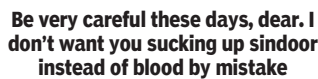

The minister stated that the issue has been examined twice with the Chief Administrator of the Shree Jagannath Temple Administration (SJTA), the district Collector, and the Endowment Commissioner. Culture enthusiasts and devotees of Lord Jagannath have voiced their concerns regarding the demolition of several ancient mutts under the guise of the Srimandir Parikrama project in Puri undertaken by the previous government.

Apple, led by CEO Tim Cook, in response to Trump's tariffs on China was looking to shift iPhone manufacturing to India as it adjusts supply chains. That plan has become a festering source of frustration for the US president, who also brought it up last week during his Middle East trip.

Reiterating that he doesn't want iPhones to be made in India, US president Donald Trump has threatened that Apple would have to pay a 25 per cent tariff if phones sold in America were not made within its borders. Apple is positioning India as an alternative manufacturing base amid Trump's tariffs on China that have raised supply-chain concerns and fears of higher iPhone prices. The iPhone maker said most of its smartphones sold in the US would originate from India in the June quarter. However, during his recent trip to the Middle East, Trump had categorically said that he doesn't want Apple to manufacture in India and had chided the company's CEO Tim Cook for moving iPhone production from China to India rather than the US.

Bengaluru: The Karnataka government has appointed actress Tamannaah Bhatia as the brand ambassador of Karnataka Soaps and Detergents Limited (KSDL), which manufactures Mysore Sandal Soap.

The state government's order issued Wednesday said Bhatia has been appointed as the brand ambassador for two years and two days at a cost of Rs 6.2 crore.

The decision drew flak from certain sections of society who questioned her appointment. "When local Kannada young actresses like @AshikaRanganath could be taken as brand ambassador why appoint and promote Hindi ones?" a woman questioned the decision on X.

Reacting to it, state Commerce and Industries Minister MB Patil explained that the decision was taken after much deliberation "to penetrate markets beyond Karnataka aggressively".

The KSDL has the deepest respect and regards to the Kannada film industry, Patil said, adding that some Kannada movies are giving competition to even Bollywood films. "Mysore Sandal has a very good brand recall within Karnataka, which shall be strengthened. However the intent of Mysore Sandal is to also penetrate markets beyond Karnataka aggressively," the minister clarified.

"The pride of Karnataka is also a Jewel of the Nation. Hence it's an independent strategic decision of the PSU board after consulting various marketing experts," Patil noted.

Congress vows to take fight for SEBC quota to villages

Bhubaneswar, May 23: Opposition Congress Friday ended its 24-hour dharna near Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi's residence demanding 27 per cent reservation in education and jobs for Socially and Economically Backward Classes (SEBCs) in the state.

However, the party vowed to take the fight for enhanced quota for SEBCs, or OBCs as categorised in Odisha, to the villages.

The party staged a peaceful protest at Mahatma Gandhi Marg here opposing the state government's announcement of 11.25 per cent of quota for SEBC students in higher education. The 24-hour dharna began at 11am Thursday and ended at 11am Friday.

The party also strongly condemned the government for not extending the SEBC quota to medical, engineering and technical courses in the state.

"I would like to thank all the Congress workers who staged an overnight dharna amid

heavy downpour. We have decided to fight till the end for the protection of the interests of the people belonging to SEBC category, who comprise 54 per cent of the state's population. The Congress will take the agitation to each village in the state," Odisha Pradesh Congress Committee (OPCC) president Bhakta Charan Das said, while wrapping up the dharna.

Das said that apart from SEBCs, the party is also committed to fight for the interests of people belonging to the Scheduled Tribe and Scheduled Caste categories.

"Altogether, STs, SCs and SEBCs comprise 94 per cent of Odisha's population," he said, alleging that tribals and Dalits are being denied their rights under the BJP government.

He said the party has already submitted a five-point charter of demands to the Governor and had plans to submit a memorandum to the Chief Minister Friday.

"However, the CM was not available... the party hopes that

the Governor would forward the Congress memorandum to Majhi," the OPCC president said.

Other Congress leaders, including Prasad Harichandan, Jaydev Jena, Srikant Jena, also came down heavily on the BJP government and dubbed it as "anti-SEBC".

"While all the states have made provisions for 27 per cent reservation for OBCs (SEBC in Odisha) in jobs and education, Odisha's BJP government is giving only 11.25 per cent quota, which is a clear discrimination against the community," Harichandan said. Meanwhile, the ruling BJP alleged that both the BJD and Congress were 'shedding crocodile tears' for SEBCs.

"What did the BJD do for the SEBCs during its 24-year rule? Within 11 months in the government, the BJP has made a provision for 11.25 per cent quota for SEBC students in higher education," BJP state president Manmohan Samal said, adding that the government will soon extend the SEBC quota to medical and engineering courses as well.

Science and Technology department principal secretary and chairperson of Pathani Samanta Planetarium Chithra Arumugam also attended the event and extended her best wishes to the students.

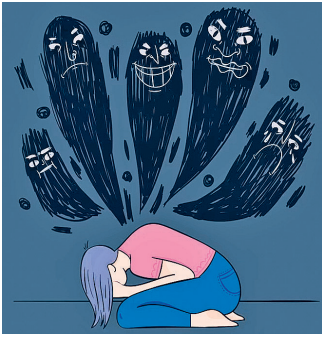
WORLD SCHIZOPHRENIA DAY

Experts call for compassion, early intervention

Bhubaneswar, May 23: Schizophrenia, termed as a chronic mental disorder, affecting how a person thinks, feels, and behaves, continues to be misunderstood and stigmatised across the society, despite of increasing awareness and treatment options. Experts on mental health urge the public to treat schizophrenia like any other medical condition—one that is diagnosable, treatable, and manageable with the right support.

Consultant psychiatrist at Manipal Hospitals SA Idrees explained, "Schizophrenia doesn't appear overnight. It often develops gradually due to genetic predispositions or environmental stressors. Patients may experience hallucinations, delusions, disorganised speech, or even believe they are someone else—like a saviour or a victim of conspiracies. These are not mere eccentricities.



They are signs of a serious mental health condition."

The World Health Organisation (WHO) estimates that schizophrenia affects approximately 24 million people worldwide, about one person in 300. In India, the prevalence is about 0.3 per cent to 0.5 per cent of the population, which translates to over 4 million people, according to the National Mental Health Survey report.

Despite its prevalence, schizophrenia remains a taboo

topic. "The stigma is the real illness," added Idrees. "People are quick to use derogatory terms like 'mad' or 'psycho,' which isolates patients and delays their recovery. We must normalise mental health treatment, the same way we do for diabetes or hypertension," he said.

Schizophrenia typically begins between the age group of 20 and 30, and its early symptoms are often mistaken for personality quirks or result of stress. Senior consultant in Neuromedicine at Manipal Hospital Dr Pradyut Ranjan Bhuyana highlighted the biological roots of the disorder and said, "Schizophrenia can stem from genetic factors, chemical imbalances, or structural abnormalities in the brain. These can distort a patient's perception of reality and trigger severe agitation or fear."

With the right care—including antipsychotic medication, cognitive behavioural therapy,

and family support—many patients live stable, fulfilling lives. "Continuous psychiatric care is crucial," quoted Bhuyana.

Experts agree that India has made significant strides in making mental healthcare accessible. Cultural awareness through several films like 'Dear Zindagi', 'Kartik Calling Kartik', and 'Chhichhore' has helped destigmatise therapy and portray mental illness with sensitivity. "Cinema, when used responsibly, can spark conversations and change attitudes," added Bhuyana.

"Let us stop labeling and start listening. Mental health issues affect children, women, professionals—everyone. Acknowledging pain, sharing stories, and encouraging treatment can make a world of difference," addressed Idrees, calling for united effort.

Experts also urge policymakers, educators, media houses, and citizens to join hands in breaking the silence.

Pradhan welcomes Kotia panel decision

"Despite numerous appeals, the previous government failed to address the matter," Pradhan stated.

With the new initiative undertaken by the state government, Pradhan expressed hope that "the local population will now benefit from multiple welfare schemes under the 'Double Engine Government'".

Pollution in Brahmani raises health concerns

Among the 11 rivers tested across the state, the Brahmani displayed some of the poorest water quality indicators

Rourkela, May 23: The Brahmani River, often referred to as the lifeline of Rourkela, is facing alarming levels of pollution posing serious health risks unless immediate corrective action is taken, environmental experts warn.

According to the latest annual report from the Odisha State Pollution Control Board (SPCB), the river's water quality has deteriorated sharply due to the discharge of untreated sewage and industrial waste. The report highlights the infiltration of chemically contaminated water into the groundwater as a major source of river pollution.

Among the 11 rivers tested across the state, the Brahmani displayed some of the poorest water quality indicators. The river's biochemical oxygen demand, or BOD, ranged from 1.8 mg per litre to as high as 39 mg per litre — far above the safe limit of 5 mg per litre. High BOD levels signal severe organic pollution and elevate the risk of waterborne diseases, the board noted.

Despite efforts by the Rourkela Municipal Corporation



(RMC), the SPCB and the Sewerage Board, implementation gaps persist. Several major drainage and sanitation projects remain stalled due to land encroachment issues, halting the completion of critical infrastructure intended to protect the river.

For fiscal year 2023-24, crores of rupees were allocated to upgrade the city's drainage system. However, much of the work remains incomplete. Many major hotels, private medical facilities and industrial units are still not connected to the main sewer network, resulting in the direct discharge of toxic waste into the Brahmani.

To curb pollution from chemicals arising out of idol immersion, a dedicated immersion ghat was built in 2023-24 at Balughat at a cost of ₹1.69 crore. Yet the ramp meant for removing residual waste remains un-

finished. The temporary mud ramp has eroded, and the ghat's drainage channels are clogged with stagnant water, creating foul odours and exacerbating pollution.

Additionally, the gallery area at the Balughat site is unplastered, and concrete layers are already peeling, further exposing lapses in project execution.

Asked about the worsening pollution in the Brahmani, Rourkela Municipal Commissioner Ashutosh Kulkarni said, "We will hold consultations with relevant departments regarding the increased pollution levels. Plans are also underway to set up a sewage treatment plant in Koel Nagar, which will significantly reduce contamination in the Koel River, a tributary of Brahmani. In addition, steps will be taken to integrate every pollution-generating establishment into the city's sewerage system, ensuring more robust drainage management."

Local environmentalists and intellectuals have stressed the urgent need for coordinated action. Cleaning the Brahmani River — the city's only major water source — is vital not only for environmental preservation but also for protecting public health.

NIT Rourkela develops biosensor for affordable diagnosis of breast cancer

New Delhi/Rourkela, May 23: Researchers at National Institute of Technology (NIT), Rourkela have developed a novel semiconductor device-based biosensor that can identify breast cancer cells without the need for complicated or expensive laboratory procedures, according to officials.

The developed biosensor does not require any added chemicals to work. It is highly effective in distinguishing the cancerous cells from the healthy breast cells, offering improved accuracy compared to the existing methods of bio-sensing devices for breast cancer diagnosis, they said.

The research has been published in the prestigious Microsystem Technologies journal. According to Prasanna Kumar Sahu, Professor at the Department of Electrical Engineering, the rise of potentially fatal illnesses has drawn attention in recent years to the global emphasis on biomolecule evaluation and Point-of-Care (POC) testing. Among these diseases, cancer is a significant global public health concern. In this context, India has seen a significant rise in breast cancer cases in the past few decades.

"Since cancer cells often do not show any initial signs of progression, it is crucial to di-



agnose them at an early stage for prevention and cure. While several diagnostic procedures such as X-ray, mammography, Enzyme-Linked Immunosorbent Assay Test (ELISA), Ultrasonography and Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) are used to identify the disease, they require specialised equipment and trained personnel.

"Additionally, these diagnostic methods are often inaccessible to people in remote areas," Sahu said.

The COVID-19 pandemic further highlighted these challenges due to the relocation of medical resources, resulting in delayed cancer screenings and treatments, he said.

"This underscores the urgent need for simpler, faster, and more affordable diagnostic tools that do not rely on complex infrastructure," Sahu added. The NIT team has designed a novel approach that uses the physical properties of cancer

cells to detect them. Cancerous breast tissues, which hold more water and are denser than healthy tissues, interact differently with microwave radiation. These differences, known as dielectric properties, make it possible to distinguish between healthy and cancerous cells.

The research team has proposed an electronic device, Tunnel Field Effect Transistor (TFET), based on TCAD simulation results that can effectively detect breast cancer cells. FETs are commonly used in electronics but here they have been adapted to function as a sensitive detector of biological materials. Unlike many traditional tests, this biosensor does not need any added chemicals or labels to work.

"A small cavity is etched into the transistor under the gate area and an equivalent material of biological sample of cells is placed in the cavity to check the sensitivities of the device. The

sensor then reads changes in electrical signals based on the properties of the sample, essentially 'sensing' whether the cells are cancerous or healthy.

"Because cancer cells like T47D have a higher dielectric constant than healthy ones like MCF-10A, the sensor picks up these differences quickly and with high precision," Sahu said. The findings show that the sensor is sensitive in detecting T47D cancer cells due to their high density and permittivity. It is also highly effective in distinguishing cancerous cells from healthy breast cells, offering improved sensitivity compared to existing technologies.

Another key feature of the developed technology is its affordability.

"TFET-based biosensor is affordable compared to the conventional testing methods and other existing FET-based biosensors. The developed technology holds significant promise for future medical applications, resulting in low-cost and easy-to-use diagnostic devices that bring early breast cancer detection to clinics, mobile testing units and home settings," said research scholar Priyanka Karmakar.

As the next step, the research team is exploring potential collaborations for fabrication and scientific validation of the developed technology.

Baripada municipality clerk in Vigilance net

BARIPADA: Vigilance sleuths Friday caught a senior clerk of the Establishment department of Baripada Municipality red-handed while accepting a bribe of ₹10,000. The accused, identified as Gopal Krushna Pradhan, allegedly demanded the bribe from the complainant to process a request for change in ownership of a municipal shop run by his deceased father. According to sources, Mohammed Jabhir of Puruna Hatsahi in Baripada had repeatedly applied to transfer the ownership of the shop following the death of his father. Despite running from pillar to post for over two years, the request was not processed. Eventually, Pradhan allegedly demanded ₹10,000 to carry out the transfer. Unable to bear the harassment, Jabhir approached the Baripada Vigilance department. Acting on his complaint, a team led by unit in-charge Bikash Swain laid a trap at the municipality office, where Pradhan was caught red-handed while accepting the chemical laced currency notes and arrested.

Mastermind in armed robbery case arrested

Balasore, May 23: Police Friday arrested the alleged mastermind of an armed robbery in which a family in Soro was targeted and valuables worth over ₹10 lakh were stolen along with ₹50,000 in cash.

The accused, identified as Bapi Pani, is the leader of a nine-member gang that carried out the robbery in Dayanidhipur village within the jurisdiction of Soro police station Wednesday night.

According to police, the gang entered the residence of Rabindra Nayak by breaking the main door and tied up five family members using torn window screens. The intruders physically assaulted the victims during the robbery, police said.



When two neighbours tried to help, the robbers climbed onto the roof and opened fire to scare them off. One of the neighbours sustained a bullet injury to his chest and was critically injured, police added.

Balasore SP Raj Prasad said, "Within 24 hours of the crime, we arrested the prime accused. Search is on to nab the other accused." Police recovered some gold ornaments, two guns, 20 live cartridges and one car from the accused.

According to police, Pani is involved in 19 criminal cases and was out on bail.

Man killed, 2 injured in wild boar attack

KENDRAPARA: In yet another case of human-wildlife conflict, one person was killed and two others, including a woman, were critically injured following a wild boar attack in the Mahakalapara forest range of Kendrapara district. According to Santanu Dalai, ranger of the Mahakalapara forest range, Siddharth Mirdha, a resident of Jamboo village, succumbed to his injuries Thursday after being attacked by a wild boar that entered the village and went on a biting spree, spreading panic among residents. Two others — Rabin Mirdha and Ashalata Mandal — also sustained critical injuries in the attack. Siddharth Mirdha was rushed to SCB Medical College and Hospital in Cuttack but died while undergoing treatment. Forest personnel are closely monitoring the movement of the wild boar in the area. The department has announced a compensation of ₹6 lakh for the family of the deceased, according to the ranger.

MITs Mega Food Park hailed for job creation

All Smoke, No Fire

With just days to go before acting DGP Prashant Kumar hangs up his boots on May 31, the race to lead Uttar Pradesh's police force is heating up—but so far, all smoke, no fire. The state government hasn't yet sent a shortlist to the UPSC, nor has it kickstarted the process under its newly minted DGP appointment rules, leaving the top job dangling in a curious mix of suspense and speculation. These new rules—brought in with fanfare as a way to cut through the bureaucratic red tape—introduce a state-led selection committee headed by a retired High Court judge, but observers say it's just a slick way to reduce the Centre's role and retain tighter political control over who gets the badge.

The field is wide open, with a few familiar names doing the rounds in the power corridors and grapevine chats alike. The most talked-about is Tiliottama Verma, a 1990-batch officer and DG (Training), who, if chosen, would become the first woman DGP of India's most populous state—a move both symbolic and long overdue. Her CBI credentials are solid, her seniority isn't in doubt, and the buzz around her has only grown since her husband, senior IPS officer Ashish Gupta, took voluntary retirement last month, possibly clearing the decks for her elevation. Then there's Daljit Singh Chaudhary, currently at the BSF, with boots-on-ground experience in central forces; Alok Sharma, guarding the highest of the high as SPG chief; and Rajiv Krishna, steering the state's police recruitment board with a reputation for being calm and competent. But none of this matters if the government doesn't act—and soon.

Because while the rules have changed, the old concerns remain: will the appointment be based on merit, integrity, and experience, or will political convenience win the day yet again? A historic appointment is within reach, but the longer the delay, the more it starts to look like just another backroom chess match, where strategy matters more than service.

From trees to trouble

In Telangana, weekends are not just for lazy brunches but also great for bulldozing forests when you think no one's looking. But the Supreme Court was definitely watching—and it isn't amused.


In a blistering hearing, the Court tore into the Telangana government over the felling of hundreds of trees in the Kancha Gachibowli forest, right next to Hyderabad Central University. The timing? A long weekend when the SC's forest bench was conveniently unavailable. The message? Clear and scathing: either restore the forest in two months, or the state Chief Secretary should start prepping for a stint behind bars.

Chief Justice of India B.R. Gavai didn't mince words, warning the state government that it should be prepared to face contempt. He further called the operation "pre-planned" and "deliberate."

The state's defence—that the land wasn't technically forest and that only "exempted" trees were felled—was laughed out of court. No EC, no paperwork, and now, possibly, no freedom.

A report from the Court-appointed Central Empowered Committee confirms what many feared: over 100 acres were razed without approvals. The land is home to wildlife corridors and natural water bodies. Yet someone thought it was ripe for an IT park.

The SC has now drawn a line. This is about more than a patch of green—it's about state impunity and the hope that no one's watching. The Court has made it clear: weekends won't save you from consequences.

Online trolling: A chilling new normal

In an era where outrage goes viral in seconds, the internet has become a coliseum, and public servants' families are easy prey.

Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri recently found himself in the eye of such a storm. Not for a diplomatic misstep, but for merely doing his job. The real target? His daughter, a private citizen, was mercilessly doxxed and branded "anti-national" for studying abroad. Her photos were circulated like evidence in a trial she never signed up for.

This wasn't anonymous trolling from the digital abyss. It was vicious, orchestrated, and met with deafening silence from the government, including Misri's own ministry.

The abuse didn't stop there. A few weeks ago, Lieutenant Vinay Narwal, a newlywed naval officer, was killed in the Pahalgam terror attack. His wife, Himanshi, in an extraordinary display of grace, appealed against communalising her husband's death. For that, she too was savaged online—her grief trampled by political hate.

Civil service bodies like the Association of Diplomats and the IAS and IPS associations, as well as prominent citizens, spoke out in support of the foreign secretary and slammed the vicious online attack. So did political leaders like Akhilesh Yadav, who rightly questioned whether the Centre's silence amounts to tacit approval. Even the Supreme Court described social media trolling as "atrocious."

This isn't free speech—it's the public lynching of private grief. If we can't draw a line here, the question isn't whether we've lost our moral compass. It's whether we even want one anymore.

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SC grills Rajasthan over surge in student suicides

New Delhi, May 23: The Supreme Court Friday grilled the Rajasthan government over the surge in student suicides in the city of Kota calling the situation "serious".

A bench of Justices JB Pardiwala and R Mahadevan said 14 suicide cases were reported from the city so far this year.

"What are you doing as a state? Why are these children dying by suicide and only in Kota? Have you not given a thought as a state?" Justice Pardiwala asked the counsel representing state of Rajasthan.

The counsel said a special investigation team (SIT) was formed in the state to examine cases of suicides.

The top court was hearing a matter over the death of a 22-year-old student studying in IIT, Kharagpur. The student was found hanging in his hostel room May 4.

It was also dealing with another case of a girl, who was a NEET aspirant and was found hanging in her room in Kota where she lived with her parents. The bench learnt that an FIR was lodged in connection with the death of IIT Kharagpur's student.

The top court, however, questioned the four-day delay

in the FIR which was registered May 8. "Don't take these things lightly. These are very serious things," the bench said.

The bench referred to a March 24 verdict of the top court which took note of recurring cases of student suicides in higher educational institutions and formed a national task force to address the mental health concerns of students and prevent such incidents.

On Friday, the bench said a prompt filing of the FIR was necessary in such cases in line with the verdict.

"Why you took four days to lodge an FIR?" the bench asked a police officer concerned, present in court. The officer said the FIR was lodged and the investigation in the case was underway. "You continue with the investigation in accordance with law," the bench told him.

It came on record that the IIT Kharagpur authorities alerted the police soon after they learnt about the suicide.

The bench, however, was not

convinced with the explanation of the IIT Kharagpur counsel and the police officer.

"We could have taken a very strict view of the matter. We could have even proceeded for contempt against the police officer in-charge concerned of the jurisdictional police station," it said. The bench then refrained from saying "anything further" with the FIR being lodged and progressing investigation.

The investigation, it said, should be carried out expeditiously in the right direction.

In the Kota suicide case, the bench disapproved non filing of the FIR.

The state's counsel said the investigation in the case was ongoing and the SIT was aware of suicide cases in the state.

"How many young students have died so far in Kota?" the bench asked the counsel.

After the counsel said 14, the bench retorted, "Why are these students dying?"

It said the task force constituted by the apex court would take its time before giving a composite report to the court.

"You are in contempt of our judgement. Why have you not registered the FIR?" the bench asked Rajasthan's counsel.

The bench said the student was not residing in the accommodations provided by her institute, which she left in November 2024 and started living with her parents.

"However, in line with our decision, it was the duty of the police concerned to register the FIR and carry out the investigation. The officer in-charge of the concerned territorial police station has failed in his duty. He has not complied with the directions issued by this court," the bench said.

The bench, as a result, summoned the police officer concerned in the Kota case July 14 to explain the situation.

Advisory on cybercriminals' new deceptive techniques

A detailed advisory has been issued to educate citizens about a growing threat.

Mahesh Kumar, Cyber Commando at Police Headquarters, explained that the attack often uses a technique called 'Steganography', where malicious code is secretly embedded inside a photo, video, or audio file.

"This hidden data becomes active once the file is opened, allowing the attacker to forward messages and calls from your device, steal bank OTPs and withdraw money, download malicious APK files without your knowledge, gain com-

plete control of your personal data and phone functions and many more," Kumar said.

He shared that in many cases, cybercriminals send fake emails or SMS messages with enticing offers, lottery wins, or government scheme benefits. These messages contain links that lead to counterfeit websites - clones of banking sites, government portals, or e-commerce platforms. Once you input personal details like bank account numbers, passwords, or OTPs, the data is captured and used to siphon funds or commit identity theft.

"A new scam involves send-

ing users a photo of a person with a message asking them to identify. If the recipient downloads the image, it activates malicious code that gives the hacker access to the user's phone and social media accounts," it said.

The police advisory asked users to turn off auto-download of media files in WhatsApp and other messaging apps, not open or download files or click links sent by unknown or suspicious contacts, avoid sharing personal information on unverified websites or through unfamiliar messages, update device software regularly and install reliable antivirus apps.

People should report cyber incidents immediately to their nearest police station or the Cyber Crime Helpline (1930) and protect their digital identity by following these essential precautions, it said.

Heatwave hits Rajasthan; red alert in three districts

Jaipur, May 23: Rajasthan continues to grapple with an intense heatwave, with large parts of the desert state experiencing scorching temperatures. However, scattered thunderstorms in a few areas have provided some relief from the relentless summer heat.

According to the India Meteorological Department (IMD), heatwave conditions are expected to persist in 16 districts Friday, with no immediate relief in sight. A red alert has been issued for Jaisalmer, Sri Ganganagar, and Bikaner, while thundershowers are forecast in 19 districts, including Jaipur and Kota.

On Thursday, Sri Ganganagar recorded the highest maximum temperature at 47.3 degrees Celsius, which is 4.8 degrees above normal.

With new chief in place, Kerala Congress set for major overhaul

Thiruvananthapuram, May 23: Less than two weeks after appointing Sunny Joseph as the new Kerala Pradesh Congress Committee (KPCC) president, the Congress high command is preparing for a major organisational overhaul at both the state and district levels in the state.

According to sources familiar with the development, the restructuring will be guided by two key reports -- one by strategist Sunil Kanugolu and another by the AICC general secretary in charge of Kerala, Deepa Das Munshi.

Both reports highlight the Congress party's weak grassroots presence in Kerala, especially when compared to rivals CPI(M) and BJP, who have robust booth-level machinery. The reports recommend urgent corrective steps to address this structural gap.

The decision to revamp the party also stems from a shift in leadership dynamics. The once-dominant figures like K Karunakaran, AK Antony, Oommen Chandy, Vayalar Ravi, and Ramesh Chennithala no longer wield the influence they once did.



While Karunakaran and Chandy have passed away, Ravi has largely withdrawn from public life, Antony is in the twilight of his career, and Chennithala's influence declined sharply after the Congress-led UDF's unexpected defeat in the 2021 assembly polls.

A political observer, speaking on condition of anonymity, noted that the high command has asserted itself more since 2021, especially after choosing VD Satheesan as the Leader of the Opposition over Chennithala, despite the latter having greater support within the legislative party.

They also appointed Kannur strongman K Sudhakaran as KPCC chief -- who has now been replaced with Joseph.

"With Sudhakaran's exit, another round of restructuring appears imminent. Unlike earlier eras, where key posts were shared among senior leaders, this revamp will have the unmistakable stamp of the high command and could bring in many new faces," the political observer said.

The urgency is also linked to the upcoming local body elections later this year and the state assembly polls in April-May 2026.

The CPI(M)-led Left Front has already announced that the Pinarayi Vijayan government is aiming for a third consecutive term.

Observers are watching closely to see whether Congress will revert to forming jumbo committees or follow the two reports' recommendation to keep teams lean and merit-based.

All eyes will also be on K.C. Venugopal, a key figure in the AICC and currently the most influential Congress leader from Kerala, to see how much sway he will hold in shaping the new party structure.

Kerala HC orders action against dumping waste at Sabarimala

Kochi, May 23: The Kerala High Court has asked the Deputy Director of the Periyar Tiger Forest Reserve to take strict action under the Wildlife (Protection) Act against those dumping waste in Sabarimala, as the entire area has been declared as a plastic-free zone.

The famed Lord Ayyappa temple is located on a hill top which is surrounded by dense forests and comes under the Periyar Tiger Reserve.

Presently, according to the temple authorities, 24 tons of waste, on an average, is generated per day in Sabarimala during the two month long season that ends in the third week of January.

The Court was told by the Deputy Director of the Periyar Tiger Forest Reserve that two elephants and a pregnant Sambar deer died after consuming the plastic waste in the area.

In his report, he had mentioned that the elephants were coming in herds to eat the waste.

The court was also told that similar things happens with monkeys (Bonnet Macaque, Niligiri Langur, Lion Tailed Macaque), the Malabar Giant Squirrel, Sambar Deer, Mouse Deer, Barking Deer, Porcupine

and birds including endangered species of birds like Nilgiri Fly Catcher, Great Indian Hornbill, Malabar Grey Hornbill also eating from the garbage.

Thecourt rapped the Travancore Devaswom Board -- the body that manages the Sabarimala temple for failing to do its duty for disposing waste in a scientific manner.

The temple prepares for devotees the hugely popular payasam and appam, which every devotee after visiting the temple returns with it.

A huge quantity of jaggery, coconut, various types of flour are used in the preparation of these items and the waste generated from these is the major attraction for these animals and birds, besides the food waste of the devotees all gets dumped in and around the forest area.

The court has now ordered the temple authorities to see that if any the hotels stock or dispense plastic, the first offence shall be punished with a fine of Rs 2,000, the second with fine of a Rs 5,000, while any further violation will lead to closing down the establishment.

With the court speaking tough, the temple authorities said that the solid waste at the temple town was removed, and steps were being taken to remove all other wastes.

BANKER, BAKER, THEN MOUNTAINEER

Thiruvananthapuram, May 23: Kannur native and a resident of Qatar, Safrina Latheef was a banker and a baker before she turned to mountaineering, a long term desire of hers, and became the first woman from Kerala to scale the over 8,000 feet Everest peak.

Latheef describes herself as a "jack of all trades" as she did a bit of banking and baking before moving on to mountaineering.

Describing the momentous feat as one of the "toughest" things she has done in her life

till now, Latheef said that not just physical fitness, but mental strength was also very important to make the climb.

She reached the Everest base camp April 19, began the climb April 28, started the final push for the summit May 12 and reached the top May 18.

"It is a mental struggle, as we see a lot of unexpected things like avalanches, rock falls and dead bodies of climbers who tried to scale the summit with the same aspirations and dreams as us. The dead bodies shake you up. You could be the next body on the line -- that thought crosses your mind.



You have to fight all that to reach the summit," she said in a voice note shared with PTI from Nepal.

However, reaching the peak is worth all that gruelling effort because of the view from there, said Safrina Latheef, who is in her late 30s.

But, her decision to take off

her goggles to experience the view with her naked eyes proved a bit costly as she got blinded by the snow and had to make the descent with poor vision and was subsequently, briefly hospitalised for it, she said.

Earlier in the day, speaking to a news channel from Nepal, Latheef said that she did not realise the heights she was climbing while scaling the summit, but on the way down "I came to realise the enormity of it".

"I am excited with the experience and happy that I got back alive," she added.

Giving details of the effort she put in to achieve the feat,

she said that it was during the Covid-19 pandemic that she and her husband realised the importance of health and physical fitness.

"We became health conscious, joined a gym and began running. It was a long-term desire of mine to do adventure trekking. So, after we became healthier, when we had time, we climbed Mt Kilimanjaro (5,895 meters) in Tanzania with some friends," she said in the voice note.

Since then, her only thought was to climb the highest peak on Earth -- Mount Everest which stands at 8,849 meters.

Kardashian robbery case nears end

Paris: The Paris robbery of Kim Kardashian lasted only minutes — but its impact reverberated for nearly a decade. A court in the French capital will decide the verdict Friday in one of the most audacious celebrity heists in modern French history — the night masked men stormed the star's luxury apartment, tied her up at gunpoint and vanished into the dark with \$6 million in jewels. Nine men and a woman stand accused of carrying out or aiding the crime during the Paris Fashion Week in 2016.

3 TTP terrorists killed in Pakistan

Lahore: Three terrorists of the banned Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) militant group were killed in Pakistan's Punjab province Friday, an official said. A Punjab Counter Terrorism Department (CTD) statement said it received information about the presence of the terrorists in the Mianwali district, about 325 kilometres from Lahore when they were planning to attack police posts near Rehmani Khel Mor. Acting on intelligence, a CTD team surrounded their hideout and asked the terrorists to surrender when they opened fire at them. "During the exchange of fire, three terrorists were killed on the spot while six of their accomplices managed to escape," the CTD statement said.

Record floodwaters in Australia leave 4 dead

Melbourne: Record floodwaters on Australia's east coast have left four people dead and one missing, officials said Friday as rain eased over the disaster area. Some 50,000 people have been isolated by flooding along the coast of New South Wales state north of Sydney after days of heavy rain. The low-pressure weather system that brought the deluge had moved further south to Sydney and its surrounds Friday. Four bodies have been retrieved from floodwaters in New South Wales since Wednesday.

4 dead, 17 trapped in China landslides

Beijing: Landslides in a rural area in China's southwestern Guizhou province have killed at least four people with 17 others still missing in the debris, state media said. Two bodies were found in Changshi township Thursday, and two others in nearby Qingyang village, where a landslide buried 19 people from eight households, according to state-run Xinhua News Agency.

Boston, May 23: A US judge Friday blocked the Trump administration from revoking Harvard University's ability to enroll foreign students, a move that ratcheted up White House efforts to conform practices in academia to President Donald Trump's policies.

US District Judge Allison Burroughs' order provides temporary relief to the thousands of international students who were faced with being forced to transfer under a policy that the Ivy League school called part of the administration's broader effort to retaliate against it for refusing to "surrender its academic independence."

The Trump administration may appeal Burroughs' ruling. Spokespeople for the Justice Department and the Department of Homeland Security did not immediately respond to requests for comment.

In a lawsuit filed in Boston federal court earlier Friday, Harvard called the revocation a "blatant violation" of the US Constitution and other federal laws, and had an "immediate and devastating effect" on the university and more than 7,000 visa holders.

"Without its international students, Harvard is not Harvard," the 389-year-old school said in the lawsuit filed in Boston federal court. Harvard enrolled nearly 6,800 international students in its current

school year, equal to 27% of total enrollment.

Russia, Ukraine each free first 390 prisoners

Chernihiv Region, Ukraine, May 23: Russia and Ukraine each released 390 prisoners Friday and said they would free more in the coming days, in what is expected to be the biggest prisoner swap of the war so far.

The agreement to exchange 1,000 prisoners each was the only concrete step towards peace to emerge last week from two hours of talks in Istanbul, the first direct talks between the warring sides in more than three years.

They failed to agree to a ceasefire proposed by US President Donald Trump.

The Russian ministry of defence said each side had released 270 soldiers and 120 civilians Friday. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy confirmed the total of 390 each, and said more would be released Saturday and Sunday.

Earlier, Ukrainian authorities told reporters to assemble at a location in the northern Chernihiv region in anticipa-

Tens of thousands of Ukrainian civilians have also died as Russian forces have besieged and bombarded Ukrainian cities.

The Russian defence ministry said those released included civilians captured in Russia's Kursk region during a Ukrainian incursion there that began last year.

Dhaka/New Delhi, May 23: Bangladesh's interim government chief Muhammad Yunus is mulling resignation as he is finding it difficult to work in view of political parties failing to reach a common ground to bring a change in the country, according to a media report. Student-led National Citizen

Party chief Nhid Islam was quoted by BBC Bangla Service that Yunus is apprehensive over the evolving political situation in the country and whether he will be able to carry on with his work.

"He (Yunus) said he is thinking about it (resignation). He feels that the situation is such that he cannot work," Islam said Thursday night after he met with the 84-year-old leader. Islam said he went to meet Chief Adviser Yunus after hearing throughout the day about the speculation of his resignation.

"Sir (Yunus) said, If I can't work... I was brought here after a mass uprising to bring change and reform to the country. But in the current situation, with mounting pressure from movements and the way I'm being cornered, this isn't how I can work," Islam told the BBC Bangla.



Another media report referring to unnamed sources close to Yunus said he actually threatened to resign if political parties do not give him their backing and expressed his desire to quit at a cabinet or advisory council meeting earlier Thursday.

It said the other advisers, effectively ministers, however,

persuaded him not to do so.

Islam told the BBC that he urged Yunus "'to stay strong for the sake of the country's security, and future and to meet the expectations of the mass uprising' (and) I hope everyone will cooperate with him".

Islam, one of the key coordinators of the Students Against Discrimination (SAD), who previously served as one three representatives of the platform in the interim government's advisory council or cabinet, quit his office to lead the NCP that emerged in February this year visibly with Yunus's blessings.

The SAD led the July uprising last year forcing the ouster of prime minister Sheikh Hasina's Awami League regime August 5, 2024.

Three days later Yunus, a Nobel Peace Prize winner for experiment of microfinance, flew from Paris to take charge.

US, Iran try to bridge chasm on nuclear enrichment

Dubai: Iranian and US negotiators resumed talks Friday in Rome to resolve a decades-long dispute over Iran's nuclear ambitions, Iranian media reported, despite Tehran warning that a new deal might not be possible amid mutually exclusive demands. The stakes are high for both sides. President Donald Trump wants to curtail Tehran's potential to produce a nuclear weapon that could trigger a regional nuclear arms race and perhaps threaten Israel. The Islamic Republic, for its part, wants to be rid of devastating sanctions on its oil-based economy. Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Aragchi and Trump's Middle East envoy Steve Witkoff were expected to lead a fifth round of talks, through Omani mediators.



Israeli strikes kill Palestinians protecting Gaza aid trucks

Cairo/Jerusalem: Israeli airstrikes killed at least six Palestinians guarding aid trucks against looters, Hamas officials said Friday, underlining the problems hindering supplies from reaching hungry people in Gaza following Israel's 11-week-long blockade. The Israeli military said 107 trucks carrying flour and other foodstuffs as well as medical supplies entered the Gaza Strip from the Kerem Shalom crossing point Thursday. But getting the supplies to people sheltering in tents and other makeshift accommodation has been fitful. So far, an umbrella network of Palestinian aid groups said, 119 aid trucks have entered Gaza since Israel eased its blockade Monday in the face of an international outcry. But distribution has been hampered by looting by groups of men, some of them armed, near the city of Khan Younis, the network said.



UK to roll out chemical castration for sex offenders

The treatment been used in Germany and Denmark on a voluntary basis, and in Poland as mandatory for some offenders

London, May 23: The British government will roll out the use of medication to suppress the sex drive of sex offenders, as part of a package of measures to reduce the risk of reoffending and alleviate the pressures on the prison system, which is running out of space. Justice Secretary Shabana

Mahmood said Thursday that so-called chemical castration would be used in 20 prisons in two regions and that she was considering making it mandatory.

"Of course, it is vital that this approach is taken alongside psychological interventions that target other causes of offending, like asserting power and control," she said in a statement to Parliament following the release of an independent sentencing review.

Though the review highlighted the treatment wouldn't be relevant for some sex offenders such as rapists driven by power and control, rather than sexual preoccupation, Mahmood said that studies show that chemical



castration can lead to a 60 per cent reduction in reoffending. It's been used in Germany

and Denmark on a voluntary basis, and in Poland as mandatory for some offenders.

The recommendation was part of a wide-ranging review led by former Justice Secretary David Gauke. As well as looking at ways to cut reoffending, Gauke recommended reforms to overhaul the prisons system, which is running at near capacity.

One of the first things Mahmood did as justice minister after Labour returned to power after 14 years last July was sanction an early-release program for prisoners to free up space. She says she inherited a judicial system that had been neglected for years by the previous Conservative government and set up the review as a means to stabilize it. "If our prisons collapse, courts are forced to

suspend trials," she said. "The police must halt their arrests, crime goes unpunished, criminals run amok and chaos reigns. We face the breakdown of law and order in this country."

The review recommended that criminals could be released from prison earlier than they are now for good behavior, while judges could be given more flexibility to impose punishments such as driving bans. It also recommended that sentences of less than 12 months would also be scrapped for tougher community sentences. It also called for the immediate deportation for foreign nationals handed a three-year sentence or less.

Trump re-escalates trade threat

The announcement of 50% tariffs on EU post i-phone tariff threat call has intensified the trade war. Experts believe that the decision is revengeful and inappropriate as tariff uncertainties pose growth risks

Washington, May 23: US President Donald Trump Friday threatened a 50% tax on all imports from the European Union as well as a 25% tariff on Apple products unless iPhones are made in America.

The threats, delivered over social media, reflect Trump's ability to disrupt the global economy with a burst of typing as well as the reality that his tariffs have yet to produce the trade deals he is seeking or the return of domestic manufacturing he has promised voters.

The Republican president said he wants to charge higher import taxes on goods from the EU, a long-standing US ally, than from China, a geopolitical rival that had its tariffs cut to 30% this month so Washington and Beijing could hold negotiations. Trump was upset by the lack of progress in trade talks with the EU, which has proposed mutually cutting tariffs to zero even as the president has publicly insisted on preserving a baseline 10% tax on most imports.

“Our discussions with them are going nowhere!” Trump posted on Truth Social (social media platform) “Therefore, I am recommending a straight 50% Tariff on the European



Union, starting on June 1, 2025. There is no Tariff if the product is built or manufactured in the United States.”

That post had been preceded by a threat of import taxes against Apple for its plans to continue making its iPhone in Asia.

FINANCIAL MARKET INSIGHTS

Stock futures sold off after Trump's postings, with the S&P 500 index futures down roughly 1.3%. The markets have developed a hair-trigger sensitivity to US president's statements, often slumping when he announces high tariffs and rallying when he retreats from those threats.

France's CAC 40 index losing 2.7%, and the threat shook the futures market for US stock indexes, which had been indicating only a modest move at the open of trading.

The core of Trump's argument against the EU is that America runs a totally unacceptable trade deficit with the 27 member states. Countries run trade deficits when they import more goods than they export.

In the bond market, Treasury yields fell after swinging back and forth a few times. The yield on the 10-year Treasury eased to 4.50% from 4.54% late Thursday. It had been running higher earlier in the week, in part on worries about how Washington's efforts to cut taxes could add trillions of dollars to the US government's debt.

From the vantage point of the EU's executive commission, trade with the US is roughly in balance if both goods and services are included. As a global centre for finance and technology, the US runs a trade surplus

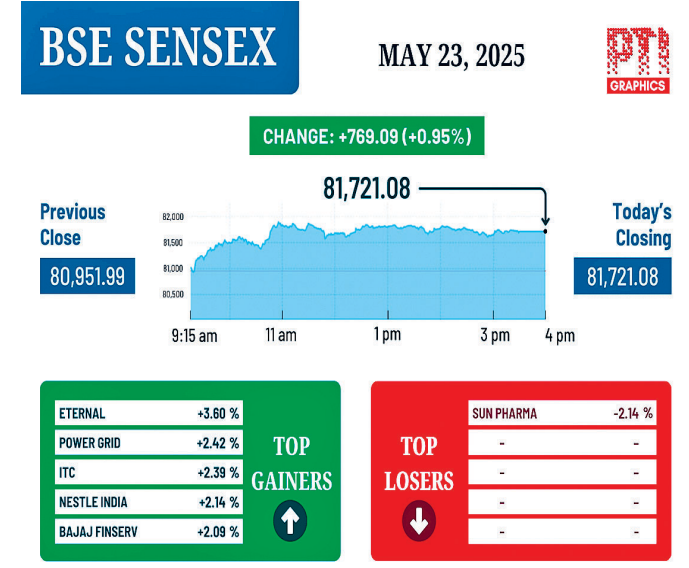
in services with Europe. That offsets some of the trade gap in goods and puts the imbalance at 48 billion euros (\$54 billion). German Foreign Minister Johann Wadephul said the EU's executive commission has his country's full support in working to preserve our access to the American market.

“I think such tariffs help no one, but would just lead to economic development in both markets suffering,” Wadephul said in Berlin. “So we are still counting on negotiations, and support the European Commission in defending Europe and the European market while at the same time working on persuasion in America.”

Trump aides have said the goal of his tariffs was to isolate China and strike new agreements with allies, but the president's tariff threats undermine the logic of those claims. Not only could the EU face higher tariffs than China, but the bloc of member states might have been better off by establishing a broad front with China and other countries against Trump's trade policy, said German economist Marcel Fratscher.

In stock markets abroad, indexes were mixed in Asia, where markets closed before Trump issued his latest tariff threats.

Markets rebound after sharp fall

Mumbai, May 23: Equity benchmark indices Sensex and Nifty rebounded sharply by nearly 1 per cent on Friday, propelled by buying in market heavyweights Reliance Industries, HDFC Bank and ITC.

Besides, hopes of a record dividend from the RBI and easing US treasury yields bolstered investor sentiment, traders said.

After a flat start, the 30-share BSE benchmark bounced back and surged 769.09 points or 0.95 per cent to settle at 81,721.08. During the day, it jumped 953.18 points or 1.17 per cent to 81,905.17. As many as 2,361 stocks advanced while 1,589 declined and 156 remained unchanged on the BSE. The NSE Nifty rallied 243.45 points or 0.99 per cent to 24,853.15.

On a weekly basis, the BSE benchmark dropped 609.51 points or 0.74 per cent and the Nifty declined 166.65 points or 0.66 per cent.

From the Sensex firms, Eternal, Power Grid, ITC, Bajaj Finserv, Nestle, Axis Bank, Kotak Mahindra Bank and Adani Ports were among the biggest gainers.

On the other hand, Sun Pharma was the only laggard, declining nearly 2 per cent.

The company's stock fell after it reported a nearly 19 per cent drop in consolidated net profit for the quarter ended March 31, 2025. The BSE mid

cap gauge climbed 0.50 per cent and small cap index went up by 0.45 per cent.

FMCG jumped 1.49 per cent, utilities (1.02 per cent), power (1.01 per cent), financial services (0.99 per cent), bankex (0.99 per cent), oil & gas (0.94 per cent) and energy (0.82 per cent). In Asian markets, Japan's Nikkei 225 index and Hong Kong's Hang Seng settled in positive territory, while South Korea's Kospi and Shanghai's SSE Composite index ended lower.

Markets in Europe were trading higher in mid-session deals. US markets ended largely flat in overnight trade on Thursday. Global oil benchmark Brent crude dipped 0.23 per cent to USD 64.29 a barrel. Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) off-loaded equities worth ₹5,045.36 crore Thursday, according to exchange data.

Previously, the BSE Sensex tanked 644.64 points, or 0.79 per cent, to settle at 80,951.99. The Nifty tumbled 203.75 points, or 0.82 per cent, to 24,609.70.

"Markets quickly rebounded after a subdued opening, as short-covering helped benchmark indices stay in positive territory thereafter. The market has been volatile throughout the week, as concerns over US fiscal health due to rising debt and interest rates seen unchanged weighed on sentiment," Prashanth Tapse, Senior VP (Research), Mehta Equities Ltd, said.

Hybrid vehicles: Growth bridge for EVs

New Delhi, May 23: Hybrid vehicles have complemented the growth of electric vehicle sales in India rather than competing with the latter, according to a report by HSBC Global Research.

Reiterating that the Indian automotive landscape will remain a multi-powertrain industry over the medium to long term, HSBC Global Research said hybrids, CNGs, and bio-fuels are practical medium- to long-term solutions, while the country moves towards eventual electrification.

In FY25, the growth in EV sales was similar to the growth in Series Hybrid Electric Vehicle (SHEV) sales, despite incentives being offered on SHEVs by Uttar Pradesh, the largest PV-selling state in India. This trend suggests that SHEV adoption is having a positive effect on BEV sales, the report pointed out.

Asserting that the perception that promoting SHEVs will hinder EV adoption is misplaced, the report said, This is not a zero-sum game, but rather an incremental opportunity where incentivising SHEVs contributes to the broader development of the clean mobility ecosystem, benefiting BEVs and advancing overall market growth.

Four-wheeler (4W) EV penetration has improved from 1.9 per cent in the first half of FY25 to 2.5 per cent in the fourth quarter of FY25 and 3.2 per cent in the first quarter of QFY26 quarter-to-date period, driven by launch on MG Windsor and M&M BEVs, the report said.

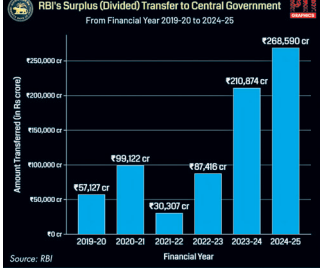
RBI announces dividend of ₹2.69L-cr

India's domestic air passenger traffic reaches 16.54 crore

New Delhi, May 23: The domestic air passenger traffic reached 16.54 crore in FY25, yearly growth of 7.6 per cent and 16.8 per cent higher than the pre-Covid level of around 14.15 crore (FY20), a report showed Friday.

The international passenger traffic for Indian carriers stood at 3.38 crore in FY25, yearly growth of 14.1 per cent, higher than the pre-Covid level of 2.27 crore by 49 per cent, according to a report by ratings agency ICRA.

In April 2025 alone, domestic passenger traffic was estimated at 1.45 crore, which was 10.2 per



cent higher compared to April 2024. Airlines also increased their capacity deployment by 6.9 per cent in April 2025 over

the same month last year. The domestic aviation industry recorded a healthy passenger load factor (PLF) of

86 per cent in FY25, reflecting strong demand and efficient operations across airlines. The highest single-day domestic air traffic was reported February 23, with 5,35,343 passengers flying across the country, driven in part by increased travel around the Maha Kumbh event in Prayagraj.

Looking ahead, ICRA has maintained a 'Stable' outlook for the Indian aviation industry. Domestic passenger traffic is expected to grow by another 7-10 per cent in FY26, while international traffic may increase by 15-20 per cent.

Domestic traffic is expected to grow by another 7-10 per cent, and international pas-

senger numbers may rise by 15-20 per cent, as per the report. While some airlines have adequate liquidity and/or financial support from a strong parent supporting their credit profiles, the credit metrics and liquidity profile of others will remain under stress over the near term, despite some improvement over the last few years, according to the report.

Meanwhile, according to ICRA's earlier report, the domestic air passenger traffic for March had been estimated at 148.8 lakh, marking an 11.3 per cent increase on an annual basis and a 5.9 per cent rise compared to 140.4 lakh in February 2025.

Mumbai, May 23: India's cricket selectors will set the ball rolling for the team's long transition journey in the longest format when they pick a new Test captain and finalise the squad for what is expected to be a challenging five-match series in England, here Saturday.

The 25-year-old Shubman Gill is a clear favourite to land the high-profile job as Indian embarks on a new World Test Championship cycle following the retirement of stalwarts Virat Kohli and Rohit Sharma in a span of one week.

By simple logic, Jasprit Bumrah was the vice-captain on the previous tour of Australia and he should be elevated to the leadership role but question marks over his long-term fitness and workload management are likely to go against him on the discussion table.

Rishabh Pant has had a forgettable IPL but he remains a vital part of India's transition phase in the Test format. The selectors are likely to make him vice-captain.

Barring the leadership conundrum, no major shake-up is expected.

Though Rohit and Kohli's exit leaves a massive void, the likes of KL Rahul can provide much-needed experience in the batting department.

Rahul and Yashasvi Jaiswal are expected to open in the first Test beginning in Leeds on June



Gambhir breaks silence on Ro-Ko's retirement

India head coach Gautam Gambhir has admitted that dealing with the absence of Virat Kohli and Rohit Sharma will be a significant challenge for the team but their Test retirement has also opened the door for others to step up and take responsibility. Kohli and Rohit bid farewell to Test cricket within a week of each other earlier this month. The announcements came ahead of the marquee five-match series in England next month, the squad for which will be announced Saturday in Mumbai. "I think, when you start the game and when you want to finish, it's a very individual decision. No one has the right. Be it the coach, the selector, be it anyone in this country has any right to tell someone when to retire and when not to retire. So it comes from within," Gautam Gambhir said. With their exit, India will not only need a new Test captain but will also be without two of their most seasoned players, a leadership and experience void, Gambhir admits, won't be easy to fill. "And yes, we've got to be without two senior players to really experience players. And sometimes I believe that it's the opportunity for some other people to put their hand up and say, 'Okay, I am ready for it.'"

20 but hot on their heels will be Sai Sudharsan, who is likely to be picked as a reserve opener.

It remains to be seen if one among Karun Nair, Sarfaraz Khan or Shreyas Iyer make it as an additional specialist batter.

Following the retirement of another stalwart, R Ashwin, Ravindra Jadeja will be lead

If the five wise men go for a left-arm pacer, Arshdeep will have competition from Khaleel Ahmed.

Kishan, bowlers fashion SRH's win over RCB

Disappointing start for Indians in Korea

Incheon: Yuvraj Sandhu was the lone Indian inside the cut line after the first day at the Kolon Korea Open on the Asian Tour here, even as his compatriots disappointed. Sandhu, at 2-over 73, was tied 48th at the Dunes Course at La Vie Est Belle golf club – north-east of the capital Seoul. Starting on the 10, Sandhu opened with a birdie and then had two birdies and two boogeys in the remaining eight holes to be one-under. On his second nine, he dropped three bogeys on the fifth, seventh and the ninth to finish at 73. Jeev Milkha Singh and SSP Chawrasia had a tough time. Jeev, who recently finished in the Top-10 at a Legends event in Europe, shot 6-over 77 and was tied 110th, while Chawrasia carded 10-over 81 to be tied 137th. Qualifier Yujun Jung, 22, from Korea was the surprise first-round leader. Jung made it through a 36-hole pre-qualifier, at the same venue, earlier in the month and drew on that experience to set the pace.

Djoko survives knee scare to enter semis

Geneva: Novak Djokovic celebrated his 38th birthday with hard-fought revenge at the Geneva Open. The second seed held firm for a 6-4, 6-4 victory over Matteo Arnaldi to reach the semi-finals at the ATP 250 event for the second consecutive year. Djokovic, who fell to Arnaldi at the ATP Masters 1000 in Madrid last month, reeled off five straight games from 1-4 in the second set to seal a one-hour, 40-minute victory. "It's great to be in the semi-finals again. Hopefully this year I can go at least a step further, that's the goal. I think I'm playing really good tennis. A straight-sets win, but it was much closer than the score indicates. I was 4-1 down in the second, but somehow I didn't lose a game," he said. Djokovic is now within two victories of claiming his 100th tour-level trophy, with which he would join Jimmy Connors (109) and Roger Federer (103) as the only men to hit the triple-digit mark in the Open Era.

Srikanth keeps India's flag flying

Shuttler enters semifinal, lone Indian left in the draw

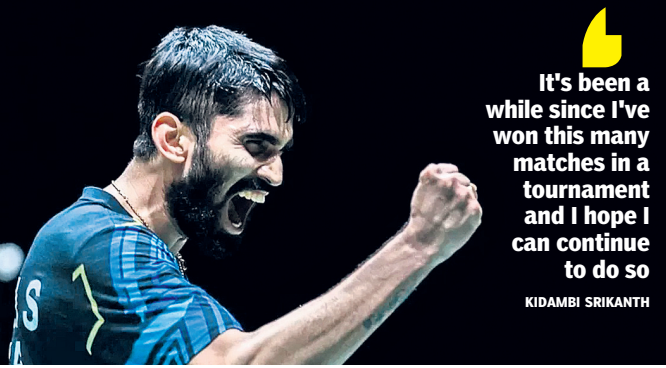

Kuala Lumpur, May 23: Seasoned Indian shuttler Kidambi Srikanth stormed into his first semifinal in over a year with a hard-fought three-game win over higher-ranked Toma Junior Popov of France at the Malaysia Masters badminton tournament here Friday.

Ranked 65th in the world, Srikanth displayed remarkable resilience and tactical maturity to outwit world no.18 Popov 24-22, 17-21, 22-20 in a fiercely-contested quarterfinal that lasted one hour and 14 minutes.

The 32-year-old from Guntur, a 2021 World Championships silver medallist, has endured a rough patch over the past few seasons, struggling with form and fitness.

However, he battled through the qualifiers and has now



notched up five straight wins to reach the business end of a BWF World Tour event.

"It's been a while since I've won this many matches in a tournament and I hope I can continue to do so," said Srikanth. "I've always been trying to better myself and this win just proves that whatever I'm doing is working," added the former world no 1, who had won four titles in a stellar 2017 season and was part of India's historic Thomas Cup triumph in 2022.

Srikanth will take on Yushi

Tanaka of Japan in the last four match, which will be his first semifinal appearance in over a year.

The Japanese, who has won two Super 300 titles -- the Orleans Masters and the US Open -- beat France's Christo Popov, brother of Toma Junior, 21-18 16-21 21-6 in another men's singles quarterfinal duel on Saturday.

The other men's singles semifinal will be played between fourth seed Kodai Naraoka of Japan and second seed Li Shi Feng of China.

Chopra finishes 2nd in Poland event

Alcaraz, Sinner rivalry takes centre stage in French Open

Bangalore, May 23: Defending champion Carlos Alcaraz and world number one Jannik Sinner resume the hottest rivalry in men's tennis at the French Open, where Novak Djokovic will fly the flag for the old guard as the claycourt Grand Slam enters the post-Rafa Nadal era.

After Nadal exited the 2024 edition of the major he won a record 14 times, Alcaraz emerged as the Spaniard's heir apparent with his first Roland Garros title.

Alcaraz has geared up for his title defence with a sparkling campaign on clay this season, with the 22-year-old capturing his first Monte Carlo crown and defeating Sinner in the Italian Open final Sunday to complete his set of elite clay-court honours.

"All eyes are on Paris now, on Roland Garros," said the world number two.

"Beating Jannik, winning Rome, both things mix together and give me great confidence going to Paris. I always say 'the final isn't about playing, the final is about winning'."

"I just repeat that approach every time I play a final."

Sinner showed little sign of rust in his first event back from a three-month ban for two doping violations, and fans will be hoping the world number one scythes through the draw to meet Alcaraz in the final.

Former Roland Garros champion Jim Courier said both players would be feeling confident after the level they showed in Rome.

"Alcaraz continues this run, four wins in a row against Sinner, which no one else is able to come close to, so that's going to give him a little extra boost," Courier said on the Tennis Channel.

"What a clay season he has had. This has been perfect for



Carlos, but also for Jannik. Re-entering (the tour) he couldn't do much better than this."

'NEW REALITY'
Djokovic won the last of his

record 24 Grand Slam titles at the US Open in 2023 and is enduring one of the worst spells of his magnificent career.

The Serb unexpectedly accepted a wildcard for this

week's Geneva Open in a bid to find claycourt form after losing his opening matches at Monte Carlo and Madrid.

Djokovic celebrates his 38th birthday Thursday and while he has suddenly looked vulnerable against the hungry young stars on the tour, few will write him off completely when he returns to the venue where he won gold at the 2024 Paris Olympics.

"It's a new reality for me ... trying to win a match or two, not thinking about getting far in the tournament," Djokovic said after his Madrid exit. "It's a completely different feeling from what I had in 20-plus years of professional tennis, so it's a challenge mentally to face these kinds of sensations on the court."

While Djokovic goes in search of a 25th Grand Slam crown, Germany's Alexander Zverev continues his bid for a first after being hammered by

Sinner in the Australian Open final -- his third straight defeat in a major championship title match.

The world number three, who came close to breaking his duck at last year's French Open when he lost to Alcaraz in five sets, won in Munich last month but has gone off the boil since and is looking to find his rhythm at the Hamburg Open this week.

A host of other contenders will be in the mix in Paris, including Barcelona champion Holger Rune, Madrid winner and former French Open finalist Casper Ruud, as well as the fast-rising duo of Lorenzo Musetti and Jack Draper.

While Nadal's name will not be etched onto the trophy this year, the 22-times major champion will return to his happiest hunting ground for a grand celebration of his achievements on the opening day of the tournament.
