**Dubai, Sept 28:** Riding on Tilak Varma's incredible half-century, fancied India beat Pakistan by five wickets in the summit showdown to win their second Asia Cup title in the T20 format here Sunday.

India bowled out Pakistan for a modest 146 and then chased down the target of 147 with two balls remaining.

Varma smashed an unbeaten 69 in 53 balls, while Shivam Dube contributed a breezy 22-ball 33 during a vital 60-run partnership for the fifth wicket. Earlier, Kuldeep Yadav was

the star of the show with excellent figures of 4/30 in four overs, while fellow spinners Varun Chakaravarthy (2/30), Axar Patel (2/26) and Jasprit Bumrah (2/25) were also among the wickets after India opted to how! first

# Nuapada synced with Bihar

Bhubaneswar, Sept 28: After a gap of nearly one-anda-half years, political parties in the state will soon sound the poll bugle, as the Election Commission of India (ECI) Sunday announced deployment of central observers for the upcoming byelection to Nuapada Assembly seat. The byelection is very likely to be held along with Bihar Assembly polls. The seat fell vacant following the demise of BJD MLA Rajendra Dholakia September 8.

According to sources, the ECI announced the deployment of 470 officers, serving in various states, as central observers (general, police and expenditure) for Bihar Assembly polls and byelections in seven states, including Odisha's Nuapada segment.

The Election Commission of India has decided to deploy 470 Officers (320 IAS, 60 from IPS and 90 from \_ IRS/IRAS/ICAS etc.) serving in various states as Central Observers (Gener-

and 90 from \_ IRS/IRAS/ICAS etc.) serving in various states as Central Observers (General, Police and Expenditure) for the forthcoming election to the legislative assembly of Bihar and bye-elections in Jammu & Kashmir (AC- Budgam & Nagrota), Rajasthan (AC-Anta), Jharkhand (AC-Ghatsila), Telangana (AC – Jubilee Hills), Punjab (AC – Tarn Taran), Mizoram (AC – Dampa) and Odisha (AC – Nuapada)," the press not released by the ECI reads.

The observers work under the superintendence, control and discipline of the commission from their appointment to the completion of the election process, the statement said.

They would act as eyes and ears of the commission and keep reporting to the panel periodically and on a need basis,

According to the poll body, the decision was taken under the plenary powers conferred by Article 324 of the Constitution and Section 20B of the Representation of the People Act, 1951, to monitor the conduct of elections

in various constituencies.

The byelection to Nuapada Assembly constituency was necessitated due to the demise of sitting MLA Rajendra Dholakia September 8 due to health-related issues. Dholakia was a fourtime MLA from Nuapada constituency. He was a minister in the Naveen Patnaik Cabinet from 2022 to 2024.

With his demise, the number of Biju Janata Dal MLAs in the 147-member Assembly has come down to 50, while the BJP has 78, Congress 14, CPI (M) one, and three Independent legislators.

### Stampede toll 40; TVK smells a rat

Karur (Tamil Nadu), Sept 28: The toll in the stampede during a rally by Tamilaga Vettri Kazhagam (TVK) in Karur's Veluchamypuram rose to 40 after a man succumbed to injuries at a government hospital, a Health official said Sunday. As the toll mounted, the TVK party led by actor-politician Vijay moved the Madras High Court Bench in Madurai seeking an independent probe into the incident.

Stopping short of alleging a conspiracy into the incident, TVK deputy general secretary Nirmal Kumar told reporters that the party had approached the High Court bench with a plea for an impartial inquiry into the incident.

# Debt-ridden Balasore farmer found dead

Bhograi, Sept 28: A 65-year-old farmer of Ganeshwarpur under this block in Balasore district was found dead on a roadside near Rupsa after he went missing a few days ago reportedly over mounting debt burden.

The deceased was identified as Rabindra Nath Sahu. According to family members, Sahu had borrowed several lakhs from a man in Dehurda village a few years ago for undertaking farming. He could not repay the debt as he suffered heavy losses.

Under pressure of the steep compound interest and alleged harassment by the moneylender, Sahu reportedly mortgaged his house and 35 decimals of land without the knowledge of his family members. As the primary breadwinner for 13 family members, he was

unable to bear the financial and mental strain, his son Bhaskar alleged.

Later, Sahu went missing from home September 18. Unable to trace him, his family members lodged a complaint at Bhograi police station. While searching for him, the family members learnt that Sahu was lying unconscious on a roadside near Rupsa and was rescued by some locals. Sahu was rushed the district headquarters hospital (DHH), Balasore by the police. However, the doctors at the DHH declared him dead on arrival.

On being informed, family members and villagers placed his body outside the alleged moneylender's house, demanding compensation and the return of Sahu's mortgaged land.

As the matter escalated, a police team led by Bhograi inspector-in-charge (IIC) Rohit Kumar Bal reached the spot and pacified the protesters by assuring them of action following which they relented.

Bhaskar has filed a formal complaint holding the moneylender responsible for his father's death, police said, adding that an investigation has begun.

### MITHUN MANHAS NEW BCCI PRESIDENT

Mumbai: Former Delhi captain Mithun Manhas was elected the president of the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) unopposed along with other members, including board's secretary Devajit Saikia, during its 94th Annual General Meeting (AGM) at its headquarters here Sunday. The 45-year-old Manhas became the 37th president of the all-powerful cricket body after he succeeded former India cricketer Roger Binny, who resigned from the post last month after turning 70. Manhas is the third consecutive First-Class cricketer to have taken over as the board's president after Binny and former captain Sourav Ganguly.

### Amazon trees get bigger due to CO2

Birmingham, Sept 28: Trees across Amazon rainforest are not only holding their ground, but are growing larger owing to increased levels of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere, according to a sweeping new study. The research, published in the 'Nature Plants' journal, found that the average size of trees in the Amazon has increased by 3.2 per cent every decade for at least the past 30 years, according to a report by 'The Independent'.

scientists say the trend is consistent with the fertilising effect of higher concentrations of CO2, which

can boost plant growth.

The findings come from the RAIN-



FOR network, an international partnership of more than 60 universities in South America, the UK and elsewhere, including the Universities of Birmingham, Bristol and Leeds. Almost 100 scientists monitored trees across 188 permanent forest plots to build the long-term dataset.

Beatriz Marimon, from Universidade do Mato Grosso in Brazil,

who coordinated much of the data collection in southern Amazonia, said: "This is a good news story. We regularly hear how climate change and fragmentation is threatening Amazonian forests. But meanwhile the trees in intact forests have grown bigger; even the largest trees have continued to thrive despite these threats."

Both large and smaller trees

Both large and smaller trees were found to be increasing in size, pointing to a widespread response to higher carbon dioxide levels in the atmosphere

Adriane Esquivel-Muelbert, from the University of Cambridge and joint lead author of the paper, said the results highlight the vital role of rainforests in tackling climate change.







## Heart attacks: Causes, signs & prevention immediately

Heart attacks (acute myocardial infarction, AMI) are increasingly affecting younger Indians, including those under 40. While young patients may show milder or atypical symptoms, the impact—lost life-years, disability, and family or financial strainis significant. Many key risk factors can be prevented or managed through lifestyle changes and basic medical care.

### What is a heart attack?

A heart attack happens when blood flow to part of the heart is suddenly blocked, usually by a clot in a narrowed artery. Without blood, that part of the heart muscle is starved of oxygen and can get damaged. The longer the delay in treatment, the more serious the damage. Quick medical care—like clot-busting medicines or procedures to open the artery-can save lives and reduce harm.

### **How common is this among** young Indians?

Indians tend to develop coronary artery disease (CAD) at younger ages than many other populations. Studies show a significant number of heart attacks occur in people under 50, with a notable minority under 40. Older data suggest 5-10% of heart attacks happen in those under 40, while recent Indian registries report up to 25% of certain acute coronary events in people under 40–50. This is why doctors refer to it as "premature" or "young-onset" CAD.

### Why are younger Indians getting heart attacks?

Risk factors fall into two cate-

### Non-Modifiable:

Family history/genetics: South Asians, including many Indians, have a higher inherited risk of coronary disease.

Age and sex: Men are more



commonly affected at younger ages, though young women are also at risk.

### **Modifiable (Common in** young Indians):

Diabetes and insulin resistance: High rates of early-onset diabetes increase risk.

Abnormal cholesterol (dyslip idaemia): High LDL, non-HDL cholesterol, and triglycerides are common in young CAD patients. Obesity and abdominal fat: Even modest overweight with central obesity raises risk. **High blood pressure:** Becoming more common at younger ages.

### How do heart attacks in young

people differ from older adults? Pattern of disease: Young patients often have single-vessel or non-obstructive coronary disease, and sometimes unusual causes like artery spasm, clotting disorders, or spontaneous coronary artery dissection.

Symptoms: They may experience atypical signs—shortness of breath, nausea, jaw or back pain, fatigue, or "indigestion" instead of classic chest pain.

Outcomes: With timely treat ment, recovery is often good, but delayed recognition or unmanaged risk factors can lead to long-term health issues and early disability.

### Warning signs - seek help

- Call emergency services or go to the nearest ER if you ex-
- New or severe chest discomfort (pressure, squeezing, heaviness)
- Pain radiating to the arm, neck, jaw, shoulder, or back ■ Shortness of breath, sudden lightheadedness, or fainting

### How is a heart attack diagnosed and treated?

- **Diagnosis:** ECG, blood tests for heart enzymes (troponins), and sometimes imaging like an echocardiogram. Coronary angiography may be done to examine the heart arteries.
- Acute treatment: Emergency procedures like clot removal (PCI) or clot-dissolving medications, along with oxygen, pain relief, and heart-supporting drugs. Young patients often respond very well to modern emergency care.
- Aftercare: Cardiac rehabilitation, medications (statins, antiplatelets, beta-blockers, ACE inhibitors as needed), lifestyle counselling, and regular follow-up.

### How to prevent heart attacks — practical steps

Many young people can greatly reduce their risk by focusing on these actions:

- Quit tobacco completely: The single most effective step. Support includes counselling, nicotine replacement, or medicines under doctor guidance. Know your numbers:
- Check blood pressure, blood sugar/HbA1c, and cholesterol. Follow medical advice if any are
- Stay active: Aim for ≥150 minutes of moderate activity weekly (walking, cycling) plus strength exercises twice a week. Even short activity breaks help

### during long sitting periods. Practical checklist

for young adults Age ≥18: Get a baseline check

of blood pressure, fasting glucose, and cholesterol every 1-3 vears-or sooner if you have a family history. Smokers: Seek help to quit im-

mediately. Overweight or inactive: Set

small, achievable goals like 10-minute walks or cooking at

### **Common questions**

Q: I'm young — do I really need a cholesterol check?

A: Yes. Many young Indians have abnormal cholesterol without symptoms. Early detection helps prevent future heart disease.

Q: Can a heart attack happen without chest pain?

A: Yes—especially in women and young people. Shortness of breath, fatigue, nausea, or jaw/ back pain may be the only warning signs.

Q: If a family member had CAD, what should I do?

A: Inform your doctor. You may need earlier screening and closer management of risk factors.

### **Personalised medicine** transforming heart care

Bhubaneswar. 28: On World Heart Day, experts highlight how personalised medicine is reshaping cholesterol management and heart care in India. Traditionally, cholesterol treatment focused on general 'good' and 'bad' levels, but today the approach is shifting toward precision, tailoring therapy to individual risk factors, genetics, and

Indians face cardiovascular risks nearly a decade earlier than Western populations, with CVDs causing 4.77 million deaths in 2020 alone. Experts stress early and regular monitoring, starting at age 18, to identify elevated LDL cholesterol (LDLC) and set personalised targets based on family history, comorbidities, and overall risk profile. For high-risk patients, LDLC goals may be as low as 55 mg/dL.

Dr Anupam Jena, Associate Professor of Cardiology, KIMS Bhubaneswar, said, "Elevated LDLC is the most significant modifiable risk factor for coronary artery disease. Personalised care combines lifestyle changes, medication, and shared decision-making, improving adherence and outcomes.

Modern strategies include combination therapies or advanced drugs such as PCSK9 inhibitors and Inclisiran when standard treatments are insufficient. Personalised programmes also guide exercise and diet according to physical capacity, metabolic factors, and cultural preferences, making lifestyle

changes more sustainable. Challenges in India extend beyond high LD-LC: low HDL cholesterol affects nearly 67 per cent of adults, and around 25 per cent carry high Lp(a), a genetic risk factor for heart attack. Experts emphasise that while boosting HDL is important, managing LDLC remains the primary goal.



each constructing a model of an equatorial sundial with the guidance and support of RSC


experts. The completed kits, along with certificates of participation, were handed over to the students to encourage

### Visually impaired teacher cracks **OCS** examination

Jajpur, Sept 28: A 32-year-old visually challenged teacher from Jajpur district cleared the Odisha Civil Services (OCS) examination, securing 300th rank in his third attempt.

Mahes Panda, a resident of Bada Biruhan under Korei block, has been serving as a teacher at Adarsha Vidyalaya, Kuleilo in Cuttack district's Athagarh since 2016.

Born with loss of vision, Panda grew up in a modest household as the youngest of five siblings, with his father sustaining the seven-member family through farming.

"Despite the best treatment and visits to several hospitals, doctors could not restore his vision. Finally, we left it to fate," his father Laxmi Narayan said

Panda completed his matriculation at the School for the Blind in Nuapada in 2009. He later graduated from Ravenshaw University, pursued a B Ed from the Central University in Koraput, and completed his post-graduation in Odia from Utkal University.

Financial hurdles after school were overcome with help from two local benefactors. along with support from Yuga Nirman Vidya Parishad and Gayatri Mission in Cuttack, who sponsored his higher education.

On balancing his teaching job with civil services preparation, Panda said, "Days were for teaching students, nights for self-study. With technology, learning has become much easier for the visually challenged.

Elated at his success, Panda credited his family and friends for their support.

# Kalinga Ghat road repair halted as landslides continue



Keonjhar, Sept 28: Police and Forest department personnel in Keonjhar district busted an ivory smuggling racket and arrested four suspects during a raid along with seizure of three elephant tusks.

Those arrested were identified as Birakishore Behera, 53, of Alisha Bazar in Cuttack, Arun Kumar Sahu, 35, of Parabila, Pradip Kumar Singh, 50, of Bhagamunda, and Pratap Behera, 36, of Paika Sahi in Angul district.

This was stated here by the Divisional Forest Officer (DFO) Dhanraj HD at a presser Sunday. The DFO said that a joint patrol team comprising police and forest personnel conducted a raid near a crusher unit in Talakaipur village under Bansapal block around 9pm September 26, following a tip-off from the police intelligence unit.

They noticed some persons engaged in suspicious activities while several



suspects fled when officers arrived. However, the joint team nabbed Birakishore and Arun from the spot and recovered three tusks from a white plastic bag in their possession. One of the tusks was 51 cm long weighing 2.026 kg, another 28 cm long and 0.600 kg, and a third 20 cm long weighing 0.387 kg. The accused failed to produce any legal documents supporting their possession of the tusks.

During interrogation, accused Arun confessed that he had purchased the seized ivory from Pradip Kumar Singh of Bhagamunda in Angul district.

Based on his statement, a joint team led by Keonjhar Assistant Conservator of Forests Sudipta Kumar Panda,

Nayanakanta Sahu, Sadar police Sub-Inspector Manas Ranjan Panda and forest guard Chandrakanta Mohanty of the Bhuyan Juang Pirha range proceeded to Angul. With the help of local forest officials, they arrested Pradip from his residence early Saturday morning.

During questioning, Pradip admitted to the crime and revealed the involvement of his associate, Pratap. The team later arrested Pratap from Paika Sahi village.

The Forest department registered a case (34/2025) and produced the accused persons in court. The DFO said that the accused were believed to possess four tusks, of which one is still missing. Efforts are underway to recover the remaining tusk and apprehend others involved.

Authorities have urged the public to report any suspicious activity related to wildlife crime.

The deceased couple was identified as Harekrushna Dunguri. 36, and his wife Kuntala, 30, of Ambabhona block in the district. They were traveling with their two children on a scooter (OD 17 AF 1757) when a dumper truck (OD 17 AC 2894) allegedly rammed into them from behind, dragging the scooter underneath its wheels and crushing the couple to death on the spot. Local residents rescued the injured children and admitted them to the district headquarters hospital in Bargarh.

Following the accident, angry locals blocked the road demanding strict action against the driver. Police later seized the truck and detained the driver for questioning. The road blockade was lifted after officials intervened.

The deceased Harekrushna was reportedly a paralysis patient, while Kuntala worked as a sanitation worker at the Ambabhona tehsil office. With both parents dead, residents have urged authorities to ensure the care and rehabilitation of the two orphaned children.

### **Woman hangs self after hubby refuses ₹40 for travel**

PATANA: A 19-year-old woman in Patana block of Keonihar district committed suicide by hanging Sunday after her husband refused to give her ₹40 for travel to her parents' house. The deceased was identified as Janaki Munda, wife of Bidyadhar Munda from Gohira village under Khadikapada panchayat and Patana police limits in the district. According to police, Janaki sought ₹40 from her husband towards vehicle fare to visit her parental house. However, her husband refused to pay her the amount, leading to a quarrel between the couple. An upset Janaki reportedly left the house early in the morning and was later found hanging from a mahua tree at a forest near the village, police said, citing preliminary investigation. Patana police registered a case (27/25) of unnatural death and handed over the body to the family members after a post-mortem examination at the Patana community health centre. Further investigation is underway, Patana IIC Manas Kumar Mahakul said.

ordered by China to the east and Pakistan to the west, Ladakh holds immense strategic value for India. Yet, more than five years after its separation from Jammu & Kashmir in 2019, Ladakh's political future remains unclear. The promise of better governance and stronger representation that once excited its residents has, for many, turned sour. That simmering discontent boiled over on the streets in Leh on 24 September, when protesters demanding statehood and constitutional safeguards fell back into violence after two hunger strikers were hospitalised. Irate demonstrators clashed with the police and torched the local office of the ruling BJP— a striking symbol of their deepening anger. Four protesters were killed, apparently in police firing, and scores were left injured.

The Centre views the agitation as untimely and disruptive. Officials accuse local leaders of acting in bad faith, pointing to climate activist Sonam Wangchuk's hunger strike and suggesting foreign influence behind the unrest. The Ladakh police arrested Wangchuk, a highly respected figure in the region, under the stringent National Security Act (NSA) and shifted him to a prison in faraway Jodhpur in Rajasthan. The police are even probing Wangchuks's alleged links with Pakistan. However, the protest leaders deny all these allegations, insisting that violence was the work of fringe actors, not the organised movement. As a possibility that too cannot be summarily overruled.

When the Union government revoked Article 370 and carved Ladakh into a Union Territory (UT), the decision was greeted with much celebration in Leh. For years, the Buddhist-majority district had demanded separation from Jammu & Kashmir, where state politics was dominated by leaders from the Valley and Jammu. The creation of a UT was seen as long-awaited recognition. But enthusiasm quickly ebbed as Ladakhis realised that, unlike the new UT of Jammu & Kashmir, their UT would have no legislature. The region lost the four MLAs it had in the erstwhile J&K Assembly, and its administration was placed entirely in the hands of New Delhi-appointed bureaucrats. For many, this was worse than the pre-2019

This disenchantment has been compounded by fears over land rights, jobs, and the preservation of Ladakh's fragile demography, environment and culture. The changed domicile rules in Jammu & Kashmir heightened anxieties that similar policies could open Ladakh to demographic shifts. As a result, local voices quickly coalesced around demands for stronger constitutional safeguards. Calls grew for full statehood, for protections under the Sixth Schedule of the Constitution — which allows the creation of Autonomous District Councils with legislative and judicial powers — as well as guarantees of jobs and political representation.

These demands are not isolated. The Leh Apex Body and the Kargil Democratic Alliance, umbrella groups representing virtually all political and social constituencies, have repeatedly pressed the Centre for these demands. They have stressed that without clear safeguards, Ladakh's tribal communities, environment, and cultural heritage face an uncertain future. Yet despite multiple rounds of dialogue, New Delhi has so far delayed concrete decisions. A fresh meeting was scheduled for 6 October, but youth groups insisted that the timeline be advanced and that discussions yield tangible outcomes.

All said and done, one thing is clear that the mistrust between New Delhi and Ladakh has now widened further. This situation calls for careful, measured dialogue rather than confrontation. Ladakh is not just a borderland, it is a critical frontier whose people have always seen themselves as proud Indians. For decades, Ladakhis have defended India's borders, serving as the first line of resistance against incursions either from China or Pakistan. Branding dissenting Ladakhis as "anti-national," something this government does with all sorts of dissenters, only hardens alienation.

Ladakh's people must be assured that their democratic aspirations and cultural identity can be protected without undermining national security. The calls for statehood and Sixth Schedule protections are not unusual for they come within the Constitutional framework. What makes Ladakh unique is that these demands unite both Buddhists and Moslems— an unusual cross-community consensus in a region often portrayed as divided. That unanimity itself should compel the Centre to listen with sincerity to the demands of Ladakhis.

For New Delhi, the Ladakh unrest comes as a big challenge, especially in the wake of its botched handling of the crisis in Manipur which continues to burn even after two and a half years since ethnic violence broke out in the northeastern state. Such unrests in strategically vital regions within the borders of the country compound the problems already created due to New Delhi's misguided foreign policy

# PEACEMAKER HYPE

bel Peace Prize," US President Donald Trump told the United Nations General Assembly this week, because "I ended seven un-endable wars in seven months." The boast was classic Trump: extravagantly formulated, unironically delivered, and patently false. A recent poll indicates that on-

ly 22 per cent of US adults believe that Trump deserves the Nobel Prize - a far cry from "everyone" - with 76 per cent of respondents stating that he does not deserve it. Perhaps this reflects the fact that Trump has not ended seven wars. Arguably, he has not even ended one. Some of Trump's claims were pure fiction. For example, he took credit for ending a war between Egypt and Ethiopia. But, although bilateral tensions over the Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam have simmered for years, they have never boiled over into war. Likewise, Trump claimed to have ended a nonexistent war between Kosovo and Serbia. Despite considerable hostility – and a history of violent clashes – the two countries have not been at war since the 1990s. No war is easier to end than one that has never started.

Perhaps Trump's most risible invention was the war - "a bad one" - between Armenia and Cambodia, countries located over 4,000 miles (6,500 kilometers) apart that have never had any conflict whatsoever. Armenia did clash with neighbouring Azerbaijan this year, and Trump convinced both countries' leaders to sign a joint declaration aimed at ending their decades-long conflict. But progress on implementing that agreement has stalled, and the accord is in danger of unraveling. That Trump would consider this conflict "ended" reveals the depth of his ignorance about peacemaking.

The same goes for the war between the Democratic Republic of Congo and Rwanda. Trump does have a set piece to point to: a "wonderful" US-mediated deal. But while the war may have ended on paper, deadly clashes continue.

As for Cambodia, it engaged in skirmishes with its neighbour Thailand in July over their contested border. But Trump's attempts at economic coercion did little to defuse the crisis. What brought the fighting to an end was the Association of Southeast Asian Nations' diplomacy, with this year's ASEAN chair, Malaysian Prime Minister Anwar Ibrahim, hosting the Cambodian and Thai leaders for face-to-face talks in Kuala Lumpur. While the underlying border dispute, centered largely on ownership and control of ancient Hindu temples, remains unresolved, the "immediate and unconditional" ceasefire that Anwar brokered halted the violence.

This is not the only example of Trump taking credit for others' foreign-policy acumen. After Pakistan-backed terrorists massacred Indian tourists in Kashmir in April, India took decisive and carefully calibrated retaliatory action, launching military strikes on Pakistani terror camps. It was this show of force that made Pakistan back down, but Trump would have the world believe that he single-handedly mediated an end to the conflict using his favourite tool: trade threats. So absurd and relentless were his boasts that Indian officials publicly refuted him.

Trump's most audacious claim, however, was that he ended the war between Israel and Iran. In reality, Trump gave Israel the green light to strike Iranian positions; deployed American military assets to help Israel shoot down Iran's missiles and drones: and ordered the bombing of Iranian nuclear sites - severely undermining the global nonproliferation regime in the process. If this is Trump's idea of peacemaking, one dreads to think what his version of warmongering would look like.

Trump's Nobel Peace Prize campaign has followed a familiar pattern: invent or inflate a problem, claim to have solved it. and then demand a reward. From his photo ops with North Korean leader Kim Jong-un to his Middle East "peace deals" (which merely formalised existing relations between the Gulf states and Israel), Trump engages in theatre, not diplomacy - performances staged for headlines and applause. The Norwegian Nobel Committee, one suspects, will not be fooled. The same cannot be said for Trump's base.

Trump's absurd claims not only undermine US credibility abroad but also carry real risks. For starters, they trivialise genuine peacemaking. Ending wars is among the most difficult tasks in international politics. It demands quiet diplomacy, painstaking negotiations that address the root causes of conflict, and a commitment to following through on any agreement. Trump has shown little interest in such work. All he cares about is fanfare.

Moreover, false declarations of peace can mask unresolved conflicts and undermine the vigilance needed to prevent new flare-ups, which could ignite with even greater ferocity. Such proclamations can also erode accountability for diplomatic failures - and even for reckless military actions like those Trump sanctioned against Iran.

Trump's claim to have ended seven "un-endable" wars is best understood as a case study in self-delusion. Branding is not leadership. Real peace depends on leaders who know the difference. But in Trump's world, peace is not the absence of war, but the presence of applause.

## Shrinking inflows, surging outflows

oreign direct investment (FDI) has long been considered a vital lifeline for India's growth story. It represents not just capital inflows but also a measure of global investor confidence in India's long-term prospects. That is why the news that India's net FDI inflows crashed 98% in May 2025 to a mere \$35 million—compared to \$2.1 billion in the same month last year—has set off alarm bells in economic and policy circles.

The drop was not a one-off statistical quirk. It was driven by a combination of declining gross inflows and surging repatriation of earlier investments. Gross FDI inflows in May fell 11% year-on-year to \$7.2 billion. At the same time, outflows in the form of repatriation and disinvestment soared 24% to \$5 billion. The arithmetic of shrinking inflows and expanding outflows meant that the net figure—the capital India can actually put to productive use-collapsed.

And yet, paradoxically, India's foreign exchange reserves remain healthy at \$702.57 billion, giving the impression that the overall external account is stable. The reality is more nuanced: reserves are strong, but the flow of fresh investment capital—the kind that builds industries, creates jobs, and upgrades

technology—is weakening.

FDI has historically played a catalytic role in India's development. Post-1991 liberalization. inflows accelerated as MNCs tapped India's growing market. Over the years, inflows into automobiles, telecom, consumer goods, e-commerce, and IT services helped create an ecosystem that expanded employment and enhanced productivity.

A \$35 million net inflowbarely enough to fund a single midsize industrial park—underscores that foreign investors are hedging their bets. The most troubling element is the rise in repatriation. When foreign companies accelerate the pace of sending back profits or divesting equity, it signals that the Indian market is not offering adequate returns or that the policy climate is not as attractive as it once was.

The RBI said that Singapore, Mauritius, the UAE and the US together accounted for more than three-fourths of the total FDI inflows in May 2025. Manufacturing, financial and computer services were the top recipient sectors. On the other hand, top sectors for outward FDI included transport, storage and communication services, a bit of manufacturing, and financial, insurance and business services. Major destinations

for outward FDI included Mauritius, the US and the UAE.

It is true that global headwinds are strong. But blaming global conditions alone would be misleading. Other Asian economies have managed to attract steady inflows despite the turbulence. Vietnam, for instance. continues to secure record FDI commitments in electronics and supply-chain relocation. Mexico, riding the "nearshoring" trend of US companies diversifying away from China, has surged ahead as a manufacturing hub.

The sectoral composition of FDI also tells a story. Over the last decade, much of India's inflows have been concentrated in services, IT, e-commerce, and digital platforms. Investment in manufacturing, especially in high-tech sectors, has lagged.

The surge in repatriation also reflects the maturity of earlier investments in IT and telecom. As these ventures generate profits, foreign investors understandably remit dividends. But when fresh inflows do not match or exceed these outflows, the net picture deteriorates sharply

On the surface, the foreign exchange reserves at nearly \$702.57 billion act as a buffer. However, reserves are a stock. not a flow. They reflect past

surpluses and interventions, not the ongoing health of capital inflows.

The government is not oblivious to the challenge. It has been actively engaging with global corporations, highlighting India as a democratic, stable, and growing market. Incentives under the PLI scheme, infrastructure expansion under the Gati Shakti plan, and sectoral liberalization in defence and insurance are part of the pitch. Yet inves-

tors remain cautious. India's 98% plunge in net FDI inflows in May 2025 is more than a statistical blip. It is a wake-up call that global capital is not automatically locked into India, despite its demographic and market advantages. The country cannot rely on domestic consumption and debt, missing the transformative impact of sustained FDI.

However, as the global investment race accelerates, India must ensure it does not sit out while others lap up opportunities. If the country can recalibrate its policies and truly unlock its potential, the current dip might yet be remembered as the turning point that spurred deeper reforms.

# Marriage registration via video KYC a hit in Kerala, benefiting NRKs

Thiruvananthapuram.

Sept 28: Dr Anish R and Dr Prakruthi K got married in a solemn ceremony in the presence of their dear ones in Kerala's Kochi some time back.

Days later, the young doctor couple registered their marriage at a local body in Ernakulam, sitting over 1,200 km away from the home state.

They registered their wedding comfortably sitting inside their apartment in Pune in Maharashtra via online. They downloaded the marriage certificate later without any hassle.

Unlike in the past, the couple didn't need to be physically present at the corporation office and wait for hours for their turn to get their marriage registered officially and receive the certificate.

This has been the new trend of online marriage registrations catching up in Kerala for some time, which enables the couple to register their wedding from anywhere in the world and at any time without being physically present at their local body.

by the state Local Self-Government Department, the mar riage registration via video E-KYC (electronic know your customer) has been imple mented through its K-SMART platform, an in-house software developed by the Information Kerala Mission (IKM).

Launched across urban lo cal bodies in the state in January last year, it has been extended to rural areas from this April, ensuring universal access across Kerala. Of the total 1,44,416 mar-

riages registered between January 2024 and September 22 this year, as many as 62,524 weddings have been registered online, as per official figures. Thrissur has the largest

number of registrations using video-KYC during the period -10062, followed by Malappuram (8345) and Thiruvanthapu ram (7394), it said.

Noting that the registration procedures are too simple, Ba bu said the couple and their witnesses can complete iden tity verification through vid eo KYC using either an Aad haar-based OTP verification or email authentication.

Chhatrapati Sambhaiinagar. **Sept 28:** At least ten persons died in rain-related incidents across Maharashtra over 24 hours, and more than 11,800 were rescued from different parts of the state, officials said Sunday.

According to the state disaster management department and other officials, four persons lost their lives in Nashik district, including three due to a house collapse, two each in Dharashiv and Ahilyanagar, and one each in Jalna and Yavatmal. In Marathwada, one of the worst-hit regions, inflow into the Javakwadi dam on the Godavari river has increased, prompting the authorities to open all its gates.

About 7,000 persons were evacuated in Paithan of Chhatrapati Sambhajinagar amid fears of flooding. Harsul circle in the district recorded 196 mm of rainfall over the last 24

Heavy rains lashed pockets of other districts in the Marathwada region, including Beed, Nanded, and Parbhani. Mumbai has been witnessing heavy rains since Saturday night. On Sunday, intermittent heavy spells lashed the city and suburbs, with some areas recording more than 50 mm rainfall between 8 am and 1 pm, the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) said.

The intensity of the rains reduced post-afternoon. Vehicular and rail traffic, however, remained largely unaffected,

with smooth movement reported from key underpasses and junctions, including Hindmata, Gandhi Market, Chunabhatti, and Malad, Dahisar, and Mankhurd underpasses.

The island city recorded an average rainfall of 47.47 mm. while the western and eastern suburbs received 53.61 mm and 37.92 mm of rain, respectively, during the five hours from 8 am to 1 pm. Thane and Palghar districts near Mumbai recorded heavy rainfall over the last 24 hours. In Bhiwandi taluka in Thane, 262 persons from 71 families were rescued, said officials.

Rain-battered Marathwada received partial relief Sunday, even as heavy rains soaked pockets of Beed, Nanded, and Parbhani districts. In Beed, the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) rescued 12 stranded residents from the Sangvi temple located in Aashti, while 970 persons living within the jurisdiction of Nanded Municipal Corporation were relocated to safer places

The Godavari river is flowing in Nanded district at a water level of about 354 metres. "The rain intensity reduced in Dharashiv from last night. So, we are now focusing on supplying aid to the affected families. Due to ongoing water discharge of 75,500 cusec from the Sina Kolegaon dam, areas in Paranda were inundated. But we have shifted 3.615 residents to safer locations", a senior district administration



An official of the Delhi Fire Services said two of the schools which received the mails were CRPF Public School in Dwarka, and Sarvodaya Vidvalava near Outub Minar. "Police teams, fire personnel, and bomb disposal units were promptly deployed to the affected schools to carry out a search operation properly. However, nothing suspicious was found," the official said. In recent months, several educational institutions in the city have repeatedly been targeted with bomb threats.

### TV child actor, brother killed in house fire

Kota, Sept 28: Eight-year-old television actor Veer Sharma. who played Pushkal in SonySAB's 'Shrimad Ramayan', and his brother died allegedly due to suffocation after a fire broke out at their home in Raiasthan's Kota.

Police said Veer and his brother Shoriya Sharma (16), an engineering aspirant, were alone at home when the fire erupted.

Their father Jitendra Sharma, who teaches at a coaching centre, was attending a bhajan event and mother actor Rita Sharma was in Mumbai at the time of the incident that happened at around 2 am on Sunday, they said.

Kota (city) SP Tejeshwani Goutam, who visited the spot Sunday morning, said a short-circuit is suspected to have caused the blaze.

The fire broke out in the drawing room of the flat and the children, who were sleeping, most likely died of suffocation caused by smoke, as fire did not spread to other rooms, the SP

Circle Inspector Bhupendra Singh said the incident took place at a flat on the fourth floor of Deepshree building under Anantpura police station area at around 2 am.

When the neighbours noticed plumes of smoke coming out of the flat, they broke open the door and found the children in an unconscious state, he said.

## Govt shuns plan to bring national litigation policy

SEEKING TO SHED THE TAG OF BEING THE BIGGEST LITIGANT, THE UNION GOVERNMENT HAS BEEN WORKING ON A COMPREHENSIVE POLICY TO CUT DOWN ON CASES WHERE IT, ITS DEPARTMENTS OR PSUS ARE A PARTY

New Delhi, Sept 28: The government has shunned the idea of bringing a national litigation policy that was in the works for years, and instead issued directives to Union ministries, departments and PSUs on ways

to cut down on court cases. Seeking to shed the tag of being the biggest litigant, the Union government has been working on a comprehensive policy to cut down on cases where it, its departments or PSUs are a party.

But after a lot of thinking, the Union law ministry has finally junked plans to bring out

a national litigation policy as the thought prevailed that the government cannot have a policy on curbing litigations as it can't stop people at large from filing cases.

"The term policy cannot be used if it is applicable only on the government, its ministries and departments and not on private litigations. "Something which is not universally applicable cannot be termed as policy...curbing government litigation is a very inward looking move," a top ministry functionary told PTI. The official pointed out that the term directive has been used as it has a "sense of force" and words like guide-



line were avoided as they are "generic" in nature. Another key reason for not bringing a policy was that it needs approval of the Union Cabinet. Any tweaks in it in the future would have required Cabinet approvals. The "Directive for

the efficient and effective management of litigation by the Government of India" issued by the Department of Legal Affairs in the law ministry was cleared by a committee of secretaries and will be reviewed annually for progress made and changes required. According to the directive issued in April, the objective of the various decisions and actions is to promote public good and better governance.

In some cases, affected parties may perceive certain decisions as unfair and pursue legal recourse through litigation," it said highlighting the importance of effective implementation of decisions by central ministries, departments and PSUs. The central government is a party in nearly seven lakh cases pending across courts, according to official data. Minimising "unwarranted appeals" in courts and addressing "inconsistencies in notifications and orders" that lead to court cases are the key measures proposed by the ministry. The law ministry had in Feb

ruary told the Rajya Sabha that the Centre is a party in nearlv seven lakh cases pending across courts, with the finance ministry alone being of the litigants in nearly two lakh cases.

Citing data available on the Legal Information Management & Briefing System (LIMBS), Law Minister Arjun Ram Megh wal had said, "There are about seven lakh cases pending where the Government of India is a party. Out of these, in about 1.9 lakh cases the Ministry of Fi nance is mentioned as a party".

Curfew was relaxed for the first time Saturday for four hours in Leh town, where an uneasy calm prevailed.

Taking into consideration the last rites of two of the slain youth, the authorities decided not to relax the curfew as a precautionary measure to maintain law and order, they said. They said the last rites of the youngsters were performed as per the Ladakhi tradition and customs amid tight security arrangements. Police and CRPF personnel in full riot gear were seen deployed in strength in the curfew-bound areas, while ITBP personnel were also seen staging a flag march during the day.

### Bareilly violence: 39 held, more than 2500 booked

The crowd was reportedly angry over the cancellation of a proposed demonstration called by Raza, the founder of Ittehad-e-Millat Council, who claimed the authorities denied permission for it.

### Zubeen Garg's family files complaint with Assam CID

Guwahati, Sept 28: The family of Assam's cultural icon Zubeen Garg filed a complaint with the state CID over his death by drowning in Singapore, seeking a thorough probe into the incident.

Garg's uncle Manoj Kumar Borthakur, a signatory in the complaint, told PTI that they had sent it to the CID through email Saturday.

'We want a thorough probe into the circumstances leading to Zubeen's death," he said.

Garg's wife Garima and his sister Palme Borthakur are the other signatories.

"We have sought an investigation into those present on the yacht trip during which the fatal incident occurred. organiser of North East India Festival Shvamkanu Mahanta and others who may be associated with the incident," another family member of Garg said.

Garg was in the Southeast Asian country to participate in the festival and had drowned while swimming without a life jacket in the sea September 19 during the yacht trip, organised by members of the Singapore Assam Association.

The singer's family also urged the police to take steps to secure the copyrights of the creative works of Garg.

A senior police officer said, We have received a complaint from Garg's family and are examining it."

He said the Special Investigation Team (SIT) of CID is already probing the incidents surrounding the death of the singer-composer, and the complaint filed by the family will be taken up with it.

A SIT member visited Garg's residence in the Kahilipara area of Guwahati on Sunday,

"We wanted to ask certain queries, and our officers met the family. Their complete statements will be recorded once the rituals are completed," he added.

Part of the 10-member SIT the officer spent about 30 minutes with the family members of Garg. The officer, however, did not reveal any details of the visit.

Meanwhile, three close associates of Garg - actor Nishita Goswami, singer Amritprava Mahanta and musician Shekharjyoti Goswami -appeared at the CID office here for the second consecutive day.

All of them were on the Singapore trip, with Goswami being present with Garg during

Their statements were also recorded by the investigators Saturday. Allegations of conspiracy and foul play behind Garg's death have been raised with the government forming the SIT to probe all angles.

The SIT has issued notices to 10 people, including Mahan ta, Garg's manager Siddharth Sharma and members of the Singapore Assam Association, to appear before it and record their statements.

Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma had said Saturday that lookout notices through the Interpol have been issued against Mahanta and Sharma so that they cannot leave the country.

### Chaitanyananda sent to five-day police custody

## Shah rejects ceasefire offer from Naxals

"Recently, to spread confusion, a letter was written stating that what has happened so far has been a mistake, that a ceasefire should be declared, and that we (Naxals) want to surrender. I want to say there will be no ceasefire. If you want to surrender, there is no need for a ceasefire. Lay down your arms, not a single bullet will be fired," Shah said.

He said if the Naxals want to surrender, a red carpet welcome awaits them with a "lucrative' rehabilitation policy.

Addressing the valedictory session of a seminar on 'Naxal Mukt Bharat', Shah also hit out at Left parties for extending ideological support to Left Wing Extremism and dismissed their arguments that lack of development led to the Maoist violence. He said it was due to the "red terror" that development could not reach many parts of the country



for several decades.

Shah said this in response to the offer of a ceasefire given by the CPI (Maoists) sometime back following the intensified operations carried out by security forces, including "Operation Black Forest" along the Chhattisgarh-Telangana border, in which several top Naxals were eliminated.

The minister said there are many people who believe that merely stopping the killings by Naxals is enough to eradicate Naxalism from India.

However, he said, this is not true as Naxalism developed in India because its ideology was nurtured by people within the

"Why did the Naxal problem arise, grow and develop in the country? Who provided them with ideological support? ### 'AI use rises in B-Schools; only 7% faculty are experts' **ACCORDING TO THE SURVEY, 51** age on student learning favour-

New Delhi, Sept 28: Only 51 per cent of faculty members are confident of a favourable impact of AI adoption on business school students, and only 7 per cent are expert users, even as the Indian B-Schools are increasingly adopting generative AI in teaching, research and curriculum design, according to a new survey.

The survey conducted by MBAUniverse.com among 235 faculty members from India's top B-schools, including IIMs. IITs, ISB, XLRI, SPJIMR, MDI and NMIMS, offered a detailed look at how generative AI is shaping management educa-

According to the survey, 51 per cent of faculty report a favourable impact of AI on stu-

dent learning, while over half expect AI's role in teaching, curriculum and research to increase in the next 12 months. Intermediate users make up 55 per cent of faculty, with 7 per cent identifying as experts, signalling huge opportunities for structured capacity-building programs. 'The findings reveal that

faculty are using AI most in research and teaching, while applications in curriculum development are growing steadily. Administrative tasks and student assessment remain emerging areas, highlighting opportunities for structured support and capacity building," the survey report said.

The survey also sheds light on faculty perceptions of AI's impact on student learning, skill development and class-

room engagement, as well as the tools, training and policy guidance they consider most important for responsible

According to Vineet Joshi, Secretary, Department of Higher Education, AI is transforming education and must be har-

nessed responsibly to strengthen both teaching and learning. "It gives every student the freedom to ask questions and helps overcome barriers of language, background, or geography," he The survey found that among

### UK backs JLR recovery

London: The UK government Sunday announced that it will support "iconic British brand" Jaguar Land Rover (JLR) with a loan guarantee of up to 1.5 billion pounds to give certainty to the Tata Motors owned carmaker's supply chain following a devastating cyber-attack. The loan will come from a commercial bank, backed by the Department for Business and Trade's (DBT) Export **Development Guarantee** (EDG), provided by export credit agency UK Export Finance, to be paid back over five years. The aim is to bolster JLR's cash reserves following the production shutdown since early this month in the wake of the hack to help support firms in the supply chain, many of them small and medium enterprises (SMEs) struggling to stay afloat. "This cyber-attack was not only an assault on an iconic British brand, but on our world-leading automotive sector and the men and women whose livelihoods depend on it," said Peter Kyle Business and Trade Secretary.

### Moldovans cast ballots

Chisinau: Moldovans were voting in a parliamentary election Sunday that could have a major impact on the government's quest to join the European Union, as a pro-Russian opposition group seeks to steer the nation away from closer ties with the bloc. If neither side wins a majority in the 101-seat chamber, political horse trading is likely to follow. further unsettling one of Europe's poorest countries, buffeted by war in neighbouring Ukraine and suspected Russian meddling in politics and religion. As the poll was underway, a pro-Russian leader called for potential post-vote protests and cyber authorities reported that election infrastructure had been attacked over the past two days.

### Death for bribery

Shenzhen: Tang Renjian, China's former Minister of Agriculture and Rural Affairs, was sentenced to death with reprieve for bribery at a court in Jilin province Sunday, according to state-run news agency Xinhua. Tang took bribes including cash and property worth over 268 million yuan (\$37.6 million) in various positions held from 2007 to 2024, Xinhua said. The Changchun Intermediate People's Court suspended his death sentence for two years, noting he had confessed to his crimes, it added. China's Communist Party expelled Tang in November 2024, six months after he was placed under investigation by the anti-graft watchdog and

removed from his post.

The ministry, part of the Hamas-run administration, does not differentiate between civilians and militants in its toll, but has said women and children make up around half the dead. Its figures are seen as a reliable estimate by the UN and many independent experts.

Residents reported hearing sounds of explosions overnight across the city, likely coming from the demolition of buildings through the detonation of explosive-laden vehicles and robots. "They were nonstop," Sayed Baker, a Palestinian who shelters close to a Shifa hospital, said of the explosions.

The Israeli military did not immediately comment on the strikes, but said it struck 140 Hamas military targets over the past 24 hours, including militants, observation equipment and infrastructure.

### **Drone activity near Danish forces sparks NATO Baltic vigilance**

Copenhagen, Sept 28: The Danish defence ministry said Sunday it had again observed drones at several of its armed forces' locations overnight, a day after NATO announced it would enhance its vigilance in the Baltic Sea region.

The ministry said in a statement it had "several capacities deployed" after drone sightings from Saturday into Sunday night. It didn't offer any further details about the specifics of the deployment, the number of drones or locations.

This is the latest unexplained drone activity after several sightings last week, including over five Danish airports last week, raising concerns about security in northern Europe amid suspected growing Russian aggression.

Moscow has denied targeting civilians in its war against Ukraine, although thousands have been killed and residential areas extensively damaged by its attacks.

### UN IMPOSES 'SNAPBACK' SANCTIONS ON A HUNGRIER, POORER AND MORE ANXIOUS IRAN

United Nations, Sept 28: Iran's clerical rulers face one of their gravest crises since the 1979 Islamic Revolution, caught between growing discontent at home and a stalled nuclear deal that together have left the country more isolated and divided.

The United Nations reimposed sanctions on Iran Saturday after last-ditch talks between Tehran and European powers Britain, France and Germany failed to resolve the latest of decades of standoffs over Iran's nuclear program.

Without a breakthrough in talks with the West, four Iranian officials and two insiders predicted Iran's economic isolation would further intensify, stoking public fury.

Yet accepting the West's demands risks fracturing the ruling elite and sidelining the Islamic Republic's revolutionary beliefs in "not succumbing to Western pressure" that define Tehran's unbowed stance, they said.

took the floor to respond, but Srinivas walked out of the hall while the Pakistani representative was speaking. In his address, Jaishankar

"choke" the financing of terrorism and sanction prominent terrorists, warning that "relentless pressure must be applied on the entire terrorism eco-system" and that those condoning terror sponsors "will find that it comes back to bite them".

Without naming Pakistan, Jaishankar underlined that "UN's designated lists of terrorists are replete with its nationals".

# **SBI** bats for another rate cut

Mumbai, Sept 28: A SBI research report has pitched for a 25 bps rate cut, saving it is the 'best possible option' for the RBI, though some other experts opined that the central bank's rate-setting panel may again opt for status quo in its bi-monthly policy to be announced October 1.

Reserve Bank of India (RBI) Governor Sanjay Malhotra-headed Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) is scheduled to begin a three-day brainstorming on policy rate Monday in the backdrop of the ongoing geopolitical tensions and the US imposing 50 per cent tariffs on Indian shipments. The decision will be an-

nounced October 1 (Wednes-The RBI reduced the key

short-term lending rate (repo) by 100 basis points in three tranches beginning in February, amidst declining consumer price index (CPI) based inflation.

However, the central bank opted for a status quo in the August bi-monthly monetary policy, taking a wait-and-watch approach to assess the impact of US tariffs and other geopolitical developments on the domestic economy. The SBI study stated that

ing monetary policy, as retail inflation is expected to remain benign even in the next financial year.

On expectations from the MPC, Madan Sabnavis, Chief Economist at Bank of Baroda said: "While we do believe that there is limited scope for any change in the reporate in this policy, there is a market view that given the current environment, a rate cut would be warranted.'

He further said that, as inflation is anyway well below the target of 4 per cent both before and after GST 2.0, this cannot be a primary consideration. Also, growth is expected to steady and be upwards of 6.5 per cent for the year and hence there is no imminent threat to this number even after taking into account the tariff effect.

"Under these conditions, we expect a status quo. A change of

stance could probably be considered to assuage sentiment and bond yields. If at all, at a later point in time, there is a package for exporters against the backdrop of tariffs, a rate cut could be considered," Sabnavis said.

Aditi Nayar, Chief Economist, ICRA, said the GST rationalisation could dampen the headline CPI prints by 25-50 bps during Q3 FY2026 - Q2 FY2027 relative to ICRA's pre-GST rationalisation estimates. taking the average for FY2026 to about 2.6 per cent. While October-November 2025 may mark a fresh low for the CPI inflation, the trajectory subsequently remains upward sloping.

"GST rationalisation is unambiguously set to moderate inflation. However, this is the outcome of a policy change and will likely be accompanied by stronger demand. This suggests

a status quo for the repo rate in the October 2025 policy review, in what appears to be a close call," she said.

Effective September 22, Goods and Services Tax (GST) has become a two-tier structure of 5 per cent and 18 per cent. The earlier rates of 5, 12, 18, and 28 per cent have been clubbed into two rates of 5 per cent and 18 per cent, resulting in a reduced price of 99 per cent of daily use items.

Dharmakirti Joshi, Chief Economist, Crisil Limited, said: "We expect that a repo rate cut could come as soon as October due to lower-than-expected inflation. Core inflation, which indicates excess demand pressure, remains low by historical standards despite the significant impact of rising gold

The rationalisation of GST rates will also likely contribute to reducing inflation further, he

"Moreover, the recent decision by the US Federal Reserve to lower its funds rate by 25 basis points, along with an anticipated additional 50 basis points of cuts this year, provides the RBI's Monetary Policy Committee with some flexibility to make adjustments," Joshi said.

According to a study published in the RBI's latest Bulletin, the pass-through of the cumulative 100 bps reduction in the repo rate during February to August 2025 to lending and deposit rates has been robust.

# Gold, silver may extend rally amid global economic cues



New Delhi, Sept 28: Gold and silver prices are expected to maintain their upward trajectory this week, but may see late profit-booking amid the release of a series of crucial global economic indicators, analysts said.

On the economic front, traders will closely monitor the manufacturing/ services PMI data from across regions and the US non-farm payrolls/employment data along with consumer confidence for the month of September and speeches from several Federal Reserve officials, they added.

New Delhi, Sept 27: Tata Motors Limited has announced that its demerger into separate commercial vehicle and passenger vehicle businesses will take effect October 1. The move comes after receiv-

ing approvals from its board, regulators, and the National Company Law Tribunal.

As part of the demerger,

shareholders will receive one share in the new commercial vehicle company for each fully paid Tata Motors share held on the record date, the company said in a filing to the exchanges.

The record date is pending announcement and will be revealed after the completion of statutory filings. Upon confirmation of the record date, investors will receive one share in the CV and PV companies for each Tata Motors share they own.

Shares will be automatically credited to investors' demat accounts, with voting rights remaining proportionate across both entities. Both companies will set their own dividend policies moving forward.

As part of the demerger, Tata Motors will split into two separate listed entities. The commercial vehicle business arm



housed in TML Commercial Vehicles Ltd. (TMLCV) is expected to be renamed to Tata Motors Limited once the demerger is complete.

Tata Motors will rename its existing listed company to Tata Motors Passenger Vehicles Ltd., retaining its passenger vehicle and electric vehicle businesses, as well as investments like Jaguar Land Rover.

Girish Wagh, who currently heads Tata Motors' CV operations, will lead the new commercial vehicle company, while Shailesh Chandra, the current head of the passenger vehicle and electric vehicle divisions, will spearhead the PV-focused

### Govt releases guidelines for setting up EV charging stations under PM E-DRIVE

New Delhi, Sept 28: The Centre has issued operational guidelines for the deployment of about 72,300 public EV charging stations across the country with Rs 2,000-crore outlay under the Rs 10,900 crore PM E-DRIVE scheme.

The norms recommend a tiered subsidy structure to be followed to support the installation of EV charging infrastructure across different locations.

Government premises such as offices, residential complexes, hospitals, and educational institutions will receive 100 per cent subsidy on both upstream infrastructure and EV charging equipment, provided the chargers offer free public access.

For locations in cities and along highways which are owned, controlled or managed by state or central governments or their public sector undertakings, the subsidy will cover 80 per cent of upstream infrastructure and 70 per cent of EV supply equipment cost, according to the guidelines.

Moreover, 80 per cent on Upstream Infrastructure will be subsidised for Cities - Streets, shopping malls, market complexes etc. along with Highways and Expressways, the norms said.

### **EPFO** launches revised ECR facility INDO-ASIAN NEWS SERVICE

New Delhi, Sept 28: The Employees' Provident Fund Organisation (EPFO) has introduced a revamped electronic challan-cum-return (ECR) facility from the wage month of September, aimed at making return filing easier and error-free for employers and establishments, as per the latest notification issued by the Central Provident Fund Commissioner.

The new facility separates the process of submitting returns from payment generation It also includes system-based validations to prevent the filing of incorrect returns.

The updated system will automatically calculate damages and interest under sections 14B and 7Q of the Employees' Provident Funds Act

It will also make it mandatory for employers to pay interest under section 7Q along with monthly contributions

Section 7Q requires employers to pay interest on pending dues until the date of payment, while section 14B allows EPFO to impose penalties for defaults in payment.

Despite the changes, the existing file format for returns (.txt) will remain the same. Employers will be able to file regu-

lar, supplementary, or revised returns through the system.

An EPFO official said the move is part of efforts to make the organisation more user-friendly. The changes are expected to reduce data-entry errors that have made return filing cumbersome in the past.

The revamped system will also help prevent errors in pension contributions under the Employees' Pension Scheme (EPS).

For instance, employees earning more than Rs 15,000 a month are not eligible for EPS. but many employers mistakenly make contributions under this head. The new system will flag such errors before filing, ensuring correct submissions Similarly, EPS membership ends at 58 years of age unless an employee opts for deferred

Earlier, the system did not stop remittances into the pension fund for employees above 58, leading to grievances.

Now, the revamped ECR will automatically restrict contributions after 58 years unless specifically marked for deferred pension by the employer.

The EPFO hopes these mea sures will simplify compliance. reduce mistakes, and provide greater clarity to both employers and employees.

## PNGRB to launch LPG portability soon

New Delhi, Sept 28: Unhappy with your LPG provider? Relief may be around the corner. In a move similar to mobile number portability, cooking gas consumers will soon be allowed to change their supplier without altering their existing connection, offering more choice and improved service.

Oil regulator The Petroleum and Natural Gas Regulatory Board (PNGRB) has invited stakeholder and consumer comments on the LPG Interoperability Framework.

PNGRB, in the notice inviting comments, stated that in situations where a local distributor faces operational constraints, consumers often have limited alternatives, leading to

hardship. "There may be other reasons,

too, and the consumer needs to have the freedom of choice on the LPG company/dealer, especially when the cylinder price is the same," it said. The then UPA government

had, in October 2013, launched pilot Portability of LPG connections in 24 districts, covering 13 states, and extended it pan-India in January 2014, covering 480 districts. However, unlike cellular

services, where consumers have the option to switch between different mobile companies, LPG consumers were in 2014 allowed limited options of changing only their dealers, not the oil company. What that meant was that a consumer of Indane Gas from

option to choose from Indane

Gas dealers in the vicinity. But,

other stakeholders on measures that could facilitate timely access to refills - by enabling consumers to be served from the nearest available distributor through improved coordination and flexible delivery arrangements within the existing network, particularly during times of disruption," the regulator said. PNGRB said India has achieved near-universal LPG household coverage with over 32 crore connections as of FY25. "However, persistent con-

sumer grievances remain over 17 lakhs annually," it added.

"While the oil marketing companies (OMCs) do strive to address the grievances, consumers do not have the option of migrating from one OMC/ LPG dealer to another.

While interoperability has been adopted in telephony with much success, the same has not happened in the LPG sector. 'Recent reports from various regions have highlighted a number of cases of supply disruptions and prolonged delays in LPG refill deliveries, in some cases extending to several weeks. Such service interrup tions have caused hardship to households and commercial establishments, particularly in areas where local distributors face suspension or operational constraints. "These developments un-

derscore the importance of adopting a continuity-centric approach to safeguard consum ers against service failures and to ensure uninterrupted access to this essential fuel," PNGRB said. Once comments are re ceived, PNGRB will frame rules and guidelines for LPG portability and fix a date for its rollout.

### In a first, captains speak to different presenters at toss after PCB demand

Animosity between India and Pakistan team continued prior to the mega final of the Asia Cup with two presenters -- India's Ravi Shastri and Pakistan's Wagar Younis -at the toss. This is the first time in the history of international cricket that two former players interview as Pakistan didn't



want to speak to Indian presenter Shastri following the bitter build-up to the title clash. It is learnt that from among the broadcasters, Shastri, who has done the toss presentation during the earlier two Indo-Pak games in the tournament, had been assigned to speak to both Survakumar Yaday and Salman Ali Agha after the toss. However, a request was sent to the Asian Cricket Council (ACC) from the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) for a neutral presenter. When the ACC went back to BCCI with the request, they had clearly mentioned that Shastri can't be replaced. As a middle-of-the-road solution, it was decided that Pakistar skipper Salman would speak to his country's pace legend Waqar, while Surya would interact with former India head coach Shastri. Also, in a departure from convention, Salman did the trophy shoot alone instead of doing alongside his Indian counterpart. As per sources in the BCCI, the ACC had never informed them about the toss photo-shoot. It must be mentioned that even during the 2024 T20 World Cup final in Barbados, there were no photoshoots involving India and South African skippers Rohit Sharma and Aiden Marrkram.

### Manhas elected as new BCCI president


Mumbai, Sept 28: Former Delhi captain Mithun Manhas was elected the president of the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) unopposed along with other members, including board's secretary Devajit Saikia, during its 94th Annual General Meeting (AGM) at its headquarters here Sunday.

The 45-year-old Manhas became the 37th president of the all-powerful cricket body after he succeeded former India cricketer Roger Binny, who resigned from the post last month after turning 70.

Manhas is the third consec utive First-Class cricketer to have taken over as the board's president after Binny and former captain Souray Ganguly

Manhas, who featured in 157 First-Class, 130 List A and 55 IPL matches between 1997-98 and 2016-17, had emerged as the frontrunner following an informal meeting of the board's power brokers in New Delhi on September 20 ahead of the final day of nomination.

He also served as the direc tor of a three-member ad-hoc committee formed by the BC CI to manage the affairs of the Jammu and Kashmir State Cricket Association (JKCA) due to mismanagement.



Manhas, who has an im pressive tally of 9,714 First Class runs with 27 centuries to go with 4,126 runs in List A matches, said he would rely on his experience as a player and administrator.

"It's an absolute honour to be the president of the world's finest cricket board. It's a huge responsibility as well. I give my assurance that I'll be committed to do it to the best of my ability and dedication and passion, Manhas told the media here.

The AGM also confirmed a few other key appointments with BCCI secretary Saikia and IPL Governing Council chair man Arun Dhumal retaining their posts, while former India cricketer and Karnataka State Cricket Association (KSCA) president Raghuram Bhat tak ing charge as the treasurer.

Veteran administrator Ra jeev Shukla will continue as the board's vice-president while M Khairul Jamal Majumdar was named as one of the two repre sentatives in the IPL GC along with Dhumal.

Former India internationals RP Singh and Pragyan Ojha were inducted into the men's selection panel, while ex-Tamil Nadu batter S Sharath returned to the junior selection committee. Sharath was a member of the senior selection committee till now.

The Ajit Agarkar-chaired committee now comprises former India players Shiv Sundar Das, Ajay Ratra, RP Singh and Ojha.

Ahmedabad, Sept 28: Ace Indian swimmer Srihari Nataraj dazzled on the opening day of the 11th Asian Aquatics Championships, clinching the men's 200m freestyle and 50m backstroke silver medals while also anchoring the 4x100m medley relay team to bronze, becoming the first Indian to win two or more continental medals in a single edition of the competi-
