New Delhi, July 8: Banking. postal and other services are likely to face disruption Wednesday as more than 25 crore workers affiliated with Central and sectoral trade unions have announced to go on strike across the country to protest against new labour codes and privatisation, and press for demands such as minimum wage of ₹26,000 and old pension scheme, according to union leaders.

The general strike is expected to disrupt services in sectors like banking, insurance, postal, coal mining, highway and construction, a trade union official said.

The Central Trade Unions such as CITU, INTUC and AI-

TUC are pressing for doing away with the four labour contractualisation, and privatisation of PSUs, increasing minimum wages to ₹26,000 per month, as well as the demands of farmer organisations for Minimum Support Price (MSP) for crops based on Swaminathan Commission's formula of C2 plus 50 per cent and loan waiver.

Sectoral organisations such as the Samyukt Kisan Morcha (SKM) and NREGA Sangharsh Morcha have extended their support to the nationwide strike. RSS-aligned Bharatiya Mazdoor Sangh (BMS), however, will not participate in the general strike, calling it a politically-motivated protest.

Gloomy picture of primary edu

Only 53 % in Class VI know tables up to 10 and a similar percentage of students in Class III can arrange numbers up to 99

Despite Centre's claims about advancements in primary education, particularly regarding the Right to Education Act and increased enrollment rates, ground reality tells a different story if the report of Performance Assessment, Review and Analysis of Knowledge for Holistic Development (PARAKH) Rashtriva Sarvekshan is any indication. The survey covering over 21 lakh students from both government and private schools in Grades 3, 6 and 9, in 781 districts, spanning 36 states and Union Territories paints a gloomy picture. Many students do not achieve grade-level learning standards. So much so that nearly 50 per cent of Class 3 students can arrange numbers up to 99 in ascending or descending order while a similar percentage of students in Class 6 know tables up to 10

in Class 6 know tables up to 10, a Ministry of Education (MoE) survey has found.

The Performance Assessment, Review and Analysis of Knowledge for Holistic Development (PARAKH) Rashtriya Sarvekshan, formerly known as the National Achievement Survey (NAS), was conducted on December 4 last year, covering 21,15,022 students from both government and private schools in Grades 3, 6 and 9, across 74,229 schools in 781

districts, spanning 36 states and Union Territories.

The survey said 1,15,022 children from the three grades were assessed and 2,70,424 teachers and school leaders responded through questionnaires.

According to the report, only 55 per cent of students in Class 3 can arrange numbers up to 99 in ascending or descending order while 58 per cent of the students can perform addition and subtraction of two-digit

In Class 6, only 53 per cent of students understand and visualise arithmetic operations and the relationships among them, know addition and multiplication tables at least up to 10 and apply the four basic operations on whole numbers to solve daily life problems.

In Class 6, an additional subject 'The World Around Us', which covers environment and society, was introduced alongside Language and Mathematics. Students scored lowest in Mathematics (46 per cent). while Language averaged 57 per cent and The World Around Us scored 49 per cent nationally.

According to Ministry of Education officials, instances where less than 50 per cent of students were able to answer correctly indicate learning gaps.

"These learning gaps highlight the need for focused interventions to strengthen students' skills, refine instructional strategies, and provide additional learning support. Addressing these areas effectively will help improve overall student learning outcomes

in the nation," an official said. In the case of Class 3, central government schools recorded the lowest performance in Mathematics.

Similarly, in the case of Class 6, government-aided and state government schools showed weaker performance, especially in Mathematics.

In Class 9, students from Central Government schools performed the best across all subjects, with a clear lead in Language. State government and gov-

ernment-aided schools recorded similar outcomes, with the lowest performance observed in Mathematics. Language was the highest-scoring subject for all school types, while Mathematics consistently remained the weakest.

A significant rural-urban divide was also observed. While Class 3 students in the rural areas performed better in both Mathematics and Language, children of Classes 6 and 9 in the urban areas outperformed their rural counterparts across all subjects.

Musk's X alleges press censorship in India

New Delhi, July 8: Social media platform X, owned by Elon Musk, Tuesday said that they were "deeply concerned" over "ongoing press censorship" in India as blocking orders were issued against two handles of the international news agency Reuters.

The Global Government Affairs account of X stated in a lengthy post that July 3, the Indian government ordered X (formerly Twitter) to block 2,355 accounts in the country. including news outlets like @ Reuters and @ReutersWorld,

under Section 69A of the IT Act. It further stated that the government warned it of "criminal liability" if it did not comply with the orders adding that the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting sought that the order must be complied with within an hour.

It claimed that the Indian government requested X to unblock @Reuters and @ReutersWorld only after a public outcry. It urged users in India



remedies against such orders. According to media reports quoting an official, the govern ment did not have any reason to withhold the two X handles of Reuters, adding that they were

issues" and the government

was working with X to resolve

the problem. The reports further stated that apart from Reuters, X accounts of other international news agencies like Turkev's TRT World and China's Global Times News were also not ac cessible in India since Saturday

evening. However, all of them were accessible within 24 hours, reported the Hindustan Times However, later in the day the official spokesperson, Ministry of Electronics and Information

Technology denied having issued any such blocking orders July 3.

448 suspected Bangladeshis, Rohingyas held

Bhubaneswar, July 8: Intensifying its crackdown on Bangladeshis and Rohingyas living illegally in the state, police Tuesday held 448 people for verification of their documents, an officer said. While the police in Jagatisnghpur district detained four members of a family residing in the port town of Paradip, 444 persons were brought to two locations for their identification in Jharsuguda district.

"These 444 people in Jharsuguda district are not exactly detained but kept in wait till their documents are verified. We doubt that many of them do not have valid documents to stay in the country," Himanshu Lal, IGP Northern

Range Sambalpur, told PTI. Similarly, Paradip Lock police station IIC Rashmiranjan Das, said that the four persons were picked up from Zardari Pada area and taken for detention. "They have confessed to have entered India by crossing a river from Bangladesh and staved for some time in Kolkata before coming to Paradip," the officer said.







Bharat Bandh: Trade unions flay labour codes

Pervices including banking, insurance, postal, coal mining and others will be affected Wednesday as more than 25 crore workers are all set to participate in a nationwide agitation, opposing, what they say, the anti-worker, anti-farmer, and anti-national pro-corporate policies of the Union government aimed at weakening the collective bargaining power of trade unions. A forum of 10 central trade unions which is organising the 'Bharat Bandh' alleged that their 17-point charter of demands submitted to Labour Minister Mansukh Mandaviya last year was ignored by the government. Their key demands include filling up of sanctioned posts, creation of additional employment opportunities, withdrawal of the Union government's four labour codes, hike in both the number of workdays and remuneration for MGNREGA workers, and introduction of a similar legislation for urban areas. Speaking to Orissa POST correspondent Manoj Kumar Jena, several trade union leaders shared their views on the bandh

All India United Trade Union Centre (AIUTUC) state secretary Jayasen Meher said, "After coming to power, the BJP has been trying to take

away the rights of the trade unions and the workers. This government has scrapped 29 out of 51 labour laws to favour capitalists. We want the government to withdraw the four labour codes."

Mahendra Parida, state

Mahendra Parida, state general secretary of All India Central Council of Trade Unions (AICCTU), said, "10 central trade unions have united against the government to fulfil their 17-point charter of demands and oppose the labour codes. Be-

sides, we also demand increase in minimum wage of labourers and ensure proper job security for workers. The government should also stop privatisation of national properties."



State president and national vice president of Indian National Trade Union Congress (IN-TUC), Ramachandra Khuntia, said, "Many labour union federations, including those in banking and farm sectors, will participate in this protest to pitch for withdrawal of four labour codes. The government is forcing us to hit the streets as it has been ignoring our demands for the last two years. We demand implementation of old pension scheme. We also demand regularisation of the services of contractual workers."

Parilata Mohapatra, state secretary-cum-district coordinator of Self-Employed Women's

ployed Women's Association (SE-WA), said, "If the four labour codes are implemented, it will take a heavy toll

on women workers. If a woman is working in an unorganised sector, she has no official identity. As per the labour codes, maternity leave is applicable only if more than 20 labourers are working in the organisation concerned. A casual worker will be deprived of maternity leave benefit and there should be wage parity as well."

AITUC state general secretary Bijaya Kumar Jena said, "The four labour codes of

labour codes of the Union government will benefit the owners/capitalists and affect the labourers from

various sectors. The government should immediately withdraw this law and fulfil all our

Hind Mazdoor Sabha (HMS) state general secretary **Pravat Tripathy** said, "The govern-

ment is trying to snatch away the rights of labourers through the four labour codes. To oppose this, the labourers have united

for a nationwide protest. We demand the minimum monthly wage be fixed at Rs 26,000, as per the country's price index.

We believe that the Central government will withdraw the four labour codes after our protest."

Trade Union Coordination Centre's (TUCC) state president **Jyoti Ranjan Mohapatra** said. "This

(strike) is also an attempt to protect the rights of common man. The Central government could have averted this

nationwide agitation by holding discussions with us. Howev-

er, it is yet to respond. Around 2 crore workers from Odisha will take part in this protest. We oppose the 12-hour-a-day work as per the new labour law. We demand the government to protect the rights of its citizens."

Centre of Indian Trade Unions (CITU) state president **Janardan Pati** said, "This is for the 23rd time that Indian

labour force is going to participate in a nationwide strike. The BJP government continues to attack on the working class by

eliminating 15 out of 44 labour laws. The rest they have categorised into labour code which will heavily impact the working class. The government is focused on privatisation which we condemn."

Suresh Chandra Panigrahi said, "All sections of the soci-

ety are opposing this labour law which will eventually have a negative impact on the economy. Instead of focusing on the betterment of the working class, the

government is serving crass, the government is serving crony capitalists."

"Our rasagola is totally different from that of Bengal. Bengal's rasagola came into existence in 1868, while the sweet originated here over 500 years ago. There is mention of rasagola in the Dani Ramayan written by Balaram Das," he asserted.

Maintaining that for centuries devotees have offered rasagola to Lord Jagannath on 'Niladri Bije', Mohanty said there should be no debate on its origin. "Let Bengal enjoy its rasagola and we ours," he said.

Bhubaneswar, July 8: "Evervone should work together. 'Impossible' is not in our vocabulary—everything is possible. The party will firmly support the government led by Mohan Charan Majhi," said Odisha BJP president Manmohan Samal. Tuesday.

He made the statement while addressing party workers and leaders during a grand felicitation held in his honour following his reappointment as state president for a fourth term.

Samal reflected on the BJP's journey in Odisha, noting that a party once dismissed as a 'signboard' by opponents has now, after years of struggle, formed a government on its own in the

He further stated that the BJP government will continue its journey through 2036, when Odisha marks 100 years of its formation, and 2047, the centenary of India's Independence. "To achieve this vision, we must work with unity and team spirit," he added.

Samal's reappointment was announced by BJP central election observer Sanjay Jaiswal in the presence of senior party leaders at the state headquarters. Jaiswal informed that Samal was the sole nominee



for the post and was therefore elected unopposed.

This will be Samal's second consecutive term and his fourth overall. His previous terms were from November 1999 to October 2000, October 2000 to May 2004, and March 2023 to

CM Mohan Charan Majhi welcomed Samal and described him as 'lucky' for BJP. "When Samal was president of BJP in 2000, the party formed government, though in coalition with BJD. Later when Samal took charge during the 2024 elections, the BJP formed its maiden government alone. Therefore, Samal is lucky for

the BJP," Majhi said. The CM said he is a four-time MLA and Samal is a four-time

BJP state president. "The power of this combine can defeat

any force," Majhi said "The BJP is in power for 11 years at the Centre and one year in the state. Taking them together, it is 12. But it will reach 112 in the future. The party and the government are two sides of one coin," the CM said.

Puri MP Sambit Patra said, "The government has 3 Ms -Manmohan, Mohan and Modi - at the helm.'

Born April 15, 1959, in Bhadrak district, Samal belongs to the OBC community, which constitutes more than 50 per cent of the state's popu-

He joined politics as a student and was elected the students' union president of Bhadrak College in 1979 as a member of the Akhil Bharatiya Vidyarthi

Parishad (ABVP). He rose through the ranks and was made a minister in the BJD-BJP coalition government headed by Naveen Patnaik in the early 2000s. He held portfolios such as Revenue and Disaster Management, and Food Sup-

plies and Consumer Welfare. He was then an MLA from


the Dhamnagar constituency. BJP insiders said Samal's reappointment for a record fourth term to the post was a reward by the Central leadership for his role in bringing the party to power in the state last year by routing the BJD government of 24 years.

He was made the state president on an ad-hoc basis in 2023, barely a year ahead of the elections. Within a short span of time, his efforts ensured that the BJP won 20 of the 21 Lok Sabha seats in the state and secured an absolute majority to form the government, they said.

The BJP won 78 seats in the 147-member assembly, while Patnaik's BJD secured 51 seats. Congress won 14 seats, CPI(M) secured one, and three Independent candidates also won.

However, Samal himself lost the assembly election from the Chandabali seat in the Bhadrak district.

Vanishing land: Kendrapara's battle with coastal erosion



Kendrapara, July 8: Large swathes of Kendrapara district are under threat as coastal erosion, driven by rising sea levels and climate change, continues to eat away at the land, displacing communities, damaging forests, and endangering cultural heritage.

On June 25, during the new moon, seawater surged past the shoreline and entered Tand village under Mahakalapada block, raising concerns over accelerating coastal erosion. The situation has become dire along nearly 28 km of the 48 kmlong Bay of Bengal coastline in Kendrapara district.

In Satabhaya, almost 40 metres of shoreline vanished within the past year alone. The iconic centuries-old Panchubarahi Temple in Rajnagar block has seen its surroundings transformed, with fears looming that the nearby Barahipur

Environmental Hemant Kumar Rout emphasised the failure of geo-synthetic tube walls installed at Pentha that are unable to withstand tidal force. Gabion boxes filled with stones are being dismantled by the sea, and even stone embankments are proving ineffective. he said.

He attributed the rising sea level to global warming and climate change, which intensify tidal waves during new moon and full moon phases. Rout underlined the need for expanding protective casuarina forests, although inadequate freshwater supply less than 15% in dry seasons against the 40% requirement hampers the growth of coastal wetlands.

Social worker Pramila Mallick recalled that the Agaranasi island, located 7 km offshore, once acted as a natural barrier against tidal forces. Since its complete submergence in 2022, coastal villages such as Tanda, Suniti and Babara have been exposed to frequent flooding during high tides and storms. endangering lives and liveli-

According to ACF Manas Kumar Das, afforestation efforts have been prioritised along the coast, with extensive plantation drives in Satabhaya and Pentha. Experts have been consulted, and reports on erosion are being compiled to formulate strategic interventions.

Woman tourist molested on Dagara beach



Ambulance vandalised during Muharram procession in Remuna

Remuna, July 8: In a disturbing incident that raises serious questions over public decency and emergency response awareness. an ambulance was vandalised during a Muharram procession in Remuna, Balasore district.

The vehicle was not only blocked, but attacked with stones and sticks by an unruly mob, leading to injuries to two ailing children and their parents who were en route to Fakir Mohan Medical College and Hospital for emergency treatment.

According to reports, the incident occurred around 10:30pm Sunday near Hatiagand Square in Remuna Bazaar. The ambulance, bearing registration number OD02BJ-5937, was carrying Rashmiranjan Sahu, his wife Urmila, and their two children

Swept away by stream, elderly woman clings to tree for 26 hours

Sambalpur, July 8: In what can only be described as a testament to human resilience and perhaps a touch of miracle, a 70-year-old woman was rescued from a tree branch Tuesday—26 hours after she was swept away by a stream during a toilet break in the rainhit Kumapatia Pada of Majhipali, under Sasan police limits in Sambalpur district.

The survivour, identified as Ahalya Singh, went missing around 11am Monday. Her family members filed a missing person report after they failed to locate her despite an initial search. Heavy rainfall had made it difficult for the search teams to begin intensive operations immediately. However, with the help of the Fire



personnel, an extensive rescue effort was launched Tuesday

After hours of searching through the flooded terrain. Ahalya was finally spotted hanging onto the branch of a



tree in the Harada stream. She had reportedly floated with the current before managing to grab a tree branch and climb up to escape being swept away further.

According to family mem-

bers and Fire personnel, Ahalya tied herself to the tree branch with her sari and clung there throughout the night exposed to torrential rain, darkness, and the constant fear of wild creatures, including venomous snakes. She stayed put without food or rest, and by the time she was found, she was severely weakened from prolonged exposure and exhaustion.

Upon rescue, she was rushed to the Debeipali Health Centre for first aid and later shifted to the district hospital for further medical evaluation. Doctors said she was conscious but her body had turned cold and numb due to the prolonged submersion in water and extreme stress.

said the Evewitnesses stream's water level had risen

dangerously, with currents flowing nearly four feet deep at the time of rescue. Firefighters used a boat to reach the tree and brought her down using a stretcher. The dramatic

rescue and her survival against the odds have generated intense discussion in the area, with many calling it a clear example of divine intervention. Locals are now hailing Ahalya's resilience and the swift action of Fire personnel that saved her life just in time.

Toll Sucks Life

nion Road Transport and Highways Minister Nitin Gadkari took everyone by surprise when at a function in Nagpur, where the RSS headquarters are located, he expressed concern over the "rising" number of poor. He said wealth was "getting concentrated" in the hands of some affluent people. He did not stop at that and went on to say there is a need for decentralisation of wealth and touched on a wide range of issues, including agriculture, manufacturing, taxation and public-private partnership in infrastructure development. In fact, he sounded like an Opposition leader when he said slowly the number of poor people is increasing and wealth is getting centralised in the hands of few wealthy people. The timing and venue are significant as Gadkari is known to be among the few BJP leaders enjoying the trust of the top echelons of the RSS. The BJP is going through the motions of selecting a party president and the RSS would apparently like to have a man of its choice at the helm of the ruling party who can take on, if necessary, Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Union Home Minister Amit Shah. The new party president is to be appointed once the PM returns from his foreign tour on 10 July. The term of the current party president, JP Nadda, ended two years ago. The announcement regarding the schedule for electing his successor is yet to be made.

At this crucial juncture, Gadkari made remarks that virtually challenged the narrative dished out by the Prime Minister himself about the country's trillions of dollars worth economy when employment generation has gone back to the level that existed four decades ago. The Opposition has, for long, been crying foul against the BJP government for following economic policies that have brought about "jobless growth" in which the rich have grown richer and poor poorer. Gadkari has virtually echoed this criticism of the Opposition by asserting that the economy must grow in a manner that creates jobs and uplifts rural areas. Driving home his point that reflects poorly on the government, he emphasized the need for further "decentralisation of wealth."

He even heaped praise on former Prime Ministers PV Narasimha Rao and Dr Manmohan Singh for adopting liberal economic policies - a credit that the ruling dispensation is chary of giving - and at the same time cautioned against unchecked centralisation.

The statistics that Gadkari reeled out are also an indictment of the government's policies for the agricultural poor. He pointed out manufacturing accounts for 22-24 per cent of the GDP, services 52-54 per cent, while agriculture, despite engaging 65-70 per cent of the rural population, contributes only around 12 per cent. What is even more significant is his reference to Swami Vivekananda – one of the icons the RSS worships – quoting his words: "Philosophy cannot be taught to someone whose stomach is empty." Gadkari's figures also go to show that while the biggest employment opportunities exist in agriculture, the focus of the government is far away and warped about this sector.

Gadkari also praised his own work and achievement by claiming credit for infrastructure development. "I was the one who started the Build-Operate-Transfer system for road construction," he said, a claim

To buttress his contention he said the earnings from Toll Booths are to the tune of Rs 55,000 crore and the income will go up to Rs 1.40 lakh crore in no time. While boasting about his immense collections in the Toll Booths spread across the country, Gadkari did not care to mention that such a massive amount of liquid cash getting regularly sucked out of the working economy also contributes in the growth of poverty and joblessness.

He spoke about projects aimed at enhancing regional connectivity and investment. On domestic investments, Gadkari said he has raised funds through Infrastructure Investment Trust (InvIT) bonds without foreign assistance. He asserted he was not accepting money from foreign countries "like Canada or the US." He reminded the audience that the aim of the government is to reduce poverty and create jobs for the youth and warned against economic liberalisation that could lead to concentration of wealth in the hands of a few.

Clearly, Gadkari is not only resetting the party's agenda, but also insisting on course correction. The Pahalgam killings by terrorists and the subsequent military actions, mired in controversies with statements by top defence officers, have not enhanced the government's image to the extent it was hoped for. In this backdrop, Gadkari's remarks, however controversial they may be in economic terms, point towards possibly big political stumbles.

IRAN'S DEMOCRATIC FUTURE

peculation about the end of Iran's Islamic Republic has surged in the wake of Israel's astonishingly effective bombing campaign, which succeeded in degrading and destroying much of Iran's offensive capability in just under two weeks.

Some commentators, like the economist Nouriel Roubini and the Stanford political scientist Abbas Milani, see regime change as plausible or imminent. Others, like the strategist Richard Haass, argue that the necessary preconditions for a democratic breakthrough are still absent.

A third group does not advocate regime change at all. While they find aspects of the Islamic Republic objectionable, they largely regard Iran as an aggrieved postcolonial state struggling for autonomy and dignity. Figures such as the exiled Iranian scholars Djavad Salehi-Isfahani and Esfandyar Batmanghelidj have expressed variations of this view

Many in this camp reserve their deepest hostility not for Islamist zealots or domestic oppressors but for foreign powers, especially the West. And they continue to insist - despite the jailing of opposition politicians and the dismantling of civil society - that a viable democratic reform movement is always on the verge of breaking through, only to be thwarted by meddling outsiders and a few uncompromising hard-liners. (It is striking that the people making this argument are largely secular expatriate Iranians who would almost certainly be arrested if they expressed themselves freely inside Iran.)

My view – based on two decades of research and years living in the country (including time served in the infamous Evin Prison) - is that democratizing reform or regime change is far harder than many assume. The authoritarian system is deeply entrenched, and civil society and opposition groups are much weaker than often imagined. This power imbalance between state and society is so pronounced

that in the short to medium term, only external forces could weaken the regime and create the conditions for a domestically led transition to a different form of rule.

But a full collapse of the Iranian state is no longer unthinkable, even if it is far from guaranteed. The Islamic Republic is under immense pressure following the Israeli military campaign and successive waves of protests and economic distress in recent years. If it were to fall, what happens next would depend less on ideology and more on logistics - namely, how a country of more than 80 million people, spread across a territory larger than France, Spain, and Italy combined, continues to govern itself.

In that case, Iran would be more ready for a stable, democratic regime than many may think. My academic research on Iran's administrative and political institutions and hands-on experience promoting democratic local governance and international cooperation (the work that resulted in my imprisonment) has revealed a robust institutional scaffolding that could serve as the backbone of a post-Islamist order. This architecture, which links central ministries to elected authorities in more than 1.000 cities and 35,000 villages, matters now more than ever.

In 1999, the regime attempted to calm unrest and improve public services by creating an entirely new tier of elected local councils. Nearly 200,000 positions were filled in the first election alone. Though intended to legitimize the state, these institutions became spaces of real civic engagement. Citizens ran for office. deliberated over budgets, and began navigating the basics of public accountability.

In my book Creating Local Democracy in Iran, I documented how Iranians embraced these roles with energy and determination. Even as the regime gradually stripped away the councils democratic substance, it never dismantled the system. This resulted in what I call dual-use institutions: created to serve an authoritarian order, but structurally available to support democratic transition - if given the chance.

Crucially, this is not just a story about local-level institutions. Iran's intergovernmental system connects national ministries, provincial administrations, and municipal authorities in a vertically integrated structure. Competent civil servants are in place at every level. This is what would set Iran apart from other post-authoritarian transitions - most notably Iraq in 2003.

The challenge facing a

post-Islamist order would not be to invent governance, but to reactivate the dormant network of state machinery already embedded in towns, cities, and ministries. True, it could be repurposed to serve a weakened but more repressive regime. As we saw in Afghanistan, institutions alone do not determine the character of governance. But if a government that upholds human rights and democratic norms emerges, then Iran's existing institutional scaffolding could become the foundation for a more liberal and stable political order.

Moreover, there is already a technical roadmap for reform. Priorities include modernizing Iran's dysfunctional municipal finance system and empowering councils to make credible, transparent budget decisions. International institutions, including the United Nations, the World Bank, and global municipal networks, are ready to offer expertise when Iranians invite them.

We should not expect any transition to be smooth, or even democratic. But pessimism must not blind us to the groundwork that has already been laid. As someone who has seen the promise - and paid the price - of reform, I believe it would be a grave mistake to ignore the country's institutional assets hiding in plain sight.

The world's attention is rightly focused on nuclear risks and regional instability. But when the moment comes Iran's democratic future will be built not only by the political elite in the capital's palaces, but also by the people who have kept the country's administrative institutions functioning against all odds. That could very well mean the difference between chaos and continuity, and it should reframe how we think about Iran's future.

or a week or two every year, the temperature gets so high that when I attempt to take my dog for a walk, she gives me a look that says, "Are you crazy?"

At times like this, when stepping outside is like stepping into an oven, I find myself asking the same question: How hot does it have to get before we take climate change seriously?

That's a question that many Europeans have been asking

"In some places in Europe we are experiencing temperatures that have never been recorded before, so it is really unusual," Carlo Buontempo, director of the Spain-based Copernicus Climate Change Service told the New York Times.

In the town of Mora in central Portugal, the mercury hit 46.6 degree C in late June, slightly hotter than the 46 degree C recorded in the town of El Granado in Spain. Those temperatures, similar to what New Delhi experienced a few weeks earlier, were the highest temperatures ever recorded in June in Portugal and Spain. It was so hot that some immigrants were heading to the airport, saying, "We're going back to Africa. It's cooler there.

Heat warnings were issued in parts of Europe, including Spain, Portugal, Italy, Germany and the UK. France put 16 regions under red alert. A red alert means that a severe heat wave is expected and if you don't take precautions, you might find yourself in the hospital, hopefully a good distance from the morgue.

According to Buontempo, having these extreme temperatures is "not surprising, because with climate change, we're bound to see more intense, longer, and more frequent heat waves, and that's exactly what we're seeing."

There are some things in life for which "more intense, longer, and more frequent" would be welcome. Once a week is just not enough, as I tell my wife during football season.

But heat waves (and cold waves) need to be less intense, shorter and less frequent. The World Meteorological

Organization (WMO) has been recording temperatures for 175 years, and it may not surprise you to learn that 2024 was the warmest year on record. But 2025 is already saying, "Hold my beer."

On average, the planet was 1.55 degrees Celsius warmer in 2024 than the average temperature in the pre-industrial era (1850 to 1900). That may not seem like much, but even a half-degree change can disrupt the world's ecosystem and put billions of people at greater risk of exposure to heat extremes.

The WMO also reported that the last 10 years (2015 to 2024) have been the hottest 10 years on record. That may explain why so many crazy things have happened in the last decade, such as the wrong winner being announced at the Miss Universe contest, the wrong Best Picture winner being announced at the Oscars, and a convicted felon being sentenced to four years in the White House.

It's important for us to do whatever we can to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and help combat climate change. It's also important to take precautions during heat waves, such as staying out of the sun as much as possible and drinking plenty of liquids, preferably something other than beer. Alcohol of all kinds should be avoided, because alcohol consumption results in frequent urination. (There are a few nations in the world that put you at risk for dehydration, but none worse than urination.)

The best thing to drink is water, at least eight cups a day. If you are working outside in the heat, you need two cups of water every 15 minutes. Pour one cup down your throat and the other cup down your shirt. Trust me, it will make you feel cooler – at least 1.55 degrees cooler.

Thane, July 8: High drama unfolded in Mira Bhayandar area near Mumbai Tuesday as hundreds took part in a protest march led by the MNS and other groups to defend the Marathi 'asmita' (pride) amid rising political heat following the attack on a shopkeeper for refusal to speak Marathi.

A video of the assault had gone viral on social media,

was sought late Monday night for holding a gathering, which was also granted.
"But when it came to the rel

"But when it came to the rally, they were pushing for a particular route. If permission was given, there might have been a law and order situation. For last so many years, we all are holding rallies and these are always done after consultation with police," he added.

MNS leader Sandeep Deshpande slammed the government, saying "CM Fadnavis says he is ready to grant permission, but only if we change our rally route. That is nothing but a tactic to suppress our voice."

Minister of State for Home Yogesh Kadam said there was no discrimination between Marathi and non-Marathi communities when it comes to granting permission for rallies, but law and order cannot be compromised.

The state government is committed to ensure law and order is maintained during such protests, he said.

The protest march, which began from Balaji Corner in Mira Road shortly after 12 noon, concluded at Mira Road railway station around 2.30 pm. However, several protesters remained in the station area till Jadhav arrived at the spot around 4 pm.

After the dramatic scenes on the streets and apparent political intervention, the morcha passed through the original route proposed by the organisers.

The situation became tense when police started detaining protesters raising slogans for protecting the 'Marathi asmita' (pride). Some of them were picked up by the police while they were addressing the media.

Gandhi-linked heritage sites in Wardha to be restored

Wardha, July 8: Three heritage structures associated with Mahatma Gandhi in Maharashtra's Wardha district are set for a makeover, with a museum, prayer hall and a complex for artisans on the premises, an official said.

As per a release issued by the Mahatma Gandhi Institute for Rural Industrialisation (MGI-RI) Monday, the Ministry of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) has granted in-principle approval for the revival plan, under which the Gandhi Smriti Bhavan, Kasturba Rasoi, and Wardha Haat will be restored by the Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts (IGNCA), Delhi.

The plan also includes revamping of the institute's departments and laboratories, it said

The Gandhi Smriti Bhavan, which once served as Mahat-



ma Gandhi's residence, will be transformed into a museum and prayer hall, and this will involve structural repairs, digitisation of valuable collections, and an interactive exhibition showcasing Gandhian ideologies. A dedicated meditation area will also be created, the release stated.

Under the plan, the original structure of Kasturba Rasoi, where meals were once prepared for the ashram community and visitors, will be restored, while Wardha Haat, inaugurated in 1936 as a bustling market-place, will be transformed into a complex for artisans.

This will involve rebuilding damaged sections, improving ventilation and lighting, and creating dedicated workspaces for rural artisans.

The MGIRI has signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) with the IGNCA, a heritage institution under the

Ministry of Culture, for the

Mahatma Gandhi founded the All India Village Industries Association (AIVIA) on this land in Wardha December 14, 1934, donated by his close associate Seth Jamnalalji Bajaj. Between 1934 and 1936, he lived at Maganwadi with his wife, Kasturba, and directed the development of AIVIA as a centre for research, production, training, and promotion of village industries.

As AIVIA expanded, the Jamnalal Bajaj Central Research Institute (JBCRI) was established in 1955 under the Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) to continue research and development.

guard our children's future,"

Maharashtra Public Health and Family Welfare Minister Prakash Abitkar on Monday said the state has recorded over 12,000 child deaths between April last year and February 2025, averaging more than 37 fatalities per day.

The figure came up during the question hour when ten MLCs from the opposition and treasury benches asked a question as to whether 12,438 children died in the state in 11 months.

UP to plant 12.5cr saplings under the MGNREGA scheme

Lucknow, July 8: The Uttar Pradesh government is set to plant more than 12.5 crore saplings in the state under the MGNREGA scheme following the directives of Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath.

According to the state government, the aim is not only to enhance greenery but also to generate large-scale rural employment.

This year's plantation drive will be carried out under the theme 'Ek Ped Maa Ke Naam 2.0', blending ecological responsibility with emotional and cultural sentiment by encouraging people to dedicate a tree to their mothers, it said.

The highest 42 lakh saplings would be planted in Lakhimpur Kheri, followed by Sonbhadra

and Hardoi.
A total of 1.89 lakh planta-

tion sites have been identified across the state, with plant species selected based on local climatic and geographical conditions. The initiative ensures that plantation efforts are sustainable and tailored to each location.

In a special move to promote

location.

In a special move to promote nutrition and health, each beneficiary of the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana (Rural) will receive two drumstick (Moringa) saplings, known for their medicinal and nutritional value. This effort aims to enhance nutritional security for rural families, the official statement said.

The success of the campaign will not be measured by plantation numbers alone, but by the survival and growth of the saplings. For this, arrangements for regular watering, tree guards, maintenance, and monitoring will be made under MGNREGA, the statement said.



As part of the 'Ek Ped Maa Ke Naam 2.0' campaign, the state also plans to plant 37 crore saplings in a day July 9. The drive will be launched by Chief Minister Adityanath from Ayodhya and Azamgarh, the state government said.

To ensure its success, a record 52.43 crore saplings have been prepared across nurseries

and designated sites statewide.
On the directive of the chief minister, all cabinet ministers will lead plantation drives in their respective districts. Designated nodal officers have already arrived in their assigned districts to review and finalize arrangements in coordination with forest department officials.

Additionally, all cabinet ministers, ministers of state (independent charge), and ministers of state will participate in the

A Forest Department official explained that geo-tagging will create a digital record making it easier to track the condition of the plants and take timely action for their care and protection. It will increase transparency and accountability in the campaign.

Senior UP govt official orders ban on outsiders in kanwariya camps

MEERUT: A senior Uttar Pradesh government official Tuesday directed authorities to ensure that no outsiders are allowed to enter camps set up for kanwariyas. Chairing a high-level meeting here, Chief Secretary Manoj Kumar Singh said the safe and smooth completion of the Kanwar Yatra is the government's top priority. "Ensure that no outsider enters the camps (meant for kanwariyas). Also, a strict ban on single-use plastic should be enforced," Singh said. Kanwariyas must get access to basic facilities such as drinking water, food, and cleanliness, he said. He directed the Public Works Department and NHAI officials to repair roads along the Kanwar Yatra route. Directives were also given to the Power Department to cover electric poles with polythene and place barricades around transformers to prevent accidents. The Food Department was asked to inspect the quality of food at eateries and dhabas so that incidents of food poisoning do not occur. He said DJ setups must not exceed the prescribed height limit and obscene songs should not be played.

DGCA assures of mechanism to curb airfare surge

New Delhi, July 8: Aviation regulator DGCA said Tuesday it will put in place a mechanism to curb whopping surge in air ticket prices, recently witnessed during the Maha Kumbh and post-Pahalgam terror attack, as the issue coupled with concerns over air safety after the Ahmedabad plane crash dominated proceedings at a parliamentary panel meeting.

Air India CEO and MD Campbell Wilson told the committee his airline will complete retrofitting of its fleet in two years to address frequent complaints about its seats and other facilities, and underscored its commitment to flight safety, sources said.

An Air India Boeing 787 Dreamliner carrying over 240 people had crashed moments after taking off from the Ahmedabad airport on June 12, killing all but one person aboard in one of the worst aviation disasters that has brought the issue of air safety into sharp focus.

Some members of the Public Accounts Committee, led by Congress MP K C Venugopal, demanded an audit of the Bureau of Civil Aviation Security, citing a spate of incidents concerning operational safety, and asked when the probe report into the crash will be ready.

With the probe still going on, there was no detailed discussion on the Ahmedabad crash, and members confined themselves to broader concerns about safety. Venugopal told reporters after the meeting that the committee members were all worried about safety issues,

ing that several incidents following the crash were reported and that every passenger wants to feel safe about their journey.

Members grilled official agencies over what some of them described as an "arbitrary" surge in air ticket prices and cited a host of examples. including the manifold hike in fares for planes flying from Srinagar after the Pahalgam terror attack and during the Maha Kumbh in Prayagraj, according to the sources. When an official said the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DG-CA) will be talking to airlines to have a consensus on developing a mechanism against it, a BJP member shot back wondering if the unfair practice will continue for want of consensus while some other MPs added that the aviation regular has the remit to take action. The DGCA said it will be putting guidelines in place to curb any unreasonable surge in prices, the sources said.

Amid complaints of broken or uncomfortable seats in Air India planes and other issues of passenger convenience, an MP in the meeting recalled his recent visit abroad in the business class of the airline, highlighting his discomfort caused by the condition of the seat.

Air India CEO Wilson said his airline is working to address these concerns and will do an overhaul of its fleet in two years.

Some members demanded an overall safety audit of all flights in operation, with the DGCA asserting that it has kept passengers' well-being paramount.

Nitish govt announces 35% quota for women in govt jobs

Patna, July 8: The Bihar cabinet Tuesday decided that the 35 per cent quota for women in government jobs will now be restricted to only permanent residents of the state.

The decision was taken with barely a few months left before the state goes to the polls, amid growing demands for the implementation of a domicile policy in government jobs.

"The cabinet approved an important proposal of the General Administration Department, allowing the 35 per cent quota for women in government jobs to be restricted only for permanent residents of Bihar. The new policy will enhance financial independence and job security for permanent resident women of the state," Additional Chief Secretary (Cabinet Secretariat) S Siddhartha said.

The government had introduced 35 per cent reservation for women in government jobs at all levels in 2016. Earlier, women from any state could have taken advantage of it.

Ahead of the assembly elec-

tions, the demand for the implementation of a domicile policy has been growing. Leader of the Opposition Tejashwi Yadav has promised '100 per cent domicile' if his RJD comes to power following the polls.

Union minister Chirag Paswan, a BJP ally, also raised his voice for a domicile policy, but questioned the RJD's commitment to the issue. Last week, a large number of job aspirants demonstrated in the state capital, demanding the implementation of the domicile policy in government jobs.

Dilip Kumar, one of the leaders of the demonstration. welcomed the government's decision, "Now, the government must introduce a domicile policy to ensure 90 per cent representation of the state's youth in government jobs," he said.

Meanwhile, the Nitish government Tuesday decided to constitute the Bihar Youth Commission, with the aim of providing more employment opportunities for the youth of the state.

The proposal for the constitution of the commission was approved at a cabinet meeting. chaired by Kumar.

"I am happy to inform you that with an aim of providing more and more employment opportunities to the youths of Bihar, training them, and making them empowered and capable, the state government has decided to constitute Bihar Youth Commission," the CM said in a post on X. "This commission will play a

significant role in advising the government on all matters related to improving and uplifting the condition of youths in the society. It will also coordinate with government departments to ensure better education and employment for the youth,

The police prosecutors prayed that prime accused Monojit Mishra, an alumnus and temporary staffer of the college, and two current students Zaib Ahmed and Pramit Mukherjee, be remanded to judicial custody. The Alipore court, after hearing all the parties, granted the prayer. A security guard of the college, Pinaki Banerjee, who was also arrested in connection with the case, was also forwarded to judicial custody till July 22. It is alleged that the first-year student of South Calcutta Law College was raped inside the premises of the institute by Mishra, assisted by Ahmed and Mukherjee, on the evening of June 25.

India engaged in efforts to halt execution of Kerala nurse in Yemen

New Delhi, July 8: India is engaged in efforts to prevent the execution of Nimisha Priya, an Indian nurse convicted in a murder case in Yemen whose death sentence is set to be carried out July 16, people familiar

with the matter said Tuesday. Priya, hailing from Kollengode in Kerala's Palakkad district, was found guilty of murdering a Yemeni man in July 2017. He was her business partner. In 2020, a Yemeni court handed her the death sentence, and the country's Supreme Judicial Council dismissed her appeal in November 2023. The 38-year-old nurse is presently lodged in a jail in Sana'a, the Yemeni capital city

E-com, online payments abused for terror financing: FATF

The FATF in its update on TF risks also highlighted the methods used to raise, move, and manage funds and other assets for terrorist financing purposes and said online fund transfers using payment services platform offer less traceability and transparency compared to wire-transfer, making it harder to clearly identify initiators and recipients of transfers

New Delhi, July 8: Global terror financing watchdog FATF Tuesday cited the February 2019 Pulwama terror attack, which killed 40 CRPF personnel, and the 2022 Gorakhnath Temple incident to say that e-commerce platforms and on-

line payment services are being misused for terror financing.

In its 'Comprehensive Update on Terrorist Financing Risks', the FATF also flagged 'state sponsorship of terrorism' and said a variety of publicly available sources of information and delegations' inputs to this report indicate that "certain



terrorist organisations have been and continue to receive

financial and other forms of support from several national governments"

"Delegations reported on this trend by referring to the use of state sponsorship for TF (terror financing) either as fundraising technique or as part of the financial management strategy of the certain organisations engaging in terrorist acts. Several forms of support have been reported. including direct financial support, logistical and material support, or the provision of training," the Financial Action Task Force (FATF)said.

In June, the FATF, while condemning the April 2025, Pahalgam terror attack, in which 26 people killed, and saying such attacks would not have been possible without financial support, had said it would come out with a "comprehensive analysis of terrorist financing", compiling cases provided by its global network consisting 200 jurisdic-


Giving the case study of use of e-commerce platform for procurement of materials for terrorist attack in India, the FATF said a key component of the improvised explosive device used in the attack -- aluminum powder -- was procured through the EPOM Amazon. This material was used to enhance the impact of the blast.

In February 2019, a suicide

bombing targeted a convoy of Indian Security forces in Pul wama in Jammu & Kashmir resulting in the deaths of 40 soldiers. India's authorities concluded that the attack was orchestrated by Jaish-I-Mohammed (JiM).

As a result of the investigation, 19 individuals were charged under relevant provisions of the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act. including sections related to TF. Among those charged were seven for eign nationals, including the suicide bomber. LEAs also re covered moveable and immovable assets connected to the attack, such as vehicles and terrorist hideouts.

New Delhi, July 8: Possible convergence of interest among China, Pakistan, and Bangladesh may result in serious implications for India's stability and security dynamics, Chief of Defence Staff Gen Anil Chauhan said Tuesday.

In an address at a think-tank, Gen Chauhan, delving into the May 7-10 military conflict between India and Pakistan, said it was perhaps for the first time that two nuclear weapon states were directly engaged in hostilities. The top military officer

said economic distress in the countries in the Indian Ocean region has given "outside powers" to leverage their influence which could create vulnerabilities for India "There is a possible conver-

gence of interest we can talk about between China, Pakistan, and Bangladesh that may have implications for India's stability and security dynamics." Gen Chauhan said at the event hosted by the Observer Research Foundation.

His comments came as India's ties with Bangladesh witnessed a sharp downturn after deposed prime minister Sheikh Hasina fled Dhaka and took shelter in India in August

Shimla/Nahan, July 8: With heavy rain pummeling several parts of Himachal Pradesh the local meteorological department Tuesday warned of a risk of low to moderate flash floods in parts of eight districts in the next 24 hours.

These districts are Chamba, Kangra, Mandi, Kullu, Shimla, Solan, Sirmaur and Una.

Himachal Pradesh has received 203.2 mm of rain against the normal of 152.6 mm from June 1 to July 8.

The meteorological department also issued a 'yellow' alert warning of heavy rains at isolated places in seven districts of the state till next Monday.

The scheduled visit of Chief Minister Sukhvinder Singh Sukhu to the disaster-hit areas of Janjheli and Thunag in Seraj assembly segment, represented by Leader of Opposition Jai Ram Thakur, was cancelled Tuesday due to inclement weather.

A total of 198 roads, including 150 in the worst-hit Mandi district, are closed while 159 transformers and 297 water supply schemes are affected in the state, according to the State Emergency Operation Nahan passing through the Banog area caused havoc. said executive engineer (NH) Rakesh Khanduja. Damage was also caused to

the Himachal Pradesh Forest Corporation's Resin and Turpentine factory complex. The general manager of the factory, Ved Sharma, said that flood water has damaged tanks, machinery and dumping facilities of the factory. Production has been halted and it might take three to four days to resume.

A section of residents in Banog claimed that the main reason for the flood in the sewage drain (Nullaha) is the construction of a common park on this sewage Nullaha by forming three culverts in the Nullaha area, which got choked due to heavy flow of water with muck. As a result, the water started flowing on the roads and entered the residential area.

The monsoon hit Himachal Pradesh June 20. Mandi district recorded 110 per cent excess rain in the June 1-8 period, Shimla 89 per cent and Una 86 per cent. Parts of the state have been

receiving moderate to heavy rain since Monday evening.

Nahan has recorded 124.2 mm of rainfall, followed by 85 in Gohar mm, 84.5 mm in Sarahan, 60 mm in Baijnath, 48 mm in Poanta Sahib, 46.2 mm in Naina Devi, 37 mm in Kasauli, 28 mm in Jogindernagar, 27.2 mm in Palampur, 24.5 in Dhaulakuan and 20 mm in Shimla. according to the weather office.

Himachal Pradesh has witnessed 31 flash floods, 22 cloudbursts and 17 landslides since the onset of monsoon June 20, and 52 people have died in rain-related incidents in the state so far, according to officials

Cong slams govt, SEBI over inaction on Jane Street 'Illegal Profits'



New Delhi, July 8: The Congress Tuesday questioned market regulator SEBI and the government for failing to protect the interest of small investors and check outflow of "illegal profits" made by US algorithm trading firm Jane Street through stock market manipulation.

Addressing a press conference here, Congress' head of social media department Supriya Shrinate said Jane Street, which manipulated the Indian stock market through algorithms and made thousands of crores in illegal profits in the Futures and Options market has caused massive losses to ordinary retail investors, while regulator SEBI remained a silent spectator.

"Why was SEBI sleeping for all these 4.5 years when Jane Street was manipulating the direct equity market and the F&O market," she asked, alleging that instead of protecting small investors, SEBI turned a blind eye to "rampant fraudulent activities' "Isn't it true that Jane Street

transferred a massive amount out of India? The government and SEBI woke up only when FII outflow numbers skyrocketed. They didn't wake up to protect small investors but rather when foreign institutional investors withdrew large sums from India," she alleged.

Shrinate asked how much money has Jane Street repatriated in the last four and a half years, as its numbers from 2023 to 2025 are only known. She claimed that Jane Street

began operations in 2020 and Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) has admitted that its profits are illegal. "What will you do about

the money repatriated to the United States? How will you retrieve it? She alleged that there are

countless examples of institu tions collapsing under the Modi government and SEBI instead of protecting small investors. turned a blind eye to "fraudu lent activities' "Why did SEBI ignore the

red flags, and what were other agencies like the ED, CBI, Income Tax, and others doing? the Congress leader asked.

"Did the Prime Minister and Home Minister know about this scam and market manipulation? Is it not true that Jane Street's repatria tion of large sums was drive ing FII outflows, which is why the government woke up," Shrinate also asked.

She also claimed that Lead er of Opposition in Lok Sabha Rahul Gandhi has repeatedly warned the government and market regulator SEBI to protect and ring-fence small investors in the volatile and highly risky Futures and Options Market.

Delhi's overage vehicle fuel ban put on hold till Nov 1

New Delhi: The Centre's panel on air quality in Delhi-NCR Tuesday decided to put on hold the implementation of the fuel ban on end-of-life (EOL) or overage vehicles in the national capital until November 1, sources said. EOL vehicles are diesel vehicles older than 10 years and petrol vehicles older than 15 years. According to directions issued earlier, such vehicles are not to be given fuel in Delhi from July 1 irrespective of the states they are registered in. Delhi Environment Minister Manjinder Singh Sirsa last week requested the Commission For Air Quality Management (CAQM) to withhold action against such vehicles, calling the move "premature and potentially counterproductive", citing "operational and infrastructural challenges"

The victim, believed to be between 22 and 23 years old and originally from Uttarakhand, had been staying with a friend two blocks away from her previous residence, where she lived with her former partner,

18 missing as Nepal bridge washes away

Kathmandu: At least eighteen people were missing after a river flooded by monsoon rains Tuesday washed away the Friendship Bridge connecting Nepal with China. The continuous monsoon rainfall in China on Monday night triggered a flood in the Bhotekoshi River in Nepal. The Miteri Bridge in Rasuwa district. 120 km northeast of Kathmandu, was swept away by flooding at around 3:15 am Tuesday, Fighteen people, including six Chinese nationals, have gone missing. official sources said. According to the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Authority (NDRRMA), 11 people. including two police personnel. were rescued by the joint team of Nepal Army, Armed Police Force and Nepal Police, Ariun Paudel, chief district officer of Rasuwa, said the flood caused heavy damage. Authorities have advised residents downstream to move to safer areas. The flooding also swept away several houses and five electric vehicles imported from China. Meanwhile, police recovered two bodies from the Trishuli River in Gaiuri Rural Municipality of Dhading district on Tuesday morning. Their identities could not be ascertained. Nepal Army's rescue team also rescued 23 labourers, including a Chinese national, who were stranded at Rasuwagadhi Hydropower project after the

Iran: 1.060 killed in war with Israel

Dubai: Iran's government has issued a new death toll for its war with Israel, saying at least 1,060 people were killed and warning that the figure could rise. Saeed Ohadi, the head of Iran's Foundation of Martyrs and Veterans Affairs, gave the figure in an interview aired by Iranian state television late Monday. Ohadi warned the death toll may reach 1,100 given how severely some people were wounded. During the war, Iran downplayed the effects of Israel's 12-day bombardment of the country, which decimated its air defences, destroyed military sites and damaged its nuclear facilities. Since a ceasefire took hold, Iran slowly has been acknowledging the breadth of the destruction, though it still has not said how much military materiel it lost. The Washington-based Human Rights Activists group, which has provided detailed casualty figures from multiple rounds of unrest in Iran, has said 1,190 people were killed, including 436 civilians and 435 security force members.

Trump says US will send more weapons to Ukraine

Washington, July 8: President Donald Trump said Monday the US will have to send more weapons to Ukraine, just days after ordering a pause in critical weapons deliveries to

The comments by Trump appeared to be an abrupt change in posture after the Pentagon announced last week that it would hold back delivering to Ukraine some air defence missiles, precision-guided artillery and other weapons because of what US officials said were concerns that stockpiles have declined too much.

"We have to," Trump said. 'They have to be able to defend themselves. They're getting hit very hard now. We're going to send some more weapons — defensive weapons primarily."

The pause had come at a difficult moment for Ukraine, which has faced increasing and more complex — air barrages from Russia during the more than three-year-long war. Russian attacks on Ukraine killed at least 11 civilians and injured more than 80 others, including seven children, officials said Monday.

The move last week to abruptly pause shipments of Patriot missiles, precision-guided GMLRS, Hellfire missiles and Howitzer rounds and weaponrv took Ukrainian officials and other allies by surprise.



The Pentagon affirmed late Monday that at Trump's direction, it would resume weapons shipments to Ukraine "to ensure the Ukrainians can defend themselves while we work to secure a lasting peace and ensure the killing stops. Still, spokesman Sean Parnell added that its framework for Trump to evaluate military shipments worldwide continues as part of "America First' defence priorities.

Trump, speaking at the start of a dinner he was hosting for Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu at the White House on Monday, vented his growing frustration with Russian President Vladimir Putin. Trump has struggled to find a resolution to the war in Ukraine but maintains he's de-

termined to quickly conclude a conflict that he had promised as candidate to end of Day One of his second term.

He has threatened, but held off on, imposing new sanctions against Russia's oil industry to try to prod Putin into peace talks.

Sen Lindsey Graham said last week that Trump has given him the go-ahead to push forward with a bill he's co-sponsoring that calls, in part, for a 500% tariff on goods imported from countries that continue to buy Russian oil. The move would have huge ramifications for China and India, two economic behemoths that buy Russian oil.

"I'm not happy with President Putin at all," Trump said Monday.

Netanyahu meets Trump

Washington/Tel Aviv, July 8: US President Donald Trump, hosting Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu at the White House Monday, said the United States had scheduled talks with Iran and indicated progress on a controversial effort to relocate Palestinians

Speaking to reporters at the beginning of a dinner between US and Israeli officials, Netanvahu said the United States and Israel were working with other countries who would give Palestinians a "better future,' suggesting that the residents of Gaza could move to neighboring nations

"If people want to stay, they can stay, but if they want to leave, they should be able to leave," Netanyahu said.

"We're working with the United States very closely about finding countries that will seek to realize what they always say, that they wanted to give the Palestinians a better future. I think we're getting close to finding several countries.

Trump, who initially demurred to Netanyahu when asked about the relocating of Palestinians, said the countries around Israel were helping out. "We've had great cooperation from ... surrounding countries, great cooperation from every single one of them. So something good will happen,' Trump said.

The president earlier this year floated relocating Palestinians and taking over the Gaza Strip to turn it into the 'Riviera of the Middle East.' Gazans criticized the proposal and vowed never to leave their homes in the coastal en-

clave. Human rights groups condemned the plan as ethnic cleansing.

Trump and Netanyahu met for several hours in Washington while Israeli officials continued indirect negotiations with Hamas aimed at securing a US-brokered Gaza ceasefire and hostage-release deal.

Netanyahu's visit follows Trump's prediction, on the eve of their meeting, that such a deal could be reached this week. Before heading to Washington, the right-wing Israeli leader said his discussions with Trump could help advance negotiations under way in Qatar between Israel and the Palestinian militant group.

It was Trump's third face-toface encounter with Netanyahu since returning to office in January, and came just over two weeks after the president ordered the bombing of Iranian nuclear sites in support of Israeli air strikes. Trump then helped arrange a ceasefire in the 12-day Israel-Iran war.

Trump said his administration would be meeting with Iran. "We have scheduled Iran talks, and they ... want to talk. They took a big drubbing," he

Trump's Middle East envoy Steve Witkoff said the meeting would take place in the next

US revokes terrorism designation of new Syrian leader's group

Washington, July 8: The Trump administration is revoking the terrorism designation of a group led by Syria's new president as part of a broader US engagement with the transitional government since the ouster of former leader Bashar Assad late last year.

In a statement released Monday, Secretary of State Marco Rubio said the move, which will take effect Tuesday, "recognis es the positive actions taken by the new Syrian government' under President Ahmad al Sharaa.

Earlier Monday, the Federal Register published an advance notice, which said Rubio made the decision on June 23 in consultation with the attorney general and treasury secretary The decision had not been previously announced, although i was made as the Trump admin istration has been moving to ease or end many US sanctions that had been imposed during Assad's rule.

The step looks to further end Syria's isolation since a lightning rebel offensive ousted the Assad family from decades of rule and give the new govern ment a boost as it tries to rebuild a country shattered by 13 years of civil war.

President Donald Trump, before having dinner Monday with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu at the White House, repeated that he previously had been told that Syria's new leader "comes from a very tough background."

"I said, Well, you know, I'm not that surprised. It's a tough part of the world," said Trump, who met with al-Sharaa in Sau di Arabia in May. "But I was very impressed by him. But we took the sanctions off because we want to give them a chance.

The brief notice offered no details about the revocation of the foreign terrorist organisa tion designation for the al-Nus rah Front, also known as Havar Tahrir al-Sham. Al-Nusrah was originally designated a foreign terrorist organisation for its previous affiliation with al-Qaida. Washington, July 8: The State Department is warning US diplomats of attempts to impersonate Secretary of State Marco Rubio and possibly other officials using technology driven by artificial intelligence, according to two senior officials and a cable sent last week to all embassies and consulates.

The warning came after the department discovered that an impostor posing as Rubio had attempted to reach out to at least three foreign ministers. a US senator and a governor, according to the July 3 cable. which was first reported by The Washington Post.

The recipients of the scam messages, which were sent by text. Signal and voice mail. were not identified in the cable, a copy of which was shared with The Associated Press.

"The State Department is aware of this incident and is currently investigating the matter, it said. "The department takes seriously its responsibility to safeguard its information and continuously takes steps to improve the department's cybersecurity posture to prevent future

It declined to comment further due to "security reasons and the ongoing investigation.

One of the officials said the hoaxes had been unsuccessful and "not very sophisticated". Nonetheless, the second official said the department deemed it "prudent" to advise all employees and foreign governments, particularly as efforts by foreign actors to compromise information security increase.

Impostor uses AI to Storms, fires hit Balkans following extreme heat

Belgrade, July 8: A severe hail storm ripped trees and roofs in Croatia Tuesday while hundreds of fires raged in neighbouring Serbia following a period of extremely hot weather in parts of the Balkan

A brief but powerful storm hit Croatia's Adriatic Sea port of Split during the morning Tuesday. High winds and hail damaged the roof of the city's soccer stadium and caused a ferry to slip its moorings at the port which then hit two other

vessels, one of which sank. At least three people were injured in the storm, and material damage across the city was huge. Photos carried by Croatian media showed downed trees and flooded streets.

The Index news portal said

that offices and the pitch itself at Split's Poljud stadium were damaged as well as the roof. The report quoted the Split meteorological service

as saying that "such storms

are usual after a long period

of heat with extremely hot days. Previously, Croatia and the rest of the Balkans experienced a heat wave with temperatures reaching 40 degrees Celsius and more. Meteorologists said the

storms prefigured cooler days ahead with temperatures set to drop to around 20 degrees Celsius in some areas.

The weather service in neighbouring Slovenia said on Tuesday that snow fell at high altitudes in the Alps while the rest of the country has been pounded with heavy rain and hail. In Serbia, firefighters battled more than 600 wild fires on Monday that injured six people.

Perils of unchecked tourism growth in Antarctica

he number of tourists heading to Antarctica has been skyrocketing. From fewer than 8,000 a year about three decades ago, nearly 125,000 tourists flocked to the icy continent in 2023-24. The trend is likely to continue in the long term.

Unchecked tourism growth in Antarctica risks undermining the very environment that draws visitors. This would be bad for operators and tourists. It would also be bad for Antarctica – and the planet. Over the past two weeks, the

nations that decide what human activities are permitted in Antarctica have convened in Italy. The meeting incorporates discussions by a special working group that aims to address tourism issues

It's not easy to manage tourist visitors to a continent beyond any one country's control. So, how do we stop Antarctica being loved to death? The answer may lie in economics.

We recently modelled future visitor trends in Antarctica. A conservative scenario shows by 2033-34, visitor numbers could reach around 285,000. Under the least conservative scenario, numbers could reach 450,000 – however, this figure incorporates pent-up demand from COVID shutdowns that will likely diminish.

The vast majority of the Antarctic tourism industry comprises cruise-ship tourism in the Antarctic Peninsula. A small percentage of visitors travel to the Ross Sea region and parts of the continent's Antarctic tourism is man-

aged by an international set of agreements together known as the Antarctic Treaty System, as well as the International Association of Antarctica Tour Operators (IAATO). The Treaty System is noto-

riously slow-moving and riven by geopolitics, and IAATO does not have the power to cap visitor numbers. About two-thirds of Antarctic

tourists land on the continent.

The visitors can threaten frag-

ile ecosystems by: compacting

soils; trampling fragile vegeta-

tion; introducing non-native microbes and plant species; disturbing breeding colonies of birds and seals.

Even when cruise ships don't dock, they can cause problems such as air, water and noise pollution - as well as anchoring that can damage the seabed. Then there's carbon emis-

sions. Each cruise ship traveller to Antarctica typically produces between 3.2 and 4.1 tonnes of carbon, not including travel to the port of departure. This is similar to the carbon emissions an average person produces in a year.

Global warming caused by carbon emissions is damaging Antarctica. At the Peninsula region, glaciers and ice shelves are retreating and sea ice is shrinking, affecting wildlife and vegetation. Of course, Antarctic tourism

represents only a tiny fraction of overall emissions. However, the industry has a moral obligation to protect the place that maintains it. And tourism in Antarctica can compound damage from climate change, tipping delicate ecosystems into decline.

Some operators use hybrid ships and less polluting fuels, and offset emissions to offer carbon-neutral travel. IAATO has pledged to halve emissions by 2050 – a positive step.

Market-based tools – such as taxes, cap-and-trade schemes and certification – have been used in environmental management around the world. Research shows these tools could also prevent Antarctic tourist numbers from getting out of control. One option is requiring visitors to pay a tourism tax. This would help raise revenue to support environmental monitoring and enforcement in Antarctica, as well as fund research.

Such a tax already exists in the small South Asian nation of Bhutan, where each tourist pays a tax of USD 100 a night. But while a tax might deter the budget-conscious, it probably wouldn't deter high income, experience-driven tourists.

Alternatively, a cap-andtrade system would create a limited number of Antarctica visitor permits for a fixed pe riod. The initial distribution of permits could be among tourism operators or countries, via negotiation, auction or lottery. Unused permits could then be sold, making them quite valuable.

Caps have been successful at managing tourism impacts elsewhere, such as Lord Howe Island, although there are no trades allowed in that system.

Any cap on tourist num bers in Antarctica, and rules for trading, must be based on evidence about what the environment can handle. But there is a lack of precise data on Ant arctica's carrying capacity. And permit allocations amongst the operators and nations would need to be fair and inclusive.

Alternatively, existing industry standards could be augmented with independent schemes certifying particular practices - for example, reducing carbon footprints. This could be backed by robust monitoring and enforcement to avoid greenwashing.

New Delhi, July 8: India plans to source about 10 per cent of its cooking gas imports from US beginning in 2026 as part of a broader effort to boost energy purchases to narrow its trade gap with Washington, four industry refining sources familiar with the matter said.

The world's third biggest oil importer and consumer relies heavily on Middle Eastern producers of liquefied petroleum gas (LPG), with more than 90 per cent of its roughly 20.5 million metric tons of imports in 2024 coming from the region.

LPG is a mix of propane and



butane used for cooking fuel and is mainly imported by state retailers Indian Oil Corp, Bharat Petroleum Corp and Hindustan Petroleum Corp and sold at a subsidised price to households.

Wrestler Reetika Hooda fails dope test

New Delhi: In a massive blow to Indian wrestling, talented Reetika Hooda, who became the country's first-ever U23 World champion in 2023, has been suspended provisionally by NADA for flunking a dope test, and is staring at a four-year ban. The 22-year-old Reetika, who also became the first Indian to qualify for the Olympics in heavyweight 76kg category, was tested March 15 during the selection trials for the Asian Championship and her urine sample found traces of \$1.1 Anabolic Androgenic Steroids, which is a prohibited substance. "There is nothing confirmed as yet. I have not done anything wrong. I will fully co-operate with the officials. I have full faith in NADA and the (Wrestling) Federation. I can't say more than that." Reetika told PTI. The wrestler is considering going for a 'B sample' testing. After a failed Olympic campaign, Reetika won a silver medal at the Asian Championship in March and also put up a dominant show at the UWW Ranking Series event in Mongolia, winning a gold in May this year.
