VILLAGE GUARDS TO GET ₹2,500/MONTH

Bhubaneswar, Jan 22: Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi Thursday announced a hike in the monthly allowance for 'Grama Rakhis' (village guards) to ₹2,500 from ₹1,800, an official said.

In addition, the government also directed the 'Grama Rakhis' to report weekly to the police station under which they serve.

This measure ensures accountability and strengthens coordination with law enforcement authorities, he said. Over 18,000 'Grama Rakhis' had recently staged an agitation demanding an enhancement in their allowance.

Meitei man shot dead in Kuki-majority area

Imphal/Churachandpur, Jan 22: A man belonging to the Meitei community was shot dead after being abducted by suspected Kuki militants in Churachandpur district, in a fresh escalation of the tensions in restive Manipur, police said Thursday.

Mayanglambam Rishikanta Singh, whose wife is a Kuki, was abducted from his home in the Tuibong area Wednesday and shot dead in the vicinity of Natjang village, a senior officer said.

The kidnappers are suspected to be members of United Kuki National Army (UNKA), a non-signatory to the Suspension of Operations (SoO) agreement. The SoO pact was signed between the Centre, the Manipur government and dozens of Kuki-Zo militant groups.

Trump launches Board of Peace; India skips event

Davos (Switzerland), Jan 22: *US President Donald Trump Thursday formally launched his Board of Peace, saying the body—initially conceived to stabilise Gaza—could take on a broader global role while working alongside the United Nations. While nations such as Pakistan and Indonesia have joined the board, countries like India and China remain noncommittal, having skipped the Davos event.*

"Once this board is completely formed, we can do pretty much whatever we want to do. And we'll do it in conjunction with the United Nations," Trump said, adding that the UN had great potential that had not been fully utilised.

Trump, who will chair the board, invited dozens of other world leaders to join, saying he wants it to address challenges beyond the stuttering Gaza ceasefire, stirring misgivings that it could undermine the UN's role as the main platform for global diplomacy and conflict resolution.

While regional Middle East powers including Turkey, Egypt, Saudi Arabia and Qatar, as well as major emerging nations such as Indonesia, have joined the board, global powers

and traditional Western US allies have been more cautious.

Trump said permanent members must help fund with a payment of \$1 billion each.

US Secretary of State Marco Rubio said the board's focus would be on making sure the plan for peace in Gaza was fulfilled but that it could also 'serve as an example of what's possible in other parts of the world'.

Apart from the US, no other permanent member of the UN Security Council - the five nations with the most say over international law and diplomacy since the end of World War Two - has yet committed to join.

Russia said late Wednesday it was studying the proposal after Trump said it would join. President Vladimir Putin said Moscow was willing to pay \$1 billion from frozen US assets in the US 'to support the Palestinian people', state media said.

France declined to join. Brit-

ain said Thursday it was not joining at present. China has not yet said whether it will do so.

The board's creation was endorsed by a UN Security Council resolution as part of Trump's Gaza peace plan, and UN spokesperson Rolando Gomez said Thursday that UN engagement with the board would only be in that context.

Few of the countries that have signed up for the board are democracies, although Israel, Argentina and Hungary, whose leaders are close allies of Trump and supporters of his approach to politics and diplomacy, have said they will join.

Board members also include Rubio, the US Gaza negotiators Jared Kushner and Steve Witkoff, and former British Prime Minister Tony Blair.

India was among the countries not present Thursday at the ceremony in Davos where Trump launched his Board of Peace. Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi was among global leaders who Trump invited to join the board. India is yet to take a call on it, people familiar with the matter said when asked about Trump's invite to Modi. New Delhi is considering various aspects as the initiative involves sensitive issues, it is learnt.

4.57L get Subhadra money

Bhubaneswar, Jan 22: Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi Thursday disbursed over ₹315 crore to the bank accounts of more than 4.57 lakh beneficiaries under Subhadra Yojana, which he called the 'state's biggest women-centric welfare scheme since Independence'.

Majhi, at a programme, transferred ₹5,000 each to the bank accounts of the beneficiaries through Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT). He said more than one crore people are benefiting from the scheme under which all eligible women in the age group of 21 to 60 are provided with an assistance of ₹10,000 every year in two equal instalments.

The CM said that each benefi-

ciary will receive ₹50,000 at the end of five years as promised by the ruling party. He also handed over cheques to selected five beneficiaries.

Of the over 4,57,681 lakh beneficiaries who received ₹5,000 each Thursday, 1,78,398 were newly enrolled and this was their first instalment, while 2,55,265 got their second and third instalments. Additionally, 24,018 beneficiaries were also added through grievance

redressal hearings, said Deputy Chief Minister Pravati Parida.

Alleging that the previous BJD government was 'using women under Mission Shakti for its political benefits', Majhi said that Subhadra Yojana, launched on Prime Minister Narendra Modi's birthday September 17, 2024, is a key initiative of the Odisha government which aims to enhance the socio-economic condition of the women. **P3**

TOP MAOIST WITH ₹2.35CR BOUNTY AMONG 16 KILLED

Chaibasa (Jharkhand)/New Delhi, Jan 22: Sixteen Maoists, including top leader Anal, were killed in a gunfight with security forces in Jharkhand's West Singhbhum district Thursday, Union Home Minister Amit Shah said.

Patiram Manjhi alias Anal Da, carrying a ₹2.35-crore bounty, and five women were among those killed.

While ₹1 crore was an-

nounced by Jharkhand, ₹1.2 crore by Odisha and ₹15 lakh by the NIA. "Today, in West Singhbhum, the ongoing joint operation by CRPF and Jharkhand Police has achieved a major success in the campaign to make the region free of Naxals, with the neutralisation of the notorious bounty-wanted Naxal Central Committee member 'Anal alias Patiram Majhi'... and 15 other Naxals so far," Shah posted on X.

Historic love letters from royals, romantics go on display

London, Jan 22: Love is, famously, a many-splendored thing. It can encompass longing, loneliness, pain, jealousy, grief — and, sometimes, joy.

As Valentine's Day approaches, the many facets of passion are going on display in "Love Letters," a public exhibition at Britain's National Archives that covers five centuries.

Curator Victoria Iglowski-Broad said that the documents recount "legendary romances from British history" involving royalty, politicians, celebrities and spies, "alongside voices of everyday people."

"We're trying to open up the potential of what a love letter can be," she said. "Expressions of love can be found in all sorts of places, and surprising places." They also take many forms.

The exhibition ranges from early 20th-century classified ads seeking same-sex romance to sweethearts' letters to soldiers at war and a medieval song about heartbreak.

"There's also one of our most iconic documents," Iglowski-Broad said, referring to a poignant letter to Queen Elizabeth I from her suitor Robert Dudley, Earl of Leicester.

Written days before Dudley's death in 1588, it conveys the intimacy between the "Virgin Queen," who never married, and the man who called himself "your poor old servant."

The missive, with "his last letter" written on the outside — spelling at the time was idiosyncratic — was found at the queen's bedside when she died almost 15 years later.

Love, in the exhibition, doesn't just mean romance.

Family bonds are in evidence in Jane Austen's handwritten will from 1817 leaving almost everything to her beloved sister Cassandra, and in a 1956 letter in which the father of London gangster twins Reggie and Ronnie Kray implores a court to go easy on the brothers because

"all their concern in life is to do good to everybody."

The letter writers range from paupers to princes. In an 1851 petition, an unemployed 71-year-old weaver named Daniel Rush begs authorities not to separate him and his wife by sending them to workhouses. It's displayed alongside the Instrument of Abdication through which King Edward VIII gave up the throne in 1936 so that he could marry "the woman I love," twice-divorced American Wallis Simpson.

"There is a lot of connection in these two items even though on the surface they seem very different," Iglowski-Broad said. "In common they have just this human feeling of love ... that the sacrifice is actually worth it for love."

Other documents tell of love lost. There is a never-before-dis-

played 1944 letter from young British intelligence officer John Cairncross to his former girlfriend Gloria Barraclough, reflecting on what might have been. "Would we have broken off, I wondered, if we had known what was coming?"

Some readers may think Barraclough had a lucky escape — years later, Cairncross was unmasked as a Soviet spy.

Some love stories tell of danger, heartbreak and tragedy. In one, Lord Alfred Douglas asks — in vain — for Queen Victoria to pardon his lover Oscar Wilde. The writer had been sentenced to two years in prison for gross indecency after Douglas' outraged father revealed their relationship.

Nearby is a letter written in 1541 by Catherine Howard, fifth wife of King Henry VIII, to her secret beau Thomas Culpeper.

Archives historian Neil Johnston noted that the tone of the extraordinary letter is "restrained panic. She is warning him to be very, very careful."

Catherine signed off the letter "yours as long as life endures." That turned out not to be long. The king discovered the affair and both Catherine and Culpeper were executed for treason.

A letter by Queen Henrietta Maria to King Charles I — "my dear heart" — is a rarity, since Britain's royal family guards its private papers closely.

It was found among possessions left behind by the fleeing king in 1645 after a battlefield defeat for royalist troops in England's civil war. Charles lost the war and was tried, convicted and executed in 1649. The letter ended up in Parliament's archives, which last year was transferred to the National Archives.

The opening day witnessed presence of filmmakers, actors, film scholars, critics, and cinephiles. Students from Birla Global University attended the festival and praised the efforts of running a community film festival in City. The day started with screening of three short

films- *Malwa Khushan, Every Now and Then Girls* and *Ballad of the Mountain*. The day also marked the opening of Adoor Goapalakashnan's Restrospective with screening of *Swayamvaram*. Released in the year 1972, *Swayamvaram's* plot revolves around Vishwam and Sita who have married against the preference of their families and wanted to start a new life together. The day followed with *Swaha* by Abhilash Sharma, which examines the haunting tale of an unemployed couple swallowed

up by forces beyond their control. The lead roles feature Satya Ranjan and Sonalli Sarmissstha—both from Odisha. Next followed Si-varanjini's *Victoria* –based on a tale of a young beautician's overwhelming day which won the FIPRESCI Award for 'Best Malayalam Film of Debut Director' at International Film Festival Kerala. The film deals with themes of gender, religion, faith, caste and class. Shailendra Sahoo's *Bailadila*—a poetic exploration of grief, art, and friendship set amid the mining landscapes of the Bailadila hills – was the next to be screened. Rani's confession

Mumbai: Yash Raj Films recently brought together Karan Johar and Rani Mukerji for a special chat celebrating 30 years of Rani's cinematic journey, ahead of *Mardaani 3*. During the conversation, Rani made a candid confession about having her voice dubbed in *Ghulam* (1998), opening up about a difficult phase early in her career. Rani revealed that as a newcomer, she had little say in the decision, especially since acting opposite Aamir Khan was a major opportunity. She later learned that the call was taken by director Vikram Bhatt along with the makers and Aamir. According to Rani, Aamir explained that films often demand personal sacrifices and told her that her voice may not have suited the character. To comfort her, he cited Sridevi, whose voice had been dubbed in several films without affecting her stardom. Though the decision deeply upset her, Rani said she couldn't express her disappointment. She emphasised that being part of a film means being a team player and prioritising the story above personal feelings. The experience, she admitted, taught her an important lesson about surrendering to what serves the film best, even when it comes at a personal cost.

Bhumi on impact of trolling

Mumbai: Bhumi Pednekar has candidly opened up about the emotional toll of online trolling following the release of *The Royals*, revealing that the backlash led her to step away from film sets for nearly nine months. In a recent interview, the actor shared that the experience forced her to confront difficult personal and professional questions, ultimately prompting a quiet but firm break from acting. Bhumi said the period after the show's release was marked by intense trolling and bot-driven criticism, alongside some constructive feedback. The noise pushed her to take drastic decisions in 2025, one of which was taking a break she chose not to publicly announce. Admitting she was emotionally exhausted, Bhumi said she had lost clarity about who she was as both an actor and a person, and needed distance to regain perspective. Emphasising that the decision was entirely voluntary, she clarified she hadn't been on a set since June and described the break as the best choice she's made for herself. Bhumi also distanced herself from the industry, returning signing amounts, declining films, award shows, and fashion events to truly disconnect. During this time, she focused on self-reflection: reading, travelling, watching films, and even pursuing a course at Harvard University. Now re-centred, Bhumi is preparing for her upcoming show *Daldal*, which premieres on Amazon Prime Video January 30, 2026.

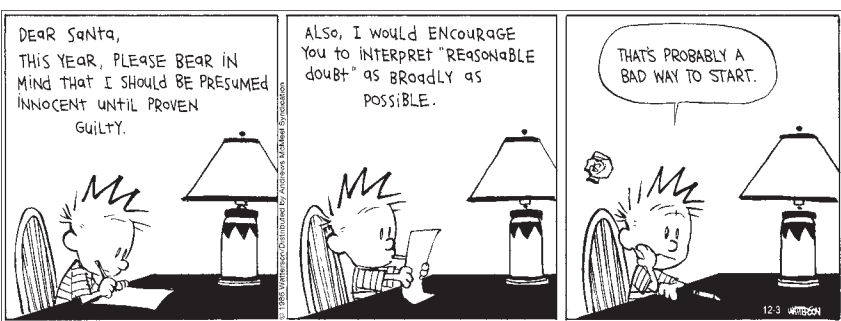

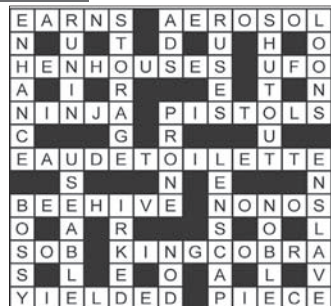

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KRUSHI ODISHA 2026 CONCLAVE

₹141.5cr MoA signed for Odisha drought mitigation

Bhubaneswar, Jan 22: The state government Thursday signed a memorandum of agreement (MoA) worth ₹141.50 crore with international research organisations for implementing the Odisha Agriculture Drought Mitigation Programme (OADMP), aimed at promoting climate-resilient farming in vulnerable regions. The MoA was signed by the Department of Agriculture & Farmers’ Empowerment (DA&FE) with International Crops Research Institute for the Semi-Arid Tropics (ICRISAT), International Rice Research Institute (IRRI), and Central Research Institute of Dryland Agriculture (CRIDA) in the presence of Deputy Chief Minister Kanak Vardhan Singh Deo here at the inaugural session of the three-day Krushi Odisha 2026 conclave. Signed under the framework of the National Drought Mitigation Project (NDMP), the initiative represents a paradigm shift from reactive disaster relief to a proactive, science-led resilience model, officials said.

“The project moves beyond temporary aid. We are building a system where science leads the way -- from the farm to the entire value chain,” DA&FE Principal Chief Secretary Arabinda Kumar Padhee said. The MoA aims at total funding of ₹141.50 crore sourced through the National Disaster Mitigation Fund (NDMF) and Odisha government funds. The project will be implemented immediately in three high-vulnerable blocks -- Komna (Nuapada), Kosagumuda (Nabarangpur), and Raruan (Mayurbhanj) -- reaching 24,000 households directly, with thousands more benefiting through convergence with existing state and central schemes, the officials said. A real-time digital dashboard will track progress -- from soil moisture level to household income, ensuring total transparency and data-driven scaling, they said. The programme aims to deliver steadier yields and higher cropping intensity by introducing drought-tolerant seed varieties and distributing water recharge systems main-

tained by the community. Furthermore, it will empower self-help groups (SHGs) and farmer producer organisations (FPOs) by improving their access to mechanisation and high-value markets, they further said. Inaugurating the conclave here, Singh Deo said that six new cold storages will soon be set up in different areas of the state to store vegetables and other perishable commodities. He said that the government has approved six proposals from different agencies received through the ‘Go-Sugam’ portal for the establishment of cold storages. “The cold-storages will be set up cluster-wise. If the government gets two proposals for a single block, we will consider that as well,” he said. While appealing to interested persons and agencies to come forward to set up cold-storages, the Deputy CM said that private players will get 3 per cent interest subsidy from the state government and another 3 per cent subsidy from the Centre. The person concerned will have to pay the remaining 3 per cent interest to the bank, he added. Singh Deo also said that Odisha, which was earlier dependent on centres for food grains, now provides foods to other states. The state’s food grain production is much higher than the national average, he said. Key objectives of Krushi Odisha-2026 include the showcasing of best products, practices, and emerging technologies that drive farm profitability.

'90% farmland to be irrigated by 2036'

Bhubaneswar, Jan 22: Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi Thursday said sustainable water management is essential for agriculture, economic growth, and the overall development of Odisha. Addressing the State-Level Pani Panchayat Fortnight-2026 at Lok Seva Bhawan Convention Centre, he said the Pani Panchayat system has brought a transformative change in the lives of farmers and the agricultural sector of the state. The CM reaffirmed the government's commitment to ensure irrigation coverage to more than 90 per cent of cultivable land by 2036, with the goal of making Odisha a prosperous state. He also announced that



the state government aims to provide irrigation facilities to an additional 15 lakh hectares of land over the next five years. He said, at present, 40,380 Pani Panchayats are functioning across Odisha, managing irrigation over 24.12 lakh hectares of farmland. Majhi noted that the Odisha Pani Panchayat Act, 2002, and its subsequent amendments have ensured equal rights and opportunities for women, fishermen, and wa-

ter users in irrigation management. CM Majhi said, “A prosperous Odisha is not possible without prosperous farmers.”

FOCUS INDIA-POLAND TIES

The sharp exchange of divergences between two Foreign Ministers of two democracies was a bit unusual for observers of international relations

was a bit unusual for observers of international relations. The relations between both countries have been steadily growing in multiple sectors since the visit of Prime Minister Modi to Warsaw en route to Kiev to meet Ukraine’s President Zelenskyy. That said mutual concerns about their respective neighbours are in fact not out of order. These have to be addressed by both countries if the ties have to be taken to new heights. Poland is certainly and genuinely concerned about Russian military actions in the neighbourhood. It has won and lost battles to Russia in the past. But in the recent past, Poland has been colonised by Russia, its predecessor Soviet Union, to be more precise. Russia under Putin has expressed off and on to extend Moscow’s influence across Eastern Europe which includes Poland as an immediate neighbour bordering it. Putin’s intentions are revisionist in nature as Soviet Union used to have political suzerainty over Eastern Europe including Poland. It is natural for Warsaw as a sovereign, independent, a fast-growing economy and democracy to be alarmed by Russia’s neo-imperialist designs. The oil purchase has become a thorn in the flesh of European

countries. As a matter of fact, many countries are driven in their geo-political relations by their respective national interests. India is no exception to that trend as it is evidenced in New Delhi’s response to Ukraine war. European Union countries have been guided by their national economic interests. Their trade and investment in China testify to the mismatch between their avowed international political principles and economic policies. Having written extensively about it, I am a bit surprised that Jaishankar does not raise the China obsession of Europe in his remarks on partner countries dealing with New Delhi’s hostile neighbours. It is in order that New Delhi raises the China question with EU including Poland whenever the latter brings up India’s policy on Ukraine war. That is a better bargain than raising European engagement with Pakistan, which is of course, of no less concern to India. But Pakistan exists only as a satellite country of one big power or the other. On the brighter side, India-Poland relations have been steadily growing despite such irritants. Under the India-Poland strategic partnership framework, both countries have agreed to review

their Action Plan 2024-2028 focusing on cooperation in trade, investment, defence and security. More important, Poland has expressed support for stronger India-EU ties as both Union of India and the European Union are about to sign a Free Trade Agreement. In economic ties, the bilateral trade has grown by 200% in the past decade, touching \$7bn. India’s investment in Poland has crossed \$3b creating job opportunities for Polish citizens. While both countries are committed to upholding international law and promoting global peace and security, they have divergent views on Russia’s actions in Ukraine. In defence cooperation, both countries have scope in expanding their collaboration. Poland’s defence industry with established companies like PZL and WZL having expertise in aerospace and defence equipment manufacturing can collaborate with India on co-development and co-production of aircraft, helicopters and drones. As India is becoming an exporter of defence equipment, both countries have potential scope in naval cooperation. Poland’s experience in building naval vassals can compliment India’s growing naval capabilities. However, the challenges that the defence cooperation may encounter consist of differences in defence procurement processes, export controls and licensing – Poland’s membership of the EU and NATO may incur export controls and licensing requirements. However, these challenges can be addressed by regular dialogue and consultations encouraging industry-to-industry engagement and providing government support and facilitation in promoting cooperation. India and Poland have similar growth aspirations and security concerns. It is, therefore, strategic for both to deepen their ties.

Feeding 10bn People

With the world struggling to feed eight billion people today, how will we feed ten billion by 2050? Meeting the nutritional needs of a growing population requires not just a radical increase in food production – almost all of it plant-based – but also a more equitable distribution to ensure that no one is food-insecure. That is a tall order. The current food system is already buckling. Roughly 673 million people go to bed hungry every night, and in 2025, we witnessed two famines (in Gaza and Sudan), each driven by conflict, climate shocks, and soaring food prices. At the same time, 1.66 billion hectares – 60 per cent of which are agricultural land – have been degraded by the very practices we rely on to feed the world. Global hunger stems not from a lack of capacity to produce enough food, but partly from our failure to produce it efficiently and distribute it evenly. Conflict and insecurity remain the dominant causes of hunger across 20 countries and territories, leaving nearly 140 million people facing acute food insecurity. Disasters have inflicted an estimated \$3.26 trillion in agricultural losses worldwide over the past 33 years – an average of \$99 billion annually, or roughly 4 per cent of global agricultural output; and recent supply-driven food-price spikes have pushed tens of millions of people into hunger almost overnight. Worse, these are not one-off shocks. They represent the new normal.

For decades, the agriculture sector has responded well to rising demand by developing higher-yielding crops and using more of everything: more fertilizer, more pesticides, and more water. Yet this trend has produced unnecessary waste, polluted rivers, degraded the soil, and released ever-more greenhouse gases (GHGs). We need to find a better path, and science can show us the way. We already have the knowledge and the tools to optimize what we use and diversify what we grow. One priority is to improve efficiency. Between 1990 and 2020, fertilizer use rose 46 per cent and pesticide use doubled. But only 30-60 per cent of fertilizer nutrients and 20-70 per cent of pesticides are effectively absorbed; the rest washes into rivers, degrades soil, or releases GHGs. Fortunately, research shows that optimizing nitrogen use can boost yields by up to 19 per cent and slash fertilizer use by 15-19 per cent. Improved pesticide management – through precision spraying, biopesticides, and residue monitoring – reduces chemical waste while safeguarding biodiversity. Agro-ecological practices – such as intercropping, crop rotation, and integrating trees into farm systems – further enhance soil health, lower input dependence, and strengthen long-term resilience.

The next priority is to diversify the food system. Decades of productivity gains have fostered a dangerous dependency on just three crops. Wheat, rice, and maize now provide most of the world’s calories. Such reliance on monocultures creates profound vulnerability to pests, diseases, and climate change. The solution lies in the crops we have marginalized. Traditional and underused species – hardy millets, nutrient-dense legumes, indigenous fruits, robust yams – offer ample nutrition alongside other benefits such as climate resilience. United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization initiatives like Future Smart Food (in Asia) and 100 Crops for Africa demonstrate how these “forgotten” crops can simultaneously expand diets, boost farm incomes, and restore degraded soils.

Finally, we must scale up effective technologies. Data analytics and precision-agriculture tools are already reshaping farming. Drones can plant seeds and deliver inputs with pinpoint accuracy. AI platforms can use satellite imagery to provide tailored, real-time recommendations. Robots can detect weeds for targeted spraying, avoiding the need for blanket herbicide applications. Digital soil tests and weather stations can guide day-to-day decisions, and blockchain systems can link smallholders to transparent and traceable markets.

Scaling these tools will require substantial investments in agricultural extension services (to promote best practices), major science-based policy shifts, and knowledge-sharing platforms to help farmers optimize inputs. Likewise, ongoing innovation must be incorporated into local practices, which calls for greater collaboration among governments, investors, the private sector, and farmers.

The objective is clear: agriculture must produce more with less – more crop per drop, more calories per kilogram of fertilizer, and more nutrition per hectare – every season, everywhere. That requires replacing one-size-fits-all industrial packages with resilient, context-specific systems finely tuned to local soils, water regimes, crops, and climates. Publicly funded research must lead where markets fall short to ensure equitable access to precision agriculture, while private innovation continues to scale up what works. Knowledge is no longer the bottleneck; political will and aligned incentives are.

Even in the face of recurring conflict, drought, and market chaos, stable production and affordable prices are possible. Resilient soils, diversified cropping, and precision management hold the key. A world where nearly everyone eats well, farmers prosper, soils regenerate, waters run clean, biodiversity recovers, and agrifood systems emit minimal GHGs is not utopian. It is the realistic reward for embracing a different agricultural model before the old one collapses.

The only question is whether we use the knowledge, science, and proven tools already in hand. Future generations will not ask whether the solutions existed; they will ask what took us so long to implement them. The choice is ours, and it starts with turning science into real-world practice.

DESPITE ITS IMPORTANCE, THE OCEAN PLAYS A MARGINAL ROLE IN INVESTMENT, GOVERNANCE, AND PLANNING DECISIONS

Long-term global stability depends heavily on what happens in the ocean. Nowhere is this more evident than in Asia, home to much of the Coral Triangle and vast mangrove and seagrass ecosystems that sustain fisheries, protect coastal communities, and store massive amounts of carbon. Together, these ecosystems underpin food security, employment, and climate resilience across the continent and beyond.

Yet, despite its importance, the ocean plays a marginal role in investment, governance, and planning decisions. Less than 1% of global philanthropic funding is directed toward ocean health, and an even smaller share reaches Asia. As a result, many conservation projects remain underdeveloped at a time when marine ecosystems and coastal communities face growing strain.

It doesn’t have to be this way. Philanthropy can make a decisive difference. By linking science, policy, finance, and communities more effectively than other forms of capital, it has a unique ability to foster collective action. It can take early risks, back emerging ideas, and fill gaps where markets and governments fall short.

There are many compelling examples. The Ocean Risk and Resilience Action Alliance is developing innovative financial and insurance instruments to

strengthen climate-vulnerable coastal communities. The 30x30 Southeast Asia Ocean Fund works with national and subnational governments and residents to expand marine protection in line with scientific priorities and local needs. And The Audacious Project enables donors to back one of the world’s largest coral restoration initiatives, combining science, technology, and community expertise to regenerate reef systems at scale. These initiatives demonstrate the potential of philanthropic action, but they remain relatively rare, and their impact is limited. To unlock meaningful progress, philanthropic contributions must align with shared priorities and reinforce one another, rather than operate in isolation.

Effectiveness depends on clarity. When governments, communities, and funders work toward a shared goal, coordination improves and momentum builds. This underscores the need for national and regional strategies that link ocean conservation with livelihoods, prioritize ecosystems by their need for protection, and identify areas suitable for sustainable industries. Without direction, efforts remain fragmented, and projects struggle to move beyond the pilot stage.

There is already a strong foundation to build on. The High-Level Panel for a Sustainable Ocean

Economy, for example, has developed a useful handbook outlining a practical process for governments to set objectives, mobilize finance, analyze baseline data, build inclusive frameworks, and implement roadmaps.

Philanthropy can accelerate the process by helping countries translate ambition into practical strategies, convene partners around shared priorities, and support the analytical and participatory work needed to develop credible long-term plans. Once these are in place, investments align more effectively, and promising solutions are better positioned to scale.

But implementation depends on capacity. Roadmaps mean little if policymakers, institutions, markets, and communities are not in sync. Early support can help catalyze critical financing. By funding feasibility studies, regulatory groundwork, and initial project preparation, philanthropy acts as risk capital, reducing uncertainty and attracting public and private investment. Concessional capital, in particular, enables projects to mature to a point where commercial actors are willing and able to participate.

Indonesia’s Southeast Asia Framework for Oceans Action in Mitigation shows how this approach works. Initial philanthropic support focused on defining how ocean solutions

could be integrated into Indonesia’s climate commitments. Subsequent funding has shifted toward execution, strengthening links between science and policy, building institutional capacity, and enabling national and local partners to set and advance new priorities. The result is not a single flagship program, but a system designed to deliver.

Ocean-related challenges cross borders and sectors, and solutions must do the same. The real opportunity for philanthropy lies in turning shared objectives into coordinated action through platforms that help clarify priorities and develop investment-ready opportunities. My own organization, the Philanthropy Asia Alliance, aims to achieve this through our annual Philanthropy Asia Summit and the Blue Oceans Community initiative, which bring funders and partners together to mobilize co-investment for Asia-focused solutions.

While philanthropy cannot save the ocean on its own, it has a crucial role to play. Its impact depends less on the amounts raised and more on how effectively it connects people and organizations working to build a sustainable blue economy with those who have the means to help.

This is the third governor vs government face-off in two days in three non-BJP-ruled southern states, the others being Kerala and Tamil Nadu.

The Governor began the speech by greeting the Chief Minister, Assembly Speaker U T Khader, Council Chairman Basavaraj Horatti, Leaders of the Opposition, ministers, and members.

“I extend a warm welcome to all of you to the joint session of the State legislature. I am extremely pleased to address one more joint session of the Karnataka legislature. My government is firmly committed to doubling the pace of the state’s



economic, social, and physical development. Jai Hind. Jai Karnataka,” he said in Hindi, before walking out. The Treasury Benches, including ministers such as H K Patil (Law and Parliamentary Affairs), stood up and requested Gehlot to complete the speech. As the Governor proceeded towards the exit door, some ruling legislators, including MLC B K Hariprasad, tried to gherao him by shouting slogans. They were removed by the security staff.

The legislators then shouted ‘shame shame’ and “Dhikkara-Dhikkara, Rajyapalarige Dhikkara” (Reproof to the Governor) in Kannada. While seemingly defending the Governor, BJP members shouted “Bharat Mata ki Jai”.

Siddaramaiah attacked Gehlot for the actions and charged him

with failing to deliver his constitutional responsibilities and duties. Accusing the Governor of reading his own speech, Siddaramaiah said he has violated the Constitution by not reading out the full speech prepared by the government, and acted like a “puppet” in the hands of the central government. “Every new year, the governor has to address the joint session, and he has to read the speech prepared by the state cabinet. That is constitutional. Because Article 176 of the Constitution and Article 163 say he or she – the Governor–shall read the speech prepared by the government or the cabinet,” Siddaramaiah told reporters.

“Today, instead of reading the speech prepared by the cabinet, he delivered the speech prepared by himself. This is against the

Anti-Sikh riots: Court acquits Sajjan Kumar

New Delhi, Jan 22: A Delhi court Thursday acquitted former Congress MP Sajjan Kumar in a case related to inciting violence in the Janakpuri area in the national capital during the 1984 anti-Sikh riots, saying the prosecution failed to prove the charges beyond a reasonable doubt.

Kumar has been in jail since 2018 after being sentenced by the Delhi High Court to life imprisonment over the murder of five people in Delhi’s Palam Colony November 1 and 2, 1984.

Special Judge Dig Vinay Singh underlined that though the court understood the trauma suffered by the victims and their families, its decision had to be “sans emotions”.

“The finding of guilt of the accused in this case must be solely judged based on the evidence led in the present matter. Unfortunately, most of the witnesses examined by the prosecution in this case are hearsay, and/or those witnesses who failed to name the accused for three long decades,” the judge said.

He said relying on the identification of the accused by

such witnesses “would be risky and may lead to a travesty”.

The judge said there was no reliable evidence that Kumar was present at the crime scene or that he was seen there by anyone. There was also no evidence of instigating any riotous mob or of conspiracy regarding the alleged incident, he added.

In the 60-page order, the court said, “Sum and substance is that the prosecution has not met its burden of proof against the accused beyond a reasonable doubt, which is essential for conviction in a criminal trial.”

“Resultantly, because of a lack of credible evidence as to the presence of the accused in the crime in question or a part of the unlawful assembly or his involvement in any manner, either through instigation, conspiracy, or abetment of any other nature, he is acquitted of the charges,” it said. Meanwhile, complainant Harvinder Singh’s counsel, Maninder Singh, hinted at challenging the order in the high court. “We will first study the verdict thoroughly and then file an appeal in the Delhi High Court,” the counsel told PTI.

PM Modi speaks to Brazil’s Lula

New Delhi: Prime Minister Narendra Modi spoke to Brazilian President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva Thursday and asserted that close cooperation was vital for advancing the shared interests of the Global South. The two leaders reaffirmed their commitment to further strengthen the India-Brazil Strategic Partnership and take it to even greater heights in the year ahead, the statement said.

Vijay’s TVK gets ‘whistle’ symbol for 2026 polls

Chennai, Jan 22: The EC has allotted ‘whistle’ as the symbol for actor-politician Vijay’s TVK and enthusiastic party workers have already taken it across the state, senior leader CTR Nirmal Kumar said Thursday.

The whistle symbol was the ‘priority’ one as preferred by Vijay from a choice of 10 symbols proposed, Kumar, joint general secretary of Tamilaga Vettri Kazhagam said.

“The overall expectations and the desire of the people of Tamil Nadu is that our leader should become the Chief Minister. As a first step, this symbol has been given,” he told reporters here. “The symbol has reached across Tamil Nadu with TVK workers enthusiastically taking it across the state,” he added.

Two years after the launch of the party, the 2026 Assembly polls will be the first electoral battle of the 50 year-old Vijay-helmed TVK, Kumar said, expressing confidence of the party securing a massive win and Vijay becoming CM.

Incidentally, one of actor Vijay’s top hit songs is “whistle podu,” (play the whistle) from his 2024 film GOAT, which had some references to his then planned political foray. He had acted in a film titled ‘Bigil,’ which also means whistle.

Meanwhile, senior Congress functionary Praveen Chakravarty, whose reported meeting with Vijay earlier had set off buzz of in the political circles, said the 2026 “election whistle” is blown in the state.

Noida techie death: 2 more builders held

The governor expressed deep sorrow over the demise of Mayanglambam Rishikanta Singh and extended heartfelt condolences to the bereaved family. He said that the case has been handed over to the NIA.

The governor further said that an intensive combing operation has been launched since Wednesday night to apprehend those responsible, with coordinated efforts involving both state and central forces and operations are being undertaken on a war footing. He also reiterated that all necessary measures are being taken in accordance with law and expressed profound regret over the tragic loss of life.

The SoO pact was signed between the Centre, the Manipur government and dozens of Kuki-Zo militant groups.

Singh, who hailed from Kakching Khunou in Kakching district, was married to Chingnu Haokip of Churachandpur and assumed a tribal name, Ginminthang.

Is Maharashtra CM so helpless, asks HC over law and order

Mumbai, Jan 22: In a sharp rebuke, the Bombay High Court Thursday asked whether the rule of law exists in Maharashtra and if the Chief Minister was so helpless that he can not say anything against a minister whose son has been absconding after being named in a criminal case.

Ministers’ children “commit crimes and roam freely” but police can not find them, Justice Madhav Jamdar said in a scathing observation.

The court was hearing a pre-arrest bail application of Vikas Gogawale, son of Shiv Sena minister Bharat Gogawale. Vikas has been named as an accused in a case related to a violent clash between rival groups during the Mahad Municipal Council elections. Following the court’s reprimand, the government assured that the minister would see to it that his son surrenders within a day.

Vikas Gogawale moved the high court after the sessions court rejected his anticipatory bail application, but he remains absconding.

“Is the state’s chief minister so helpless that he does not say anything against even one minister? Ministers’ children commit crimes and roam freely and they stay in touch with their parents but the police can not find them?” Justice Madhav Jamdar said.

From Parakram to progress: Netaji's enduring vision

On the birth anniversary of Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose, the nation bows in remembrance of a life that burned with courage, sacrifice and an unyielding passion for freedom. From a young age, Netaji displayed a rare moral intensity—renouncing personal comfort, worldly ambition and even a prestigious career in the Indian Civil Service to dedicate himself entirely to India's liberation. For him, freedom was a sacred duty that demanded discipline, fearlessness and the willingness to sacrifice everything. A profound insight into Netaji's personality comes from a message written in 1939 by the great son of Bharat, Gurudev Rabindranath Tagore. In a remarkable tribute, Gurudev hailed Subhas Chandra Bose as Deshnayak—the leader of the nation. Gurudev observed that in troubled times, a country needs the strong hand of an inspired and valiant leader, one who can rise above adversity and lead with vigour. In Netaji, he saw that rare fusion of courage, vision and moral force.

Netaji's journey was marked by difficult choices and lonely resolve. When conventional paths appeared inadequate to achieve independence, he charted his own course, transforming the freedom struggle into an international movement through the Indian National Army. He asserted with conviction, "There is no power on earth that can deprive us of our birthright of liberty any longer." This belief found concrete expression in the INA.

Netaji's clarion call—"Give me blood, and I will give you freedom"—and his assertion that "Freedom is not given; it is taken," reflected his unwav-

ering faith that liberty must be earned through struggle and supreme sacrifice.

Netaji's call for action, rooted in courage and self-respect, resonated deeply across regions and communities of India, especially among the people of the southern regions of the country, particularly the Tamils. This deep emotional and ideological bond between Netaji and the Tamil people became one of the strongest pillars of support for the INA and the larger freedom movement. Netaji's popularity not only rose across the Madras Presidency but also spread overseas, resonating powerfully with Tamil communities in Malaya, Burma and Singapore.

From the early 1920s, Netaji recognised the political importance of the Madras Presidency within the Indian national movement. As a Congress organiser and national leader, he engaged closely with political workers and leaders in the region, viewing it as a vital component of an all-India struggle. Netaji's visits to Madras (now Chennai) and other centres of the Presidency were marked by large public meetings and enthusiastic receptions, particularly among students and politically conscious youth. His speeches, stressing complete independence, discipline and national regeneration, found a deeply receptive audience and further strengthened his bond with the Tamil people.

On 3 September 1939, Netaji arrived at Madras Central Station, where he was received by supporters including lawyer and freedom fighter S. Srinivasa Iyengar and Pasumpon U. Muthuramalinga Thevar. Taken in an open jeep to "The Peak," the residence of civil engineer S. P. Aiyaswami Mudaliar, he was followed by a sea of supporters. That evening, he addressed a massive public meeting at Marina Beach.

During this visit, Pasumpon U. Muthuramalinga Thevar, a close associate of Netaji, emerged as a key leader of the Forward Bloc in Tamil Nadu. Often remembered as the "Bose of the South," he played a significant role in mobilising Tamil support for the Indian National

Army. He also founded a Tamil weekly magazine titled Netaji and urged members of the Tamil community to join the INA.

A remarkable feature of the Tamil contribution to the INA was the wide geographical spread of its recruits. Among them was Ramu Thevar, a young boy from Penang, originally from Ramnad in the Madras Presidency. Inspired by Netaji at the age of about fourteen, he joined the INA and was later entrusted with intelligence duties. Arrested while attempting to reach India, he was imprisoned in Alipore Jail. His letters to his mother speak of immense hardship and unwavering patriotism. Unaware of his execution in Madras Jail in 1944, his mother continued writing to him until 1948. Ramu Thevar was only eighteen when he made the supreme sacrifice for the nation.

Another notable figure was Lieutenant R Madhavan Pillai, a Tamil from Burma who played a significant role in the INA. It was heartening to see the Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi felicitating him at the Parakram Diwas celebrations in 2024.

Netaji's call also awakened the courage of Indian women. In a stirring address at the Padang in Singapore in 1943, he urged women to join the struggle, declaring that this must be a truly revolutionary army. His words deeply moved Tamil Indian women in Malaya, many of whom had endured hardship on rubber plantations. Despite having never seen India, nearly a thousand women volunteered for the Rani of Jhansi Regiment.

While the bravery of Dr Lakshmi Swaminathan (Captain Lakshmi Sahgal) is widely recognised, the contributions of Janaky Thevar, Anjalai Pon-nusamy and Rasammah Bhupalan are equally inspiring. Janaky Thevar, only fourteen when she first heard Netaji speak, donated her diamond earring to the INA and later rose to a senior leadership position in the Rani Jhansi Regiment. Saraswathi Rajamani, often re-garded as one of India's youngest women intelligence operatives, joined the INA at sixteen and served with distinction. In

EC terms SIR fair, just & reasonable

New Delhi, Jan 22: The Election Commission Thursday termed the decision to undertake Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls "fair, just and reasonable", and urged the Supreme Court to reject pleas challenging the exercise in Bihar.

It argued that a roving and fishing enquiry into the special scrutiny cannot be done at the behest of a few NGOs and politicians.

"None of the 66 lakh persons, whose names were deleted in Bihar SIR, came to this court or high court or filed pleas with the Election Commission. A roving and fishing enquiry cannot be permitted at the instance of ADR (Association for Democratic Reforms) and the PUCI (People's Union for Civil Liberty) and a few parliamentarians," said senior advocate Rakesh Dwivedi on behalf of the poll panel.

The submissions were made by the senior lawyer during the final hearing on a batch of petitions challenging the Election Commission's decision to undertake SIR in different states, including Bihar.



Referring to a judgment in which the top court had refused a plea seeking re-introduction of paper ballot and discarding the EVMs, he said, "In short, we must follow Europe. If they go for EVMs, then we must go for it. And if they go for a paper ballot, then we go for it."

He said one person writes an article in a newspaper, and the other files a petition in the top court referring to that.

Dwivedi urged the bench of Chief Justice Surya Kant and Justice Joymalya Bagchi to dismiss the pleas with cost while defending the SIR as a lawful and transparent exercise of statutory powers under the Representation of the People Act, 1950.

SC allows Hindus, Muslims to offer prayers at Bhojshala

New Delhi, Jan 22: A heavy posse of police and paramilitary personnel has been deployed in Dhar district of Madhya Pradesh as the Supreme Court stepped in Thursday to avoid any tension at the disputed 11th-century Bhojshala-Kamal Maula Mosque.

The top court Thursday also directed that a list of persons from the Muslim community coming for namaz be given to the district administration.

Hindu and Muslim groups have sought nod for religious activities at the Bhojshala complex January 23, a Friday when Saraswati Puja will also be held on the occasion of Basant Panchami.

A bench comprising Chief Justice of India Surya Kant and Justices Joymalya Bagchi and Vipul



M Pancholi made an appeal to both sides to observe mutual respect and cooperate with the state and district administration for maintenance of law and order.

"ASG as well as Advocate General have fairly suggested that, after knowing that how many persons belonging to Muslim community are likely to come tomorrow for namaz between 1 to 3 pm, an exclusive and separate space within the same compound/ premises shall be made available, so that the namaz can be performed at the prescribed time."

"Similarly, a separate space, as

per the past practice, shall be made available to the Hindu community to hold the traditional ceremonies on the occasion of Basant Panchami," the bench said.

It directed the district administration to make law and order arrangements at the site for offering of prayers. "The district administration may, with a view to ensure maintenance of law and order, issue appropriate passes, free of cost, for the visitors or may adopt any other fair measures to ensure that no untoward incident takes place and the rituals are performed peacefully," the bench said.

Hindus consider Bhojshala, an Archaeological Survey of India (ASI)-protected 11th-century monument, to be a temple dedicated to Vagdevi (Goddess Saraswati), while the Muslim community calls it Kamal Maula mosque.

Vance heads to Minneapolis

Minneapolis: Vice President JD Vance is expected to visit Minneapolis Thursday to show support for a massive federal law enforcement operation underway in a city that has been on edge since an ICE officer shot dead a 37-year-old mother of three. With the city and the country deeply divided over the January 7 fatal shooting of Renee Good, the vice president's visit is meant to show support for the work of US Immigration and Customs Enforcement, part of a force of 3,000 federal law enforcement officers deployed to the area. Minnesota has become the latest Democratic-leaning jurisdiction targeted by Republican President Donald Trump with a federal police show of force that the administration says is aimed at immigration violators and a fraud investigation involving social service programs in the Somali community.

Germany expels Russian diplomat

Frankfurt: Germany is expelling a member of Russia's diplomatic service suspected of espionage, the German foreign ministry said Thursday, the latest sign of intensifying Russian intelligence activities in Europe since the Russian invasion of Ukraine. Berlin also summoned the Russian ambassador to inform him of the expulsion, it added. "The German government does not tolerate espionage in Germany - especially not under the guise of diplomatic status," the foreign ministry said in a post on X. The Russian Embassy in Berlin did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

Colombia imposes tariffs on Ecuador

Bogota(Colombia): Colombia announced Thursday that it will apply a 30 per cent tax on a group of products from Ecuador and will suspend the sale of energy to that country, in response to a matching tariff announced the previous day by the government of Ecuadorian Daniel Noboa. The escalating trade dispute between the South American neighbours follows a public protest by Noboa regarding a more than \$850 million trade deficit with Colombia. Noboa also cited a lack of reciprocity in securing their shared border, which remains a stronghold for criminal organizations and international drug trafficking. The Colombian government expressed surprise at Ecuador's unilateral tariffs.

War has to end: Trump sends message to Putin

Davos, Jan 22: US President Donald Trump said his message to Russian leader Vladimir Putin was that the war in Ukraine has to end, after what he said were "good" talks with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy in Davos Thursday.

US and Ukrainian officials have spent weeks in frenetic shuttle diplomacy as Kyiv faces pressure from Trump to secure peace in the nearly four-year-old war, despite few signs Moscow wants to stop fighting.

After a meeting with the Ukrainian leader that lasted around an hour, Trump said they had a "good" discussion but provided no further details on the substance of the conversation. Trump had said a deal was "reasonably close" Wednesday.

"I think the meeting with President Zelenskyy was good. It's an ongoing process," Trump told reporters, saying that US envoys were heading for talks in Moscow Thursday. Asked what his message was for Putin, Trump replied, "The war has to end."

Zelenskyy had said earlier this week he would only travel to Davos if he could sign agreements with Trump on US security guarantees and post-war reconstruction funding for Ukraine, but there was no indication after the meeting that a breakthrough had been made.

US envoy Witkoff optimistic about progress talks

Ukraine bonds rally amid flurry of diplomatic meetings

Witkoff, Kushner due in Moscow Thursday to meet Putin

The two leaders have met around half a dozen times face-to-face since Trump returned to the White House last year and upended US policy on Ukraine by embracing diplomacy with Russia.

Zelenskyy, saddled with an energy crisis at home from Russian air strikes that have left swathes of the capital and other regions without power and heating, was due to deliver a speech after his meeting with

Trump, his spokesperson said.

"If both sides want to solve this, we're going to get it solved," US envoy for Ukraine Steve Witkoff told an audience at the World Economic Forum Thursday morning. "I think we've made a lot of progress."

TALKS WITH PUTIN IN MOSCOW

Witkoff has held talks in recent days with Ukrainian officials in Davos, following weekend discussions in Florida. He was due in Moscow with fellow US envoy Jared Kushner - Trump's son-in-law - later Thursday for talks with Putin on the possible plan to end Europe's deadliest war since World War Two.

After those discussions, negotiators would head directly to Abu Dhabi, Witkoff said Thursday, "where there will be military-to-military talks and discussion of the prosperity package".

Cambodia to send 73 online scam suspects to S Korea

Seoul, Jan 22: Dozens of South Koreans detained in Cambodia for alleged involvement in on-line scam compounds will be sent home this week to face investigations, officials said Thursday, in what would be the largest group repatriation of Korean criminal suspects from abroad.

The 73 South Korean suspects allegedly scammed fellow Koreans out of 48.6 billion won (\$33 million), according to the statement.

The suspects, 65 men and eight women, were among about 260 South Koreans detained in a crackdown in Cambodia in recent months. Public outrage over scam centers in Southeast Asia flared in South Korea when a Korean student was found dead last summer after reportedly being forced to work at a scam compound in Cambodia.

Authorities said at the time he died after being tortured and beaten, and South Korea sent a government delegation to Cambodia in October for talks on a joint response.

South Korea will send a chartered plane to Cambodia, which is expected to return Friday with the suspects, who will be immediately handed over to investigative authorities upon arrival, according to a South Korean government statement.

Cybercrime has flourished in Southeast Asia, particularly in Cambodia and Myanmar, as trafficked foreign nationals were employed to run romance and cryptocurrency scams, often recruited with false job offers and then forced to work in conditions of near-slavery.

B'desh launches campaigns for first post-Hasina polls

The election will include a referendum on a national charter, with the interim government seeking to campaign for voters to support what it describes as a new political course built on reforms

Dhaka, Jan 22: Campaigning began Thursday for Bangladesh's first national elections since the 2024 uprising that ousted longtime Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina.

The major political parties held campaign rallies in the capital, Dhaka, and elsewhere ahead of February 12 election, which is seen as the most consequential in Bangladesh's history as it follows Hasina's ouster and is being held under an interim government, with voters also deciding on proposed political reforms.

The interim government led by Nobel Peace Prize laureate Muhammad Yunus has pledged to hold a free and fair election, but questions were raised after his administration banned Hasina's former ruling Awami League party. The Awami League and the Bangladesh Nationalist Party have historically dominated the country's electorate.



There are also concerns about the country's law and order situation, but the government says it will keep the voting peaceful.

Yunus assumed office three days after Hasina left the country for India August 5, 2024, following the deaths of hundreds of protesters and others in a violent crackdown.

With the Awami League excluded from the election, a 10-party alliance led by Jamaat-e-Islami, an Islamist party, is seeking to expand its influence. Jamaat-e-Islami has long faced criticism from secular groups who say its positions challenge Bangladesh's secular foundations. A new party formed by student leaders of the uprising, the National Citizen Party, or NCP, is also part of the alliance.

Tarique Rahman, BNP chairman and the son of former Prime Minister Khaleida Zia, is widely seen as a leading contender for prime minister. His party has drawn strong support rooted in the political legacy of his mother, who died last month. Rahman returned to Bangladesh last month after 17 years in exile in the United Kingdom.

Train collides with crane arm in Spain

Madrid, Jan 22: A commuter train collided with a crane arm that swung into its path in southeastern Spain Thursday, the transport minister said, in the country's fourth rail accident in less than a week.

Six people suffered minor injuries after the arm hit the passing train's windows, close to the port city of Cartagena in Murcia region, authorities added.

The incident - which did not derail the train but briefly disrupted traffic on the line - came

four days after a high-speed train collision in the southern Andalusia region killed at least 43 people.

Two days after that, Tuesday, a commuter train derailed after a containment wall fell on the track due to heavy rain near the city of Barcelona, killing the driver and seriously injuring four passengers.

The main train drivers' union called a nationwide strike over safety standards after that and a second, less serious, collision in the north-eastern Catalonia region the same day.

"A street-lighting basket crane vehicle ... encroached on public railway land with its arm, striking the windows of a metric gauge train that was passing by at the time," Transport Minister Oscar Puente wrote in a post on X Thursday.

The injuries were minor, a spokesperson for the central government's representative in Murcia told Reuters.

Alcohol tests on both the train driver and the crane operator were negative, they added.

Greenland's hunting culture helps emergency preparedness

Greenland's government issued updated recommendations for crisis preparedness Wednesday, advising residents to keep five days' worth of water and food, as well as access to hunting weapons, ammunition, and fishing gear

Kapisillit, Greenland, Jan 22: While many Greenlanders have been alarmed by US President Donald Trump's demands to acquire their homeland, others such as Kaaleeraq Ringsted have stayed calm, trusting in food stockpiles and traditional ways of life to navigate the uncertainty.

"I'm not scared," 73-year-old Ringsted said, standing beside one of his two chest freezers packed with reindeer meat, halibut, cod, redfish, and seal meat in his home in the Kapisillit settlement in the Nuuk fjord.

"I have enough food here for more than a year."

Ringsted, who no longer hunts due to health issues, depends on family and friends to deliver fish and meat from the Nuuk fjord. Supply chains in remote parts of Greenland are vulnerable to sudden weather changes, and the local grocery store in his settlement is restocked just once a week with basic necessities.

FISH, SEALS, REINDEER

For many Greenlanders, self-sufficiency has long been integral to daily life.

Aslak Wilhelm Jensen, 50, who keeps three chest freezers full of fish and meat at his home in Nuuk, expressed little concern about food security or Trump's remarks as he worked aboard his small fishing boat at the bottom of the Nuuk fjord.

"Fish are all around here, there are seals right over there, the area is teeming with reindeer," Jensen said. "You're not really afraid of dying of hunger if someone comes and takes over your land."

Denmark, which holds sovereignty over Greenland, has promoted modernisation and urbanisation since the 1950s, often shifting locals away from traditional pursuits of hunting and fishing. However, many

Greenlanders continue to balance modern occupations with skills honed over generations.

Deadly drone strikes have left people in and around central Sudan's El Obeid mourning and worried, Jensen, who had caught 900 kilograms of cod the day before, emphasized a worldview shaped by surviving in a rugged environment.

"We're not the kind of people who go into complete panic when we hear something is happening out in the world," he said.

"Us Greenlanders, we relax when we have food on the table," added Jensen. "We live with the animals as neighbours." Greenlanders have long been adapted to harsh weather conditions, isolation, and unreliable supply chains. Stocked freezers and self-reliance aren't considered "doomsday prepping" but a way of life.

IndiGo net drops 78%

New Delhi: India's largest airline IndiGo Thursday reported a 78 per cent decline in December quarter net profit at ₹549.1 crore as flight disruptions and implementation of the new labour code took a toll on its earnings. The airline reported a net profit of ₹549.1 crore in the October-December quarter, compared with ₹2,448.8 crore earnings in the year-ago period, according to a company statement. The company said it took a hit of ₹1,546.5 crore in the third quarter. This included ₹577.2 crore due to massive flight disruptions witnessed during early December and another ₹969.3 crore on account of the implementation of new labour laws.

Zee Ent net dips 5%

New Delhi: Zee Entertainment Enterprises Ltd Thursday reported 5.37 per cent decline in consolidated net profit at ₹154.8 crore for December quarter FY26. It had logged a net profit of ₹163.6 crore in the October-December period a year ago, according to a regulatory filing from Zee Entertainment Enterprises Ltd (ZEEL). Total income was up 14.6 per cent to ₹2,298.5 crore in December quarter FY26. Total expenses were at ₹2,087.4 crore, up 20.3 per cent year-on-year.

USFB profit rises 71%

Mumbai: Ujjivan Small Finance Bank posted a 71% year-on-year jump in third-quarter net profit to ₹186 crore, driven by improving microfinance collections and lower provisioning. Provisions declined to ₹195 crore from ₹223 crore a year earlier as stress in the portfolio eased. The bank also reported its highest-ever quarterly net interest income of ₹1,000 crore, supporting profitability. Pre-provision operating profit rose 23% to ₹440 crore. Asset quality improved with the share of secured loans increasing to 48% from 39% last year, lending greater stability to the balance sheet.

Indian Bank net up 7%

New Delhi: Indian Bank Thursday reported a 7.33 per cent growth in net profit to ₹3,061 crore for the third quarter ended December 2025. The public sector bank had recorded a net profit of ₹2,852 crore in the December quarter of 2024-25.

EU suspends GSP export benefits

The EU's GSP is a unilateral trade arrangement that allows developing countries to export to the EU at a lower-than-MFN tariffs

New Delhi, Jan 22: The European Union (EU) has suspended export benefits to sectors such as textiles and plastics under a preferential scheme for India and two other countries effective from January 1.

The commerce ministry said the move will not have any impact on the country's exports to the 27-nation bloc, as from 2016, the EU has progressively suspended GSP tariff preferences for India across products, such as minerals, chemicals and textiles.

This was further widened in 2019 and 2023.

"The same list was extended as per regulations released on December 1, 2025. From January 1, 2026, GSP preferential duties will be suspended for the same list of products until December 31, 2028," the ministry said in a statement.

As a result of this phased product level graduation, for 2024-25, about 47 per cent of India's exports to the EU, valued at \$35.6 billion, are currently outside the scope of the GSP, with only 53 per cent (\$40.20 billion) remaining eligible for the benefits. However, experts and exporters have stated that the move will impact the country's exports to the EU.

The development is important as the two sides are likely to announce the closure of negotiations for a free trade agreement (FTA) January 27.

According to the Official Journal of the European Union, the European Commission on September 25, 2025, laid down rules for the application of the regulation with regard to the suspension for 2026-2028 of certain tariff preferences granted to certain GSP beneficiary countries - India, Indonesia and Kenya.

"It shall apply from 1 January 2026 until 31 December 2028..." it said.

Commenting on the development, think tank Global Trade Research Initiative (GTRI) said from January 1, 2026, India faces a "major setback" in the EU market, as 87 per cent of its exports begin paying higher import tariffs following the European Union's suspension of GSP (Generalised Scheme of



Preferences) benefits.

Only about 13 per cent of exports, including agriculture and leather, retain the benefits under this scheme, it said.

GSP concessions allowed Indian exporters to ship at less than MFN (most favoured nation) tariffs to EU markets. Now, concessions are suspended for 87 per cent value of Indian goods to the EU.

In simple terms, an apparel product facing a 12 per cent tariff paid only 9.6 per cent under the GSP. From January 1 this year, this benefit ends, and exporters must pay the full 12 per cent duty. The EU has removed GSP benefits across almost all major industrial sectors - minerals, chemicals, plastics and rubber, textiles and garments, stone and ceramics, precious metals, iron and steel, base metals, machinery, electrical goods and transport equipment - which together form the backbone of India's exports to Europe.

The EU periodically reduces these benefits, as it did earlier in 2013 and 2023. This time, the concessions have been completely withdrawn for three years from 2026 to 2028.

"While there is optimism over the conclusion of the India-EU Free Trade Agreement, Indian exporters will, in reality, confront higher trade barriers in the near term, as the loss of GSP preferences coincides with the start of the tax phase of the EU's Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism (CBAM)," GTRI Founder Ajay Srivastava said.

With the FTA's implementation likely to take at least a year, if not longer, India's exports to the EU will face a difficult period marked by higher tariffs, rising compliance costs and weakened competitiveness, hitting exporters just as global trade conditions remain fragile, he said.

Gold, silver decline from record peaks

New Delhi, Jan 22: Gold and silver prices retreated from record highs in the national capital Thursday as investors turned to profit-taking amid subdued global cues and easing demand for safe-haven assets, according to the All India Sarafa Association.

The yellow metal of 99.9 per cent purity declined by ₹2,500 or 1.56 per cent, to ₹1,57,200 per 10 grams (inclusive of all taxes) Thursday, after closing at the highest-ever level of ₹1,59,700 per 10 grams in the previous session.

Silver ended its unprecedented nine-day rally, tumbling by ₹14,300, or 4.3 per cent, to ₹3,20,000 per kilogram (inclusive of all taxes) from the previous close of ₹3,34,300 per kg. The white metal surged by ₹11,300 Wednesday.

"Gold and silver corrected from record highs as safe-haven demand eased and investors took profits following a record-breaking rally," Saumil Gandhi, Senior Analyst - Commodities at HDFC Securities, said.

According to Jateen Trivedi, VP Research Analyst - Commodity and Currency, LKP Securities, easing geopolitical risk sentiment triggered partial profit booking in domestic markets even as Trump's comment that the US will have a good trade deal with India kept bullion prices slightly pressured.

According to FOREX.com, gold slipped by \$8.80, or 0.18 per cent, to \$4,822.65 per ounce. The yellow metal had retreated and settled at \$4,836.67 Wednesday, after hitting a record of \$4,888.22 per ounce in the global markets.

Bangladesh firm on not playing in India

Dhaka, Jan 22: The Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) has reaffirmed its decision not to tour India for next month's Twenty20 World Cup, with its chief Aminul Islam announcing Thursday that it would again request the International Cricket Council (ICC) allow the team to play in Sri Lanka instead.

The ICC board has dismissed Bangladesh's concerns regarding the safety of its players and fans in India, despite persistent political tensions between the two South Asian neighbours.

Following a meeting Thursday between the BCB's top officials, players and the sports adviser of Bangladesh's interim government, the board maintained its stance despite the risk of being replaced by another team in the tournament set to begin February 7.

"We will go back to the ICC with our plan to play in Sri Lanka," BCB president Islam said at a press conference.

the interim government. "We are hopeful that ICC will give us the opportunity to play in Sri Lanka," Nazrul said.

Political relations between India and Bangladesh have recently deteriorated, impacting cricket too.

Bangladesh player Mustafizur Rahman was dropped from this year's Indian Premier League (IPL) despite signing with its Kolkata franchise.

Bangladesh responded by banning IPL broadcasts in the country and demanding to play their World Cup matches in Sri Lanka.

After an emergency ICC board meeting Wednesday, cricket's global governing body ruled out any security issue in India for players and fans from Bangladesh. It also ruled out altering the schedule so close to the tournament, saying it would set a bad precedent.

Pakistan will play their World Cup matches in Sri Lanka in keeping with their policy of not touring India over fraught political tensions.

Sindhu, Lakshya enter quarterfinals

Jakarta, Jan 22: Top Indian shuttlers PV Sindhu and Lakshya Sen entered the quarterfinals of \$500,000 Indonesia Masters badminton tournament after securing straight-game wins in their respective round-of-16 matches here Thursday.

Lakshya, a 2021 world championships bronze medallist, prevailed over Hong Kong China's Jason Gunawan 21-10 21-11 in a contest that lasted a little over half an hour.

The 24-year-old from Almora, who won the Australian Open last year, will meet Thailand's rising talent Panitchaphon Teeraratsakul, who knocked out Paris bronze medallist Lee Zii Jia of Malaysia.

Sindhu, a two-time Olympic-medallist, notched up a 21-19 21-18 triumph over familiar foe Line Hojmark Kjaerfeldt of Denmark in her pre-quarterfinal that took 43 minutes to wind up. This was Sindhu's fifth win over the Dane in their six clashes so far.

Sindhu will next be up against tournament top seed and world number four Chen Yu Fei of China in the Super 500 event. Sindhu and Fei have faced each other 13 times so far and the latter holds a slight 7-6 edge overall.

The Indian's last win over Fei came back in 2019 and she would be eager to improve that record. Later in the day, former world No 1 Kidambi Srikanth, a 2021 world championships silver medallist, was too erratic to pose any challenge, going down 11-21 10-21 to Chinese Taipei's Chou Tien Chen in a lop-sided pre-quarterfinals.

Djokovic rolls back years

Melbourne, Jan 22: Novak Djokovic rolled back the years to reach the Australian Open third round Thursday but Jannik Sinner, the man who has usurped him as king of Melbourne Park, showed why he is favourite to claim a hat-trick of titles.

Women's defending champion Madison Keys overcame a second-set wobble against Ashlyn Krueger to also advance while former champion Naomi Osaka toned down her outfit but not her power game as she also reached round three.

Iga Swiatek continued her quest to complete her career Grand Slam with a 6-2 6-3 victory over unseeded Marie Bouzkova.

Fourth seed Djokovic, seeking a record-extending 11th Melbourne Park title and 25th Grand Slam trophy overall to break the deadlock with Margaret Court, eased past Italian qualifier Francesco Maestrelli 6-3 6-2 6-2. He raced through the opening set and pounced again in the opening game of the second set to heap pressure on world number 141 Maestrelli.

In 2009, Djokovic, Cilic and Wawrinka all reached round three and 17 years later they are still going strong.

The man to beat on blue Melbourne hard courts these days, however, is Sinner. He was supreme as he thumped home wild card James Duckworth 6-1 6-4 6-2 in the Rod Laver Arena evening session, banging down 18 aces in a dominant display.

Sinner, bidding to join Djokovic by becoming only the second man in the profession-

Bhubaneswar, Jan 22: The Men's Hockey India League (HIL) 2025-26 is set for a high-voltage contest as table-toppers Kalinga Lancers face second-placed Ranchi Royals in Qualifier 1 at the Kalinga Hockey Stadium here January 23.

Kalinga Lancers advance to the playoffs as table toppers with 16 points, while Ranchi Royals, with 12 points, finished second, leading to this highly anticipated knockout match.

The Bhubaneswar-based Lancers have had a dominant league run, characterized by consistent performance and strategic discipline. They experienced only one loss in seven matches.

Ranchi Royals have focused on an aggressive attacking strategy, ending the league stage as the top scorer with 25 goals. Their forward line is spearheaded by captain Tom Boon, who leads the tournament with 15 goals.

Ahead of the crucial encounter, Boon acknowledged the magnitude of the occasion. "Qualifier 1 is exactly the kind of match players prepare for. We have played attacking hockey throughout the season, and against a disciplined side like the Lancers, accuracy and composure will be decisive. We have faith in our system and our squad, and we are ready for the challenge," he said.

With a spot in the final at stake, the pressure will be at an all-time high. The winner of Qualifier 1 will advance straight to the Men's HIL final January 26, while the loser will have a second chance, playing again in Qualifier 2 January 25 against the winner of the Eliminator.

RED HOT INDIA AIM TO MAKE IT 2-0 AGAINST NZ

Manchester, Jan 22: Real Madrid remained the biggest-earning club in world football during the 2024-25 season while Liverpool for the first time generated the most revenues in the Premier League, according to an annual financial list published Thursday.

The Spanish club topped Deloitte's Football Money League with 1.16 billion euros (\$1.36 billion) of revenue despite not winning either LaLiga or the Champions League.

The only club to make more than \$1 billion in the past two seasons, Real Madrid benefited in 2024-25 from a whopping 23% rise in commercial revenue - driven by merchandise and corporate partners - to 594 million euros, the Deloitte figures showed, opens new tab.

Perennial rivals and reigning LaLiga champions Barcelona were the second highest earn-

ers with 975 million euros, back in the top three for the first time in five years.

Bundesliga champions Bayern Munich ranked third with 861 million euros, ahead of Champions League winners Paris St-Germain on 837 million euros.

Liverpool's fifth place in the global money list, with 836 million euros of revenues from the season they won the Premier League, was the strongest performance of any English club in the 29-year history of the rankings. Manchester City dropped to sixth with 829 million euros, followed by this season's Premier League leaders Arsenal on 822 million.

MANCHESTER UNITED'S SLIDE

Manchester United, who finished a lowly 15th in the Premier League last season, fell from fourth to eighth in revenues with 793 million euros - their lowest-ever position in the Money League that they have



topped 10 times in the past.

Deloitte noted that United's revenue outlook for the current season will worsen due to their absence from European competition and early exits from the FA Cup and League Cup.

Six Premier League sides made

the global top 10, with Tottenham ninth on 673 million euros and Chelsea 10th on 584 million.

Overall, revenue for the top 20 clubs rose 11% to a record 12.4 billion euros. Commercial income increased to 5.3 billion euros, driven by expanded sta-

dium usage on non-matchdays, rising sponsorship deals and improved retail operations.

Matchday revenue grew the fastest, up 16% to 2.4 billion euros, while broadcast revenue rose 10%, helped by the expanded FIFA Club World Cup in the United States last summer.

Deloitte said the rise of some Saudi Pro League clubs and Inter Miami from Major League Soccer could challenge the financial hegemony of Europe's major sides in the future.
