and they can avail the health services in 30,000 government and private hospitals across the country.

"I understand that many people from Odisha work in Delhi, Mumbai, Chennai and other places. They all can avail of this facility," Nadda said. Nadda launched the scheme in

the presence of Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi and others. Addressing the gathering, Majhi said that the previous BJD government did not implement the Ayushman Bharat scheme due to political reasons, because of which the people suffered.

"However, after installation of the double engine government (in Odisha), the people are getting benefits earlier denied to them," he said. The CM said the BJD government has been filling vacant posts of doctors and para-medical staff. "Today our government completes 10 months and during this period, we have filled up 4000 posts including doctors in the healthcare facilities," he said adding that 5,374 doctors and dentists will be recruited very soon.

Majhi said the Odisha government is emphasising opening medical colleges. At present the state has 12 medical colleges and two others will start functioning soon, he said.

Budgetary allocations have been made for setting up new medical colleges in Bhubaneswar, Jagatsinghpur, Nabarangpur and Dhenkanal districts along with four dental colleges.

### OVER 100 KILLED IN INDIA, NEPAL RAINS

NEW DELHI: More than 100 people have died since Wednesday after unseasonably heavy rain lashed parts of India and Nepal, officials said, as the weather department predicted more rain for the region. At least 82 people have died in rain-related incidents in Bihar over the last two days, while 18 people had died due to lightning and storm-related incidents in Uttar Pradesh. In Nepal, lightning strikes and heavy rain killed at least eight people, National Disaster Authority officials said.

## Tariffs ring recession alarm

Beijing, April 11: The global trade war further escalated Friday as China retaliated against the US by raising its tariffs on American imports to a whopping 125 per cent. The US has imposed 145 per cent tariffs on China. This reciprocal action poses a significant threat to global supply chains and could potentially push the world toward a recession. China's response has deepened the economic instability triggered by US President Donald Trump's tariffs, causing markets to decline further and leaving foreign leaders grappling with how to address the most significant disruption to the global trade system in decades. Analysts warn that these reciprocal tariff increases could render trade between the two largest economies in the world nearly impossible, a trade that was valued at over \$650 billion in 2024.




China Friday continued its tit-for-tat move against the Trump administration's tariffs by hiking its additional levies on imports from the US to 125 per cent against duties of 145 per cent by America even as it evinced interest in dialogue with Washington to resolve the impasse. Announcing an additional 125 per cent tariff, China's Customs Tariff Commission said, "Even if the US imposes higher tariffs, it would no longer make economic sense and ultimately go down as a joke in world economic history." "Given that it's already impossible for the Chinese

market to accept US imports at the current tariff level if the United States imposes further tariffs on Chinese products, China will ignore it," it said. China's retaliation has intensified the economic turmoil unleashed by Trump's tariffs with analysts fearing a looming recession. "Recession risk is much, much higher now than it was a couple weeks ago," said Adam Hetts, global head of multi-asset at Janus Henderson.

The brief reprieve for battered stocks seen after Trump decided to pause duties for dozens of countries for 90 days quickly dissipated, as attention returned to the escalating trade conflict between the US and China. UBS analysts in a note called China's declaration that it would not retaliate to any further tariff increases "an acknowledgement that trade between the two countries has essentially been completely severed."

### GOLD SKYROCKETS ₹6,250

NEW DELHI: Gold prices surged by ₹6,250 to hit a record high of ₹96,450 per 10 grams in the national capital Friday due to heavy demand from local jewellers and retailers, according to the All India Sarafa Association. Analysts said the precious metal hitting lifetime high levels in the international markets on strong safe-haven demand amid escalating US-China trade tensions boosted the domestic prices. Wednesday, the yellow metal of 99.9 per cent purity had closed at ₹90,200 per 10 grams. Rebounding after four days of sharp fall, gold of 99.5 per cent purity surged by ₹6,250 to touch an all-time high of ₹96,000 per 10 grams against the previous close of ₹89,750 per 10 grams. Silver prices also registered a steep rise of ₹2,300 to ₹95,500 per kg, largely in tandem with global trends. The white metal had closed at ₹93,200 per kg in the previous market close. Meanwhile, gold futures for June delivery climbed by ₹1,703 to hit yet another lifetime high of ₹93,736 per 10 grams on the Multi Commodity Exchange. "Gold extended its record-setting rally... to hit fresh lifetime highs near ₹93,500 on MCX, defying rupee strength as geopolitical tensions and tariff battles between the US and China escalated further," Jateen Trivedi, VP Research Analyst of Commodity and Currency, LKP Securities, said.



### Rana had plans for similar attacks on other cities: NIA

New Delhi, April 11: The National Investigation Agency (NIA) Friday began an extensive interrogation of Mumbai terror attack mastermind Tahawwur Hussain Rana to uncover the "deeper layers of the conspiracy" as the probe agency told a Delhi court it suspects he had plans to target other Indian cities as well with similar large-scale strikes.

Rana, the 64-year-old Pakistani-origin Canadian businessman, was brought to the National Investigation Agency (NIA) headquarters here early this morning shortly after a Delhi court granted the agency his 18-day custody. Escorted by NIA officials, Rana reached Delhi Thursday evening on a chartered aircraft after his extradition from the US ending a 16-year-long wait to prosecute one of the key accused in the deadly Mumbai attack.

### Process begins for election to 1,134 vacant PRI posts


Bhubaneswar, April 11: The State Election Commission has initiated the process for election to 1,134 vacant posts in three-tier Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs) in Odisha. As per an official statement issued by the SEC, by-elections will be held for five zilla parishad (ZP) members, 41 panchayat samiti members, 45 sarpanches and 272 ward members, while fresh polls will be conducted in 771 wards in different panchayats. In the last three-tier panchayat elections held in 2022, there were no nominations filed in these 771 wards meant for reserved category. Therefore, after de-reservation of

these wards by the concerned district collectors, the process for the fresh elections is being initiated, it said. The SEC said splitting of electoral rolls of the concerned ward from the latest electoral rolls prepared by the Election Commission of India (ECI) will be conducted from April 17 and 22. On April 24, ward-wise preliminary electoral rolls will be published at gram panchayat headquarters. Thereafter, filing of objections and claims will be made by April 30 and the disposal of the same will take place between May 2 and May 5, the statement said. The final publication of electoral rolls will be made May 6.

### How atmospheric rivers cause floods

Washington, April 11: Atmospheric rivers are storms akin to rivers in the sky that dump massive amounts of rain and can cause flooding, trigger mudslides and result in loss of life and enormous property damage. The weather system occurs all over the world. It starts when a large amount of water vapour from tropical oceans is carried by a jet stream toward land. As the air rises, it cools and condenses, resulting in rain or snow. Atmospheric rivers most commonly form in mid-latitude oceans, roughly 30 and 60 degrees north and south, according to NASA. They appear as a trail of wispy clouds that can stretch for hundreds of miles. Most atmospheric



rivers are weak and do not cause damage. In fact, they can provide much-needed rain or snow. Atmospheric rivers can carry up to 15 times the volume of the Mississippi River, according to the National Oceanic and

Atmospheric Administration. In drought-stricken California, such storms have triggered mudslides, toppled utility poles and blocked roadways, but also helped replenish depleted reservoirs and reduced the risk

of wildfires by saturating the state's parched vegetation. In 2019, an atmospheric river nicknamed the 'Pineapple Express' hit California. The water vapour from near Hawaii brought rain and triggered mudslides that forced motorists to swim for their lives and sent homes sliding downhill. In 2021, an atmospheric river dumped a month's worth of rain on British Columbia in two days, prompting deadly floods and landslides, devastating communities and severing access to Canada's largest port. Atmospheric rivers of the kind that drenched California and flooded British Columbia in recent years will become larger - and possibly more destructive - because of climate change, according to scientists. Columns in the atmosphere

hundreds of miles (km) long carry water vapour over oceans from the tropics to more temperate regions in amounts more than double the flow of the Amazon River, according to the American Meteorological Society. There are projected to be 10 per cent fewer atmospheric rivers in the future, but they are expected to be 25 per cent wider and longer and carry more water, according to a 2018 research paper. This could make managing water supply much harder as moderate atmospheric rivers, which can be beneficial for water supplies, will be less frequent, and strong ones could become more calamitous.

A landmark victory for people's rights and judicial accountability

A David vs. Goliath battle

April 12th marks a significant date in the annals of Odisha's long history of people's movements against land acquisition. For the farmers, fisherfolk, and countless residents of the 22 mouzas nestled along the scenic Puri-Konark Marine Drive, April 12, 2023, is etched as a 'Victory Day'. On this day, the Supreme Court of India delivered a resounding judgment, putting a definitive end to the controversial land acquisition process initiated nearly two decades prior for the proposed, grandiose Vedanta University project promoted by the Anil Agarwal Foundation (AAF).

Gross violation of land acquisition norms: Critics argued that the acquisition process flouted established laws and procedures under the Land Acquisition Act, 1894. The apex court upheld the Odisha High Court's 2010 judgment in its entirety, dismissing the appeals filed by AAF and the state government.

High Court and the Supreme Court. Their pro-bono service stands as a shining example of legal activism upholding constitutional rights. The aftermath: Implementation, compensation, and accountability. The Supreme Court's verdict provided immense relief and validation, but the struggle isn't entirely over. The focus now shifts to the meticulous implementation of the judgment: Return of Land: Ensuring the acquired land is promptly returned to the rightful owners - the farmers, the government, and the Shree Jagannath Temple Managing Committee - is the primary task. This involves complex administrative processes to restore land records and physical possession. Compensation and restitution: Many farmers had accepted compensation under duress or misinformation years ago. The judgment implies this land must be returned. Mechanisms need to be established for the fair return of any compensation received by farmers, possibly adjusted for the loss of livelihood and hardship endured over nearly two decades.

2023, belongs to the resilient people of the 22 mouzas, particularly the women and youth who formed the movement's backbone. It belongs to activists like Benudhar Pradhan, the supportive opposition parties, the vigilant media, and the committed pro-bono advocates. Above all, it reaffirms the vital role of an independent judiciary as a guardian of citizens' rights against arbitrary state action and powerful corporate interests. As Odisha continues its development journey, the lessons from Puri-Konark must not be forgotten. # NCST seeks ATR on school dropouts in mining belts

**Jajpur, April 11:** The National Commission for Scheduled Tribes (NCST) has sought an action-taken report (ATR) within 30 days on the alarming rate of school dropouts, particularly among SC/ST students, in the industrial and mining belts of Jajpur district—specifically in Sukinda and Danagadi blocks. Social activist Mantu Das had drawn the attention of the NCST Chairperson towards the state of affairs through a formal complaint September 7 last year. Acting on the complaint, NCST Director P Kalyan Reddy April 5 this year directed the Principal Secretary of the ST/SC Development, Minorities and Backward Classes Welfare Department, the Commissioner of School and Mass Education department, and the Jajpur Collector to submit a factual report on the issue within 30 days of receiving the letter. Failure to comply may result in a summons being issued to the concerned

officials, the NCST warned. As per data provided recently by Tata Steel Foundation (TSF) operating in the Kalinganagar industrial zone, a total of 56,166 dropout students were identified between 2015 and 2024 in the mining and industrial belts of Sukinda and Danagadi blocks. These figures were compiled from 331 government schools across 462 villages in 48 gram panchayats. These dropout students have been rehabilitated under TSF scheme. Further, the January 2024 Unified District Information System for Education (UDISE) report by the Samagra Shiksha division of Jajpur recorded 13,010 dropout students. However, despite various initiatives by the Education department to reintegrate these children into mainstream education, the efforts have largely been ineffective. Most of the dropouts, who belong to SC/ST communities, are now engaged in menial jobs such as working in liquor shops, agricultural fields, hotels, contract-based

labour, and garages, adversely impacting their physical and mental well-being, reports said. Highlighting the gravity of the issue, Mantu Das had earlier filed a public interest litigation (PIL, No. 1729/2023) in the Orissa High Court, citing that these children were being denied their fundamental rights to education, nutritious food, and healthcare. The High Court had directed the Odisha State Commission for Protection of Child Rights to investigate and appropriately rehabilitate the affected children January 24, 2023. However, over two years have passed since the issuance of the directive no substantial progress has reportedly been made. Allegations have also surfaced that the failure of the Education department is forcing these children to seek alternatives like job placements under TSF's rehabilitation schemes. Despite investing over ₹168.64 crore in upgrading 249 high schools across the district - and a second phase of transformation currently underway - dropout numbers have not decreased, raising questions about the effectiveness of the Education department's initiatives. It is further alleged that many ST/SC children have not been brought under the purview of the Right to Education Act, 2009. As part of his complaint, Mantu Das submitted a list of 22 dropout students to the NCST, including information that four underage girls had already married and given birth to children. Given the sensitivity and scale of the issue, the NCST has taken the matter seriously and instructed concerned authorities to file a detailed ATR.

# Elephant calf under treatment dies

**Keonjhar, April 11:** An 18-months-old elephant calf who was under treatment in Chamakpur area of Joda section after it was rescued April 7 with internal injuries died at around 3.30am Friday. Prima Facie accidental fall and injury due to male aggression resulting into bone fracture and septicemia was suspected when the calf was rescued. "It's a case of chronic infection," said Divisional Forest Officer, Keonjhar Dhanraj HD. "Its tarsal joints (legs) were damaged and bones were broken due to ac-



cidental fall," he said. According to the DFO, the male calf, around 18-months-old, was noticed by field staff 7th April in Chamakpur area of Joda section while it was

moving slowly and limping in hind legs. "As the calf was in a herd, the staff could not go near it but observed it through drone," he said. On April 10, the calf was slowly moving in the morning hours. But around 11am, it was found lying down due to weakness. The mother elephant and herd kept their eyes on it from a distance to notice its activity. However, the calf could not get up and walk. The wildlife treatment team went near it and found swelling in both hind legs and apprehended injuries to its bones. The team removed huge quantity of pus from swelling organs. "Depression mark without external injury was observed adjacent to left side of tail. Left side neck had a skin growth resembling that of a tusk injury. It might be a case of other male aggression," the DFO further said. Septicaemia was suspected and ceftriaxone was given in consultation with experts from Centre for Wildlife Health Bhubaneswar, and Wildlife Institute of India. "We also coordinated with Joint Task Force of PCCF Wild Life office during treatment," the DFO added. After post mortem the calf's body was buried in the ground Friday.

# PROBE INTO SDCCB RECRUITMENT SCAM BEGINS

**Bargarh, April 11:** A major recruitment scam has come to light at the Sambalpur District Central Cooperative Bank (SDCCB) in the district, with allegations that several employees secured jobs using fake educational certificates. The issue gained attention after Attabira MLA Nihar Ranjan Mahanand raised the matter in the state

Assembly, prompting the initiation of an official probe. According to reports, numerous employees submitted forged academic documents and degree certificates from various universities to secure employment at the bank. Notably, some of the individuals allegedly involved in the scam have already been promoted within the organisation. As part of the investigation,

Kamakhya Prasad Mahananda, a Class IV (supporting staff) employee, has already been suspended. The educational qualifications of other employees are currently under verification, and it is believed that more dismissals may follow based on the findings. A special investigation team (SIT) has been constituted to verify the credentials of all 174 bank employees. The team has reportedly contacted universi-

ties within Odisha and outside the state to cross-check the submitted academic documents. Bank CEO Bhakteshwar Mallik confirmed that the verification process was launched after receiving complaints regarding fraudulent educational certificates. "Out of the 174 employees, the documents of 93 have been verified so far. The rest will be completed by the end of this month," said Mallik.

# Man gets life imprisonment for murder

**SONEPUR:** A local court here found the accused in the sensational Pabana murder case (of 2020) guilty of the crime and sentenced him to life imprisonment, Friday. Sessions Judge Rashmi Mohan Acharya also imposed a cash fine of ₹10,000 on the convict, Himanshu Sethi, 43. In the event of non-payment of the fine, the convict will have to undergo an additional six months rigorous imprisonment, the order stated. According to the case details, June 10, 2020, a longstanding enemy over fishing rights on a pond in Ghamandiapali village under Birmaharajpur police limits in Subarnapur district led to a fatal altercation. Himanshu, who is related to fellow villager Pabana Sethi attacked the latter with an axe, resulting in his death. Pabana's wife, Mithali, was a witness to the crime. Following a complaint filed by the deceased's son, Sachidananda Sethi, Birmaharajpur police registered a case under various legal provisions and launched an investigation. Police arrested Himanshu and latter submitted a charge sheet in the court. The case was registered as Sessions Case No. 30/20 in the Subarnapur District and Sessions Court. During the trial, which was based on the testimony of 20 witnesses and supporting documents submitted by the police, the judge found Himanshu Sethi guilty. Public prosecutor Kanheyal Pradhan appeared on behalf of the state.

# INDIA'S CHOICES

The unilateral and universal tariff imposed by Donald Trump had shaken the world. It has disrupted the global economy—supply chains, export regimes and employment. What is worse, it threatens a global war on trade. Some observers are talking about ensuing depression as well as recession. My purpose in this piece is to assess the possibility of a global trade war, and to examine India's response to the emerging economic scenario.

Second is to negotiate a bilateral trade agreement quite soon. New Delhi is aiming to sign it when Trump arrives in Delhi for Quad Summit later this year. And the third, which it may perforce do, is to carry out the much-needed trade reforms and revisit some of the tariffs in a few sectors. For instance, according to the White-house factsheet, India imposes 50 per cent tariff on apples from the USA. Is it necessary?

As per the same factsheet, New Delhi has NTBs like quality control and certification against certain American items on telecom, chemicals and medical devices. Those can go. Trump says India is the tariff king of the world. Indian economy had been dubbed a protectionist economy bordering on dirigisme from 1947 to 89. It opened up only in 1991. After that momentous period, reforms stalled.

That said, the loss of India's revenue from exports to USA is calculated at 3.6 billion dollars which is 0.1 or 0.2 per cent of India's GDP. Should the negotiations fail, India can live with that. But the larger point is that India should treat this as ironic opportunity like it did in 1991 foreign currency crisis and 1998 Pokhran-II consequences and fix its own economy especially the trade regime. Each crisis could be a blessing in disguise. India could negotiate with America, not for years on end as it has been with EU, but it must put its house in order. There is a deepening dichotomy between political rhetoric and economic reality. That must end sooner than later.

**INDIAN ECONOMY HAD BEEN DUBBED A PROTECTIONIST ECONOMY BORDERING ON DIRIGISME FROM 1947 TO 89. IT OPENED UP ONLY IN 1991**

First of all, what is the casus belli of this prognosis of a global war caused by Trump's action? There are divided opinions on it. One school of thought says that Trump's tariff is an instrument to meet his political objectives. Second, it is to prevent China from overtaking America on trade and later, on GDP. Third, it is Trump's one figment of thinking to fix the American economy in the line of MAGA—Making America Great Again. These three perspectives merit some discussion.

Coming to the reasons for the Trumpian tariff, the politics of the action may be that Trump wants to geo-politicise trade to bargain with each country. By imposing tariffs universally, he sought to disrupt the alliances, integrations, regionalisation and so on and then, bargain with each country to secure their political and economic allegiance.

The competition by China is a more plausible argument. The Chinese world market share of manufacturing goods is about 32 per cent whereas that of America is around 16 per cent. The Chinese GDP is 19 trillion compared to 29 trillion of USA. Trump would not want China to catch up or

overtake. The American trade deficit with China is about 1 trillion. By levying high tariffs on China, Trump perhaps wants to make up the trade deficit and revive its own manufacturing sector.

The third reason follows from the second, which is fixing the American economy. Manufacturing in any country creates jobs and generates growth. Unemployment in America has been rising. Hence, Trump wants to rejuvenate the domestic manufacturing sector by reducing competition from foreign countries. It is another matter that consumers will be forced to buy foreign goods at a higher price in the absence of domestic production. This will lead to inflation.

Are the tariffs reciprocal as claimed by the Trump Administration? No, they are protectionist. By any calculation, they are not reciprocal. One formula used for levying tariffs is to take the total trade deficit with a country and take half of that and levy it as a tariff. But that is not the case

with each country.

Will the tariffs lead to a trade war? It seems a remote possibility. Remember, the total imports of America from the World are 13 per cent. So, the rest 87 per cent is immune to the Trumpian tariff. So, if the countries create alternative markets and make alliances, they can withstand the tariff tension on their economies. For instance, it is reported that the trade ministers of Japan, South Korea and China met a few days ago to curate a trade alliance of some kind to counter American action.

Also, Trump is known for changing his mind. If he finds the going is tough, he will change the course. He is testing the waters. He had made a tariff hike his poll promise. This is to perhaps fulfil that. He will roll it back if it boomerangs on America. At the time of writing, he has declared 90 days pause on the tariff except on China.

How is India responding to it? One strategy is keeping quiet in view of the strategic proximity between two countries.

## Wake-up call for a grim climate

NASA confirmed that the bygone year 2024 was the warmest year ever recorded in human history. The year saw an extreme and prolonged heat wave condition sweeping across the whole world starting from Japan in the east to the USA and Canada in the west encompassing Southern Europe, and North Africa breaking all previous temperature records. The heat wave brought widespread temperatures above 100 degrees Fahrenheit (38 deg Celsius) in the Mediterranean region over the beginning three weeks of July.

In the far-east, authorities in Japan issued heatstroke alerts for tens of millions of people in 20 of its 47 prefectures. In the United States, widespread and oppressive heat wave ravaged in the Southern and Western states encompassing Florida to California to Washington as wildfires raged in southern California. The Death Valley of Arizona desert (one of the hottest places on Earth) recorded a temperature as high as 54 deg C. China also recorded its highest-ever temperature with a remote township in its north-western Xinjiang region boiling at 52.2 deg C.

The heat wave also continued its ravage across Spain with temperatures reaching 44 deg Celsius in the Guadalquivir Valley near Seville. There

have been frequent power cuts in some parts of Europe due to the surging demand for air conditioners. The foreign office of Britain issued extreme weather advisories to its citizens traveling to Italy, Greece and Spain with advice to stay indoors during the daytime. The heat wave has triggered evacuations of nearly 20,000 people from several towns near large wildfires areas around Athens in southern Greece.

Back home, several Indian cities recorded 40 plus degree Celsius temperatures with Delhi's Mungeshpur weather station recording a temperature as high as 52.9 deg C. The IMD has forecast that the summers in 2025 from March to May would experience warmest temperatures breaking last year's record. On March 15, 2025 Odisha's Boudh district recorded the highest temperature in India reaching 43.6 deg Celsius.

According to IPCC, our planet has been warmed by 0.6 deg Celsius over the last century and it is projected that the Earth's mean temperature is likely to rise by 2.4 to 4.8 deg Celsius by the year 2100. The consequences are catastrophic some of which are already becoming visible: melting of glaciers and rising of sea level, climate change and its manifold impacts like change in precipitation patterns, untimely

monsoon onsets, increase in extreme weather conditions of floods, droughts, heat waves, hurricanes and long term effects like lowering of agricultural yields, species extinction, increase of vector-borne diseases of dengue and malaria, social conflicts over issues like water etc. The fact that 11 of the warmest years of the past 125 years occurred only after 1990 with 2024 being the warmest year on record tells amply the extent of nature's fury in recent days.

Global warming has proved to be very harsh to our state Odisha also. Atmospheric temperature is consistently surging with summer seasons turning out to be painfully unbearable. Low-pressure weather conditions and depressions are becoming regular incidents causing unpredictable rainfall patterns across the state much to the woes of farmers.

Frequent floods and famines in the following years battered the lives of the people and shattered the economy of the state. The sea has also posed a serious threat to the state. The Bay of Bengal is expanding towards the coastal landscape at an alarming rate taking many villages and fertile farmlands into its grip thereby seriously threatening the livelihood of the native villagers. Many dev-

astating cyclones, triggered by the climate change, have originated from the Bay of Bengal and ravaged coastal Odisha in past. These were: Super Cyclones of 1971 and 1999, Phailin of 2023, Hudhud of 2014, Titli of 2018, Fani and Bulbul of 2019, Amphan of 2020, Yaas, Gulab and Jawad of 2021 and Dana of 2024.

Keeping these grave consequences in mind, world leaders have met at several forums in the past to find a solution to greenhouse gas emissions of nations with the Rio Summit in 1992 serving as the launching pad. The Paris Agreement signed in 2015 by 196 parties of the world at the COP 21 summit was a landmark event as it, for the first time, put a legally binding international obligation on nations to combat climate change by limiting global warming to well below 2 deg Celsius. However, the subsequent climate summits like the Glasgow Summit (2021) and Dubai Summit (2024) have failed to deliver any tangible result to realize the zero carbon emission goal. Under the circumstances, the humanity has no alternative but to embrace a nature-friendly lifestyle for a green and sustainable future.

## Silver Lining

The way babus handle crises has a distinct rhythm, and the recent events at Vanijya Bhawan exemplify this perfectly.

The Ministry of Commerce was abuzz with activity as the tariff threats from the Trump administration regained public attention. Negotiators put in hours that would make investment bankers blush, and files were moving at breakneck speed—well, by government standards.

Then—bam! Formally, the tariffs were announced. It dropped from the White House like a policy hammer, unaltered and unmodified. What followed? A collective sigh. It was nearly Zen-like—no panic, simply acceptance.

Observers noted that this was evident in their body language. That "Que Sera, Sera" gleam surfaced in the eyes of the overworked officers who hadn't seen daylight in weeks. As if someone had pressed the pause button on the bureaucratic treadmill, even the support staff appeared to move a bit more slowly. One senior babu, evidently exhausted, was overheard saying, "We worked until the last minute, gave it our best—but the Americans just went ahead with their playbook." So be it. The response blends stoic realism with classic fatigue. The system is saturated after months of frantic drafting, quiet diplomacy, and backchannel discussions. The engines have cooled, for now.

But there's always a bright side to a crisis, and it seems the babus have found theirs. The general outlook in the Commerce Ministry is that the time is ripe for Indian exporters to look beyond their usual suspects. It won't be a cakewalk. New markets mean new rules, new risks, and a lot of handholding for Indian traders. Essentially, our babus are gearing up to play guide and cheerleader. Furthermore, it's not just Delhi that's in action; reportedly, state governments are joining in too. Gujarat, with its flashy Vibrant Gujarat show, is likely to lead the charge. But Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, and Andhra Pradesh aren't sitting back either—they possess serious export muscle and are eager to flex. So, next year, don't be surprised if your local babu starts racking up air miles!

Diplomatic reshuffle signals strategic moves

At the highest levels of India's diplomatic establishment, a subtle but important shuffle is taking place. Nidhi Tewari's appointment as Prime Minister Narendra Modi's new private secretary (reported earlier by DKB) means that her predecessor, Vivek Kumar (IFS: 2004) is expected to make way—and perhaps move west.

According to rumours circulating in the corridors, Kumar will probably be assigned to the Indian High Commission in London as the Deputy High Commissioner. For the seasoned diplomat, whose professional path has been closely linked to the Prime Minister's Office, it would be a natural next step. He began in the PMO as Deputy Secretary in 2014, the same year Tewari joined the foreign service, and worked his way up to Director before becoming the PM's Private Secretary in 2022. Kumar brings with him both technical and diplomatic heft. His previous postings in Russia and Australia add to his well-rounded global experience—credentials that will serve him well if he indeed takes charge in London. Meanwhile, Tewari's elevation marks a generational shift. Known for her work in disarmament and international security, her entry as PS to the PM signals not just a new face in the PMO, but also a fresh approach to navigating India's external engagements.

This reshuffle is more than a routine personnel change. It's a strategic recalibration—one that reflects India's growing diplomatic ambitions and the quiet churn beneath the surface of South Block.

When babus ignore rules, governance suffers

What happens to senior babus who disregard the regulations they are supposed to uphold? We now know the answer: In 2024, 91 IAS officers, in addition to the 73 who did so in 2023, failed to file their Immovable Property Returns (IPRs). Not amused, a parliamentary panel has demanded harsher punishments.

This goes beyond paperwork. IPR filings serve as a fundamental accountability check, guarantee transparency, and avoid conflicts of interest. These officers cannot be considered for important postings because they lack vigilance clearance. Nevertheless, a portion of the privileged babu class conveniently disregards the rulebook year after year. Reminders are obviously insufficient, so the panel has correctly recommended a centralised compliance tracking system.

But the larger governance issue is the shortage of 1,316 IAS officers. Several important parts are missing from India's so-called steel frame, which has an authorised cadre strength of 6,858. Only 3,987 of the 4,781 direct recruits are in place, a worrying statistic. With only 1,555 officers meeting the 2,077 quota, the situation for promotees is worse, leading to the obvious impact on administration—inefficiency, overworked officers, and delayed decision-making.

While the suggested online tracking system for IAS vacancies is a good place to start, states must also take action. The panel's suggestion to penalise those who fail to fill promotion vacancies promptly may be the final push that's required.

# NSF calls for strict enforcement of ILP

Kohima, April 11: The Naga Students' Federation (NSF) Thursday called for strict enforcement of the Inner Line Permit (ILP) claiming escalating threats to the socio-economic and political fabric of indigenous Naga population.

Addressing a press conference NSF president Medovi Rhi and Inner Line Regulation Commission (ILRC) chairman and senior students' leader NSN Lotha said that they submitted a memorandum to state Chief Secretary J Alam highlighting the historical importance and continued relevance of Bengal Eastern Frontier Regulation (BEFR) of 1873.

The BEFR aims to protect and safeguard the identity and existence of the indigenous people of Nagaland. The regulation makes it obligatory for anyone, both Indian citizen and foreigner, who is not an indigenous inhabitant of Nagaland, to obtain an Inner Line Permit (ILP) as may be prescribed by the Government of Nagaland, to enter the state of Nagaland for a limited period.

The NSF warned of a looming crisis due to unchecked economic encroachment by non-Naga individuals, stating that "the hegemonic control over the economy of the Nagas has grown to such a height that even politicians are funded during the general elections."

It emphasised that while Nagaland welcomes all people, guests must abide by state laws and not undermine the region's indigenous identity.

The Federation was of the view that the existing im-

plementation of the BEFR in Nagaland is "facilitative" compared to the "regimental" approach adopted by Mizoram, resulting in what it describes as "alarming levels of influx," posing a serious threat to Naga identity, land, and livelihoods.

The NSF ILRC also made 10 key proposals and demands for stringent enforcement of ILP in the state.

The 10 proposals include the establishment of a centralised ILP database - for secure and

consistent tracking of all outsiders entering Nagaland. Strengthen ILP checkpoints - especially along porous borders with Assam and at key entry points like Dimapur railway station and airport.

Create a separate ILP enforcement wing to monitor and take action against ILP defaulters. Conduct sensitisation training for government officials - to ensure proper understanding and application of BEFR provisions. En-

sure transparency in ILP fee collection.

Adopt digital payment for ILP fees. Simplify ILP issuance - Aadhaar or EPIC to be basic criteria, while maintaining stringent guarantor responsibilities. Scrutinise purpose of entry - with ILPs issued only for genuine reasons.

Revise penalties for defaulters - raising the minimum fine to Rs 5,000, going up to Rs 25,000 for repeat offences. Restrict ILP renewals - with a maximum of two extensions and mandatory exit upon expiry.

Emphasising that the time has come for the Nagaland government to take decisive action to secure the future of its people, the NSF ILRC claimed that "the Nagas may soon become minorities in their own homeland if corrective steps are not taken now."

Hyderabad, April 11: Telangana Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy Friday asked officials to speed up the works related to the Musi river rejuvenation project and to invite tenders in June for the proposed bridge on the sprawling Mir Alam Tank in the city.

Reddy, who held a meeting with officials, discussed the proposed 'Gandhi Sarovar' at Babu Ghat, a Gandhi memorial in the city, and also the models for the proposed bridge on Mir Alam Tank.

He told the officials to prepare the Detailed Project Report (DPR), plans, surveys and proposals before inviting tenders for the Mir Alam Tank Bridge in June.

A power-point presentation on the model designs of the bridge, prepared by consulting agencies for the project, was made to the CM, an official release said.

Reddy suggested that the 2.5 km-long bridge should be built in a grand manner while also ensuring the safety and security of those who travel on it and also the visitors.

It was decided in the meeting that the three island-like places in the Mir Alam Tank should be developed as tourist destinations, it said.

Reddy said 'birds paradise' and waterfalls should be developed in the islands, making one remember the famous Gardens by the Bay in Singapore.

The island zones should be developed as a wedding desti-

nation as well by establishing convention centres, adventure park, theme park and amphitheatre, besides resorts, hotels and boating for tourists, he said.

The DPR should have plans for cleaning the water in the tank and to develop the projects in the Public Private Partnership (PPP) model, he said.

The plans should incorporate details about the availability of water in the tank and also water flow speed during flood besides conducting a hydrology and environment-related survey, he said.

Reddy also suggested that the proposed Mir Alam Tank Bridge and the island zones should be linked to the adjacent Nehru Zoological Park.

# Tripura to bring in 'best teachers' from outside

Agartala, April 11: Tripura Chief Minister Manik Saha Friday said the government was planning to bring in the "best available teachers" from outside the state to ensure quality education for students, especially in key subjects.

Addressing two separate programmes at Teliamura and

Kalyanpur in Khowai district, the CM referred to Finance Minister Pranajit Singha Roy's recent budget speech, in which a proposal was made to set up coaching centres in all subdivisions to improve academic support for students.

"The established teachers of the state may not join the coaching centres, but I have requested the Finance Minister to float ten-

ders to bring the best teachers from outside the state to ensure quality education," Saha said.

"They will teach students subjects such as English, mathematics, physics and biology," he added. The CM said there is no way to reduce the academic pressure on students unless alternative academic support is made available.

"It has been observed that students are rushing to private

tuition classes on scooters, bikes or other means of transport, which adds to their stress. The proposed coaching centres will systematically teach the four key subjects," he added.

On infrastructure development, Saha announced the government's plan to set up an examination hall at Hapania in West Tripura at a cost of Rs 15 crore.

# Protests in Telangana against Waqf Act

# Mizoram to use tankers to address water crisis in Lunglei town

Aizawl, April 11: In an effort to address the ongoing water crisis in Mizoram's Lunglei town, the state government has decided to use tankers to meet the demand of the residents, an official said Friday.

Lunglei, the second-largest town in the state after Aizawl, has been experiencing an acute water shortage since March due to the drying up of the Tlawng River, its primary water source.

The river's water level has dropped significantly because of an extended dry spell in the region. An official said the government has decided to use tankers to ferry water from the Mat River, which flows between Zobawk in Lunglei district and Hnahthial town,

and begin distribution within the Lunglei Municipal Council (LMC) starting Saturday.

The move comes after an arrangement was made by Public Health Engineering (PHE) Minister Lalnilawma, along with four local legislators from Lunglei, he added.

He said the government will collaborate with the Lunglei Truck Owners' Association to distribute water to residents.

Officials claimed the region has not received rainfall since January, which has



significantly depleted natural water sources.

PHE superintending engineer Zohmingliana said under current conditions, the department is able to pump only 1.5 million litres per day

(MLD) from Tlawng River, while the daily requirement for Lunglei stands at 3.5 MLD.

"During normal times, we can pump water for 24 hours straight. But due to the sharp decline in water level, we can

now operate pumps for only 9 to 13 hours a day," he added.

Zohmingliana also said residents have been collecting water on their own from streams, borewells (hand pumps) and 90 traditional waterholes, locally known as 'Tuikhur', in and around Lunglei.

According to him, Lunglei and its surrounding areas have around 80,000 residents and more than 16,000 water tap connections.

He further mentioned that the government is currently constructing a concrete gravity dam on Tlawng River, which is expected to significantly improve water security in the area.



NEGOTIATIONS FOR TRADE DEALS

India geared up for 'high degree' of urgency: EAM

New Delhi, April 11: The Trump administration was quick in responding to what was tabled for a bilateral trade pact with India and New Delhi is geared up for a "very high" degree of urgency in concluding trade deals with the US, the European Union and the UK, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said Friday.

In an interactive session at the Global Technology summit, he said the US under President Donald Trump has fundamentally changed its approach to engaging with the world and it has consequences across every key domain, especially in the technology sector. The external affairs minister's remarks came as Trump's policy on tariffs triggered massive trade disruptions and fears of a global economic recession.

On Wednesday, Trump announced a 90-day pause on his sweeping tariffs on all countries, except China as countries around the world wilted under the impact of the seismic action. Jaishankar, without sharing any specific details of negotiations between India and

the US on the proposed trade pact, indicated that New Delhi was keen to conclude it as early as possible. "Within a month of change in the administration, we actually have conceptually an agreement that we will do a bilateral trade agreement; that we will find a fix that will work for both of us because we have our concerns too. And its not an open ended process," he said.

"We did four years of talking in the first Trump administration. They have their view of us and frankly we have our view of them. The bottom line is that the deal didn't get done," he said. Following talks between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Trump in Washington DC in February, the two sides announced to negotiate the first tranche of the BTA by the fall of 2025.

Jaishankar also referred to India's negotiations with the European Union for a free trade agreement. "If you look at the EU, often people say we've been negotiating for 23 years which is not entirely true because we had big blocks of time when nobody was even talking to somebody else. But they have

tended to be very protracted processes," he said.

"It's actually the other way around today. That urgency we are trying to communicate to all three accounts (the US, EU, the UK)," he said.

"My sense probably is in terms of other parties' response -- at least so far the US has been fairly quick to whatever has been tabled. Now we have to see after April 2 how that picks up," he said. On Trump's policies, he said the US has fundamentally changed its approach to engaging the world and it has consequences across every domain.

"But the tech consequences, I believe, would be particularly profound and it will be profound not just because the US is the largest economy, the main driver, in a way, of global tech advancements but also because it's very clear that tech has a big role in making America great again (MAGA)." The external affairs minister, while highlighting a big shift in global order also spoke about China's advancement.

NC moves SC against Waqf Act

Srinagar, April 11: Jammu and Kashmir's ruling National Conference (NC) Friday said it has filed a petition in the Supreme Court challenging the recent amendments to the Waqf Act.

The party first announced its decision to challenge the Act, which it termed a constitutionally "alarming interference" in the religious affairs of the Muslim community, Wednesday.

The same day, Chief Minister Omar Abdullah defended protests by NC MLAs in the legislative assembly against the Act, saying the law had hurt the sentiments of the majority of the people in Jammu and Kashmir. "On the directions of Party President Dr. Farooq Abdullah, and in the interest of the minorities of India, JKNC has challenged the Waqf Amendment Act in the Supreme Court. Our MLAs @arjunsinghraj, @AdvReyazkhan & Hilal Lone have filed a writ petition today seeking justice," the NC said in a post on X Friday. The Waqf (Amendment) Bill was passed by Parliament April 4 after marathon debates in both Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha.

Indian EVMs not prone to hacking: EC sources

New Delhi, April 11: Election Commission sources Friday rejected suggestions that electronic voting machines (EVMs) used in the country are vulnerable to hacking, asserting that the machines work like simple calculators which are not connected to the internet or infrared.

Referring to the reported remarks of United States Director of National Intelligence Tulsi Gabbard that her office has obtained evidence of vulnerabilities to the hacking of electronic voting systems for manipulating votes, the sources pointed out that some countries use "electronic voting systems" which are a mix of multiple systems, machines and processes including various private networks including the Internet.

They underlined that India uses electronic voting machines that work like "simple, correct and accurate calculators" and cannot be connected to either the internet, WiFi or

infrared. These machines have stood legal scrutiny by the Supreme Court and are invariably checked by the political parties at various stages, including the conduct of "mock polls" before actual polling starts.

More than five crore paper trail machine slips have been verified and matched while counting in front of political parties, they pointed out. Tech mogul Elon Musk had last year called for the elimination of EVMs, citing the risk of being hacked by humans or artificial intelligence (AI). The then chief election commissioner Rajiv Kumar had in January responded to Musk's claim saying, "A global IT expert said EVMs can be hacked while our elections were going on. They (the US) don't have EVMs, they have electronic voting mechanisms. "The remarks created pandemonium here. The same expert later said that India takes a single day to finish counting while the US takes over a month. We just follow the narratives that are suiting."

IISc-study develops 'venom maps' of deadly snake in India

New Delhi, April 11: Researchers have developed "venom maps" using local climate conditions that could help predict the venom characteristics of Russell's viper, a deadly snake found widely in India.

A team of researchers from the Indian Institute of Science (IISc), Bangalore said the venom maps could help clinicians select the most appropriate treatment for patients with snake bites. The findings of the research have been published in the journal "PLOS Neglected Tropical Diseases".

Author Kartik Sunagar from the Centre for Ecological Sciences, IISc said, "Russell's viper is arguably the clinically most important snake species

in the world. It kills and maims more people than any other snake species."

"As a result, it is important to precisely unravel the composition, activity and potency of Russell's viper venoms and understand the role of biotic and abiotic factors in shaping them," he added. The researchers explained that the toxic effects of a snake's venom are caused by concentrations of enzymes, which are influenced by factors, such as climate and availability of prey.

"Recent studies from our laboratory have shed light on the influence of biotic factors, such as developmental shifts in diet, on Russell's viper venom composition and toxicity," Sunagar said. However, the factors



driving changes in the venom of Russell's viper are unknown, the researchers said. "Here, we highlight, for the first time, the role of climatic conditions, such as temperature, humidity and rainfall, in driving the bio-

Maharashtra cyber cell rescues over 60 Indians trapped in Myanmar

Mumbai, April 11: The cyber wing of Maharashtra Police has rescued more than 60 Indian nationals who were tortured and forced into cyber slavery in Myanmar, and arrested five agents, including a foreign national, a senior official said here Friday.

The victims in the case were promised high-paying jobs abroad, but were threatened and physically tortured to commit cyber frauds there, he said.

This is perhaps the biggest action taken by the Maharashtra Cyber in a cyber slavery case with the help of the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) and Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA), he said.

Cyber slavery is an emerging form of exploitation that begins with online deception and evolves into physical human trafficking.

Maharashtra Cyber has registered three First Information Reports (FIRs) in this connection, he said.

The racketeers contacted the victims through social media platforms and lured them with high-paying jobs in Thailand and other East Asian countries, he said.

The agents arranged passports and flight tickets for the victims and sent them to Thailand on tourist visas. After



landing in the country, they were sent to the Myanmar border, where they were made to cross a river in small boats.

On entering Myanmar, the victims were taken to guard-compounds controlled by armed rebel groups, where they were forced to commit cyber frauds ranging from 'digital arrest' scams to fake investment schemes on an industrial scale. Maharashtra Cyber, along with other agencies, rescued the victims, the official said, without giving details as to whether the operation was carried out inside Myanmar.

Additional Director General of Police (Maharashtra Cyber) Yashasvi Yadav said, "The accused include facilitators who helped the victims to take them to Myanmar."

"During the investigation of the case, four accused were arrested by the Goa Police, while we arrested the main accused from Mumbai, who was an Indian conduit," he said, adding that of the 60 victims, some could be named as accused if they were found to have played a role in it.

In order to force the victims into cyber frauds, the accused persons used to torture them. In some cases, they would even pull out the nails of the victims.

Nearly 100 cows died at TTD goshala in Andhra

Amaravati, April 11: YS Jagan Mohan Reddy-led YSRCP Friday alleged that nearly 100 cows died over the past three months at Tirumala Tirupati Devasthanam (TTD) goshala due to the "negligence and poor maintenance of the temple body."

However, TTD has strongly refuted these allegations, labelling social media claims of 100 cow deaths as "completely fake and misleading." YSRCP in a post on X said: "Heart-breaking scenes emerge from the TTD Goshala, where nearly 100 innocent cows have lost their lives over the past three months due to sheer neglect and poor maintenance. A silent tragedy is unfolding in a sacred space meant to shelter and protect them." YSRCP leader M Bharath accused the NDA coalition government in Andhra Pradesh of neglecting TTD's Goshala, where he claimed over 100 cows had died recently.

The former MP from Rajahmundry said that it's a betrayal of Lord Venkateswara's trust and the state government must answer for these shocking losses, urging Hindu leaders to demand justice. YSRCP leader and former TTD Chairman B Karunakar Reddy echoed the concern, attributing the deaths to poor upkeep and said a probe is needed to uphold Tirumala's sanctity. TTD Gosala's condition worsened under current leadership, he said in a release. Reddy alleged that the Divisional Forest Officer (DFO) lack expertise, calling it sheer negligence by the NDA coalition-appointed board.

In an official statement Friday, the TTD said that the images circulated do not pertain to TTD Gosalas, condemning the propaganda as "malicious".

Washington/ New York, April 11: Mumbai terror attack accused Tahawwur Rana allegedly said the Indians "deserved it" and commended the nine LeT terrorists killed during the attack, suggesting that they should be given "Nishan-e-Haider", Pakistan's highest gallantry award, according to the US Department of Justice.

The US Wednesday extradited Tahawwur Hussain Rana, a Canadian citizen and native of Pakistan, to stand trial in India on 10 criminal charges stemming from his alleged role in the 2008 terrorist attack in Mumbai that killed 166 people, including six Americans.

India alleges that Rana facilitated a fraudulent cover so that his childhood friend Headley, a US citizen born Daoud Gilani, could freely travel to Mumbai to conduct surveillance of potential attack sites for Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT).

statement said. "In an intercepted conversation with Headley, Rana allegedly commended the nine LeT terrorists who had been killed committing the attacks, saying that "they should be given Nishan-e-Haider" -Pakistan's highest award for gallantry in battle, which is reserved for fallen soldiers," the statement said.

India alleges that Headley received training from LeT members in Pakistan and was in direct communication with the terrorist outfit about plans to attack Mumbai. Rana agreed to open a Mumbai branch of his immigration business and appoint Headley as the manager of the office, despite the latter having no immigration experience, it said.

Between November 26 and 29, 2008, ten LeT terrorists carried out a series of 12 coordinated shooting and bombing attacks in Mumbai.

LeT terrorists infiltrated the city by sea, dispersing to multiple locations in teams. They attacked a train station, two restaurants, the Taj Mahal Palace Hotel and a Jewish community centre.

Toll due to lightning strikes climbs to 61

Patna, April 11: While a sudden change in weather brought respite from the scorching heat in Delhi and Uttar Pradesh Friday, lightning strikes and hailstorms in Bihar claimed 61 lives in the last 24 hours, officials said.

Ambulance driver gets life sentence for raping Covid patient in Kerala

Pathanamthitta (Kerala), April 11: A court here Friday sentenced a man to life imprisonment for brutally raping and physically assaulting a 19-year-old COVID-19 patient, who belongs to a Dalit community, while she was being transported to a first-line treatment centre near here in 2020.

The sentence was pronounced by Judge N Harikumar, who also ordered the convict, Noufal (29), who hails from Kayamkulam, to pay a fine of ₹2.12.000.

The court had found the accused guilty Thursday, following the conclusion of arguments, and deferred sentencing to Friday.

The shocking incident took place at midnight September 5, 2020, at a time when the country was gripped by fear due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Instead of taking the patient to the COVID treatment centre in Pandalam, the accused diverted the vehicle and transported her to a deserted area within the land allocated for the Aranmula airport project. After entering the back of the ambulance and shutting the door, the accused forcefully restrained the woman and assaulted her.

The survivor, who was menstruating at the time, was raped after the accused covered her mouth. He also slapped her on the cheek and kicked her in the stomach. During the struggle, the woman fell and sustained an injury to her left knee.

After the assault, the accused dropped the semi-conscious woman in front of a private hospital in Pandalam and proceeded towards Adoor. The hospital staff, upon learning of the incident from the survivor, immediately informed the police.

Acting swiftly on her statement, the police apprehended Noufal and placed him under arrest.

BENGAL TEACHERS WHO LOST JOBS HOLD MARCH

Kolkata, April 11: The familiar scenes of mass agitation returned to the streets of Kolkata Friday — echoes of the protests over the ghastly rape-murder at RG Kar Hospital — this time led by thousands of teachers and non-teaching staff who lost their jobs following a Supreme Court verdict that invalidated their appointments.

Chants of 'We want justice' shattered the sultry afternoon air, accompanied by visible outrage and frustration as demonstrators marched along the Salt Lake route. Their march from Karunamoyee to Acharya Sadan, the office of the West Bengal School Service Commission (SSC), was held in demand for the release of the 22 lakh Optical Mark Recognition (OMR) sheets to identify the genuine candidates who appeared for

the 2016 SSC exams and whose entire panel was annulled by the top court after it found the selection process "vitiated and tainted" beyond redemption.

Carrying placards demanding reinstatement, the protesters were joined by members of various civil society organisations in a show of solidarity. "SSC should release the copies of the OMR sheets to help segregate the eligible teachers," a demonstrator said.

The commission had earlier told both the Calcutta High Court and the Supreme Court that it no longer has the OMR sheets or their digital copies, as they were destroyed. Protestors squatted on the road and eagerly awaited the outcome of the crucial meeting scheduled to be held between representatives of the teachers who lost their jobs and the state education minister Bratya Basu later in the day.

NHF urges Centre to issue guidelines to protect vendors

New Delhi, April 11: The National Hawkers' Federation (NHF) Friday urged the Centre to issue national-level guidelines to protect street vendors from the rising threat of heatwaves.

The increasing temperatures are putting the lives and livelihoods of over two crore vendors at risk, it said. In a letter to Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Union Environment Minister Bhupender Yadav, the federation said the frequency and intensity of heatwaves have increased alarmingly, with 2023 witnessing around 30 days of extreme heat conditions, and demanded that heatwaves be included in notified disasters under the Disaster Management Act.

The federation said vendors are facing a "double impact" in the form of health risks due to

prolonged exposure and loss of income due to reduced customer footfall.

"Vendors report heat exhaustion, dehydration, dizziness and even heat strokes. Heatwaves also impact perishable goods, increasing financial losses. Vendors selling fresh produce, dairy and other heat-sensitive items suffer particularly heavy economic setbacks," the federation said.

It said despite the growing risks, street vendors often lack basic infrastructure like shade, drinking water and first-aid support. The NHF demanded that the government integrate vendor protection measures into the National Disaster Management Authority's (NDMA) guidelines and ensure state and urban bodies implement them.

The hawkers' body proposed several measures including advance planning by local au-

thorities, installation of public hydration stations, provision of umbrellas and temporary shade structures and distribution of oral rehydration salts, cooling towels and caps.

It also recommended the creation of shaded rest areas near markets and the formation of

vendor-led response teams trained to handle heat stress emergencies. The letter called for street vending zones to be developed with green cover and heat-resistant materials as part of long-term urban planning.

"With rising temperatures and increasing heatwave days,

it is imperative that street vendors who form a critical part of India's informal economy are given adequate protection. The central government must provide clear guidelines to states and urban local bodies on ensuring street vendors' safety during heatwaves. These guidelines should be officially integrated into the NDMA framework, making them a part of broader climate resilience and urban planning measures," NHF general secretary Saktiman Ghosh said in the letter. Mecanzy Dabre, deputy gen-

eral secretary of the federation, said the government must provide adequate funding to heat action plans, notify heatwaves as a national disaster and provide necessary support to street vendors.

Currently, the notified list of disasters eligible for National Disaster Response Fund (NDRF) and State Disaster Response Fund (SDRF) assistance includes cyclones, droughts, earthquakes, fires, floods, tsunamis, hailstorms, landslides, avalanches, cloud bursts, pest attacks, frost and cold waves.

However, state governments can use up to 10 per cent of their annual SDRF allocation, subject to certain conditions, to provide immediate relief for natural disasters they consider significant within the local context, even if they are not included in the centrally notified list.

# China courts EU as hedge against Trump

Beijing, April 11: China is looking to mend a strained trading relationship with the European Union, the last open major market for its products, to weather a trade war with the United States. But diplomats and analysts say breaking a prolonged stalemate won't be easy.


The EU and other major trading partners argue that Chinese overinvestment in manufacturing is flooding the world with goods, while Beijing accuses the EU of being protectionist.

But since US President Donald Trump's return to the White House, a procession of European officials and lawmakers have made their way to Beijing, capped off with Spanish Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez meeting Chinese leaders including President Xi Jinping Friday.

Xi, in his first public comments since Trump launched his tariff offensive, appealed directly to the EU by telling Sanchez that China and his bloc should join forces to defend globalisation and oppose "unilateral acts of bullying".

Both sides have quietly intensified coordination, with EU officials agreeing to monitor trade diversions from US tariffs, a potential strain on the relationship, in two separate calls with Chinese counterparts Tuesday. China and the EU also established several economic working groups after EU trade chief Maros Sefcovic's visit late March, including on EV supply chain investment and agri-food market access issues.

French foreign minister Jean-Noel Barrot won a short-term delay on definitive Chinese tariffs on cognac imports after his visit late March. However, Beijing unusually ignored a European demarche request on cognac-related issues for several months prior, two European diplomats told Reuters.

Top EU leaders will visit Beijing in July for a face-to-face summit with President Xi, an EU Commission spokesperson said Friday.

## Indian Consulate in Melbourne vandalised

Melbourne, April 11: The Indian Consulate in Melbourne has been targeted in an act of vandalism with the Indian High Commission in Canberra raising the issue with Australian authorities Friday.

The Consulate premises in Melbourne have previously been the site of similar provocations, with slogans defacing the premises in past years during periods of heightened international tension, The Australia Today reported.

Victoria Police said graffiti was discovered at the front entrance of the diplomatic premises around 1:00 am early Thursday.

"Officers believe the front entry of the building was graffitied overnight, sometime between Wednesday and Thursday. An investigation into the damage remains ongoing," a police spokesperson said.

The High Commission in a post on X on Friday said it raised the issue with Australian authorities.

"The incident of defacing at the premises of the Consulate General of India in Melbourne by miscreants has been raised with Australian authorities. All necessary steps are being taken to ensure the safety and security of Indian diplomatic and consular premises and personnel in the country," the post said.

Police have not confirmed whether any suspects have been identified in the Thursday incident.

Authorities have urged anyone with information to come forward, the police spokesperson said.

The act has reignited concerns within the Indian-Australian community which has expressed frustration over a growing pattern of targeted incidents involving Hindu temples and Indian government establishments across Melbourne, the news portal said.

## Siemens CEO killed in Hudson helicopter crash

New York, April 11: A tourist helicopter plummeted upside down into New York City's Hudson River Thursday killing all six people on board, including a Spanish family with three children and the pilot, Mayor Eric Adams said.

Agustin Escobar, CEO of Rail Infrastructure at Siemens Mobility, the train transportation arm of Germany-based technology company Siemens was among those killed, a company spokesperson told Reuters.

"We are deeply saddened by the tragic helicopter crash in which Agustin Escobar and his family lost their lives," the spokesperson said in an emailed statement.

Video of the crash showed what appeared to be a large object plunging into the river, followed seconds later by what appeared to be a helicopter blade. Afterwards, emergency and police boats were seen circling around a patch of river where the helicopter was submerged, with only what appeared to be the aircraft's landing gear poking above the water's surface.

The Bell 206 chopper, operated by New York Helicopter Tours, departed at about 3 pm from a downtown helicopter pad and flew north over the Hudson River, New York Police Commissioner Jessica Tisch said.

reached the George Washington Bridge and crashed minutes later, hitting the water upside down and sinking near Lower Manhattan about 3:15 pm, just off Hoboken, New Jersey, Tisch added.

Dani Horbiak, a 29-year-old resident of Jersey City, New Jersey, said she witnessed the crash from her window while working from home.

"I looked out my window right here, and I saw the helicopter falling to pieces, and I watched multiple pieces splashed down into the river below, and I was wondering what happened," she told Reuters. "But I'm putting the pieces together... it does sound like I was maybe hearing the propeller smacking into something."

Horbiak said she was "shaken" by the incident and later called emergency services which said it had already dispatched responders to the scene. Divers helped remove the victims from the water. Four were pronounced dead at the scene, while two others were taken to area hospitals, where they died.

#### Nepal protests: Key person held

Kathmandu: Police in Nepal Friday arrested the main person behind the March 28 pro-monarchy protests in the capital Kathmandu that killed two persons. Nepal Police said in a statement that Durga Prasai, who was involved in the violent protests of Tinkune, Kathmandu, was arrested from Jhapa district bordering India along with his bodyguard. Prasai was charged with state offence and organised crime. According to media reports, Prasai was arrested in Assam by the local police there and handed over to Nepal Police, who brought him to Jhapa, where he was formally arrested.

#### Tesla launches in Saudi Arabia

Riyadh: Tesla officially launched in Saudi Arabia Thursday, marking a new chapter in the company's global expansion after Elon Musk's troubled relationship with the kingdom — but the Middle East country's extreme heat could pose a challenge for its electric vehicle performance and battery efficiency. Musk and Saudi Arabia have had a complicated history. Back in 2018, the Tesla CEO claimed he had secured funding from the kingdom's sovereign wealth fund to take the company private. That deal never happened, leading to lingering tensions. With the launch of its first showroom and service centre in the Saudi capital, Riyadh, Tesla makes its long-anticipated entry into the Saudi market.

#### Brazil's former Prez Bolsonaro hospitalised

Sao Paulo: Former Brazilian President Jair Bolsonaro was hospitalised Friday morning with abdominal pain while travelling in northeastern Brazil, his political party said. The pain was related to long-term effects of a stabbing to the abdomen he suffered in September 2018, the press office of his Liberal Party said. Bolsonaro has been in and out of hospitals since the incident at a campaign event before Brazil's 2018 presidential election. The conservative leader underwent several surgeries during his presidency from 2019-2022. He was admitted Friday to a hospital in Santa Cruz, a small city in the northeastern state of Rio Grande do Norte. Sen Flavio Bolsonaro, one of his sons, said he would be transferred to a hospital in the state's capital, Natal.

## US envoy in Russia for talks with Putin

Moscow, April 11: US President Donald Trump's special envoy Steve Witkoff flew to Russia Friday for talks with President Vladimir Putin about the search for a peace deal on Ukraine, the Kremlin said, saying the two men might also discuss a Trump-Putin meeting.

The Izvestia news outlet released video of Witkoff leaving a hotel in Russia's second city St Petersburg, accompanied by Kirill Dmitriev, Putin's investment envoy.

Witkoff has emerged as a key figure in the on-off rapprochement between Moscow and Washington amid talk on the Russian side of potential joint investments in the Arctic and in Russian rare earth minerals.

Putin was also in St Petersburg on Friday to hold what the Kremlin called an "extraordinarily important" meeting about the development of the Russian Navy, which is in the throes of a major modernisa-



tion and expansion drive.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov played down the planned Witkoff-Putin meeting, telling Russian state media the US envoy's visit would not be "momentous" and that no breakthroughs were expected.

The meeting will be their third this year and comes at a time when US tensions with Iran and China - two countries

with which Russia has close ties - are severely strained over Tehran's nuclear programme and a burgeoning trade war with Beijing.

Witkoff is due in Oman Saturday for talks with Iran over its nuclear programme after Trump threatened Tehran with military action if it does not agree to a deal. Moscow has repeatedly offered its help in trying to clinch a diplomatic settlement.

Putin and Trump have spoken by phone but have yet to meet face-to-face since the US leader returned to the White House in January for a second four-year term.

## Once on civil war's frontline, Lebanon museum sees new life

Beirut, April 11: When Lebanon's civil war erupted 50 years ago this month, its national museum became a flashpoint of its capital's deadly frontline, with militants barricaded among ancient sarcophagi and sniping through historic mosaics.

Now, students and tourists roam through its artefacts - some still blackened by indoor campfires lit by those fighters - and into a new pavilion opened during Lebanon's most recent war last year, when Israel and armed group Hezbollah traded heavy fire.

For its admirers, the building not only houses the country's heritage, but also symbolises its resilience.

"I hope these young people I see here also know what happened in the museum in 1975, because

what happened here is something worthy of respect," said Lebanon's culture minister Ghassan Salameh, speaking to Reuters in the main museum hall.

"There is a right to forget. The Lebanese who want to forget the civil war - it's their right to do so. But there is also a duty to remember, so that we do not repeat it again, and again, and again."

The war erupted April 13, 1975, after Christian gunmen fired on a bus carrying Palestinian fighters in Beirut - just a few kilometres from the museum, which first opened in 1942.

A frontline running directly adjacent to the museum split east Beirut from the west. After militants took up the museum as a barracks, the director of antiquities at the time, Maurice Chehab, ferried small artefacts to vaults at Lebanon's central



bank and encased the larger pieces in reinforced concrete to protect them from shelling.

At least four major pieces were damaged, Salameh said. They are visible in the museum today, including a football-sized hole in a floor-to-ceiling 5th century mosaic used by snipers to target rival

militants near the front.

The war lasted 15 years, leaving more than 100,000 dead and displacing hundreds of thousands more. Halfway through it, Israeli troops invaded all the way to Beirut and Hezbollah was founded the same year, vowing to push Israel out.

New pavilion opened amid recent conflict, uncovering buried antiquities

In 2023, a new war erupted between the old foes, when Hezbollah launched rockets into Israel, triggering a year of tit-for-tat strikes until Israel escalated its air and ground campaign, leaving Hezbollah badly weakened by the end of 2024.

Even as that conflict was raging, the museum worked to open a new wing for rotating exhibitions. As construction was under way, archaeologists uncovered dozens of artefacts that Chehab had buried in the

museum's backyard to protect them, said Sarkis Khoury, Lebanon's current director of antiquities.

He spoke to Reuters while standing in front of an outer wall damaged during the civil war that museum authorities had decided to preserve as a testament to its resilience.

"The things we left visible are a lesson for the future, because we are a country that should be a country of peace, a country of coexistence, because this is our history," said Sarkis Khoury, Lebanon's current director of antiquities.

Keeping the wall is a rare example of memory preservation in Lebanon, where other landmarks of the civil war have remained abandoned or were covered up by the rapid construction of high-rises once the conflict ended.

# India, US finalise terms of reference for first phase of trade deal

## Indian govt moves quickly to clinch a trade deal following Trump's tariff pause

**New Delhi, April 11:** India and the US have finalised terms of reference for talks over the first part of a bilateral trade deal, an Indian trade official said Friday, adding it was possible that a "win-win" deal could take shape in the next 90 days.

US President Donald Trump Wednesday announced a 90-day pause on most tariff hikes for major trading partners including India, while raising levies on China, providing temporary relief for Indian exporters.

Trump's administration had announced a 26% tariff on Indian goods earlier this month, and New Delhi had said it did not plan to retaliate.

Trade analysts have said that, following Trump's huge increase in tariffs on China, some companies could use India to divert exports to the US market.

"Neither will India be the source of trade diversion for our products, nor will it become a safe haven for others to divert through India," the official said.

"India wants to remain a trusted trading partner. This is the message of Prime Minister Narendra Modi to all government officials and industry."


**Mumbai, April 11:** Benchmark Sensex surged by 1,310 points while Nifty closed above 22,900 level Friday on gains in banking, oil and metal shares as investors rejoiced the 90-day suspension of additional import duties by the US.

Defying a bearish trend in world markets, the 30-share BSE benchmark Sensex jumped 1,310.11 points or 1.77 per cent to settle at 75,157.26. During the day, it soared 1,620.18 points or 2.19 per cent to 75,467.33.

The NSE Nifty surged 429.40 points or 1.92 per cent to 22,828.55. In intra-day trade, the benchmark rallied 524.75 points or 2.34 per cent to 22,923.90.

The US announced suspension of additional tariffs on India for 90 days until July 9 this year, according to the White House executive orders. On April 2, US President Donald Trump slapped universal duties on about 60 countries exporting goods to America and additional steep levies on countries like India, potentially impacting sales of products from shrimp to steel in the world's biggest economy.

Tata Steel was the lead gainer among Sensex shares, rising by 4.91 per cent after the company announced a transformation plan, including job cuts, for its Netherlands steel plant to improve efficiency and margins. HDFC Bank rose by 2.33 per cent, emerging as the biggest contributor to the Sensex's rise. Reliance Industries, ICICI Bank, Bharti Airtel, Kotak Mahindra Bank, NTPC and Adani Ports were among the gainers. IT behemoth TCS dropped 0.43 per cent after the company reported a 1.7 per cent decline

All BSE sectoral indices ended higher. Commodities surged the most by 3.40 per cent, followed by consumer durables (2.92 per cent), utilities (2.76 per cent), power (2.64 per cent), energy (2.51 per cent), industrials (2.34 per cent) and consumer discretionary (2.25 per cent).

As many as 3,115 stocks advanced while 846 declined and 118 remained unchanged on the BSE. Equity markets would remain closed Monday for Dr Baba Saheb Ambedkar Jayanti.

## Global stocks rout

World markets largely slumped amid growing concerns due to a tit-for-tat tariff war between China and the US. Tokyo's Nikkei 225 index and South Korea's Kospi settled lower while Shanghai SSE Composite index and Hong Kong's Hang Seng ended higher. Tokyo's Nikkei 225 index dropped nearly 3 per cent. European markets were trading lower.

US markets ended significantly lower Thursday a day after a sharp rally. The Nasdaq composite tanked 4.31 per cent, S&P 500 slumped 3.46 per cent and Dow Jones Industrial Average dropped 2.50 per cent.

# IIP growth at 6-month low of 2.9%

Poor show by manufacturing, mining pulls down factory growth

**New Delhi, April 11:** India's industrial production growth decelerated to a six-month low of 2.9 per cent in February 2025, mainly due to poor performance of the manufacturing, mining and power sectors, according to official data released Friday.

The government also revised upward the industrial growth figure to 5.2 per cent for January 2025 from the provisional estimate of 5 per cent released in March.

The factory output, measured in terms of the Index of Industrial Production (IIP), rose by 5.6 per cent in February 2024.

The previous low was recorded in August last year when the growth remained flat at zero per cent. "As expected, the leap year base pulled down the YoY (year-on-year) growth of



the IIP to 2.9 per cent in February 2025 from 5.2 per cent in January 2025...the deceleration was broad-based, with all the use-based categories, as well as two of the three sectors barring electricity, witnessing a slower growth in February 2025 vis-a-vis the previous month. While the growth performance of mining is expected to deteriorate in March 2025 relative to February 2025, this is likely to be offset by an uptick in electricity

generation, amid steady manufacturing growth," Iera Chief Economist Aditi Nayar said.

The data released by the National Statistics Office (NSO) showed that the manufacturing sector's output growth slowed to 2.9 per cent in February 2025, down from 4.9 per cent in the year-ago month.

Mining production growth dipped to 1.6 per cent from 8.1 per cent a year ago.

Power output growth also slowed to 3.6 per cent in February 2025 from 7.6 per cent in the year-ago period.

In the April-February FY25, the IIP grew 4.1 per cent, down from 6 per cent recorded in the corresponding period of the preceding fiscal.

As per use-based classification, the capital goods segment growth accelerated to 8.2 per cent in February 2025 against 1.7 per cent in the year-ago period.

# ₹ jumps 58 paise to 86.10 against \$

**Mumbai, April 11:** The rupee surged 58 paise against the greenback to settle at 86.10 Friday due to a sharp correction in the US dollar and a strong rebound in the domestic equity markets.

The surge in the local unit came a day after US President Donald Trump suspended the 26 per cent tariffs on India till July 9.

At the interbank foreign exchange, the domestic unit opened at 86.22, up 46 paise against the US dollar. During the intra-day trade, it rose to 85.95 before settling at 86.10, up



58 paise against the greenback. The rupee had settled at 86.68 Wednesday. Equity, forex, and com-

modity markets were closed Thursday on account of Shri Mahavir Jayanti.

"The rupee opened at 86.22 but the dollar was immediately sold off as the dollar index fell below 100 levels for the first time in three years," Anil Kumar Bhansali, Head of Treasury and Executive Director, Finrex Treasury Advisors LLP, said. "The rupee is expected to be in the range of 85.75-86.25 next week on Tuesday after the holiday on Monday," he said.

Meanwhile, the dollar index, which gauges the greenback's strength against a basket of six currencies, crashed 1.52 per cent to 99.335.

# Market volatility hits equity MFs and SIPs

Equity MF inflow drops to 11-month low of Rs 25,082 cr in Mar; SIP hits 4-month low

**New Delhi, April 11:** Inflow in equity mutual funds (MFs) declined to an 11-month low at Rs 25,082 crore in March primarily due to sharp redemption in sectoral and thematic funds amid continued market volatility spurred by tariff concerns.

This was the third consecutive month of a decline in inflow in equity funds and also marks 14 per cent drop in inflow from February. The latest fund infusion by investors was the 49th consecutive month of net inflows into the segment.

Moreover, inflows into systematic investment plans (SIP) came at Rs 25,925 crore in March - a four-month low. Before this, SIP inflow was Rs 25,999 crore in February, Rs 26,400 crore in January and Rs 26,459 crore in December.

In the fiscal year 2024-25, the average monthly SIP contribution reached Rs 24,113 crore, marking a significant increase from the Rs 16,602 crore observed in the preceding fiscal year.

According to data released by Association of Mutual Funds in India (Amfi) Friday, equity-oriented MFs saw an inflow of Rs 25,082 crore in March, way lower than Rs 29,303 crore in February.

The flow in March was at the lowest level since April 2025, when equity mutual funds attracted Rs 18,917 crore.

ITI Mutual Fund CEO Jatinder Pal Singh attributed the decline in inflows to higher redemption in sectoral and thematic funds.

Within the equity fund categories, flexi cap funds recorded the highest inflows in March, attracting Rs 5,165 crore. However, sectoral/thematic funds, which saw a robust inflow of Rs 5,711 crore in February, experienced a sharp drop, drawing in just Rs 735 crore in March.

This significant decline indicates a shift in

investor sentiment, with interest moving away from niche sectoral bets towards more diversified and flexible investment strategies.

In March, mid-cap and small-cap mutual funds continued to attract significant investor interest, with inflows of Rs 3,439 crore and Rs 4,092 crore, respectively.

These figures marked a slight increase from February's inflows of Rs 3,406 crore for mid-caps and Rs 3,722 crore for small-caps. In contrast, large-cap funds witnessed a decline in inflows, receiving Rs 2,479 crore in March compared to Rs 2,866 crore in February.

In FY25, equity-oriented funds witnessed cumulative inflows of Rs 4.17 lakh crore, significantly higher than the Rs 1.84 lakh crore recorded in FY24.

On the other hand, debt funds registered an outflow of Rs 2.02 lakh crore in March as compared to Rs 6,525 crore in February.

In March, all 16 debt fund categories recorded net outflows, highlighting broad-based redemption pressure across the segment. Liquid funds bore the brunt, witnessing the highest outflow at Rs 1.33 lakh crore - accounting for 65.64 per cent of the total outflow for the month.

This was followed by overnight funds, which saw redemptions of Rs 30,015 crore, and money market funds, which experienced net outflows of Rs 21,301 crore.

Moreover, outflows remained relatively muted in the duration-oriented categories, such as medium to long duration, and gilt funds.



Hyderabad, April 11: Desperate to arrest a worrying slide, Sunrisers Hyderabad will be eager to effect a turnaround when they host a power-packed Punjab Kings in their next IPL engagement here Saturday.

Last season's finalists, SRH began their 2025 campaign on a thunderous note, racking up a mammoth 286 to dismantle Rajasthan Royals by 44 runs.

With an explosive batting line-up at their disposal, the 'Orange Army' seemed poised to become the first team to breach the 300-run mark but their ultra-aggressive approach has since backfired spectacularly. In their last three matches, their attack-at-all-costs strategy with the bat yielded underwhelming totals of 163, 120, and 152 resulting in crushing defeats, and leaving them languishing at the bottom of the points table. They have worst Net-Run-Rate of -1.629 as of today.

With the bat, Sunrisers Hyderabad need far more from their big names like Travis Head, Abhishek Sharma, Ishan Kishan, and Heinrich Klaasen. Head and Sharma, who played a crucial role in delivering explosive starts last season, have failed to find their rhythm this year. In fact, SRH's best opening stand so far is a paltry 15.

Head's performance has tailed off dramatically, returning scores of 67, 47, 22, 4, and 8. Abhishek, too, has struggled for consistency, with a top score of just 24 across five innings.

Kishan, after his unbeaten ton in the opener, has looked a shadow of himself, while SRH's middle-order mainstay Klaasen is yet to set the stage on fire.

Yet, the team appears committed to sticking with their ag-

gressive blueprint. Head coach Daniel Vettori stressed on the need for better game awareness rather than a shift in philosophy after their last defeat.

"I think we know the style is going to work, but we have to respect conditions, and we have

to assess really well and that's probably something we haven't done," Vettori said.

While SRH's misfiring batting line-up has dominated post-match discussions, their bowling unit hasn't exactly lit up the tournament either.

## LSG vs GT: In-form Pooran will have Siraj riddle to solve

**Lucknow:** The prolific Nicholas Pooran will have his task cut out against a menacing Mohammed Siraj in a battle of equals as table toppers Gujarat Titans take on hosts Lucknow Super Giants in an IPL match here Saturday. In sapping Lucknow heat, an enticing battle is likely to ensue since there is not much to choose between the two teams. Titans have won four matches in a row to sit pretty on top of the table (8 points) by virtue of better net run-rate compared to Delhi Capitals, which also has four victories in its kitty. LSG are currently fifth in a mid-table middle with six points but it is a side on upward curve at the moment.



In all big battles, the important sub-plots hold the key and in this match, it would be a duel between tournament's top scorer Pooran and Siraj, the best fast bowler on view. With 288 runs, Pooran is on top of the leader-board of run-getters, with only one failure in five innings so far. The 24 sixes that he has smashed alongside 54 fours is a testimony to his dominance in the shortest format. A strike-rate of 225 will intimidate any rival captain. Slotted at No 3 by head coach Justin Langer and skipper Rishabh Pant has worked perfectly for him. But in Siraj, Pooran will face a crafty operator, who has been brilliant in Powerplay overs with 10 wickets in five games so far. An economy rate of 7.70 is more than decent if one factors in the pace at which the game is moving. The best part about Siraj's bowling is his ability to bowl the conventional Test-match length first up with movement off the surface. Hitting Siraj through the line during the Powerplay overs isn't always the easiest of propositions and not just Pooran but the two openers Aiden Markram and Mitchell Marsh will also have to be careful while playing him. Kagiso Rabada's absence hasn't really hurt Titans as was the case in the last game with an improved Prasadh Krishna (8 wickets, ER 7.05) proving to be a revelation this season. Left-arm premier R Sai Kishore (10 wickets, ER 7.25) has in fact overshadowed team's spinner Rashid Khan (3 wickets, ER 10).

### Bopanna-Shelton lose

**Roquebrune-Cap-Martin:** Indian ace Rohan Bopanna and Ben Shelton's men's doubles campaign at the Monte Carlo Masters ended in the quarterfinals after losing to Monegasque Romain Arneodo and partner Manuel Guinard Friday. The Indo-American duo came back from a set down but lost in the super tiebreak with the scoreline 6-2, 4-6, 10-7. This was Bopanna's sixth quarterfinal appearance at the Monte-Carlo Masters, a title he famously lifted in 2017. Bopanna-Shelton rallied to a 2-6, 7-6(4), 10-7 second-round victory against third seeds Simone Bolelli and Andrea Vavassori that featured a topsy-turvy match tie-break to make it to the quarterfinals.

### Salah renews contract

**Liverpool:** Mohamed Salah's trophy-laden spell with Liverpool is set to extend to a decade after the prolific Egypt forward signed a new contract with the Premier League leader, ending months of uncertainty over his future. The 32-year-old Salah was one of three key senior players — with Trent Alexander-Arnold and Virgil van Dijk — who were due to be out of contract at the end of this season. He is the first to extend his stay, having already established himself as a club great with 243 goals in 394 appearances, placing him third in the list of Liverpool's all-time top scorers. "Of course I'm very excited," Salah said. "We have a great team now. Before also we had a great team. But I signed because I think we have a chance to win other trophies and enjoy my football."

# Shooters hit the mark as India finish second

**Buenos Aires, April 11:** The Indian team finished a creditable second in the year's first ISSF World Cup for rifle, pistol and shotgun shooters despite the young trap mixed team pair of Lakshay Sheoran and Neeru missing out on a medal by a point in the final event of the tournament here.

After the bronze picked up by the mixed team air pistol pair of Suruchi and Saurabh Chaudhary Thursday, India's overall tally swelled to eight medals, including four gold, two silver and two bronze, which put them in second position.

China finished on top of the standings with five gold, three silver and three bronze medals, thanks to a 1-2 in the mixed team air pistol event on the final day. The other gold of the day was picked up by Chinese Taipei in the mixed team trap.

The highlight of India's performance was the gold medals won by Sift Kaur Samra

(women's 50m rifle 3 positions), Rudranksh Patil (men's 10m air rifle), Suruchi (women's 10m air pistol) and Vijayveer Sidhu (men's 25m rapid-fire pistol).

Sidhu became the first Indian ever to win an ISSF World Cup gold in his event. Also noteworthy was the silver winning performance in the women's 25m pistol by young Paris Olympian Esha Singh, a reigning mixed team world champion.

Heartwarming performances were also delivered by

the likes of Chain Singh, an Asian Games medalist in men's 3P from over a decade ago, winning his first individual ISSF World Cup medal, as well as former Asian Games and Youth Olympic Games champion Saurabh Chaudhary, making a return to the ISSF World Cup medals fold after a gap of two years.

The squad now moves to Lima, Peru where competitions in the second leg of the combined ISSF World Cup stage begin from April 15.

## Compound mixed team assures third medal in Archery WC Stage 1

**Auburndale (USA), April 11:** India are assured of a third medal at the Archery World Cup Stage 1 after the compound mixed team of Jyothi Surekha Vennam and Rishabh Yadav entered the final by beating Slovenia here Friday.

The Indian duo's feat came close on the heels of the event's addition to the 2028 Los Angeles Olympics programme.

Jyothi and Rishabh, who were fifth seeds by virtue of their qualification scores, beat Spain (156-149) in the opening round, Denmark (156-154) in the quarterfinals, before getting the better of Slovenia (159-155) in the last-four round.

They will now take on Chinese Taipei in the final Saturday. This was after a jet-lagged Dhiraj Bommadevara, who landed in the US just hours before the competition due to visa issues, showed remarkable composure to guide the Indian men's recurve team into the final Thursday.

The fifth-seeded Indian team, also comprising seasoned campaigners Tarundeep Rai and Atanu Das, defeated Spain 6-2 to assure the country of a second medal at the season-opening World Cup. India will now face third-seeded China in the gold-medal clash Sunday.

India had already opened their account with a bronze medal from the compound men's team event Wednesday.

## Badminton Asia Championships: Shuttlers' poor show continues

### Dhruv-Tanisha exit in quarters as Indian challenge ends

**Ningbo (China), April 11:** Dhruv Kapila and Tanisha Crasto, India's last remaining players at the Badminton Asia Championships 2025, bowed out in the mixed doubles quarterfinals.

The Indian duo suffered a 22-20, 21-13 loss at the hands of Hong Kong's fifth-seeded Tang Chun Man and Tse Ying Suet Friday.

The duo registered a comeback 12-21, 21-16, 21-18 win over Chinese Taipei's Ye Hong Wei and Nicole Chan at the Ningbo Olympic Sports Centre Gymnasium Thursday. After dropping the opening game 12-21, the Indian duo fought back to take the second 21-16 and edged a tense decider 21-18. Meanwhile, India's campaign in the singles was ended Thursday when ace shuttler PV Sindhu, Priyanshu Rajawat and Kiran George lost their respective second-round matches.

Sindhu fought hard but ultimately lost to Akane Yamaguchi 11-21, 21-16, 16-21 after coming from behind in the second game to challenge the Japanese former world champion.

In men's singles, Kiran battled tough against world champion Kunlavut Vitidsarn but was defeated 21-19, 13-21, 16-21, while Priyanshu lost 14-21, 17-21



to Kodai Naraoka. In the men's doubles, Hariharan Amsakarunan and Ruban Kumar Rethinasabapathi, who moved into the second round after beating Sri Lanka's Madhuka Dulanjana and Lahiru Weerasinghe, lost to Paris Olympic bronze medallist Malaysian pair of Aaron Chia and Soh Wooi Yik 15-21, 14-21 Thursday.

On Day 1, Paris 2024 semifinalist Lakshya Sen, HS Prannoy and Malvika Bansod were knocked out in the first round. Sen was crushed out after a straight-game defeat against world No. 1 Lee Chia-hao of Chinese Taipei. Prannoy put up a fight but couldn't avoid a 21-16, 12-21, 21-11 defeat against China's Lu Guangzu, marking his fourth first-round exit in six tournaments this year.

Malvika, 22nd in the women's singles rankings, lost against world No. 15 Gao Fang Jie. She was beaten 21-14, 21-8 by the Asian Games silver medallist. In the women's doubles, India's challenge ended after Priya Konjengbam and Shruti Mishra were ousted by Chinese Taipei's Sung Shuo-yun and Yu Chien-Hui following a 21-11, 21-13 defeat.

## India submits bid for 2031 AFC Asian Cup

The host country, which will be picked in 2026, will get automatic berth in the tournament

**New Delhi, April 11:** India has submitted 'Expression of Interest (EOI)' to host the 2031 AFC Asian Cup, the continent's showcase football event, the All India Football Federation (AIFF) said Friday.

The AIFF was one of the seven national football bodies which submitted the EOI before the deadline of March 31.

"Yes, we have submitted the EOI to host the 2031 AFC Asian



Cup. Let us see how it goes," AIFF's deputy secretary general M Satyanarayan told PTI. India will face tough competition from established football powerhouses such as Australia, South Korea and United Arab Emirates to get the right to host the tournament. Indonesia and Kuwait have also submitted the

EOI while there is a joint bid of Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan and Uzbekistan.

The host country, which will be picked in 2026, will get automatic berth in the tournament. India finished runners-up in the 1964 edition and were eliminated in the group stage in 1984, 2011, 2019 and 2023. The tournament began

in 1956. Out of the seven bidding countries, Australia, UAE, South Korea and Kuwait have earlier hosted the tournament.

Chairing the Asian Football Confederation's Executive Committee meeting in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, on the eve of the 35th AFC Congress, president Shaikh Salman lauded "the highest ever number of EOIs received in modern history and attributed the exceptional reception to the growing prestige of Asia's crown jewel."

The AFC had sent out invitations November 27, 2024, for all member associations to express their interest in hosting Asia's most prestigious men's national team tournament. The deadline to submit the EOI was March 31, 2025.

# East Bengal claim maiden title over Odisha
