2-DAY HOLIDAY FOR DIWALI ANNOUNCED

Bhubaneswar, Oct 18: The state government has declared a two-day holiday for Diwali this year, according to a notification issued Saturday. The government had earlier declared October 21 as the Diwali holiday. In the fresh notification, it has also declared October 20 as a holiday for Diwali.

"This year, state government employees will get a two-day holiday for Diwali. However, they have to work

October 25, which is a fourth Saturday," Revenue Minister

Suresh Pujari said. He said employees in Nuapada will not get a holiday October 20, as that is the last date for filing of nomination papers for the November 11 bypoll.

3 Afghan cricketers die in Pak airstrike

Kabul, Oct 18: At least three Afghan cricketers were killed in a Pakistani airstrike in Afghanistan's Paktika province, the Afghanistan Cricket Board (ACB) confirmed.

The players had travelled from Urgan to Sharana, near the Pakistan border, to participate in a friendly cricket match. The ACB identified the deceased players as Kabeer, Sibghatullah, and Haroon, adding that five other civilians also lost their lives in the strike.

The ACB also announced its decision to withdraw from the upcoming Tri-Nation T20I Series involving Pakistan, scheduled for late November, as a mark of respect for the victims. **P10**

20 new cybercrime police stations to be operational

Bhubaneswar, Oct 18: Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi Saturday announced that at least 20 new cybercrime police stations will soon become operational in the state. In addition, steps will be taken to modernise the existing 14 cyber police stations, he said.

The Chief Minister stated that 1,127 new police positions and 170 technical experts will be appointed shortly. A state-level Command Centre under the Crime Branch will also be established, serving as a Centre of Excellence for cybercrime prevention.

Majhi launched the Cyber Security Awareness Campaign 2025 at Kalinga Stadium to educate the public on cyber safety. As part of the month-long campaign,



awareness vehicles and programmes will reach all districts, except Nuapada, where a by-election will be held November 11.

Highlighting the significance of the campaign, Majhi said that nearly 820 million people in India—around 55 per cent of the population, currently use the internet, making the country the second-largest in internet usage globally. He emphasised that increasing internet reliance has also made citizens vulnerable to cybercrime and online fraud. **MORE P3**

India, Pak in war of words

Every inch of Pak territory in BrahMos range: Rajnath

Lucknow, Oct 18: Every inch of Pakistan's territory lies within range of BrahMos and what happened during Operation Sindoor was just a trailer, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh said here Saturday, in a stern warning to Pakistan.

The operation proved that victory has become a habit for India, he said.

The Union Minister, along with Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath, flagged off the first batch of BrahMos missiles manufactured at the BrahMos Aerospace unit in Sarojini Nagar here.

Singh described BrahMos as a symbol of India's rising strength.

"BrahMos is not just a missile, it is proof of India's strategic confidence. From the Army to the Navy and the Air Force, it has become a key pillar of our defence forces," he said. Singh asserted that India's defence capabilities now serve as a powerful deterrent.

"Every inch of Pakistan's territory lies within range of BrahMos. What happened during Operation Sindoor was just a trailer. It made Pakistan realise that if India could create Pakistan, then if the time comes... I

need not say more, you all are wise enough," he said.

Operation Sindoor proved that "victory is not just a small incident for us but it has become a habit", he added.

Hailing Operation Sindoor, Singh said it instilled a new confidence among Indians and proved BrahMos' effectiveness to the world.

"Maintaining this confidence is now our collective responsibility," he said.

"The entire world now recognises India's capability. BrahMos has strengthened our belief that India can turn its dreams into reality," he said.

On the manufacturing of BrahMos at the Lucknow unit, Singh said the project symbolises India's growing confidence and capability in defence manufacturing.

'Decisive response' to even minor provocation: Munir

Islamabad, Oct 18: In a sharp escalation of rhetoric, Pakistan Army chief Field Marshal Syed Asim Munir Saturday warned India of a "decisive response" to even a minor provocation, saying there is "no space for war in a nuclearised environment".

Munir was addressing a graduation ceremony of passing out army cadets at the premier Pakistan Military Academy (PMA) Kakul at Abbottabad in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.

"I advise and firmly caution India's military leadership that there is no space for war in a nuclearised environment," he said.

"We will never be intimidated, not coerced by rhetoric and will respond decisively to even a minor provocation without any qualms," the Chief of Army Staff (COAS) said.

Referring to the recent military conflict between India and Pakistan, Munir claimed that his country's armed forces had demonstrated "remarkable professionalism" and far-reaching capabilities by neutralising all threats and emerged victorious against a numerical superior adversary.

India launched Operation Sindoor May 7, targeting ter-



ror infrastructure in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir in retaliation for the April 22 Pahalgam attack that killed 26 civilians.

India and Pakistan reached an understanding May 10 to end the conflict after four days of intense cross-border drone and missile strikes, following direct talks between the Directors General of Military Operations (DGMOs) of the two militaries.

Munir also accused India of using terrorism as a weapon to destabilise Pakistan, saying a handful of terrorists cannot harm Pakistan and warned that "all proxies using Afghan soil would be raised to dust", in an apparent reference to Tehreek-i-Taliban Pakistan (TTP).

The Army chief also urged India to settle core issues as per international norms, an apparent reference to the Kashmir dispute, while reiterating Pakistan's commitment to provide "moral and diplomatic support" to the people of Jammu and Kashmir.

City shocker: Jharkhand minor girl raped, rescued in critical condition

Major sex racket busted in Capital; 3 victims rescued, 4 arrested

Bhubaneswar, Oct 18: A 16-year-old girl from Jharkhand was rescued in a critical and distraught condition from a roadside in Ashok Nagar area here late Thursday night, police said Saturday. A medical examination confirmed that the minor had been raped, they said.

The girl, who had no identification documents or mobile phone, was admitted to Capital Hospital, where doctors filed a medico-legal case (MLC) citing "psychic disorder" and a history of sexual assault. Based on

the MLC received October 16 around 8pm, the Capital police station took suo motu cognisance and registered a case under relevant sections of BNS and the POCSO Act.

"As per the MLC, the victim is a minor and a resident of Jharkhand. We are conducting further investigation to confirm her exact age and identity. Her statement has been recorded and she's currently undergoing treatment," Police Commissioner S Dev Datta Singh said.

During the investigation, the police scanned CCTV footage and gathered evidence that led them to a sex

racket operating out of Laxmisagar area in the Capital city. A raid was conducted Friday, resulting in the rescue of three survivors and the arrest of four individuals.

The arrested have been identified as Manju Sethi, 47, Mamata Sahu, 42, Sanjib Kumar Das (the house owner), and Abinash Muduli, 28. Police said that Muduli was involved in the sexual assault of the minor.

Two separate cases have been registered and all the accused will be forwarded to court, police said. The incident has sparked widespread outrage among locals.

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Sir David Attenborough makes history at 99

FAMED NARRATOR BECOMES OLDEST DAYTIME EMMY WINNER FOR SECRET LIVES OF ORANGUTANS

Pasadena, Oct 18: Sir David Attenborough broke Dick Van Dyke's record for oldest Daytime Emmy winner Friday, taking the trophy for daytime personality, non-daily as host of Netflix's *Secret Lives of Orangutans*.

Attenborough, who is 99, was not on hand. The Brit's career as a writer, host and narrator spans eight decades.

Van Dyke was 98 when he won as guest performer in a daytime drama series for *Days of Our Lives* in 2024. He is the oldest actor to win a Daytime Emmy. Jonathan Jackson of *General Hospital* and first-time nominee Su-

san Walters of *The Young and the Restless* won supporting acting honours.

Jackson accepted the trophy for playing Lucky Spencer, a role he originated in 1993 and has played on and

off ever since.

The ABC show also claimed trophies for Alley Mills as guest performer in a daytime drama and its writing team.

It was Mills' second ca-

reer win for playing Heather Webber. The 74-year-old, who first won in 2023, is best known as the mom on *The Wonder Years*.

"We are living in really dark times right now. Ev-

erything is crazy," Mills told the audience at the Pasadena Civic Auditorium. "We just got to keep our spirits high."

Walters plays Diane Jenkins on CBS' *Y&R*, which she has appeared in during three different stints.

"I am so happy that I won so I can thank my husband of 40 years," she said, singling out Linden Ashby, who has appeared on the same show.

The Young and the Restless brought a leading 19 nominations into the 52nd annual show. It is just one of three shows nominated for best daytime drama, along with *General Hospital* and *Days of Our Lives*.

signed a movie with Sir before my first film was even released, which was a huge deal for me as a complete newcomer. Thanks to his kindness, no audition was required."

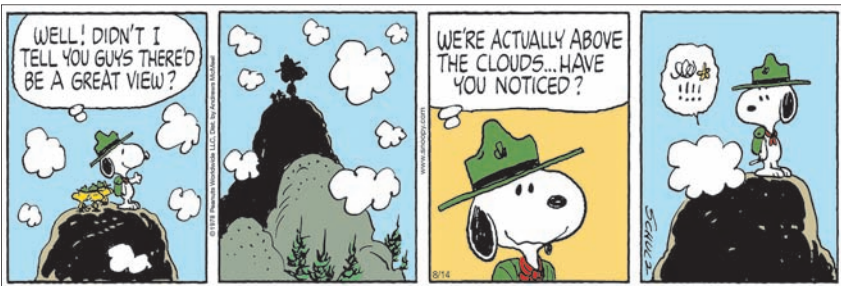

Revenue services must be citizen-centric: Min

Bhubaneswar, Oct 18: Revenue officers should focus on making revenue services simpler, more citizen-centric, and accessible within a specified timeframe. It has become essential to introduce necessary amendments and reforms to the Revenue laws, said Revenue and Disaster Management Minister Suresh Pujari while addressing officers at the two-day Central Region Revenue Conference at the Revenue Officers' Training Institute (ROTI) here Saturday.

Minister Pujari stated that revenue laws must be simplified keeping in view the interests of the general public.

The use of modern technological knowledge can make the delivery of revenue services more efficient.

He urged revenue officers to take proactive steps to resolve people's land-related issues, ensuring citizens receive proper and timely services. Protecting government property and removing encroachments are among the key responsibilities of revenue officers. He also emphasised the need to facilitate the acquisition of land for government projects. "Tahasildars should prepare a database on the land status within their jurisdictions," he directed.

Although the scope of responsibilities for revenue officers has expanded over time,

they must still ensure timely service delivery to the public. Achieving this will contribute to the goal of a prosperous Odisha by 2036 and a developed India by 2047, the Minister added.

Speaking as the chief guest, Additional Chief Secretary and Member of the Odisha Revenue Board Deoranjana Kumar Singh said that while the government has enacted several laws for the welfare of citizens, their successful implementation lies in the hands of revenue officers. They must be diligent and sincere in this regard so that the public can truly benefit from the revenue services.

The event, presided over by Revenue Divisional Commissioner, Central Division, Guha Poonam Tapas Kumar, saw participation from Collectors of 10 districts of the central region through virtual mode, along with 9 Additional District Magistrates (Revenue), 16 Sub-Collectors, 112 Tahasildars, 10 District Registrars, 62 Assistant Registrars, and 4 District Welfare Officers.

In her welcome address, Commissioner Kumar said that the main aim of the conference is to make revenue administration more citizen-oriented, review existing laws and government guidelines, and create awareness among officers through expert discussions on various aspects of revenue administration and law.

Housing units to 44 families in Salia Sahi

Bhubaneswar, Oct 18: Under its Affordable Housing Project (AHP), Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation (BMC) allotted housing units to 44 families through a transparent lottery system, selected from a total of 274 families currently residing along the left parallel road of Salia Sahi in Ward No. 21.

BMC has taken the necessary steps to relocate the 44 families to the Buddha Vihar Housing Project at Chandrasekharpur. Based on a preliminary survey, 274 beneficiaries were provisionally selected for allotment of AHP houses at Chandrasekharpur. The corporation clarified that the houses will be handed over only after verification of all relevant documents.

As per the eviction and resettlement policy, arrangements have been made to provide basic assistance to the affected families during relocation — including transport facilities, food for three days, temporary electricity connections, and water supply in coordination with agencies such as TPCODL and WATCO.

Each allotted house is priced at ₹6 lakh, while the beneficiary will have to contribute only ₹1.5 lakh. Those unable to pay this amount can contribute ₹15,000 upfront and avail the remaining amount through bank loans. For



this purpose, BMC has facilitated coordination with selected banks to assist the beneficiaries.

To simplify the loan process, a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed between HDFC Bank and BMC recently.

At the special function, Housing and Urban Development Minister Krushna Chandra Mahapatra attended as chief guest. Other dignitaries including BMC Mayor Sulochana Das, deputy

mayor Manjulata Kanhar, BMC commissioner Chanchal Rana, Slum Settlement Standing Committee chairperson Mahamaya Swain, corporator Pritinanda Rautray, and senior HDFC Bank officials Arjunananda Bag (zonal head) and Sushanta Kumar Panigrahi (cluster head), among others joined the event.

Expressing his views, Mahapatra reiterated that every eligible person will be provided housing and no one will be left out. "The state government has launched several schemes to ensure housing for all. Besides the economically weaker sections, many middle-class and upper-middle-class families in Bhubaneswar also lack their own homes. Initiatives are already underway to provide affordable houses to them, ranging from ₹14 lakh to ₹50 lakh. The work is in progress, and houses will soon be allotted through the lottery system," he added.

Empty Ambition

When was the last time you read or saw something about India and the G20? And what do you recall from that memory? Like me, for many readers, the answers are most likely to be: When India was in the presidency a couple of years ago, and the posters and hoardings about India's presidency.

If asked what outcomes were achieved in that presidency or what plans exist to follow up with what we initiated, I do not have an answer because, like you, I do not know. The G20 thing was an opportunity for an event, and that event is over.

A few days ago, again, India went to the United Nations and asked that the institution reform itself. Formed in 1945 just after World War 2 ended and two years before Indian independence, the UN Security Council retains the same five permanent members. When India uses the words UN reform, what we mean is that we also want a permanent seat in the Security Council, with a veto.

In the words of our foreign minister, "The historical injustice done to Africa should be redressed. Both permanent and non-permanent membership of the Council must be expanded. A reformed Council must be truly representative. And India stands ready to assume greater responsibilities."

These greater responsibilities that we are ready to assume is the subject of this piece. It is fine to have ambition; the question is what we want to do with it.

The BJP's 2024 manifesto, like the one in 2019, has a line about this. It reads: "We are committed to seeking permanent membership in the UN Security Council to elevate Bharat's position in global decision making."

How would this be secured? This was not elaborated on. What would India say to convince all five permanent members and two-thirds of the general assembly that it should be given more power? What was the pathway to becoming more popular with the world? No mention of that.

Other than the idea that India was entitled to more than it had and should be given it by the world, there appears to be no direct and specific aim of this aspect of foreign policy.

Let us suppose we got this seat. What would we do with it that we cannot do today? No clarity on that either. On Gaza and Ukraine, the two most pressing global issues of our time, India's contribution has been to abstain from crucial votes in the UN. Having or not having the veto would have made no difference when there is nothing one has to say to the world.

China's rise since 1990 to superpower has come on the back of industrial policy and economic growth, not on the basis of its UNSC seat.

In the 2014 manifesto, the BJP said that in the foreign policy of its predecessor the UPA, "instead of clarity, we have seen confusion" and because of "absence of statecraft", India "is seen to be floundering, whereas it should have been engaging with the world with confidence".

Under Manmohan Singh India had "failed to establish enduring friendly and cooperative relations with India's neighbours" and "India and its neighbours have drifted apart". The party would correct this and "strengthen SAARC". The fact is that SAARC has not met since November 2014, because we do not have any interest in it. The leaders of Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan and Sri Lanka have all changed since that summit meeting. India has the same person at the helm.

We cannot even bring our neighbourhood together but believe that if given more power at the UN we can reform the world. The BJP's manifestos tell us the party will do more to link with ASEAN, but we chose in 2019 not to join the free trade agreement spearheaded by ASEAN, the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership.

The words 'vasudhaiva kutumbakam' appear in the manifestos but try telling Rohingya fleeing genocide that India sees humanity as a joint family. Try telling the Bangladeshi refugee that, or those excluded from the Citizenship Amendment Act. There is no value residing in those two words and they offer nothing other than platitudes.

The question we must then come to is this: If we do not have a pathway of getting there and if we do not know what we will do with our veto, why are we clamouring for a bigger role? The answer takes us back to where we started in this column. It gives us a forum to strut about and pretend we are the leader of the world and the leading light of the global community.

It is another place where we can pretend we are relevant, and can display our personalised and very physical diplomacy.

The world knows this. It has observed us and has heard our words and our silences and abstentions. It does not for a moment buy the idea that any one nation 'deserves' a thing more than the rest of them.

It is for this reason that it is a good thing that the government has not laid out a pathway to getting to a UNSC permanent seat. If it did, there would be questions for which it has no answers.

THE TOP COURT'S DECISION ONCE AGAIN PROVED INDIA'S PHILOSOPHY OF PEOPLES' INTEREST IS ABOVE PROFITS

On 17th October 2025, the Supreme Court of India has rejected the petition filed by the International Pharmaceutical Giant, Roche, against the Delhi High Court's order allowing the domestic pharma company, Natco, to market the generic version of Risperidone, the only available remedy in India. The Delhi High Court has refused on 9th October to provide injunction against the selling of generic version of only drug available for treating spinal muscular atrophy (SMA) bringing huge relief to the SMA patients and care giver. At present very expensive unaffordable treatment is available in our country as the medicine is under patent protection. The SC's decision once again proved India's philosophy of peoples' interest is above profits.

The Swiss company, F Hoffmann-La Roche Limited, holds Indian patent for this drug in 2015 and is valid till 2035. The company claims that it is a new chemical entity and does not cover the company's earlier patents. The Natco argued that Roche is trying to get the patent protection without much advancement of science, something called evergreening. Roche had earlier filed petition against the Indian Pharma Natco's plan to market the generic version of Risperidone at Delhi High Court. Delhi High Court bench in its verdict says there is no reason to intervene the single judge verdict allowing Natco Pharma to market generic version. The generic version of the medicine is expected to bring the treatment cost down from Rs 600,000 to Rs 15,900 per bottle. SMA is a rare genetic disorder for

which no affordable treatment is available.

Spinal muscular atrophy is a very severe genetic disorder mostly affecting newborns, toddlers, and young adults. It affects the muscles in the limbs, face, chest, throat and tongue. Thus, the disease causes movement loss (adversely affecting walking) and, in some cases, death from respiratory failure. There would be progressive weakness and muscle wasting. The weakness tends to be more severe in the muscles that are close to the centre of the body (proximal) compared to muscles away from the body's centre (distal). The muscle weakness usually worsens with age. There are many types of spinal muscular atrophy that are caused by changes in the same genes. The new treatments are the hope for the parents and children. There are three drugs available globally: Zolgensma, Risperidone and Nusiners

sane. Risperidone (brand name Evrysdi) is marketed by Roche is only available in our country. The novel therapies provide a much needed relieve: the children with SMA type 1 who could not even hold the head are now walking if the treatment is started early. The novel treatment is available but access to the treatment is a big question mark. The treatment is essential for successful outcomes and well-being of these unfortunate individuals.

The question-and-answer session in the parliament (11 February 2022) confirms that National registry has 295 Spinal Muscular Atrophy cases. Of them, 188 (63.70%) are male and 107 (37.30%) are female. Preliminary analysis of age distribution of the cases (N=295) are as follows: <1 year-140 (47.5%); 1 to <5 years- 91 (30.8%); 5 to <10 years-9(3.1%) and Not Known-46(15.6%). The government cannot do much as

the treatment (drugs) are protected under the Patent Act. Government's initiative is restricted to support individuals. Crowd funding approach is also made available through government portal. The government has established a rare disease fund to support treatment cost but is not sustainable. During 2022-23, the fund has supported 203 patients to the tune of Rs 35 crore. The government has also provided full waiver of Basic Customs Duty (BCD) and IGST to drugs imported (personal use only) for treatment of SMA, thereby making the medicines for SMA more affordable. The current price of available drug, Risperidone in India is reported to be Rs 6,00,000. The Natco Pharma proposed to sell the generic version at Rs 15,900 for a 60 mg/80 ml bottle. The annual cost of Roche's patented product is Rs 72 lakh and the cost of generic version for the same period is Rs 5 lakh. Just think of what a huge relief to the patients mostly children and their care givers. India has one-sixth of global burden of SMA cases.

While the SC's refusal to grant relief to Roche is hailed publicly as another landmark decision but this is not the end. This is just the provision of providing interim relief to Natco to launch the generic version of Risperidone in Indian market. The patent infringement case would continue in Delhi High Court till final disposal. Public interest logic should prevail over patent exclusivity.

De-risking and repositioning

In the past three years, both the European Union and India have been forced to redefine what "strategic autonomy" actually means. For Europe, the shock came from the pandemic, Russia's war against Ukraine, and the deep realization that its prosperity had been quietly built on external dependencies — on Russian gas, American technology, and Chinese supply chains.

For India, the shock was geopolitical as well as civilizational: the limits of China's power had become visible, but so had the limits of disengagement.

Today, both Delhi and Brussels are experimenting with new grammars of dependence — not decoupling, but de-risking; not confrontation, but repositioning.

In October 2025, Beijing introduced a fresh round of export controls on technologies linked to the processing of rare earth metals and the production of high-performance magnets. It was a political gesture with measurable economic weight. Once again, China reminded the world that it can govern the time of global supply chains. It doesn't need to raise tariffs or ban exports; a simple delay in licensing or a pause in shipment is enough to make the entire system tremble.

This subtle mastery of tim-

ing — of making the world wait — has become the new dimension of resource geopolitics. Both India and Europe have learned this lesson. The question is: how to respond without turning protectionism into dogma?

Europe's answer has been to regulate. The Critical Raw Materials Act (CRMA), now in force, sets measurable targets for mining, processing, and recycling by 2030. The European Union has also launched anti-subsidy measures against Chinese electric vehicles — with temporary tariffs reaching up to 37 percent — and introduced new instruments for screening foreign investments and state aid transparency.

A Polish example, the electric car project Izera (based on Chinese Geely's platform), shows how fragile this balancing act can be: a European ambition wrapped in an Asian supply chain.

For Brussels, the goal is not to exclude China entirely, but to turn interdependence into a calculated risk, not an existential one.

India, by contrast, builds networks rather than regulations. Its Atmanirbhar Bharat and Production Linked Incentive (PLI) schemes have created an ecosystem for domestic manufacturing, while partnerships with Africa and

the Quad members help secure access to critical minerals. Delhi's diversification drive has already reshaped global expectations: autonomy is no longer defined by separation, but by multiplicity.

Over the past year, relations between the European Union and India have accelerated — and not by coincidence. The joint Trade and Technology Council (TTC) is already operational, focusing on supply-chain security, semiconductors, and artificial intelligence. In parallel, the 14th round of negotiations on the EU-India Free Trade Agreement is underway, with a political goal of conclusion before the end of 2025. These developments mark a shift in perception: Brussels increasingly sees Delhi not merely as a market, but as a strategic partner in re-balancing Chinese influence across Eurasia.

In this sense, India and Europe meet not in rhetoric but in practice — in their shared understanding that diversification is no longer a slogan, but a language of survival.

India's own policy toward Chinese investment has never been doctrinaire. While the 2020 Press Note 3 restrictions still limit direct investment from China, New Delhi is now considering selective relaxation in low-risk, non-strategic

sectors — particularly consumer goods and low-tech manufacturing. This signals a form of conscious balancing: neither isolation nor full openness, but managed interdependence. It is perhaps the emerging model of the post-global era — not cutting ties, but calibrating connection.

The EU protects the logic of the market; India redraws the geometry of the chain. Europe builds defensive walls of rules; India lays adaptive bridges of cooperation. Yet both face the same paradox: how to remain open in a world that increasingly rewards closure.

For Europe, the universality of its solutions — the CRMA's quantifiable targets, the principle of conditional market access, the rhetoric of "de-risking" — may serve as templates, not as transferable laws. India, on the other hand, turns these templates into practice, guided less by regulation than by intuition.

If there is a common denominator, it lies here: Both sides know that China no longer controls the space of globalization — it controls its tempo. And that, for the first time in decades, makes time itself a strategic resource.

New pathways for rural livelihood

Kargil, Oct 18: A Kargil-based agricultural institute has devised a new method to extract honey from buckwheat crops, opening new pathways towards sustainable agriculture and rural livelihood development

According to an official, buckwheat honey extraction at School of Agriculture Science and Technology, Kargil Campus, University of Ladakh, was part of efforts to promote apiculture in the region.

In 2019, honey was extracted from alfalfa crop at the institute which was earlier named as Mountain Agriculture Research and Extension Station, Kargil.

“This year, the School of



Agriculture Science and Technology, Kargil formulated a floral calendar and accordingly introduced bee colonies in synchronisation with floral period of alfalfa and buckwheat and thus able to extract honey from both the crops resulting in a significance development in apiculture as honey was extracted for the first time from buckwheat crop,” an official of the institute said.

He said the buckwheat crop was sown July 22 and later in synchronisation with the

flowering of buckwheat crop. bee colonies were introduced from Sher-e-Kashmir University of Agricultural Sciences and Technology, Kashmir August 24.

After a gap of one-and-a-half month, honey was extracted from these colonies marking a historic step, the official said, adding that the extraction of buckwheat honey has opened new pathways towards sustainable agriculture, rural livelihood development, and biodiversity conservation.

He said the unique altitude and climate of Kargil have given this honey a distinctive aroma and taste, setting it apart from other regional varieties and making a way for the untapped potential for high quality honey production from Kargil region.

The official said the institute is planning to expand more bee colonies in desirable villages, honey branding, and marketing and to promote buckwheat honey of Kargil as a unique GI-tagged product in the future.

Kerala opens Mullaperiyar dam as water level crosses 137 feet

Idukki (Kerala), Oct 18: Following heavy rains, the water levels at various dams in Idukki have risen, prompting authorities to release water, the district administration said Saturday.

The water level in the Mullaperiyar dam has crossed 137 feet, leading to the opening of three shutters to 75 cm and the release of 163 cusecs of water at 9 am, according to an official statement.

At 8 am, the water level at the dam was recorded as 138.25 ft above the permissible limit, officials said.

The volume of water released may be increased later in accordance with the rule curve, they said.

Residents living along the banks of the Periyar River have been advised to remain vigilant.



Instructions have been issued to the respective tahsildars to relocate people from flood-prone areas. The Idukki Sub-Collector has been assigned to coordinate disaster management operations.

Meanwhile, four shutters at the Kallar dam were raised by 60 cm, releasing 1063 cusecs of water. Authorities have alerted people living along the banks of the Kallar and Chinnar rivers about possible flooding.

Four shutters of the Malankara diversion dam also remain open. The inflow to the dam depends on water released after power generation at the Kerala State Electricity Board's Moolamattom plant.

The water level at the Idukki reservoir, the largest dam in the state, was recorded 2,381.92 ft, and live storage was 75.80 per cent at 7 am. All the gates of the dam are currently closed, officials said.

Samba farmer earns lakhs from floriculture

Samba, Oct 18: Samba district is fast emerging as a symbol of agricultural innovation in Jammu and Kashmir. Several farmers are moving beyond traditional practices to embrace modern farming techniques.

Among these pioneers is Rampal Sharma, who is a progressive farmer from Tarore village. His journey from conventional farming to earning lakhs through floriculture has become an inspiration for the entire region.

For the past ten years, Rampal Sharma has taken an experimental and forward-looking approach to agriculture. By actively participating in government training programmes, availing the benefits of schemes, and adopting modern technology, he has suc-

cessfully transformed farming into a profitable business.

While talking, he recalls how he started with traditional crops like wheat, paddy, and maize. But over time, he realised that crop diversification and the use of modern techniques could yield higher returns, even from limited land. This realisation led him to venture into flower cultivation.

Presently, Rampal cultivates various types of ornamental flowers on 12 kanals of land. These flowers enjoy steady demand in the market throughout the year.

“Flower farming does require more care and effort, but if done scientifically, the profits are just as high,” he stated with a smile.

“In just one four-month crop cycle, I make a net profit of nearly ₹5 lakhs,” he added confidently.

Over 5K members of Islamist party held

Lahore: Pakistan's Punjab police have so far arrested over 5,500 members of a radical Islamist party following violent clashes earlier this week over plans to stage an anti-Israel demonstration. The supporters of Tehreek-i-Labbaik Pakistan (TLP) launched a protest march Friday last with the mission to stage a sit-in in front of the US Embassy in Islamabad in support of the people of Palestine. On Monday this week, 16 people, including policemen, were killed and over 1,600 injured in clashes between police and TLP supporters at Muridke, some 60 km from Lahore, the Punjab police said. The TLP, however, claimed that dozens of its supporters were killed, while thousands injured after police allegedly opened fire on the "unarmed" protesters expressing their solidarity with Palestinians.

Three Indians killed in boat accident

Maputo: Three Indian nationals were killed, one was injured, and five others rescued in a boat accident off the coast of Beira in Mozambique, the Indian High Commission here said Saturday. The mishap took place Thursday. In a social media post, the Indian mission conveyed its "heartfelt condolences on the loss of lives, including of three Indian nationals," in the boat accident off Beira port. It said the mission was in contact with the families of those who lost their lives in the mishap and is extending all possible assistance to them. In another post, the High Commission said a Consular Officer from the mission visited an Indian national who survived the accident and was receiving medical attention in a hospital in Beira.

Strike ignites ship off Yemen coast

Dubai: A ship caught fire Saturday in the Gulf of Aden off Yemen after being struck by a projectile, the British military said, with one report suggesting its crew was preparing to abandon the vessel. The incident comes as Yemen's Houthi rebels have been attacking ships through the Red Sea corridor. However, the rebels did not immediately claim the attack, though it can take them hours or even days to do so. The British military's United Kingdom Maritime Trade Operations centre issued an alert about the vessel, describing the incident as taking place some 210 kilometres (130 miles) east of Aden. The maritime security firm Ambrey described the ship as a Cameroon-flagged tanker that was "en route from Sohar, Oman, to Djibouti."

Nobel Prize-winning Chinese physicist Chen-Ning dies at 103

Beijing, Oct 18: Noted Chinese physicist and Nobel Laureate Chen Ning Yang, died in Beijing on Saturday. He was 103 years old.

Yang was born in Hefei, east China's Anhui Province, in 1922. In the 1940s, he went to the United States to pursue academic studies and subsequently held teaching positions. He was awarded the Nobel Prize in Physics in 1957, official media here reported.

In 1954, he co-authored a set of equations with the American physicist Robert Mills that turned out to be as important to physics as Einstein's theory of relativity.

The resulting Yang-Mills theory described how three of nature's four fundamental forces – the electromagnetic, weak and strong interactions – operate in the subatomic world, the Hong Kong-based South China Morning Post reported.

Their theory laid the mathematical foundation for what later became known as the Standard Model, the cornerstone of modern physics that unifies these forces and explains the behaviour of all known elementary particles.

"Yang was one of the greatest theoretical physicists of the 20th century," Shi Yu, professor of physics and associate director of the Wilczek Quantum Centre at the Shanghai Institute for Advanced Studies said.

Yang's most profound contribution was changing the mindset of Chinese people who once believed they were not as good as others in science and inspiring future generations to believe they could stand shoulder to shoulder with the world's best scientists, she said.

PALESTINIAN DEATH TOLL IN GAZA CROSSES 68,000

Tel Aviv: More than 68,000 Palestinians have been killed in the Israel-Hamas war, Gaza's Health Ministry said Saturday. The ministry said the number of dead has climbed since the ceasefire went into effect more than a week ago. The majority of the newly counted dead bodies have been found during recovery efforts under the rubble. Meanwhile Israel received the remains of another hostage from Gaza Friday, the prime minister's office said, a handover from Hamas as the militant group worked to shore up a ceasefire by using bulldozers in a search for bodies under the rubble in the war-scarred enclave. The handover came after Hamas' military wing, known as the Qassam Brigades, said the remains were that of an "occupation prisoner", suggesting that they belonged to an Israeli rather than one of the hostages of several other nationalities also taken in Gaza.

Pak, Afghan talk after fierce fight

The peace negotiations come against the backdrop of escalating cross-border attacks blamed by Pakistan on militants operating from Afghan soil, straining relations between the two neighbours

Islamabad, Oct 18: Afghanistan and Pakistan were holding peace talks in Doha Saturday, both sides said, after the South Asia neighbours extended a ceasefire following a week of fierce border clashes.

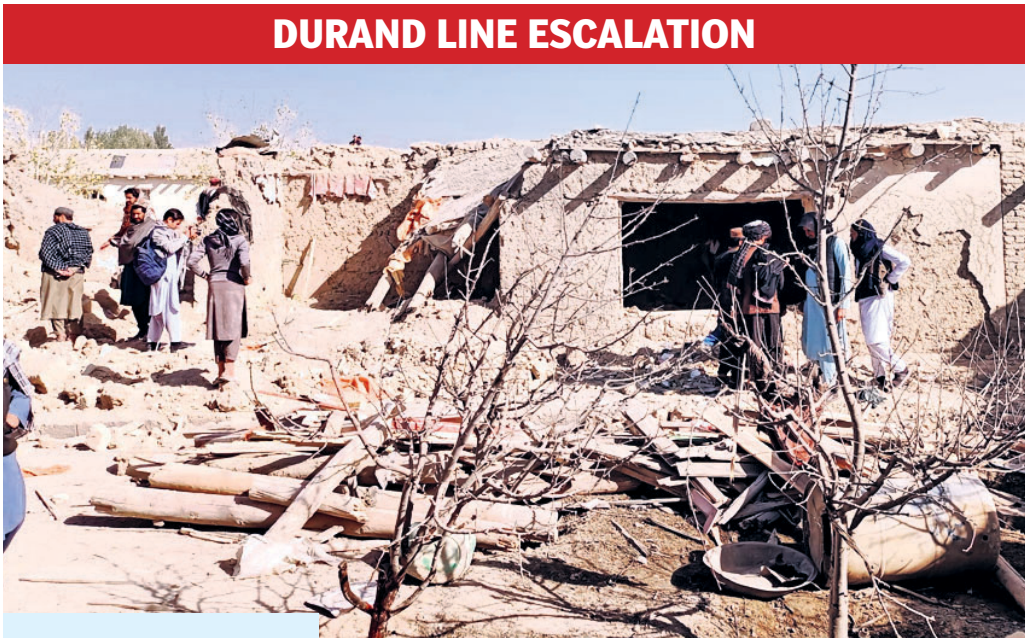
They are seeking to find a way forward after the clashes killed dozens and wounded hundreds in the worst violence between the two countries since the Taliban seized power in Kabul in 2021.

"As promised, negotiations with the Pakistani side will take place today in Doha," Afghan government spokesperson Zabihullah Mujahid said, adding that the Kabul team led by Defence Minister Mullah Muhammad Yaqoob had arrived in Doha.

Pakistan's foreign office said Defence Minister Khawaja Muhammad Asif would lead discussions with representatives of the Afghan Taliban.

"The talks will focus on immediate measures to end cross-border terrorism against Pakistan emanating from Afghanistan and restore peace and stability along the Pak-Afghan border," it said.

It was not immediately clear how long the talks would last. Officials on both sides have said they could be extended

from Saturday, adding senior intelligence officials from both countries were part of the talks.

The ground fighting between the one-time allies and Pakistani airstrikes across their contested 2,600-km (1,600-mile) frontier were triggered after Islamabad demanded that Kabul rein in militants who had stepped up attacks in Pakistan, saying they operated from havens in Afghanistan.

The Taliban denies giving haven to militants to attack Pakistan and accuses the Pakistani military of spreading misinfor-

mation about Afghanistan and sheltering Islamic State-linked militants to undermine its stability and sovereignty. Islamabad denies the accusations.

Militants have been waging a war for years against the Pakistani state in a bid to overthrow the government and replace it with their strict brand of Islam-

ic governance system.

On Friday, a suicide attack near the border killed seven Pakistani soldiers and wounded 13, security officials said.

The Afghan government spokesperson said Pakistan had conducted airstrikes in Afghanistan hours after the ceasefire, which began on Wednesday,

EASY FOR ME TO SOLVE, SAYS US PRESIDENT

Amid escalating hostilities between Afghanistan and Pakistan, US President Donald Trump claimed that the conflict between the two countries will be an "easy" one for him to solve, if he had to solve it. While speaking to the media during a bilateral lunch with the President of Ukraine, Volodymyr Zelenskyy, on Friday, Trump said, "I do understand Pakistan attacked or there is an attack going on with Afghanistan, that's an easy one for me to solve if I have to solve that." Trump once again claimed to have saved millions of lives while assuring that he will have "success" in resolving the conflict between Afghanistan and Pakistan. I like stopping people from being killed. I have saved millions and millions of lives, and I think we are going to have success with this war," the US president said. Meanwhile, Trump has once again expressed dismay at not receiving the Nobel Peace Prize despite resolving "eight wars". "You know we resolved eight others, it's funny how people say this, if you get this one ... every time I do one, they forget about that one. I solved eight wars," Trump said. "Every time I solve one, they say if you solve the next one, you are going to get the Nobel prize," Trump added. However, the US President was quick to add that he did not do it for the Nobel while claiming that he does not know Maria Corina Machado, the Nobel Peace Prize winner for 2025, without naming her.

Washington, Oct 18: Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy came to the White House Friday looking for weapons to keep fighting his country's war with Russia, but met an American president who appears more intent on brokering a peace deal than upgrading Ukraine's arsenal.

While US President Donald Trump did not rule out providing the long-range Tomahawk missiles Zelenskyy seeks, Trump appeared cool to the prospect as he looked ahead to a meeting with Russian President Vladimir Putin in Hungary in the coming weeks.

After speaking with Zelenskyy for more than two hours, Trump implored both Ukraine and Russia to "stop the war immediately," even if it means Ukraine conceding territory.

"You stop at the battle line, and both sides should go home, go to their families," Trump told reporters on his way to his home in West Palm Beach, Florida. "Stop the killing. And



that should be it. Stop right now at the battle line. I told that to President Zelenskyy. I told it to President Putin."

The two leaders then went behind closed doors where they also discussed a call the previous day between the Russian president and Trump, who has portrayed himself as a mediator between the warring forces despite the fact that Russia invaded Ukraine in 2022.

little bit," Trump told reporters.

Zelenskyy, however, noted how difficult it has been to try to secure a ceasefire. "We want this. Putin doesn't want (it)," he said.

The Ukrainian leader was frank, telling Trump that Ukraine has thousands of drones ready for an offensive against Russian targets, but needs American missiles. "We don't have Tomahawks, that's why we need Tomahawks," he said. Trump responded: "We'd much rather have them not need Tomahawks."

Later, Trump reiterated that he wants the United States to hold onto its weaponry.

When asked about Trump's comments, Zelenskyy said: "President (Trump) is right, and we have to stop where we are. This is important, to stop where we are, and then to speak."

Nepal's Gen Z group to form political party; puts conditions to contest polls

Elections in the Himalayan nation are slated to take place March 5, 2026

Kathmandu, Oct 18: Nepal's Gen Z group Saturday announced that it will establish a political party, but said its participation in next year's general election depends on the fulfilment of certain "bottom-line" conditions.

The youth-led group led protests against corruption and a government ban on social media sites last month, resulting in the ouster of the KP Sharma Oli-led government.

Led by Miraj Dhungana, one of the leaders of the recent Gen Z movement, the group unveiled its agenda in a press conference here.

They asserted that although they are considering forming a political party to bring together the Gen-Z youths, they will not contest the election until their

"bottom line" demands are addressed.

The group has been primarily advocating for two key agendas: a directly elected executive system and voting rights for Nepali citizens residing abroad.

According to Dhungana, his group has decided that the formation of a political party is essential to unite the youths associated with the Gen-Z movement.

While disclosing their agenda, Dhungana underscored the formation of a citizen-led investigation committee for corruption control and the adoption of a clear policy on economic transformation.

"We will continue to fight for issues like promoting good governance, transparency and checking corruption. We will not let the sacrifices of Gen-Z youths go in vain," he said, calling for collective commitment and cooperation from all sides in the nation-building task.

He added that they are currently collecting suggestions for an 'appropriate' name for the new party.

Prince Andrew: The British royal brought down by scandal

King Charles III's brother Prince Andrew gives up royal titles amid Epstein sex scandal

London, Oct 18: Once widely reputed to be Queen Elizabeth's favourite son and feted as a dashing young military officer, Britain's Prince Andrew will now always be seen in the public eye as the royal who was accused of sexually abusing a teenage girl.

Andrew, 65, said Friday he would give up his title of Duke of York after years of criticism about his connections to the late, disgraced US financier Jeffrey Epstein.

The brother of King Charles was accused by Virginia Giuffre of sexually abusing her when she was a teenager at properties owned by Epstein or his associates, and in February 2022 he made an undisclosed payment to settle a US lawsuit.

BY THE QUEEN'S SIDE

While he admitted no wrongdoing, Andrew - who had already stepped down as a working royal over his relationship with Epstein and following a disastrous BBC interview in which he had hoped to clear his name - was stripped of his military links, royal patronages and "His Royal Highness" moniker. "I never have really parted," he told the BBC. "I was single for quite a long time in the early 80s but then after I got married I was very happy and I've never

really felt the need to go and party and certainly going to Jeffrey's was not about partying."

Increasingly unloved by the public, he was cast aside by his family who saw him as an embarrassment who might cause lasting damage to their whole institution.

Only his late mother seemed to retain her affections, allowing him to escort her into a memorial service for her husband Prince Philip in March 2022.

His public appearances thereafter were limited to major family occasions such as the funeral of the queen later that year and his brother's coronation in 2023.

Earlier in his career, he served in the navy for 22 years and in 2001 he was named the United Kingdom's Special Representative for International Trade and Investment, a role

he held until he was pilloried for his connections to Epstein.

Until that point, Andrew was probably best known for his 1986 marriage to the vivacious, flame-haired Sarah Ferguson, or "Fergie" as she was dubbed by the press.

They separated in 1992, not long after he moved to a desk job at the Ministry of Defence so he could be at home more. It was a year of travails and scandals for the royal family which the queen described as an "annus horribilis".

Andrew was said to be devastated by the break-up from his wife, who described him as a gentle man who deserved to be loved.

The couple had two children, Beatrice and Eugenie, and the family remained close and on good terms after they divorced in 1996, going on holiday togeth-

er and sharing the same house.

'AIR MILES ANDY'

After leaving the military, Andrew's personal life still hit the headlines. Tabloids linked him to a series of women, from swimwear models to entrepreneurs. Photographs appeared of Andrew cavorting on yachts or sunbathing
