8-yr-old girl raped, murdered in Assam

eight-year-old girl was allegedly raped and killed at a tea garden in this district of Assam, police said Sunday. The incident happened at a small tea garden in Kachari Pathar under Namrup police station Saturday when the girl was out to collect firewood, they said.

"The accused was fishing nearby when he saw the girl alone. He allegedly raped and killed her, most likely by smothering," an officer said.

The accused then concealed the body in a drain, covering it with hav and grass, he said.

"When the girl did not return home, her parents along with neighbours began searching for her. They also informed the police. The body was found around 8:40pm," he added.

Locals caught the accused when he tried to flee from the scene and handed him over to the police. The accused had killed his mother and served 14 years in jail for it before being released three years ago police said.

Konark, August 10: In a tragic incident, three youths drowned while taking bath in Chandrabhaga beach here, Sunday. Another person sustained injuries too, police said.

The deceased were identified as Rahul Kumar Senapati, 25, vounger son of Khetrabasi Senapati of Jamatala village and Arupananda Jena, 25, son of Bimbadhar Jena from the same village under Konark police limits. The third was identified as Pintu Pattnavak of Pahal area in Cuttack district.

Shiv Kumar, 25, of Uttar Pradesh was injured and undergoing treatment at a hospital. Police said Pintu drowned while bathing with his friends about 1 km from Chandrabhaga

In a separate incident near Chandrabhaga Eco Retreat, three friends employed at a private four-wheeler servicing company were taking bath when two of them - Senapati



and Jena - were swept away by the current.

Fire Services personnel from Champahar fire station, led by their officer Bichitra Kumar Choudhury, rescued the victims. Shiv Kumar was admitted to Konark hospital for treatment while the other two were shifted to Gop community health centre, where doctors declared Rahul and Arupananda dead. Pintu's body was sent to Puri DHH for postmortem. The bodies of Senapati and Jena were seized by Chandrabhaga Marine police and taken to Charichhak CHC for autopsy.

The Marine police registered separate cases of unnatural death and launched investigations, said IIC Pratima Sahu.

3 drown in Chandrabhaga CM launches 650-bed facility at Koraput hosp

Bhubaneswar/ Koraput, August 10: In a major fillip to healthcare in southern Odisha, Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi Sunday inaugurated a new building with 650 beds at Shaheed Laxman Nayak Medical College and Hospital in Koraput. Majhi also announced that his government will develop a six-lane highway, the Jeypore-Bermhapur-Bhubaneswar economic corridor'.

He said the new building at the hospital has been built at a cost of ₹280 crore.

"The state government has been making available all facilities at the medical college, so that people of Koraput and adjoining areas do not have to travel to distant cities for healthcare services," he said.



ple of Malkangiri, Nabarangpur and Rayagada districts, besides those from nearby areas of neighbouring Andhra Pradesh and Chhattisgarh. He also said all vacant posts at the medical college would be filled soon.

"A cancer treatment centre is also being built on two acre land adjacent to this hospital.

For this, our government is spending about ₹41.15 crore," he said. Maihi said there are currently 12 government medical colleges in the state, and four more will be set up in Dhenkanal, Bhadrak, Jagatsinghpur and Nabarangpur.

A total of 3.46 crore people (80% of the state's population) are getting free healthcare cover under Ayushman Bharat and Gopabandhu Jan Arogya Yojana schemes, he said.

"Till now, about 3.91 lakh people have been provided medical facilities worth ₹900 crore under these two schemes," he said. "Similarly, 8,644 people above 70 years of age have been provided healthcare benefits worth ₹35.60 crore under Ayushman Vaya Vandana Yojana," he added.

The CM said the people of Koraput will also reap the benefits of development, as a significant amount of work has been accomplished in just one year of the BJP government in the state.

Addressing the function, Health Minister Mukesh Mahaling said another new chapter was added to the history of healthcare services in Koraput with the expansion of the hospital.

Georgia, August 10: A meteorite that crashed into a Georgia home in June this year is older than the Earth itself and is believed to have been formed 4.56 billion years ago, according to scientists who are studying the space rock.

 $On lookers\ in\ the\ Southeast\ of$ Georgia were taken aback when they saw a fireball streaking across the sky June 26, 2025, according to a report by 'Independent'.

Fragments of the meteorite hurtled into the roof of a homeowner in McDonough, Henry County, just south of Atlanta, leaving behind a hole the size of a golf ball in the ceiling and a dent in the floor, the report said.

Scott Harris, a researcher in the University of Georgia's Franklin College of Arts and Sciences' department of geology, has been studying the fragments and believes the meteorite formed 4.56 billion years ago. The Earth is thought to be 4.543 billion years old.

A press release issued by the university, quoting Harris, said, "This particular meteor that entered the atmosphere has a long history before it made it to the ground of Mc-Donough, and in order to totally understand that, we actually have to examine what the rock is and determine what group of asteroids it belongs to.'

Using optical and electron microscopy to analyze the fragments, Harris said he believes

ordinary Chondrite.

"It belongs to a group of asteroids in the main asteroid belt between Mars and Jupiter that we now think we can tie to a breakup of a much larger

asteroid about 470 million years ago," Harris said. "But in that breakup, some pieces get into Earth-crossing orbits, and if given long enough, their orbit around the sun and Earth's orbit around the sun end up being at the same place, at the same moment in time.' The sound and vibration the

meteor made was equivalent to a close-range gunshot. The homeowner told Harris he's still finding specks of space dust around his living room from the collision. "I suspect that he heard

three simultaneous things,' Harris said. "One was the collision with his roof, one was a tiny cone of a sonic boom and a third was it impacting the floor all in the same moment. There was enough energy when it hit the floor that it pulverized part of the material down to literal dust fragments." The meteorite, which has been named McDonough, is the 27th to be recovered in Georgia's history.





KENDRAPARA 'SELF-IMMOLATION'

POLICE ARREST EX-BOYFRIEND

Bhubaneswar/Kendrapara, August 10: The ex-boyfriend of the 19-year-old woman, who died allegedly by setting herself on fire in Kendrapara district, was arrested Sunday on charges of abetment of suicide and sexual harassment,

police said.

The woman's charred body was found on the staircase of her house August 6, following which her father alleged that her ex-boyfriend shared their intimate videos online, which forced her to take her life.

The woman broke up with the accused, Pramod Behera, following which he started threatening her to make their intimate videos public. As he sent the videos to different persons, including the woman's father, she took her life, police said

The woman's family had also

alleged that she sought the police's help regarding the matter, but no action was taken.

Behera was booked under BNS sections 296 (obscene act), 75 (sexual harassment), 78 (stalking) and 108 (abetment of suicide), and sections 66-E and 67-A of the IT Act, Kendrapara SP Siddharth Kataria told renorters

"There are at least 60 obscene videos in the mobile phone of the accused," he said.

"The accused had sent one of the videos to the mobile phone of the deceased woman's father July 17. He has also sent such videos to five-six other persons. He had sent a message to the deceased at 7:34 am August 6, following which she died. He had also called the victim August 5," the SP said.

He said the investigators were now waiting for the post-mortem examination reports.

Meanwhile, the accused's father threatened that he would also die by setting himself on fire outside the police station if his son was not released.

"I am a poor man because of which justice is denied to me. My son is innocent," he claimed. The accused's mother and sister admitted that he had a relationship with the victim, but denied that he blackmailed her. They alleged that the woman's father had set his daughter on fire in a case of 'honour killing'.

Based on the allegation, police have interrogated the victim's father and brother, besides speaking to her mother.

Odisha's 1st desalination plant unveiled in Ganjam

Berhampur, August 10: Union Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan Sunday inaugurated Odisha's first seawater desalination plant in Ganjam district.

The plant, at Matikhal near Chhatarpur, will convert seawater into freshwater using reverse osmosis (RO). It has been developed by the Odisha Sands Complex (OSCOM), a unit of Indian Rare Earths Limited (IREL).

Around 4 lakh litres of water will be supplied from the plant every day, benefitting around 7,000 people. PM Narendra Modi had launched the plant in March last year from Bhubaneswar.Pradhan said that with the operationalisation of the plant, the water problems of two seashore villages will be solved.

"The villagers were facing drinking water problems due to the salinity in the groundwater," he said.

NURSING STUDENT'S DEATH

BJD's 12-hr Raighar bandh today

Bhubaneswar, August 10: The Biju Janata Dal (BJD) Sunday announced a 12-hour bandh August 11 (Monday) in Raighar block to protest the death of a female nursing student from Dumurimunda village in Nabarangpur district.

The bandh will be observed from 6am to 6pm, during which all private and government institutions—including schools, colleges, markets, shops—and vehicular movement will remain suspended. However, emergency services will continue to operate uninterrupted.

The party alleged a sharp rise in violence against women in the state, creating a climate of fear that is making women hesitant to step out of their homes.

The BJD demanded the resignation of Deputy Chief Minister Pravati Parida, accusing the government of failing to protect women.

The party has also demanded

₹1 crore compensation for the victim's family. "Until women, students, and minors in Odisha are safe, the BJD will continue to intensify its statewide agitation to demand justice," the statement said.

The victim was reportedly harassed for months by a youth identified as Satyajit Sarkar, who wanted to be in a relationship with her. The situation worsened when Satyajit allegedly assaulted her in a local market July 13 and later leaked obscene videos and photos of her on social media. The humiliation reportedly drove her to consume pesticide on July 17.

She was initially treated at a local hospital before being shifted to AIIMS-Bhubaneswar as her condition worsened. Sadly, she died August 9 while undergoing treatment.

The police have arrested Satyajit and another youth in connection with the case, and investigations are ongoing.

Two, including para-athlete Jogendra, die in dog attack

Gudvela, August 10: In a tragic incident at Chhendjad village under Gudvela block in Bolangir district, para-athlete Jogendra Chhatria (33) died late Saturday night at Burla Medical College, succumbing to injuries sustained in a stray dog attack. Jogendra, who was unmarried, had represented Odisha and India in volleyball. His family said he aspired to excel in the sport and bring glory to the nation.

Another villager, Hrushikesh Rana (47), also died Sunday after being bitten by the same dog, while four others remain in critical condition and are receiving medical treatment.

According to reports, a stray dog attacked several residents of Chhendjad village July 23 including Keshab Nag, Meghnad Chhatria, Phul Chhatria, R. Rana, player Jogendra, and Hrushikesh—one after another. All were admitted to a nearby health centre.

As the condition of Jogendra and Hrushikesh worsened, they were first shifted to Bhima Bhoi Medical College and Hospital in Bolangir, and later referred to Burla Hospital. Jogendra was declared dead by doctors Saturday night.

Hrushikesh was advised to be taken home without further treatment. While being brought back, he died around 9:30am Sunday. His last rites were performed in the village, while Jogendra's cremation took place in Burla after post-mortem.

News of the two deaths has cast a pall of gloom over the village, with fear spreading among residents. Villagers have demanded proper attention to ensure the recovery of the remaining injured.

Perpetual War

lmost two years into the war in Gaza, the Israeli security cabinet has approved yet another military escalation -- a proposed takeover of Gaza City. This move, spearheaded by Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, aims to achieve five objectives: disarming Hamas, securing the return of all hostages, demilitarizing Gaza, ensuring Israeli security control in the region, and establishing a civil administration that is independent of both Hamas and the Palestinian Authority.

However, the move seems to reflect more of Netanyahu's domestic political strategy than a coherent military plan. The decision was made despite strong opposition and serious warnings from Israeli military leaders, who cautioned that it could exacerbate the humanitarian crisis and keep Israel in perpetual war.

Nevertheless, Netanyahu has advanced his plan, which offers him an unspoken advantage: it buys him time to secure his political position. For his current Far-Right coalition partners, this means extending the conflict. Time and again, his allies, Itamar Ben Gvir and Bezalel Smotrich, have obstructed ceasefire negotiations, threatening to destabilise his government if the war were to conclude. Yet, Netanyahu's strategy to encircle Gaza City does not fully meet the demands of his coalition partners. In fact, Ben Gvir and Smotrich are advocating for a complete occupation of the region, not just Gaza City, as a preliminary step toward rebuilding Jewish settlements in Gaza and ultimately annexing

The military concerns reflect a widespread sentiment among the Israeli public. Numerous opinion polls indicate that a majority of Israelis favour a ceasefire that would secure the return of the remaining hostages, numbering about 50, and bring an end to the conflict. Analysts and political opponents argue that Netanyahu's current decision-making is out of touch with both military counsel and public opinion. It is, instead, driven by the urgent need for his political survival.

Netanyahu's plan for a takeover of Gaza also places him and Israel in a position of unprecedented international isolation. Although US President Donald Trump's administration has provided him with considerable leeway in the Gaza conflict, the escalating famine and humanitarian crisis have eroded global support for Israel's actions. The repercussions of the latest cabinet decision were swift and clear: Germany—Israel's second most crucial strategic ally after the United States—announced it would suspend some military exports to Israel, potentially prompting other European Union nations to further diminish their relations with the country.

Despite receiving support from the United States, Israel is grappling with a significant crisis in international credibility, which may take a long time to overcome. A recent Pew poll indicates that global perceptions of Israel are now more negative than positive. In early 2025, a majority of respondents from countries like the Netherlands (78 per cent), Japan (79 per cent), Spain (75 per cent), Australia (74 per cent), Turkey (93 per cent), and Sweden (75 per cent) expressed an unfavour-

The Israeli military intervention since the 7 October 2023 Hamas attack has so far claimed the lives of over 60,000 Palestinians. As images of starving children in Gaza have flooded the news in recent weeks, many of Israel's allies in the Western world are reaching a breaking point with its policies. In a significant shift in the global sentiment, France has announced plans to recognise Palestinian statehood, prompting the United Kingdom and Canada to pledge similar actions. Germany has also initiated steps toward recognition, while Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese has suggested that his country's acknowledgment of Palestine is imminent. Additionally, Spain and Sweden have called for the suspension of the European Union's trade agreement with Israel, and the Netherlands has officially designated Israel as a 'security threat," citing efforts to sway public opinion in the country.

A takeover of Gaza escalates the fight with Hamas without any way of ending it. While twenty months of attacks have severely weakened Hamas, the group's capacity to mount a limited insurgency remains. And, insurgencies are hard to defeat, as the US learned it the hard way in Vietnam and Iraq. Perpetual wars leave everyone worse off.

SAVING THE LAST LUNG

naturally grown forest reserve of some 105 acres that has taken root and thrived over the last three decades or thereabouts is the focus of a new battle that is receiving national attention. The fate of the pink city's last green lung now lies between the rising crescendo of a movement trying to protect it and bulldozers determined to flatten it for structures that will include a mall, a fintech park and residential buildings.

The structures are part of a large-scale commercial project that is essential for economic growth and job creation, argues the State represented by the Rajasthan Industrial Development and Investment Corporation (RIICO). Opponents say these structures can be put up elsewhere and should not remove or in any manner disturb the forest that is home to 2,400 trees, over 80 bird species (some of them endangered, many migratory), and native wildlife including nilgai, porcupine, mongoose, snakes, peacocks and a wide variety of unusual butterflies.

The movement to preserve what is a rare gem of nature in the heart of an urban centre has echoes in other movements that have risen from the grassroots to resist top down. environment-unfriendly development agenda in other parts of the country. In that sense, the movement in Jaipur has echoes of prolonged efforts to save the Aarey forest in Mumbai which has had to make space for a metro rail car shed, or protests against the planned cycle walk through Jahanpanah forest in South Delhi or the case of the Khalanga Reserve Forest in Dehradun,

which is threatened by a water reservoir project that would require cutting approximately 2,000 Sal trees.

Urban forests provide a range of valuable ecosystem services, including carbon sequestration, improved air and water quality, and reduced noise pollution. In Mumbai. for example, anyone who visited Aarey before many trees were cut down noticed a clear drop in temperature all year round; the cooler and cleaner air drew thousands to the area just to breathe better and get away from the rush of the 'Urbs Prima in Indis'.

Far away from Jaipur, the city of Kochi is experiencing flooding and extreme heat risks. The increasing heat stress comes from the city's dwindling tree cover caused by unplanned urban expansion. Kochi's susceptibility to these hazards is also on account of its dense population, coastal geography and limited adaptive capacity. Estimates from satellite data reflect that approximately 31% of the city's population is exposed to temperatures above 30 degrees Celsius and about 26% lives within flood plains. Local authorities and leaders are seeking a larger role for forests in the city's new disaster management and climate change adaptation plan. The Kochi Municipal Corporation is now working with local community-based organisations like Kudumbashree, a Kerala State's women-led poverty eradication mission, and other groups like Cities4Forests to promote planting trees and reactivating forestry. Kochi, Mumbai and Bangalore are 3 Indian metros that have joined Cities4Forests, a global alliance that helps cities around the world better conserve.

manage and restore nature. Nagrika, an organisation looking at urban governance and development, has explored the issue of urban tree cover loss and highlighted the importance of urban forestry for low-carbon cities. The challenges and benefits of urban forestry are a complex system but there is no getting away from the well accepted and evidence-based view that loss of tree cover can exacerbate urban heat islands, as seen in

Many people don't associate cities with trees, and don't figure that urban areas are dependent on healthy forests. Trees within cities reduce heat, recharge the soil and water and provide spaces for recreation. Nearby trees in watersheds around cities filter drinking water and help prevent flooding and landslides.

The grassroots movements taking shape, like the one in Jaipur, tell us the issues of the environment are issues for ordinary people. Ordinary citizens, particularly the youth, are increasingly tending to stand up for the rights of nature, for their own rights to breathe clean air and live with nature around them, even in urban landscapes. They are also sensitive to the long-term impacts of climate change and are willing to put in the effort to stand up and resist development that hurts the environ-

This is an important socio-political change that must not be missed. It in fact builds on the ethos of India and its traditions, which show reverence and respect for nature, with every mountain and river often recognised as a place for prayer or a space for quiet contemplation. Reverence for nature comes to this land from the Isho Upanishad: Isha vasyam idam sarvam yat kincha jagatyam jagat, Tena tyaktena bhunjitha ma gridhah kasyasvid dhanam, which loosely translated means "All that is on Earth is enveloped by the Lord. Enjoy by renunciation...

mid US President Donald Trump's 50% tariff assault, most Indians ignored the severe slide in the stock market since 7 April, repeated with Operation Sindoor on 7 May, and peaking on 8 August for unimpressive earnings, stretched valuations and large foreign capital (FPI) outflows in between April and

The Sensex has been in a bear hug for the last six consecutive weeks. The market is shaken by Trump's statement on putting off talks until the tariff dispute is resolved. On 8 August, Sensex crashed 847 points, or 1.05%, to hit an intraday low of 79,775.84. The Nifty also dropped by 1.05% to hit the day's low of 24,337.50. Broader markets underperformed. The BSE Midcap index lost 1.56%, while the Smallcap index lost 1.03%. The overall market capitalisation of BSE-listed firms dropped to ₹440 lakh crore from ₹445 lakh crore in the previous session. Thus, the massive across-segments sell-off made investors poorer by about ₹5 lakh crore in a single session, as per market estimates

Foreign investors had put in ₹14,590 crore in the country's equity market in June. marking the third straight

month of investment, supported by improving global liquidity conditions, easing geopolitical tensions, and a rate cut by the RBI. However, FPIs turned net sellers in July and pulled out ₹1,421 crore, in the first week of July itself, data with the depositories showed. FPIs made a total outflow of ₹17,741 crore in the whole of July, marking a shift after three consecutive months of inflows, according to data released by NSDL.

Since the US tariff announcement on 2 April, the total market value of all NSE-listed companies has fallen by \$280 billion. "In the current scenario of US tariff uncertainty, Indian markets will struggle a bit more," says Mahesh Patil, chief investment officer at Aditya Birla Sun Life Asset Management Company. Data from NSDL suggests sold equities worth ₹1.12 lakh crore in February, and outflows continued at ₹30,015 crore in March. The trend has persisted since last year. With the tariff war, this situation has aggravated further.

Although the situation is often linked to actions taken by Trump, other factors too are involved. India, facing significant domestic consequences in its political sphere, has

declined two major requests from the US: allowing free entry of farm goods and dairy products into the country. The government has maintained its position against permitting genetically modified food products. Domestic protests regarding US farm imports have contributed to this refusal. India has not opened its agricultural markets to US grains, fruit, dairy,

Agriculture sustains about 54% of India's population and at least 46% of labour. But farming household earnings are poor at ₹13,661 per month, on average. Agricultural farm income is just ₹4.476. The rest is oncome from other work. It would be imprudent to throw small farmers against highly mechanised farms of America. With crucial Bihar elections approaching, India's large farm-dependent population faces rising input costs and inflation that outpaces crop earnings, despite higher minimum support prices. This has significant political and economic implications. High agricultural employment highlights industry struggles to create sufficient jobs or provide adequate wages and conditions.

Increased financial market

volatility and potential disruptions in manufacturing and supply chains could further impact the economy. The economic turbulence is tied to a complex US-China-India-Russia dynamic. Possible turning points include a Trump-Vladimir Putin meeting, bilateral India–China or India–Russia summits, or a QUAD gathering hosted by India.

Meanwhile, doubts linger over whether the WTO can be revived or if it is sliding into irrelevance like the League of Nations before WW-II. India's moral stance in resisting Trump's tariff terms is clear, but the negotiation endgame remains uncertain. The answers are as complex. Even the smallest solution could change the tack. It is a critical phase. India is morally correct in stalling the Trump tariff negotiations. But that cannot be the end.

While India is projected to be a leading global growth engine in 2025, it faces headwinds from a slowing global economy and potential trade disruptions. The country's ability to manage these challenges and maintain its growth trajectory will be crucial for its long-term economic health.

Chance for peace

Sir, India's strategic doctrine of multi-alignment and autonomy reflects a deliberate effort to navigate a multi-polar world without being tethered to any single bloc. Rooted in its post-Independence legacy of non-alignment, this evolved framework allows India to engage with major powers—including the US, Russia, China, and the Global South—on an issue-based, interest-driven basis. This approach positions India as a bridge-builder in global affairs, offering a third path between alignment and isolationism. However, maintaining this autonomy is increasingly challenging amid intensifying great power rivalries. The US-China strategic competition places India in a delicate position: while it deepens defence and technological ties with Washington, it remains warv of being drawn into containment strategies against Beijing. Simultaneously, India's continued engagement with Russia—especially in energy and arms—has attracted scrutiny from the West. Border tensions with China and persistent friction with Pakistan further complicate India's regional calculus, testing its ability to remain non-aligned while safeguarding national security. India's reliance on Russian oil, Middle Eastern energy, and Western technology creates leverage points that external powers can exploit.



Three killed in road accident

Uttarkashi, August 10: A vital bridge was constructed in disaster-hit areas of Uttarkashi in Uttarakhand Sunday, with authorities focusing more on supplying relief materials to people who have been stranded without essentials for over five days now.

The sixth day of rescue operations to evacuate the stranded and find the missing was delayed till 10 am on Sunday due to bad weather. By 3 pm, 177 people were airlifted from disaster-hit areas by deploying helicopters. Around 1,200 people have been rescued so far.

The district administration has confirmed four deaths in the tragedy, the recovery of two bodies and 49 people missing since the disaster.

Chennai, August 10: After marking a humble beginning in the Indian space programme with a tiny rocket supplied by the United States, ISRO would launch a 6.500 kg communication satellite built by the US in the next couple of months, the chairman of the space agency, V Narayanan said Sunday.

Following the historic launch of NASA-ISRO Synthetic Aperture Radar (NISAR) mission onboard a GSLV-F16 rocket July



Chennai. Narayanan, who is also the

secretary of Department of Space, was presented with the honorary degree of Doctor of Science, by the Governor of Maharashtra CP Radhakrishnan, during the 21st Convocation of SRM Institute of Science and Technology at Kattankulathur near Chennai. In his acceptance speech, Narayanan recalled that the ISRO was set up in 1963 and the country was 6-7 vears behind advanced countries then. In the same year, a tiny rocket was donated by the United States marking the beginnings of the Indian Space Programme. "It was November 21, 1963," he said.

In 1975, through satellite data given by the US, ISRO demonstrated 'mass communication' by keeping 2,400 television sets across 2,400 villages of 6 Indian states, he said.


"From that (kind of humble beginnings), the 30th of July

was a historical day for the Indian space programme. We have launched the NISAR satellite. The costliest satellite ever built in the world. The L Band SAR payload from the USA and S Band payload provided by ISRO. The satellite was placed in orbit precisely by Indian launcher (GSLV). And today, we are shoulder to shoulder with advanced countries," Narayanan remarked.

He noted that the team from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) lauded their counterparts in IS RO for the precision launch of the GSLV-F16/NISAR Mission

From a country which did not possess satellite technology 50 years back, ISRO has, to date, launched 433 satellites of 34 countries using its own launch vehicles, he said.

Elucidating about the Indian space programme, he said, "Today, there are 55 applications where ISRO has been contributing for the welfare of the country.



VP polls: INDIA bloc promise a plans joint candidate

New Delhi, August 10: The INDIA bloc will put up a joint candidate for the vice presidential polls and Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge is reaching out to Opposition parties to explore names and reach a consensus on it, sources

They said that there was a strong feeling in the bloc that Opposition parties should not shy away from a contest to send a strong political message irrespective of the outcome.

Though there has not been any structured discussion on nicking a candidate backchannel talks are on among INDIA bloc partners to deliberate on names of possible candidates with Kharge reaching out to Opposition parties for building a consensus. There is consensus among

parties that the INDIA bloc will put up a joint candidate for the vice presidential polls, Congress sources said.

However, a section in the Opposition camp believes that the INDIA bloc must decide their candidate after the BJP announces its pick.

This comes at a time of heightened unity among IN-DIA bloc constituents who have vowed to fight against the Special Intensive Revision of electoral rolls in Bihar and alleged poll rigging.

In a show of unity, top INDIA bloc leaders held a dinner meeting at the residence of Congress leader Rahul Gandhi Thursday and vowed to fight the electoral rolls' revision in Bihar as well as what they described as the "vote chori model" of the BJP-Election Commission.

This was the first physical meeting of top leaders of the opposition bloc since they last met in June 2024, soon after the Lok Sabha elections at Congress chief Mallikarjun Kharge's residence.



Several leaders from 25 parties were present at the meeting, which included Kharge, Sonia Gandhi, NCP-SP chief Sharad Pawar, National Conference supremo Farooq Abdullah, PDP's Mehbooba Mufti, SP's Akhilesh Yadav, RJD's Tejashwi Yadav, TMC's Abhishek Banerjee, Shiv Sena(UBT) chief Uddhay Thackeray, DMK's Tiruchi Siva and TR Baalu, CPI(M)'s M A Baby, CPI's D Raja, CPI(ML)'s Dipankar Bhattacharya and MNM chief Kamal Haasan.

During the meeting, Gandhi gave a presentation on the "vote chori model" being allegedly perpetrated by the BJP through the Election Commission.

Congress general secretary (organisation) KC Venugopal termed the meeting as one of the "most successful". Asked whether the vice presidential election was also discussed, he had said, "There wasn't much discussion on the vice presidential election... There are other occasions for it".

Kharge will also host a dinner for INDIA bloc MPs Monday. In a sudden move, Jagdeep Dhankhar quit as vice president on the evening of August 4 citing medical reasons, though there have been consistent murmurs about other reasons behind his resignation.

The effective strength of both the Houses together is 781 and the winning candidate will require to win 391 votes in the

election for the vice president considering all eligible voters exercise their franchise. All members of Lok Sabha and Raiva Sabha, including the nominated ones, vote in the vice presidential poll. The NDA seems to have the numbers on its side with a strength of around 422 members. The Election Commission

last Thursday issued a notification for the September 9 vice presidential poll, kickstarting the exercise to elect Dhankhar's successor. Rajya Sabha Secretary

General P C Mody, the returning officer for the election, received three nomination papers, which were rejected for not being in order.

According to the notification, August 21 is the last date for filing nominations and the documents will be scrutinised August 22. The last date for the withdrawal of nominations is August 25.

According to constitutional provisions, in case of a midterm poll, the incumbent gets a full five-year term. A person cannot be elected as the vice president unless he is a citizen of India, has completed 35 years of age and is qualified for election as a member of Rajya

A person is also not eligible if he holds any office of profit under the government of India or a state government or any subordinate local authority.

'Downing of Pak special mission aircraft during Op Sindoor significant'

New Delhi, August 10: Air Chief Marshal A P Singh's assertion that Indian Air Force downed a large Pakistani aircraft from a distance of around 300 km, reflected its unprecedented air superiority that dealt a "huge" psychological blow to the adversary.

This is what military officials said while breaking down nuances of the Air Chief Marshal's address in Bengaluru Saturday where he said India shot down five Pakistani fighter jets and a large special mission aircraft during Operation Sindoor.

The IAF chief described the downing of either an ELINT (Electronic Intelligence) or AEW&C (Airborne Early Warning and Control) aircraft as the "largest-ever recorded surface-to-air kill" that we can talk about.

"It is significant as there is no publicly available information of a surface-to-air missile bringing down such an asset at a distance of 300 kms or beyond, said a senior military official on condition of anonymity. The strike dealt a massive

psychological, strategic and tactical blow that will be difficult for Pakistan to overcome, explained another official.

If it was an AEW&C aircraft,

In recent times, the airline has faced operational issues with some of its planes, including the Dreamliner. Air India's Dreamliners -- 26 legacy 787-8s and seven 787-9s -- had undergone checks, including that of fuel switches, after the fatal crash of a London Gatwick-bound 787-8 plane soon after take off from Ahmedabad that killed 260 people June 12. Under the USD 400 million fleet retrofit programme announced in December 2022, the Tata Group-owned airline has now started the retrofit of the first legacy Dreamliner, which was flown to a Boeing facility in Victorville, California in July 2025.

year, with more than 15 people submitting sworn affidavits and placing public advertisements in newspapers to declare their commitment to India and its Constitution.

"We do get many applications from erstwhile separatists, and everyone is evaluated based on their involvement in anti-national activities," a se-

He added that if the separatist is involved in a "heinous crime, we allow the law to take its own course.

Among the key leaders who have pledged to the Constitu-

tion include DPM's Mohammad Shafi Reshi, a former close aide of late Syed Ali Geelani and Shahid Saleem, chairman of the Jammu and Kashmir People's Movement.

Neelofer Akbar Bhat, the spouse of Jammu and Kashmir

Salvation Movement patron Zaffar Akbar Bhat, has made a public disassociation of her family with separatist conglomerate the All Parties Hurriyat Conference (APHC) Similarly, Fareeda Behen-

ji, chairperson of the Jammu Kashmir Mass Movement, has also formally separated herself and her organisation from separatist groups, stating in an affidavit that they have no links to the APHC or any similar platforms.

Pak lost Rs 4.1 bn after Indian airspace ban

Islamabad: Pakistan's airport body suffered a loss of Rs 4.1 billion in over two months due to the closure of airspace for Indian airlines, according to official data. Pakistan and India closed their respective airspaces for each other's airlines following the deadly Pahalgam terrorist attack in Kashmir April 22, which killed 26 people, mostly tourists. The airspace ban was extended after ties between the two countries deteriorated due to the four-day conflict as India **launched Operation Sindoor** May 7 and destroyed terror infrastructure in territories controlled by Pakistan.

Chinese diplomat Liu Jianchao detained

Beijing: Liu Jianchao. a senior Chinese diplomat heading the foreign relations department of the ruling Communist Party, has been detained for questioning, the Wall Street Journal reported Sunday. The 61-year-old senior diplomat was taken away for questioning in late July after returning to Beijing from an overseas work trip, the paper reported, quoting people familiar with the matter. There is, however, no official confirmation of his detention yet. Liu, the Minister of the International Department of the Communist Party of China (CPC), is regarded as the potential future foreign minister and shares close ties with President Xi Jinping.

Magnitude 6.1 quake hits Turkey

Istanbu: An earthquake of magnitude 6.1 struck western Turkey on Sunday, the country's AFAD disaster management authority said, while local media said the quake was felt across multiple provinces. AFAD said the quake occurred at around 7:53pm local time in the Balikesir province, near Turkey's biggest city Istanbul, but there were no immediate reports of casualties or damage in any of the affected provinces. Local media reports that one building collapsed in the town of Sindirgi, the epicentre of the earthquake.

Haiti declares 3-month state of emergency

San Juan: Haiti's government announced Saturday that it is implementing a three-month state of emergency in the country's central region as gang violence surges. The measure will cover Haiti's West, Artibonite and Centre departments "to continue the fight against insecurity and respond to the agricultural and food crisis," according to a government statement.

SK's military shrinks by 20% in 6 years as male population drops

Seoul, August 10: South Korea's military shrank by 20% in the past six years to 450,000 troops, largely due to a sharp drop in the population of males of enlistment age for mandatory service in the country with the world's lowest birthrate, a report said Sunday.

The dramatic decline in the pool of available males for military service is also causing a shortfall in the number of officers and could result in operational difficulty if it continues, the defence ministry said

The report was made to the ruling Democratic Party member of parliament Choo Mi-ae, whose office released it.

South Korea's military has steadily declined since the early 2000s when it had about 690,000 soldiers. The pace accelerated during the late 2010s and there were about 563,000 active-duty soldiers and officers in 2019.

North Korea is believed to have an active-duty military of about 1.2 million, according to the latest estimate by the defence ministry in 2022. In the period between 2019



and 2025, the population of 20-year-old males declined by 30% to 230,000, according to government data, the age when

most men who pass a physical exam enlist for military service, which is now 18 months long.

The military has cited im-

proved capabilities as a key reason for shortening service periods, made possible by a military alliance with the United States and the development of a defence industry that has become a major exporter of arms.

Able-bodied men served 36 months in 1953 when the Korean War ended in an armistice.

South Korea's defence budget, at more than 61 trillion won (\$43.9 billion) in 2025. is larger than the estimated size of North Korea's economy.

Still, the military is 50,000 troops short of the number of troops adequate for maintaining defence readiness, the ministry said. About 21,000 of the shortfall is in the non-commissioned officer ranks, it said.

South Korea is one of the world's fastest ageing societies and has the lowest fertil ity rate in the world at 0.75 in 2024, which signifies the average number of babies a woman is expected to have during her reproductive life.

Its population, which hit a peak of 51.8 million in 2020, is expected to shrink to 36.2 million by 2072, according to a government projection.

'Gaza City push aims to end war quickly'

Netanyahu defends planned military offensive in Gaza, lashes out at 'global campaign of lies'

Jerusalem. August 10: Israel aims to take on Hamas' two remaining strongholds in its new Gaza offensive, which it hopes will conclude "fairlv quickly" and end the war, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said Sunday.

Israel approved the new plan to expand its military operations and take control of Gaza City, the territory's largest urban centre, in a move that drew fresh criticism at home and abroad, including from several European countries. He spoke to foreign media

minutes before an emergency meeting of the United Nations Security Council on Gaza. Notably, Netanyahu said he has directed Israel's military in recent days to "bring in more foreign journalists" - which would be a striking development, as they haven't been allowed into Gaza beyond military embeds during 22 months of war.

Gaza, our goal is to free Gaza," Netanyahu asserted. He also pushed back against what he called a "global campaign of lies" - and said Chancellor Friedrich Merz of Germany, one of Israel's strongest backers, had "buckled under" by announcing that Germany won't authorise exports of military equipment to Israel that could be used in Gaza until further notice.

Netanyahu said there is a "fairly short timetable" in mind for next steps in Gaza, but didn't give specifics. The goals there, he said, include demilitarising the territory, the Israeli military having "overriding security control" there and a non-Israeli civilian administration in charge.

Netanyahu again blamed many of Gaza's problems on the Hamas militant group, including civilian deaths, destruction and shortages of aid. "Hamas still has thousands of armed terrorists in Gaza," he asserted, adding that Palestinians are "begging" the world to be freed from them.

The prime minister, who has asserted that there is "no starvation in Gaza," did acknowledge hunger there. saying, "there was a problem with deprivation, no question about it." Israel wants to increase the number of aid distribution sites, he said, but

Ukraine seeks place at table with Trump, Putin

Kyiv, August 10: Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskiy thanked European leaders Sunday for backing his demand for a seat at the table as Russia and the United States prepare for a summit this week where Kyiv fears they could seek to dictate terms to it for ending the 3-1/2-year war. US President Donald Trump,

who for weeks had been threatening new sanctions against Russia for failing to halt the conflict, announced instead last Friday that he would hold an August 15 summit with Russian President Vladimir Putin in Alaska.

A White House official said Saturday that Trump was open to Zelenskiy attending, but that preparations currently were for a bilateral meeting with Putin.

The Kremlin leader last week ruled out meeting Zelenskiy at this point, saying the conditions for such an encounter were "unfortunately still far from being met.

Trump said a potential deal would involve "some swapping of territories to the betterment of both (sides)", a statement that compounded Ukrainian alarm that it may face pressure to surrender more land.

Yunus calls for full security at polling stations

Dhaka, August 10: Bangladesh Chief Adviser Muhammad Yunus has called for "complete security" at polling centres for the country's general elections set to take place in February 2026, stressing the need to make the polls "free, fair and peaceful", a media report said Sunday. The interim government head

made the remarks Saturday at a high-level meeting at the state guest house Jamuna here, reported the state-run Bangladesh Sangbad Sangstha (BSS).

"We must guarantee complete security at all polling centres, no matter the cost Our goal is to make the February election the most free, fair, and peaceful in the country's history," Yunus was quoted as saying.

The polls next year would be the 13th Parliamentary elec tions. At the meeting, Yunus special assistant on Telecommunications and Information and Communication Technol ogy (ICT) Affairs Faiz Tavel Ahmed said the process to procure 40,000 body cameras was in the final stages.

The use of bodycams by police will enhance security at voting booths during the upcoming elections, he said.

"We are aiming to procure the bodycams by October so police officers can receive adequate training on their key features, including AI capabil ities," he added.

Yunus ordered officials to

expedite the process and ensure proper training for the police personnel, according to the report. Bangladesh's Chief Elec-

tion Commissioner (CEC) AMM Nasir Uddin on Saturday said general elections would be held in the first week of February 2026.

UK police make 474 arrests in Palestine Action protest

London, August 10: London's Metropolitan Police arrested more than 466 people at a protest on Saturday against Britain's decision to ban the group Palestine Action, the force said.

British lawmakers banned Palestine Action under anti-terrorism legislation in July after some of its members broke

into a Royal Air Force base and damaged planes as part of a series of protests. The group accuses Britain's government of complicity in what it says are

Israeli war crimes in Gaza. Protesters, some wearing black and white Palestinian scarves and waving Palestinian flags, chanted "hands off Gaza", and held placards with the message "I oppose genocide.

of genocide at the International Court of Justice and from human rights groups over its devastating military assault in Gaza.


ussia's full-scale war on Ukraine is one piece of Rukrame is one parameter abroader campaign to restore a sphere of influence in post-Soviet Eurasia. The 2022 invasion came as a shock to many of Russia's neighbours in Eastern Europe, the South Caucasus, and Central Asia. confirming their fears that Russia remained a threat to the sovereignty and territorial integrity of their countries. Yet because the war in Ukraine has been a massive drain on Russian attention and resources, it has also presented many of these countries with an opportunity. Taking advantage of Moscow's distraction, they have enhanced their cooperation with one another, cultivated and deepened partnerships outside the region, and loosened some of the bonds tying them to their former imperial hegemon.

Improved cooperation within the wider region is also creating new opportunities to enhance trade connectivity and build alternatives to transit through Russia. By reducing the dependence that once defined their relationship with their former hegemon, countries in the region have become increasingly capable of engaging Russia (and other powers) on favorable terms. And yet if history is any

guide, Moscow could go to extreme lengths to preserve its regional dominion. In 2014, before the full-scale invasion of Ukraine, Russia annexed Crimea and intervened in the

lowest attrition rate New Delhi: ICICI Bank has reported the lowest employee attrition rate among large private sector lenders in the last three financial years, reflecting higher stickiness due to competitive remuneration and a better working environment. During the last three financial years, the industry has also witnessed a sustained decline on a year-on-year basis. The employee attrition rate at the country's second-largest private sector bank declined to 18 per cent in FY25 from 24.5 per cent in FY24, according to the bank's latest Business Responsibility and Sustainability Reporting (BRSR) report. During 2022-23, the bank reported an attrition rate of 30.9 per cent, lower than its competitors. Its larger peer, HDFC Bank, has recorded an employee attrition rate of 22.6 per cent in FY25, compared to 26.9 per cent in FY24. The attrition was 34.2 per cent during 2022-23. Similarly, the attrition was 25.5 per cent for Axis Bank, down from 28.8 per cent in FY24, and Kotak Mahindra Bank's manpower exit rate fell to 33.3 per cent from 39.6 per cent in the previous year, according to their annual and BRSR reports. For IndusInd Bank, the attrition rate was 29 per cent in FY25, lower than 37 per cent witnessed during 2023-24 and 51 per cent in FY23. Govt to review petrol pump licensing norms

New Delhi, August 10: The government is considering further easing the norms for setting up petrol pumps in the world's fastest-growing fuel market, in light of the evolving energy security paradigm and commitment to decarbonisation, according to an official

The government relaxed the norms earlier in 2019 for setting up petrol pumps, to help non-oil companies to enter the fuel retailing business. At that time, companies with

a net worth of ₹250 crore were permitted to sell petrol and diesel, provided they committed to setting up infrastructure for at least one new-generation alternative fuel, such as CNG, LNG, biofuels, or EV charging, within three years of beginning their

For companies wanting to sell petrol and diesel to retail and bulk consumers, the networth criteria was set at ₹500 crore.

The Ministry of Petroleum and Natural Gas has now constituted an expert committee to review the 2019 guidelines

The expert committee will "assess the effectiveness of the

policy framework with national commitment towards decar bonisation, electrical mobility and promotion of alternative fuel: and address issues in implementation of existing guidelines," the order said.

RBI eases claim settlement process of deceased customers

Mumbai. August 10: The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) plans to standardise forms to process claims on deceased customers bank accounts and lockers within a 15-day timeframe and provide compensation to nominees for any settlement delays.

The bank proposes to come out with standard procedures for the settlement of claims in respect of bank accounts, and articles kept in safe custody or safe deposit lockers of deceased bank customers. The aim is to make the settlement more convenient and simpler.

Towards this, the central bank has issued 'Draft Circular Reserve Bank of India (Settlement of Claims in respect of Deceased Customers of Banks) Directions, 2025' and invited comments and feedback on it by August 27.

"A bank shall use the standardised forms for receiving the claims and other documents..., said the draft.

It also has provisions for compensation for delay in the settlement of claims.

In case a nominee has been provided in deposit accounts or lockers, he or she would have to submit a claim form, death

claims, a bank, based on its risk management systems, should fix a threshold limit, subject to a minimum of ₹15 lakh.

In cases of claim amount up to the threshold limit, additional documents like a bond of indemnity/surety signed by the claimants and a letter of disclaimer no objection from non-claimant legal heirs, if applicable, will be

For a claim amount above the threshold limit, a succession certificate, or a legal heir certificate issued by a competent authority, or a declaration regarding the legal heirs of the deceased depositor would also be needed.

of claims in a safe deposit locker and articles in safe custody kept by the deceased customer in cases without a nominee/survivor.

It further said that a bank should settle a claim in respect of deposit accounts of a deceased customer within a period not exceeding 15 calendar days from the date of receipt of all the requisite documents associated with the claim, it said.

"In case of safe deposit locker/ articles in safe custody, the bank shall, within 15 days of receipt of all the requisite documents, process the claim and issue communication to the claimant for fixing the date for taking inventory of the locker/ articles in safe custody," said the draft.

According to the draft, the standardised forms and other documents required for settlement of claims with respect to the deposit accounts/ safe deposit locker/ articles in safe custody kept by a deceased customer should be made available in all the branches as well as on the bank's website.

Banks should also display on their website the list of documents to be submitted by a claimant and the procedure to be followed for the settlement of claims in various scenarios.

Public charging infra development vital for EV adoption: Maruti Suzuki

New Delhi, August 10: The development of public charging infrastructure will play a vital role in faster adoption of electric vehicles as driving range anxiety has emerged as a deterrent to customers to accept an EV as a primary car in a household, according to a senior Maruti Suzuki India executive.

The sales of electric passenger vehicles in the domestic market have almost doubled, but the overall base still remains small.

"Total contribution of EVs is 4.5 per cent (overall PV sales), it has grown from 2.4 per cent to 4.5 per cent. Absolutely, if you see numberwise, growth is 100 per cent. But is it sustainable?' Maruti Suzuki India Senior Executive Officer (Marketing

& Sales) Partho Banerjee said in an interaction.

Maruti Suzuki is set to introduce its first electric model e-VITARA this fiscal.

Banerjee stated that the segment is not witnessing adequate growth as customers do not perceive EVs as the primary car in a household. "He (customer) has got many

inhibitions that EV cannot be my first car. A person who just wants to have one car doesn't want EV to be the first car," he added. According to FADA sales

data, electric passenger vehicle retail sales jumped 93 per cent year-on-year in July. Total electric passenger vehicle registrations rose to 15,528 units last month as compared with 8.037 units in the year-ago period.

Banerjee said that while au-

Athletes live up to expectations

Sreeshankar shine in India's maiden **WA Continental Tour event**

Bhubaneswar, August 10: Star sprinter Animesh Kujur, veteran javelin thrower Annu Rani and long jump ace Murali Sreeshankar lived up to expectations by winning their respective events at India's maiden World Athletics Continental Tour competition here Sunday.

The bronze level event went off smoothly but the quality of competitions did not rise to any great heights.

There was drama in store as far as Kujur is concerned. The 22-year-old pulled up after a few paces in his men's 100m heat race in the morning. He then came out to run his 200m heat half an hour later and qualified for the final with a time of 20.99

In the evening, he ran 20.77 seconds in the 200m final to win the gold. Ko Seunghwan of Korea (20.95 seconds) and another Indian Ragul Kumar (21.17 seconds) were second and third respectively.


Kujur, representing Odisha, holds national records in both 100m (10.18 seconds) and 200m (20.32 seconds).

Sreeshankar, representing JSW, was up against rising teenager Shahnavaz Khan, who won gold in Uttarakhand National Games in February. The 17-year-old Khan was leading with his fourth round jump of 8.04m, while Sreeshankar was second with 7.95m.

But the 26-year-old Sreeshankar produced 8.13m in his final attempt to take the gold in dramatic fashion for his fourth title in a row since coming back from a long injury lay-off.

He is, however, yet to breach the Tokyo World Championships direct entry mark of

Khan became the latest en-





trant to the 8m club in the Indian men's long jump. His earlier best was 7.90m.

In women's javelin, Asian Games champion Annu Rani bagged the gold with a fourth round throw of 62.01m, thereby strengthening her chances of making it to the Tokyo World Championships in September.

The men's javelin event disappointed the crowd at the Kalinga Stadium as the Indian participants barely crossed the 80m mark.

Sri Lanka's Rumesh Tharanga Pathirage, who finished third in the NC Classic hosted by Neeraj Chopra July 5 in Bangalore, took the men's javelin gold with his first round throw

86.50m, thereby breaching the World Championships direct entry mark of 85.50m.

India's 20-year-old Shivam Lohakare, the latest entrant in the 80m club at the Indian Open Athletics Meet in Pune last month with 80.95m, took the silver with 80.73m.

The immediate focus will be on sending the best team for the Asia Cup T20 tournament, hoping all players are fit and



available," a BCCI source privy to the developments told PTI on conditions of anonymity.

The BCCI never believes in taking decisions in haste and would always gauge the mood and public perceptions before taking a call, which is sensitive in nature considering the mas-

sive fan following of the two players.

The last tournament that they played was the Champions Trophy in Dubai where Kohli scored a hundred in a successful chase against Pakistan at the group league stage

while Rohit starred with a sub

lime half-century in the chase during the final.

However, both have not played competitive cricket since the conclusion of the Indian Premier League.

Kohli, who is now a resident of London, had recently posted an Instagram story after an indoor nets session, which is an indicator that he has started training.

Rohit, who was also in the UK on a break post IPL, is recently back in Mumbai and would certainly be expected to start training in a few days.

While there are some media reports about BCCI offering the duo a farewell game at Sydney October 25, the BCCI source in the know of things said that as of now, no such discussions have taken place.
