Woman gangraped after conversion

Bhograi, August 26: A woman in Balasore district was allegedly gangraped in captivity for five months by her boyfriend and his relatives after she was kidnapped and forced into religious conversion by the accused, police said Tuesday.

The victim, a kabaddi player from Bhograi, lodged a complaint with police Tuesday, alleging she was lured into a false romance by Abdul Gafar of Majhichhak village. She claimed that Gafar and others abducted her, kept her at multiple locations. Later, they raped her after changing her religion forcibly.

Police sent the woman to a shelter home in Balasore and scheduled for a medical examination Wednesday. An officer said a thorough investigation is underway to secure justice.

As her family planned her marriage elsewhere, the victim allegedly eloped with Gafar March 1, taking jewellery worth Rs 4 lakh. Her mother reported her missing, prompting a kidnapping case (76/2025) under relevant sections of BNS. The victim returned Tuesday with her parents and a lawyer, alleging she was held in Baripada, Baisinga and Gafar's home, where Gafar, his father Fakir Khan, brother-in-law, uncle and others raped her. However, she somehow managed to escape.

Flood: More than 170 villages inundated

Bhubaneswar, August 26: More than 170 villages in Balasore, Bhadrak and Jajpur districts of North Odisha were under flood water for the second consecutive day Tuesday, even as the IMD has warned of heavy rainfall in the next few days due to fresh low pressure area in the Bay of Bengal, officials said.

While 130 villages under three blocks of Baliapal, Bhograi and Jaleswar were flooded by the water of river Subarnarekha, around 45 villages in Jajpur are inundated by Baitarani flood water. Dhamnagar and Bhandaripokhari blocks of Bhadrak district are also affected. Some villages in Keonihar and Sundargarh districts have also been hit by the flood, officials said.

"Jajpur district has been severely hit due to a breach on the embankment of Kani river, a tributary of Baitarani river. I am going to the affected areas in Jajpur," Revenue and Disaster Management minister Suresh Pujari said, adding that

relief and rescue operations are in full swing in affected districts.

The minister said many people have been evacuated and sheltered in relief camps in all affected districts. The people were being provided with cooked food, dry food and also fodder for cattle.

Alleging that the floods in north Odisha are caused mostly due to unregulated flow of water from neighbouring Jharkhand, Pujari urged Governor Hari Babu Kambhampati to intervene into the matter and take measure to complete the Chandil Dam and Galudih Barrage projects across the Subarnarekha river.

As per the latest report, the water level of the Subarnarekha river at Rajghat was 10,70 metre above the danger mark of 10.36 metre. Similarly, the water level of Baitarani at Akhiapada was also flowing close to the danger mark, the official said.

Meanwhile, the IMD said that a fresh low-pressure area has formed over the northwest Bay of Bengal off the Odisha coast at 5.30 am Tuesday.5

Washington, August 26: The United States has issued a draft notice detailing plans to implement the additional 25 per cent tariff on Indian products, as previously announced by President Donald Trump, that will come into effect from August 27.

The Department of Homeland Security, in the draft order said the increased levies would hit Indian products that are "entered for consumption, or withdrawn from warehouse for consumption, on or after 12:01 am eastern daylight time on August 27, 2025"

This was on top of the 25 per cent tariff announced in late



July that came into effect from August 7.

However, Indian products will be exempt from the new 50 per cent tariff if they were "already loaded on a ship and in transit to the US before 12:01 am (EDT) on August 27, 2025, provided they are cleared for use in the country or taken out of a warehouse for consumption before 12:01 am (EDT) on September 17, 2025, and the importer certifies this to US Customs by declaring the special code HTSUS 9903.01.85"

NEW HERITAGE POLICY SOON TO PROTECT 3K SITES

Rhuhaneswar: A high-level meeting was conducted here at Lokseva Bhavar Tuesday to introduce a comprehensive heritage policy aimed at protecting, preserving, and developing the state's rich cultural legacy. Deputy Chief Minister Prayati Parida, who chaired the session, announced that a dedicated task force will oversee the conservation of more than 3,000 heritage sites across the state. The policy will initially focus on the holistic development of 75 key heritage sites. Law, Works, and Excise Minister Prithwira Harichandan; Minister of Odia Language, Literature and Culture. Sports and Youth Services, and Higher Education Suryavanshi Suraj; and senior officials from relevant departments attended the meeting, "Odisha's heritage is very ancient, yet many sites remain neglected," Parida observed. "A coordinated task force—bridging the tourism, culture, and works departments—is essential to safeguard these treasures," she said. Harichandan stressed the need to restore monuments and improve road connectivity to heritage destinations. He also announced plans to geo-tag all ancient temples and integrate initiatives linked to Jagannath culture across multiple sectors. To mark the 75th birth anniversary of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, the first phase will prioritise the protection of 75 heritage monuments with significant tourism potential, Suraj added.

Submerged Stone Age settlement unearthed in Denmark They hope further excavations

Bay of Aarhus (Denmark), August 26: Below the dark blue waters of the Bay of Aarhus in northern Denmark, archaeologists search for coastal settlements swallowed by rising sea levels more than 8,500 years ago.

This summer, divers descended about 26 feet below the waves close to Aarhus, Denmark's second-biggest city, and collected evidence of a Stone Age settlement from the seabed.

It's part of a 13.2 million euro (\$15.5 million) six-year international project to map parts of the seabed in the Baltic and North Seas, funded by the European Union, that includes researchers in Aarhus as well as from the UK's University of Bradford and the Lower Saxony Institute for Historical Coastal Research in Germany

Most evidence of such settlements so far has been found at locations inland from the Stone Age coast, said underwater archaeologist Peter Moe Astrup, who's leading underwater excavations in Denmark.

"Here, we actually have an old coastline. We have a settlement that was positioned directly at the coastline," he said. "What

we actually try to find out here is how was life at a coastal settlement." After the last ice age, huge ice sheets melted and global sea levels rose, submerging Stone Age settlements and forcing the hunter-gatherer human population inland.

About 8,500 years ago, sea levels rose by about 6.5 feet per century. Moe Astrup said.

Moe Astrup and colleagues at the Moesgaard Museum in Højbjerg, just outside Aarhus, have excavated an area of about 430 square feet at the small settlement they discovered just off today's coast.

Early dives uncovered ani-



mal bones, stones tools, arrowheads, a seal tooth, and a small piece of worked wood, likely a simple tool. The researchers

are combing the site meter by meter using a kind of underwater vacuum cleaner to collect material for future analysis.

Moe Astrup said. "When sea level rose, everything was preserved in an oxygen-free environment... time just stops.'






Man held for ₹1.27cr loan fraud in City Post News Network

Bhubaneswar, August 26: The Economic Offences Wing (EOW) of Odisha Police Tuesday arrested a 55-year-old man here in connection with a loan fraud of Rs 1.27 crore, officials said.

Subrat Kumar Nayak of Laxmisagar area in the City availed a loan of Rs 1.03 crore from ICI-CI Bank's Bomikhal branch November 30, 2017, by mortgaging three plots. "The loan, however, was classified as non-performing asset (NPA) with a total outstanding of Rs 1.27 crore, including interest, as Nayak didn't repay it," they added.

When the bank examined the matter, it was found that the lands were in the name of Nayak's mother, who had died in November 2016. And that Nayak used forged documents, including fake signature of his dead mother, to avail the loan, they said. The bank lodged a complaint with the EOW following which the agency registered a case and arrested the accused

HC issues directions for smooth conduct of festivals

Cuttack, August 26: Stating that public safety cannot be compromised for celebration, the Orissa High Court issued a host of directions to ensure smooth conduct of upcoming festivals in Cuttack, beginning with Ganesh Puja August 27.

Taking suo motu cognisance of recurring 'civic failures', a division bench of Justice SK Sahoo and Justice V Narasingh ordered strict curbs on pandals blocking roads, unregulated electronic gates, and unsafe bamboo structures, citing last year's gate collapse at Badambadi.

It sought affidavits from authorities on traffic control, noise and air pollution, fire safety compliance, drinking water supply, and illumination of non-functional streetlights.

Bhubaneswar, August 26: The Odisha District Revenue Ministerial Employees, who were on a cease work since August 11 over their 10-point charter of demands, called off their strike Tuesday, keeping in mind the prevailing flood situation and the upcoming festive season.

President of the employees' association, Tirupati Balaji Sahu, said, "In view of the prevailing flood situation in some districts and upcoming festive season, for the greater interest of the people, we have decided to call off our protest and join duty today." Similarly, another functionary of the association said that their meeting with Chief Secretary Manoj Ahuja Monday evening was 'successful'.

"The government has given assurance to look into our genuine demands. From the meeting, it seems that the government is looking forward to fulfilling our demands," he said. Revenue and Disaster Management Minister Suresh Pujari welcomed the employees' decision and appealed to them to work for more hours to clear the pending work.

The striking employees' association, Odisha Rajaswa Amala Sangha (ORAS), claimed that they were forced to take to agitation as successive governments have ignored their genuine demands.

Their demands included publication of District Revenue Ministerial Cadre Rules to enable overdue promotions, inclusion of all eligible district offices and staff in the Revenue Ministerial Service Cadre, implementation of uniform pay structure with pay upgrades and creation of a new ASO post.

The public service delivery system, especially the revenue services, was severely hampered across districts due to their protest.

The revenue employees have taken the decision to call off their strike, a day after the Revenue department sought an action taken report from all district Collectors on the unauthorised mass leave of the employees.

Angul/Bhubaneswar, August **26:** It may sound surprising, but lemons from Odisha's Angul district have made their way to the United States. Nearly one lakh lemons have been exported to the US in three phases this month. What once sold for just 20 to 30 paisa a piece in the local market is now fetching farmers Rs 1 per piece, thanks to the support of the Odisha Rural Development and Marketing Society (ORMAS).

The demand for Angul lemons is rising in international markets, particularly in the US and the UK. This month alone, three consignments carrying around one lakh Farmers say the initiative has brought them much-needed relief and motivation to continue lemon cultivation on a larger scale.

Bipin Sahu, a lemon farmer, told IANS, "Earlier, I could hardly earn Rs 20,000-30,000 a year from selling lemons. This year, I was even planning to cut down my lemon trees and shift to other crops. But after selling lemons with ORMAS' support, I am hopeful of making good profits."

"Earlier, due to poor prices in the market, we often left lemons unharvested. Now, that will no longer happen," added Sahu.

Another farmer, Tunia Sahu, said, "Previously, traders paid us only 20 paisa per lemon. Since the harvesting cost was higheraround Rs 6 per sack-we had stopped plucking lemons. But now, with the government ensuring Rs 1 per lemon, we are very happy. We have also demanded that in the future, lemons should be procured at Rs 1.50 each."

ORMAS Deputy CEO Biman Mal said, "We are exporting lemons and farmers are getting a lot of benefits, as they are receiving higher prices. Around 30,000-40,000 lemons have been exported recently. We are also preparing lemon juice and many more products.'

Seagrass revival in Odisha's Haripur creek

Seagrass meadows return, offering fresh hope for coastal resilience and marine biodiversity

Bhubaneswar, August 26: After nearly a decade, seagrass meadows-crucial for marine ecosystems-have naturally reappeared in Haripur Creek near Gopalpur, Odisha. Scientists attribute this rare ecological revival to reduced human activity during the Covid-19 lockdowns between 2019 and 2021.

Seagrasses, often called "ecosystem engineers," play a key role in stabilising coasts, trapping carbon, and sheltering marine life. Once lost from Haripur Creek due to cyclones, pollution, and overfishing, their natural return is now being hailed as a "ma-

jor ecological breakthrough." The findings, published in the prestigious National Academy Science Letters, were authored by marine scientists Debasish Mahapatro and Sangita Mishra. Their three-year field study (2019-2021) showed that the pause in tourism, fishing, and boating during the lockdown enabled seagrasses to naturally recolonise the creek.

"This is a globally rare phe-



tentionally gave nature a chance to heal," said Mahapatro, who had first documented seagrass in Haripur Creek in 2010.

Once confined to Chilika Lake, seagrasses were first reported in Haripur Creek between 2010 and 2012, dominated by the species Halophila ovalis. However, the meadows were wiped out between 2012 and 2019 by successive cyclones—Phailin (2013).Hudhud (2014), and Fani (2019)—as well as pollution from shrimp farms, plastics,

and boating. During the lockdown, stable salinity, active tidal flows, and the absence of extreme weather events created favourable conditions for regrowth. New species such as Halodule uninervis and Halodule pinnifolia were also recorded, signalling improved biodiversity.

Biomass studies also confirmed the recovery. While Phase-I (2010-2012) recorded 23.1 g/100 cm², Phase-II (2019-2021) showed 25.3 g/100 cm². Researchers attributed the increase to the coexistence of multiple species, unlike the earlier period dominated by a single species.

Among the most striking


outcomes of the seagrass revival was the first live sighting of the golden mantis shrimp (Lysiosquilla tredecimdentata) in Haripur Creek, a clear indicator of improving

ecosystem health. However, researchers caution that the fragile ecosystem remains under threat. "Plastic waste, ghost nets, and unregulated coastal development continue to endanger the seagrass meadows. We must act swiftly to protect what has been restored,' warned Mahapatro.

The revival of seagrass in Haripur Creek is seen not just as a local triumph but as a global example of how easing human pressure can help marine ecosystems recover naturally. Scientists are urging authorities and stakeholders to adopt long-term conservation measures to safeguard

this vital underwater habitat. As climate change and biodiversity loss dominate global debates, this ecological success from a small creek in southern Odisha offers a powerful message: sometimes, letting nature be can achieve far more than human intervention

On being informed, Chandiposh police reached the hospital, seized the bodies, and sent them for postmortem Later, the bodies were handed over to the family. Police have registered an unnatural death case and are investigating the incident.

MAN GETS 7-YR RI FOR RAPING MINOR

Bhubaneswar: A man in Bargarh district was sentenced to seven years of rigorous imprisonment (RI) by a designated POCSO court Tuesday for raping a minor girl two years ago. 

The fishing vessel had trespassed into prohibited sanctuary corridors near Barunei coast contravening the provisions of Wildlife Protection Act, Orissa Marine Fishing Regulation Act and mandatory rules of marine sanctuary, added the forest officer. It should be noted here that the state government has clamped a seven-month log fishing ban along the 20-km stretch Dhamara-Devi river mouth from November 1 till May 31 in view of the ensuing mass nesting of endangered Olive Ridlev marine turtles.

However, the fishing prohibition remains enforced round the year in Gahirmatha as it is accorded the status of marine sanctuary. The mute species, accorded as Schedule-1 animal under Wildlife Protection Act for its highly threatened status, get entangled in the nets for prolonged periods and die of asphyxiation. The turtles also perish in large numbers after getting hit by the fast moving propeller of the fishing trawl ers, forest personnel said.

Hope in UK

ngland had its #MeToo moment when a court recently dismissed the libel claim of actor Noel Clarke accused of inappropriate sexual behaviour against his junior colleagues and actors and held him guilty of the charges levelled against him. The case did not simply concern one offender as the powerful entertainment industry was put on the dock for its complicity of silence while the victims had moved from pillar to post till leading British daily "The Guardian" took up the matter. The verdict is also a triumph of investigative journalism in the UK, which sends a message of hope across the globe at a time when a large section of the media in different countries is kowtowing before the powers that be.

In fact, the judgement of Mrs Justice Steyn is about power and complicity as well as the failure to protect vulnerable people. In her verdict, she agreed with the justification of the campaign run by the daily to champion the cause of hapless victims. The reporters did a commendable job of piecing together the accounts of several victims taking utmost care to base their stories on authentic documents. The judge ruled that there were "strong grounds to believe that (Clarke) is a serial abuser of women."

The court heard testimony from 26 witnesses before concluding that Clarke had engaged in harassment, bullying and abuse of power over many years. To be fair, the judge accepted some of his evidence but found him to be neither credible nor reliable. The journalists, on the other hand, meticulously collected facts, spoke to the victims, drew them out of their shells and gave Clarke reasonable opportunity to respond as well as fairly presenting his denials. Full credit goes to the women who spoke up, broke their silence and enabled the media to expose the wrongdoing that is almost endemic in the entertainment industry across the globe.

This is borne out by the fact that Clarke was not just another actor and he was being honoured by the British film academy, BAFTA for his "outstanding British contribution to cinema" even as serious allegations began to circulate. The deeper indictment is therefore of an industry that turned a blind eye to the rampant phenomenon known as "casting couch" which is a euphemism for sexually exploiting women aspiring for stardom. Clarke was rewarded and celebrated while women, who spoke out, risked their careers. The structures of power that enabled him - and the colleagues who were too ready to pretend as if nothing had happened – are the same factors that help abusers thrive in society with impunity.

Clarke prospered in this cultural climate. It is this culture that needed #MeToo before the voices of the women being persecuted silently with the help of a cynical and colluding industry could be heard. When politicians and business tycoons get involved in this web of murky, sexual racket, as is being revealed in the US and elsewhere, the hapless victims become doomed.

On the other hand, unfortunately, the list of young British girls $% \left\{ 1\right\} =\left\{ 1\right\} =$ raped by mostly Pakistani grooming gangs in the UK is yet to get due attention either by the media or by the justice system. After the damning report by Baroness Louise Casey criticising decades of institutional failure to protect children from so-called "grooming gangs," the Labour Party headed by Prime Minister Kier Starmer has agreed for a probe into the matter. The Casey report points to grave failure by successive governments to protect children from organised sexual abuse for decades. But the fact that now the UK government has agreed for an independent investigation, whether it be because of the sheer scale of the scandal or because it gained international attention due to Elon Musk constantly drawing attention to the subject on X and criticising the Starmer administration over its failure to act, a probe is underway and hopefully will bring justice to the victims and their families. An unbiased probe may also deter such crimes in future as

the system sheds its race, power and gender based bias.

ment is among the most Israel-friendly in the country's history, which is why Italian Defense Minister Guido Crosetto's recent remarks about the ongoing war in Gaza should set off alarm bells among Israelis, particularly within the government.

In an interview with La Stampa, Crosetto delivered a blunt message to Israel's leaders. "Fighting terrorists is no longer an excuse,' he said, adding that "We need decisions that will force [Israeli Prime Minister Binyamin Netanyahu] to stop." Such measures, he added, should not be directed against Israel itself, but instead serve as a "way to save its people from a government that has lost its reason and its humanity."

Crosetto is right. The war in Gaza has taken a devastating toll not only on Palestinians but also on Israel's economy. democracy, and global standing. Without an immediate change of course, Netanyahu's agenda could make Israel an international pariah for decades to come.

True, the current round of violence started with the malicious attack by Hamas terrorists on Israeli civilians in October 2023. True, this attack included murder, sexual assaults, and kidnappings, with almost 1,200 civilians killed. And true, as of now, almost two years after the attack, 50 (mostly) Israelis remain missing, either as hostages held by Hamas or dead.

Yet what began as an existential Israeli response to that Hamas atrocity has degenerated into mass destruction. The United Nations World Food Program has warned that one-third of Gazans have gone days without food. Although the international outcry at the lack of available food did lead to an increase in supply, this has been of little benefit, owing to a distribution method encouraged by the Israeli government, executed by a private company, and forced upon the obedient, though reluctant, army to supervise.

A recent UN experts' report found that famine now affects at least a half-million people in northern Gaza, including Gaza City. The Israeli government's proposal in July to create a "humanitarian city" that would force hundreds of thousands of Gazans into confinement, and the August decision to conquer Gaza City, including more forcible transfers, indicate that the situation will only get worse.

Netanyahu's government persists on its ruinous course because his own political survival depends on it. Weakened by corruption trials, Netanyahu's means of clinging to power is through endless war. This desire is giving the most extreme members of his coalition the whip hand, with some openly advocating the mass transfer of the Palestinians from Gaza and the West Bank. For them, famine and displacement are not unintended consequences but goals.

This ongoing Israeli response is more than a moral calamity. As 24 leading academic

economists - among them 11 Nobel laureates – wrote in a recent open letter to Netanyahu, Israel is on the brink of inflicting lasting self-harm. Western leaders should

not treat Israel's policies in Gaza as "business as usual." To continue backing Netanyahu's government is to enable a rogue regime, one more akin to Vladimir Putin's Russia than to a Western democracy. Europe, facing immense domestic pressure to act to save the people of Gaza, will not stand idle. Targeted sanctions on Israel are becoming ever more likely. These would undermine Israel's trade with the European Union, its largest trading partner, and jeopardize much research funding that supports Israel's booming tech sector.

Credit downgrades are underway, borrowing costs are rising, and skilled Israelis are emigrating in significant numbers. While the United States may, for its own strategic reasons, choose to bear part of these costs, it is hard to see any

not badly wounded, for many years, by Netanyahu's policies.

US President Donald Trump's administration, reluctant to bankroll foreign wars, has its own reasons to reconsider its support of Israel's Gaza strategy. Leading Israeli economists who have consulted for Netanyahu and his government for decades have concluded that Israel cannot finance the conquest of Gaza City and the indefinite "hosting" of more than two million people. As with the aftermath of the 1982 war between Israel and Lebanon, further aggravation of the already terrible situation in Gaza would probably end up costing the US billions of dollars, on top of the more than \$20 billion already spent on military aid to Israel since October 7, 2023.

The path forward is well articulated in the economists' letter. First, Israel must restore sufficient provision of food and medical aid to keep Gazans alive, measured by its efficiency and not merely by the volume of food entering Gaza (only to be kept out of people's reach). Second, Israel must renounce any plans to herd Gazans into camps. Third, Israel must recommit publicly to basic human rights as per international law, even in periods of armed conflict. And finally, Israel must seek a genuine ceasefire that brings home the hostages and ends the fighting. Western governments should use diplomacy, economic measures, and politics to press for these steps.

Israel today stands at a crossroads. It can choose Netanyahu's path of extremism, which will inevitably lead to more war-crimes charges, international isolation, and national decline. Or it can heed the warnings of allies and their best minds and reclaim its democratic future.

'm in the market for a new treadmill. When I say "new," I don't mean "brand new." I mean "new to me." I am looking for a treadmill that someone within 100 kilometers of my city is advertising as "almost new," "like new" or "heavily used, but only to dry clothes.

I would not buy the treadmill sight-unseen of course. People in some cultures get married sight-unseen, but it's a little different with a treadmill as I hope it gets turned on every single night. And it can't go into "sleep mode" after just three minutes. It needs to keep going for half an hour or more, until it gets turned off -- and not by profuse sweating.

Sight-unseen may work for some marriages, but for a treadmill, I want to not only see it, but also push its buttons. I want to see if it can go fairly fast without slipping,

vibrating too much or making too much noise. Like a spouse who talks incessantly, a noisy treadmill can make it hard to watch TV while you're on it. But at least "shut up" works for one of them. (The one with built-in AI.)

While I'm checking out the treadmill, I also want to take a good look at the person selling it. If they're in great shape, slim and athletic, then it probably means that the treadmill has been used too much. I want to buy a treadmill from someone who looks like they've never used it. When you're showing me photos of your treadmill on Facebook Marketplace from 12 angles. please include a photo of yourself. I'm not buying a treadmill from Sha'Carri Richardson. (Especially if she treats it like she treats her boyfriend.)

You may be wondering why I don't just buy a brand new treadmill. Well, it's partly because of the price and partly because I've been reading reviews online. Every time I think I'm going to like a particular treadmill, someone online spoils it for me by writing, "This treadmill is a total waste of money. I bought it, assembled it, plugged it in and right away, it made a terrible sound like a cat was stuck in it. I immediately panicked and thought, 'Oh no, what if it's one of my cats?' I counted my cats -- luckily they were all at home -- and was relieved that all nine were safe and sound. I called customer service and a woman said that my treadmill probably just has a bad roller and they will ship another one to me within 30 days. It has to come all the way from China. I may eventually buy a new treadmill, but only if I can't find a good used one. My last treadmill was a used one. Five years is a long time to stick around, especially when someone is constantly walking all over you.

Tourism, terror, turf wars fuel ISI's strategy

New Delhi, August 26: When the Pahalgam attack took place, it became amply clear that Pakistan wanted to disrupt tourism in Jammu and Kashmir and hurt its economy. Post the abrogation of Article 370, J&K witnessed several positive changes, and key among them was the thriving tourism industry.

While this was one of the main reasons, the other was to address a massive rift between the Jaish-e-Muhammad and Lashkar-e-Taiba. Over the last year and a half, there have been sharp differences between the two terror groups. There have been ideological differences, and also relating to the strategy in Jammu and Kashmir.

Both outfits focus largely on Jammu and Kashmir, and a rift had broken out, which the ISI

This is, however, not the first time that the ISI has targeted India with the intention of fixing internal rifts within the terror networks in Pakistan. The same was done during the Mumbai 26/11 attacks as well.

The plan to attack Mumbai was originally that of Ilyas Kashmir, the head of Al-Qaeda's 313 Brigade. This was confirmed by David Headley, with whom Kashmiri shared a good rapport. The two would often discuss the Kashmir issue, FROM MUMBAI 26/11 TO PAHALGAM



and during one such interaction, the plan to attack came up. The Mumbai attacks were part of Kashmiri's larger plan to launch his ambitious Ghazwa-e-Hind project.

This was, in fact, confirmed by Kashmiri during an interview with the late Syed Saleem Shahzad, who was then the chief of Asia Times Pakistan bureau.

At around the same time, the ISI was finding it hard to keep the Jaish-e-Muhammad and Lashkar-e-Taiba cadres. Both were insistent that they go and fight in Afghanistan. At that time, the Taliban was facing losses at the hands of the US forces, and the cadres of both these groups felt that they

The ISI, however, did not want either the Lashkar-e-Taiba or Jaish-e-Muhammad to divert from Jammu and Kashmir and the rest of India. Hence, it approached Kashmiri and told him to hand over the plan to the Lashkar-e-Taiba. This acted as a diversionary tactic, and the rift was sorted out.

The Pahalgam attack, too, has a similar back story. One of the goriest attacks was planned to settle a rift between the Lashkar and Jaish-e-Muhammad. The Lashkar-e-Taiba was unhappy that the ISI was giving the Jaish-e-Muhammad preferential treatment in J&K.

It was also giving the

Jaish-e-Muhammad terrorists a safe passage into India, while not allowing the Lashkar-e-Taiba cadres to infiltrate from Pakistan. The ISI wanted the Lashkar-e-Taiba to use its existing cadre already inside J&K to carry out attacks.

The army, too, had been roped in to sort out the differences, but it failed to make any impact. The Lashkar would not settle for anything short of a massive attack, and hence the carry out the Pahalgam attack. The understanding was that the Lashkar-e-Taiba would carry out the Pahalgam attack while the Jaish-e-Muhammad would continue with its infiltrations.

This diversion and understanding were much needed for the ISI to ensure that its two biggest assets remain united. The rift had become so bad that it was the terrorists of the Jaish-e-Muhammad who killed Qari Abdul Rehman, the chief financier of the Lashkar-e-Taiba and a relative of the outfit's chief Hafiz Saeed.

While the rift may have been sorted out for now, Indian agencies say that this would be short-lived. The problem does not just begin and end with who is getting preferential treatment. There are ideological differences as well.

The Lashkar-e-Taiba follows the Ahl-i Hadith, formed by the Agencies warn of ISI-driven push as BKI adopts new strategy in Punjab New Delhi: Opening up a war on another front, the ISI has been pushing the

neighbouring states. The number of busts that are taking place in Punjab relating to the BKI has been alarming, with the police stating that this is a clear sign that the outfit wants to revive the Khalistan movement. The modus operandi of the BKI, which is the most dangerous Khalistan terror group, has been different this time. Earlier, these outfits would indulge in bombings or shootings in which even civilians would be killed. However, this time around, the intention is to target the establishment directly. Their targets include police stations, Intelligence Bureau offices, government offices and courts. The idea is to send out a message to the people that their fight is against the establishment and not them. They want to tell the people that their fight is for a separate Khalistan nation, and it is the establishment that is preventing them from attaining that. While attempts have been made to revive the movement, it has not gained much traction in Punjab. The recruitments have not gone as planned, and the youth in the state are not buying their argument. This explains why these elements have become aggressive in countries such as Canada and the UK. There have been many instances where Indians who do not support the Khalistan cause have been assaulted. Further, there are several anti-India events that have been held by these elements. India has often complained that these countries are not do-ing enough to stem this rot. The BKI realises that if it does not have the support by not targeting civilians, it is trying to send a message that the fight is against the establishment and not the people. In a recent operation, the Punjab police had busted a BKI module that was being operated by foreign-based handlers Maninder Billa and Manu Agwan. Three persons were arrested in connection with a case relating to a grenade attack at the police post Badshapur in Patiala. The attack took place April 1 2025. The probe by the police found that all activities of the BKI are being controlled by Harvinder Singh Rinda and Harner Singh alias Happy Passia. The arrest of Passia in the US was a major shot in the arm for the agencies. Rinda and Passia were behind the attacks on several police stations in Punjab and are key assets of the ISI. While the agencies have been successful in curtailing the activities of the BKI, they are, however Punjab Police has been campaigning heavily to urge the youth to distance and progress. The BKI operatives have, in the past, made several attempts to get the youth on board. They have used drugs, brainwashing techniques, among others, but have largely been unsuccessful. In the wake of these devel opments, the BKI decided to change its strategy and target the establishment The Intelligence agencies say that activities of the BKI would go up as the ISI yould want to keep the Indian agencies busy on yet another front

Cross-border arms smuggling racket busted; 1 arrested

Chandigarh, August 26: Punjab Police Tuesday claimed to have busted a cross-border arms smuggling racket with the arrest of a person in Amritsar, Five sophisticated Glock pistols and four magazines were recovered from his possession, they said.

Director General of Police (DGP) Gauray Yaday said the accused has been identified as Amit Singh, a resident of Guru Ki Wadali, Chheharta in Am ritsar. Apart from recovering weapons, police teams also impounded his motorcycle, which the accused was using to deliver the consignments. Preliminary investigation has revealed that Singh and his associate, Gurpreet Singh alias Ginny, was in touch with Pakistan-based smugglers, who were pushing weapon consignments to disturb peace and harmony in the state.

The DGP said the arrest and recovery have helped in unearthing the network and averting a major crime in the region. More arrests and recoveries are expected in the coming days, he said. Sharing op eration details, Commissioner of Police (CP), Amritsar, Gurpreet Singh Bhullar said acting on re liable information, a police team carried out an intel-based opera tion, leading to the arrest suspect Amit Singh, when he was on the way to deliver the weapon con signment to someone.

Relief efforts intensify as rivers overflow, villages submerge

PUNJAB FLOOD CRISIS

The situation, worsened by the release of excess water from key dams and heavy rainfall in neighboring Himachal Pradesh and Jammu & Kashmir, has led to large-scale evacuation and rescue operations

RESCUE OPERATIONS ACROSS THE STATE

Massive rescue and relief efforts are underway in the worst-hit districts, including Pathankot, Gurdaspur, Fazil-

ka, Kapurthala, Tarn Taran, Ferozepur, and Hoshiarpur. Teams from the Army, National Disaster Response Force (NDRF), State Disaster Response Force (SDRF), and Border Security Force (BSF) are working round-the-clock to

evacuate people and livestock

from flood-affected areas.

A central flood control room has been set up in Jalandhar to coordinate relief measures. Helicopters have been deployed to airlift stranded residents in critical zones like Narot Jaimal Singh and Bamial blocks in Pathankot

SCHOOLS CLOSED, MINISTERS ON GROUND

With the India Meteorological Department forecasting continued rainfall, Punjab Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann announced the closure of all schools across the state from August 27 to 30. Multiple state ministers, including Water Resources Minister Barinder Kumar Goyal and Lal Chand Kataruchak, have visited flood-hit districts to oversee the situation and direct relief operations

DAMS AND RISING WATER LEVELS

The water levels in the Sutlej, Beas, and Ravi rivers have surged following the release of Bhakra, and Pong dams. In Pathankot, around 1.10 lakh cusecs of water was released from the Ranjit Sagar dam, raising the Ravi and Ujh rivers to dangerous levels. In Fazilka, 2.20 lakh cusecs was released from the Hussainiwala headworks. **EVACUATIONS AND RELIEF**

Thousands of residents have been evacuated and shifted to relief camps or safer locations. In Kapurthala district alone, over 45 individuals were res cued from inundated villages such as Baupur Jadid and Muhammadabad. Relief centres have been set up in schools and religious institutions, offering food, shelter, and medical aid.

In Fazilka and Ferozepur, villagers are on high alert, moving their belongings and livestock to higher ground. Some have taken refuge on rooftops as water levels continue to rise.

CROP DAMAGE AND LIVELIHOOD

Farmers are facing massive crop losses, with vast tracts of farmland submerged. In Kaluwala village, for instance, one resident reported that his entire three-acre crop has been washed away. Similar devastation is being reported across multiple districts, raising concerns over food security and rural livelihoods.

Minister Goyal stated the government's immediate focus is on protecting lives, minimizing property damage, and ensuring timely delivery of relief supplies. All leaves for district officials have been cancelled, and 24/7 operations are ongoing at the ground level.

13 dead, including 9 in landslide on **Vaishno Devi route**

Jammu/Srinagar, August 26: Rivers overflowed, the raging waters flattening everything in their way, and boulders, trees and rocks hurtled down slopes across Jammu region Tuesday, killing at least 13 people, including nine pilgrims struck by a landslide on the Vaishno Devi route.

Relentless heavy rain led to havoc not just in Jammu, which saw flashfloods, landslides and the pilgrimage to the Vaishno Devi shrine being suspended, but also in Kashmir Valley. Traffic on the Jammu-Sri-

nagar and Kishtwar-Doda national highways was suspended and dozens of hill roads were blocked or damaged by landslides or flashfloods, they said. Many trains to and from Jammu were cancelled. The winding route to the

Mata Vaishno Devi shrine atop the Trikuta hill was a picture of devastation. While nine people were killed when the mountainside literally gave way around 3 pm, 21 people were injured. The toll could go up

Several people were feared trapped, officials said as rescuers scrambled to pull out those buried under the debris near the Inderprastha Bhojnalaya at Adhkwari.

The landslide struck at a point about halfway along the winding 12-km trek from Katra town to the hilltop shrine. Kiran, from Mohali in Punjab, was among those caught in the hail of stones, trees and boulders. "I was coming down the hill after performing darshan when people started shouting. I saw stones falling down. I rushed to safety but was injured," Kiran told PTI Videos from a hospital bed in Katra. Many relatives gathered at the hospital and Vaishno Devi base camp in Katra looking for news of their loved ones. Some of the injured have been shifted to the Narayana Hospital in Katra, about 15 km from Jammu.

Three relief columns of the Army were swiftly mobilised in rescue and relief operations in and around Katra, the PRO

In other rain-related incidents across the Jammu province Tuesday, at least four people were reported killed in Doda district. Three of these slipped and fell into a river, drowning in the swift flowing waters, while one died in a house collapse.

Hundreds of people were evacuated from low lying areas in the region. Reports came in of damage to public and private infrastructure from the high altitude areas of Kishtwar, Reasi, Rajouri, Ramban, and Poonch districts, the officials said. The real picture of the disaster will emerge only after an assessment of the ground situation, they said. Chief Minister Omar Abdullah termed the situation serious. He presided over an emergencv meeting and ordered district administrators to be on high alert. Abdullah also ordered the administration to provide essentials such as food, water, and medicine to affected families in a timely manner and prioritise relief to vulnerable groups.

The deluge has forced nearly all water bodies in the area to overflow above the danger mark, inundating low-lying areas and prominent roads.

The overflowing Modhopur barrage on the Ravi river in Kathua crossed the one lakh cusec mark, resulting in heavy flooding in Kathua district.

Major rivers such as Taranah, Ujh, Tawi, and Chenab have also overflowed their danger marks, forcing police and civil authorities to make repeated public appeals for people to shift to safer areas.

The administration issued advisories asking people to stay away from water bodies and landslide-prone areas. The communication blackout impeded emergency response measures and caused panic among residents. Telecom operators said technical teams have been deployed to restore services as soon as possible. All government and private schools in the Jammu division were directed to close till

SC AGREES TO REEXAMINE CASE OF DEATH ROW CONVICT

New Delhi, August 26: The Supreme Court has agreed to reexamine the case of a death row convict punished for raping and killing a minor in 2022.

A bench of Justices Vikram Nath, Sanjay Karol and Sandeep Mehta said the case could be reopened on the point of sentence if guidelines on mitigating factors framed by the apex court in 2022 were not followed at the time of punishment.

Vasant Sampat Dupare, who hails from Nagpur, was punished for raping and killing the four-year-old minor girl in April 2008.

The top court upheld the conviction but set aside the 2017 view on sentencing for now and placed the matter before Chief . Justice B R Gavai for appropriate directions.

Dupare lured the girl with chocolates, raped her and disfigured her face to avoid iden-

While allowing Dupare's plea, the top court referred to the 2022 verdict in Manoj v. Madhva Pradesh in which it issued several guidelines and mandated trial courts to collect the accused's psychiatric and psychological evaluation report before awarding death. "We hold that Article 32

of the Constitution of India empowers this court in cases related to capital punishment to reopen the sentencing stage where the accused has been condemned to death penalty without ensuring that the guidelines mandated in Manoj (supra) were followed," the bench held August 25. Calling it "corrective pow-

BJP-ruled states in SC defend powers of Guv, Prez over Bills

New Delhi, August 26: Some BJP-ruled states Tuesday defended in the Supreme Court, the autonomy of governors and President in assenting to bills passed by their assemblies and said "assent to a law cannot be given by court".

A five-judge Constitution bench headed by Chief Justice B R Gavai was informed by senior advocate Harish Salve that under the constitutional scheme power to accord assent to Bills passed by state legislators vests only with governors or President and there was no concept of "deemed assent". The bench is hearing the pres-



idential reference on whether the court could impose timelines for governors and President to deal with Bills passed by state assemblies. Different state governments said judiciary couldn't be a pill for

every disease."The court cannot issue a writ of mandamus asking the governors to grant assent to Bills. Assent to a law cannot be given by the court. Assent to a law has to be given either by governors or by President," Salve, who was representing Maharashtra, submitted.

The bench also comprises Justices Surya Kant, Vikram Nath, P.S. Narasimha and A.S. Chandurkar. On April 8, a different bench of the top court invoked its powers under Article 142 to rule that 10 bills cleared by Tamil Nadu assembly and pending since 2020 with Governor were deemed to be assented. Referring to Article

361 of the Constitution, Salve said President, or Governor "shall not be answerable to any court for the exercise and performance of the powers and duties of his office or for any act done or purporting to be done by him in the exercise and performance of those powers and duties".

"The court can only ask what your decision is. But the court cannot ask why you have taken a decision," Salve added Additional Solicitor General K M Nataraj, appearing for Uttar Pradesh and Odisha, said President and Governor enjoy functional autonomy and they have absolute discretion prior to giving assent.

One-third school students take pvt coaching: Survey

New Delhi, August 26: Nearly one-third of school students take private coaching and the trend is more common in urban areas, the Centre's Comprehensive Modular Survey (CMS) on education has found.

The survey noted that government schools play a pivotal role in providing education across India, accounting for 55.9 per cent of total enrolments.

"It is higher in rural areas, where two-thirds (66.0 per cent) of students are enrolled, in comparison to urban areas (30.1 per cent). The private unaided (recognised) schools account for 31.9 per cent of enrolment nationwide," the survey report said.

The CMS Education survey, part of the 80th round of the National Sample Survey (NSS), focused specifically on household expenditure for currently enrolled students in school education. Data was collected from 52,085 households and 57,742 students across India using Computer-Assisted Personal Interviews (CAPI).

The survey noted that nearly a third of all students (27.0 per cent), were taking or had taken private coaching during the current academic year. This trend was more common in urban areas (30.7 per cent) than in rural areas (25.5 per cent).

The average annual household expenditure on private coaching per student in urban areas (Rs 3,988) was higher than that in rural areas (Rs 1,793).



Among the students who made expenditures for school education, 95 per cent of students in India reported that the first major source of their funding was from other household members. This trend is

consistent across both rural (95.3 per cent) and urban (94.4 per cent) areas. In India, 1.2 per cent of students reported that Government scholarships were their first major source of funding for school education.

The survey noted that government schools play a pivotal role in providing education across **India**, accounting for 55.9 per cent of total enrolments

The last comprehensive education survey undertaken by the National Sample Survey (NSS) was the 75th Round (July 2017-June 2018).

However, officials said, its findings cannot be directly compared with those of the current survey.

"In the NSS 75th Round. anganwadi centres were not classified under pre-primary

education and expenditures on school education included private coaching. However, CMS: E classified anganwa dis within the pre-primary category and collected and presented spending on school education and private coaching separately," a senior Ministry of Education (MoE) official explained.

The primary objective of the CMS was to generate national-level estimates of average expenditure on school education and private coaching during the current academic year.

Across all types of schools the highest average expenditure per student during the current academic year was on course fees (Rs 7.111), followed by textbooks and stationery (Rs 2,002) at the all-India level.

Modi makes a pitch for Navy commissions Swadeshi, Make in India INS Udaygiri, Himgiri

Ahmedabad, August 26: A day before US President Donald Trump's additional 25 per cent tariff kicks in, Prime Minister Narendra Modi Tuesday made a vehement pitch for swadeshi and Make in India that should help create jobs in the country.

Swadeshi should everyone's life mantra and irrespective of who is investing, production must take place domestically, Modi asserted on a day when Japan's Suzuki Motor Corporation committed to invest over ₹70,000 crore in the country in the next five to six years.

The government's 'Make in India' initiative has created a favourable environment for both global and domestic manufacturers and the world will drive electric vehicles that are made in India, Modi said.

He was speaking after flagging off exports of Maruti Suzuki's first electric vehicle. the e VITARA, from the Hansalpur facility in Guiarat to over 100 countries and also inauguration of production of lithium-ion battery, cell and electrode manufacturing for strong hybrid electric vehicles.

"My definition of swadeshi is very simple: it doesn't matter whose money is invested, whether it is dollars, pounds, whether the currency is black or white, it doesn't matter to me. What matters is that in production, the sweat belongs to my countrymen. The money may be someone else's, but the sweat is ours," he asserted.

In that way, Maruti Suzuki is also a swadeshi company, he said. The world will drive electric vehicles that are made in India, he said.

Today is a great day for 'Make in India' as e-vehicles made in the country will be exported to 100 countries. The world will

Visakhapatnam (Andhra Pradesh), August 26: In a major boost to the country's maritime strike capabilities. the Indian Navy Tuesday commissioned two multi-mission stealth frigates, INS Udaygiri and INS Himgiri, each equipped with eight BrahMos missiles and featuring a suite of advanced weapons and sensors developed by the indigenous manufacturers.

The commissioning of two state-of-the-art Project 17A stealth frigates, which was presided over by Union Defence Minister Rajnath Singh here at the Eastern Naval Command of the Indian Navy, marks the first occasion when two frontline surface combatants constructed at two different shipyards were commissioned simultaneously.

This development also underscores the growing maritime importance of India's eastern

"These warships' weapons and sensor packages make them the unparalleled guardians of the sea. It has been told to me that these warships also include many advanced capabilities. These two warships, which can cover long distances. have advanced systems such as surface-to-surface air missiles. supersonic BrahMos missiles, torpedo launchers, combat management systems, and fire control systems," Singh said.

They were modern ves sels and will prove to be a game-changer in very complex and risky operations in the sea, he added. Incidentally, Udaygiri happens to be the 100th ship designed by the Navy's Warship Design Bureau (WDB), marking a milestone in five decades of indigenous warship design.

The two are follow-on ships of the Project 17 (Shivalik) class frigates, and both the vessels incorporate significant improvements in design, stealth, weap-



on, and sensor systems, capable of executing a full spectrum of maritime missions in 'blue water' conditions, according to officials.

"Two state-of-the-art combatant platforms join the Indian Navy fleet, fortifying India's strength at sea..." said the Indian Navy in a post on 'X' late on Monday.

Udaygiri is the second ship from Project 17A stealth frigates and was built by Mazagon Dock Shipbuilders Limited (MDL) in Mumbai, while Himgiri is the first of the P17A ships to be constructed by Garden Reach Shipbuilders & Engineers (GRSE), Kolkata. Both the frigates represent a generational leap over earlier designs.

Udaygiri also holds the distinction of being the fastest ship of her class to be delivered postlaunch, a result of the modular construction methodology adopted by Indian shipyards.

Displacing about 6,700 tons, the P17A class frigates are roughly five per cent larger than their predecessor Shivalik-class frigates, incorporating a sleeker form with a reduced radar cross section.

They also feature a suite of advanced weapons and sensors developed by Indian manufacturers. The weapons suite of these frigates includes supersonic surface-to-surface missiles, medium-range surface-to-air missiles, 76 mm MR Gun, and a combination of 30 mm and 12.7 mm close-in weapon systems. Both ships are the result of an industrial ecosystem spanning over 200 MSMEs. supporting approximately 4,000 direct jobs and more than 10,000 indirect jobs.

The researchers said addressing wildfire risks requires more than tracking burned areas, calling for a strengthening of resilience in the regions most exposed to fire.

Improved strategies in fire management tailored to local contexts, investments in fire-resilient infrastructure, and policies that address the growing overlap of human settlements and fire-prone landscapes, they

The authors said that while under five per cent of the world's land involves an interaction between uncultivated wildlands and humans (or 'wildland-urban interface'). nearly half the world's population resides in such areas. "Wildfires are no longer sea-

sonal or regional anomalies; they have become a global crisis, intensified by rising heat waves, worsening droughts and drastic land use changes, Kaveh Madani, director of the United Nations University-Institute for Water, Environment and Health, said.

By combining measures that address wildfire risks with global efforts to curb climate change, societies can better protect vulnerable populations and mitigate the escalating human toll of wildland fires, the authors said.

Cairo, August 26: More Palestinian families left Gaza City Tuesday after a night of Israeli shelling on its outskirts, as Israelis launched a day of nationwide protests calling for hostages to be released and the war in Gaza to end.

Residents said Israeli aerial and tank shelling continued throughout the night and early on Tuesday in the eastern Gaza City suburbs of Sabra, Shejaia, and Tuffah, as well as in Jabalia town to the north, destroying roads and houses.

"Earthquakes, we call it, they want to scare people to leave their homes," said Ismail, 40, a Gaza City resident.

The Israeli military has said its forces are operating in the area to locate weapons and destroy tunnels used by militants. Despite widespread protests at home and international condemnation, Israel is preparing to launch a new offensive in Gaza City, in what it describes as Hamas' last bastion.

Israeli strikes at Nasser Hospital in the southern Gaza Štrip on Monday killed at least 20 people, including journalists working for Reuters, the Associated Press, Al Jazeera and others.

At least 34 people were killed in Israeli strikes in the enclave overnight and on Tuesday, local health authorities said, including 18 people around Gaza City.

Around half of the enclave's two million people currently live in Gaza City, with several thousand already moved westward, pouring into the heart of the city and along the coast.

Others have ventured further south to central Gaza and the coastal area of Al-Muwasi near Khan Younis. Monday's attack on Nasser

Ex-labour union leader becomes Lithuania's PM



Vilnius, August 26: Lithuania's parliament Tuesday elected a former labour union leader and relative political newcomer as the country's new prime minister, weeks after her predecessor resigned following investigations into his business dealings.

Lawmakers approved Inga Ruginiene, 44, as the new head of government by 78 votes to 35.

Ruginiene, a former head of Lithuania's labour union confederation, joined the centre-left Social Democratic Party just before a general election last year and then served as minister for social affairs and labour under Prime Minister Gintautas Paluckas, who resigned at the end of July after less than a year in office. Paluckas had been dogged

by media investigations into his business and financial dealings. Several media outlets published investigations in July regarding his past and present ventures and alleged mishandlings, including ones more than a decade ago. Anti-corruption and law enforcement agencies in the country subsequently launched their

President Gitanas Nauseda, who nominated Ruginiene as the new prime minister, told parliament before Tuesday's vote that she is "a constructive negotiator

Ruginiene told lawmakers she will focus on "restoring stability" and will work to "ensure that the government carries out the work entrusted to it by the voters.

The Social Democrats Monday signed an agreement on a new centre-left coalition with two junior partners, one of which is new to the government. It has a solid majority in the parliament, or Seimas, with 82 of the 141 seats.

Ruginiene must still be formally appointed by the president and sworn in at a ceremony in parliament, but those are formalities. Her government should serve out the remainder of the four-year term that started with last fall's election.

Lithuanian foreign policy is unlikely to change because of the government shakeup. Nauseda, who was elected separately, is the country's face on the world stage and has been one of the most stalwart supporters of Ukraine's fight against invading Russian forces — a position that has broad political support in the Baltic nation of about 2.8 million people.

Australia accuses Iran of organising attacks, expels ambassador

Melbourne, August 26: Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese accused Iran of organising two antisemitic attacks in Australia and said the country was cutting off diplomatic relations with Tehran in response Tuesday.

The Australian Security Intelligence Organisation concluded the Iranian government had directed arson attacks on the Lewis Continental Kitchen, a kosher food company, in Sydney in October last year and on the Addas Israel synagogue in Melbourne in December last vear. Albanese said.

Iran's government had no immediate reaction.

There has been a steep rise in antisemitic incidents in Sydney and Melbourne since the Israel-Hamas war began in 2023.

AI will be key to victory in Ukraine—and elsewhere

7hen Russia first launched its full-scale invasion of Ukraine, the conflict drew comparisons to wars of the twentieth century. Tanks, armored personnel carriers, and artillery dominated the battlefield, and infantry on both sides were entrenched in trenches. This oldschool style of warfare was evident in September 2022. Since then, a monumental transformation has been witnessed: the emergence of a new kind of warfare.

In the summer of 2023, the commander of Ukraine's Third Assault Brigade's Drone Unit—referred to here as Fil (not his real name)—explained that a new weapon was beginning to change the course of the conflict: first-person-view drones. These small, inexpensive, and highly maneuverable quadcopters transmit real-time footage to their operators and strike targets in kamikaze-style attacks. That year, Ukraine deployed thousands of these drones across the battlefield, and Russia quickly followed suit. Today, hundreds of thousands of such drones fill the skies over Ukraine.

What began as a war 'with' drones has evolved into a war 'of' drones. Two years ago, the strength of a Ukrainian brigade was primarily measured by its stockpile of Western-supplied tanks, armored personnel carriers, and artillery. Since

emerged as the most critical weapon on the battlefield. Due to their low cost, speed, and precision, drones have largely replaced traditional systems—including antitank missiles, mortars, tanks, and even artillery and aircraft. Today, a unit's effectiveness and resilience are defined by the number of skilled drone operators it has and its capacity to deploy drones at scale. This represents a profound

2023, however, drones have

shift in warfare, largely instigated by Ukraine to compensate for its shortfalls in conventional weapons and manpower. In the world's first drone war, drones determine how battles are won and how soldiers die: Ukrainian drone strikes now account for 90 percent of destroyed Russian tanks and armored vehicles and 80 percent of Russian casualties. They have also made it possible for each side to attack far past the frontlines without having to gain air superiority over the battlefield. Ukraine, for example, hit Russian airbases 5,000 miles from Kyiv in June by smuggling drones across the border and launching them from the beds of trucks.

Russia, for its part, was originally slower to field drones in large numbers. But it has dramatically increased its production of first-personview drones, as well as those



used for strategic bombardment, such as the Iranian-designed Shahed. Today, Moscow matches Kyiv's extraordinary rate of technological adaptation. It has developed equally capable models, such as the Orlan, which is used for surveillance, and the Lancet, which loiters over a target before exploding on impact. Because Russia and Ukraine

are constantly iterating on hardware, software, and tactics, the war changes at a breathtaking rate. The saturation of drone surveillance, for example, has made nearly all troop movement visible and therefore vulnerable,

creating a transparent battlefield: anything that moves near the frontline is struck within a matter of minutes. Drone pilots have become prime targets, and with many traditional weapons rendered obsolete, drones are increasingly fighting other drones. Amid this cycle of innovation, the two sides are inching toward a new frontier: entirely automated warfare.

Surveillance and reconnaissance drones have become so ubiquitous that both Russian and Ukrainian forces scarcely move in the daylight. During a recent visit, we witnessed the motion of a single Russian van,

five miles from the frontline, cause a sensation among drone operators, who then destroyed it. To avoid detection, movement near the frontline tends to take place during sunrise and sunset, when neither the davlight video cameras nor night-vision infrared cameras operate properly.

The fight for information advantage is always important in war, but even more so in this one, where it means the ability to form and maintain resilient drone-based sensor networks over the battlefield. If a unit is "blinded"—unable to maintain surveillance drones overhead—it becomes exceedingly vulnerable. For that reason, roughly 3,000 Ukrainian troops work around the clock to operate reconnaissance drones, mostly Chinese-made DJI Mavics, along the entire 750-mile frontline. Ukrainian brigade command centers display as many as 60 of these drone feeds around the clock.

This transparency means that the military maxim "what can be seen can be hit" is truer on today's battlefield than at any point in history. It is nearly impossible for either side to mass and maneuver forces along the frontline, as troops are now easily spotted forming up for attack. The Russian army has historically relied on its ability to deliver impressive firepower through concentrated tube and rocket

artillery fire, but these tactics are useless when any attempt to amass forces is identified within minutes. Russian guns are now widely dispersed, deeply dug in, and operate primarily at night.

Drones have upended the old ways of war. Military doctrine, tactics, and organization will never be the same. Armies everywhere will need to completely revamp their doctrine and training to reflect the realities of fighting on a droneswept battlefield. And the best way to prepare for the future of combat is to speak to those fighting this war. Historians often call World

War II a "war of factories." The same is true for the war in Ukraine today. Ukraine produced more than two million drones in 2024 and plans to make over four million by the end of 2025. Its adversary is also getting better at drone production: last year, Russia was building 300 Shahed drones a month. Now, it can produce 5,000 in the same time frame. The side that consistently builds the most drones is the one most likely to prevail. And it is in the interest of the West, and of the United States in particular, to support the Ukrainian people in their dogged determination to win that fight—not only for Ukraine's sake but also for its own, so it can learn to reckon with this new reality of war.

In their midyear crime brief released on Tuesday, the Singapore police said two murders were reported in the first half of 2025, compared with three during the same period in 2024. The number of rape cases also rose in the first half of 2025 to 233. from the 188 cases during the same period in 2024, The Straits Times reported, citing police data. There were 401 rape cases for the whole of 2024. Molestation cases have gone up, with 807 cases reported in the first half of 2025, an increase of 21.2 per cent compared with the 666 cases during the same period in 2024. Police said victims knew their assailants in more than half of the cases.

New Delhi, August 26: Apex exporters body FIEO Tuesday expressed serious concerns over high US tariffs on Indian goods and said that textiles and apparel manufacturers in Tirupur, Noida, and Surat have halted production amid worsening cost competitiveness due to these steep duties.

The US duties on Indian goods will increase to 50 per cent from August 27.

The move will severely disrupt the flow of Indian goods to its largest export market, Federation of Indian Export Organisations (FIEO) President S C Ralhan said.



New Delhi, August 26: India's wind energy capacity is estimated to reach 107 GW by 2030, compared to the government target of 100 GW, according to a report by the Global Wind Energy Council (GWEC) released Tuesday. The latest report, Wind at

the Core: Driving India's Green Ambitions and International Influence, was unveiled in the presence of New & Renewable Energy Secretary Santosh Kumar Sarangi. The report details how in-

stalled wind capacity in India can more than double from 51 GW at present to 107 GW by 2030, in line with state-level Resource Adequacy Plans (RAP). This is pivotal to help India

Kaur's golden double for India



Shymkent (Kazakhstan), August 26: Olympian Sift Kaur Samra pulled off an incredible show, clinching the individual women's 50m rifle 3 positions gold and helping the country to the team title as well in the Asian Shooting Championships here Tuesday.

The 23-year-old world record holder fired a superb 459.2 in the final to beat China's Yang Yujie (458.8) for gold, and the trio of Samra, stalwart Anjum Moudgil and Ashi Chouksev also bagged the top podium in the team event with an aggregate of 1753 points.

India are placed second on the charts with 20 medals, nine of them gold. China are leading the table with 24 medals, including 13 gold.

This was Samra's fourth Asian Championships gold, and she was in a different zone altogether in the event as she qualified for the eight-shooter final placed No 1 with a score of 589. Another Indian, Shriyanka Sadandi, who had topped the qualification round was not eligible for the final as she was competing for 'Ranking Points Only' (RPO).

RPO shooters cannot compete for medals.

Samra, who had the highest world ranking of No 5 among the eight finalists, had scores of 151.0, 156.2 in the kneeling and prone positions. In the standing-elimination round, she was simply unbeatable and led till the end despite a late fightback by her Chinese rival, who finished just 0.4 points behind the Indian.

Japan's Nobata Misaki (448.2) took the bronze.

Chouksey, who had entered the final placed fourth, ended up seventh with 402.8 points.

Senior pro and two-time Olympian Anjum finished

Samra led from the front in the team event as well as she guided India to the gold medal along with Anjum and Ashi.

The trio of Sameer (576) Suraj (577) and Abhinav 571) aggregated 1724 to finish on top of the podium in the team section on Monday.

India's Haris Sabeera and Addya Katyal took the junior women's trap gold and silver, shooting 39 and 38 in the final. The trio of Sabeera (105), Addya (110) and Bhavya Tripathi (109) also took the trap team gold, aggregating 324 in an event where their only competitor was Kazakhstan (323).

India also won the junior men's trap team gold after the trio of Arya Vansh Tyagi (112), Arjun (110) and Udhav Rathore (106) totalled 328. Arva Vansh also bagged the individual junior trap silver after a tense shoot-off with Kazakhstan's Nikita Moisseyev.

Paris, August 26: Star Indian shuttlers PV Sindhu and HS Prannoy advanced to the second round of women's and men's singles competitions respectively with straight-game wins at the BWF World Championships here Tuesday.

Sindhu will next meet Thailand's Karupathevan Letshanaa, while Prannoy is likely to take on second seed Anders Antonsen. Mixed doubles pair of Rohan Kapoor and Ruthvika Shivani Gadde also crossed the opening



hurdle, beating Macau's Leong Iok Chong and NG Weng Chi 18-21 21-16 21-18 in 47 minutes.

Sindhu, a two-time Olympic medallist, looked nervy at the start to fall 0-4 behind due to a series of miscued shots early on.

From 6-2, Nalbantova gave away few freebies as Sindhu narrowed it to 5-7. The Bulgarian kept the pressure on the Indian to move to 9-5. A wellplaced shot followed by another precise return saw Nalbantova grab a 11-7 advantage at the break. After the break, world number 15 Sindhu unleashed a series of smashes, including her trademark cross-court returns, to claw back at 12-12. With the Bulgarian finding the net twice.

Sindhu took a 14-12 lead.

The Indian's deep clears sailed out thrice as it was 15-15. Nalbantova moved to 19-17 after Sindhu's net shot tumbled inside after kissing the net.

After Sindhu levelled things with a fine net shot, she went long again as the Bulgarian had a game point but Nalbantova sprayed into the net as it was 20-20. A forehand slice went to net as the Bulgarian grabbed a second game before not only squandering it again but handing her fancied opponent the game point once more. Sindhu sealed it this time.

Prannoy fell behind a bit early on but found his range soon to turn the tables at 8-7 with his round-the-head cross court smashes. The Indian controlled the rallies, making his opponent twist and turn to set up the points and finishing with his smashes.

Alcaraz, Ruud sail through first-round wins

New York, August 26: Carlos Alcaraz downed big-serving American Reilly Opelka 6-4, 7-5, 6-4 to begin his campaign at Flushing Meadows, where this fortnight Alcaraz is aiming for his second US Open crown and sixth major trophy overall.

With the win, Alcaraz stays on course in the battle for World No 1. If the Spaniard matches or betters Jannik Sinner's result, Alcaraz will leave New York atop the ATP

Alcaraz boasts a season-leading 55 wins and six titles, according to the ATP Win/Loss Index. Last Monday, Alcaraz lifted his first Cincinnati Open title. Elsewhere, Casper Ruud registered a 6-1, 6-2, 7-6(5), victory against unseeded Sebastian Ofner in their first-round match in Louis Armstrong

Ruud, who's most comfortable on clay, has had mixed success on the hard courts at the Austrailian Open and US Open since his '22 final run in Flushing Meadows, where he fell to Carlos Alcaraz in four sets. In eliminating Ofner, Ruud collected just his ninth win at a hard-court Grand Slam event since then.

Zarazua stuns Keys, Andreeva dismantles Park

Renata Zarazua staged an upset at The US Open by beating Australian Open champion Madison Keys to reach the second round. The Mexican had scored her first ever Top 10 triumph with a gruelling 6-7(10), 7-6(3), 7-5 scoreboard to down No 6 seed Keys

Zarazua fell in six previous attempts against Top 10 talents, but secured a career-best result in three hours and 10 mins to book a Round 2 rumble with France's Diane Parry. In another action, Mirra Andreeva made an impressive return to competition on Monday night at the 2025 US Open, dismissing a wayward Alycia Parks under lights in Louis Armstrong Stadium. Andreeva had played just one match since Wimbledon due to an ankle injury, while Parks had arrived in New York fresh off her run to last week's WTA Monterrey semifinals.
