Dinesh K Patnaik named India's envoy to Canada

PNN & AGENCIES

New Delhi, August 28: India and Canada Thursday appointed envoys to Ottawa and New Delhi, respectively, signalling their efforts to repair ties that came under severe strain following the killing of a Sikh separatist in 2023.

India named seasoned diplomat Dinesh K Patnaik as the next high commissioner to Ottawa, while Canada appointed Christopher Cooter as its new envoy to New Delhi.

Patnaik, a 1990-batch Indian Foreign Service officer, is currently serving as India's ambassador to Spain




"He (Patnaik) is expected to take up the assignment shortly," the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) said in a brief statement.

In Ottawa, Canadian Foreign Minister Anita Anand announced that Cooter will become the next high commissioner to India, a position previously held by Cameron MacKay. "The appointment of a new high commissioner reflects Canada's step-by-step approach to deepening diplomatic engagement and advancing bilateral cooperation with India," Anand said.

Cooter has 35 years of diplomatic experience, having served most recently as Canada's charge d'affaires to Israel and as Canada's high commissioner to South Africa, Namibia, Lesotho, Mauritius and Madagascar.

He also served as first secretary at Canadian High Commission in New Delhi from 1998 to 2000. Notably, in June. Prime Minister Narendra Modi and his Canadian counterpart Mark Carney agreed to pursue 'constructive' steps to restore stability in India-Canada ties.

Rahul: 65L voters deleted from Bihar rolls were poor

Sitamarhi/Motihari, August 28: Congress leader Rahul Gandhi Thursday claimed that the 65 lakh people whose names were deleted from the electoral rolls of Bihar belonged to the poor and socially weaker sections of society.

Addressing a rally in Sitamar-hi as part of the 'Voter Adhikar Yatra', Gandhi said the people of Bihar would not allow the BJP and Election Commission to 'rob' them of their right to vote. "We have exposed the BJP and the EC, who were indulging in stealing of votes... They did it in Maharashtra, Haryana and Karnataka. Now, they want to repeat it in Bihar, which we will not allow them to do," he said.

Gandhi claimed he would provide more evidence of what he termed 'vote chori' in the coming months. Ahead of the rally, he visited the famed Janaki Temple in the area and offered prayers.

Later in the day, Himachal Pradesh Chief Minister Sukhvinder Singh Sukhu also joined the 'Voter Adhikar Yatra' in Motihari. Besides Sukhu, RJD



leader Teiashwi Yaday and oth er representatives of the INDIA bloc participated in the yatra, waving at an enthusiastic crowd from an open-roof SUV. In a post on X, Sukhu said,

"By participating in the 'Voter Adhikar Yatra' in Motihari, we have given further momentum to this great campaign for democratic awareness. Under the leadership of Rahul Gandhi jee. the entire Bihar has risen against vote theft and injustice, standing in favour of democracy."

"I am witnessing the resonance of the youth, the call of the farmers, and the voice of the people have become one. Vote theft is not just a crime; it is a direct attack on democracy. It is the duty of every Indian to respond to this and protect the Constitution," he said.

US blames Modi for Bhubaneswar, Mumbai among Russia-Ukraine war safest cities for women: Report

New York/Washington, August 28: A few hours after US President Donald Trump's 50 per cent tariffs on Indian products came into effect, White House trade adviser Peter Navarro dubbed the ongoing Russia-Ukraine conflict as 'Modi's

Navarro – Trump's Senior Counsellor for Trade and Manufacturing – alleged that India is helping feed the Russian war machine by purchasing its oil, which he said undermines American consumers, businesses, and workers. "Everybody in America loses

because of what India is doing. The taxpayers lose because we got to fund Modi's war," he said Wednesday on Bloomberg Television's Balance of Power.

When asked if he meant Putin's war, Navarro insisted, "I mean Modi's war, because the road to peace runs, in part, through New Delhi." Trump has imposed an additional 25 per cent tax on India for its purchases of Russian oil, levies that came into effect from Wednesday, bringing the total duties slapped on India to 50 per cent.

New Delhi: Equity investors became poorer by ₹9.69 lakh crore in two days of sharp fall in the stock markets, where the benchmark Sensex tumbled 1,555 points. The additional 25 per cent tax imposed by the US on India came into effect Wednesday, bringing the total of levies imposed on New Delhi to 50 per cent. Also, relentless foreign fund outflows dented investors' sentiment. On Thursday, the 30-share BSE Sensex nked 705.97 points or 0.87 per cei to settle at 80,080.57. During the day, it dropped 773.52 points or 0.95 per cent to 80,013.02. In two days, the benchmark has plummeted 1,555,34 points or 1.90 per cent. The market capitalisation of BSE-listed firms declined by ₹9,69,740.79 crore to ₹4,45,17,222.66 crore (USD 5.08 trillion) in two days.

has to stop buying Russian oil. "India can get 25 per cent off tomorrow if it stops buying Russian oil and helping to feed their war machine." Navarro said.

Calling Prime Minister Narendra Modi 'a great leader', Navarro said he was puzzled as "this is a mature democracy with intelligent people running it, and they look us bald-faced in the eye on the tariff part and say, 'we don't have the highest tariffs in the world', when, in fact, they do." "There's no dispute about that. If you look at the numbers and then they say..., 'We're not going to stop buying Russian oil'. Now, what does that mean?" Navarro said.

The trade adviser then further alleged that India buys Russian oil at a discount and then Indian refiners, in partnership with Russian refiners, sell it at a premium to the rest of the world. "Russia uses the money it gets to fund its war machine, kill more Ukrainians. And then the next thing that happens, of course, is Ukraine comes to the US and Europe and says give us some more money," Navarro added.

India has called the tariffs imposed by the US 'unjustified and unreasonable'. New Delhi has said that, like any major economy, it will take all necessary measures to safeguard its national interests and economic security. The trade adviser further said that India is the biggest democracy in the world and it should 'act like one' and 'not side with the authoritarians'.

There was no immediate comment from New Delhi on

Navarro's statement. Meanwhile, the House Foreign Affairs Committee said that instead of imposing sanctions on China or others purchasing larger quantities of Russian oil, Trump is singling out India with tariffs, hurting Americans and sabotaging the US-India relationship in the process. It's almost like it's not about Ukraine at all.

New Delhi, August 28: Kohima, Visakhapatnam, Bhubaneswar, Aizawl, Gangtok, Itanagar and Mumbai have emerged as the safest cities in the country for women, while Patna, Jaipur, Faridabad, Delhi, Kolkata, Srinagar and Ranchi were ranked the lowest, according to the National Annual Report & Index on Women's Safety (NARI) 2025.

The nationwide index re leased Thursday, based on a survey of 12,770 women across 31 cities, placed the national safety score at 65 per cent, categorising cities as 'much above', 'above', 'below' or 'much below' this benchmark. Kohima and other top-ranked cities were associat-

"The body has been sent to Capital Hospital for post-mortem. Though it is unclear as to why Deepak took the extreme step, depression is suspected to be the reason," a police official said.

Maha building collapse death toll rises to 17

Palghar, August 28: The death toll in the collapse of an allegedly unauthorised building at Virar in Maharashtra's Palghar district rose to 17 Thursday afternoon with the discovery of two more bodies as the search operation came to an end. Seven people are undergoing treatment at various hospitals, officials said.

While the Maharashtra government announced an assis tance of Rs 5 lakh to the kin of the deceased, police have arrested the builder of the four-storey structure, Ramabai Apartment, after the Vasai Vi rar Municipal Corporation

(VVMC) lodged a complaint. The bodies of Omkar Jovil 27, whose one-vear-old daugh ter's birthday was being cel ebrated when the building came crashing down Wednes day, and Rohini Chavan, 37 were the last to be retrieved by the NDRF and other rescue

agencies. Jovil's wife Arohi, 24, and one-year old daughter Utkarsha too died in the collapse.

The search operations ended around 3pm, Assistant Munici pal Commissioner Gilson Gonsalves told PTI.

Oldest known ankylosaur fossil found in Morocco oid crash-landing wiped out at rivals or predators. This sug-

Morocco, August 28: With a tank-like build, armored body, and a collar of spikes as long as golf clubs, Spicomellus afer looked more like something out of a Pokémon game than a real animal. According to palaeontologists, this strange dinosaur once roamed the floodplains of present-day North Africa around 165 million years ago.

"The fossil – the oldest known ankylosaur specimen was unearthed near the central Moroccan town of Boulemane. Its extravagant armour has confounded existing theories of how the ankylosaurs, a major group of plant-eating dinosaurs, evolved," The Guardian reported."It's absolutely bristling with spikes all over its body, said Prof Richard Butler of the University of Birmingham and the project co-lead.

"It has these incredibly distinctive spikes around the neck – an armoured collar that is absolutely enormous and totally out of proportion to the rest of the body, smaller spikes projecting out of the ribs, and at the end of its tail it would have had some

kind of weapon," Butler said. The dinosaur's anatomy was so outlandish that piecing together the body plan from the incomplete jumble of fossilised

bones was not an easy task. "We put all the armour out fit," said Butler.



typically interpreted as having evolved as a physical defence. The sheer extravagance of Spicomellus's spikes, which would have protruded through tough skin, is more suggestive of dominance or mating displays, the researchers concluded.

"When you see the neck collar of this thing, it seems like total overkill," Butler said, adding, "It does seem like the kind of thing that would've complicated its life.'





US tariff hike to hit 15L in Odisha fishing sector shrimp cultivation. Asked about

Bhubaneswar, August 28: The new tariff imposed by US President Donald Trump on Indian exports will affect the livelihood of at least 15 lakh people engaged in the fishing sector in Odisha, Seafood Exporters' Association said Thursday.

Claiming that the seafood exports to the US would halt as the Indian businessmen could not compete in the American market, as traders from Vietnam and other Asian countries are taxed at a lower rate there, said Tara Ranjan Patnaik, a member of the Seafood Exporters' Asso-

of Odisha-based Falcon Marine Exports, a leading frozen shrimp exporter, told PTI: "We have already reduced production and collection of seafood, which were meant for exports to the US. The impact has already been felt in the coastal states like Odisha. It will affect the livelihood of at least 15 lakh people engaged in the fishing sector.'

The additional 25 per cent tariff imposed by Trump on India for the country's purchases of Russian oil came into effect Wednesday, bringing the total amount of tariff imposed on New Delhi to 50 per cent.

could never compete with those from Ecuador. They have the lowest tariff rate of 10 per cent,' he pointed out.

Odisha exported seafood worth ₹4,700 crore in 2024-25, and the US market alone accounts for one-third of this, he said. Patnaik also said that his company used to send about 120 to 130 carriers of seafood for export every month.

"In August, it has come down to 25 carriers," he said, expressing anguish over the decline in the seafood trade and the people engaged in fishing, particularly marine and commercial alternative markets across the world. Patnaik said. "The seafood processing is a costly affair. The Americans have better buying capacity than other shrimp-consuming countries.'

The tariff hike by Trump has severely hit Indian exports, and has never happened in the re cent past, said another member of the Seafood Exporters' Association of India.

She is employed in a bank, while her husband is engaged in the medicine business. The couple was married three months ago.

"On August 14, around 9:30am, the couple left for work after locking their house. At about 2:30pm, the husband returned to find the main door broken and the bedroom almirah forced open. Gold or naments weighing nearly 300 grams and cash worth ₹5 lakh were missing. The matter was then reported to Bharatpur Police Station," Commissionerate Police sources said.

Acting upon the complaint, the police initiated an investigation into the matter and arrested the accused Thursday.

3-day monsoon bird census at Bhitarkanika **NP from August 30**

Rajnagar/Bhubaneswar, August 28: Bhitarkanika National Park will conduct a three-day monsoon bird census from August 30 at three locations within the park.

Assistant Conservator of Forests (ACF) Manas Kumar Das said the enumeration will be carried out at Mathadia, Laxmiprasad Dia, and Durgaprasad Dia.

Two seven-member forest teams have been formed to undertake the census under the supervision

of Rajnagar Mangrove (Forest) Division DFO Varadaraj

During the Annual Residential Bird Census 2024, enumerators had spotted an estimated 1,30,123 residential birds belonging to 10 different species.

Over the past several years, Mathadia, Laxmiprasad Dia, and Durgaprasad Dia have emerged as the preferred nesting and breeding grounds for these birds.

However, the Bagagahan heronry, once considered a paradise for residential birds, has been skipped by the avian visitors in recent years

In the last census drive, as many as 27,282 nests were spotted across 1,300 mangrove trees. Laxmiprasad Dia recorded the highest number with 12,702 nests, followed by Mathadia with 12,502 nests, Durgaprasad Dia with 1,548 nests, and Bali Dia with 520 nests. Das informed.

A total of 10 out of 11 local bird species flock to Bhitarkanika National Park during the monsoon

for nesting and breeding. These include the Open-billed Stork, Little Cormorant, Inter-

Egret, Large Egret, Little Egret, Purple Heron, Grey Heron, Night Heron, Darter, White Ibis, and Cattle Egret.

The birds selectively use mangrove species such as Guan, Bani, Choranda, Kerauan, and Oruan trees for constructing their nests.



Twin murders mute Nuakhai



Kuchinda/Sohela, August 28: The celebration of Nuakhai was muted following twin murders of a man and a youth in separate incidents in Sambalpur and Bargarh districts Thursday.

In the first incident, Krupasindhu Raksha, 70, of Charbhati village under Kuchinda police limits in Sambalpur district was allegedly punched to death by his son Bibardhan Raksha, 23, over a dispute involving Rs 70. The accused allegedly demanded Rs 70 from his father for festival expenses, and when denied, he pushed him to the ground and punched on his face and back repeatedly, leaving Krupasindhu dead on the spot.

The incident occurred when the family members were busy preparing for the festival. The victim's daughter raised the alarm, alerting relatives and

residents. She also informed Kuchinda police who registered a case (249/25), and arrested Bibardhan. IIC Bamadev Sankhuala said, "A scientific team from Sambalpur has been pressed into service. The accused will be produced in court Friday.'

Bibardhan stood near his father's body for some time before fleeing the scene when the cops approached. He was later arrested during raids in nearby areas, said the police.

The incident cast a pall of gloom on Charbhati where the happiness of the residents received a jolt during Nuakhai.

In another incident, a 24-year-old youth was hacked to death in broad daylight Thursday at a petrol pump in Haldipali under Sohela police limits of Bargarh district over suspected past enmity.

Police said the victim, identified as Balishtha Pradhan of

axe while sitting at the pump and scrolling through his phone around 11:15am. The assailant, Lipu Sahu, 24, alias Lipan of Garbhana village under Sohela police limits, allegedly attacked him with the weapon repeatedly from rear before fleeing the scene

Profusely bleeding, Pradhan was rushed to a private hospital in Bargarh in critical condition, where doctors pronounced him dead. His body was later sent to the district headquarters hospital for post-mortem.

Police arrested Sahu from his home and registered a case. Investigators said CCTV footage from the petrol pump showed the accused delivering as many as 16 blows to the victim.

Residents blocked the traffic on the national highway near Haldipali Square around 3pm, burning tyres and wooden logs demanding death penalty for the accused.

On being informed, police officials, including Additional SP Indurekha Paschimakabat, Padmapur SDPO Pandav Sabar, Bargarh SDPO Padarabinda Tripathy, and another officer Sourav Ota rushed to the spot. As talks failed, police dispersed the protesters and cleared the road around 4 pm.

4 fishers return home 7 days after boat sinks

Bhadrak, August 28: Four fishermen of Bhadrak district battled waves, hunger and fatigue, floating on water for seven days after their boat sank in the Bay of Bengal, before returning home safely Thursday.

The four, including a 70-yearold man, refused to give up hope as they clung to some floats and survived only by drinking water they carried in a bottle.

When they ventured into the sea from Chudamani fishing harbour under Basudevpur block of the coastal district August 21 to catch fish, they did not know theirs would be a survival story.

"We had cast a net when the engine of the boat 'Hidimba' suddenly stopped working due to a snag. Despite repeated attempts, it failed to start. We dropped the anchor, but it was ripped away by the strong ocean currents," said 55-year-old Pabana Mallick, one of the four fishermen. The boat then drifted further towards the deep sea.



The fishermen tried to control the vessel for three days using the sail, but August 24, it broke apart and eventually sank, Mallick said.

"We fell into the water with only a bottle of water. We clung to floats and makeshift supports - some styrofoam articles - to stay afloat," he said.

After nearly seven days, the fishermen reached close to the Sunamuhin forest area on the night of August 27, when they were rescued by locals.

They were taken to Basudevpur CHC, where doctors confirmed their condition was stable, said Lopamudra Navak, the inspector in charge of Basudevpur police station. The other three fishermen are: Prakash Mallick,,34, Bana Mallick, 27, and Sapana Mallick, 70.

BEANS FARMING BOON FOR DARINGBADI WOMEN

Daringbadi, August 28: Beans cultivated in Raikia block of Kandhamal district are one of the most sought-after vegetables in Bhubaneswar and other major towns across Odisha. They are now being cultivated on a large scale in Daringbadi block of Kandhamal district, generating steady income for farmers, especially women.

While the demand for beans remains high, lack of organised marketing network and price (MSP) have prevented farmers from receiving fair returns for their hard work. Middlemen and traders are reportedly profiting the most from these lapses resulting in sufferings for the farmers.

To support farmers, some voluntary organisations have stepped in to ensure proper marketing facilities for the vegetables cultivated by the farmers. Under the guidance of Kailash Chandra Dandapat, secretary of Jagruti, a voluntary outfit, field coordinator



Sarat Navak has trained 210 beans farmers across five panchavats of the block. As a result, the farmers collectiveat Rs 90 per kg, earning Rs 5.4 lakh in total.

However, with more harvests expected, many farmers are worried as traders continue to buy their produce at low prices. Farmers said the government should introduce regular marketing facilities and establish processing units to ensure beans are available in the market vear-round.

The absence of cold storage facilities in the block has also created difficulties

for farmers. Kalpana Pradhan and Arupa Pradhan from Samagata village under Badabanga panchayat successfully marketed their beans, while groups from Tagapanga in Greenbadi panchayat also participated in the initiative.

Among the 25 panchayats in the block, Badabanga, Greenbadi and Pliheri are the major beans producing areas. Still, farmers are concerned as some crops are showing signs of leaf disease, with plants turning yellow.

Democracy & Justice

he architecture of international justice - the rules, norms, and institutions that have guided efforts to hold accountable the perpetrators of grave crimes – was largely built upon the presumption that the world was moving toward greater respect for democracy

To be sure, progress was not linear: there were steps sideways and backward. But from the Nuremberg and Tokyo war crimes trials, which prosecuted German and Japanese perpetrators after World War II, to the adoption in 1998 of the Rome Statute, which established the International Criminal Court (ICC), the general trajectory was proceeding in the direction of accountability. Despite their flaws and crimes, some of the world's oldest and most powerful democracies helped lead the push for justice in the former Yugoslavia, Rwanda, and Sierra Leone.

But recent events have reversed this trend. Authoritarian leaders who scorn human rights have come to power in several democracies, including the United States. Donald Trump's election as US president in 2016, and his re-election in 2024, have been particularly concerning. Already under Trump's second administration, the US – whose leadership of the international justice system is as essential as it has been inconsistent - has gone so far as to impose sanctions on the ICC's prosecutor, two deputy prosecutors,

and six of its judges The US is not the only democracy under pressure from authoritarian forces that fear any form of accountability. According to news reports, even before the current war in Gaza, the then-director of Israel's Mossad intelligence agency allegedly threatened the ICC's then-prosecutor, Fatou Bensouda, as part of a years-long pressure campaign to prevent an investigation into alleged war crimes and crimes against humanity in Palestine. In 2019, the Philippines withdrew from the ICC following the court's investigation of then-President Rodrigo Duterte's drug crackdown. And earlier this year, proudly illiberal Hungary announced its intention to do the same, shortly after it refused to execute an ICC arrest warrant.

Of course, international justice is not only a concern for democracies. After all. Joseph Stalin was one of the Allied leaders who agreed to establish the International Military Tribunal that sat in Nuremberg after WWII. As Robert Jackson, the US Supreme Court justice who served as the chief American prosecutor at Nuremberg, observed in his opening statement, the trial was "part of the great effort to make the peace more secure." The Rome Statute, whose signatories include governments of all stripes, similarly recognises that "grave crimes threaten the peace, security and well-being of the world."

Even so, the global turn toward authoritarianism makes the world a less welcoming place for the independent

judges and lawyers trying to bring justice to victims of genocide, war crimes, crimes against humanity, and aggression. When elected heads of state seek to expand their power beyond traditional bounds, when governments remove and criminally charge the leadership of bar associations, when judges in national courts are threatened for acting as a bulwark against executive overreach, the rule of law suffers – to the detriment of everyone.

The question now is whether the project of holding high-level perpetrators to account will survive at all. Amid the challenges and disappointments, I find hope in the many expressions of courage, resistance, and faith in the law as an instrument for pushing back against arrogations of power. Such progress is contagious: advancing the rule of law anywhere makes a rule-of-law culture possible everywhere.

Just look at the judges who, in recent years, have defended the integrity of democratic elections in Senegal, India, Brazil, and other countries – often at great personal risk. Or consider the US courts that have rejected unlawful attempts to punish law firms for whom they represent and university students for what they say.

At the global level, the International Court of Justice has bravely taken the lead in shining a light on grave crimes in Myanmar, Syria. and Gaza. Over the past year, rulings by the ICJ, the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea, and the Inter-American Court of Human Rights have affirmed that states have a legal obligation to address

The current struggles for international justice and for democracy, though not identical, are related. And while hope alone is not enough to prevail in either fight, it is essential – for the victims of grave crimes, and for all those who worry that their next expression of dissent may be their last. In an atmosphere of pervasive fear, every decision to sign a letter, join a peaceful protest, or file a legal complaint against authoritarian measures is a step toward justice.

won't flow together...' warned Prime Minister Narendra Modi soon after the Pahalgam terror attack while taking the contentious decision to suspend the six decades old Indus Waters Treaty with Pakistan. Well, blood may not flow with water but it surely does with sport. In a fortnight from now, the Asia Cup cricket will begin with all eyes on the marquee India-Pakistan clash. The government has green-flagged the matches, claiming that they are making a distinction between bilateral engagements and multilateral events, while also rather piously claiming to "position India as a preferred destination for hosting international sporting events."

In principle, the government is only adhering to the unwritten guidelines followed since 2012: the only cricket encounters between the two countries since have been in global tournaments. As a long-standing advocate of Indo-Pak sporting ties, I ought to be welcoming the government's stand without demur. Cricket binds the subcontinent, sports is meant to be a bridge-builder. Some of my most cherished moments as a cricket fan have involved India-Pakistan matches. From Anil Kumble's ten wickets at the Kotla, the heroics of a Sachin Tendulkar in the 2003 World Cup to Javed Miandad's last ball six in Sharjah, Indo-Pak cricket has been the ultimate roller-coaster ride of emotion, one where competing nationalisms are tied into fractious history, past and present. An Imran Khan versus a Sunil Gavaskar, a Shoaib Akhtar versus a Virender Sehwag, Indo-Pak cricket has served up many a classic contest whose impact stretches far beyond the boundary.

And yet, somehow this time feels very different. Two teams will be locked in a battle on the field barely months after the two countries were on the verge of a potential nuclear conflict. What happened in Pahalgam was gruesome, an act of bestiality that sparked off rage across India. And yet, there was no remorse shown

by the Pakistani army-state. Unwilling to take any responsibility for its active sponsorship of terror, there was a crude attempt to describe the attack on civilians as a 'false flag' operation. The army chief General Asim Munir, who only weeks ahead of the terror attack had brazenly endorsed the two nation theory, was promoted to Field Marshal even as he continued to spew venom against India.

What do international cricketers have to do with the machinations of the malevolent Pakistan army-state? Isn't it possible to keep the purity of sport distinct from the coarseness of a political establishment that seeks to bleed India with a 'thousand cuts'? In theory yes, in reality, no. In the aftermath of the Pahalgam attack, there wasn't a single statement of empathy or solidarity with the Indian people from any recognisable voice within the Pakistan cricket fraternity. Instead, we had Shahid Afridi make provocative remarks blaming the Indian army for the terror attack. He wasn't alone. The Pakistan Cricket Board chief, Mohsin Nagvi. who is also a minister in the Shahbaz Sharif government, was quoted as saying, "Pakistan is a nuclear power and India doesn't have the courage to refuse playing cricket with us. They know what the consequences would be."

The PCB chief's incendiary statements show just how

deep the hostility is within the Pakistani establishment towards New Delhi. Yes, there are hotheads in this country too, who continue to peddle a dangerously jingoistic agenda that desires the 'elimination' of Pakistan. The media disinformation campaigns during Operation Sindoor on both sides of the border - perhaps far more bellicose on the Indian side – mirrors the complete collapse of any sense of institu-

tional code of conduct. In the circumstances, can an Indo-Pak cricket match provide a healing touch when the political class and media prefer war-mongering? Sadly not. I recall being in Pakistan in 2004 during what was in many ways a watershed tour, one where not only did India defeat Pakistan in Pakistan in a Test series for the first time but where there was a surge of warmth and goodwill towards the Indian team that held out a lingering ray of hope in the power of people to people contact. On one unforgettable evening in Lahore, I was surrounded by a group of frenzied Pakistani fans who were singing "Balaji zara dheere chalo," a reference to the Indian fast bowler, Lakshmipathi Balaji whose infectious smile had won hearts across the border. There is also the lasting memory of a Chennai crowd giving a standing ovation to the Pakistani team after they had narrowly defeated India in a Test match in 1999. Those

were goose bump moments, instilling some optimism in a more 'normal', congenial relationship. Alas, they have proven to be a false dawn.

Truthfully, the India-Pakistan relationship is anything but normal. Cricket, in that sense, is only an instrument to convey a fabricated sense of normalcy in a badly twisted equation. Players are expected to be our 'warriors in blue and green', waging a 'war' with bat and ball even as we spectators on both sides of the border are pushed into unimagined bouts of national hysteria by a cricket eco-system that thrives on these match-ups.

Cricket between India and

Pakistan is no longer about adhering to sporting protocols that frown upon the boycott of any national team. This is quite simply about the only thing that really matters in the greed-driven, amoral world of super-rich sports bodies: the size and volume of sponsorship money. An India-Pakistan cricket match will attract more eyeballs and advertising monies than all the other matches put together in the fortnight-long Asia Cup. It is the commerce of cricket that sustains Indo-Pak cricket. Poor ordinary Indians and Pakistanis divided by Partition won't get visas to visit each other's families in the Pahalgam aftermath but the VVIP elites of the two countries' cricket boards will happily snuggle upto each other in air-conditioned boxes. Blood and water may not coexist but the colour of money knows no such boundaries. Let the 'war' on the pitch begin!

Post-script: I am part of an India and Pakistan WhatsApp group of cricket fans. To be honest, I find it almost therapeutic to listen to intelligent voices across the border sans the noise of politics. Gavaskar or Hanif, Imran or Kapil, Virat or Babar Azam, the debates rage on. Maybe one day we should pick an all-time combined India-Pakistan eleven. So much easier to deal with than verbal jousting over who downed how many jets!

India's space mission: The road ahead

INDIA'S SPACE PROGRAMME IS CHARACTERISED BY COST AFFORDABILITY, **RELIABILITY AND** CONSISTENCY

early two years ago, India created history by softlanding its Chandravaan-3's Vikram lander on the permanently shadowed south pole of the Moon which is known for its treasure trove of mineral deposits. This made India the first country in the world to softland on the Moon's south pole and explore the surface with a rover.

India has a glorious heritage of astronomy rooted in mathematical precision, observational skills, and philosophical insights. From a few shadow measuring devices of the post Vedic period to the colossal masonry observatories of Sawai Jai Singh, India ventured on a path to unravel the mysteries of the cosmos. The modern space age is dawned by insights of visionary scientist Dr Vikram Sarabhai. He realised that space exploration for a developing nation like India was not just a fancy, but a necessity to uplift the country economically and societally. He dreamt of a country where satellites beam back signals to solve many real life problems faced by people in the fields of communication, weather forecasting, agriculture, health services, disaster management and education. To materialise his dreams, he initiated space activities in India with a humble beginning at Thumba in 1963 with the firing of Apache sounding rockets. This was the time when a church was converted to a makeshift launching station and rocket materials were transported using bicycles and bullock carts. Overcoming these early days of dwindling resources and depleted manpower, India marched triumphantly in its mission driven by indigenous technologies and innovations to launch its first satellite Aryabhatta in 1975 and eventually to reach the Moon through Chandrayaan-3. India's space programme

is characterised by cost affordability, reliability and consistency. For instance, the Chandravaan-3 mission cost only ₹615 crore, which is less than the cost of a typical Hollywood movie. Our launch vehicle PSLV has proved time and again to be the workhorse of ISRO for its proven reliability and flawless operations. Further, India proved its space prowess by launching 104 satellites in a single launch in 2017. Besides the Moon, India also sent missions to the Sun and Mars.

India's successful lunar exploration was a feat long due for a nation of 1.4 billion people and having the advantage of inheriting some of the greatest space legacies of the world like Vikram Sarabhai, Satish Dhawan and UR Rao. ISRO was set up in 1969 (a few days before the USA landed its astronauts on the Moon) and it took only 54 years for

it to achieve a soft-landing of its unmanned spacecraft on the Moon.

However, we should not be complacent of our lunar accomplishments and rather eye for even bigger goals in space exploration. Our manned space flight programme Gaganvaan is running way behind schedule. Substantial work is yet to be started for building a space station in low earth orbit.

The Gaganyaan manned spaceflight mission is likely to take off early next year. For this, astronauts have already been designated and various safety systems tested. We hope that Candrayaan-3's success and its legacy will serve as a catalyst for inspiring our future space missions in soaring to new heights of success and glory.

Targeted for completion within the next 10 years, this system merges missiles, radars, lasers, directed-energy weapons, and satellite sensors. spanning land, sea, air, undersea, and space. It relies on AI, advanced computation, big data analytics, and quantum technologies to ensure real-time detection, tracking, and neutralisation of aerial threats. These plans reinforce lessons from Op Sindoor, where domestic air-defence systems like Akashteer, Akash Shield, and D4 countered enemy drones and missiles with precision. Additionally, DRDO's Integrated Air Defence Weapon System (IADWS) has successfully tested a layered defence using launchers and laser-based directed energy. The Air Chief commended the tri-service synergy during Op Sindoor urging caution against hastily adopting theatre commands as in China and the US. Instead, he advocated for a joint planning and coordination centre in Delhi—centralised planning, decentralised execution under the Chiefs of Staff Committee, leveraging existing structures effectively. It seems to prove advantageous if the joint coordination centre is established immediately, allowing it to mature while Sudarshan Chakra is developed simultaneously. **RS Narula, PATIALA**

GST relief on cards

Sir, The GST Council will discuss a plan to slash levies on a host of products including cement, mass-consumption services such as salon and beauty parlors as well as individual life and health insurance plans when it meets early next month. Also on the agenda will be a proposal to move all food and textiles products into the 5% slab as part of a move to simplify the tax regime and end all classification concerns. The levy on cement is proposed to be reduced from 28% to 18%, sources said, in what will address a long pending demand from the construction and infrastructure sectors with the building material being a key input. The move is expected to reduce costs for end consumers, provided the industry, which has often faced cartelization charges, passes on the benefit of lower taxes.

JARANGE HEADS TO MUMBAI 27% OBC quota in MP: CM

Mumbai, August 28: Activist Manoj Jarange and his supporters were set to reach the outskirts of Mumbai Thursday evening ahead of his indefinite hunger strike for reservations for the Maratha community, while the Maharashtra government said it was ready for talks.

Over 1,500 Mumbai police personnel have been deployed at the Azad Maidan in south Mumbai to maintain law and order in view of Maratha quota activist Manoj Jarange's agitation, officials said Thursday. Senior police officials, including Joint Commissioner of Police (Law and Order) Satya Narayan, on evening visited the protest venue in the evening and took stock of the security arrangements.

In view of the protest, the police have put in place security arrangements at the Azad Maidan. They expect more than 20,000 protesters in south Mumbai, an official said.

Besides the local police, one company each of the Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF), Rapid Action Force (RAF), Central Industrial Security Force (CISF) and Maharashtra Security Force (MSF) are also deployed at the protest venue and its surrounding areas to avoid any untoward incident, he said.

This was the right time for Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis to win the hearts of Maratha community by accepting the reservation demand, the 43-year-old activist said after reaching Pune. The activist set out for

Mumbai from his Antarwali Sarati village in Jalna district Wednesday, and reached Shivneri Fort, the birthplace of Maratha king Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj, in Pune district with hundreds of his supporters Thursday morning.

Vikhe Patil also said the Maratha quota issue will not be resolved if personal attacks were made against chief minister Fadnavis. Jarange had earlier called Fadnavis "anti-Hindu" and "anti-Maratha".

The MVA could not safeguard the Maratha reservation. the BJP minister said, referring to the scrapping of the quota, granted in 2018 when Fadnavis was CM, by the Supreme Court.

The Supreme Court May 5, 2021, struck down reservations for the Marathas in college admissions and jobs in Maharashtra, saying there were no exceptional circumstances to justify the breach of the 50 per cent ceiling on overall reservations. The MVA led by Uddhav Thackeray governed the state then.

Speaking elsewhere, chief minister Fadnavis said his government was committed to protect the interests of both the Marathas and OBCs, and did not intend to pit the two communities against each other.

"We will not allow injustice to happen to the OBCs, and Marathas should know that it is my government which has worked for the community's welfare. The reservation granted (to the Marathas) by our government is still legally valid," he said.

The reservation for Economically Weaker Sections (EWS) resolved the reservation issues in other states, but in Maharashtra, the way of looking at the EWS quota was not yet positive, Fadnavis said.

The Marathas already have 10 percent quota, and still there is a demand for reservations, he said, noting that there are more than 350 sub- castes among OBCs. "Still, we will try to understand what the protesters have to say," the CM said.

GANPATI FESTIVAL

Nearly 30K idols immersed after one-and-half days in Mumbai

Mumbai, August 28: Nearly 30,000 Ganesh idols have been immersed till Thursday night in Mumbai, the metropolis' civic body said.

During the 10-day festival, a large number of devotees immerse idols after one-and-half days as well as on the fifth and seventh days, a Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) official said, adding no untoward incident has been reported during this process from the city so far.

"A total of 29,965 'one-andhalf-days' Ganpati idols were immersed in the sea, other water bodies and artificial ponds till 9pm Thursday, the second day of the festival. These include 29,614 'household' Ganpati idols and 337 from 'sarvajanik' (public festivity) pandals," the civic official said.

BMC claimed idols have been immersed in large numbers in artificial lakes. Till 3 pm, 326, or more than 55 per cent of 583 Ganapati idols, were immersed in artificial lakes, the official said.

However, sources claimed the BMC commissioner's office has asked concerned departments to not publicize the number of idols immersed in artificial ponds.

When contacted by PTI, civic

tor Bhushan Gagrani avoided giving a reply on the issue.

'The Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation has taken action from time to time as per the orders given by the Hon'ble High Court and the Government of Maharashtra. It has also created public awareness in an effective manner," the civic body claimed in a statement.

This year, the BMC has earmarked 70 natural water bodies (including stretches of the sea shore) and set up 288 artificial ponds for immersion, the offi cial added.

The festival, among the most patronised in Maharashtra, started on Ganesh Chaturthi (August 27) and ends on Anana Chaturdashi (September 6). As part of measures to protect

the environment, the civic body has urged citizens to immerse their eco-friendly Ganpati idol in drums or buckets, while Plaster of Paris (PoP) idols that are less than 6 feet in height must be immersed in artificial ponds. It has also asked 'sarvajanik'

mandals to segregate offerings so that biodegradable material can be turned into fertiliser. The BMC has trained more

than 1000 volunteers of such mandals in handling emergencv situations, including overcrowding, officials said

Rain, flash floods upend lives

New Delhi, August 28: Raging waters swallowed roads and bridges, swept away buildings and cut off villages in parts of India Thursday as the rain gods refused to relent, leaving many stranded and rescuers scrambling to reach them.

From Himachal Pradesh in the north to Kerala in the south, rains caused water levels of rivers and dams to rise and inundate residential areas and agricultural fields. Kashmir, however, breathed

easy as a let-up in rain after two days eased the flood threat. In Himachal Pradesh, flash floods in the Ravi river washed away several government buildings in the remote Bada Bangal village in Kangra district, officials said. The Bada Bangal village,

located at an altitude of 7,800 feet, is accessible only by foot through the high-altitude Thamsar and Kalihani passes. It remains cut off from the rest of the state for four to six months during winters.

According to the State Emergency Operation Centre, 536 roads are closed across 11 of the 12 districts in Himachal Pradesh. Reports from Chamba have not been received as the communication network in the district is snapped, it said.

According to the meteorological department, a spell of light to moderate rain at scattered to fairly widespread places with a



possibility of moderate to heavy rain or thundershowers in a few districts of Jammu is likely from August 30 to September 1.

From September 2 to 6, a brief spell of rain or thundershowers is expected at a few places. Jammu and Kashmir Chief Minister Omar Abdullah said he would sit with officers in a few days to understand what flood mitigation measures were taken after the 2014 deluge and corrective measures would be taken wherever the union territory was lagging.

In Punjab, where at least eight districts have been hit by flash floods, central and state agencies worked tirelessly to evacuate people from the flooded areas.

Officials said 1,052 people have been rescued so far from

the flood-hit areas in Hoshiarpur district. Many villages in Tanda and Mukerian sub-divisions remained inundated because of heavy inflow of water from the Beas river and rain.

The officials said 15 relief camps are being run and these house 413 people, including 280 moved in the last 16 hours. The floods have so far damaged 5,287 hectares of agricultural land in the district.

Seventeen 'kutcha' houses have collapsed, five have suffered severe damage and one was partially damaged this monsoon, they said.

The rising water level of the Ganga disrupted normal activities, including the daily 'aarti' and cremations, on the ghats of Varanasi in Uttar Pradesh.

After a slight drop over

the past few days, the Ganga crossed the warning mark of 70.262 metres to reach 70.91 metres Thursday morning, nearing the danger level of 71.262 metres, officials said. In Rajasthan, waters receded in Bundi district and villagers in Nainwan, Kapren and Keshoraipatan regions were seen trying to salvage what they could from their flood-ravaged homes.

Heavy rain is likely at some places in Kota and Udaipur divisions. Some parts of Jodhpur and Bikaner divisions are also expected to receive moderate to heavy rain during this period, the weather office said.

In Maharashtra's Nanded and Latur districts, more than 2,200 people have been shifted to safety amid heavy rainfall,

From Himachal Pradesh in the north to Kerala in the south. rains caused water levels of rivers and dams to rise and inundate residential areas and agricultural fields

Rain intensified in Kerala, triggering landslides at the Thamarassery pass in Wayanad district and a rise in water levels of dams. The India Meteorological Department (IMD) issued an 'orange' alert for six districts -- Ernakulam, Thrissur, Kozhikode, Wayanad, Kannur and Kasaragod.

An 'orange' alert means very heavy rain of 11 cm to 20 cm. In Telangana, one person died when the wall of his house collansed in Kamareddy district and five are missing after being swept away by the floodwaters, an official release said.

South Central Railway said 69 trains were cancelled due to the submerging of tracks at different locations in the Hyderabad division. In Karnataka's Bidar district, overnight rainfall in Aurad taluk submerged several bridges, including Dadagi bridge in Badalgaon-Chondimukhed in Bhalki taluk, stopping vehicu-

New Delhi/Patna, August 28: Alleging that abuses were hurled at the late mother of Prime Minister Narendra Modi during Rahul Gandhi's 'Voter Adhikar Yatra' in Bihar, the BJP Thursday asserted the Congress-led INDIA bloc will be "punished" by the people in the upcoming Assembly polls.

A delegation of the state BJP also lodged a complaint at the Kotwali police station here Thursday in connection with Wednesday's incident in Darbhanga town, from where Gandhi, her sister and Congress general secretary Priyanka Vadra and RJD leader Tejashwi Yadav had left for Muzaffarpur on motorcycles.

Reacting to the episode of a video clip purportedly of Darbhanga district, which has gone viral on social media, Deputy Chief Minister and former state BJP president Samrat Choud hary said "the behaviour of the crowds was characteristic of the RJD's hooliganism. And the Congress puts up with rowdy behaviour in its blind quest for power"

The video clip is of a small podium on which no prominent leader was present, but a person screaming an expletive into the mic, who can be heard but not seen, met with admonition from bystanders. PTI could not independently verify the authenticity of the video. "There has been tremendous anger among party workers who have burnt an effigy of Rahul and Tejashwi. We are also gathering evidence and look forward to lodging another FIR," said Aditya Narayan Jha 'Manna', the BJP's district unit

chief in Darbhanga. Union Minister of State for Home Nityanand Rai, a former state BJP president, also came out with a statement, asking Gandhi and Yaday to tender an apology for the behaviour

of their alleged supporters. Talking to reporters after lodging the police complaint, state BJP media in-charge Danish Eqbal said, "Just look at the chronology of the INDIA bloc. First, they invite to the yatra Revanth Reddy and MK Stalin, both of whom have been known for abusing Bihar. Then their workers abuse the PM".

Reddy, the Chief Minister of Congress-ruled Telangana, and his Tamil Nadu counterpart Stalin, who heads the DMK, had joined the Yatra Tuesday and Wednesday, respectively.

CJI to administer oath to new SC judges today

New Delhi, August 28: Chief Justice of India B R Gavai will on Friday administer oath to Bombay High Court Chief Justice Alok Aradhe and Patna High Court Chief Justice Vipul Manubhai Pancholi who were elevated to the Supreme Court August 27.

With their elevation, the apex court is set to regain its full working strength of 34 judges, including the CJI. Justice Pancholi will be in line to become the CJI in October 2031 after Justice Joymalya Bagchi's retirement October 2, 2031.

He would assume the CJI's office October 3, 2031, and retire May 27, 2033. On August 25. the apex court collegium recommended to the Centre the names of Justices Aradhe and Pancholi for elevation as top court judges.

Collegium member and Supreme Court's Justice B V Nagarathna, however, registered a strong dissent to the apex court collegium's recommendation to elevate Justice Pancholi to the top court, saying his appointment would be "counter-productive" to the judiciary. Justice Nagarathna, the only woman judge in the top court, recorded her dissent on various counts.

Sources privy to the development said Justice Nagarathna, in her dissent, noted that pushing ahead with his appointment could erode "whatever credibility the collegium system still

Panel submits 450-page report on Sambhal violence to Yogi

Lucknow: A three-member judicial commission headed by retired Allahabad High Court judge Devendra Kumar Arora Thursday submitted its report on the November 2024 violence in Sambhal to Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath. The panel members, including Arora, retired IPS officer Arvind Kumar Jain, and ex-IAS officer Amit Mohan Prasad, met the chief minister and submitted their report on the violence that erupted near the Shahi Jama Masjid in Sambhal November 24 last year during an ASImonitored survey of the mosque, claiming four lives and injuring several others. The commission was set up November 28, 2024. Its members visited Sambhal several times since December 1, 2024, when they

first visited the violence-hit area to record witness statements.

Paper leak: HC cancels 2021 Raj police recruitment exam

Jaipur: The Rajasthan High Court Thursday cancelled the contentious 2021 police sub-inspector recruitment exam owing to allegations over paper leak and involvement of members of Rajasthan Public Service Commission (RPSC). Justice Sameer Jain cancelled the exam, which was the bone of contention for both BJP and Congress governments in the state and gave a detailed verdict. "The Hindi idiom: 'ghar ka bhedi lanka dhaye' (insider does maximum damage), aptly encapsulates the egregious circumstances surrounding the Sub-Inspector Recruitment Examination 2021, wherein the very guardians entrusted with safeguarding the sanctity of the process, namely the members of the RPSC, were instrumental in its vitiation," the order said.

'NCAP target of 40% cut in pollution can add 2 yrs to lives'

New Delhi, August 28: Residents of 130 cities covered under the National Clean Air Programme (NCAP) could see their life expectancy increase by two years compared to 2017 if India achieves its revised target of a 40 per cent reduction in particulate pollution by 2026, a new report said Thursday.

Launched in 2019, NCAP aimed to cut 2017 particulate pollution levels in 130 highly polluted cities by 20-30 per cent by 2024. In 2022, the government revised the target to

a 40 per cent reduction by 2026. In practice, only PM10 concentration is being considered for performance assessment.

The Energy Policy Institute at the University of Chicago (EPIC) said in its 2025 report that residents in these 130 cities would gain two years in life expectancy as compared to 2017 if the target is met.

Government data shows 103 of the 130 cities recorded an improvement in PM10 levels in 2024-25 compared to 2017-18. Sixty-four of them reduced these levels by more than 20 per cent, while 25 achieved cuts of over 40 per cent.



Top court questions Guv's delay in assenting to Bills

Article 200 provides for the powers of the Governor regarding bills passed by the State Legislature, allowing them to either assent to the bill, withhold assent, return the bill for reconsideration or reserve the bill for the consideration of the President

New Delhi, August 28: The Supreme Court Thursday said the term 'as soon as possible' used in Article 200 of the Constitution in deciding the fate of bills will serve no practical purpose if Governors are allowed to withhold consent for "eternity"

A five-judge Constitution bench made the observation even as the Centre submitted that state governments cannot invoke writ jurisdiction in moving the apex court against the actions of the President and the Governor in dealing with the bills passed by state Assemblies for violation of fundamental rights.

The top court also said the framers of the Constitution deliberately replaced an earlier six-week limit with the phrase 'as soon as possible' in Article 200 and asked the Centre whether this phrase can be ignored in

deciding the fate of bills. A proviso of Article 200 says the Governor may, as soon as possible after the presentation to him of the Bill for assent, return the Bill, if it is not a Money Bill, to the house for reconsideration and shall not withhold the consent after the assembly reconsiders and sends it back to him.



"The question is when the Governor sits over a Bill passed by the legislature and keeps sitting over it. The words used were 'as soon as possible' .. earlier it was six weeks and later made as soon as possible and one of the members in the drafting committee stated 'as soon as possible' would mean immediately.. if this was the view of the constitution makers then can we ignore that," Chief Justice of India B R Gavai asked.

Senior advocate Abhishek Singhvi, appearing for Tamil Nadu, said the argument that Governors can withhold assent even to money bills passed by the assembly would effectively

make them a "super Chief Min-

Withholding of a Bill must lead to returning it to the Assembly and if the Governors are allowed to withhold his assent permanently then it will make mockery of the whole Article 200 and it will be swallowed by this proviso, he said.

Responding to submissions that Governors can withhold assent to even money bills, Singhvi told a bench, also comprising justices Surya Kant, Vikram Nath, PS Narasimha, and AS Chandurkar, that "It is in sync with the submission that the governor is not in a dominating position rather he is a super Chief Minister".

Referring to Constituent assembly debates, Singhyi said Governors and the President are "titular heads" who have no discretion on executive decision-making, save and except a very few ones.

Earlier in the day, Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, appearing for the Centre, told the bench that he has got the instructions to submit that the President is of the opinion that the top court render its views on the questions whether states could invoke Article 32 to move the apex court seeking a mandamus to the Governor or the President for clearing a Bill.

Bhagwat pitches for maximum 3 children, minimum 3 languages

New Delhi, August 28: RSS chief Mohan Bhagwat Thursday said all Indians should know at least three languages, including their mother tongue, their state's language and a link language for the entire country that cannot be a foreign one.

Patna, August 28: A high-security alert has been sounded across Bihar following inputs suggesting that three terrorists from Pakistan have entered the state through Nepal, an official said Thursday.

Bihar Police headquarters has issued an alert to all district police and has also issued the names and photographs of the terrorists, belonging to the banned terror outfit Jaish-e-Mohammed. It is suspected that all of them reached Bihar via Nepal through Araria. Talking to PTI Thursday, Bihar DGP Vinay Kumar said, "Yes, a general alert has been sounded across the state. All district police and several other wings of the Bihar Police have been directed to maintain a close watch and 'extraordinary' vigil to thwart any attempt by anti-national elements by intensifying area domination patrolling and search operations. The security has already been heightened in the state." When specifically asked about the inputs suggesting

three terrorists from Pakistan have entered the state through Nepal, the DGP said, "I can only say that a general alert has been sounded across the state". He refused to divulge more details about the alert. However, sources said intelligence inputs suggest that all three terrorists have entered Bihar. Photographs of Pakistani terrorists - Hasnain Ali, Adil Hussain, and Mohammad Usman - have also been released and sent to all district police. Hasnain is a resident of Rawalpindi, Adil from Umerkot and Usman from Bahawalpur in Pakistan, sources said.

The state shares a long porous boundary with Nepal.

Security around the vital institutions and tourist places in Rajgir, Bodhgaya, Patna and several other places has been enhanced as a precautionary measure. Security has been beefed at all places where footfall of tourists was high, like Mahabodhi Temple Complex (Bodh Gaya), Viswa Shanti Stupa (Rajgir), Mahaveer temple and Takhat Sri Harimandir Ji, Patna Sahib (Patna).

ROAD ACCIDENTS

Not wearing seat belts claimed 16,025 lives in 2023: Report

New Delhi, August 28: As many as 16,025 people were killed in road accidents in 2023 as they were not wearing seat belts, according to a report by the Ministry of Road Transport and Highways (MoRTH).

Of the casualties, 8,441 were drivers while the remaining 7,584 were passengers, according to the report titled 'Road accidents in India 2023'.

A total number of 4,80,583 road accidents have been reported by Police Departments of States and Union Territories (UTs) in the country during the calendar year 2023, claiming 1,72,890 lives and causing injuries to 4,62,825 persons.

The report noted that non-usage of safety devices such as helmets and seat belts is critical for averting fatal and grievous

injuries in the event of the occurrence of road accidents. Helmets are mandatory for



all motorists on two-wheelers, barring a few exemptions.

According to the report, the total number of fatal road accidents had increased from 1,55,781 in 2022 to 1,60,509 in 2023, registering an increase of 3.04 per cent corresponding to the same period last year.

During 2023, 33.4 per cent of total accidents were fatal, it

Nature of accident or collision types at the aggregate national level data shows an increase in 2023 compared to 2022.

As per the report, 'Hit from Back['] accounted for the largest share in total accidental death (20 per cent), followed by 'Hit and Run' and 'Head on Collision', which account for 18 per

cent and 16 per cent, respectively. Further, the report high-

lighted that 'Hit from Back' accounted for the largest share in total accidents (21 per

cent), followed by 'Head on Collision' and 'Hit from side', which account for 17 per cent and 15 per cent, respectively. Road accident se-

verity, measured by the number of persons killed per 100 accidents, had slight-

ly decreased to 36 in 2023 from 36.5 in 2022.

During 2023, the report said 'over speeding' accounted for 68.4 per cent of the total road accidents, 68.1 per cent of total deaths and 69.2 per cent of total



UK PM to replace key aide Nin Pandit

London: British Prime Minister Keir Starmer is set to replace one of his key aides at 10 Downing Street in London, Ninjeri 'Nin' Pandit, after just 10 months as his **Principal Private Secretary** (PPS), according to UK media reports Thursday. The Indianorigin top civil servant, in charge of running the team at the Prime Minister's office as PPS, is expected to be moved into a new role leading on policy delivery at No. 10 Downing Street. According to the BBC, Starmer had become concerned that Pandit was ineffective as one of the most influential members of his inner circle. However, allies of the UK PM have since dismissed this speculation and indicated that he retained trust and confidence in her.

Singapore toughens vape, drug penalties

Singapore: Singapore will impose increased penalties on vape users and etomidate suppliers while foreigners caught vaping risk having their passes revoked, being deported and banned from re-entering the city-state from September 1, it was announced Thursday. The stricter drive against the menace also includes issuing nicotine test kits to schools across Singapore amid a sharp rise in vaping among students. Foreigners caught with e-vaporisers will have their vapes seized, and they will be fined, and Short Term Visit Pass holders who reoffend will be banned from re-entering Singapore.

Anti-polio drive kicks off in KP

Peshawar: An anti-polio drive to immunise 5.7 million children in Pakistan's Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province was launched amid tight security measures Thursday. Wyoming, August 28: Federal Reserve Governor Lisa Cook filed a lawsuit Thursday claiming President Donald Trump has no power to remove her from office, setting up a legal battle that could reset long-es tablished norms for the US central bank's independence.

The lawsuit said Trump violated a federal law allowing him to remove a Fed governor only "for cause" when the pres ident took the unprecedented step August 25 of announcing he would fire her. Trump has accused Cook of committing mortgage fraud in 2021, a year before she joined the central bank's governing body

Cook also filed a motion for a temporary restraining order which declares that Trump's effort to fire her is unlawful and seeks to bar the Fed from taking steps to remove her pending further litigation. A hearing on the motion is set for 10 am Friday.

"Neither the type of 'offense' the President cited nor the threadbare evidence against Governor Cook would constitute 'cause' for removal even if the President's allegations were true - which they are not," the motion said.

In the court filings, Cook said an unsubstantiated allegation about conduct that took place before she was confirmed to her position at the Fed does not amount to cause. She denied committing mortgage fraud,

Europeans launch UN sanctions process on Iran

Paris/United Nations, August 28: Britain, France and Germany launched a 30-day process to reimpose UN sanctions on Iran over its nuclear programme Thursday, a step likely to stoke tensions two months after Israel and the United States bombed Iran, according to a letter sent by E3 to the UN Security Council seen by Reuters.

The trio, known as the E3, said in a statement they had decided to trigger the so-called snapback mechanism before they lose the ability in mid-October to restore sanctions on Tehran that were lifted under a 2015 nuclear accord with world powers.

They have held several rounds of talks with Iran since Israel and the United States struck its nuclear installations

in mid-June, aiming to agree to defer the mechanism but they deemed that talks in Geneva Tuesday did not yield sufficiently tangible commitments from Iran.

The E3 have pressed ahead now over accusations that Iran has violated the 2015 deal that aimed to prevent Tehran from developing a nuclear weapon. The United States, which was party to that deal, pulled out under President Donald Trump in 2018, and held failed indirect negotiations earlier this year with Tehran.

The E3, whose ministers informed US Secretary of State Marco Rubio of their decision Wednesday, said they hoped that Iran would engage by the end of September to provide commitments over its nuclear programme that will convince them to defer concrete action.

"The E3 are committed to

using every diplomatic tool available to ensure Iran never develops a nuclear weapon. That includes our decision to trigger the 'snapback' mechanism today through this notification," they said in the letter.

Small biz scrambles to cushion blow

US President Donald Trump's additional 25% tariff on Indian imports took effect Wednesday, raising duties on some shipments to as much as 50% - among the highest imposed by Washington and on par with Brazil and China

Mumbai, August 28: Tens of thousands of Indian small businesses are scrambling to find new buyers in markets across Europe, Africa and Asia to dull the impact of a 50% tariff on exports to the US that took effect Wednesday.

Firms also front-loaded shipments earlier in August ahead of the August 27 deadline, sending out existing orders before tariffs were doubled from the 25% import tax imposed by US President Donald Trump in July.

Over 50,000 exporters among India's nearly 60 million small enterprises, spanning sectors including textiles, jewelry and chemicals, face the tariff spike but the government has yet to announce any financial or credit support for those affected.

It has instead urged exporters to find alternative markets. A survey of export-oriented

businesses conducted by India SME Forum, a lobby group of nearly 100,000 small businesses, found that 57% of respondents were looking at using countries in the Gulf region. Latin America, Africa and Britain to re-route shipments or value-added transshipments.

The point would be to identify markets where shipped products could be modified or re-manufactured to obtain a new "country of origin" tag and then export on to the US market. Another 27% were reviving

business with buyers in non-US regions while 16% were looking at outsourcing parts of the orders to enterprises in other countries in order to retain those clients. "The sense we are getting is

New Delhi: Persisting uncertainties related to the US trade policies pose downside risk to the overall demand in the Indian economy while the inflation outlook for the near term has become more benign than anticipated earlier. RBI said in its latest bulletin Thursday. In the August bulletin, the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) also said that India's sovereign rating upgrade by S&P bodes well for capital inflows and sovereign yields, going forward. The US has imposed a steep 50 per cent tariff on Indian goods According to the central bank, favourable rainfall and temperature conditions bode well for the kharif agriculture season and an increase in real rural wages may support rural demand in the second half of the financial year. "Coupled with the benign financial conditions, ongoing transmission of rate cuts, supportive fiscal measures and rising household optimism, the environment is conducive for holding up aggregate demand. On the other hand, persisting uncertainties related to India-US trade policies continue to pose downside risk," it noted. Further, RBI said the inflation outlook for the near term has become more benign than anticipated earlier. "Headline inflation, driven by muted food price pressures supported by favourable base effects, are likely to soften further below the 4 per cent target in Q2 before inching up in the last quarter of the financial year. "Overall, the average headline inflation this year is expected to remain significantly below the target. Monetary policy, going forward, would continue to maintain a close vigil on the incoming data and the evolving domestic growth-inflation dynamics to chart out the appropriate monetary policy path." the bulletin said. In July, the central bank said domestic economic activity remained mixed across sectors and the timely progress of monsoon has boosted kharif sowing. While industrial activity remained subdued, manufacturing sector expanded along with services sector sustaining the growth momentum. Headline inflation fell for the ninth consecutive month in July. Financial conditions remained congenial and supportive of domestic economic activity.

Russian oil imports to rise in September in defiance of US

Moscow: Russian oil exports to India are set to rise in September, traders said, as producers cut prices to sell more crude because they cannot process as much in refineries that were damaged by Ukrainian drone attacks on energy infrastructure. India has become the biggest buyer of Russian oil supplies that were displaced by Western sanctions after Moscow invaded Ukraine in 2022. This has allowed Indian refiners to benefit from cheaper crude. But the purchases have drawn condemnation from the government of US President Donald Trump, which increased US tariffs on Indian imports to 50% Wednesday. Three trading sources involved in oil sales to India said Indian refiners would increase Russian oil purchases levels, or by 150,000-300,000 barrels pe day. In the first 20 days of August, India imported 1.5 million barrels per day of Russian crude, unchanged from July but slightly below the average of 1.6 million bpd in January-June, accordin to data from Vortexa analysts. The volumes are equal to around 1.5% of global supply, making India the largest buyer of seaborne Russian crude, which covers some 40% of India's oil needs. China and Turkey are also big buvers of Russian oil.

India extends cotton duty waiver amid US tariff pressure Mumbai: India has extended an import

duty exemption on cotton by three months, until the end of December, a government order showed Thursday, as New Delhi seeks to support the local garment industry that has been hit by hefty US tariffs. The imports are likely to support global cotton prices , which erased losses and rose 0.2% after the order. However, they are likely to reduce demand for local cotton, pressuring domestic prices, market watchers said. The world's second-biggest cotton producer had earlier announced an exemption on cotton imports from an 11% duty until September-end and has now extended that to December 31 The cotton is likely to be sourced from Australia, Brazil, the United States and Africa, which have a surplus available for export, industry officials said. The duty exemption until year-end will let Indian textile companies import cheaper cotton, easing pressure amid a slowdown in US demand, Atul Ganatra, president of the Cotton Association of India, told Reuters. "With the duty-free extension, imports could hit a record 4.2 million bales this year. Strong imports are likely to continue into the first quarter of next year as well,

Industrial growth surges to 4-month high

New Delhi, August 28: India's industrial production growth accelerated to a 4-month high of 3.5 per cent in July this year due to good performance of manufacturing sector, according to official data released Thursday. The country's industrial

output earlier recorded this level of growth at 3.9 per cent in March 2025.

The factory output, measured in terms of the Index of Industrial Production (IIP), had expanded by five per cent in July 2024.

The National Statistics Office (NSO) in its revised figure for June kept the pace of industrial production growth unchanged at 1.5 per cent as against the provisional estimates released last month.

The latest NSO data showed that the manufacturing sector's output growth rose to 5.4 per cent in July 2025 from 4.7 per cent in the year-ago month.

Mining production contracted by 7.2 per cent against a growth of 3.8 per cent recorded a year ago. Power production rose by a meagre 0.6 per cent in July 2025 against 7.9 per cent in the year-ago period.

During the April-July period of FY26, the country's total industrial production grew by 2.3 per cent compared to 5.4 per cent a vear ago.

Commenting on the data Aditi Nayar, Chief Economist, Head - Research & Outreach, ICRA, said, "Encouragingly, growth in manufacturing output accelerated to a six-month high of 5.4 per cent in July 2025 from 3.7 per cent in June 2025, aided by construction inputs



Govt faces first legal fight on online gaming ban

Online money-based games were expected to be worth \$3.6 billion in India by 2029

New Delhi, August 28: Gaming company A23 has challenged the government's ban on online money-based games, a legal filing shows, in the first case against a law that led to the sudden shutdown of popular contests and has thrown the industry's future into doubt.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government issued a law last week to ban such games, which the industry says rely on skill and are therefore not gambling. Gambling was already highly restricted in India.

The legislation is a setback for an industry backed by venture capital firms such as Tiger



worth \$3.6 billion in India by 2029, according to industry estimates. In a court filing at the High Court of Karnataka in southwestern India, A23, which offers rummy and poker games, said the law "criminalises the legitimate business of playing online games of skill, which would result in the closure of various gaming companies overnight".

The new law is a "product of state paternalism", A23 added in its filing, asking it to be declared unconstitutional when applied

A23.com describes itself as

an online gaming platform with more than 70 million players.

Endorsements by leading Indian cricketers and other marketing efforts have boosted the appeal of apps such as Dream11 and Mobile Premier League, where virtual cricket teams are created based on real players, earning points on runs, wickets and catches.

uters queries, while Dream11 said it plans to "build a great Indian sports company, driven by AI and the creator economy".



Sindhu stuns world No 2: Dhruv-Tanisha, Satwik-Chirag enter quarters in World C'ships

Paris, August 28: Two-time Olympic medallist PV Sindhu shocked world number 2 Wang Zhi Yi of China to storm into the quarterfinals of the World Championships here Thursday.

The 15th ranked Sindhu, who won the world title in Basel in 2019, took 48 minutes to prevail 21-19 21-15 in the pre-quarterfinals to lead head-to-head record against the Chinese 3-2.

Later in the day, India's top doubles pairing of Satwiksairaj Rankireddy and Chirag Shetty came from behind to beat China's Liang Wei Kang and Wang Chang 19-21, 21-15, 21-17 and enter the quarterfinals. It was their first win against the Chinese pair after four succes-

In the women's singles, Sindhu will now face world number nine Putri Kusuma Wardani of Indonesia in the quarterfinals as the 30-year-old Indian is now just one victory away from securing a record-equalling sixth World Championships medal.

The Indonesian had beaten Sindhu in straight games at the Sudirman Cup earlier this year, though the Indian had prevailed in their Asian Games round-two clash in 2022

A five-time World Championships medallist, Sindhu made a bright start in the opening game, racing to an 11-6 lead at the mid-game interval with a flurry of sharp smashes and net winners. Wang fought back strongly

to level at 19-19, but the Indian held her nerves to pocket the

In the second game, Sindhu kept up the pressure, once again opening up a 11-6 cushion at the break.

A stunning 57-shot rally briefly tested her, but she re-

India's Dhruv Kapila and Tanisha Crasto also pulled off a big upset by stunning Hong Kong world number 5 pairing of Tang Chun Man and Tse Ying Suet 19-21 21-12 21-15 in a 63-minute battle to storm into the quarterfinals.

The Indians, who had earlier cruised past Ireland's Joshua Magee and Moya Ryan 21-11 21-16 in 35 minutes, came from a game down to topple the reigning Asian champions with a determined fightback.

"We had a rough run a couple of months back. I think we are building together, step by step, slowly, slowly we are get ting there. Really happy with the way we played today," Tanisha said.

We came prepared, prepared better this time. We didn't give up at any point in the

match. Even after we lost the first set, we didn't let it get to us. We fought back even harder in the second and third. We kept pushing each other till the end, till the last shot. I think that was the real game changer today.'

The Indian duo had endured a patchy start to the year, losing in the round of 16 at the Malaysia Open and India Open, before reaching the semifinals at the German Open in February.

However, early exits at the Orleans Masters and All England Championships followed.



AIFF, FSDL submit 'consensual resolution' to SC **ISL LIKELY TO START IN DECEMBER**

New Delhi, August 28: The logjam in Indian football could be headed for a resolution with the AIFF and FSDL agreeing to a "transparent tender" process for the selection of a commercial partner to conduct the Indian Super League in December in a proposal submitted to the Supreme Court here Thursday.

The resolution was submitted to the Supreme Court after the All India Football Federation (AIFF) and Football Sports Development Limited (FSDL) held discussions on the matter Monday as per an earlier directive of the apex court.

The top court is also seized of a case relating to the constitution of the AIFF

The AIFF and FSDL said that they have come to a "consensual resolution" in the larger public interest and for the promotion of the game in India.

"The AIFF has agreed that: It will conduct an open, competitive and transparent tender (or equivalent process) for selection of a commercial partner to conduct the ISL in line with global best practices," the resolution submitted before the court stated.

"Such process will be conducted in conformity with the National Sports Development Code 2011, the National Sports Governance Act 2025, the AIFF Constitution, and applicable FI-FA/Asian Football Confederation (AFC) regulations.

"The process may be managed by an independent professional firm of repute, such as



one of the 'Big Four' or an entity of equivalent standing.'

The AIFF and the FSDL agreed that the process will be concluded by October 15, 2025, thereby providing certainty to clubs, broadcasters, sponsors and other stakeholders. Subject to the consent of the AFC, the new league season can thereafter commence in December.

The agreement between the two parties came a couple of days after the world football governing body FIFA and the Asian Football Confederation threatened an international ban on India, issuing a stern ultimatum to the AIFF that it must adopt and ratify a new constitution by October 30 or risk suspension.

To ensure the timely commencement of the football calendar in the country and to maintain competitive continuity, the AIFF and the FSDL agreed that the 2025-26 season may begin with the Super Cup or another domestic competition directly under the control of the national federation, after an adequate pre-season period.

"The Super Cup, being a domestic tournament open to clubs across multiple tiers ensures that the players and clubs remain competitively engaged pending the commencement of the league season," the resolution said.

The idea of holding Super Cup as season opener to give competitive matches to the players was first mooted in a meeting between the AIFF and 13 ISL clubs in Delhi August 7.
