17 KILLED IN **HYDERABAD BUILDING FIRE**

Hyderabad, May 18: A blaze triggered by a suspected short circuit in a building near the iconic Charminar here Sunday left 17 people dead, with a majority of them being children.

The fire broke out at a building in Gulzar House here, police said.

"All 17 who were shifted to hospitals were brought dead," a senior police official said.

A narrow staircase was the only escape route for the inmates of the building, but they could not rush out.

The building housed jewellery shops on the ground floor and people were residing in a flat above, police said adding smoke spread and people suf-

Telangana State Disaster Response and Fire Services Director General Y Nagi Reddy, who inspected the spot, told reporters that the fire accident was reported between 6 am and 6.15 am.

There was a call to the fire department at 6.16 am and the fire engine was turned out at 6.17 am, he said. There were shops on the ground floor while the first and second floors were residential, he said.

"Prima-facie cause of the fire is short circuit in the mains in the shopping area," Reddy said. A total of 21 people were in

the building when the fire erupted, and of them 17 were shifted to hospitals by the fire department in an unconscious state.

There was only one escape route, the staircase, which was very narrow and the inmates could not run to safety, he said.

Telangana Fire Department in a statement said the fire broke out on the Ground floor G+2 building) and spread to the floors above.

In a post on X, Prime Minister Narendra Modi expressed anguish over the loss of lives due to the fire tragedy. He announced ₹2 lakh for the kin of those who died and ₹50,000 to the injured.

Professor held over post on Op Sindoor PRESS TRUST OF INDIA

Sonipat (Haryana), May 18: Ashoka University's head of political science department, Ali Khan Mahmudabad, was arrested Sunday after two FIRs were lodged on stringent charges, including endangering sovereignty and integrity, for his social media posts related to Operation Sindoor, police and his lawver said.

One of Mahmudabad's lawyers, Kapil Balyan, said that the associate professor was produced before a court this evening and was remanded in police custody for two days in a case registered on the complaint from the Haryana State Commission for Women late Saturday night.

The arrest comes days after the Commission sent a notice to him questioning his remarks, though Mahmudabad had maintained that they were 'misunderstood' and asserted that he had exercised his fundamental right to free dom of speech.

Deputy Commissioner of Po lice Narender Kadyan said two FIRs were lodged at the Rai police station here -- one based on a complaint from the chairper son of Haryana State Commission for Women, Renu Bhatia, and the other on the complaint of a village sarpanch.

"Ali Khan Mahmudabad has been arrested in Delhi," ACP. Rai, Ajeet Singh said.

Puri YouTuber under scanner CJI flags 'protocol breach' need to understand their signed

Bhubaneswar, May 18: The Odisha Police have started an investigation into the alleged links between Puri-based You-Tuber Priyanka Senapati and Jyoti Malhotra, who was arrest ed on the charge of passing on sensitive information to Pakistani intelligence operatives, an officer said Sunday. The police found that Malho-

tra, who runs a YouTube channel - Travel with JO - and hails from Hisar in Haryana, had visited Puri in September 2024 and came in contact with Priyanka in the coastal town, who is also a YouTuber, the officer said.

Jyoti, whose YouTube channel and Instagram account have 3.77 lakh subscribers and 1.33 lakh followers respectively, allegedly was in contact with a Pakistani staffer working at the Pakistan High Commission in Delhi. On May 13, India had expelled that Pakistani official for allegedly indulging in espionage.

The woman in Puri had also travelled to Kartarpur Sahib Gurdwara in Pakistan recently, Puri SP Vinit Agrawal said.

"We found that Jyoti Malhotra had visited Puri last year, **PAK SPY RING**

and we are verifying the fact. Anything more can be shared after the verification," Agrawal said. Asked whether the YouTuber from Puri had shared intelligence inputs with Malhotra. Agrawal said, "The Haryana Police are investigating the matter and we are providing them the required assistance.

The police are also 'examining the objective' of Malhotra's visit to Puri, and trying to find out 'where she stayed, whom she contacted and any possible suspicious activities', the Puri SP said.

"We are in touch with various Central agencies and the Harvana Police. We will share details with the media after field verification," he said while responding to queries from re-

Priyanka's father said the police had quizzed her daughter Saturday and sought some information. A team of police personnel visited the woman's residence in Puri for an investigation into the matter. "My daughter came in con-

tact with Jyoti Malhotra as both are YouTubers. As a friendship developed between them, Malhotra visited Puri. As it is a matter of the nation's security. a proper investigation should be carried out. We will cooperate with the police," he said. "My daughter visited Kartar-

pur in Pakistan with another friend, not Malhotra, three or four months ago for a pilgrimage. My daughter has no involvement in anti-national activities and was unaware of Malhotra's alleged espionage," he said.

In a social media post, Priyanka said, "Jyoti was just a friend of mine, and I came in contact with her through You-Tube. I was unaware of anything which she is accused of I would not have been in touch with her if I knew she was spying for enemy Pakistan."

She further stated that her connection with Malhotra was

City gets NIA police station

Mumbai, May 18: Stopping short of calling it a protocol violation, Chief Justice of India BR Gavai Sunday expressed his displeasure over the absence of senior Maharashtra government officials, including the Chief Secretary, from his first public event in the state after taking oath as the head of the

"It's a question of respect by the other organs of the institution to the judiciary," said CJI Gavai, addressing a felicitation programme organised here in his honour.

"If the Chief Justice of India is visiting Maharashtra for the first time, and the state's Chief Secretary, the Director General of Police, and the Mumbai Police Commissioner don't feel it appropriate to be present, then they need to reflect on that. There's nothing new about the protocol — it's a matter of respect from one constitutional institution to another," he said.

CJI Gavai said, "When the head of a constitutional institution visits the state for the first time, the kind of reception given to them must be considered carefully... These may seem like small matters, but people need to understand their significance." The three pillars of democracy

-- the judiciary, the legislature, and the executive -- are equal, and every organ of the Constitution must reciprocate and show respect to the other, he said.

The CJI's remarks come at a time when there is a perceived tension between the judiciary and the executive, aggravated by the use of strong words by constitutional functionaries like Vice President Jagdeen Dhankhar and some MPs amid allegations of judicial overreach in the Tamil Nadu Bills case.

In a candid observation, the CJI also sought to use the Mumbai event to remind the executive about the constitutional conventions and limits.

"If it had been one of us in such a situation, discussions about Article 142 might have taken place," he said, amid a light-hearted applause from the audience.

The power under Article 142 of the SC has become a matter of debate following the Tamil Nadu Bills case verdict, which is perceived to have brought the functioning of the President and Governors under judicial review by setting a time limit for granting assent to bills.

Faulty PSLV fails to deliver satellite in orbit

Sriharikota (Andhra Pradesh): ISRO Sunday failed to put its earth observation satellite in orbit after its trusted PSLV rocket developed a fault minutes after launch from the spaceport here.
In ISRO's 101st mission from the space port here, the Polar Satellite Launch Vehicle (PSLV-C61) had a text-book lift off at 5:59 am, only to experience an anomaly in the 12th minute of the flight. "Today we targeted the 101st launch from Sriharikota, the PSLV-C61 EOS-09 mission. The PSLV is a four-stage vehicle and up to the second stage, the performance was normal. The third stage motor started perfectly but during the functioning of the and the mission could not be accomplished," Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) Chairman V Narayanan said He said there was a fall in the chamber pressure of the motor case and the mission could not be accomplished. Top LeT terrorist killed in Sindh

New Delhi: Lashkar-e-Taiba terrorist Razaullah Nizamani alias Abu Saiullah, who was the brain behind the 2006 attack on the RSS headquarters, was killed by unidentified gunmen in Sindh province of Pakistan Sunday, officials here said. Nizamani, who had been provided security by the Pakistani government, had left his residence at Matli in Sindh this afternoon and he was gunned down by assailants near a crossing, the officials said. Besides masterminding the attack on the RSS headquarters at Nagpur, the Lashkar operative was involved in the Indian Institute of Science attack of 2005 in Bengaluru and the terror strike at a CRPF camp at Rampur in 2001.

The deceased has been identified as Rutikesh Matal of Maharashtra. The body of the deceased has been fished out, while a search operation is underway to trace his colleague, he said. The company officials identified the missing engineer as Rutik Bhonje from Maharashtra.

Three cyber crooks held for ₹10L fraud

Bhubaneswar, May 18: Cyber Police Sunday arrested three miscreants for allegedly duping a city resident of ₹10 lakh by luring him with high returns on his investments.

The arrested were identified as Sidharth Pujari, 25, Abinash Sahoo, 37, and Bibek Singh, 35, According to Deputy Commissioner of Police (DCP) Jagmohan Meena, "Sidharth and Abinash ran two companies namely GPNS business private limited and Asspay digital services private limited, respectively."

The police have seized ₹5.3 lakh, five mobile phones, seven cheque books, one laptop, and one iPad from the trio, the DCP added. While Sidharth was arrested from Jeypore town in Koraput, Abinash was nabbed from Khurda, he said.

The arrests followed a complaint lodged by victim Soumya Ranjan Pradhan, a resident of Mancheswar area here, January 1, 2025. He alleged that Sidharth lured him to invest in GPNS business private limited, with a monthly commission of 7 per cent. "Soumya transferred ₹10 lakh in three instalments – ₹2.5 lakh in July 29, 2024, ₹4.5 lakh in September 9, 2024, and ₹3 lakh in November 11, 2024 – to the company's bank account," said Meena.

The Cyber Police has booked the trio under Sections 318 (4), 318 (2), 319 (2), and a host of other sections under BNS, along with Section 66 (D) of Information Technology Act. They were produced before a local court Sunday for remand.



In an evolving job market, Odisha's vouth grapple with making informed choices that will shape their academic and professional lives

Bhubaneswar, May 18: As career options diversify and job markets evolve, students in Odisha are increasingly grappling with critical choices about their academic and professional futures. Influenced by parental expectations, peer trends, and emerging sectors like technology, healthcare, and national service, the question persists—who should

guide students in making informed decisions?

A growing concern is the herd mentality among students. "When I passed Class 10, everyone was talking about which stream to choose. Most just followed their friends—I did the same," shared Nidhi Agarwal, a recent graduate from Bhubaneswar. "Looking back. I feel career counselling could have broadened my outlook. Students need to know there are more options beyond science and commerce.

However, student aspirations are not monolithic. Chirag Mallick, a Class 12 student at DAV Public School, said, "I haven't decided yet, but I'm inclined towards a BSc in Physics or B.Tech in Computer Science. My interest in Physics started



early, and my parents have given me full freedom to choose.

Yet, parental influence remains strong, often guided by conventional ideas of stability. "We want what's best for our children. Engineering and medicine have always felt secure,' said Madhusmita Mohanty, a parent. "That said, we are now open to newer fields like cybersecurity or agri-tech, as long as there's job potential.

Teachers, too, play a key role in shaping student choices. "We interact with students daily and understand their potential," said Manoj Kumar Nayak, PGT Economics at DEV International School. "While professional counsellors are valuable, teachers are in a strong position to identify and nurture students' strengths."

Narsingh Majhi, PRO and member of the Career Counseling and Placement Cell at Rama Devi Women's University, added, "Career counselling must be institutionalisedjust like yoga is today. Students also need soft skills and exposure to emerging career paths. Teachers can bridge

that gap due to their academic rapport with students."

Odisha's growing economy, with Bhubaneswar emerging as a tech hub and traditional sectors like steel, agriculture. and tourism opening new career avenues, is influencing student choices. Prestigious institutions such as IIT Bhubaneswar and NIT Rourkela further strengthen the state's academic landscape

In conclusion, there is consensus among stakeholders: students must be empowered with both freedom and informed guidance. A hybrid model involving parents, teachers, and trained counsellors could help Odisha's youth align their passions with purposebuilding careers that are both meaningful and future-ready.

NHRC seeks ATR on condition of rural populace in Keonjhar



Keonjhar, May 18: The National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) has sought an Action Taken Report (ATR) from the Keonjhar District Collector on the deplorable quality of life of rural populace in the district who are deprived of basic education, healthcare, employment, and essential amenities.

Acting on a petition filed by human rights activist and Supreme Court lawver Radhakanta Tripathy, the NHRC passed the order, highlighting the precarious living conditions and deprivation faced by residents in 781 villages across the district.

Tripathy stated that although Keonjhar generates substantial revenue for the state, its people continue to live in abject poverty. The northern district holds vast reserves of iron ore. chromite, limestone, dolomite, nickel, and granite. According to District Mineral Foundation (DMF) reports, Keonjhar has an estimated 2,555 million tonnes of iron ore reserves, expected to last for another 60 years at the current extraction rate of 55 million tonnes annually.

Tripathy further criticised successive state governments for approaching mineral-rich districts like Keonjhar with a rent-seeking, colonial mindset—extracting wealth without addressing the welfare of the local population. He labelled this neglect as a result of visionless leadership that treats politics as a means of personal enrichment.

He urged the NHRC to initiate an urgent reassessment of the quality of life of tribal communities in Keonjhar and to explore the role of education in improving these conditions. He also recommended the implementation of Artificial Intelligence (AI)-driven accessibility audits to improve planning and execution processes. These audits, he said, could help identify infrastructure gaps in real time using sensor networks and computer vision systems.

'The commission is of the considered view that the allegations levelled in the complaint are serious violations of the human rights of the victims. Accordingly, the registry is directed to send a copy of the complaint to the District Magistrate-cum-Collector, Keonjhar, Odisha, to examine the matter and submit a report expeditiously within a period of 15 days, treating the matter as very urgent," the NHRC stated in its order.

As per DMF Keonjhar, a total of ₹11,684 crore has been collected cumulatively. In the 2023-24 financial year alone, ₹1,731 crore was collected, compared with ₹580 crore in 2014–15. As per constitutional provisions, these funds are intended for the welfare of local communities, particularly those affected by mining-related industrialisation.

We want our jobs protected: Steel plant workers after top court order

Jharsuguda, May 18: Fear of loss of jobs among workers of a $\,$ steel plant in Jharsuguda has been growing with each passing day, following the Supreme Court setting aside a resolution plan and ordering liquidation of the unit's original owner, Bhushan Power and Steel Limited (BSPL), earlier this month.

The workers, who have been demonstrating in front of the plant for the past several days, said they do not understand legal issues involved in the case, and only want their jobs to be

Not only the plant's employees, but also contractual workers, local vendors, and small traders are a worried lot as they held demonstrations at the main gate of the plant, originally owned by BPSL.

After the BSPL failed to repay a loan of over ₹47,000 crore, lenders dragged the company to insolvency proceedings and cessful bidder for BSPL.

The Supreme Court May 2. however, set aside a resolution plan submitted by JSW Steel for BSPL, holding it illegal and in violation of the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code (IBC). The

The apex court has ordered the liquidation of the **Bhusan Steel unit** under the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code

apex court also ordered the liquidation of BSPL under the IBC.

The functional and now a profit-making unit has also been the industrial showpiece in the mineral-rich region, and many people depend on it for their livelihood.

While about 3,000 people are directly employed in the BPSL plant, it provides indirect employment to around 20,000 others. They include suppliers, transporters, shopkeepers and

As an air of uncertainty prevails in the western Odisha town which used to be affected by migration of workers, state Industries Minister Sampad Candra Swain told PTI, "We are looking into the matter. I do not want to speak more on the issue now.'

Workers do not want the legal wrangle to jeopardise their livelihood. "We are worried about our 'roji roti' (livelihood). The company is making profits due to stability in its operations. Thousands of peonle will be forced to starve or start migrating again if there is liquidation," said one of the workers of the plant, who did not wish to be identified.

Asked about the court or der, another employee said "We are not legal experts and don't understand the law. We only want our livelihoods to be protected."

The local sarpanch of Thelkoloi, Avanti Nayak, said that the local people including employees of the BPSL were concerned over the development.

"This plant not only provides employment to local people but also supports thousands of an cillary jobs, small businesses and community initiatives,' she told PTI. Similar views were also expressed by Hemant Pandey, a supplier of manpower to industrial units in the Jharsuguda region.

"Sending a functional, employment-generating industrial asset into possible liquidation poses a threat to economic recovery of the region," Pandey said.

The stakeholders are hoping for a positive outcome through judicial and government intervention into the matter.

Baliapal, May 18: Bamboo artisans in Baliapal block of Balasore district are facing increasingly difficult times, as the demand for handmade bamboo items continues to decline. Once a thriving family profession passed down through generations, the traditional craft now faces extinction due to the rise of plastic and steel alternatives.

"From our forefathers' time, we have been sustaining ourselves through this craft," said one artisan. "But now, it's no longer possible to earn a decent living. We still hold on to hope that people will appreciate and purchase our handmade goods, but the income we made 20 years ago is no longer achievable."

Madhupura, Simulia, Balarampur, Barasha, Gopinathpur, Khaladiha, and Biripalia villages under Baliapal block in Balasore district, many people from the Harijan community and oth-



er socially and economically backward groups earn their livelihood by crafting and selling various bamboo-made household items. These artisans traditionally produced items such as kula (winnowing fans), pachhia (storage trays), bhogei (carrying baskets), jhampa (flat trays), and dala (round baskets), which once

enjoyed strong market demand. Customers even used to pay in advance to secure these products. However, that demand has now significantly declined.

Need of the Hour

he first direct parleys between Russia and Ukraine in three years should have been a watershed moment in the ongoing war between the two countries. But, it took less than two hours in Istanbul on 16 May to become crystal clear that the direct negotiations were nothing but a failure. However, such an outcome was expected even though the two sides managed to reach an agreement

As it turned out, for Russian President Vladimir Putin the negotiations were a dilatory or even an avoidance tactic. His objective is not difficult to understand as he came under renewed pressure after a proposal for a 30-day ceasefire had been put forward at a summit in Kyiv where key European leaders gathered with President Volodymyr Zelenskyy to support Ukraine. Zelenskyy too had openly been snubbed by US President Trump and hence did not risk provoking the latter further. He decided to come to Turkey, while throwing, at the same time, a challenge to Putin to attend the talks. What was more, Trump himself had not ruled out that he might come and join the two Presidents, squeezing out time from his diplomatic tour of the Arabian Peninsula, should such a summit materialize.

But in the end, Putin refused to travel to Turkey and sent a lower-ranking delegation. He seems to be putting across the message to the world that he has no interest in discussions aimed at ending the war that he himself had started. Perhaps, his major premise is that in the war he is in a position of strength and hence on the driver's seat

The whole development offers some lessons to global players, especially Trump. The key lesson is that it is not prudent for a country to unreservedly align with the aggressor's positions at the victim's expense. The second lesson for Trump is that by entrusting this complex issue to his envoy, a completely inexperienced diplomat and wealthy real estate developer like Steve Witkoff, has its own down side. This has put the White House in such an embarrassing position that Republican Senator Lindsey Graham of South Carolina advocated that 'devastating" new sanctions are needed to deprive Russia of the oil revenue that funds the war, if the Kremlin continues to reject the prospect of peace negotiations. But, more than that the US can force Russia to come to the negotiating table by resuming arms deliveries to Ukraine. The European Union has already geared its efforts in this direction. But, this is easier said than done since the US under Trump has portrayed Ukraine and the EU, instead of Russia, as the source of all the problems.

Significantly, a day before the summit Trump declared, "nothing will happen" on Ukraine as long as Putin does not meet him. He, however, carefully avoided unveiling his plan to end the fighting, should such a Russia-US summit occur. The key question surely remains whether Trump can be persuaded to be more helpful to Ukraine and its European allies rather than supportive of Putin. Trump's insistence that only a meeting with Putin can yield results is chilling, to say the least. Whatever is achieved on the diplomatic stage, the fact remains that Russian attacks are still on. An immediate ceasefire is the need of the hour.

Trump's recent Middle East trip has messages for India. He on 16 May announced that India has offered a trade deal that proposed almost "no tariffs" on US goods, as the South Asian nation seeks to avert higher import and export costs. Trump on 14 February had issued a blunt warning to BRICS nations, threatening a 100% tariff on all imports into the US if they proceed with launching a common currency. He had said this hours before a scheduled meeting with Prime Minister Narendra Modi, dismissing the economic bloc's relevance, declaring, "BRICS is dead.' BRICS is still kicking, but definitely Trump's aggression for a unipolar dollarized world has thawed it a bit as Russia listens to him for ceasefire with Ukraine and the US-China trade conflict settles for lower tariff.

His agreements with Saudi Arabia, UAE and Qatar add further teeth to the anti-BRICS mission. Trump had said, "I don't care, but BRICS was put there for a bad purpose and most of those people don't want it. They don't even want to talk about it now. They're afraid to talk about it because I told them if they want to play games with the dollar, then they're going to be hit with a 100% tariff."

New Delhi is looking to clinch a trade deal with the US within the 90-day pause announced by Trump on 9 April, on so called reciprocal tariffs for major trading partners. On 8 May, the White House secured a trade agreement with the UK, two days after India inked a similar pact with the latter.

Trump's tea with Syrian President Ahmad al-Sharaa, a former jihadist who until recently had a \$10 million US bounty on his head, has opened up opportunity worth billions of dollars for Gulf countries that have been keen to invest in Syria.

The baits are enough to keep off BRICS, the US believes. The Saudis are silent since they attended the last BRICS summit in October 2024. Qatar's emir, Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad Al-Thani, says that talks with Trump, a first visit by US President on this trip will "give new impetus to the existing strategic cooperation between the two countries.' They signed a host of deals including a \$96 billion agreement for Qatar to acquire up to 210 American-made Boeing planes. Trump also accepted a Boeing 747-8 jet from Qatar, to be used initially as Air Force One, a gift that is stated to influence the Trump administration.

Qatar is the Gulf state with the most formalized security ties with Washington. It hosts the biggest US military installation in the Middle East, which the State Department describes as "indispensable" for US military operations in the region. It even helped the US in its Afghanistan operations.

The UAE's main target from Trump's trip was deeper investments on AI and technology, and while it achieved victories in that regard the visit fell short of what Abu Dhabi really wanted: unrestricted access to advanced American microchips. Trump gave the UAE a partnership to build a massive data centre in Abu Dhabi to advance AI capabilities with 5-gigawatts of capacity - enough to power a major city. The complex would require 2.5 million chips, bigger than all major AI infra so far.

The Arab states got business opportunities in the US, Syria, and in their own countries. They, however, could not replace the ally Israel and may have to protect it even against their will, a major US gain.

The US is India's largest trading partner, with bilateral trade totalling some \$129bn in 2024. India ran a \$45.7bn surplus with the US last year, mainly in the form of pharmaceutical products, electrical machinery and jewellery. The Americans have got what they want with various kinds or arm-twisting methods in the region.

Finally, India may get its tariff relief as it extends more to the nutty US relations. India, however, is continuing with BRICS as Union Minister of Power and Housing & Urban Affairs Manohar Lal visits Brazil to attend the BRICS Energy Ministers' Meeting on 19 May.

ca's withdrawal from agreement will undermine the international consensus to reduce greenhouse-gas emissions. Yet just in the last month, there have been two major steps toward widespread carbon pricing where it is needed most. To be sure, carbon pricing is not always the best policy, and not all sectors need to be subjected to schemes that require international consistency. If India electrifies its vehicle fleet more slowly than Europe, European industry suffers no competitive disadvantage. But the situation is different in long-distance shipping and aviation, and in heavy industries such as steel and chemicals, which account for around 25% of global emissions. Here, carbon pricing is key to cost-efficient decarbonization, and must be imposed on an internationally consistent basis.

Fortunately, the technologies needed to achieve net-zero emissions by mid-century in each sector already exist. For example, methanol or ammonia can be used instead of fuel oil in ship engines, and hydrogen can replace coking coal in iron production. As matters stand, these technologies would impose a

significant "green cost premium" at the intermediate product level, but with only a small impact on consumer prices. Carbon pricing is essential to overcome the green cost premium, and it could drive cost-efficient decarbonization at a trivial cost to consumers. But in each of these sectors, inherently international products or the international trade in products (steel) make purely domestic approaches untenable. That is why the International Maritime Organization (IMO) agreed on 11 April to impose a carbon levy reaching \$380 per metric ton on ship operators whose emissions intensity exceeds a defined threshold.

The IMO agreement is not perfect. The organization aims to cut global shipping emissions by 20% by 2030, but the new pricing scheme would achieve only an 8% reduction. Still, concluding a new multilateral agreement despite a US boycott of the negotiations is a big step forward. China, India, and Brazil were among the 63 countries in favor.

Carbon pricing could also drive decarbonization in heavy industry, but if it is imposed in only some countries, production and emissions will simply move to others. Though the ideal solution would be common carbon prices worldwide for these energy-intensive sectors, there is no international rule-making body like the IMO. The second-best solution. then, is for individual countries to impose domestic carbon prices combined with border carbon tariffs. The European Union is pursuing this approach. Not only will its emissions-trading scheme likely price carbon around \$140 per metric ton by 2030; it is also removing the free allowances that heavy industry previously enjoyed and introducing a border carbon adjustment mechanism (CBAM) to subject imports to the same carbon pricing as domestic production. But the CBAM has been too weak, and heavy-industry decarbonization projects have been delayed. As a result, in March the European Commission committed to strengthening the regime in three respects: by ensuring a level playing field for exports as well as domestic sales; by widening the product coverage; and by improving the measurement of imports' carbon intensity. The crucial question now is

how developing countries will respond. In the past, several governments - in particular China and India - have criticized CBAMs as protectionist. But their arguments are unconvincing. Combining a domestic carbon price with a CBAM does not give domestic producers a competitive advantage. It simply maintains the competitive balance that existed before both were introduced. Moreover, it is the only way that developed countries can truly decarbonize their heavy industry, rather than hypocritically claiming to reduce emissions that have merely moved to other countries. These arguments are beginning to gain traction in developing countries. China's own emissions-trading scheme has been extended to heavy-industry sectors, and prices are slowly increasing - though they still hover around \$10-15 per metric ton. If carbon prices in China, India, and other developing countries gradually rose to European levels, and if CBAMs were imposed on those outside this low-carbon club. Chinese and Indian companies would also decarbonize.

These ideas should be debated at COP30 in Brazil this November, regardless of whether an official US delegation attends.

Thiruvananthapuram, May 18: In a pioneering initiative, Kerala has emerged as the first state in the country to make robotics education mandatory for all 4.3 lakh students of class 10, starting from the upcoming academic year June 2

The integration of robotics into the tenth-grade ICT textbook, specifically the sixth chapter titled "The World of Robots" in the first volume, will empower students to explore fundamental robotics concepts through engaging activities, an official statement said Sunday.

These include circuit construction, utilising sensors and actuators, and controlling electronic devices using computer

programming, K Anvar Sadath, CEO of KITE and Chairman of the ICT Textbook Committee, said in a statement.

KITE is the technical arm of the General Education Department of the Kerala government.

It has already distributed 29,000 robotic kits to high schools across the state to ensure the effective implementation of this curriculum.

'This ambitious initiative builds upon Kerala's prior success in making Artificial Intelligence (AI) learning accessible to all seventh-grade students, another national first achieved in the previous academic year," Sadath said.

The practical experience gained from the robotics curriculum piloted for Little KITEs statement further said.

The initial hands-on activ-

ity in the textbook challenges students to utilise components from the provided robotic kits - such as Arduino breadboards, IR sensors, servo motors, and iumper wires – to construct an automated sanitiser dispenser that activates upon detecting a hand, it said.

Progressing further, students will also delve into creating AI-powered smart home automation systems, including face-rec ognition-enabled smart doors.

To facilitate this, they will utilize the 'Face Detection Built-in Model' within the Pictoblocks software's program ming IDE, leveraging webcams on laptops and Arduino kits supplied by KITE to program door-opening mechanisms.

KITE's innovative robotics

learning approach is designed to equip students with the skills to address a wide range of practical problems through cutting-edge technologies.

KITE has already conducted the first phase of training on the new tenth-grade ICT textbook for 9,924 teachers.

Sadath said dedicated robotics training for teachers will be organised in July.

Furthermore, KITE will ensure the availability of additional robotic kits, extending support to unaided schools following the state syllabus that may require them.

The ICT textbook is being provided to all students in Malayalam, English, Tamil, and Kannada mediums, the official added in the statement

GMC celebrates legacy of 180 yrs

Mumbai, May 18: One of South Asia's oldest medical institutions, Grant Government Medical College (GMC) aka Sir JJ Hospital, turned 180 May 15 marking nearly two centuries of pioneering contributions to medical education and research

Conceived by Sir Robert Grant, then Governor of the Bombay Presidency, the icon ic institution was envisioned to train native Indians in modern medicine. Notably, ₹44,000 was raised through crowdfunding for its construction.

The proposal, made in March 1838 by Grant, was approved by the British Government, but unfortunately, the news of its sanction arrived in India nine davs after Grant's death at Dap odi, Pune.

A memorial meeting in Mumbai led by civic leader Jagannath Shankarsheth commemorated Grant's vision. It was here that he proposed naming the upcoming med ical college after Sir Grant Philanthropist Jamsetjee Je jeebhoy contributed ₹1 lakh to construct a hospital to accompany the college.

An additional ₹44,000 was raised through crowdfundingan early example of community-supported public healthcare, recalled Dr Rewat Kaninde, a devoted chronicler and alumnus of GMC

Known as the centre of excellence in medical education, research, and patient care in Central India, the Grant Government Medical College and Sir JJ Hospital is the alma ma ter for thousands of doctors.

Lack of funds for resources keeps more than 200 newly built primary health

centres locked in Maharashtra

Mumbai, May 18: More than 200 newly constructed primary health centres (PHCs) and sub-centres in Maharashtra are lying unused, as funds have not been allocated for essential supplies and staff, a senior official from the public health department said.

PHCs and sub-centres are crucial to the rural healthcare system and are the first respondents during medical emergencies and outbreaks of diseases in villages, providing affordable treatment. They run national health programmes, including immunisation drives and provide essential care to women and children.

The official said several PHCs and sub-centres built over the last four years have remained non-functional, as they haven't received funds

for furniture, power connec-

tion and staff. The department approved the construction of more than 400 primary health centres (PHCs) and sub-centres across the state between 2021 and 2025. and of these, 210 buildings have been constructed, but many remain non-functional," he said.

The official said in some instances, fully-constructed buildings have remained unutilised for nearly two years.

"Although the physical infrastructure is ready, the absence of basic operational support means that these centres are vet to start functioning," he said. According to the department's data, 98 PHCs were sanctioned in the last four

"Only 64 PHCs are operational, and 34 remain locked due to an acute shortage of staff and essential supplies," the official

Local health authorities say they have repeatedly requested the government for funds for furniture, medicines, electricity, and staffing.

The situation is no different for sub-centres in rural areas. **According to the** department's data, 98 PHCs were sanctioned in the last four years

"Of the 308 sub-centres approved for construction, only 129 have become operational, and the remaining 179 buildings are lying unused," the official noted, adding that the department is flooded with requests from across the state for human resources, electricity, and equipment. He, however, explained that

fund allocation becomes difficult as each facility is in different stages of completion.

"We cannot judiciously assign funds when every centre requires a different level of support, which is why many buildings are technically ready but lie unused," the of-State Public Health Minister

Prakash Abitkar had said the department has revised its procedural guidelines.

"Earlier, furniture procurement and staff appointments would only begin once construction was 75 per cent complete. Now, we have decided to start preparations when the work is 50 per cent complete," the minister had said.

A former senior official cited the department's vast infrastructure network as a challenge

"The public health department operates an extensive system of PHCs, sub-centres, civil and rural hospitals. With such a wide reach, it is not feasible to focus resources on any one facility. As a result, projects take longer to complete,' he explained.

ban along the east coast. The vessels -- a mechanised bottom trawler and a fibre boat -- were intercepted by Tamil Nadu authorities for operating illegally in the sea off Thoothukudi during the ban period.

Kerala-registered vessels operating 32 nautical miles off the Thoothukudi coast. Both boats were found carrying a total of 16 fishermen and had onboard a significant haul --1,732 kilograms of fish and 110 kilograms

Notably, the fibre boat was reportedly using illegal light fishing methods, which are strictly prohibited during the ban period. The authorities seized both vessels and escorted the crew to shore for legal action.

A senior fisheries official confirmed that the catch was subsequently auctioned for approximately ₹4 lakh.

A formal charge sheet has been filed against the owner of the two boats for violating Tamil Nadu's fishing regulations. "The fishing ban is in place to protect fish breeding during critical spawning periods. Any violation, especially by vessels from neighbouring states, is taken very seriously, the offi-

Samba/Jammu: An army personnel died of a bullet injury from his service rifle inside a post near the International Border in Jammu and Kashmir's Samba district Sunday, officials said. The 28-year-old soldier, a native of Telangana, was on sentry duty at Border Outpost Saroj when his service rifle went off, causing his death on the spot, they said.

Chandigarh, May 18: Pakistani intelligence operatives were developing Haryana You-Tuber Jyoti Malhotra, who was arrested on espionage charges, as an asset, a senior Haryana police officer claimed Sunday.

She was allegedly in touch with a Pakistani officer posted at the Pakistan High Commission in New Delhi during the four-day military conflict between India and Pakistan that followed the April 22 terror attack in Pahalgam, the officer said.

Hisar Superintendent of Police Shashank Kumar Sawan said Malhotra did not have any direct access to any information related to the military or defence operations which could be said at this stage that she could have shared.

But she was directly in touch with PIOs, he said addressing mediapersons in Hisar, Harvana. Hisar-based Malhotra (33), who runs a YouTube channel, 'Travel with JO', was arrested from New Aggarsain Extension Friday, they said.

She has been booked under relevant sections of the Official Secrets Act and the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita, police said.

She was sent to a five-day police remand after being produced before the court Saturday. SP Sawan told reporters that Malhotra is being questioned by Haryana Police. The officer said Malhotra was in



touch with PIOs, and that she has visited Pakistan "multiple times" and China once

Asked about any information on her movements during the Pahalgam terror attack and whether she was in contact with the Pakistani officer posted at the Pakistani High Commission during Operation Sindoor, the SP said during the (India-Pakistan) conflict, she was "in touch with the PIOs and the person who was declared persona non grata".

The officer said she has been to Pakistan on what appeared to be "a sponsored trip". In one of her videos, she was requesting a visa to visit China, he said. The SP said she went to Kashmir before the Pahalgam attack and visited Pakistan before that, and added that police are also trying to establish the "link" between these visits.

Sawan said she was allegedly also in touch with other YouTube influencers.

"They were also in touch with PIOs," he said.

"Through her, we are also investigating other Indian contacts. We have got some leads that some more could be involved.

Police are trying to look into who were being provided with 'information", he said.

Odisha Police have started an investigation into the alleged links between a Puri-based YouTuber and Jyoti Malhotra. The state's police said Sunday that Malhotra allegedly visited Puri in September 2024 and came in contact with a female YouTuber from the coastal town.

Asked about one of Malhotra's videos in which she could be seen visiting the Pakistani Embassy March 28, 2024, the SP said, "Socialisation is allowed but one should understand their intentions. Pakistan is not a not a normal country for us.'

Fake marksheets, degrees recovered from private varsity

Hapur (UP), May 18: A large number of fake marksheets and degrees were recovered from a private university in Hapur district in Uttar Pradesh during a raid by a team of the UP Special Task Force, police sources said Sunday.

The STF arrested 10 persons, including university chairman, Vijendra Singh Hooda, and other staff -- Mukesh Thakur, Anil Batra, Nitin Kumar Singh, Gaurav Sharma, Sunny Kashyap, Imran, Kuldeep, Vipul Talyan and Sandeep Sehrawat -following the raid late Saturday evening, they said.

During interrogation, they allegedly confessed to charging ₹50 thousand to ₹4 lakh per marksheet, police said.

Important documents, computers and other items were confiscated in Saturday's raid at Monad University in Pilkhuwa The STF team took computers and documents into custody and interrogated the owner and staff and investigated for about five hours.

An FIR was lodged under BNS sections 318(4) (cheating), 338 (forgery of valuable security), 340 (1) (forged documents), 111 (organised crime) and 336 (3) (forgery). The accused were produced in a court and sent to jail, they said.

In a statement issued in Luc know Saturday, ADG STF Amitabh Yash said. "In the course of investigation of an application, action was taken by the STF Lucknow Headquarters team at Monad University, Hapur today May 17.

"A large number of fake mark sheets, degrees etc. were recovered, in which about a dozen people were detained, which included the university chairperson and main accused Vijendra Singh Hooda", he said.

Lashkar-e-Taiba terrorist Razaullah Nizamani killed

New Delhi, May 18: Lash kar-e-Taiba terrorist Razaullah Nizamani Khalid alias Abu Saifullah Khalid, who was the brain behind the 2006 attack on the RSS headquarters, was killed by three unidentified gunmen in Sindh province of Pakistan Sunday, officials here said.

Khalid used to head the terror operations of Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) from Nepal in early 2000 and had many aliases including Vinode Kumar, Mohammed Salim and Razaullah. He was involved in multiple terror strikes in India. they said.

He left his residence at Matli this afternoon and was gunned down by assailants near a crossing at Badni in Sindh province, the officials said.

A close associate of Abu Anas of Lashkar, Khalid was the mastermind of the attack on the Rashtriva Swavamsevak Sangh (RSS) headquarters at Nagpur in which all three terrorists were shot dead.

Besides the RSS attack, the Lashkar operative was involved in the Indian Institute of Science terror attack of 2005 in Bengaluru, in which IIT professor Munish Chandra Puri was killed and four others injured.

The terrorists had escaped from the scene. Later, police investigated the case and chargesheeted Abu Anas, who is still at large. Khalid was also the master-

mind of the 2008 attack on a CRPF camp at Rampur in Uttar Pradesh in which seven personnel and a civilian were killed. The two terrorists escaped under the cover of darkness.

From mid-2000, Khalid was the in-charge of the Nepal

8 members of two families die in Maharashtra textile unit fire

Mumbai, May 18: Eight members of two families, including a toddler, died in a devastating fire that raged through a textile factory for almost 13 hours in Maharashtra's Solapur district Sunday, officials said.

Three Fire Brigade personnel were injured during firefighting, which stretched till 8 PM. involving 100 water tankers, fire tenders, and several personnel of different fire brigades.

Prima facie, a short in the circuit triggered the blaze around 3:45 am at Central Textile Mills situated in the Akkalkot Road in Solapur MIDC, around 400 km from Mumbai. Prime Minister Narendra Modi expressed grief over the fire tragedy and announced an ex-gratia of ₹2 lakh from PMNRF for the next of kin of each deceased. The injured

would be given ₹50,000, the PM stated on X. Modi stated that he was pained by the loss of lives due to a fire tragedy in Solapur, Maharashtra, "Condolences to those who have lost their loved ones. May the injured recover soon," the prime minister added. Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis also expressed condolences and announced an ex gratia of ₹5 lakh for the kin of the deceased.

The deceased individuals include the factory owner, Haii Usman Hasanbhai Mansuri (80) and three members of his family, namely his grandson Anas Hanif Masuri (25), his wife Shifa Anas Mansuri (20), and their one-and-a-half-yearold son Yusuf Mansuri.

The bodies of the Mansuri family were found inside the bedroom of a structure on the premises of the factory by Fire Brigade personnel who had to dismantle the wall to gain entry. Officials said Yusuf was found in the arms of his mother. The other four were either workers or their family members. They were identified as a worker, Mehtab Sayyad Bagwan (45), his wife, Ashabanu (38), their son, Salman (20) and

Over 42 unexploded shells destroyed in J&K

Jammu, May 18: Security forces Sunday destroyed 42 unexploded shells in different forward villages near the Line of Control in Poonch district of Jammu and Kashmir in a major operation to clear civilian areas following a military confrontation between India and

Indian Army, in close co-

ordination with local police authorities, successfully conducted a controlled operation for the safe destruction of 42 unexploded ordnances in the border areas of Jhullas, Salotri, Dharati and Salani, a defence spokesperson said.

He said these shells, remnants

of recent cross-border shelling, posed a serious threat to the lives and safety of local residents.

Indian Army engineers have launched a sweeping clearance operation across border districts, defusing over 80 unexploded shells in the past five days — including 6 in Pargwal, 19 in Rajouri, 42 in Poonch, and 12 along the IB.

The operation in Poonch was carried out with utmost precision, adhering to all standard safety protocols to prevent any risk to civilian life or property,

the spokesperson said. He said the bomb disposal teams from the Indian Army in coordination with police, ensured the complete neutralisa tion of all explosive remnants.

Cong in Kerala distances itself from Tharoor delegation row

Kochi/ Malappuram, May 18: The Congress in Kerala Sunday distanced itself from the controversy surrounding Shashi Tharoor's decision to accept the Centre's invitation to lead a multi-party delegation abroad, stating that it is for the party high command to comment on

Responding to a reporter's query. Leader of the Opposition V D Satheesan said Tharoor is a member of the Congress Working Committee (CWC), and leaders like him hold a lower position in the party hierarchy.

"A CWC member holds a significant position. The central leadership of the party should express its opinion on the matter. Whatever their view, we will share it," he said on the sidelines of a function in Paravur.

Senior Congress leader Thiruvanchoor Radhakrishnan, however, urged Tharoor to fulfil his "primary responsibility" as a Member of Parliament representing the Congress. Speaking to a TV channel,

Radhakrishnan said Tharoor has two roles-one as an international figure with his views and connections, and the other as a Congress MP.

"Naturally, he should proceed with the knowledge and approval of the party's national leadership. He can still work in the international arena, but



that should not undermine the party he currently represents,'

the former home minister said. Admitting that Tharoor is not a leader of small stature, Radhakrishnan nonetheless said he should prioritise his duties as a member of the parliamen-

tary party. Meanwhile, the Indian Union Muslim League (IUML), a prominent ally in the Congress-led UDF, took the position that the grand old party has already accepted his inclusion in the delegation and that it is their internal matter.

No expiry date on truce with Pak: Army



New Delhi, May 18: There is "no expiry date" to the understanding reached between Indian and Pakistani Director Generals of Military Operations (DGMOs) on cessation of hostilities nearly a week back, the Indian Army said Sunday.

The clarification came following reports that the arrangement between the two militaries on stopping the hostilities is ending this evening.

The Director Generals of Military Operations (DGMOs) of India and Pakistan May 12 decided to continue with the understanding of halting all military actions. The arrangement was originally reached for two days when the DGMOs held a conversation over the hotline May 10. "As far as continuation of break in hostilities, as decided in DGMOs interaction of May 12 are concerned, there is no expiry date to it," the Indian Army said in a brief clarification.

It also made it clear that there are no "DGMO talks" scheduled for Sunday as reported in a sector of the media.

The arrangement reached May 10 came after four days of intense hostilities that saw the two sides targeting each other's military installations with drones, missiles and long-range weapons that raised fears of a wider military conflict.

The DGMOs of India and Pakistan May 12 again deliberated on ways to avoid "inimical" military actions and agreed on considering immediate steps to reduce troops of the two militaries from the borders and forward areas. In the conversation, the two officers focused on continuing the commitment that both sides must not fire a "single shot" or initiate any "aggressive and inimical" action against each other.

India curbs Bangladeshi exports via land ports to ensure fairness: Sources

New Delhi: India's decision to curb Bangladeshi exports of ready-made garments and several other consumer goods through land ports is aimed at ensuring fairness and equality in bilateral trade, government sources said Sunday. India's trade relationship with Bangladesh will be based on "reciprocal terms" and the decision on restricting exports of ready-made garments from the neighbouring country is in response to Dhaka imposing similar trade barriers on Indian yarn and rice, they said. India Saturday decided to allow entry of ready-made garments from Bangladesh only through Kolkata and Nhava Sheva sea ports and barred imports of a range of consumer items through land transit posts in the Northeast.

Under Operation Sindoor, India carried out precision strikes on terror infrastructure early May 7 in response to the April 22 Pahalgam terror attack. Following the Indian action, Pakistan attempted to attack Indian military bases May 8, 9 and 10.

The Pakistani attempts were strongly responded to by the Indian side, inflicting heavy damage to a number of key Pakistani military installations. including air bases, air defence systems, command and control centres and radar sites.

On May 15, Pakistan Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar told the country's Senate that the DGMOs of Pakistan and India talked over the hotline May 14 to discuss the "ceasefire".

However, the Indian military chose not to comment on Dar's claim. Dar said the two DGMOs in their conversation May 10 had firmed up the "ceasefire"

Cong slams govt over 'mismatch' in **Covid death figures**

New Delhi, May 18: The Congress Sunday attacked the Centre over alleged mismatch between the official COVID-19 death toll and the figures reflected in the Civil Registration System data, saying it would be too much to expect this government to show regret for its "tone-deaf" actions but when history is written, it will be sure to record this "act of



Congress general secretary in-charge communications Jairam Ramesh said more than five years ago, the world was ravaged by the COVID-19 pandemic.

"It was clear - even in that moment -? that India underwent devastation on a scale that we hadn't seen for more than a century," he said on X.

From the migrant crisis to the manufactured shortage of vaccines, from the mass deaths and oxygen shortages to the Prime Minister's insistence on campaigning in West Bengal rather than prioritising human lives -? the cruellest and vilest impulses of the Modi government -were on display during the pandemic, Ramesh alleged.

'While we always knew that the Government had systematically underreported COVID-19 deaths, we now learn that there were an additional 20 lakh deaths reported across India in 2021 alone," he said.

Most of these can be attribute ed to the COVID-19 pandemic? and this estimate of 20 lakh is nearly six times higher than the official Covid death tally of 3.3 lakh, Ramesh said and shared graphs citing the Civil Registration System data.

The Prime Minister's home state of Gujarat has achieved the dubious distinction of undercounting deaths on a staggering scale - 33 times more deaths were reported than acknowledged by the Gujarat

SRO's 101st mission fails due to pressure issue

(Andhra Sriharikota Pradesh), May 18: ISRO Sunday failed to put its earth observation satellite in orbit after its trusted PSLV rocket developed a fault minutes after launch from the spaceport here.

In ISRO's 101st mission from the spaceport here, the Polar Satellite Launch Vehicle (PSLV-C61) had a text-book lift off at 5:59 am, only to experience an anomaly in a little after six minutes into the flight.

"Today we targeted the 101st launch from Sriharikota, the

The PSLV is a four-stage vehicle and up to the second stage. the performance was normal. The third stage motor started perfectly but during the functioning of the third stage we are seeing an observation and the mission could not be accomplished," Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) Chairman V Narayanan said.

He said there was a fall in the chamber pressure of the motor case and the mission could not be accomplished. This was the third failure of the PSLV, ISRO's trusted warhorse rocket that launched the Chandrayaan-1 and Mars Orbiter Mission. The PSLV has had 63 launches so far. The previous failures were in

1993, the inaugural flight of

the PSLV, and in 2017 when it

did not succeed in putting in

orbit a navigation satellite. In January, ISRO's navigation satellite NVS-02 encountered a failure after being put in orbit by a Geosynchronous Satellite Launch Vehicle (GSLV). The satellite, meant to be placed in a geostationary orbit, is oper-

ating from an elliptical orbit at present.

On Sunday, post lift-off, the PSLV C61 flight was tracked from the Mission Control Centre and other units of ISRO located in various parts of the country. According to the data shared by ISRO, the PS1 (first stage) separation was scheduled for 111.64 seconds after lift-off, but it was achieved at 110 seconds. Further, the second stage ignition of the rocket was targeted to be achieved at 111.84 seconds, but the process occurred at 110.2 seconds leaving a marginal difference.

New Delhi, May 18: Men accounted for 72 per cent of suicides committed in India in 2022. This data from the National Crime Records Bureau has experts raising concerns about the rising mental health issues in men, which they say

are largely overlooked. Men are often conditioned to suppress vulnerability, leading to silent suffering and in many cases devastating consequenc-

es, said Jyoti Kapoor, founder-director and senior psychiatrist at Manasthali.

"Understanding and supporting men's mental health has never been more critical. We must normalise mental health conversations, provide accessible therapy resources and foster environments that encourage emotional expression without judgment, ?both at home and workplace," Dr

Kapoor said. The incidents of atrocities against men -- ranging from false accusations and emotional abuse to domestic violence and legal harassment -- not only cause significant psychological trauma but also reflect a deeper, systemic neglect of male emotional well-being.

A study conducted in rural Haryana further revealed that 52.4 per cent of married men reported experiencing gender-based violence, often without access to legal recourse or psychological support.

Societal narratives continue to overlook the pain of men and the need of the hour is urgent reforms, including gender-inclusive mental health policies, safe spaces for emotional expression, and the dismantling of harmful stereotypes that dis-



courage vulnerability in men. Dr Shweta Sharma, General Secretary of the Indian Associ-

ation of Clinical Psychologists and Founder of Mansa Global Foundation for Mental Health, said, "Men who experience viopurpose and safety. In thera-

lence or are wrongfully accused often suffer in silence, fearing ridicule or disbelief. These experiences not only impact their mental health but also distort their sense of identity,

py, we frequently see how un acknowledged trauma in men can manifest as withdrawal aggression, substance use or suicidal ideation.

The issue is further compounded by a lack of legal safeguards, said Dr Preeti Singh, Senior Consultant Clinical Psychologist, Seamless Minds Clinic and Paras Health.

A 2013-?14 study found that 53.2 per cent of rape charges filed during that period were false, sparking concern among psychologists and legal experts alike about the psychological toll on the falsely accused, she said. 

Deir al-Balah, May 18: Israel launched "extensive" new ground operations in the Gaza Strip while airstrikes in a new offensive killed at least 103 people, including dozens of children, overnight and into Sunday, hospitals and medics said, and forced northern Gaza's main hospital to close. Airstrikes killed more than

48 people in and around the Palestinian territory's southern city of Khan Younis, some hitting houses and tents sheltering displaced people, according to Nasser Hospital, which said it struggled to count the dead because of the condition of the bodies. Eighteen children and 13 women were among them, spokesperson Weam Fares said.

In northern Gaza, a strike on a home in the built-up Jabaliya refugee camp killed nine members of a family, according to the Gaza Health Ministry's emergency services.

Another strike on a residence in Jabaliya killed 10, including seven children and a woman, according to the civil defence, which operates under the Hamas-run government.

In Gaza City, Um Mahmoud al-Aloul lay across the shrouded

body of her daughter, Nour al-Aloul. "You took my soul with you," she cried. "I used to turn off my phone from how much

Israel's military had no immediate comment, but its statement announcing the ground operations said that preliminary strikes over the past week killed dozens of militants and struck more than 670 targets. Israel blames civilian casualties on Hamas because the militant group operates from civilian areas.

Israel launched the offensive Saturday with the aims of seizing territory, displacing hundreds of thousands of Palestinians to Gaza's south and taking greater control of aid distribution.

An Israeli blockade on food, medicine and other supplies is now in its third month, with global food security experts warning of famine across the territory of more than 2 million people.

Talks in Qatar

Israel has said it is pressuring Hamas to agree to a temporary ceasefire on Israel's terms one that would free Israeli hostages held in Gaza, but wouldn't necessarily end the war. Hamas savs it wants a full withdrawal of Israeli forces and part of any new ceasefire deal. Israel had said it would wait until the end of US President Donald Trump's visit to the Middle East before launching its offensive, saying it was giving a chance for efforts at a new deal Trump didn't visit Israel on his trip, which ended Friday.

Israeli Prime Minister Benja min Netanyahu's office said that his negotiating team in Qatar's capital, Doha, was "working to realise every chance for a deal," including one that would bring an end to fighting in exchange for the release of all remaining 58 hostages, Hamas' exile from Gaza and the disarmament of the Palestinian territory.

Hamas has refused to leave Gaza or disarm.

Israel shattered a previous eight-week ceasefire in March, launching airstrikes that killed hundreds of people. Days before that, Israel halted all imports into Gaza, deepening the humanitarian crisis.

The war in Gaza began on October 7, 2023, when Hamasled militants attacked southern Israel, killing 1,200 people and abducting 251 others.

Israel's retaliatory offensive has killed more than 53,000 Palestinians, many of them women and children, according to Gaza's Health Ministry, which doesn't differentiate between civilians and combatants in its count.

Houthi rebels launch missile at Israel

The Israeli military said that it intercepted a missile launched early Sunday by Iranian-backed Houthi rebels in Yemen.

The rebels said that they fired two ballistic missiles including a hypersonic one towards Israel's main airport near Tel Aviv, whose grounds were struck by a Houthi missile

Russia launches war's largest drone attack

Kyiv, May 18: Russia launched Sunday its largest drone attack on Ukraine since the start of the war, destroying homes and killing at least one woman a day before US President Donald Trump is due to discuss a proposed ceasefire with Russia's Vladimir Putin.

Ukraine's intelligence service said it also believed Moscow intended to fire an intercontinental ballistic missile later on Sunday as an attempt to intimidate the West. There was no immediate response from Moscow to the accusation.

President Volodymyr Zelenskiv, straining to restore ties with Washington after a disastrous February White House visit, met Vice President JD Vance and Secretary of State Marco Rubio in Rome on Sunday on the sidelines of Pope Leo's inauguration. Ukrainian media said

Romanians vote in presidential runoff

Bucharest: Romanians voted Sunday in a tense presidential runoff between a hard-right nationalist and a pro-Western centrist in a high-stakes election rerun that could determine the geopolitical direction of the European Union and NA-TO member country. The race pits front-runner George Simion, the 38-year-old leader of the hard-right Alliance for the Unity of Romanians, or AUR. against incumbent Bucharest Mayor Nicusor Dan. Dubai, May 18: Nothing captured Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's isolation more starkly this week than the image of US President Donald Trump shaking hands with Syria's Islamist leader Ahmed al Sharaa - a man Israel has branded "an al Qaeda terrorist in a suit."

"He's got the potential. He's a real leader," Trump told reporters after talks with Sharaa Wednesday in Riyadh - a meeting brokered by his Saudi hosts, with whom the US president agreed a slew of arms, business and technology deals.

Trump's whirlwind four-day tour of Saudi Arabia, Qatar and the United Arab Emirates this week was more than just a diplomatic spectacle marked by lucrative investments

It sealed the emergence of a new Sunni-led Middle East order - one that eclipses Iran's shattered 'axis of resistance', and leaves Israel sidelined, according to three regional and two Western sources.

Amid growing irritation in Washington with Israel's failure to reach a ceasefire in Gaza, Trump's tour was a snub to Netanyahu, a close US ally who was the first foreign leader to visit Washington after the president returned to office in January, the sources said.

The message was clear: in Trump's less ideological, more results-driven vision of Middle East diplomacy, Netanyahu could no longer count on unconditional US support for his rightwing agenda, the sources said.

"This administration is very frustrated with Netanvahu and that frustration is showing,



said David Schenker, a former US Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs under Republican former President George W. Bush.

'They're very, very transactional, and Netanyahu isn't giving them anything right now.' The sources said that the US

was not about to turn its back on Israel, which remains a vital US ally whose support in Washington runs deep and is bipartisan.

But the Trump administration wanted to deliver the message to Netanyahu that America has its own interests in the Middle East and it does

not like him standing in its way, the sources added. US patience has been strained not just by the Israeli prime minister's refusal to countenance a Gaza ceasefire but also his objection to US talks with Iran over its nuclear programme, according to sources familiar with the matter.

Netanyahu's office did not respond to requests for comment. It has made no public statements on Trump's regional visit.

A spokesperson for the White House's National Security Council emphasized Trump was a friend to Israel.

'We continue to work closely with our ally Israel to ensure remaining hostages in Gaza are freed, Iran never obtains a nuclear weapon, and to strengthen regional security in the Middle East," NSC spokesman James Hewitt said.

While publicly insisting

US-Israeli relations remain strong, Trump administration officials have privately expressed irritation with Netanya hu's refusal to fall into line with Washington's positions on Gaza and Iran, according to sources familiar with the matter.

Six regional and Western sources said friction between the US and Israel was building before Trump's regional trip.

The tension began when Netanyahu flew to Washington on a second visit in April seeking Trump's backing for military strikes on Iran's nuclear sites only to discover, to his shock that Trump was opting for di plomacy.

An unbending advocate for a hardline stance against Tehran, Netanyahu was caught off guard, learning just hours before his meeting that negotiations were about to start.

Cement makers report volume growth in Q4

New Delhi: Large cement companies have reported a volume growth in March 2025 quarter and expect enhanced performance in FY26 on better sales realisation and stable demand. Leading listed cement firms like UltraTech, Ambuja Cements, ACC, Shree Cements, and Dalmia Bharat have retained around 7 to 7.5 per cent growth for the cement industry in FY26, following government spending on infrastructure projects and rural recovery. New Delhi, May 18: India continues to be the world's largest market for electric three-wheelers for a second year in a row as sales rose nearly 20 per cent to reach about 7 lakh vehicles in 2024, the International Energy Agency (IEA) said in a report.

In its Global EV Outlook 2025, the Paris-based energy watchdog said India continues to drive most growth in the global electric three-wheeler market.

Despite the three-wheeler (3W) market shrinking 5 per cent from the previous year, electric 3W sales grew more than 10 per cent to surpass 1 million vehicles in 2024. Electric 3W sales represented almost one-quarter of all 3W sales, up from one-fifth in 2023, it said.

The market is highly concentrated, with China and India together accounting for more than 90 per cent of electric and conventional 3W sales.

"Electrification of 3Ws in China has stagnated at less than 15 per cent over the past three

years. In 2023, India overtook China to become the world's largest market for electric 3Ws. and it maintained this position in 2024, with sales growing close to 20 per cent year-onyear to reach nearly 7,00,000 vehicles," it said.

This translated into a record 57 per cent electric sales share in 2024, 3 per cent up on the previous vear.

This growing trend, it said, looks set to continue thanks to policy support under the new PM E-DRIVE scheme, which allocated budget in 2024 to support the roll-out of more than 3,00,000 electric 3Ws for commercial use - for which the total fleet (electric and ICE) was estimated at more than 10 million vehicles in 2023

IEA said China, India and Southeast Asia remain the world's largest 2/3W markets. accounting for around 80 per cent of 2024 global sales, with 2/3Ws serving as the primary mode of private passenger transport in these regions.

"India's increasingly dynam ic electric 2W market hosted a total of 220 OEMs in 2024, up from 180 in 2023, although the

four market leaders accounted for a combined 80 per cent of the 1.3 million electric 2Ws sold in the country in 2024 (6 per cent of the overall 2W mar-

While the upfront purchase price of electric 2Ws remains higher on average than that of conventional 2Ws, increasing competition is prompting OEMs to offer more affordable electric models.

"Policy support is also helping to bridge the affordability gap between electric and ICE 2W models, with the new PM Electric Drive Revolution in Innovative Vehicle Enhancement (PM E-DRIVE) policy continuing financial support formerly provided under both Faster Adoption and Manufacturing of Electric Vehicles (FAME)-II and Electric Mobility Promotion Scheme measures." IEA said.

This provides purchase incentives for electric 2Ws (offering purchase subsidies of up to ₹5,000/kWh for 2Ws fitted with lithium-ion batteries), as well as for 3Ws and other emerging EV categories (specifically excluding private cars), with a total budget of USD 1.3 billion.

New Delhi, May 18: India's coal import declined 1.7 per cent to 263.56 million tonnes in the 2024-25 financial year The country's coal import was 268.24 million tonnes (MT) During 2024-25, non-coking

coal import was 167.10 MT lower than 175.96 MT imported in the previous year. Coking coal imports was at 54.08 MT in 2024-25 as against 57.22 MT in 2023-24. According to data compiled

by mjunction services ltd, coa import in March also declined to 22.79 MT over 23.96 MT in the year-ago period. Of the total imports in

March, non-coking coal imports stood at 14.84 MT, against 15.33 MT imported in the same month last year. Coking coal import volume was 4.41 MT, against 5.34 MT imported in March 2024. mjunction MD & CEC

Vinaya Varma said, There was a drop in import volume in March (and in 2024-25) which was in line with market expectation. As the domestic market remains replete with high stockpile (of non-coking coal), we expect the appetite for imports to remain subdued till demand picks up in peak summer.

The cumulative coal production in 2024-25 crossed the one billion tonne-mark, reaching 1,047.57 MT (provisional), compared to 997.83 MT in 2023-24, recording a growth of 4.99 per cent.

The coal ministry said it remains committed to fostering self-reliance, reducing import dependency, and driving sustainable mining practices to bolster the na tion's energy security and economic resilience.

AEPC, GBCI aim to promote climate clothing

New Delhi, May 18: Apparel Export Promotion Council (AEPC) Sunday said it has inked a pact with Green Business Certification Institute (GBCI) with an aim to promote sustainable manufacturing in the garment sector.

It will help increase the number of LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certified garment factories in India. LEED certification is a globally-recognised rating system for evaluating a building's environment performance and sustainability and indicates building's adherence to green building principles promoting energy efficiency, resource conservation and healthier indoor environments.

The MoU was signed by AEPC Secretary General Mithileshwar Thakur and Gopalakrishnan P, MD, GBCI Asia Pacific and Middle East. Sudhir Sekhri, Chairman AEPC, said the Indian garment industry is committed to promote sustainable practices. The LEED certification indicates reduced resource consumption, lower carbon footprint and improved air quality within the factory.

kets regulator Security Exchange Board of India (SEBI) has made the electronic book mechanism mandatory for all private placement debt issues of ₹20 crore or above and expanded the platform's scope to include Real Estate Investment Trusts (REITs) and Infrastructure Investment Trusts (InvITs).

The move, based on recommendations from a working group and public feedback, is aimed at enhancing the efficiency of the Electronic Book Provider (EBP) platform.

Under the new framework. the use of the EBP platform is now mandatory for private placements of debt securities, non-convertible redeemable preference shares (NCRPS). and municipal bonds, where the issue size is ₹20 crore or more, including single, shelf, and subsequent issues within a financial year, according to a circular.

Earlier, the mechanism was mandatory for all private placements of debt securities with an issue size of ₹50 crore or more.

An issuer, if desirous, may



choose to access EBP platform for private placement of securitised debt instruments or security receipts or commercial papers (CPs), certificates of deposit (CDs) and issuers constituted as REITs, SM RE-ITs and InvITs can also access the EBP platform for private placement of units of REITs, SM REITs and InvITs, Sebi said Friday

The regulator said that issuers are required to submit the placement memorandum and term sheet containing key terms and conditions; at least two working days before the issue opens, or three working days in the case of first-time users of the EBP.

The documents must disclose the base issue size and any green shoe option, which is capped at five times the base size. Besides, past green shoe allocations are required to be disclosed.

Depending on the credit rat-

ing of the instrument, issuers can reserve a portion up to 30 per cent for AAA to AA-, 40 per cent for A+A-, and 50 per cent for others and anchor investors, who will have to confirm their participation electronically one day before the issue.

unconfirmed Further. amounts will be reallocated to the base issue.

To ensure transparency, SEBI said that if multiple bids are received at the same cutoff price, allotments must be made on a proportionate basis.

The EBP is required to publicly update detailed bidding and issue-related information on its website by the end of the bidding day or by 1 PM the next day, depending on when the issue closes. Additionally, revised timelines have been introduced to obtain in-principle approval from stock exchanges before T-2 or T-3 for EBP-based issues and before the issue opens for non-EBP issues.

These changes will come into effect immediately, except for certain clauses, including those related to anchor investors, disclosures, and reporting, that will be implemented three to six months from the circular's date.

Smartphones shine as top export good

New Delhi, May 18: India's smartphone exports surged nearly fivefold to US and about fourfold to Japan in the past three years, propelling the segment to surpass petroleum products and diamonds as the country's top exported goods. according to government data.

The smartphone exports rose by 55 per cent to \$24.14 billion in 2024-25 from \$15.57 billion in 2023-24 and \$10.96 billion in 2022-23. In the last fiscal, the top five

Trophy drought ends for Crystal Palace

Wembley, May 18: Crystal Palace etched their name into English football folklore Saturday as they stunned Manchester City 1-0 in the FA Cup final to lift their first-ever major trophy in 164 years, at the Wembley Stadium.

Eberechi Eze was the hero at Wembley, scoring the decisive goal in the 16th minute to deliver a moment of glory that will be remembered for generations in south London.

Eze's early strike seals historic FA Cup triumph for Crystal **Palace at Wembley**

Eze latched onto a clever pass and weaved through the City defence before calmly slotting past Stefan Ortega to send the Palace end into delirium. His goal was not just a spark of brilliance, but the foundation of a monumental upset against a City side that had dominated domestic football for nearly a decade. Manchester City responded with urgency and nearly found

a way back into the game when Erling Haaland broke through on goal, only for Palace keeper Dean Henderson to controversially handle the ball outside the penalty area.

Referee Stuart Attwell initially let play continue, and though VAR intervened, it was eventually ruled that Henderson had not denied a clear goalscoring opportunity, sparing him a red card. Just minutes later. Henderson further justified that decision by saving a penalty from Omar Marmoush after a Palace handball inside the box.

The second half saw City push relentlessly for an equaliser, but Pep Guardiola's decision to go without a holding midfielder left his side exposed in transition. Palace thought they had doubled their lead through Daniel Munoz in the 58th minute, but the goal was disallowed for offside after a VAR review.

City threw everything forward in the closing stages, including teenage sensation Claudio Echeverri, but Henderson stood tall again, producing two outstanding late saves to preserve the Eagles' slender lead.

The final whistle sparked scenes of unbridled joy among Palace players and fans alike. For a club that helped found the FA Cup in 1871 and played in its first semi-final, this was a full-circle moment - their first major trophy, their first FA Cup, and a ticket to the 2025-26 UEFA Europa League.

For Pep Guardiola, it marked the end of a glittering eightyear streak of winning at least one major trophy per season with Manchester City, as Palace completed one of the biggest upsets in modern FA Cup

India had come flying out of the blocks. Within two minutes, they were ahead. Awarded a free-kick from over 30 yards out, Shami spotted the Bangladesh keeper slightly out of position and went for goal.
