Gopalpur gangrape: CB probe ordered

Bhubaneswar, June 17: On the direction of DGP Odisha, YB Khurania, the Gopalpur gangrape case has been taken over by the Crime Against Women & Children Wing (CAW & CW) of the CID-Crime Branch, Odisha Police.

The case has been classified as a Red Flag matter due to its sensitive nature and seriousness. The inquiry is being conducted under the direct supervision of IG, CAW & CW, Shyni S., ensuring close monitoring and prompt action in the pursuit of justice.

Earlier, National Commission for Women (NCW) took suo motu cognisance of the alleged gang-rape of a 20-yearold student at Gopalpur beach in Ganjam, calling the incident 'shocking' and demanding urgent intervention from state authorities.

In a statement issued Tuesday, NCW Chairperson Vijaya Kishore Rahatkar wrote to the Odisha Director General of Police, directing immediate arrest of all the remaining accused.

The NCW has also sought an Action Taken Report from the state police within three days.



Monsoon covers entire state, heavy rains likely

Bhubaneswar, June 17 Heavy rains are likely in the state over the next three days, with the southwest monsoon covering the entire state and a low-pressure area forming nearby, officials said Tuesday

This year, monsoon entered Odisha on May 28, 14 days ahead of schedule, they said.

In a statement, the IMD said 'Southwest monsoon has fur ther advanced and today it covered the remaining parts of Odisha." The low-pressure area has formed over southwest Bangladesh and adjoining Gangetic West Bengal under the influence of a cyclonic circulation. It is likely to become more marked and move west-northwestwards during the next 24 hours.

Mumbai/Kolkata, June 17: Troubles continued at Air India, which is facing the biggest crisis since Tata group bought the airline three-and-a-half vears back, with as many as seven international flights being cancelled Tuesday for varied reasons, bringing the total number of cancellations to 83 since the devastating Ahmedabad crash. Besides, a glitch forced fliers on San Francisco-Mumbai flight to deplane during a stopover at Kolkata.

While Air India cancelled six international flights due to aviation regulator DGCA subiecting its Dreamliner fleet to enhanced checks, the Ahmed



BOMB THREAT TO INDIGO FLIGHT

Kochi: A bomb threat was Tuesday received with regard to an Indigo flight which arrived here from Mus-cat and departed for Delhi, prompting it to make an emergency landing at Nagpur airport for undergoing inspection, the Cochin International Airport Ltd (CIAL) said. It said that the threat was received on its official email ID about the Indigo flight which departed for Delhi with 157 passengers and six crew members at 9.31 am. Subsequently, a Bomb Threat Assessment Committee (BTAC) was convened and the threat was declared as 'specific', CIAL said.

The Delhi-Paris flight was cancelled after some problems were detected during pre-flight

checks. The other flights cancelled during the day included Bengaluru-London, London-Amritsar, Delhi-Vienna, Delhi-Dubai and Mumbai-San Francisco.

In a statement earlier in the day, Air India said flight Al143 from Delhi to Paris has been cancelled after "mandatory pre-flight checks identified an issue which is being presently addressed". It did not detail the issue that came to light during pre-flight checks.

"However, in view of the flight coming under the restrictions on night operations at Paris Charles de Gaulle (CDG) airport, the said flight has been cancelled," Air India said. Many passengers flying in and out of India expressed their frustration over last minute cancellations and lack of customer support, a source revealed

No major safety concerns with B787 fleet: DGCA

Mumbai: Aviation watchdog DGCA Tuesday said surveillance of Air India's Boeing 787 fleet did not reveal any major safety concerns in the wake of the fatal plane crash in Ahmedabad last week. Amid mounting safety concerns and the cancellation of at least 66 flights that were to be operated with Boeing 787 Dreamliner aircraft, DGCA officials held a detailed review meeting with top Air India and Air India Express executives. Air India and Air India Express operate over 1,000 flights daily.

Govt deputes 4 teams to diarrhoea-hit dists

Bhubaneswar, June 17: The state government Tuesday deputed four state-level teams

to districts affected by diarrhoea to observe field-level

State Health Secretary Aswathi S told newsmen that the teams have been formed with senior officers, experts, and advisors from the Health and Family Welfare Department.

She said Joint Director Dr. Ashok Kumar Paik Roy, Advisor Dr. Kalloka Das, IRT Member Surjit Garabdu, Dr. Asit Kumar Mohanty, Dr. Prabhakar Sahu, and Advisor Shri Anup are among the prominent members of these teams.

They will visit Bhubaneswar. Banki, Dharamsala, Badachana, and Bhandaripokhari to inspect diarrhoea control efforts and strengthen coordination among the various departmental teams working at the grass roots level.

The teams will monitor water source purification, houseto-house campaigns, early de tection and primary treatment of diarrhoea patients, door-todoor distribution of medicines and halogen tablets, public awareness programmes, and provide necessary advice and support to make interventions more targeted.

Suspected spurious liquor claims 2 in City

Bhubaneswar, June 17: The state government Tuesday sealed a liquor shop here following allegations that two persons died after consuming alcohol bought from the outlet, an official said. After receiving allegations

from some locals of the Laxmisagar area here, a team of excise officials collected some samples from the liquor shop located near the station bazaar and sealed it. "We have information that

some people have been hospitalised after consuming liquor from the shop. We have collected some liquor samples from the shop for testing and sealed it," the Deputy Superintendent of Excise, Bhubaneswar, Raj Sekhar Swain, said.

According to locals, a group of youths bought liquor from the shop and conducted a feast. After that four to five persons became seriously ill and were admitted to a hospital and two of them died, they alleged.

However, the alleged death of two persons due to illicit liquor or food poisoning or some other reason can be ascertained after post-mortem examination and an investi gation, another excise official Earlier, irate over the

deaths of the two young men, locals staged a protest in front of the liquor shop and demanded its closure and action against the owner and employees for allegedly selling spurious liquor.

The protesters also demanded adequate compensation for the families of the deceased and free treatment for the oth ers who are currently fighting

Donald Trump seeks Iran's unconditional surrender

Washington, June 17: President Donald Trump said Tuesday the US knows where Iran's Ayatollah Ali Khamenei is hiding but doesn't want him killed "for now." Trump urged, in a social media posting, Iran's "UNCONDITIONAL SURREN-DER" as the five-day conflict continues to escalate.

"We know exactly where the so-called 'Supreme Leader' is hiding," Trump added. "He is an easy target, but is safe there -We are not going to take him out (kill!), at least not for now. But we don't want missiles shot at civilians, or American soldiers. Our patience is wearing thin.'

Trump's comments towards Tehran come after urging Tehran's 9.5 million residents to flee for their lives as he cut short his visit to an international summit to return to Washington for urgent talks

with his national security team. Trump, as he made his way back to Washington, expressed frustration with Iranian lead-

SHADMANI KILLED IN ISRAELI STRIKE

Tehran: The Israeli military said Tuesday it killed Iran's top military commander, Ali Shadmani, in an overnight strike, calling him the closest figure to Supreme Leader Avatollah Ali Khamenei. In a statement, the military said following "a sudden opportunity overnight, the (Israeli air force) struck a staffed command centre in the heart of Tehran and eliminated Ali Shadmani the wartime Chief of Staff, the most senior military commander, and the closest figure to Iranian Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei". The Israeli military said Shadmani had commanded both the Islamic Revolution ary Guard Corps and the Iranian armed forces.

European satellites create first artificial solar eclipse

Cape Canaveral, June 17: A pair of European satellites has created the first artificial solar eclipses by flying in precise and fancy formation, providing hours of on-demand totality for scientists.

The European Space Agency released the eclipse pictures at the Paris Air Show Monday. Launched late last year, the orbiting duo has churned out simulated solar eclipses since March while zooming tens of thousands of miles (kilometers)

Flying 492 feet (150 meters) apart, one satellite blocks the sun like the moon does during a natural total solar eclipse as the other aims its telescope at



the corona, the sun's outer atmosphere that forms a crown or halo of light.

It's an intricate, prolonged dance requiring extreme precision by the cube-shaped spacecraft, less than 5 feet (1.5 meters) in size. Their flying accuracy needs to be within a mere millimeter, the thickness of a fingernail. This meticulous positioning is achieved autonomously through GPS navigation, star trackers, lasers and radio links.

lion mission has generated 10 successful solar eclipses so far during the ongoing checkout phase. The longest eclipse lasted five hours, said the Royal Observatory of Belgium's Andrei Zhukov, the lead scientist for the orbiting corona-observing telescope. He and his team are aiming for a wondrous six hours of totality per eclipse once scientific observations begin in July. Scientists already are

Dubbed Proba-3, the \$210 mil-

thrilled by the preliminary results that show the corona without the need for any special image processing, said Zhukov.

"We almost couldn't believe our eyes," Zhukov said in an email. "This was the first try. and it worked. It was so incredible," he added.

Zhukov anticipates an average of two solar eclipses per week being produced for a total of nearly 200 during the two-year mission, yielding more than 1,000 hours of totality. That will be a scientific bonanza since full solar eclipses produce just a few minutes of totality when the moon lines up perfectly between Earth and the sun - on average just once every 18 months.

The sun continues to mystify scientists, especially its corona, which is hotter than the solar surface. Coronal mass ejections result in billions of tons of plasma and magnetic fields being hurled out into space. Geomagnetic storms can result, disrupting power and communication while lighting up the night sky with auroras in unexpected locales.





Addressing the Kisan Shakti Samavesh, which was being held in Bolangir to mark one year of the BJP government in the state, Majhi said, "Our government is committed to empowering farmers of the state. Efforts are underway to increase their income by different means.' "One of our major election

promises was to ensure fair value for the hard work of lakhs of our farmer brothers and sisters - a promise we have fulfilled,' he said. As soon as the new government took the oath of office June 12, 2024, it decided to provide ₹800 towards per quintal of paddy as input subsidy to the farmers, Majhi said.

He noted that over 60 per cent of the state's population depends on agriculture and allied sectors for their livelihood.







Bhubaneswar, June 17: Raids were conducted Tuesday at several restaurants in Bhubaneswar, Jaipur and Cuttack to assess the standard of hygiene amid the diarrhoea outbreak in parts of the state, officials said.

Diarrhoea was first detected in Jajpur June 9. Over 200 patients are still under treatment in different healthcare facilities in the district, they said.

A team, led by Darpan's tehasildar Manas Tripathy, conducted raids at eateries, sweet shops and hotels in Barchana town in Jajpur.

"We are checking the hygiene and quality of food served in eateries. If stale food was found, we issued a warning to the owner. If they continue to serve unhygienic or stale food, we will seal their shop," he said. The local administration in Bari, Dharmasala,

Vyasanagar and Binjharpur blocks has already shut down hotels, eateries, fastfood stalls, meat shops and water packaging units for a temporary period.

Municipal authorities in Cuttack and Bhubaneswar have also started conducting raids after diarrhoea cases were detected in some pockets of the twin cities.

Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation (BMC) teams conducted raids at eateries in Kalinga Vihar and Delta Square areas. They collected food samples for testing and also fined some restaurant owners for not maintaining the quality, an official said.

ODISHA MARKS 50 YRS OF PROJECT CROCODILE

Min urges mass movement for crocodile conservation



Forest Minister Ganesh Ram Singkhuntia highlights Odisha's 50-year legacy as a global role model in crocodile conservation

Bhubaneswar, June 17: Forest, Environment and Climate Change Minister, Ganeshram Singkhuntia, Tuesday appealed to people to make the conservation of crocodiles a mass movement.

The state celebrated the 50th anniversary of the Crocodile Conservation Project in Odisha here.

In a video message, which was played at the event organised on the occasion of International Crocodile Day, the minister said that Odisha is an important habitat for crocodiles as all the three crocodile species -- saltwater crocodile (Baula), Mugger and Gharials -- are found in the state.

"For the past 50 years, our state has been setting an example for the whole world in the conservation of crocodiles," he said

He further said that crocodile

conservation is not just about saving a single creature, it is a symbol of preserving the rivers, water bodies and the entire eco-

Being an integral part of the food chain, crocodiles play a vital role in maintaining natural biodiversity by removing dead organisms from rivers, lakes and other water bodies, creating a healthy environment, Singkhuntia said.

Stating that the state is committed to the protection of water, forests and wildlife, he stated, "We must take a pledge to take forward the great work started by our ancestors towards nature and environment protection and turn it into a mass movement."

The challenge of today is to make the crocodile conservation project in the state as successful as possible by maintaining the ecological balance of the wetlands, he added.

Forest, Environment and Climate Change Additional Chief Secretary Satyabrat Sahu, said, "Today, we are not just celebrating an ordinary event, but we are celebrating 50 years of a unique and glorious journey of Odisha in the field of nature

(crocodile) conservation."

About fifty years ago, the three species of crocodiles living in the rivers, lakes and reservoirs of Odisha were on the verge of extinction. Their number was limited to a handful, he said, while narrating the history behind the crocodile conservation project.

In that critical situation, in 1975, the ambitious project was launched in Odisha with the joint support of the Government of India and the United Nations, Sahu said, adding, Odisha's role in the success of this project has become an example for the whole world today.

From 96 Baula crocodiles in Bhitarkanika mangrove then, their number has increased to 1,880. Similarly, due to natural reproduction of the Gharial crocodile at Satkosia Gorge in Tikarpada of the Mahanadi, its number has increased to 16.

Due to successful breeding efforts, the state now has more than 200 Mugger crocodiles, he added. Principal Chief Conservator of Forests and Chief of Forest Force, Suresh Panth, highlighted the growing challenge of human-crocodile conflict due to shrinking habitats and loss of spawning grounds.

Principal Chief Conservator of Forest (Wildlife) & Chief Wildlife Warden Prem Kumar Jha outlined the project's key achievements, highlighting habitat restoration, community participation, and financial aid for individuals affected by crocodile-human conflicts.

Looking ahead, a national-level workshop on crocodile conservation will be held June 18, bringing together experts and forest officials from across the country.

Odisha Yatri App to roll out ambulance services

Bhubaneswar, June 17: In a major boost to emergency medical response in Odisha, the state government has announced that its flagship mobility platform, the Odisha Yatri App, will soon include ambulance services, both government and private, under its umbrella.

Commerce and Transport Minister Bibhuti Bhushan Jena made the announcement Tuesday, highlighting the state's push to digitise and streamline emergency healthcare transportation. "Following the successful integration of autorickshaw and taxi services, Odisha Yatri App will now offer citizens the ability to book ambulances online. The Commerce and Transport department will initiate the



process shortly," he said.
"This initiative mark

"This initiative marks a significant step in our commitment to an inclusive, citizen-centric transport and healthcare ecosystem," said Minister Jena, reaffirming the government's focus on equitable, accessible public services.

"The new service will be operated by Capital Region Urban Transport (CRUT), while the Transport department will

manage the system's maintenance and regulatory oversight. The move is seen as a vital step toward improving last-mile healthcare delivery, especially in remote and underserved areas," he said.

The initiative stems from a broader government vision to create a seamless, tech-enabled platform that ensures timely access to medical transport. The app, launched last year and

powered by the Open Network for Digital Commerce (ONDC), already offers various affordable transport services including AC and non-AC minicabs, sedans, inter-city rides, and rentals.

At a recent review meeting, Commerce and Transport department Principal Secretary Usha Padhee emphasised the importance of leveraging digital infrastructure for emergency healthcare. "Our aim is to bring all ambulances under a single, standardised platform to improve service reliability, ensure faster response times, and enhance citizen access," she noted.

To achieve this, the government plans to launch a campaign-mode registration drive for private ambulances, encouraging them to join the platform. These ambulances will be linked to the Vehicle Location

Tracking System (VLTS), enabling real-time GPS monitoring and efficient deployment during emergencies.

The platform will also feature a Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) for ambulance fare regulation, a move designed to protect citizens from arbitrary or exploitative pricing. Incentives and regulatory clarity will be provided to encourage private ambulance operators to register and comply with service norms.

Officials underscored that strict enforcement mechanisms will be put in place to prevent unauthorised operations and ensure service quality. With the integration of ambulance services, the Odisha Yatri App is set to become a comprehensive mobility and emergency care solution for the people of Odisha.

4 minors among 10 held

Berhampur/Gopalpur, June 17: Two days after a college girl was gangraped on Gopalpur beach in front of her male friend who was assaulted and restrained, police arrested 10 persons including four minors in this connection Tuesday.

The adult accused were identified as Pramod Kumar Nayak, 23, of Hundata village under Purushottampur police limits, Baburam Dalei, 23, Lakhsman Pradhan, 24, of Burupada village, Kunal Pradhan, 24, of Patapur village under Hinjili police limits, their associates Om Pradhan, 24, and Deepak Tarai, 19 of Sikiri village under Hinjili police limits.

Pramod, the prime accused, is a history-sheeter and carries cases of attempted murder and bomb-making in his name. He committed the crime when he had come home from Bangalore on holiday.

Four minor boys have also been detained by police in this connection. The accused were produced in the court and remanded to judicial custody while the minors produced before a Juvenile Justice Board. Three bikes and eight mobile phones were seized from their possession.

Three of the 10-member group raped the girl while the rest seven beat up the male friend of the survivor and held him hostage, police said. The survivor hailing from outside the district is a student of Plus III final vear in a local college.

This was stated by Berhampur SP Saravana Vivek M at a presser organised at Gopalpur police station Tuesday. The Juvenile Justice Board will be requested to treat the four minor accused as adults during the trial in view of the heinous crime, as they have attained the age of 17, the SP said.

Police said that the prime accused Pramod and his friends visited Gopalpur beach and took bath in the sea. They soon

sat there. The survivor and her male friend visited the beach Sunday evening and also sat at the deserted place at some distance from the group of

Seven of the accused then went near the survivor and beat up her male friend while Pramod, Baburam and Kunal dragged the girl and took turns to rape her. They threatened to make a video of her rape and make it viral and extracted ₹1,000 from the survivor's male friend and also some money through the payment app PhonePe.

The survivor and her male friend visited the Gopalpur police station and informed the police. Police IIC Prasant Kumar Mallick and his team immediately raided various places and picked up seven persons for interrogation. Three other police teams were formed and the remaining three accused were arrested, he stated, adding that two of them were trying to flee to Bangalore and Surat when police nabbed them.

The statements of the survivor and her male friend were recorded and a case (186/25) was registered in this connection under Section 70(1) (gangrape), 296 (obscene acts and songs), 351(3) (criminal intimidation involving severe threats), 310(2) (a gang of persons associated for the purpose of habitually committing crime) of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS)

The SP said that the police will file the chargesheet in this case very soon and will make all efforts for maximum punishment to the accused persons.

The safety of women in tourist destinations has been questioned," he said

"The government should be vigilant in preventing the increasing atrocities against women every day. The government should take strict steps to ensure the safety and security of women in the state," he added.

The Opposition party rushed a team to Gopalpur to meet the local administration and the survivor, said BJD vice-presi-

dent Debi Prasad Mishra. Congress MLA Sofia Firdous said she was "shaken" by the incident. "This isn't just a crime; it's a chilling reflection of the complete collapse of law and order in our state,'

Firdous alleged that the state government has failed to protect the people. "The BJP government must be held accountable for the erosion of public safety under its watch. As a woman, I refuse to stay silent. No delay. No mercy. The guilty must face the harshest punishment. To the survivor: You are not alone. We will not let this be forgotten," she said.

Local MLA and state minister Bibhuti B Jena said all the accused persons have been arrested and the government would ensure that the culprits

Decaying carcass of female elephant found in Kuldiha

Nilagiri, June 17: The decomposed carcass of a female elephant was recovered from Kuldiha Wildlife Sanctuary, reigniting concerns over the rising number of elephant deaths in the region.

Frequent deaths of the pachy derms over the past few years, despite Kuldiha being officially recognised by the state government as an elephant sanctuary have raised serious questions about the effectiveness of patrols and conservation efforts by the Forest department, Environmentalists warn that if the trend continues, the sanctuary could soon lose its elephant population altogether.

Local villagers reportedly noticed a foul odour Tuesday while grazing goats near the upper forested area of Putibandh on the foothills of the sanctuary. Upon investigating, they

Kendrapara, June 17: After a gap of six-and-a-half months, marine fishermen in Kendrapara district have resumed fishing activities following the lifting of the annual fishing ban within a 20-km radius of the Gahirmatha Marine Sanctuary.

The Odisha Marine Fisheries department had imposed the ban from November 1, 2024 to May 30, 2025, in accordance with the provisions of the Orissa Marine Fishing Regulation Act (OMFRA), 1982.

In addition, a second ban was in effect from April 15, 2024 to June 14, 2025, under the Wildlife Protection Act, 1972, the OMFRA, and the Orissa Marine Fishing Rules, 1983.

These measures aimed to protect the endangered Olive Ridley sea turtles, which nest in large numbers at Gahirmatha.

The ban was introduced with conservation in mind, as trawlers using fine-mesh nets risk capturing eggs and juvenile fish, thereby disrupting the breeding cycle and depleting fish population.

Trouble For Iran

he escalating conflict between Israel and Iran has plunged the Middle East into deeper turmoil, with ramifications stretching far beyond the region. The latest round of hostilities, marked by Israel's targeted strikes on Iran's nuclear sites and Iran's retaliatory ballistic missile launches, has intensified fears of a broader war. The situation is further complicated by the ongoing crisis in Gaza, the shifting dynamics of air superiority over Tehran, and the geopolitical maneuvering of global powers, including the United States

The Middle East has long been a tinderbox of geopolitical tensions, but the latest Israel-Iran conflict threatens to ignite a full-scale regional war. Israel's Operation Rising Lion, launched on June 13, 2025 struck key Iranian nuclear and military sites, including Natanz and Fordow, killing top Iranian military leaders and nuclear scientists. Iran responded with a barrage of ballistic missiles, some of which breached Israel's defenses, striking Tel Aviv and Haifa. The exchange of fire has led to significant civilian casualties on both sides, with Iran reporting over 224 deaths and Israel confirming 24 fatalities.

One of the most striking developments in this conflict has been Israel's rapid establishment of air superiority over Tehran. Within 48 hours of launching its offensive, Israel claimed to have dismantled a significant portion of Iran's air defenses, allowing Israeli fighter jets to operate freely over Iranian airspace. This shift has given Israel a strategic advantage, enabling it to conduct further strikes with minimal resistance. The loss of air superiority has severely weakened Iran's ability to defend its territory, and its long-term military capabilities.

Israel's decision to strike Iran's nuclear facilities marks a significant escalation. The attacks on Natanz, Fordow, and Isfahan were aimed at crippling Iran's ability to develop nuclear weapons. While Israel has long viewed Iran's nuclear ambitions as an 'existential threat', the direct targeting of these sites has drawn international condemnation. The International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) has warned of potential radiological risks, though no elevated radiation levels have been detected so far. Iran, meanwhile, has vowed to rebuild its nuclear infrastructure, signaling that the conflict is

US President Donald Trump's abrupt departure from the G7 summit in Canada has added another layer of complexity to the crisis. Trump, who has historically been a staunch supporter of Israel, left the summit early, citing the escalating conflict. His administration has signaled tacit approval of Israel's actions, with Trump himself warning Iran to evacuate Tehran. While European leaders have called for de-escalation, Trump's stance suggests that the US may take a more active role in supporting Israel's military campaign

Speculation is mounting over whether US aircraft based in Qatar will participate in Israel's strikes against Iran. Reports indicate that American military assets, including aerial refueling tankers, have been repositioned closer to the Middle East. The presence of US forces in the region raises questions about Washington's true level of engagement. If American air power was used with Israeli operations, it would mark a significant escalation.

Beyond the immediate military exchanges, the Israel-Iran conflict has far-reaching consequences. The crisis in Gaza remains unresolved, with civilians on all sides caught in the crossfire. The conflict has also disrupted global trade routes, particularly in the Strait of Hormuz, a vital artery for oil shipments. Additionally, the war threatens to derail nuclear negotiations between Iran and Western powers. further isolating Tehran on the global stage whereby it could easily turn up as another Moslem rogue state

The latest Israel-Iran conflict is a dangerous escalation that could reshape the Middle East's geopolitical landscape. Israel's air superiority, its strikes on nuclear sites, Iran's missile retaliation, and Trump's unwayering support for Israel all point to a prolonged and volatile confrontation. Whether the US will deepen its involvement remains uncertain, but the potential for a broader war looms large. As the world stands worried about the crisis, the fate of the region

uch like Germans during the hyperinflation that plagued the Weimar Republic a century ago, Syrians today rarely leave home without carrying thick stacks of cash. As sectarian tensions - long repressed in a country ruled by the Alawite minority until recently - continue to fuel instability, ATMs cap withdrawals at around \$40 per week, if they are working at all.

Six months after the ouster of President Bashar al-Assad, which ended the country's brutal 13-year civil war, Syrians are still struggling just to make it through each day. Despite the overwhelming hardships, many cling to the hope that a measure of normalcy may soon be within reach. But every week brings hardships that belie such optimism. Most recently, by using Syrian airspace to attack Iran, Israel places Syrians in a quandary they would rather avoid.

In a culture where hospitality is sacred, most Syrians can no longer afford to offer visitors more than a single cup of coffee. The country is grappling with a severe drought - worse than the one often linked to the 2011 uprising – that now threatens 75% of wheat crops, undermining access to bread and exacerbating food insecurity.

Few Syrians long for Assad's return, but many are skeptical of his successor, Ahmed al-Sharaa. A former al-Qaeda commander, Sharaa ruled the rural province of Idlib for several years, enforcing a strict Sunni Islamist code. Although he has since moderated his stance, he remains as much an enigma as the soft-spoken, Western-educated Assad, who promised reform only to become one of the worst war criminals since World War II.

Like his predecessor, Sharaa governs by decree, with little to no transparency, causing many Syrians to fear they have merely



Like his predecessor, Sharaa governs by decree. with little to no transparency, causing many Syrians to fear they have merely exchanged one autocrat for another, replacing a secular dictatorship with an Islamist one

exchanged one autocrat for another, replacing a secular dictatorship with an Islamist one. Moreover, Sharaa's ideological leanings and economic priorities remain unclear. His detractors deride him for his al-Qaeda past, while those who fought alongside him in Iraq have questioned his jihadist zeal.

Regardless of Sharaa's agenda, sectarian divisions continue to imperil meaningful government action, as the Druze in the south and the Alawis in Assad's longtime stronghold along Syria's coast refuse to accept the new government. "They are hypocrites," Druze spiritual leader Hikmat al-Hijri told me, describing Sharaa and his allies with a loaded religious term for those who resisted the Prophet Muhammad's message. When asked whether he supports a federal state, al-Hijri replied that he opposes centralism. In reality, what he and his co-religionists want is a weak central government incapable of asserting control over their remote province.

The Alawis face a different problem. As Syria's former ruling minority, they share little with the Sunni elite toppled by the United States in neighboring Iraq. Given that Sunnis are the predominant sect across the broader Arab and Islamic world, Iraq's

Sunni minority believed it was entitled to rule over the country's Shia majority and clamored for the restoration of its rightful status.

Syrian Alawis cannot harbor similar aspirations. Still, this hasn't stopped some from attempting to launch an insurgency, much like Iraq's Sunnis did after the US invasion in 2003. The problem is not only that the Alawi minority is much smaller than the Sunni minority in Iraq, but also that it has historically been too fragmented to present a united front.

Recent clashes between the government and these minority groups have rattled Syria, eroding public confidence in the new regime. But despite sectarian conflict, Sharaa enjoys the support of most Arab Sunnis. Devout Muslims back him because the collapse of the atheist Ba'ath party has allowed religion to re-enter public life. Others credit him with lowering prices, though there is little evidence he can move markets like, say, US President Donald Trump.

Anti-Americanism virulent anti-Israelism were central pillars of the Assad dynasty's Ba'thist creed. Assad and his father adopted this militant dogma to distract from their domestic failures

and minority rule. Under the Assads, Syria would have been the first to denounce Israel's strikes against Iran and offer support - both vocal and material – to any party willing to tangle with the Israelis. Today, Syrians have become insular. more concerned with national healing than with regional events. Though Israel has increasingly encroached on Syrian territory since Assad's fall, many Syrians are content to have normal neighborly re-

In a society plagued by scarcity, the one thing Syrians are not short of is hope - a free commodity that, unlike most goods, is neither expensive nor subject to international sanctions. "Without hope, we cannot live," a middle-aged man told me as he contemplated whether to spend his meagre savings on new sneakers for his children or repair his apartment's faulty wiring.

Syrians face an abundance of such tradeoffs. What they lack are sudden strokes of luck like Trump's unexpected decision to loosen US sanctions, which has led many Syrians to expect more such flukes. "It is Allah who planted the seed of Syria in Trump's heart," a man told me confidently while holding a satchel of decomposing tomatoes - bought at a discount - in his calloused hands.

According to US special envoy to Syria Tom Barrack, the administration's decision to lift certain sanctions was intended to "flood the zone with hope." But what Syrians are hoping for is that Americans will flood their country with capital and investment, sparing them the need to choose between existential needs and basic comforts, and allowing them, at the very least, to buy produce that is ripe rather than rotting.

Sir, This refers to "India, Cyprus condemn terrorism, agree to boost defense ties," Orissa POST, June 17. The timing is not accidental. It reflects India's willingness to recalibrate its geopolitical posture in response to Turkey's provocations. By standing with Cyprus and strengthening India's Eastern Mediterranean foothold, Modi subtly warns Ankara: India will counter any alliance that endangers its national interest, even through diplomatic and strategic partnerships. The message is clear—friendship cannot coexist with sabotage.

STRANDED IN CONFLICT-HIT TEHRAN

Bengal mountaineer pleads to cross Iran border by road

Kolkata, June 17: Forty-yearold Falguni Dev has barely slept during the last six nights. Stuck inside a hotel room in central Tehran, the assistant professor at Women's Christian College in south Kolkata and a mountaineer by passion, Dev is currently at his wit's end in figuring out how to return home.

Relentless sounds of explosions from Israeli war machines especially at night and sights of thick black smoke billowing from targets that have been hit in Teheran visible from his hotel window during the day, have only added to Dev's anguish and anxiety.

With no respite currently in sight and money running out quickly, the now-desperate adventure sports enthusiast is mulling a dangerous bid to escape Iran via the land route and cross over to an adjacent country like Turkey, Armenia Azerbaijan, Afghanistan or

"I had no intention of staying in Teheran for so long and I barely have money left with me to sustain at this hotel where I am stuck. I can't fetch money closed. I am the only Indian in my hotel and I have no evacuation promises from the Indian government so far.

"So, I have no choice but to take this decision of moving out by road and crossing over to a neighbouring country from where I can catch a flight back



here has assured me of help in this," an exasperated Dey told PTI from Tehran.

He had reached Tehran June 5 with an aim to conquer Mount Damavand, Asia's highest volcanic peak standing at an elevation of 5.610 metres in the northeastern fringes of the Iranian capital. This was Dey's third attempt at a volcanic summit after having previously successfully scaled Mount Kilimanjaro and Mount Elbrus, the two highest dormant volcanoes in the eastern hemisphere.

Dey's hopes in Iran, however, remained unfulfilled after a nasty blizzard forced him to abandon the climb barely 400 meters below the summit.

"I returned to Tehran with a heavy heart. But the moment I set foot in the city, I realised something here was terribly wrong. The city was being hombed and I was caught in the middle of an all-out war. I was scheduled to take my return flight the next day, but then the Iranian airspace had been shut down and all flights in and out of Tehran were cancelled," Dey said.

Asked whether he managed to contact the Indian embassy in Iran to inform the officials about his plight, the adventure tourist said he was in constant touch with the embassy, which hasn't been able to provide evacuation hopes so far and have, instead, laid down a set of protocols to follow.

"I hear that there are some

including nearly 4,000 students from Kashmir. But, I do not know any of them. Here I am all by myself and the embassy has asked me not to venture out far from my hotel. People here are going about their daily lives de-

spite the bombings," Dey said.

But, the anxiety of his relatives back home in Kolkata's Jadavpur where he lives seems to have pushed Dey to take a call to escape Iran by any means possible. "The nearest international border is about a thousand kilometers away, and I understand that a lot of protocol and paperwork would be involved in crossing the land border. But, I have to take that chance since I am running out of means to stay put here, given there is no help from any quarters. I do not know which country I will be crossing over to, because that will depend on India's diplomatic relations with these neighbouring na tions," he stated.

Meanwhile, all Indians in Tehran were Tuesday advised to move out of the city to safe locations and be in touch with the embassy, as the conflict between Iran and Israel intensified.

Hi-tech tools launched to curb Delhi pollution

New Delhi, June 17: Delhi Chief Minister Rekha Gupta and Environment Minister Manjinder Singh Sirsa Monday took part in a demonstration of new machines aimed at tackling pollution in the city.

The chief minister during the event said that the government had decided to hire machines like mechanical road sweepers. water sprinklers and anti-smog guns to reduce dust and air pollution in Delhi.

'We plan to send these machines to every assembly constituency so that the roads can be cleaned properly," she added. Gupta said these cleaning machines are advanced and come in different types, including

electric ones.

"We are trying to use electric machines so that they don't cause more pollution," she added. The Mechanical Road Sweeping (MRS) machines being introduced can sweep roads, spray water and pick up garbage. Earlier May 20, the chief minister had announced that the Cabinet had approved a detailed plan to control dust and



managed by the Public Works Department (PWD).

According to the plan, the PWD will use 250 water sprinklers with anti-smog guns, 70 sweeping machines with 210 sprinklers and anti-smog guns along with 18 dump trucks and 18 water tankers.

A number of machines, including water sprinklers with anti-smog guns, electric and CNG sweeping machines, litter pickers and water jetting machines, were demonstrated at the Delhi Secretariat here, said

The chief minister said the goal is to ensure that roads across Delhi are cleaned and sprayed with water throughout the year.

The demonstration shows that the government is moving towards more modern and technology-based cleaning, she added. One of the machines shown during the event was a water sprinkler with an anti-smog gun. It can hold 17,000 litres of water and run for four hours. It sprays a fine mist that helps reduce harmful dust in the air and

can even clean off dust from tall trees, the statement said.

An electric road sweeping machine with a 3.5-metre sweep ing range can clean up to 45 km in one shift. It has a water tank that can be expanded up to 2,000 ing dust, small stones and litter from roads, it added.

The CNG-powered sweeping machine is similar and works at a speed of 8 to 10 kilometres per hour, the statement said.

A battery-operated litter pick er was also on display.

It can be used while riding or walking and it comes with a bin and features like automat ic brakes, fire safety, GPS and battery tracking. It can collect everything from small waste to glass bottles, the statement said

The water jetting machine has a 500-litre tank and car work for six to eight hours after one charge, covering up to 125 km. It also has GPS for monitor ing, it added.

The chief minister said Del hi will get 460 sprinkler ma chines with anti-smog guns 70 sweeping machines, 70 lit ter pickers, water tankers and garbage trucks.

Banerjee said a detailed in-

vestigation and assessment of the damage caused by the pre-dawn blaze at the nearly 150-year-old market would be carried out.

"I have spoken to the mayor

and a new market will be constructed at the affected site with a modern, scientific and safe design, including a proper fire management system. You will not have to spend anything. The government will build this market so that you don't face problems in the future," she assured the affected traders.

The chief minister, who left the state Assembly for a visit to the fire-ravaged site a few hours after the flames were doused, also announced financial aid to shop owners based on the extent of damage.

"Traders whose shops were completely destroyed will receive ₹1 lakh, covering the cost of reconstruction and materials. Those who suffered partial damage will receive ₹50,000 in assistance. These amounts will be disbursed only after relocation," she said.

To help affected traders continue business. Baneriee said the market will be temporarily relocated to a nearby site till a new structure is built.

"We are finalising the relocation site in consultation with the councillor and the mayor. A spot has already been identified. Your market will be temporarily shifted there so that your business, livelihood, and family life can continue without major interruption," she said.

Banerjee said a survey will be conducted to identify the beneficiaries, and that no new person will be allocated shops in the proposed market.

In Delhi, only 3% of year sees clean air, thermal comfort



New Delhi, June 17: Only three per cent of the hours in a year in Delhi offer both clean air and thermally comfortable conditions necessary for safe natural ventilation, according to a new study.

The study, conducted by CEPT University and climate-tech firm Respirer Living Sciences, found that Delhi records around 2,210 thermally comfortable hours with outdoor temperature in the range of 18 degrees Celsius to 31 degrees Celsius.

But 1,951 of those hours also coincide with poor air quality (air quality index above 150). That leaves just 259 hours in the year, about three per cent, when residents can enjoy both clean air and pleasant temperatures.



ventilation. Compared to Delhi, Bangalore fared much better with over 8,100 hours of acceptable air quality and minimal overlap between thermal comfort and pollution. Ahmedabad, despite being warmer, also offered more usable outdoor conditions.

However, Chennai, like Delhi, saw 88 per cent of its comfortable hours affected by poor air quality. The researchers said the study shows that convergence of heat and pollution

is becoming widespread across Indian metros. Conventional building operations, either based on fully sealed air-conditioned spaces or unfiltered natural ventilation, no longer meet the needs of urban India, they said.

To address the challenge, the study recommends mainstreaming Personalised Environmental Control Systems (PECS) in Indian buildings.

These systems offer filtered ventilation, occupant-level control and localised thermal comfort and are especially useful in mixed-mode buildings that shift between natural and mechanical ventilation based on time of day, season or pollution levels.

"PECS (ventilation) contributes to both short-term and longterm health and energy performance outcomes," said Rajan Rawal of CEPT University, a leading building science expert.

'With ongoing improvements in AQI across Indian cities. there is growing potential for occupants to utilise natural ventilation when outdoor conditions permit. Nevertheless, PECS continues to offer substantial energy savings under prevailing conditions," he said.

The modelling by researchers found that PECS can save up to 72 per cent energy used for ventilation in Chennai, 70 per cent in Ahmedabad and 68 per cent in Delhi, compared to conventional air-conditioned setups.

"PECS work especially well in conjunction with low-energy solutions like ceiling fans and task-based ventilation," Rawal

Road accidents claim 577 lives in first 5 months of 2025

New Delhi, June 17: Even as fatal road crashes in the national capital dropped in number during the first five months of 2025 compared to the same period last year, the death toll on the city's roads remains alarmingly high, claiming nearly four lives every day, official data reveals.

According to figures shared by Delhi Police, 2,235 road accidents were reported between January and May this year, resulting in 577 fatalities and 2,187 injuries.

While this marks a slight dip in overall accidents from 2,322 cases and 652 deaths reported during the same period in 2024, the national capital still faces a major challenge in curbing road violence. Moreover, the total num-

ber of people injured in road accidents has seen a gradual increase from 2.106 injured in the first five months of 2024 to 2,187 this year. March stood out as the dead-

liest month this year, recording 137 fatal accidents and 139 deaths. Surprisingly, even as April saw fewer fatal crashes with 91 such accidents, it re ported the highest number of injuries -- 476 this year -- indicating a rise in high-impact collisions.

A total of 458 accidents, including 100 fatal ones resulting in 107 deaths and 458 injuries were recorded in May 2025 The figures in May last year stood slightly higher with 447 total accidents, including 125 fatal resulting in 127 deaths.

Cong questions govt's intention

New Delhi, June 17: The Congress Tuesday accused the Centre of delaying the caste census, saying its intention appears to be to "buy time, grab headlines and manage the narrative", and asked the government to be transparent about the exercise.

Congress general secretary Sachin Pilot said the objective cannot just be to collect data on an individual's caste but to understand the living conditions of these families and create policies to substantially improve their livelihoods. He said there are doubts

about the government's intentions on the caste census and pointed out that the required funding for the census is Rs 10.000 crore whereas the government has allocated only Rs 574 crore. His remarks come a day after a Home Ministry spokesperson made it clear that the census will include caste enumeration, following the Congress' charge that the government notification is "silent" on the inclusion of caste in the exercise.

"The demand for a caste census was led by the Congress party, particularly by the Leader of Opposition in Lok Sabha, Rahul Gandhi, who has been raising this issue for several years. "Due to the party's continuous and forceful demand. the Modi government has yielded and announced a caste census. However, the facts and figures tell a different story," Pilot said at a press conference at the Congress' Indira Bhawan headquarters here Tuesday.

The government plans to start the exercise in 2027,

but the required funding for the census is Rs 10,000 crore, whereas the government has allocated only Rs 574 crore, he pointed out. "The objective is not just to collect data on an individual's caste but to understand the living conditions of these families and create policies to substantially improve their livelihoods. Without tangible data, no state or central government can implement targeted interventions, which is what we aimed to achieve,

Initially, the BJP labelled us as "urban naxals" and refused to accept these demands and now, sensing the country's mood, they have accepted the proposal in principle, he said. "However, there seems to be considerable confusion and dissatisfaction regarding it. Therefore, I urge the government to be clear and transparent, avoiding extended deadlines and inadequate budget allocations," Pilot said.

4 states account for half of India's low birth weight case: Study

New Delhi, June 17: Cases of a low weight at birth from four states -- Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Maharashtra, and West Bengal -- account for nearly half of India's cases, despite an overall progress in lowering rates over the last 30 years, an analysis of the National Family Health Survey shows.

The findings are published in the British Medical Journal (BMJ) Global Health. Having a low birth weight -- under 2.5 kg -- can often signal a mother's underlying health issues and poor nutrition, and has been linked with problems in the

child's cognitive development

and a vulnerability to chronic conditions in later life

Analysing data gathered from all five waves of the national survey, researchers from Duke and Harvard universities in the US and institutes in South Korea found that overall, the prevalence of low birth weight in India fell by eight percentage points -- from 26 in 1993 to 18 in 2021.

State-wise, the average prevalence was seen to decline across the five waves of the survey from 25 per cent in 1993 and 1999 to 20 per cent in 2006, and 16 per cent in 2021, when the last wave concluded.

Analysis of data from the fifth wave (2019-21) suggests



that 42 lakh babies were born with a low weight in a single vear, almost half (47 per cent) of which came from only four states -- Uttar Pradesh, Bihar,



to 18 per cent during the period. The 2019-21 survey revealed that four states, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Maharashtra, and West Bengal, accounted for almost half of all low-birthweight births in India.

The data from the fifth wave also showed that babies having both a lower weight and a smaller-than-average size at birth were "considerably more likely" to be born to women with little or no formal education and from the poorest households. The team also highlighted the need for continued efforts in addressing maternal and neonatal health disparities and called for improved data collection at healthcare facilities, which can provide quality data for decision-making across India. Recorded births were found to increase from 48,959 in 1993 to 2,32,920 in 2021. Proportion of babies weighed at birth increased over time, resulting in 7,992 being included in the analysis in 1993 (16 per cent) to 209,266 in 2021 (90 per cent), the authors said.

Indian students moved out of Tehran, says MEA



Tehran, June 17: Amid escalating tensions between Israel and Iran, Indian students in Tehran have been moved out of the city, with 110 of them crossing the border into Armenia as part of arrangements made by the embassy.

The Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) said in a statement that the Indian Embassy remains in touch with the community with a view to extend all feasible assistance. At a press briefing here later in the evening, Israeli Ambassador Reuven Azar was asked if any request for the evacuation of Indian nationals in Israel has been received by his country. "We are full coordinating

with the MEA, and when it comes to request for Indians to evacuate, we are starting to organise now through our ministry of transport... commute for diplomats, foreign citizens who want to leave, there are few options, terrestrial and maritime, and we are coordinating," he said. So far, 24 people have been killed in Israel and hundreds injured, Azar said when asked about the casualties in his country in this military flare-up. Earlier in the day, the MEA said in its statement, "Indian students in Tehran have been moved out of the city for reasons of safety. through arrangements made by the Embassy.

Separately, some Indians have been facilitated to leave Iran through the border with Armenia, the MEA said, adding that further advisories may be issued given the fluid

According to the Jammu and Kashmir Students Association, 110 Indian students from Urmia Medical University, 90 of them from the Kashmir Valley,

have safely crossed the border into Armenia. In a post on X, the Indian Embassy in Iran said, "All Indian Nationals and PIOs who can move out of Tehran using their own resources, are advised to move to a safe location outside

In another statement, the MEA said a 24x7 control room has been established in the ministry in view of the ongoing developments in Iran and Israel. govt for stalling 'Thug Life'

New Delhi, June 17: Coming down heavily on the Karnataka government after actor Kamal Haasan's film "Thug Life" was not screened in theatres in the state, the Supreme Court Tuesday said mob and vigilantes cannot be allowed to take over streets.

A bench of Justices Ujjal Bhuyan and Manmohan said the rule of law ought to be established and guns cannot be put to people's heads to stop them from watching the movie.

"We can't allow mobs and vigilantes to take over the streets. The rule of law must prevail. We can't allow this to happen. If somebody has made a statement, counter it with a statement. if somebody has written something, you can counter it by some writing," Justice Bhuyan told the Karnataka government's counsel and directed him to file a response on the matter by June 18. While people may not watch the movie if it is screened, they cannot be put to fear that theaters will be burnt down, the bench added. Advocate A Velam, appearing for petitioner M Mahesh Reddy, who challenged the film's non screening in Karnataka, said the state hadn't filed complaints against those issuing threats.

Justice Manmohan said, "Rule of law demands that any film which has a CBFC certificate



has to ensure its screening. You cannot put a gun on people's head and say don't watch the movie." The judge went on, "It can't be that at the fear of burning down the cinemas, that the film can't be shown. People may not watch the film. That is a different matter. We are not passing any order that people must watch the film. But the film must be released.'

The counsel representing Karnataka said a plea filed by the film producer was scheduled to come up for hearing in the high court June 20. The bench then indicated to transfer the petition pending before the high court to the apex court.

It was also critical of the observations made by the high ogy from Haasan for his remark suggesting that "Kannada was born out of Tamil".

"It is none of the business of the high court to seek an apology from him (actor)," Justice Manmohan said.

The judge continued, "This issue is concerning the rule of law and fundamental rights. Therefore, this court is intervening. That is what the Supreme Court is meant for to be a custodian of the rule of law and fundamental rights. It is not just about a film." The bench said if Haasan had uttered anything inconvenient it couldn't be tak en as gospel truth and the enlightened people of Karnataka should have debated and said he

harashtra government had introduced a policy called in 2018

to provide a monthly honorarium to such persons in recognition of their sacrifices under its "Gaurav Yojana".

At present, there are around 3,000 beneficiaries of the scheme in the state. As per the revised policy, individuals who were imprisoned for more than one month during the Emergency will now receive ₹20,000 per month, while their surviving spouse (in case of the death of the individual who was imprisoned) will be eligible for ₹10,000 per month.

Those who were jailed for less than a month will receive ₹10.000 per month, while their surviving spouse will get ₹5,000.

In order to claim the hono rarium, the surviving spouses must submit a fresh applica tion to the respective District Collector offices. If the Emer gency-era detainees passed away before January 2, 2018, their surviving spouse can still apply by submitting an affidavit along with the appli cation, the chief minister's of fice (CMO) said in a statement The application window will

remain open for 90 days from the issuance of the government resolution, it said. The cabinet also scrapped the earlier condition that the applicant must have been at least 18 years old at the time of arrest during the Emergency, it added.

Russian attack on **Ukraine kills 15**

Kviv: An overnight Russian missile and drone bombardment of Ukraine killed 15 people and injured 156, local officials said Tuesday, with the main barrage demolishing a nine-story Kyiv apartment building in the deadliest attack on the capital this year. At least 14 people were killed as explosions echoed across the Ukrainian capital for almost nine hours, Kyiv City Military Administration head Tymur Tkachenko said, destroying dozens of apartments. Russia fired more than 440 drones and 32 missiles, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy said.

China to commission third aircraft carrier

Beijing: China plans to operationalise its third aircraft carrier 'Fujian' this year as it vears of sea trials, setting the stage for the Chinese navy for the first time to operate three carrier groups, official media reported on Tuesday. Fujian, stated to be China's most advanced aircraft carrier possessing the electromagnetic aircraft launch system (EMALS) similar to that of the American aircraft carrier USS Gerald R Ford, was launched in 2024 and since then completed multiple sea trials, accumulating more than 100 days of sea trials. The entry of the carrier with more than 80,000 tons carrying a wide variety of carrier-borne aircraft, including fighter jets, early warning aircraft, antisubmarine aircraft and drones will enable China to enter a new era of three aircraft carriers, state-run CCTV reported.

Khamenei sees his inner circle hollowed out by Israel

Dubai/London, June 17: Iran's 86-year-old Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei cuts an increasingly lonely

Khamenei has seen his main military and security advisers killed by Israeli air strikes, leaving major holes in his inner circle and raising the risk of strategic errors, according to five people familiar with his decision-making process.

One of those sources, who regularly attends meetings with Khamenei, described the risk of miscalculation to Iran on issues of defence and internal stability as "extremely dangerous".

Several senior military commanders have been killed since Friday including Khamenei's main advisers from the Revolutionary Guards, Iran's elite military force: the Guards' overall commander Hossein Salami, its aerospace chief Amir Ali Hajizadeh who headed Iran's ballistic missile program and spymaster Mohammad Kazemi.

These men were part of the supreme leader's inner circle of roughly 15-20 advisers comprising Guards commanders, clerics, and politicians, according to the sources who include three people who attend or have attended meetings with the leader on major issues and two close to officials who regularly attend.

The loose group meets on an ad-hoc basis, when Khamenei's office reaches out to relevant advisers to gather at his compound in Tehran to discuss an important decision, all the people said. Members are characterised by unwavering loyalty to him and the ideology of the Islamic Republic, they added.

Khamenei, who was imprisoned before the 1979 revolution and maimed by a bomb attack before becoming leader in 1989, is profoundly committed to maintaining Iran's Islamic system of government and deeply



mistrustful of the West.

Under Iran's system of government he has supreme command of the armed forces, the power to declare war, and can appoint or dismiss senior figures including military commanders and judges

Khamenei makes the final decision on important matters, though he values advice, listens attentively to diverse viewpoints, and often seeks additional information from his counsellors, according to one source who attends meetings.

"Two things you can say about Khamenei: he is extremely stubborn but also extremely cautious. He is very cautious. That is why he has been in power for as long as he has,' said Alex Vatanka, director of the Iran Program at the Middle East Institute think-tank in Washington.

"Khamenei is pretty well placed to do the basic cost-benefit analysis which really fundamentally gets to one issue more important than anything else: regime survival.

AIRPORTS CLOSE ACROSS MIDEAST

Beirut: After Israeli strikes landed near the hotel where he was staving in the Irani an province of Qom, Aimal Hussein desperately wanted to return home. But the 55-year-old Afghan businessman couldn't find a way, with Iranian airspace completely shut down. He fled to Tehran after the strike Sunday, but no taxi would take him to the border as the conflict between Iran and Israel intensified. "Flights, markets, everything is closed, and I am living in the basement of a



Associated Press by cellphone Monday. "I am trying to get to the border by taxi, but they are hard to find, and no one is taking us." Israel launched a major attack Friday with strikes in the Iranian capital of Tehran and elsewhere, killing senior military officials, nuclear scientists, and destroying critical infrastructure. Among the targets was a nuclear enrichment facility about 18 miles from Qom. Iran has retaliated with hundreds of drones and missiles. The dayslong attacks between the two bitter enemies have opened a new chapter in their turbulent recent history. Many in the region fear a wider conflict as they watch waves of attacks across their skies every night. The conflict has forced most countries in the Middle East to close their airspace. Dozens of airports have stopped all flights or severely reduced operations, leaving tens of thousands of passengers stranded and others unable to flee the conflict or travel home.

Trump quashes US spies' claim that Iran wasn't building nuclear weapon

Washington, June 17: Tulsi Gabbard left no doubt when she testified to Congress about Iran's nuclear programme ear lier this year. The country was not building a nuclear weapon the national intelligence direc tor told lawmakers, and its supreme leader had not reautho rised the dormant programme

But President Donald Trum dismissed the assessment of US spy agencies during an over night flight back to Washington as he cut short his trip to the Group of Seven (G7) summit to focus on the escalating conflict between Israel and Iran.

"I don't care what she said," Trump told reporters. In his view, Iran was "very close" to having a nuclear bomb.

Trump's statement aligned him with Israeli Prime Minis ter Benjamin Netanyahu, who has described a nuclear-armed Iran as an imminent threat rather than with his own top in telligence adviser. The Repub lican president was expected to meet with national security of ficials in the Situation Room on Tuesday as he plans next steps

Trump's contradiction of Gabbard echoed his feuds with US spy leaders during his first term, when he viewed them as part of a "deep state" that was undermining his agenda. Most notably, he sided with Russian President Vladimir Putin in 2018 when asked if Moscow had inter fered in the 2016 election, saying Putin was "extremely strong and powerful in his denial."

The latest break over Iran was striking because Trump has staffed his second admin istration with loyalists rather than establishment figures Gabbard, a military veterar and former Democratic con gresswoman from Hawaii, was narrowly confirmed by the Re publican-controlled Senate because of her scant experience with intelligence or managing sprawling organisations.

Israeli tanks kill 59 trying to get aid in Gaza

Cairo/Gaza, June 17: Israeli to get aid from trucks in Gaza Tuesday, killing at least 59 people, according to medics, in one of the bloodiest incidents yet in mounting violence as desperate residents struggle for food.

Video shared on social media showed around a dozen mangled bodies lying in a street in Khan Younis in the southern Gaza Strip. The Israeli military, at war with Hamas-led Palestinian militants in Gaza since October 2023, acknowledged firing in the area and said it was looking into the incident.

Witnesses interviewed by Reuters said Israeli tanks had launched at least two shells at a crowd of thousands who had gathered on the main eastern road through Khan Younis in the hope of obtaining food from aid trucks that use the route.



"All of a sudden, they let us move forward and made evervone gather, and then shells started falling, tank shells," said Alaa, an eyewitness, interviewed by Reuters at Nasser Hospital, where wounded victims lay sprawled on the floor and in corridors due to the lack of space.

"No one is looking at these people with mercy. The people are dying, they are being torn apart, to get food for their children. Look at these people, all these people are torn to get flour to feed their children."

Palestinian medics said at least 59 people were killed and 221 wounded in the incident, at least 20 of them in critical condition. Casualties were be ing rushed into the hospital in civilian cars, rickshaws and donkey carts. It was the worst death toll in a single day since aid resumed in Gaza in May.

In a statement, the Israeli military said: "Earlier today, a gathering was identified adjacent to an aid distribution truck that got stuck in the area of Khan Younis, and in proximity to IDF troops operating in the area. The IDF is aware of reports regarding a number of injured individuals from IDF fire following the crowd's approach. The details of the incident are under review. The IDF regrets any harm to uninvolved individuals and operates to minimise harm as much as possible to them while maintaining the safety of our troops.

Now we are 6: G7 leaders after Trump's early exit

Kananaskis (Canada), June 17: Six of the Group of Seven leaders are trying on the final day of their summit Tuesday to show the wealthy nations' club still has the clout to shape world events despite the early departure of President Donald

Prime Minister Mark Carney and his counterparts from the UK, France, Germany, Italy and Japan will be joined by Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy and NATO chief Mark Rutte to discuss Russia's relentless war on its neighbour.

World leaders had gathered in Canada with the specific goal of helping to defuse a series of pressure points, only to be disrupted by a showdown over Iran's nuclear programme that could escalate in dangerous and uncontrollable ways. Israel launched an aerial bombardment campaign against Iran Friday, and Iran has hit back with missiles and drones.

Trump left the summit in the Canadian Rocky Mountain resort of Kananaskis a day early late Monday, saying: "I have to be back, very important." It came as conflict between Israel and Iran intensifies and the US leader declared that Tehran should be evacuated "immediately" — while also expressing optimism about a deal to stop the violence.

Before leaving, Trump joined the other leaders in issuing a statement saying Iran "can never have a nuclear weapon' and calling for a "de-escalation of hostilities in the Middle East, including a ceasefire in Gaza. Getting unanimity — even on a short and broadly worded statement — was a modest measure of success for the group.

At the summit, Trump warned that Tehran needs to curb its nuclear programme before it's "too late." He said

Iranian leaders would "like to talk" but they had already had 60 days to reach an agreement on their nuclear ambitions and failed to do so before the Israe li aerial assault began. "They

World's most trafficked mammal pangolin is endangered in US

Washington, June 17: US officials proposed Monday to protect the pangolin, a small, nocturnal mammal covered in scales, under the Endangered Species Act.

The pangolin is "the most trafficked mammal in the world" in large part for its scales, used in traditional Chinese medicine, and meat, according to the World Wildlife Fund. The US Fish and Wildlife Service is looking to add protections for four species of the pangolin native to Asia — including the Chinese, Indian, Sunda and Philippine pangolin — and three species native to Africa, including the white-bellied, black-bellied and giant pangolin. Seven species are in danger of extinction, according to the Center for Biological Diversity.

An eighth species from Africa, the Temminck's ground pangolin, is already protected by the law. Scientists also say two more species of the mammal may exist. The protections were signed into law in 1973 with bipartisan support and are key for preserving global biodiversity and keeping iconic types of plants and animals, such as the bald eagle, from dving out. The Endangered Species Act protects over 2,000 US and foreign species. Conservation and environmental groups say habitat loss from climate change is just one reason the

act is especially critical today. The endangerment listing, once finalized, would help strengthen trade and import restrictions of pangolin parts in the US, except in the case of

scientific or other conservation

purposes, according to the Cen-

tre. It is illegal to trade them: the pangolin received certain commercial trade protections under the 2017 Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species. But tons of poached scales representing thousands of pangolin have been found by authorities around the world in recent years.

"I'm delighted the United States is doing its part to save these adorably odd creatures, Sarah Uhlemann, international program director at the Centre for Biological Diversity, said in a statement. "Pangolins are on the razor's edge of extinction, and we need to completely shut down any US market for their scales. There's no good reason for anybody to ingest any part of a pangolin.'

The pangolin eats insects and rolls into a ball when threatened by predators. The Fish and Wildlife Service said pangolin popu-



lations have declined due to targeting by poachers and criminal activity, noting "proceeds from the illicit sale of pangolins and other imperiled species often fund serious crimes, including drug and arms trafficking."

While the act requires endangered species listing regardless of their origin, the designation could also assist in prosecuting

smugglers violating the protections. Advocates, including from the International Fund for Animal Welfare and other national and international groups, have for years petitioned to list the pangolin. In 2020, these organizations and the Fish and Wildlife Service signed an agreement to enforce listing deadlines.

Google unveils safety charter SEBI bans Sanjiv Bhasin, to combat online fraud

New Delhi, June 17: Google Tuesday unveiled its Safety Charter for India as part of efforts to crack down on online frauds, curb synthetic and misleading content, and promote cybersecurity and responsible AI development.

According to Google, the charter is a blueprint for tackling the online world's new challenges collaboratively with the wider ecosystem. This entails keeping the end user safe from online frauds and scams; cybersecurity for government and enterprise infrastructure; and building AI responsibly.

The move assumes significance as reports indicate a significant surge in cyber frauds. as scammers leverage advanced techniques like AI-generated content, deepfake videos, and voice cloning to create highly convincing fraudulent schemes.

UPI-related frauds reportedly cost Indians over Rs 1.087 crore in 2024, and industry estimates project that Indian entities could lose up to Rs 20,000 crore to cybercrime in 2025, if left unchecked,



as per a Google blogpost.

"It is about building digital safety. As we accelerate India's economic growth, there is one essential connective tissue, and that is trust. While the digital landscape brings many possibilities, we are all aware of the many unique challenges it presents as well." Preeti Lobana, Vice President and Country Manager, Google India, said at 'Safer with Google India Summit'.

Lobana pointed out that while the power of internet is a force multiplier for good elements like safety, security and trust cannot be an "afterthought". As AI increasingly

becomes part of people's digital lives, ensuring a safe and secure online environment becomes important, she added.

"Trust is the bedrock of our digital aspirations and the reason that India's digital economy has become a force multiplier and a growth engine," she noted

Elaborating on the impact of its efforts, Google said under the 'Digikavach' programme, it has reached over 177 million Indians with AI-powered protections and awareness initiatives to combat financial fraud.

In its 149-page interim order, the exchange noted that Bhasin was a well-known media guest expert with a huge following on social media. While associated with IIFL as a director or consultant, Bhasin provided stock recommendations through media channels, Telegram, and II-FL platforms.

Investigation revealed that prior to his appearances on media channels; Bhasin would take positions -- primarily buy orders-- in the trading accounts of Gemini Portfolios, Venus Portfolios, and HB Stock Hold ings Ltd through dealers of the trading member RRB Master Securities Delhi Ltd.

Given the significant view ership of these channels, his stock recommendations had a considerable impact on the price and volume of the rec ommended scrips. Capitaliz ing on this influence, Bhasin would then execute opposite trades (sell orders) in the same accounts, contrary to his public buy recommendations, to profit from the surge in prices of the recommended scrips.

A search and seizure oper ation conducted by Sebi on June 13-14, 2024, across multiple locations in NCR led to the discovery of critical evidence including WhatsApp (social me dia platform) chats and audio recordings.

It was also revealed that Lalit Bhasin, cousin of San iiv Bhasin, aided him and at times, assisted in placing the alleged fraudulent trades Further, Ashish Kapur, MD RRB Master Securities Ltd provided the necessary in frastructure and set-up to facilitate the scheme.



New Delhi, June 17: The National Stock Exchange (NSE) has received the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) approval to shift its expiry day to Tuesday for equity derivatives contracts, while BSE has been assigned Thursday as its expiry

day, the exchanges announced. This marks a swap from current schedule, where NSE conducts F&O (Futures & Options) expiry Thursdays and **BSE Tuesdays**

The new schedule will apply to all new equity derivatives contracts that expire on or after September 1, 2025. Moreover, contracts expiring before this

SEBI has approved NSE's proposal to shift its weekly expiry day for equity derivatives from Thursday to Tuesday. To avoid simultaneous expiries, BSE Sensex expiry will move to **Thursday, effective September 1, 2025**

date will continue to follow the existing expiry schedule.

The exchanges said they would keep the expiry day of derivatives contracts unchanged for already introduced contracts - with the exception of long dated index options contracts for which equity exchanges would suitably realign expiry day.

To support a smooth transition, the exchanges are expected to issue detailed circulars soon, outlining the operational guidelines and implementation process. The move came after SEBI stated that expiries of all equity derivatives contracts across exchanges will be uniformly limited to Tuesdays or Thursdays. SEBI aims, to optimise the spacing between expiries and avoid designating, either the first or last day of the

week as the expiry day. Addi-

tionally, the exchanges will seek its approval before launching or modifying any contract expiry or settlement day.

Earlier in March, Sebi came out with a consultation proposing that the expiries of all equity derivatives contracts across exchanges be uniformly limited to either Tuesdays or Thursdays. Following the consultation paper, the NSE deferred its plan to change the expiry day of all index and stock derivatives to Monday from Thursday until further notice.

The shift, which was scheduled to take effect April 4, 2025, would have seen all index and stock derivative contracts move from Thursday to Monday.

Real estate data analytics firm PropEquity said the new supply stood at 45,901 units in the first quarter of 2024 calendar year. Samir Jasuja, Founder and

CEO of PropEquity, said, "The decline in supply is a result of cautious approach and shifting priorities by developers. Financially robust developers with strong balance sheet look to launch premium homes in order to increase their profit margin.

As per the data, new housing supply in Ahmedabad fell 35 per cent to 11,096 units during January-March 2025 from 17,108 units in the year-ago period.

Gandhinagar saw a decline of 10 per cent in housing supply to 4,356 units from 4,825

'I ruled out Test captaincy'

Leeds, June 17: The peerless Jasprit Bumrah has revealed that he had ruled out Test captaincy during the IPL itself as part of his workload management, and had informed the BCCI of his desire to prioritise his bowling responsbilities over leadership duties

During an interaction with former India wicketkeeper-batter Dinesh Karthik on Sky Sports Cricket, Bumrah explained the thought process behind his decision to turn down the Indian Test captaincy.

"There's no fancy stories to it. There is no controversy or a headlining statement that I was sacked. Before Rohit and Virat retired, I had spoken to the BCCI during the IPL about my workload going forward in a five-match series, Bumrah said.

"I've spoken to the people who have managed my back, I've spoken to the surgeon as well, who's always spoken to me about how smart you have to be about the workloads.'

"And then we came to the conclusion that I have to be a little smarter. So then I called the BCCI and said I don't want to be looked at in a leadership role, because I won't be able to give all matches coming to a five-match Test series," added Bumrah.

After Rohit's retirement and with Bumrah ruling himself out, the BCCI appointed Shubman Gill as the skipper of the Test team with his first assignment being the five-match Test series against England, beginning in Leeds Friday.

During the interaction, Bumrah stressed on the need for continuity in leadership, particularly in a long series, something he would not be able to offer because of his heavy workload as the team's premier bowler.

"The BCCI was looking at me at (a) leadership (role). But then I had to say no as it's not fair for the team as well. It's not fair to the team if in a five-Test series,



three matches somebody else is leading and two matches somebody else is leading.'

"I always wanted to put the team first, even if me being there as a player offers a lot more just not as a captain," Bumrah said.

"Captaincy is a position. But you always have leaders in the team and I wanted to do. Obviously, if I'm not careful, I don't know about the future, and I don't want to be in a situation where I have to abruptly go away from this format.

Bumrah acknowledged that leading the Indian Test team is a huge honour but added that he loves the game more than captaincy.

"Captaincy meant a lot. I had worked very hard for it. But, unfortunately, sometimes you have to look after the bigger picture. I love cricket more than captaincy so I want to contribute more as a cricketer and to the Indian team as a player."

"Obviously ambitions are there but that's how it is and I called the BCCI and said that I don't want to be looked at in a leadership role," said the magnificent fast bowler.

The decision to rename the Pataudi Trophy to Tendulkar-Anderson Trophy was taken by the England and Wales Cricket Board, A formal announcement was due on the sidelines of the WTC final at Lord's last week but it was put off in light of the horrific Air India plane crash in Ahmedahad, Renaming the trophy drew criticism from the likes of former India captain Sunil Gavaskar, However, it has been learned that Tendulkar himself reached out to the ECB and expressed that the Pataudi name should remain a part of India-England cricket, ICC chairman Jay Shah also had a role to play, "When this happened Sachin reached out to ECB and conveyed that Pataudi name should remain a part of the India-England rivalry. Mr Jav Shah was involved in the discussions. ECB has agreed to the request and decided to present Pataudi Medal to the winning captain," said a BCCI source. With the planned ceremony not going ahead in the UK, a formal announcement on the renaming of the trophy is scheduled for June 19, a day before the series-opener at Leeds. Tendulkar is the leading run getter in Test cricket while Anderson has the most wickets in the traditional format as a fast bowler. The Pataudis, on the other hand, have deep ties to the India-England cricketing landscape. Iftikhar Ali Khan Pataudi and his son Mansur both captained India and both played county cricket in England.

England As far as his participation in the England series in concerned, Bumrah is planning to play in at least three Test matches, including the opener at Headingley.

"Obviously, the number is not decided. First (Test) is definitely on, that is going to happen. Rest, we will see how things are, what is the workload and scenario... but yes, 3 Tests is what I can manage at the moment.'

Dubai: India vice-captain Smriti Mandhana Tuesday moved up to the top spot in ICC ODI batting rankings for the first time since 2019 after South Africa skipper Laura Wolvaardt lost 19 rating points in the latest update. Mandhana has a total of 727 rating points followed by England captain Natalie Sciver-Brunt at 719. Wolvaardt is now third with 719 points. The next two Indian batters in the list after Mandhana are Jemimah Rodrigues and skipper Harmanpreet Kaur, who are placed 14th and 15th respectively. India and England are set to face off in five T20Is and three ODIs later this month. While Mandhana has sat inside the top 10 on the list for ODI batters in recent times. the left-hander hasn't held the premier position since the start of 2019 as a drought of more than six years comes to an end.

Moosa-led U-23 team gear up for Tajikistan



New Delhi, June 17: India men's football team will take on hosts Tajikistan in a friendly match Wednesday, kicking off a crucial two-match tour that serves as preparation for the AFC U-23 Asian Cup 2026 Qualifiers later this year.

The match will be played at the Hisor Central Stadium near Dushanbe, with the second fixture against Kyrgyz Republic scheduled for Saturday.

Drawn in Group E alongside Bahrain, Qatar and Brunei Darussalam. India will be aiming to qualify for the continental event for the first time when the qualifiers are held in September.

The ongoing tour is seen as a vital tune-up in terms of acclimatisation, team cohesion, and tactical fine-tuning.

The Naushad Moosa-coached 23-member squad had been in camp in Kolkata since June 1 before flying out to Dushanbe.

After arriving in the Tajik capital Monday evening, the team held a mobility session Tuesday morning and followed it up with a 90-minute evening training session at the venue, which is located around 25 kilometre from the city.

Tajikistan U23s were last in action in November 2024 when they lost two friendlies against United Arab Emirates, both by a 0-3 margin.

At the AFC U23 Asian Cup 2024, Tajikistan were knocked out in the group stage after defeats to Iraq and Saudi Arabia and a win over Thailand.

Moosa, however, is not reading too much into past results hand, "We know Tajikistan are a strong team. They qualified for the U23 Asian Cup last year and also did well at the senior Asian Cup," Moosa stated in AIFF website.

"The players will, of course, be different tomorrow. The coach has changed. We just have to go out there and do our job right," added Moosa.

Despite Dushanbe being lo cated 700 metre above sea level, the weather is hot at this time of the year, soaring to almost 40 degrees during the day.

What the Blue Colts mainly have to adjust to is the artificial turf surface of the Hisor Central Stadium, located 25 kilometre from the city of Dushanbe.

Moosa hoped for a good turn out at the 20,000-capacity venue

"The weather is pretty warm. It's normal for us. It's always good to have supporters in the stands. We would love to have them cheer for us," said Moosa. "Most of our players are com

ing here for the first time, so it

would be great motivation for

them. I think the last time the Indian senior team played in Tajikistan, there were a lot of Indian fans in the stadium, so let's hope for the same.' This tour marks Moosa's second assignment with the India

U-23 side, having previously overseen their two friendlies against Malaysia in Kuala Lum pur last year. The 53-year-old has been

This will be the world's first franchise league in archery and the federation is hopeful of a strong response that will go a long way in developing Indian archers, who are still chasing their maiden Olympic medal.

Netherlands beat Nepal in third Super Over

Glasgow: The Netherlands beat Nepal after an incredible three super overs during a T20 International tri-series match here, the first time in the history of T20 or List A cricket. Michael Levitt struck a six in the third Super Over to eventually give the Netherlands victory here Monday night. Having posted 152 for 7 in their allotted 20 overs, the Dutch looked set for victory with Nepal needing 16 from the final over in the run chase. However, Nepal could only level the scores (152/8) with tailender Nandan Yadav hitting two boundaries, including one from the last ball.

FIFA lifts transfer ban on **Mohun Bagan Super Giant**

Kolkata: The transfer ban on Mohun Bagan Super Giant was Tuesday lifted by the FIFA Disciplinary Committee, clearing the way for the club to sign new players ahead of the upcoming season. The ban, imposed May 5 over non-payment of dues to Australian striker Jason Cummings' former club Central Coast Mariners, was revoked following prompt action by the club. Mohun Bagan had submitted a 107-page

document to FIFA and responded to two subsequent queries from the governing body. "Mohun Bagan submitted a 107-page document to FIFA and thereafter there were two queries, and finally the disciplinary committee has sent a mail lifting the ban," a Mohun Bagan Super Giant official told PTI.

Junior compound archers storm into Asia Cup finals

Singapore, June 17: India's junior compound archers continued their dominant run at the Asian Cup Leg 2, reaching the finals in both the men's and women's individual events here Tuesday.

Top seed Kushal Dalal booked his place in the men's individual compound final after a solid 147-143 win over Himu Bachhar of Bangladesh in the semifinals, confirming at least a silver medal.

Dalal had topped the qualification round with 714 points.

Meanwhile, India's 10th seed Sachin Chechi lost his semifinal to Australia's Joshua Machon and will face Bachhar in the bronze medal match.

In the women's individual compound section, India is assured of a gold and silver as top-seeded Shanmukhi Naga Sai Budde and second seed Tejal Salve will clash in an all-Indian final.

Shanmukhi, who qualified with 706 points, defeated Indonesia's Yurike Nina Bonita Pereira 145-139 in the semifinals.

Teial, who shot 700 in qualification, overcame Malaysia's Fatin Nurfatehah Mat Salleh 147-142 to set up the title clash.

Earlier in the tournament, Indian archers made headlines by setting two world records.

The women's compound team of Shanmukhi, Tejal, and Tanishka Thokal scored 2101 points to set a new team qualification world record.

Europe tour ends with loss to Netherlands **Indian junior** women's hockey team loses shootout thriller

against Netherlands in final match of

Europe tour

Utrecht (Netherlands), June 17: The Indian junior women's hockey team concluded their successful Tour of Europe with a hard-fought match against hosts Netherlands, narrowly losing 2-3 in the shootout after a goalless draw in regulation time.

Coming into the match with four consecutive wins under their belt - three against Belgium and one against Australia - the Indian junior side displayed grit and composure against a technically strong Dutch outfit in what turned out to be a tightly contested encounter.

Despite both teams creating several scoring opportunities over the four quarters, neither side could break the deadlock, thanks to disciplined defending



and impressive goalkeeping at both ends. The match proceeded to a shootout, where Lalrinpuii and Priyanka Yadav converted their chances for India. However, the Netherlands edged ahead with successful strikes from Imme de Leeuw, Roos Alkemade, and Lotte Rust to clinch the 3-2 win in the shootout

While the tour ended with a narrow defeat, the Indian junior women's hockey team can take immense pride in their performances, finishing the European tour with four wins out of five matches and valuable international exposure ahead of future competitions, which includes all important FIH Hockey Women's Junior World Cup 2025, set to take place from December 1 to 13 in the city of Santiago, Chile.

Previously, the team concluded a promising outing at the Four Nations Tournament in Rosario, Argentina.

In Argentina, the Indian side delivered strong performances against quality opposition. They registered a 2-1 win and a 2-2 (2-3 SO) loss against Chile, earned a 1-1 (2-0 SO) win and a 2-4 loss against hosts Argentina, and defeated Uruguay twice - 3-2 and 2-2 (3-1 SO). The tour served as an important step in the team's preparations, offering valuable lessons in handling high-pressure scenarios and adapting to different playing styles.

My goal is to bring tennis back to life: Hitesh

New Delhi, June 17: The 17-year-old Hitesh Chauhan, who recently became the first Indian to reach the second round of the French Open Juniors since 2016, has set his sights on a goal much bigger than winning a Grand Slam - reigniting the diminishing flame of tennis in the country.


In an exclusive conversation, the young talent opened up about his dream of representing India in Grand Slams and breaking into the top 30 of the ATP rankings. For Chauhan. it's not just about personal glory — it's about inspiring a generation and reviving interest in tennis nationwide.

"It's going to be a long, tough iourney. I don't think I'm even halfway there, but through

it all, I just want to make my country, my parents, my coaches, Roundglass -everyoneproud. I want every Indian to see tennis. I want them to see an Indian playing Grand Slams. being in the top 50, and top 30 in the ATP rankings.

"My goal is to bring tennis back to life in India—not at the level of cricket, of course—but to give it the recognition it deserves. I'm ready for the competition, ready for the hard work. And I'm sure I'll be in the top 30—that's my goal," Hitesh told.

In the first round of the French Open Junior men's singles, Hitesh defeated Sweden's Ludvig Fredrik Hede 6-4, 6-3. This was the Indian's first win at a Grand Slam tournament. In the doubles, Hitesh, alongside teammate Havdar Cem Gokpinar (Turkiye), brushed past



Ludvig Hede and Switzerland's Flynn Thomas 7-5, 6-3.

"It was an awesome experience over there. Playing with the champs over there, with the ATP players, No 1 Jannik Sinner, (Carlos) Alcaraz, and all. Then playing where all the ATP players play, on the historic courts over there at

the French Open. And playing with an amazing crowd over there. I will never forget this experience in my whole life,' Hitesh said. In an almost poetic manner, Hitesh's first win at a Grand Slam came during the tournament where his inspiration, Rafael Nadal, was honoured for his stellar career.

"Rafa is an inspiration, I always thought that one day I want to be like him. So I have to face these challenges in my life. That also motivated me a lot, thinking about him, thinking how he played with this much crowd. He also played the French Open when he was 17 years old," he said.

Hitesh's journey at the tournament came to an end when he was handed a 6-1, 6-4 defeat by American Benjamin Willworth. Despite the defeat, Hitesh showed incredible heart and fight by continuing and fighting for each point despite cramping up in the second set. He also revealed how Aditya Sachdeva, his coach at Roundglass Academy, was extremely proud of him and opened up on the heartwarming conversation they shared after the game.

"When I called him after I lost a match, he was like, in my mind, you have won. In my heart, you have won. The match you played today was iust incredible. I'm so proud of you. The whole team, the whole academy, is so proud of you. This, I would not count as a loss. For me, it is a win that you played, even after you were injured. In the third set, you were 4-2 up, and then you got injured You didn't leave. You didn't give up and you gave up every single, every single percentage of yours," Hitesh revealed.

After a memorable French Open, Hitesh now turns his attention towards the pinnacle of Tennis - Wimbledon. The 17-year-old is currently adapting to the grass courts at the Chandigarh Club, as it will be his first time playing on the surface.
