3 women killed, four hurt in jumbo attack

Dhenkanal, Feb 10: Three women were killed while four others sustained grievous injuries in an attack by a wild elephant at a forest in Dhenkanal district Tuesday, a senior officer said. The incident occurred near Lochapali village in Patpuri forest of Dhenkanal Sadar range, he said.

The deceased were identified as Indumati Pradhan, 60, Tuni Behera, 50, and Kuntala Pradhan, 40. The injured were identified as Rama Dehuri, 40, Rashmita Pradhan, 35, and Jhili Pradhan, 35. The identity of the other injured woman is yet to be confirmed. The women had gone to the dense forest to collect firewood when they came across the tusker. “The elephant suddenly appeared before us and attacked without any provocation,” one of the survivors said.

DFO Sumit Kumar Kar said, “A forest patrol team rescued the women immediately, but three of them lost their lives.”

Sadar Range officer Uchhab Pradhan said forest staff on patrol had warned villagers about the presence of the tusker and advised them not to venture into the forest, but to no avail.

The district administration provided ₹10,000 each from district Red Cross fund to the victims’ families, Sadar tehsildar Swadhin Behera said.

No-trust notice against Om Birla

Perturbed by what they termed the “partisan” conduct of Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla during the ongoing Budget Session of Parliament, Opposition parties Tuesday submitted a notice seeking his removal from office. The notice, signed by at least 118 MPs, was submitted to the Secretary General of the Lok Sabha. Alleging that the Speaker repeatedly denied Opposition members to speak in the House, the signatories - including MPs from the DMK, Samajwadi Party, Shiv Sena (UBT), NCP (SP), and Left parties - claimed that their basic democratic rights had been infringed

New Delhi, Feb 10: Opposition parties Tuesday put in motion the process to oust Om Birla as Lok Sabha Speaker, alleging that he had acted in a “blatantly partisan” manner in the House and prompting him to step aside from chairing the proceedings till the matter is settled.

Congress’ deputy leader in Lok Sabha Gaurav Gogoi, chief whip K Suresh and whip Mohamed Jawed submitted the notice under Article 94C of



the Constitution to Lok Sabha Secretary General Utpal Kumar Singh on behalf of several opposition parties, including the Congress, Samajwadi Party (SP) and the DMK.

The Opposition accused the Speaker of making certain false claims against the Congress members when he spoke of some “unexpected action” in the Lok Sabha and asked Prime Minister Narendra Modi not to come to the House to reply to the debate in the Motion of Thanks to the President’s Address.

Lok Sabha Secretariat officials said Birla, upholding the highest standards of morality, has decided not to sit in the Speaker’s chair until the no-confidence motion moved against him is settled.

The officials said the no-con-

fidence motion against the Speaker is likely to be taken up March 9, when the House reassembles after the recess to examine budgetary proposals.

“We, the undersigned, hereby give notice of a resolution for the removal of Shri Om Birla from the office of Speaker Lok Sabha, in terms of the provisions of Article 94(c) of the Constitution of India, because of the blatantly partisan manner in which he has been conducting the business of the Lok Sabha,” the notice said.

On several occasions, opposition parties have just not been allowed to speak, which is their basic democratic right in Parliament, the notice said.

The notice said that Rahul Gandhi was not allowed to complete his speech on the Motion of Thanks to the President’s Address February 2. This is not an isolated instance. The Leader of Opposition in the Lok Sabha is almost invariably not allowed to speak, it claimed. Eight Opposition MPs were “arbitrarily suspended” for the entire Budget session February 3, the notice mentioned.

CM flags off 250 ambulances

Bhubaneswar, Feb 10: In a bid to meet emergency health-care requirements and reduce the time taken for patients to reach hospitals, Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi Tuesday flagged off 250 new ambulances to strengthen emergency health services across the state.

While 150 ambulances were launched in the first phase December 23, the additional 250 were dedicated to the public at Kalinga Stadium here Tuesday.

The state government has invested around ₹111 crore from its own resources for the fleet, an official said.

“The objective of launching these ambulances is to ensure timely emergency health services and reduce the time taken for patients to reach hospitals,” Majhi said.



At present, 866 emergency ambulances are operational across Odisha. An additional 500 ambulances under the ‘Janani Express’ scheme cater specifically to pregnant women and sick children, the officials said. Majhi said steps are being taken to ensure uninterrupted ambulance services from all blocks to district hospitals, and from district hospitals to SCB Medical College and Hospital

in Cuttack. “Ambulance services will also be extended to airstrips such as Rourkela and Jaipur under the Viman Yojana,” he said.

ARSON, FIRING ROCK MANIPUR

Imphal, Feb 10: In a fresh bout of violence over the alleged assault of a Tangkhul Naga community member in Manipur’s Ukhrul, several abandoned houses were set on fire and shots fired Tuesday morning, prompting the state government to suspend internet services in the district for five days, police said.

The fresh firing and arson in Litan Sareikhong area comes a day after two Tangkhul Naga organisations restricted the movement of Kukis in Ukhrul and Kamjong districts.

“Armed men set ablaze abandoned houses and fired several rounds of bullets at Litan Sareikhong. The situation remains tense, and security forces are trying to bring the situation under control,” a police officer said.

The Manipur government Tuesday ordered suspension of internet, including services through broadband, VPN and VSAT in the revenue jurisdiction of Ukhrul district for five days as a preventive and precautionary measure, he said.

Locals, who fled their residences, confronted security forces for their alleged failure to stop firing in the area.

Washington, Feb 10: A newly discovered deep-sea creature has become an unlikely Internet star. After appearing in a popular YouTube video, a rare chiton found nearly three miles beneath the ocean surface sparked a worldwide naming effort, drawing more than 8,000 suggestions from people around the world. Scientists ultimately chose the name ‘Ferreiraella populi’, meaning “of the people” or “The people’s mollusc”.

Scientists first discovered the deep-sea chiton – a type of marine mollusc – in 2024 in the Izu-Ogasawara Trench of the coast of Japan at a depth

of over 5,500 metres (3.4 miles), according to a report by ‘The Independent’.

Following its discovery, a public naming campaign began after YouTuber Ze Frank

featured the rare chiton from the genus Ferreiraella in an episode of his “True Facts” series, the report said.

Over 8,000 suggestions for its name were submitted through social media, and after reviewing the entries, scientists selected the name ‘Ferreiraella populi’, where the species name in Latin means “of the people”.

Eleven different participants independently suggested the same name during the online process, researchers say.

The mollusc has eight armoured shell plates and an iron-clad radula, or tongue, and belongs to a rare group known for living only on sunken wood in the deep sea. Chitons, espe-

cially deep-sea ones, are rarely studied despite their key role in nutrient circulation within seafloor wood-fall ecosystems.

It also hosts a small group of worms that feed on its excrement near its tail, according to details of the species revealed in the ‘Biodiversity Data Journal’.

“We were overwhelmed by the response and the massive number of creative name suggestions!” said study author Julia Sigwar from the Natural History Museum Frankfurt.

Other suggestions were also made in the online poll, including the name Ferreiraella ohmu, referencing a chiton-like creature from a Studio Ghibli film.

in association with Nikhil Chaudhary of MDC Film-works.

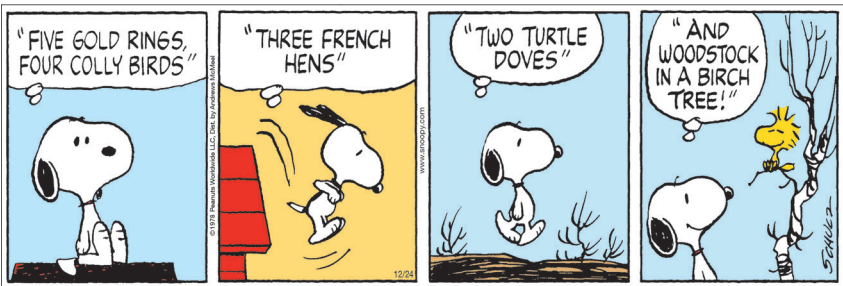
National Award-winning actor Prakruti Mishra, Dipanwit Dashmohapatra, Sonalli Sharmishta, and Satya

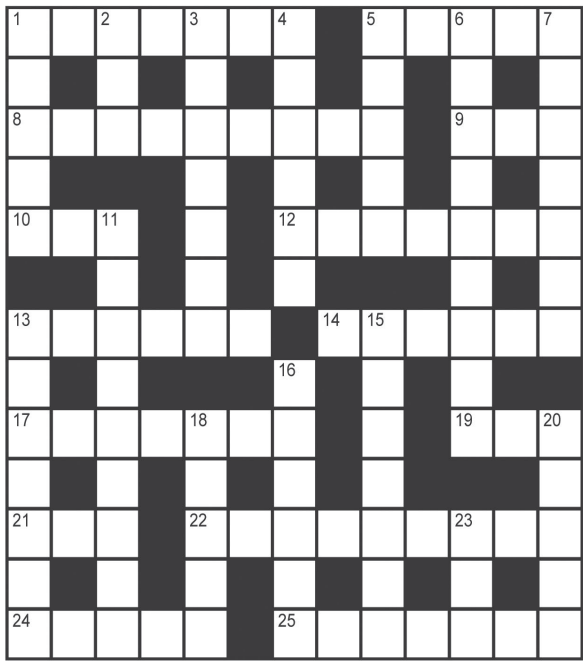

Illegal crusher unit owners jittery after minor minerals dept directive

Pitabas Panda murder case: Accused Bikram hospitalised

Jajpur, Feb 10: Illegal stone crusher units are causing the state to lose revenue worth crores of rupees, officials said. Despite periodic inspections, effective action against unauthorised crushers has remained limited, allowing violations to continue.

The Minor Minerals department has been conducting checks at stone crusher units to verify environmental clearances, transit passes, sale receipts and other mandatory documents. However, visible enforcement against illegal units has so far been lacking.

To curb such violations, the state Steel and Mines Department had earlier issued an order, May 5, 2025, directing all stone crusher units to register on the Integrated Minor Mineral Mining Management System (i4MS) portal. The Directorate of Minor Minerals reiterated the directive through subsequent orders issued May 9, 2025 and October 30, 2025.

However, as per the officials, even after nine months, none of the stone crusher owners complied with the registration requirement, prompting fresh instructions from the government.



In a recent order February 9, 2026, Deputy Director of Minor Minerals Turam Balai Munda directed all Deputy Directors of Mines (DDMs) and Mining Officers (MOs) to ensure that all stone crusher units are registered on the i4MS portal by February 20, 2026.

The directive asked field officers to treat the matter on priority and initiate appropriate action against non-compliant units. Officials said the registration process would help improve monitoring, enhance transparency and prevent revenue loss caused by unauthorised mining and crushing activities.

The Directorate of Minor Minerals under the Steel and Mines Department has issued a standard operating procedure (SOP) for the registration of stone crusher units on the i4MS portal. As per the SOP, all

operational stone crusher units must complete their registration on the i4MS portal within one month.

A private farm has been directed to take the necessary steps for integration of the SOP. The registration certificate will remain valid until the expiry of the sitting criteria or the consent to operate (CTO). Unit owners must apply for renewal through the portal at least 30 days before the registration expires.

For transportation of minerals from crusher units, obtaining permission from the competent authority and securing an e-Transit Permit (e-TP) through the i4MS portal will be mandatory. Crusher unit owners must provide accurate daily details of raw materials received and processed output dispatched through Form-C on the portal. A consolidated

monthly return must be submitted to the authorities within the first week of every month.

All norms prescribed by the Pollution Control Board must be strictly followed. Crusher units will be required to produce mineral stock details and relevant records during inspections by government officials. Installation of CCTV cameras and check gates has been made mandatory to ensure proper monitoring of stock.

Violation of the SOP may lead to cancellation of registration. The district-level task force will oversee the registration process and ensure compliance. Regular roadside checks will be conducted by the administration to inspect vehicles transporting chips, dust and metals from crusher units. Vehicles found operating without valid e-TPs will face penalties, and action will be initiated against owners and drivers. In such cases, the registration of the concerned crusher unit can also be cancelled.

Officials said strict implementation of these measures is expected to significantly boost revenue and effectively curb illegal mining and transportation of black stone.

Chhatrapur/Berhampur, Feb 10: Former MLA Bikram Panda, who is lodged in Berhampur Circle Jail after his arrest in the Pitabas Panda murder case, was admitted to the surgery ward of MKCG Medical College and Hospital Tuesday following health complications.

Panda had returned to jail after receiving treatment at MKCG Medical College and Hospital two days ago. However, he was readmitted after complaining of severe abdominal and chest pain. He is currently under police guard and admitted to Bed No. 320 in the surgery ward.

Hospital sources said Panda is suffering from a gall bladder-related ailment, and surgery may be required.

In a related development, another accused in the case, BJD leader Madan Dalai, was also admitted to the same hospital Tuesday after his health condition deteriorated. Dalai was produced before the district and sessions court Monday in a wheelchair due to his poor health. He has been admitted to the orthopaedics department for treatment.

MKCG Medical College and Hospital Superintendent Durgamadhab Satapathy confirmed that Panda is undergoing treatment in the surgery ward under the supervision of specialist doctors. He also said

Dalai has been admitted for medical care in the orthopaedics department.

Police have so far arrested 16 persons in connection with the murder of Pitabas Panda, including former MLA Bikram Panda and former mayor Shibashankar Das, also known as Pintu. All the accused were produced before the court and remanded to judicial custody.

The case was heard on February 9 and subsequently transferred to the court of the Additional District and Sessions Judge-III. The next hearing in the case is scheduled for February 17.

Defence counsel Chakrapani Nahak said the court is expected to hear bail pleas of some of the accused and frame charges on the same day.

Dacoity bid foiled in Sonapur; 3 held with firearms, bomb

Sonapur, Feb 10: Police foiled an attempted dacoity in Sonapur town and arrested three persons, seizing firearms, live ammunition, a bomb and other weapons, officials said Tuesday.

The arrested accused were identified as Debashish Panda (28) of S Patrapali village under Ulunda police limits, Sonu alias Shubhanshu Sekhar Kumbhar (26) of Block Chhak area in Sonapur town, and Vicky alias Shubham Pritam Hota (25) of Champamal area under Biramaharajpur police limits.

Superintendent of Police Narayan Nayak said in a press conference held at the district police headquarters Tuesday that the accused were allegedly planning a dacoity at a business establishment in Sonapur and were moving around in a car with lethal weapons Monday night. Acting on intelligence inputs, a police team led by Sonapur IIC Jayadev Bag intensified patrolling.

As per reports, the police intercepted a red Maruti Alto car (OR-05-AD-0933) while it was moving from Nalini Chhak towards Biju Patnaik Chhak. While the occupants attempted to flee after spotting the police, they were apprehended by the cops.

During a search conducted in the presence of witnesses, police recovered two country-made pistols, six live rounds and a magazine from the accused. A knife was seized from Panda, while a small axe, a live bomb and cash amounting to ₹39,300 were recovered from the car.

Police said the accused did not possess any valid arms licence and had allegedly procured the weapons from a neighbouring district. Shubhanshu and Shubham have previous criminal records, officials added. A case (48/26) has been registered at Sonapur police station under the Arms Act and Explosives Act. The accused were produced before the court, and further investigation is underway to ascertain the involvement of others.

Odisha appoints special officer in Kotia amid border dispute

Koraput, Feb 10: In a significant administrative move amid the ongoing Odisha-Andhra Pradesh border dispute, the Odisha government Monday independently assigned Sourav Kumar Das the responsibility of Leave Reserve Officer (LRO) at the Collectorate, with a special focus on Kotia. The decision reflects the state government's intent to strengthen governance, restore public confidence, and address long-pending civic issues in the sensitive border region.

Soon after assuming charge, Das visited Kotia along with senior officials and representatives from various administrative council bodies. The visit aimed at taking stock of ground realities and initiating coordinated action on key concerns affecting local residents, particularly in the sectors of healthcare, education, infrastructure, and overall development.



During an extensive interaction at the Kotia Panchayat, the newly appointed officer held discussions with elected representatives, village elders, and members of the local administration. Several issues were raised, including lack of adequate medical facilities, educational challenges faced by students, road connectivity, welfare scheme implementation, and administrative accessibility.

Assuring prompt action, Das emphasized that the government is committed to resolve the problems of Kotia on a priority basis. "The purpose of my visit is to listen to the people

directly and rebuild trust. The administration will now work in close coordination to ensure that basic services reach every resident of Kotia without delay," he said.

He further assured that continuous monitoring would be carried out and inter-departmental coordination will be strengthened to fast-track development works. "From now onwards, the administration will fully cooperate with the people. Our focus is on sustainable development and protecting the interests of residents in this border area," Das added.

Local representatives welcomed the government's initiative, expressing hope that the appointment would bring administrative stability and long-term solutions to Kotia's longstanding issues. The move is being seen as a strategic step by the Odisha government to assert administrative presence and reinforce governance in the region.

Court frames charges against top ultra Azad

Rayagada, Feb 10: A POC SO court here Tuesday framed charges against Maoist leader Azad, also known as Dunna Keshava Rao, in connection with a 2013 case involving alleged rape and torture of a minor girl. Azad is currently lodged as an undertrial prisoner at Jharsuguda jail.

Although his advocate Nab Kumar Kanta filed a petition seeking to absolve Azad of the offences, the court framed charges against top Maoist leader.

Additional District and Sessions Judge and POC SO court judge Sweta Mishra rejected the petition and remanded Azad to judicial custody.

According to the case details, it was April 25, 2013, when a minor girl lodged a complaint at Bissamkatak police station, alleging that about a year ago, she was abducted by Azad, along with several other Maoists - Nikhil, Sagar, Mitu, Sadhu and Subas. They threatened her at gunpoint and gangraped her. She was allegedly held captive in forest areas of Chandrapur, Phulbani, Gajapati, Karlaghati and Niyamgiri hills. However, she escaped around 15 days before filing the complaint and later approached the police.

A case (43/13) was registered under Sections 363, 366(A), 376(G), 506 and 34 of the IPC, Sections 25 and 27 of the Arms Act, and Sections 4 and 8 of the POC SO Act. Kanta dubbed the allegations false, stating that Azad had surrendered before Hyderabad police in May 2011 and had been in custody since then, making his involvement in the alleged 2012 offence impossible.

97 sign up for body donation at VIMSAR

Sambalpur, Feb 10: As many as 97 people have submitted sworn declarations expressing their willingness to donate their bodies to Veer Surendra Sai Institute of Medical Sciences and Research (VIMSAR), Burla. The documents were handed over Tuesday morning by the Indian Body and Organ Donation Institute (IBODI).

The declarations, along with other necessary documents, were formally presented to VIMSAR Director and Dean Pradeep Kumar Mohanty and Head of the Anatomy Department Mamata Sar in the presence of IBODI president Prabhas Acharya, associate professor Sabita Singh, former principal and professor of pharmacology Bhabagrahi Rath, and organisation members Bipin Panda and Narayan Pradhan.

These donors included both men and women who had earlier taken an oath expressing their consent for body donation.

Speaking on the occasion, Acharya said the institute had so far facilitated pledges from around 50,000 people for organ donation and about 2,600 for body donation. He said such initiatives played a crucial role in strengthening medical education and research.

Sar said medical students showed greater interest in learning from actual human bodies than virtual models, as it significantly aided their understanding of anatomy. She added that the efforts of volunteers encouraging body donation were highly commendable and contributed meaningfully to the training of future doctors.

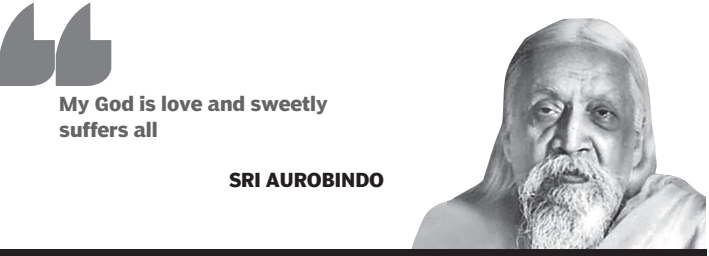

Epstein’s Sleaze & Politics

Influential people and high dignitaries often willingly get into honey-traps or sex rackets to seek pleasure using their positions. The Dutch dancer Mata Hari used her charm and sexuality during World War I as part of her spying weapon to ferret out secrets from her targeted victims. Italy’s Prime Minister Silvio Berlusconi organized the infamous “bunga bunga” parties between 2010 and 2011 in his private villa in Arcore, near Milan, for alleged erotic entertainment, including striptease acts by young women, some of whom were reportedly aspiring showgirls. But all these pale into insignificance compared to the sexual exploits influential men from different continents allegedly indulged in as favours from the dubious American financier and human trafficker Jeffrey Epstein. This is because national secrets and trade and commerce have never before been compromised on such a scale as the Epstein files unearthed by US investigators have revealed. These documents demonstrate that unlike Mata Hari or Berlusconi, Epstein and his rich and powerful friends did not remain limited to just sex with young women but more importantly it was the gruesome acts of pedophilia mixed with abominable practice of child sacrifice, drinking the blood of tortured and terrified children and infants and multiple acts that cannot be understood or comprehended, leave alone believed by common people.

Epstein files contain names, references and details of many top world leaders, not just limited to politicians like ministers, Presidents, Prime Ministers, but also judges, top officials, industrialists, business tycoons and billionaires from the US and across the world, including India. Hushed whispers even go as far as to connect the recent US-India trade deal as a product of pressure generated by ‘Redacted’ Indian names that hold the power of disturbing the power structure in this country.

The UK also is currently in the grip of a severe political crisis in the wake of the disclosures that threaten the survival of British Prime Minister Keir Starmer. The latest casualty is Starmer’s chief of staff Morgan McSweeney who has resigned after taking responsibility for backing the appointment of Lord Mandelson as Britain’s ambassador to the US, despite what was known about the peer’s friendship with Epstein. The resignation was hoped to be a calculated gamble to let the PM off the hook for the role he played in the appointment of Mandelson. But it has compounded matters for Starmer with a call for his own resignation given by Anas Sarwar, Labour’s leader in Scotland with ambition to step into Starmer’s shoes.

Starmer had earlier sought to deflect the criticism for vetting Mandelson’s appointment and indicated that he would move to tighten rules on lobbying, following revelations that Epstein used Mandelson as a conduit for influence and inside information. But McSweeney’s exit shows there is deep trouble within the ranks of the ruling Labour Party. Many within the ruling establishment are said to be willing to share Sarwar’s view that over the past year and a half there have been “too many incidents where wrong judgment calls have been made.”

PM Starmer still has some chance to successfully weather the storm since his would-be challengers are keeping their cards close to their chests. It seems unlikely that any of them would relish the prospect of their party suffering a debacle in elections to several counties in May. Whatever happens, there is no denying the fact his government has now lost control over how events will unfold in the coming months. The Epstein scandal in which two of Starmer’s close men have got involved has come as a shot in the arm of the Far-Right political party, Reform UK, of Nigel Farage which seems to have already captured the imagination of a large number of people in that country.

PM Starmer has tried, in the past few days, to insulate himself against the wave of outrage that threatens to engulf him. He condemned in unequivocal terms Mandelson’s apparent leaking of market-sensitive information as a cabinet minister in Gordon Brown’s government. He has now announced Mandelson will be removed from the privy council.

The Epstein scandal has unnerved Starmer so much that he has been forced to accept the proposal from Kemi Badenoch, the Leader of the Opposition, that all documents relating to Mandelson’s appointment should be made public. However, this has landed him in fresh troubles with his own party colleagues questioning the decision to open sensitive documents for public scrutiny.

At the moment there have been a flurry of denials and unconvincing self-defence by many of the bigwigs whose names have figured in the Epstein files for alleged moral turpitude, child trafficking and selling classified information for sexual favours. They have acquired political overtones as an influential elite group of people seemed to have believed itself to be beyond the law. Or, as some claim, so very powerful that no law anywhere can touch them. Time, like many such exposes earlier, may very well never tell whether they were correct since the law is never equal for the weak and the powerful.

TRANSACTIONAL FOREIGN POLICY

The just-concluded talks among representatives of the United States, Russia, and Ukraine in the United Arab Emirates to end Russia’s war in Ukraine finished, no surprise, virtually where they began. But the latest effort might shed light on how the US is thinking about Russia’s place in the international system – in particular, what a postwar bilateral relationship might look like. Like much of US President Donald Trump’s foreign policy, this vision appears to be defined by commercial considerations.

Trump’s willingness to put aside human rights or respect for the rule of law in his quest to strike business deals from Pakistan to the Gulf states might look like realpolitik, but Trump’s transactional approach should not be mistaken for realism. Whereas a realist foreign policy accounts for constraints, power dynamics, and long-term interests, a transactional approach reduces international politics to a patchwork of narrow bargains. And while realism calls for making the most of norms, alliances, and institutions, transactionalism counsels their evasion or even destruction.

At a time when the postwar order appears to be crumbling, this traditional conception of realism might sound idealistic, and transactional engagement more pragmatic. Unburdened by the responsibility to build institutions or maintain alliances, and unconstrained by principles, a transactional leader, the thinking goes, can deliver results even in challenging circumstances. But the long-term outcomes are likely to be far from desirable.

This is almost certainly the case when it comes to America’s emerging approach to Russia. The Trump administration seems to view the end of active hostilities in Ukraine less as an end goal than as an opportunity to begin reconfiguring economic and geopolitical relations with the Kremlin. The gradual rollback of sanctions, technology restrictions, and market barriers will then enable the US to continue to shape outcomes as

it wishes.

Crucially, however, these changes will be applied selectively, with actors being forced to negotiate agreements individually. What were conceived as instruments of broad deterrence – mechanisms for forcing a rogue entity back into a rules-based system – will be wielded to shape incentives within elite structures. This pay-to-play approach, devoid of institutional ambition, can hardly be considered economic statecraft, and it is unlikely to work.

Because commercial considerations are always paramount for Trump, he assumes that the same is true for leaders like Russian President Vladimir Putin, and thus that political agreements are more likely to last if they are embedded in commercial arrangements that increase the costs of reversals or violations. This also explains the administration’s belief that a partial normalization of the US-Russia relationship would automatically weaken Russia’s relationship with China.

According to this “reverse Nixon” strategy, it does not matter that an ideological realignment is not on the cards; drawing Russia back into some Western-connected infrastructure – financial clearing, technological standards, supply chains – will be enough to weaken Russia’s alignment with China. Power, in this view, lies less in alliances than in controlling the architecture of connectivity. The Russian elite thus needs to be brought into Western economic and commercial frameworks through a large number

of narrow, overlapping deals.

Whether these assumptions hold in Russia is far from clear. Nearly four years of war, harsh sanctions, and asset redistribution have further consolidated what was already a highly personalized regime. Personalization increases the internal cost of compromise and narrows the space for durable deal-making. What looks appealing on a balance sheet might be politically untenable in the Kremlin, which must reckon with a population that has absorbed around a million casualties in the Ukraine war.

Even if deals are made, the idea that they can underpin a stable, prosperous system is far-fetched. By privileging personalities over processes, leverage over legitimacy, and speed over sustainability, transactional policymaking erodes predictability, and creates space for rule-breaking. This is not good news for the US: it was by acting as a trusted enforcer of shared rules that America was able to secure and retain the global leadership position that brought it so many advantages over the last several decades. But it is even worse news for Europe.

Ukraine’s gradual integration is a central geopolitical project for the European Union. A US-Russia arrangement in which Ukraine is little more than a bargaining chip risks hollowing out this project before it is consolidated. How can the EU anchor Ukraine in its institutional order if Ukraine’s future is to reflect a transactional settle-

ment negotiated by external powers?

Europe is trying to adapt to this new, more disorderly world through diversification and “de-risking.” Recent trade agreements with India and Mercosur (Argentina, Brazil, Paraguay, and Uruguay) reflect this approach. But while these partnerships are strategically necessary, they carry political costs. Social resistance to trade agreements like that reached with Mercosur highlights the limits of a “narrow-path” globalization which promises resilience while generating domestic anxiety.

More important, diversification does not eliminate dependency. The US remains the EU’s largest market, absorbing one-fifth of EU exports. Moreover, Europe still depends on US capabilities in defense, intelligence, finance, internet technology, cloud computing, AI, and advanced semiconductors. The effort to break these dependencies by embracing European alternatives or building coalitions of middle powers will not bear fruit any time soon.

Not everyone is worse off in this new age of transactional international politics. While Trump looks for excuses to declare quick victories, China is playing the long game, reinforcing Sino-centric technological standards, locking in supply chains, expanding financial and digital infrastructure, and building up its military and innovative capacity. This will leave it well positioned to capitalize on the destruction of the US-led global order.

In a world of asymmetrical power dynamics and deep interdependencies, the only path to stability lies in binding rules, credible institutions, and enduring alliances. Trump’s rejection of this basic truth – reflected in his administration’s dealings with Russia – augurs an age of volatility from which China will emerge a clear winner.

The calf is sticking its head out, while being held by someone in the backseat. It’s not everyday that you see a cow – even a baby cow – being transported in an auto-rickshaw, so the video was widely shared and received many likes and comments.

My favourite comment was this: “Why should dogs have all the fun?”

Indeed, another video shared on Instagram shows a dog sitting calmly on the roof of an auto-rickshaw as it travels down a busy street in Pune. Don’t ask me why the dog was

on the roof. Perhaps the auto didn’t have enough space for it, or perhaps the dog just wanted to do something that dogs don’t often get to do: look down on humans.

Dogs have been known to travel in every mode of transportation possible. Many of them routinely travel in cars, of course. They love to put their heads outside the window and feel the breeze. They especially love spotting other dogs on the street and barking at them: “Ha ha! You’re walking!”

Dogs have also travelled on motorcycles, on buses and trains, and on bullock carts. They’ve taken many flights, mostly on planes, but also on helicopters. The only type of travel that dogs do not routinely attempt is space travel.

Dozens of wealthy people have become space tourists in recent years by spending \$450,000 or more for short trips into space,

but dogs do not have that kind of money. It’s only a matter of time, of course, that a billionaire takes his pooch on a space flight.

Which ever dog becomes the first canine space tourist will be following in the footsteps of Laika, the first dog in space. Laika was a stray mongrel taken off the streets of Moscow and sent into space aboard a Sputnik 2 spacecraft in 1957, becoming the first animal to orbit the earth. The Soviets were using dogs to observe the effects of spaceflight on living creatures. Unfortunately Laika did not survive – she died of hyperthermia during the flight. But she will always be remembered as a pioneer of dog space travel. If dogs ever create a Canine Space Agency, you can bet there’ll be a statue of Laika outside the headquarters.

I’ve tried to tell my dog, Lu-

lu, about Laika, hoping it will inspire her. I don’t want her to travel into space – I just want her to travel down the road in a car. But Lulu has a fear of cars that I just can’t overcome.

Whenever we want to travel with Lulu, we have to struggle to get her into our car. She pulls back on her leash and tries desperately to run away. If we do manage to get her into the car, she sits nervously in the backseat, drooling continually, looking like a death-row inmate being driven to the gallows. If we give her something to eat, even a special treat, she doesn’t touch it.

Some humans suffer from fear of flying. My dog suffers from fear of riding. I’ve shown her videos of dogs traveling blissfully in cars, trains and planes, but Lulu just gives me a look that says, “You expect me to believe that you didn’t create this with AI?”

Mumbai installs barriers to protect oceans

Mumbai releases about 5 million kg of plastic waste into the Arabian Sea and the Indian Ocean annually, impacting 220 km of the coastline, 152 sq km of mangroves, 107 protected species and nearly 1.9 million livelihoods dependent on coastal and marine ecosystems

New Delhi, Feb 10: At least 61 tonnes of plastic is expected to be recovered every year from Trombay and Malad waterways in Mumbai, where barriers will be installed in phases to stop the flow of plastic waste into the Arabian Sea and the Indian Ocean, officials said Tuesday.

The initiative is being led by The Ocean Cleanup, a Nether-

lands-based non-profit organisation that develops technologies to remove plastic from the oceans, in collaboration with the Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai and the Maharashtra Pollution Control Board (MPCB).

“Mumbai will witness the deployment of barriers to stop the flow of plastic waste into the Arabian Sea and the Indian

Ocean. The first deployments will focus on the Trombay and Malad waterways, identified through a data-driven analysis as significant contributors to ocean-bound plastic waste. The technology is scheduled for deployment over 2026. Once operational, these initial systems are expected to recover 61 to 92 tonnes of plastic per year. Research found that 80

per cent of marine litter along India’s coastlines is made up of plastic,” the Ocean Cleanup said in a statement.

The deployment, which will kick off before the monsoon season arrives, will take place in phases.

According to a survey conducted by the Ocean Cleanup, Mumbai releases about 5 million kg of plastic waste into the Arabian Sea and the Indian Ocean annually, impacting 220 km of the coastline, 152 sq km of mangroves, 107 protected species and nearly 1.9 million livelihoods dependent on coastal and marine ecosystems.

The primary sources of plastic waste in the city are urban runoff, industrial discharge, and inadequate waste management practices.

“India is a critical geography in the global fight against plastic pollution. With such a large proportion of plastic on India’s coasts, stopping waste before it reaches the ocean is crucial in safeguarding the ocean against plastic pollution,” said Boyan Slat, Founder and CEO, The

Ocean Cleanup.

“Through our 30 Cities Programme, Mumbai has been identified as a priority intervention point, and by working closely with local government bodies, implementation partners, NGOs and community partners, we aim to deploy solutions that are not only effective but also deeply aligned with local needs and long-term development goals,” Slat added.

Research by The Ocean Cleanup reveals that just 1,000 of the world’s 3 million rivers are responsible for nearly 80 per cent of plastic emissions into the ocean.

Through the 30 Cities Programme, The Ocean Cleanup aims to cut one-third of global river-based plastic emissions, using its comprehensive strategy and proven technologies to target 30 of the most polluting urban waterways worldwide.

Mumbai is identified as a critical intervention point due to the scale of plastic leakage and its impact on local communities and ecosystems.

UP to build 1,680 modern toilets at 640 railway stations

Lucknow, Feb 10: As the Uttar Pradesh government is set to build 1,680 modern toilets for women at 640 railway stations across the state, Uttar Pradesh Women’s Commission Vice Chairperson Aparna Yadav Tuesday termed it an important step for women’s health, dignity, and safety.

Calling the initiative a welcome move, Aparna Yadav praised the state government and the Railway Department for prioritising women-friendly infrastructure at railway stations, especially in smaller and rural areas.

Speaking to IANS, Aparna Yadav said, “This is an important step for women’s health, their self-respect, and their safety. It is quite a welcoming step that the Railway Department has made a proposal on this. I want to thank Prime Minister Narendra Modi for the way he is inspiring people on women sensitisation.”

She further said that separate and clean toilets for women at railway stations were a necessity and would also send a strong message about women’s dignity in public spaces.

“The government is trying to take women empowerment seriously. Making separate bathrooms will also give a message, as it is a matter of pride. The most important thing is to have clean bathrooms because a lot of problems come up with

using dirty bathrooms,” she told IANS.

Highlighting how railway stations cater to people from all walks of life, Aparna Yadav stressed that women passengers often face discomfort due to a lack of hygienic and safe washroom facilities, especially at stations where existing infrastructure is limited.

“Now, women will not feel uncomfortable. Railway stations are such places where every type of person comes. It is not necessary that only educated people come there. People come from different backgrounds, and rail is such a medium through which people can travel at any time. So, it is a welcoming step. I praise the government and the Railway Department,” she added.

As per the plan, the 1,680 toilets will be built at 640 stations, including major stations like Charbagh, Alamnagar, Utrertia, and Malhaur. The Railway Board has given in-principle approval to the project, which is estimated to cost around ₹84 crore. An amount of ₹15 crore will be allocated for the first phase of the work.

The lack of toilets for women at railway stations has been a long-standing concern in Uttar Pradesh. The Daily Passengers Association had earlier raised the issue with Railway Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw, following which the Railways took cognisance and moved ahead with the proposal.

Maha clears land policy for development of ‘Third Mumbai’

Mumbai, Feb 10: The Maharashtra cabinet Tuesday approved a land acquisition and allotment policy for development projects for “Third Mumbai” near Mumbai Trans Harbour Link (MTHL), also known as Atal Setu.

Speaking to reporters after the cabinet meeting, Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis said that 200 sq km of land had been handed over to the Mumbai Metropolitan Regional Development Authority (MMRDA) to develop the area.

According to an official statement, the decision will apply to areas falling under the newly appointed New Town Development Authority and projects to be implemented in the future by the MMRDA.

The policy aims to facilitate planned development in the impact zone of the MTHL.

The cabinet decision is expected to provide a clear framework for land acquisition and distribution, enabling faster execution of infrastructure and urban development projects in the region.

The Atal Setu, a sea bridge which connects Sewri in Mumbai to Nhava Sheva in Navi Mumbai, is a key infrastructure project and is expected to play a crucial role in decongesting Mumbai and promoting balanced regional growth.

The cabinet also approved a long-term loan of ₹15,000 crore from NABARD to complete water resources projects, benefiting around 8 lakh hectares of agricultural land across the state.

The cabinet has allocated 12.76 hectares of government land at Vikaswadi in Karveer taluka of Kolhapur district for an international-standard cricket stadium.

To speed up the Purandar airport project in Pune district, the cabinet approved the formation of a Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV) and a loan of ₹6,000 crore for land acquisition and allied works.

The loan will be repaid by state agencies, including the MIDC, MADC and CIDCO, according to their shareholding, with the Maharashtra government providing approval and guarantee.

Fadnavis said 96 per cent of the farmers have given their consent for the project.

The cabinet cleared the launch of the ‘Majha Gaav, Arogya Sampanna Gaav’ (My Village, Healthy Village) campaign to improve health at the village level, which will run from April 1 to March 31, 2027, with an annual budget of ₹80.75 crore.

Under the campaign, awards ranging from ₹5 lakh to ₹2 crore will be given to gram panchayats up to the district council level.

Lucknow, Feb 10: Uttar Pradesh’s budget size has more than doubled from ₹3.47 lakh crore in 2016-17 to an estimated ₹8.33 lakh crore in 2025-26, while capital expenditure rose from ₹69,790 crore to ₹1,47,720 crore during the period, according to the Economic Survey.

Presenting the report on the opening day of the budget session Monday, Finance Minister Suresh Kumar Khanna said the budget has expanded by ₹4.86 lakh crore over the past nine years, compared to an increase of ₹2.34 lakh crore between 2008-09 and 2016-17.

The survey described the

state’s fiscal position as balanced, noting that the public debt-to-GSDP ratio declined from 29.3 per cent in 2016-17 to 28.0 per cent in 2024-25, lower than national and global averages.

In the health sector, the allocation has reached a record ₹46,728.48 crore, accounting for 6.1 per cent of the total budget. The report claimed that citizens’ out-of-pocket health expenditure has reduced and medical infrastructure has been strengthened.

Institutional deliveries increased from 34.74 lakh in 2021-22 to 41 lakh in 2024-25, marking an 18.02 per cent rise. Institutional births accounted for 96.12 per cent of total deliveries in 2024-25, while non-institutional deliveries declined by 50.44 per cent to 1.66 lakh.

The survey stated that free vaccination is being provided to children aged 0-5 years against 12 life-threatening diseases, including polio, tuberculosis, measles and Japanese encephalitis, and pregnant women are being immunised against tetanus.

Khanna said the number

of medical colleges has increased from 36 in 2017 to 81 by the end of 2025, including 45 government and 36 private institutions.

The state currently has 38 state universities and 52 private universities.

On tourism, the report said arrivals in Uttar Pradesh recorded an increase by 2.4 times, reaching 156.18 crore in 2025. A record 66.30 crore visitors attended the Prayagraj Mahakumbh, it said.

In agriculture, the sector’s contribution to the state economy increased from 24 per cent in 2017-18 to 24.9 per cent in 2024-25. Foodgrain production reached 737.4 lakh metric tonnes in 2024-25, raising the state’s share in national output from 18.1 per cent to 20.6 per cent.

Per hectare gross value addition rose from ₹0.98 lakh in 2017-18 to ₹1.73 lakh in 2024-25. Paddy accounts for 13.1 per cent of the state’s agricultural gross value, with area and production rising by 19.4 per cent and 23.6 per cent, respectively.

The report said around 65,000 food processing units are operational in the state, employing nearly 2.55 lakh youths, as Uttar Pradesh emerges as a food processing hub.

According to the Periodic Labour Force Survey 2023-24, 53.2 per cent of the workforce is engaged in agriculture and allied sectors, including 78.8 per cent of working women and 44 per cent of working men. Khanna also told the House that a zero-tolerance policy towards crime has been implemented to strengthen women’s safety.

VULTURES RETURN TO MELGHAT

The presence of a migratory Himalayan griffon suggested improving ecological conditions following sustained rewilding efforts

Mumbai, Feb 10: A wild Himalayan griffon vulture has been spotted in Maharashtra’s Melghat Tiger Reserve after nearly a decade, indicating that vultures released there are attracting their wild counterparts back to the landscape, a wildlife expert has said.

The sighting was significant as vultures had become locally extinct from the Melghat and Tadoba landscapes. The presence of a migratory Hi-

malayan griffon suggested improving ecological conditions following sustained rewilding efforts, Bombay Natural History Society (BNHS) Director Kishor Rithe said Monday.

Very recently, after the Himalayan griffon was seen in Melghat, a Eurasian griffon vulture was also spotted in the Tadoba Andheri Tiger Reserve, he noted.

By 2004, vulture populations in Maharashtra had declined drastically due to the use of non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) such as diclofenac, aceclofenac, ketoprofen and nimesulide, which proved fatal to the birds.

Thereafter, the Maharashtra Forest Department joined hands with BNHS to revive the nearly extinct species.

As part of the programme, 15 critically endangered long-billed vultures were shifted from the Vulture Conservation Breeding Centre at Pinjore to



the Somthana range in Melghat Tiger Reserve April 23 last year. The birds were kept in an aviary for acclimatisation before their release.

The vultures were fitted with GSM and satellite transmitters to study their movement, behaviour and survival December

19 last year. They were released from the aviary January 2 this year, after which BNHS began feeding them naturally outside the enclosure.

“Melghat has historically been a stronghold for vultures. We hope the birds relearn to thrive here. Their continued

presence and exploration of the Melghat Tiger Reserve (MTR) area over the last one month shows positive signs. On top of it, their socialising with a wild Himalayan griffon for almost a week is remarkable,” Rithe said.

Bhaskar Das, a conservation biologist at BNHS, said the fact that vultures released in Melghat were attracting wild vultures was a major achievement.

“The Himalayan griffon mixing with captive-released vultures and feeding alongside them indicates growing ecological acceptance of the MTR area,” he said.

A pioneer in vulture conservation, BNHS runs vulture breeding centres and several release sites and currently cares for around 700 vultures.

As many as 34 vultures have been soft-released in Melghat, Pench and Tadoba tiger reserves in Maharashtra during 2025-26.

Govt tightens AI use on social media

NEW RULES AIM TO CURB AI MISUSE ON SOCIAL MEDIA BY REQUIRING PERMANENT META DATA ON AI-GENERATED CONTENT, BANNING ILLEGAL CONTENT, AND SHORTENING USER GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL TIMELINES

New Delhi, Feb 10: The government Tuesday tightened rules for social media platforms such as YouTube and X, mandating the takedown of unlawful content within three hours, and requiring clear labelling of all AI-generated and synthetic content.

The new rules - which came in response to the growing misuse of Artificial Intelligence to create and circulate obscene, deceptive and fake content on social media platforms - require embedding of permanent meta-data or identifier with AI content and ban content considered illegal in the eyes of law, as well as shorten user grievance redressal timelines. The response timelines have been reduced to

two hours for platforms to take down flagged content involving material that exposes private areas, and in case of full or partial nudity, or sexual acts.

In the run-up to the rules, authorities had flagged a rise in AI-generated deepfakes, non-consensual intimate imagery and misleading videos that impersonate individuals or fabricate real-world events,

often spreading rapidly online.

The amended IT rules aim to curb such abuse by requiring faster takedowns, mandatory labelling of AI-generated content and stronger accountability from platforms to prevent the promotion and amplification of unlawful synthetic material. It places the onus on both social media platforms as well as AI tools.

Ministry of Electronics and

Information Technology (MeitY) issued a gazette notification, amending the Information Technology (Intermediary Guidelines and Digital Media Ethics Code) Rules, 2021. The new rules will come into force February 20, 2026.

Interestingly, February 20 is also the concluding day of India AI Impact Summit, a mega congregation New Delhi will host as the nation prepares to take the centre stage in global AI conversation.

The tweaked rules explicitly bring AI content within the IT rules framework; it defines AI-generated and synthetic content as one that by means audio, visual or audio-visual "is artificially or algorithmically created, generated, modified

or altered using a computer resource, in a manner that such information appears to be real, authentic or true and depicts or portrays any individual or event in a manner that is, or is likely to be perceived as indistinguishable from a natural person or real-world event."

Routine editing, accessibility improvements, and good-faith educational or design work are excluded from this definition.

The new rules require social media platforms to take down any illegal content flagged by the government or courts within three hours instead of the previously 36 hour deadline.

User grievance redressal timelines have also been shortened. The rules require mandatory labelling of AI content.

Time to impeach Rahul, Cong from politics: BJP

The BJP alleged that the Congress and its allies have been attacking constitutional institutions and posts at the behest of US-based billionaire George Soros since the BJP-NDA returned to power for a third consecutive term under Modi's leadership

New Delhi, Feb 10: The BJP Tuesday slammed the Opposition for submitting a notice to move a resolution for the removal of Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla from office, saying the time has come for India to "impeach" Rahul Gandhi and the Congress from politics. "Those who have been impeached of their consciousness are the ones who want to impeach all the constitutional posts of India," BJP national spokesperson Sambit Patra told reporters when asked about the Opposition's notice.

The BJP also alleged that the Congress and its allies have been attacking constitutional institutions and posts at the behest of US-based billionaire George Soros since the BJP-NDA returned to power for a third consecutive term under Prime Minister Narendra Modi's leadership.

The comments came after the Opposition submitted a notice for moving a resolution to remove Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla from office, for disallowing Rahul Gandhi and other opposition leaders from speaking in the House on the Motion of Thanks to the President's address, as well as

for the suspension of eight MPs.

Congress MP and chief whip K Suresh submitted the notice to the Lok Sabha Secretariat on behalf of several Opposition parties, including the Congress, Samajwadi Party and the DMK.

The TMC MPs, however, did not sign the notice and were not a party to it. Reacting sharply to the Opposition's move, Patra said, "The entire country is watching the behaviour of Rahul Gandhi and the Congress party in the House."

At the behest of Gandhi, an attempt was made to gherao the prime minister's seat so that they could do something to harm him, the BJP MP alleged in an apparent reference to the Opposition members' Wednesday protest in the Lok Sabha.

"What kind of thinking is this? I think the entire country will now have to think over this. The time has come for India to impeach Rahul Gandhi and the Congress party from politics," Patra told reporters at the BJP headquarters in Delhi.

The Lok Sabha Wednesday witnessed dramatic scenes as women MPs from the Opposition marched towards the Treasury benches holding banners ahead of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's scheduled reply to the discussion on the Motion of Thanks on the President's address.

Abdullah was addressing the House, winding up a discussion on the Union territory's Bud-



get presented February 6. The BJP members were on their feet during most part of his nearly 40-minute speech.

Speaker Rather, who repeatedly tried to persuade members to take their seats, later informed the BJP MLAs that their protest will not be recorded.

Referring to the recent India-US interim trade deal, the chief minister claimed it was detrimental to the interests of Jammu and Kashmir. He also made some remarks against the

BJP members, who repeatedly disrupted his speech.

The BJP legislators then stood up and assembled in the front row, terming Abdullah's remarks "unparliamentary". Talking to reporters outside the Assembly, Abdullah said, "Had they (BJP members) allowed me to speak, I would have withdrawn my words myself. I was ready to withdraw them and say the same thing in a different manner. But they did not let me speak.

"There is no question of offering an apology now. What has been said is already on record. Had they allowed me even a second to speak, I was standing there to say 'fine, I would withdraw those words' and put the same point differently. But since they did not allow me to speak, there is no question of apologising," Abdullah said.

BJP candidate dies by suicide

Hyderabad, Feb 10: A BJP candidate contesting the municipal elections in Telangana allegedly died by suicide in Narayanpet District Tuesday police said.

The saffron party alleged that "harassment and intimidation" by ruling Congress leaders drove the candidate to take the extreme step.

Hitting back at the BJP, the Congress said the saffron leaders are trying to derive political mileage out of the incident by blaming the ruling government in the state.

E Mahadevappa (45), contesting for the councillor post in Makthal municipality, was found hanging to the ceiling fan at his house in Makthal at around 4.30 AM, police said.

The Telangana BJP announced an ex-gratia of Rs 10 lakh to the family of Mahadevappa.

As of now, there is no prima facie evidence of abetment, but police are investigating from all angles, a senior police official said. The reason for the suicide is still not known, police said.

Director General of Police (DGP) B Shivadhar Reddy told reporters here that a case has been registered. "No suicide note was found," he said, adding further investigation was on.

Siddique murder case

Court frames charges against 27 accused

Mumbai, Feb 10: A special court here Tuesday framed charges under MCOCA and BNS against 27 accused in the 2024 murder case of former Maharashtra minister and NCP politician Baba Siddique after they pleaded not guilty.

Framing of charges is the first stage in a criminal trial under the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS), where the court formalises accusations based on evidence. The court, in the previous hearing, noted that there is sufficient material to proceed against all the accused and directed them to remain present before it Tuesday.

However, only 15 accused, lodged in Kalyan and Arthur Road jails, remained present. The other accused lodged in a jail in Thane were produced through video conferencing as they could not be brought to the court in South Mumbai due to logistical issues.

Special Judge Satyanarayan R Navander recorded the pleas of all the accused, who all pleaded not guilty and preferred to stand trial.

Parents, teachers back internet safety in school curriculum: Survey

New Delhi, Feb 10: Over 56 per cent parents and educators are advocating inclusion of the subject of internet safety into the core curriculum for students to protect them from mounting online perils and malicious content, a new survey has found.

The study, which gathered responses from 1,800 parents and 300 teachers, primarily focuses on how artificial intelligence (AI) is transforming the digital landscape -- deeply affecting how young minds learn, socialise and navigate information.

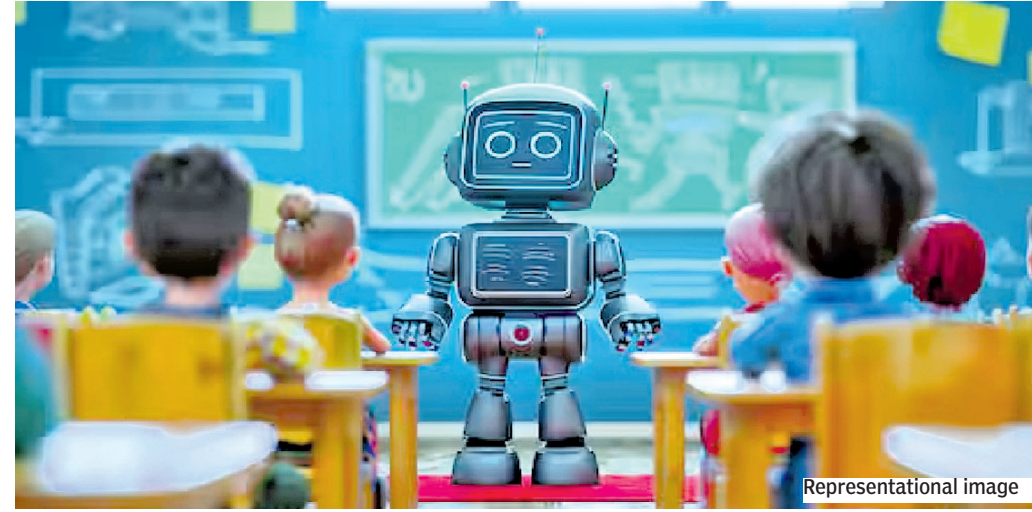
According to the survey, 32 per cent respondents called for

making internet safety a dedicated subject with weekly classes, while 24 per cent sought its integration into

existing core subjects like computer studies.

Naman Jain, Vice Chairman of Silverline Prestige School, which conducted the survey, said the outcomes are a wake-up call. "Our parents and teachers are telling us clearly -- the digital world our students inhabit today is fundamentally different from the one we grew up in. With AI reshaping every corner of the internet, online safety is no longer optional, it is essential literacy," he said.

"We have a responsibility to equip our students not just with academic knowledge, but with

the awareness and tools to navigate an increasingly complex digital ecosystem safely and intelligently," he said, asserting that educators should be committed to building a curriculum that prepares children for both opportunities and risks of tomorrow.

According to the survey, 34

per cent participants flagged cyberbullying prevention and reporting mechanisms as their primary concern, while protection from inappropriate content and online predators was a priority for 29 per cent respondents.

Privacy protection and re-

sponsible sharing of personal information was flagged as an urgent need by 22 per cent participants, while 15 per cent advocated managing screen time and preventing digital addiction.

When asked about the necessary frequency of the digital safety curriculum, 42 per cent

called for monthly sessions, 35 per cent supported termly programmes, 16 per cent advocated biannual sessions, while only 7 per cent believed annual sessions would be adequate.

When asked about how concerned they were regarding the emerging threats, 40 per cent respondents said they were 'extremely concerned' about students' exposure to inappropriate content and online safety threats, describing it as a daily worry requiring immediate action, while 24 per cent said they were 'moderately concerned', the report said.

"However, only 12 per cent felt 'very prepared' to actively address online safety. The majority, 51 per cent indicated they feel 'somewhat prepared' but need more resources and training, while 29 per cent admitted they feel 'minimally prepared' and struggle to keep pace with rapid technology changes," it added.

12 killed, 8 hurt as bus falls into river

Kathmandu: Twelve people were killed and eight others injured Tuesday after a passenger bus fell into a river in central Nepal, police said. The incident occurred around 11 am when the bus enroute to Okhaldhunga from Kathmandu fell into the Tamakoshi River in Ramechhap municipality in Bagmati province, 150 km east of Kathmandu, they said. Twelve people were killed in the accident, police said. Ten of the 12 deceased passengers were identified, Manthali Hospital Medical Superintendent Dr Keshab Singh Dhami was reported as saying by The Himalayan Times.

Israeli strikes kill 5 in Gaza


Cairo: Israeli airstrikes and gunfire killed five Palestinians in Gaza Tuesday, health officials said, the latest violence to undermine a four-month-old, US-brokered truce in the enclave. In Deir Al-Balah in central Gaza, an airstrike killed two people who were riding an electric bike, medics said. Later, Israeli drone fire killed a woman in Deir Al-Balah and troops shot dead a man in Khan Younis in the south, they said. Another man was killed by Israeli gunfire in Jabalia in north Gaza, Palestinian medics said.

Indian Students' attacker remanded

Moscow: The 15-year-old juvenile, who attacked and wounded four Indian medical students and two police officers Saturday, pleaded guilty and was remanded to two months' judicial custody Tuesday. The teenager, a student of class IX of a local school, pleaded guilty and apologised to his victims for causing suffering to them, Bashinform agency reported. He was produced in the Ufa court and has been remanded for two months of judicial custody till April 7, according to reports from the capital of Bashkortostan, 1200 km east of Moscow. He faces up to a 15-year sentence for the knife attack on four Indian students and two police officers.

Immigration chiefs to testify in Congress

Washington: The heads of the agencies carrying out President Donald Trump's mass deportation agenda will testify in Congress Tuesday and face questions over how they are prosecuting immigration enforcement inside American cities. Trump's immigration campaign has been heavily scrutinised in recent weeks, after the shooting deaths in Minneapolis of two protesters at the hands of Homeland Security officers.

China ramps up Taiwan rhetoric

China to support 'reunification forces' in Taiwan, go after 'separatists'

Beijing, Feb 10: China will offer firm support for "patriotic pro-reunification forces" in Taiwan and strike hard against "separatists", the top Chinese official in charge of policy towards the democratically-governed island said in comments published Tuesday.

China, which views Taiwan as its own territory despite the objections of the government in Taipei, has ramped up its military and political pressure against the island as Beijing seeks to assert its sovereignty claims.

Addressing this year's annual "Taiwan Work Conference", a key meeting which sets the tone for China's policy towards the island, the ruling Communist Party's fourth-ranked leader Wang Huning said officials must advance the "great cause of national reunification", the official state-run Xinhua news agency said.

China's "ultimate goal is to eliminate the Republic of China and advance unification," Taiwan's China-policy making Mainland Affairs Council said in a statement, referring to the island's formal name.

EU plans demands for concessions from Russia

Brussels, Feb 10: European Union foreign policy chief Kaja Kallas said Tuesday she would propose a list of concessions that Europe should demand from Russia as part of a settlement to end the war in Ukraine.

Talks to end the war have mainly involved Ukrainian, US and Russian officials, with Europeans consulted from time to time. But European officials say there can be no peace deal without them.

"Everybody around the table, including the Russians and the Americans, needs to understand that you need Europeans to agree," Kallas told a group of news agency reporters in Brussels.

"And for that, we also have conditions. And we should put the conditions not on Ukrainians, who have been already pressured a lot, but on the Russians."

TO PUT LIST TO EU GOVERNMENTS IN COMING DAYS

Kallas said she would propose a list to EU member governments in the coming days. Asked what the list could include, she cited the return of all Ukrainian children abducted during the war and limitations on Russia's armed forces. She did not elaborate further.

European officials say they have leverage such as some 210 billion euros (\$250 billion) in Russian assets frozen in Europe, which may be part of any settlement. Most European nations have pursued a policy of diplomatically isolating Russia since its 2022 invasion of Ukraine. But some have spoken in recent months in favour of talking directly to Moscow, partly as they are wary of extensive discussions between US and Russian officials.

Lavrov accuses US of blocking Russian oil buyers

Moscow, Feb 10: Russia has accused the US of attempting to prevent India and other countries from buying Russian oil, saying Washington is using a wide range of "coercive" measures, including tariffs, sanctions and direct prohibitions, to fulfil its objective of global economic dominance.

Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov also accused the US of using "unfair methods" to suppress competitors by imposing sanctions on Russian oil companies. "(The US) is attempting to

control our trade, investment cooperation, and military-technical ties with major strategic partners, such as India and other BRICS members," Lavrov said in an interview with TV BRICS Monday.

He said that the West is reluctant to relinquish its formerly dominant positions. "With the arrival of the (US President Donald) Trump administration, this struggle to suppress competitors became particularly pronounced and open," he said. Lavrov said that Russia accepted America's proposal on Ukraine during the Alaska

talks between President Vladimir Putin and his US counterpart Trump last year.

"We were told that the Ukrainian issue must be resolved. In Anchorage, we accepted the United States' proposal. To put it straightforwardly, they proposed, and we agreed - the problem should be solved," he said.

"Having accepted their proposals, we essentially fulfilled the task of resolving the Ukrainian issue and moving toward comprehensive, broad, mutually beneficial cooperation," he added.

"In practice, however, the opposite occurs: new sanctions are imposed, attacks on tankers are staged in international waters in violation of the UN Convention on the Law of the Sea, and India and other partners are discouraged from purchasing affordable Russian energy, while Europe has long prohibited such purchases, forcing them to buy American liquefied natural gas at significantly higher prices. Thus, in the economic sphere, the US has effectively declared a goal of economic domination," he said.

"This is the right time for them to step up at the international level, and I am confident they will make the most of this opportunity. Favourite Anish Bhanwala shot 287 to remain in contention for a finals berth while Neeraj Kumar's 277 meant that he would have to work hard on Wednesday to make the finals cut, which will follow the second rapid-fire round.

India's medal tally currently stands at 39 gold, 15 silver and 12 bronze medals and they comfortably head the standings.

Skipper Gerhard Erasmus blazed away to a nine-ball 18 before JJ Smit scored 22 off 15 balls to prop up Namibia. Logan van Beek and Bas de Leede picked up two wickets each for the Netherlands. In reply, Netherlands chased down the target of 157 in 18 overs with Bas de Leede and Colin Ackermann making 72 and 32 respectively, after opener Michael Levitt struck a 15-ball 28.

NZ outclass UAE

Chennai: Power hitting openers Finn Allen and Tim Seifert slammed fifties as New Zealand drubbed the United Arab Emirates by 10 wickets in their T20 World Cup Group D match here Tuesday. Allen (84 not out) and Seifert (89 not out) made mincemeat of the inexperienced UAE bowlers as the Kiwis overhauled the target of 174 in just 15.2 overs. This was also the highest partnership in T20s for any wicket. Earlier, skipper Muhammad Waseem and the promising Alishan Sharafu hit fifties to carry the UAE to a competitive 173 for six. After opting to bat, UAE lost opener Aryan Sharma early to pacer Jacob Duffy, but Waseem (66 no off 45 balls) and Shrafu (55, 47b) added 107 runs for the second wicket to give their side a solid base. For the Kiwis, pacer Matt Henry took two wickets while skipper Mitchell Santner and Duffy took a wicket each.

Pakistan defeat USA

Colombo: Sahibzada Farhan's power-filled fifty and spinner's accuracy lifted Pakistan to a smooth 32-run win over the United States of America in a Group A match of the T20 World Cup here Tuesday. Farhan's 41-ball 73 led Pakistan to a healthy 190 for nine, and then their highly-efficient spin quartet of Abrar Ahmed (1/30), Mohammad Nawaz (1/21), Shadab Khan (2/26) and Usman Tariq (3/27) did not allow the US batters any breathing space, limiting them to 158 for eight. It was Pakistan's second successive victory in this tournament, and now they are leading the group with four points.

Pakistan Prime Minister

Shehbaz Sharif announced that the national would boycott the T20 World Cup group league match against India in Colombo February 15 in solidarity with Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB), who were replaced after refusing to play their matches in India citing security reasons.

After hectic parleys and back-channel talks which also included intervention from Sri Lankan President Anura Kumara Dissanayake and the Bangladesh Cricket Board, which requested Shahbaz Sharif to change their stance keeping broader interests in mind, the boycott did end on Monday night.

The PCB has now also been given clearance to play India if both countries have to face off again in the latter stages of the World Cup.

Riyadh, Feb 10: Five Indians will tee up as the new season of the 2026 Ladies European Tour (LET) gets underway with the PIF Saudi Ladies International at Riyadh Golf Club.

The tournament takes place from Wednesday to Saturday, and Diksha Dagar, the top ranked Indian at 25th place in 2025, will be looking to improve her place to get into the Top-3 like she did in 2023.

The other golfers are Avani Prashanth, who has a superb first season on LET, Pranavi Urs, who did well to recover from an injury midway through the year and Hitaashee Bakshi, who sealed her card with a fine a top-3 finish as three Indians figured in the top-5 at the Hero Indian Open.

Also playing the event is Aditi Ashok, who divided her time between the LPGA and the LET, where she has won five times.

The LET has announced a record prize purse for the 2026 season with players competing for over 40 million euros for the first time in its history.

The PIF Saudi Ladies International, which is the first event of the 2026 PIF Global Series, will be contested as a 72-hole stroke play tournament, with a cut after 36 holes, and carries a prize purse of \$5 million USD.

From fringes to frontline: Dhakshineswar, India's new Davis Cup hero

New Delhi, Feb 10: In an era obsessed with flair, Dhakshineswar Suresh's rise has been defined by order.

From meticulously placed kit bags and stern discipline to years of dawn-to-dusk grind, his journey to becoming India's newest Davis Cup mainstay has been forged quietly, patiently, and far from the spotlight.

His tennis roots trace back to family. His father, Suresh Ekka, was a club-level player from Dindigul, and it was through those early connections that Dhakshineswar found his way to coach Lakshman Chakravarthi in Chennai.

From those early days, the grind was relentless. Between 2010 and 2016, Dhakshineswar would travel nearly 16 kilometres daily by bus across Chennai.

"He was just nine then. There was no ego, no shortcuts. He had to travel from Surapet to Mogappair, then Mogappair to

Anna Nagar, and from Anna Nagar to Loyola College, Nungambakka. I would pick him from the bus stand. The mornings were spent with fitness trainer Ranjit in Anna Nagar, followed by tennis sessions at Loyola College," Chakravarthi told PTI, sharing his ward's early struggles.

"He would play sets with everyone, and never shied away from working hard. He is very quiet, has a different attitude. He never drank Pepsi or Coke for years. He is very very disciplined," he added.

Money was often an issue. Opportunities were limited. Yet progress came in flashes. In 2016, Dhakshineswar travelled to France for training and later that year won the U16 Nationals at DLTA -- the prestigious Fenesta Open -- a milestone that gave the world a peek into his potential.

"If he had sponsors earlier, things could have been very different. He is playing at a different level," his coach said.



Setbacks, however, kept interrupting momentum.

A back injury in 2019 cost him five to six months, and the COVID-19 pandemic that followed, dried up competition and sponsorship.

With options narrowing, former India player Somdev

Devvarman advised a move to the United States, a decision that would re-define Dhakshineswar's career.

"We were short of money, so we sent him to the US on the advise of Somdev. The scholarship helped," Chakravarthi said. "There, he improved a

lot. College tennis not only provided structure but also sharpened his mental edge. The constant match play, the pressure of team competition, and the professional environment toughened him in ways rankings alone could not."

That mental strength now shows on the Davis Cup stage. In India's recent Davis Cup tie against the Netherlands in Bangalore, Dhakshineswar rose to the occasion, producing a composed and fearless performance under pressure to anchor the team when it mattered the most, winning all his three matches in India's close 3-2 win.

He will finish in May his studies at the Wake Forest University, where he is pursuing 'communication studies'.

At 65, Chakravarthi calls Dhakshineswar his finest pupil.

The coach believed the next leap is close.

"He should travel more and compete more. He can crack top-100 in six months. He should get wild cards. Playing

more tournaments is the key."

More than the coaching, Chakravarthi underlined the physical demands ahead.

"Coaching is good in India. Fitness is where the difference comes. He did well in the US, but he still needs to work on his legs."

At home, pride remains understated. Suresh Ekka, a man of few words, summed up his emotions after his son's latest Davis Cup heroics simply.

"What to say, no words."

Suresh said after his heroic show against the Netherlands, Dhakshineswar didn't say a word to his family.

"There was no conversation, just a hug." That quiet embrace mirrored Dhakshineswar's journey: uncluttered, disciplined, and built patiently over years of unseen effort. As he now cements his place in India's Davis Cup plans, his story stands as a reminder that breakthroughs are often forged not in noise, but in routine, resilience and belief sustained over time.
