MAN FIGHTS OFF LEOPARD

Badamba/Cuttack, Jan 24: In a fierce face-off inside a farmhouse in Cuttack district, a man fought off a leopard with a kitchen knife, killing the animal but sustaining serious injuries, officials said Saturday.

The incident took place at Anantaprasad village Friday night. The injured Subhranshu

Bhol was rushed to a local hospital initially and then rushed to SCB Medical College and Hospital with multiple injuries, additional conservator of forests Manoj Patra told reporters.

The forest department has seized the carcass of the leopard from the farmhouse.

According to Subhranshu's father Sudharshan, his son was at the farmhouse located

in Narsinghpur West forest range when he heard dogs barking outside.

"When my son opened the door to check, a leopard jumped into the house and pounced on him. He tried to drive it away, but it went on attacking my son," his father said.

"At that moment, Subhranshu grabbed hold of a kitchen knife and stabbed the leopard



repeatedly, which weakened the animal. He later locked himself in a room and called me to rush with an ambulance," he added.

Calling the drastic fall in India's Russian oil imports in the face of sweeping 50 per cent tariffs from the Trump administration a 'success,' US Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent has indicated that the punitive tariff of 25 per cent imposed on Indian goods may be relaxed. Bessent's remarks came amid heightened pressure from President Trump, who earlier warned that tariffs could increase further unless India curtails its Russian oil purchases. India's Russian oil imports in December dropped to their lowest in two years, lifting OPEC's share of Indian oil imports to an 11-month high

refineries of Russian oil have collapsed. So that is a success. The tariffs are still on, 25% tariffs for Russian oil are still on. I would imagine there is a path to take them off," Bessent said in an interview with Politico at the World Economic Forum.

Bessent's remarks came amid heightened pressure from Trump, who earlier warned that tariffs could increase further unless India curtails its Russian oil purchases.

Indian refiners have been buying more oil from Middle Eastern, African and South American countries to make up for a drop in Russian oil imports, which is expected to help India negotiate a tariff deal with Washington.

Indian Oil Corp, the country's top refiner, has bought 7 million barrels of oil, including from Brazil's Petrobras, for March loading to replace

Russian oil, trade sources said. IOC last month bought its first Colombian oil and for the first time bought Ecuadorian Oriente crude.

India became the top buyer of discounted Russian seaborne crude after Moscow's February 2022 invasion of Ukraine, but challenges posed by Western sanctions eventually prompted Indian refiners to increase imports from other sources.

Bessent also criticised Europe for not imposing tariffs on India.

"Our virtue-signalling European allies refused to do it (impose tariffs) because they wanted to sign this big trade deal with India," he said.

He accused Europe of funding Russia's war by purchasing the oil refined in India.

"But in the ultimate act of irony and stupidity, guess who was buying the refined products from the Indian refineries made from Russian oil. The Europeans. They are financing the war against themselves," he added.

When asked if he called the Europeans "stupid," Bessent said, "I said there was an act of stupidity."

PIO kills wife, 3 relatives in US

New York, Jan 24: A 51-year-old Indian-origin man has been arrested for allegedly shooting dead his wife and three relatives purportedly due to a family dispute in the US state of Georgia.

Vijay Kumar was taken into custody a short distance from the residence in Lawrenceville city where the shooting occurred Friday, Gwinnett County Police said in a social media post.

Gwinnett County Police identified the victims as Kumar's wife Meenu Dogra, 43, who is an Indian national, and the relatives Gourav Kumar, 33, Nidhi Chander, 37, and Harish Chander, 38.



Police said an argument began between Kumar and Dogra at their home in Atlanta and they travelled to their relatives' home on Brook Ivy Court with their 12-year-old child.

Gourav Kumar, Nidhi Chander, and Harish Chander, resided at the

Brook Ivy Court home, along with two juveniles who are seven and 10 years old, police said.

Kumar's child was the one who called 911 after the incident occurred, police said.

"It is unknown at this time what the argument was about, why they came to the residence, or what led up to the incident," police said.

Upon arrival, officers located four deceased adults inside the home, all suffering from apparent gunshot wounds, they said.

The three children were inside the residence, hiding in a closet and were unharmed.

Police said the motive remains under investigation but appears to be domestic related.

Gmail, FB, Netflix passwords of 149 million users leaked

New Delhi, Jan 24: Login credentials, including usernames, passwords, of over 149 million accounts of internet firms, including Gmail, Instagram, Facebook, and Netflix, have allegedly been leaked, a report published by ExpressVPN said.

The report published by cybersecurity researcher Jeremiah Fowler claims that the publicly exposed data includes 48 million accounts on Gmail, 4 million on Yahoo, 17

million on Facebook, 6.5 million on Instagram, 3.4 million on Netflix, 1.5 million on Outlook, etc. "The publicly exposed database was not password-protected or encrypted. It contained 149,404,754 unique logins and passwords, totalling a massive 96 GB of raw credential data. In limited sampling of the exposed documents, I saw thousands of files that included emails, usernames, passwords, and the URL links to the login or authorization for the accounts," Fowler said in the report.

Greenland, Denmark set aside troubled history to face Trump

Nuuk, Jan 24: Greenland and Denmark have formed a united front to face down US President Donald Trump, momentarily setting aside the troubled history between them. The Arctic island, a Danish colony for three centuries, still has a complicated relationship with Denmark, which now rules it as an autonomous territory.

Greenland's main political parties all want independence, but disagree on how exactly to get there. Trump's designs on the island led them to forge a coalition government in March last year.

Greenland was a Danish colony from early 18th century. It became a Danish territory in 1853, a full part of Denmark -- before becoming an autonomous territory in 1979, a status that was strengthened in 2009. "Any colonial relation is a question of domination and there have

been some injustices committed," said Astrid Andersen of the Danish Institute for International Studies.

Those injustices include a 1951 social experiment in which 22 Inuit children were forcibly separated from their families and prevented from speaking Greenlandic -- part of bid to create a Danish-speaking elite. In 2021, the six still alive were each awarded compensation of 250,000 crowns. Another dark chapter was Denmark's efforts from the 1960s and for three decades on to reduce the birth rate in Greenland.

Several thousand women and teenagers had IUDs fitted without their consent to prevent them conceiving.



CM seeks NITI's support for new economic region devpt

Odisha man among 8 held for duping elderly couple of ₹14cr

New Delhi/Bhubaneswar, Jan 24:

The Delhi Police has arrested a 27-year-old man from Odisha, along with seven others from separate states, for allegedly duping an elderly NRI couple of over Rs 14 crore through 'digital arrest', busting a cyber fraud racket with links to operators based in Cambodia and Nepal, officials said Saturday.

The accused were apprehended from Gujarat, Uttar Pradesh and Odisha following a multi-state operation that exposed the well-coordinated network engaged in impersonating law-enforcement agencies and siphoning off victims' money through mule bank accounts, they added.

Divyang Patel, 30, and Krutik Shitole, 26, from Gujarat's Vadodara, Mahavir Sharma alias Neel, 27, from Odisha's Bhubaneswar, Ankit Mishra alias Robin from Gujarat, Arun Kumar Tiwari, 45, and Pradyuman Tiwari alias SP Tiwari, 44, from Uttar Pradesh's Varanasi, and Bhupender Kumar Mishra, 37, and Aadesh Kumar Singh, 36, from Lucknow have been arrested in connection with the incident, the officials said.

Sharma, arrested January 19, is a B.Com graduate. According to police, the victim, a 77-year-old woman living in South Delhi's Greater Kailash, received a call in December 2025 claiming that a SIM card issued in her name was linked to a money-laundering case.

She was then placed on video calls by the fraudsters, who posed as officials from agencies such as the CBI and police, showed her a forged arrest warrant and conducted fake 'court proceedings'.

The victim and her husband were allegedly kept under round-the-clock video surveillance and threatened with dire consequences if they contacted anyone. Under fear and coercion, they were persuaded to transfer funds, including from fixed deposits and share investments, into so-called 'RBI-mandated' accounts for 'verification', with false assurances that the money would be returned. A total amount of Rs 14.84 crore was transferred through eight transactions, police said.

An e-FIR was registered at the Special Cell's IFSO police

station in New Delhi January 10 under relevant sections of the BNS and a special team formed to investigate the case.

Through technical surveillance and an analysis of bank accounts, police tracked the money trail leading to several alleged mule-account holders.

The investigators said the accused acted as facilitators by procuring and operating mule accounts and layering defrauded funds at the behest of the international syndicate – mostly based in Cambodia and Nepal.

Police have frozen Rs 2.08 crore of the Rs 14.84 crore duped in the case and seized seven mobile phones and chequebooks during the operation. Further investigation is on to unearth the entire money trail and identify other conspirators, the officials added.

'Higher public health funding can cut household med costs'

New Delhi, Jan 24: Ahead of the Union Budget 2026-27, a new study has added empirical weight to long-standing demands for higher expenditure on public healthcare, warning that socio-economic factors are increasingly driving medical costs and deepening inequality in access to care.

The study, 'Impact of Determinants of Healthcare Expenditure in India: The ARDL Bounds Testing Approach', published in the International Journal of Advanced Research in December last year, analyses national data from 1991 to 2023 to assess what shapes healthcare expenditure in India -- both total per-capita spending and household out-of-pocket (OOP) payments.

Using advanced econometric

modelling, the authors argue that income growth, urbanisation, education levels, inflation and life expectancy all have statistically significant long-term effects on healthcare spending.

The research shows that rising incomes and rapid urbanisation are closely linked to higher health care consumption, while education and longevity also influence spending patterns, particularly private OOP expenses.

The findings suggest that India's development trajectory itself is structurally pushing healthcare costs upward – disproportionately impacting families dependent on private care.

The study highlights the persistent 'dual nature' of India's health financing system – limited public spending alongside heavy

Rising incomes, urbanisation, education, and longevity drive higher healthcare spending, especially out-of-pocket costs

The findings indicate that India's development path is structurally increasing healthcare costs, disproportionately affecting families who rely on private medical care

reliance on private OOP expenditure. This structure, the authors note, entrenches inequality, with rural and lower-income households facing a greater risk of catastrophic medical costs and delayed treatment.

"Without stronger public financing, the burden of illness continues to fall most heavily on those least able to afford it," the paper concludes. Industry leaders say

the study reinforces the urgency of structural healthcare and innovation-centric reforms.

Amit Mookim, Board Director and CEO, Immuneel Therapeutics, said, "As India advances its ambition to become a global hub for next-generation biotherapies, the Union Budget 2026-27 can play a defining role in improving access, affordability, and innovation in cell and gene therapy."

Broader rationalisation of GST on manufacturing inputs, targeted import-duty relief, insurance frameworks for one-time curative therapies like CAR-T, innovative financing models, and a predictable regulatory pathway aligned with international standards will be critical to expanding patient access and ensuring sustainable innovation, Mookim said.

Sexagenarian killed over sorcery; 6 held

Rayagada/Tikiri, Jan 24: Police arrested six persons in connection with the murder of a 65-year-old man who was allegedly murdered over suspicion of practising sorcery in Rayagada district. Five of the accused were arrested from Doraguda area, while another was apprehended from Puri, police said Saturday.

The incident occurred in Doraguda village in Kashipur block. The victim, identified as Gopala Dora, was allegedly murdered by villagers who suspected him of practising sorcery and causing harm to their families, police said.

Rayagada Sub-Divisional Police Officer (SDPO) Gaurahari Sahu said the case was cracked within three days of the recovery of the body. The arrested persons have been identified as Iswar Dora, Eno Dora, Ramarao Dora, Nachi Dora, Raju Dora and Mohanrao Dora. Iswar Dora, also known as Isha, was arrested from Puri, while the remaining five were detained



from Doraguda area.

According to police, the victim's daughter, Gangama Dora, lodged a missing complaint January 21, stating that her father had been living in a hut about 300 metres from the village to tend cattle and had not returned home for the past 25 days. Villagers spotted his body Thursday in a nearby river, with his hands and legs tied and a stone fastened to his waist.

Following the complaint, Doraguda IIC Kiranbala Samal registered a case (08/26) and initiated an investigation, which revealed that the death was a murder involving six accused. During interrogation, the accused allegedly confessed to killing Gopala over suspicions

that he was practising sorcery and harming their families.

Police recovered a piece of eucalyptus wood, plastic bags and ropes allegedly used in the crime. After post-mortem examination, all the accused were produced before court.

The incident has once again highlighted the prevalence of superstition and lack of awareness in remote tribal pockets of the state. Despite the presence of major industrial units such as Utkal Alumina International Limited in the Doraguda area and claims of extensive CSR activities, local intellectuals have raised questions about the effectiveness of education, health and awareness programmes at the grassroots level.

Woman arrested for ₹3 crore fraud

Udala, Jan 24: Police arrested a 40-year-old woman for duping people of more than ₹3 crore by impersonating a senior Labour department official and falsely promising government loans.

The accused, identified as Binodini Nayak of the Balani police station area in Keonjhar district, was arrested from the Hanspal area of Bhubaneswar following a complaint lodged at Kaptipada police station.

Police said Nayak targeted both men and women by claiming to be a senior officer in the Labour department. About six months ago, she organised a meeting in the Kaunrapur area under Kaptipada police limits, where she assured attendees that she could arrange government loans. Believing her, more than 20 people collectively paid her over ₹30 lakh.

Neither the promised loans ever materialised, nor was the money returned. After repeated attempts to contact her failed, a victim, Santosh Kumar Pati of Parasibadi village, submitted a written complaint to the police.

During the investigation, police found that multiple cheating cases had already been registered against Nayak at Kaptipada, Udala, Bhanpur, Kharavela Nagar and Balipata police stations. Preliminary findings indicate that she cheated victims of around ₹3



crore across several districts.

Investigators said the accused used more than 30 SIM cards to evade detection, frequently changing numbers after committing fraud in one area. Records show cases against her were registered between March 2025 and January 2026.

Police also alleged that Nayak used the money to fund a lavish lifestyle, including travel in expensive vehicles.

A case (08/26) has been registered at Kaptipada police station. Station officer Madhusmita Mohanty said further investigation is underway and raids are being conducted to identify others involved in the racket.

Toxic water scare grips villages near NALCO

Angul, Jan 24: Allegations have surfaced against the National Aluminium Company Ltd. (NALCO), a Navratna public sector undertaking, of causing severe environmental pollution and endangering human and animal lives in Banarpal area on the outskirts of Angul town.

Local residents alleged that toxic ash and chemical-laden wastewater discharged from NALCO's captive power plant is being released daily into an open canal. The canal passes through villages such as Gota-mara, Lingarakata and Basana-

li before merging with the Indira Nullah near Budhapank and ultimately flowing into the Brahmani river, leading to severe water pollution.

Villagers claimed that breaches in the canal embankment have allowed contaminated water to seep into nearby ponds and water bodies. Residents using the water reported suffering from skin diseases, kidney ailments and even cancer-like symptoms. Cattle deaths have also been reported after animals consumed the polluted water, with visible signs of infection observed.

Residents further alleged that

excessive industrial noise from the plant has disrupted daily life, affecting children's education and sleep patterns. A black residue reportedly settles on wells and ponds every morning, making the water unfit for drinking.

Subas Nayak of Gotamara village said land had been handed over to NALCO decades ago with assurances of employment and development, but local communities continue to face health hazards and unsafe infrastructure, including unmanned railway crossings that have led to fatalities.

Ramchandra Nayak of Baghar village alleged widespread

skin infections among villagers who bathe in the polluted Nandira Nullah. Similar concerns were raised by residents of Lingarakata, who reported repeated cattle losses due to the absence of protective fencing along the canal.

Attempts to contact Ramesh Chandra Eka, the regional head of the Pollution Control Board in Angul were unsuccessful. NALCO authorities declined to comment on the allegations. Residents have demanded immediate intervention by the district administration, warning of a large-scale protest if corrective measures are not taken.



Legal Apartheid

This week, Rajasthan is set to pass a segregation law modelled after one in Gujarat. It is unlikely that most Indians will know of its existence because it is unlikely that the media will report it. Let us look at what it is intended to achieve.

Poor people forced to live clubbed together is what we know as a slum. An ethnic group forcibly relegated to certain neighbourhoods is a ghetto. The former have no means to go elsewhere. The latter have no choice even if they have the means. Apartheid means separateness and refers to the policy of South Africa of forcing the black Africans in ghettos. They could only live in fixed spaces by law.

When segregation in the United States was legally ended in the 1960s, the government passed laws that sought to integrate the races, like the Fair Housing Act. It prevented discrimination in the buying and selling of properties which was keeping the races separate. All across Gujarat, in all major cities and in several towns, the BJP government has done the opposite. Muslims are deliberately forced into ghettos through a law called the Gujarat Prohibition of Transfer of Immovable Property and Provision for Protection of Tenants from Eviction from Premises in Disturbed Areas Act. The law requires citizens in particular parts of cities to seek permission from the government before selling their property or changing their tenant and filters them by religion. The application must list the name of the buyer and the seller and includes an affidavit that the sale has been without coercion and at market price.

The law was passed initially by the Congress, and in 2009, the Modi government amended the Act to give discretionary powers to the collector to hold an inquiry and to take possession of property under the Act. In July 2019, another change was introduced. Previously, property sellers had to apply for permission to transfer their property and register their consent on affidavit. Now, it would not matter even if the sale was with free consent, and the fair value was paid to the owner. The collector could stop a sale of property if he felt at his discretion that there was any 'disturbance in demographic equilibrium' or 'improper clustering of persons of a community' or 'likelihood of polarisation', if the transfer took place.

The collector could reject an application for the legal transfer of a property after making assessment on these grounds. Punishment for transferring property without clearance was raised to six years in jail (it was six months when the law was first introduced). The law now also allowed the state government to form a 'Monitoring and Advisory Committee' to keep a check on the demographic structure in neighbourhoods. This committee would advise the collectors on whether or not sales could be permitted.

The act is currently in force in large parts of the state's three largest cities, Ahmedabad, Vadodara and Surat, and also in Bhachruch, Kapadvanj, Anand and Godhra. These are also the places Gujarat's Muslims are concentrated, effectively ghettoising them permanently. In effect, foreigners can lease and buy property in Gujarat that Indian Muslims cannot.

Last week Rajasthan Cabinet has approved a law that does the same thing in their state. Law Minister Jogaram Patel said neighbourhoods with "improper clustering" would be targeted. The transfer of immovable properties in these areas without permission of the government would be void.

Like the other laws persecuting minorities, this one is also given a benign name: the Rajasthan Prohibition of Transfer of Immovable Property and Provisions for Protection of Tenants from Eviction from the Premises in Disturbed Areas Bill, 2026.

Its effects will of course be the same as we have seen in Gujarat. It criminalises social and commercial intercourse between communities, in much the same way as Nazi Germany did. Violation of the Rajasthan law's provisions are non-bailable and cognisable, and punishable with imprisonment of up to five years and a fine. You could go to jail for renting a property. The Congress in the state opposes the passing of the law, but it lacks the numbers and will not be able to stop it. Its state chief said that "Demographic imbalance is not a legal term. There is no mention of the basis on which an area will be declared disturbed. The BJP wants to remain in power by following the Gujarat model."

This is true. India under Modi has hollowed out the constitution's secularism through a slew of laws that have found no resistance. The courts have looked away, the Opposition is too weak and the media is complicit. Criminalisation of the possession of beef was introduced in 2015, starting with Maharashtra and Haryana. Criminalisation of interfaith marriage came in 2018, starting with Uttarakhand. Criminalisation of Muslim divorce came in 2019, as did their specific exclusion from the Citizenship Amendment Act. The Rajasthan law carries this progression forward. Step by step, law after law, we have entered New India, a majoritarian state that is shedding its carapace of secularism.

Climate change creating economic momentum

The latest United Nations Climate Change Conference ended in a political deadlock. COP30 in Belém produced no agreement to phase out fossil fuels, no binding plan to halt deforestation, and no meaningful increase in support for the countries already drowning – sometimes literally – in climate and ecological losses. For a summit held in the world's largest rainforest, the symbolism was brutal.

But the real story was not the political paralysis on the negotiating floor. It was the unmistakable signal that the economics of climate change have already moved on. To see the developments that really matter, we can look to corporate balance sheets, sovereign credit ratings, supply chains, and risk pricing. These show that the transition to carbon-neutrality is happening despite the dysfunctional politics surrounding the issue.

When it comes to addressing major global risks, politics often fail until the economic math works out. In the case of climate change and nature loss, markets, insurers, lenders, and ratings agencies are now forcing the transitions that governments have been deferring. Sovereign credit ratings are being revised to reflect climate- and nature-risk exposure. Insurance markets are collapsing in high-risk regions, leaving households,

businesses, and entire municipalities without coverage. Borrowing costs are rising for countries facing drought, flooding, and deforestation, thus narrowing their fiscal space and accelerating capital flight. These mechanisms are doing what politicians will not do: Making inaction more expensive than action.

Meanwhile, the global auto market is evolving fast. More than half of new vehicles sold in China are plug-ins. In Norway, almost 90% of new cars sold in 2024 were fully electric. Fossil fuels still dominate the existing system, but they are decidedly absent from the future that is being built. The economics of clean energy have already won, and these industries' advantages are widening. The cumulative effect is unmistakable. The cost advantage of low-carbon systems is now structural, not cyclical.

Even the re-emergence of trade issues at COP30 – with emerging economies, including China, objecting to unilateral climate-related trade measures – ultimately points to the same conclusion. Rules that are being rewritten through markets, supply chains, and standards are inevitably ending up on the agenda for consensus-based diplomacy.

Moreover, the economic transition is not only about energy. The global bioeconomy – economic sectors that use re-

newable biological resources for materials, energy, chemicals, and agriculture – is valued at about \$4 trillion today, and is projected to grow to around \$30 trillion by 2050 – roughly 30% of current global GDP.

In this respect, COP30's emphasis on inclusion of Indigenous peoples and local communities mattered not for its symbolism, but because markets now recognize that traditional stewardship underpins the increasingly fragile ecosystems – forests, watersheds, soils – upon which our economies depend.

Just as energy markets are reshaping cost curves, nature-dependent sectors are taking steps to address their economic exposure to risks such as rainfall disruption, soil loss, fisheries collapse, and coastal erosion.

These responses are reshaping markets as powerfully as energy price shocks can. Disaster losses are compounding so fast that insurers are withdrawing from entire regions and product lines. Heat stress is shrinking productivity from South Asia to the Gulf of Mexico. From Brazil to Indonesia, deforestation is destabilizing rainfall patterns. Agriculture, fisheries, tourism, and shipping are all absorbing mounting climate- and nature-driven losses, triggering food-price spikes and economic volatility.

Regardless of political gridlock, climate change and ecolog-

ical degradation are creating undeniable economic momentum. As renewables scale up, fossil fuels will become even less competitive. As ecosystems degrade, fiscal burdens will rise. Central banks, sovereign lenders, ratings agencies, and private investors have already begun pricing drought-driven crop failures, flooded infrastructure, eroding coastlines, collapsing fisheries, and other risks.

In many countries, climate change is raising borrowing costs, boosting debt, and shaving points off expected growth.

At some point, the financial pressure will become so acute that what was once a political choice will become an economic inevitability. Brazil's launch of the Bioeconomy Challenge – a three-year multi-partner effort to "translate the G20 Bioeconomy High-Level principles into real outcomes" – reinforces this shift. It signals that the transition is increasingly being shaped through economic strategy rather than multilateral consensus.

This pattern is not new. The Cold War superpowers didn't pull back from their nuclear arms race because it was morally right; they did it because the costs were unsustainable, and the risks too high. When the economics change, the politics eventually follow.

Sir, Ever since US President Donald Trump stepped up efforts to acquire Greenland in the second week of January, the rupee – like other emerging market currencies – has come under pressure from rising geopolitical uncertainty. Fears of a transatlantic trade war between the US and Europe have unsettled global markets, triggering aggressive selling by foreign institutional investors and heightened demand for dollars from importers. This has accelerated the rupee's decline, even as the US dollar index has weakened by 4-5 per cent over the past year. Additional stress stems from penal US tariffs, global capital chasing AI-driven equities, elevated Indian stock valuations, and the broader drift towards protectionism. None of these headwinds appears temporary, suggesting prolonged currency pressure. While exporters are often seen as beneficiaries of a weaker rupee, gains are limited. Nearly 40 per cent of India's exports rely on imported inputs, raising costs and compressing margins. Currency depreciation also inflates fuel prices, with a five per cent fall in the rupee estimated to add 20-30 basis points to inflation through higher transport and manufacturing costs. The rupee thus faces a constrained path, with sustained stress likely until global economic disorder becomes the new normal.

Over 40-year-old, 10 tonne steel bridge stolen overnight

Korba, Jan 24: A 70-foot-long steel bridge weighing over 10 tonnes built on a canal more than four decades ago was stolen overnight in Chhattisgarh's Korba city, leaving local residents stunned, police said Saturday.

Investigators found the involvement of 15 persons in the incident, who allegedly cut and stole the structure to sell it as scrap. Five of the accused have been arrested so far, officials said. Residents noticed that the steel bridge built over the

Hasdeo Left Canal and used as a pedestrian pathway in Ward No 18. 17 of the Dhodhipara area had gone missing, following which local corporator Laxman Shrivastava lodged a complaint, Korba Additional Superintendent of Police Laxman Patle said.

Preliminary investigation suggested that unidentified accused used gas cutters to cut the iron railings of the structure, he said.

Based on the written complaint received at the CSEB police chowki, a special police

team was constituted to probe the matter, he added.

Following technical analysis, inputs given by informers and sustained investigation, police identified 15 accused in the case. Five of them - Lochan Kevat (20), Jaysingh Rajput (23), Moti Prajapati (27), Sumit Sahu (19) and Keshavpuri Goswami alias 'Picture' (22), all residents of the CSEB police chowki area - were arrested, Patle said.

Efforts are underway to trace the remaining 10 accused, including the alleged kingpins Mukesh Sahu and Aslam Khan, who are currently absconding, he added.

During their interrogation, the arrested accused confessed to committing the theft to sell the iron as scrap, he said, adding that further investigation is underway. CSEB police chowki in-charge Bhimsen Yadav said around seven tonnes of steel, which had been hidden inside the canal, has been seized.

The vehicle used to transport the stolen steel has also been seized, he said, adding that the police were probing where the remaining material was sold.

Talking to PTI over phone, corporator Shrivastava said the bridge, around 70 feet long and five feet wide, was built nearly 40 years ago and weighed more than 10 tonnes.

now visible on the ground.

There was a time when fear of Maoist violence forced several families from highly sensitive villages in the district to abandon their homes. Many of them fled after Maoists killed the heads of their families, branding them as police informers. The trauma pushed these families into years of forced migration and insecurity.

Speaking to IANS, Ram Bai Mandavi, a victim of Maoist violence, recalled her painful past. "The incident happened

in 2009. After that, our entire family left the village. The Maoists killed my husband. Now the Maoists are gone, so we have returned to our village. We have received a house, and now we will live here," she said.

Another victim, Aghan Singh, shared a similar experience.

"In 2009, my father was beaten to death with sticks after the Maoists suspected him of being an informer. At that time, we did not receive the benefit of any government scheme. Now, in 2026, we have finally been given a house," he said.

Ramita Bai, another Maoist-affected woman, described the terror she endured.

"The Naxals tied me up and took me with them. They kept me for a day and a night, beat me, and later released me. When the police found out, our entire family was shifted to Manpur. Due to fear, I lived in Manpur for 18 years. Now the situation has improved, we have received a house, and we will stay here," she said.

According to Pranjal Prajapati, CEO of Mohla, 26 houses have been sanctioned for Maoist-affected families under the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana. "Our entire staff is working on the ground to ensure that these houses are completed at the earliest," he told IANS.

Jhansi/Saharanpur/Ballia: At least six people were killed and several others injured in separate road accidents across Uttar Pradesh, police said Saturday. In Jhansi district, three people died, while 13 others were injured when an overloaded auto carrying 16 passengers was hit head-on by an unidentified vehicle near Lohia Degree College in the Gursara area Friday night. Two men were killed after their car hit a divider and overturned near the Ghalauli checkpost in the Deoband area of Saharanpur district Friday night. In Ballia district, a 22-year-old man was killed and a minor seriously injured after a cylinder-laden truck rammed into their motorcycle in the Haldi police station area Saturday morning.


Air cancels NY, Newark flights for Jan 25, 26

New Delhi, Jan 24: Congress leader Rahul Gandhi Saturday alleged that what is being done in Gujarat in the name of SIR is a "well-planned, organised, and strategic vote chori", with the Election Commission becoming a key participant in the "conspiracy of vote theft".

The Leader of Opposition in the Lok Sabha said the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls has been transformed into a weapon to destroy the constitutional right of "one person, one vote", so that the BJP, not the people, decides who will be in power.

"Wherever there's SIR, there's vote theft. What is being done in Gujarat in the name of SIR is not any kind of administrative process, it is a well-planned, organised, and strategic vote chori," Rahul Gandhi said in a post in Hindi on X.

The most shocking and dan-

gerous thing is that thousands upon thousands of objections were filed under the same name, he claimed.

"Votes were selectively removed from specific communities and booths that support the Congress party. Wherever the BJP sees a potential defeat, voters are simply made to disappear from the system," Rahul alleged.

"This same pattern was seen in Aland. The same thing happened in Rajura. And now the same blueprint is being implemented in Gujarat, Rajasthan, and every state where SIR has been imposed," he said.

"The most serious truth is that the Election Commission is no longer the protector of democracy, but has become a key participant in this conspiracy of vote theft," Rahul said.

His remarks came over Gujarat Congress' social media post in which it alleged that after Rahul Gandhi exposed

vote manipulation, the BJP has adopted a next-level model of election rigging.

"Election rigging means the theft of your voting rights, and this new game has come to light in Gujarat. According to the rules, the Election Commission, after the SIR, released the draft list and began accepting objections, setting January 18 as the final date. Only a handful of objections were received until January 15, but the real game began afterward. Under a conspiracy, millions of objections (Form 7) were suddenly submitted," the party's state unit claimed.

When the Election Commission released the 1.2 million objections, it became clear that rules were being floated to target specific castes, communities, and regions. Dozens of objections were filed in the name of a single person, with different names and signatures, while the Election Commission remained a "silent spectator", it further alleged.

"When the main opposition party writes a letter requesting information about the objections, they receive no response, making the election rigging completely evident. This is because the Election Commission has mortgaged both its responsibility and accountability to the ruling party," the party claimed.

Zubeen's family writes to PM seeking expeditious trial

Guwahati, Jan 24: The family of popular Assam singer Zubeen Garg Saturday wrote to Prime Minister Narendra Modi requesting a special court for expedited trial and appropriate diplomatic-legal action in Singapore in connection with his death in the island country last September.

They also sought that bail should not be granted to any of the accused in the case till the judicial process is over. The memorandum, signed by Garg's wife Garima, sister Palmer Borthakur and uncle Manoj Kumar Borthakur, has been sent via email to Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

Posting the memorandum on Facebook, Garima wrote: "Ahead of celebration of glorious 77th Republic Day of our nation, I conveyed my greetings to PM Narendra Modi and also sent a memorandum on behalf of our family regarding the legal process concerning Assam's heart-throb Zubeen Garg's death."

In the memorandum, the family said the singer-composer's death has left behind not merely a grieving family, but also millions of people seeking clar-

ity and lawful action in the matter.

"We have a sole objection now, Zubeen Garg has to receive real and complete justice. The guilty must get the most severe punishment," she added.

The family mentioned that while the Assam Police's CID is investigating the matter here, the Singapore authorities are also conducting their own enquiry with the family in "continuous engagement with authorities in both jurisdictions".

Ahead of Budget Session, govt convenes all-party meet Jan 27

New Delhi, Jan 24: Ahead of the Budget Session of Parliament, the government has called an all-party meeting January 27 to discuss the legislative and other agendas.

The Budget Session will begin January 28, with President Droupadi Murmu's address to the joint sitting of Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha.

In a rare occasion in parliamentary history, the Union budget would be presented on February 1, which is a Sunday. This will be Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman's ninth consecutive budget.

"The all-party meeting, convened by Parliamentary Affairs Minister Kiren Rijiju, will be held at the main committee room of Parliament House annexe at 11 am January 27," a government source said.

The Budget Session will continue till April 2. The first phase will conclude February 13, with Parliament reassembling March 9.

The session comes at a time when the opposition Congress is conducting a nationwide campaign against the Viksit Bharat-Guarantee for Rozgar and Ajeeyika Mission (Gramin) Act, which replaces the UPA-era Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act.

The ruling BJP is meanwhile running a counter campaign to highlight the new legislation as reformist and necessary to plug loopholes of the old law.

The Union Budget will also be presented at a time when US President Donald Trump's tariffs have upended the global economic order.

According to an internal circular, the Lok Sabha has provisionally allotted three days -- February 2 to 4 -- for discussion on the Motion of Thanks on the President's Address. There will be no Zero Hour January 28 and February 1.

Over 70 fugitives wanted by India located abroad during 2024-25: Report

New Delhi, Jan 24: Over 70 fugitives, wanted by India, were located abroad during 2024-25, according to an official report. As many as 203 fugitives wanted by other countries were detected/located in India during the same period.

A total of 71 "wanted persons/fugitives wanted by India" were located abroad in 2024-25, according to the annual report of the Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievances and Pensions.

The number of such wanted fugitives located abroad is the highest in the over a decade time, officials claimed. A total of 27 fugitives/wanted persons returned to India, from abroad in the last financial year, said the ministry's annual report for 2024-25.

It also gave details on the working of the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI), which acts as the National Central Bureau (NCB) - the nodal point for Interpol in India.

During the period of April, 2024 to March, 2025, 74 Letters Rogatory (LRs) were sent abroad, out of which 54 pertained to CBI cases and 20 of them to state law enforcement and other central agencies, the report said.

It was confirmed by Indian law enforcement agencies including CBI that 47 LR were fully executed during the said period and 29 were disposed of as closed/withdrawn on partial execution.

As March 31, 2025, a total 533 LR were pending with other countries, out of which 276 pertained to CBI cases and 257 to state police and other central law enforcement agencies. As many as 32 LR/treaty based requests were received from various countries requesting to provide assistance in the investigation of criminal matters.

"The scammers directed him not to step out of his house and coerced him into transferring his savings to various bank accounts over a span of a month," police said.

According to police, the victim has stated in his complaint

that the ordeal began August 4 last year, when he received a call from a man claiming to be a Mumbai Police officer. The caller accused him of being linked to a drug-trafficking racket.

Subsequently, fraudsters impersonating ED and CBI officials also contacted him.

"Out of fear, the victim complied with their instructions and kept transferring money from his bank accounts to the accounts specified by the fraudsters. The accused also threatened the victim of dire consequences if he revealed the matter to anyone," police added.

Realising that he was duped, Malhotra got a complaint lodged on the National Cyber-crime Reporting Portal (NCRP) September 19 last year, following which the matter was transferred to the Intelligence Fusion and Strategic Operations (IFSO) unit. Police had said an FIR was registered and Rs 12.11 crore of the cheated amount were frozen in various bank accounts.

Unapologetic on Op Sindoor: Tharoor on issues with Cong


Earlier, answering questions during a session at the Kerala Literature Festival here, Tharoor said he had taken a strong stand on 'Operation Sindoor' and remained "unapologetic," about it.

Explaining his position, Tharoor said that as an observer, commentator and writer, he had written a newspaper column after the Pahalgam terror attack, stating that it should not go unpunished and that there should be a kinetic response.

He said that while India is focused on development, it should not be dragged into a prolonged conflict with Pakistan, and that any action should be limited to targeting terrorist camps.

Tharoor said that to his surprise, the Indian government did exactly what he had recommended.

When the government sent him abroad as part of a multi-party delegation over Operation Sindoor, his party, for some reason, did not like it.

"You can speak to them and find out," he said. Tharoor said it was Jawaharlal Nehru who posed the famous question: "Who lives if India dies."

"When India is at stake, when India's security and its place in the world are involved, India comes first," he said.

He added that political parties may have differences as part of the process of building a better India, but when national interests are involved, India must prevail.

Terrorists had gunned down 26 people, mostly tourists, in Jammu and Kashmir's Pahalgam in April 2025, sending shockwaves across the country. In response, India launched Operation Sindoor, a precision military offensive targeting terror launchpads in Pakistan.

CBSE mandates mental health, career counselors in all affiliated schools

New Delhi: In a significant policy reform aimed at strengthening students' mental health and providing them with career guidance, the Central Board of Secondary Education has made the appointment of socio-emotional and career counsellors mandatory in all affiliated schools. For this, the national education board amended Clause 2.4.12 of the CBSE Affiliation Bye-Laws, 2018, following a Public Interest Litigation (PIL) filed before the Rajasthan High Court in July 2025 by Kota-based advocate Sujeev Swami and some psychology experts. The PIL highlighted rising mental health challenges among students, including academic stress and lack of structured career guidance, and sought mandatory provisions for qualified counsellors and a uniform mental health support framework in schools.

Hyderabad, Jan 24: In a fresh incident of alleged stray dogs killing in Telangana, about 300 canines were allegedly killed in Jagtial district, taking the toll to 900, animal rights activists claimed.

Inspector Ch Kiran said, during the inquest, around 70 to 80 dog carcasses were exhumed from the burial site. The burial appeared to have taken place three to four days ago.

"At this stage, we cannot confirm the involvement of the accused persons in the incident," he said, adding that post-mortem reports were awaited and further investigation was in progress.

Jakarta (Indonesia): A predawn landslide triggered by torrential rains on Indonesia's main island of Java killed at least eight people Saturday and left 82 missing as rescuers struggled through deep mud, searching for survivors. Days of torrential rains had caused rivers to burst their banks, tearing through Pasir Langu village in the West Bandung district of West Java province. Mud, rocks and trees tumbled down the mountainside, burying some 34 houses. Rescuers were searching for the 82 residents feared buried under heaps of mud and debris, while 24 people managed to escape the disaster, said spokesperson Abdul Muhamad of the National Disaster Management Agency.

US envoys meet with Netanyahu

Cairo: American officials met with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu Saturday, urging Israel to move into the second phase of the ceasefire that stopped the war in Gaza. Netanyahu met with President Donald Trump's envoy Steve Witkoff and Jared Kushner, Trump's son-in-law and Middle East adviser, according to the Prime Minister's Office. The US is anxious to keep the Trump-brokered deal moving, but Netanyahu is facing pressure from within Israel not to progress to the second phase until Hamas returns the body of the last hostage it is holding in Gaza. The Rafah border crossing is both a symbolic and logistical step that is the biggest signal of the commencement of second phase, and many outside Israel are eager to see it open.

Suicide bombing at Pak wedding kills 7

Pakistan: The death toll from a suicide bombing at a wedding near the Afghan border rose to seven Saturday, police said, as Pakistan struggles to deal with a rising wave of militant attacks. The bombing tore through a building housing members of a peace committee during a wedding ceremony Friday in northwestern Pakistan's Dera Ismail Khan district, said police official Muhammad Adnan. The committees are made up of local residents and elders and supported by Islamabad as part of its efforts to counter Islamist militants in the regions along the Afghan border. The four, who were among nearly a dozen people hurt in the attack, died in hospital, Adnan added. Three people were confirmed dead Friday.

US-CANADA TRADE TENSIONS RISE

Trump warns of 100% tariffs

Washington, Jan 24: President Donald Trump Saturday threatened to impose a 100 per cent tariff on goods imported from Canada if America's northern neighbour went ahead with its trade deal with China.

Trump said in a social media post that if Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney "thinks he is going to make Canada a Drop Off Port" for China to send goods and products into the United States, he is sorely mistaken.

While Trump has waged a trade war over the past year, Canada this month negotiated a deal to lower tariffs on Chinese electric vehicles in return for lower import taxes on Canadian farm products.

Trump initially had said that agreement was what Carney "should be doing and it's a good thing for him to sign a trade deal."

Carney's office did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

Trump's threat came amid



an escalating war of words with Carney as the Republican president's push to acquire Greenland strained the NATO alliance. Trump had commented while in Davos, Switzerland, this week that "Canada lives because of the United States." Carney shot back that his nation can be an example that the world does not have to bend toward autocratic tendencies.

Trump later revoked his in-

vitation to Carney to join the president's "Board of Peace" that he is forming to try to resolve global conflicts.

Trump's push to acquire Greenland has come after he has repeatedly needed Canada over its sovereignty and suggested it also be absorbed by the United States as a 51st state.

He resumed that this week, posting an altered image on social media showing a map

Russian air attack on Ukraine knocks out power for millions

Kyiv, Jan 24: Russia launched another vast attack on Ukraine's energy system in the small hours of Saturday, rocking Kyiv with explosions throughout the night and leaving 1.2 million properties without power countrywide.

The sky over Kyiv was lit up by regular orange flashes as air defences fired on missiles and drones descending on the capital, with loud booms echoing around the city's tall buildings.

Nearly 6,000 buildings in the capital were left without heating Saturday morning as temperatures hovered around -10 degrees Celsius (14 F). Many residents' apartments were already freezing cold from disruption to the city's centralised heat distribution system following previous attacks.

Moscow carried out the strikes as trilateral, US-brokered talks between Russia and Ukraine continued into a second day in the UAE, with no sign of compromise Friday.

Kyiv Mayor Vitali Klitschko said one person was killed in the capital city and four injured, including three being treated in hospital, while 19 people including a child were wounded in Ukraine's second city, Kharkiv.

Russia, which has pummeled Ukraine's power grid

since its full-scale invasion in 2022, is conducting its heaviest bombardment campaign on energy facilities this winter, leaving people across Ukraine with only a few hours of power a day and some without heat or water.

Over 800,000 people in the capital and another 400,000 in the northern region of Chernihiv were without power after the latest attacks, Deputy Prime Minister Oleksiy Kuleba said.

Ukraine's air force said Russia had unleashed 375 drones and 21 missiles, including two of its rarely deployed Tsirkon ballistic missiles, in its overnight attack.

The sky over Kyiv was lit up by regular orange flashes as air defences fired on missiles and drones descending on the capital, with loud booms echoing around the city's tall buildings.

Tymur Tkachenko, head of Kyiv's military administration, reported strikes in at least four districts. A medical facility was among the buildings damaged.

Before Saturday, Kyiv had already endured two mass overnight attacks since the New Year that have knocked out power and heating to hundreds of residential buildings.

Emergency workers were still engaged in restoring services to residents that had been knocked out by those attacks, and Klitschko said many of the buildings that had lost heating Saturday had only recently had it restored.

In Kharkiv, a frequent target 30 km (18 miles) from the Russian border and much closer to eastern battlefronts, Mayor Ihor Terekhov said 25 drones had hit several districts.

Winter storm forces over 10,000 flight cancellations across US

Dallas, Jan 24: More than 10,000 flights across the US set to take off over the weekend were cancelled as a monster storm started to wreak havoc Saturday across much of the country and threatened to knock out power for days and snarl major roadways with dangerous ice.

Roughly 140 million people, or more than 40 per cent of the US population, were under a winter storm warning from New Mexico to New England. The National Weather Service forecast warns of widespread

heavy snow and a band of catastrophic ice stretching from east Texas to North Carolina.

All Saturday flights were cancelled at Will Rogers International Airport in Oklahoma City, and all Sunday morning flights also were called off, as officials aimed to restart service Sunday afternoon at Oklahoma's biggest airport. The airport was nearly deserted Saturday morning, with only a few TSA agents and a couple of travellers remaining inside the departures side. The Texas Department of Transportation Saturday posted images of snow-covered highways in the suburbs north of Dallas.

China places highest-ranking general under investigation

Beijing, Jan 24: China's most senior general is under investigation, China's defence ministry said Saturday in the highest-profile purge to date of senior military leadership just as Beijing modernises its forces and tries to further project its might.

Zhang Youxia serves as second-in-command under President Xi Jinping as vice-chairman of the Central Military Commission - the supreme

command body - and has long been seen as Xi's closest military ally.

The ministry said Zhang and Liu Zhenli, chief of staff of the CMC's Joint Staff Department, were under investigation for suspected serious violations of discipline and law.

Zhang is also a member of the elite Politburo of the ruling Communist Party and is one of just a few leading officers with combat experience.

The military was one of the

main targets of a broad corruption crackdown ordered by Xi in 2012. That drive reached the upper echelons of the People's Liberation Army in 2023 when the elite Rocket Force was targeted.

Zhang's removal is the second of a sitting general on the Central Military Commission since the 1966-76 Cultural Revolution. He has not been seen in public since November 20, when he held talks with Russia's defence minister in Moscow.

Indian crew world's most abandoned seafarers in 2025

The International Transport Workers' Federation (ITF) said that abandonment worldwide hit record levels last year as it released new data showing 6,223 seafarers abandoned across 410 ships

London, Jan 24: Indians are the most abandoned nationality of seafarers for the second consecutive year as 1,125 cases of abandonment were logged at the end of 2025, a UK-headquartered global union of transport workers has found.

The International Transport Workers' Federation (ITF) said that abandonment worldwide hit record levels last year as it released new data showing 6,223 seafarers abandoned across 410 ships.

The ITF welcomed the Indian government's "blacklisting" measures to protect its seafar-

ers from ships as a result of repeat abandonments and other bad practices.

"It's nothing short of a disgrace that, yet again, we are seeing record numbers of seafarers abandoned by unscrupulous ship owners," said David Heindel, Chair of the ITF Seafarers' Section.

"Every day, all around the world, seafarers face horrific violations of their human and labour rights, all so that bottom-feeding companies can make a quick buck at their expense. It's very clear that this is a systemic issue in the industry and that means we need the entire industry to come together

with seafarers and their unions to say, 'enough is enough', and take action together to end this crisis," he said.

Seafarer abandonment is defined by the International Maritime Organisation (IMO), headquartered in London, under three criteria: failing to cover

the cost of a seafarer's repatriation; leaving a seafarer without necessary maintenance and support; unilaterally severing ties with a seafarer, including failure to pay contractual wages for a period of at least two months.

According to the ITF analy-



sis, the worst region for abandonment was the Middle East, followed by Europe. The two countries where most ship abandonments took place and the highest number of vessels on which abandonments occurred were Turkey (61) and the United Arab Emirates (54) both of which were found to have significantly higher abandonment rates than any other country.

The ITF data, to be submitted in a report to the IMO ahead of its discussion at a legal committee meeting later this year, also shows that seafarers were owed a total of 25.8 million dollars in 2025 as a consequence of the abandonments. From this total, the ITF said it has recovered and returned 16.5 million dollars to seafarers.

"In 2025, we've yet again seen the worst year on record for seafarer abandonment. But this isn't just a story about

numbers, these are the people the workers who keep our economy moving forward being forced into absolutely desperate situations, far from home and often without any clear resolution in sight," said ITF General Secretary Stephen Cotton.

"As we've long said, the solutions to abandonment lie in accountability in the shipping industry ensuring that ship owners can't dodge their responsibilities. The International Maritime Organisation must be given more power to play a co-ordinating role in eradicating abandonment," he said.

The union has been campaigning against the misuse of the 'Flags of Convenience' (FOC) system. An FOC vessel is one that flies the flag of a country other than the country of ownership, at the same time adopting the regulations set down by that flag.

149mn Gmail, FB, Netflix accounts leaked: Report

New Delhi, Jan 24: Login credentials, including usernames, passwords of over 149 million accounts of internet firms, including Gmail, Instagram, Facebook, and Netflix, have allegedly been leaked, a report published by ExpressVPN said.

The report published by cybersecurity researcher Jeremiah Fowler claims that the publicly exposed data includes 48 million accounts on Gmail, 4 million on Yahoo, 17 million on Facebook, 6.5 million on Instagram, 3.4 million on Netflix, 1.5 million on Outlook, etc.

"The publicly exposed database was not password-protected or encrypted. It contained 149,404,754 unique logins and passwords, totaling a massive 96 GB of raw credential data. In a limited sampling of the exposed documents, I saw thousands of files that included emails, user names, passwords, and the URL links to the login or authorization for the accounts," Fowler said in the report.

Email queries to major firms named in the report did not elicit any immediate reply.

Fowler said the database was publicly accessible, allowing anyone who discovered it to potentially access the credentials of millions of individuals. "The exposed records included usernames and passwords



collected from victims around the world, spanning a wide range of commonly used online services and about any type of account imaginable," he said.

Financial services accounts, crypto wallets or trading accounts, banking and credit card logins also appeared in the limited sample of records that the cybersecurity researcher claims to have reviewed.

He said a serious concern was the presence of credentials associated with '.gov' domains from numerous countries.

"While not every government-linked account grants access to sensitive systems, even limited access could have serious implications depending on the role and permissions of the compromised user.

"Exposed government credentials could be potentially used for targeted spear-phishing, impersonation, or as an entry point into government

networks. This increases the potential of '.gov' credentials posing national security and public safety risks," he said.

Fowler said that the exposure of such a large number of unique logins and passwords presents a potentially serious security risk to a large number of individuals who may not know their information was stolen or exposed.

"Because the data includes emails, user names, passwords, and the exact login URLs, criminals could potentially automate credential-stuffing attacks against exposed accounts including email, financial services, social networks, enterprise systems, and more.

"This dramatically increases the likelihood of fraud, potential identity theft, financial crimes, and phishing campaigns that could appear legitimate because they reference real accounts and services," he said.

T20 World Cup: ICC drops B'desh, brings in Scotland

The ICC has pushed Bangladesh out of the upcoming T20 World Cup, bringing in Scotland after BCB refused to let its team travel to India citing security concerns in the wake of Mustafizur Rahman's ouster from the IPL.

Scotland's entry ended the month-long suspense after Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) repeatedly insisted that their matches be shifted to Sri Lanka and even suggested their group being swapped with Ireland.

"An e-mail was sent last evening to Bangladesh Cricket Board chairman intimating him that his board didn't get back to ICC officially after the 24 hour deadline that was given to them to decide if they wanted to come to India," an ICC source told PTI



on conditions of anonymity.

The ICC also intimated all the participating member nations separately about Bangladesh being dropped from the tournament.

Bangladesh Sports Ministry advisor Asif Nazrul had advised against national team travelling to India, citing security issues despite being given repeated assurances by the ICC.

Scotland will thus play their four group league games against West Indies (February 7), Italy (February 9) and England (February 14) in Kolkata followed by a game against Ne-

pal in Mumbai February 17.

Govt to take call: PCB on participation
