13 yrs on, another Nirbhaya

Faridabad, Dec 31: A woman was allegedly gangraped in a moving van through the night and thrown out of the speeding vehicle, suffering serious head and facial injuries, on a desolate road by two men who have since been arrested, police said Wednesday.

The assault of the mother of three, which brings back the horror of the Nirbhaya rape on another cold December night 13 years ago, took place in the early hours of Tuesday on the winding, little populated Gurgaon-Faridabad road, officials said.

Faridabad police produced the two accused, one from Uttar Pradesh and the other from Madhya Pradesh, in a city court Wednesday and sent them into judicial custody, they said.

The 25-year-old, who had been living at her parents' home after troubles with her husband, suffered severe injuries to her head and face, which required more than 12 stitches. She has been admitted to a private hospital in Faridabad, adjoining the national capital. Her condition is critical, and she is not yet fit to record a statement, a police official said.

Recapping what had hap-



pened, police said the two men, who live in Faridabad, offered her a lift while she was waiting for transport. Instead of taking her to her destination, the two men drove towards Gurugram and raped her inside the van.

She was driven around through the night and thrown out of the vehicle that was moving at a speed of over 90 kmph near Raja Chowk in Faridabad around 3am. Bleeding profusely, the woman managed to call her sister, who reached the spot and took her to the Badshah Khan Civil Hospital.

Given the seriousness of her injuries, the doctors advised that she be taken to Delhi, but the family admitted her to the private hospital. A doctor at the hospital said she had suffered significant injuries, including broken facial cavities and a dislocated shoulder.

"Women feel unsafe and criminals are emboldened under the BJP rule," Harryana Congress alleged.

CENTRE APPROVES NH-326 UPGRADE

New Delhi: The Union Cabinet Wednesday approved the widening and strengthening of NH-326 in Odisha, upgrading the existing two-lane stretch to a two-lane highway with paved shoulder from 68.600 km to 311.700 km under the EPC mode. According to an official statement, the total capital cost for the project is ₹1,526.21 crore, which includes a civil construction cost of ₹966.79 crore. The statement said the upgradation of NH-326 will make travel faster, safer, and more reliable, resulting in overall development of southern Odisha, particularly benefiting the districts of Gajapati, Rayagada, and Koraput.

2 held with 150 kg ammonium nitrate

Tonk (Raj), Dec 31: A massive haul of 150 kg of explosives along with 200 cartridges and six bundles of safety fuse wire was seized from a car, police here said Wednesday.

The police said two people have also been arrested, adding that preliminary investigation has suggested that the explosives were meant for blasting at illegal mining sites in the Aravallis.

Further investigation is underway to ascertain the source, destination, intended use and possible links of the seized explosive material, they said.

The accused have been identified as Surendra Patwa and Surendra Mochi, both residents of Bundi district, the police said. DSP Tonk City Mrityunjay Mishra said the accused were transporting the explosive material from Bundi to Tonk.

During patrolling on the National Highway-52 (Tonk-Jaipur), the accused told police they were carrying fertiliser for agricultural purposes in sacks. However, on inspection, ammonium nitrate was found

In a first, SC holds vacation benches amid winter break

New Delhi, Dec 31: The Supreme Court has held vacation courts for the first time with Chief Justice of India Surya Kant himself sitting twice during the winter break to hear urgent matters involving life and liberty as well as those requiring immediate judicial intervention.

The top court holds vacation benches during longer summer break, which has now been rechristened as partial court working days, but this year was the first instance when the apex court held vacation benches even in a shorter winter break.

The Supreme Court was closed for Christmas and New Year holidays from December 22 to January 2, 2026. It will reopen January 5.

Justice Surya Kant, who was sworn in as Chief Justice of India November 24, had made it clear December 19 that vacation benches including him will be sitting during the winter break to hear urgent matters. A statement issued by the top court said that special sittings had been arranged to ensure timely consideration of pressing cases that required immediate judicial intervention.

■ INDIA-PAK MEDIATION CLAIMS

After US, now China

Beijing, Dec 31: After US President Donald Trump's 70-odd assertions, China has now claimed a role in "mediating" a ceasefire between India and Pakistan, drawing a sharp contrast with New Delhi's insistence that there was no third-party intervention in bringing the conflict to a pause.

Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi Tuesday said "tensions between India and Pakistan" were among the list of hotspot issues "mediated" by China this year.

New Delhi has been maintaining that the May 7-10 conflict between India and Pakistan was resolved through direct talks between the DGMOs (Director General of Military Operations) of the armies of the two countries.

At the May 13 press briefing, the Ministry of External Affairs had said, "regarding ceasefire and what sort of role other countries played, etc. See, the specific date, time and wording of the understanding was worked out between the DGMOs of the two countries at their phone call on 10th May 2025, commencing at 1535 hours."

India has also been consistently maintaining that there is no place for any third-party intervention in matters relating to India and Pakistan.

"This year, local wars and cross-border conflicts



flared up more often than at any time since the end of WWII. Geopolitical turbulence continued to spread", Wang said, speaking at the Symposium on the International Situation and China's Foreign Relations in Beijing.

"To build peace that lasts, we have taken an objective and just stance, and focused on addressing both symptoms and root causes", he added.

Following this Chinese approach to settling hotspot issues, we mediated in northern Myanmar,

the Iranian nuclear issue, the tensions between Pakistan and India, the issues between Palestine and Israel, and the recent conflict between Cambodia and Thailand", he said.

China's role in the May 7-10 Operation Sindoor conflict between India and Pakistan this year came under serious scrutiny and criticism, especially the military assistance provided by Beijing to Islamabad.

On the diplomatic front, China May 7 called on India and Pakistan to exercise restraint even while expressing regret over India's airstrikes.

But China's active military support to Pakistan during the Operation Sindoor in May has become a sharp reminder about the negative impact of China-Pakistan close ties on Beijing's relations with New Delhi.

SJTA stops calendar sale over pic

Bhubaneswar, Dec 31: Authorities of Srimandir in Puri Wednesday tendered an apology to the public and stopped the sale of calendars with a picture of the sibling deities in wrong positions on the 'Ratna Singhasan' (bejewelled throne), the chief administrator of the temple has asked officials concerned to 'suspend the sale of the calendars and issue an apology for this unintentional mistake', the SJTA said.

The BJD termed the change of position of the deities in the calendar picture as 'extremely unfortunate'.

"In the illustrations, Lord Balabhadra has been placed in the position of

Lord Jagannath and vice versa. As a result, Goddess Subhadra is shown with Lord Jagannath on her right side and Lord Balabhadra on her left, which is contrary to tradition," BJD spokesperson Lenin Mohanty told reporters.

He said the erroneous image has reportedly been printed on table and wall calendars, and in diaries released by the temple administration.

He alleged that the SJTA did not consult intellectuals before using the old painting in the calendar.

"Such mistakes reflect a lack of sensitivity towards Jagannath Culture and Odia Asmita," the BJD leader alleged.

Puri under tight security for New Year

Puri, Dec 31: Puri was placed under an unprecedented security blanket Wednesday as thousands of people thronged the pilgrim town to celebrate the New Year (NY) and seek the blessings of Lord Jagannath.

Anticipating the arrival of over 3.5 lakh people to the holy city Wednesday night and Thursday, the administration has deployed around 70 platoons (2,100 personnel) force, installed over 300 CCTV cameras and engaged around 300 lifeguards on the beach to make the New Year's



celebrations safe, Puri SP Prateek Singh said.

"The administration is taking no chances this time, especially in view of the irregularities witnessed during this year's Rath Yatra," a district official said, adding that

extensive arrangements have been made as many devotees wished to begin the New Year with the darshan of the Trinity – Lord Balabhadra, Devi Subhadra and Lord Jagannath.

Shree Jagannath Tem-

ple Administration (SJTA) Chief Administrator Arabinda Padhee said the temple gates would open for devotees from 2am Thursday.

As large numbers of devotees queue up for darshan, Padhee said the temple doors would remain closed from 11pm to 2am for religious rituals.

Puri district Collector Dibya Jyoti Parida has cancelled the leaves of all government employees in the temple town till January 4 and urged them to help the administration in managing the crowd and traffic.

Police personnel have

been deployed both inside and outside the temple, and the entire shrine has been brought under CCTV surveillance.

A total of 344 cameras have been installed in and around the temple premises, an official said.

The Puri SP said 152 cameras were installed inside the temple, while 192 were placed outside to monitor crowd movement and traffic.

This apart, Odisha Fire Service has also engaged additional life guards on the beach as a large number of people take bath in the sea as part of New Year celebrations.

City AIIMS performs first liver transplant

Bhubaneswar, Dec 31: All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS)-Bhubaneswar has successfully conducted its first-ever liver transplant procedure on a 37-year-old man from Puri's Pipili recently reaffirming its commitment to delivering advanced and life-saving medical services to the people of Odisha and neighbouring states, the hospital authorities said Wednesday.

The recipient is recovering well and the donor, 30, the recipient's younger brother, has also made an uneventful recovery. The recipient's brother donated a portion of his liver purely out of a sense of duty and affection, without any financial or material consideration. The surgery team, comprising of more than 50 members, took nearly 14 hours to complete the process, said AIIMS-Bhubaneswar Executive Director Dr Ashutosh Biswas.

In order to ensure excellence and sustainable capacity building, AIIMS-Bhubaneswar had entered into a pact with the Institute of Liver and Biliary Sciences (ILBS)-New Delhi, the country's premier public sector institute dedicated

exclusively to liver and biliary diseases.

The Liver Transplant Programme at AIIMS-Bhubaneswar, which was conceptualised in 2023, received the official license to initiate the programme in the same year. Later, the Liver Transplant Outpatient Department (OPD) became operational February 21, 2025. Further strengthening the transplant services, a 10-bed transplant Intensive Care Unit (ICU) has been fully operational since November 2025.

The procedure was performed by the Department of Surgical Gastroenterology, led by Dr Brahmaddatta Pattaikai, Head- GI & Liver Transplant Surgery, along with Dr Tanmay Datta and Dr Sunita Gupta, under the mentored guidance of Prof Dr Vinayendra Pamecha, Head of Liver Transplant Surgery, ILBS-New Delhi, and his expert team. Dr. Subrat Kumar Sahoo, a trained paediatric liver transplant surgeon, was also a key member of the surgical team.

The programme received institutional support from Medical Superintendent Dr Dilip Kumar Parida, DDA Lt Col Abhijit Sarkar, Dr Manoj Kumar Mohanty, Head of the Department of Paediatric Surgery and OT Committee Chairman.



Student collapses during annual sports meet, dies

Sundargarh, Dec 31: A tragic incident occurred during the annual sports meet at Bhawanipur Eklavya Model School in Sundargarh district Wednesday, when a student collapsed while running and later died at hospital.

The deceased was identified as Jayadeep Sagar Beck, 18, a Plus II first-year Science student of the school. He was the only son of Phagunath Beck and Suktanti Beck. According to sources, Jayadeep was participating in the two-day annual sports meet held on the campus playground beginning Tuesday. While taking part in the 200-metre relay race, he completed one round of 100 metres before suddenly sitting down on the track and collapsing. oped physical complications Wednesday, teachers, school staff and the on-duty nurse, along with the school principal, rushed him to Government Medical College and Hospital,

Sundargarh. However, doctors declared him dead on arrival.

Following the incident, officials including Town Police Station personnel, PA-ITDA Dhirendra Kumar Sethi and district social welfare officer (DSWO) Bhagirathi Patel reached the hospital on the direction of District Collector Shubhankar Mohapatra to assess the situation and conduct a preliminary inquiry.

Speaking to reporters, the school principal confirmed that Jayadeep collapsed during the relay race and was rushed to the hospital, where doctors pronounced him dead.

Police seized the body, conducted a postmortem and handed over the body to the family members in the evening. An unnatural death case has been registered and investigation is underway. The DSWO said after receipt of the postmortem report, the deceased student's family would be provided ₹5 lakh as ex gratia assistance.



This writer and the sitting MP are now piecing together the full text, searching for an overlooked exit clause that allows the region to "withdraw" if promises are broken. Whether dusty parchment can still compel Bhubaneswar—and Delhi—to deliver overdue justice is the question the district has waited three generations to answer.

From 598 AD, when Maharaja Jai Singh founded the realm, until 1949, Mayurbhanj stood as one of India's best-administered princely states. That year Maharaja Sir Pratap Chandra Bhanj Deo signed the Instrument of Merger with Union Home Secretary MK Vellodi, and the kingdom was reduced to a mere district of Orissa (now Odisha). Overnight, tehsils such as Behragora, Chinchda, Gopiballavpur, Mankidia, Raibania, Ulmara, Khud, Khandamauda, Dhalbhumgarh, Seraikela and Kharswan were excised for "administrative convenience" and appended to Bihar (today's Jharkhand) and West Bengal, and Balasore district of Odisha. In a single stroke, a coherent state was carved into fragments.



New Delhi, Dec 31: The Congress Wednesday termed Chinese claims of mediation between India and Pakistan concerning and said the people of India need clarity on the issue.

Congress general secretary Jairam Ramesh asked Prime Minister Narendra Modi to break his silence on the claim, which he said seemed to make a joke of the country's national security.

"President Trump has long claimed that he personally

intervened to halt Operation Sindoar May 10, 2025. He has done so on 65 different occasions in various forums in at least seven different countries. The Prime Minister has never broken his silence on these claims made by his so-called good friend," Ramesh said in a post on X.

Centre bans high-dose nimesulide oral drugs over health risk concerns

New Delhi: The Union Health Ministry has banned the manufacture, sale and distribution of all oral formulations containing the popular painkiller nimesulide above 100 mg, citing serious risks to health, an official notification said. The decision was taken following a recommendation by ICMR, the apex health research body of India, it said. "The Central government is satisfied that the use of all oral formulations containing Nimesulide above 100 mg in immediate release dosage form is likely to involve risk to human beings and that safer alternatives to the said drug are available," the notification issued Monday said. It stated that it is necessary and expedient in the public interest to prohibit the manufacture, sale and distribution of the drug in the country for human use.

Water contamination: Death toll reaches 7

Indore: Seven persons have died so far due to diarrhoea and vomiting after allegedly consuming contaminated water in Indore city of Madhya Pradesh, its Mayor Pushyamitra Bhargava confirmed Wednesday amid conflicting claims over the number of fatalities. "The health department has reported three deaths due to the diarrhoea outbreak in the Bhagirathpura area. But to my knowledge, four more people suffering from the disease were brought to hospitals and they too died," he told reporters. Bhargava said a preliminary assessment suggested that drainage water entered the drinking water pipeline due to leakage, which triggered an outbreak of diarrhoea and vomiting in the Bhagirathpura area. Meanwhile, District Magistrate Shivam Verma said doctors have confirmed four deaths due to the diarrhoea outbreak caused by contaminated drinking water. He said 149 patients suffering from the disease have been admitted to 27 hospitals across the city and their health condition is being monitored.

Nightclub fire: Probe finds safety lapses

Panaji, Dec 31: The Goa nightclub, where a deadly fire killed 25 people in early December, was built illegally on salt pan and allowed to operate without a valid trade licence, pointing to serious lapses and collusion at multiple official levels, said a government-constituted magisterial inquiry's report.

The probe report, made public Wednesday, noted the ill-fated structure stood in the middle of a salt pan and was "not permissible under any law".

The 'Birch by Romeo Lane' nightclub, located in Arpora village in North Goa, continued to run illegally without a valid licence and no action was taken by the local panchayat to seal the property, said the report.

According to a police report cited in the inquiry, ordered by the state government after the tragedy, fireworks were organised at the establishment "without taking proper care and caution" and without adequate fire safety equipment, triggering the blaze December 6 night.

The report, placed before a review meeting chaired by Chief Minister Pramod Sawant in the presence of senior officials, states that the revised site sketch "depicts the hexagonal structure at the middle of salt pan/water body."

"This clearly establishes that the structure is situated at the middle of the salt pan/water body which is not permissible to be erected under any law in force either now or earlier. Converting salt pan is in violation of Section 32 of Land Revenue Code as well as Coastal Zone Regulations," it observed.

The state government Wednesday released the entire report to the media. The inquiry recorded that the village panchayat of Arpora Nagao issued an establishment licence December 16, 2023, to "Being GS Hospitality Goa Arpora LLP" for running a bar and restaurant-cum-nightclub, valid until March 31, 2024. The licence was not renewed thereafter.

88 injured in loco train collision inside Chamoli project tunnel

Gopeshwar/Dehradun, Dec 31: Chamoli District Magistrate Gaurav Kumar Wednesday ordered a magisterial inquiry into the collision between two loco trains inside the Pipalkoti tunnel of the under-construction Vishnugad-Pipalkoti hydropower project, which left 88 people injured.

Earlier in the day, Kumar said that the accident occurred around 8.30 pm Tuesday at the TBM (Tunnel Boring Machine) site inside the tunnel being built by THDC (India).

A loco train carrying workers for tunnel excavation during the night shift was about two kilometres inside the tunnel when another loco train coming from the opposite direction lost control and collided with it.

One of the trains had workers and officials on board, while the other carried material. Upon receiving information about the collision, Uttarakhand Chief Minister Pushkar Singh Dhami ordered proper treatment for the injured. He spoke to the DM over the phone and instructed him to ensure that all the injured receive the best possible medical facilities.

DM Kumar and Superintendent of Police Surjit Singh Panwar met the injured at the Gopeshwar District Hospital.

Kumar said 109 people were on board the loco train at the time of the accident, most of them labourers. None of the injured was serious, he said.

He said that 88 of them were injured, although none of them are in serious condition. They said that 84 workers were discharged after receiving first aid, while four are still hospitalized.

DM Kumar and SP Panwar also inspected the project site and sought detailed information about the incident from the project officials.

They instructed them to strictly implement all necessary safety standards to prevent a recurrence of such an incident in the future.



Financing Security

Intensifying great-power rivalries have made increased defense spending a priority that few states dare to question. This growing sense of insecurity propelled global military spending, which increased by 37% from 2015 to 2024, when it reached \$2.7 trillion – a sum almost equivalent to Africa's entire GDP.

The NATO alliance accounted for over 50% of this spending, with most of its members investing more in defense at the expense of other public spending. In Canada, the United Kingdom, and Germany, foreign aid has taken a hit. Tepid public support for such programming makes it politically expendable, while security anxieties and the search for a defense-industrial boom fuel military spending.

Yet surging military budgets have not improved global security. Instead, military investment increases instability, destroys ecosystems, fuels arms races, and heightens conflict risks. It can also indirectly crowd out public investment in a guns-versus-butter tradeoff. The financing gap for the non-climate-related Sustainable Development Goals would have easily been closed in 2024 if the increases in defense spending had been redirected for that purpose. And since sectoral investments in health, education, and energy infrastructure have larger "fiscal multipliers" than military spending, these investments would likely have boosted GDP by more than we can expect defense spending to.

Public investment in human capital and infrastructure builds resilience and makes it more likely that societies will resolve disputes without violence and displacement. Most countries' biggest security risks are not territorial; they are threats like pandemics, climate change, and cyberterrorism. An aid-for-defense swap may be politically rational, but it amounts to robbing Peter (a resilience-based multidimensional understanding of security) to pay Paul (a narrow, militarized understanding).

The development-finance gaps resulting from this swap are unlikely to be funded by private sources. Fragile countries tend to be more dependent on grants and highly concessional loans, and social sectors generally do not generate the kinds of returns that private investors seek. That is why countries like Haiti and Sudan have long struggled to attract foreign direct investment, and why infrastructure projects in larger and less risky emerging markets appeal to private investors.

Now, pension funds, insurance companies, and banks are rushing to seize opportunities created by increased public-sector investments in defense, some of which are being directed by new multilateral entities like the Defense, Security and Resilience Bank. Stimulating such capital flows raises questions about the future of global ESG (environmental, social, and governance) investment frameworks, which have typically assigned defense industries a higher risk, owing to uncertainties about their business ethics, product use, governance, and environmental impact.

Security financing does not have to be a zero-sum game. An improved defense financing framework could help us address the complexities of today's collective security challenges.

A better approach would have three pillars. First, it would embrace a more multidimensional perspective on security. In June, NATO members agreed to spend 5% of their GDP on defense by 2035, with 3.5% of GDP focused on core defense and 1.5% on security-related spending to "protect our critical infrastructure, defend our networks, ensure our civil preparedness and resilience, unleash innovation, and strengthen our defense industrial base." For now, at least, the 1.5% is more focused on civilian defense than a holistic understanding of security.

We have already seen creative accounting practices to minimize the fiscal burden of the higher target, as in the case of Italy's effort to include a \$15.8 billion suspension bridge. Moreover, direct contributions toward Ukraine's defense will count toward the 5% target, providing a template for funding future military operations elsewhere in the world. In a promising sign, some NATO members are now exploring whether development spending in security-adjacent areas like international peacekeeping missions, early-warning systems for climate shocks, and resilient supply chains for essential medicines and vaccines might count toward the 1.5% target. But while shoehorning these budget lines into NATO's accounting framework could protect them from cuts, it might also jeopardize the integrity of standardized defense accounting if the boundaries of "security-related" remain unclear. It also raises the likelihood of "securitizing" aid and politicizing engagement in ways that will endanger lives.

A better approach, then, is to measure the full spectrum of national inputs for global security and assess their value in terms of military defense and deterrence, as well as economic growth and resilience. As the 2030 deadline for achieving the SDGs approaches, a multidimensional perspective on security could be a good starting point for discussing its successor framework.

The second pillar is a modern security financing framework featuring more transparent estimates of defense investment needs. In NATO's case, these are classified, even though transparent national estimates of minimum defense-investment requirements are key to preventing waste and ensuring that spending deters legitimate threats without raising the likelihood of conflict.

Setting military-spending targets as a share of GDP assumes that countries should spend whatever they can afford on defense, rather than focusing on what they (or their allies) actually need to contain genuine threats. Such a crude formula for burden-sharing inevitably militarizes economies by turning weapons proliferation and global conflict into industrial and commercial advantages. Input spending targets incentivize quick disbursements that can jeopardize procurement processes intended to ensure value for money.

Releasing aggregate estimates of true defense needs should be possible without compromising national security. Doing so would ensure accountability for defense outlays and allow for multidimensional security investment that targets both military and non-military threats.

The third pillar comprises stronger fiscal safeguards for key spending priorities. Global defense spending now outpaces development aid by 13 to one, a trend that is already generating ripple effects – from diplomatic layoffs to the collapse of global health investment. The opportunity cost of such massive defense investments could well be global cooperation itself. But some countries are seeking a better way. "We are building weapons, when we should be building social infrastructure," warned South African President Cyril Ramaphosa at last year's United Nations General Assembly, echoing concerns made by Brazil, Kazakhstan, and Nepal (among others). For her part, Mexican President Claudia Sheinbaum, recognizing the symbiotic relationship between diplomacy, defense, and development, has proposed that G20 members earmark 1% of their military spending for sustainable development.

International cooperation is at a turning point, with the Global North far more committed to funding defense than defending development. A 21st-century approach to financing security threats should ensure that defense and development pull in the same direction.

REFORMS IN BITS & PIECES

We head into the New Year with India continuing to be the fastest growing large economy in a world marked by challenges. The latest World Economic Outlook of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) indicated a continued slowdown in global economic growth, with risks remaining tilted to the downside. This came amid the disruptions brought by US tariffs, which also brought 25% extra tariffs on Indian goods, making it a total of 50% on goods exported by India to the US. On 28 November 2025, the National Statistical Office (NSO) announced 8.2% GDP growth for Q2 of FY26. The growth in the face of a global slowdown, the punishing Trump tariffs and the 7.8% GDP growth of Q1 FY26, is noteworthy. GDP growth has been contributed by all three sectors of the economy – primary-agriculture at 3.5%, secondary-industry at 7.7% & manufacturing at 9.1% and tertiary-services at 9.2%, indicating that the core of the economy is robust.

Skeptics about these numbers and the upgrade in the GDP growth rate are not far to seek. Recently, the IMF rated India's GDP data quality as 'C', a low mark. "Economic change in all periods, depends more than most economists think, on what people believe," wrote Joel Mokyr, the 2025 Nobel Laureate in Economics in the opening of his book, "The Enlightened Economy: An Economic History of Britain 1700-1850," published in 2010. We may ask: what do people believe in the case of the India growth story?

With the revival of the economy post pandemic, GDP growth of India has been exceeding expectations of economists and analysts year after year. GDP growth of 9.2% in FY24 was dismissed as a statistical mirage driven by very low deflators and it was predicted that GDP growth would come down to earth the following year. But in FY25, India delivered a GDP growth of 6.5%,

taking the average growth of two years to 7.85%, far beyond the deflator washout hypothesis.

India's long term GDP growth since 2000 has been 6.5%. Seemingly, India's potential GDP growth has moved up to over 7%.

What is adding up to this surmise is an array of reforms and affirmative actions taken by the government in the last decade. Macro-economic reforms include the consolidation of the fragmented indirect tax regime into GST and its rationalisation this year, legislative creation of the Exit Policy-Bankruptcy Code, Real Estate Regulatory Authority and Monetary Policy Committee.

India has since comprehensively transited from fragile five in 2013 to an enviable economically stable geography represented by low inflation, low fiscal deficit, contained debt (just about 80%) to GDP ratio, durable current account deficit and high forex reserves of over \$600 billion.

The RBI's State of the Economy paper published in December noted, "Continued focus on macro-economic fundamentals and economic reforms should help unlock efficiencies and productive gains to firmly keep the economy on high-growth trajectory amidst a fast-changing global environment." These major reforms have been supplemented by the cleanup of balance sheets of banks and corporates, creation of national digital public

infrastructure to bridge the digital divide, a major shift in public expenditure from revenue heavy to capital formation-infrastructure build up and the steady decline of fiscal deficit of 500 basis points reduction in five years.

In addition, some of the affirmative action schemes like Lakhpati Didis, Mudra Loans, and support to Farmers' Producers' Organizations (FPO) launched in the last decade are now playing out. It is estimated that at the end of 2025, there were one crore Lakhpati Didis as against the target of three crore. By now, 52 crore Mudra loans amounting to Rs 33 lakh crore have been disbursed. National Agriculture Market, known as 'e-NAM', India's electronic trading portal that networks existing Agriculture Produce Market Committees and individual farmers, making it a unified national market for agricultural commodities, has been put on a robust frame.

Confidence amongst professionals and institutions in the stable public policies is validated in part by the growing number of Global Capacity Centres built in India. Currently, there are nearly 1,800 GCCs employing over 19 lakh people which generated revenue of \$64.6 billion by 2024. The number of GCCs continues to grow year after year and the revenue expected by 2030 is \$100 billion. 'Jan Viswas' steps like

self-attestation, self-assessment, decriminalization of hundreds of offenses/lapses, push for refund of public moneys by banks, insurance companies and mutual funds, and tax authorities seem to indicate that direction of governance is moving, albeit slowly, from policing to an administrative state. Implementation of recently announced labour reforms, the Gauba Committee recommendations focusing on easing the burden for MSMEs, Securities Market Code and SAKTI legislation will likely aid growth.

These steps are leading to growing economic engagement, improving infrastructure, declining logistics cost, reducing financial repression and rising incremental capital output ratio (INCOR). Whereas these reforms may not look like the Big Bang reforms of 1991, the trail of bits and pieces of incremental steps seem to be favourably influencing the potential GDP growth of India.

However, lifting the potential GDP growth to over 8%, the minimum required rate for achieving developed economy status by 2047, warrants factor and institutional reforms covering the judiciary, public administration, police, among others, in addition to land reforms, electricity reforms. These are essential for the reduction in time and cost of enforcement of contracts, land acquisition, ease in the delivery of public service and raising of total factor productivity. It is important to note that currently only one of the investment engines is firing at full throttle. This is the public sector. Public investments have budgetary limitations. Private sector investments continue to be sluggish even now. The government must engage with trade and industry bodies to understand why this is so and take appropriate measures to spur private sector investment. This is India's moment to capitalize the demography and build a prosperous nation.

100% FDI in insurance: Promises & perils



INDIA'S INSURANCE PENETRATION CURRENTLY STANDS AT A MODEST 3.7% TO 4%, SIGNIFICANTLY TRAILING THE GLOBAL AVERAGE OF 7.4%

The global insurance narrative is a study in contrasts between maturity and untapped potential. In advanced economies, insurance is a foundational pillar of the financial system, with the ratio of premiums to GDP often exceeding 7% to 9%. In these markets, insurance is not merely a tax-saving tool but a sophisticated mechanism for risk management and long-term wealth preservation.

Conversely, India has historically occupied the other end of the spectrum. Despite being the world's most populous nation and its fastest-growing major economy, India's insurance penetration currently stands at a modest 3.7% to 4%, significantly trailing the global average of 7.4%. For decades, the Indian insurance sector was a state-guarded fortress. It was only in 2000 that the gates were cautiously opened to private players with a 26% FDI cap. This threshold was raised to 49% in 2015 and 74% in 2021, each step bringing a surge of capital and expertise.

However, the most definitive shift occurred in late 2025 with the passage of the Sabka Bima Sabki Raksha (Amendment of Insurance Laws) Bill, which officially

permits 100% FDI in the sector. This landmark reform signals India's transition from a protective stance to one of full global integration, aiming to achieve Insurance for All by 2047.

The logic behind allowing total foreign ownership is rooted in the 'patient capital' requirement of the industry. Insurance is a capital-intensive business with long gestation periods, often taking seven to ten years before a company turns profitable. Domestic promoters often find it challenging to continuously infuse the massive capital required to maintain solvency margins as they scale.

The advantages of this liberalization are multifaceted. First is the infusion of global best practices and technology. International players bring advanced AI-driven underwriting, sophisticated risk models, and seamless digital claims processing.

This is expected to bridge the 'trust deficit' in the Indian market, where consumers have long been wary of cumbersome claim settlements. Second, competition is the greatest catalyst for innovation. With 100% ownership, global firms are more likely to introduce 'niche' products such as parametric insurance

for climate-affected farmers, cyber-risk covers for small businesses and 'sachet-sized' micro-insurance which were previously considered too risky or low-margin by domestic players.

Furthermore, the reform facilitates the introduction of composite licenses, allowing a single company to offer life, health and general insurance under one roof. This structural efficiency is expected to drive down operational costs, a benefit that will eventually be passed on to the consumer in the form of lower premiums. From a macroeconomic perspective, the inflow of stable FDI will help stabilize the rupee and provide long-term funding necessary for India's massive infrastructure projects, as insurance funds are typically invested in long-dated government and corporate bonds.

However, the path to 100% FDI is not without its thorns. A primary concern is the potential for predatory pricing. Deep-pocketed global conglomerates could theoretically underprice their products to gain market share, threatening the viability of smaller Indian firms. There is also the risk of 'cherry-picking,' where foreign insurers focus exclusively on high-margin, affluent

urban 'creamy layer,' neglecting the rural and social sectors that need protection the most.

Another point of contention is repatriation of profits. While the 2025 Bill includes 'guardrails' requiring companies to invest the entirety of their premium collections within India, the eventual outflow of dividends to foreign headquarters could impact the current account in the long run. There are also valid anxieties regarding data sovereignty and the protection of sensitive personal and health information of millions of Indian citizens when managed by fully foreign-owned entities.

As India embarks on this new chapter, the role of the regulator, IRDAI, becomes paramount. The transition from a rule-based to a risk-based supervisory framework will be essential to manage the complexities that global giants bring. If executed with transparency and robust oversight, this reform could be the catalyst that finally turns India into a truly 'insured' society, where every citizen has a shield against the uncertainties of tomorrow.

Odisha Budget 26-27

The Annual Budget 2026-27 will be presented in the Odisha Legislative Assembly in the month of February, 2026.

As Odisha aims to become a USD 500 billion economy by 2036, and to grow into a USD 1.5 trillion economy by 2047, these economic ambitions should be anchored in an inclusive development: creating over a crore of new jobs, ensuring quality education and healthcare, and leading the nation in green energy, tourism, manufacturing, and technology.

We can expect to see an increased expenditure in these sectors in the upcoming Budget.

SCBMCH to turn AIIMS++

SCB Medical College and Hospital (SCBMCH) in Cuttack is set to turn into an AIIMS++ level institution soon. It is targeted for completion by June 2026. Upgraded at a cost of Rs 4,474.49 crore, the hospital's bed capacity will surge to 3,796, enhancing specialised care and medical education infrastructure.

The revamp includes modern facilities such as advanced diagnostic centres, upgraded surgical units, and expanded academic spaces. Further, SCB MCH's elevation to AIIMS++ standards aligns with the state's goal to establish it as a regional healthcare hub.

Boost for road infra with RVEC

The Raipur-Vishakhapatnam Economic Corridor (RVEC), a 6-lane highway project, is set for completion by December 2026, significantly reducing travel time through tribal districts of Odisha. It stretches across the forests of Chhattisgarh, mineral-rich landscapes of Odisha and hills of Andhra Pradesh. The corridor is being built at a total cost of Rs 16,482 crore and is expected to be completed by December 2026. It is set

to cut down the distance from 597 km with the existing NH-26 to 465 km — saving 132 km in distance and nearly seven hours of travel time.

AI in school curriculum

The Ministry of Education's new curriculum, which integrates Artificial Intelligence (AI) and Computational Thinking for students from Class 3 onwards, is set to begin implementation in the 2026-27 academic year in collaboration with state governments.



Bangladesh general election February 12

General elections are scheduled to be held in Bangladesh February 12, 2026 to elect members of the Jatiya Sangsad. This election will determine the next Government of Bangladesh. The vote will take place under the interim government led by Muhammad Yunus, which has governed the country since August 2024. A constitutional referendum on the July Charter will be held alongside the election. Major parties are expected to contest, however, the Awami League, the winner of previous four elections, is currently suspended, and is not participating in the election. A total of 2,582 candidates are contesting for 300 seats in this election.


Battle of Galwan


Dune: Part Three

Union Budget

While parliamentary conventions suggest the FM could still present it Sunday (as happened during special sessions in 2012 and 2020), the Cabinet Committee on Parliamentary Affairs will make the final call in January. If postponed, it will be moved to Monday, February 2.

GAGANYAN UNCREWED MISSIONS (G1 & G2): The primary focus is executing uncrewed orbital flights to test critical systems—such as life support, re-entry, and crew escape mechanisms—before the planned 2027 crewed mission.

COMMERCIAL & SCIENTIFIC PAYLOADS: ISRO aims to launch several commercial satellites and technology demonstrators using PSLV and GSLV rockets to boost the country's space economy.

ADITYA-L1 SOLAR MISSION: The solar observatory will continue its operations, with 2026 expected to be a critical year for observing maximum solar activity.

Govt freezes VI's dues

New Delhi: The government Wednesday approved a major relief package for Vodafone Idea, freezing its outstanding AGR dues, approving a five-year moratorium on payment, and clearing the way for reassessment of the capped statutory charge - giving a critical lifeline to the beleaguered telco. The relief measures approved by the Union Cabinet aim to protect the interest of the government (which has about 48.9 per cent stake in the telco), enable orderly payment of dues to the Centre by way of spectrum auction charges and AGR dues, ensure competition in the sector and safeguard the interests of 20 crore consumers of Vodafone Idea, according to sources. The Cabinet, headed by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, agreed to freeze AGR dues of Vodafone Idea at Rs 87,695 crore, which the struggling company now has to start paying from 2031-32 fiscal and clear by 2040-41, sources aware of the decision said.

Centre rolls out ₹4,531cr export aid

New Delhi: The government Wednesday launched Rs 4,531 crore market access support for exporters under which financial support will be provided to participate in activities such as international fairs and exhibitions. It will help exporters at a time when they are facing a steep 50 per cent tariff by the US. The measure is a part of the Rs 25,060-crore export promotion mission, which is aimed at enhancing competitiveness of Indian exporters. It has 11 components. Market Access Support (MAS) is the first component of the mission that has been operationalised from Wednesday and the remainder will be rolled out by January-end, Director General of Foreign Trade Ajay Badhoo said.

Hyundai to hike prices around 0.6%

New Delhi: Hyundai Motor India Ltd Wednesday said it will increase prices by around 0.6 per cent across its model range, effective from January 1, 2026, citing a rise in the cost of precious metals and commodities. The company will implement a weighted-average price increase of around 0.6 per cent across its model range due to the rise in the cost of precious metals and commodities, Hyundai Motor India Ltd said.

Shares advance in year's final session

Stock markets rally nearly 1%; Nifty jumps 10.50% annually

Mumbai, Dec 31: Equity benchmark indices Sensex and Nifty jumped nearly 1 per cent Wednesday, the final trading session of 2025, driven by sustained buying by domestic institutional investors and strong gains in Reliance, Tata Steel and Kotak Bank.

Following a subdued trend in equity markets recently, value buying emerged in energy, PSU banks, metal and consumer durable counters, which pushed indices higher, traders said.

After five days of decline, the 30-share BSE Sensex jumped 545.52 points, or 0.64 per cent, to settle at 85,220.60. During the day, it surged 762.09 points, or 0.90 per cent, to 85,437.17.

A total of 2,799 stocks advanced, while 1,413 declined and 162 remained unchanged on the BSE.

The 50-share NSE Nifty soared 190.75 points, or 0.74 per cent, to end at 26,129.60 after four days of decline.

From the 30-Sensex firms, Tata Steel, Kotak Mahindra Bank, Reliance Industries, Axis Bank, Titan and Trent were among the biggest gainers.

However, Tata Consultancy Services, Tech Mahindra, Infosys, Bajaj Finance and Sun Pharma were the laggards.

"Indian equity benchmarks rebounded sharply on Wednesday, snapping their recent losing streaks as strong buying in metal stocks lifted overall sentiment. Sentiment was further aided by a mild decline in crude oil prices, which helped

Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) offloaded equities worth Rs 3,844.02 crore on Tuesday, while Domestic Institutional Investors (DIIs) bought stocks worth Rs 6,159.81 crore, according to exchange data.

Falling for the fifth consecutive day Tuesday, the Sensex dipped 20.46 points or 0.02 per cent to settle at 84,675.08. The Nifty skidded 3.25 points or 0.01 per cent to 25,938.85.

Zomato, Swiggy boost rider incentives

New Delhi, Dec 31: Food delivery platforms Zomato and Swiggy are offering more incentives to their delivery partners, a standard practice they follow on festive periods, to ensure minimal disruptions in services on New Year's Eve amid strike call by gig workers' unions.

Telangana Gig and Platform Workers' Union (TGPWU) and Indian Federation of App-Based Transport Workers (IFAT) have claimed that lakhs of workers are set to join the nationwide strike to demand better payouts and improved working conditions.

The strike may affect the operations of food delivery and quick commerce firms like Zomato, Swiggy, Blinkit, Instamart and Zepto on New Year's Eve, when demand is at an all-time high, according to industry sources.

Zomato has offered delivery

"This is part of our standard annual operating protocol during festive periods, which typically see higher earning opportunities due to increased demand," an External spokesperson told PTI.

External owns Zomato and Blinkit brands.

Similarly, Swiggy has also increased incentives around the year-end period, offering delivery workers earnings of up to Rs 10,000 across December 31 and January 1, according to people aware of the development.

On New Year's Eve, the platform is advertising peak-hour earnings of up to Rs 2,000 for the six-hour period between 6 pm and 12 am, in a bid to ensure adequate rider availability during one of the busiest ordering windows of the year, they said, maintaining that increased payouts were a standard practice during such periods.

plunges 5% in 2025 amid dollar strength

Mumbai, Dec 31: The rupee slumped 5 per cent in 2025 as persistent capital outflows from foreign investors, alongside heightened dollar demand from importers, making it one of the worst-performing Asian currencies.

On the last trading session of 2025, the rupee depreciated 13 paise to close at 89.88 against the US dollar as month-end demand and FPIs' dollar buying kept it lower.

The domestic currency has exhibited a negative bias throughout the year, making it Asia's worst-performing currency in 2025, with foreign portfolio investors pulling out USD 16.5 billion from equities this year, further denting investor sentiments, forex traders said.

At the interbank foreign exchange, the local unit opened at 89.89 against the dollar and touched an intra-day low of 89.95 and a high of 89.84 against the American currency.

At the end of Wednesday's trading session, the rupee was quoted at 89.88 against the greenback, registering a fall of 13 paise over its previous close.

On Tuesday, the rupee rose 23 paise to close at 89.75 against the greenback.

Govt's fiscal deficit at ₹9.76 lakh crore

New Delhi, Dec 31: The Centre's fiscal deficit at the end of November stood at Rs 9.76 lakh crore, or 62.3 per cent of the annual budget target for 2025-26, compared to 52.5 per cent in the year-ago period, according to government data released Wednesday.

The Centre estimates the fiscal deficit (the gap between expenditure and revenue) during 2025-26 at 4.4 per cent of GDP, or Rs 15.69 lakh crore.

According to data released by the Controller and Auditor General of India (CAG), the central government received Rs 19.49 lakh crore (55.7 per cent of the corresponding BE 2025-26 of total receipts) up to November 2025.

This comprised Rs 13,93,946 crore of tax revenue (net to Centre), Rs 5,16,366 crore of non-tax revenue and Rs 38,927 crore of non-debt capital receipts.

CGA data showed Rs 9,36,561 crore was transferred to state governments as devolution of share of taxes by the Centre during the period, a rise of Rs 1,24,498 crore year-on-year.

The total expenditure incurred by the Centre was Rs



29.26 lakh crore (57.8 per cent of the corresponding BE 2025-26), out of which Rs 22,67,700 crore was on revenue account and Rs 6,58,210 crore on capital account.

Out of the total revenue expenditure, Rs 7,45,765 crore was towards interest payments and Rs 2,88,333 crore on account of major subsidies.

Commenting on the data, Aditi Nayar, Chief Economist with Icra, said the rating agency anticipates a shortfall of Rs 1.5 lakh crore in the Centre's gross tax revenues in the current fiscal relative to the FY2025-26 budget estimate (BE).

"Overall, we expect the potential miss on the taxes side to be offset by higher-than-budgeted non-tax revenues and sizeable expenditure savings on the revenue spending front. As a result, we do not anticipate fiscal slippage at the current juncture," Nayar said.



Odisha hand big defeat to Delhi

Odisha continue winning streak against star-studded Delhi; at top of the table with 12 points

Alur (Karnataka), Dec 31: India keeper Rishabh Pant's indifferent form coupled with Delhi's leading batters failing to fire saw their unbeaten run being interrupted by Odisha, who carved out a huge 78-run victory in a fourth-round Group D match of the Vijay Hazare Trophy here Wednesday.

With the national selectors set to announce the squad for the three-match ODI series against New Zealand in first week of January, it was the charismatic India keeper-batter and Delhi skipper Pant, who was the focus of attention.

But the feisty cricketer could score only 24 as the much-vaunted Delhi batting imploded, managing just 193 in 43.3 overs in the chase of an immensely gettable 272/8 scored by Odisha after being sent in to bat first.

Delhi's innings have largely been built around one solid batting performance so far this season. But the absence of one Wednesday cost them not just the match but also their top position on the points table, which could come back to haunt them as the tournament progresses.

Odisha went top of the table with 12 points and a healthy



net run rate (NRR), while Delhi, despite being on the same number of points, slipped to fourth, with even Railways and Haryana getting ahead of them on better NRR.

It was also the first time so far this season that Delhi could not cross 200, something which looked so easy when Virat Kohli slammed a century against Andhra in the opener, and opener Priyansh Arya scored a fine 78 in the previous game against Saurashtra.

Paint, following scores of 5, 70, 22 could only manage 24 off 28 balls before he was dismissed by pacer Debabrata Pradhan (3/28), who along with young right-arm pacer Sambit Baral (3/34), hastened Delhi's collapse.

Odisha's competitive total was built around veteran skipper Biplob Samantray, who scored a 74-ball-72 after they lost three wickets before their score crossed the 100 mark.

Odisha's lower rung made small but useful contributions to frustrate the Delhi bowling attack, led by India players Navdeep Saini and Nitish Rana, though off-spinner Hrithik Shokeen returned excellent figures of 4/27 in his 10 overs.

Delhi's batters were off to an awful start losing openers Priyansh Arya and Sarthak Ranjan on single-digit scores to be two down for just six runs on the board. Pant's dismissal saw Delhi teetering at 50/3 in only the 11th over, which quickly

became 55/5.

A recovery from this stage was next to impossible but due credit to Harsh Tyagi (43) and Hrithik Shokeen (32) for delaying the inevitable with some gritty batting.

Meanwhile, Saurashtra defeated Andhra by 74 runs with right-arm pacer Ankur Panwar taking a five-for and dismissing the rivals for 180 in the chase of 255.

The procedure, which was expected to last 40 minutes, extended to almost three hours due to a complication, AS said, adding the procedure was successful. Roberto Carlos is said to be out of danger but remains under close observation and will stay hospitalized for another 48 hours to ensure his recovery continues.

4000-plus runs: Lynn's BBL milestone

Adelaide: Adelaide Strikers' opener Chris Lynn has achieved a significant milestone in the Big Bash League (BBL) by becoming the first player in the tournament's history to cross the 4,000-run mark. He reached this milestone in the 17th match of the ongoing 15th edition of the BBL, playing for the Strikers against Brisbane Heat here at the Adelaide Oval Wednesday. Chasing a target of 122 runs, Lynn scored an unbeaten 41-ball 79 to help his side claim a seven-wicket victory. Lynn smoked six fours and as many sixes while scoring at 192.68 as the Strikers sailed to a comfortable victory on New Year's Eve. Lynn, in 131 BBL matches (129 innings) so far, has scored a total of 4,065 runs at an average of 36.29, including a century and 32 fifties, with the most recent one coming Wednesday.


This was the Gunners' fourth straight victory as they ended Villa's 11-match winning run in all competitions.

In his first start since early November, Gabriel Magalhaes profited from some poor goal-keeping from Emiliano Martinez to open the scoring three minutes into the second half, Premier League reports.

Martin Zubimendi then tucked home in the 52nd minute, before Leandro Trossard and Gabriel Jesus both added sublime curling finishes.

Ollie Watkins scored a stoppage-time consolation goal for Villa, who are now six points adrift of Arsenal. Second-placed Manchester City could move



back to within two points of the leaders when they visit Sunderland on New Year's Day.

On the other hand, West Ham ended a run of three successive losses with a pulsating 2-2 draw against Brighton & Hove Albion.

Although Nuno Espirito Santo's side closed the gap on 17th-placed Nottingham Forest to four points, West Ham were twice pegged back by their visitors in a dramatic game.

Jarrod Bowen slotted the home side into a 10th-minute lead, but their advantage was short-lived as Danny Welbeck sent Alphonse Areola the wrong way with a clinical

penalty.

Just moments later, Welbeck chipped his second penalty of the game onto the crossbar. That miss was punished in the fourth minute of stoppage time, when Lucas Paqueta converted the match's third spot-kick after Lewis Dunk was penalised for handball.

However, Areola's error from a corner then gifted Brighton an equaliser as Joel Veltman pounced from close range. The 2-2 draw means the Hammers end 2025 in the relegation zone, in 18th place, while Brighton dropped to 14th after failing to win any of their December matches.

AIFF proposes new ISL format, clubs to confirm participation

New Delhi, Dec 31: The All India Football Federation (AIFF) Wednesday asked the clubs to confirm their participation in the delayed season of the Indian Super League (ISL) and the proposed format within a day so that it can inform the continental body the exact number of matches to be played in the competition.

With the ISL 2025-26 yet to start, it is certain that the clubs will not be able to play the mandatory 24 matches in the season -- including top division league and domestic cup -- to be eligible to feature in the AFC Champions League 2.

In that regard, the ISL clubs had urged the AIFF to request the Asian Football Confederation for a one-time relaxation in the minimum requirement of 24 matches so that they can play in the ACL 2.

The representatives of the clubs and a committee formed by the AIFF have had five meetings since December 24 on how to hold the 2025-26 ISL season.

"... the meetings held on 28th December 2025, wherein the ISL Clubs requested the All India Football Federation to take up the matter with the Asian Football Confederation regarding a one-time relaxation in the minimum requirement of 24 matches," the AIFF said in a letter to the ISL clubs.

"AIFF asks ISL clubs to confirm participation and the proposed competition format in ISL 2024-25 by January 1, 2026. The AFC, the Sports Ministry



and the Supreme Court will be informed accordingly.

"Considering the urgency of the matter, it would be highly appreciated if the above confirmation is received by tomorrow, i.e., 1st January 2026. We trust you will appreciate the seriousness and time-sensitive nature of the situation."

The AIFF also said it is required to submit the outcome of the meetings it had with the ISL clubs to the Sports Ministry before January 2, 2026.

The AIFF had proposed two competition formats for the ISL 2025-26 season, which it wants to start in the first week of February.

The first option is a conference-based league structure where the 14 participating teams would be divided equally into East and West groups. Teams would play against each other

only within their respective conferences. The top four sides from each group will advance to a single-leg championship round to decide the ISL winner. All the matches would be played at two centralised venues.

Under the second option, all the teams would compete in a single-leg format without conferences. There would be no playoffs, with the league table alone determining the champion at the end of the season.

India has two spots in the ACL 2 -- one in group stage for ISL Shield winners and another in playoff round for Super Cup winners.

Each club in the domestic top division also needs to play a minimum of 24 matches in a season -- including top division league and domestic cup -- to be eligible to feature in the ACL 2.

The AIFF proposed a new structure for the ISL, under which the league would be owned and operated by the national body in accordance with its new constitution for the next 20 seasons last Friday.

According to the new proposal, the league will implement a promotion and relegation system from the upcoming season.

The 2025-26 ISL season was put on hold in July due to the uncertainty over the renewal of the Master Rights Agreement (MRA) between the league's former organisers, Football Sports Development Limited (FSDL), and the AIFF.

The deal expired December 8, creating a contractual impasse that also required Supreme Court intervention.

Pro Wrestling League player auctions Jan 3

The player auction Saturday is expected to be a major focal point in the lead-up to the season, with over 300 professional wrestlers from more than 20 countries set to be auctioned off.

The auction pool features Olympic and World Championship medallists, along with a strong contingent of Indian men and women wrestlers, underscoring the league's international reach and depth of competition.

With its refreshed identity and reimagined competitive structure, beginning with the January 3 auction, the league aims to usher in a new chapter for professional wrestling in India, combining world-class competition with renewed fan engagement.

Meanwhile, Muralitharan Pandurangan (Puducherry) and Peter Christopher (Maharashtra) have been inducted as Assistant Referees. Ashwin Kumar and Aditya Purkayastha, along with making the FIFA list, have also completed their AFC Referee Academy course in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

Rachana Kamani is currently undergoing the same course. As many as 19 match officials from India are a part of the FIFA list for 2026. The draw for the 2026 FIFA World Cup was conducted at the John F. Kennedy Center, setting the stage for the first 48-team edition of football's biggest tournament. With expanded group formats and an unprecedented number of matches across Canada, Mexico, and the United States, the draw ceremony delivered several headline-grabbing clashes.






