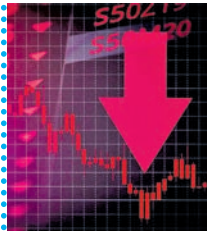

SUBHADRA MONEY FOR 4.57 LAKH IN JANUARY

Bhubaneswar, Jan 8: Financial assistance under Subhadra Yojana will be credited to over 4.57 lakh beneficiaries within this month, Deputy Chief Minister Pravati Parida said Thursday. “A total of 4,57,681 beneficiaries will receive the amount. They are 1,78,398 newly-enrolled beneficiaries, who attained the age of 21 years, 24,018, who were previously excluded due to application errors or verification issues, and 2,55,265 who had received only the third installment due to technical issues under this fund-transfer scheme,” Parida, who also holds the Women and Child Development portfolio, told reporters. **P3**

500% TARIFFS LOOM

At a time when India is facing steep US tariffs of 50 per cent, including 25 per cent on its purchases of Russian energy, President Donald Trump has given his 'go-ahead' to a Bill that seeks to impose tariffs of at least 500 per cent on countries buying oil from Moscow. The Bill, Sanctioning Russia Act of 2025, which is now headed for bipartisan approval, aims to 'punish nations like India and China that buy cheap Russian oil and fuel Putin's war machine'. The US move could further impact India's energy imports and strain its trade ties. In yet another significant development, Trump announced the withdrawal of US from over 60 global organisations, including India-led International Solar Alliance (ISA), claiming they go against US national interests. The ISA exit of US undermines global solar energy cooperation at a juncture when countries around the world are ramping up efforts to deploy clean and affordable renewable power.

New York/Washington, Jan 8: US President Donald Trump has 'greenlit' a sanctions Bill that could impose 500 per cent tariffs on countries buying Russian oil, giving him 'tremendous leverage' against countries like China and India to stop them from purchasing cheap oil from Moscow. Senator Lindsey Graham said he had a 'very productive meeting' with Trump at White House Wednesday, during which the President 'greenlit' the bipartisan Russia sanctions Bill that has been in the works for months. “This will be well-timed, as

US exits India-led ISA, 65 int’l institutions

UN/WASHINGTON: President Donald Trump has withdrawn the US from 66 international organisations, including UN bodies and the India-led International Solar Alliance (ISA), calling the institutions 'redundant' and 'contrary' to America's interests. Trump Wednesday signed a memorandum titled 'Withdrawal of the United States from International Organisations, Conventions, and Treaties that Are Contrary to the Interests of the United States'. After signing, Trump said he has determined that it is 'contrary' to the interests of the US to remain a member of, participate in, or otherwise provide support to the 66 UN and non-UN organisations. This includes 31 UN entities, as well as 35 non-UN organisations that operate contrary to US national interests, security, economic prosperity, or sovereignty, according to a White House factsheet. Trump directed all executive departments and agencies to take immediate steps to put into effect the withdrawal of the US from the organisations 'as soon as possible'.

Ukraine is making concessions for peace, and Putin is all talk, continuing to kill the innocent. This Bill will allow President Trump to punish those countries who buy cheap Russian oil, fuelling Putin's war machine,” Graham wrote on X. “This Bill would give President Trump tremendous leverage against countries like China, India and Brazil to incentivise them to stop buying the cheap Russian oil that provides the financing for Putin's blood-bath against Ukraine,” he said. Graham said he looks forward to a 'strong' bipartisan vote on the Bill, 'hopefully as early as next week'. Graham and Richard Blumenthal

have introduced the Sanctioning Russia Act of 2025, which would impose secondary tariffs and sanctions on 'countries that continue to fund Putin's barbaric war in Ukraine'. The legislation has proposed a 500 per cent tariff on secondary purchase and reselling of Russian oil and one that almost every single member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee has co-sponsored. Earlier this week, Graham said that Indian Ambassador to the US Vinay Kwatra informed him about New Delhi reducing its purchases of Russian oil and asked him to convey to President Trump to 'relieve the tariff' imposed on India.

3 Odisha courts get bomb threat emails

Bhubaneswar, Jan 8: Anonymous emails threatening bomb blasts prompted Odisha Police to swing into action Thursday, leading to the evacuation of three district courts—Cuttack, Sambalpur, and Deogarh—along with the Orissa High Court. Police personnel, assisted by sniffer dogs and bomb disposal squads, rushed to the court premises and launched intensive search operations. Advocates, court staff, and members of the public were asked to vacate the premises as a precautionary measure. “Several courts in the country have received such anonymous threat mails. There is no cause for alarm. After thorough searches conducted by security teams, court operations have fully resumed,” Law Minister Prithiviraj Harichandan said. DGP YB Khurania said police evacuated the courts as a precaution, conducted checks, and enhanced security arrangements at all locations.



Khurania, who spoke to Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi and the Home department's Additional Chief Secretary immediately after the receipt of the emails, said, “Anonymous emails containing threats to damage court premises (using bombs/explosives) by 2.35 pm were received at Cuttack, Sambalpur and Deogarh district courts. Police have taken cognisance of the matter and initiated a thorough investigation.” Though no specific threat was received for the HC, police evacuated the premises in Cuttack while closely monitoring entry and exit points. Later in the evening, the CM directed police to strengthen the bomb squad and issue a standard operating procedure to remain alert at all times.

State to get Farmer Skill & Agri-Incubation Centre

Bhubaneswar, Jan 8: The Odisha government has decided to set up a state-of-the-art Farmer Skill and Agri-Incubation Centre (FS&AIC) with an aim to position the state as a leader in futuristic agriculture, official sources said Thursday. Project details were discussed during a high-level meeting chaired by Deputy Chief Minister and Agriculture Minister KV Singh Deo here Thursday. The centre will operate through four specialised modules – Agri-entrepreneurship development, farmer skilling and training, technology demonstration, and value-added services. “The objective of the centre is skill development. By training our farmers in modern techniques and providing them with financial access and market connectivity, we're ensuring long-term profitability and economic stability for rural Odisha,” Singh Deo said.

Nod to ₹55,783cr industrial projects

Bhubaneswar, Jan 8: The High-Level Clearance Authority (HLCA), led by Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi, Thursday approved seven industrial projects worth ₹55,783 crore and having the potential to generate 14,507 jobs. Saffron Resources Pvt Ltd leads the approvals with a mega investment of ₹35,000 crore to establish a 6 MTPA steel plant in Dhenkanal. It is expected to generate 8,000 jobs. Jindal Poly Films Ltd got approval to set up a 0.5 MTPA Titanium Dioxide Pigment manufacturing unit at an investment of ₹12,000 crore in Ganjam. It would create 4,000 jobs. Among other approvals, Ferro Alloys Corporation Ltd's plan to invest ₹2,000 crore in Keonjhar to establish facilities for Ferro Manganese, Silico Manganese, manganese ore beneficiation, along with a 100 MW captive power plant also got the nod. It will create 772 jobs. **P3**

Oldest known poison arrows were used 60K yrs ago

Scientists have detected traces of plant toxins on Stone Age arrowheads that were used by hunter-gatherers in South Africa about 60,000 years ago. The find marks the oldest known poison arrows and indicates that such tools and sophisticated hunting strategies existed thousands of years early than previously thought, according to the authors of a study published Wednesday in the journal Science Advances. “In persistence hunting, poisoned arrows did not usually kill prey instantly,” said lead study author Sven Isaksson, professor of archaeological science at Stockholm University's Archaeological Research Laboratory. “Instead, the poison helped hunters reduce the time



and energy needed to track and exhaust a wounded animal.” Two different alkaloids, or organic plant compounds, found in the poisonous chemical residue were from the gifbol plant, or Boophone disticha. Traditional hunters in the region still utilize the plant today and refer to it locally as poison bulb, CNN reported. Hunter-gatherers likely dipped the quartz arrowheads,

excavated from the Umhlatuzana Rock Shelter in KwaZulu-Natal, South Africa, in 1985, in poison before using them to kill animals for food. The presence of poison arrows during the Late Pleistocene suggests that hunter-gatherers knew which plants to use, as well as how long it would take for the toxins to be effective. “Understanding that a substance applied to an arrow will

weaken an animal hours later requires cause-and-effect thinking and the ability to anticipate delayed results,” Isaksson wrote in an email. “The evidence points to prehistoric humans having advanced cognitive abilities, complex cultural knowledge, and well-developed hunting practices.” (While humans have long relied on plants as food, poison arrows are just one example of how our ancestors living during the most recent ice age exploited the chemical properties of plants to develop medicine and toxic substances,) Isaksson said. Hunters could have applied poison to the points, also called backed microliths, by stabbing the gifbol plant's bulb, or by cutting the bulb and capturing

the poisonous substance in a container. The poison may have been concentrated by applying heat or exposing it to sunlight, according to the study. Poisons work in different ways, with some varieties like myotoxins destroying muscle tissue and others, called neurotoxins, attacking the nervous system. Hunter-gatherers may have avoided any part of the animal affected by myotoxins, whereas neurotoxins would be diluted after spreading throughout the animal's body, Isaksson said. “Some toxins are only dangerous if they enter the blood stream and are not harmful when ingested,” he said via email. “Others may be easily destroyed by heat and thus neutralized by cooking.” **AGENCIES**

Mamata storms I-PAC chief's Kolkata home amid ED search

WB CM alleges bid to seize TMC's internal data

Kolkata, Jan 8: West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee Thursday dramatically turned up at the residence of I-PAC chief Pratik Jain amid an ongoing ED raid, alleging that the Central agency was attempting to seize the TMC's internal documents, hard disks and sensitive data linked to its election strategy. She said the raid at the residence and offices of Jain, “the in-charge of my IT cell”, was politically motivated and unconstitutional. Banerjee arrived at Jain's residence around noon, minutes after Kolkata Police Commissioner Manoj Verma

reached the spot, and stayed for 20-25 minutes before emerging with a green folder in her hand. “They raided the residence and offices of our in-charge of IT cell. They were confiscating my party's documents and hard disks, which have details about our party candidates for the Assembly polls. I have brought those back,” Banerjee told reporters. She accused the ED officials of walking away with hard disks, mobile phones, laptops, candidate lists and internal strategy documents of the ruling party. Apart from providing political consultancy to the TMC, the Indian Political Action Committee (I-PAC) also manages the party's IT and media operations.

Review meeting on transit, affordable housing projects

PROVISIONAL ALLOTMENT OF COMPLETED HOUSING UNITS; EMPOWERED COMMITTEE TO ENSURE OPTIMAL UTILISATION

Bhubaneswar, Jan 8: A high-level review meeting on Transit Housing and Affordable Housing Projects (AHPs) was held Thursday under the chairpersonship of the Principal Secretary, Housing & Urban Development department, Usha Padhee, to assess the status of completed housing stock, streamline allotment mechanisms, and strengthen measures for planned urban growth.

The meeting undertook a detailed review of key Affordable Housing Projects, including the Chandrasekharpur Affordable Housing Project (Buddha Vihar), Nilamadhab Awas Yojana, Santipali Awas Yojana, and the Subuddhipur Affordable Housing Project. Emphasis was laid on to ensure timely occupation of completed housing units, with project-wise progress, beneficiary coverage, and inter-agency coordination discussed to avoid vacancies in ready housing stock.

Progress of upcoming Affordable Housing Projects at Ghatikia and Gadakana was also reviewed. Directions were issued for monitoring of timelines and adherence to

schedules, as these projects are critical to addressing urban housing demand and preventing unplanned settlements and encroachments.

A key outcome of the meeting was the decision to constitute an Empowered Committee, chaired by the Principal Secretary, to provide policy oversight and ensure coordinated decision-making on affordable housing, rental housing prioritisation, allotment modalities, and optimal utilisation of completed AHP units. The committee will facilitate swift resolution of inter-departmental issues and ensure uniform implementation of housing policies.

It was decided that completed affordable housing units will be provisionally allotted to eligible beneficiaries. The provisional allotment will be valid for a period of six months, during which occupancy, usage, and compliance with eligibility conditions will be closely monitored.

Final allotment orders will be issued only after successful completion of this watch period. The allotted dwelling units will not be transferable, sub-let, or handed over to any other person, thereby ensuring disciplined and intended utilisation

of affordable housing stock.

To promote sustainable urban mobility, the meeting underscored the importance of integrating housing allotments with the AMA bus public transport system to improve accessibility while encouraging the use of public transport.

Reaffirming the government's firm commitment to the policy of "No New Slums and No New Encroachments", Padhee emphasised that proactive housing provision, prioritisation of rental housing, and strict enforcement must proceed in tandem to ensure orderly, inclusive, and sustainable urban development.

The meeting also highlighted the need to prioritise rental housing, particularly for migrant workers, the urban poor, and families in transition. Engagement with NGOs was identified as a key enabler for beneficiary outreach, awareness generation, verification, and post-allotment handholding.

The meeting was attended by Chanchal Rana, Vice Chairman, Bhubaneswar Development Authority (BDA) and Commissioner, BMC; Arindam Dakua, Director, Municipal Administration; Subhananda Mohapatra, Additional Secretary; Surendra Routroy, Additional Secretary; Manoj Kumar Swain, Additional Commissioner, BDA; Ajay Kumar Mohanty, Deputy Commissioner, BMC along with other senior officials.

The review concluded with directions for time-bound provisional allotment, transparent processes, strong inter-agency coordination, and robust monitoring, reinforcing Odisha's commitment to planned urbanisation, affordable housing, and improved quality of life for urban residents.

₹500 parking fee at Bhakta Nivas draws flak

Puri, Jan 8: The Shree Jagannath Temple Administration's (SJTA) move to impose ₹500 parking fee for four-wheelers at its Bhakta Nivas (devotee guest house) facilities here has drawn sharp opposition from tourists, servitors and political leaders.

In a notification issued Wednesday, the SJTA said guests staying at its four Bhakta Nivas would have to pay ₹500, including 18 per cent GST, for parking a four-wheeler for 24 hours. The arrangement will continue until further orders.

SJTA Chief Administrator Arabinda Padhee said the decision was aimed at ensuring structured parking manage-

ment and better organisation of parking spaces, adding that it would improve convenience for visitors.

However, following objection from various quarters, Puri district Collector Dibya Jyoti Parida, who is also the deputy chief administrator of the SJTA, said the administration would reconsider the decision.

"We will reconsider the parking fee. I will get back to you after taking up the matter with the authority," he told reporters.

Puri BJD MLA Sunil Kumar Mohanty demanded an immediate rollback, saying hotels in Puri and elsewhere in the country do not charge guests

separately for parking. "It must be withdrawn immediately," he said.

Local MP Sambit Patra of the BJP said he was not aware of the development. "Our government will take a decision that is good for all, particularly the poor people," he said.

Odisha Pradesh Congress Committee president Bhakta Charan Das opposed the move. In a post on X, he called the fee unjustified and an unnecessary financial burden on devotees.

He urged the authorities to ensure pilgrim-friendly facilities.

Addressing a press conference in Bhubaneswar, BJD vice-president Sanjay Das Burma also demanded immediate

withdrawal of the hefty parking fee, alleging that staying at Bhakta Nivas had already become more expensive.

"The administration is trying to derive financial benefit from the religious sentiments of devotees," he said.

Tourists, too, voiced their discontent. "While parking a car at airports costs around ₹150, the administration here is demanding ₹500. This could become the country's highest parking fee," claimed Chaturbhuja Samal, a frequent visitor to Puri.

Sources said the four Bhakta Nivas were built during the previous BJD government, with room tariffs ranging between ₹900 and ₹2,500 for 24 hours.

Drug peddler gets life imprisonment

Bhubaneswar, Jan 8: A City court Thursday convicted a drug peddler and sentenced him to rigorous imprisonment (RI) for life along with a fine of ₹50,000 for transporting prohibited drugs.

The court of the Second Additional District Judge-cum-Special Judge, Bhubaneswar, also ordered that in default of payment of the fine, the convict would undergo an additional one year of RI.

The convicted person has been identified as Padmanabha Behera of Begunia, under Gop police station in Puri district. He was booked under Sections 274, 275, and 276 of the IPC read with Section 2 of Odisha Act 3 of 1999

at Bharatpur Police Station.

According to the prosecution, in the early hours of May 13, 2022 morning, Behera was apprehended by a special task force (STF) near Baramunda Bus Stand while transporting prohibited manufactured drugs in a vehicle.

During the search, the STF recovered and seized 1,280 bottles of Eskuf cough syrup containing Codeine Phosphate and Chlorpheniramine Maleate, along with other incriminating materials, from his possession.

The accused failed to produce any valid documents or authorisation for possessing the prohibited drugs. Consequently, he was detained and handed over to Bharatpur Police Station for legal action.

Millers end stir, participate in paddy procurement

BHUBANESWAR: All Odisha Rice Millers' Association, which has been on an indefinite strike since Monday, called off the protest Thursday and cooperated with the state government in the procurement of paddy from farmers. The rice millers had launched the strike since Monday, leading to disruption in the paddy procurement process, an official said. The association has been demanding an increase in milling charges, revision of transportation rates for paddy and rice and enhanced custody and maintenance levies for the grain stored in their godowns.

Odisha applauded for national road safety & transport reforms

Bhubaneswar/New Delhi, Jan 8: Odisha has emerged as a national frontrunner in road safety and transport reforms, earning widespread recognition at the recently concluded Transport Development Council (TDC) Meeting. Held January 7-8, 2026, at Bharat Mandapam in New Delhi, the event was organized by the Ministry of Road Transport and Highways (MoRTH), Government of India, and chaired by the Union Minister for Road Transport and Highways.

The TDC meeting saw the participation of transport ministers and senior officials from all states and Union Territories, where Odisha's groundbreaking achievements in road safety, digitization, and driver training were spotlighted.

Principal Secretary of Odisha Commerce and Transport Department, Usha Padhee led the state's delegation, presenting Odisha's innovative road safety measures and transport governance. She highlighted key initiatives such as the state's

digital transport governance system, technology-enabled enforcement, and comprehensive driver training programs.

Sources said, Odisha reported full readiness for the roll-out of PM-RAHAT, a cashless treatment scheme for road accident victims, ensuring coverage of up to ₹1.5 lakh. Odisha is now the first state in the country to integrate the e-DAR (electronic accident reporting) system with the CCTNS (Crime and Criminal Tracking Network and Systems), providing seamless coordination among police, health, and transport authorities. This integration, developed in collaboration with the National Informatics Centre (NIC) and IIT Madras, was hailed as a model for other states to follow.

The Ministry of Road Transport and Highways praised Odisha's SUVAHAK and AMA SUVAHAK programs, as well as community-based safety initiatives such as Rakshak and Junior Rakshak. These programs, which focus on educating and empowering local communities to take an active role in road safety, have now inspired the

Sadak Suraksha Mitra initiative, which will be implemented at the national level.

Despite only qualifying for two Institutes of Driving Training and Research (IDTRs) under a centrally sponsored scheme, Odisha has already set up four such centres, with MoRTH noting them as among the best in the country. The central government has indicated that additional IDTRs may be considered for Odisha in the future.

Odisha's reform-driven approach was further recognized when it was included in a high-level Committee of Secretaries formed by MoRTH. The committee is tasked with drafting and refining transport rules and amendments to the Motor Vehicles Act, as well as introducing reforms such as Automated Testing Stations (ATS) and Vehicle Location Tracking Devices (VLTD).

MoRTH officials encouraged the state to enhance its implementation of VLTDs and High Security Registration Plates (HSRP) and raise awareness regarding the Pollution Under Control Certificate (PUCC) to ensure greater compliance.

ECor offers 3% discount on digital unreserved tickets

Bhubaneswar, Jan 8: The Khurda Road Division of East Coast Railway (ECor) is encouraging digital ticketing by offering a three per cent discount on unreserved tickets booked through the RailOne App. The benefit, earlier limited to R-Wallet cashback, has now been extended to other digital payment modes such as UPI, debit/credit cards and net banking, while the R-Wallet scheme will continue unchanged.

The discount will be available for six months, from January 14 to July 14, 2026. The Centre for Railway Information Systems (CRIS) will review the scheme's implementation in May 2026 to decide on its continuation.

This initiative aims to enhance passenger convenience, reduce queues at ticket counters, and promote cashless transactions, supporting Indian Railways' goal of digital transformation.

To raise awareness, the Senior Divisional Commercial Manager, Anil Kumar S, has instructed staff to actively inform passengers through public announcements, banners, and posters at prominent locations across railway stations.

Unsafe mineral transport alleged at railway siding

Joda, Jan 8: Allegations of unsafe and irregular mineral transportation have surfaced at a South Eastern Railway (SER) siding at Jurudi in Keonjhar district, raising concerns over compliance with safety norms.

Sources said mineral loading takes place daily on five to six lines at the siding, with hundreds of rakes moving out on a daily basis. However, rules meant to ensure safe transport are allegedly being flouted. Several wagons are reportedly not cleaned properly before loading, while some have holes that remain unrepaired. In addition, minerals are said to be loaded unevenly and transported without tarpaulin covers.

Officials and locals said spillage of minerals along the track poses a serious risk, including the possibility of train derailments.

Railway guidelines require rakes to be placed on designated lines and loaded within five hours of placement. Before loading, the wagons must be thoroughly cleaned and holes on those sealed to prevent leakage during transit. These steps are intended to ensure that minerals do not spill onto the tracks.

Despite these clear norms, contractors allegedly continue unsafe practices, while the Ministry of Railways has remained silent, effectively leaving operations in the hands of private contractors, critics say.

If wagon doors and openings are not properly secured, they can open during transit, caus-



ing mineral spillage on the tracks leading to congestion. In several cases, this has also raised the risk of train derailments and accidents.

Sources said railway wagons are often loaded mechanically with more than 60 metric tonnes of minerals, which then require manual leveling by workers. If the load is not evenly levelled, there is a strong possibility of derailment at turning points while the rake is en route to its destination.

However, proper levelling is reportedly not ensured at railway sidings. Even after loading, tarpaulins are not being used to cover wagons to prevent minerals from flying off. Avoiding such lapses and ensuring the safe movement of trains to their destinations is a

key responsibility of the Ministry of Railways. Contrary to this mandate, irregularities have surfaced at the Jurudi railway siding.

Meanwhile, inspections found that several of the 58 wagons in a rake were without tarpaulin covers, some had doors not secured properly, and many loaded wagons had not been levelled Wednesday. If such negligence continues, the Ministry could suffer financial losses running in to several crores of rupees. There have been calls for senior departmental officials to intervene.

Jurudi Station Manager Shashikant Jajo said the contractor involved would be warned, adding that the responsibility lies with the commercial department. He said rakes are despatched only after clearance from the commercial wing. Goods and commercial department officer Goutam Kumar, however, claimed the process was being carried out properly.

State gets first fully solar-powered villages

Cuttack/Badamba, Jan 8: Two tribal dominated villages under Narsinghpur block in Cuttack district have become the first fully solar-powered villages of the state following the project's inauguration Thursday.

This has been achieved under the Centre-sponsored PM Surya Ghar Muft Bijli Yojana. These villages were identified as Mundia Sahi in Olaba panchayat and Kandha Devabhum village under Debabhuin panchayat of Narsinghpur block.

A total of 76 families including 47 in Mundia Sahi and 29 in Kandha Devabhuin villages will receive free electricity through solar panel installations. The solar panels have been installed by TPCODL, through which the villages



have been completely electrified using renewable solar energy. Badamba MLA Bijaya Kumar Dalabehera inaugurated the power supply in the presence of Cuttack Collector Dattatraya Bhausaheb Shinde, Athagarh Sub-Collector Prahlad Narayan Sharma, TPCODL

authorities and other officials. With this development, villagers will be able to avail all electricity-based facilities without dependence on conventional power supply. The entire installation work has been completed successfully within a span of approximately 25 days.

For each solar panel installation, the Central government provided a subsidy of ₹30,000, while the state government contributed ₹25,000. The remaining beneficiary contribution has been borne by the district administration with funds available from the District Mineral Foundation (DMF).

This initiative has been specifically implemented for Below Poverty Line (BPL) families to ensure equitable access to reliable electricity. The availability of uninterrupted solar power will improve living standards by supporting household lighting, education, healthcare, and livelihood activities. It will also significantly reduce electricity expenses for beneficiary families while promoting energy self-sufficiency and environmental sustainability.

Pradhan seeks permanent solution to rising air pollution in Angul-Talcher belt

Bhubaneswar, Jan 8: Union Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan has sought personal intervention from the Centre and the state government to find a permanent solution to the alarmingly rising air pollution in the Angul-Talcher industrial belt.

In separate letters addressed to Union Minister for Environment, Forest and Climate Change Bhupender Yadav, Union Minister for Coal and Mines G Kishan Reddy, and Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi, Pradhan highlighted the serious threat posed by deteriorating air quality to public health in the region.

Expressing deep concern over the Air Quality Index (AQI) in Angul consistently remaining in the "severe" category, Pradhan noted that Talcher's inclusion among the most polluted cities in the country is particularly worrying.

He pointed out that the sit-

uation is severely affecting children, the elderly, and people suffering from respiratory illnesses.

The Union minister stressed the need for strict enforcement of pollution control norms in industrial areas and for strengthening real-time air quality monitoring systems. He urged the Ministry of Coal to introduce mechanised coal transportation systems along with advanced dust suppression measures.

Pradhan also proposed the creation of green buffers through large-scale plantation around industrial zones and mining corridors, and the expansion of target-based initiatives under the National Clean Air Programme (NCAP).

Observing that measures under the Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP) are largely temporary, he emphasised the importance of a long-term, coordinated strategy involving the State Pollution Control Board (SPCB), district administration, and industrial establishments.

300 fall ill after wedding feast

Rajnagar: As many as 300 people fell ill with diarrhoea and vomiting after they attended a wedding feast under this block in Kendrapara district, prompting health authorities to rush medical teams to the affected villages. The outbreak was reported from Endulapur, Prasannapur and Khandamara villages under Hatina panchayat. Health officials said the illness spread after people consumed food served at a wedding reception Tuesday night. According to local sources, the feast was organised for the wedding of Kanha Rout, the younger son of Dayanidhi Rout of Endulapur village. Nearly 1,000 people attended the feast, including residents of Endulapur and neighbouring villages. Soon after the feast, many guests developed symptoms of diarrhoea and vomiting. Some sought treatment from local pharmacies and unlicensed practitioners Wednesday, but their condition did not improve. By Thursday, the number of patients had increased sharply, with entire households getting affected in Endulapur. Officials said more than 200 people were affected in Endulapur alone, while over 100 cases were reported from Prasannapur and Khandamara villages. Two medical teams led by Dr Rashmi Ranjan Mohanty, chief medical officer of the Rajnagar Community Health Centre, reached the villages Thursday. The teams set up temporary camps and conducted door-to-door visits, providing treatment and distributing medicines to the patients.

Youth stripped, paraded on nat'l highway; 2 held

Baripada, Jan 8: Police arrested two persons Thursday after a youth was allegedly stripped, assaulted and paraded on National Highway-220 over his love affair with a minor of a separate community under Bahalda police limits in Mayurbhanj district. After their arrest, the two accused were produced in the court Thursday.

The victim, who is a member of a minority community, was allegedly targeted by relatives of the minor girl over an alleged love affair. According to local authorities, the attackers tied the man's hands with a rope, stripped and forced him to walk along the NH-220.

A video of the assault went viral on social media, prompting police to register a case. Investigators confirmed that two suspects were taken into custody and produced before a court.

The victim's family met with Mayurbhanj Collector Hema Kanta Say to demand a thorough investigation. Formal complaints were also submitted to the Superintendent of Police, the Odisha Human Rights Commission, and the Orissa High Court Police are investigating the assault and public humiliation of the youth from a minority community who was allegedly stripped and paraded through the streets January 2.

According to authorities, the victim had travelled by car to meet the minor girl with whom he was reportedly in a relationship. The girl's relatives, who had previously filed a police complaint against the youth, discovered the two together and intercepted the man.

The group allegedly vandalised the victim's vehicle and physically assaulted him. Witnesses and officials stated that the attackers tied the man's hands, stripped him, and forced him to walk on the road while shouting verbal abuses. The assailants also reportedly forced the victim to chant religious slogans against his will.

IIC Bhaskar Pradhan said a case has been registered and authorities are working to identify all those involved.

Public office, private gain

Last month, US President Donald Trump banned or severely restricted nationals of 20 additional countries from entering the United States, expanding the entry restrictions he put in place in June, supposedly to mitigate “national security and public safety threats.” But a cursory glance at the list of targeted countries makes clear that this is just another case of ethnonationalist politics dressed up as an anti-terrorism measure.

Many of the countries Trump targeted in 2025 – including Angola, Antigua and Barbuda, Dominica, Haiti, Laos, Malawi, Senegal, Sierra Leone, Tonga, Zambia, and Zimbabwe – have virtually no history of exporting transnational terrorism. But a large share of them – 16 out of the 20 announced last month and 26 of the 39 targeted in 2025 – are in Africa. The obvious conclusion, especially in light of Trump’s wider agenda and rhetoric, is that racial bias is informing US policy, much as religious bias guided his first administration’s 2017 restrictions on travel and resettlement from seven Muslim-majority countries.

To be sure, US officials say their decisions reflect “demonstrated, persistent, and severe deficiencies in screening, vetting, and information-sharing,” as well as criteria like visa-overstay rates and even refusal to accept US deportation flights. But these justifications are more improvised than airtight. For example, as the American Immigration Council observes, the Trump administration is using non-immigrant overstay rates to justify bans on immigrant visas.

Moreover, much like Trump’s tariffs, the criteria are being selectively applied, with some countries, such as Egypt and Kuwait, facing no new restrictions, despite high overstay rates, documented information-sharing, and vetting deficiencies. Even countries with longstanding links to global jihadism, such as Pakistan and Qatar, are being spared, despite Trump’s claim to be motivated by national-security considerations. Saudi Arabia belongs to both groups, yet it has never been targeted by Trump.

Some of these privileged countries are almost certainly dangerous. What they have in common is not that they are safe, but that they are useful. Countries like Egypt and Iraq are considered strategically indispensable. Saudi Arabia is not only a key US defense partner; it is, like Qatar, a major investor in the US – and in the investment firm of Trump’s son-in-law, Jared Kushner.

Pakistan signed a major investment deal with World Liberty Financial, a cryptocurrency firm majority-owned by the Trump family, as part of its aggressive courtship of the US administration. It’s a strategy that never fails to pay off: No country that hosts a major Trump-branded property or has struck a high-profile business deal with a member of Trump’s inner circle faces US travel restrictions.

A telling example of this pattern is that while the Trump administration tightened restrictions on many countries, it lifted its pre-existing ban on non-immigrant visas for Turkmenistan, which has supposedly made “significant progress in improving its identity-management and information-sharing procedures.” Conspicuously, the decision came just a few weeks after the exclusive, gas-rich country agreed to cooperate with the US on energy and critical minerals, and to consider granting preferential treatment to US firms.

This lesson is clear: countries that have strong personal ties to the Trump administration or lucrative business relationships with his family and cronies receive favorable treatment. The boundary between US public office and private gain has never been so porous, with Trump’s business empire expanding rapidly since his return to the presidency.

The result is absurd. A citizen of Burkina Faso, a country with no history of threatening US security, is barred from entering the country, but a national of Bangladesh, which is beset by Islamist violence and anti-American extremism, is not. This incongruity undermines the credibility of US diplomacy and counterterrorism efforts, as it sends a dangerous message to states that sponsor or tolerate extremism: accountability is negotiable.

If Trump actually wanted to protect the US from terrorism, he would pursue a strategy based on credible intelligence and consistent standards. He would recognize that international terrorism is not confined to weak or isolated states; on the contrary, some of its most prolific enablers are regional powers. And he would demonstrate a willingness to confront US partners and adversaries alike.

Unfortunately, for all of Trump’s talk about security, he has proven far more interested in lining his own pockets. His latest travel restrictions are a case study in how the language of national security can be repurposed for coercive diplomacy and private gain.

In a sense, this was the natural evolution of the “America First” ethos. The concept was always intended to justify a transactional approach to international engagement. But during Trump’s second presidency, it has ascended to a higher level of cynicism. Now, those who fail to produce adequate offerings for Trump are punished, while those who prove themselves useful to him can act virtually with impunity – US national security be damned.

NO BEIJING MODEL FOR DELHI

There is a Hindi idiom — chutki lena — that loosely translates as teasing, trolling, mocking or putting someone down. Social media today is full of people taking chutki over air pollution in Delhi. The recent tweet by Chinese Embassy spokesperson, offering “step-by-step guide” on how Beijing tackled air pollution, falls into this category. It is unsolicited, overly generic and not helpful — regardless that the Chinese capital recently suffered a rare smog (AQI of 214) after years of pollution clean-up efforts.

Researchers in India, including myself, have followed Beijing’s air quality journey closely for years. We have studied the “Beijing model,” examined its successes and understood its limitations. One must first recognise a basic reality about information coming out of China: it is tightly controlled and never complete. While general descriptions of actions taken and headline pollution reductions are widely available, crucial information is missing.

Data on regulatory enforcement, economic costs, public expenditure, private sector liabilities, worker displacement, compensation and social costs are largely absent. Without this information, simply lifting the Beijing model and superimposing it on Delhi is neither feasible nor responsible.

That said there is no denying Beijing has achieved remarkable improvements in air quality in a relatively short period. India can — and should — learn from their experience. But learning does not mean copying.

Value of a regional action plan: The Beijing-Tianjin-Hebei (BTH) regional framework enabled coordinated action across an airshed, leading to significant emission reductions. However, it is important to understand the administrative simplicity behind

it. BTH region covers about 2.2L sq km under two centrally administered municipalities — Beijing and Tianjin — and a single province, Hebei, with 11 cities. Coordinating action across this region, while challenging, was administratively manageable.

Replicating this approach for Delhi is far more complex. A meaningful regional plan for Delhi would need to cover areas within a 150 km radius, spanning six states (Delhi, Punjab, Haryana, UP, MP and Rajasthan), urban local bodies and cantonment areas. Delhi is governed by three authorities — Centre, state and municipal corporations, cantonment aside. So, we’ll require an entirely new administrative and governance model to make regional action work.

Public transport and vehicle electrification are other areas where Beijing offers important lessons. Many measures Beijing adopted — stricter emission standards, cleaner fuels, and scrapping old vehicles — are also being attempted in Delhi, but with limited success. A key difference is that Beijing actively curtailed the growth of private vehicles; Delhi has not. But like Beijing, we need to build world-class public transport across all of NCR. Similarly, rapid electrification of transport is essential.

In many ways, Beijing’s air pollution crisis helped catalyse China’s rise as the world leader in electric vehicles. China converted an environmental crisis into an economic opportunity. India should aim to do the same.

Reduction of coal use and strict regulation of power plants and industries is another critical lesson. While Delhi has shut down its thermal power plants and shifted many industries to the outskirts, coal use within the broader airshed remains substantial. Beijing not only reduced coal consumption by nearly 90% but also enforced extremely stringent emission standards. For example, the particulate matter standard for coal power plants in China is 10 mg/m³ or lower; in India, the standard is 30-100 mg/m³ — 3 to 10 times higher.

China’s SO standard is 35 mg/m³, whereas in India even relaxed limits of 100-600 mg/m³ were exempted for nearly 75% of coal-based power plants. Without enforcing strict pollution norms, meaningful air quality improvement is impossible. This is one of Beijing’s clearest lessons.

Shutting down or relocating more than 3,000 heavy industries, as Beijing did, would effectively de-industrialise the entire region. Such an approach would be economically disastrous, so-

cially destabilising and politically untenable in India.

Then there is the question of cost. While exact figures are unavailable, it is clear that Beijing spent billions of dollars to clean its air. That scale of expenditure is simply not feasible for India. Any clean air plan for Delhi must work within the country’s fiscal constraints.

Finally, Delhi faces challenges Beijing never had to confront. The most prominent is stubble burning. Beijing’s air quality was not affected by seasonal agricultural fires the way Delhi’s is. Any serious clean air plan for Delhi must directly address this problem.

Similarly, clean cooking fuel was never an issue for Beijing. China transitioned most households to gas by the early 2000s and launched a Clean Heating Policy in 2013 to move residential heating away from biomass and coal. In contrast, biomass use for cooking and heating remains a major source of pollution in the Delhi-NCR and must be tackled head-on.

Lastly, the Delhi airshed also faces a major challenge from pollution generated by lakhs of informal micro and small enterprises — from jaggery and confectionery makers to small metalworkers and many others. These enterprises must be supported to shift to clean fuels.

In sum, while Delhi can and should learn from Beijing — and from other cities around the world — it must develop its own clean-air strategy and make it work in Indian conditions. From a researcher’s perspective, it is clear Delhi’s air pollution challenge is far more complex than Beijing’s ever was. Social media chutki may earn likes and retweets, but cleaning Delhi’s air requires far more than a step-by-step guide.

The looming population bust

While many people still view runaway population growth as today’s most urgent global challenge, falling fertility rates are the real demographic time bomb. Nearly two-thirds of people now live in countries where fertility is below the replacement rate of 2.1 children per woman. The UN expects the world’s population to peak in the 2080s, with some scholars arguing that the turning point may arrive even sooner.

The consequences of this shift are already visible. As the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development’s (EBRD’s) latest Transition Report shows, the median age in advanced economies has risen from 29 in 1950 to 41 in 2023. The trend is even more pronounced in Central and Eastern Europe: the median age in Croatia and Bulgaria now stands at 45 and 44, respectively, while in Poland it has reached 42. In Nigeria, by contrast, the median age is just 18.

What sets Central and Eastern European economies apart is that their demographic transitions are unfolding at income levels 3-4 times lower than was the case for advanced economies. In other words, they are growing old before they grow rich, leaving them with limited capacity to sustain growth.

Declining fertility reflects profound shifts in social norms

and cultural attitudes toward family planning, as people marry later in life and, increasingly, do not marry at all. The EBRD report finds that more than three-quarters of baby boomers in the EU’s eastern member states were married by their early 30s. Among millennials, that figure has fallen to roughly two-thirds.

At the same time, motherhood has changed. Women are becoming mothers later in life, owing to longer education, shifting gender roles, and evolving career aspirations. Since 1990, the average age of first-time mothers has increased from 24 to 29 in Croatia, from nearly 24 to 28 in Poland, and from 26.8 to 31.5 in Spain. A growing share of women have no children, while those who do typically have fewer than in previous generations.

Later motherhood and persistent economic pressures reduce the likelihood of having larger families. As a result, many people have fewer children than they may want. Surveys show that in the world’s richest countries, respondents have, on average, one child fewer than their stated ideal. In poor countries, where fertility rates remain high, the opposite is the case.

The combination of falling fertility and rising life expectancy implies rapidly aging populations and shrinking

workforces, which will increase the number of retirees relative to workers and erode living standards. According to the EBRD’s projections, demographic headwinds will shave an average of 0.4 percentage points off annual GDP per capita growth in emerging European economies through 2050.

Structural reforms could mitigate some of these demographic pressures. Raising the pension age, for example, would extend productive working lives. Increased immigration could help supplement shrinking labor forces, while technological innovation could boost productivity.

But none of these measures would be easy to implement or realize. As France’s abandoned pension reform illustrates, raising the retirement age remains deeply unpopular. Similarly, increased migration, especially at the scale required to offset demographic decline, would invariably face strong voter resistance in countries where immigration has become a major political fault line. And while AI advances may enable some workers to become more productive, many others will be displaced and require retraining.

The greatest obstacle, however, may be aging itself. As societies age, so do electorates, with older voters increasingly shaping policy outcomes. Turning out in higher numbers, they

tend to favour higher spending on pensions, health care, and defence while showing far less enthusiasm for immigration, education, or short-term risk-taking in pursuit of long-term growth.

Political leadership is aging as well, particularly in countries with entrenched incumbents, narrowing the space for critical pension reforms, labour-market adjustments, and pro-immigration policies. Reversing this trend will require not only bold policy choices but also sustained efforts to mobilize younger voters.

Despite these constraints, demography need not be destiny. Reforms that take effect gradually, including pension adjustments, are often more politically palatable when enacted well in advance. What is needed is political courage: a willingness to explain difficult trade-offs, resist short-term pressures, and act before demographic realities close off available options. Only leaders prepared to address those realities today – and, crucially, bring younger voters into the debate – can ensure shared prosperity in the decades ahead.

Dangerous convergence

FROM LOKPAL STIR TO RURAL DEVELOPMENT

Anna Hazare’s papers to be part of PMML archives

Pune, Jan 8: The Prime Ministers’ Museum and Library (PMML) in New Delhi will preserve the correspondence and papers of veteran activist Anna Hazare, recognising his contribution to social reforms, rural development and anti-corruption movements, including the 2011 agitation for Lokpal, his close aide said.

A PMML team, led by Neeraj Kumar and Jitumani Sharma, under the guidance of Associate Director Ravi Mishra, arrived at Ralegan Siddhi, the activist’s native village in Maharashtra’s Ahilyanagar district, to initiate the process, Hazare’s associate Datta Awari claimed Wednesday. Documents to be archived included material related to Hazare’s social work, the historic 2011 Lokpal movement in New Delhi, village development initiatives, water conservation efforts and campaigns against

corruption. These will be preserved at the PMML archives for historical and academic research, he said.

Over the years, the Armyman-turned-activist, who is in his 80s, has led numerous movements to promote rural development, increase transparency in government functioning, and curb corruption. He is a recipient of the Padma Bhushan, India’s third-highest civilian award.

Hazare’s papers are expected to hold significant academic and historical value, given his leadership of the Lokpal movement and long-standing work in rural development and the fight against corruption, said a release quoting PMML officials.

The PMML is an internationally renowned autonomous academic institution engaged in research on modern and contemporary Indian history. Its archives house institutional collections of organisations such as the AICC, Janata Party, DAV College Trust and Management Society, and personal papers of eminent figures, including Jawaharlal Nehru, Mahatma Gandhi, Syama Prasad Mookerjee, Charan Singh, Chandrashekhar and Jayaprakash Narayan.

According to the release, the archives mainly consist of original correspondence, diaries, unpublished documents, notes, speeches and articles of prominent personalities. The institution is also undertaking a major digitisation project to make archival material accessible to scholars.



FROM 2017 TO 2026

Assets of several BMC poll candidates see steep jump

As many as 1,700 candidates are in the fray for the 227-ward Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation elections scheduled January 15

Mumbai, Jan 8: Several prominent candidates in the upcoming Mumbai civic polls, including former mayor Kishori Pednekar, have declared a sharp rise in assets since 2017, according to affidavits uploaded by the State Election Commission.

As many as 1,700 candidates are in the fray for the 227-ward Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) elections scheduled January 15. Shiv Sena (UBT) candidate and former city mayor Kishori Pednekar, contesting from Lower Parel (ward 199) in central Mumbai, has declared total assets of Rs 5.26 crore, a 226 per cent increase from Rs 1.61 crore in 2017.

Pednekar, who served as Mumbai mayor from 2019 to 2022, has declared immovable and movable assets of Rs 4.69 crore and Rs 57 lakh, respectively. Shiv Sena (Shinde faction) candidate Samadhan Sarvankar, son of former MLA Sada Sarvankar and seeking a second term, has declared assets of Rs 46.59 crore, a steep rise of 394 per cent from Rs 9.43 crore in 2017. The Sena candidate,

who has listed his profession as business, has immovable assets of Rs 40.59 crore, along with substantial movable assets, as per the affidavit.

Former MLA Yamini Jadhav (Shiv Sena candidate from Mazagaon area ward 209), wife of former corporator and ex-chairman of BMC’s standing committee, Yashwant Jadhav, has Rs 14.57 crore of assets, including immovable properties of Rs 11.28 crore and movable properties of Rs 3.28 crore.

In 2024, when she contested the Maharashtra assembly elections, she had declared total assets of Rs 10.10 crore, along with loans of Rs 52 lakh from financial institutions.

Gangster-turned-politician Arun Gawali’s daughter, Geeta Gawali, who is contesting from the Byculla-Agripada area (ward 212) and seeking another term, has declared assets of Rs 7.26 crore, including Rs 4.70 crore in immovable properties, compared to Rs 3.38 crore during the 2019 assembly polls.

Her younger sister, Yogita Gawali (ward 207), who is contesting civic elections for the first time from the Chinchpok-

li-Byculla area (ward 207), has declared assets of Rs 3.65 crore, including Rs 1.19 crore in movable assets.

Neil Somaiya (35), former corporator and son of BJP leader Kirit Somaiya, has declared total assets worth Rs 9.89 crore, a 400 per cent rise against Rs 1.99 crore in 2017. His assets include Rs 5.72 crore and Rs 4.16 crore in movable and immovable properties, respectively, as per the affidavit.

Prabhakar Shinde, another prominent BJP leader in the BMC, has assets of Rs 17.63 crore, compared to Rs 11.9 crore in 2017 (48 per cent rise).

Former Shiv Sena (UBT) corporator Sachin Padwal, contesting from the Sewri area (ward 206) and seeking a second term, has declared assets worth Rs 5.4 crore, up from Rs 65.06 lakh nine years ago, a rise of over 700 per cent. He has immovable properties of Rs. 3.54 crore in immovable properties.

Tejasvini Ghosalkar, who recently joined the BJP after quitting Shiv Sena (UBT) and is contesting from ward 2 in the Dahisar area, has declared assets of Rs 5.15 crore, as against Rs 25.82 lakh in 2017.

Congress candidate from ward 1 in Dahisar, Sheetal Mhatre, has shown total assets of Rs 4.27 crore, compared to Rs 17.29 lakh in the last civic polls. She has declared immovable and movable assets of Rs 1.22 crore and Rs 3.05 crore, respectively.

The last date for filing the nomination papers was December 30. While the affidavits of several candidates contesting the January 15 civic polls have been uploaded on the BMC’s website, those of some nominees were not published till late Wednesday night.

ACCI flags influx of Bangladeshi products

Itanagar, Jan 8: The Arunachal Chamber of Commerce and Industries (ACCI) Thursday raised concern over the growing influx of Bangladeshi products into Indian markets, saying that unchecked entry of foreign brands is hurting local traders, MSMEs and indigenous entrepreneurs, particularly in the sensitive border state.

ACCI president Tarh Nachung, in a statement, said local traders face significantly higher transportation and operational costs, making it difficult to compete with low-priced imported goods.

He cautioned that the trend threatens local employment, traditional trades and runs contrary to the national vision of ‘Atmanirbhar Bharat’ and ‘Vocal for Local’.

The ACCI also expressed concern over reported incidents of violence against Hindus in Bangladesh. Citing reports, the chamber said six Hindus have been killed in the last 18 days, including Rana Pratap Bairagi and Sarat Mani

Chakraborty January 5. Describing these incidents as inhuman and deeply disturbing, the chamber said it was shocked to see the rising presence of Bangladeshi brands in India even as members of the minority community continue to face violence in Bangladesh.

It said the growing market footprint of such brands is impacting local trade and small businesses.

The ACCI pointed out that products of Bangladeshi companies have gained access across the country, including the Northeast.

While reiterating respect for lawful international trade and regional cooperation, the chamber cautioned that unregulated or excessive market penetration is creating unfair competition for local traders, MSMEs and indigenous businesses.

Underscoring the strategic and economic sensitivity of the Himalayan region, Nachung urged policymakers to adopt a region-specific approach while framing trade and market-access policies.

He cautioned that unchecked inflow of foreign-branded products could weaken the fragile economic ecosystem of the Northeast.

The chamber also asked distributors of the identified foreign brands operating in the state to surrender their licences immediately, while retailers should sell or dispose of existing stocks within a week.

Movement of hazardous goods through Sela Tunnel regulated for public safety

Itanagar, Jan 8: Arunachal Pradesh’s West Kameng district administration has imposed strict regulations on transportation of hazardous goods through the strategically important Sela Tunnel, citing public safety and the need to prevent untoward incidents inside the underpass.

According to an order by deputy commissioner Akriti Sagar, movement of vehicles carrying hazardous materials through the Sela Tunnel will now be allowed only during fixed time windows.

According to the order, vehicles carrying inflammable liquids such as petrol and LPG will be permitted to pass through the tunnel between 1 pm and 3 pm, while night-time movement will be allowed only between 11 pm and 4 am.

The administration has also clarified that Army vehicles transporting hazardous materials may be allowed to cross the tunnel strictly as per convoy movement, after prior intimation to the tunnel safety officer.

The order further outlines comprehensive winter and monsoon traffic management measures.

The Border Roads Organisation (BRO) has been made responsible for ensuring that the tunnel remains traffic-worthy through adequate deploy-

ment of manpower, equipment and regular maintenance.

Traffic police will manage vehicular movement, including diversion of vehicles when required. During snowy conditions, civil police deployed at Padma and Dirang towns will ensure that snow chains are fitted on vehicles entering the tunnel road. A set of mandatory safety instructions has also been issued. All vehicles carrying dangerous goods must be equipped with automatic self-extinguishing devices, while firefighting equipment such as extinguishers and hydrants must be installed inside the tunnel and kept clearly visible and easily accessible.

Overtaking inside the tunnel has been strictly prohibited, and vehicles carrying hazardous goods must maintain a safe distance from other vehicles at all times.

The order states that any vehicle transporting hazardous materials must inform the tunnel safety officer at least 24 hours in advance to enable preparation of a proper hazardous passage manifest.

The maximum speed limit inside the tunnel has been capped at 40 km per hour, and both overtaking and halting inside the tunnel are strictly prohibited.

Champion of Western Ghats conservation Madhav Gadgil dies

Pune, Jan 8: Noted ecologist Madhav Gadgil, known for his work on the conservation of Western Ghats, has passed away in Pune after a brief illness, family sources said Thursday.

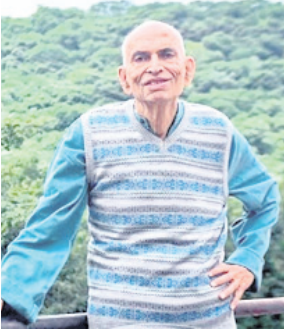
He was 83. Gadgil breathed his last late Wednesday night at a hospital in Pune, the sources said. He played a pioneering role in shaping India’s ecological research and conservation policy.

Gadgil was the founder of the Centre for Ecological Sciences at the Indian Institute of Science (IISc),

Bangalore, and chairman of the Western Ghats Ecology Expert Panel (WGEEP), popularly known as the Gadgil Commission.

In 2024, the United Nations presented Gadgil with the annual Champions of the Earth award, the UN’s highest environmental honour, for his seminal work on the Western Ghats, a global biodiversity hotspot.

He had chaired the government-constituted Western Ghats Ecology Expert Panel to study the impact of population pressure, climate change, and development activities on the ecologically fragile region



in India. In 2010, Gadgil was appointed chairman of the panel, which submitted a landmark report recommending that a significant portion of the Western Ghats be designated as ecologically sensitive. While the report triggered intense debate, it is widely regarded as a milestone in India’s environmental discourse. Born in Pune May 24, 1942, Gadgil hailed from an illustrious academic family.

His father, Dhananjay Ramchandra Gadgil, was a noted economist and former director of the Gokhale Institute.

Madhav Gadgil graduated in biology from Fergusson College in 1963 and completed his master’s degree in zoology from the University of Mumbai in 1965. He went on to pursue a PhD from Harvard University in 1969, where he worked on mathematical ecology and animal behaviour.

After returning to India in 1971, Gadgil joined the Indian Institute of Science in 1973.

During his tenure at IISc, he established key institu-

tions, including the Centre for Ecological Sciences and the Centre for Theoretical Studies, laying the foundation for modern ecological research in the country.

He retired from IISc in 2004 and later continued his academic engagement with the Agharkar Research Institute in Pune and the University of Goa. Gadgil served on several high-level national and international bodies, including the Scientific Advisory Council to the Prime Minister, the National Advisory Council, and the National Tiger Conservation Authority.

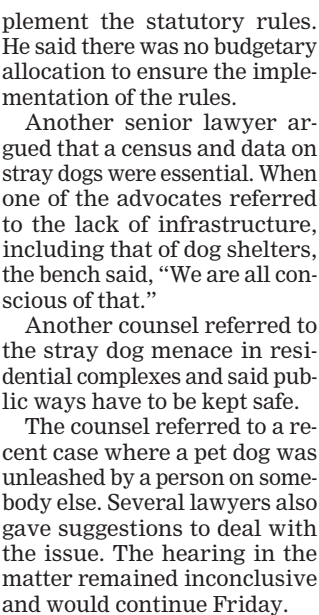

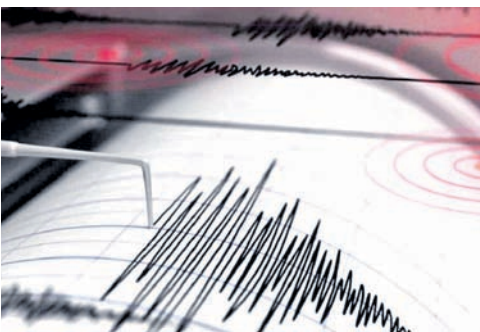

WATER CONTAMINATION

Several fall ill in Greater Noida

Noida, Jan 8: Several residents of Greater Noida's Delta 1 Sector fell ill after allegedly consuming contaminated drinking water, prompting health concerns and complaints of sewage mixing with the supply line, officials and residents said. The affected residents reported symptoms such as vomiting, fever, stomachache and loose motions after consuming tap water in parts of the sector Tuesday and Wednesday. However, officials of the Greater Noida Industrial Development Authority (GNIDA) denied any mixing of sewage with the potable water supply, claiming tests conducted so far found the water to be clean. Rishipal Bhati, a resident and former president of the local residents' welfare association (RWA), told PTI on Thursday that overflow of sewage and leakage in pipelines, particularly in C Block, led to the problem.

"Around six to seven families fell ill with symptoms such as vomiting, fever and loose motions after consuming contaminated water," he said, adding that similar complaints had earlier surfaced from other blocks as well. The incident follows heightened concern over water safety following recent cases reported from Indore in Madhya Pradesh, where multiple deaths were linked to the consumption of contaminated water, and from Gandhinagar in Gujarat, where several people reportedly fell ill due to polluted water supply. Authorities across states have since stepped up monitoring and testing of drinking water sources.

The residents of Delta 1 alleged that sewage water from blocked sewer lines was mixing with broken pipelines and reaching household taps. A resident complained of a severe stomachache after consuming tap water, while others said water leakage has been a recurring issue in the sector. Harendra Bhati, a resident of Beta 1 Sector located nearby, claimed that sewage overflow is a common problem in several parts of Greater Noida. "I have raised the issue multiple times, but no permanent solution has been implemented," he said. GNIDA officials said the authority took immediate note of the complaints on Wednesday, with a water department team visiting the affected homes and testing water samples.

Mumbai, Jan 8: Shiv Sena (UBT) chief Uddhav Thackeray Thursday said there was no alternative to the unity of the Congress and regional Opposition parties at the national level, and blamed Prime Minister Narendra Modi for "breaking" his party. Use-and-throw has been the BJP's policy and it has reduced the Shiv Sena faction led by Eknath Shinde to a "doormat", the former Maharashtra chief minister said in an interview to PTI Videos ahead of the all-important election to the Brihan-mumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) January 15. His cousin, Maharashtra Navnirman Sena chief Raj Thackeray, and him will never part ways now that they have come together after several years, Uddhav said. Responding to the question whether the INDIA bloc still exists, Uddhav said, "Probe a bit and check whether the INDIA bloc is there or not. It is true that we met only once after Parliamentary polls at Rahul ji's (Rahul Gandhi) residence."

Congress unilaterally declared that it wanted an alliance with Shiv Sena (UBT) for the civic polls but not with the other parties (MNS) which are with the Sena, he said. "Sharad" Pawar saheb (NCP-SP) is with us (in the BMC polls). Congress is not with us. At the national level we want everyone to be together. We, other regional parties and Congress should be there. There should be an attempt to



(come together). I don't see any other alternative to it," Thackeray asserted.

The Congress, an important partner in the Opposition's Maha Vikas Aghadi in Maharashtra, decided to go solo in the BMC polls citing Shiv Sena (UBT)'s alliance with the MNS which is known for its strident anti-North Indian stand. When asked whether the MNS will be part of the INDIA bloc in future, Thackeray said, "Currently, the Shiv Sena (UBT) and MNS have come together. Anyone else who wants to come can join us. It's their wish. We are not going to ask them if they want to come along."

On his stormy relations with the BJP, he said, "I am sad and angry that I campaigned for Narendra Modi in 2014 and 2019. Even after helping him twice, he broke my party. "I was (then) saying that he should be made prime minister. Now, he is saying that I should be finished," Thackeray added. He also alleged that separating Mumbai from Maharashtra

was the "old dream" of the BJP. "Now they think that (Uddhav's father and Sena founder) Balasaheb Thackeray is not there (and) they have finished off the Sena on paper. But they can't do so on the ground," he said.

"BJP's tendency is to use and throw. This bad tendency was not there during Atal ji's (Atal Bihari Vajpayee) time. The BJP has turned the Eknath Shinde-led Shiv Sena into a doormat," Thackeray said. Shinde, notably, split the Shiv Sena led by Thackeray in June 2022, and formed a government with the BJP's support.

On his rapprochement with cousin Raj Thackeray, Uddhav said they have come together "after much thought and understanding."

The once-estranged cousins, fighting for survival after the drubbing their respective parties received in the 2024 assembly elections, announced an alliance last month ahead of the polls in Mumbai and 28 other municipal corporations in Maharashtra.

Tenor of Wangchuk's speech not to spread violence, wife tells SC

New Delhi, Jan 8: Jailed climate activist Sonam Wangchuk's wife, Gitanjali J Angmo, told the Supreme Court Thursday that the tenor of her husband's speech was not to propagate violence, but to quell it, and facts are being manipulated to portray him as a criminal. Angmo also told the top court that Wangchuk was not provided with the "complete grounds" of his detention and was not given a proper opportunity to make a representation to the authority concerned against detention.

Hearing in the matter remained inconclusive and will continue January 12. Wangchuk was detained under the stringent National Security Act (NSA) September 26, 2025, two days after violent protests demanding

statehood and Sixth Schedule status for Ladakh left four people dead and 90 injured in the Union territory. The government has accused him of inciting the violence.

The NSA empowers the Centre and states to detain individuals to prevent them from acting in a manner "prejudicial to the defence of India". The maximum detention period is 12 months, though it can be revoked earlier. Senior advocate Kapil Sibal, appearing for Angmo, told a bench of Justices Aravind Kumar and Prasanna B Varale that Wangchuk was detained by the administration to prevent him from indulging in the prejudicial activities.

Playing a video of Wangchuk's speech in the top court, Sibal said the climate activist made a speech while breaking his hunger strike.

Icy cold freezes Dal Lake fringes in J&K

New Delhi, Jan 8: The winter chill deepened Thursday across northern states, as fringes of Dal Lake and several other water bodies froze in Jammu and Kashmir, and mercury plunged further in the national capital and Uttar Pradesh.

Icy cold wave conditions continued in most parts of Himachal Pradesh as well, with sub-zero temperatures in 13 districts and near-zero in four, officials said.

In Jammu and Kashmir, several places, including Srinagar, experienced the coldest night of the season as cold conditions tightened their grip in Kashmir with a significant fall in the minimum temperature in most parts.

The bone-chilling cold conditions led to the freezing of the fringes of several water bodies, including the famous Dal Lake here. Srinagar recorded a low of minus 5.1 degrees



Celsius on Wednesday night, down 3.5 degrees from minus 1.6 degrees Celsius Tuesday night, officials said. They said it was the season's coldest night in the city, and the minimum temperature was 3.2 degrees below the season's normal. The tourist resort of Sonamarg in central Kashmir's Ganderbal district was the coldest recorded place in Jammu and Kashmir as it shivered at a low of minus 9.8 degrees Celsius, they said.

The night temperature in



Gulmarg in north Kashmir's Baramulla district settled at a low of minus 9.2 degrees Celsius, down from minus 7.6 degrees Celsius, they said.

It was the lowest temperature at the resort so far this winter, they added.

Kashmir valley is currently in the midst of 'Chilla-i-Kalan', a 40-day period of extreme cold, during which night temperatures often drop several degrees below the freezing point, and chances of snowfall are the highest.

MERCURY PLUNGES IN UP, DELHI

CHANDIGARH, THE COMMON CAPITAL OF THE TWO STATES, RECORDED A LOW OF 7.6 DEGREES CELSIUS IN PUNJAB, BATHINDA WAS THE COLDEST CITY, WITH THE MERCURY SETTLING AT 5 DEGREES CELSIUS IN RAJASTHAN, COLD WAVE CONDITIONS CONTINUED IN SEVERAL PARTS, WITH THE SIKAR DISTRICT BEING THE COLDEST AT 2.5 DEGREES CELSIUS IN JAIPUR, THE MAXIMUM AND MINIMUM TEMPERATURES WERE RECORDED AT 17.6 DEGREES CELSIUS AND 4.4 DEGREES CELSIUS, RESPECTIVELY

The plains of the valley, however, have not received any snowfall so far this season.

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has said the weather is likely to remain dry

but cloudy till January 20.

It said the night temperatures would witness a significant fall in the valley till January 10.

In Himachal Pradesh, Kumseri was the coldest with a minimum temperature of minus 11.2 degrees Celsius, while Tabo recorded a low of minus 8.9 degrees.

Out of 34 stations, 13 recorded a minimum temperature below zero degrees, while data from seven stations was not available. The mercury stayed between 3 and 7 degrees Celsius at the remaining 10 stations.

The local Meteorological station issued a yellow warning of dense fog at isolated places in Una, Hamirpur, Bilaspur, Kangra, Mandi, Solan and Sirmaur, from January 9 to 12.

The weather office predicted dry weather in the state for the next four days and a gradual increase of two to four degrees in minimum temperature during the next three to four days.

Assembly Speaker orders forensic probe of video

Opposition AAP MLAs also protested, shouting slogans and waving posters.

The BJP MLAs Tuesday accused Atishi of "insulting" the Sikh Guru after a special discussion on a programme held by the Delhi government to mark his 350th martyrdom anniversary in November last year.

Gupta said that both the ruling party and the Opposition Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) members have demanded a forensic examination of the video clip.

He ordered the forensic probe report to be submitted within 15 days.

"The matter related to the remarks allegedly made by the Leader of Opposition regarding Sikh Gurus has been referred by Speaker Vijender Gupta to the Privileges Committee for examination and report," a statement from the Delhi Assembly secretariat read.

On Thursday, the speaker adjourned the House for the entire day amid protests. It was adjourned without transacting any business Wednesday also.

The session has been extended for one day to complete important business, including tabling of CAG reports, motion of thanks on LG address to the House, tabling of Jan Vishwas Bill, and appropriation Bills.

Parliamentary Affairs Minister Parvesh Verma demanded a time-bound completion of the probe into the matter by the Privileges Committee.

Syrian army launches new strikes in Aleppo

Aleppo: The Syrian army launched new strikes in parts of Aleppo Thursday after ordering residents to evacuate, accusing the Kurdish-led Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF) of using Kurdish-majority areas to launch attacks as clashes entered a third day. The army released more than seven maps identifying areas it said would be targeted in strikes, urging residents to leave immediately for their safety. Its operations command announced a curfew in the neighbourhoods of Sheikh Maqsoud and Ashrafieh from 3 pm.

Israeli forces kill 4 in Gaza

Cairo/Dubai: Israeli forces killed at least four Palestinians in two separate strikes in the Gaza Strip Thursday, hours after the military said it had hit the site of a failed militant rocket launch, the latest violence to jeopardise the ceasefire. Medics said an Israeli airstrike killed at least three people and wounded three others, including children, in a tent in the western area of Khan Younis in the southern Gaza Strip. Another strike killed a person east of the city, near where Israeli forces operate. There was no immediate Israeli comment on the death reports. Earlier, the military said it had struck a launch site shortly after the firing of a rocket that had failed to reach Israeli territory. It accused Hamas of violating the ceasefire twice in the past 24 hours.

Separatist leader flees Yemen with UAE help

Aden: The Saudi-led coalition in Yemen said Thursday that the United Arab Emirates had spirited a separatist leader out of the country by boat in a dramatic twist to a rift between the Gulf powers, as Saudi-backed forces advanced to the port of Aden after losing ground there. The escape of Aidarous al-Zubaidi, head of a UAE-backed southern separatist group, could exacerbate tensions between Saudi Arabia and the UAE, global oil heavyweights and both close allies of the United States. The Saudi assertion that the UAE helped him escape raises the stakes in a crisis that erupted last month when the separatists swept through southern Yemen, including Aden, advancing within reach of the border with Saudi Arabia. Riyadh declared the move a threat to its national security.

Moscow, Jan 8: Three Indians are among the crew on board the Russian oil tanker seized by the US, local media reported even as Moscow Thursday asked Washington to comply with international laws on freedom of maritime navigation while strongly rejecting its 'neo-colonist' tendencies.

The Russian Foreign Ministry also said information about the *Marinera* tanker, previously known as *Bella 1*, that was seized Wednesday by the US coastguard in the North Atlantic, was conveyed to America repeatedly.

"The *Marinera* crew consists of 17 Ukrainian citizens, six Georgian citizens, three Indian citizens and two Russian citizens," Russia Today said, quoting sources.

"We call on Washington to resume compliance with the fundamental norms and principles of international maritime navigation and immediately cease its illegal actions against the *Marinera* tanker and other vessels engaged in law-abiding activities on the high seas," the Foreign Ministry said in a statement.

Moscow said it considers the US references to its national "sanctions legislation" to be unfounded.

"The statements by some US officials that the seizure of the *Marinera* is part of a broader strategy to establish Washing-

ton's unlimited control over Venezuela's natural resources are extremely cynical. We strongly reject such neo-colonialist tendencies," the Foreign Ministry underscored.

"Unilateral restrictive measures by the US, as well as other Western countries, are illegitimate and cannot justify attempts to establish jurisdiction and, even more so, to seize ships on the high seas," it said.

Demanding humane and dignified treatment of its crew, the statement said, "We reiterate our demand that the US ensure humane and dignified treatment of the Russian citizens comprising the tanker's crew, strictly observe their rights and interests, and make no obstacles to their prompt return to their homeland."

It also expressed serious concerns of the use of military force by the US against the oil tanker, full information about which was conveyed to it.

"The *Marinera*, which on December 24 received temporary permission to sail under the Russian flag in accordance with the international law and Russian legislation, was peacefully transiting international waters in the North Atlantic, heading for one of Russia's ports," the foreign ministry said.

The US government had been repeatedly provided with reliable information, including from the Russian Foreign Ministry, about the ship's Russian origin and its civilian status, it asserted.

"Russia did not give consent to these actions. On the contrary, it lodged an official protest with the US government regarding the pursuit of the *Marinera* by a US Coast Guard vessel over the past several weeks, insisting on the immediate cessation of these activities and the withdrawal of the unlawful demands made on the Russian ship's captain," the ministry said.

Under these circumstances, US military personnel boarding a civilian vessel on the high seas and effectively seizing it, as well as capturing its crew, "can only be viewed as a gross violation of the basic principles and norms of international maritime law and freedom of navigation," the Russian Foreign Ministry said.

Dhaka suspends visa service in India, seeks US visa bond exemption

Dhaka, Jan 8: Bangladesh's interim government Thursday said it has asked its key missions in India, including at New Delhi, to suspend visa services over security concerns.

Foreign Affairs Adviser M Touhid Hossain told a media briefing at his office that Bangladesh has also sought reversal of a recently imposed visa bond requirement by the United States.

"What I have done is that I have asked our three missions (in India) to keep their visa sections closed for the time being. It's a security issue," Hossain said.

The adviser's comments came after Bangladesh's Deputy High Commission in Kolkata overnight restricted visa services after identical moves in New Delhi and Agartala keeping business and work visas beyond the purview of the restriction.

Bangladesh has diplomatic missions in Mumbai and Chennai as well, where the visa services remained operative.

India had earlier imposed restrictions on visas for Bangladeshi nationals after August 5, 2024, citing security concerns. Bangladesh ties with New Delhi have remained strained since prime minister Sheikh Hasina's Awami League regime was ousted following a violent student-led street protest in July-August 2024.

Hossain also told reporters that Bangladesh will pursue diplomatic efforts to seek exemption from the United States' newly imposed visa bond requirement calling the decision "certainly unfortunate and painful for us."

He, however, said the US decision was "not abnormal" as it was not applied for Bangladesh alone and a number of countries were faced with immigration-related challenges in view of the US administration's measure.

Pak, Saudi in talks on JF-17 jets for loans deal

Islamabad, Jan 8: Pakistan and Saudi Arabia are in talks to convert about \$2 billion of Saudi loans into a JF-17 fighter jet deal, two Pakistani sources said, deepening military cooperation months after the two nations signed a mutual defence pact last year.

The talks underscore how the two allies are moving to operationalise defence cooperation at a time when Pakistan is facing acute financial strain and Saudi Arabia is reshaping its security partnerships to hedge against uncertainty about US commitments in the Middle East.

The mutual defence deal was signed following Israel's strikes on what it said were Hamas targets in Doha, an attack that shook the Gulf region.

One of the sources said the discussions were limited to the provision of JF-17 Thunder fighter jets, the light combat aircraft jointly developed by Pakistan and China and produced in Pakistan, while the second said the jets were the primary option among others under discussion.

The first source said the total deal was worth \$4 billion, with an additional \$2 billion to be spent on equipment over and above the loan conversion. The sources close to the military with knowledge of the matter spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorised to speak on the deal.

Pakistan's military and finance and defence ministries did not immediately respond to requests for comment. Saudi Arabia's government media office also did not respond.

Pakistan's Air Chief Zabeer Ahmed Baber Sidhu was in Saudi Arabia this week to discuss "bilateral defence cooperation, regional security environment and future avenues of collaboration" with his counterpart Lieutenant General Turki bin Bander bin

Pakistan's defence minister Tuesday said the success of its weapons industry could transform the country's economic outlook.

"Our aircraft have been tested, and we are receiving so many orders that Pakistan may not need the International Monetary Fund in six months," Khawaja Asif told broadcaster Geo News.

Foreign troops in Ukraine would be targets: Russia UK and France pledge post-ceasefire deployment

Moscow, Jan 8: Russia said Thursday that any troops sent to Ukraine by Western governments would be "legitimate combat targets", after Britain and France announced plans to deploy a multinational force there in the event of a ceasefire.

A Russian Foreign Ministry statement said "militaristic declarations" by a coalition of pro-Ukraine Western governments were becoming increasingly dangerous.

Russia was responding for the first time to a meeting of the "coalition of the willing" in Paris Tuesday at which Britain and France signed a declaration of intent on the future deployment.

French President Emmanuel Macron said it could involve



sending thousands of French troops. British Prime Minister Keir Starmer said it paved the way for a legal framework whereby "British, French and partner forces could operate on Ukrainian soil, securing Ukraine's skies and seas and regenerating Ukraine's armed forces for the future".

Russia "warns that the deployment of Western military units, military facilities, depots and other infrastructure on Ukrainian territory will be

classified as foreign intervention, posing a direct threat to the security of not only Russia but also other European countries," the statement from Moscow said.

"All such units and facilities will be considered legitimate combat targets of the Russian Armed Forces."

It added, "The fresh militaristic declarations of the so-called coalition of the willing and the Kyiv regime constitute a veritable 'axis of war'."

"The plans of these participants are becoming increasingly dangerous and destructive for the future of the European continent and its inhabitants, who are also being forced by Western politicians to finance these aspirations out of their own pockets."

MERCOSUR TRADE DEAL

Paris, Jan 8: French farmers blockaded roads into Paris and landmarks like the Arc de Triomphe with tractors Thursday in protest against a sweeping trade deal the European Union is due to sign with South American nations.

Farmers from the right-wing Coordination Rurale union called for the protests in Paris amid fears the planned free trade agreement with the Mercosur bloc will flood the EU with cheap food imports.

They also protested against high costs and excessive local regulation and demanded an end to a government policy of culling herds of cows in response to a highly contagious cattle disease, which they consider excessive.

"We are between resentment and despair. We have a feeling of abandonment, with Mercos-

ur being an example," Stephane Pelletier, a senior member of the Coordination Rurale union, told Reuters beneath the Eiffel Tower.

FARMERS' PROTEST PILES PRESSURE ON MACRON

The farmers overran police checkpoints to enter the city, driving along the Champs Elysees avenue and blocking the road around the Arc de Triomphe before dawn, before gathering in front of the National Assembly.

National Assembly President Yael Braun-Pivet was booed and jostled when she stepped outside of the assembly's gates to talk with the Coordination Rurale protesters.

Dozens of tractors obstructed highways leading into the capital ahead of the morning rush hour, including the A13 leading into Paris from the western suburbs and Normandy causing 150 km of traffic jams, the



transport minister said.

Farmers from the FNSEA and young farmers unions joined them later at the Eiffel Tower in a calm demonstration.

"We're going to import products from the rest of the world that don't meet our standards - that's not possible, that's unacceptable. So we're staying mobilised, we're carrying on," Arnaud Rousseau, president

of the FNSEA farm union told reporters, referring to the Mercosur deal.

The protest piles yet more pressure on President Emmanuel Macron and his government, a day before EU member states are expected to vote on the trade accord. Without a majority in parliament, any policy misstep by Macron risks a perilous vote of no confidence in the chamber.

France has long been a stiff opponent of the trade deal.

Even though Paris has won significant last-minute concessions, the trade deal is a political hot potato for the government, with municipal elections in March and the far right polling strongly ahead of elections to replace Macron in 2027.

"This treaty is still not acceptable," government spokesperson Maud Bregeon told France Info radio.

French Farm Minister Annie Genevard said Wednesday that, even if EU members backed the accord, France would continue to fight against it in the European Parliament, whose approval will also be required for the agreement to enter into force.

This week the European Commission proposed making 45 billion euros of EU funding available earlier to farmers in the bloc's next seven-year budget and agreed to cut import duties on some fertilizers in a bid to win over countries wavering in their support of Mercosur.

The deal is backed by countries such as Germany and Spain and the Commission appeared closer to winning Italy's backing. Rome's support for the deal would mean the EU had the votes needed to approve the trade accord even without French support.

A vote on the accord is expected Friday.

Mobile tariffs may go up by 15%

New Delhi: Telecom operators are expected to increase mobile tariffs by 15 per cent after about two years, which is estimated to more than double the revenue growth rate of the sector in FY27, a report by analysts said Thursday. The Jefferies report by Equity Analyst Akshat Agarwal and Equity Associate Ayush Bansal expects that a proposed initial public offering of Jio in the first half of 2026 will increase the valuation of the sector as well as support an increase in mobile services rates. "We expect mobile tariffs in India to rise by 15 per cent in June 2026, two years after the last tariff hikes -- in line with trends in the past," the report said. The report projects a hike of 10-20 per cent in mobile tariff by Jio to push its valuation closer to Bharti Airtel, and offer investors a double-digit internal rate of return.

Bajaj acquires 23% Allianz stake

New Delhi: Financial services firm Bajaj Finserv Thursday announced the completion of the 23 per cent stake acquisition in its insurance subsidiaries -- Bajaj General Insurance and Bajaj Life Insurance -- from Germany's Allianz SE for Rs 12,190 crore and Rs 9,200 crore, respectively. The acquisition, carried out in alliance with Bajaj Holdings & Investment Ltd and Jamnalal Sons Private Ltd, takes the ownership of the Bajaj Group in both insurance companies to 97 per cent from 74 per cent, giving Bajaj Finserv complete control of the insurance companies with 75.01 per cent stake. This acquisition marks the end of a successful 24-year joint venture between Bajaj Finserv and Allianz SE, Bajaj Finserv said in a statement.

IREDA bags 'Excellent' rating for fifth time

In the local bullion market, the price of gold of 99.9 per cent purity decreased by Rs 900 to Rs 1,40,500 per 10 grams (inclusive of all taxes) compared to the previous close of Rs 1,41,400 per 10 grams.

"Gold extended its fall on Thursday, weighed down by long liquidation as traders reduced their positions due to ease of safe-haven demand and a stable US dollar," Saumil Gandhi, Senior Analyst - Commodities at HDFC Securities, said. In the international markets, spot gold fell

by \$29.65, or 0.67 per cent, to \$4,426.91 per ounce, while silver traded 3.22 per cent lower, or \$2.51, to \$75.67 per ounce.

An official Thursday said Air India completed the title transfer of the Dreamliner at the Boeing's Everett factory in Seattle January 7.

The new aircraft has a three class configuration -- economy, premium economy and business class seats.

that was acquired by Air India was in October 2017 when the carrier was under the government ownership.

According to the official, the latest aircraft is the airline's first wide-body and 52nd overall delivery from the 220 Boeing jets ordered in 2023.

Air India Express has already taken delivery of 51 narrow-body Boeing 737-8s, including its first line fit plane that was inducted in late December.

After Tatas took over in January 2022, Air India placed orders for 350 Airbus and 220 Boeing planes. Out of the Airbus order, 6 A350s have already been inducted into the Air India fleet.

orated amid heightened geopolitical tensions and global trade-related concerns, which weighed on overall risk appetite. DCB Bank backs women's path to self-reliance

Cuttack, Jan 8: In rural Cuttack, every drop of honey tells a story—of courage, cooperation, and change. Across the blocks of Banki, Athagarh, and Dampada, 250 rural women have discovered a new source of strength through scientific beekeeping.

Under DCB Bank's Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) initiatives, in collaboration with Concern India Foundation and Gram-Utthan, these women have turned traditional knowledge into thriving micro-enterprises—rewriting their own stories of self-reliance.

Between 2023 and 2025, the impact became visible and measurable. A total of 341 kilograms of honey was harvested, generating a value of over Rs 2.72 lakh. But the real worth lay beyond numbers as household incomes improved and women stepped into leadership roles.

The management team took the opportunity to interact with the community project members and understand their needs, situation and expectations.



"We are very happy to see the progress that is happening. I myself had come here in 2019. What we wanted to do was to improve the income of people, particularly women, and we realised that to improve the livelihood, there has to be an integrated and sustainable type of source of income. We introduced beekeeping here that became a game changer. Villagers have not only shown interest in it, but they have also scaled it up significantly. This gives us an opportunity to invest more. The profit is one thing, yes, but improving the livelihood of communities is the responsibility of banks," MD Kutty said.

Highlighting the benefits of their initiative, he added, "With increased awareness of biodiversity, pollination,

and eco-friendly practices, the initiative strengthened local agriculture and ecosystems. Fields grew healthier, yields improved, and communities became more resilient to climate uncertainties."

The initiative began in the financial year 2020-21 when DCB Bank and Concern India Foundation started an intervention to improve water resources and soil conservation through its "Livelihood Improvement Project (LIP) through Integrated Watershed Management" in the area.

The intervention includes restoration of six water harvesting structures, cleaning of seven ponds, construction of changing rooms and a tubewell, plantation of 3,000 trees, and community awareness activities across Banki and Athagarh blocks.

SEBI overhauls stockbroker rules after 30 years

New Delhi, Jan 8: Market regulator SEBI has overhauled its stockbroker regulations for the first time in more than three decades, replacing the 1992 rules with the new Sebi (Stock Brokers) Regulations, 2026.

The move is aimed at simplifying compliance, improving clarity, and making it easier for brokers to do business.

Under the new framework, stockbrokers will now be allowed to carry out activities that fall under other financial regulators, as long as they follow the rules prescribed by those authorities.

The market regulator said such activities will be governed by the concerned financial sector regulator, not by Sebi.



The regulator has also rewritten the rules in simpler language, removed outdated provisions, and introduced clearer definitions.

The regulations are now organised into eleven chapters that cover all major aspects of stockbroking, making them easier to read and understand.

Several old schedules have been deleted and relevant parts have been directly added as chapters.

SEBI has also removed repetitive sections and reorganised rules related to underwriting, code of conduct, and other permitted activities.

Key definitions have been updated, including those for clearing members, professional clearing members, proprietary trading members, and designated directors.

The market regulator clarified that proprietary trading refers to trading done by a stockbroker in its own account, while a proprietary trading member is a broker that only trades on its own behalf.

To reduce compliance burden, SEBI has allowed joint inspections by the regulator along with stock exchanges, clearing corporations, or depositories.

Brokers will also be permitted to maintain their books of accounts in electronic form, but they must inform the stock exchange about the location where these records are kept.

SEBI has also revised the criteria for identifying qualified stockbrokers. Brokers with a large number of active clients or high trading volumes will now come under closer supervision and stricter compliance requirements.

Sydney, Jan 8: Australia completed a 4-1 Ashes series victory with a five-wicket win in the fifth and final cricket test Thursday.

The Australians bowled England out for 342 on the fifth morning of the series finale and were chasing 160 for victory.

Tension grew with a succession of wickets and a contentious DRS review before Alex Carey hit the winning runs to guide the Australians to 161 for five in 31 overs.

Carey finished unbeaten on 16, Cameron Green was unbeaten on 22, and 39-year-old Usman Khawaja was sent into retirement with a victory. The Australians retained the Ashes with wins in the first three tests, but England was determined to narrow the margin after its drought-breaking win in the Boxing Day match at Melbourne.

The 39-year-old veteran walked to the crease after Smith was bowled by Will Jacks and Australia was 92-3.

He was given a guard of honor from the England players, shook hands with Stokes and hugged Marnus Labuschagne.

Kolkata, Jan 8: Five-time world champion Viswanathan Anand recovered from an early setback to register two victories and emerge as joint leader with Nihal Sarin after six rounds of the Tata Steel Chess India Rapid here Thursday.

Rounds four to six produced fighting chess and frequent shifts at the top of the standings in both the Open and Women's sections. Both Anand and Nihal are tied on 4.5 points.

In round four, the 56-year-old Anand appeared to be pressing in the middle game before a rook blunder allowed Arjun Erigaissi to turn the tables. The young Indian defended patiently and later capitalised on an endgame error to seal the win.

Anand, however, bounced back strongly, picking up full points against Hans Niemann and Volodar Murzin in the next two rounds to return to the top of the standings.

Round six saw Anand deliver a positional master-class in an opposite-coloured bishop middle game against Murzin to stay atop the leaderboard.

In the women's section, Kateryna Lagno led the standings with 4.5 points from six rounds.

Among the Indians, Vantika Agrawal was placed fifth with three points, while Harika Dronavalli, R Vaishali and Rakshitta Ravi were tied on 2.5 points. World champion Divya Deshmukh was at the bottom with two points.

Rakshitta earlier produced a fearless attacking display to defeat Nana Dzagnidze in an opposite-side castling battle, while Lagno converted an endgame advantage against Divya and Stavroula Tsolakidou outplayed Vantika in a controlled encounter.

MI could also find themselves facing selection headache with the available talent.

Shabnim Ismail will lead the bowling attack which also includes Saika Ishaque, who will face the challenge of getting her act together after a tough couple of seasons following an impressive debut in 2023.

With Meg Lanning moving to UP Warriorz, mercurial Indian batter Jemimah Rodrigues has taken charge of the Delhi Capitals' outfit which carries the burden of tripping at the finish line all three times in the finals.

The Capitals have a dangerous squad and one that can go the distance if things fall in place.
