

Rahul Gandhi displays former Army chief's 'unreleased' memoir

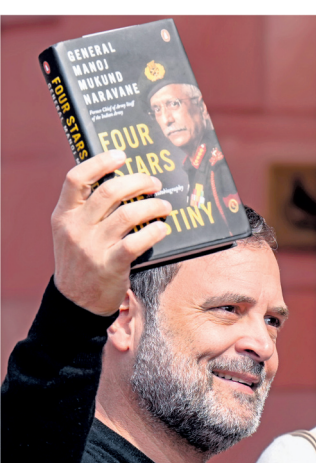
New Delhi, Feb 4: Leader of Opposition Rahul Gandhi Wednesday cited former Army chief MM Naravane's 'unreleased' memoir to claim that Prime Minister Narendra Modi shed responsibility during the India-China conflict in 2020 and passed the buck on to the general.

Addressing reporters in the premises of Parliament House complex, Gandhi held up the 'unreleased' memoir and said he would like the youngsters in India to know that this 'book' exists despite the government claiming otherwise.

"The Speaker has said this book does not exist, the government has said it does not exist, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh ji has said this book does not exist. Every youngster in India should see this book exists," Gandhi said. He said Naravane has written the full account of what happened in Ladakh.

Gandhi said he has been told that he cannot quote from this "memoir" in Lok Sabha.

"The main line is what the PM said -- 'jo uchit samjho woh ka-



ro'. The chief of army staff Gen Naravane called Rajnath Singh and said 'Chinese tanks have come on Kailash ridge, what should we do? Rajnath Singh did not reply to him at first. He (Naravane) asked S Jaishankar, NSA (Ajit Doval) and Rajnath Singh ji, but did not get a reply," the Congress leader said citing the 'memoir'.

BLACKBUCK POPULATION RISES SHARPLY IN GANJAM

Berhampur, Feb 4: The population of blackbucks in Ganjam district has risen by 498 in the last one year, officials said Wednesday. According to the census conducted by the Forest Department January 29, the total number of blackbucks in the district stood at 9,287. The population was estimated at 8,789 in 2025, 7,273 in 2023, 7,358 in 2021 and 6,875 in 2020, officials said.

Of the total population recorded this year, 5,832 were females, 2,104 males and 1,351 juveniles, they said. Locally known as

'Krushnasar Murga', the blackbuck is listed under Schedule I of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, and is categorised as vulnerable in the Red Data Book. The highest number of blackbucks, 5,972, was sighted in the Ghumusar South forest division, while the lowest count of 459 was recorded in Ghumusar North. Another 2,856 animals were found in the Berhampur forest division. Around 500 people, including wildlife experts, activists, academicians and students, were involved. "Locals believe the sighting of blackbucks in paddy fields is a good sign," said Amulya Upadhyaya, president of the Blackbuck Protection Committee (Ganjam).

Ghaziabad, Feb 4: Three sisters, the youngest just 12, addicted to an online Korean game that involved a series of tasks died after jumping off the balcony of their ninth floor home in the early hours of Wednesday, police said.

Nishika, 16, Prachi, 14, and Pakhi left behind a chilling note that said, "Read everything written in this diary, it is all here." It was accompanied by a crying face emoji and a handwritten message, "Sorry papa, I am really sorry."

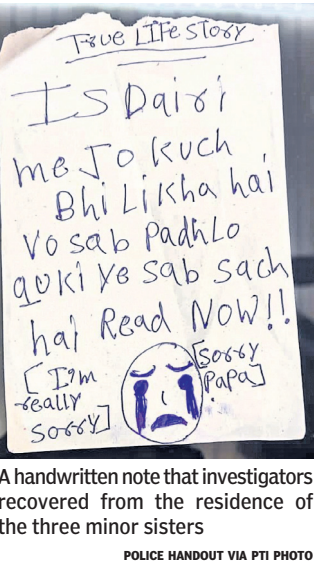
The diary was recovered from the girls' belongings. The three did not go to school and had been home for the last two

years, police said. Their father Chetan Kumar, a forex trader, has two wives, both sisters, and there were five children in all-four daughters and a son. The entire family lived together.

Police received information that three girls had jumped from the balcony of their home in Bharat City in Sahibabad area in Ghaziabad, the busy satellite town abutting the national capital, around 2.15 am.

They were rushed in ambulance to a hospital in Loni close by where doctors declared them dead on arrival. Uttar Pradesh DGP Rajeev Krishna told PTI in Lucknow, "We are getting the whole case examined in detail."

Though details were sketchy, Deputy Commissioner of Police

Nimish Patil said preliminary investigation revealed the girls were influenced by Korean content and spent a significant amount of time on their mobile phones. He said the girls' education had been irregular and their academic performance was below par.

"But it is evident that the girls were highly addicted to mobile phone usage," he said. Assistant Commissioner of Police (Shalimar Garden) Atul Kumar Singh added that the sisters were addicted to a Korean task-based interactive "love game".

"Their parents had restricted their mobile phone usage for the past few days, which left them distressed. This may have triggered the decision (to take the

extreme step)," he said.

The sisters got addicted to online gaming during the pandemic years and played it almost without break.

They had been playing the game for the last two-and-a-half to three years, said the father.

The apparent suicide pact recalled the Blue Whale challenge that is believed to have pushed a 14-year-old Mumbai boy to suicide in 2017. It was a 50-day-challenge believed to have originated in Russia and claimed over 130 lives across Russia and the Central Asian countries of Kazakhstan and Kyrgyzstan.

It gave a task a day -- each one potentially fatal -- to the player for 50 days.

Mahanadi row: State urges Centre to step in

Bhubaneswar, Feb 4: Seeking further extension of the Mahanadi Water Disputes Tribunal (MWDT), the Odisha government Wednesday urged the Centre to step in as mediator to help resolve the long-pending water-sharing dispute with neighbouring Chhattisgarh.

Revenue and Disaster Management Minister Suresh Pujari said the state government has requested the Centre to take the lead in resolving the dispute through negotiations, even though the matter is under consideration of the tribunal.

"We have talked to the central government and also the Chhattisgarh government. Odisha wants that the matter should be resolved amicably. The Centre needs to play the role of a mediator between the two states," Pujari told reporters here.

Pujari said Odisha government's inter-ministerial committee headed by Deputy Chief



Minister KV Singh Deo has also held discussion with Chhattisgarh Chief Minister Vishnu Deo Sai.

"At the same time, the Odisha government has formally written to the Centre seeking a nine-month extension of the tenure of the tribunal, whose current term is nearing completion," he said.

Justifying the demand for extension of the tribunal, the minister said the chairperson of the panel was not available for nine months for which no hearings could be held. Therefore, the tenure of the tribunal need to be extended, he added.

MWDT was constituted in March 2018 under the Inter-State River Water Disputes Act, 1956 to resolve the dispute over water sharing between Odisha and Chhattisgarh.

In 2016, Odisha filed a complaint alleging that Chhattisgarh constructed several dams/barrages at upstream of Mahanadi, thus blocking the free flow of water in the interstate river.

Though the tribunal operates since five years, the statement of only one witness has so far been recorded. Therefore, the tribunal's tenure should be extended, Pujari said.

Malkangiri declared 'Naxal-free' district

Malkangiri, Feb 4: Malkangiri, once considered a Maoist hotbed, was declared a 'Naxal-free' district Wednesday after rebel Sukhram Markam, who was carrying a bounty of ₹21 lakh on his head, surrendered before the police, a senior officer said.

The announcement comes days after Nabrangpur district was declared Maoist-free after nine red rebels surrendered in neighbouring Chhattisgarh.

Markam, an area committee member of the outlawed CPI (Maoist), also laid down one SLR rifle, ammunition and other articles, Malkangiri SP Binod Patil H said. "This surrender of operational and ideological CPI (Maoist) leader marks a final blow to the red rebels in the district, making Malkangiri Naxal-free," the SP told reporters.

Markam, alias Suresh alias Yogesh, was present at the press conference. Malkangiri was once considered the breeding ground of left-wing extremism in Odisha.

"Maoist violence started in Malkangiri and spread to 21 of the state's 30 districts. Later, they spread their network across Odisha," said a retired DGP rank officer.

India to lower tariffs on agri goods to 0%: USTR

US Trade Representative Jamie-Greer's claim that India will reduce tariffs on American agricultural goods, including fruits and vegetables, to zero per cent could trigger fears of cheaper imports undercutting domestic producers. Indian exports to the US would, however, face 18 per cent tariff which Greer justifies because America has a 'giant' trade deficit with India. In India, where millions depend on farm income and price support, agriculture remains a politically sensitive sector. Any such move to open up the country's agriculture and dairy sectors could likely face pushback unless accompanied by safeguards and protection for small farmers.

New York/Washington, Feb 4: India will lower tariffs on a 'vast array' of American industrial and agricultural goods, such as 'fruits' and 'vegetables,' to zero per cent under the trade deal announced by President Donald Trump, a top US official has said.

US Trade Representative Jamie-Greer described the deal as a 'big win' while not-

ing that India will continue to control 'certain key areas' that enjoy protection.

"This is it. The time has come, and now we have the deal. We'll finish papering it, but we know the specifics. We know the details. It's a very exciting opportunity," Greer told CNBC Squawk Box. Greer said the US will continue to maintain some level of tariff against India - 18 per cent -- "because we have this giant trade deficit with them..."

Giving details of the deal, Greer said the average tariff on industrial goods in India is currently around 13.5 per cent "That's going to go to zero for virtually everything. When I say virtually, I mean 98-99%. On the agricultural side, there's a vast, vast array of agricultural goods. So it will go to zero," he said.

"India, like every country in the world, including the US, has some protection around certain key areas where they'll continue to control that. We'll continue to work on access. But for a variety of things, tree nuts, wine, spirits, fruits, vegetables, etc, they're going down to zero. This is a big win," Greer said.

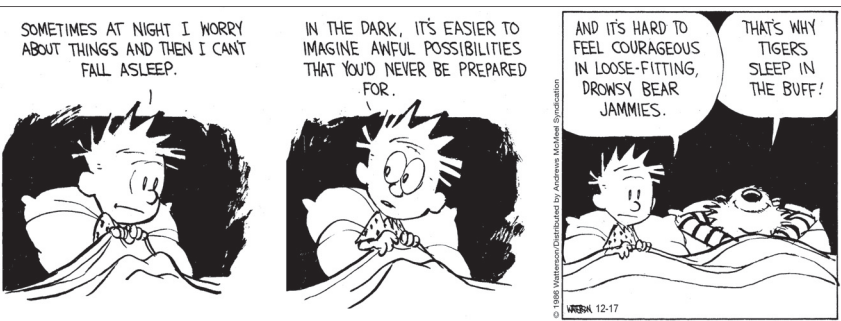

OPHWC employee steps down over ‘sexual harassment’

Balasore, Feb 4: A female employee of the Odisha Police Housing and Welfare Corporation (OPHWC) has resigned from her position, claiming she was denied justice after accusing the project manager of Kalidaspur office here of sexual harassment.

The woman filed a formal written complaint with the corporation’s headquarters in Bhubaneswar against Project Manager SK Mohanty. She alleged that Mohanty harassed her over an extended period by sending explicit videos and messages via WhatsApp and making unwanted romantic advances.

According to the complaint, the harassment escalated in January when Mohanty allegedly summoned her to his office under the pretext of work, locked the door, attempted to use physical force and misbehaved with her. The victim further alleged that after she resisted, Mohanty called her father over phone and threatened him. Later, she sought justice from her office headquarters in Bhubaneswar. The woman stated that she decided to resign due to a lack of disciplinary action from the department and mounting professional pressure on her.

Last week, the complainant in a letter sought assistance from Member of Parliament Pratap Chandra Sarangi. Sarangi has since directed Soumendra Priyadarshi, the corporation’s chairman and managing director, to conduct a thorough investigation and take legal action if the claims are verified. When contacted, Mohanty has denied all allegations, calling them “completely false and baseless”.

“There are CCTV cameras installed in the office. An investigation will reveal the truth. This is a conspiracy against me,” Mohanty said.

AP officials’ visit to Neredibalsa triggers territorial concerns

Koraput, Feb 4: Tension resurfaced in the sensitive Kotia border region after officials from Andhra Pradesh allegedly entered the area and held a meeting with villagers at Neredibalsa village Wednesday. The fresh incursion has raised serious concerns among local residents, who fear repeated interference by Andhra authorities in villages that fall under Odisha’s jurisdiction.

A group of Andhra officials reached Neredibalsa and discussed welfare schemes and administrative matters with villagers. The meeting reportedly took place without prior coordination with the Odisha administration, triggering strong reactions from the local community. Villagers alleged that such repeated visits are creating confusion and pressure among residents, especially in border villages where jurisdictional issues have remained contentious for years.

Local residents allege that officials from the neighbouring state have been making frequent attempts to influence villagers by promising various benefits and facilities, which they say undermines Odisha’s administrative authority. The villagers expressed that they

are proud residents of Odisha and do not want any external interference in their day-to-day affairs.

“We belong to Odisha and our village is part of Kotia. Andhra officials come here again and again and hold meetings, which creates fear and confusion among people. We want the Odisha government to protect our rights and strictly stop such intru-

sions,” Ramesh Kadraka of Neredibalsa said

Another villager, Sukanti Jani, echoed similar concerns, stating, “Because of these repeated visits, villagers are under pressure. Some people get tempted by promises, but most of us want permanent development from Odisha. The administration should take strict steps so this does not happen again.”

The incident has once again highlighted the long-standing border dispute and the vulnerability of fringe villages like Neredibalsa. Locals have demanded immediate intervention by senior Odisha officials, increased administrative presence, and awareness programmes to reassure villagers and prevent further intrusions. The situation remains tense, with residents urging the government to safeguard Odisha’s territorial and administrative integrity in Kotia.

Admin hears grievances of Raipahad residents

Nandapur/Padua: Amid growing interstate disputes involving border villages in Koraput district, the district administration has begun field visits to assess ground realities and hear public grievances. Several villages along the Andhra Pradesh–Odisha border, similar to Kotia, remain contentious, with residents alleging long-standing neglect due to unresolved disputes between the two states. While villagers reportedly receive certain benefits from the neighbouring state, they claim they have been denied entitlements promised by Odisha. Following repeated media reports, officials of the Koraput district and block administrations Wednesday visited Raipahad village under Golor panchayat in Nandapur block. They interacted with the residents to understand their concerns. Tensions arose when villagers and elected representatives alleged that assurances given by the Odisha government after bilateral meetings between the two states had not been implemented even after a considerable lapse of time. The visiting team included senior district, block and line department officials, along with local panchayat representatives. Officials assured residents that their grievances would be examined and forwarded to higher authorities for appropriate action.



8 arrested as drunken brawl escalates into communal clash

Paralakhemundi, Feb 4: Eight people were arrested after a drunken brawl snowballed into a communal clash in Gajapati district, leaving 10 injured, police said Wednesday.

The incident happened in Chandipur village in the Mohana police station area Monday evening, they said.

In the violence, the house of a local BJP leader was attacked, they added.

“We have arrested eight people seen on the CCTV footage of the communal clash and detained four others,” Gajapati SP Jatindra Kumar Panda said.

“Those detained are the youths who were involved in the drunken brawl. They could not be seen on the CCTV footage of the clash, but we are verifying their mobile tower locations. They may also be arrested soon,” he said.

Panda said the situation is under control in the area at present.

Two platoons (60 personnel) of armed police have been deployed in the area to avoid any further escalation, he said.

Leaders of both the communities are making efforts to bring back complete normalcy in the area, he added.

The SP said two FIRs have been registered in connection with the violence.

Rayagada ITI student critical after assault

Rayagada, Feb 4: A 16-year-old student of a government Industrial Training Institute (ITI) in Rayagada was critically injured after being assaulted with an iron rod by a fellow student, police said.

The injured student, identified as Manoj Gouda of Therubali DP Camp area in Kolnara block, was initially admitted to the Rayagada district headquarters hospital. As his condition deteriorated, he was later referred to MKCG Medical College and Hospital in Berhampur for advanced treatment.

According to a written complaint filed at Rayagada Town


police station by the victim’s uncle Kamadev Gouda, Manoj is enrolled in the welder trade at the government ITI. Another student, identified as Bhubhan Lima, allegedly struck Manoj on the head with an iron rod, leaving him bleeding and seriously injured.

After receiving information about the incident, Kamadev reached the district hospital along with villagers and spoke to his nephew and his classmates. He later lodged a complaint seeking action and protection for the injured student.

Police launched an investigation into the incident, Inspector In-Charge Prasanna Kumar Behera said.

Bolangir gangrape: 6 boys held

Bolangir: Six boys have been arrested for allegedly gangraping a 15-year-old girl in Bolangir district, police said Wednesday, adding that the video of the assault was later circulated on social media. According to police, the incident took place in Turekela police station area December 27 last year when the Class IX student was returning home from coaching. The case came to light after the video went viral on some social media platforms. The accused allegedly threatened the victim and asked her not to tell her parents about it, police said. However, when the victim’s father lodged a complaint Tuesday, a case was registered at Turekela police station and all the six accused were arrested, a police officer said. “We have arrested all the accused,” IG (northern range) Himanshu Lal told reporters in Bolangir. “Six boys, including a 17-year-old who is the mastermind of the crime, have been arrested. We will request the court to treat the prime accused as an adult during trial,” Bolangir SP Abilash G said. The mobile phone used to record the video of the incident has been seized, he added.

2 held for abduction, torture of minor girl

Tumudibandha, Feb 4: Police arrested two persons in connection with the abduction and torture of a 14-year-old girl who was found restrained in a forest under Kandhamal district. The accused, identified as Nitesh Nayak and Sushil Nayak, were taken into custody following an investigation by Belghar police. Baliguda Sub-Divisional Police Officer (SDPO) Shubham Bhosle confirmed the arrests Wednesday. According to investigators, the incident occurred Sunday when the girl was walking alone to a village stream. The two men allegedly took her into a nearby forest after abducting her and forced her for establishing sexual relationship. When the girl resisted, the accused allegedly tore her clothes, captured her video and threatened to make it viral. Later, they tied her hands and feet. They also gagged her mouth and abandoned her in the forest before absconding.

The victim spent a night in the forest before somehow managing to reach her home Monday. Following a formal complaint, police registered a case (10/26) and conducted a medical examination of the victim. “The victim’s statement has been recorded, and the investigation is underway,” Bhosle said.

Man held for killing father

Bissamcuttack: Police Wednesday arrested a 26-year-old man in connection with the murder of his father in Bissamcuttack town of Rayagada district: an incident that shocked the local community. The accused, Shyam Sundar Sahu, allegedly killed his father, Kailash Chandra Sahu, at their residence in the Brahmin Sahi area January 30. Police said the murder stemmed from a long-standing dispute over money lending and unpaid loans. According to investigators, the incident occurred around 4:30pm when the victim was alone in the courtyard of his house. The accused allegedly mixed toilet-cleaning acid with a soft drink and forced his father to consume it. After drinking the mixture, the victim fell seriously ill and began vomiting. Police said the accused then attacked his father with a vegetable cutter (paniki), striking him on the head before slitting his throat. The victim died on the spot. Later, the accused reportedly raised an alarm. Neighbours rushed the victim to Christian Hospital in Bissamcuttack, where doctors declared him dead. A case under Section 103(1) of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita was registered at Bissamcuttack police station. Police seized the weapon, acid, soft drink bottle and bloodstained clothes.

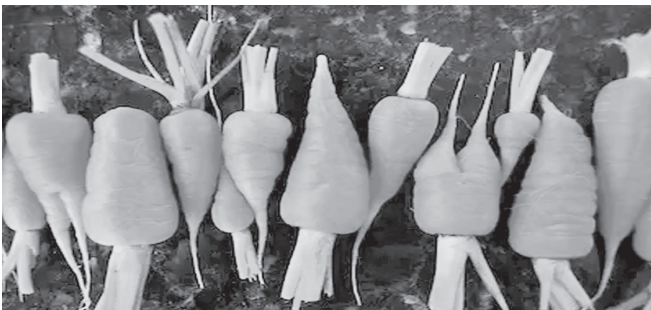

CULTURE OF CULINARY KILLING



The sharp decline in the edible-age of vegetables, especially the untimely harvest of vegetables, is something grotesque and abominable

ing culture. It is this strange culinary turn that has forced us to transgress the ethics of eating, particularly the virtue of ‘sustainable eating’. We now belong to an age of culinary killing!

The contributions of food technology, tourism, hotel managements, culinary capitalism, on one hand, and our relentless experimentation with new flavours, colours, tastes and lifestyles largely tempted by ‘fusion cuisine’, on the other, are some of the gastronomical avarices that have galvanized the increasing and unethical treatment of these baby vegetables – baby corn, baby jackfruits, baby potatoes, tender drumsticks, onion or garlic shoots, not to mention of tender leaves, buds, and flowers of some other vegetables. We literally nip them at the buds!

Some modern gastronomes taste these natural-poor as appetizers, others snobbishly please their eyes, while some others make status statement by trying with these baby vegetables garnished on their goblets, dishes, or laid naked on their costly salad plates. We are the real hungry-alists of fashionable culinary innovations whose stomachs always rebel against monotonous food/dishes. We hate repeating a dish for very long; we love experimenting our

tastes; and the result is the sacrifices of nature and sacrilege of ethics of eating! Several of us who belong to this gluttonous generation love to devour these poor children of nature for mere food-fashions we are intreated into by predominant culinary bourgeoisie and late gastroeconomics.

Now, who should be held responsible for this unethical eating-- our stomach, pocket, farmers, restaurateurs, or market? I think it is an organized crime of herbicides committed by our society in general. We can’t blame it on our poor stomach because it is most human for it to welcome anything into it. Our pockets? No, because it doesn’t have a mind to think of ethics. Food is a mental construction, so is hunger, much like poverty, caste, gender, nationality, and identity. It is not our stomach but our mind which decides our menu. The premature herbicides of vegetables in contemporary gluttonous culture can, therefore, be attributed to this social construction of tastes and food. Can we not deconstruct our desire, our hunger, and our taste to refrain from such infanticides of nature?

It is not that our predecessors did not consume baby vegetables at all. Of course they did; and they did more than

us. But they ate those vegetables that offered them in the most appropriateness of their seasons and species. They did not transgress the edible time and species of vegetables. We have defied this appropriateness of seasons and species of nature; we almost promote a sort of vegetable-Darwinism and merely kill them as culinary snobs. I am sure our forefathers were no snobs to prepare exotic dishes out of baby corn or baby jackfruits for their own sport, status, or fun. Somehow, we moderners have made spectacle of our culinary tastes, disrespecting the dignity of nature! Our oldies had respect, patience, justice, and wisdom both in the matter and manner of eating, and these eating virtues are what we mostly lack now, or, at least, despise to practice. The sharp decline in the edible-age of vegetables, especially the untimely harvest of vegetables, is something grotesque and abominable. I think consuming vegetables in their infancy is not a wisdom but greed and snobbery of the urban folks. The oxymoron of our consumption culture is-- ‘we rear to kill’. Let us not justify our gluttony for any creative destruction; let us, instead, vow for no destruction at all.

It is too anthropocentric to consider that plants are insentient and, therefore, it is not sinful to sacrifice them for human tummies. Baby vegetables have irresistibly succumbed to the experiments of modern/metro appetite. As part of the deep ecology, we humans must consider this culinary case of vegetable-subalterns as epistemological tool to critique on the urban psychology and culture of consumption. It behooves, therefore, to espouse the ethics of “sustainable eating.”

IT IS NOT OUR STOMACH BUT OUR MIND WHICH DECIDES OUR MENU

Amongst many exotic cuisines that we have grafted into our urban culinary culture, there is a general taste for eating baby vegetables. This appears to be the most ostentatious appetite of modern gastronomes driven by insatiable consumerism. As inevitable items of what they call ‘fine-dining’, baby vegetables nowadays are the most vulnerable natural entities in brigade de cuisine. Whether cheap or grand hotels, urban or suburban restaurants, homemade or packed foods, a usual gastronomic fascination for such fashionable cuisines, made of baby vegetables, is the hallmark of our social status and eating habits. Eating them raw, boiled, roasted, singed or steamed, as they appear in verbatim on our exquisite urbane menus, is the exotic symptom of our consumption snobbery, our nouvelle cuisine. Even displaying these green-infants of nature on commercial ads, food exhibitions, food packets, social gatherings, digital platforms, markets and dinner tables does a lot of disgrace to these.

There has been a general amnesia and silence on this issue of culinary ethics of baby vegetables sacrifice. Even religions across the time and space have been silent on this. Most of our debates and diatribes conveniently gaze on vegetarianism vs non-vegetarianism. But baby vegetables are victims of both, the omnivores, which need urgent attention. It is therefore ethical now to intervene in this culinary carnage.

Origins of these culinary carnages may be attributed to the advent of new economies and mushrooming of urban eateries that propel such devouring desires, even in most unlikely places and times. Also, in the contemporary culinary landscape, there is a paradigmatic shift of eating habits from the shared, sustained, and ethical tradition of past to a modern, solitary, and quick hunger tam-

SPECTRUM DIGITAL SAFETY

Raising digitally wise children

Children today step into the digital world as effortlessly as they learn to speak. In India, smartphones

often enter a child’s life long before adulthood. As internet access spreads rapidly across urban and rural homes alike, the central question is no longer whether children should be online, but whether we are equipping them to navigate that space safely and intelligently.

For too long, digital safety has been reduced to restriction. Screen limits, blocked websites, and constant monitoring may delay exposure, but they do not build discernment. Filters can be bypassed. Controls can be evaded. The real challenge is not limiting access, but shaping the way children think, question, and respond online.

Digital safety works best when it feels like guidance rather than surveillance. Adults often ask children how long they were online. A better question would be what they saw and how it made them feel. That single shift replaces interrogation with conversation. Children who feel trusted are far more likely to report disturbing content, cyberbullying, or uncomfortable interactions. Silence thrives under control, while awareness grows through dialogue.

One of the most effective yet underused strategies is shared digital space. When devices remain in common areas and adults actively engage with apps, games, and platforms children use, the internet loses its secrecy. It becomes visible, discussable, and accountable. Just as children are taught critical thinking in classrooms, they must be taught to apply the same skills on screens by questioning sources, recognising manipulation, and understanding consequences.

Schools must move beyond treating cyber safety as an isolated lecture or annual workshop. Digital safety should be embedded into daily learning through discussion, real world scenarios, and reflection. Children need practical skills to identify misinformation, respond to online harassment, protect personal data, and seek help without fear. Online safety is not a technical topic. It is a life skill.

At home, technology must be balanced with culture. Built in filters, strict mode settings on iOS and Android, and age

appropriate platforms such as YouTube Kids or curated streaming profiles are useful tools. Third party applications like Qustodio or Net Nanny add another layer of protection. Yet no software can compensate for poor modelling. Children mirror adult behaviour. When parents scroll endlessly at the dinner table or before bedtime, limits lose credibility. Healthy digital habits begin with example, not enforcement.

Equally important is reducing unnecessary screen dependence by offering meaningful alternatives. Outdoor play, sports, creative arts, block building, memory games, and hands on activities support cognitive and emotional development while drawing children away from passive screen consumption. These experiences build focus, creativity, and resilience, qualities no algorithm can provide.

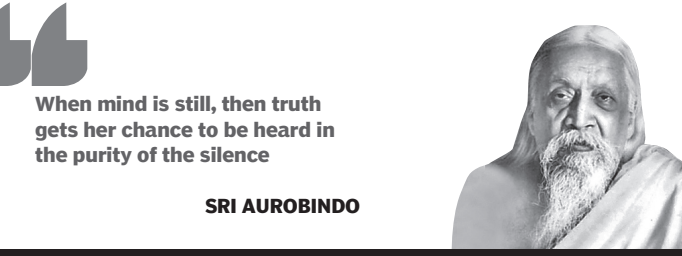
Responsibility does not end with families and schools. Despite the Indian government’s prohibition of pornographic websites in 2015, users continue to bypass restrictions using virtual private networks. This reality exposes the limits of blanket bans and highlights the need for smarter regulation. India

requires robust, child centric digital policies that mandate age appropriate design, enforce strict content moderation, and demand accountability from technology platforms.

Technology companies must also be held to higher standards. AI driven content filters, privacy by default settings, and transparent moderation mechanisms can significantly reduce children’s exposure to harmful material if implemented responsibly. Combined with parental involvement and digital literacy education, these measures can meaningfully strengthen online safety.

Safeguarding children online is not a parental burden alone. It is a collective national responsibility. The strongest filter is not embedded in a device, but in the mind of a child who knows when to pause, question, and speak up. When adults choose curiosity over control and guidance over fear, children learn to protect themselves even when no one is watching. In a young and rapidly digitising nation like India, that may be our most important investment of all.

The ICEmen Killeth

When a white police officer in Minneapolis killed George Floyd, a Black man he was putting under arrest, by kneeling on his neck nearly six years ago, the political repercussions were serious, immediate, and felt nationwide. The Black Lives Matter (BLM) movement, which emerged in response to police brutality against Black people, gathered steam. Huge protests – mostly peaceful, but not always – took place across America, as well as in many other countries. “Defund the police” became a popular slogan.

It looked like a high point for liberal politics. But in fact, BLM probably ended up hurting the Democrats, as many voters came to regard the party, fairly or not, as elitists who coddled minorities and treated white working-class Americans with contempt.

But the recent killings by US Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and Border Patrol agents of people observing their raids in that same city could be more consequential. On 7 January, Renée Good, a mother of three, was shot dead through her car window while moving away from federal officers. On 24 January, intensive-care nurse Alex Pretti, with only a phone in hand, was shot ten times in the back after being wrestled to the ground.

Without any evidence, US Secretary of Homeland Security Kristi Noem smeared Good as a “domestic terrorist.” Stephen Miller, President Donald Trump’s deputy chief of staff and a key adviser on immigration and homeland security, described Pretti in a social-media post as a “would-be assassin.”

The shootings in Minneapolis were predictable. Sending poorly trained, heavily armed masked men into Democratic cities to kick down doors, shove people into cars, detain children, and arrest people without a warrant or probable cause is a performative kind of brutal violence. ICE agents do not try to hide their aggression; they want people to see their abusive behaviour.

More migrants were deported under Presidents Barack Obama (more than 3.1 million) and Joe Biden (roughly four million) than under Trump (1.9 million in his first term, and 540,000 so far in his second term). But these Democratic presidents were more discriminating in their methods, and mostly targeted convicted criminals. There were no stories of children being used as bait, of half-dressed old men being dragged from their homes in freezing conditions, of people being shipped off to countries whose languages they don’t even speak, let alone of US citizens being gunned down in the street.

This orgy of violence is deliberate. It is meant to show that the Trump administration is serious about ridding the United States of “drug dealers, criminals, and rapists.” Following the 9/11 attacks, George W. Bush’s administration instructed officers to “take the gloves off,” resulting in the torture and murder of suspected terrorists. This, too, was intended to demonstrate that the US government would do everything in its power to keep Americans safe.

Autocratic governments – and some revolutionary movements – tend to use performative brutality to intimidate people who could conceivably stand in their way. The Nazis consolidated their power with the help of the Sturmabteilung, brown-shirted thugs who were licensed to beat up Jews, Communists, and other “undesirables.”

Many people who might not approve of such tactics prefer to look away not only because they are intimidated, but also because violent regimes are selective in their targets. So long as one wasn’t a Jew or a leftist in the early years of Hitler’s Germany, one was unlikely to get into serious trouble.

Joseph Stalin was not like that. He was deliberately indiscriminate. Anyone, even loyal party members, could end up in torture prisons or slave labour camps. People in the Soviet Union lived in a permanent state of fear, which was of course Stalin’s intention. But this is relatively rare. Most dictators, or aspiring dictators, select specific groups to isolate and persecute.

When ICE agents, in their zeal to fulfill deportation quotas, targeted Hispanics or people of colour, most white Americans did not fear for their safety, even if they deplored such tactics. The murders of Good and Pretti changed that. Not only were they US citizens, but they were about as mainstream as a white American from the Midwest can be. Neither had a criminal record. Pretti was even a gun owner. ICE agents removed his holstered firearm before he was shot, a fact that the administration has used to justify his killing, angering gun-rights activists who support Trump.

But the killings upset many other people, too, across the political spectrum. If Pretti and Good could be executed in broad daylight, anyone could. The Trump administration realized fairly quickly that this could harm their chances in November’s midterm elections. Allegations of “domestic terrorism” were dialed back. Miller acknowledged a possible breach of ICE “protocol.” Trump even called Good’s killing a “tragedy.” The man overseeing the raids in Minneapolis, Gregory Bovino, a diminutive bruiser who swaggered before the cameras in a long greatcoat reminiscent of those worn by Nazi SS officers, was demoted and transferred out of Minnesota.

This may come as a relief to some. Public opinion still counts in America, even if it can be fickle. While memories are often short, the footage of two peaceful US citizens killed at close range by trigger-happy government goons won’t fade fast. Anger at the government will linger. But we will have to wait and see if it drives Americans, especially those who might be having second thoughts about voting for Trump, to the polls in November.

Strategic asset

Sir, India is planning a strategic underground railway link beneath the Siliguri Corridor, the narrow “Chicken’s Neck” connecting the mainland with the Northeast. The corridor, barely 20–22 km wide, lies close to Bangladesh, Nepal and Bhutan, with China’s Chumbi Valley nearby, making it a critical security chokepoint. The proposal envisages a 40-km underground twin-track line, built 20–24 metres below ground, alongside expansion of surface tracks to form a six-line network. As the region falls in Seismic Zone IV–V, the tunnels will incorporate earthquake-resistant engineering, including reinforced linings, shock-absorbing joints and real-time monitoring systems to withstand tremors, landslides and floods. Strategically, the underground alignment reduces vulnerability to sabotage, air strikes and blockades, ensuring uninterrupted military and civilian movement. The project is expected to cost several thousand crore rupees and take 5–7 years. Geopolitically, it strengthens India’s posture against China, limits leverage for Bangladesh, and indirectly neutralises Pakistan’s strategic interest in the corridor.

Kerala passes resolution urging Centre to 'stop neglecting state'

Thiruvananthapuram, Feb 4: The Kerala Assembly Wednesday passed a resolution urging the central government to stop its alleged "neglect towards the state and to accept its rightful demands".

The resolution moved by Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan was passed by the House in the absence of the Congress-led UDF opposition.

The CM, while reading out the resolution in the Assembly, said that the Union government was "neglecting" Kerala's needs and was "discriminating" against it.

Vijayan said that no country can stand tall by weakening its states, but the central government was not giving any consideration to many of the reasonable demands put forward by Kerala in the last few years.

He said this was evident from the fact that there was no mention in the Union Budget about setting up an AIIMS or implementing a high-speed rail corridor in Kerala, both of which are needed in the state.

The CM further said that Kerala was at the forefront in implementing the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employ-

ment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA), but its conversion to the VB-G RAM-G scheme will cause a loss of around Rs 3,800 crore to the state.

"It is a major setback for Kerala. In addition to this, the allocation for the rural employment scheme in the Union Budget for 2026-27 has been reduced from the earlier Rs 88,000 crore to Rs 30,000 crore. The cut of Rs 58,000 crore in the national level allocation for the scheme, which Kerala is laudably implementing, will seriously affect the state," he said.

The CM also referred to the state government's repeated requests to provide Viability Gap Funding (VGF) as a grant for the Vizhinjam port project and said that the Centre was only providing the VGF as a loan which has to be repaid.

"The union government, which has granted VGF as a

grant to many other states, has adopted a completely discriminatory approach in granting VGF to the Vizhinjam port," he contended.

He also accused the Union government of adopting an "inhuman approach" towards Kerala with regard to providing the necessary financial assistance for the rehabilitation of the disaster-hit areas of Wayanad.

"The central government has not only refused to provide the compensation the state deserves for the efforts to recover from the Mundakkai-Chooralmala disaster, but has also repealed the section on loan waiver for disaster victims through an amendment to the National Disaster Management Act," the CM said.

He said that the Centre was taking an approach of financially restricting Kerala which is "moving forward with a sense of direction by giving equal importance to infrastructure development and welfare activities".

Vijayan said that the central government was undermining welfare activities and infrastructure development initiatives in the last phase of the financial year in a continuation of its "vindictive" approach towards the state.

"This House expresses the strong protest of the people of Kerala against the neglect and discrimination of the central government, which is reducing the financial resources of the state, withholding the central share for centrally sponsored projects and not giving any consideration to Kerala in terms of physical infrastructure development," the CM said.

He urged the Centre to revise its approach towards the state and requested that the demands of Kerala be accepted.

Kerala to bear half cost of Sabari rail project

Thiruvananthapuram: The state government will bear 50 per cent of the cost of the long-pending Angamaly-Erumely Sabari railway project, with Rs 1,900 crore to be provided through the KIIFB. The decision was taken at the state cabinet meeting chaired by Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan Wednesday, according to a CMO release. First proposed in the 1997-98 railway budget, the 110-km railway line is considered a key infrastructure project for the state. It is expected to provide safe and convenient travel for Sabarimala pilgrims and boost economic activity in the eastern highland regions of Ernakulam, Idukki, and Pathanamthitta districts. In a post on 'X', Vijayan said the Kerala government is moving decisively to realise the long-cherished Sabari rail project.

CM Omar highlights heritage conservation initiatives

Jammu, Feb 4: Jammu and Kashmir Chief Minister Omar Abdullah Wednesday highlighted the government's ongoing initiatives for revival, restoration and conservation of heritage sites at Parihaspora and Pattan.

Replying to a question by Pattan MLA Javid Riyaz Bedar in the Legislative Assembly regarding promotion of heritage tourism, Abdullah, who also holds the Culture and Tourism portfolios, said the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) is mandated to promote heritage tourism and undertake major conservation and development works at the heritage sites of Parihaspora, Pattan and Tappar.

He said the ASI is carrying out conservation, protection and major developmental interventions at these sites.

The chief minister, however, said the J&K tourism department has constructed a tourist cafeteria at Parihaspora to provide basic amenities to visitors, adding that the facility will be further renovated and upgraded to improve services.

Giving details of initiatives taken by the Culture Department, Abdullah said that Govardhan at Parihaspora was declared a State Protected Monument vide SRO-408 dated September 19, 2013.

Protection measures, including installation of chain-link fencing around the monument, were completed during the 2024-25 financial year under the



capex budget at an estimated cost of Rs 39.89 lakh, he added.

He said Divar Yakhmanpora at Parihaspora, declared a state-protected monument on August 31, 1989, comprises an ancient temple complex presently under excavation.

The excavation work was initiated during 2023-24 under Phase-I of the scheme for revival, restoration, preservation and maintenance of architecture and heritage in J&K at an estimated cost of Rs 373.10 lakh, the chief minister said, adding that around 60 per cent of the work has been completed.

Since the process involves manual excavation, the work is likely to continue into the next financial year, he said. The site is being actively maintained by

the department.

Abdullah further said that a heritage site comprising a temple and spring near Sukh Nag in Pattan was declared a State Protected Monument vide SRO-517 dated August 29, 2019.

He said that the restoration and development works at the Sukh Nag Spring and Temple were undertaken during 2024-25 under the same scheme at an estimated cost of Rs 229.92 lakh. The site has been fully restored and is being maintained by the department.

Regarding Tappar, the chief minister said the site is a Centrally Protected Monument under the administrative control of the ASI and, therefore, no initiative has been taken by the department at the site.

Guv Arlekar forwards Wildlife Protection Bill for presidential assent

Thiruvananthapuram, Feb 4: Governor Rajendra Vishwanath Arlekar has agreed to forward the new Wildlife Protection (Kerala Amendment) Bill, which seeks to amend certain provisions of the central act to mitigate human-wildlife conflict in the state, to the president for assent without delay, Minister AK Saseendran said.

Saseendran, along with Kerala Industries and Law Minister P Rajeev, met the governor Wednesday and requested him to forward the bill for presidential assent.

"His response was very positive, and he has assured us that he will forward the bill to the president without any delay," the state forest minister told reporters after the meeting.

The assembly passed the Wildlife Protection (Kerala Amendment) Bill, 2025, in October last year.

The ministers also requested the governor to give assent to



another law that allows private individuals to grow sandalwood on their properties and sell it to the forest department.

"The wildlife issue falls under the concurrent list, and states have the power to bring in amendments to laws in the concurrent list. Based on this provision, we have introduced the new law. The other bill is an exclusive state legislation, but we have not yet received the governor's

assent on it," Rajeev said.

He said the ministers had explained the details of the bill and the relevance of the amendment to the governor, who agreed to examine the matter and do the needful within two days.

"The definition for the classification of dangerous animals in the central act is very vague. No authority is empowered to take immediate action when a wild animal strays into human settlements or agricultural areas and at-

tacks human beings," Rajeev said.

"Following all the procedures under the act is very difficult when it comes to protecting human lives and livelihoods. That is why we have brought in this amendment," he added.

He said the forest minister had discussed the matter with the advocate general and that the cabinet had also deliberated on the issue, taking into account various demands and suggestions submitted by different organisations before introducing the amendment to the central act.

"As per the amendment, if a wild animal enters a human settlement or farmland, the district collector can take action based on the situation, including ordering the animal to be killed, to protect people's lives and livelihoods," Rajeev said.

Saseendran said that once the bill becomes an act, it would be of great help to farmers, especially those in the high ranges, who are frequently affected by human-animal conflict.

TEACHING CHILDREN TO CARE

Kerala's Aksharam Arogyam puts health in young hands

Thiruvananthapuram, Feb 4: Kerala is placing students at the centre of a comprehensive school programme titled Aksharam Arogyam, which focuses on teaching children the importance of basic first aid, menstrual hygiene and everyday healthy habits.

The initiative is being rolled out by the state health department with the support of the general education department to ensure the overall physical and mental well-being of children.

It encourages children to grow not just as learners but also as health ambassadors who can carry awareness from classrooms to homes and communities, State Health Minister Veena George said in a release Wednesday.

The programme will cover students from classes 1 to 12 in all government and aided schools, aiming to identify health concerns early and ensure timely care.

The government aims to take health awareness from classrooms to homes and further into the commu-



nity by empowering children with health knowledge and good habits, it added. George said children could play an important role in influencing healthier lifestyles within their families and society.

Under the programme, students will undergo regular health check-ups and receive a health card that records key health details.

This card will later be converted into a secure electronic health card and stored at the state data centre with complete privacy.

In emergencies, this digital record can offer timely support and guidance for treatment, it added. Schools will also serve as hubs for

regular health awareness activities, with health assemblies and health corners to be set up.



Teachers will be appointed as health mentors and trained using modules prepared jointly by the health and education departments.

These mentors will provide structured health education sessions covering 11 themes across four major areas at regular intervals, the release said.

Health education will be delivered in an age-appropriate and student-friendly manner to encourage curiosity, participation and scientific understanding.

To ensure active student involvement, one or two students from each class will be selected as health ambassadors. These students will help share health messages among their peers in a more relatable and engaging way, it said.

The programme will also strengthen existing school health initiatives such as iron and folic acid supplementation, adolescent health programmes, immunisation drives and menstrual hygiene education.

Turkish plane lands after engine fire alert

Kolkata: A Passengers of a Turkish Airlines plane, which made an emergency landing at Kolkata Airport Wednesday afternoon after the pilot declared a fire in the right engine, will fly off in a replacement aircraft at 6 am tomorrow, an official said. The flight was on way to Istanbul from Kathmandu, the Civil Aviation Ministry said a statement. A Kolkata airport official said passengers will be taken en route to their destination in another aircraft Thursday morning.

Man arrested for raping tribal girl

Bokaro: A tribal girl was allegedly raped in Jharkhand's Bokaro district, police said Wednesday. The incident occurred Tuesday within Petarwar police station limits when the girl was alone at home and her parents had gone to work. A person, identified as Jitendra Yadav, has been arrested in this connection, an official said. "The accused hails from Bihar's Rohtas district and works as a driver in a road construction company. Cong slams Goyal's remarks in Parliament

New Delhi, Feb 4: Terming Union minister Piyush Goyal's remarks on the India-US trade deal in Parliament "non-statement", the Congress Wednesday said his high-sounding claims go completely contrary to what the US side has put out, and claimed that the real damage to Indian farmers will become evident once the details of the agreement are out.

The government Wednesday assured Parliament that the country's core sensitivities in food and agriculture have been fully safeguarded in the India-US trade deal, and the pact will enhance export competitiveness in the American market.

Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal made a statement on the trade deal first in the Lok Sabha and later in the Rajya Sabha amid disruptions by Opposition MPs, who sought clarifications (on the deal) but were not allowed by the Chair. Congress general secretary in charge communications, Jairam Ramesh, said the statement on the India-US trade deal read out by Goyal in both Houses of Parliament was "actually a non-statement".

"It provides no details since the details are still being negotiated. Piyush Goyal's high-sounding claims go completely contrary to what the US president, the US secretary of agriculture, and the US trade representative have put out in

their names on social media," the Congress leader said.

"It is 100 per cent clear that Monday's announcement of the deal at the urging of the prime minister was for grabbing headlines "nothing more, nothing else. It was urgent and momentary damage control on his part. However, when the details of the deal are finally out, the real damage to Indian farmers will become most painfully evident," Ramesh said.

Attacking the government on the India-US trade deal in the morning, the Congress said that spin doctors are at work, but any details on it (the deal)

have still not been shared, although it is clear that "India has made concessions on liberalising imports of agricultural items". US President Donald Trump Monday said that India and the US have agreed to a trade deal. On his part, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said he was delighted that "made in India products will now have a reduced tariff of 18 per cent". Ramesh said, "Thirty-six hours have passed since President Trump said the India-US trade deal was being announced and coming into effect immediately at Mr Modi's request." "Spin doctors are at work, but we still don't have any details on the deal - although it is clear that India has made concessions on liberalising imports of agricultural items. There is not even a joint statement," Ramesh said on X before Goyal's statement in Parliament.

14-year-old ends life, family blames mobile addiction

Bhopal, Feb 4: A 14-year-old boy allegedly committed suicide in the city with his family members suspecting that his addiction to a mobile game was responsible for his death.

Ansh Sahu, a Class IX student, was found hanging at his house in Shriram Colony under Piplani police station area Monday afternoon. The only child of his parents, he studied at a reputed school in the city. His parents teach at a private school, Deputy Commissioner of Police Vivek Singh told PTI Videos.

He was allegedly addicted to the mobile game 'Free Fire', Singh said, adding that on the day of the incident, Ansh's mother had reprimanded him for mobile gaming. Earlier, Rs 28,000 had been deducted from his grandfather's bank account due to the same game, the DCP said.

Police were examining the boy's mobile phone, and the reason behind the suicide would become clear only after the investigation is over, he said.

The police would issue an advisory regarding the game, Singh added. Piplani police station house officer (SHO) Chandrika Yadav told PTI that one-and-a-half months ago, the parents had even taken away the phone from him.

Om Sahu, the boy's maternal uncle, told PTI Videos that Ansh had become addicted to mobile games in recent months, and it had started affecting his studies too.

The family had counselled him several times, but even after ₹28,000 were deducted from his grandfather's account, his addiction continued, Sahu said.

Ansh's parents had gone out to attend a funeral feast on Monday and found him hanging on their return. He was rushed to a private hospital where doctors declared him dead, Sahu said.

to the bench for the opportunity to argue in person and urged it to "save democracy".

Logical discrepancies cited while reconciling the rolls with the 2002 voter list include mismatches in a parent's name or the age gap between a voter and their parent being less than 15 or more than 50 years.

Manipur gets new CM a year after Biren Singh stepped down

Imphal, Feb 4: BJP MLA Yumnam Khemchand Singh Wednesday became the 13th Chief Minister of Manipur, nearly a year after the resignation of BJP leader N Biren Singh following months of ethnic violence between Meitei and Kuki communities in the state, leading to the imposition of President's Rule.

The 62-year-old leader was administered the oath of office and secrecy by Governor Ajay Kumar Bhalla at a ceremony held at the Lok Bhavan, hours after the President's rule was revoked in the violence-hit Manipur.

BJP MLA Nemcha Kipgen, who belongs to the Kuki community, and Naga People's

Front legislator L Dikho took oath as the deputy chief ministers of Manipur.

The formation of the new government comes at a time when the strife-torn state is trying to move forward towards normalcy.

Congratulating Khemchand Singh and his two deputies, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said, "I am confident they will work diligently towards furthering development and prosperity for my sisters and brothers of Manipur."

Manipur has been witnessing ethnic violence since May 3, 2023, after a tribal solidarity march was taken out in the hill districts, in protest against the majority Meitei community's demand for Scheduled Tribe (ST) status.



Nemcha Kipgen and L Dikho were sworn in as the Deputy Chief Ministers of Manipur. The swearing-in ceremony occurred after the revocation of President's rule in Manipur. Manipur has been experiencing ethnic violence since May 2023, leading to significant loss of life and displacement.

Since then, at least 260 people, including members of both the Kuki and Meitei communities as well as security personnel, have been killed in the violence, while thousands become homeless.

Talking to reporters at the Lok Bhavan soon after taking oath, Khemchand Singh said Manipur comprises 36 communities and that the state was taken care of for long by them. "Our hope now is for all to

help in bringing a peaceful atmosphere. "Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Union Home Minister Amit Shah have placed great faith in me, and I want to take that faith forward," the two-time BJP legislator said.

Khemchand Singh is a long-time RSS functionary and an organisation-focused leader who has held key constitutional and ministerial positions in the state. Apart from politics, he has had a long association with Taekwondo. A black belt holder, he is a former vice-president of the Taekwondo Federation of India and has been involved in the promotion of the sport in the Northeast.

Deputy CM L Dikho told reporters that inclusiveness is the new mantra of the government.

Israeli strikes kill 23 in Gaza

Gaza/Cairo/Jerusalem: Israeli tank shelling and airstrikes killed 23 Palestinians including seven children in Gaza Wednesday, health officials said, the latest violence to undermine a truce in the enclave. Among the dead was a medic who rushed to help victims of a strike in the southern city of Khan Younis and was then killed by a second attack on the same location, health officials said. Other strikes hit Gaza City in the north, where health officials said a 5-month-old boy was killed. The attacks come three days after Israel reopened Gaza's main border crossing with Egypt, a major step in the US-backed truce.

Stepson of crown prince cries in court

Oslo: The son of Norway's crown princess denied Wednesday that videos on his phone showed acts of rape, as he broke down during his first day of testimony in his trial for rape and domestic violence, a case that has shaken the embattled royal family. Marius Borg Hoiby, 29, who joined the royal family when his mother Mette-Marit married Crown Prince Haakon in 2001, said his upbringing in the public eye since he was a toddler had led him to crave drink and sex. He could face years in prison if found guilty of the most serious of the 38 charges against him. The first day of his trial, he pleaded not guilty to the most serious charges of rape and domestic violence but acknowledged partial guilt - a plea allowed under Norwegian law - for aggravated assault and reckless behaviour Tuesday. He also admitted lesser charges, including driving too fast.

Trump to draw down 700 immigration agents

Fort Snelling, Minnesota: The Trump administration is immediately withdrawing some 700 federal immigration enforcement agents from Minnesota, although about 2,000 agents will remain on the ground, White House border czar Tom Homan announced Wednesday. In an unprecedented surge, US President Donald Trump has deployed thousands of armed immigration enforcement agents in and around Minneapolis this year to detain and deport migrants, resulting in angry and sometimes violent confrontations with residents and street protests across the nation.

US plans minerals bloc to counter China: Vance

Washington, Feb 4: The Trump administration wants to create a critical minerals trading bloc with its allies that will use tariffs to maintain price floors and defend against China's tactic of flooding the market to undermine any potential competitors.

Vice President JD Vance said Wednesday that the trade war over the past year exposed how dependent most countries are on the critical minerals that China has a stranglehold on.

"We want members to form a trading bloc among allies and partners, one that guarantees American access to American industrial might while also expanding production across the entire zone," Vance said at a meeting of foreign ministers at the State Department.

"What is before all of us is an opportunity at self-reliance that we never have to rely on anybody else except for each other, for the critical minerals necessary to sustain our industries and to sustain growth."

India free to buy oil from any supplier: Kremlin

Moscow, Feb 4: India is free to buy oil from any country, and there is nothing new about its decision to diversify its crude suppliers, the Kremlin said Wednesday.

"We, along with all other international energy experts, are well aware that Russia is not the only supplier of oil and petroleum products to India. India has always purchased these products from other countries. Therefore, we see nothing new here," Kremlin Spokesman Dmitry Peskov said while responding to a question.

He was asked about US President Donald Trump's claim that Prime Minister Narendra Modi had agreed to stop buying Russian oil and switch to purchasing crude from the United States and, potentially, from Venezuela. A day earlier, Peskov said that Russia has not received any statements from India regarding the cessation of Russian oil purchases.

Private Kommersant FM business radio noted that, unlike President Trump, PM Modi did not mention any agreement on stopping Russian oil imports. Igor Yushkov, a leading expert at the National Energy Security Fund, said that Indian refiners cannot fully stop the import of Russian crude.

"The American shale oil they export is light grades, similar to gas condensate. Russia, on the other hand, supplies relatively heavy, sulfur-rich Urals. This means India will need to blend US crude with other grades, which incurs additional costs, meaning a simple substitution won't be possible," he said.

1.5 million to 2 million barrels per day to the country. America won't be able to cover that volume. So, one gets the sense that Trump is simply trying to show that he won these trade negotiations and the deal was concluded entirely in line with US demands," he said.

Last time, when Russia switched to the Indian market from European and American markets in 2022, it cut production by 1 million barrels per day. This led to prices rising to \$120 per barrel, and the US set an all-time high for gasoline and diesel prices, Yushkov recalled. Trump last year imposed 50 per cent tariffs on India, among the highest in the world, including 25 per cent levies for its purchases of Russian energy.

India buys about 88 per cent of its crude oil, which is converted into fuels like petrol and diesel, from overseas.



Xi, Trump talk by phone, hours after Xi spoke to Putin

Beijing, Feb 4: Chinese President Xi Jinping spoke with US President Donald Trump by phone Wednesday, state broadcaster CCTV said, ahead of an expected visit by Trump to China in April and hours after Xi had a virtual meeting with Russian President Vladimir Putin.

The Kremlin said it was informed in advance about the conversation between Xi and Trump. It said earlier Wednesday that Putin had accepted an invitation from Xi to visit China in the first half of this year.

"Yes, we were aware of this in advance," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told Interfax news agency, responding to a question on whether the Chinese president had informed Putin about plans to hold a conversation with Trump Wednesday.

Xi and Trump last spoke by phone in late November, after which Trump touted "extremely strong" relations with China.

Following months of trade tensions triggered by Trump's tariffs last year, relations between Washington and Beijing stabilised after a meeting between the leaders in October in South Korea, where a fragile trade truce was struck.



Andrew leaves Windsor home after latest Epstein revelations

London, Feb 4: Andrew Mountbatten-Windsor, the younger brother of King Charles, has moved out of his mansion on the royal estate in Windsor, a royal source confirmed Wednesday, following new damaging revelations about his links to the sex offender Jeffrey Epstein.

His exit from Royal Lodge, his home for decades, marks a new low for the former prince, following years of scrutiny over his connections to Epstein, a scandal that has cast a shadow over Britain's royal family.

Mountbatten-Windsor, 65, had hoped to stay at the 30-room Georgian mansion for longer, the Sun newspaper said, but he moved under the cover of darkness Monday and was driven to a cottage in Sandringham, the king's estate in Norfolk, in eastern England.

Amid the fallout from the release of the latest trove of millions of files related to Epstein, British police Tuesday also launched an investigation into Peter Mandelson, Britain's former ambassador to the US, over alleged misconduct in public office, following allegations that he leaked market-sensitive information to Epstein.

The files included emails suggesting that Mountbatten-Windsor had maintained regular contact with Epstein for more than two years after he was found guilty of child sex crimes.

He had previously denied maintaining ties with the financier after Epstein's 2008 conviction, apart from a 2010 visit to New York to end their relationship.

British Prime Minister Keir Starmer said on Saturday that the former prince should testify before a US congressional committee, following the new revelations.

US, Iran to seek de-escalation in nuclear talks

Dubai, Feb 4: The US and Iran are due to hold talks in Oman Friday after Tehran requested a change of venue to limit negotiations to its nuclear programme, a regional official said, with a build-up of US forces in the Middle East raising fears of a confrontation.

Iran wanted the meeting to take place in Oman as a continuation of previous rounds of talks held in the Gulf Arab country on its nuclear programme, asking for a change of location from Turkey to avoid any expansion of the discussions to issues such as Tehran's ballistic missiles, the regional official said.

Iran has said it will not make concessions on its formidable ballistic missile programme - one of the biggest in the Middle East - calling that a red line in negotiations.

Tehran, which says it replenished its stockpile of ballistic missiles since coming under attack from Israel last year, has warned that it will unleash its missiles to

defend the Islamic Republic if its security is under threat.

The regional official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Iran had since the beginning stressed that it would only discuss its nuclear programme, while Washington wanted other issues on the agenda, to mutual threats of air strikes and stirred fears of a wider war.

Greenland shatters temperature record, redrawing economic shift

Nuuk, Feb 4: Greenland, the Arctic island coveted by US President Donald Trump, experienced its warmest January on record this year, as a rate of warming four times faster than the global average redraws the outlook for sectors from fishing to mining.

Trump has said the US must own Greenland, an autonomous part of the Kingdom of Denmark, for security reasons although he has backed away from threats to take the island by force.

Preliminary temperature readings from the Danish Meteorological Institute in the Greenlandic capital Nuuk averaged +0.2 degrees Celsius (32.4

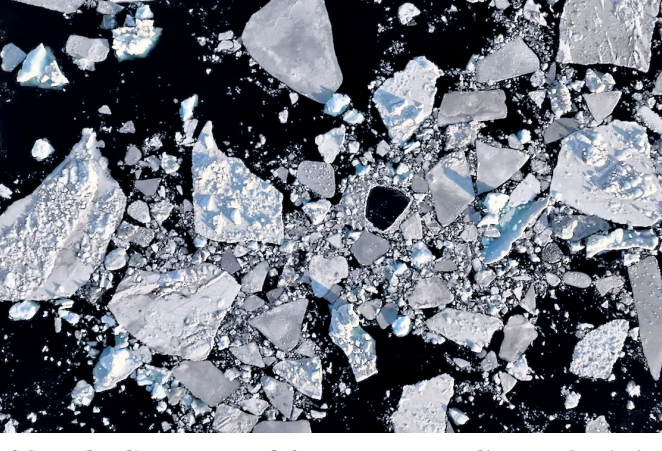
degrees Fahrenheit) in January, the highest on record and well above the historical average of -7.7 degrees between 1991 and 2020.

"Climate change is already clearly visible on Greenland," said Jacob Hoyer, head of the National Centre for Climate Research at the Danish Meteorological Institute.

"From the records we can see that it is warming four times faster than the mean temperature hike in the world."

The warm weather means sea ice extends less far south along the coast each winter and is thinner even where it does exist, making it difficult to use for transport, according to Hoyer.

It can also affect the mainstay



of Greenland's economy - fishing. Catches of mainly shrimp, halibut and cod are the biggest export and accounted for 23% of gross domestic product in

2023, according to Statistics Greenland, while the industry provides 15% of all jobs.

"The waters around Greenland are also warming up, and

that can change the ecosystem and the fishery business. It will most likely have an impact," said Hoyer, adding it was too early to tell exactly how.

While Trump has chiefly highlighted security concerns, Greenland also holds strategic mineral resources that could play a part in the power struggle for the island. A Danish survey published in 2023 showed 25 of the 34 minerals deemed "critical raw materials" by the European Commission were found there.

Red tape surrounding mining concessions, harsh conditions and opposition from indigenous groups have historically made mining expensive. The flip side of the warming climate could be that such ventures become more profitable as extraction and shipping become less costly, Hoyer said.

Still, businesses in many established sectors face uncertainty in the here and now. Casper Moller, owner of a company providing tours for tourists, says the lack of snow and ice makes these difficult by snowmobile or skis.

"So, what we are doing at this moment is just crossing our fingers that we will reach more snow quite soon," he said.

New Delhi, Feb 4: The Competition Commission Wednesday ordered a detailed probe against IndiGo for unfair business practices, nearly two months after the country's largest airline cancelled thousands of flights due to operational issues, causing hardships to passengers.

After taking into consideration data related to airlines and those provided by the aviation regulator DGCA, the Competition Commission of India (CCI) has prima facie concluded that IndiGo has abused its dominant position.

In a 16-page order, CCI said that by cancelling thousands of flights, which constituted a significant portion of the scheduled capacity, IndiGo effectively withheld its services from the market, creating an artificial scarcity, limiting consumer access to air travel during peak demand.

"Such conduct by a dominant enterprise may be viewed as restricting the provision of services under Section 4 (2) (b)(i) of the Act," the regulator said.

Section 4 of the Competition Act pertains to abuse of dominant position.

For assessing the complaint filed by a passenger who was impacted by the cancellation of flights in early December, the watchdog considered the 'market for domestic air passenger transport services in India' as the relevant one.

Noting that prima facie the airline's conduct seems to be causing an appreciable adverse



Flight fiasco impacted over 9L passengers

New Delhi: More than 10.4 lakh passengers were affected by flight cancellations in December, with over 93 per cent of the total passengers getting impacted by IndiGo cancellations. Latest data shared by aviation regulator DGCA also showed that scheduled domestic airlines shelled out over ₹24.27 crore towards compensation and facilities for flight cancellations that affected more than 10.46 lakh passengers in December. Out of them, flight cancellations by IndiGo impacted 9.82 lakh passengers in December and the airline spent ₹22.74 crore towards facilitation. The overall cancellation rate of scheduled domestic airlines was 9.62 per cent in December, and that of IndiGo was 9.65 per cent.

It is only CCI, which is empowered to deal with the same anti-competitive act from the lens of the Competition Act. Silver soars to hit near ₹3L/kg; gold jumps to ₹1.65L/10g

New Delhi, Feb 4: Precious metals extended their sharp rally for the second straight day in the national capital Wednesday, with silver prices surging to ₹2.98 lakh per kg and gold climbing to ₹1.65 lakh per 10 grams.

Firm global trends, a weak US dollar, which revived investor interest in precious metals after last week's steep sell-off, contributed to the surge, traders said.

According to the All India Sarafa Association, silver soared by ₹14,300, or 5.03 per cent, to ₹2,98,300 per kilogram (inclusive of all taxes). The white metal closed at ₹2,84,000 per kg in the previous session.

Gold of 99.9 per cent purity also advanced sharply, gaining ₹7,400, or 4.69 per cent, to ₹1,65,100 per 10 grams (inclusive of all taxes), compared with Tuesday's close of ₹1,57,700 per 10 grams.

"Gold and silver extended their rebound on Wednesday, with gold prices rising over 3 per cent and touching around ₹1.6 lakh per 10 gms, while silver jumped as much as 6 per cent intra-day after a period of sharp volatility and correction," Gaurav Garg, Research Analyst at Lemonn Markets Desk, said.

In the international market, spot silver gained \$4.28, or 5.03 per cent, to \$89.35 per ounce, while gold rose by \$100.03, or 2.02 per cent, to \$5,047.07 per ounce.

Gold and silver advanced Wednesday, driven by renewed safe-haven buying amid escalating geopolitical tensions between the US and Iran, Saumil Gandhi, Senior Analyst - Commodities at HDFC Securities, said.

"This confrontation undermines the optimism over the US-Iran nuclear talks later this week and has raised concerns about the potential for further conflict between Washington and Tehran, which could increase the risk premium on gold and heighten demand for safe-haven assets," Gandhi said.

AARON'S CLASSY HUNDRED CARRIES INDIA TO SEVEN WICKET WIN OVER AFGHANISTAN

Harare, Feb 4: Aaron George's silken hundred seamlessly merged with the explosive fifties from IPL stars Vaibhav Sooryavanshi and Ayush Mhatre, guiding India to the ICC U19 World Cup final with a seven-wicket win over Afghanistan here Wednesday.

India now face England in the summit clash here Friday. It will be India's 10th final in the U19 showpiece, a testimony to BCCI's structured junior cricket programme that unearths serious talent.

India seemed to have a tough task ahead once Afghanistan piled 310 for four, built around hundreds by Faisal Shinozada (110) and Uzairullah Niazal (101).

But India cantered past the target in 41.1 overs and it was also their highest-ever chase

in the U19 World Cup. Aaron (115, 104b) led the chase with a hundred of impeccable pace and precision placements of his shots.

He received ample backing from Suryavanshi (68, 33b) and Mhatre (62, 59b) as India kept their run-rate above seven all the while. As is his vaunt, Sooryavanshi gave a flying start to India's innings with a flurry of boundaries, mainly off off-spinner Wahidullah Zadran.

There was a slice of fortune too when Niazal dropped the left-hander on 22 at point off Abdul Aziz.

But around that lapse, Sooryavanshi batted quite aggressively, even pulling off a stunning helicopter shot six off pacer Nooristani Omarzai.

There were repeated attempts to play pull shot in his innings, which eventually became his undoing - an aimless

hoick off Omarzai ended in the hands of Osman Sadat inside the circle. The opening wicket alliance stopped at 93, but Aaron then combined with Mhatre to add another 114 runs in just over 17 overs to take India past 200 in the 27th over.

Mhatre, who has been struggling for his rhythm in this tournament, made a fifty at the right moment, displaying his full selection of shots.

Once again, Aaron played the anchor's role to perfection as Mhatre took all the risks to keep his side much ahead of the asking rate. Mhatre's dismissal did not deter Aaron, and he batted on as composedly as has been doing in this innings.

Apart from his unflappability and situational awareness, the aesthetics of Aaron's batting was also impressive.

Not one shot was hit in angle, as the right-hander, who

migrated from Kottayam, Kerala, to Hyderabad, batted with seldom seen elan at this age of range-hitting.

His cover drives off Zadran and Roohullah Arab were a sight for sore eyes, and even his lofted shots which fetched him sixes were bereft of stress.

His just flowed into the shot with a high elbow and still head, and the maximum over long-on off Omarzai can hold a pride of place in a cricket museum.

Aaron went past his hundred in 95 balls with an exquisite tuck past mid-wicket for a four.

Aaron and Vihan Malhotra added 96 runs for the third wicket alliance as India sauntered to a win. However, Aaron could not stay long enough to see his side touching the tape.

Earlier, Shinozada and Niazal led the way with magnificent hundreds as Afghanistan posted a challenging total.

Faisal top-scored with 110 off 93 balls, while Niazal sparked with an unbeaten 101-run knock off 86 deliveries as the Indian bowlers struggled to pick wickets at regular intervals.

Opting to bat, Afghanistan were off to a solid start with the opening duo of Sadat and Khalid Ahmadzai adding 53 runs before pacer Deepesh Devendran effected the first breakthrough in the 13th over.

It was a length ball and as Ahmadzai shaped up to drive, he got a slight inside-edge that went through to wicketkeeper Abhigyan Kundu.

Shooter Esha helps India win two gold



World champion Samrat Rana settled for bronze on the opening day

New Delhi, Feb 4: Olympian Esha Singh carried her excellent form from last year into the new season, clinching the women's individual 10m air pistol gold and helping the home team to another top-podium finish, even as world champion Samrat Rana settled for bronze on the opening day of the Asian Championship (pistol/rifle) here Wednesday.

Esha, 21, came from behind to score 239.8 in the final, fending off challenges from two Chinese Taipei shooters -- Cheng Yen-Ching (235.4, silver) and Yu Ai-Wen (217.7, bronze) -- as well as compatriot Suruchi Singh, to claim her second individual senior Asian Championship gold.

The shooter, who had earlier secured the season-ending ISSF World Cup gold in Ningbo, China last year, had won her first continental title in Jakarta in 2024 at the age of 19.

Suruchi, 19, who led the final after the first 10-shot stage, slipped dramatically in the elimination round to finish fourth, while Manu Bhaker, a double bronze medalist at the Paris Olympics and the third Indian to reach the eight-shoot-

er final, ended up in seventh place.

In a competition that didn't rise to great levels, with all the shooters' scores swaying between the highs of upper 10s and the lows of 8s, it was Esha who kept her cool with three scores of 10.4 and above to take a big leap for gold, while the two Chinese Taipei shooters fell back sharply, with some of their scores in the 9s and 8s.

In the qualification round, Suruchi finished second with a score of 576, while Manu and Esha both ended on 575. Manu edged ahead of Esha for qualification based on a higher 'inner 10' count, with all three advancing to the final.

The trio of Suruchi (576), Manu (575), and Esha (575) went on to win the team gold with a combined total of 1,726, comfortably ahead of Vietnam (1,713) and Chinese Taipei (1,711), who claimed the silver and bronze respectively.

Samrat, who was the stand-out performer at last year's World Championships in Cairo -- where the Karnal shooter showed nerves of steel to win gold -- raised hopes of another top-podium finish in the season opener.

He seemed set to carry his form into the new season after shooting 581 in the qualification round, which placed him second going into the final.

Kubo 21-10, 21-8 and Ayush Shetty then defeated Jia Heng Jason Teh 21-17, 21-15 to give India the lead.

The second doubles combination of Pruthvi Roy and K Sai Pratheek almost sealed the match for India as they easily won the opening game against Nge Joo Jie and Donovan Willand Wee before going down 21-8, 21-23, 20-22.

This meant that Srikanth had to find a way to beat Koh, and the experienced campaigner did

that in style.

In the women's match, defending champions India did not break any sweat against Myanmar with world junior championship silver medalist Tanvi Sharma opening the account with a 21-13, 21-16 win over Thet Htar Thuzar and then the team sweeping all remaining two singles and both the doubles matches.

They will now face Thailand in the second group game Thursday to decide the group winner.

Modinagar, Feb 4: Olympic silver medallist Mirabai Chanu delivered a statement performance, bettering three of her own national records while clinching the women's 48kg title at the National Weightlifting Championships here Wednesday.

The multiple-time World Championships medallist registered a combined lift of 205kg (89kg in snatch + 116kg in clean and jerk), setting new national marks in snatch, clean and jerk and total effort.

"I am delighted. This performance has boosted my confidence. Earlier, I was competing in 49kg, to be able to achieve this result in 48kg is great. I hope in the next competition I

cross the 90kg mark. Today also I tried but since I had not had proper training I was not able to do it. But once the training is in full flow I'm sure I'll lift 90kg," Chanu told PTI after her gold-winning performance.

As is often the case at domestic competitions, Chanu was never under threat of missing out on gold, needing only two successful lifts each in the snatch and clean and jerk to seal the title.

However, there was a noticeable shift in strategy with India chief coach Vijay Sharma pushing her instead of adopting a conservative approach.

The 31-year-old opened with a higher-than-usual starting weight of 86kg in the snatch and 116kg in the clean and jerk.

She responded confidently,



clearing 86kg with ease before producing a flawless lift of 89kg. The effort improved upon her previous personal best snatch record of 88kg, set at the 2020 Nationals in the 49kg category.

Over the past few years, the

diminutive Manipuri lifter has repeatedly chased the elusive 90kg barrier, often coming agonisingly close. On Wednesday too, she made an attempt at 91kg in her final lift but failed to maintain balance.

In the clean and jerk as well, Chanu completed lifts of 112kg and 116kg before being pushed to attempt 120kg in her final effort, which she could not execute.

Notably, Chanu had set a world record with a lift of 119kg in clean and jerk at the 2021 Asian Championships.

While she has consistently remained among India's most decorated weightlifters, she had not bettered her personal best in snatch and clean and jerk since 2020 and 2021 respectively.

Wednesday's performance, therefore, signals renewed progress and sharpness as Chanu gears up for a packed season that includes the Commonwealth Games, Asian Games and the World Championships.
